LOOKING BACK

An all-around exceptional effort by Penn State, including a five-point effort by **Pat Manley** on Senior Day, propelled the Nittany Lions to the first Big Ten win in program history with an 11-6 victory over Rutgers.

PLAYING BOTH ENDS OF THE FIELD

Mike Sutton captured Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors after notching a hat trick in the first quarter and causing two turnovers in Penn State's 11-6 win over Rutgers. Sutton is the first attackman to win Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week, and the second Nittany Lion this season to pick up the accolade after **Connor Darcey** took home the first Defensive Player of the Week honor in conference history. The sophomore was a bulldog on the attack, scoring three goals and forcing two Rutgers turnovers on attempted clears in the third quarter of the Nittany Lions' first Big Ten win in program history.

MANNING THE ATTACK

As his final season nears its conclusion, **Pat Manley** has taken it upon himself to guide the Nittany Lions' attack. He has 17 points in his last three games, including career-best performances against Johns Hopkins (four goals) and Rutgers (four assists, five points). He ranks sixth in the conference with two goals and 1.33 assists per Big Ten game, and his 3.33 points per conference game ranks seventh. Against Johns Hopkins, Manley's four-goal game, all scored in a 12-minute span, was the first outing in his four Penn State seasons with three-or-more goals. This year, he has surpassed career totals in all offensive categories, totaling 11 goals and six assists for 17 points.

SOPHOMORE SENSATIONS

The Nittany Lions' sophomore class has been one of the team's high points this season.

Redshirt-sophomores **Connor Darcey**, **Drake Kreinz** and **Matt Florence** have led Penn State respectively in the cage, at the 'X' and in the attacking midfield. Joining Florence's offensive prowess are true sophomores **Mike Sutton** and **Nick Aponte**, each maintaining 16-game point streaks. Alongside Florence, Sutton and Aponte, classmate **Dan Craig** rounds out the team's top-5 point-getters. **Brian Prestreau** has played nearly every game in the midfield, while **Tyler Chambers'** and **Peter Triolo's** defensive efforts have proved invaluable and **Billy Lombardi** has provided support at the 'X'.

ONE OF THE DAY'S FINEST

Penn State's win over Rutgers had a bit of everything: great defense, solid goaltending and ridiculous goals, one of which garnered national attention by earning the No. 6 spot on SportsCenter's Top 10 that night. With the Nittany Lions down 3-1 midway through the first quarter, **Pat Manley** raced to the side of the cage and flipped the ball to **TJ Sanders** just outside of the crease, who threw it behind his back and into the goal to spark a five-goal run. This is Penn State's second appearance on SportsCenter's Top 10 this year. After the Ohio State game, **Dan Craig** earned the No. 7 spot by scooping up the ball behind his back and whipping a horizontal shot behind him into the top right corner of the net.

SANDERS THE STALWART

Since joining the Nittany Lions as a freshman in 2013, a Colonial Athletic Association Rookie of the Year campaign, **TJ Sanders** has been one of Penn State's most reliable attackmen. The Orillia, Ontario native is just the third junior Nittany Lion since 2009 to score 100-or-more points (110) with current Major Lacrosse League players Shane Sturgis (108) and Matt Mackrides (102). Sanders has scored in all but seven games since his debut in the Blue and White, scoring multiple goals in 25 contests, and has netted 20-or-more goals each collegiate season. He

GAMEDAY CENTRAL

SCOUTING THE WOLVERINES

Michigan (5-7, 1-3 Big Ten) is coming off of a 16-9 loss to Johns Hopkins, getting out-scored 11-4 in the final 33 minutes of play. The Wolverines possess an identical Big Ten record to the Nittany Lions at 1-3, with their lone win coming against Rutgers, a 10-8 margin at home. During the season, Michigan's most consistent attackman has been Ian King, who is in the midst of a 20-game point streak and leads the 2015 team with 28 points (17 goals, 11 assists). Gerald Logan has been outstanding in the cage for the Wolverines, commanding a strong defensive corps. Starting every contest, he ranks seventh nationally and tops the Big Ten with 12.75 saves per game, maintains an 11.74 goals against average and turns away 53 percent of his shots. His solid play radiates to the defenders, as Michigan causes 9.17 turnovers per game, the third-most in Division I.

