## BADGERS OPEN BIG TEN PLAY AT PENN STATE

- No. 7 Wisconsin (4-2-0, 0-0-0-0 Big Ten) begins Big Ten play with a visit to No. 12 Penn State (4-1-0 0-0-0-0 Big Ten) for a rare Thursday-Friday series. Thursday's Halloween faceoff begins at 6 p.m. CT, while Friday's game is a 5 p.m. start. Both games air live on BTN and the Badger radio network.
- Penn State ended the Badgers' 2018-19 season with a two-games-to-one series victory in the first round of the Big Ten tournament at Pegula Ice Arena at Penn State.
- The Badgers and Nittany Lions match-up ushers in the seventh year of Big Ten hockey with the first league contest for any Conference school.
- The games against Penn State will give the Badgers their sixth and seventh against a ranked foe in eight games so far this season.



Sophomore forward Roman Ahcan scored the first goal, then had the primary assist on UW's other three goals, including the winner with 6.1 seconds left.

## KEY NOTES TO CONSIDER

- This weekend's series against Penn State matches up the second and fourth highest-scoring offenses in the country. The Badgers' average of 4.50 goals per game shares second, despite UW's blanking last Friday at the hands of Clarkson. Penn State ranks fourth in the nation at 4.40 goals per game.
- Notre Dame leads the nation at 5.25 goals per game.
- Wisconsin's 27 goals through six games is tied for the highest in the country with Providence.
- The Badgers' penalty kill is perfect in five of six games so far this season. The kill went 5-for-5 last weekend against Clarkson and sits at 90.9 percent (20-for-22) this season.
- The penalty kill also leads the nation with three short-handed tallies.
- UW's penalty kill has scored one more goal than it has allowed through six games.
- The Badgers are 1-5-0 in their previous six Big Ten openers.
- UW getting shutout last Friday by Clarkson marked the first time in 30 games for UW, dating back to a Nov. 16, 2018 loss at Ohio State.
- The shutout snapped season-opening, four-game point streaks for junior defenseman Wyatt Kalynuk and junior forward Linus Weissbach. Kalynuk recorded an assist last Saturday to start a new streak.
- Freshman forward Cole Caufield recorded a goal and an assist last Saturday against Clarkson, his fourth multi-point game in six contests this season. The previous three multi-point games were multi-goal games.
- Sophomore forward Roman Ahcan posted his first career four-point game last Saturday against Clarkson, scoring the game-opening goal then recording primary assists on UW's other three scores, including the winner with 6.1 seconds left in regulation. Ahcan shares the UW lead with nine points in six games. His seven assists share the team lead and are just two shy of his freshman-season total.
- Ahcan's four-point game was the first for the Badgers since then-freshman K'Andre Miller had a goal and three assists against Penn State on Dec. 1, 2018 in an 8-5 Wisconsin victory.

## BY THE NUMBERS

After this weekend, the Badgers will have played seven of their last 15 games at Penn State. UW played five of its last seven games last year at PSU, including three playoff games.

Wisconsin boasts the top three scoring freshman among Big Ten schools with Cole Caufield (Nine points), Alex Turcotte (eight points) and Owen Lindmark (seven point) pacing the league. Next closest freshman has four points.

# 7

Freshman forward Cole Caufield leads the nation with seven goals in six games, while his 1.17 goals-per-game scoring average ranks second in the country. He shares UW's team lead with nine points in six games.

## PLUS OR MINUS

■ Sophomore forward Roman Ahcan is a lofty plus-11 through the first six games of the season. That is tied for the national lead with Notre Dame sophomore defenseman Nate Clurman.

■ Ahcan has been on the ice for eight even strength goals for and three short-handed goals for through six games.

■ He's been on the ice for just one goal against, a power-play tally by Minnesota Duluth in the home opener.

## LEADING THE WAY

■ It's a small sample size, but Wisconsin and its players lead the nation and the Big Ten in various statistical categories.

■ Freshman forward Cole Caufield is the nation's leading goal scorer with seven goals in six contests.

■ Freshman forward Alex Turcotte leads the nation with 0.75 power-play goals per game. He has three in four contests.

■ Freshman forward Owen Lindmark shares the national lead with two short-handed markers. He also shares second with two-game winning tallies.

