## SCOUTING #1 SEED SOUTH CAROLINA

- The top-seeded Gamecocks defeated Cal State Northridge and Oregon State to move on to the Sweet Sixteen.
- South Carolina is eighth in both major polls with a 29-4 overall record and 14-2 mark in SEC play en route to the conference title.
- SEC Player of the Year Tiffany Mitchell tallies 15.6 points, 5.6 rebounds and 3.5 assists per game. She also shoots the ball at an impressive rate, hitting 50.2% of her shots from the field and 52.9% of her attempts from three-point range.
- Aleighsa Welch tallies 13.8 points per outing to go along with 7.6 rebounds, while SEC Freshman of the Year Alaina Coates adds 12.0 points and a team-best 8.3 boards per game.
- Dayton fell to Fordham in the conference tournament championship game.
- Andrea Hoover was selected as the Atlantic 10 Player of the Year as she averaged 17.2 points per game with 5.4 rebounds and 3.6 assists. She has also knocked down a team-best 66 three-pointers this season.
- Ally Malott joined Hoover on the All-Atlantic 10 first team as she accounted for 14.5 points per game and a team-best 8.2 rebounds.
- Rounding out the quartet of double-digit scorers for the Flyers are Amber Deane (13.2), Kelley Austria (11.4) and Cassie Sant (10.9). Austria will miss the postseason after having ACL surgery in February.

## ALL-TIME VS. THE GAMECOCKS

- The Lady Lions are 6-4 all-time against South Carolina and have won the last two contests.
- PSU is won the only NCAA Tournament meeting between the teams, a 77-67 win in the second round of the 2003 tourney in the Bryce Jordan Center.
- Penn State is 25-30 all-time against current SEC schools.

## LAST TIME VS. USC

- The Lady Lions used a 13-0 run, including the final six tallies coming from **Maggie Lucas**, over the final 5:47 to earn a 55-50 come-from-behind win at South Carolina on Nov. 20, 2011 in Columbia, S.C.
- Lucas nailed a jumper with 1:22 left to give the Lady Lions the lead and clinched the win with a layup, followed by a pair of free throws in the final 22 seconds.
- Lucas finished with 18 points on 7-of-13 shooting and dished out a pair of assists.
- **Talia East** had six points to go along with personal bests of 15 rebounds and seven blocks. Her seven rejections are tied for third-most in school history.
- **Ariel Edwards** also reached double figures with 10 points via a 5-for-7 shooting performance and snared seven rebounds.

## SCOUTING #4 SEED NORTH CAROLINA

- The Tarheels moved on to the Regional Semifinals with wins over UT Martin and Michigan State to move to 26-9 on the season.
- UNC is 13th in the USA Sports Coaches' Poll and 12th in the AP poll.
- Diamond DeShields was selected as the ACC Rookie of the Year after leading the North Carolina charge with an 18.1 scoring average. She also accounts for 2.7 assists per game.

### LUCAS RISES ON BIG TEN SCORING LIST

- **Maggie Lucas** became fourth player in Big Ten history to surpass 2,500 points against Florida (3/25).
- She is also the 18th player in Big Ten history to reach 2,000 points at Georgetown (12/8).
- With 26 tallies against Northwestern on Feb. 20, Lucas moved into fourth place on the Big Ten's career scoring list with 2,504 points.
- Lucas broke a tie for fourth place with Purdue's MaChelle Joseph (2,405; 1989-92) in conference history with her effort against Nebraska on Feb. 24.
- Lucas needs 74 points to move into a tie for third place with Ohio State's Katie Smith (2,578; 1993-96).

### LUCAS CLAIMS LONG RANGE RECORD

- Senior guard **Maggie Lucas** broke the Big Ten and Penn State record for career three-point field goals made with a pair of triples against Ohio State in the Big Ten Tournament.
- Lucas has 365 triples in her collegiate career, breaking Kelly Mazzante's Big Ten and Penn State record of 357 three-pointers.
- Lucas is just the second player in Big Ten history and 45th player in NCAA Division I history with 300 career three-pointers.
- Lucas currently ranks 11th on the NCAA's career three-pointers list.
- Lucas had her streak of consecutive games with a three-pointer snapped against Alcorn State on Dec. 22 at 45 games, which was a school record.

### NEW FREEBIES QUEEN

- With seven free throws made against Northwestern on Feb. 20, Maggie Lucas broke the Penn State career free throws record.
- Her 547 career makes from the charity stripe break the 29-year old record of 512 previously set by post player Kahadeejah Herbert from 1982-85.
- With three freebies against Florida on March 25, Lucas also broke the single-season free throws record with 185 freebies.
- She bypasses Tyra Grant's record of 176 free throws made during the 2009-10 season.
- Lucas will also finish her career fourth on Penn State's career free throws attempted list with 603.

### LUCAS IN A LEAGUE OF HER OWN

- Senior guard **Maggie Lucas** has a knack for scoring and when she is scoring from the free throw line, she does it at a high clip and as such, she is in the midst of doing something that no NCAA women's basketball player, no WNBA player and no NBA player have ever accomplished.
- Lucas is the only player in NCAA women's basketball, WNBA and NBA history to average 20 or more points with a free throw percentage of 94.9% or better.
- In men's NCAA history, the only players to accomplish the feat are Appalachian State's Donald Sims (20.4 ppg; 95.1%) in 2010, Corey Coon (22.0 ppg, 96.3%) of Illinois Wesleyan in 2000 and Ryan Junghans (20.0 ppg; 95.9%) of Hood College in 2008.

- **Maggie Lucas** added her name to another exclusive scoring list with 32 tallies at Indiana on Feb. 13 to become the third player in school history with four seasons of 500 or more points.
- Lucas joins fellow 2,000-point scorers Kelly Mazzante and Susan Robinson as the only Lady Lions to accomplish the feat.
- Lucas is fifth on Penn State's single-season scoring list with 666 tallies this season.

- Senior guard/forward **Ariel Edwards** became the 36th member of Penn State's elite 1,000-point club with a 17-point effort against Wichita State on March 23.
- Edwards has had an outstanding senior campaign with a career-high 481 points per game.
- She is seventh in the Big Ten in scoring with a 15.5 average, making the Lady Lions the only team to have two players in the Top 10 in the league in scoring (Maggie Lucas - 2nd).
- Edwards has 1,032 career points, which is 34th in school history
- In the last five games, Edwards is averaging a team-best 21.8 points and 5.2 rebounds with a 57.1% shooting percentage.

## FABULOUS SENIOR CLASS

- Senior center **Talia East** posted her fifth career double-double and first in an NCAA Tournament game with 13 points and a season-best 13 rebounds against the Shockers.
- She also rejected a pair of shots against Wichita State to become the eighth player in school history with 100 career blocks.
- The double-digit rebounding effort was East's third in her last five NCAA Tournament games.
- East has had seven or more rebounds in each of her last five NCAA games.
- In her last five NCAA Tournament games, East is averaging 10.0 rebounds per game.

## DARA DISHES

- Senior guard **Dara Taylor** surpassed the 200-assist milestone for her Penn State career at Purdue on Jan. 30.
- Taylor is the 30th player in school history to accomplish the feat, but did so in just two years.
- With 260 helpers in her Penn State career, Taylor is 18th in program history, passing Sue Martin (247; 1976-80) for the position with an eighth-assist effort against Ohio State on March 7.
- Taylor needs three helpers to tie Lisa Shepherd (263; 1998-01) for 17th position.
- For her collegiate career, Taylor surpassed the 500-assist plateau with four dimes against Florida on March 25 to bring her career total to 502 helpers.

## EAST NABS #500

- Senior forward/center **Talia East** hauled in her 500th career rebound against Ohio State on March 7.
- With her four-rebound performance against the Buckeyes, East became the 30th member of Penn State's 500-carom club.
- She has 522 career boards, which is 30th on the Penn State career charts behind Adrie DeVries' 526 rebounds.

## "D" IS THE KEY

- The Lady Lions' defense has proven to be a case of Jekyll and Hyde this season. Penn State appears to be two different teams defensively in its wins and losses.
- In Penn State's 24 victories this season, the Lady Lions have held opponents to 61.6 points per game with a 35.4% opponent shooting percentages from the field and a 28.1% effort from three-point range.
- Conversely, in the Lady Lions' seven losses this season, Penn State is allowing 83.0 points per game with opponents shooting 45.3% from the field and 46.6% from long range.
- Additionally in the losses, Penn State allows 8.8 three-pointers per game as compared to 6.4 in wins.

### EDWARDS HITS CAREER-HIGH

- Senior guard/forward **Ariel Edwards** had a career game against Ohio State on March 7 as she tallied 29 points.
- Edwards' 29 points surpass her previous personal best of 24, which was set three times in her career, most recently at Nebraska on Feb. 24.
- The effort marked the third-straight 20-point performance for Edwards and the eighth of her career.
- She also went 11-for-15 from the free throw line, which were also career highs.
- Additionally, Edwards pulled in 10 rebounds to post her fourth double-double of the season and fifth of her career.

### BOUNCEBACK-ABILITY

- Penn State has shown that it is resilient after a loss. The Lady Lions have won their last 20 games following a loss, dating back to the 2010-11 season.
- The Lady Lions last lost consecutive games on Feb. 17 and Feb. 24, 2011, which is the only time this senior class has lost consecutive games in their career.
- PSU is 6-0 in games after a loss this season.

### FINISHING TOP 15 IN THE AP

- The Lady Lions will finish the season ranked 14th in the Associated Press poll, marking the third-straight season that Penn State has accomplished that feat.
- This is the first time since a six-year stretch from 1991-96 that Penn State has finished the season in the Top 15 in the AP poll in three or more consecutive years.

### BIG TEN THREE-PEAT

- With a 77-62 win over Michigan on March 1, Penn State clinched a share of its third-straight Big Ten regular-season title with a 13-3 record in conference play.
- This is the first time school history that the Lady Lions have won three consecutive conference regular-season titles (Big Ten or Atlantic 10).
- The Lady Lions join Ohio State (2005-10 and 1982-87) and Iowa (1987-90) as the only Big Ten teams to win three or more consecutive Big Ten titles.
- Penn State has won eight overall regular season crowns (1994, 1995, 2000, 2003, 2004, 2012, 2013, 2014).
- The Lady Lions earned the No. 1 overall seed in the Big Ten Tournament for the seventh time in program history.

### LUCAS WINS SECOND PLAYER OF THE YEAR AWARD

- Senior guard **Maggie Lucas** was named the 2014 Big Ten Player of the Year by the league's media voters to earn her second-straight Player of the Year Award.
- She is the seventh player in conference history to win two honors and the second Lady Lion, joining Kelly Mazzante, who won the award in 2003 and 2004.
- Among the players with multiple honors are Northwestern's Anucha Browne (1984, 1985), Ohio State's Tracey Hall (1986, 1987), Purdue's Katie Douglas (2000, 2001), Mazzante, Ohio State's Jessica Davenport (2005, 2006, 2007) and Ohio State's Jantel Lavendar (2008, 2009, 2010, 2011).

### TAYLOR CLAIMS BIG TEN DEFENSIVE TOP HONOR

- Senior guard **Dara Taylor** was selected as the 2014 Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year by the league's coaches.
- She is the second Lady Lion to win the top defensive honor, along with Tanisha Wright, who won the award three consecutive seasons from 2003-05.
- Taylor was also named to the Big Ten All-Defensive team for the second year in a row. This season, she was the only unanimous selection.

- Lady Lion head coach **Coquese Washington** was named the 2014 Big Ten Coach of the Year by the conference's media for the third-straight season.
- Washington joins Ohio State's Jim Foster (2005 (c), 2006, 2007) as the only coaches in league history to win three consecutive coaching honors.
- Washington was the 2012 Coach of the Year by both the coaches and media and was selected to the top honor again last season by the league's media members.

### GUARD DUO NAMED TO FIRST TEAM

- Senior guard **Maggie Lucas** and senior guard/forward **Ariel Edwards** were named to the All-Big Ten first team. Lucas was a unanimous selection by the coaches and media.
- Lucas garners first team accolades for the third time in her career, making her the sixth player in program history to earn the honor three or more times.
- She joins Tina Nicholson (1994, 1995, 1996), Angie Potthoff (1995, 1996, 1997), Kelly Mazzante (2001, 2002, 2003, 2004), Tanisha Wright (2003, 2004, 2005) and Alex Bentley (2011, 2012, 2013) as the only players to garner first team honors three or more times in their career.
- Lucas is the first back-to-back unanimous selection for the Lady Lions since Kelly Mazzante in 2002, 2003 and 2004.
- Edwards earns All-Big Ten honors for the first time in her career and is the 13th Lady Lion to win first team accolades.
- Penn State's 30 All-Big Ten first team selections are the most since joining the league in 1992-93 and are second-most all-time.

### MORE BIG TEN ACCOLADES

- Senior guard **Dara Taylor** was named to the All-Big Ten second team by the coaches and media.
- It is the first conference honor of her career.
- Senior center **Talia East** also took home her first career conference accolade as she was selected honorable mention All-Big Ten by the coaches and media.
- Senior guard/forward **Ariel Edwards** was Penn State's Sportsmanship Award recipient.

