


2007 National Finalists

A true reflection of Penn State's commitment to women's athletics, the Penn State Field Hockey Complex is entering its sixth season as the home of Nittany Lion field hockey. The pitch, which is used exclusively for field hockey, features new turf and a state-of-the-art watering system. The Lions opened the new field in style in 2005, going 10-0 en route to a program record 17 straight wins. Penn State is 34-11 in five years at its new field.

Two sets of seating areas on one side of the field have room to seat up to 750 spectators, 250 more than Bigler. The field also has permanent lights that allow for night games to be played. The watering system allows the field to be

watered both prior to practices and games as well as at halftime of games in order to maintain optimal field conditions on one of the finest playing surfaces in the country.

The Penn State Field Hockey Complex, which is located adjacent to Bigler Field, replaced Bigler as the home of field hockey and became the team's fifth different home since the program's inception in 1964. Bigler was home to Penn State field hockey for nine seasons from 1996-2004. The field has become just one of the latest new additions to Penn State's ever-growing "athletic campus" on the Northeast end of campus.

The field has proven to be quite friendly for the home standing Nittany Lions. In addition to the impressive 34-11 record over its first five years on the field, it has also proved to be a fan-friendly experience. Penn State finished third in the country in home attendance in 2009 and the interest is reaching an all-time high. A facility record 794 fans came out for the Sept. 1, 2008 game vs. Maryland.

The longest tenured coach in the Big Ten and seventh longest tenured at a single school in Division I field hockey, Charlene Morett enters her 24th season as head coach of the Penn State field hockey program. Morett boasts a remarkable resume covering her time as leader of the Nittany Lions. Over the last three years, Morett has led the Nittany Lions to a Big Ten Championship (in 2008), one year following their second appearance in the National Championship Game.

Morett currently ranks fourth all-time (in Division I history) in wins with 396 and is one of just 10 DI coaches to accumulate 300 career wins. With four more wins, she will become only the fourth Division I field hockey coach in NCAA history to hit the 400-victory plateau.

Morett has led the Nittany Lions to the NCAA Tournament in 20 out of her 23 years as head coach and has helped maintain Penn State's distinction as the No. 2 ranked school in all-time NCAA Tournament appearances with 25.

Despite an up-and-down 2009 season, there were a number of bright spots. The Nittany Lions beat two straight ranked teams in early October, No. 18 Ohio State (in overtime) and No. 14 Stanford in succession. Penn State went on to beat the Buckeyes for a second time in the first round of the Big Ten Tournament, becoming only the second No. 7 seed to ever win a tournament game. The Lions were also tied with No. 20 Indiana heading into halftime of the Big Ten semis, but fell just short of a berth in the championship game.

In 2008, Morett led the Nittany Lions to the Big Ten Regular Season Title, their first conference championship since 2005 and fifth overall. The squad was eventually awarded an at-large berth to the NCAA Tournament where it fell to a tough Princeton squad, 2-0. Morett was also named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the fourth time.

In 2007, Morett led Penn State through a memorable run to its seventh NCAA Semifinal appearance in program history and was named the NFHCA Mideast Region Coach of the Year. The milestones have been end-

A six-time Mideast Region Coach of the Year, Morett is an excellent teacher of field hockey. Her players earn national recognition on a yearly basis, 10 of whom have been named two-time First Team All-Americans with Jen Long being the most recent. Her teams dominate the national scene, consistently ranking among the Top 10 in the national polls. In fact, Penn State was ranked in the Top 10 of the STX/NFHCA poll for 32 consecutive weeks from the first poll of the 2005 season ending with the second poll of 2008. The 1999 squad achieved a No. 1 ranking in the STX/NFHCA poll for the first time in program history. From 2005-08, Penn State finished eighth, sixth, ninth, and 11th respectively, in the final poll of the season.

