NITTANY LIONS MEET UNBEATEN WILDCATS ON HOMECOMING

THIS WEEK

Penn State brings a three-game winning streak into its Big Ten home opener and 93rd Homecoming game, meeting unbeaten Northwestern. The Nittany Lions and Wildcats are meeting for the 16th time overall, but are in opposite Big Ten divisions and are not scheduled to meet again until at least 2017.

The Wildcats moved into the national rankings this week, debuting at No. 22 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 24 in the Associated Press poll.

The Nittany Lions are coming off a decisive 35-7 victory at Leaders Division rival Illinois to give first-year Coach Bill O'Brien his first Big Ten win in his conference debut and also his initial road victory. The Wildcats beat Indiana, 44-29, last Saturday in their Big Ten opener.

The Penn State-Northwestern game will air on ESPN, the Nittany Lions' sixth consecutive appearance on ESPN/ABC to open the season.

NITTANY LIONS WIN THIRD STRAIGHT; THUMP ILLINI IN BIG TEN OPENER

Senior quarterback Matt McGloin accounted for three touchdowns and senior linebacker Michael Mauti grabbed two interceptions, returning one a school record 99 yards, to help boost Penn State to a 35-7 thumping of Illinois in the Big Ten opener for both teams.

Coach Bill O'Brien earned his first Big Ten victory and initial road win as the Nittany Lions won their third consecutive game in convincing fashion.

Mauti was selected the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week, as well as the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in three games (see pg. 2).

McGloin was 18 of 30 for 211 yards, including a 21-yard scoring strike to tight end Matt Lehman late in the second quarter that gave Penn State a 21-0 lead. McGloin ran for a one-yard touchdown midway through the first period for a 14-0 lead and added another one-yard scoring run late in the third frame to boost the lead to 28-7. McGloin boosted his ca-

reer touchdown pass total to 32, moving into seventh place on the all-time school list. He also delivered his 11th career 200-yard passing game, good for a tie for fourth in Penn State history.

Sophomore running back Zach Zwinak delivered his second consecutive career performance, gaining 100 yards on 19 carries and scoring twice for his first career 100-yard rushing game. Zwinak opened the scoring with a one-yard touchdown run just 4:19 into the game and added another one-yard scoring run early in the fourth quarter for a 35-7 lead.

A candidate for the Bednarik and Butkus Awards, Mauti played like his hair was on fire, grabbing two picks and returning them 105 yards, making six tackles and 0.5 sack.

With the Illini threatening to become the first team to score a touchdown against Penn State in the first half, Mauti grabbed a Nathan Scheelhaase pass at the goal line and raced up the near sideline with a convoy of blockers. He avoided several would-be tacklers, but was tripped up at the Illinois one-yard-line. The interception return broke the school record for longest interception return, a 98-yard effort by Wayne Berfield vs. Boston University in 1958. Mauti made his second theft near midfield late in the third quarter to set-up Zwinak's second touchdown run.

The Nittany Lions forced three turnovers, pushing their total to 11 forced in the past four games, and held the Illini nearly 20 points below their season average. Penn State has committed only one turnover in the past four contests.

MAUTI SELECTED WALTER CAMP & BIG TEN DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Senior linebacker Michael Mauti (Mandeville, La.) delivered a record-setting performance in Penn State's 35-7 win at Illinois and was selected the Walter Camp Football Foundation's National Defensive Player of the Week.

Mauti also was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in three weeks and the third time in his career.

A candidate for the Butkus and Bednarik Award, Mauti also earned a helmet sticker from ESPN's College Football Final program via fans on social media. West Virginia quarterback Geno Smith earned Walter Camp's offensive honor for Week 5.

Mauti led another dominant Penn State defensive performance, by recording two interceptions, six tackles (four solo) and combining on a sack. With the Illini threatening to become the first team to score a touchdown against Penn State in the first half, Mauti grabbed a Nathan Scheelhaase pass at the goal line and raced up the near sideline with a convoy of blockers. He avoided several would-be tacklers, but was tripped up at the Illinois one-yard-line. The 99-yard interception return broke the school record for longest interception return, a 98-yard effort by Wayne Berfield at Boston University in 1958.

Mauti made his second theft near midfield late in the third quarter to set-up a Zach Zwinak's second touchdown run of the game for a 35-7 lead early in

the fourth quarter. Also in the third period, the former Mandeville High School All-American and defensive end Deion Barnes combined on a seven-yard sack of Scheelhaase.

Led by Mauti, the Nittany Lions forced three turnovers and held Illinois well below its season average of 26.5 ppg, 0 for 3 in the Red Zone, and an 0 of 9 start on third down conversions until late in the third quarter. Before the final Illini drive of the game, Penn State allowed just one of 13 Illinois drives to extend longer than six plays.

For the season, Mauti leads Penn State and is tied for fourth in the Big Ten with 48 tackles (26 solo), has 2.5 tackles for minus-29 yards, 1.5 sacks, one fumble recovery and two pass break-ups. He also is tied for fourth in the Big Ten with two interceptions, leads with 105 interception return yards and is tied for first in the conference with two forced fumbles.

LIONS STARTING FAST

Penn State has out-scored the opposition, 49-0, in the first quarter this season, and 76-9 in the first half, allowing only three field goals.

The Nittany Lions have scored at least one touchdown in the first quarter of all five games, with two touchdowns against Navy and Illinois.

The Nittany Lions scored touchdowns on their initial possessions vs. Virginia and Navy and saw their first drive vs. Ohio end with a fumble after marching 67 yards in 11 plays. Penn State scored a touchdown on its third possession vs. the Bobcats for a 7-0 first quarter lead. The Nittany Lions also scored on their third possession vs. Temple, as Matt McGloin hit Allen Robinson on a 41-yard scoring strike with :06 left in the opening period.

Penn State scored a touchdown on its second possession at Illinois, taking a 24-yard Sam Ficken field goal off the scoreboard after a roughing of the kicker penalty. Zach Zwinak scored his first career touchdown on a one-yard run for a 7-0 lead just 4:19 into the game.

TURNOVER TURNAROUND: LIONS TIED FOR NO. 1 IN BIG TEN IN TURNOVER MARGIN

Penn State has made a dramatic turnaround in turnovers since losing three and not gaining any in the season opener vs. Ohio.

The Nittany Lions forced four turnovers against both Virginia and Navy and three turnovers at Illinois

for 11 in the past four games. Penn State has turned the ball over once in the past four games.

The Nittany Lions are tied with Iowa for No. 1 in the Big Ten with a +1.40 turnover margin, having gained 11 and lost four in five games. Penn State is No. 2 in the conference with its 11 turnovers forced and No. 3 with its four turnovers lost.

LIONS SECOND IN SCORING DEFENSE; 27 POINTS ALLOWED LAST THREE GAMES

The Penn State defense has allowed a combined total of 27 points during the Nittany Lions' three-game winning streak, holding Illinois and Navy to seven points apiece.

The Nittany Lions have moved into second in the Big Ten and tied for 14th nationally in scoring defense at 13.6 ppg. Michigan State leads the conference at 12.8 ppg.

THIRD DOWN IMPROVEMENT

In the wins over Navy, Temple and Illinois, the Penn State defense permitted only 11 of 42 (26%) third down conversions, a significant improvement from the first two games. Ohio and Virginia were a combined 22 of 36 (61%) on third down conversions.

Illinois started the game 0 of 9 on third down conversions, earning its first one late in the third quarter and with Penn State leading, 28-7.

BUTKUS AWARD CANDIDATES HODGES & MAUTI AMONG BIG TEN TACKLE LEADERS

Penn State senior linebackers Gerald Hodges (Paulsboro, N.J.) and Michael Mauti (Mandeville, La.) are two of the Big Ten's top defensive players and are among the conference's tackle leaders.

Both players are on the Bednarik and Butkus Award watch lists.

The Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week on Sept. 17 and Oct. 1, Mauti is tied for fourth with 48 tackles (9.6 tpg). He also has 2.5 tackles for minus-29 yards, 1.5 sacks (minus-24), two interceptions, two forced fumbles, recovered a fumble and two pass break-ups.

A first-team pre-season All-American, Hodges is eighth in the Big Ten with 39 stops (7.8). He also has 1.0 TFL, one interception, recovered a fumble against Virginia and one pass break-up.

MCGLOIN LEADS BIG TEN IN PASSING

Senior Matt McGloin threw for a career-best 318 yards in the win over Temple and is the leading the Big Ten in passing yardage and is second in touchdown passes and completions.

McGloin is 101 of 170 (59%) for 1,217 yards, with 10 touchdowns and just two interceptions. He was the first Big Ten signal-caller to hit 1,000 passing yards this season and is averaging 243.4 ypg. Michigan State's Andrew Maxwell is second at 227.6 ypg.

Nebraska's Taylor Martinez leads the Big Ten with 11 touchdown passes, followed by McGloin with 10. Maxwell leads the conference with 103 completions and McGloin is second with 101 and he also is fourth in total offense at 243.4 ypg.

The former West Scranton High School standout was 18 of 30 for 211 yards in the Big Ten opening win at Illinois. He threw a 21-yard touchdown pass to tight end Matt Lehman and was not intercepted. McGloin also ran for a pair of touchdowns for the second consecutive game.

McGloin threw a 41-yard touchdown pass to Allen Robinson, the Big Ten's second-leading receiver, in the win over Temple. He also had his first multiple rushing TD game with one and two-yard scoring runs to give Penn State a 21-3 third quarter lead.

McGloin has had a hand in 14 of Penn State's 16 offensive touchdowns this season, as well as all 18 long plays from scrimmage (20 yards or longer).

During the 2011 season, McGloin started the last five regular season games (played in all 12) and threw for 1,571 yards and eight touchdowns, completing 54 percent of his passes.

MCGLOIN MOVES INTO 7TH PLACE WITH 32ND CAREER TOUCHDOWN PASS

Matt McGloin threw a 21-yard touchdown pass to Matt Lehman at Illinois for his 32nd career scoring strike to move into seventh place on the all-time Penn State list.

McGloin moved past Anthony Morelli, who threw 31 career touchdowns from 2004-07. Chuck Fusina is sixth with 37.

McGloin threw 14 touchdown passes in 2010 and eight last season.

McGLOIN DELIVERS THIRD 300-YARD GAME; POSTS 11TH 200-YARD GAME AT ILLINOIS

Matt McGloin delivered the third 300-yard passing game of his career with his 318 yards in the win over Temple. He surpassed his previous career-high of 315 yards posted vs. Indiana in 2010.

McGloin is tied with Daryll Clark (2006-09) with three 300-yard passing games and trails only Kerry Collins (1991-94) who had four 300-yard passing games, the most in Penn State history.

McGloin's 318 passing yards rank No. 9 in Penn State history and were the most since Clark had 353 yards vs. Akron in 2009. McGloin completed passes to a season-high nine different receivers.

McGloin threw for 211 yards in the win at Illinois for his 11th career 200-yard passing game (fourth this year), good for a tie for fourth-best in the Penn State annals with Chuck Fusina, Tony Sacca and Anthony Morelli.

HEAD COACH BILL O'BRIEN

Bill O'Brien is 3-2 in his first season as the leader of the Penn State football program. He was named the 15th head coach in the Nittany Lions' 126 years of varsity football on January 6, 2012.

O'Brien was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach with the New England Patriots during the 2011 season, helping the Patriots to their second Super Bowl during his five years on the coaching staff.

Like his predecessor, Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno, O'Brien graduated from Brown University, where he played linebacker and defensive end from 1990-92. O'Brien coached at Brown (1993-94), Georgia Tech (1995-2002), Maryland (2003-04) and Duke (2005-06) before joining the Patriots' staff.

As a member of Bill Belichick's Patriots' staff, O'Brien coached the wide receivers in 2008 and was the quarterbacks coach his final three seasons. O'Brien was the Patriots' offensive coordinator in 2011 and was instrumental in New England leading the AFC in scoring (32.1 ppg) and ranking No. 2 in the NFL in total offense (428.0 ypg) and passing offense (317.8 ypg) en route to winning the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLVI.

Born in Dorchester, Mass., O'Brien was raised in Andover, a Boston suburb. O'Brien and his wife, Colleen, have two sons, Jack and Michael.

COACHING STAFF CONNECTIONS

In addition to Bill O'Brien, seven assistant coaches are in their first season at Penn State. Among the 10 coaches on the staff, nine had previously worked with at least one other member of the 2012 Nittany Lion coaching staff prior to this season.

Among some of the coaching staff ties:

- O'Brien worked with Stan Hixon, Mac McWhorter and Ted Roof at Georgia Tech during O'Brien's eight-year tenure on the Yellow Jackets' staff (1995-2002);

- O'Brien worked with Charles London and John Strollo at Duke in 2005-06, when Ted Roof was the head coach;

- O'Brien also worked with Craig Fitzgerald, Director of Strength and Conditioning for Football, in 2003-04 when they were on the staff at Maryland;

- John Butler was an assistant coach at Minnesota from 2007-10, working with Ted Roof during the 2008 season. Butler also worked with Craig Fitzgerald at Harvard in 2005-06 and at South Carolina in 2011, helping the Gamecocks to 11 wins and their first-ever top 10 finish;

- Larry Johnson and Ron Vanderlinden have worked together as Penn State assistant coaches on the defensive side of the ball.

ONE OF NATION'S TOUGHEST HOME VENUES

The Nittany Lions own a superlative 180-64 (73.8) all-time record in the nation's second-largest facility, which opened in 1960 and has a capacity of 106,572.

NORTHWESTERN COACH PAT FITZGERALD

Head coach Pat Fitzgerald has led the Wildcats to a 5-0 start for the third time in the last four years. He is 45-36 in his seventh season. Fitzgerald was the linebackers coach at NU from 2001-05 and the national defensive player of the year in 1995 and 1996. He is a 1996 Northwestern graduate.



SCOUTING THE WILDCATS

Northwestern is off to a 5-0 start; 1-0 in the Big Ten after Saturday's 44-29 victory over Indiana in Evanston. In five victories, the Wildcats are out-gaining their opponents on an average of 466.6 yards per game to 379.0. Northwestern has started its games quickly, out-scoring its opponents 84-33 in the first half.

The Wildcats gained a school record 704 yards of total offense in the win over Hoosiers, posting 36 first downs.

Northwestern is second in the Big Ten and No. 9 nationally in rushing (255.8 ypg), No. 3 in the conference in total offense (466.6 ypg) and fourth in scoring offense (33.8 ppg).

The rushing game features two backs who average over 74 yards per game in Venric Mark (107.6) and Kain Colter (74.2). Mark has rushed for 538 yards, while Colter has amassed 371 yards at quarterback. Mark has five touchdowns and Colter has scored six, a team high.

Colter is a triple-threat option, making nine catches for 131 yards, while throwing two touchdowns and 369 yards passing. Colter's counterpart is Trevor Siemian who has completed 69 percent of his passes for 672 yards (134.4 per game) with one touchdown.

The main receiving target has been Demetrius Fields who has made 21 catches for 178 yards and a touchdown. Tony Jones leads the team in total receiving yards (203) on 14 catches, while Christian Jones has totaled 173 yards on 15 catches.

The Wildcat defense has recovered six fumbles, grabbed two interceptions and has eight sacks this season. Chi Chi Arizquo has 39 total tackles with 6.5 for loss to lead the linebacking corps. Damien Proby has 37 tackles, 27 of which are solo efforts, while David Nwabuisihas 31 tackles, 4.5 for a loss this season. Lineman Tyler Scott has the team lead in sacks with three this season.