### BIG TEN STATS TITLES

- The Lady Lions led the Big Ten in rebounding margin in conference games with a +8.6 advantage on the boards.
- This is the second time in the last three years that Penn State has led the conference in that category and the third time since joining the conference in 1993-94. In addition to 2011-12, the Lady Lions also led the league in rebounding margin in 1998-99.
- Senior guard **Maggie Lucas** led the conference in free throw percentage with a .947 mark in Big Ten games.
- She is the fifth Lady Lion to lead the league in free throw percentage, joining Helen Holloway (1993-94), Jess Strom (2002-03), Adrienne Squire (2005-06) and Julia Trogele (2010-11).
- The Lady Lions also had a solid showing in the Big Ten stats, finishing second in scoring offense, scoring margin and field goal percentage defense.
- Individually, Lucas was second in league play in scoring (21.8) and **Dara Taylor** was second in steals (2.8).

### DUO BLOCKING THE LANE

- Senior center **Talia East** and junior center **Tori Waldner** have made it tough for opponents to find success in the lane as the pair have moved into the Top 20 in school history in blocks.
- East moved into eighth place in program history with four rejections against Michigan on March 1.
- She has 101 career rejections to become the eighth player in school history with 100 blocks.
- With her performance against the Wolverines, East passed Jess Brungo (94, 2001-04) for the eighth position, which is where she will finish her career.
- With one block versus Michigan on Mar. 1, Waldner moved into a tie for 12th place on the PSU chart with 88 career rejections.
- She broke a tie with Reicina Russell (87; 2003-04) and Vicki Link (87; 1984-87) for 12th spot with one block against Florida on March 25.
- Waldner needs one block to tie Kathy Phillips (89; 1989-92) for 11th place.

#### FOURTH-STRAIGHT 20-WIN SEASON

- With a 78-68 victory over Wisconsin on Feb. 16, the Lady Lions posted their fourth consecutive 20-win season.
- This is the 26th season 20-win season in the program's 50-year history.
- The win also marked the 10th home win of the season, giving the Lions four-straight 10-win home slates.

#### EDWARDS & TAYLOR INCREASE PRODUCTION

- With the graduation of a strong senior class a year ago, **Dara Taylor** and **Ariel Edwards** have stepped in to fill the gaps as both have significantly increased their offensive production from a year ago.
- Taylor is averaging 11.7 points, 4.9 assists and 2.7 steals per game this season, which is up from 7.0 points, 3.4 assists and 2.4 steals a year ago.
- She has also increased her free throw percentage from .623 to .750 as a senior.
- Edwards has also turned in an impressive jump in production, improving her scoring average by nearly eight points (7.9 to 15.5) and rebounding average by more than two and a half boards a game (3.2 to 5.8).

#### CAREER SEASON IN THE "AIR"

- Senior guard/forward **Ariel Edwards** is having career season for the Lady Lions.
- Edwards surpassed her scoring total from last season (252) just 18 games into the season.
- The 481 points are the most for the Elmont, N.Y., native in a single season.
- Additionally, Edwards has already achieved a personal-best with 181 rebounds, 73 assists, 34 steals and 13 blocks.
- Her previous personal-best for rebounds in a season was 125 as a sophomore.
- Edwards' previous career-high in assists was 32 as a sophomore and she is working on doubling her collegiate total (68 in her first three seasons).
- The senior's previous personal mark for steals in a season was 22, set during her sophomore campaign.
- Her previous season-high for blocks was 10 as a junior.

#### EAST SEES A BOARD

- Entering her senior season, **Talia East** had five double-digit rebounding performances in her career. In 26 games this season, East has eight games with double figures in the rebounding column.
- East surpassed her rebounding total from all of last season (97) in just 15 contests.
- She has 233 caroms on the season to surpass her career high for rebounds in a season of 173, set during her sophomore season.

#### TAKING ADVANTAGE OF THE FREEBIES

- Whether it is an effect of the new rules in college basketball or a change in style for the Lady Lions, Penn State has shot 113 more free throws in 31 games (581-750) this season than it did all of last year (468-637).
- The Lions have also improved on their stroke from the charity stripe, knocking down 77.5% of their shots, which is third in the Big Ten and is ninth in the country.
- One of the main reasons for PSU's success at the free throw line is senior **Maggie Lucas**, who is second NCAA Division I in free throw percentage at a 94.9% clip (185-195).
- Lucas has attempted 55 more shots from the line and made 59 more freebies as compared to last season.
- In 2013-14, Lucas is 185-195 from the free throw line, while in 2012-13, Lucas was 126-140 from the charity stripe all of last season.

#### WALDNER'S WAY

- Junior post **Tori Waldner** was 6-for-11 from the field en route to a career-high 14 points against Northwestern on Feb. 20.
- Waldner's previous personal best was 11, set twice this year against Indiana and UConn.
- She also pulled in nine rebounds, just narrowly missing out on her first career double-double.
- She also tied her career high with five blocks, a feat which she also accomplished against Minnesota on Jan. 24, 2013.

#### 33'S 25s

- **Maggie Lucas** reached the 25-point plateau for three consecutive games with 32 tallies at Indiana (2/13/14), 25 markers versus Wisconsin (2/16/14) and 26 points against Northwestern (2/20/14).
- She is the first player since Kelly Mazzante in Dec. 2003 to accomplish the feat.
- Mazzante had 31 points in back-to-back games against Baylor (12/9/03) and Pittsburgh (12/14/03) and had 29 tallies versus Louisiana Tech (12/21/03).
- Lucas has scored 20 points or more in her last five games, marking the second time in her career that she has done so (junior year).

#### BIG TEN ROAD WARRIORS

- The Lady Lions picked up their school-record eighth consecutive Big Ten road win with a 71-63 victory at Indiana on Feb. 13.
- The previous school-record for consecutive Big Ten road wins was seven that took place from Jan. 31, 1999 until Jan. 16, 2000.
- The streak was snapped at Nebraska on Feb. 24 with a 94-74 loss, marking Penn State's first Big Ten road loss since an 89-81 loss at Minnesota on Feb. 28, 2012.
- The win over the Hoosiers also marked the seventh Big Ten road victory of the season, which ties the school record (1994, 2000, 2004, 2012).
- The Lady Lions are 20-4 in Big Ten road games since 2011-12.

- The Eighth Annual Pink Zone at Penn State was held Sunday, Feb. 16 in the Bryce Jordan Center against Wisconsin.
- The Lady Lions honored a Pink Zone-record 698 survivors at halftime that represented 3,499 years and six months of survivorship.
- The preliminary fundraising total for this year's Pink Zone is \$196,364.50, which does not include donations from single-game ticket sales, t-shirt sales or the CharityBuzz.com online auction.
- Last year, the Lady Lions donated a record \$260,000 to breast cancer causes.
- All totaled, the Lady Lions have donated more than \$825,300 for breast cancer research and awareness in the first seven years.
- This year's fundraising efforts will benefit the Mount Nittany Medical Center, Penn State Hershey Cancer Institute, Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition, the Kay Yow Cancer Fund, J.C. Blair Memorial Hospital and Lewistown Hospital.

## WIN #875

- With a 74-54 win at Ohio State on Feb. 9, the Lady Lions earned the 875th win in program history.
- Penn State is the 12th program in NCAA Division I history with 875 wins.
- Joining the Lady Lions with 875 program wins are Tennessee, Louisiana Tech, James Madison, Old Dominion, Stephen F. Austin, Texas, Stanford, Ohio State, Tennessee Tech, Connecticut and Georgia.

## OF NOTE

- Penn State (82) and Ohio State (99) combined for the highest scoring game in Big Ten Tournament history as the teams put up 181 points.
- Among the Lady Lions' success on defense is the fact that only five teams (Northwestern, 47.3%; Iowa, 50.0%; Nebraska, 56.9%; Ohio State, 62.1%; Florida, 46%) have shot better than 45% this season.
- The Lady Lions 94-74 loss at Nebraska on Feb. 24 marked Penn State's worst loss since dropping an 89-67 decision at Ohio State on Feb. 17, 2011.
- The 94 points given up to the Huskers on Feb. 24 are the most allowed by a Penn State team in regulation since a 96-81 loss to Iowa on Feb. 10, 2002 and are the third-most points allowed under **Coquese Washington**.
- Penn State's 71-63 win at Indiana on Feb. 13 gave the Lions their fourth consecutive season with 10 conference wins.
- Senior **Dara Taylor** surpassed the 500-point mark for her Penn State career with 12 tallies at Indiana on Feb. 13.
- The 74-54 win at Ohio State on Feb. 9 marked the first back-to-back wins in Columbus since it occurred in 2002 and 2004.
- The Ohio State win Feb. 9 was also the program's 240th victory in Big Ten play.
- Senior **Ariel Edwards** surpassed the 400-rebound mark for her career with nine boards at Northwestern on Feb. 2.
- Senior **Dara Taylor** surpassed the 700-point mark for her collegiate career with 13 tallies at Purdue on Jan. 30.
- Penn State won back-to-back games in West Lafayette for the first time in school history with a 75-72 victory over Purdue on Jan. 30.
- The Lady Lions connected on just 38.1% (8-21) of their shots from the free throw line against Purdue on Jan. 30, marking the lowest effort from the charity stripe since going 7-for-21 (33.3%) at Duquesne on Jan. 24, 1991.
- The loss to Purdue on Jan. 12 marked the first Big Ten home loss for the Lady Lions since Jan. 7, 2012 against Michigan State, a string of 14 games.
- The Lady Lions did not have a blocked shot against Illinois on Jan. 9, marking the first time since Feb. 19, 2009 against Purdue that Penn State has been shutout on the rejections front.
- Penn State started the Big Ten slate 2-0 for the second-straight season and just the second time in the last nine years.
- Lady Lion head coach **Coquese Washington** claimed her 125th career win against then-#20/24 Texas A&M on Dec. 15.
- Sophomore **Candice Agee** doubled her career high with 16 points in the win over Bucknell Nov. 20. She surpassed her previous career mark of eight, which she accomplished four times in her career.
- The Lady Lions have started the season 2-0 for each of the last eight seasons.
- Penn State is 7-0 in season openers under head coach Coquese Washington.
- Agee and Waldner made their first career starts in the season opener against St. Francis (Pa.) on Nov. 8.
- The Lady Lions found themselves at the free throw line frequently against the Red Flash (11/8). PSU was 37-for-43 from the line, marking the first time since Nov. 11, 2007 against Pitt that the Lady Lions have made 30 or more free throws and attempted 40 or more freebies in a game
- Penn State's 117 points scored against St. Francis (Pa.) (11/8) were the most points scored in a Division I game on opening night (123 games).

### WHITTED WHIPS UP A CAREER SCORING EFFORT

- Freshman guard/forward **Peyton Whitted** had the best offensive performance of her young career at Northwestern.
- She was 5-for-6 from the field en route to a career-high 11 points, which passes her previous personal best of nine points that came at Illinois on Jan. 9.
- Whitted also had six rebounds in just 13 minutes of play.

### T'S A BEAST, AGAIN

- Senior **Talia East** posted her fourth double-double of the season and second in a three-game span with 14 points and 12 rebounds versus Iowa.
- The 14 tallies are a career high for East, surpassing her previous mark of 13 points vs. Indiana (1/22/14).
- The 12 rebounds also equal East's season-high, which was also accomplished at Purdue (1/30/14).

### TOPPING A RANKED FOE

- With a 75-72 win at Purdue on Jan. 30, the Lady Lions posted their third win over a ranked opponent this season.
- Penn State previously topped #20/24 Texas A&M on Dec. 15, 66-58, and #22/23 Iowa on Jan. 5, 87-71.
- The Lady Lions have defeated at least two ranked foes in each of the last five seasons and have topped at least four ranked teams in each of the last three seasons.
- Additionally, the Lady Lions have at least one win over a ranked foe in 24 of the last 25 seasons.
- The Lady Lions are 117-163 all-time against ranked opponents, but are 68-36 in home games against ranked foes.
- Penn State is 4-3 against ranked opponents this season, including losses to the regular-season unbeaten Connecticut and Notre Dame.

### EAST IS A BEAST

- Senior center **Talia East** posted her third double-double of Big Ten Conference play with 12 points and 12 rebounds in the win at Purdue on Jan. 30.
- She was efficient, connecting on a career-best six field goals on 10 attempts.
- East also played a personal-best 35 minutes against the Boilers.

### DARA'S DOUBLE VISION

- Senior guard **Dara Taylor** turned in arguably one of the best performances of her collegiate career against Minnesota on Jan. 26 as she posted her second career double-double and the first of her Penn State career with 15 points and 10 assists.
- In addition to her double-double, Taylor only turned the ball over one time in 37 minutes of action.
- The 10 helpers are the most for Taylor in a Penn State uniform, surpassing her previous Penn State high of eight, which has happened twice for her in the Blue & White.
- Taylor's first career double-double was at Maryland against Virginia with 10 points and 11 assists on Jan. 11, 2010.
- The point-assist double-double is the first for a Lady Lion player since Alex Bentley had 15 points and 15 assists against North Carolina on Nov. 30, 2011.
- The North Carolina game was also the last time that a Penn State player reached double figures in the assist column.

