NEED TO KNOW

WRAPPING UP THE REGULAR SEASON

- The No. 8/8 Penn State women's hockey team concludes its 2020-21 regular season schedule with a two-game road set at Mercyhurst Feb. 26-27 after having clinched its first CHA regular season championship last Friday.

THE MATCHUP

- Mercyhurst leads the all-time matchup 20-6-9, but the Nittany Lions won both games in their series earlier this season and three of last four games against the Lakers.
- The coaching matchup between Jeff Kampersal (378 wins) and Mike Sisti (507 wins) pits two of the top 10 winningest division one women's hockey coaches against each other.

IMPORTANT NUMBERS

With 15 wins this season, Penn State is two wins away from tying its season-best win total (17, 2017-18). Freshman goaltender Josie Bothun set a new program record for wins with all 15 victories.

Penn State is riding a program-best eight game unbeaten streak (11-0-1) that dates back to their Jan. 8 at Robert Morris. That is the second longest active streak in the country (Northeastern, 17)

Freshman center Kiara Zanon ranks tied for second in the country with 27 points this season after setting a program record with 6 points (1G, 5A) last Wednesday against RIT.

2020-21 CHA REGULAR SEASON CHAMPS

- With its 5-0 win Friday, Feb. 19 at RIT, Penn State clinched its first ever CHA regular season championship in team history. Penn State had never finished higher than 3rd in the CHA standings (2017-18).
- The Nittany Lions completed its two-game set with at RIT with a second 5-0 shutout to improve to 15-1-2 both overall and in conference play.
- Penn State received its first-ever national ranking in the USCHO.com women's division I hockey poll Jan. 11 when the Nittany Lions were ranked 10th overall. They were also ranked 10th the next day in the USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine poll, also a program first.
- In this week's version of the polls, Penn State is ranked 8th in both polls, marking the seventh-straight week the Nittany Lions have been ranked in the top ten.
- The Nittany Lions are unbeaten in the 2021 calendar year entering this weekend at Mercyhurst (11-0-1). Their 12-game unbeaten streak is currently the second longest active unbeaten streak in the country (Northeastern, 17 games).
- The Nittany Lions rank fifth in the nation in both scoring offense (3.50 goals per game) and scoring defense (1.33).

KIARA ZANON NAMED 2021 PATTY KAZMAIER AWARD FINALIST

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Penn State freshman forward Kiara Zanon (Fairport, New York) was named by USA Hockey as one of 10 finalists for the 2021 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award as announced Feb. 25, 2021.

Zanon is the lone freshman and underclassman on the stellar list and becomes the first Nittany Lion to be named a finalist for the player of the year honor. The full list of 2021 finalists can be found via USA Hockey's release.

"This is definitely a huge honor," Zanon said. I wouldn't be here without the help and support from my teammates and coaches as well as my family and trainers back home. I know I still have a long way to go individually and our team has more to accomplish this season, but I am very thankful for the consideration."

"I'm so happy for Kiara," said Penn State head coach Jeff Kamperal. "Most importantly, she is an awesome human being and leader. As player, she possesses poise, vision, skill and difference-making change of speed. What separates Kiara is her work ethic. She spends many extra hours on the ice, during the season and during the summer, mastering her craft. Kiara embodies all the wonderful qualities that define Patty and the Kazmaier family. We are proud that Kiara is the first Nittany Lion to be nominated as a top-10 finalist for this prestigious award."

Zanon has been one of the most influential players in the country in her freshman campaign with the Nittany Lions and is certainly one of the many drivers to Penn State's breakout season in 2020-21. She leads College Hockey America with 27 points (8G, 19A), currently tied for second nationally and leads all rookies.

A speedy skater with a game-breaking playmaking ability, Zanon posted a program-record six-point game (1G, 5A) in Penn State's 7-1 win over RIT Feb. 10, 2021. She has either scored or assisted on six game-winning goals for Penn State this season and sports a team-best +20 rating.

In a shortened 2020-21 season due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Zanon is still on track to shatter several Penn State season records, including points per games (1.50) and assists per game (1.06). Her eight multi-point games matches a Penn State season best despite playing just 18 games so far.