Kicker Jeff Budzien has made all 11 field goal attempts and is 17-for-21 in his career with a long of 44 yards. He has also made all 19 extra-point attempts to lead the team with 52 points.

Punter Brandon Williams has averaged 42.6 yards per punt with a season long 61 yards. His career long is 77 yards with a career average of 40.6 yards.

LAST MEETING

The last meeting between Penn State and Northwestern was Oct. 22, 2011, as the Wildcats fell 34-24 at Ryan Field. Matt McGloin threw for 192 yards and two touchdowns and Silas Redd ran for 164 yards. Penn State scored back-to-back touchdowns spanning halftime to overcome a 24-20 deficit.

Linebacker Gerald Hodges recorded a then career-high 14 tackles, returned his first career interception 63 yards and while had 1.5 sacks to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week accolades. Defensive tackle Jordan Hill recorded six tackles, including two sacks.

VANDERLINDEN HAS NORTHWESTERN TIES

Penn State linebackers coach Ron Vanderlinden was Northwestern's Defensive Coordinator and Assistant Head Coach from 1992-96, helping the Wildcats win Big Ten titles in 1995 and '96. He was head coach at Maryland from 1997-2000, joining the Penn State staff prior to the 2001 season.

Vanderlinden coached the linebackers at Northwestern, helping Pat Fitzgerald become the Big Ten and national defensive player of the year in 1995 and '96.

Vanderlinden is in his 12th season at Penn State. He has consistently developed a talented linebacking corps at "Linebacker U," including the squad's top tacklers, Michael Mauti, Gerald Hodges and Glenn Carson.

Vanderlinden has been instrumental in the development of two-time All-American Paul Posluszny, winner of the 2005 and '06 Bednarik Award and the

2005 Butkus Award, two-time All-American Dan Connor, winner of the 2007 Bednarik Award and Penn State's career tackle leader and NaVorro Bowman, who was selected to the 2011 AP All-Pro team.

Vanderlinden coached Bowman, Josh Hull and Sean Lee to All-Big Ten honors in 2009. Seven of Vanderlinden's "Linebacker U." pupils are on 2012 NFL rosters.

As of Sept. 30, Bowman led the NFL with 45 tackles, with one interception and five pass break-ups, while Lee was tied for 15th with 32 tackles, prior to Dallas' Oct. 1 game with Chicago.

LIONS' TOP RED ZONE DEFENSE FACES BEST RED ZONE OFFENSE

Penn State leads the Big Ten in Red Zone defense at 61.5 pct., with the opposition scoring on just 8 of 13 Red Zone opportunities (6 TD, 2 FG). The Nittany Lions have forced two turnovers in the Red Zone.

Northwestern leads the Big Ten at 92.0 in the Red Zone, going 23 of 25 with 13 touchdowns and 10 field goals.

LIONS FROM ILLINOIS

Redshirt freshman linebacker T.J. Rhattigan is the lone Nittany Lion from Illinois. He is from Naperville and attended Neuqua Valley High School.

VERSUS ILLINOIS SCHOOLS

Penn State has an official 12-7 record against teams from the state of Illinois: Northwestern (4-3), Illinois (7-4), Northern Illinois (1-0). A 2009 victory over Eastern Illinois was vacated in addition to the wins against the Illini and Wildcats that were vacated.

ZWINAK EARNS FIRST 100-YARD GAME; BELTON AND DAY RETURN VS. ILLINI

Sophomore running back Zach Zwinak delivered his second consecutive career performance in the 35-7 win at Illinois, gaining 100 yards on 19 carries and scoring twice for his first career 100-yard rushing game. Zwinak became the first Nittany Lion to eclipse 100 rushing yards since Silas Redd gained 137 yards vs. the Illini on Oct. 29, 2011.

Penn State gained a net 173 rushing yards vs. the Illini, losing 34 yards on three sacks.

Zwinak opened the scoring with a one-yard touchdown run just 4:19 into the game and added another one-yard scoring run early in the fourth quarter for a 35-7 lead. The powerful Zwinak had six carries for a punishing 36 yards on Penn State's third touchdown drive for a 21-0 second quarter lead.

Late in the third quarter, Zwinak contributed 20 yards on four attempts, capped by Matt McGloin's second one-yard rushing touchdown. Following Michael Mauti's second interception, Zwinak carried the ball five consecutive times, including a 14-yard burst, for the final 31 yards and his second score of the game for a 35-7 lead.

The rushing attack was boosted by the return of a trio of players from injury. Sophomore Bill Belton started at running back and set career-bests with 65 yards on 16 carries, including a 19-yard burst, the Nittany Lions' longest run by a running back this season. Belton had missed the last three games with an ankle sprain. Junior Curtis Dukes gained 21 yards on five carries and senior Derek Day had 14 yards on four attempts.

HOMECOMING GAME

Northwestern will provide the opposition for Penn State's Homecoming game for just the second time, the other being in 2002. The Nittany Lions have an impressive 56-21-5 record in front of the alumni audience.

PENN STATE FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES TIED FOR TOP GRADUATION RATE AMONG TOP 25 BCS TEAMS

The Penn State football team was tied with Stanford for the top Graduation Success Rate (GSR) among teams ranked in the final 2011 Bowl Championship Series Top 25 rankings, according to data released by the NCAA in Oct. 2011.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2001-04 earned a superlative Graduation Success Rate of 87 percent, tied with Stanford for No. 10 overall among the nation's 120 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions.

Penn State's 87 percent GSR was significantly higher than the 67 percent FBS average and was second to Northwestern (94) among Big Ten institutions.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2001-04 earned a strong four-year federal graduation rate of 80 percent, also No. 2 to Northwestern (86) among Big Ten squads. The Nittany Lions' 80 percent graduation figure was 24 points above the 56 percent FBS average, according to the NCAA.

In the NCAA's 2009 graduation data, the Nittany Lions earned the highest GSR and federal graduation rate among teams ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 poll.

The strong NCAA graduation rate data is the latest success in a long line of academic achievement for members of the Penn State football program, who consistently are near the top nationally in academic success:

- Penn State has had 15 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans® in the past six years to lead the nation, with 13 first-team selections.

- Penn State's all-time total of 49 Academic All-America® football players is third among all FBS institutions.

Penn State Homecoming King. The Homecoming King and Queen will be announced at Friday night's pep rally in Rec Hall, scheduled to begin at approximately 8:30 p.m., immediately after the parade.

From Ebensburg, Pa., McGregor is one of the squad's top students with a 3.85 grade-point average. He is on schedule to graduate in December with degrees in english and journalism. A 2011 winner of a Jim Murray Memorial Foundation scholarship, McGregor covered the BCS National Championship game last January.

PARADE AMONG HOMECOMING EVENTS

Numerous activities will take place this weekend associated with Penn State Homecoming.

The parade -- annually the largest collegiate Homecoming parade in the nation -- begins at 6 p.m. on Friday. More than 200 students, alumni and community groups will participate, and the parade will feature 44 floats created by student organizations, said student Gabi Donchez, parade director.

Some of the Penn State alumni who participated in the 2012 Olympic Games, including bronze medalists Natalie Dell (rowing) and Dominique Blake (track and field) are expected to be in the parade, along with Felix Aronovich, Miles Chamley, Shana Cox and Kirsten Nieuwendam.

The grand marshals will be Terry and Kim Pegula, whose \$102 million commitment to the University is funding construction of the Pegula Ice Arena and providing scholarships for student-athletes. State College businesswoman and Penn State Trustee Emerita Mimi Barash Coppersmith will be the honorary grand marshal.

Immediately after the parade, a pep rally will be held at 8:45 p.m. in Rec Hall. The rally features the Penn State Blue Band, cheerleaders and the Nittany Lion, and ends with the crowning of the Homecoming king and queen.

At 10 p.m. Friday, students, alumni and fans can join

the Penn State Lion Ambassadors as they "Guard the Lion Shrine," a tradition that dates back to the '60s, and celebrate the University's iconic mascot with entertainment, games and other activities.