### KEEP IT UNDER 55

- Penn State did not allow an opponent to score more than 55 points in a span of four games (Ohio State, 66-42; Michigan State, 66-54; Indiana, 65-52; Minnesota, 83-53).
- This marks the first time that the Lady Lions have accomplished that feat in Big Ten regular-season play for the Lions since 1999-00 (Indiana, 74-36; Northwestern, 66-34; Minnesota, 99-43; Ohio State, 56-50).
- The last time overall that Penn State has held four consecutive opponents to less than 55 points is in non-conference play during the 2011-12 season (Virginia Tech, 66-28; UMES, 76-51; Wagner, 103-42; Bucknell, 78-54).

### ANOTHER DOUBLE DIP FOR T

- Senior center **Talia East** earned her second career double-double game with 13 points and 11 rebounds against Indiana on Jan. 22.
- East's 13 points are a career high, surpassing her previous mark of 12 set against Notre Dame (12/4/13).
- The senior attempted eight free throws surpassing her personal best of seven and tied her free throws made at five set against Purdue (2/4/13).

### KALIYAH'S CAROMS

- Freshman guard/forward **Kaliyah Mitchell** pulled in a career-high 10 rebounds at Michigan State on Jan. 19.
- She pulled in nine of her 10 caroms in the second half, including an offensive rebound and putback to give Penn State its first lead of the game.
- Mitchell's previous personal best was eight rebounds against Bucknell on Nov. 20.

### OVERCOMING POOR SHOOTING

- The Lady Lions won back-to-back games over Ohio State and Michigan State despite shooting less than 35% from the field in those games.
- In the 66-42 win over the Buckeyes on Jan. 16, Penn State shot 34.7% from the field and in the 66-54 win at MSU on Jan. 19, the Lady Lions connected on 33.3% of their shots.
- This marks the first time since the 2003-04 season that Penn State has won back-to-back games despite "off" shooting nights.
- On Jan. 2, 2004, Penn State topped #7 Purdue, 47-42, while shooting just 34% and followed that up on Jan. 4, 2004 with a 64-62 win over #22 Michigan State after shooting 34.9% from the field.

**REMEMBERING MARY JO HAVERBECK:** The Penn State Lady Lion basketball program mourns the passing of former associate sports information director Mary Jo Haverbeck, who died on Monday, Jan. 6 in State College. She was 74. Haverbeck was a trailblazer for women in the field of athletic communications, earning several lifetime achievement honors from the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). She was the first woman inducted into the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1995 and was the first recipient of the organization's Trailblazer Award in 2001. Additionally, she was the first female to earn the Arch Ward Award, in 2000, which is presented to a member who has made an outstanding contribution to the field of college sports information or has brought dignity and prestige to the profession. She continued to cover the Lady Lions in retirement for Blue-White Illustrated and the Lady Lion Cager Club. Haverbeck will be honored at the 2014 Women's Final Four with the WBCA's Mel Greenberg Media Award.

# COQUESE WASHINGTON

## PENN STATE LADY LION BASKETBALL

Coquese Washington was introduced as the fifth head coach of the Penn State women's basketball program on April 23, 2007. Washington is the first female African-American head coach in Penn State history.

The Lady Lions continued their return to the national spotlight in 2012-13 as they collected their second-straight Big Ten regular-season title and seventh overall with a 26-6 overall record and 14-2 mark in conference play. In each of Washington's first six years, Penn State has improved their Big Ten win total. The Lady Lions posted their third consecutive 25-win season, joining the 1993-94, 1994-95 and 1995-96 squads as the only teams in program history to accomplish the feat. Penn State also advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament with a win over Cal Poly. The Lady Lions were consistently ranked in the Top 10 for most of the season and finished eighth in the Associated Press Top 25 and 12th in the USA Today Sports Coaches' Poll.

With another stellar campaign, the accolades continued to roll in for the Lady Lions. Washington was selected as the Big Ten Coach of the Year by the media for the second-straight season and became just the fifth mentor in Big Ten history to win back-to-back Coach of the Year accolades. She was also the WBCA Region 6 Coach of the Year and a finalist for WBCA National Coach of the Year for the second-straight season. The awards also piled up for Penn State's dynamic backcourt of Maggie Lucas and Alex Bentley. Lucas was selected as the Big Ten Player of the Year, was a Wade Trophy Finalist and was an All-America choice by four outlets, including the WBCA (honorable mention), Associated Press (second team), USBWA (first team) and Full Court (second team). She is just the third Lady Lion in program history to win Big Ten Player of the Year honors, joining Helen Darling and Kelly Mazzante. Bentley earned her third-straight first team All-Big Ten award and honorable mention All-America bids from the WBCA and Associated Press. She was also selected as the 2013 recipient of the Frances Pomeroy Naismith Award, which is presented to the nation's outstanding female collegian 5-8 and under. Bentley is the third Lady Lion to win the honor, joining Darling and Suzie McConnell. Nikki Greene also capped a stellar career for the Lady Lions with third team All-Big Ten accolades. She also became the first player in school history to accumulate 1,000 points, 900 rebounds and 200 blocks.

Both Bentley and Greene heard their names called on WNBA Draft night. Bentley was selected with the 13th overall pick by the Atlanta Dream to become the highest draft pick for the Lady Lions since Tanisha Wright (12th) in 2005. Greene was the 26th overall selection by the Phoenix Mercury to give Penn State two draft picks for the first time since 2004 (Mazzante, Jess Brungo).

With five graduating seniors in 2012-13, Penn State was stout on the recruiting trail, bringing in a seven-member class that was ranked 14th by ESPN/HoopGurlz. The Lady Lions also added transfer Sierra Moore from Duke to complete the eight-player class. The addition of Moore gives the Lady Lions four McDonald's All-Americans on the roster heading into the 2013-14 campaign, joining Dara Taylor (2009), Lucas (2010) and Candice Agee (2012).

Washington returned the Lady Lions to Big Ten prominence in her fifth season as she guided Penn State to the Big Ten regular-season title with a 13-3 record in conference play. Additionally, the Lady Lions advanced to the NCAA Tournament Sweet Sixteen with wins over UTEP and LSU en route to a 26-7 overall record. The Lady Lions posted back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time since 2002-03 and 2003-04. It was also the first Big Ten crown and Sweet Sixteen berth for the Lady Lions since 2003-04. The Lady Lions were ranked throughout the season and finished ninth in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll and 11th in the Associated Press Top 25.

For her efforts in rebuilding the Penn State program, Washington was honored as the Big Ten Coach of the Year and the WBCA Region 6 Coach of the Year, making

her a finalist for WBCA National Coach of the Year. The accolades were not just limited to Washington; all five Lady Lion starters earned All-Big Ten recognition, including first team bids for Bentley and Lucas. Both Bentley and Lucas also garnered honorable mention All-America honors from the WBCA and Associated Press, respectively. Lucas joined the 1,000-point club in 2011-12, becoming just the third sophomore in program history to accomplish the feat.

On the recruiting trail, the Lady Lions' 2012 class earned a Top 20 class from Dan Olson's Collegiate Girls Basketball Report. The class included transfer Taylor, who sat out the 2011-12 season due to NCAA transfer rules, and McDonald's High School All-American Agee from California. Additionally, Agee earned a gold medal with the USA Basketball U18 National Team Trials at the 2012 FIBA Americas Championship in August.

Washington came to Happy Valley after eight seasons as an associate head coach and assistant coach under Muffet McGraw at Notre Dame, her alma mater. During Washington's eight years on the bench, Notre Dame amassed a 188-69 record with eight NCAA Tournament appearances, including four Sweet Sixteen runs and a National Championship in 2001.

Washington was a four-year starting point guard for Notre Dame under McGraw and was the team captain on Notre Dame's first-ever NCAA Tournament team. She was a two-time All-Midwestern Collegiate Conference (MCC) selection and led Notre Dame to three MCC Tournament titles.

The epitome of a student-athlete, Washington graduated from Notre Dame in 1992, a full year ahead of schedule, with a bachelor's degree in history. She went on to attain "Double Domer" status in 1997 after earning her Juris Doctorate from the Notre Dame Law School.

A native of Flint, Mich., Washington and her husband, Raynell Brown, have a son, Quenton (8), and a daughter, Rhaiyna (4). They reside in Port Matilda, Pa.

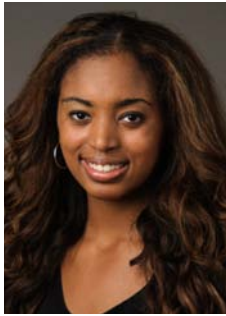

## MAGGIE LUCAS LEADS LADY LIONS INTO FOURTH STRAIGHT NCAA TOURNAMENT

You hear the rhythmic sounds before you get there.

The ball bounces, there's a pause and then you hear it hit the ground, again.

The closer you get, you can distinguish the swishing sounds or the squeak of a shoe.

At Penn State, it's not located far away from the spotlight of the Bryce Jordan Center court.

You head down a hallway and take a right. You walk past the Penn State women's basketball locker room and there it is on the left — South Gym.

Often you don't have to look through a tiny window to see who is responsible for the basketball symphony inside.

It's one of the greatest scorers in Penn State and Big Ten history — Maggie Lucas.

"You know it's Maggie Lucas." Penn State coach Coquese Washington says.

"You know it's Maggie," Penn State center Talia East agrees. "If practice starts at 3 p.m., you know she's here at 2 p.m."

You wonder why someone with a shot that looks like it's going in every time it leaves her hand would need to spend so much time in the gym.

Yet, it's those solitary days — just Maggie, a basketball and a hoop — coupled with one-on-one instruction from Lady Lion assistant coach Fred Chmiel that have helped make her the two-time Big Ten Player of the Year, and one of the most feared scorers in the country.

Lucas helped lead the Lady Lions (22-7) to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth consecutive year, where they'll face Wichita State at 12:30 p.m. Sunday at the Jordan Center

### ORIGINS

Lucas says she remembers playing basketball for the first time around age 4.

"I can remember I had a pair of white Chucks and high tube socks, and I thought I was the best basketball player there was in the YMCA League," she said.

But Betsy and Albert Lucas' youngest child had older brothers, Peter and Ben, to keep her in check.

It was games against her brothers that stoked her fire. With her father playing, there were two-on-two battles at the local gym.

"Having two older brothers, it's embedded in me to be competitive," Maggie said. "I can't help it. If we're doing anything, I get competitive, but it's kind of helped me be the player I am."

So did growing up in the Philadelphia suburbs.

"We had a fun neighborhood with lots of kids," Maggie said. "We were outside all the time, playing kick-the-can, manhunt, football, just everything. We all competed with each other and there were a lot of different kids in the neighborhood who played sports. And along came my brothers, we were just always playing games and competing."

While there were many different options, Lucas always had a fascination with the game that had a basket. It intrigued her, gave her something to work toward.

"I played soccer. I played lacrosse," Lucas said. "I think what I like about basketball the most is how many different skills you always can continue to hone. You've always got to be on top of it. I know in other sports it's the same way, but I really think basketball is the most like that."

She and teammate Dara Taylor began a long friendship when they first began playing together at age 10.

"I remember we were playing in kind of suspect gyms," said Taylor, a transfer from Maryland who has played two seasons at Penn State. "We didn't really know what we were doing. We were kind of playing around. Now to see us playing at the highest level together, ranked in the country and on top of our conference, it's amazing to look back to see where we started from."

### WORK, WORK, WORK

From the outside, you wouldn't call Maggie Lucas physically intimidating.

She's listed at 5-foot-10. She doesn't jump higher or isn't quicker than a lot of the defenders that play against her.

Lucas' biggest attributes are on the inside.

She has an intense passion for the game that multiplied during her four seasons at Penn State.

She's been willing to do whatever it takes to improve, be it conditioning or hours in the gymnasium.

She takes the theory and puts into practice.

"She's a sponge," Chmiel said. "She soaks it up and to her credit she's a great student of the game. It's not so much anything I've done. It's the work she's put into it."

"I've never met anybody who works harder than Maggie," East said. "I've never met anybody who is in the gym more than Maggie. I'm not making it up. Hours before practice and hours after practice, I've never seen anyone work on their game more and you can see in the results."

"It's rubbed off on me a little bit. I think to myself, 'If I put in that kind of time, I could be awesome.'"

When Lucas arrived on campus, her reputation as a shooter preceded her.

"Coming out of high school she was just known as a 3-point specialist — Machine Gun Maggie just shooting threes," Washington said.

It didn't take Lucas long to learn that opponents have ways in dealing with long-range bombers. They face-guarded Lucas all over the floor and made it difficult for her to even touch the ball.

That's where the work with Chmiel has paid off. Lucas is now a scorer. She can still make the 3-pointer, but she can beat a defender off the dribble, shoot a step-back or rub a defender off a screen. And if you foul her, she's going to make the free throws 90 percent of the time.

But time to work those things out is limited, so self-motivation is a key.

"The way the NCAA works, you don't have a lot of hands-on time with them," Chmiel said. "If a kid wants to change, they have to do it on their own. We help them and give them methods. But unless they practice those methods and make them their own, they don't get better."