Zanon became the first Nittany Lion to win an individual national award when she was named Hockey Commissioners Association Women's National Rookie of the Month for December. She scored two game-winning goals and had six points (2G, 4A) in four games in the month.

Additional conference awards won by Zanon this season include two CHA Rookie of the Month honors (Dec. and Jan.), and three CHA Rookie of the Week awards.

Off the ice, Zanon is involved with Penn State's Student Athlete Advisory Board (SAAB) and Student-Athlete Welfare and Development program. She has also volunteered her time to local organizations in central Pennsylvania such as Pets Come First as well as a few hometown groups like the Rochester Hockey Academy and Cameron Community Ministries Food Pantry.

An award of The USA Hockey Foundation, the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award is annually presented to the top player in NCAA Division I women's ice hockey. Selection criteria includes outstanding individual and team skills, sportsmanship, performance in the clutch, personal character, competitiveness and a love of hockey. Consideration is also given to academic achievement and civic involvement.

The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award is named in honor of the late Patty Kazmaier, who was a four-year varsity letter-winner and All-Ivy League defenseman at Princeton University from 1981-86. An accomplished athlete who helped lead the Tigers to the Ivy League Championship in three consecutive seasons (1981-84), Patty Kazmaier-Sandt died Feb. 15, 1990, at the age of 28 following a long struggle with a rare blood disease.



AMAZING ZANON

- Forward Kiara Zanon leads the CHA in points with 27 (8G, 19A), a mark that ranks second nationally and leads all rookies in the country. She was chosen a Top-10 finalist for the 2021 Patty Kazmaier Award by USA Hockey Feb. 25.
- Zanon posted a program-record six point game (1G, 5A) in Penn State's 7-1 win over RIT Feb. 10, 2021. The previous Penn State record was four points.
- A speedy skater with a game-breaking playmaking ability, Zanon has either scored or assisted on six game-winning scores for Penn State this season and a team-best +20 rating.
- In a shortened 2020-21 season, Zanon is poised to break several Penn State records, including ppg and apg. Her eight multipoint games this season matches a Penn State program high despite playing just 18 games (Petersen, 2016-17).
- Zanon became the first Nittany Lion to win an individual national award when she was named HCA National Women's Rookie of the Month for December. She scored two game-winning goals in the month and had 6 pts (2G, 4A) in four games during the month.

D IT UP WITH THE CREW

- Junior defender and alternate captain Rene Gangarosa set the PSU all-time season mark for points by a defender with 18 (6G, 12A) in 2019-20. She led the 2019-20 Nittany Lions with five power-play scores. An great all-around player, she has three assists in her last 15 games and sports a +15 rating.
- Junior defender Izzy Heminger was named to the All-CHA Second Team after her 16-point season (4G, 12A) in 2019-20. Her 41 career points ranks third among all program defenders.
- Sophomore defender Mallory Uihlein became the second Nittany Lion defender in the last two seasons to be named to the All-CHA Rookie Team. She tied the team high with nine assists and had 11 total points. She tied a single-game best with three assists Feb. 20 at RIT.
- Junior defender and 2018-19 All-Rookie team performer Jessica Adolfsen returns to the lineup after missing most of 2019-20 with an injury. Her heavy shot adds another threat on the power play with her six career PP goals.

UP ON HEISING

- Senior forward and captain Natalie Heising became the second Nittany Lion to score 50 career goals after her first-period score Nov. 30. (Laura Bowman, '17, 61 goals). She currently has 51 career goals.
- Heising surpassed Shannon Yoxheimer ('16) for third on the all-time PSU scoring list with her 81st point Nov. 30. She is three points shy of becoming the third Nittany Lion to reach 100 career points. (Laura Bowman and Amy Petersen)
- Heising tops the PSU record book with 19 power play goals. Her 10 PPG in 17-18 tied the NCAA lead and set a program single-season record. Her 11 game-winning scores total also tops the PSU all-time list.
- Heising was named the 2017-18 CHA Rookie of the Year, becoming the first Nittany Lion to win the award. In her freshman year, she set the all-time single-season PSU goals record (19).

