NITTANY LIONS CLOSE SEASON AT NO. 14 WISCONSIN

Penn State will conclude the 2013 season with a trip to No. 14 Wisconsin for a 3:30 p.m. clash in Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers are the sixth team Penn State has played this season that has been nationally ranked.

The Nittany Lions and Badgers are meeting in the regular season finale for the third consecutive year, but after Saturday's game are not scheduled to meet until 2018, with the start of the Big Ten's East and West divisions in 2014. Wisconsin owns an 9-7 advantage in the series, but Penn State has won three of the last four meetings. The Nittany Lions earned a 24-21 overtime victory in Beaver Stadium last season.

Zach Zwinak gained 149 rushing yards vs. Nebraska for his third straight 100-yard rushing effort, giving him four on the season and 10 for his career. His 1,881 career rushing rank him 18th in PSU history, just behind Franco Harris.

Allen Robinson's eight catches for 106 yards against Nebraska helped the wideout move into second on the career receptions chart with 169 catches, just 10 catches shy of Deon Butler's school record 179 grabs from 2005-08. A semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, Robinson owns the single season receptions (89) and receiving yards (1,310) marks. Robinson leads the Big Ten in receptions (8.1 rpg) and receiving yards per game (119.1), ranking eighth and fifth, respectively, in the NCAA.

True freshman Christian Hackenberg is among the Big Ten's top signal callers, ranking second in the conference in completions (210) and passing yards (237.8 ypg). Hackenberg has eight 200-yard passing games this year to break to Penn State freshman record and ranks in the top five in school season completions and yardage.

The Badgers average 297.8 yards rushing per game, which ranks eighth in the NCAA and second in the Big Ten, with Melvin Gordon (125.0 ypg) and James White (116.5 ypg) both ranking among the top-15 in the NCAA. Linebacker Chris Borland is among the top tacklers in the country with 9.2 stops per game.

LAST GAME RECAP

NITTANY LIONS FALL TO NEBRASKA IN OT, 23-20

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; Nov. 23, 2013 -- Quarterback Christian Hackenberg totaled three touchdowns and wide receiver Allen Robinson passed Bobby Engram for second all-time on the program's career receptions list, but Penn State fell to Nebraska, 23-20, in overtime at Beaver Stadium.

The Nittany Lions got the ball to start overtime. After two runs by Zach Zwinak and an incomplete pass to Robinson, Sam Ficken missed a 37-yard field-goal attempt. On Nebraska's offensive possession, Pat Smith connected on a 47-yard attempt to seal the victory.

Hackenberg, who added a seven-yard rushing touchdown, completed 16-of-33 passes for two touchdowns and an interception and earned his fourth Big Ten Freshman of the Week honor. He notched his fourth multi-touchdown game this season, while Zwinak rushed for his 10th career 100-yard game with 149 yards on 35 carries.

Robinson finished the game with 169 career receptions, moving him past Engram (167) for second all-time at Penn State. The standout wide receiver finished the contest with eight receptions for 106 yards.

The Nittany Lions outgained the Huskers by a 387-360 margin. Penn State held the advantage in both passing yards, 217 to 192, and rushing yards, 170 to 168.

The Penn State defense forced three fumbles, recovering two. Senior Glenn Carson led the unit with 10 tackles, while Mike Hull and Malcolm Willis each had nine stops. Jordan Lucas contributed eight tackles. C.J. Olaniyan and Adrian Amos each got a sack. Olaniyan, Willis and freshman Brandon Bell all forced a fumble.

After both teams traded punts through the first 10:38 of the game, Penn State struck first on a two-yard touchdown pass from Hackenberg to fellow freshman tight end Adam Breneman. On first-and-goal from the Nebraska four-yard line, Hackenberg handed off to Zwinak for a two-yard gain. On the next play, the Nebraska defense bit on a play action to the right side by Hackenberg, who rolled left and found Breneman, who caught a touchdown for the second straight week, for a diving catch in the end zone with 33 seconds left in the quarter. Ficken's extra-point attempt hit the right upright and did not go through.

With 13:14 left in the first half, the Cornhuskers answered with a touchdown drive of their own to take a 7-6 lead. Quarterback Ron Kellogg III made his first appearance of the game, replacing starter Tommy Armstrong, Jr. Kellogg III completed all four of his pass attempts on the drive, with the last hitting Quincy Enunwa over the middle as Enunwa took the ball 27 yards to the end zone. The drive lasted seven plays for 91 yards in 2:19.

Early in the third quarter, Kellogg III dropped back as Penn State's Olaniyan came around the left side of the line and stripped Kellogg III from behind. The ball rolled to the Nebraska eight-yard line, where Olaniyan fell on it with 11:17 left in the quarter. The fumble was the third that Olaniyan forced this year.

The Nittany Lion offense took advantage as Hackenberg, on second-and-goal, fooled the Husker defense with play action to the left side. Hackenberg slipped out to the right and sprinted toward the corner pylon and in for the score. Ficken's point-after gave Penn State the 13-7 lead with 10:47 remaining in the third quarter.

Nebraska's Kenny Bell would not let that lead hold for long as he took the ensuing kickoff 99 yards for the score. The Huskers reclaimed the lead on Smith's PAT. With 1:16 left in the third quarter, Nebraska extended its lead on a 39-yard field goal by Smith. The kick capped a nine-play, 30-yard drive to hold a 17-13 advantage.

The Nittany Lions answered on a 46-yard touchdown reception by tight end Jesse James. The sophomore slipped out to the left side as Hackenberg hit him in stride. James took the ball up the sideline, fought off a tackle attempt by safety Corey Cooper and tiptoed his way to the end zone. Ficken's extra point put the Lions up, 20-17, with 14:50 in the fourth quarter.

Nebraska tied the game, 20-20, with a 19-yard field goal by Smith with 4:29 remaining. The field goal came after Penn State kept the Huskers out of the end zone after Nebraska got down to the Penn State one-yard line. Hull and Bell met Kellogg III at the goaline and stripped the ball, which Nebraska recovered, but it forced the Huskers to kick the field goal.

WISCONSIN HEAD COACH GARY ANDERSEN

Gary Andersen is in his first season as Wisconsin's head coach. He had spent the previous four seasons at Utah State, leading the Aggies to a school-record 11 wins in 2012. Andersen, in his sixth season as a head coach, owns a career record of 39-33.

SCOUTING THE BADGERS

Wisconsin enters the contest with a 9-2 record and a 6-1 mark in Big Ten play. The Badgers are 6-0 at Camp Randall Stadium this season.

Wisconsin leads the Big Ten in red zone defense (76.0%) and ranks second in total defense, allowing just 278.5 yards per game. The Badgers have not allowed an offensive touchdown to six opponents, tops in the nation. The defense has also not allowed a 100-yard rusher all season, with the highest individual total set by Carlos Hyde of Ohio State (85 yards).

The Badgers rank third in total offense, gaining 489.3 yards per game. Wisconsin ranks second in both scoring offense (36.8 ppg) and scoring defense (13.4 ppg) in the conference.

The Badgers have one of the nation's top rushing attacks, with Melvin Gordon (125.0 ypg) and James White (116.5 ypg) ranking second and third, respectively, in the Big Ten in rushing yards per game.

The Badgers average 297.8 rushing yards per game, which is second in the Big Ten to Ohio State (314.7) and ranks among the top-10 in the NCAA.

Quarterback Joel Stave has completed 170-of-270 passes for 2,075 yards. He has 17 passing touchdowns and nine interceptions on the season.

Jared Abbrederis leads the team and ranks fourth in the Big Ten with 5.5 receptions per game and 83.3 receiving yards per game. His seven touchdown catches rank sixth in the conference.

Linebacker Chris Borland ranks third in the Big Ten at 9.2 tackles per game and tied the NCAA record with his 14th career forced fumble last weekend vs. Minnesota.

LAST GAME: NO. 16 WISCONSIN 20, MINNESOTA 7

James White rushed for 125 yards and one touchdown and Wisconsin beat Minnesota, 20-7, last Saturday in Minneapolis.

When its ground game faced a challenge from Minnesota, the Badgers relied on their defense to help win their sixth in a row.

Melvin Gordon gained 69 yards on 12 attempts to help the Badgers gain 324 total yards. Joel Stave was 16 for 26 for 127 yards with one touchdown and one interception and Jared Abbrederis made seven catches for 67 yards and a touchdown.

Linebacker Chris Borland recovered two fumbles and forced one to tie the NCAA record for career fumbles caused (14). The Badgers forced three turnovers and held Minnesota to 185 total yards.

Minnesota's Aaron Hill accounted for the Gophers' only score when he returned an interception for a touchdown in the second quarter.

SERIES NOTES

Penn State and Wisconsin are meeting on the gridiron for the 17th time, with the first contest in 1953 in Madison. The Badgers hold a 9-7 edge in the on-field series.

The teams have met in 15 of Penn State's 21 seasons in the Big Ten. Starting next year, Penn State will be in the Big Ten East Division and Wisconsin joins the West Division. The teams' next scheduled meeting is Nov. 10, 2018.

Penn State won last season's contest, 24-21, in overtime and has won three of the last four meetings.

PREP TEAMMATES

Penn State's Zach Zwinak (RB) and Wisconsin's Rob Havenstein (OL) played at Linganore (Md.) High School.

LAST MEETING

Beaver Stadium didn't want to let go of the memorable 2012 senior class on the cold November evening when Penn State and Wisconsin needed overtime to decide the regular season finale. The Nittany Lions prevailed, 24-21, to finish the season with eight wins in their final 10 games.

A 57-yard scoring strike from Wisconsin's Curt Phillips to Melvin Gordon got the scoring started and, after a Zach Zwinak three yard touchdown run tied the game, Montee Ball ran for a 17 yard score to give the Badgers a 14-7 lead after one quarter.

A pair of Sam Ficken field goals in the third quarter pulled the Lions within one point and a 41 yard touchdown pass from Matt McGloin to Jesse James in the fourth quarter - with Zwinak plunging in for the two point conversion - gave Penn State a 21-14 lead.

Jeff Duckworth caught the game-tying touchdown pass from Phillips with 0:18 left in the fourth quarter and the game headed to the extra frame.

After Ficken connected on a 37-yard field goal on the Lions' first possession of overtime, the Nittany Lion defense held and forced a 44-yard field goal attempt by Kyle French that was wide left, setting off an emotional celebration on the field.

Zwinak ran for a career-high 179 yards, which gave him 1,000 yards on the season, and Matt McGloin threw for 200 yards and one touchdown.

Senior Jordan Hill made a career-high 12 tackles with 2.0 sacks and 3.0 TFL in the game. Glenn Carson led all players with 13 stops.

PENN STATE VS. BIG TEN

Penn State owns a 128-85-2 on-field mark against Big Ten Conference teams since the Nittany Lions first opposed Ohio State in 1912.

The Nittany Lions began play as a member of the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and have a 106-63 on-field mark in their 21st conference season.

Prior to 1993, Penn State played 46 games vs. Big Ten and was 22-22-2 in those games.

Maryland and Rutgers will join the Big Ten on July 1, 2014 and join Penn State, Indiana, Michigan, Michigan State and Ohio State in the East Division.

27 FORMER LIONS ON NFL ROSTERS

Twenty-five former Penn State players were on the rosters of 18 National Football League teams during NFL Kickoff Week, the second-highest total in the Big Ten Conference. The Nittany Lions annually are among the top 20 programs nationally in producing players in the NFL.

In October, linebacker Josh Hull was signed by the Washington Redskins and fullback Michael Robinson was re-signed by the Seattle Seahawks to push the number of former Nittany Lions in the NFL to 27.

Also in October, Levi Brown was traded by the Arizona Cardinals to the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Penn State and USC lead all schools with nine former players playing linebacker in the NFL.

The Oakland Raiders feature a league-high three former Nittany Lions on their roster, including third-year starting center/guard Stefen Wisniewski, second-year defensive end Jack Crawford and rookie quarterback Matt McGloin, who made the team as a free agent. Six additional NFL squads boast two former Nittany Lions on their opening week rosters: Atlanta, Jacksonville, Miami, Minnesota, San Diego and San Francisco.

Four seniors from Penn State's 2012 squad made NFL teams: Jordan Hill (Seattle), Gerald Hodges (Minnesota), Michael Mauti (Minnesota) and McGloin (Oakland).

Among the other Nittany Lions who made the active roster of new teams this season were: Dan Connor (New York Giants), Derek Moye (Pittsburgh), Rich Ohrnberger (San Diego), A.Q. Shipley (Baltimore) and Nate Stupar (San Francisco).

Chicago Bears All-Pro placekicker Robbie Gould is the elder statesman among former Nittany Lions, in his ninth season, and Kansas City Chiefs All-Pro linebacker Tamba Hali is second in longevity, in his eighth season. Offensive tackle Levi Brown (Arizona) and linebacker Paul Posluszny (Jacksonville) are in their seventh professional seasons.

A total of 332 Nittany Lions have been selected all-time in the NFL Draft, including 36 in the first round. Thirty-three Penn State football student-athletes have been drafted since 2006, including 15 in the first three rounds.

Penn State has had at least one alumnus on a Super Bowl team in 42 of 47 title games, including last season when All-Pro linebacker NaVorro Bowman helped the San Francisco 49ers reach Super Bowl XLVII. Thirty-five former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 51 Super Bowl rings.

FIVE FORMER NITTANY LIONS ON NFL COACHING STAFFS

Five former Nittany Lions are patrolling the sidelines as part of NFL coaching staffs in 2013, including Mike Munchak, the third-year head coach of the Tennessee Titans.

The list of Penn State coaches who are NFL assistant coaches includes: Gary Brown (Dallas Cowboys), John McNulty (Arizona Cardinals), Jeff Nixon (Miami Dolphins) and Darren Perry (Green Bay Packers).

Former Penn State assistant coach Greg Schiano (1991-95) is in his second season as head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Former Nittany Lion assistant coach Jim Caldwell (1986-92) is in his second year as the offensive coordinator for the Super Bowl champion Baltimore Ravens after serving as head coach of the Indianapolis Colts.

HEAD COACH BILL O'BRIEN

Bill O'Brien owns a 14-9 record in his second season as the leader of the Penn State football program. He was named the 15th head coach of the Nittany Lions all-time on January 6, 2012.

During the 2012 season, O'Brien led the Penn State to wins in eight of its final 10 games and earned numerous accolades. He was selected the 2012 Bear Bryant, Maxwell Football Club and ESPN Coach of the Year, as well as the Big Ten-Dave McClain Coach of the Year.

O'Brien was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach with the New England Patriots during the 2011 season, helping the Patriots to their second Super Bowl during his five years on the coaching staff.

Like his predecessor, Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno, O'Brien graduated from Brown University, where he played linebacker and defensive end from 1990-92. O'Brien coached at Brown (1993-94), Georgia Tech (1995-2002), Maryland (2003-04) and Duke (2005-06) before joining the Patriots' staff in 2007.

O'Brien is from Andover, Mass., a Boston suburb. He and his wife, Colleen, have two sons, Jack and Michael.

MICHIGAN STATE LONE BIG TEN TEAM O'BRIEN HAS NOT FACED

With Penn State playing Minnesota for the first time since 2010, the Nittany Lions have played five of the six Legends Division teams since Bill O'Brien became head coach in 2012.

Michigan State is the only Big Ten team Penn State has not played the past two seasons. The teams will be East Division rivals starting in 2014 and play annually.

O'BRIEN EARNS TRIO OF NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR HONORS; NAMED BIG TEN COY

When you think about the challenges that occurred during Bill O'Brien's first season at the helm of the Nittany Lions the distinction of Coach of the Year might not be saying enough.

His on-field and off-field resume garnered the first year head coach to the Big Ten Dave McClain Coach of the Year award and a trio of National Coach of the Year accolades.

O'Brien was the Bear Bryant, Maxwell Football Club and ESPN National Coach of the Year after leading Penn State to an 8-4 overall mark and a 6-2 record in the Big Ten, finishing second in the Leaders Division. The Nittany Lions won eight of their final 10 games, capped by a Senior Day overtime win over Wisconsin, the eventual Big Ten champion.

O'Brien's eight wins in 2012 were the most by a first-year Penn State head coach.

FOUR NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP COACHES

Four members of the Penn State coaching staff have been members of national championship staffs, including a pair of Bowl Championship Series titles:

COACHING STAFF CONNECTIONS

When Bill O'Brien was hired he began to compile a staff of people in which he had a prior connection with.

In all, seven coaches on O'Brien's staff have previously worked with at least one other member of the 2013 Nittany Lion coaching staff prior to this season. Among some of the coaching staff ties:

- O'Brien worked with Stan Hixon and Mac McWhorter at Georgia Tech during O'Brien's eight-year tenure on the Yellow Jackets' staff (1995-2002);
- O'Brien worked with Charles London and John Strollo at Duke in 2005-06;

- O'Brien also worked with Craig Fitzgerald, Director of Strength and Conditioning for Football, in 2003-04 when they were on the staff at Maryland;

- John Butler worked with Craig Fitzgerald at Harvard in 2005-06 and at South Carolina in 2011, helping the Gamecocks to 11 wins and their first-ever top 10 finish;

- Larry Johnson and Ron Vanderlinden have worked together as Penn State assistant coaches on the defensive side of the ball since 2001.

O'BRIEN IN ELITE COMPANY AMONG BIG TEN FIRST-YEAR COACHES

When Penn State won its third straight Big Ten road game at Purdue on Nov. 3, 2012, head coach Bill O'Brien etched his name into some elite company in Big Ten history.

By defeating Illinois, Iowa and Purdue away from Beaver Stadium last season, O'Brien became just the fifth Big Ten coach since 1950 to win his first three road games, joining: Jim Valek (Illinois, 1967), Earle Bruce (Ohio St., 1979), Hayden Fry (Iowa, 1979) and Urban Meyer (Ohio St., 2012).

WISCONSIN GAME NOTES

LIONS' SIXTH FOE RANKED THIS SEASON

Wisconsin is the sixth team that has been ranked in the Top 25 this season that Penn State has faced.

The No. 14 Badgers are among three Nittany Lion opponents that are ranked by AP this week, joining Ohio State (3) and UCF (17).

Penn State opponents Michigan, Minnesota and Nebraska also have been ranked during the 2013 season.

BOUNCING BACK

Penn State is 7-1 in its next game after a loss under Coach Bill O'Brien.

The Nittany Lions started last season 0-2, but have not lost consecutive games since. They have defeated Kent State, Michigan, Illinois and Purdue following losses this year.

ZWINAK RUMBLES TO 10TH 100-YARD RUSHING GAME OF CAREER VS. NEBRASKA

Junior running back Zach Zwinak posted his 10th career 100-yard rushing effort in the overtime setback against Nebraska on Nov. 23.

The Fredrick, Md. native is now tied for 11th in Penn State history with Charlie Pittman (1967-69) after piling up 149 yards on 35 carries.

It is his fourth 100-yard rushing effort of the season, including three straight games reaching the century mark. He has rushed for 448 yards in his last three games; toting the ball for 150 yards at Minnesota, 149 yards against Purdue and 149 yards vs. the Huskers.

The 149 yards vs. the Huskers are tied for his third most in a single game in his career.

The 35 carries last Saturday vs. Nebraska is the second highest total in his career, just one carry shy of his 36 last season vs. Wisconsin.

In 2012, Zwinak ran for 141 yards and a touchdown on 26 carries at Nebraska. His 50 yard touchdown run was the longest run of the season for the Nittany Lions.

Zwinak has 874 yards rushing this season and 1,881 rushing yards for his career; ranking him 18th on the all-time list, just behind Franco Harris (2,002; 1969-71)

LIONS PLAY THIRD HOME OVERTIME GAME IN 2013

The Beaver Stadium faithful got their money's worth out of the Big Ten schedule in 2013, with Penn State becoming the first team to three overtime home games in one season.