Chmiel calls Lucas "special" in those regards. Very few players are willing to sacrifice that kind of time and effort.

"They're rare and they're usually WNBA Draft picks," he said. "She's got the best work ethic that I've ever dealt with. There's kids that want to learn and there's kids that want to learn and can execute. That's the difference between her and everybody else."

"The things she wanted to accomplish, we talked about that," Washington said. "You're going to have to expand your game. You're going to have to grow. You're going to have to become a leader.' I had confidence and trust in her that those things would happen."

When you're around Lucas, practice rarely looks like a chore.

She's bantering with teammates, constantly clapping her hands and encouraging.

It's obvious that she and former Philadelphia 76er great Allen Iverson have totally opposite views on the importance of practice.

"I don't see it as busy work or something I have to do. I see it as something I want to do," Lucas said. "For me, if you take a week off from basketball, it's just not the same. You've got to have that feel for the ball. Like I've said, I'm kind of an obsessive, detail person. Basketball kind of fit my personality really well."

It's a perfect fit.

"She has one of the greatest shots I've ever seen," Taylor said. "But, you can see, even as a freshman, how her game has grown. It's all her, her dedication, her hard work. It's everything that she's put in and it shows."

## CRAZY DECISION

When the Penn State program was at its lowest of lows, Lucas saw something different.

After her sophomore season at Germantown Academy, the future McDonalds All-American decided she was heading to a program that had a new coach and was in the midst of four consecutive losing seasons.

She chose hope over a sure thing.

"I can remember back when I committed that people were shocked," Lucas recalls with a smile. "They were like, 'What are you doing? They're not good. You've got to be kidding me.' I just really had a lot of faith in Co and a lot of faith in what I committed to. I told my mom and dad, 'I can just see myself going to school at Penn State more than any other place I looked at.'

"From the beginning, I really wanted to say yes, but there was everyone in my ear saying they're not that good. All along, I was like, 'I want to commit there. I know in my gut that's where I'm the most comfortable and where I belong.'

"One day I was like, 'I'm going to take a leap of faith. I've heard about these other girls she's supposed to get --- Alex Bentley and Nikki Greene. I have faith we can get it done.'"

Lucas actually committed to the program before Bentley, the WNBA Rookie of the Year last season, and Greene, who is playing professionally in Korea.

That show of faith is not lost on Washington.

"It's really hard to put it into words what she's meant to the program, what she's meant to me personally, the bond that we share," the three-time Big Ten Coach of the Year said. "Maggie and I had a lot of trust in each other. She verbalized early in high school when we were coming off an 11-win season. She believed in our vision for the program and I believed in her. I believed she could be the player she wanted to be and could accomplish the things here at Penn State that she wanted to accomplish."

Coupled with her teammates, Lucas has helped put Penn State back on the map. The Lady Lions have won 25, 26, 26 and 22 games since Lucas arrived and have captured the Big Ten regular-season crown the last three seasons.

"I really don't think many people saw what we saw happening — three Big Ten championships and being in the NCAA Tournament every year. I'm pretty proud of that."

She's never regretted her decision to come to Penn State and has become one of the most popular players in program history.

"She's a household name," Washington said. "There's not too many places in America from a women's basketball perspective that you can say the name Maggie Lucas and people not know who she is and what she has accomplished."

"I really don't think I could ask for a better experience from college and being embraced by a town," Lucas said. "I can't say enough good things about Penn State."

Be it walking on campus, pumping gas and wandering through a store, people feel like they can talk to Maggie.

"I love when fans come up and talk to me," she said. "Even after a tough game, people come up to me and they're positive. I just don't know too many other sports towns that are like that. Even after a bad loss, people are coming up to me and giving me words of encouragement for the next game and telling me they're still proud of me. They're just great."

## CRAZY NUMBERS

The numbers that Lucas has amassed at Penn State are staggering.

She's piled up 2,460 points, second only to Kelly Mazzante (2,919) in program history. She recently passed Mazzante and has the school and Big Ten mark with 358 career 3-pointers. She'll go down as the school's best and one of the top 10 free throw shooters in NCAA history having made 90.7 percent of her attempts.

She's also 10th in steals (231) in school history and 15th in assists (279).

Lucas has never put an emphasis those numbers, looking more at team wins than her line in the box score. In fact she credits others for her assault on the record books.

"I credit that so much to being surrounded by unbelievable players and working with who I think is the best guard position coach in the country in Fred Chmiel," she said. "He's transformed my game. ... Every second I get a chance to be in the gym with him as a benefit to me."

Teammates say Lucas' accomplishments speak for themselves.

"That kid is amazing," East said. "Look at her awards list. She is just a great player and the best thing about her is consistency."

Lucas has been remarkably consistent. She averaged 15.4 points her freshman season and it's gone up to 19.5 as a sophomore, 20.1 as a junior and even with increased scrutiny to 21.5 this season.

Surprisingly, she's had only seven career games where she's scored 30 or more points. She has piled up the 20-point games, amassing 56 of those.

And, she's put up those numbers with sheer enthusiasm. Rarely does a game go by when Lucas isn't trying to exhort the crowd or pump up her teammates.

"Part of it is that there's nothing like playing in front of you college fans and the excitement of that," Lucas said. "Even on the road, it's so exciting. I just get immersed in it and we're playing I'm just really passionate about it. I know how much we put into it as a team and this has been my life. Since I was four years old, it's been my life."

She does realize that her passion can wear thin on others, especially those in opposing uniforms.

"I know there are people out there that think I'm a little much," Lucas admits. "It's not about that. I have fun every time I'm out on the court. I like to show emotion. I think one thing for me has been being able to control the emotion, too. My emotion is totally genuine. I'm excited to be out there."

Not everything has always been rosy. The Lady Lions have advanced to the Sweet 16 just once in Lucas' career and she has seen some tough times as opposing teams have focused so much attention on defending her.

Lucas has learned from disappointment.

"You've got to experience the lows," she said. "That's what makes the highs so great. To a certain point, you can't let them bring you down. It's going to keep happening. Nothing is going to be perfect the rest of your career."

## THE FUTURE

Lucas obviously wants a shot at playing as a professional. She's projected as a first-round WNBA Draft pick when the selections are made in 20 days.

"That's been my dream my whole life to play professionally, but I do feel like I have more work to do here," Lucas said. "I owe Penn State more work and everything I have left in the tank."

In addition to a basketball career, Lucas would like to own a restaurant one day. Her father has been director of operations for several restaurants and Maggie has become a full-blown "foodie."

"We've grown up going to restaurants, experiencing all different kinds of food," she said. "It's something I really love. I'm crazy about food. It's like my second passion."

"I love Asian, sushi and sashimi, but I also love classic seafood like oysters and clams. I'm big into Mexican food, too."

She's even dined with Iron Chef Masaharu Morimoto at his restaurant in Philadelphia.

"It was unbelievable," Lucas said. "He came over and sat with us and we ate sushi and sashimi with him. It was really cool."

Lucas knows working at a restaurant isn't easy.

"My dad works from 9 in the morning until 12 at night," she said. "It's a hard job to run a restaurant."

But anyone who knows Lucas knows she's not afraid of a little work.

"When I look at Maggie and the work ethic that she has, the passion that she plays with and the sacrifices that she makes in committing to be the best that she can be, it's really gratifying to see all of the things happen for a kid like that," Washington said. "I am so happy for her."

"However the season ends, it will be what it will be," Lucas said. "We have our in-house goals, but I just can't say enough about how much I've loved it here. It's going to be really hard to leave."

Until then, the ball will keep bouncing in South Gym.

"That girl is committed," East said. "I'm sure that's something that's going to stick with her the rest of her life."



## EDWARDS MAKES MOST OF SENIOR SEASON

Northwestern coach Joe McKeown has seen a lot of basketball in his 28 years on the bench. He's coached in more than 960 games over his career so he has a pretty good idea about talent and how the game is supposed to be played.

After playing and losing to Penn State for the second time this season, McKeown offered up his assessment of the Lady Lions' Ariel Edwards, a player who has lurked more in the shadows than in the spotlight in her four seasons.

"She's probably the most underrated player in the Big Ten and has been that way since she's been here," McKeown started. "It would have been better if she had come to Northwestern, right? She's had a great career for them and they probably appreciate her because she does all of the little things."

For a player who has taken the long road to a starting position with the Lady Lions, those words are nice to hear.

"It's a great compliment," said Edwards, who along with Maggie Lucas, Talia East and Dara Taylor will be recognized on Senior Day as the No. 8 Lady Lions (21-6 overall, 12-3 Big Ten) face Michigan (17-11, 8-7) at 3:30 p.m. at the Bryce Jordan Center. "There's so many good players in our league. Sometimes you can feel like your talents are lost or you're not really appreciated as a player. It's great to hear that."

Edwards has earned every bit of the plaudits this season. She's averaging 14.7 points and 5.9 rebounds per game, both totals that are around double her career averages.

In her first full season as a starter, Edwards is a big reason why the Lady Lions have a shot at clinching at least a tie Saturday for their third consecutive conference regular-season title.

"We're not in this position without what she's done," Penn State coach Coquese Washington said. "I just take my hat off to her because she's really been an impact player for us all season long."

### LONG JOURNEY

Edwards is the first to admit that her trek to the starting lineup has been easy.

She arrived at Penn State having been a post player at Christ the King High School in New York. But at Penn State, Washington had plenty of post players. She needed the 6-foot-3 Edwards to move to the wing.

Making the adjustment wasn't easy. In her first season, Edwards averaged 2.9 points in 33 games.

"I've always been that kind of player that the more experience I get the more comfortable I get and the better I do."

Edwards is what coaches call "a thinker."

And when she arrived at Penn State, Edwards wanted to deal in absolutes in a game that is constantly changing.

"I don't think Ariel ever questioned how good of a player she was," her position coach Kia Damon said.

"Sometimes putting together the mental and physical in your four years can be a challenge. Sometimes when you live in the world of absolutes ... basketball isn't a game that plays out that way. There's always some gray area and your ability to thrive in that gray area is what separates good players from great players."

Edwards admits her brain didn't always help her play.

"Definitely and that hurts me sometimes," she responds when asked if she is a thinker. "I think that's why it took me this long to play the way I'm capable of playing."

Edwards likes things orderly. For example, she doesn't want items on her plate touching each other. She won't eat syrup on pancakes because she doesn't want it to spill over into the eggs. She'll eat one Skittle at a time so the flavors don't bleed into each other.

It was the same way for a time on the basketball court.

"It's something that's helped me and hurt me in terms of basketball that I do things a certain all of the time," Edwards said. "It helps me to be a consistent player, but if I don't understand something that's happening on the court, sometimes it hinders my performance."

"I've learned that basketball is not going to be predictable. There are some things that are consistent within the game, but there's a lot of things that move and change. I've become more flexible."

### HARDEST LESSON

Edwards began her junior season in the starting lineup, but just a few games into the season, she was relegated back to a reserve role.

After two seasons doing the same thing, the move back to the bench stung.

"It was tough, but it was a wake-up call for me," Edwards said. "There were still some things I needed to learn and some confidence I needed to build in myself before I could start and be effective at that position consistently."

"It definitely was a hard time, but I learned a lot from it."

She averaged a career-high 7.9 points per game as a junior. She arguably was the best player on the floor in Penn State's 71-66 NCAA loss to LSU, scoring 13 points in 15 minutes.

### CONFIDENT STARTER

With three starters graduating and seven freshmen joining the roster, Edwards knew that she was going to be in the starting lineup this season.

And from the start, she has been a different player.

"When you look at what Ariel has been statistically able to do in terms of the jump she's made from junior to senior year, that's a pretty impressive jump," Damon said. "What she means to our team, she allows us to do so many different things offensively and defensively. We can play lots of different styles because of Ariel."

Ask teammates what has made Edwards better, and one word comes up consistently.

Confidence.

"Her confidence has really grown which has allowed her to do a lot of things that she's been working on the last four years," Lucas said. "She's been a huge player for us and we count on her every game."

"Her confidence is up so much more this year," East added. "She is so confident and she knows we

need her to score the ball. We need her to attack and shoot that mid-range. We need her to go into the paint strong and get rebounds. I think she's done a phenomenal job."

Edwards says her teammates are right.

"I do think I'm more confident, but I realized my role had to change," she said.

Being a starter meant a different mindset than coming off the bench.

"Coming off the bench, whatever you can provide is great," Edwards said. "There's not really a lot of expectations for you to do something every night."

Washington and her staff made it plain that there were plenty of expectations for Edwards. With the loss of Alex Bentley, Nikki Greene and Mia Nickson, the Lady Lions had to have a consistent scorer to take some of the pressure off Lucas, the reigning Big Ten Player of the Year.

She's done that with a variety of drives to the basket, mid-range jumpers and even long bombs.

Although she hasn't shot many, Edwards is the team's best percentage 3-point shooter (39 percent).

"She's just really elevated her play and you can see it in the confidence in which she attacks the basket and shoots the ball," Washington said.

Edwards admits it's been difficult shooting more. She's put up 334 shots this season, compared to 467 for her first three years combined.