ELECTRIC FRESHMAN SKATERS

- Forward Olivia Wallin's 10 goals are second most in the CHA. Armed with maybe the best pure shot on the team, her four game winners are also second most in the country.
- Defender Lyndie Lobdell tops all rookie conference defenders with 12 points on 12 helpers. She is yet another great defender in PSU's d-corps with a great ability to both defend PSU's zone while also leading the breakout and entry into the offensive end.
- Forward Maeve Connolly posted back-to-back multi-point games for the first time Feb. 19-20 at RIT. She had two assists in game one followed by a goal and a helper in game two. She has 10 points this season on 3G, 7A.
- Forward Jess Ciarrocchi has a two-game goal streak going and is tough player to face. She a speedy and ferocious forechecker and is adept at drawing penalties.
- Forward Carrie Byrnes is a crafty playmaker with five points this season. She scored PSU's first goal of the season.
- Forward Alyssa Machado is a tenacious presence with great speed and strength to win puck battles all over the ice. She scored her first career goal Jan. 29 at Lindenwood.

COOL, CALM AND COLLECTED

- Freshman goaltender Josie Bothun has played spectacular in goal for the Nittany Lions making timely saves in big moments.
- Her 15 wins in 2020-21 is a Penn State record and she reached that mark in just 18 starts.
- Bothun's 1.23 GAA and .951 save percentage are both on pace to shatter Penn State single-season records.
- While Penn State has outshot its opponents in the majority of games this season, Bothun still has plenty of shot volume to confirm her impact play. She has 13 games with at least 20 saves this season, including three wins with at least 30 saves this season. In her only loss, she stopped a season high 42 shots Dec. 12 at Syracuse.
- Bothun has won two CHA goaltender of the month honors plus three weekly CHA awards (2 goaltender, 1 rookie).

2020-21 PENN STATE WOMEN'S HOCKEY

EXPERIENCED AND IMPROVING FAST

- Sophomore Julie Gough could very well be Penn State's most improved player from a season ago. She netted her first career hat trick at RIT Feb. 19 and is tied for the team lead in goals with 10 after posting only three in her entire freshman season. Gough has been on a scoring tear since the turn to the 2021 calendar year with 15 points (9G, 6A) during Penn State's 12-game unbeaten streak.
- Junior Amy Dobson notched her first career multi-point game Jan. 23 and added a second Feb. 20 at RIT. She has 11 points (6G, 5A), including a team-best 3 PPG.
- Sophomore Rachel Weiss has used her game-breaking speed to score four goals this season, including drawing and scoring on a penalty shot in her career-best two-goal/three-point game Jan. 29.
- Junior forward and alternate captain Anna Promersberger returned to the lineup Feb. 19-20 after missing time since Dec. with an injury. She has three assists this year.
- Sophomore forward Mikayla Lantto adds more team speed and depth. She has two points in six games this season.

THE HEART OF HOCKEY VALLEY

- Pegula Ice Arena is a state-of-the-art college hockey facility built not only to house the Penn State varsity and club hockey programs, but to serve as a central hub to local hockey enthusiasts in central Pennsylvania.
- The 5,782-capacity arena rink, which also boasts the 1,000-seat "Roar Zone" student section, is among the best collegiate hockey facilities in the country. It has hosted multiple events outside of Penn State hockey contests, including NHL Preseason contests, most recently featuring the Buffalo Sabres and the Pittsburgh Penguins Sept. 16, 2019. A community ice rink has also enabled the facility to host youth hockey tournaments, figure skating programs, ice shows, and community open skates.
- The facility was brought to fruition by an initial \$88 million donation - the largest in University history - from Terry and Kim Pegula, who, through their gift, helped Penn State realize its goal of Division I hockey. At the ceremonial groundbreaking on April 20, 2012, the Pegulas added \$14 million to the project to lift the total donation to \$102 million. The first Penn State women's hockey contest in Pegula was played Oct. 19, 2013 vs. Union.

One of the winningest and well-respected coaches in women's ice hockey history, Jeff Kampersal enters his fourth season at the helm of the Penn State program in 2020-21. His coaching excellence at both the collegiate level and the international level with USA Hockey has brought a steadying veteran leadership to the up-and-coming Nittany Lions.