The Nittany Lions join the 2012 Wisconsin squad as the only two teams to play three overtime games in one season, with the Badgers playing two overtime games at home and one on the road (at PSU).

Overall, Penn State has played 34 frames of football in seven home games. They have contested 28 quarters of regulation and six overtime periods.

Four of Penn State's last five Big Ten home games have gone into overtime; three in 2013 and the season final vs. Wisconsin in 2012.

VICTORIOUS FOES OWN 40-14 RECORD

The five teams that have beaten Penn State this season own a combined record of 40-14 (.740) and four of the teams are nationally ranked or receiving votes: Ohio State, Minnesota, Nebraska and UCF.

HACKENBERG EARNS FOURTH B1G FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONOR

Christian Hackenberg earned his fourth Big Ten Freshman of the Week honor after accounting for all three of Penn State's touchdowns in its 23-20 overtime loss to Nebraska last Saturday, throwing 217 yards and two scores and running for a seven-yard touchdown.

The starting signal-caller in every game for Coach Bill O'Brien's Nittany Lions, Hackenberg's four Big Ten Freshman of the Week selections are the most for a conference player since 2010 (Nathan Scheelhaase, Illinois, 6; James White, Wisconsin, 4).

Hackenberg threw a two-yard touchdown pass to freshman tight end Adam Breneman to open the scoring against Nebraska. His 46-yard scoring strike to sophomore tight end Jesse James early in the fourth quarter gave the Nittany Lions a 20-17 lead.

Early in the second half, Hackenberg ran for a seven-yard touchdown, his fourth of the season, to give the Nittany Lions a 13-7 lead.

The former Fork Union Military Academy All-American also had a 43-yard completion to Allen Robinson in the third quarter and now has 11 completions of 40-plus yards this season.

Hackenberg posted his eighth 200-yard passing game against Nebraska, moving him into a tie for third place on the Penn State single season list with Daryll Clark (2009), trailing only Kerry Collins (10, 1994) and Matt McGloin (11, 2012). His eight 200-yard passing games are already tied for 10th on the school career list with Michael Robinson (2002-05).

For the season, Hackenberg is 210 of 362 for 2,616 yards, with 16 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He is second in the Big Ten in completions (210) and passing yards (237.8 ypg) and fourth in total offense.

Hackenberg's 210 completions rank fourth at Penn State in a season. Daryll Clark with 232 completions in 2009 is third. Hackenberg has thrown for 2,616 yards this season, moving him into fifth place on the Penn State single-season chart. He trails Anthony Morelli (4th, 2,651) and Kerry Collins (3rd, 2,679) on the single season charts.

ZWINAK STAYS STRONG IN NOVEMBER

Over the past two seasons, junior running back Zach Zwinak has rushed for 1,062 yards in the month of November.

He had 589 in four games last year and he has 473 in four games in 2013. He ran for at least 100 yards in all four November games in 2012 and has compiled at least 100 yards rushing in three of four contests this season.

In 2013, Zwinak ran for 25 yards to open November vs.

Illinois, but followed that up with 150 yards at Minnesota and back-to-back 149-yard efforts against Purdue and Nebraska.

In 2012, Zwinak ran for 134 yards at Purdue, totaled 141 yards at Nebraska, rushed for 135 yards vs. Indiana and closed the season with a career-high 179 yards vs. Wisconsin.

He has seven scores in the month of November, with four coming in 2013.

ZWINAK RUSHES INTO TD SEASON TOP 10 VS. PURDUE

Junior running back Zach Zwinak posted his ninth career 100-yard rushing effort in the win over Purdue last week and moved onto the single season rushing touchdowns list.

The Fredrick, Md. native piled up 149 yards on 26 carries and scored three touchdowns against the Boilermakers. It was the junior's fourth game with three touchdowns in 2013 and fifth of his career.

With his three rushing touchdowns against Purdue, Zwinak became the 16th player in school history to register 10-plus rushing touchdowns in a single season. He is now tied with Evan Royster (2008) and John Cappelletti (1972) for ninth on the single season rushing touchdowns list.

His 18 career touchdowns are tied for 20th in program history.

ROBINSON NAMED A BILETNIKOFF SEMIFINALIST

Allen Robinson has been selected a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, presented to the college football's premier receiver.

The Tallahassee Quarterback Club Foundation, Inc. sponsors the Biletnikoff Award, which recognizes the outstanding receiver in college football. Former Nittany Lion first-team All-American Bobby Engram was the recipient of the inaugural Biletnikoff Award in 1994.

The 2012 Big Ten Richter-Howard Receiver of the Year, Robinson is among 10 semifinalists for the 2013 Biletnikoff Award. The record-setting Robinson is the only player from a Big Ten institution on the semifinalist list.

The three Biletnikoff Award finalists will be announced on Monday, Nov. 25. The Biletnikoff Award winner will be announced live on ESPN's The Home Depot College Football Awards Show at 7 p.m. on December 12.

Robinson leads the Big Ten and is ranked in the top 10 nationally in receptions (89, 8.1 avg. - 8th in nation) and receiving yardage (1,310; 119.1 ypg - 5th in nation). The 2013 mid-season All-American broke his own Penn State single season receptions record (77, 2012) by making eight catches for 98 yards in last Saturday's 45-21 win

over Purdue. Robinson, who has six touchdown catches this season and 17 in his career, also increased his school single-season yardage record to 1,310 yards with one game to play.

Robinson's production in the Nittany Lions' six Big Ten games this season has surpassed his overall season averages, as he has made 63 catches (9.0 avg.) for 862 yards (123.1 ypg) in conference play. The vastly talented and athletic Robinson has made 12 catches of 35 yards or longer this season, including four touchdowns of 45 yards or longer for coach Bill O'Brien's squad.

A football and basketball standout at Orchard Lake St. Mary's prep, Robinson owns the top two Penn State season receptions marks (89 and 77) and the No. 1 and 4 season receiving yardage marks (1,013 in 2012), with Engram holding the No. 2-3 spots.

Robinson, who made three catches for 29 yards as a freshman in 2011, has gained 2,352 yards on 169 catches in his career, ranking fourth and second, respectively, on the Penn State career receiving charts.

The 2013 Biletnikoff Award winner will receive the Biletnikoff Award Trophy and the custom designed Biletnikoff Award winner's ring before 600 patrons at the annual Biletnikoff Award Banquet at the University Center Club at Doak Campbell Stadium in Tallahassee on Saturday, February 8, 2014, and will be live streamed on ESPN3.

DEFENSIVE END OLANIYAN AMONG BIG TEN TOP 10 IN TRIO OF CATEGORIES

In his first year as a starter, junior defensive end C.J. Olaniyan has emerged as a disruptive force, ranking among the top 10 in three Big Ten categories.

Olaniyan forced his third fumble of the season last week against Nebraska, good for a tie for second in the conference. He has recorded 11.0 tackles for loss, tied for 10th in the Big Ten, and his 5.0 sacks are tied for ninth.

For the season, Olaniyan leads the Nittany Lions in sacks and forced fumbles, is tied for the team lead with one fumble recovery and is second in TFL. He is seventh on the team with 47 tackles and has two pass break-ups.

Olaniyan was selected Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week after delivering his best career game in the four over time win over Michigan. He set career-highs with eight tackles and 2.5 sacks (minus-18), while also forcing his first career fumble, which was recovered by DaQuan Jones. He also broke up two passes.

ROBINSON BREAKS SEASON RECEIVING MARKS

With a seven-catch, 63-yard effort at Minnesota, junior Allen Robinson broke the Penn State season receiving yardage record, bringing a total of 1,106 yards into the Purdue game.

Robinson, the 2012 Big Ten Receiver of the Year, eclipsed All-American Bobby Engram's total of 1,084 yards from 1995.

His eight catches for 98 yards against Purdue on Nov. 16 gave Robinson 81 catches on the season, which eclipses his own season record total of 77 from last year.

He caught eight passes for 106 yards vs. Nebraska to bring his season total to 89 catches for 1,310 yards.

In the Penn State career record books, Robinson ranks second in career receptions (169), is fourth in career receiving yards (2,352) and fifth in career touchdown catches (17).

Robinson is the first player in Penn State history with two seasons with at least 60 receptions.

ROBINSON AMONG NATION'S ELITE RECEIVERS

Allen Robinson continues to lead the Big Ten in nearly every receiving category and is among the nation's top pass catchers entering the final week of the regular season. Through 11 games, the junior's tops the conference receiving charts with 89 catches (8.1 rpg) and 119.1 yards per game.

In the NCAA, Robinson is third in receiving yards (1,310) and fifth in receiving yards per game. His 89 catches are seventh in the NCAA and his 8.1 catches per game are eighth nationally.

Robinson has 2,352 yards on 169 catches in his career, ranking fourth and second, respectively, on the career receiving charts at Penn State. His 17 career receiving touchdowns are also fifth in Penn State history.

His 63 yards receiving at Minnesota moved him into first on the single season receiving yards charts. His 1,204 yards in 2013 eclipse Bobby Engram's total of 1,048 yards from the 1995 season.

The junior's eight catches for 98 yards against Purdue moved his season total to 81 grabs on the year, besting his school record 77 catches from 2012.

He added to both of those totals with eight catches for 106 yards and enters the season finale at Wisconsin with 89 catches for 1,310 yards in 2012.

Robinson amassed 173 yards on 12 catches at Ohio State, including a dazzling career-long 65-yard catch and run, tying his season best-effort in both categories, set at Indiana on Oct. 5. The 12 catches are tied for second most in a single game, behind Freddie Scott's 13 catches vs. Wisconsin in 1995, and his 173 receiving yards are tied for eighth on the all-time single game charts.

Earlier the season, the Biletnikoff Award semifinalist became the third receiver in Penn State history to account for 100-yards receiving in three straight games, joining Joe Jurevicius in 1996 (at Ind., vs. N'western, at Mich.) and Kenny Jackson in 1982 (at BC, vs. N. Carolina St., at ND).

Robinson logged 133 yards on seven grabs with a 51-yard catch and run vs. Syracuse in the season opener, recorded 129 yards on seven catches with a 45-yard touchdown reception against Eastern Michigan and grabbed nine catches for 143 yards, including a 46-yarder vs. UCF.

LIONS IMPROVED IN THE RED ZONE

The Nittany Lions have been turning opportunity into more points in the red zone in 2013, converting 38 of 45 (84 percent) visits into points.

Of the 45 visits into the red area this season, Penn State has scored 29 touchdowns and nine field goals.

The Nittany Lions have scored on 69 of their last 79 trips into the red zone dating back to the Oct. 6 contest vs. Northwestern last season.

Last year, Penn State was 44 of 56 (78.6) for the season in the red zone.

LIONS AMONG NATIONAL LEADERS IN FEWEST PENALTIES AND YARDS

Penn State leads the Big Ten and is No. 7 in the nation in the fewest penalty yards per game, averaging 32.5 yards per game.

Penn State ranks second in the Big Ten and 12th nationally in the fewest penalties per game, with 46 penalties for a 4.18 per game average.

HACKENBERG OWNS SEVERAL FRESHMAN RECORDS; AMONG TOP 10 ON ALL-TIME SEASON LISTS

Christian Hackenberg has already compiled the greatest season by a Penn State freshman quarterback and with one game remaining will have an opportunity crack the top five on several school season passing charts.

The Nittany Lions' starter in every game this season, Hackenberg is 210 of 362 (58.0 pct.) for 2,616 yards, with 16 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He also has rushed for fourtouchdowns, all coming in Big Ten play, including one in each of the last two games.

Hackenberg broke his first Penn State record when he threw 55 pass attempts at Indiana on Oct. 5. He has thrown for 300 yards in three games, which is a school freshman record, and ranks second in a season, trailing only Matt McGloin's four 300-yard efforts from last season.

LINEBACKER U. DUO PILING UP TACKLES

Senior Glenn Carson and junior Mike Hull are displaying the traits that so many before them have shown at the linebacker position.

Seven games into Big Ten play, Hull ranks third in the conference with 9.4 tackles per conference game. The junior has made at least nine tackles in six of his seven Big Ten games, including 10 at Indiana and vs. Michigan and a career-best 13 vs. Illinois. Hull also has had a critical end zone pass break-up in the wins over the Wolverines and Illini. He also contributed nine stops at Ohio State, at Minnesota and vs. Nebraska.

Carson ranks 12th in the Big Ten with 7.7 tackles per game in all games and is 11th with 8.0 tackles in conference games. Carson made 11 tackles against Illinois on Nov. 2 and contributed 10 tackles at Indiana, vs. Michigan in the 4 OT victory and against Nebraska.

Carson leads the team with 85 tackles in 11 games played, while Hull, who missed two full games and parts of others due to a knee injury, is second on the squad with 71 stops in eight games.

JONES MAKING MAJOR CONTRIBUTIONS

Senior DT DaQuan Jones dropped approximately 15 pounds in the off-season and that has helped him drop more of the opposition this season.

His 11.5 tackles for loss this season are tied for ninth in the Big Ten this season.

Jones opened the year with a career-high nine tackles, three tackles for loss and one sack vs. Syracuse.

He followed that up by tying his career-high with nine stops and added two TFL and one sack vs. Eastern Michigan. He boasted five stops vs. UCF to move past his 2012 season total (22) for tackles with 23 through three games.

He tied his career-high for the second time in 2012 with a nine tackle effort in the Lions four overtime victory against Michigan, adding 2.0 TFL and his second career fumble recovery.

Jones eclipsed his career totals in tackles for loss and sacks in just two games in 2013, entering the season with four career tackles for loss.

The senior had 1.5 sacks entering 2013 and has already boasted 3.0 sacks for minus-21 yards.

His 56 tackles rank fifth on the squad and surpass his career total (36) entering the year. He leads all Big Ten defensive linemen in tackles at 5.1 per game.

STRONG HOME FOOTBALL ATTENDANCE CONTINUES; RANKS NO. 5 NATIONALLY

Penn State fans continue to demonstrate why they are regarded as the best in the nation as they flocked to Beaver Stadium, keeping the Nittany Lions among the top five nationally in home attendance.

ROBINSON ASCENDS TOWARDS TOP OF RECEIVING CHARTS

Allen Robinson entered his junior season with a target on his chest and on his back, as the 2012 Richter-Howard Receiver of the Year will again be a key target in coach Bill O'Brien's offense and a main focus of opposing defenses.

Robinson's game is a perfect fit for O'Brien's up-tempo offense and continues to etch his name into the Nittany Lion record books.

On Nov. 17, 2012 vs. Indiana Robinson caught ten passes and became the first Nittany Lion to eclipse the 70 catch mark in a season. His six catches at Minnesota on Nov. 9, 2013 made him the first PSU player with multiple 70-catch seasons.

He also owns the sophomore and junior record for catches & yards in a single season.

In 2012, Robinson led the conference in catches, catches per game receiving yards, receiving yards per game and touchdowns catches in 2012.

He opened the 2013 campaign with back-to-back seven-catch, 100-plus yard efforts against Syracuse and Eastern Michigan. He posted nine catches for 143 yards vs. UCF to become the third player in school history with three consecutive 100-yard receiving games.

Robinson's 12 catches at Indiana and at Ohio State rank second in a single game by a Nittany Lion (13 - Scott vs. Wisconsin, 1995) & his 173 yards vs. the Hoosiers and Buckeyes rank eighth on the PSU single game charts. He also ranks tied for fifth on that list with 197 yards vs. Indiana in 2012.

He is assaulting the career top-10; ranking 2nd in receptions, 4th in receiving yards and 5th in touchdown grabs.

URSCHEL EARNS NFF SCHOLAR-ATHLETE AWARD

One of the most prestigious honors a collegiate football student-athlete can earn has been bestowed upon Penn State senior John Urschel. The 2012 first team All-Big Ten guard and first-team Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American® has been selected one of 16 National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame Scholar-Athletes, presented by Fidelity Investments, from across all NCAA and NAIA divisions.

Urschel will receive an \$18,000 scholarship for post-graduate studies. He also is a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, endowed by HealthSouth, presented to the nation's premier college football Scholar-Athlete, with the winner receiving a total of \$25,000 for post-graduate work.

From Williamsville, N.Y., Urschel is the 17th Nittany Lion to be selected a Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete and follows another standout offensive lineman and first-team Academic All-American®, Stefan Wisniewski (2010), on the distinguished list.

Penn State is tied for third in the nation (with Notre Dame) with its 17 Scholar-Athlete recipients. Nebraska (22) and Ohio State (20) are the only schools with more honorees than Penn State.

The 2013 Scholar-Athletes will be honored at the National Football Foundation's 56th Annual black tie awards dinner on December 10 at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City.

The Foundation's National Scholar-Athlete Awards are awarded on an annual basis to a select group of college football players in their senior year of eligibility who have demonstrated outstanding academic success, strong leadership, citizenship and superior football performance.

Among the other 2013 Scholar-Athletes joining Urschel are: Max Bullough (Michigan State), Derek Carr (Fresno State), Spencer Long (Nebraska), James Morris (Iowa) and Aaron Murray (Georgia). Urschel, John Arena (Johns Hopkins) and Gabe Ikard (Oklahoma) are the three Scholar-Athletes with a perfect 4.0 GPA.

In addition to Stefan Wisniewski, among the other Penn Staters to earn the prestigious Scholar-Athlete honor since its inception are: Mark Markovich (1973), Lance Hamilton (1985), Tony Pittman (1994), Jeff Hartings (1995), Wally Richardson (1996), Aaron Collins (1997) and Paul Posluszny (2006). Director of Athletics Dave Joyner was Penn State's first Scholar-Athlete recipient in 1971.

A 6-3, 301-pound guard, Urschel has established himself as one of the nation's exceptional football student-athletes. A 2012 first team CoSIDA Academic All-American®, he has earned a 4.0 grade-point average during his Penn State career and was among seven of the 171 Scholar-Athlete nominees with a 4.0 GPA from all NCAA and NAIA divisions.

Urschel has started 19 consecutive games and earned first team All-Big Ten honors last season after blocking for 1,000-yard rusher Zach Zwinak and 3,000-yard passer Matt McGloin. He is on the Watch Lists for the 2013 Outland Trophy and the Rotary Lombardi Award. Urschel also is one of 30 candidates for the Senior CLASS Award.

A Penn State game captain three times in the first seven contests this season, Urschel earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in mathematics over the past four years. The former Canisius High School standout anchors the Nittany Lions' offensive line, and is working on a second master's degree, in math education.

Urschel has an opportunity this fall to earn his fourth straight nod on the Academic All-Big Ten squad, his third selection to the Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-District® team and his second Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America® selection.

Urschel taught a section of Math 041 - Trigonometry and Analytic Geometry - during Penn State's spring 2013 semester and is teaching a section of Math 232 - Integral Vector Calculus - this semester, in addition to his academic and football responsibilities. Urschel has participated in the Penn State Lift for Life, THON events, the Relay for Life and the Special Olympics Pennsylvania State Summer Games during his collegiate career.

A paper written by Urschel titled, "Instabilities of the Sun-Jupiter-Asteroid Three Body Problem" was published in 2012 in the journal, Celestial Mechanics and Dynamic Astronomy. He has a second paper accepted for publication, "A Space-Time Multigrad Method for the Numerical Valuation of Barrier Options" in the journal, Communications in Mathematical Finance.

passionate and enthusiastic fans will rank among the top five in the nation in average home attendance among the 124 Football Bowl Subdivision institutions.

Led by an electric sellout throng of 107,884 for the primetime clash with Michigan, the Nittany Lions drew a total of 676,112 fans, an average of 96,587 per game, off by just 143 fans per game (996 total, 0.1 percent) compared to the 2012 average of 96,730.