SERIES HISTORY vs. MICHIGAN

The Nittany Lions are a perfect 3-0 against the Wolverines, out-scoring Michigan 49-22 in the three contests.

is currently fifth in the Big Ten with two goals per game, eighth with 2.92 points per game and 10th with 0.92 assists per game.

SUTTS IN THE BUCKET

After an abbreviated freshman season, **Mike Sutton** has returned for his sophomore campaign with a vengeance. The Sewell, N.J. native is in the midst of a 16-game point streak and this season, he is second on the team with 23 goals and 26 points. In the conference rankings, Sutton currently ranks third with 7.75 shots per game, eighth with 1.92 goals per game and 10th with 2.17 points per game. He has six multi-goal games, including two hat tricks, on the year.

SAVED!

Connor Darcey has been a stalwart in the cage this season, his first as a starter. The redshirt sophomore has made double-digit saves in nine of the Nittany Lions' 12 contests. In Penn State's game at Harvard, Darcey made 18 saves, the most for a Nittany Lion since 2012 and the highest number on the day for a Big Ten goalie. In his first collegiate start, against Vermont, Darcey made 15 saves en route to his first collegiate win. His efforts earned him the first-ever Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week award. Currently, Darcey ranks second in the Big Ten with 12.17 saves per game, which is eighth nationally.

GOING WITH THE FLO

Matt Florence has made an immediate impact since transferring to Penn State this year. He has recorded a point in eight games this season, amassing 20 points in 10 games played. He notched his second hat trick of the year against Rutgers, had a four-goal outing against Penn and scored three goals and added two assists in the season opener against Vermont, the first three-goal performance in a Penn State debut since 2002.

NATIONAL PRIDE

Associate head coach **Peter Toner** was tabbed as an assistant coach for the 2016 U.S. Men's National Under-19 team. Toner will work under the head coach Nick Myers, who currently serves at the helm of Ohio State's men's lacrosse program. With the announcement, Penn State's three coaches have all served on the coaching staffs of a national team. Head coach **Jeff Tambroni** was an assistant for the 2014 U.S. men's senior team, and assistant coach **Chris Doctor** served in the same capacity for the Iroquois Nationals at the 2014 FIL World Championship.

FAMILY TIES

RICHARDS DRAFTED IN MLL

Michael Richards was tabbed 45th overall in the 2015 Major League Lacrosse (MLL) Collegiate Draft by the Denver Outlaws on Jan. 23 in Baltimore. Richards joins Shane Sturgis (New York Lizards) and Tom LaCrosse (Ohio Machine), both of whom exhausted eligibility in 2014 and were picked in the 2015 Supplemental Draft, as selections by one of the MLL's eight teams in the U.S.A. and Canada. Richards appeared in all of the Nittany Lions' contests last season, making 10 starts in the midfield. The 2014 Academic All-Big Ten honoree recorded six points, collected 20 ground balls and caused four turnovers.

ZITTEL NAMED TEAM CAPTAIN

Senior **Kyle Zittel** was named the 2015 Penn State's men's lacrosse team captain, the program's first solo team captain since 1978. A defensive midfielder, Zittel played in all 13 games for the Nittany Lions, picking up a career-best 11 ground balls and causing four turnovers. Zittel, an Eden, N.Y. native, also excels in the classroom. The science major has a cumulative 3.5 grade point average and earned a 4.0 grade point average during the fall 2013 semester. After graduation, he intends to enroll in medical school.

TAMBRONI IN HIS FIFTH SEASON

Guiding the Nittany Lions through the inaugural season of Big Ten Lacrosse, **Jeff Tambroni** is in his fifth season as Penn State's head coach in 2015. With a 35-24 record, Tambroni has guided his Nittany Lion teams to .500-or-better records in each of his four seasons at the helm.

2014 U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM ASSISTANT COACH

Guiding the Nittany Lions through the inaugural season of Big Ten Lacrosse, Jeff Tambroni is in his fifth season as Penn State's head coach in 2015.

In 2014, Tambroni led Penn State to its fourth consecutive above-.500 season. His student-athletes earned the eighth USILA All-American and third Scholar All-America honors of Tambroni's Penn State career. He also coached goalkeeper Austin Kaut to his school record third All-America honor and conference-best All-CAA First Team award. Following the season, he helped lead the U.S. Men's National Team to a silver medal at the FIL World Championships as an assistant coach on the squad.