■ Junior defenseman Wyatt Kalynuk shares the national lead among blue liners with six assists.

■ Caufield shares the national lead among freshman with nine points and a 1.50 points-per-game scoring average. Turcotte is averaging 2.0 points per game, but doesn't meet the 75 percent of games played minimum to be listed on the national stats.

■ Among Big Ten schools, a Badger leads or shares the lead in goals (Caufield - 7), power-play points (Turcotte - 6), power-play goals (Turcotte - 3), short-handed points (Lindmark/Ahcan - 2), short-handed goals (Lindmark - 2), game-winning goals (Lindmark - 2), defenseman scoring (Kalynuk - 6) and freshman scoring (Caufield - 9, Turcotte - 8, Lindmark - 7).

■ UW also leads the Big Ten with 27 goals and a +8 on special teams.

## RELENTLESS SCHEDULE

■ Wisconsin boasts one of the nation's toughest schedules, opening with seven of its first eight contests against preseason ranked foes, including the season opener at No. 10 Boston College and the home opener against two-time defending NCAA champion and No. 3 Minnesota Duluth on Oct. 18-19 at the Kohl Center.

■ In addition to BC and UMD, UW skates against preseason No. 10 Clarkson and No. 9 Penn State in the first eight games.

■ The Badgers have 19 of their 34 regular-season games scheduled against teams ranked in the top 20 of the USCHO.com preseason poll. Ten addition games are against teams receiving votes in the poll.

## OLD AND YOUNG

■ Wisconsin boasts one of Wisconsin returns 77.0 percent of its goals (87 of 113), 79.1 percent of its assists (151 of 191) and 78.3 percent of its points (238 of 304) from last year's team.

■ Five of the Badgers top six, and 12 of UW's top 14 scorers are back for 2019-20.

■ According to College Hockey, Inc, Wisconsin is the second youngest team in college hockey.

■ Freshman forward Dylan Holloway is the second-youngest player in college hockey, having turned 18 on Sept. 23.

## PRESEASON IN VANCOUVER

■ Wisconsin took an international trip in late summer to Vancouver and took on the University of British Columbia in a pair of exhibition contests. Wisconsin won its games, 3-0 and 7-5, on Aug. 30 and Sept. 1, respectively.

■ Freshman forward Cole Caufield tallied four goals in the two games, including a hat trick in the second contest.

■ Freshman forward Dylan Holloway scored goals in both contests.

## BAND OF BROTHERS

■ Wisconsin boasts three sets of brothers on its 2019-20 roster, including juniors Jason and Sean Dhooghe. The other two sets of brothers including sophomore Brock and freshman Cole Caufield, as well as freshmen siblings Shay and Ryder Donovan.

■ Wisconsin's coaching staff also have sibling connections to college hockey. Head coach Tony Granato and his brother Don both played for the Badgers, associate head coach Mark Strobel played at UW with his brother Mike and finally associate head coach Mark Osiecki played for the Badgers, while his brother, Matt, skated for Notre Dame.

## US NTDP BADGERS

■ Seven current Badgers came to Wisconsin from the U.S. National Team Development Program, including three of UW's newcomers.

■ Juniors Sean Dhooghe and Tyler Inamoto, as well as sophomores K'Andre Miller and Ty Emberson and freshmen Alex Turcotte, Cole Caufield and Owen Lindmark all arrived at UW from the USNTDP in Plymouth, Michigan.

## ONCE A BADGER...

■ Every member of Wisconsin's coaching staff, as well as its director of hockey operations, are graduates of the University of Wisconsin. That includes head coach Tony Granato, associate head coaches Mark Osiecki and Mark Strobel, volunteer assistant coach Brad Winchester, and operations director Shane Connelly. No other program in the nation boasts having alumni as its head coach and associate/assistant coaches.

■ Osiecki won the 1990 NCAA title as a Badger defenseman and was an assistant coach for the team's 2006 NCAA title. He assisted the team during its run to the 2010 NCAA title game, as well.

■ Connelly was a goaltender on the 2006 NCAA championship team.