Penn State saw the overall attendance for its four Big Ten home games this season increase by 10,573 from 2012, an average of 2,643 per game.

Last Saturday's home finale for Coach Bill O'Brien's squad against Nebraska drew 98,517, the second-largest crowd of the season. The combined attendance for the last two games of the 2013 season (Purdue and Nebraska) was 195,008, an increase of 11,145 (5,573 avg.) compared to the final two games of the 2012 season against Indiana and Wisconsin.

The slight decline in overall home attendance this season from 2012 is being felt at FBS programs nationwide.

The five schools that led the NCAA in average attendance last year all have a smaller average home attendance figure this year compared to 2012 in games through Nov. 23, with Penn State's difference of 143 fans the smallest average decline. Eight of top 10 attendance leaders from 2012 have seen a decline in their average home attendance as of Nov. 23, compared to last year.

ZERO PUNTS VS. PURDUE; FIRST TIME SINCE AT LEAST 1980

Alex Butterworth's name showed up in the participation for the game against Purdue, but the senior punter didn't get to showcase his skills kicking the football.

Butterworth held all six PAT attempts and Sam Ficken's 29-yard field goal, but the Nittany Lions were not forced to punt against the Boilermakers.

The zero punts are the first time since 1980 that a Penn State team did not punt in a game.

The Nittany Lions have had nine games between 1980 and 2013 with one punt, but never with zero. The last time Penn State punted just once was a 2008 meeting with Coastal Carolina at Beaver Stadium.

DEFENSE DELIVERS IN WIN OVER PURDUE

The Penn State defense forced three turnovers, that led to 21 points, in the Nittany Lions' 45-21 win over Purdue last week. The three forced turnovers were tied for the team's season-high (Syracuse and Michigan).

The Nittany Lions scored a season-high 21 points off its three turnovers vs. Purdue. The previous high had been 14 points in the overtime win over Michigan.

Penn State recorded six sacks in the win over the Boilermakers, the most for the Lions since they recorded seven sacks at Northwestern in 2011. The Nittany Lions' eight tackles for loss were their most since recording nine against Nebraska last season. Purdue mustered just 41 rushing yards on 20 carries against the Penn State defense.

OFFENSE POSTS 45 POINTS, MOST FIRST DOWNS SINCE 2005 IN WIN OVER PURDUE

Penn State's 45 points and 501 yards in the 45-21 win over Purdue were its most in a Big Ten game since its 45-22 win over Indiana in 2012. The Nittany Lions had 546 yards in last year's win over the Hoosiers.

Penn State posted 31 first downs against Purdue,

the most by the Nittany Lions since they had 35 first downs in the 2005 win over Minnesota. The Lions had 58 rushing attempts against the Boilers, good for 289 yards, their most since 59 attempts in the 2005 win over Minnesota.

Penn State's season-high 289 yards rushing against Purdue were the most for the Nittany Lions since a 338-yard day on the ground at Illinois in 2009. The Lions' five rushing touchdowns tied their season high (vs. Eastern Michigan).

BELTON HITS 1,000 CAREER RUSHING YARDS

Junior Bill Belton became the 41st Nittany Lion all-time to surpass 1,000 career rushing yards when he gained 47 yards on just seven carries at Minnesota.

Belton enters the Nebraska game with 1,124 career yards and needs six yards to pass Mike Guman and move into 35th place on the list, which also includes classmate Zach Zwinak (1,732, 19th).

On Nov. 2, Belton became the 15th Nittany Lion all-time to rush for at least 200 yards in a game when he tallied 201 yards in the win over Illinois. He delivered Penn State's first 200-yard game since Larry Johnson had 279 yards vs. Michigan State in 2002.

Belton leads Penn State with 796 rushing yards this season on 154 carries (5.2) and has five rushing touchdowns. He is second on the team with 1,015 all-purpose yards, an average of 101.5 yards per game.

Belton is the seventh in the Big Ten in overall rushing at 79.6 ypg.

ZWINAK RUSHES FOR 150 YARDS AT MINN.; POSTS EIGHTH CAREER 100-YARD EFFORT

Junior running back Zach Zwinak posted his eighth career 100-yard rushing effort with 150 yards on 27 carries at Minnesota last week.

He also scored his ninth touchdown of the season in the first quarter against the Golden Gophers. Zwinak gained 61 yards on just five carries during Penn State's first scoring drive, including a 38-yard burst that set-up his own 12-yard touchdown run.

Zwinak's 150 yards against the Gophers were the second-highest total in his career, behind the 179-yard effort in the overtime win over Wisconsin in 2012.

OVERTIME OVER TIME

College football introduced overtime during the bowl season in 1995 and adopted the system for regular season games in 1996.

Since then, Penn State has played nine overtime games, including four over the past two seasons. Four of the last five Big Ten games the Nittany Lions have played at home have gone into overtime.

The Nittany Lions dropped their first three contests that went to the extra period, but won five straight overtime contests before falling to Nebraska on Nov. 23.

URSCHEL, KLINE EARN ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT® HONORS

Ben Kline and John Urschel have been selected to the Capital One Academic All-District® Football Team as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). They are now eligible for

consideration for the Academic All-America® Team.

A senior, Urschel was a 2012 first-team Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American® and earned Academic All-District® accolades for the third consecutive year. Kline, a redshirt sophomore, earned his second consecutive Academic All-District® selection.

Urschel will have an opportunity to become the 11th Nittany Lion to earn first team Academic All-America® honors twice. He is among the eight Nittany Lions who have already earned their degrees. A starter in all 20 games the past two seasons for Coach Bill O'Brien's Nittany Lions, Urschel graduated with a 4.0 grade-point average in math, earned his master's degree in math in one year, and is working on a second master's, in math education.

A 2012 first-team All-Big Ten guard, Urschel recently was named a prestigious National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete, earning \$18,000 for post-graduate studies. In addition to being among the finalists for the NFF's William V. Campbell Trophy, Urschel also is among 10 finalists for the Senior CLASS Award.

A linebacker, Kline owns a 3.90 GPA as a finance major in the Smeal College of Business. He made his first career start in last week's win over Illinois and recorded a career-best eight tackles. Kline has been slowed by a shoulder injury this season, but has 18 tackles, with 1.5 tackles for loss and one sack in his six games.

Penn State has led, or been tied for first, in first-team Academic All-America® selections among FBS institutions in four of the past five years. The Nittany Lions' 17 Academic All-Americans® since 2006 (15 first-team) leads the nation. The Penn State football team has had a least one first-team Academic All-American® in nine of the past 11 years (17 overall selections).

Penn State has had 51 Academic All-Americans® all-time to rank No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) programs.

The Capital One Academic All-District® Football Team was selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). To be eligible, a student-athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve, maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 3.30 on a scale of 4.00 and have achieved sophomore academic eligibility.

NITTANY LIONS AMONG TOP 10 PERCENT IN FBS GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

The Penn State football team's superlative NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) is among the top 10 percent of the nation's Football Bowl Subdivision institutions and tied for second nationally among public FBS institutions.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2003-06 earned a Graduation Success Rate of 85 percent, second-highest in the Big Ten Conference and tied with Rutgers and TCU for No. 12 overall among the nation's 124 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions.

The Nittany Lions' football graduation rate was tied for No. 2 among all public FBS schools, trailing only Boise State. Penn State's graduation figure was 15 points higher than the 70 percent FBS average and was second to Northwestern among Big Ten institutions, according to the NCAA.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2003-06 earned a four-year federal graduation rate of 72 percent, also No. 2 to Northwestern among Big Ten teams. The Nittany Lions' graduation figure was 14 points above the 58 percent FBS average, according to the NCAA.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate, and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete.

Penn State student-athletes that enrolled from 2003-06 earned a GSR of 88 percent, compared to the 81 percent average for Division I, according to the NCAA.

The outstanding graduation data is the latest success in a long line of academic achievement for members of the Penn State football program, who consistently are at or near the top nationally in academic success:

The Nittany Lions' 17 Academic All-Americans® over the past seven years (15 first team selections) leads the nation. Senior guard John Urschel (Williamsville, N.Y.) and 2012 senior Pete Massaro earned first-team Academic All-America® accolades last year. Penn State has had a least

He is the sixth member of the Penn State Football program to be inducted in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Robinson was an All-American in 1962 and also has been enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame.

one first team ESPN Academic All-American® in eight of the past nine seasons;

The Nittany Lions' all-time total of 51 Academic All-America® football honorees ranks third among all FBS institutions.

A program record 28 Penn State football student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2012 for earning at least a 3.0 grade point average and being a letterwinner, bringing the Nittany Lions' total to 308 honorees since 1993.

PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE DAVE ROBINSON TO BE RECOGNIZED

Former Penn State All-America end Dave Robinson was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in August and will be recognized at halftime of the Nebraska game.

Robinson is the sixth member of the Penn State Football family to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, joining Jack Ham, Franco Harris, August Michalske, Lenny Moore and Mike Munchak. Munchak, head coach of the Tennessee Titans, had been Penn State's most recent inductee, in 2001.

Robinson also is among the 22 members of the Penn State Football family that have been enshrined in the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame.

From Mount Laurel, N.J., Robinson was a first-team All-American for the Nittany Lions in 1962 and a three-year letterwinner under Coach Rip Engle. He helped Penn State to a 24-8 record from 1960-62, including wins over Oregon in the 1960 Liberty Bowl and Georgia Tech in the 1961 Gator Bowl. An offensive and defensive end, Robinson was the MVP of the 1962 Gator Bowl, despite the Nittany Lions falling to Florida, 17-7 to complete a 9-2 season. He was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame in 1996.

The Green Bay Packers and Coach Vince Lombardi selected Robinson in the first round of the 1963 NFL Draft (14th overall selection) and he played linebacker 12 years in the NFL. He played with the Packers from 1963-72 and the Washington Redskins in 1973-74.

Robinson was selected to the Pro Bowl three times (1966-67, 1969) and twice earned Associated Press first-team All-Pro honors (1967, 1969) during his career in Green Bay. Robinson was a starter on teams that won three consecutive NFL Championships (1965-67) and Super Bowls I and II. He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960s. He intercepted 27 passes in his 12-season career.

THIRTEEN TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE MADE DEBUTS

Thirteen true freshmen have made their Penn State debuts this season, with three of them making starts.

Quarterback Christian Hackenberg has started each game, while tight end Adam Breneman earned his first start in the win over Eastern Michigan and wide receiver Richy Anderson – son of former Penn State running back Richie Anderson – made his first start against UCF.

Running back Von Walker has seen action on offense and returning punts. Gregg Garrity – son of former Nittany Lion wideout Gregg Garrity, Sr. – also has seen action. Chip Chiappialle, Adam Geiger, Dad Poquie and Mike Wiand have all made appearances on special teams this season, as well.

The defensive side of the ball has seen linebackers Brandon Bell and with cornerbacks Anthony Smith and Jordan Smith have an impact this season. Zach Ladonis joins Anthony Smith as players who have handled long snapping duties for punter Alex Butterworth this season.

ROBINSON EARNS MID-SEASON ALL-AMERICA ACCOLADES

Several Penn State players earned mid-season honors. Junior wide receiver Allen Robinson was selected a second-team Mid-season All-American by CBSsports.com and Phil Steele's College Football.

Robinson and senior DT DaQuan Jones earned first-team All-Big Ten accolades from ESPN.com and Phil Steele at the halfway point of the season.

True freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg was named ESPN.com's No. 2 Freshman nationally at the season's mid-point. He also was selected ESPN.com's Big Ten Newcomer of the Year and BTN.com's Freshman of the Year at mid-season.

Guard John Urschel was a Phil Steele second-team all-conference Mid-season selection. Hackenberg, LB Glenn Carson, cornerback Jordan Lucas, DE C.J. Olanyian, T

Donovan Smith and S Malcolm Willis earned third team All-Big Ten recognition by Phil Steele.

Also, for the second consecutive year, sophomore Kyle Carter was named to the John Mackey Award Mid-Season Watch List. The Mackey Award is presented to the nation's top tight end.

HACKENBERG EARNS ANOTHER FRESHMAN HONOR

True freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg (Palmyra, Va.) was selected Athlon Sports' Big Ten Freshman of the Week for the second time this season for his efforts in the win over Illinois. He has earned Big Ten Freshman of the Week from the conference office three times this year.

Hackenberg helped lead Penn State to its second consecutive home overtime win to earn Athlon Sports' Big Ten Freshman honor. He was 20 of 32 (62.5) for 240 yards, with one touchdown and no interceptions against the Illini. He also ran for a nine-yard score in the second quarter. In overtime, he rifled a 15-yard scoring strike to tight end Kyle Carter to give Penn State a 24-17 lead. On Illinois' first play in the extra session, cornerback Adrian Amos broke up a pass in the end zone that was intercepted by safety Ryan Keiser, giving Penn State its fifth consecutive overtime win.

HACKENBERG HAVING A STRONG ROOKIE SEASON

True freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg has quickly grasped Bill O'Brien's diverse and dynamic offense.

He has completed 210-of-362 passes (58 percent), for 2,616 passing yards and 16 touchdown passes in 11 starts. Six of his 16 scoring strikes have been 45 yards or longer.

Hackenberg has been selected Big Ten Freshman of the Week three times, earning the honor after the season opening win over Syracuse, against UCF and after leading a fourth quarter comeback and 4OT victory over Michigan.

The former Fork Union Military Academy All-American has quickly moved among the top signal callers in the Big Ten and in the NCAA.

He ranks second in the Big Ten and is 36th in the nation in completions per game (19.1) and sits second and 35th, respectively, in passing yards per game (237.8). He is sixth in the Big Ten with 16 touchdown passes and is fourth in the conference and 53rd nationally in total offense (231.3).

Hackenberg has thrown for at least 250 yards in five of the team's 11 games, including three 300-yard efforts, and his 11 completions of 40-plus yards are tied for 14th in the nation.

He has connected with Allen Robinson on eight of those passes, Jesse James twice and Geno Lewis once. Four of those tosses have netted over 50 yards and/or have went for touchdowns.

Hackenberg has broken the Penn State single game record for passing yards by a freshman twice this season, doing so at Indiana with 340 yards after he threw for 311 yards in the win over Eastern Michigan to top Zack Mills' freshman yardage mark of 280 yards. Mills accomplished that feat twice, against Ohio State and Southern Miss in 2001.

He has thrown at least 200 yards in eight games this season, breaking Zack Mills' freshman record of five from the 2001 season.

Hackenberg's eight 200-yard games are 10th in a Penn State history.

Hackenberg became just the fourth Penn State signal caller to amass 50 passing attempts in a game, breaking Kerry Collins school record of 54 (at BYU, 1992), when he threw the ball 55 times at Indiana. His 30 completions vs. the Hoosiers are third on the PSU single game charts.

He is one of only four quarterbacks in PSU history to post multiple 300-plus yard passing games in career, ranking third in school history with three such games. Hackenberg trails Matt McGloin (six) and Kerry Collins (four) on the 300-yard passing games list.

CARTER AGAIN NAMED TO MACKEY AWARD MIDSEASON WATCH LIST

After being the only freshman on the Midseason watch list last season, sophomore tight end Kyle Carter was one of four underclassmen named to the Mackey



Award Midseason Watch List in 2013. The award is given to the nation's top tight end.

A 2012 consensus first-team Freshman All-American, Carter suffered an arm injury early in the Syracuse game and didn't record a catch, but has made 14 receptions for 186 yards and a touchdown in the past five games played.

Last season, Carter ranked second on the team with 36 receptions for 453 yards and was the lone freshman to rank among the Big Ten leaders in receptions and receiving yards per game in 2012.

He made six catches of 20-or-more yards, despite missing three of the final four games in 2012 due to injury, and caught a pair of touchdown passes on the season.

URSCHEL A FINALIST FOR PRESTIGIOUS SENIOR CLASS AWARD

Senior John Urschel was selected as a finalist for the Senior CLASS Award, presented by Premier Sports Management, which is awarded to an NCAA FBS student-athlete that excels both on and off the field.

The 2012 first team All-Big Ten guard and first-team Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American® has been selected one of 10 finalists for the award. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as a senior at an NCAA Division I FBS program and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence - community, classroom, character and competition.

Urschel, Derek Carr (Fresno State) and Gabe Ikard (Oklahoma) are the nation's only players selected a Senior CLASS finalist as well as a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School (CLASS), the award program is designed exclusively for college seniors who are utilizing their complete athletic eligibility, remaining committed to their university and pursuing the many rewards a senior season can bring.

The 10 finalists were chosen by a media committee from the initial list of 30 candidates and nationwide fan voting begins immediately to help select the winner. Fans can vote daily and the votes will be combined with media and Division I head coaches' votes to determine the winner. The Senior CLASS Award winner will be announced in early January, 2014.

Fans can vote for Urschel daily through Dec. 16 at seniorCLASSaward.com.

Already this season, Urschel has been named a recipient of the National Football Foundation's Scholar-Athlete Scholarship and is a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, endowed by HealthSouth, presented to the nation's premier college football Scholar-Athlete.

A 6-3, 301-pound guard, Urschel has established himself as one of the nation's exceptional football student-athletes. A 2012 first team CoSIDA Academic All-American®, he has earned a 4.0 grade-point average during his Penn State career.

BELTON EARNS BIG TEN ACCOLADES AFTER 201-YARD RUSHING EFFORT VS. ILLINOIS

Junior running back Bill Belton (Sicklerville, N.J.) was honored by the Big Ten Conference for his career-high 201-yard rushing effort in Penn State's 24-17 overtime win over Illinois last Saturday.

Belton was selected Big Ten Co-Offensive Player of the Week for the first time in his career. He becomes the fourth Nittany Lion to earn conference honors this season, joining placekicker Sam Ficken, quarterback Christian Hackenberg and defensive end C.J. Olaniyan. Belton shares the Big Ten weekly honor with Minnesota quarterback Philip Nelson.

Belton delivered the first 200-yard rushing game by a Nittany Lion (24th overall) since Larry Johnson ran for 279 yards against Michigan State in 2002. Belton crushed his previous career-high of 108 in the win over Eastern Michigan on Sept. 7. His 36 carries also were a career-best and the most by a Nittany Lion since Zach Zwinak had 36 last season against Wisconsin.

A former first-team All-South Jersey standout at Winslow Township High School, Belton got the Nittany Lions on the scoreboard first with a five-yard touchdown run early in the first quarter. He averaged 5.6 yards per carry against Illinois and also caught two passes for eight yards, giving him a career-high 209 all-purpose yards. He eclipsed 100 rushing yards for the third time in his career.

Belton's 201-yard rushing performance is fifth-highest in the Big Ten this season.

BELTON CONTINUES STRONG PLAY VS. BUCKEYES

Junior running back Bill Belton gained 98 rushing yards at Ohio State - the most allowed by the Buckeyes this season - on 22 carries. Belton gained 78 yards in the first half to surpass the most Ohio State had allowed in a game this season -- 74 yards by Wisconsin's Melvin Gordon.

Making his first start this season, Belton also caught one pass for nine yards to accumulate 107 all-purpose yards vs. the Buckeyes.

LIONS WIN LONGEST GAME IN B1G HISTORY

When Bill Belton scored the game-winning touchdown in the fourth overtime against Michigan on Oct. 12 he capped a 10-point comeback in the final 6:35 and ended the longest game in the 118-year gridiron history of the Big Ten Conference.

The four extra frames are the longest Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) game this season.

Penn State's previous longest game was its 26-23, three overtime win over Florida State in the 2006 FedEx Orange Bowl.

FOLLOWING BYE WEEK

Penn State has a 15-10 on-field record after a bye week since starting Big Ten competition in 1993.