Heading into the 2020-21 season, Kampersal ranks sixth in career victories among active Division I women's hockey coaches with 363, a total that also ranks seventh all-time.

Penn State has reached the College Hockey America semifinals for three-straight seasons for the first time in its history under Kampersal's direction.

Kampersal's team has showcased defensive excellence since his arrival, highlighted in the 2019-20 season by seven total shutout victories, a single-season program high. Penn State's increased competitiveness has resulted in marquee program victories of late, including a win over fifth-ranked Colgate, 4-2, in 2018-19, the highest-ranked win in program history.

The 2019-20 Nittany Lions added three more All-CHA award recipients for now 11 honorees over the past three seasons. That total is tied for the most conference honorees in any three-year stretch.

Kampersal's arrival impacted Penn state immediately on the ice in his first season in 2017-18, when Penn State allowed a CHA-best 1.92 goals per game, an improvement of more than a goal per game from the previous season.

In addition to his on-ice guidance, Kampersal has built and sustained a program culture of excellence both in the classroom and in the community. Since Kampersal's arrival in Hockey Valley, Penn State women's hockey recorded back-to-back perfect academic progress rates according to the latest NCAA APR reports, which measures eligibility, retention and graduation of the program's student-athletes. The Nittany Lions have also had 66 All-CHA Academic team honorees and 61 Academic All-Big Ten winners during his tenure.

The 2018-19 team captain Kelsey Crow was the recipient of Penn State's prestigious Eric A. Walker Award, an award given to a graduating Penn State senior who has best represented the university through extracurricular activities and community service.

Kampersal was named Penn State head coach on June 1, 2017. The head coach of the Princeton Tigers for 21 seasons, Kampersal garnered ECAC Hockey Coach of the Year honors three times and Ivy League Coach of the Year accolades twice.

He guided the Tigers to two Ivy League Championships (2005-06 & 2015-16) and two NCAA Tournament appearances (2005-06 & 2015-16).

Kampersal's student-athletes earned 68 All-Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Hockey honors, 54 All-Ivy League selections, five Patty Kazmaier Award nominees and two American Hockey Coaches Association (AHCA) All-America plaudits. During his final two seasons at Princeton, Kampersal guided the Tigers to a 42-19-5 cumulative record that included the 2016 Ivy League Championship and an NCAA Tournament at-large berth.

The 2016-17 campaign saw Princeton compile an overall record of 20-10-3, falling to eventual national champion Clarkson in the ECAC Tournament semifinals. During the season, the Tigers recorded seven wins over ranked teams, had a Patty Kazmaier top-10 finalist, the USCHO.com National Rookie of the Year, six All-Ivy League members and four All-ECAC members, including the Goalie and Rookie of the Year. Princeton was ranked No. 9 in the final 2016-17 USCHO.com poll.

In 2015-16, Kampersal directed Princeton to its winningest season in program history to date. The Tigers compiled a 22-9-2 record, won the Ivy League title, had an NCAA Tournament bid and Kampersal earned Ivy League and ECAC Hockey Coach of the Year honors.

Kampersal's experience as a coach with USA Hockey includes guiding the USA Women's Hockey Under-18 Team to silver medals at the 2013 and 2014 International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) World Women's U18 Championships. He also served on the coaching staff of the USA Women's Select Festival from 2004-06.

A 1992 Princeton graduate with a degree in psychology, Kampersal served as the men's hockey team's captain as a senior. An All-Ivy League and All-ECAC selection, Kampersal was awarded the 1941 Championship Trophy, given to the Princeton player who best represents the winning spirit of the 1941 championship team.

From Beverly, Massachusetts, Kampersal played high school hockey at St. John's Prep in Danvers, Massachusetts, and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 2009.

A 10th-round selection of the National Hockey League's New York Islanders in the 1988 entry draft, Kampersal played for the ECHL's Richmond Renegades and the AHL's Capital District Islanders.

Kampersal and his wife, Eileen, have a daughter, Keira, and a son, Jack.

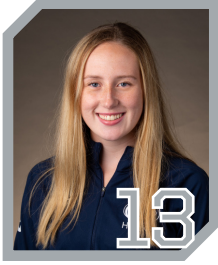