ROBINSON No. 2 AMONG BIG TEN RECEIVERS; LEADS WITH FIVE TD CATCHES

Sophomore WR Allen Robinson (Southfield, Mich.) has quickly established himself as one of the Big Ten's premier receivers and is second among all conference players in receptions and receiving yards and tied for the lead in touchdown receptions.

The former Orchard Lake St. Mary's Prep standout has 32 receptions for a 6.4 average. Robinson's 439 receiving yards top the conference and he is second in per game average at 87.8 ypg. His five touchdown catches are tied for the lead.

A candidate for the Biletnikoff Award, the Penn State season receptions record by a sophomore is 48 set by Bobby Engram (1993) and Deon Butler (2006). The all-time season mark is 63 held by O.J. McDuffie (1992) and Engram (1995). Engram was the inaugural winner of the Biletnikoff Award in 1994.

In the win over Temple, Robinson made five catches for 82 yards, including a 41-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter for a 7-0 lead.

In the 34-7 win over Navy, Robinson broke his career-high for the second time in three games with 136 receiving yards for his first career 100-yard game. He made five catches, three of which went for touchdowns to re-write another career high.

Robinson hauled in a pair of career-long 45-yard catches vs. the Mids, with the second one going for a score to give Penn State a 14-0 lead. He also grabbed a two-yard toss from Matt McGloin in the second quarter and then snagged a pass that was tipped by Trevor Williams for a 25-yard touchdown in the third quarter.

Robinson's three touchdown receptions on the day marked the most for a Penn State receiver since Graham

Zug grabbed three in a win at Michigan in 2009.

Robinson eclipsed his career high in receptions (9) set vs. Ohio by posting a game-high 10 catches for 89 yards and a touchdown at Virginia. Robinson recorded his first career touchdown reception on a diving 30-yard grab from Matt McGloin early in the fourth quarter vs. the Cavaliers.

Robinson became the first Nittany Lion to post double-digit receptions in a game since Derrick Williams had 10 vs. Purdue in 2007.

TIGHT ENDS MAKING IMPACT: TRIO WITH TD CATCHES IN FIRST FOUR GAMES

Coach Bill O'Brien indicated before the season that the tight ends would play a vital role in the Penn State offense and they have played a prominent role in the first half of the schedule.

Through the initial five games, four tight ends have caught 31 passes for 392 yards (12.6), with three of them scoring touchdowns. Redshirt freshman Kyle Carter is second on the team with 19 catches for 235 yards (12.4) and a touchdown at Virginia.

In the Illinois game, tight ends Matt Lehman and Kyle Carter combined to make eight catches for 115 yards and one touchdown. Five tight ends played on the Nittany Lions' first two series.

Junior Matt Lehman made a career-high five catches for 70 yards at Illinois, including a 21-yard touchdown pass. He is fourth on the team with nine receptions for 137 yards, including four grabs of 20 yards or more. He made a touchdown catch vs. Ohio. Junior Garry Gilliam has two catches for 18 yards.

True freshman Jesse James made a two-yard

BEAVER STADIUM SEES IMPROVEMENTS

Penn State fans are enjoying several significant upgrades to Beaver Stadium during the past two years.

The most significant changes to the venerable facility include:

- WiFi is available throughout the stadium;
- Credit and debit cards will be accepted at all concession stands;
- Waterproofing of the south upper deck seating areas;
- A camera has been installed on the south goalpost for the in-house videoboard;
- A new entry gate - Gate F - on the East side of the stadium near Gate A;
- More than 100 new locations for ADA patrons and companion seating on the East and West sides;
- Paving work on the field level concourse in the East, West and North sides of the stadium will provide a smoother and level surface for fans;
- A total of eight new restroom facilities, which are ADA-accessible, have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse;
- Improved drainage in seating areas

The changes and improvements to Beaver Stadium began as soon as the 2010 season ended and were completed in two phases, according to Associate Athletic Director Mark Bodenschatz. The first phase ended the week prior to the 2011 Blue-White Game and the second phase wrapped up in time for Football Eve on Sept. 2, 2011, and the Nittany Lions' 125th season opener the next day.

The new entry — Gate F — is located near Gate A on the East side of the stadium. Designed to accommodate 6,000-8,000 patrons, Gate F will be a tremendous asset on gamedays, allowing some fans who sit on the East side and previously have entered at Gate E, a smoother entry into the stadium. Penn State students will continue to enter Beaver Stadium at Gate A.

The most noticeable changes inside the stadium have occurred in the lower sections of the East, West and North seating areas. In the East and West, the first three rows of seats from goal line to goal line were removed and replaced with five large, pre-cast sections that will permit additional ADA spectators and companions to watch the Nittany Lions from a great vantage point. The pre-cast sections are approximately eight feet wide, to allow spectator traffic flow with the new ADA and companion seating.

Also in the East and West stands, vomitory ramps have been improved to allow for increased and easier access by ADA patrons to the new seating areas.

Fans will also notice significant changes on the North side of the stadium. The Section NF vomitory ramp has been modified with a gentler slope to permit ADA spectators to enter the North field level seats from Section NF, rather than the visiting team tunnel. A total of eight new ADA-accessible restroom facilities have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse.

Bodenschatz said 101 new ADA seats, as well as 101 companion seats, will be available for the upcoming season. With the ADA improvements, the Beaver Stadium capacity is 106,572, the nation's second-largest stadium.

Additional work has been done in a number of areas in the stadium, according to Bodenschatz. The work includes new storm water lines, allowing rain to be captured and re-directed at higher points in the stadium. Trenches, some 8-10 feet deep, were dug in the lower concourse to house the storm water drainage, as well as new water and sanitary lines. With the new lines in place, approximately 50 percent of the field level concourse surface area has been repaved since the end of last season.

Another completed stadium project includes consolidating the storage areas for the field maintenance staff and stadium concessions with new facilities in the North end of the stadium. Electrical work, painting of the east side seats in rows 1-60, new carpeting in the Penn State locker room and painting in the press box on the west side of the stadium also has been completed.

Twenty-nine former Penn State players were on the rosters of 19 National Football League teams for Kickoff Week. Penn State traditionally is among the top 15 schools nationally in producing current NFL players.

The Oakland Raiders feature a league-high three former Nittany Lions on its roster, including second-year starting center Stefen Wisniewski and rookies Jack Crawford and Nate Stupar. Stupar is on the practice squad.

Six NFL teams have two former Nittany Lions on their opening day rosters: Arizona, Cleveland, Dallas, Indianapolis, Miami and the New York Jets.

Bryan Scott is the elder statesman of former Nittany Lions in the NFL, as the Buffalo Bills safety/outside linebacker is entering his 10th professional season. Originally a second round draft choice of the Atlanta Falcons, Scott then played with the New Orleans Saints for one year before spending the last five in Buffalo.

Chicago Bears All-Pro plackicker Robbie Gould is next among Penn Staters in NFL longevity, entering his eighth season.

Three former Nittany Lion offensive linemen made NFL rosters with new teams: Dennis Landolt (Jets), Rich Ohrnberger (Arizona) and A.Q. Shipley (Indianapolis).

A total of 329 Nittany Lions have been selected all-time in the NFL Draft, including 36 in the first round. In the 2012 NFL Draft, Penn State had at least four players selected for the 39th time in NFL Draft history.

Penn State has had at least one alumnus on a Super Bowl team for 41 of 46 title games. Thirty-four former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 51 Super Bowl rings as players, including tackle Kareem McKenzie and defensive tackle Jimmy Kennedy with the New York Giants for Super Bowl XLVI.

Penn State's Andrew Quarless helped the Green Bay Packers win Super Bowl XLV and former Nittany Lions Sean McHugh and Scott Paxson helped the Pittsburgh Steelers win Super Bowl XLIII.