"Initially, it really didn't come natural to me," she said. "I don't know what it is, I've just always been that way that I don't feel comfortable shooting the ball a lot.

"This year, we didn't know what we were going to get from anybody," she added. "Coach Washington told me, 'This is what I need from you every night.' That definitely helped me for the games to have a more laser-like focus."

Scoring isn't the only responsibility that Washington needed.

The Lady Lions needed someone who could be a stopper on defense and Edwards was Washington's choice. With excellent foot speed and length, Edwards can cover point guards all of the way up to power forwards.

"We graduated Alex Bentley who was a phenomenal defender," Washington said. "... When you lose a defender like that, you look around and go, 'Who's going to step up and get stops for us?' Ariel has really elevated her play on that end."

Edwards likes the challenge.

"I think it's great," Edwards said. "If you want to be the best, you have to guard the best. Going into every game with a new challenge has pushed me to be a better player."

## MOVING FORWARD

Edwards hopes that challenge will help her play professionally.

"I really feel like I might have a chance at that," she said. "It's really exciting. ... Definitely after I finish here, playing basketball is something I want to do whether it's in the WNBA or overseas."

Edwards has a pretty good fallback if it doesn't work out. The health policy and administration major is looking towards medical school and becoming a surgeon.

Basketball and have athletics have been a big part of her family. Edwards' older brother Johnathan played at Radford and her cousin Winston Blake Jr. was a 1,000-point scorer at Northwestern. Her mother Tulia played volleyball in South America.

Edwards said her family has been integral in her success — from her father Everton pushing her to practice to playing pickup basketball against guys on the playgrounds with Johnathan.

She'll leave Penn State with her head held high and brimming with confidence. She knows that today's game won't be her last at the Jordan Center, since the Lady Lions have the opportunity to play two NCAA Tournament games at home.

"It's kind of crazy to think that it's almost over and there are only a few games left," Edwards said. "It's bittersweet. You definitely want to leave a place where it's kind of sad to leave, but not impossible to leave."

Edwards, who likes to shop and read (*Kite Runner* is her favorite book), says the girl that walked on campus four years ago is not the same one who will walk off.

"They're two totally different people," she said. "... It's a great to see that some hard work paid off. It's exciting to see yourself improve and to know where you've been and where you're heading."

## FIREPOWER: PENN STATE'S LUCAS ADDS LEADERSHIP TO HER ARSENAL

At first glance, the scene last Sunday seemed strangely familiar as Maggie Lucas, scorer extraordinaire for No. 12 Penn State, poured in 30 points in a 77-68 victory over Georgetown. The 5-10 senior guard shot 10-of-21 from the field, 5-of-12 from three and 5-of-6 from the line. It was the sixth 30-point game of her glittering career, and her second of this season, during which she is averaging a career-best 21.3 points per game. With her 22nd point against the Hoyas, she became the fifth Lady Lion ever to crest 2,000 points.

A week later, she reprised the feat and even upped the ante, powering the Lions to a 66-58 win over No. 20/24 Texas A&M with a game-high 26 points on 50-percent field-goal shooting. The day's tally moved her into third place on her school's all-time scoring list (and 14th place in the Big Ten's record books) with 2,054 career points to date.

Lucas's jumper remains the jumper, one of the best in recent memory, honed through years of exacting repetition on any number of courts throughout her hometown of Narberth, Pa. The shot's specifications are an exercise in fundamental precision: right elbow positioned directly underneath the ball, the left jutting out to form a 90-degree angle, the wrist-flicked release sending the ball spinning from the pads of her fingers into perfect rotation.

That jumper has already cast Lucas into the national limelight. The preseason Big Ten Player of the Year was a sure bet for this year's Wade, Wooden and Naismith watch lists and is considered to go early in 2014's

So last Sunday's game, replete as it was with offensive fireworks from Lucas, another Lady Lions victory — the 83rd for Maggie while wearing navy and white — in many ways appeared to be just more of the incredible, at times unbelievable, same for the Lions' star and her teammates.

Even the cast of characters remained virtually unchanged. Penn State assistant coach Fred Chmiel fed Lucas passes as she shot during pre-game warm-ups and gave her last second-pointers as timeouts wound down and she headed back onto the court.

Lucas's father, Alfred, had braved the winter snows falling along the Eastern Seaboard and made the trip down to Washington, D.C. from Pennsylvania. He was seated three rows from the top of Section 112 in McDonough Arena, and he was wearing his white Nittany Lions T-shirt with Maggie's number printed on it. Al Lucas has missed just two of Maggie's games this season, both of them when team traveled to the Junkanoo Jam in the Bahamas in late November. But even in the Bahamas, Maggie's mom, Betsy, was on hand to watch her daughter lead the Lady Lions to two wins and take home honors as the tournament MVP.

When Lucas hoisted a shot against the Hoyas, Al rose from his seat in perfect symmetry with his daughter's motion, all bent knees and eager anticipation as they both tracked the ball's path through the air, expecting the likely result.

Even Lucas's starting backcourt mate against the Hoyas, fellow senior Dara Taylor, was a constant. Save for the two seasons Taylor spent at Maryland before transferring to Penn State, the two have played together since they were 10, traveling the national circuit for the Philly Belles AAU team.

Yet amidst all this sameness, the player known affectionately as 'Mags' has changed significantly, say those who know her best. And against Georgetown, Lucas convincingly demonstrated her transformation as a player and, more importantly this season, as a leader of the Lady Lions.

"She's more of a thinker now," said Penn State Fred Chmiel of Lucas, who added four assists, five rebounds and three steals to her final stat line against the Hoyas. "She sees the game more clearly. Every team that we play is trying to lock her down, so now she's got to think about the next step ahead of that — be two, three steps ahead of the defense.

"This (Georgetown win) was a complete cerebral game for her."

Al Lucas echoes the sentiment. He thinks we're seeing a more vocal Maggie than in seasons past, when she enjoyed a near-telepathic connection with long-time teammates such as Alex Bentley, with whom she spent three seasons in Happy Valley. "I see her doing a lot of teaching and coaching on the court (now)," Al said. "She's making sure she spends a lot of time with the girls, communicating verbally."

After last season ended with a devastating loss to LSU in the NCAA tournament Round of 32, the Lady Lions lost five seniors and gained seven highly-touted freshmen and a brand new bulls-eye for Lucas's back.

Lions head coach Coquese Washington has used six freshmen this season. (The seventh, Lindsey Spann, is out for the year with a torn ACL.) Against Georgetown, five played a combined 38 minutes. With the preponderance of newcomers, it was almost inevitable that the Nittany Lions would endure rocky spells to begin their 2013-14 campaign. Sensing that uncertainty, defenses have ratcheted up their pressure and thrown different looks at Lucas, whose shooting percentage has dipped just below 40 percent through the team's first eight games. (She averaged 43 percent through her first three seasons.)

Lucas has responded to the flux by embracing a vocal leadership role. When good looks grow scarce, she focuses upon impacting games in other ways — an exercise that includes helping freshmen find their confidence and comfort on the court.

"I think Coquese has challenged the seniors, and Maggie and Dara [Taylor] in particular," said Al. "She really kind of framed that responsibility for them from the get-go, and it was a situation where they knew for the betterment of the young players and the team, they had to step up and be those types of communicators."

It's another adjustment for Lucas, who's become an expert at adapting on the fly. To wit: Those who know Lucas well weren't particularly worried when she shot just 4-of-14 from the field in the first half against Georgetown.

"She's always good about getting back into her game," said Chmiel. "And she always thinks her next shot is going in."

Lucas herself said that she felt the majority of her shots were "right there" on the rim. Her father echoed that sentiment. "I felt all but two of her shots in that first half were going in," he said.

When Lucas missed her final shot of the half, an open mid-range jumper in transition, she let out a scream of indignation before heading into the locker room. When she came back onto the court, minutes before the second half was set to begin, the outburst was already long forgotten. She calmly hoisted a series of perimeter jumpers and got herself, as Al Lucas put it, “dialed in.”

Lucas recalibrated her balance and simplified her motion. Before long, she was back in rhythm. She hit her first four shots of the second half and finished the frame at 6-of-7, putting her at a healthy 10-of-21 for the game. After scoring 15 points on 14 shots in the first half, she got her next 15 with half the attempts.

And it wasn't just her shooting that picked up. Lucas flexed her burgeoning all-around influence during those final 20 minutes, chipping in four assists, including a couple of excellent passes on the fast break, and grabbing one rebound and three steals.

Lucas's thrilling offensive ability remains intact, great plays often punctuated with emphatic “Whoops” and bounding chest-bumps with teammates, but it is now coupled with an intensely analytical approach that allows her to navigate rough stretches. Before, a first half like the one against Georgetown might have undone her. “She's come a long way from emotional, ride-the-wave Maggie to being more of a thinker, more methodical, more of an assassin,” said Chmiel.

Chmiel and Lucas are both huge fans of Kobe Bryant, and they often dial up film of the Lakers legend. In addition to taking notes on his impeccable footwork and ability to create space with the faintest of feints, Kobe's long career has illustrated the importance of becoming a leader for one's teammates.

Washington says that Lucas's imprint is already all over this team. It began this summer, and it will no doubt continue to grow in force as the season progresses. This offseason, Washington instructed Lucas and her three fellow seniors (Taylor, Talia East and Ariel Edwards) to spend time with the freshmen, not just on the court but off it. She wanted them to serve as stewards for Penn State basketball and instill its principles in the new guard, Washington explained following Sunday's game.

Lucas quickly realized that if this team was going to be successful, she had to communicate. That proved to be a greater challenge for Lucas than one might have expected for a player with her skills. When you see something so clearly in your mind, as is so often the case with the greats, however, it can escape your attention to relay it to others.

So Lucas made a point of taking the freshmen under her wing, taking their pulse on how things were coming along. She found her efforts at extending herself were soon reciprocated by youngsters eager to learn from her. Lucas headed to the gym this summer to put up extra shots, the freshmen kept asking if they could come along. She marvels at their energy and raves about their work ethic.

That's high praise considering the source. Lucas “has certainly earned her spot,” team spokesperson Kris Petersen told Full Court recently. “She is the hardest worker I have ever met and is constantly trying to improve her game.”

Now Lucas is learning to direct the underclassmen on the court. Taylor is the team's point guard, but Lucas frequently has the ball in her hands, initiating the offense or looking to create her own shot with the help of on-ball screens. There are stretches when Taylor takes a break on the bench, and Washington trusts Lucas as the primary ballhandler.

While a Penn State teammate shot a free throw against Georgetown, Washington called Lucas over and relayed the next defensive set she wanted run. Lucas understood immediately, and turned to go, but Washington told Maggie to “Tell them,” referring to her teammates. And she did.

But Lucas doesn't settle for instructing her younger teammates, she is quick to encourage them as well. When Lady Lions junior forward Tori Waldner received a pass on offense in the second half and found herself alone in the middle of the key, Lucas shouted for her to take the shot. Waldner sank the jumper. Eyes twinkling, Lucas slapped Waldner five on the way back down the court.

Make no mistake, the Lady Lions will lean heavily on Lucas's scoring ability this season. She accounts for 27.6 percent of the team's cumulative output of 77 points per game, though she's actually taken five fewer shots through the first eight games (123) than she had at this same juncture a year ago.

The Georgetown game wasn't close to a perfect offering — Penn State allowed two furious second-half runs by the Hoyas, the second of which cut a comfortable lead to just five points with 2:06 left to play, and turnovers remain an issue (19, one shy of the team's season average of 20, against the Hoyas) — but when is a journey ever without its rocky stages? That's part of what makes it fun.

And having fun is one of the underlying messages of this season for the Lions. Washington has told her team to embrace each and every moment, a perfect mantra for a certain senior on her last go-round. This could be the last time she'll play with a team that feels so much like family, with her parents watching on proudly from the stands.

While the mistakes generate weary looks from Washington, the Lions' coach already sees improvements within her young squad, just one month into the regular season. Two of Penn State's three losses in the early going this season have come at home against UConn and Notre Dame, both of whom are top-5 teams. The third came last week in an 83-79 stumble at South Dakota State, and though the Jackrabbits aren't nationally ranked, they have long been notoriously difficult to beat on their home floor. On the upside, Penn State captured the Junkanoo Jam crown, and last week notched their first “W” of the season against a ranked opponent when they knocked off the No. 20/24 Aggies. Georgetown was the Lady Lions' first true road game, and they emerged with a victory.

The early success provides incalculable confidence for a group of first-year players continuing to iron out the creases. A measure of resiliency emerges when you handle a hostile environment. It provides another step in the search for identity.

For Lucas, this season presents the type of challenge she covets. As a heralded recruit coming out of Germantown (Pa.) Academy, she had her pick of the national powers, but she signed with Penn State in large part because they hadn't yet won a national title. What more thrilling way to make one last run at that crown than with a team that possesses one of the highest ceilings in the country?

## WALDNER FINDING HER CONFIDENCE FOR LADY LIONS

Tori Waldner was at a crossroads with her college basketball career at Penn State.

So instead of heading back home to Milton, Ga., for the summer, Waldner made the South gym at the Bryce Jordan Center her home.

The ensuing hard work over those months has resulted in the desired effect — a place in the Lady Lions' starting lineup.