Under Morett's tutelage, five of her players have been named Big Ten Athlete of the Year — Traci Anselmo, Jen Coletta, Heather Gorlaski, Tracey Larson and Kiley Kulina. Six players have been voted the Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year — Natalie Berrena, Coletta, Dawn Lammey, Larson, Tara Maguire, and Allison Scola. In 2008, Long was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year for a second consecutive season, becoming the league's eighth Defensive Player of the Year from Penn State, joining Anselmo, Gorlaski, Becca Main, Jill Martz and Jill Pearsall. Long and



Anselmo are the only Lions to be named Defensive Player of the Year twice. Since Penn State's entry into the Big Ten in 1992, Morett's program has produced more First Team All-Big Ten selections, more Big Ten Defensive Players of the Year, more Big Ten Athletes of the Year and more Big Ten Freshmen of the Year than any other. Penn State's eight Defensive Player of the Year honorees is four more than the schools with the next most.

With Laura Cahill and Bethany Marvel earning All-Big Ten laurels last season, Penn State has now totaled 76 All-Big Ten selections since 1992, including 53 First Team All-Conference choices, the most of any Big Ten school since 1992.

During Morett's tenure, Penn State has produced 35 First-Team All-America choices with at least one player earning the honor in 22 of the coach's 23 seasons. Overall, Penn State has had at least one First Team All-American in 24 of the last 25 years, including every year from 1975-2008. In 2007, for the first time since 2002, Penn State had two First Team All-Americans in Long and Kiersten Wood.

A number of Morett's players - past and present - have played at an elite level with the United States program, with Larson earning a spot on the U.S. National Team for three consecutive seasons. Another former Nittany Lion, Eleanor Stone, has been on the national team for a total of seven different seasons. Seven former players have competed on the U.S. National Team, with several others playing on various other levels of national teams. Recent graduates Long and Scola were three-year members of the U.S. Under-21 National Team. Both Long and Wood trained with the U.S. National Team in Chula Vista, Calif. while Scola went on an exhibition tour of Argentina with the U-21 team. In the spring of 2007, Long and Scola represented the U.S. on the U-21 team's tour of China. Morett attended with them as the Chef de Mission for U.S. Field Hockey. Additionally, Long and Scola, along with All-America alum Larson helped the East team capture the U.S. Open Regional Championship in the summer of 2007.

Laura Kassab and current junior Jessica Longstreth were both members of the U.S. National Indoor Hockey Team as well. Scola is currently on the U.S. Development Squad after being named to the team in June of 2009. In addition, Long and current sophomore Kelsey Amy competed for team PA in USA Field Hockey's National Championship this past June. Incoming freshman goalkeeper Kylie Licata played on the Junior National High Performance Team as well.

Morett's teams have also produced a run of success in Big Ten games that is unparalleled since Penn State joined the conference in 1992. Since that time, the Nittany Lions own the most Big Ten regular season wins, the highest Big Ten regular season and tournament winning percentage, the second-most Big Ten Tournament wins and a tie for the most Big Ten Tournament titles.

The squad has enjoyed plenty of recent success as well. In 2007, after defeating Virginia for the second time in the season with a win in the first

round of the NCAA Tournament, Penn State stunned second-ranked Maryland on the Terps' home field to advance to the NCAA Semifinals. The Nittany Lions then came back to the same field five days later and knocked off third-ranked Wake Forest in the National Semifinals, the program's first-ever win over the Demon Deacons, to advance to the National Championship Game. The memorable run included three wins over ACC teams for the shot to play for the national title.

Despite the season ending with a loss to top-ranked and undefeated North Carolina in the title game, four Nittany Lions were named NFHCA All-Americans. One year earlier in 2006, Morett led the Nittany Lions to their first appearance in the Big Ten Tournament Championship Game since 2003. She also won her 350th career game with a 1-0 win over Connecticut on September 3, 2006.

In 2005, the Nittany Lions won 17 consecutive games to tie a program record en route to a Big Ten regular season crown, their first conference crown since 1998. Berrena, a senior, was named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year and three other Nittany Lions were honored as All-Big Ten. Morett also won her 300th game as Penn State head coach, a 5-0 decision over Temple on September 14. She was named Mideast Region Coach of the Year for the fifth time in her career and also was recognized as the Big Ten Coach of the Year for the third time.