- The Badgers played Penn State in the first round in the Big ten tournament last season and won the opening game of the series, but then lost the remaining two games
- Although Wisconsin played Penn State seven times last season, only two of them were at the Kohl Center
- Wisconsin is 4-4-3 in the last two seasons versus Penn State. The Badgers took the regular-season series last year, 2-1-1.
- In 25 of 32 games in the all-time series between Wisconsin and Penn State, at least one team has scored four goals in the game.
- In four of the seven meetings last season, one team scored at least six goals in the game.

## BADGERS AND THE NHL

- The Badgers' 12 NHL draft picks are the most since the 2004-05 team had 12. That squad included nine eventual NHL skaters including Joe Pavelski (Dallas) and Brian Elliott (Philadelphia), among others.
- Wisconsin will boast three first-round NHL draft picks on its roster for the first time since the 2009-10 season when defensemen Ryan McDonagh (12th), Jake Gardiner (17th) and Brendan Smith (27th) each suited up for the Badgers. This season, the Badgers boast forwards Alex Turcotte (fifth), Cole Caufield (15th) and defenseman K'Andre Miller (22nd) from the first round. A fourth, rookie forward Dylan Holloway, is projected as a first-round pick for the 2020 draft.
- For the second consecutive season, Wisconsin boasts five NHL draft picks on defense.
- Wisconsin is one of three schools in the country to boast at least five NHL draft picks on defense (Minnesota - 6, Boston University - 5). The Badgers five drafted defensemen include sophomores K'Andre Miller (New York Rangers) and Ty Emberson (Arizona), as well as juniors Wyatt Kalynuk (Philadelphia), Josh Ess (Chicago) and Tyler Inamoto (Florida).
- The five Badgers' defenseman drafted on the roster are the most for UW since the 2009-10 team had five drafted defensemen on the roster (Justin Schultz, Brendan Smith, Ryan McDonagh, Jake Gardiner, Cody Goloubeff). That year, the Badgers had a sixth rear guard, John Ramage, who was drafted following the season.

## 600 GAMES, 300 POINTS FOR CRAIG SMITH

- Nashville Predators forward Craig Smith (UW: 2009-11) played in his 600th career NHL game on Oct. 19, all with the Predators. Smith, a Madison native, has 144 goals and 300 points in 601 regular-season games played (as of Oct. 23).
- He became the fourth player to skate in 600 games with the franchise.
- Smith tallied his 300th career point on Oct. 3 against Minnesota in the Predators' season opener.

Wisconsin's freshman class of forwards Alex Turcotte, Cole Caufield, Dylan Holloway, Ryder Donovan, Owen Lindmark, and defensemen Shay Donovan and Mike Vorlicky were chosen by Collegehockeynews.com as the top recruiting class in the nation. In addition, junior Harvard transfer Ty Pelton-Byce joins to give the Badgers eight newcomers.

Four of the incoming class were drafted in the 2019 NHL Draft including Alex Turcotte, who went fifth overall to the Los Angeles Kings, Cole Caufield, who went 15th overall to the Montreal Canadiens, Ryder Donovan, who went in the fourth round at No. 110 to the Vegas Golden Knights and Owen Lindmark, who was chosen in the fifth round at No. 137 to the Florida Panthers. A fifth possible pick, Holloway is a projected first-round draft pick for the 2020 NHL Draft.

**ALEX TURCOTTE**

Turcotte is the third Wisconsin Badger drafted among the top five in the NHL draft, joining Dany Heatley (2nd overall in 2000) and Kyle Turris (3rd overall in 2007).

Turcotte ranked sixth on the 2018-19 U.S. Under-18 Team in scoring with 62 points on 27 goals and 35 points in 37 games despite missing 27 contests

Turcotte posted six goals and 12 points in eight games against college opponents in 2018-19 with the U.S. Under-18 Team.

**COLE CAUFIELD**

Caufield, a 2019 first-round pick of the Montreal Canadiens, scored a hat trick and totaled four goals in Wisconsin's exhibition games against the University of British Columbia during UW's summer trip to Canada.

The all-time leading career (126) and single-season (72) goal-scoring leader with the U.S. National Team Development Program, Caufield beat former record-holders Auston Matthews (55) and Phil Kessel (104) by 17 and 22 goals, respectively. He also ranks third all-time in USNTDP scoring annals with 180 career points, while his 100 points last year rank sixth in single-season history behind Matthews, two Jack Hughes seasons, Clayton Keller and Patrick Kane

During his time with the USNTDP, Caufield tied Alexander Ovechkin's tournament goal-scoring mark by tallying 14 goals at the 2019 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 World Championship in a tournament MVP performance.