THIRTEEN NITTANY LIONS HAVE EARNED FIRST START THIS SEASON

ZWINAK FOURTH RUNNING BACK TO LEAD NITTANY LIONS IN RUSHING

Penn State had a different rushing leader in each of the initial four games, with injuries giving five running backs an opportunity to carry the ball and bolster the team's depth.

Sophomore Bill Belton led the Nittany Lions with 53 yards on 13 carries in the opener vs. Ohio, but suffered a sprained ankle and has missed the last three games. Senior Derek Day earned his first career start at Virginia and gained 47 yards on 18 attempts, but suffered a shoulder injury and missed the next two contests.

Senior Michael Zordich, who had 15 carries in 2011, gained a team-high 50 yards on 11 carries in the win over Navy. Junior Curtis Dukes made his first career start and gained 47 yards on 11 attempts, but missed the Temple game after sustaining a thigh injury.

In the Sept. 22 win over Temple, sophomore Zach Zwinak set then-career-highs with 18 carries for 94 yards (5.2). Zordich re-wrote his career bests with 15 attempts for 75 yards (5.0), including a team season-long 16-yard run. He left the game after taking a hit to his left knee. Behind Zwinak and Zordich, Penn State gained a season-high 173 rushing yards on 42 carries (4.1) and also set season bests for first downs (27) and time of possession (36:52).

MAUTI & BARNES EARN BIG TEN HONORS

Senior linebacker Michael Mauti and red-shirt freshman defensive end Deion Barnes were honored Sept. 17 by the Big Ten Conference for their efforts in Penn State's 34-7 win over Navy.

Mauti was selected Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in his career and Barnes was named the conference's Co-Freshman of the Week for the first time.

At least one Penn State linebacker has earned Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week every season since 2004, including senior Gerald Hodges (Paulsboro, N.J.), who was honored for the Northwestern and Illinois games last year. Penn State two-time All-America linebacker Paul Posluszny is the conference's all-time leader in career weekly Defensive honors with five.

Mauti led a defensive effort that resulted in forcing four turnovers, including one defensive touchdown, and holding Navy to just seven points and 4 of 15 on third down conversions.

Mauti posted a game-high 12 tackles (seven solo) for his fifth career game with 10 or more tackles and second this season. The Butkus Award candidate also recorded his first sack of the season and had two tackles for loss (minus-26 yards). He led an effort that resulted in season highs of four sacks and nine TFL.

Playing in his third career game, Barnes shared his first Big Ten honor with Indiana quarter-

back Nate Sudfeld. Making his second start, Barnes made a season-high five tackles (three solo), including his third sack of the young season. He forced his second fumble of the year on a sack on a Navy fourth down play from the PSU 31-yard-line early in the third quarter with the Nittany Lions leading 20-0.

The former Northeast High School standout is tied for third in the Big Ten with 3.5 sacks and tied for No. 1 in the conference with two forced fumbles. Barnes has 11 tackles (seven solo), with 3.5 sacks, 4.5 TFL and two forced fumbles.

DEFENSE DELIVERS FOUR TURNOVERS IN SECOND CONSECUTIVE GAME

The Penn State defense has made considerable strides, forcing four turnovers against both Virginia and Navy and holding them to a combined 24 points.

In the 34-7 win over Navy, the defense scored its first touchdown of the season when sophomore linebacker Mike Hull (Canonsburg) picked up a loose ball and returned it 74 yards for a fourth quarter score.

The fumble return was the Nittany Lions' first for a touchdown since Navorro Bowman returned one 91 yards vs. Eastern Illinois in 2009.

Gerald Hodges grabbed his second career interception at the Penn State 11-yard-line in the first quarter.

Penn State recorded season-highs with nine tackles for loss (by seven players) and four sacks, including two by freshman DE Anthony Zettel (West Branch, Mich.). The Nittany Lions also limited Navy to 4 of 15 on third down conversions.

PENN STATE'S 20th BIG TEN SEASON

After 106 years as an independent in football, Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and is playing its 20th year in the conference. The Nittany Lions were Big Ten Champions in 1994, beating Oregon to win the 1995 Rose Bowl, and playing USC in the 2009 Rose Bowl.

The Nittany Lions will begin Big Ten play at Leaders Division foe Illinois on Sept. 29 and finish the regular season with home games against division rivals Indiana (Nov. 17) and Wisconsin (Nov. 24). Penn State also hosts Leaders Division foe Ohio State (Oct. 27) and visits Purdue (Nov. 3).

Penn State will annually play Nebraska (Nov. 10) from the Legends Division and also plays at Iowa (Oct. 20) and hosts Northwestern (Oct. 6 - Homecoming) from the Legends Division this year. In 2013 and '14, Michigan and Minnesota will replace the Hawkeyes and Wildcats on the Nittany Lions' schedule. Michigan State and Iowa return to the Penn State slate in 2015.

PENN STATE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 88 PERCENT GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Penn State student-athletes continue to graduate well above their peers nationwide, earning record-setting academic performances, according to statistical information released by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in October, 2011.

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent compared to the 80 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2001-02 through 2004-05. The 88 percent figure was third to Northwestern (96) and Illinois (89) among Big Ten Conference institutions.

The Penn State football team earned a record GSR of 87 percent, tied with Stanford for the top graduation rate among teams in this week's BCS rankings and AP Top 25 poll. The Nittany Lion basketball (90 percent) and Lady Lion basketball (100) teams also earned graduation rates at least 15 percent higher than the national average.

This was the 21st annual release of institutional graduation rates since national "right-to-know" legislation was passed in 1990. In 2005, the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance implemented the initial release of the team GSR data.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate, and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete. The federal rate does neither.

In addition to releasing each institution's overall four-year Graduation Success Rate, the NCAA also released the federal graduation rates for students and student-athletes as it has for the past 21 years. The four-year federal graduation rate average for University Park student-athletes was 79 percent, second to Northwestern (88) among Big Ten schools, and significantly above the 64 percent Division I average. The four-year average for University Park students was 85 percent, also far exceeding the 62 percent rate for all students nationwide.

Among the 2004-05 entering freshman class, 80 percent of Penn State student-athletes earned degrees within six years, up from 76 percent last year and well above the 65 percent average for all Division I institutions. Penn State's 80 percent figure was second-highest among Big Ten schools, trailing only Northwestern (85). The graduation rate for all Penn State students was 85 percent in the entering class of 2004-05.

The NCAA data revealed that student-athletes from six Penn State squads earned a Graduation Success Rate of 100 percent -- Lady Lion basketball, field hockey, women's golf, men's gymnastics, men's tennis and women's tennis - and eight additional teams were at 90 percent or higher. Twenty of Penn State's 25 teams (track/cross country teams combined) earned a Graduation Success Rate at or above the national GSR average of 80 percent.

The Penn State Football (87 percent compared to 67), Nittany Lion Basketball (90 to 66 percent) and Lady Lion Basketball (100 to 84 percent) teams all earned four-year Graduation Success Rates considerably higher than the national average for their sport. Coach Patrick Chambers' Nittany Lions ranked second in the Big Ten with their 90 percent GSR score. Coach Coquese Washington's Lady Lions were tied for first in the Big Ten with their 100 percent GSR average.

The 2004-05 entering class for the Nittany Lion football team earned a stellar 84 percent graduation rate, which was highest among Big Ten Conference teams (Northwestern was second at 80 percent).

Navy was 5-7 last year and had played in eight consecutive bowl games before missing by one win in 2011.

Pete Massaro and Michael Mauti graduated last December. Evan Lewis, Ty Howle, Matt McGloin and John Urschel, who graduated in three years with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average, joined them as graduates in May.

James Terry, Michael Yancich and Michael Zordich graduated in August.

FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN MAKE DEBUT vs. OHIO; BENCH BECOMES SIXTH TO PLAY

Five Penn State true freshmen made their debut against Ohio in the season opener: CB Da'Quan Da-

vis, TE Jesse James, Saf Jordan Lucas, LB Nyeem Wartman and WR Trevor Williams.