The Nittany Lions fell at Indiana on Oct. 5 after their first of two byes this season. The Nittany Lions won at Iowa in 2012 following their only bye week during last season.

Penn State has played on the road following a bye five out of the last six times dating to the 2005 season.

Penn State will also have two bye weeks during the 2014 season.

LIONS UNDER THE LIGHTS

The Nittany Lions played their second straight night game and third of the season at Ohio State on Oct. 26.

Penn State and Ohio State played their fifth primetime game since 2005, with Penn State winning twice.

Penn State fell, 34-31, to UCF on Sept. 14 in its first non-conference night game since playing at Alabama in 2010 and hosted its first non-conference night game since Notre Dame in 2007.

On Oct. 12, the Lions hosted Michigan under the lights and claimed a 43-40 decision in four overtimes with an energized sellout crowd of 107,844 on hand for

This year marks the sixth time since 2000 that Penn State will play multiple night games in the same season.

Penn State has played at least one regular season night game in 14 consecutive seasons.

Penn State has a 39-25 on-field record in night games, going 9-9 at home, 19-9 on the road, 1-1 at regular season neutral sites and 10-6 in bowl games.

The Lions' night games over the past 14 seasons include: Ohio State, Michigan and UCF (2013); Iowa and Ohio State (2012); Northwestern (2011); Alabama, Iowa and Michigan (2010); Iowa (2009); Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio State (2008); Notre Dame, Ohio State and Texas A&M (2007); Michigan (2006); Illinois, Ohio State and Florida State (2005); Minnesota and Boston College (2004); Nebraska (2002 and '03); Miami (Fla.) (2001) and Indiana (2000).

OFFENSE RUNS PERFECT "TWO MINUTE" DRILL AGAINST MICHIGAN

It is a situation the offense practices every day under Coach Bill O'Brien; under two minutes left in the game with the ball deep in their own territory and they need a touchdown to tie or win the game.

Trailing by a touchdown to No. 18 Michigan, true freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg and the Penn State offense trotted out onto the field needing to travel 80 yards in 50 seconds to tie the game, with no timeouts.

The sequence that unfolded was a clinic on how to run the "two minute drill".

A 14-yard completion on the Penn State sideline to Allen Robinson, where he drug his toe to keep himself in bounds, started the drive.

Hackenberg then fit a pass into a small window between two UM defenders to a leaping Brandon Felder along the Michigan sideline for a 29-yard completion. After spiking the ball to stop the clock, Hackenberg found Robinson, who made an outstanding leaping grab of 36 yards at the one yard line.

After a Michigan timeout, Hackenberg's quarterback sneak and Sam Ficken's extra point tied the game. It was the first career rushing touchdown for Hackenberg and was the first touchdown Michigan had allowed on the ground in 2013.

The drive traveled 80 yards on five plays and took just 23 seconds.

HACKENBERG, OLANIYAN EARN BIG TEN HONORS AFTER STANDOUT EFFORTS VS. MICHIGAN

Junior defensive end C.J. Olaniyan and true freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg were honored by the Big Ten Conference for their efforts in Penn State's thrilling, 43-40, four overtime win over No. 18 Michigan.

Olaniyan was selected Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the first time in his career and Hackenberg was named the conference's Freshman of the Week for the third time in six games. His three selections are the most by a Big Ten freshman on offense or defense since 2010 (Nathan Scheelhaase, Illinois, 6; James White, Wisconsin, 4).

Olaniyan delivered his best career game against Michigan, setting career-highs with eight tackles and 2.5 sacks (minus-18), while also forcing his first career fumble, which was recovered by DaQuan Jones. He also broke up two passes. Olaniyan was instrumental in the Penn State defense not allowing Michigan to score a touchdown in the four overtime periods and holding the Wolverines' running backs to 28 rushing yards on 30 carries.

Olaniyan is the sixth different Penn State defensive end since 1999, all under defensive line coach Larry Johnson, to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors. He joins a distinguished list that includes: Courtney Brown, Michael Haynes, Tamba Hali, Maurice Evans and Aaron Maybin.

Hackenberg was instrumental in Penn State rallying from a 10-point deficit with less than 7:00 to play, forcing overtime by directing an 80-yard touchdown drive, with no timeouts, in 23 seconds. He tied the game at 34-34 with 27 seconds left on a one-yard touchdown plunge, the first of his career, and the first rushing touchdown allowed by the Wolverines in 2013.

Hackenberg was 23 of 44 for 305 yards against Michigan, tying his career-high with three touchdowns for the second consecutive game. He tossed 12- and 24-yard scoring strikes to Brandon Felder and a 20-yard touchdown pass to Jesse James to help Penn State build

a 21-10 lead.

With Penn State trailing, 34-27, with :50 to play, the Nittany Lions forced a punt and took possession at their own 20-yard line with no timeouts. Hackenberg hit Allen Robinson (Southfield, Mich.) on a 14-yard sideline strike and then Felder snared a 29-yard completion to the Michigan 37. Robinson then made a leaping grab at the one-yard-line to set-up Hackenberg's sneak, sending Beaver Stadium into a frenzy.

Hackenberg posted his third 300-yard passing game, tying him with Daryll Clark (2006-09) for third most in school history in a career. He trails only Matt McGloin's six 300-yard games and Kerry Collins' four career 300-yard efforts.

HACKENBERG, OLANIYAN HONORED BY ATHLON SPORTS AFTER 40T WIN OVER MICHIGAN

Athlon Sports selected quarterback Christian Hackenberg as its National Freshman of the Week after he led the Nittany Lions to a thrilling 43-40 four overtime win over No. 18 Michigan, also tabbing the true freshman as its Big Ten Freshman of the Week.

In addition, Athlon selected Nittany Lion defensive end C.J. Olaniyan as its Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week.

Hackenberg helped Penn State rally from a 10-point deficit with less than 7:00 to play, forcing overtime by directing an 80-yard touchdown drive, with no timeouts, in :23. He tied the game at 34-34 with :27 on a one-yard touchdown run, the first of his career, and the first rushing touchdown allowed by the Wolverines this season.

Olaniyan delivered his best career game against Michigan, setting career-highs with eight tackles and 2.5 sacks (minus-18), while also forcing his first career fumble, which was recovered by DaQuan Jones. He also broke up two passes.

DEFENSE INVADERS MICHIGAN BACKFIELD

The Penn State defense marked their territory in the 43-40 victory over Michigan, getting into the backfield to disrupt the Wolverines offense on numerous occasions.

As a team, the Nittany Lions piled up season-high 11 tackles for loss and recorded three sacks for the fourth time in 2013 against the previously unbeaten Wolverines.

Penn State held Michigan's running backs to 28 rushing yards on 30 carries.

Junior defensive end C.J. Olaniyan led the charge with 2.5 sacks - doubling his career total entering the game - and adding 2.5 tackles for loss to bring his season total to 5.5 TFL.

Linebacker Mike Hull and defensive tackle DaQuan Jones both ended the afternoon with 2.0 TFL, while DT Kyle Baublitz, DT Austin Johnson and S/LB Stephen Obeng-Agyapong each chipped in 1.0 TFL.

LB Glenn Carson, DT Brian Gaia and LB Nyeem Wartman each ended the day with 0.5 TFL, with Carson also earning 0.5 sack on the game.

Olaniyan also forced his first career fumble, which was recovered by Jones, while Jordan Lucas and Anthony Zettel each grabbed interceptions against the Wolverines.

EIGHT ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA® NOMINEES

The Penn State football team has had a least one Capital One Academic All-American® in 10 of the past 11 seasons, including a school record five in 2008 and three more in 2009 and again in 2010.

Fifth-year senior guard John Urschel graduated in May 2012 with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average in mathematics and received his master's in math in May 2013. Urschel and 2012 senior Pete Massaro earned first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America® accolades last year.

A total of eight Nittany Lions were nominated for Academic All-America® consideration: junior safety Jesse Della Valle, junior guard Miles Dieffenbach, junior placekicker Sam Ficken, senior center Ty Howle, junior linebacker Mike Hull, junior safety Ryan Keiser, sophomore linebacker Ben Kline and Urschel.

The Nittany Lions' 51 all-time Academic All-Americans® rank No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

Nominees for Capital One Academic All-America® consideration must have at least a 3.30 cumulative grade point average and be a starter or key reserve.

PENN STATE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 88 PERCENT GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Penn State student-athletes continue to graduate well above their peers nationwide, earning record-setting academic performances, according to information released in October 2013 by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

The NCAA's annual study of institutions across the nation revealed Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent compared to the 81 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2003-04 through the 2006-07 academic year.

The Nittany Lion basketball and Lady Lion basketball teams earned perfect Graduation Success Rates of 100 percent. The Penn State football team posted a GSR of 85 percent. All three programs delivered graduation figures at least 15 points higher than the national average for their sport.

Penn State consistently ranked in the top three among Big Ten Conference institutions across a variety of key NCAA graduation data comparisons.

The superlative graduation data comes amidst a fall sports season that has three Penn State teams leading in their respective Big Ten standings (field hockey, men's soccer and women's volleyball) as the fall sports' regular season winds down. During the 2012-13 academic year, Penn State won a school record 11 conference championships, including a record eight Big Ten titles.

This is the 23rd annual release of institutional graduation rates since national "right-to-know" legislation was passed in 1990. In 2005, the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance implemented the initial release of the team GSR data.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate, and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete. The federal rate does neither.

In addition to releasing each institution's overall four-year Graduation Success Rate, the NCAA also released the federal graduation rates for students and student-athletes as it has for the past 23 years. The four-year federal graduation rate average for University Park student-athletes was 78 percent, tied for second among Big Ten institutions, and significantly above the 65 percent Division I average. The four-year average for University Park students was 86 percent, also far exceeding the 63 percent rate for all students nationwide.

Among the 2006-07 entering freshman class, 77 percent of Penn State student-athletes earned degrees within six years, well above the 65 percent average for all Division I institutions. The graduation rate for all Penn State students was 86 percent in the entering class of 2006-07.

The NCAA data revealed student-athletes from eight Penn State squads earned a Graduation Success Rate of 100 percent, up from five teams in the 2012 report. The men's basketball, women's basketball, field hockey, men's golf, women's lacrosse, softball, men's tennis and women's tennis teams all posted perfect GSR scores. Twenty of Penn State's 25 teams (track/cross country teams combined) earned a Graduation Success Rate at or above the national GSR average of 81 percent. (The NCAA data does not include the Penn State men's and women's hockey teams, which became varsity sports in the 2012-13 academic year.)

**HACKENBERG HAS RECORD DAY AT INDIANA**

In just the fifth start of his career, true freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg broke the Penn State record with 55 passing attempts at Indiana last Saturday.

Hackenberg is one of just four Penn State passers to attempt more than 50 passes in a game, joining Kerry Collins (54, 1992 at BYU), Rashard Casey (51, 2000 vs. Iowa) and Matt McGloin (51, 2012 vs. Northwestern).

Hackenberg also set career-highs with 30 completions, 340 yards and three touchdown passes at Indiana. The 30 completions are third most in school history and his 340 passing yards rank ninth in single game history.

Earlier this season, Hackenberg threw for 311 yards vs. Eastern Michigan, making him the 11th Penn State quarterback to throw for 300 yards in a game and his 340 yards at Indiana make him just the fourth Nittany Lion signal caller to put together multiple 300-yard passing games in a career. He joins Matt McGloin (6), Kerry Collins (4) and Daryll Clark (3) on the list.

HACKENBERG EARNS SECOND BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS

For the second time in three weeks, quarterback Christian Hackenberg was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week.

Hackenberg was 21 of 28 for 262 yards, with one touchdown and no interceptions in the 34-31 loss to unbeaten UCF. He connected with Allen Robinson on a five-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter and also found Robinson on 44 and 46-yard completions.

Hackenberg also was honored by the Big Ten after the season opening win over Syracuse, when he became just the third Penn State true freshman quarterback to start the season opener since 1910.

LIONS' DEFENSE DIMS GOLDEN FLASHES

The Penn State defense delivered an impressive performance in the 34-0 victory over Kent State on Sept. 21.

The Nittany Lions defense limited the Golden Flashes to just 190 yards of total offense and only nine first downs in the game to earn their first shutout since blanking Kent State on Sept. 18, 2010.

The nine first downs were the fewest allowed by the Penn State defense since holding Indiana State to eight first downs in 2011.

Senior safety Ryan Keiser grabbed his first career interception and his first career sack against Kent State, to go along with a career-high four tackles.

The Blue and White limited KSU to just 56 yards rushing, a season-low total for an opponent.

LYNCH NETS SECOND 100-YARD RUSHING DAY

Redshirt freshman Akeel Lynch has made the most of his opportunities the last three games, with two 100-yard efforts.

He carried the ball a game-high 13 times for 108 yards vs. Eastern Michigan, which tied teammate Bill Belton for game-high honors.

He toted the ball five times for 32 yards against UCF, but stepped up and delivered a game-high 123 yards on 14 carries against Kent State.

His second 100-yard rushing effort makes him the 49th player in Penn State history to record multiple 100-yard games in a career.

ZWINAK SCORING STREAK

Junior Zach Zwinak scored a touchdown in the final three games of 2012 en route to a 1,000-yard season, but did not reach the end zone against Syracuse in the season opener.

But, over the next three games, Zwinak scored eight times on the ground, including three trips to paydirt against UCF and Kent State. He is tied for fifth nationally with eight rushing touchdowns.

He has already set a career-high with eight touchdowns on the season and can become the 16th player - 19th time overall - in Penn State history with 10-plus rushing scores in a single season.

Zwinak also scored in three straight games to end the 2012 season, tallying one touchdown at Nebraska, vs. Indiana and against Wisconsin.

FICKEN'S 54-YARDER SETS SCHOOL RECORD

It wasn't an ideal day to be attempting a record-setting kick, but junior Sam Ficken executed his steps, and followed through, but he didn't get to see it split the uprights after holder Alex Butterworth mugged him soon after he kicked it.

The 54-yard field goal with 2:45 remaining in the Kent State game was the longest field goal made by a Penn State kicker in home game history.

The longest field goal at Beaver Stadium belongs to Gary Homer from Ohio University, who connected on a 57-yarder in 1973.

Ficken's 54-yarder is tied for the fourth longest in school history, behind Chris Barr's trio of 55-yarders in 1975. It was the longest kick by a Penn State placekicker since Herb Menhardt's 54-yard kick to beat NC State in 1979.

Ficken's kick is tied for the fifth-longest field goal in the NCAA and has the longest field goal by a Big Ten kicker this season.

The last 50-plus yard kick by a Penn State kicker prior to Ficken's boot was in 2008 by Kevin Kelly. That season, Kelly made a 52-yarder vs. Syracuse and connected on a 50-yarder at Wisconsin.

TRIO OF NITTANY LIONS WITH 100 RUSHING YARDS FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2007

When junior Zach Zwinak piled up 129 yards and three touchdowns against UCF on Sept. 14 he became the third Penn State running back to post a 100-yard rushing game during the 2013 season. It was the seventh career 100-yard game for the Frederick, Md. native, which ties him for 16th all-time at Penn State.

Zwinak joined junior Bill Belton and freshman Akeel Lynch as 100-yard rushers in 2013. Belton and Lynch each contributed 108 rushing yards in the Nittany Lions, 45-7, victory over Eastern Michigan on Sept. 7. Lynch carried the ball a team-high 13 times and scored his first career touchdown on an 18-yard jaunt in the fourth quarter. Belton needed only nine carries to eclipse the 100-yard mark, including two touchdowns, one a 51-yard burst in the fourth quarter.

Lynch added his second 100-yard effort of the season with 123 yards on 14 carries against Kent State to become the 49th player in school history to accumulate multiple 100-yard rushing games, a club that Belton and Zwinak both belong to, as well.

The last time Penn State had three 100-yard rushers in the same season was during the 2007 season when senior Rodney Kinlaw, freshman Evan Royster and senior Austin Scott all delivered such games. Kinlaw led the way in 2007 with six, 100-yard games, including three in Big Ten play and a 143-yard effort against Texas A&M in the Alamo Bowl. Royster ran for 126 yards at Illinois and Scott posted the last of his four career 100-yard game in 2007 with 116 against Notre Dame under the lights at Beaver Stadium.

FICKEN NETS 20TH CAREER FIELD GOAL; SETS CONSECUTIVE MAKES RECORD AT 15

When junior Sam Ficken connected on a career-long 47-yard field goal in the second quarter against UCF it marked his 15th consecutive successful FG attempt and 20th career field goal as a Nittany Lion. Ficken is the 15th Nittany Lion all-time to connect on at least 20 field goals.

Ficken made his final 10 kicks of the 2012 campaign and moved his consecutive makes streak to 13 with a 3-for-3 day against Syracuse in the season opener at MetLife Stadium. His 39-yard field goal with 17-seconds left in the second quarter vs. Eastern Michigan split the uprights to set a new Penn State record for consecutive field goals made.

Ficken broke a tie with Craig Fayak, who made 13 straight field goals in 1992, and saw his consecutive field goal streak end at 15 on a 57-yard attempt that came up just short at the end of the first half vs. UCF.

ZWINAK TOPS 100-YARD MARK AGAINST UCF

Hard-charging RB Zach Zwinak needed just 21 carries to amass 128 yards vs. UCF for his seventh career 100-yard rushing game. He averaged 6.1 yards per carry and had a 38-yard burst vs. the Knights.

Against the Knights, Zwinak ran for a career-best three touchdowns (4, 9, 1 yards) and caught one pass for 19 yards, giving him 147 all-purpose yards.

The Lions' fourth scoring drive vs. UCF was all Zwinak, as he ran for 44 yards and caught his lone pass of the game. He gained all 63 of Penn State's yards on the drive, with two UCF penalties accounting for the other 18 yards.

SEVEN MAKE FIRST STARTS; 15 GET FIRST APPEARANCE VS. SYRACUSE

Four Nittany Lions made their first career starts, while 15 players saw their first game action wearing the blue and white, in the 23-17 season opening win over Syracuse.

Christian Hackenberg was the only true freshman starter for the Lions against the Orange, while junior Kyle Baublitz, sophomore Jordan Lucas and redshirt freshman Nyeem Wartman all made their first career starts. Freshman tight end Adam Breneman made his first career start vs. Eastern Michigan and freshmen wideouts Richy Anderson and Geno Lewis started against UCF.

Anderson, Breneman, Hackenberg, Anthony Smith, Jordan Smith and Von Walker were the six true freshmen to see game action in the season opener. Freshmen Brandon Bell and Gregg Garrity made their debuts in the win over Eastern Michigan.

Redshirt freshmen Adam Cole, Tyler Ferguson, Brian Gaia, Malik Golden, Austin Johnson, Geno Lewis, Akeel Lynch, Carl Nassib and Tyrone Smith all saw their first career game action during the victory over Syracuse.

EIGHT NITTANY LIONS ARE GRADUATES

Entering the 2013 season, eight Nittany Lions had earned their degrees.

Glenn Carson, Adam Gress, Stephen Obeng-Agyapong and Malcolm Willis all received their degrees at Penn State's spring commencement in May, joining Ty Howle and John Urschel as graduates on the 2013 roster. Urschel earned his master's degree in mathematics just four years after enrolling at Penn State, boasting a perfect 4.0 GPA.

Matt Lehman and Brandon Felder each earned their degrees at Summer Commencement, pushing the Lions.

Penn State is among the national leaders with eight graduates on their current roster. The Nittany Lions are tied for eighth in the NCAA with eight players holding degrees.

COIN TOSS COMMEMORATES CROKE PARK CLASSIC

Officials from Ireland's Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) and Croke Park Stadium attended the UCF game to continue the planning for the Croke Park Classic between Penn State and UCF in 2014. The first international contest for both teams will take place on August 30, 2014 at Croke Park Stadium in Dublin.