Penn State's 2013 campaign saw Tambroni lead Penn State to one of the greatest seasons in program history while celebrating its 100th season. The Nittany Lions set records for wins (12) and earned the program's first outright regular season conference title by sweeping the CAA with a 6-0 record. PSU rattled off 10 straight wins to earn the school's third NCAA bid and first chance to host an NCAA game.

Tambroni was named CAA Coach of the Year for the second time in his career (2011), while goalkeeper Austin Kaut (under Tambroni's tutelage) was named Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr. Award for the nation's best goalie. Also, Kaut was CAA Player and Defensive Player of the Year. Freshman TJ Sanders was named Rookie of the Year and the Nittany Lions placed six on the All-CAA First Team.

During the 2012 campaign, Tambroni led the Nittany Lions to a second-

place CAA finish with two USILA All-Americans and six All-CAA honorees. Penn State finished with a 9-6 overall record and a 5-1 mark in conference action.

The 2011 CAA Co-Coach of the Year, Tambroni led the Nittany Lions to a 7-7 record and their first-ever CAA tournament berth during his first year at the program's helm. Eight Nittany Lions garnered All-CAA recognition and freshman goalkeeper Austin Kaut earned Rookie of the Year honors while being named a USILA Honorable Mention All-American.

Prior to Penn State, Tambroni spent 10 seasons as head coach at Cornell (2001-10). He guided the Big Red to a 109-40 record and three NCAA Semifinal appearances (2007, 2009-10), including the 2009 national championship game.

Tambroni was named 2009 USILA Division I Coach of the Year and was tabbed the 2007 and 2009 Field Turf/NCAA Division I Coach of the Year. Tambroni was also the 2004 and 2009 Ithaca Journal Male Coach of the Year and a three-time National Coach of the Week.

While at Cornell, Tambroni became the 10th-fastest coach to reach the 100-win mark when he accomplished the feat in his 134th career game in March 2010. During his tenure, his players earned 37 first-team All-Ivy honors, including five Ivy League awards, and three conference Rookie of the Year selections. In addition, 39 players garnered All-America recognition.

Prior to serving as Cornell's head coach, he spent four seasons as a Big Red assistant coach (1997-2000). Tambroni also served as assistant coach at Loyola College in 1997 and at his alma mater, Hobart College, for three seasons. With the Statesmen, he helped the program reach the 1994 NCAA Division III national championship game.

A 1992 graduate, Tambroni earned his bachelor's degree in American studies. He earned first-team All-America honors as a senior and was twice named a second-team All-American (1990-91). The MVP of the 1990 NCAA title game, Tambroni helped lead the team to back-to-back NCAA championships (1990-91) and left Hobart tied for seventh on the school's all-time scoring list with 202 points.

Before embarking upon his collegiate coaching career, Tambroni coached the Heaton Mersey Lacrosse Club of the English Lacrosse Union for one year and served as a visiting coach for the Czech-American Lacrosse Foundation in Prague in the summer of 1996.

In addition to his coaching duties, Tambroni is a member of the Teewaarton Award Men's Selection Committee. The Central New York native and his wife, Michelle, have three daughters, Carissa, Madison and Ella. Michelle played field hockey at Penn State from 1988-90 and earned All-America honors as a senior.

No. 14/17 Men's Lacrosse Opens Season with 15-8 Win

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; Feb. 7, 2015 - Two Nittany Lions recorded hat tricks and **Connor Darcey** (Wellesley, Mass.) earned the first win in the first start of his collegiate career, leading the No. 14/17 Penn State men's lacrosse team to a season-opening 15-8 win over Vermont on Saturday.

Penn State is now 4-1 in season debuts with head coach **Jeff Tambroni** at the helm.

Eight different Nittany Lions (1-0-0) found the back of the net, led by **Matt Florence** (Greenwood Village, Colo.) and junior **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario). Alongside two assists, Florence, a redshirt sophomore, opened scoring 2:22 into the game and added a pair of markers on the man-up. Sanders posted the 19th multi-goal game of his career with his trio of goals and he dished out an assist. **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.) turned out a three-point performance with two tallied and an assist. **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.) and **Kyle Baier** (Auburn, N.Y.) each had two-goal outings, while **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.) recorded a goal and an assist.

Peter Triolo (Smithtown, N.Y.) and **Mike Aronow** (Holbrook, N.Y.) each caused one turnover. In the first start of his collegiate career, Darcey made 15 saves for the victory.