Quarterback Steven Bench became the sixth true freshman to see action when he entered the Virginia game in the second quarter. Bench completed his first collegiate pass attempt with a 7-yard completion to Allen Robinson. He finished 2-of-7 for 12 yards on the day. Bench also gained 18 yards on three carries, including a 15-yard run for a first down.

Bench is the third true freshman to play at quarterback for Penn State in the last eight years, joining Anthony Morelli (2004) and Rob Bolden (2010).

Wartman blocked an Ohio punt at the Bobcats' 25-yard-line in the second quarter that Penn State converted into a 14-yard touchdown pass from Matt McGloin to tight end Matt Lehman for a 14-3 lead. Wartman also had one solo tackle.

1982 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM RETURNS FOR TEMPLE GAME

The 1982 Nittany Lions, one of the outstanding teams in Penn State's glorious football history, were honored at halftime of the Temple game.

The '82 Nittany Lions won Penn State's first National Championship by defeating No. 1 Georgia, 27-23, in the Sugar Bowl. Penn State earned a last second 27-24 win over No. 2 Nebraska in late September and rebounded from a 42-21 loss at Alabama in early October to win its last six games and earn a shot at the unbeaten Bulldogs for the title.

NITTANY LIONS BEAT NAVY FOR O'BRIEN'S FIRST CAREER WIN

Penn State scored on its initial three possessions and kept Navy off the scoreboard until the fourth quarter to post a 34-7 victory on Sept. 15 and give Coach Bill O'Brien his first career victory.

Sophomore wide receiver Allen Robinson recorded career-highs with 136 receiving yards and three touchdowns on five receptions and senior quarterback Matt McGloin tied his career high with four touchdown passes. McGloin was 13 of 21 for 231 yards and was not intercepted for the second consecutive game, as he delivered his ninth career 200-yard passing game. Freshman tight end Jesse James' first career catch resulted in a two-yard touchdown catch to cap the Nittany Lions' opening drive of the game. The Nittany Lions did not have a turnover for the second straight week.

The Penn State defense forced four turnovers (three fumbles) for the second consecutive game, boosting the Nittany Lions to the Big Ten lead in turnover margin (+1.67 tpg).

Early in the fourth quarter, sophomore linebacker Mike Hull scooped up a fumble and sprinted 74 yards for a touchdown. The Nittany Lions also recorded season-highs with four sacks and nine tackles for loss. Senior linebacker Michael Mauti recorded a game-high 12 tackles to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week accolades for the second time in his career.

Defensive end Deion Barnes forced a fumble for the second straight week and recorded his third sack in the past two games to earn Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week accolades.

THIRTY LETTERWINNERS RETURNED

Penn State returned 28 lettermen from last season – 12 on offense and 16 on defense. Two letterwinners from the 2010 season who were injured and did not play last year also return – tight end Garry Gilliam and defensive end Pete Massaro – bringing the total to 30 returnees.

Penn State returned six starters from the 2011 squad, along with 13 additional players who had made at least one start prior to this season. Two starters are back on offense (C Matt Stankiewitch and QB Matt McGloin) and four on defense (LB Glenn Carson,

DT Jordan Hill, LB Gerald Hodges, DE Sean Stanley).

Among the 13 additional returning players that had made starts prior to 2012, seven are on offense and six are on defense. The 13 players have a combined total of 56 career starts, led by CB Stephon Morris (13), DE Pete Massaro (11), LB Michael Mauti (11) and Saf Malcolm Willis (6).

TRIO OF RETURNEES EARNED 2011 ALL-BIG TEN RECOGNITION; ON 2012 WATCH LISTS

Among the returnees are three Nittany Lions who earned All-Big Ten recognition in 2011 and should be candidates for all-conference and national honors this year:

- Senior linebacker **Gerald Hodges** was selected first-team All-Big Ten and to the ESPN.com All-Big Ten team; 2012 Candidacy & Watch Lists: Lindy's pre-season first-team All-American, Bednarik Award, Nagurski Trophy, Butkus Award, Rotary Lombardi Award.

- Senior defensive tackle **Jordan Hill** was named honorable-mention All-Big Ten; 2012 Watch Lists: Outland Trophy, Rotary Lombardi Award.

- Senior linebacker **Michael Mauti** was a 2011 pre-season All-Big Ten choice, but suffered a season-ending knee injury in the fourth game last year; 2012 Watch Lists: Butkus Award.

HODGES NAMED PRE-SEASON FIRST-TEAM ALL-AMERICAN; CANDIDATE FOR SEVERAL NATIONAL HONORS

Senior linebacker Gerald Hodges was selected a 2012 pre-season first-team All-American by Lindy's and is a candidate for four national awards.

Hodges is on the Watch Lists for the: Bednarik Award, Butkus Award, Nagurski Trophy and Rotary Lombardi Award.

Hodges earned first team All-Big Ten honors from the coaches and ESPN.com in 2011. He was instrumental in Penn State having the nation's No. 5 scoring defense in 2011 and became the 22nd Nittany Lion to post at least 100 tackles in a season. Hodges led the team with 106 tackles (60 solo), ranking in the top 15 in the Big Ten in hits (eighth) and sacks (tied-14th with 4.5). Hodges also recorded 10.0 tackles for loss, forced two fumbles, broke-up four passes and made one critical interception and 63-yard return to set-up a touchdown in the win at Northwestern.

The former Paulsboro High School All-South Jersey standout was selected the Touchdown Club of Southern Jersey's 2011 Division I College Player of the Year.

HILL ON OUTLAND TROPHY AND ROTARY LOMBARDI AWARD WATCH LISTS

Senior defensive tackle Jordan Hill is a candidate for the Outland Trophy and the Rotary Lombardi Award.

Hill, a pre-season All-Big Ten candidate, will anchor a talented and deep defensive line in 2012. Last year, Hill led the D-line with 59 tackles, including eight tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks, earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition. The former Steelton-Highspire High School standout also topped the team and was tied for second in the Big Ten with three fumble recoveries, had one forced fumble and two pass break-ups.

MAUTI A BUTKUS AWARD CANDIDATE

Senior Michael Mauti joins Gerald Hodges on the Watch List for the Butkus Award, presented to the nation's premier linebacker.

Mauti saw an impressive start to the 2011 season abruptly end versus Eastern Michigan in the fourth game when the pre-season first-team all-conference selection tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee. In the three-plus games in which he played, Mauti recorded 21 tackles, with three tackles for loss, one interception and three pass break-ups. In the

clash with No. 2 Alabama, Mauti led the team with a career-high 13 tackles and had two pass break-ups.

STANKIEWITCH ON RIMINGTON TROPHY WATCH LIST

Penn State senior Matt Stankiewitch is on the Watch List for the Rimington Trophy, presented to the nation's top center. All-American A.Q. Shipley won the 2008 Rimington Trophy.

A starter in every game last season, Stankiewitch will anchor the offensive line and is the unit's only returning starter. He was instrumental in helping Penn State lead the Big Ten in fewest sacks allowed last season (14 in 13 games) and gave Penn State a 1,000-yard rusher for the seventh consecutive season.

NUMEROUS NITTANY LIONS HAVE FAMILY TIES TO PENN STATE FOOTBALL

Six members on the 2012 squad have ties to current or former Nittany Lion football team players, coaches or staff:

- Junior **Nate Cadogan's** brother, Gerald, lettered at tackle for the Nittany Lions from 2006-08;

- Senior kick snapper **Mike Furhman** is the son of Chet Furhman, former Penn State Football strength and conditioning coach;

- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Mike Hull's** father, Tom, lettered for the Nittany Lions from 1971-73;

- Rich Mauti was a letterman for the Nittany Lions in 1975 and '76 and played eight NFL seasons. One of his sons, **Michael Mauti**, is a fifth-year senior linebacker and another son, Patrick, was a senior in 2009;

- Freshman **Jonathan Warner's** father, Curt, was a first-team All-America tailback in 1981 and '82, and was instrumental in the Nittany Lions winning their first National Championship in 1982. Curt Warner was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 2009;

- Senior **Michael's Zordich's** father, Michael, played at Penn State from 1982-85, earning first team All-America honors as a senior before embarking on a 12-year NFL career.