Waldner will make her second start of her career Sunday when No. 13 Penn State (1-0) hosts Fordham (1-0) at 2 p.m. at the Bryce Jordan Center.

In her first two seasons, the 6-foot-5 Waldner had played limited minutes, backing Nikki Greene and Mia Nickson on the front line. Waldner's role for Coquese Washington was to score an occasional basket, grab rebounds and play solid defense. She became especially effective as a shot blocker finishing second to Greene with 32 rejections last season.

Waldner was realistic about her chances to break into the starting lineup.

"I was behind Nikki and Mia and being a starter was unlikely with the amount of talent we had," she said. "It was really about accepting my role and Co was really the one who helped me with that."

With Greene and Nickson having graduated, an opportunity existed to break into the starting rotation.

So Waldner worked on her game. She worked out most of the summer with teammate Ariel Edwards, Penn State's top reserve who would be making a jump to the starting lineup.

"I had workouts with weightlifting, running and staying in shape," Waldner said. "I worked on my shot. I worked on post moves and getting just a lot of reps up."

Washington was impressed with the results.

"She put in a lot of work over the summer," Washington said. "She stayed here all summer. She was in the gym all of the time. Her shot got better and she worked on some things defensively. The work that she put in has caused her confidence to get higher."

And it is confidence that has helped Waldner make the transition to the starting lineup.

"Confidence is what has eased her into it," Washington said. "The more confident she's been with herself, the more productive and consistent she's been."

Waldner says she definitely believes more in her game this winter.

"I think I'm a lot more confident because of the work I put in over the summer," she said. "Just having a ball in my hands every day and having the use of the facilities ... confidence comes from being able to do things over and over."

Washington said confidence is usually the measure of how well players perform.

Some like Maggie Lucas and Alex Bentley walk onto campus oozing with it. For others, it takes time.

"If I knew what it was? It's just different for everybody," Washington said. "I think the biggest thing is it comes down to self-confidence, how strongly you believe in who you are and what you can do when you don't play well, make mistakes or there's adversity."

"Ultimately confidence ... is so much of how you see yourself. When you're talking about kids that come to college at 17 and 18 years old, their self perception and self awareness isn't fully formed. It takes them a couple of years to develop that confidence in themselves and who they are, not as basketball players, but who they are as people and women. When you see that all start to come together, then you see the confidence, the ability to go out there and make mistakes and still believe in yourself. It just takes different people different times to develop that self awareness."

Waldner seems pretty aware of how she fits into the picture for the Lady Lions. She knows she's not about to become the focus of the Lady Lion offense, but knows that nailing a perimeter jumper or blocking a shot can make the difference.

She also knows her time in the starting lineup could be fleeting.

"Being a starter was a goal of mine and it still is because at any point if I don't perform it could be taken away," said Waldner, who had three points and three rebounds in a 117-77 season-opening win against St. Francis on Friday. "Just knowing the talent that we have on the team is enough to know that if I don't perform that somebody else will."

Waldner hopes that being in better shape will help keep her on the floor. She estimates she's dropped 30 pounds from when she stepped on campus as a freshman.

"Oh my gosh, I'm loads quicker," she said. "I'm very fortunate that our strength coach (Brad Pantall) pushed me to where I needed to be. Now I can run up and down the floor and move when I need to."

Washington said Waldner is moving in the right direction.

"It's not an easy challenge to go from coming off the bench and impacting the game that way and then to being a starter," Washington said. "There's different stresses and responsibilities. It takes a pretty level-headed person to make that adjustment."

## FRESHMAN SPANN WORKING BACK FROM INJURY

Lindsey Spann is the only member of Penn State's vaunted freshman class not to see action this season.

She'll be on the bench as the No. 12 Lady Lions (16-4 overall, 7-1 Big Ten) try to keep their league lead with Sunday's 2 p.m. clash at Northwestern (14-7, 4-4).

It's not that Penn State coach Coquese Washington wouldn't like to point down and put the highly-recruited point guard from Our Lady of Good Counsel in Baltimore on the floor.

She can't.

Spann tore the anterior cruciate ligament in her right knee during an offseason workout in July and has spent the resulting months working to rehabilitate the injury.

She's made remarkable progress since the injury.

As the season started, she was pedaling a stationary bike like she was training for the Tour de France. She's worked her way into non-contact drills, showing some of the speed that helped her average 15.9 points, 5.3 assists and 2.8 steals during her senior season at Good Counsel.

She's made remarkable progress with an injury that often sidelines players for a year.

"She's handled it great," Washington said of Spann. "She's doing fantastic. She's getting a little bit more active in practice every day. In another week or so, she'll actually get to start practicing with us."

"Everything is going pretty well," Spann agreed. "I'm making progress. I should be getting more contact in throughout February so I'm moving along."

While she'd like to be out on the floor, Spann is trying to see the silver lining as she waits to suit up in her No. 12 jersey.

"It's been pretty hard, but it's been a learning experience," Spann said. "I can see things that I can take advantage of when I get back onto the court. Things like that help me get ready for next year."

And make no mistake, next year she'll be really needed. Dara Taylor, the starting point guard, will graduate. Maggie Lucas, who at times spells Taylor, also graduates. Keke Sevilian, the team's only other ballhandler, has seen limited action.

Spann, who some prognosticators said was the most college ready of Penn State's incoming class, could start next fall.

That's why anything she can glean this season will be important.

"I pay close attention to the details and the concepts that we practice and the different options there are in our plays and offenses," Spann said. "I'm just learning the ins and outs of Lady Lion basketball while I'm sitting on the bench my freshman year."

At least, she has some company.

Sierra Moore, a highly-touted guard from Delone Catholic, is sitting out a season as mandated by the NCAA after transferring from Duke.

"I think the fact her and Sierra had to sit out this year together has helped both of them," Washington said. "They're not alone going through this. They've been a great support for each other."

"Sierra is like my partner in crime," Spann said. "We see things together. We know little things we can work on. It's a big help."

And while Spann and Moore can't play, that doesn't mean they aren't fired up for each game.

"I don't know if you ever watch them on the bench, but they're definitely into the game and very vocal," Washington said. "They bring some energy on that bench, for sure."

Spann would love to be out there with her teammates, but remains content with her situation.

"I look at it as a blessing in disguise," she said. "I think everything happens for a reason. I'm hoping to improve, get back to where I was before or even better. That's what I look forward to — being able to play again fully."

Spann's teammates are coming off a huge win, avenging an earlier season loss by knocking off Purdue 75-72 on Thursday. The triumph kept the two-time defending league champs in first place as the Big Ten season reached its midpoint.

While happy with her team's improvements, especially on defense, Washington is taking nothing for granted in the second half of the season.

"The thing is we just can't get complacent," she said. "The first half of conference play is over with. The second half will be just as tough, if not tougher. As the season winds down and people are playing for postseason seeding and positioning and the opportunity to get into the postseason, the competition gets thicker. We know we have a tough road ahead of us, but I like where we are. As long as we keep going and getting better, we'll be in good shape."

The Lady Lions have hammered Northwestern over the years, holding a 31-7 edge in the all-time series.

The improving team they'll face Sunday that is in the thick of a tight conference race. The Wildcats have knocked off three ranked teams this season, including Purdue (71-68) and Nebraska (63-59).

Northwestern is led in scoring by freshman Nia Coffey (15.4), sophomore Maggie Lyons (13.0), freshman Christen Inman (12.8) and sophomore Lauren Douglas (11.8). The quartet has helped the Wildcats to an 11-2 record at Welsh-Ryan Arena.

"Nia Coffey is playing really good basketball, one of the best freshmen in our conference," Washington said. "Lauren Douglas is playing really good basketball, just a sophomore. They're getting great contributions from Maggie Lyons and Alex Cohen."

"Again, playing on their home floor and coming off a tough road game (at Purdue), we've got to be rested and ready to go because that can be a tough place to play."



## THE MAN AMONG THE LADIES

When Julie Chmiel found out she was pregnant, she hoped for her husband, Fred, it would be a boy. Instead, she had a little girl named Skylar, now a 3-year-old "diva" that Fred can only laugh about. Julie says he was super-excited when Skylar was born, and he's fantastic at raising her now.

"I'm not saying I'm a diva," Julie insists. "Just Skylar. [Fred] would think she gets it from me."

One reason Fred, 42, is so good with his daughter is he's around women almost constantly. The Penn State Lady Lions assistant coach, now in his fourth season with the team, wakes up with Skylar and Julie at their home in State College. He had been going to work with fellow assistants Maren Walseth or Kia Damon, since he couldn't drive after rupturing the patella tendon in his left knee at practice in November. At the Bryce Jordan Center, he works closely with the likes of Maggie Lucas and Candice Agee, and also attends meetings run by his boss, Lady Lion head coach Coquese Washington. Finally, he'll return home to Skylar and Julie.

And the cycle repeats itself.

When Skylar's in her late teens, Chmiel will have the advantage in that father-daughter relationship — he's already been dealing with the 18-to-22 age group for years.

While Chmiel began his coaching career coaching the men's teams at junior-college schools Feather River College and Lassen College, both in California, he's been working in women's basketball now since 2005. His long-term exposure to the men's and women's sides of the game has given him a strong understanding of the latter.

"[Women] are better listeners," says Chmiel, who played point guard for two seasons at Division II University of Alaska-Fairbanks. "They're better at executing things. The athleticism is catching up. It's interesting I've seen that part of it catch up."

"I still have the same type of relationships with [the Lady Lions] that I did with the guys. Sometimes, you have to worry about feelings. But to me it doesn't seem like they hang onto it too much. I yell at them, they forget about it."

His ability to engage with female athletes caught the attention of Washington in 2010. She had an opening on her staff after Iloro Coleman left to become the head coach at Clemson. Chmiel was an assistant for the San Diego State women's team at the time, fresh off an improbable Sweet 16 run in the NCAA Tournament. Washington flew him cross-country to State College for a daylong interview, but the field was very competitive. There aren't many coaching vacancies in NCAA women's basketball, so applicants are always looking to move up. When Chmiel returned to California, Julie couldn't quite gauge how the interview had gone.

"He's not one of many words," she says.

The Penn State job opening was the perfect opportunity for the Chmiel family to move back east. They wanted to be closer to Pittsburgh — Julie's hometown — to settle down for the first time as a family.

Fred was born in Alaska — actually, he says, he was almost born in a Cessna that was on its way to Anchorage from a fishing village. The pilot had to make an emergency landing, and he was born in the town of Niniilchik. "Don't ask me how to get there," he says.

His father had a commercial fishing boat, and Fred says, "As soon as I could fit in a life vest I traveled to villages in Alaska called Naknek and Egegik in the Bristol Bay where my dad would fish all summer long for salmon."

When he was a teenager, Chmiel worked on a vessel and fished and shrimped with his dad, uncles, and aunt. During his college days, he would return to work to make some money.

"It was hard and dangerous work but served me well for the future," says Chmiel, who has a sister who still lives in Alaska and a brother who lives in North Dakota. "Out on the water there are no excuses, breaks — and there are no lapses in focus and judgment, or people get hurt or worse. Not to mention the fact that you can't make money!"

Eventually, Fred moved to California to begin his coaching career. After a decade spent coaching at the junior-college level, he then went to the professional and women's ranks — he was an assistant coach for two seasons with the WNBA's Charlotte Sting, was head coach for a season for the NWBL's San Jose Spiders, and went back to the WNBA and was an advance scout for three seasons for the Detroit Shock.

In 2006, he accepted an assistant-coaching position with the women's team at Temple University. On a road trip to Duquesne, he met Julie through a mutual friend. They kept a cross-state relationship alive for a year before Julie met up with Fred in Philadelphia. By 2010, they were in San Diego, married with a three-month-old daughter, waiting to hear back from Penn State and Coach Washington.

Once the Lady Lions coach offered Fred the job, the Chmiel family picked up their life yet again, and moved it to Happy Valley. They quickly assimilated into the State College community.

"This is the first place that I feel like has actually been home," Julie says.

Julie and Fred continue to travel week-by-week as a part of their jobs. She leaves town for longer periods than he does. As the senior project director for a consulting firm called Tripp Umbach, she plays an integral role in the establishment of new medical schools across the country. She spends about half of every month on the road.

During the Lady Lions' off-season, Fred helps to shoulder the load at home. He can take Skylar to and from daycare, and cook spicy Mexican dinners. Julie says Fred does most of the cooking, and he's really good at it.

"He can make literally anything, which is just weird, because if he wasn't a coach I'd swear he'd be a chef," she says.

But Julie knows Fred will never stop being a coach. During the season, her husband's schedule is tied to the Lady Lions'. He's even busy at points in the summer with recruiting. When neither of them is home, Julie says her parents, who are retired, have kept up a sense of normalcy by taking care of Skylar. Fortunately for the Chmiels, the Lady Lions are a very family-oriented team — one of the reasons they were so excited that Fred accepted the job. Washington has a family, so her young children, as well as Skylar, often take full advantage of postgame on-the-court privileges that come only with being a coach's kid.