In 2002, Morett guided the Nittany Lions to a memorable NCAA Tournament run. Penn State opened with back-to-back wins over Kent State

and Princeton in the opening two rounds played at Penn State before defeating No. 1 ranked Old Dominion, 3-2, to advance to the NCAA National Championship Game for the first time in program history.

While Penn State dropped the title game, 2-0, to Wake Forest, the year went down as one of the greatest seasons in program history as four players were recognized with STX All-America honors and five earned All-Big Ten status.

Morett led the 1993 squad to the university's first outright Big Ten Championship in any sport. The team won 15 straight games, a record at the time. The most notable upset was a 2-1 victory at Old Dominion which ended the Monarchs' 66-game win streak. Since then, Morett has led her Lions to four more regular season titles and an unprecedented four straight Big Ten Tournament crowns from 1995 through 1998.

Morett's teams have not only excelled on the field but also in the classroom. Penn State has produced 159 Academic All-Big Ten selections since 1992 and is the only school in the Big Ten to have 10 or more Academic All-Big Ten selections for the last nine consecutive seasons. Additionally, a record 16 members of the team were named to the NFHCA National Academic Squad in 2008, a then-record 14 the year before, and in the two years previous to that, a total of 12 players were named to the squad in each season. During the 2008-09 school year, the Nittany Lions were also winners of the Penn State Highest GPA Academic Award given to the team with the highest overall GPA and the "Varsity S" Women's Team GPA honor.

A 1979 graduate of Penn State, Morett was an outstanding field hockey player and the program's only three-time First Team All-American. Captain of the undefeated 1978 team, Morett was a phenomenal scorer, netting 50 goals in four years and was the first Lion to score five goals in a game. She held that record for 21 years. After leaving Penn State, Morett continued to play field hockey at the national level and in 1982, she was named the USFHA's Co-Athlete of the Year.

A two-time Olympian, Morett played in more than 100 international matches. Morett remained in Happy Valley as a graduate assistant to train

for the 1980 Olympics. Unable to participate in the 1980 Moscow Games due to the U.S. boycott, Morett remained loyal and enthusiastic to the U.S. team, traveling all over the world in international competition in preparation for the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games, where she won a bronze medal. Morett was also awarded a Congressional Gold Medal as part of the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team when the U.S. Congress officially awarded the medals more than 27 years after the boycotted games.

Also an All-America lacrosse player in Happy Valley, Morett was one of the nation's top scorers in the sport when Penn State won its second consecutive National Championship. She also played for the 1978 and 1979 United States Women's Lacrosse Association National Champion teams. Morett was a member of the U.S. Lacrosse team and earned Most Valuable Player at the 1979 USWLA National Championship, where the Nittany Lions defeated the University of Massachusetts.

After completing her undergraduate degree in physical education, she worked for one year as a graduate assistant at PSU, helping the Lions become National Finalists in field hockey and National Champions in lacrosse.

Beth Anders then tabbed Morett as her assistant in 1980 at Old Dominion, where she would stay for four years. During that time, Morett helped the Monarchs reach three straight National Title games and in the process, Anders served as a positive mentor for Morett's future success.

In 1984, Morett was named head field hockey and lacrosse coach at Boston College. She immediately lifted the Eagle field hockey program into the Top 20 and won an Eastern College Athletic Conference title in her first year.

When Penn State legend Gillian Rattray retired from coaching in 1987, Morett returned to her alma mater to take over for her mentor, inheriting a program with 17 straight winning seasons and five straight NCAA Tournament appearances.

Morett has continued that winning tradition by leading 20 of her teams into the NCAA Tournament, including her first 14 straight, giving the Penn State program 19 straight NCAA appearances from 1982-2000. Morett has enjoyed a winning record in 21 of her 23 years with the Nittany Lions and a non-losing record 22 times. Under Morett and Rattray before her, Penn State had amassed 30 straight years with at least 10 or more wins, the longest streak in Division I field hockey history.