Among the dignitaries visiting Happy Valley were Páiraic Duffy, GAA Director General and Dan Rooney, the Pittsburgh Steelers' team chairman and former U.S. Ambassador to Ireland. Duffy and Rooney participated in the coin toss.

The winning team in the Croke Park Classic will earn the Dan Rooney Trophy. The Dan Rooney Trophy is a replica football made of bog yew and Pittsburgh steel. The yew comes from what remains of forests which grew six to seven thousand years ago and lie deep in the Irish midlands.

The steel is from Heinz Field, home of the National Football League's Pittsburgh Steelers.

BALANCED ATTACK TOPPLES EAGLES

In Penn State's 45-7 victory over Eastern Michigan the Nittany Lions piled up 574 yards of total offense, the most by a Penn State team since their 594 yards against Coastal Carolina in 2008.

Penn State averaged 7.8 yards on its 74 plays vs. the Eagles, with 39 rushes and 35 passes on the day. The balanced attack included 286 rushing yards and 323 passing yards.

Five different players carried the football and 10 different players caught passes from the quarterback duo of Christian Hackenberg and Tyler Ferguson.

BELTON, LYNCH TOP 100 YARD MARK VS. EMU

For the 32nd time in program history Penn State had two 100-yard rushers in the same game.

Bill Belton and Akeel Lynch each piled up 108 yards vs. Eastern Michigan, marking the first time since 2010



against Northwestern that two players topped the 100-yard rushing mark.

In his first game carrying the ball, Lynch led the team with 13 carries and scored his first career touchdown. Belton toted the ball nine times and tied with Zach Zwinak for team-high with two touchdown runs.

Zwinak carried seven times for 43 yards, as well.

LEHMAN TO MISS REST OF 2013 WITH KNEE INJURY

Senior tight end Matt Lehman will miss the remainder of the season due to a serious knee injury suffered against Syracuse, head coach Bill O'Brien announced on Sept. 3.

Lehman suffered the non-contact injury to his left knee during the first quarter in the win over the Orange at MetLife Stadium. A starter against Syracuse, Lehman made two catches in the first period, including a 16-yard grab from Christian Hackenberg that resulted in a first down.

Lehman made 24 receptions for 296 yards (12.3) with three touchdowns last season, ranking fourth on the team in receptions. A starter in three games, he made a career-high five catches for 70 yards, including a 21-yard scoring grab, in the 35-7 win at Illinois.

A transfer from Shippensburg University, Lehman made the Penn State squad during team try-outs and would eventually earn a scholarship. The former Newport High School three-sport standout graduated in August with a degree in kinesiology.

CAPPELLETTI BLAZES ANOTHER TRAIL

Penn State's first Heisman Trophy winner in 1973, John Cappelletti returned to Beaver Stadium last week for a recognition of the undefeated 1973 squad, the first Nittany Lion team to earn a 12-0 record.

After announcing the more than 50 members of the 1973 squad that returned to Happy Valley for the 40th anniversary of the historic season, Cappelletti was called out of the tunnel last to a tremendous ovation.

The crowd was further elated to hear the announcement by Director of Athletics Dave Joyner that Cappelletti's iconic No. 22 jersey was to become the first number in Penn State athletics history to be retired.

Redshirt freshman Akeel Lynch, who rushed for 108 yards and a touchdown vs. Eastern Michigan, will continue to wear the number throughout his Penn State career, a request that was made by Cappelletti.

HACKENBERG, FICKEN EARN BIG TEN HONORS AFTER SEASON OPENER

Placekicker Sam Ficken and freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg were honored as Big Ten Special Team and Freshman of the Week, respectively, for their efforts in the season opening win over Syracuse at MetLife Stadium.

Their efforts helped head coach Bill O'Brien's Nittany Lions to their third consecutive game overall and their 11th win in their last 12 regular season neutral site contests.

Ficken earned his second career honor after making field goals of 36, 35 and 46 yards in the win over Syracuse. His then-career-long 46-yard connection early in the fourth quarter gave the Nittany Lions a 16-10 lead. He made both of his PAT attempts and four of his six kickoffs were touchbacks.

At the time, his three makes pushed his consecutive field goal streak to 13 and joined Northwestern's Jeff Budzien as the only Big Ten kickers to make three field goals during the opening weekend of the season.

Hackenberg became the second true freshman quarterback to start a Penn State season opener since 1910 and directed the Nittany Lions to five scoring drives in the win over the Orange.

He was 22-of-31 for 278 yards, with a pair of 50-yard touchdown passes in the second half and two interceptions. His 278 yards were the third-highest total by a freshman quarterback in school history at the time (280 - Mills, 2001 vs. OSU and USM).

In the second half against the Orange, Hackenberg was 11 of 16 for 209 yards and two touchdowns to extend Penn State's 6-3 halftime lead to a 23-10 advantage early in the fourth quarter.

Hackenberg became the 27th different quarterback in school history to post a 200-yard passing game and completed his first six passing attempts, including a five-yard completion to running back Zach Zwinak on the Nittany Lions' first play from scrimmage.

HACKENBERG HAS SUCCESSFUL DEBUT AGAINST ORANGE

Quarterback Christian Hackenberg became just the third Penn State true freshman get the start under center in a season opener since 1910. He joined Rob Bolden, who started his first career game in 2010, as the first two true freshmen to take the opening snap of the year since 1910.

He captained 16 of the team's 17 offensive possessions and completed 22 of 31 passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns. His yardage total was the third highest for a Penn State freshman in school history at the time.

He connected with Allen Robinson and Geno Lewis for scoring strikes of 51 and 56 yards, respectively, while also throwing two interceptions.

Hackenberg completed his first six career passing attempts, including a five-yard catch by Zach Zwinak on the opening play of the game. The rookie also became the 27th different Penn State signal caller to post a 200-yard passing game.

DEFENSE HOLDS STRONG AGAINST SYRACUSE

One thing that fans knew heading into the season opener is that the Nittany Lions would be a stout defensive team and the experienced group showed why in the season opener vs. Syracuse.

John Butler's group flew around the field and created three turnovers (2 INT, 1 Fumble), amassed eight tackles-for-loss and broke up eight passes, holding the Orange to just 11 first downs and 260 yards of total offense.

The Lions limited Syracuse to 71 yards on 37 carries on the ground, a 1.9 yards per carry average, which was more than 100 yards under its season average of 178.0 yards per game in 2012.

Stephen Obeng-Agyapong made eight tackles in the game, forced and recovered a fumble and notched his first career interception and converted wide receiver Trevor Williams made his first career start at cornerback and grabbed a fourth quarter interception along the sideline to seal the victory.

DaQuan Jones had a team and career-high nine tackles, including a career-best three tackles-for-loss. With 3 tackles-for-loss vs. Syracuse, Jones surpassed his 2012 TFL total of two.

PENN STATE IN NFL VENUES

Penn State has played in eight current National Football League stadium after opening the season at MetLife Stadium, home of the NFL's New York Giants and New York Jets.

Penn State has played the in the current homes of the Miami Dolphins (Sun Life Stadium), Minnesota Vikings (Metrodome), New Orleans Saints (Mercedes-Benz Superdome), Philadelphia Eagles (Lincoln Financial Field), San Diego Chargers (Qualcomm Stadium), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (Raymond James Stadium) and Washington Redskins (FedEx Field). Penn State has played five of the above stadiums since the 2005 season.

In 2015, Penn State will take on Maryland at M&T Bank Stadium, home of the Super Bowl XLVII Champion Baltimore Ravens.

The first documented Penn State game in a professional stadium was in 1921 when the Nittany Lions defeated Georgia Tech, 28-7, in front of 30,000 fans at the Polo Grounds in Upper Manhattan, New York City.

LIONS CONTINUE TO HONOR PLAYERS WITH JERSEY NAMES IN 2013

In 2012, head coach Bill O'Brien felt that something needed to be done to honor those student-athletes who kept their promise to play for Penn State after the NCAA handed down sanctions on the program.

His plan; to place the names of each player on the back of their uniforms. It was something that had never been done in the 126-year history of the program, but was symbolic.

You stuck with us, so we're sticking your name on your uniform and the 2013 season will be no different, as O'Brien and his staff have decided to keep the names on the historically elegant uniforms.

PENN STATE IN 21ST BIG TEN SEASON

After 106 years as an independent in football, Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and is playing its 21st season in the conference. The Nittany Lions were Big Ten Champions in 1994, beating Oregon to win the 1995 Rose Bowl, and played USC in the 2009 Rose Bowl.

The Nittany Lions will begin Big Ten play at division foe Indiana on Oct. 5 and finish the regular season with a trip to Wisconsin (Nov. 30). Penn State will also play division rival Ohio State (Oct. 26) and Minnesota (Nov. 9) on the road.

The Lions will host Michigan (Oct. 12-Homecoming), Illinois (Nov. 2), Purdue (Nov. 16) and Nebraska (Nov. 23-Senior Day).

The Big Ten will move to East and West divisions in 2014 when Maryland and Rutgers join the conference.

EIGHT BOWL TEAMS ON 2013 SCHEDULE

The Nittany Lions will face eight teams that played in bowl games last year, with five games at home, two on the road and one at a neutral site.

Penn State will open the season at MetLife Stadium against Syracuse, which won the New Era Pinstripe Bowl over West Virginia in 2012.

Among the teams coming to Beaver Stadium this fall are 2012 bowl teams: UCF (Beef O'Brady's), Kent State (GoDaddy.com), Michigan (Outback), Purdue (Heart of Dallas) and Nebraska (Capital One).

Minnesota (Meineke Car Care) and Wisconsin (Rose) are among the road tests for the Nittany Lions, who also visit Ohio State and Indiana.

O'BRIEN TIES CONSECUTIVE WINS RECORD FOR FIRST-YEAR HEAD COACH

With a 38-14 win at Iowa last season, head coach Bill O'Brien became just the third Nittany Lion head coach to win five consecutive games in his first season at the helm.

O'Brien joined George Hoskins (1892) and Dick Harlow (1915) as the only first-year coaches to win a school record five consecutive games.

POSITION CHANGES

Several Nittany Lions have moved position since last season, including: Adrian Amos (CB to S), Jesse Della Valle (CB to S), Garry Gilliam (TE to T), Malik Golden (WR to Saf), Jake Kiley (CB to WR), Jordan Lucas (S to CB) and Trevor Williams (WR to S).

PENNSYLVANIANS ON STAFF

Penn State quarterbacks coach Charlie Fisher is a native of Allenwood, Pa., 70 miles east of State College, and attended Nittany Lion games in his youth. Secondary coach John Butler and Craig Fitzgerald attended LaSalle College High School in suburban Philadelphia at the same time, along with Keith Conlin, an All-Big Ten tackle for Penn State in 1995 and a starter for the Nittany Lions' 12-0 team in 1994.

ESPN'S ALL ACCESS: TRAINING DAYS HIGHLIGHTS NITTANY LION FOOTBALL

Fans got an inside look at the Penn State football team's preparations under Bill O'Brien through ESPN's All-Access: Penn State Training Days.

ESPN All-Access: Penn State Training Days showcased behind-the-scenes access to on- and off-field activities, team meetings and campus facilities. The segments introduced players and coaches as they completed pre-season training camp.

The program culminated with a one-hour ESPN special on Aug. 20. In addition, five Penn State vignettes were shown during College Football Live, SportsCenter and multiple on ESPN2 shows. A four-part series consisting of 30-minute specials aired on ESPNU from Aug. 21-23.

Penn State joined Alabama, Ohio State and Oklahoma as the college football programs featured on the ESPN All-Access: Training Days series since its 2010 debut.

**THIRTY-SEVEN LETTERWINNERS RETURNED**

Penn State returned 37 lettermen from last year's 8-4 squad - 19 on offense, 16 on defense and two specialists.

Of the 37 returning letterwinners, 25 have starting experience - 15 on offense, eight on defense and the starting placekicker and punter.

One returning letterman (No. 38) was lost for the season when defensive end Brad Bars ruptured his achilles tendon during an off-season workout.

Penn State returns 16 starters for this season - eight on offense, six on defense and both specialists.

Returning on offense are guard Miles Dieffenbach, tight end Jesse James, wide receiver Brandon Felder, wide receiver Allen Robinson, tackle Donovan Smith, guard John Urschel and running back Zach Zwinak. Tackle Garry Gilliam, who started eight games at tight end last year, also returns.

The defensive starters returning are safety Adrian Amos, defensive end Deion Barnes, linebacker Glenn Carson, defensive tackle DaQuan Jones, safety Stephen Obeng-Agyapong and safety Malcolm Willis.

Punter Alex Butterworth and placekicker Sam Ficken return to anchor the special teams units.

TIGHT ENDS HAVE MAJOR IMPACT; RANK 2ND NATIONALLY WITH 82 RECEPTIONS

Coach Bill O'Brien indicated before the 2012 season that the tight ends would play a vital role in the Penn State offense.

By the end of the season, the Penn State tight ends had combined to make 82 catches, which ranked second in the nation behind Stanford's 90 tight end catches. Among Big Ten teams, Michigan State was second with 37 receptions by its tight ends.

A tight end caught at least one touchdown pass in nine of the team's 12 games in 2012. Thirty-two percent of Penn State receptions were made by tight ends and 10 of the 24 receiving TDs were hauled in by tight ends this season.

Sophomore Kyle Carter ranked second on the team with 36 catches for 453 yards (12.6) and grabbed his first touchdown pass at Virginia. Carter re-set his career-high with 85 yards on six catches in the 38-14 win at Iowa to earn Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors. Carter was a consensus first-team Freshman All-American.

Carter was in range of the Penn State season record for tight end receptions of 41, set by Andrew Quarless in 2009, before being injured at Nebraska.

Senior Matt Lehman made a career-high five catches for 70 yards at Illinois, including a 21-yard touchdown pass. He was fourth on the team with 24 receptions for 296 yards, including five grabs of 20 yards or more and three touchdowns during his junior season.

Sophomore Jesse James had a career day at Iowa with three catches for 52 yards and a 31-yard touchdown grab to open the scoring. His true freshman season netted 15 catches for 276 yards (18.4) and five touchdown grabs.

BUTLER NAMED DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

John Butler enters his second season on the Penn State coaching staff after being promoted from secondary coach to defensive coordinator in January.

Butler, who will continue to coach the cornerbacks, coached the defensive backs and worked with the special teams in 2012. The Philadelphia native inherited a secondary that lost all four starters from the 2011 season and helped the 2012 squad rank second in the Big Ten and No. 16 nationally in scoring defense at 19.1 ppg.

MIDGET JOINS STAFF AS SAFETIES COACH

Anthony Midget joined the Penn State staff in February as the safeties coach after serving as defensive coordinator at Georgia State University in 2012.

Midget spent 2008-12 at Georgia State after starting his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, Virginia Tech.

A third-team All-American and first-team All-Big East selection at cornerback in 1999, Midget helped the Hokies to four consecutive bowl berths, capped by an appearance in the 1999 BCS National Championship game.

TRIO OF FIRST TEAM ALL-BIG TEN PERFORMERS HIGHLIGHT RETURNERS

Six Nittany Lions earned first-team All-Big Ten accolades in 2012 and three of the honorees return for this season.

Wide receiver Allen Robinson attained first-team All-Big Ten honors from the coaches and media and was the conference's Richter-Howard Receiver-of-the-Year.

Tight end Kyle Carter was named to the media first-team following his redshirt freshman season. Guard John Urschel was selected to the coaches' first-team and the media's second team.

In addition, defensive end Deion Barnes was the Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

A trio of 2012 Penn State seniors - defensive tackle Jordan Hill, linebacker Michael Mauti and center Matt Stankiewicz - also gained All-Big Ten first-team accolades and linebacker Gerald Hodges was on the second-team.

URSCHEL ON OUTLAND TROPHY AND ROTARY LOMBARDI AWARD WATCH LISTS

Senior John Urschel has been tabbed as a preseason candidate for both the Rotary Lombardi Award, given to the top down linemen and those defensive players who line up within five yards of the football, and the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top interior lineman.

The 2012 first-team All-Big Ten guard and first team CoSIDA Academic All-American, Urschel will lead the Nittany Lions' offensive line this fall. The 6-foot-3, 307-pound offensive guard is among the top returning offensive linemen in the Big Ten and helped pave the way for 1,000-yard running back Zach Zwinak and 3,000-yard passer Matt McGloin in 2012.

JONES ON OUTLAND TROPHY WATCH LIST

Senior DaQuan Jones is among the preseason candidates for the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top interior lineman.

A mainstay in the defensive line rotation during his career, Jones enjoyed his best season in the blue and white in 2012. He made 22 tackles, forced a fumble and registered two tackles for loss.

A strong physical presence in the middle of the defensive line, Jones adds his candidacy for the Outland Trophy to his preseason All-Big Ten selection from Phil Steele's College Football Magazine.

NUMEROUS NITTANY LIONS HAVE FAMILY TIES TO PENN STATE FOOTBALL

Six members on the 2012 squad have ties to current or former Nittany Lion football team players, coaches or staff:

- Freshman wide receiver Richy Anderson's father, Richie, played for the blue and white from 1991-92 and ranks 17th on the

- Freshman wide receiver **Gregg Garrity, Jr.** is the son of Greg Garrity, Sr. who was a wide receiver for the Nittany Lions from 1980-82. The elder Garrity made "The Catch" that helped the Nittany Lions win the 1983 National Championship.

- Redshirt junior linebacker **Mike Hull's** father, Tom, lettered for the Nittany Lions from 1971-73;

- Redshirt freshman **Jonathan Warner's** father, Curt, was a first-team All-America tailback in 1981 and '82, and was instrumental in the Nittany Lions winning their first National Championship in 1982. Curt Warner was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 2009;

- In addition, redshirt sophomore **Alex Kenney's** sister, Lauren, is a sophomore on the Penn State women's track and field team, placing fifth in the javelin at the 2013 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

NITTANY LION FOOTBALL TEAM POSTS RECORD 91 PERCENT NCAA GRADUATION RATE

The Penn State football team broke its program record for the second consecutive year with a Graduation Success Rate of 91 percent according to data released in October 2012 by the NCAA.

The Nittany Lions posted a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 91 percent, tied with Rutgers for the No. 7 graduation rate among all 120 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams. The national average was 68 percent. The

record 91 percent GSR figure was second-highest to Northwestern among all Big Ten gridiron teams.

The 2005-06 entering class for the Nittany Lion football team earned a record 93 percent graduation rate, which was No. 2 among Big Ten teams (Northwestern, 95%).

Penn State football student-athletes earned a four-year federal graduation rate of 84 percent, second in the Big Ten and No. 5 among all FBS teams.

The Nittany Lions posted a then-record 87 percent Graduation Success Rate in the NCAA's 2011 Graduation rates report.

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent compared to the 80 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2002-03 through 2005-06. The 88 percent figure was third to Northwestern (97) and Illinois (89) among Big Ten Conference institutions.

NEARLY 70 ACADEMIC ALL-BIG TEN HONOREES OVER PAST THREE YEARS

A total of 28 Penn State football student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors last fall for owning at least a 3.0 grade point average and being a letterwinner. A total of 208 Nittany Lions have earned Academic All-Big Ten on the gridiron honors since 1993, including 67 over the past three seasons.

NEARLY 50 FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 3.0 GPA IN SPRING SEMESTER

The Penn State football team produced another outstanding academic performance during the spring 2013 semester, with 46 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade-point average.

Among the 46 players with a 3.0 GPA, 37 will be returning for the 2013 season.

The 46 Nittany Lions with a 3.0 GPA during the spring semester is a significant increase from the 34 football student-athletes who earned a 3.0 during the 2012 spring semester. A total of 47 Nittany Lions earned a 3.0 GPA during the 2012 fall semester.