Penn State went 2-for-4 on man-up opportunities and Vermont was 0-for-3. The Nittany Lions also narrowly edged the Catamounts in faceoffs, 14-13, and led the ground ball race, 33-26. Vermont out-shot Penn State by a 45-40 margin.

Penn State's offensive output was evenly distributed throughout the game. In both the third and fourth quarters, the Blue and White put up four goals and put five past Justin Rosenberg in the opening 15 minutes.

The Nittany Lions opened the inaugural season of Big Ten Lacrosse with a bang, netting four unanswered goals. **Tripp Traynor** (Downingtown, Pa.) cashed in the first goal of his collegiate career eight minutes into the second quarter and Florence assisted on a Sanders shot less than two-and-a-half minutes later to put the score at 7-2.

The Catamounts (0-1-0) fought their way back, however, cutting Penn State's lead to three with nine minutes left in the third quarter. But the Nittany Lions responded with their second four-goal run of the day for a 13-6 lead with 8:15 remaining in the contest. Each team would add two goals for the final 15-8 score.

Late Rally Not Enough for Men's Lacrosse

BALTIMORE, Md.; Feb. 14, 2015 - The Penn State men's lacrosse team scored four unanswered goals in the fourth quarter but was unable to overcome an early Loyola advantage and fell to the Greyhounds, 8-6, on Saturday.

Six different Nittany Lions (1-1) got on the board, with **Matt Florence** (Greenwood Village, Colo.), **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.), **Brian Prestreau** (Yorktown Heights, N.Y.), **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.), **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario) and **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.) recording the goals. Florence, Sanders and Manley also added an assist, and **Dan Craig** (Shelburne, Ontario) had one helper.

Drake Kreinz (Delafield, Wisc.) went 9-for-17 from the X. Penn State was narrowly edged in the ground ball battle, 35-32. Kreinz picked up a team-best five ground balls, and **James Burke** (Duxbury, Mass.) and **JP Burnside** (Garden City, N.Y.) each had four. The Nittany Lions were out-shot by the Greyhounds, 22-14, with Sanders recording four to lead Penn State. **Connor Darcey** (Wellesley, Mass.) fell to 1-1 with the loss and notched 14 saves to Pat McEnerney's eight.

Florence netted the game's first goal 1:38 into the game. It was a solid individual effort by the redshirt sophomore as he dodged a group of defenders and ripped it from the arc.

Loyola (1-1) scored a trio of goals for a 3-1 lead early in the second quarter before Manley cut the lead to one. Just under seven minutes into the quarter, he drove to the net and pushed through three Greyhound defenders to slice in the 3-2 score.

Loyola responded with four unanswered markers, holding a 7-2 lead late in the third quarter.

But Penn State found its offensive rhythm as time wound down in the frame to bring the score within one.

With just over two minutes left in the third, Craig passed the ball over to Prestreau, whose sidearm shot made the score 7-3.

The Blue and White carried its momentum into the fourth quarter. Twenty-one seconds into the quarter, Zach Herreweyers was called for slashing and while on the man-up, Florence ran behind the net, serving the ball to Sutton for the 7-4 tally.

The Nittany Lions found the back of the net 3:38 later. A Loyola blocked shot allowed Penn State to travel coast-to-coast. Manley moved behind the cage and passed it up to Sanders who fired in the quick shot for the 7-5 score.

Less than three minutes later, Penn State was able to cut the Greyhounds' lead to one. Aponte sent a low shot into the net off of a Sanders dish, giving the Nittany Lions its fourth unanswered goal and the 7-6 score.

However, a turnover in Loyola's third allowed the Greyhounds to move into Penn State's third and with just 1:36 left in regulation, Loyola sealed the Nittany Lions' fate as Romar Dennis netted the final 8-6 goal.

Men's Lacrosse Falls to Villanova, 11-7

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; Feb. 28, 2015 - Penn State received four-goal performances from both **T.J. Sanders** (Orillia, Ont.) and **Matt Florence** (Greenwood Village, Colo.) as the Nittany Lions defeated No. 16/11 Penn, 14-11, at Holuba Hall on Saturday.

In addition to the four goals from Sanders and Florence, **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.) and **Dan Craig** (Shelburne, Ont.) netted two each while **Brian Prestreau** (Yorktown Heights, N.Y.) and **James Burke** (Duxbury, Mass.) chipped in with a goal. Sanders, who had the 20th multi-goal game on his career, also added a pair of assists.