In addition, redshirt sophomore **Patrick Flanagan** is the nephew of Nittany Lion Basketball head coach Patrick Chambers. Redshirt sophomore **Alex Kenney's** sister, Lauren, is a sophomore on the Penn State women's track and field team, placing fourth in the javelin at the 2012 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

FULLBACK BYERS ACTIVE DUTY MEMBER OF NAVY OFFICER PROGRAM

Senior fullback P.J. Byers had a remarkable path en route to earning a spot on the Penn State squad as a walk-on in 2010. An active duty member of the United States Navy's officer program, Byers went 18 years between introductions with the late Joe Paterno. In 1992, his father, Patrick, Sr., interned under Paterno at the annual Big 33 Classic. Paterno signed a program for P.J., who was seven years old, with the inscription, "I'll be waiting."

A 2003 graduate of Penn Trafford High School, Byers enlisted in the Navy, but was put on delayed entry and enrolled at Marietta College. At Marietta, he played football and was a member of the track and field team in 2003-04 before heading to boot camp, where he hoped to launch his career as a Navy SEAL. But, Byers' eyesight did not pass the necessary requirements and he shifted his career to becoming a Navy dive specialist. After being stationed in Connecticut and Florida, Byers was assigned to the Pearl Harbor Naval Station, where he learned to do underwater submarine repairs and demolition of explosives, during his three years in Hawaii. He then spent two years in San Diego, where he continued his diving education, including training dolphins to find mines.



During his time at Pearl Harbor and in San Diego, Byers was able to continue his dream of playing football in military-sponsored leagues. When Byers was selected for the Navy's officer program, he was able to choose any college or university he wished to attend, in order to earn a degree, which is a requirement for the officer program. Having attending games in Beaver Stadium during his youth, becoming a Nittany Lion was his first choice.

Once Byers graduates, if pro football does not work out, he aspires to become a Navy Explosive Ordinance Disposal (EOD) officer, where he would be on the frontline, disarming explosive devices and disposing of them.

Byers made his Penn State debut last year with a carry against Eastern Michigan. He is on schedule to graduate in May 2013, owned a grade-point average above 3.0 following the spring semester and is a potential Academic All-Big Ten candidate.

UNIFORM CHANGES

The Penn State football team is wearing uniforms featuring a blue ribbon on the back of the helmet to support all victims of child abuse. Also, for the first time, the names of each football player adorn their jersey in recognition of their resolve and dedication to the team and the University.

"The Penn State community stands with all victims of child abuse," said Acting Athletic Director David Joyner. "Coach Bill O'Brien and his football team made it clear they want to support victims and bring more awareness to this issue, which affects so many."

"I'm proud that our players want to be part of the University's efforts to help victims of child abuse," O'Brien said. "We hope our fans join us in wearing blue ribbons to all Penn State home games. Together, we can make a difference in the lives of children everywhere."

Coach O'Brien says after speaking with some members of the team, they made the decision together to add names to the uniforms. Players indicated the names on their jerseys also mean they will hold each other accountable to uphold the traditions of Penn State football, both on and off the field.

"We want our fans to know and recognize these young men," O'Brien said. "They have stuck together during tough times, and I commend them for the leadership they have shown. Moving forward, I'm deeply committed to honoring Penn State's traditions, while building a bright future for our football program."

PENN STATE FOOTBALL THEME DAYS AND GAMEDAY EVENTS SET

Every Penn State home gameday will feature new and returning Nittany Lion fan favorites in Beaver Stadium. As the Next Chapter of Penn State Football begins, numerous game themes and promotions are scheduled for Bill O'Brien's first season as head coach.

Special dates remaining this season are:

Northwestern, Oct. 6 - Homecoming

Penn State's 93rd annual Homecoming game is Oct. 6 vs. Northwestern, with kickoff slated for noon in Beaver Stadium. The Homecoming court will be introduced and the Alumni Blue Band will perform at the game. The popular Homecoming parade will take place Friday at 6 p.m. on campus and in downtown State College.

Ohio State, Oct. 27 - Primetime Penn State White Out

A Primetime Penn State White Out is slated for the Nittany Lions' 6 p.m. clash with Ohio State on Oct. 27. All fans are encouraged to wear white to the game against the Leaders Division rival Buckeyes. ESPN or ESPN2 will televise the contest.

Wisconsin, Nov. 24 - Senior Day and THON Celebration Day

Penn State concludes its home schedule Nov. 24 with one of the special events of every season - Se-

nior Day. The Nittany Lion seniors will be introduced one final time to the crowd prior to kickoff against Leaders Division foe Wisconsin. The contest also is THON celebration day.

SEVERAL ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA® CANDIDATES

The Penn State football team has had at least one Capital One Academic All-American® in nine of the past 10 seasons, including a school record five in 2008 and three more in 2009 and again in 2010.

Redshirt junior guard John Urschel graduated in May 2012 with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average in mathematics. Urschel should be a strong candidate in the fall to become Penn State football's 50th CoSIDA Academic All-American®.

Fifth-year senior defensive end Pete Massaro earned first team Academic All-America® honors in 2010, but missed the 2011 season with a serious knee injury and was not eligible for consideration. Massaro earned a 3.85 undergraduate GPA, earning his degree in finance in December 2011.

Among the Nittany Lions' other potential Academic All-America® candidates are: redshirt sophomore defensive end Brad Bars, junior linebacker Glenn Carson, redshirt sophomore linebacker Mike Hull and senior center Matt Stankewitch.

The Nittany Lions' 49 all-time Academic All-Americans® rank No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

Nominees for Capital One Academic All-America® consideration must have at least a 3.30 cumulative grade point average and be a starter or key reserve.

NEARLY 35 FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 3.0 GPA IN SPRING SEMESTER

The Penn State football team produced another outstanding academic performance during the spring 2012 semester, with 34 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade-point average.

Among the 34 Nittany Lions above a 3.0 GPA, 15 earned Dean's List recognition by posting a 3.5 GPA or higher this past semester.

The superlative academic performance brought to 37 the total number of Penn State football student-athletes with a cumulative 3.0 or higher GPA through the spring semester.

Four additional Nittany Lions who are not using their fifth-year of eligibility also earned a 3.0 or higher during the spring semester: Andrew Goodman (Philadelphia), J.D. Mason (Philipsburg), Kenny Pollock (Dallas, Pa.) and Ryan Scherer (Avon Lake, Ohio). Goodman earned Dean's List recognition and graduated in May with Mason and Scherer. Pollock is on schedule to graduate in December.

Redshirt junior guard John Urschel (Williamsville, N.Y.) posted a perfect 4.0 GPA for the sixth consecutive semester and graduated in May, earning his degree in mathematics in three years. Urschel is enrolling in a master's degree program in statistics. The team's projected right guard coming out of spring practice, Urschel should be a strong candidate in the fall to become Penn State football's 50th CoSIDA Academic All-American®.

Also earning 4.0 GPAs during the spring semester were senior tackle Mike Farrell (Pittsburgh) and senior wide receiver Evan Lewis (Gettysburg), who also graduated in May. A minimum 12 credit hours are required for Dean's List consideration.

Among the additional Nittany Lions on the Dean's List last spring were: defensive end Brad Bars (Nashville), cornerback Jess Della Valle (Pittsburgh), linebacker Mike Hull (Canonsburg), linebacker Ben Kline (Seven Valleys), tight end Matt Lehman (Newport) defensive end Pete Massaro (Newtown Square), quarterback Shane McGregor (Ebensburg) and center Matt Stankewitch. Kline earned a 3.94 GPA during the spring semester and brought a 3.92 cumulative

GPA in the summer academic sessions.

