## SQUARING UP AGAINST THE SCARLET KNIGHTS

Ranked 23rd in the country by NSCAA, Rutgers sits at a 9-2-1 record with a 2-2-1 conference mark. The Scarlet Knights finished the non-conference season at a perfect 7-0 and had an eight-game winning streak snapped against Illinois on Sept. 24, which was followed by a 1-0 loss to Northwestern on Sept. 27. Big Ten wins for Rutgers include a pair of 1-0 victories against Maryland and Michigan State. Last time out, Rutgers tied Michigan, 1-1, on Sunday afternoon. The Scarlet Knights are led in scoring by Colby Ciarrocca and Cassie Inacio, who have both found the back of the net three times. Samantha Valliant and Rachel Cole have each scored twice for Rutgers, while six others have registered at least one goal. Casey Murphy has played every minute of the season in goal, collecting 37 saves with a 0.33 goals against average.

Indiana and Rutgers have met only once before - a 1-0 Scarlet Knights victory last season in New Jersey.

## PLAYING PENN STATE

No. 11 Penn State is off to a 3-1-1 Big Ten start and an 8-2-2 overall mark. Conference victories for the Nittany Lions include Wisconsin, Iowa and Northwestern. Penn State lost a 1-0 decision to Minnesota and tied Nebraska, 1-1. Mallory Weber and Frannie Crouse have each scored six goals on the year, while Megan Schaffer has added five. In total, 10 Nittany Lions have combined to score 26 goals this year with four assists apiece to Weber and

Charlotte Williams. Britt Eckerstrom has started all 12 games this year, making 31 saves with a 0.59 goals against average.

Indiana and Penn State have previously met 24 times with the lone Hoosier win coming in 1996. The teams battled to a 0-0 draw in 2006 in Bloomington.

## LAST TIME OUT

The Hoosiers played just one contest last week, hosting Iowa on Saturday night. Indiana put up a season-high 20 shots, including nine on frame, but the two teams battled to a scoreless draw in double overtime.

## NEWS AND NOTES

- Sophomore Kayla Smith hails from Green Lane, Pa., which is about three hours from University Park, and is playing at Penn State for the first time in her career.
- Freshman Justine Lynn, who had battled back from an injury, made her first career appearance against Wisconsin on Sept. 25 before making her first career start against Minnesota on Sept. 27. The Grosse Pointe Woods, Mich. native made her first start at home on Saturday night.

## STONE'S CAREER YEAR

Goalkeeper Sarah Stone has registered a career-high six shutouts this season, bringing her career total to 14, just one behind the Indiana program record (15 by Ashley Davis, 1996-99). In addition, the redshirt senior has recorded 164 career saves, which ranks sixth in IU program history. Stone is currently second in the conference with 56 saves on the year.

## PUTTING IN OVERTIME

To this point, Indiana has played in six overtime contests this season, which is the most since the 2007 team played in eight. Five of Indiana's OT games have resulted in ties, while a sixth resulted in a 1-0 victory against Baylor in the first OT period on Aug. 30. Indiana's five ties this season are the most since the 1999 team registered six. The Hoosiers have had five of six home games result in double overtime ties.

## TIME CHANGE FOR OCT. 25

Indiana's Oct. 25 battle at Michigan State has been moved from a 1 p.m. start to 3 p.m. The game will now be shown live on the Big Ten Network, meaning all remaining IU contests will be broadcast live.

## TEAM EARNS ACADEMIC AWARD

For the fourth straight year, Indiana was recognized by The National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) for excellence in the classroom. Indiana was one of just 208 schools to have both the women and men's team earn the award.

## THAT'S A WRAP

IU finished up the non-conference portion of the season with a 3-3-2 mark. Highlights from the first part of the schedule:

- Three straight matchups against 2014 NCAA Tournament teams to open the season.
- A sweep at the Boilermaker Challenge Cup as the Hoosiers defeated Missouri and Baylor to be name the tournament champions. The victories included first goals in an Indiana uniform by Marissa Borschke and Cassidy Blacha.
- A scoreless streak of 463 minutes that ran from early in the first half against Virginia Tech on Aug. 21 to against LSU on Sept. 6. The stretch was the second-longest in IU program history.
- A 2-0 shutout of Middle Tennessee State on Sept. 4 that saw goals from Marissa Borschke and Maya Piper.

## NEW FACES

The Hoosiers welcome eight new players to the roster in 2015, including seven freshmen in Abby Allen, Bristol Hadley-Mautino, Hanna Johnson, Maya Piper, Caroline Dreher, Cassidy Blacha and Justine Lynn. In addition, senior Emily Basten joins the Hoosiers after transferring from Central Michigan.

## TOP RETURNERS

With the eight newcomers, there are 16 returners from the 2014 squad. Jessie Bujouves, who led the Hoosiers in goals last season with eight, returns to help pace the offense for her senior campaign. Kayla Smith, who ranked second behind Bujouves with nine points last season is also back for Indiana.