Five football student-athletes earned a perfect 4.0 GPA during the spring semester, three of whom are returning for the 2013 season: sophomore linebacker Ben Kline (Seven Valleys), freshman fullback Dom Salomone (Dillsburg) and 2012 first-team Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American® John Urschel (Williamsville, N.Y.). A pair of 2012 seniors, Frank Figueroa and Brian Irvin, also earned a 4.0 GPA in the spring.

Among the 46 high achieving Nittany Lions, 20 earned a 3.5 GPA or higher during the spring semester. A total of 12 Nittany Lions earned Dean's List recognition in the spring by earning at least a 3.5 GPA and passing the minimum 12 credits.

The superlative academic performance by Coach Bill O'Brien's squad brings to 34 the total number of Penn State football student-athletes with a cumulative 3.0 or higher GPA who are returning for the 2013 season.

A fifth-year senior this fall, Urschel posted a perfect 4.0 GPA in the spring for the eighth consecutive semester. A 2012 first-team All-Big Ten guard, he earned a master's degree in math in May and is working on a master's in math education. Urschel taught Math 041 to Penn State undergraduate students during the semester, in addition to his academic load and football responsibilities. Urschel will be a primary candidate for the National Football Foundation's William V. Campbell Trophy in the fall as college football's premier student-athlete.

In addition to Kline and Salomone, other returning Nittany Lions who made the Dean's List during the spring semester were: placekicker Sam Ficken (Valparaiso, Ind.), tackle Garry Gilliam (Carlisle), safety Ryan Keiser (Selinsgrove), center Wendy Laurent (Hamilton, N.J.), tight end Matt Lehman (Newport), defensive end Carl Nassib (Malvern), safety Stephen Obeng-Agyapong (Bronx, N.Y.) and running back Deron Thompson (Lititz).

A total of 13 Nittany Lion freshmen or newcomers during the 2012-13 academic year earned at least a 3.0 GPA during the spring, including: tight end Adam Breneman (Mechanicsburg), quarterback Tyler Ferguson (Bakersfield, Calif.), defensive tackle Brian



Gaia (Pasadena, Md.), running back Jack Haffner (State College), linebacker Nyeem Wartman (Philadelphia), Laurent and Salomone.

Bars and Kline joined Urschel and 2012 senior Pete Massaro on the 2012 CoSIDA Academic All-District® team. Massaro earned first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America® honors for the second time.

BIG TEN ANNOUNCES 2014 FOOTBALL SLATE

Penn State will welcome Maryland and Michigan State back to Beaver Stadium and play at Rutgers for the first time since 1955 next year.

During the 2014 season, the Big Ten will welcome a pair of the Nittany Lions' oldest rivals in Maryland and Rutgers, as they join Penn State, Indiana, Michigan, Michigan State and Ohio State in the Big Ten's East Division.

The Terrapins will visit Beaver Stadium on Nov. 1, 2014 for the first time since a Sept. 26, 1992 contest. Penn State and Maryland have met 37 times, with the first meeting in 1917 and the last contest in 1993 in College Park. From 1960-93, the Nittany Lions and Terrapins played every year except 1976, '81 and '83.

Coach Bill O'Brien's Nittany Lions also will host East Division foes Ohio State (Oct. 25) and Michigan State (Nov. 29) in 2014. Penn State and Ohio State have met 28 times, including every year since 1993. The Nittany Lions and Spartans will end the 2014 regular season against each other as they did from 1993-2010 in the battle for the Land Grant Trophy. Penn State also will host West Division foe Northwestern in the Big Ten home opener on Sept. 27.

Penn State will provide the opposition for the Scarlet Knights' first Big Ten game, on Sept. 13, 2014 in Piscataway, N.J. The clash also will be opening game of the Big Ten's 119th football season. The Nittany Lions have played Rutgers nine times in New Jersey, but the last six meetings came at Giants Stadium, most recently in 1995. Penn State has played at Rutgers in 1951, '53 and '55. The teams have met 24 times, with the first game in 1918 and the last meeting in 1995. From 1977-95, the Nittany Lions and Scarlet Knights played every season except in 1980 and '81.

The Nittany Lions also will visit East Division rivals Michigan (Oct. 11) and Indiana (Nov. 8), as well as West Division foe Illinois (Nov. 22) during the 2014 campaign.

Big Ten teams will play eight conference games from 2013-15, with a nine-game conference schedule starting in 2016. The Nittany Lions will play their six East Division rivals and three West Division teams that rotate starting in 2016. Penn State and all East Division teams will have five Big Ten home games in 2016 and in even-numbered years thereafter.

ROBINSON BECOMES SIXTH NITTANY LION INDUCTED INTO PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Former Penn State All-America end Dave Robinson became the sixth member of the Penn State Football family to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame earlier this year.

Robinson joined Jack Ham, Franco Harris, August Michalske, Lenny Moore and Mike Munchak as Penn Staters in the Hall of Fame.

From Mount Laurel, N.J., Robinson was a first-team All-American for the Nittany Lions in 1962 and a three-year letterwinner under Coach Rip Engle. He helped Penn State to a 24-8 record from 1960-62, including wins over Oregon in the 1960 Liberty Bowl and Georgia Tech in the 1961 Gator Bowl.

An offensive and defensive end, Robinson was the MVP of the 1962 Gator Bowl, despite the Nittany Lions falling to Florida, 17-7 to complete a 9-2 season. He was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame in 1996.

The Green Bay Packers and Coach Vince Lombardi selected Robinson in the first round of the 1963 NFL Draft (14th overall selection) and he played linebacker 12 years in the NFL. He played with the Packers from 1963-72 and the Washington Redskins in 1973-74.

Robinson was selected to the Pro Bowl three times (1966-67, 1969) and twice earned Associated Press first-team All-Pro honors (1967, 1969) during his career in Green Bay. Robinson was a starter on teams that won three consecutive NFL Championships (1965-67) and Super Bowls I and II. He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960s. He intercepted 27 passes in

his 12-season career.

Robinson is among 22 members of the Penn State football family who are enshrined into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (1997). He was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame in 1982.

15 FIRST TEAM ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS@ PAST SEVEN YEARS

The Nittany Lions continue to be at the head of the class when it comes to Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America® selections.

John Urschel and Pete Massaro both earned the distinction in 2012, with Massaro earning his second career selection.

All-America guard Stefen Wisniewski became the first Penn State football student-athlete to earn Academic All-America® three times, with first-team nods in 2009 and 2010.

Senior linebacker Chris Colasanti and Massaro also were first-team Academic All-Americans® in 2010.

Penn State has earned a nation's best 17 Academic All-Americans® over the past seven years, with 15 first team honorees. A program record five Nittany Lions were selected to the 2008 Academic All-America® team.

The Nittany Lions' 51 Academic All-Americans® all-time are No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

SAN DIEGO STATE ADDED TO 2015 SCHEDULE

The 2015 Penn State football schedule is near completion with the announcement that the Nittany Lions will host San Diego State on Sept. 26 in Beaver Stadium.

The two programs have never collided on the football field. Penn State has one non-conference game left to be scheduled to complete the 2015 schedule.

Penn State has a 4-0 record all-time against current Mountain West Conference members, having played Air Force (3-0) and Utah State (1-0). The last game against a current MWC member was in 1977, as the Nittany Lions beat Utah State in Beaver Stadium.

The Nittany Lions have met four programs from the state of California. Penn State has played against Cal, Stanford, UCLA and USC, compiling a 13-11 on-field overall mark and an 8-2 record at home.

LIONS AND HOKIES SCHEDULE FIRST MEETING ON GRIDIRON FOR 2022 SEASON

Penn State will visit Blacksburg on September 17, 2022 and Virginia Tech will travel to Beaver Stadium on Sept. 16, 2023.

Despite having campuses located less than 375 miles apart, Penn State and Virginia Tech have never met. The Nittany Lions have played Virginia (5-3), VMI (1-0) and William & Mary (4-0) from The Old Dominion, earning a cumulative 10-3 on-field record.

Virginia Tech AD Jim Weaver earned bachelor's (1967) and master's degrees (1968) from Penn State, playing center and linebacker for the Nittany Lions. A native of Harrisburg, Weaver began his coaching career with the Nittany Lions as a graduate assistant (1967-68) and was an assistant coach from 1969-72.

Virginia Tech will be the 13th Atlantic Coast Conference institution Penn State has played on the gridiron, with Duke the only other ACC team the Nittany Lions have not played. Penn State will open this season vs. Syracuse in the Orange's first game as an ACC member and played at Virginia last year.

Penn State has a 181-87-11 all-time on-field record vs. current ACC teams.

11th ANNUAL PENN STATE UPLIFTING ATHLETES "LIFT FOR LIFE" HITS RECORD \$130,000 TO BENEFIT KIDNEY CANCER ASSOCIATION

The 11th Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift For Life" was a tremendous success on Friday, raising the 2013 total to a record total in excess of \$130,000 to benefit the Kidney Cancer Association.

More than 100 members of Coach Bill O'Brien's squad participated in Friday's event, breaking their record for the fifth consecutive year, besting the 2012 total of \$119,701 for the Kidney Cancer Association.

With the \$133,506 in contributions from this year,

more than \$825,000 has been raised in the battle against rare diseases by Penn State Uplifting Athletes since the inaugural Lift For Life was held in 2003. The inaugural event raised just under \$13,000. The last three Lift For Life events have all raised in excess of \$100,000.

"Lift For Life has become a great tradition where Penn State Football and our fans are able to raise more than \$100,000 annually for kidney cancer patients and research," said fifth-year senior tackle Eric Shrive (West Scranton), president of Penn State's Uplifting Athletes Chapter. "I couldn't be prouder to be a part of such a great tradition."

During Shrive's Penn State career, he has personally raised more than \$112,000 for Lift For Life, including in excess of \$42,000 for the 2013 event. He was selected the 2013 Uplifting Athletes' Rare Disease Champion earlier this year.

The Penn State Lift For Life was held outdoors at the Penn State Lacrosse Field for the second consecutive year. The defense posted a 220-152 victory over the offense during the five strength and conditioning competitions, winning two of the three tug-of-war battles to conclude the event. The competitions included an obstacle course, sand bag stack (100-lb. sand bags), sled pull and push, keg carry (150 pounds of sand) and the tug of war.

The offense won the 2012 Lift For Life, 176-136, over the defense.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved eight new therapies for the treatment of kidney cancer in the U.S. since the first Lift For Life in 2003. The Kidney Cancer Association has credited the Penn State Lift For Life as being a catalyst for the new treatments, according to Scott Shirley, Uplifting Athletes Executive Director.

Founded by Penn State Football teammates Scott Shirley, Dave Costlow and Damone Jones in 2003, Lift For Life has continued to build awareness and raise funds for the Kidney Cancer Association. The event is organized by Penn State Football Uplifting Athletes, whose members are on the Penn State football team, led this year by Shrive (Scranton), president of the chapter. Joining Shrive as Uplifting Athlete officers are: vice president - senior tackle Adam Gress (West Mifflin, Pa.); head of operations - senior center Ty Howle (Wake Forest, N.C.); secretary - sophomore cornerback Da'Quan Davis (Baltimore) and fundraising chairman - freshman tight end Adam Breneman (Camp Hill).

Penn State owns an on field record of 50-42-4 against the Panthers, but the two teams have not met since 2000.

Blue-White Weekend presented by AAA has become the university's unofficial annual spring reunion. The game has drawn more than 50,000 fans in five of the past seven years, which included three consecutive crowds above 70,000.

PENN STATE STUDENTS AGAIN SELL OUT 21,000 SEASON FOOTBALL SEATS

The anticipation for the 2013 Nittany Lion football season continues to build, with Penn State students purchasing more than 21,000 season tickets to again sellout the student section at Beaver Stadium.

Penn State's proud and enthusiastic student section in Beaver Stadium is the nation's second-largest full season student ticket section of any school, for any sport. ESPN's College Gameday and ESPN The Magazine ("The Nation's No. 1 Student section") are among the national media accolades for the Nittany Lions' loud and impactful student section.

BIG TEN NETWORK TO AIR MULTIPLE PENN STATE GAMES AMONG ITS 40-PLUS FOOTBALL GAMES THIS SEASON

BTN will air 40-plus football games this season, with each school making a minimum of two appearances, including at least one conference game.

BTN has televised four Nittany Lion games in 2013.

The Big Ten Network is available to more than 90 million homes across the United States and Canada, and has agreements with more than 300 affiliates.

The network, though, is not carried by Adams and Blue Ridge cable in Pennsylvania. The network also is not available to Armstrong Cable customers in western Pennsylvania and in the Medina and Youngstown, Ohio areas. A combined total of more than 35,000 Penn State alumni live in communities served by the three cable providers, in addition to thousands more fans and current Penn State students.

The Big Ten Network will televise approximately 800 events in 2013-14, all in HD, including 40-45 football games, at least 110 men's basketball games, at least 55 women's basketball games, Olympic sport events and conference championships.

The Big Ten Network is available in more than 95 percent of the homes in the nine Big Ten states.

4 - ADRIAN AMOS, S

Has started all 11 games in 2013 and has made 24 straight starts. Made three tackles and had a pass breakup vs. Syracuse. Recorded four tackles in the home opener against Eastern Michigan. Made three tackles vs. UCF and added one tackle against Kent State. Grabbed his first interception of the season, fourth of his career, in the third quarter at Indiana, leading to a Penn State field goal. Also recorded one tackle and a pass breakup vs. the Hoosiers. 18 - DEION BARNES, DE

Was a pre-season candidate for Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy. Has started nine of the team's 11 games in 2013 and has 17 career starts. Made one tackle, batted down a pass and posted a pair of quarterback hurries in the win over Syracuse. Notched two tackles against Eastern Michigan and UCF. Tied his career-high, which he set at Nebraska in 2012, with six tackles vs. Kent State, adding one-half sack and one TFL in the 34-0 victory. Logged one tackle at Indiana. 1 - BILL BELTON, RB

Is eighth in the Big Ten in rushing yards per game with an average of 79.6 ypg; eighth in Big Ten games only at 90.5 ypg. Against Minnesota, became the 41st Nittany Lion to record 1,000 career rushing yards. Strong performance against Eastern Michigan, rushing for a then-career-high 108 yards on nine attempts and notching a pair of touchdowns. His 51-yard touchdown run was team's longest since Evan Royster's 69-yard run at Northwestern in 2009. Combined with Akeel Lynch (108 yds) to become the 32nd running back combo to rush for 100 yards in the same game and the first since 2010 vs. Northwestern

(Royster/Redd). Had six rushes for 22 yards and three kickoff returns for 66 yards against Syracuse, including a long of 26 yards in the third quarter. Had five rushes for 36 yards against UCF, including a long of 16 yards in the second quarter. Carried the ball 13 times for 90 yards (6.9 avg) against Kent State, including long of 28 yards in the second quarter that set up Penn State's second touchdown of the game. Also made a 15-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter against Kent State. Recorded three catches for 24 yards and one touchdown in the Big Ten opener at Indiana. Also rushed for 31 yards on 10 carries against the Hoosiers. Earned ESPN.com Big Ten Helmet Sticker in four overtime win over No. 18 Michigan. Carried the ball a then career-high 27 times for 85 yards and scored the game winning touchdown from two-yards out in the fourth overtime against the Wolverines. Had 50 yards rushing after third quarter and caught three passes for 26 yards. Recorded 22 carries for 98 yards at No. 4 Ohio State, the most rushing yards allowed by the Buckeyes this season. In his first start of the season, also caught one pass for nine yards versus Ohio State. Became the first Nittany Lion to rush for 200 yards since Larry Johnson vs. Michigan State in 2002, gaining a career-high 201 yards on 36 carries with a five-yard touchdown against Illinois. Averaged 5.6 yards per carry and recorded a long of 16 yards on the opening drive. Had 209 yards of all-purpose yards vs. Illinois, adding one reception for eight yards to his rushing total. Became the 15th different Nittany Lion to rush for at least 200 yards in a game. Carried the ball seven times for 47 yards, including a long of 19 yards in the fourth quarter vs. Minnesota. Also had a career-high 41 receiving yards on two catches. Made a career-long 30-yard catch in the fourth quarter vs. the Gophers. Carried the ball 19 times for 81 yards, with a five-yard touchdown to open the scoring in the 45-21 win over Purdue. Did not play against Nebraska due to slight shoulder injury and illness.

81 - ADAM BRENEMAN, TE

Has appeared in nine games this season, making three starts. Posted his first career catch, a two-yard reception, in the first quarter vs. UCF. Made four catches for 22 yards against the Knights. Grabbed his lone reception of the game in the fourth quarter vs. Kent State, a 27-yard catch and run on 3rd-and-2, that kept the drive alive for a Zach Zwinak touchdown run. Caught two passes for eight yards against Illinois. Totaled a season-high 27 yards on two catches at Minnesota. Made his first career touchdown catch, good for eight yards, in the second quarter in the win over Purdue. Also caught a 14-yard pass in the third quarter against the Boilermakers. Notched his second career touchdown catch against Nebraska, grabbing a two-yard pass for the first touchdown of the game.

45 - ALEX BUTTERWORTH, P

Has handled all of the punting duties since the start of the 2012 season. Punted six times for 231 yards in the season opener vs. Syracuse for an average of 38.5 yards. Accumulated 207 yards on five punts for an average of 41.4 yards per punt vs. Eastern Michigan. Pinned UCF inside the 20 on both punts of the evening. Punted four times for a total of 156 yards, averaging 39.0 yards per attempt in the 34-0 win over Kent State. Boomed four punts a total of 181 yards at Indiana, with a 52 yarder that narrowly missed pinning the Hoosiers at their own one yard line. His 45.2 yards per

punt average at Indiana is his best single-game average this season. Booted four punts for 44.8 yard average, including a career-long 66 yarder, in four overtime win over No. 18 Michigan. Punted six times for an average of 37.0 per attempt at No. 4 Ohio State, pinning the Buckeyes inside their own 20 yard line twice. Dropped two of his three punts inside the 20 in the victory over Illinois. Punted three times for a total of 109 yards at Minnesota for an average of 36.3 yards per punt, pinning the Golden Gophers inside their own five yard line twice. Did not punt in the win over Purdue, as the Nittany Lions did not punt in a game for the first time since at least 1980. Had 10 punts for a total of 391 yards against Nebraska. Six of his 10 punts pinned the Cornhuskers inside their own 20 – including two inside the 10-yard-line. Had the first punt of his career blocked by the Huskers, but the play did not result in any points.

40 - GLENN CARSON, LB

A pre-season candidate for the Butkus Award. Has started 23 consecutive games at middle linebacker and has a team-high 35 starts in his career. Leads the team and ranks 12th in the conference with 7.7 tackles per game. Has 256 career tackles, needing just two hits to move in Penn State career Top 10. Tallied six tackles, one tackle-for-loss and tied for team-high with two pass breakups, including one on a third down late in the fourth quarter vs. Syracuse, to help preserve a six-point PSU lead. Produced his first double digit tackle performance of the season and fifth of his career with 10 stops vs. Eastern Michigan. The 10 tackles against the Eagles were a game high and included 0.5 sack. His six tackles vs. UCF tied for the team-high. Produced a team-high seven tackles in the 34-0 shutout win over Kent State, two of which were tackles for loss. Notched his second 10-tackle effort of the season at Indiana, nine of which were solo, to share the team lead. Tipped a pass that was intercepted by Adrian Amos to set-up a score vs. the Hoosiers. Collected 10 tackles for the second consecutive game against No. 18 Michigan. Also recorded 0.5 sack in the 4 OT victory over the Wolverines. Added six tackles, four of which were solo, at No. 4 Ohio State. Made 11 tackles, including seven solo stops, in the win over Illinois. Teamed with Mike Hull to defend a pass on fourth-and-one from PSU 4 early in the fourth quarter. Recorded six tackles, including five solo stops, at Minnesota. Made three tackles in the 45-21 win over Purdue. Posted a game-high 10 tackles – seven of which were solo stops – vs. Nebraska in the final home game of his career and added a pass breakup to complete his performance. The double-digit tackle performance was his fifth of the season and ninth of his career.