Morett's 2002 and 2007 teams reached the National Championship Game, her 1990, 1991 and 1993 teams reached the NCAA Semifinals, and her 1988, 1992 and



1994 squads missed joining the Elite Foursome after one-goal losses in overtime. Her coaching accomplishments include five Big Ten Championships (1993, 1997, 1998, 2005, and 2008), four Big Ten Tournament titles (1995-1998) and two Atlantic 10 Conference championships (1989-1990).

Morett's success at PSU has led to numerous coaching honors. She was the Mideast Region Coach of the Year in 1990, 1991, 1993, 2000, 2005 and 2007. The Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year in 1989, she was the Big Ten Coach of the Year in 1993, 1998, 2005, and 2008.

Morett is a member of the USFHA Hall Of Fame as well as the NFHCA Hall of Fame and served as the USFHA Vice President of Coaching. She had the honor of presenting this award to her mentor, Rattray when she was inducted into the Hall in 2006. Lisa Bervinchak-Love, one of the top players in Penn State field hockey history, is entering her 16th year on the sideline under Head Coach Charlene Morett.

During her time at Penn State, she has assisted on several highly successful teams, including a pair of National Finalist teams that reached the National Championship Game in 2002 and 2007, a 2005 team that won 17 straight games, and the 1995-1998 teams, all of which won the Big Ten Tournament in their respective seasons. Bervinchak-Love has been on the sideline for a total of 13 NCAA Tournament appearances by the Nittany Lions and for five Big Ten regular season championships.

As a player, Bervinchak-Love — who played three years for the Nittany Lions after transferring from Villanova following her freshman campaign — scored 28 goals in her career. She was also a vocal leader as an All-American captain. As a senior co-captain, she led the team in scoring with 12 goals and three assists and was named to the Atlantic 10 All-Conference Team. She scored two of the Lions' goals at the 1988 Atlantic 10 Conference Semifinals and was an All-Tournament selection. Following her graduation in 1989, Love continued to play field hockey at the national level. In 1991, she helped her team win a silver medal at the Olympic Sports Festival in Los Angeles.

A standout student, she was the Student Academic Advisory Board representative at Penn State in 1988. In 1989, Love graduated with a degree in health planning and administration and worked as an intern with the planning and marketing department at Lancaster General Hospital in Pennsylvania.

Following her internship, she was a Penn Manor School District elementary school teacher and assisted head coaches in field hockey and basketball. She also held teaching positions at Central Manor, Farmdale, Burgard and Brecknock elementary schools.

Throughout the years, she continued her involvement with the Nittany Lion program as an assistant director and instructor at Penn State camps.

Love was a four-sport athlete at Penn Manor High School and earned All-Star honors in field hockey and basketball, and was the district champion in the triple jump. She continues to play field hockey today and captured the U.S. Indoor Title with the Norlanco Club in 2003 and 2004. She currently plays with Red Rose and helped them win the 2006, 2007, and 2008 club championships.

Love comes from a family of coaches and athletes. Her brother Jude is the wrestling coach at Hempfield High School in Lancaster, Pa. and brother Greg, his assistant. Her dad James, meanwhile, was a football standout at Minersville High School. Her parents, James and Dolores, recently celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

Also an active participant in intramural athletics, Love has won over 10 intramural championships in various sports, including football and basketball.

She married Steve Love, a Penn State alumni and graphic artist with Supelco, in 1996. They have two daughters, Taylor Marie and Kelsey Evelyn.

Annie Zinkavich enters her fifth season as an assistant coach at Penn State. A former goalkeeper with the Nittany Lions, she works primarily with the goalkeepers and also assists in the day-to-day operations of the field hockey program.

Working with first-time starter Ali Meves last season, Zinkavich helped aid the junior goalkeeper to some stellar efforts, highlighted by an 11-save performance against No. 18 Ohio State to spearhead the Lions to a thrilling 2-1 overtime victory on the Big Ten Network. She followed that performance with six huge saves vs. No. 14 Stanford in a second straight win. Meves was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week and Penn State Student-Athlete of the Week following her effort against the Buckeyes while also cracking the Big Ten All-Tournament Team after leading the Nittany Lions into the conference semifinals.