On the defensive end, Stone is back in goal after posting five shutouts in 2014. Also leading the defensive unit is Borschke who, along with Stone and Smith, was named a Big Ten Player to Watch.

## RECAPING 2014

The Hoosiers posted a 7-11-1 mark last season. The defense shined as Indiana surrendered just 25 goals, the fewest since allowing 22 during the 2009 campaign. Indiana closed out the year with two consecutive shutouts – a 1-0 victory at Purdue and a 2-0 win against Michigan State. In addition, the shutout at Purdue marked the third straight victory against the Boilermakers.

## HEAD COACH

**AMY BERBARY****HEAD COACH**

Amy Berbary is in her third season as the head coach of the Hoosiers in 2015. She was named the third head coach in Indiana Women's Soccer history on Feb. 6, 2013, after spending the previous five seasons as an assistant coach at Auburn University.

Last season, the Hoosiers finished with the year with a 7-11-1 mark. The defense allowed just 25 goals, the fewest since surrendering 22 during the 2009 campaign. Indiana closed out the year with two consecutive shutouts – a 1-0 victory at Purdue and a 2-0 win against Michigan State. In addition, the shutout at Purdue marked the third straight victory against the Boilermakers. On the offensive end, Jessie Bujouves led the attack with 11 points and five goals, including two game-winners. Also netting a pair of game-winning goals was Veronica Ellis, who found the back of the net in the 49th minute to defeat Purdue. Freshman Kayla Smith, who scored the winner against Michigan State, was named Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week for her efforts against the Spartans. Indiana's off-the-field accolades included receiving the Herbert Cup, which is given to the Indiana team with the highest GPA, after posting a 3.65 GPA in the Fall 2014 semester. Additionally, 14 Hoosiers garnered Academic All-Big Ten honors, which was tied for fourth-most amongst Big Ten schools.

In her first season in Bloomington, she guided the Hoosiers to a 15-7-1 overall record and a 6-5 mark in Big Ten play, earning appearances in the Big Ten Tournament and NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2007. The season began with a bang, as the Hoosiers opened the year 8-0-1, setting a new school record for best start to a season. The team excelled all over the field, posting school records for wins (15), goals (43), assists (46) and shutouts (9) in a single-season. Indiana also claimed its first-ever victory at Purdue and defeated DePaul at home in the First Round of the NCAA Tournament. Following the season, she signed a 5-year contract extension that goes through the 2019 season.

During her tenure at Auburn, Berbary helped guide the Tigers to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2011 and 2012 while earning the program's first-ever seed in the NCAA Tournament in 2011. That came on the heels of winning the 2011 Southeastern Conference (SEC) Tournament and the Tigers made another appearance in the conference tournament title game in 2012. The Tigers claimed the SEC West Division crown in 2008 and 2011 as well. Auburn also placed at least one player on the First Team All-SEC in each of the five years that Berbary was there.

The 2011 season was a historic one for the Auburn offense under the leadership of Berbary, as the Tigers tallied 50 goals and 61 assists, both ranking as the second-most in a single season in school history. In her five years, Auburn averaged 39 goals scored per season. She coached Katy Frierson to First Team All-SEC honors, NSCAA All-American accolades and she was a semi-finalist for the Hermann Trophy.

Berbary came to Auburn after four years as an assistant coach at the University of Dayton, where the Flyers had a .691 winning percentage during her time. She coached a pair of Atlantic-10 Offensive Players of the Year and seven first team all-conference selections. As the recruiting coordinator at Dayton, all of her recruiting classes were regionally and nationally ranked and four times the Flyers had players land on the All-Rookie Team for A-10.

Before Dayton, Berbary was the head coach at Gainesville High School in Gainesville, Ga., where she led the team to back-to-back regional championships and a 19-0-0 regional record. She was named the Region 7AAA Coach of the Year twice and the 2004 Women's Soccer Coach of the Year by the Gainesville Times.

In June 2015, Berbary was named the U.S. Olympic Development Program Region II head coach of the 1999 age group. She also served as a staff coach with the program from 2005-11. She was an assistant coach for Ohio South '91, '90 and '88 girls (2005-07), the head coach for Ohio South '93 Girls in 2008, a Region II Staff Coach (2008-09) and a Region III Staff Coach (2009-11).

While earning her degree in Health Promotion and Wellness Education from the University of Georgia in 2002, Berbary was a standout on the field for the Bulldogs. She closed her career in third place on the career goals scored list as well as the career points list. She led the team in scoring three straight years and propelled UGA to the Sweet 16 in 1998 and the Second Round of the NCAA Tournament in 2001.

A native of Alpharetta, Ga., she played for the Tophat Club program and was an assistant varsity coach at Oconee High School in Watkinsville, Ga. Berbary is also a member of the NSCAA and holds a USSF "B" License.