The Chmiels also got to spend this past Thanksgiving in the Bahamas with the Lady Lions, who were playing in a tournament there. Julie says Washington has always been very open to her coaches' and players' families. That policy certainly helps, because most of the time, Fred is deep in his work, mentoring these Penn State women's basketball players.

"My 4-year-old daughter ... I see these girls more than I see her," Chmiel says. "Thank goodness my wife understands. She knows the commitment involved, and I couldn't do it without her."

Chmiel's style is the most vocal of Penn State's coaches. He doesn't sugarcoat anything. As the Lady Lions let their championship hopes slip away against Connecticut in the Sweet 16 of the 2012 NCAA Tournament, he laid into them. He told them — explicitly on the sidelines — how badly they were playing, and why they were playing so badly.

A screaming Fred Chmiel is not an uncommon sight at any game or practice.

"I tend to get after it a little bit. Get the kids going," he says. "Sometimes they have it inside them and they just need a little jump start."

His fire derives from his playing days at Alaska-Fairbanks. A 5-foot-9 point guard, he says he matched up against other back court players who were six or seven inches taller. He took his fair share of hits to the face.

His specialty is defense. Usually, he's very actively involved during practices, demonstrating techniques and guarding his own players. That's been more difficult for him since he ruptured his patella tendon, but Washington says he's still invaluable to the team. "He's a bad patient, let that be known," she says. "He's been a tremendous addition to our staff. The energy that he brings, the intensity, the focus, especially to the defensive end. Our defense has flourished under him."

Lucas, Penn State's senior guard, adds, "I love Fred. He's one of the best coaches I've ever played for. He's my position coach. I owe so much to that man." At Chmiel's rate of success, he could soon draw head-coaching interest from other schools. The possibility of running a squad of his own one day has always been in the back of his mind — and he says he'd be open to coaching a men's team again. It's something he talked about with Washington before he took the Lady Lions assistant job.

Washington was able to offer him some advice based from her own experiences: Wait for the right job. That's what she did when she was an assistant at Notre Dame, and things have worked out pretty well for her at Penn State.

Things are working out pretty well for Chmiel at Penn State, too, which is what makes his prospects as a head coach so conflicting. The family would have to move, again. And this time, their daughter is old enough that it would affect her.

But if anyone can seamlessly manage such a transition, it's Chmiel. And if anyone can understand why he would want to make that transition in the first place, it's Julie.

"He's very fortunate to do something that he loves," she says, "because not a lot of people get that experience."



## LUCAS STILL CATALYST AS LADY LIONS HEAD TO OHIO STATE

Numbers never lie.

Teams, players, fans hear that a lot in sports.

Need to evaluate a team or player? Just go to the statistics and you have your answer.

Penn State coach Coquese Washington doesn't believe that's always the case, especially when you're looking at Maggie Lucas' numbers this season.

While she is second in the Big Ten in scoring with a 21-point average, Lucas is having the worst shooting season of her Penn State career.

Lucas, a career 43 percent shooter from both the field and 3-point range over her first three seasons, is shooting 38 percent from the floor and 34 percent from 3-point range this season.

Washington jokes that Lucas is now shooting numbers "that normal basketball players shoot."

But Washington is dead serious when asked why those percentages for the reigning Big Ten Player of the Year have come down.

Washington admits that Lucas is receiving more attention from opponents, but the coach points more toward changes in the Lady Lion lineup. Gone are Alex Bentley, Nikki Greene and Mia Nickson — three starters who Lucas had played with in her first three seasons.

"When you play with a core group for three years — and an extremely talented core group — you develop a rhythm, a comfort level," Washington said. "They know what you're going to do and you know what they're going to do every time down the floor. It makes it easier for her play the way she was grew accustomed to playing.

"This year, she's getting a little bit of increased attention, but she has got attention every year since she has been here. This team plays a lot different than the other three teams she's played on. It's a little bit different, so the looks she gets are a little bit different."

Lucas agrees that the shots that she's taking are not the same.

"It's a different year than what I have been used to and the shots that I've been used to getting," said the program's second-leading scorer with 2,299 points. "It's something that gets better. The last game is better than the game before. It's just an adjustment."

It's not just the type of shots, but Lucas has also increased the volume. She's averaging 17 shots a game, up from 13.7 over her first three seasons.

"She's got to take more shots for this team than she did last year," Washington said.

Texas A&M coach Gary Blair agrees.

"You see Kobe Bryant go 7 for 24 and his team wins a lot of the times," Blair said after the Lady Lions beat the Aggies 66-58 earlier this season. "Sometimes, forget the 7 for 20, Lucas might have on an off night. Look what she does for the other people."

Fellow starters Ariel Edwards (14.7), Dara Taylor (11.7), Talia East (7.6) and Tori Waldner (4.9) are all have career-high averages.

Washington also said Lucas has inherited another shooting role.

"One other thing that sometimes is forgotten is that Alex Bentley took a lot of shots for us at the end of the shot clock for us in (Maggie's) three years," Washington said. "Now, Maggie is taking those shots. When you shoot a lot of shots at the end of the shot clock, that impacts your shooting percentage. You're not necessarily getting the great look that you will get normally in the offense.

"In Maggie's first three years, she shared that responsibility with not just one other person but a couple of other people. This year, she's carrying that a lot more, especially early in the season. That impacts your shooting percentage."

Lucas, who was 7 for 21 from the floor in Thursday's 73-70 upset loss to Iowa, wants to bring up the percentages.

"I pay attention to them," she said. "It's something I like to work on."

Players approach the offensive numbers differently.

"Personally, I don't pay a lot of attention to it," Edwards said. "Because the kind of player I am, I sometimes focus too much on that and it takes away from my game."

Edwards prefers to be critiqued by her position coaches and Washington, but admits the team statistics are good indicators of how well a team is doing.

"The numbers do generally tell the truth," she said. "The best teams in the country usually have the best percentages in certain areas."

While the points from the field have been tougher to come by for Lucas, she's still scoring more points per game than she has before.

One reason is she's getting to the foul line more often and when she's there she rarely misses. Lucas has made 130 of 135 attempts, a nation-leading 96 percent. She's shooting that percentage will playing a team-leading 34 minutes per game.

Lucas said the new emphasis on hand-check fouls actually has been a blessing for her.

"The way they're calling the game this year is different which has helped me get to the line a little more," she said.

When all of the number talk is said and done, Washington points to the Lady Lions' record.

"I am not focused on her shooting percentage," Washington said. "I'm focused on the wins and losses. With the way that she's played and the way that she's carried this team on the offensive end of the floor in particular has helped us to a good win-loss record.

"I haven't lost one night of sleep worrying about Maggie Lucas' shooting percentage. I think she's taking great shots. I think she's made a lot of tough shots. I think as the season has gone on, her teammates have learned how to play with her."

## TAYLOR'S THE LADY LIONS VOICE OF REASON

In just two seasons on the court in the blue and white, senior guard Dara Taylor has managed to make a seamless transition into the fabric of the Penn State women's basketball program.

It's almost as if she has been a Lady Lion for four years, however, that is hardly the case. Taylor has had to display patience and growth to reach the point that she is at currently.

Just this past week, Taylor's patience and hard work was noticed by more than just her coaches and teammates, as she was named the Big Ten's Defensive Player of the Year, in addition to being selected to the All-Big Ten second team and the Big Ten All-Defensive team.

"Being named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year is cool," said Taylor. "It's only my second year in the league, but it is great to have the respect of the other coaches and humbling that they would allow me to win that award."

Her mentor and head coach, Coquese Washington, could not be happier for her star point guard.

"I'm really, really happy for her," said Washington.

That feeling is echoed by Taylor's teammates.

"She picks up her defensive assignment full court every game," said senior guard Maggie Lucas. "That's a lot to ask out of somebody and she's done it, no questions asked, the whole season. In my opinion, she 100 percent deserves to be Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year. We are very proud of her."

However, it wasn't all accolades and awards for Taylor when she arrived in Happy Valley during the 2011-12 season. As a matter of fact, Taylor had to sit out the entire year due to NCAA transfer rules.

"That year was difficult," said Taylor. "Not to be able to travel, not to be able to really play with the team, that was tough. But, it gave me a chance to see how things developed, how the team worked together and what the coaches were looking for. I think it really helped me fit into the system really well when I finally got my chance."

Even Washington knew how much the year off was a struggle for Taylor, but she also realized how much she could learn from simply watching an entire season.

"That year off, that hurts," said Washington. "It kills you every night when you're watching your teammates play, and you can't go out there and help them. But I think she learned a lot during that season."

For Taylor, her collegiate basketball career began in 2009 at the University of Maryland. During her freshman campaign she broke Maryland's freshman single season assists record with 171 dimes. She then saw considerable time during her sophomore campaign but felt she needed a change.

That's where Washington and the Lady Lions come into play. Taylor opted to move from College Park to State College after her sophomore year, and the rest is history.

"I got here [to Penn State] and Coquese really worked one-on-one with me," said Taylor. "That helped get me comfortable and build my confidence up. She's been very specific in what she is looking for, which makes it really easy as a player. They [coaches] are constantly giving me feedback and helping me to grow, that makes it easier to gel on the court."

Since Taylor's arrival onto the court, the Lady Lions have compiled a record of 48-12. In her senior campaign, the 5-foot-8 point guard is averaging 33.8 minutes per game, 11.6 points per game, 4.9 assists per game, and 2.9 steals per game.

When looking at those numbers, the word balance certainly comes to mind.

"Certainly she's grown this year on both ends of the floor," said Washington. "She's been able to be a better defensive player than she was last year in terms of steals per game. Also what she's done on the offensive end in terms of managing and running the team has been amazing."

From where Taylor began, to where she is now, she has transitioned from lead by example, to lead by example and being a vocal leader. According to Washington, Taylor's most impressive development has been the maturation of her voice on the court and in practice.

"Believe it or not, she's more vocal this year," said Washington. "You probably can't tell on the court - she's quiet by nature - but she's been more vocal. She's a good balance with Maggie, who is a little bit more emotional and more of a fiery player. Dara is the voice of reason and calms everyone down and gets them focused on what needs to happen next."

So much of Taylor's development can be traced to assistant coach, Fred Chmiel, who Taylor gives the majority of credit to for her success. With that being said, Chmiel notes that Taylor is an extremely hard worker, so seeing her be awarded for her efforts comes as no surprise.

"She's got a lot to work with," said Chmiel. "She's fast, she's quick, and she's intelligent. So, it's not hard for her to be a great defensive player. The hard part for her was swinging for the fence every time down the floor - going for the steal. She refined things like changing her angles, knowing where the next pass was coming from and the other little things. The rest was Dara, she's a phenomenal athlete and defender."

Despite being rewarded for her stellar play this season, Taylor, her teammates, and her coaches understand that the season is still far from over. The Big Ten Tournament is up next, followed by the NCAA Tournament.

Washington knows that the success of her team relies on the balance that Taylor can bring to the hardwood.

"The more balanced she can be, the better it makes our team," said Washington. "We've been at our best this year when we're getting four or five people in double figures. And that is a direct reflection in some respects on the way Dara manages the game. Her defense is going to be there night in, night out, but she makes our team run on both ends."

When senior guard Ariel Edwards was asked what single word would describe her Penn State career her answer was automatic. She chose the word growth.

That makes sense if you take a look at her career numbers. She went from being a role player her freshman year to a main contributor and team captain her senior year where she averages 14.9 points and 31.9 minutes per game.

However, that isn't the growth Edwards was talking about. She was referring to the growth of the Lady Lion basketball program, which has always come before herself.

"From when our senior class first got here the program isn't where it was now," Edwards said. "Seeing how far it has come in four years since I've been here is amazing. It's definitely rewarding to see how much we have grown."

So when coaches and teammates choose words to describe Edwards, the most commonly used word? Selfless.

While it is obvious just by talking to her, Edwards isn't here for personal accomplishments or accolades. If she was, she probably would have complained after not becoming a full time starter until her senior season. Edwards never did so.

It's been about her teammates and coaches and what she can do to help the team win basketball games. That's what assistant coach Kia Damon likes most about Edwards personal growth. Not the numbers or statistics, but how she has been a team first player and now a team leader in her senior campaign.

"She is able to be vocal to the younger players and help them understand the level they need to perform at for the team," Damon said. "She's also really good with the senior group by sharing her opinions and being vocal on the things she sees and recognizes that the group needs to do."

Edwards says it's so easy to be that type of player because of the trust she had in her coaching staff and teammates since her first day on campus. She blossomed into what Damon calls the "x-factor" of this Penn State team that claimed at least a share of its third straight Big Ten regular season title on Saturday with a 77-62 win over Michigan.

On the floor, Edwards has evolved into a versatile threat on both ends of the floor, which is why that label Damon gave her senior captain is very fitting. Edwards ranks in the top two on the team in points and rebounds and third in minutes, while anchoring the very strong Lady Lion defense.

"She is able to do so much for us from an offensive and defensive standpoint," Damon said. "She can play guard or forward, she can rebound or point our press break and do a lot of things defensively. We use her versatility offensively because we are able to post her up, put her in one-on-one situations, run her off screens and she allows us to manipulate our offense in a lot of different ways."

For the senior, she aims the credit toward her teammates in terms of why she has developed on the court.