Penn State (2-2) dominated the faceoff 'X', as Drake Kreinz (**Delafield, Wis.**) won 17 of 29 faceoffs. The Nittany Lions also won the ground ball battle, collecting 44 to Penn's 36. The Quakers capitalized with the extra man, going 1-2 while the Blue and White went 0-3.

Darcey Makes 18 Saves in 12-9 Loss to Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. - Connor Darcey (Wellesley, Mass.) recorded the most saves for a Nittany Lion since 2012, but the Penn State men's lacrosse team fell to No. 13/16 Harvard, 12-9, on Saturday.

Dan Craig (Shelburne, Ontario), **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.) and **Drake Kreinz** (Delafield, Wis.) each scored a pair for the Nittany Lions (2-3). **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.), **Matt Florence** (Greenwood Village, Colo.) and **Ryan Guittare** (Garnet Valley, Pa.) added tallies, while **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario) dished out two helpers and **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.) recorded one assist.

In the cage for Penn State, Darcey made 18 saves, the most for a Nittany Lion since 2012. Bryan Moore turned away 12 shots for the Crimson (3-1). Harvard out-shot Penn State, 46-31. Sutton's nine shots was a career high, and Craig's seven shots was a season best. The Crimson narrowly edged the Nittany Lions in the ground ball battle, 27-26. Kreinz scooped up a team-best six ground balls. Harvard also beat Penn State by one at the face-off 'X', 12-11. On the man-up, the Crimson went 1-for-4, while the Nittany Lions were 0-for-4.

After being assessed an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty on the opening face-off, putting the Nittany Lions on the man-up, Harvard took over control. The Crimson scored on its first four possessions of the game to take an early 4-0 lead.

The Nittany Lions were able to get on the board by reacting quickly. Sanders took the ball deep into Harvard's third, but was knocked down and lost the ball, drawing a flag. Sutton was able to corral the ball and tossed it to Sanders, who jumped to his feet and ripped it low nearside for the 4-1 score.

Penn State kept the momentum in its favor in the second quarter, scoring a pair of goals in 13 seconds to put the game within one. With 8:22 left in the quarter, Aponte sent a quick pass to Sutton, who cut in front and put it past Moore. Thirteen seconds later, Kreinz ran down the right wing, dodged a defender and scored in front for the third unanswered tally.

A late rally by the Nittany Lions put the game again within a goal. With 1:15 left in the half, Sanders fed the ball to Craig from behind the net who put it in. Exactly one minute later, Penn State's fifth of the contest came from a strong individual effort by Florence. The redshirt sophomore deked a defender from an angle and sent it over Moore's shoulder for the 6-5 score.

But with just .03 left in the half, the Crimson got a break when the ball trickled over the goal line for the 7-5 lead at halftime. The goal kicked off a three-goal run for Harvard, who led 10-5 with a minute left in the third quarter. Penn State broke up the string of Crimson goals with 43 seconds remaining in the quarter. Guittare received a long pass, broke through center and whipped it in from a distance for the 10-6 tally, the first of his career. Harvard was able to answer the breakaway with a tally for an 11-6 lead two-and-a-half minutes into the fourth quarter.

The Nittany Lions got a break of their own three minutes later. With Dan Craig and Mike Sutton in front of the Crimson crease, the ball was knocked loose and took a high bounce, falling in to the back of the cage for the 11-7 marker. Six seconds later, Kreinz got his second of the game to give Penn State its seventh of the game. The redshirt sophomore won the face-off cleanly and took it downfield before whipping it into the back of the cage for his second of the game.

The Crimson rebounded from the back-to-back goals scored against them. With just under nine minutes to go in regulation, Joe Lang struck the ball into the cage, and it went through the net to cause a hole and put the Crimson up, 12-8.

However, the Nittany Lions refused to go down without a fight. With five minutes left in the quarter, Manley cut in front from behind the net, scoring his fourth of the year for the final 12-9 score.

Sanders' Five Sparks 9-8 Penn State Win

BABSON PARK, Mass.; March 10, 2015 - **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario) matched a career-high with five goals and **Matt Sexton** (Niskayuna, N.Y.) produced his first multi-goal game en route to the Penn State men's lacrosse team's 9-8 win over Marist on Tuesday, the programs' first meeting.

Mike Sutton (Sewell, N.J.) and **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.) rounded out the Nittany Lions' scoring. **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.), **Ryan Keenan** (Smithtown, N.Y.), **Drake Kreinz** (Delafield, Wis.) and Sutton picked up helpers.