Before his USNTDP tenure, Caufield scored 50 goals and 79 points in 22 games as a sophomore and 25 goals and 58 points in 23 games as a freshman playing for Stevens Point Area High School.

In 15 games against colleges last year as a high schooler, Caufield scored 15 goals and 19 points.

Cole Caufield became the second player in UW's modern era (since 1963) to begin a season with three consecutive multi-goal games. Only John Newberry, who opened the 1981-82 season with four multi-goal games, accomplished the feat before Caufield.

Caufield was the fifth Badger to record consecutive multi-goal games to open a season, and the first freshman.

### ■ 2017 BIG TEN COACH OF THE YEAR

- Wisconsin's fifth head coach since 1966, upon his hiring in 2016
- Led the Badgers to a 20-15-1 record in his first season
- Named the 2017 Big Ten Coach of the Year and a finalist for national coach of the year

- Teams Granato served as head or assistant coach posted winning records in 12 of his 13 seasons in the NHL.
- Served as an assistant coach for the 2014 U.S. Olympic Team, coaching former Badgers Ryan McDonagh, Joe Pavelski, Derek Stepan and Ryan Suter, among other of the world's star skaters. The team finished fourth.

- Picked in the sixth round, 120th overall by the New York Rangers in the 1982 draft

- Won Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy in 1997 for his dedication to hockey

- Member of Team USA at the 1988 Olympic Winter Games, and tied for second on the team with eight points, including seven assists for the seventh-place Americans. The seven assists are tied for third all-time for Team USA at one single Olympics. His three assists in a game on Feb. 13, 1988 against Austria are tied for second on the all-time list, one off the team single-game record

- Played for the Americans at the 1983 and 1984 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championships, skated at the 1985, '86 and '87 IIHF World Championships, and for Team USA at the 1991 Canada Cup.

- Finalist for the 1987 Hobey Baker Memorial Award after his 73-point senior season
- Badgers' captain during 1986-87
- Named the WCHA Student-Athlete of the Year and the team's Spike Carlson MVP award winner
- Member of the UW Athletics Hall of Fame
- Finished his Badger career as the school's fourth-leading scorer with 220 points, ranking third with 100 career goals.
- Brother and former UW associate head coach, Don, skated for the Badgers (1987-91)
- Second brother, Rob, also skated for UW (1992-94), as did cousin Kevin (1997-2001)
- Sister, Cammi, is in the Hockey Hall of Fame as one of the greatest women's hockey players in history. She was recruited to play soccer at Wisconsin before Badger women's hockey began, but instead went on to star with the Providence women's hockey program in the early 1990s. She dropped the ceremonial first puck before the inaugural game of Wisconsin women's hockey in 1999 at the Kohl Center.
- Tony and his wife, Linda, reside in Madison. They are the parents of four grown children, including Michael, Nicholas, Dominic and Gabriella.
- Completed his degree during his first year as UW head coach, graduating in 2017 with a bachelor's degree in human development and family studies.

**KOHL CENTER**

- The Kohl Center, which opened in 1998, is the second largest on-campus rink in the nation (15,359). The only on-campus facility with a larger capacity is Value City Arena (17,500) in Columbus, Ohio
- Wisconsin has won at least 11 games in a season at the Kohl Center on 10 occasions.
- The Kohl Center played host to NCAA regional action for the first time in 2008 when the NCAA Midwest Regional took place on March 29-30. The building had previously played host to the 1998 NCAA Women's Volleyball Championships, a 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Regional and a 2007 NCAA Women's Ice Hockey Quarterfinal contest.
- The Kohl Center cost \$76.4 million to construct and is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW graduate who donated \$25 million towards the project.
- The Kohl Center ice sheet is 200 feet long by 97 feet wide.
- Some of the names of players from opposing teams who have played in the building include Patrick Kane, Jonathan Toews, David Backes, Duncan Keith, Ryan Miller, Carl Hagelin, T.J. Oshie, Paul Stastny, Matt Carle, Kyle Okposo, Jack Eichel and Auston Matthews, among others.