87 - KYLE CARTER, TE

Named a Mid-season candidate for the John Mackey Award, after being the only freshman on the award's Mid-season watch list in 2012. Has started four games this season and has six career starts. Made the start, but was limited against Syracuse due to a slight arm injury. Made two catches in the home-opener against Eastern Michigan, gaining 16 yards. Recorded two catches for 23 yards against UCF, including a long of 15 yards in the second quarter. Had one catch for 29 yards in the first quarter against Kent State that set up PSU's first touchdown of the game. Tied his career-high with six catches for a season-high 79 yards at Indiana; including a 26-yard catch to set-up a score. Hauled in a pair of catches for 24



yards against No. 18 Michigan - including a long of 14 yards that setup a fourth-and-one, which Penn State converted on its way to a field goal that drew them within 34-27, in the fourth quarter. Caught the game-winning touchdown pass vs. Illinois, a 15-yarder from Christian Hackenberg in overtime, for his only reception of the game. Made one catch for eight yards vs. Minnesota. Made two catches for 25 yards vs. Nebraska, including a long of 22 yards in the third quarter.

39 - JESSE DELLA VALLE, CB

Ranks fourth in the Big Ten and 31st nationally in punt return average at 9.2 yards per punt return. Had three punt returns for 44 yards vs. Syracuse, including a career-long 31 yard return in the third quarter to set up Penn State's second touchdown. Averaged 10.5 yards on two punt returns for 21 total yards vs. Eastern Michigan. Produced one punt return of 15 yards and added three tackles against UCF. Returned one punt for nine yards against Kent State. Returned one punt for three yards at Indiana and added two special teams tackles. Had three punt returns for 26 yards, including a 12-yard return on his first opportunity. Made his first career start at No. 4 Ohio State and recorded a career-high nine tackles (four solo), tied for second on the team. Started at safety and made five tackles, four solo, in the victory over Illinois, with one pass breakup. Returned three punts for 27 yards vs. Nebraska in the home finale, including a long of 25 yards to set up the team's first touchdown of the game. Made two solo tackles and recovered a fumble for a touchback on third and goal from the PSU three-yard line in the second quarter against Nebraska for his first career fumble recovery. Was a candidate for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, entering the fall semester with a 3.39 GPA.

65 - MILES DIEFFENBACH, G

Has started all 11 games this season and has 22 career starts. Was instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions gain 574 yards of total offense against Eastern Michigan, their most since 2008 vs. Coastal Carolina (594 yds). Helped pave the way for a 287-yard rushing effort vs. Kent State, which is the most rushing yards in a game since gaining 338 yards at Illinois in 2009. Helped protect Christian Hackenberg at Indiana, allowing him to complete 30 passes for 340 yards and three touchdowns vs. the Hoosiers. 85 - BRANDON FELDER, WR

Has started six games at wide receiver in 2013 and has 18 career starts. Had made at least one catch in 16 straight games before not registering a catch at Minnesota - the streak ran from Sept. 15, 2012 to Nov. 2, 2012. Tied his career-high with six catches for 40 yards against Syracuse in the season opener. Tied his career-high for the second straight game with six catches for 56 yards against Eastern Michigan, including a long of 16 yards in the second quarter. Had one catch for four yards against UCF. Made three catches for 35 yards against Kent State, including a long of 17 yards in the second quarter. Missed the Indiana game due to injury (ankle). Hauled in a career-best two touchdown passes and tied his career-high with six catches for 97 yards in the four overtime win over No. 18 Michigan. Caught a 12-yard touchdown pass for the opening score of the game. Gave Penn State a 21-10 halftime lead with a 24-yard touchdown catch. Made a leaping 29-yard catch between two defenders on the second play of the game-tying final minute TD drive, at the Michigan 37-yard line. Made four catches for 42 yards and a touchdown at No. 4 Ohio State. Opened the scoring for Penn State in the second quarter, catching a 12-yard TD pass from Christian Hackenberg vs. the Buckeyes. Caught one pass for 19 yards in the third quarter of the OT win vs. Illinois. Did not have any receptions against Minnesota or Purdue. Made one catch for 19 yards vs. Nebraska.

5 - TYLER FERGUSON, QB

Enrolled at Penn State in January. Made his Nittany Lion debut against Syracuse, completing his only pass attempt for 18 yards to Matt Zanellato. Went 2-of-2 for 12 yards in the win over Eastern Michigan. Attempted one pass against Kent State. Completed a career-best 7-of-11 passes for 125 yards and threw his first career touchdown pass at No. 4 Ohio State. Connected with Allen Robinson on a 65-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter, which is the longest play from scrimmage this season for Penn State.

97 - SAM FICKEN, PK

Owens the Penn State record for consecutive field goals made, with 15 straight converted attempts, a streak which started on Oct. 27, 2012 vs. Ohio State and ended on Sept. 14, 2013 vs. UCF. Kicked the longest field goal by a Penn State player in home game history with his 54-yard conversion vs. Kent State, which was the longest Penn State field goal in 34 years and is tied for fourth all-time at Penn State. Ranks fourth in the Big Ten and tied for 33rd in the NCAA in field goals made per game (1.3), and is fourth in the conference with 14 field goals made. Has the longest field goal make of the season in the Big Ten at 54 yards, which is tied for sixth in the NCAA this season. Also ranks tied for seventh in scoring in the Big Ten with 7.2 points per game, a mark which is tied for fourth among Big Ten kickers. Earned Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week for the second time in his career after connecting on all three field goals and both extra points in the win over Syracuse. Made a then career-long field goal of 46 yards in the fourth quarter vs. the Orange. Converted his 14th consecutive field goal late in the second quarter (39 yards) vs. Eastern Michigan, breaking the Penn State record he previously held with Craig Fayak (1992). Extended his Penn State record of consecutive field goals made to 15 by booting a career-long 47 yarder in the second quarter vs. UCF. Streak

ended when 57-yard attempt was just short near end of first half vs. UCF. Booted a career-long 54-yard field goal in the fourth quarter of Penn State's win over Kent State. Went a perfect 2-of-2 on field goal attempts vs. Kent State including the 54-yarder. Converted a 30-yard field goal and three extra points at Indiana, going one-for-two on field goal attempts. Posted four touchbacks on five kickoff attempts in the game. Connected on field goals of 45, 43 and 36 yards against No. 18 Michigan, going 3-for-5 overall, and made all four extra point attempts. Converted both extra points attempts at No. 4 Ohio State, but did not have any field goal attempts. Had an 11-game streak of kicking at least one field goal snapped at Ohio State. Kicked the game-tying field goal from 35 yards out with 41 seconds left in regulation in the overtime win over Illinois, while also converting all three of his extra point opportunities. Connected on a 27-yard field goal and his lone extra point opportunity at Minnesota. Kicked a 29-yard field goal and converted all six of his extra point attempts in the win over Purdue. Made two extra points in the home finale vs. Nebraska. Has 18 touchbacks on 61 kickoffs, averaging 61.6 yards per kickoff. Was a candidate for CoSIDA Academic All-District, entering the fall semester with a 3.62 GPA in finance.

77 - GARRY GILLIAM, T

Was awarded a sixth year of eligibility by the NCAA after suffering a serious knee injury during the 2010 season. Moved from tight end to offensive tackle during spring practice. Added approximately 30 pounds to his 6-foot-6 frame during off-season workouts. After missing most of the spring with a calf injury, he earned the start at right tackle in the first two games this season and has started four games overall this season. 14 - CHRISTIAN HACKENBERG, QB

Became just the second true freshman to start a Penn State season-opener at quarterback since 1911. Has started all 11 games, earning four Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors, double the next closest honoree. At Mid-season, named nation's No. 2 freshman by ESPN.com and Big Ten's top freshman by ESPN.com and BTN.com. Has broken one Penn State overall passing record and seven school freshman game or season records in the first 11 games. Is fifth in the PSU single-season passing yards chart with 2,616 passing yards this season. Is tied for 10th on the Penn State career 200-yard passing games ledger with eight in his freshman season alone. Has completed 11 passes of 40-yards or longer (eight to Allen Robinson), which is tied for 14th in the NCAA. Ranks second in the Big Ten in completions (210) and passing average (237.8 ypg), fourth in total offense (231.3) and tied for sixth in touchdown passes (16). Ranks second in the Big Ten and 32nd nationally with 2,616 passing yards. Earned Big Ten Freshman of the Week after completing 22-of-31 passes for 278 yards, adding two touchdowns and two interceptions against Syracuse. His 278 passing yards were the third-highest, at the time, by a Penn State freshman signal caller in school history. He threw two 50-plus yard touchdowns, including his first career touchdown pass to Allen Robinson (51 yds) in the third quarter. Also fired 54-yard TD strike to Eugene Lewis in the fourth quarter vs. the Orange. Broke Zack Mills' Penn State freshman single-game passing record (280 yds; vs. OSU & USM) in the win over Eastern Michigan, going 23-of-33 for 311 yards with one touchdown and one interception. His longest completion against the Eagles was a 45-yard touchdown pass to Allen Robinson in the fourth quarter. Also connected with Robinson on a 43-yarder that set up Lions' first touchdown of the game. Named Big Ten Freshman of the Week for the second time after completing 21-of-28 passes for 262 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions against UCF. His longest completion against the Knights was a 46-yard pass to Robinson in the third quarter that set up the Lions second touchdown of the game. He threw a 5-yard TD pass to Robinson and they also connected on a 44-yard pass play. Completed 13-of-35 passes for 176 yards with

one touchdown and one interception against Kent State. His longest completion against the Golden Flashes was a 29-yard pass to Kyle Carter in the first quarter that set up the first Nittany Lion touchdown. Connected with Bill Belton on a 15-yarder for PSU's first touchdown of the contest. Also found Adam Breneman with a 27-yard completion on 3rd-and-2 in the fourth quarter against the Golden Flashes. Completed a career-high 30 passes and broke the school record with 55 attempts at Indiana. Broke Kerry Collins' single game passing attempts record of 54 set in 1992 at BYU against the Hoosiers. His 30 completions rank third in a single game at PSU and he threw for a career-best 340 yards and three touchdowns at Indiana. His 300-plus yard effort vs. the Hoosiers made him just the fourth player in school history to accumulate multiple 300-yard passing games. Threw a 46-yard touchdown pass to Allen Robinson in the second quarter. He also connected with Robinson for a 26-yard touchdown pass and found Kyle Carter with passes of 23 and 26 yards at Indiana. Posted his third 300-yard passing game with 305 yards on 23-of-44 passing and tied his career-high with three touchdown passes in four OT win over No. 18 Michigan. Named National Freshman of the Week by Athlon Sports and Big Ten Freshman of the Week for third time. Also won the Capital One Cup Performance of the Week vs. Michigan. Connected with Felder on scoring passes of 12 and 24 yards, while hitting Jesse James with a 20-yard scoring grab for 21-10 halftime lead. Led the team on a game-tying, 80-yard scoring drive with 50 seconds left in the fourth quarter and no timeouts. Completed a 14 yard pass to Robinson, followed by a 29-yard strike to Felder and a 36-yard leaping grab by Robinson at the Michigan one yard line, before he dove into the end zone for his first career rushing score. Hackenberg's one-yard TD run with :27 left in regulation tied the game at 34-34 and was the first rushing TD allowed by Michigan this season. Went 12-of-23 with one touchdown and two interceptions at No. 4 Ohio State. Connected with Brandon Felder on a 12-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter against the Buckeyes for the Lions' first touchdown of the game. Left the game in the third quarter with slight shoulder injury. Completed 20-of-32 passes with one passing touchdown in the OT win over Illinois to earn Athlon Sports' Big Ten Freshman of the Week. Posted his eighth completion of 40 yards or longer, a 47-yarder to Robinson in the first quarter, and connected with Kyle Carter on the game-winning, 15-yard touchdown pass in overtime. Also had a nine-yard touchdown run in the second quarter vs. the Illini. Broke Penn State freshman record with his sixth 200-yard passing game against Illinois; breaking a tie with Zack Mills (2001). Completed 14-of-25 passes for 163 yards at Minnesota, on a day with winds gusting to 31 mph. Connected with Bill Belton on a 30-yard pass in the fourth quarter vs. the Gophers. Completed 16-of-23 passes with one touchdown and one interception in the 45-21 win over Purdue to earn Athlon Sports' Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors for a fourth time. Capped the scoring vs. Purdue with a four-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. Connected with Adam Breneman on an eight-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter. Also completed a season-long 58-yard pass to Jesse James in the third quarter vs. the Boilermakers. Completed 16-of-33 passes, including two passes of 40 yards or more, with two touchdowns and one interception vs. Nebraska. Connected with Adam Breneman

on a two-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter and Jesse James on a 46-yard touchdown pass at the beginning of the fourth quarter. Completed a 43-yard pass to Allen Robinson in the third quarter as well. Also delivered a seven-yard touchdown run in the third quarter for a 13-7 lead en route to earning his fourth Big Ten Freshman of the Week honor.

60 - TY HOWLE, C

Has started all 11 games at center in 2013 and 12 career games. Was instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions gain 574 yards of total offense against Eastern Michigan, their most since gaining 594 yards vs. Coastal Carolina in 2008. After serving as the long snapper on all placements the past three seasons, Howle garnered his second career start, first at center, in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Helped pave the way for a 287 yard rushing effort vs. Kent State, which is the most rushing yards in a game since running for 338 yards at Illinois in 2009. Helped protect Christian Hackenberg at Indiana, allowing him to complete 30 passes for 340 yards and three touchdowns vs. the Hoosiers. Helped pave the way for 390 yards of total offense and five total touchdowns in four OT win over Michigan, including the first two rushing touchdowns allowed by the Wolverines in 2013. Ranks third in the conference with 9.4 tackles per game in Big Ten play and is ninth overall with 7.9 tackles per game. Has made at least nine tackles in 6-of-7 Big Ten games this season. Has played in nine games with eight starts this season, missing the Eastern Michigan and Kent State games and seeing limited time vs. UCF due to injury (knee). Made his second career start in the season opener vs. Syracuse and made one tackle. Suffered a first half knee injury that knocked him out of most of the game vs. the Orange. Posted four tackles, including three solo stops, against UCF. Posted a then season-high 10 tackles at Indiana, one shy of his career-high. Recorded 0.5 sack against the Hoosiers, his first of the season. Posted his second straight 10-tackle effort in the four OT win over No. 18 Michigan. Recorded two tackles for loss on Wolverines' final drive of regulation, forcing a punt. Had a huge pass break-up in the end zone in the second OT to help keep UM to a field goal. Tied for second on the team in tackles at No. 4 Ohio State with nine stops. Made a career-high 13 tackles to lead the team and all Big Ten players on Nov. 2 in the victory over Illinois. Broke-up a pass on fourth-and-one from PSU 4 early in the fourth quarter. Led the team with nine tackles, including



seven solo, and added 1.0 TFL on the first play of the second half at Minnesota. Posted six tackles, one TFL, forced and recovered a fumble in the 45-21 win over Purdue. Also forced and recovered a fumble against the Boilermakers. Recorded nine tackles – including four solo stops – vs. Nebraska, which included a tackle on 1st and goal on a fourth quarter goal line stand. Was a candidate for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, entering the fall semester with a 3.43 GPA in finance.

18 - JESSE JAMES, TE

Has started all 11 games at tight end this season and has 17 career starts. Made two catches for 10 yards in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Made two catches for 46 yards against Eastern Michigan, including a season long of 27 yards in the second quarter. Had two catches for 30 yards against UCF, including a long of 17 yards in the fourth quarter that set up the Lions' final touchdown of the game. Recorded three catches for 20 yards against Kent State, including a long of 11 yards in the second quarter. Made a career-best six catches and grabbed his first touchdown of the season, a 20-yard reception, in the four OT win over No. 18 Michigan. He gained a season-high 67 yards against the Wolverines. Made a seven-yard catch in the win over Illinois. Had one catch for nine yards at Minnesota. Made two catches for 64 yards in the 45-21 win over Purdue, including a career-long 58-yard catch and run in the third quarter. Made three catches for 56 yards against Nebraska, including a career-long 46-yard touchdown catch in the fourth quarter to give Penn State a 20-17 lead.

99 - AUSTIN JOHNSON, DT

Has appeared in all 11 games this season and made his first career start vs. Kent State. Made a career-high six tackles and netted his first career 0.5 sack and TFL against Eastern Michigan. Recorded three tackles, two of which were solo, vs. UCF and made three tackles at Indiana. Had two tackles, including 1.0 TFL, in the four OT win over No. 18 Michigan. Recorded a tackle at Ohio State. Made his second start and posted two tackles, both solo, in the win over Illinois. Posted three solo stops, including 1.0 TFL at Minnesota. Recorded two tackles, including 0.5 sack, while also recovering his first career fumble in the 45-21 win over Purdue.

91 - DAQUAN JONES, DT

Was a candidate for the Outland Trophy. At Mid-season, named first-team All-Big Ten by ESPN.com and BTN.com. Ranks ninth in the Big Ten with 11.5 TFL and is the only defensive lineman ranked in tackles per game (5.1) in the Big Ten. Has started every game in 2013 and has 22 career starts. Logged a career-high nine tackles in the first two contests vs. Syracuse and Eastern Michigan. Added three TFL and one sack in the season opener vs. Syracuse. His three TFL surpassed his season total from 2012 (2.0 TFL in 12 games). Recorded one sack and two TFL against Eastern Michigan. Entered 2012 with 1.5 sacks and 4.0 TFL in his career and surpassed those totals in the first two games of the 2013 season. Made five tackles vs. UCF. His two tackles vs. Kent State give him 25 tackles on the season, besting his season total of 22 from 2012. Posted five tackles at Indiana, including three solo stops, with 1.0 TFL. Tied his career-high for the third time against No. 18 Michigan with nine tackles (five solo) and added 2.0 tackles for loss and his second career fumble recovery in the four

OT win. Recorded one tackle in the victory over Illinois, which was a TFL for a loss of four yards. Made five tackles, including four solo and 1.0 TFL at Minnesota. Posted three tackles, including 1.0 sack for minus-five yards in the win over Purdue. Helped hold the Boilermakers to 41 rushing yards on 20 carries. Posted seven tackles, including a tackle on 1st and goal on a fourth quarter goal line stand, in his final home game vs. Nebraska.

23 - RYAN KEISER, S

Made two tackles vs. Syracuse and against Eastern Michigan. Also had a five-yard rush on a fake field goal to pick up a first down that led to the Lions first field goal of the game in the win over Syracuse. Produced two tackles and broke up a pass against UCF. Had top career game vs. Kent State, recording the first interception and sack of his career, logging a career-high three pass breakups and four tackles. Suffered a hand injury vs. Kent State. Did not play at Indiana due to injury. Returned from injury to make his first career start against No. 18 Michigan and tallied two tackles. Posted a pair of two tackles at No. 4 Ohio State. Has handled the holding responsibilities on placements during the 2012 and the early part of 2013. Cemented the win over Illinois by hauling in the game-ending interception in the end zone to give the team a 24-17 win, which was the No. 6 play on the SportsCenter Top 10 for Nov. 2. The interception was his second of the season and he added a solo tackle for loss in the win. Made a career-high seven tackles, including six solo, during a start at Minnesota. Matched his career high in tackles with seven, ranking second on the team, in the 45-21 victory over Purdue. Recorded four tackles, including three solo, and added one pass breakup vs. Nebraska.