A major reason for the Nittany Lions' (3-3) success, Kreinz won 70 percent of his face-offs during the game, going 14-6 at the 'X'. Penn State won the ground ball battle, 21-17, led by Kreinz's seven. The Nittany Lions out-shot the Red Foxes, 35-30, as Sanders and Sutton each took nine shots. In the cage, **Connor Darcey** (Wellesley, Mass.) moved to 3-3 on the year, making 10 saves to Dave Scarcello's seven.

Despite falling behind 2-0 nearing the end of the first quarter, the majority of the opening frame was spent in Marist's half of the field. Penn State out-shot the Red Foxes, 14-5. Men's Lacrosse Drops 12-8 Decision to UMass

AMHERST, Mass., March 14, 2015 - Billy Lombardi (Rochester, N.Y.) had a career game for the Penn State men's lacrosse team going 14-22 at the face-off 'X' and scoring his first collegiate goal, but the Nittany Lions were unable to overcome a five-goal third quarter for Massachusetts and fell to the Minutemen, 12-8.

TJ Sanders (Orillia, Ontario) scored a pair of goals, while **Dan Craig** (Shelburne, Ontario), **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.), **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.), **Tanner Peck** (Lincoln University, Pa.), Lombardi and **Drake Kreinz** (Delafield, Wis.) each added tallies for the Nittany Lions (3-4).

UMass (2-5) out-shot Penn State, 31-28, taking 14 shots in the third quarter alone. The Nittany Lions were led by Sutton's five shots. In the cage, both Zach Oliveri and **Connor Darcey** (Wellesley, Mass.) made nine saves. Penn State dominated at the face-off 'X', posting a 15-8 mark. Penn State was 2-for-3 on the man-up, and UMass went 1-for-4.

Penn State got off to a hot start, taking a 4-0 lead just 7:02 into the first quarter. Kreinz won the game's opening face-off on a UMass violation. UMass opened the second half on a tear, however, and did not trail the Nittany Lions again in the game from 9:49 into the third quarter on.

Penn State was able to knot the score twice more in the quarter, with an Aponte low sidearm shot at 11:38 of the third and Lombardi's first career goal. The sophomore, seeing the most action of his collegiate career, won the face-off and ran down the field, taking a low backhand shot that bounced past Oliveri for the 7-7 score.

Peck would add his first collegiate goal, a low sidearm shot from the front of the cage, for the final 12-8 score.

Penn State Can't Contain No. 5 Denver's Offense

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y., March 21, 2015 - The Penn State men's lacrosse team led No. 5/6 Denver for nearly half of the contest, but couldn't overcome a high-powered Pioneer offense and fell to Denver 10-8 on Saturday at Hofstra University.

Recording three points each was **Dan Craig** (Shelburne, Ontario), who scored a goal and added two assists, and **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.), posting two goals and an assist. **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario) and **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.) also scored two goals apiece, and **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.) assisted on Penn State's final tally of the game.

Connor Darcey's (Wellesley, Mass.) 14 saves make him the first goalie since 2011 to make 10-or-more saves in seven of the season's first eight games. Ryan LaPlante turned away 10 shots for Denver.

Penn State (3-5) was out-shot by the Pioneers, 38-31, with the Nittany Lions led by Sutton's seven. Denver (6-2) won the ground ball battle, 25-23. The Pioneers dominated at the face-off 'X', going 14-8. Both teams were 1-3 with the extra man.

Mike Sutton (Sewell, N.J.) scored goals in the second and third quarters. **Matt Florence** (Greenwood Village, Colo.) **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.), **Dan Craig** (Sherburne, Ontario), **Michael Richards** (Skaneateles, N.Y.), **Brian Prestreau** (Yorktown Heights, N.Y.) and **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.) rounded out the scoring ledger for Penn State. **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario) recorded a pair of fourth quarter assists. **James Burke** (Duxbury, Mass.) and Florence also added helpers.

Ohio State out-shot Penn State, 32-27, with Sutton's eight leading the Nittany Lions. **Connor Darcey** (Wellesley, Mass.) suffered the loss for Penn State, stopping eight shots to Tom Carey's six. The Buckeyes topped the Blue and White in the ground ball battle, 23-20. At the face-off 'X', the Nittany Lions narrowly edged Ohio State, 12-10, led by **Drake Kreinz's** (Delafield, Wis.) 11-8 outing. The redshirt-sophomore won 8-of-11 restarts in the final 30 minutes of play. Also appearing at the 'X', **Billy Lombardi** (Rochester, N.Y.) was 1-2. Both teams were unable to convert with the extra man. Ohio State had four opportunities and Penn State had two opportunities.