Five true freshmen earned Dean's List honors during the spring semester: Kevin Blanchard (Katy, Texas), Sam Ficken (Valparaiso, Ind.), Carl Nassib (Malvern), Deron Thompson (Litzitz) and Kline.

NEARLY 40 ACADEMIC ALL-BIG TEN HONOREES OVER PAST TWO YEARS

A total of 20 Penn State football student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors last fall for owning at least a 3.0 grade point average and being a letterwinner. A total of 280 Nittany Lions have earned Academic All-Big Ten honors since 1993, including 39 the past two years.

10th ANNUAL PENN STATE UPLIFTING ATHLETES "LIFT FOR LIFE" HITS RECORD \$110,000 TO BENEFIT KIDNEY CANCER ASSOCIATION

The 10th Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift For Life" was a tremendous success on July 13 raising the 2012 total to a record total in excess of \$110,000 to benefit the Kidney Cancer Association.

Penn State football student-athletes have raised \$110,374.00 for kidney cancer patients and awareness this year, with additional donations expected. The 2012 total breaks the chapter's previous record from the 2011 "Lift For Life," which netted \$100,930.00 for the Kidney Cancer Association.

More than \$700,000 has been raised in the battle against rare diseases by Penn State Uplifting Athletes since the inaugural "Lift For Life" was held in 2003.

A total of 81 Penn State football student-athletes secured at least one donation for Lift For Life, led by junior guard Eric Shrive (Scranton), who raised \$31,868.00. Senior tackle Mike Farrell (Pittsburgh) was next with \$12,755 and fullback J.R. Refice (Jes-sup) was third.

"A big thank you to everyone who donated and supported the football team by attending Lift For Life," said Mike Farrell, president of Penn State's Uplifting Athletes chapter. "We really appreciate everyone who helped in the Penn State community, from Coach (Bill) O'Brien and Coach Fitz (Craig Fitzgerald), the team, Deloris Brobeck, Kevin Henry and all our great volunteers who helped make the event successful."

"I would like to thank everyone who supported this year's Lift For Life event," said Shrive, vice president of Penn State's Uplifting Athletes chapter. "With everyone's support and generosity this was the best Lift For Life yet. We Are!"

The team was broken into six groups, with two groups from each side of the ball competing against each other:

- offensive linemen vs. defensive linemen,
- running backs/tight ends vs. linebackers
- quarterbacks/wide receivers vs. defensive backs.

The competitions included pushing a 15-passenger van weighing approximately 6,400 pounds, flipping a 680-pound tire, a medicine ball toss over a goalpost, a weighted sled pull and push and relays that included stacking three 50-pound bags, carrying weights and the tug of war.

"It's a hard workout," said Fitzgerald, Director of Strength and Conditioning for Football. "It was a great day for Penn State and most importantly, for (beating) kidney cancer."

funds for the Kidney Cancer Association. The event is organized by Penn State Football Uplifting Athletes, whose members are on the Penn State football team. They are led this year by officers Farrell, Shrive, senior linebacker Mike Yancich (Washington), who is the secretary, and junior center Ty Howle (Wake Forest, N.C.), who is head of operations.

Uplifting Athletes has grown to 13 chapters, with Boston College, Colgate, Kent State, Maryland, North Carolina State, Northwestern, Ohio State, Princeton, St. Francis, Notre Dame, Illinois and Fordham joining the Penn State chapter.

Penn State has earned a nation's best 15 Academic All-Americans® over the past six years, with 13 first team honorees. A program record five Nittany Lions were selected to the 2008 Academic All-America® team.

The Nittany Lions' 49 Academic All-Americans® all-time are No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

DATES SET FOR 2013 BLUE-WHITE WEEKEND

BIG TEN NETWORK TO AIR MULTIPLE PENN STATE GAMES AMONG ITS 40-PLUS FOOTBALL GAMES THIS SEASON

BTN will air 40-plus football games this season, with each school making a minimum of two appearances, including at least one conference game.

Penn State's Oct. 20 contest at Iowa will air in primetime on BTN, with a 7 p.m. CT kick in Iowa City. Additional Nittany Lion games will air on BTN once the 12-day selection process begins.

BTN televised three Penn State football games in 2011 and 2010 and four Nittany Lion contests in 2009.

The Big Ten Network is available to more than 80 million homes across the United States and Canada, and has agreements with more than 300 affiliates.

The network, though, is not carried by Adams and Blue Ridge cable in Pennsylvania. The network also is not available to Armstrong Cable customers in western Pennsylvania and in the Medina and Youngstown, Ohio areas. A combined total of more than 35,000 Penn State alumni live in communities served by the three cable providers, in addition to thousands more fans and current Penn State students.

BTN will air football tripleheaders on Sept. 1, 8 and 15.

The Big Ten Network will televise approximately 800 events in 2012-13, all in HD, including 40-45 football games, at least 110 men's basketball games, at least 55 women's basketball games, Olympic sport events and conference championships.

The Big Ten Network is available in more than 95 percent of the homes in the nine Big Ten states.

LAST GAME RECAP

NITTANY LIONS THUMP ILLINI, 35-7

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Sept. 29, 2012 - Senior quarterback Matt McGloin accounted for three touchdowns and senior linebacker Michael Mauti grabbed two interceptions, returning one a school record 99 yards, to help boost Penn State to a 35-7 thumping of Illinois in the Big Ten opener for both teams.

Coach Bill O'Brien earned his first Big Ten victory and initial road win as the Nittany Lions won their third consecutive game in convincing fashion.

Mauti was selected the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week, as well as the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in three games (see pg. 2).

McGloin was 18 of 30 for 211 yards, including a 21-yard scoring strike to tight end Matt Lehman late in the second quarter that gave Penn State a 21-0 lead. McGloin ran for a one-yard touchdown midway through the first period for a 14-0 lead and added another one-yard scoring run late in the third frame to boost the lead to 28-7. McGloin boosted his career touchdown pass total to 32, moving into seventh place on the all-time school list. He also delivered his 11th career 200-yard passing game, good for a tie for fourth in Penn State history.

Sophomore running back Zach Zwinak delivered his second consecutive career performance, gaining 100 yards on 19 carries and scoring twice for his first career 100-yard rushing game. Zwinak opened the scoring with a one-yard touchdown run just 4:19 into the game and added another one-yard scoring run early in the fourth quarter for a 35-7 lead.

A candidate for the Bedanrik and Butkus Awards, Mauti played like his hair was on fire, grabbing two picks and returning them 105 yards, making six tackles and 0.5 sack.

With the Illini threatening to become the first team to score a touchdown against Penn State in the first half, Mauti grabbed a Nathan Scheelhaase pass at the goal line and raced up the near sideline with a convoy of blockers. He avoided several would-be tacklers, but was tripped up at the Illinois one-yard-line. The interception return broke the school record for longest interception return, a 98-yard effort by Wayne Berfield vs. Boston University in 1958. Mauti made his second theft near midfield late in the third quarter to set-up Zwinak's second touchdown run.

The Nittany Lions forced three turnovers, pushing their total to 11 forced in the past four games, and held the Illini nearly 20 points below their season average. The Illini gained 74 rushing yards on 22 attempts, becoming the second team to not rush for 100 yards this season against the Nittany Lions.

Penn State has committed only one turnover in the past four contests.

Linebackers Glenn Carson and Gerald Hodges tied for team-high honors with nine tackles each, with Carson adding 1.0 TFL and a pass break-up. Senior linebacker Michael Yancich made a career-high seven stops, combining with DaQuan Jones to stop Illinois running back Donovan Young from the one-yard-line on the final play of the game. Cornerback Stephon Morris had four hits, including 1.5 TFL. Six players combined on three sacks.