38 - BEN KLINE, LB

Earned his second consecutive Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-District® selection and is a candidate for the Academic All-America® team. Made two tackles with 0.5 TFL against Syracuse in the season opener. Did not play in the Eastern Michigan game but returned to action vs. UCF. Recorded two tackles in the shutout victory over Kent State. Posted his first career sack as a part of a two tackle effort at No. 4 Ohio State. In his first career start, had a breakout game in the win over Illinois, posting a career-high eight tackles. Made four tackles in a start at Minnesota but was injured on the second play of the game and will miss the final three games of the season due to injury (chest). Is a candidate for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, entering the fall semester with a 3.90 GPA in finance.

84 - MATT LEHMAN, TE

Made two catches, including a 16-yard reception, before leaving the season opener with Syracuse due to injury. Will miss the remainder of the season due to a serious knee injury that occurred on a non-contact play.

22 - AKEEL LYNCH, RB

In his first career game carrying the ball from scrimmage, Lynch tallied a then-career-high 108 yards rushing on a team-high 13 carries in the win over Eastern Michigan. He found the end zone in the fourth quarter, an 18-yard rush off the right side for his first career score. Combined with Bill Belton (108 yds) to become the 32nd running back combo to rush for 100 yards in the same game and the first since 2010 vs. Northwestern (Royster/Redd). Had five carries for 32 yards

against UCF, including a long of 13 yards in the second quarter. Became the 49th player in school history with multiple 100-yard rushing games when he ran for a career-high 123 yards on 14 carries in the victory over Kent State. Registered a career-long carry of 43 yards in the third quarter against the Golden Flashes. Ran for seven yards on three carries in the Big Ten opener at Indiana. Gained 35 yards on 11 carries at No. 4 Ohio State. Suffered a minor knee injury against the Buckeyes and did not play vs. Illinois or Minnesota. Carried the ball nine times for 44 yards in the win over Purdue, including a long of nine yards in the second quarter. Had five carries for nine yards against Nebraska.

9 - JORDAN LUCAS, CB

Has started all 11 games at cornerback in 2013. Is tied for eighth in the Big Ten with two forced fumbles and ranks tied for fourth in passes defended per game (1.36). Made his first career start in the win over Syracuse. Logged three tackles, 0.5 TFL and tied for team-high with two pass breakups vs. Orange. Collected three tackles, including a TFL, against Eastern Michigan. Forced his first career fumble and notched a then-career-best six stops, including one TFL, against UCF. Led the team with four pass breakups against Kent State, while also adding three tackles and a 0.5 sack. Posted a then career-high nine tackles against Indiana, including six solo stops, adding 0.5 sack and one pass breakup. Logged 1.5 TFL vs. the Hoosiers, giving him at least 0.5 TFL in every game this season. Grabbed his first career interception in the first quarter vs. No. 18 Michigan, returning it 14 yards to the UM 14-yard line to set up the first touchdown of the game for Penn State. Recorded four tackles in the four OT win over the Wolverines. Led the team with a career-high 11 stops (seven solo) at No. 4 Ohio State. Had seven tackles, one interception and two pass breakups in the 24-17 win over Illinois. His interception at the Penn State 15 in the first quarter set up the drive that resulted in Bill Belton's five-yard touchdown run to open the scoring. Posted four tackles and added a pass breakup at Minnesota. Picked off his third pass of the season and returned it 22 yards in the second quarter vs. Purdue to set-up a touchdown. Made three solo tackles and one pass break-up in the victory over the Boilermakers. Posted eight tackles – including a team-best six solo stops – to go with one pass break-up against Nebraska.

95 - CARL NASSIB, DE

In his first career game action, made two tackles, including a 17-yard TFL on a bobbled punt snap, in the season opening win over Syracuse. Produced two tackles and a pass breakup in the win over Kent State. Produced a career-best four tackles, all of which were solo, at Indiana. Produced two solo tackles at No. 4 Ohio State. Made one solo tackle at Minnesota. Recorded his first career sack for a loss of eight yards and forced a fumble for the first time as a Nittany Lion in the win over Purdue.

7 - STEPHEN OBENG-AGYAPONG, S

Has started four games at outside linebacker, making his first career start at the position against Eastern Michigan. Has 16 career starts. Was an impact player in the season opener vs. Syracuse with eight tackles, one INT, forced and recovered a fumble and a sack. Set up the Nittany Lions first score, a field goal, vs. the Orange when he forced and recovered a fumble at midfield. His interception to end the third quarter vs. Syracuse



set up a fourth quarter field goal for 16-10 lead. Made four tackles, including three solo stops, vs. UCF in his second start at Linebacker. Tallied four tackles as the starter at OLB in the 34-0 victory over Kent State. Notched four tackles in the Big Ten opener at Indiana. Made three tackles, including 1.0 TFL, in the four overtime win against No. 18 Michigan. Recorded five tackles at No. 4 Ohio State, including two solo stops, and had one solo tackle at Minnesota. Made a solo tackle in the win over Purdue.

86 - C.J. OLANIYAN, DE

Has started 12 career games, including every game in 2013 at defensive end. Ranks tied for second in the conference with three forced fumbles, is tied for 10th in tackles for loss (11.0) and is tied for ninth in the Big Ten in sacks (5.0). Had one tackle in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Made four stops, including his second career TFL and sack against Eastern Michigan. Tied for the team-high with a career-best six tackles vs. UCF and added one tackle for loss. Made four tackles, including a tackle for loss in the shutout win over Kent State. Recorded four tackles, including 1.0 tackle for loss, in the Big Ten opener at Indiana. Earned Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors after posting career-highs with eight tackles and 2.5 sacks and forcing his first career fumble in the second quarter in the four OT win over No. 18 Michigan. Made five tackles, including 1.0 tackle for loss, at No. 4 Ohio State. Made two tackles in the 24-17 victory over Illinois. Had a strong effort at Minnesota, producing six tackles, 2.5 TFL (minus-11), one-half sack and his second forced fumble of the season. Made two tackles in the 45-21 win over Purdue, helping hold the Boilermakers to 41 rushing yards on 20 carries. Forced and recovered a fumble on the same play at the Nebraska 8-yard-line to set up a third quarter go-ahead score. Made five tackles and 1.0 sack for a loss of 16 yards against the Cornhuskers.

8 - ALLEN ROBINSON, WR

Candidate for All-America and was among 10 semifinalists for the Biletnikoff Award. Was the leading vote getter in the first round fan vote for the Biletnikoff Award. The 2012 Big Ten Richter-Howard Receiver of the Year. Named a second-team Mid-season All-American by CBSSports.com and Phil Steele's College Football. Named first-team All-Big Ten at mid-season by ESPN.com and BTN.com. Has made at least three catches in 23 straight games. Leads the Big Ten in catches per game (8.1) and receiving yards per game (119.1), ranking eighth and fifth in the NCAA, respectively. Is tied for sixth in the Big Ten with six touchdown catches. In the Minnesota game, became Penn State's single season receiving yardage leader with 1,106 yards, passing Bobby Engram's mark of 1,084 in 1995. Has eight catches of 40 yards or longer this season. Is the first Nittany Lion to ever register a pair of 60-plus reception seasons. Became the third receiver in school history to deliver three straight 100-yard receiving games, joining Joe Jurevicius in 1996 (at Ind., vs. N'western, at Mich.) and Kenny Jackson in 1982 (at BC, vs. N. Carolina St., at ND). Is the only Penn State receiver with multiple 10-catch, 100-yard receiving games in school history, accomplishing the feat four times in his career. Became just the seventh receiver in program history to record over 2,000 career receiving yards. Is fourth on Penn State's all-time list for receiving yards, amassing 2,352 throughout his career at PSU. Is second on the program's all-time receptions ledger with 169. Notched nine catches for 143 yards and one touchdown against

UCF. Had a 44-yard catch in the first quarter that set the Lions up for their first touchdown against the Knights and a 46-yard reception in the third quarter that led to another Penn State touchdown. Also made a leaping five-yard catch in the fourth quarter for his third TD of the season. Made seven catches for 129 yards and one touchdown against Eastern Michigan. Had a diving 43-yard catch in the first quarter that set Penn State up for its first touchdown in the win over the Eagles and made a 45-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter. Made seven catches for 133 yards and one touchdown vs. Syracuse. Caught both passes on a two-play scoring drive on Penn State's first drive of the third quarter vs. Syracuse, making a 25-yard catch prior to a 51-yard catch and run for his first score of the season. Notched three catches for 43 yards against Kent State, including a long of 18 yards in the first quarter. Added three catches – all in the first half – of a 34-0 victory over Kent State, amassing 43 yards. Hauled in a career-high 12 catches for 173 yards and two touchdowns at Indiana. The 12 catches rank second in Penn State single game history, one behind Freddie Scott's 13 grabs vs. Wisconsin in 1995. Had a 46-yard catch and run in the second quarter against the Hoosiers to give Penn State its first touchdown of the game. Gave the Nittany Lions a 14-13 third quarter lead with a 26-yard touchdown catch. Made five catches for 84 yards in the four overtime win against No. 18 Michigan. Made a 14-yard catch on the sideline on the first play of Penn State's game-tying TD drive in regular. He then hauled in a spectacular, leaping 36-yard catch on the fourth play of the drive to set up first-and-goal at the UM one yard line and the game-tying score by Christian Hackenberg. Robinson's leaping catch was the ESPN SportsCenter Play of the Day on Oct 12. Tied his career-high with 12 catches and accounted for 173 receiving yards at No. 4 Ohio State. Made a career-long 65-yard touchdown catch and run in the fourth quarter against the Buckeyes, which is the Nittany Lions' longest play from scrimmage this season. Caught 11 passes for 165 yards in the 24-17 win over Illinois. Had a 47-yard catch in the first quarter to help setup the Lions' first touchdown of the game. Also made a leaping 39-yard sideline catch late in the game. Had one carry for 14 yards, giving him 179 all-purpose yards. Made seven catches for 63 yards at Minnesota, including a long of 14 yards. His 12-yard reception in the fourth quarter moved him past Bobby Engram (1,084 yds, 1995) and into first place on the single season receiving yards chart at Penn State. Made eight catches for 98 yards in the 45-21 win over Purdue, including a long of 18 yards. His eight catches against the Boilermakers gave him 81 for the season, topping his own school record 77 catches from 2012. Made eight catches for 106 yards against Nebraska, including his eighth catch of more than 40 yards (43 yds) this season. Broke the school record with his seventh 100-yard receiving game of the season vs. the Huskers.

76 - DONOVAN SMITH, T

Has started 10 games at left tackle in 2013 and has made 19 career starts. Was instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions gain 574 yards of total offense against Eastern Michigan, their most since piling up 594 yards vs. Coastal Carolina in 2008. Helped pave the way for a 287 yard rushing effort vs. Kent State, which is the most rushing yards in a game since running for 338 yards at Illinois in 2009. Helped protect Christian Hackenberg at Indiana, allowing him to complete 30 passes for 340 yards and three touchdowns vs. the Hoosiers. Helped

pave the way for 390 yards of total offense and five total touchdowns in the four OT win over Michigan, including the first two rushing touchdowns allowed by the Wolverines in 2013. Helped Bill Belton record the first 200-yard rushing effort since 2002 against Illinois (201 yards) and paved the way for 250 rushing yards and 240 passing yards in the win over the Illini. Paved the way for Zach Zwinak's 150 yards rushing at Minnesota, which was the eighth career 100-yard rushing effort for Zwinak. Helped Zwinak register his ninth career 100-yard rushing performance vs. Purdue and paved the way for 289 rushing yards and 501 total yards in the win over the Boilermakers. The 501 yards are a season-high against a Big Ten opponent. Blocked for Zach Zwinak's 149-yard rushing effort vs. Nebraska; the 10th, 100-yard effort of Zwinak's career, and Christian Hackenberg's 217-yard passing effort.

64 - JOHN URSCHEL, G

Earned his third consecutive Capital One CoSIDA Academic All-District® selection and is a candidate for his second selection to the Capital Academic All-America® Team. Is among 10 finalists for the Senior CLASS Award. Has started all 11 games at right guard to extend his starts streak to 23 straight games. Was instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions gain 574 yards of total offense against Eastern Michigan, their most since gaining 594 yards vs. Coastal Carolina in 2008. Helped pave the way for a 287 yard rushing effort vs. Kent State, which is the most rushing yards in a game since running for 338 yards at Illinois in 2009. Helped protect Christian Hackenberg at Indiana, allowing him to complete 30 passes for 340 yards and three touchdowns vs. the Hoosiers. Helped pave the way for 390 yards of total offense and five total touchdowns in the four OT win over Michigan, including the first two rushing touchdowns allowed by the Wolverines in 2013. Helped Bill Belton record Penn State's first 200-yard rushing effort since 2002 against Illinois (201 yards) and paved the way for 250 rushing yards and 240 passing yards in the win over the Illini. Paved the way for Zach Zwinak's 150 yards rushing at Minnesota, which was the eighth career 100-yard rushing effort for Zwinak. Helped Zwinak register his ninth career 100-yard rushing performance vs. Purdue and paved the way for 289 rushing yards and 501 total yards in the win over the Boilermakers. The 501 yards are a season-high against a Big Ten opponent. Blocked for Zach Zwinak's 149-yard rushing effort vs. Nebraska; the 10th, 100-yard effort of Zwinak's career, and Christian Hackenberg's 217-yard passing effort. Graduated in three years with a 4.00 grade-point average in mathematics and earned a master's degree in math in Spring, 2013. Is working on a second master's in mathematics. Owns a 4.00 grade-point average and was earned first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America honors in 2012. Is among the primary candidates for the William V. Campbell Trophy, presented by the National Football Foundation to the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Was named a finalist for the Senior CLASS Award for college football.

5 - NYEEM WARTMAN, LB

Made his first career start vs. Syracuse after missing the final 10 games of 2012 due to injury and receiving a medical redshirt season. Started the first four games of the season at outside linebacker and has started eight games on the season. Has appeared in all 11 games. Made three tackles in the win over the Orange.



Produced a then-career-best six tackles, while leading the team with three pass breakups, in the win against Eastern Michigan. Recorded three stops against UCF. Logged two tackles and a pass breakup against Kent State. Made a career-best eight tackles and his first career 0.5 TFL in the four OT win over No. 18 Michigan. Was in on three stops on the Wolverines' last drive in regulation, with the three carries resulting in minus-2 yards, to help force a punt. Notched five tackles at No. 4 Ohio State, three of which were solo stops. Produced his first career sack and forced fumble, while adding two tackles in the 45-21 win over Purdue. Made one tackle for loss in the home finale vs. Nebraska.

1 - MALCOLM WILLIS, S

Has started 10 games – appearing in all 11 – at safety in 2013 and ranks second on the team with 27 career starts. Recorded eight tackles, one shy of his career-high, and added one TFL vs. Syracuse. Accumulated three tackles vs. Eastern Michigan. Grabbed his third career interception in the second quarter to snap UCF quarterback Blake Bortles' streak of 232 passes without an interception, the longest active streak in the FBS at that point. Logged five tackles, which included four solo stops, against UCF. Produced five tackles, good for third on the team, in the win over Kent State. Recorded four tackles at Indiana. Made six tackles in the four overtime win against No. 18 Michigan. Made six tackles at No. 4 Ohio State. Posted three tackles in the 24-17 win against Illinois. Made eight tackles, including six solo, recovered his first fumble of the season – third of his career – and added one pass breakup at Minnesota. Recorded a tackle in the victory over Purdue. Forced the first fumble of his career at the Penn State goal line on a second quarter goal line stand in his home finale vs. Nebraska. Tied his career-high with nine tackles against the Huskers.

10 - TREVOR WILLIAMS, CB

Moved from wide receiver to cornerback during spring practice and earned his second career start vs. Syracuse (Ohio State, 2012 at WR). Has started six of 11 games in 2013 at cornerback. Ranks tied for 19th in the Big Ten with seven passes defended. Made three tackles and picked off a pass on the sidelines to with 1:56 remaining in the game to seal the victory over the Orange. Logged two solo tackles in the home opener against Eastern Michigan. Against UCF, tied for the team-high with a career-best six tackles and made a team-high two pass breakups. Recorded five tackles and a pass breakup in the 34-0 win over Kent State. Broke up one pass at Indiana and posted three tackles in the four overtime win against No. 18 Michigan. Recorded one tackle at No. 4 Ohio State. Broke up a pass and added one tackle vs. Nebraska.

98 - ANTHONY ZETTEL, DE

Has started two games and played in all 11 this season. Is tied for fourth on team with 2.0 sacks (minus-20) and is tied for fifth with 4.0 TFL (minus-31). Made two tackles vs. UCF and recorded a sack for nine yards at Indiana. In his first career start, vs. Michigan, grabbed his first career interception, returning 18 yards to set-up a touchdown. Made three stops (two solo) in the 4 OT win over the Wolverines. Made four stops at No. 4 Ohio State, including 2.0 TFL for minus-11 yards. Recorded one sack for minus-11 yards in the win over Illinois. Made one solo tackle at

Minnesota. Posted a tackle and a pass break-up in the win over Purdue. Recorded a solo tackle in the home finale vs. Nebraska.

28 - ZACH ZWINAK, RB

Has started seven-of-11 games at running back in 2013 and has started 11 career games. Is tied for third in the Big Ten in touchdowns with 12 and ranks ninth in rushing yards per game (79.5). Posted his seventh career 100-yard rushing effort vs. UCF with 128 yards on 21 attempts and ran for a career-high three touchdowns in the game against the Knights. Logged a 38-yard carry at the end of the third quarter to set up his third touchdown of the game. He also registered a 19-yard catch in the third quarter to total 147 all-purpose yards. On the Lions' fourth scoring drive vs. UCF, Zwinak rushed for 44 yards and added his lone reception to account for all 63 of Penn State's yards on the drive. Carried the ball 24 times for 61 yards and caught the first pass of Christian Hackenberg's career, a five yard grab, in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Toted the ball seven times for 43 yards and tied his career-high with a pair of touchdowns runs in the win over Eastern Michigan. Had a 20-yard carry on 3rd-and-24 to set up a fourth down conversion, which led to his second TD run of the game. Tied his career-high with three touchdowns in the win over Kent State. Carried the ball 15 times for 60 yards against the Golden Flashes, including a long of 20 yards in the third quarter. Ran for 72 yards on 17 carries in the Big Ten opener at Indiana; including a long of 13 yards in the second quarter. Carried the ball eight times for 24 yards in the four OT win over No. 18 Michigan. Had three carries for eight yards at Ohio State. Carried the ball six times for 25 yards in the 24-17 win over Illinois. Notched his eighth career 100-yard rushing performance vs. Minnesota with 150 yards on 26 carries and one touchdown. Had a 38-yard carry on the Lions' first scoring drive at the end of the first quarter, which ties his season-long rush vs. UCF. Gained 61 yards on five carries on Penn State's first scoring drive, which he capped with 12-yard TD run. Posted his ninth career 100-yard rushing performance in the 45-21 win over Purdue, which is tied for ninth in program history, with 149 yards and three touchdowns on 26 carries. His three touchdowns tied his career high, which he has accomplished five times. Zwinak became the 16th player in school history to register 10-plus rushing touchdowns in a single season and is tied for ninth in school history for single season rushing touchdowns with 12 (Evan Royster, 2008; John Cappelletti, 1972). Notched his 10th career 100-yard rushing effort against Nebraska, which is tied for 11th in program history, with 149 yards on 35 carries. His 35 carries vs. Nebraska are the second most in his career (36; Wisconsin, 2012).