With 6:44 remaining in regulation, Aponte smoked one past Carey into the top right corner. Prestreau found the back of the cage 47 seconds later when, from a distance, his sidearm shot snuck in at the right pipe. Both shots counted feeds from Sanders.

1:10 after the Prestreau goal, Craig's highlight reel goal put the game within three. Sanders put a shot on net and after a Buckeye attempted to pick up the rebound, Craig scooped up the ball behind his back and whipped a horizontal shot behind him into the net. Another strong individual effort resulted in Penn State's eighth goal of the game. At 2:37, Florence took the ball from behind the cage, split a double team and strong-armed it in for the 10-8 score.

Kreinz won the draw on the ensuing restart and aside from a shot-on-goal from Sanders, the Nittany Lions couldn't generate quality chances for the final 10-8 score.

Men's Lacrosse Suffers 11-10 Double Overtime Heartbreaker

BALTIMORE, Md.; April 11, 2015 - Penn State got a lights-out game by **Connor Darcey** (Wellesley, Mass.) and a four-goal performance by **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.), but suffered an 11-10 double overtime heartbreaking loss at the hands of Johns Hopkins on Saturday.

Manley's four-goal game, all scored in a 12-minute span, was his first career showing with three-or-more goals. **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.) had a hat trick of his own, while **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.) put together a four-point night (one goal, three assists), matching his career high, and **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario) recorded a goal and an assist. **Dan Craig** (Sherburne, Ontario) netted a man-up goal, and **Matt Sexton** (Niskayuna, N.Y.) posted an assist. Darcey stopped 13 shots, his eighth game of the season with double-digit saves, to Will Ryan's 10. **Drake Kreinz** (Delafield, Wis.) narrowly edged the Blue Jays at the face-off 'X', going 13-for-25, but Johns Hopkins won the ground ball battle, 29-28. Penn State (3-8, 0-3 Big Ten) was 1-for-3 on extra man opportunities and the Blue Jays were 1-for-5.

After falling behind 2-0 in the first quarter, the Nittany Lions cut the Blue Jays' lead in half with 4:12 left in the frame. **Peter Triolo** (Smithtown, N.Y.) won a ground ball battle in front of the Blue Jays' (5-6, 2-1 Big Ten) net, raced in and flipped it to Sutton. The sophomore muscled to the front of the net and threw it in to put Penn State on the board.

Johns Hopkins responded with three goals to take a 6-1 lead midway through the second quarter, which the Nittany Lions were able to cut three-and-a-half minutes in. A Blue Jay was issued a slashing penalty and with the extra man, Craig drew a slide, stepped in and ripped a sidearm shot to make the score 6-2.

As the half neared its close, the Nittany Lions took charge offensively with a five-goal run, led by the senior midfielder. Trailing 6-2 with four seconds left in the second quarter, Manley received a feed from Aponte and sent his overhand shot low into the cage to for the 6-3 at halftime.

Penn State's offense picked up where it left off after the intermission. Fifty-one seconds into the second half, Aponte dished the ball from behind the cage to Sutton, who stepped around his defender and put it past Ryan for the 6-4 score. Two-and-a-half minutes later, Manley kept up the Nittany Lion run to put the game within one. He corralled the ball after a Penn State shot on Ryan, dodged a trio of defenders and cashed in the 6-5 goal. Manley continued to smolder and after four minutes ticked off, tied the game for Penn State. At 7:23, he drew a slide and whipped a left handed shot around his defender to make the score 6-6.

The scoreboard flipped to the Nittany Lions' favor 4:20 later, thanks to the Blue and White's most prolific scorer during the day. Sanders sent a pass to Manley, who got the 7-6 tally at 3:03 for the first four-goal game of his career. But with 1:12 remaining in the third quarter, the Blue Jays stopped the Nittany Lions' roll to tie the game at 7-7.

The fourth quarter sparked a nail-biter of an ending, which saw each team trade three goals. Just under five minutes into the fourth, the Nittany Lions' season-leading point-getter snatched back the lead. Sanders stepped in and scored the 8-7 goal, his 21st of the year. Thirty-eight seconds later, Ryan Brown's 40th of the season tied the game at 8-8.