"It's always great to be surrounded by great players," Edwards said. "I feel like on the court I've got so many other talented people out there with me and that's a great feeling to feel like your teammates have your back."

Her teammates have her back because she has always had theirs right from the start

"I'm very lucky to have her as a teammate," fellow senior Maggie Lucas said.

It's that simple for Ariel Edwards. Her selflessness has not gone unnoticed in her four years at Penn State and it's all coming full circle as her team heads into the postseason with a share of their third straight Big Ten regular season title.

In the four seasons that senior forward Talia East has been a part of the Penn State women's basketball program, the Lady Lions have registered 98 wins, a mere 29 losses and won two Big Ten regular season titles.

"This class is accustomed to winning," said assistant coach Kia Damon. "What these ladies [the seniors] have been able to do in their four years here has been pretty remarkable."

A big reason for Penn State's success over the past four seasons can be linked to the development of East into a leader and dominant inside presence.

"Talia has represented our edge and our toughness, especially in the post," said Damon. "That's always a key component you want to have, especially as you build a team to be really, really successful. She takes pride in being our enforcer. She's from Philly and we tell her that we need the 'Philly' in her to come out every game. She does a great job of being the stabilizing force inside for us, both offensively and defensively."

In her senior season, East is posting the best numbers of her career. She has played in all 27 games, starting in 24 of those, while averaging 7.6 points per game by shooting 52 percent from the field, grabbing 7.5 rebounds per game and swatting 1.3 shots per game.

For the humble East, her on-the-court performance this year has come as a little bit of a surprise.

"Who knew?" said East. "I think just learning and focusing on getting better each game was key for me. Just putting in the time and effort has definitely paid off. I'm just so proud of what I've accomplished and how much more there is to accomplish. The season is not even close to being over."

When asked to describe her time as a Lady Lion in one word, East responded with being "blessed" to be a part of a great team each of her four seasons.

"Talia helps keep things in perspective," said Damon. "She has a great sense of when to be serious and when there is a light or fun moment. I think that keeps everyone on balance."

During East's four-year career one aspect of being a Lady Lion has been a staple, her head coach.

"Coquese [Washington] is like a second mom to me," said East. "I couldn't ask for a better coach, and I honestly mean that. She's so caring, but she's hard on you when you need it. She's really just been there for me in my ups and in my downs. I definitely would not be where I am without her."

It certainly has been a memorable four years for East. Her personality has created an environment that is comfortable for her teammates to play in, especially the freshman.

But, as the season winds down and the Big Ten and NCAA Tournaments can be seen over the horizon, East goes back to her senior teammates, the best friends that have been with her along the way.

"I love them," said East. "Those are the people who I started this journey with. Before there was hype around our team, before anybody thought we'd win the Big Ten; that was the three that we had. It has just been an amazing journey, and I'm just looking forward to ending it the right way."

Two years ago when Dara Taylor stepped on the Penn State campus after transferring from the University of Maryland as a pass-first point guard.

Earlier this season she was still a pass-first point guard. Her coaches had to constantly get on her to be more of a shooter and more aggressive. Even to the point where Taylor had to do push-ups and spend time on an exercise bike as punishment.

"When she passes up shots, I get on her about passing up shots," head coach Coquese Washington said. "If you make them or miss them it doesn't matter. You have to take them. She's a good enough shooter.

"I used to yell at her for passing up shots and if she passed up enough of them I would make her ride the bike or do some push ups or something and said 'if you don't want to shoot then we'll wear out your arms another way.' She'd rather shoot than ride the bike."

Taylor has made that clear over the second half of Big Ten play as she has scored 10 or more points in her last seven games dating back to Jan. 26. Washington credits Taylor's recent aggressiveness and consistency to her understanding of what the team needs.

The senior guard took that to heart and has since been much improved offensively and has seen the team be better off for it as well. A unique bond between Washington and her point guard has allowed Taylor to excel over the past season.

That bond is that they both are point guards and have the mindset of point guard, which Taylor says is the bulk of the reason why her mentality has changed and her play has improved.

"She [Coquese] was a point guard herself so from stepping on campus to now the growth I've had rests a lot on her shoulders," Taylor said. "She's constantly telling me what to look for and the reads to make and I think I've grown in that department based off of her."

Being able to interact with her head coach and ask for advice and criticisms has made Taylor more open to shooting because she now believes it is what her team needs.

"Down the stretch with the games remaining if Coquese needs me to shoot more, score more and be aggressive that's what I have to do for the team," she said. "With coach and my teammates putting that confidence in me I really don't mind taking those shots if that's what the team needs me to do. I'm fine with that."

Washington has commended Taylor's ability to make that change and embrace the role. With three regular season games and postseason play remaining in her Lady Lion career, Taylor has blossomed into the guard Washington wanted her to be when she first arrived on campus.

The key to that, in Washington's eyes, is that she is her own type of point guard. Not a mirror image of previous Lady Lion point guard Alex Bentley, but her own brand with her own type of contributions to the team.

"She's really grown into understanding how to be a point guard here at Penn State and what we want her to do is just play and lead the team," Washington said. "She's done it in a way that is authentic and comfortable for her.

"We still wanted to be an up tempo team and expect the point guard to be the leader of the team and the voice of the team and she has embraced all of those and done a fantastic job of being a leader on the court."

Taylor will have another chance to avoid push-ups or the exercise bike as Penn State faces Northwestern Thursday at 7 p.m. where her coach will be looking for her to, as always, shoot the ball.

That is something not many teams have at their disposal.

"It's a different dimension to our team and we are thankful to have them," Edwards said of Spann and Moore. "They bring a lot of energy and it's something that we feed off of and helps us when we don't have anything besides ourselves."

Spann and Moore will use this season to help themselves get better and be prepared for when they step onto the court in 2014-15. For now, they are focused on what they can control and that is being the never-ending energy source of Lady Lion basketball.

The versatile Lady Lion newcomer has basketball in her blood. Her love of the game can be traced back to her father, Kevin, who played at Tennessee from 1993-95 and then professionally overseas in Spain and France.

According to Peyton, since playing her first game at the youthful age of seven, her father has taught her everything thing she knows about the game, from lacing up the shoes to the left-handed lay-up.

"He's taught me everything," said Whitted. "He's taught me how to shoot, how to dribble and how to play multiple positions."

More importantly, her father imbedded into his daughter's brain an even greater reason why basketball is not just a way of life; it's a life lesson.

"He has taught me off the court that everything I learn in basketball is going to help me with everyday life," said Whitted. "All the skills that I am learning out here apply to everything that I'm doing." Whitted is one of seven newcomers on the Lady Lions squad this season, which includes six freshmen and one sophomore transfer.

At this point in the season, Washington voiced that what has been most impressive about her young, supplementary seven has been their noticeable growth.

"Sometimes when you make the adjustment from high school to college...you can say 'I'll wait my turn. I'll wait until next year. I'll wait until whenever,'" said Washington. "But that has not been case with this group of freshmen. They continue to work. They continue to get better in practice...their fight and their effort to improve has been really impressive to me."

Despite the fact that Washington has displayed excitement surrounding the maturation of her entire freshmen class, it is clear that Whitted has exhibited the most growth since her arrival in Happy Valley.

With that being said, since the start of Big Ten play Whitted's confidence has clearly surged as of late. In Penn State's first three conference games, Whitted is averaging 5.7 points per game and 5.3 rebounds per game in 13.7 minutes per game.

"I think her confidence comes from going into games and not tripping over her feet," said Washington jokingly. "Actually getting a rebound, putting a basket in and making a free throw. That is where her confidence is coming from. And as her confidence in her abilities and in her skill set has grown, her performance has grown."

Yes, her confidence stems from practice, games, repetition and team comradery, but going to a university like Penn State adds another explanation to Whitted's escalating growth and confidence. That additional justification resides in the people of Happy Valley.

"I love it [Penn State]," said Whitted. "Everybody is nice here. I have yet to meet one unfriendly person when I walk around campus. People really support women's basketball, and I really like that about this school. I just love the atmosphere on campus."

A tightknit community has made Whitted feel at home. For an athlete who sleeps with her eyes open, it is safe to say that such comfort makes it easier for Whitted to never take her eyes off the prize.

"Yes, I sleep with my eyes open," said Whitted with a laugh. "You can ask Kaliyah [Mitchell]. It's like every night. I fall asleep before her, and she always thinks I'm still awake. She tries to talk to me, but I don't answer her."

Although just a freshman, it is no surprise as to why Whitted keeps her eyes open 24/7. She dreams big. Her list includes being crowned Big Ten Champions, winning a National Championship, and being drafted into the WNBA.

The 6-foot-3 frame of Whitted makes her one to watch when it comes to the future of women's collegiate basketball. In the first half of her first collegiate season she has created mismatches for opponents on both sides of the ball. The Suwanee, Ga., native has the unique ability to be a physical force down low and a triple threat around the perimeter.

When asked which WNBA players she likes to emulate on the hardwood, Whitted said, "Candace Parker and Elena Delle Donne."

Hailing from the state of Georgia, Whitted is used to enjoying juicy peach as a healthy snack. With that being said, she surprisingly has yet to savor one here at Penn State.

"I've had apples and bananas here, but no peaches," said Whitted.

Maybe after tonight's home game at 7 p.m. against Big Ten foe Ohio State (12-7, 2-1), Washington and her team can treat the Georgia native to the Penn State way of consuming peaches--a cup of Peachy Paterno from the Creamery.

On an emotional senior day, No. 12/8 Penn State (22-6, 13-3) topped Michigan (17-12, 8-8), 77-62, to earn at least a share of the Big Ten regular-season championship for the third straight season.

"It's pretty unbelievable," said senior guard Maggie Lucas. "I don't think many people believed in this. People within the program just worked so hard for this. I give a lot of credit to our entire team. The young players bought into what we had to accomplish and trusted the coaches and the older players in what it takes to get here. I'm so proud to be a Lady Lion today."

In seven seasons at the helm of the Blue and White, Washington has taken the women's basketball program to new heights. By winning yesterday the Lady Lions joined Ohio State and Iowa as the only Big Ten teams to ever win three or more consecutive conference titles.

Not only was it senior day, but it was also alumni day inside the Bryce Jordan Center. The current Lady Lions certainly put on a show on the hardwood for the past Lady Lions in attendance.

"It's amazing to be able to share this [Big Ten title] with them [the alumni]," said senior forward Ariel Edwards. "It's very rare that these two things happen at the same time - Alumni Day and a Big Ten Championship. When you look around you see so much history and it's amazing to see where we've been and how far we've come."

After the final horn sounded an incredible scene ensued. The four seniors embraced one another with Washington in between. Then each player took turns cutting down the net, followed by the team meeting at half court to hug each other and the trophy.

"It is like Christmas morning for parents when their kids open presents," said Washington. "Trust me, we've had some days when they are running their tails off and it's hard work to winning a championship. The moment where the confetti comes down and they accomplish what they set out to accomplish, I just like watching them enjoy that moment."

All four seniors managed to score in double-figures yesterday to cap off outstanding careers donning the blue and white, making it a perfect end for a special class.

"They played like seniors," said Washington. "They played the way you want seniors to play on senior night. They came together and all had really good nights and played well for us, which all culminated with a Big Ten Championship. It's a great way to go out."

Once the two found out they would both be coming to Penn State, they immediately became closer.

"We started talking more and found out we had a lot of stuff in common," the Stone Mountain, Ga. native said.

From there, the pair went from barely knowing each other, to what their coach Coquese Washington called "two peas in a pod."

Making the transition from high school to college can be hard for any normal student, but for student-athletes it can be even harder — add in a 700-mile distance and the change can become drastic.

For Mitchell and Whitted, having each other made the transition much easier. The two became roommates when they arrived on campus.

"Coming from the same area, we kind of know what each other is dealing with, being so far away from home," Mitchell said.

Washington said the two are there for each other on and off the court through whatever they are dealing with.

The pair agreed the biggest change was the temperature, especially the cold, but they got some tips from junior Tori Waldner, a Milton, Ga. native who now has almost three years of experience with Pennsylvanian weather.

"She just let us know what to expect, things that are going to happen," Mitchell said. "With the change in weather you need to wear more clothes and bigger coats. The coats from Georgia, they're not going to keep you warm."

The wind and the snow are the biggest obstacles for Whitted, adding that there is snow almost every day here, whereas in Georgia she saw snow once during her sophomore year of high school.

Their coach said all the warm clothes don't stop the roommates from griping, though.

"They think every day here has been cold since July," Washington said. "Every time I talk to them they talk about the heat in their room and how it's on 90."

In terms of basketball, both players have heated it up on the court this season as well. Mitchell averages 16.6 minutes per game and 4.8 points, while Whitted plays 10.7 minutes per game and averages three points.

Whitted also has a career-high of 11 points, which she tallied against Northwestern on Feb. 2. Mitchell registered her career-high of 14 points on Nov. 20, against Bucknell.

The two both said over the season they have become very close friends — sisters, as Washington put it — and they're practically inseparable.

Washington said that once the girls got on campus, along with Waldner, they really hit it off.

"The little Georgia peaches," Washington said with a smile, "they kind of hang together."