After recording three assists, Aponte got one of his own to regain the Blue and White advantage, 9-8, with 8:16 to go in regulation. He went around the goal, dropped his inside shoulder and finished the shot with his 11th of the season. Under a minute later, Ryan Brown's fifth of the game made the score 9-9 and, at 1:27, Johns Hopkins scored the go-ahead 10-9 goal.

Penn State refused to give in, however, and after putting a shot on goal, Sutton made good and completed the hat trick to tie the game at 10-10 with 33 seconds left in regulation.

With just seven ticks of the clock remaining in the second overtime period, though, the Nittany Lions suffered the heartbreaker when Joel Tinney put away the game-winner.

Penn State Makes Program History on Senior Day

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; April 19, 2015 - An all-around exceptional effort by the Penn State men's lacrosse team, including a five-point effort by **Pat Manley** (Arnold, Md.) on Senior Day, propelled the Nittany Lions to the first Big Ten win in program history with an 11-6 victory over Rutgers on Sunday.

One of Penn State's nine seniors honored prior to the contest, Manley had a career game, dishing out four assists and scoring a late fourth-quarter goal. **TJ Sanders** (Orillia, Ontario) scored three goals and added an assist, and **Mike Sutton** (Sewell, N.J.) and **Matt Florence** (Greenwood Village, Colo.) each notched hat tricks. **Dan Craig** (Shelburne, Ontario) recorded a goal and an assist, while **Matt Sexton** (Niskayuna, N.Y.) and **Nick Aponte** (West Islip, N.Y.) posted one assist each.

Connor Darcey (Wellesley, Mass.) stopped 11 shots in the cage for the Nittany Lions (4-8, 1-3 Big Ten) and Kris Alleyne recorded 13 saves for Rutgers (4-10, 0-4 Big Ten). Joe Nardella out-performed **Drake Kreinz** (Delafield, Wis.) at the face-off 'X', 12-8. Penn State went 2-for-5 on the man-up with both extra man goals scored by Sutton and coming in the first quarter. Rutgers was 1-for-3 on extra man opportunities. The Nittany Lions out-shot the Scarlet Knights, 39-33, led by Sutton's 11, and won the ground ball battle, 34-29.

Penn State went down 3-1 midway through the first quarter before Sanders got an outrageous behind-the-back tally to spark a five-goal run, putting Penn State up 6-3 early in the second quarter. The junior picked up a feed from Manley, tossing it behind his left shoulder for the 3-2 score with 4:08 remaining in the first quarter.

Sutton tied the game at 3-3 just 36 seconds later. Jules Henningburg was issued a holding penalty and with four seconds remaining on the man advantage, Sutton went low-to-high and the ball flew just below the crossbar for his second of the game.

With just under three minutes remaining in the first quarter, Sanders gave Penn State's its first lead of the game. Manley beat his defender behind the Rutgers cage and served it to Sanders, who put in the 4-3 score.

Sutton got his second man-up goal of the game and the hat trick with 40 seconds left in the opening frame. He put in a strong overhand shot with just one tick remaining on the advantage for the 5-3 lead at the end of the opening 15 minutes.

Florence scored the Nittany Lions' fifth unanswered goal at 7:41 of the second quarter with his overhand left-handed shot, doubling Penn State's lead, 6-3.

But Rutgers dimmed out Penn State's fire, taking advantage of its second man-up opportunity of the game 57 seconds later for the 6-4 score, and putting the game within one at 11:47 in the third quarter.

Florence thwarted the Scarlet Knights' attempted comeback, however, and gave the Nittany Lions a two-goal lead 46 seconds after the fifth Rutgers goal. He put in a sharp-angled shot over Alleyne's shoulder for the 7-5 score.

Sanders completed his hat trick with under a minute remaining in the third quarter. Sutton forced a turnover near the Rutgers restraining line and shoveled the ball to Aponte. The sophomore then served it to Sanders for the high-to-low 8-5 goal.

Craig's strong overhand release gave Penn State a 9-5 lead with 13:15 remaining in the game. Rutgers answered with a goal of its own but less than a minute later, Florence completed his own hat trick by ripping in a left-handed shot to put the Blue and White up 10-5. Manley closed the game with a score of his own in convincing fashion, beating his defender and sending a shot to the post and bouncing in for the final 11-6 score.