This past summer, Zinkavich served as assistant cocach for the gold medal winning Pennsylvania Junior High Performance squad.

In 2009, Penn State recorded nine shutouts thanks in large part to Zinkavich's work with the goalies. The duo of Jen Beaumont and Meves recorded a 82.5 save percentage that was tops in the nation while its 1.05 goals against average was fourth best nationally and shutouts per game (0.45) was second. The Nittany Lion defense and goalkeeping dominated the conference, coming in first in fewest goals allowed, GAA, and shutouts. The team's 21 goals allowed for the year was the fewest since the 1999 squad only allowed 20. Beaumont was also named a First Team All-Conference Performer as well as earning First Team All-Region and Second Team All-

In 2007, Zinkavich's work helped the Nittany Lions record 10 shutouts, including nine by Beaumont and two big shutouts in the NCAA Tournament against a pair of top five teams. Beaumont also ranked among that nation's leaders in goals against average and save percentage while being named All-Region for the second straight season. Three years ago, Beaumont, then a first-year starter, had an outstanding year between the pipes for the Lions as she was named First Team All-Region and a Second Team All-American while finishing fifth in the country and tops in the Big Ten in goals against average.

Zinkavich was a four-year letterwinner for the Nittany Lions from 2000-2003. She recorded eight shutouts in 2002 to anchor the defense of the squad that advanced to the NCAA National Championship game. In 2002, she ranked 16th nationally in goals against average with 1.41 per game. She earned Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors six times in her career, including three in 2001. In 2002, Zinkavich set a Bigler Field record for saves in a game with 10 in a 2-1 upset victory over No. 6 North Carolina. She was named to three consecutive All-Mideast teams, garnering first team honors in 2001 and 2003 and second team honors in 2002. She started 85 out of the 87 games she played in her career. She had 22 shutouts in her career, which ranks sixth all-time at Penn State.

Prior to returning to her alma mater, Zinkavich served for two years as the graduate assistant coach at Bucknell, also working with the goalies. Under her tutelage, Bucknell's senior keeper Liz Jordan was named the Patriot League Goalkeeper of the Year and the East Coast Athletic Conference Goalkeeper of the Year. Jordan was also a Second Team All-Mideast Region selection.

Zinkavich is currently finalizing her master's degree in college student personnel from Bucknell University.

She plays club field hockey for Red Rose and helped the team win the Club Cup in Virginia Beach in April of 2006, 2007, and 2008. She also received her Level II Coaching Accreditation in January.

Zinkavich received her Bachelor of Science in psychology from Penn State in 2003. She hails from Kingston, Pa. and graduated from Wyoming Seminary in 1999. Her parents are Joe and Peg.

SEASON OUTLOOK Q&A WITH COACH MORETT

Q: Talk about the incoming freshmen class as a whole.

Morett: As a whole, I think it's a very solid class from the forward line players through the midfield, into the defensive backfield, all the way back to the goalkeeping position. We have a solid group of freshmen. Lauren Purvis and Brittany Grzywacz really highlight that incoming class because they're two who were on the U.S. Under 19 team that went to Argentina this past spring. Fortunately, I was one of the coaches who went with them. I had the chance to see - up close - their potential playing at the next level instead of the high school leagues. They were both very impressive in the way they played and the way they were able to contribute to the team's success.

Q: Bring us position by position. Let's start with the goalkeepers.

Morett: There's a lot of talent at goalkeeper. I think that was one of our question marks last year, the goalkeeping aspect and also the forward line play. We were inexperienced in those two areas, which doesn't bode well for success. This year, we obviously have **Ayla Halus** and **Ali Meves** who are returning. Both have significant experience. Ali played in more games last year than Ayla, but Ayla got a lot of experience playing in the spring when Ali got hurt. So I would say they're coming in neck-and-neck into the preseason. **Kylie Licata** is an incoming freshman who will redshirt.

Q: How about the defenders?

Morett: We did lose a significant amount at defense. I would say more from the center of our field into the backfield. We lost the leadership of **Laura Cahill** back there. She pretty much directed the defense. We feel good; we've made a position change with **Daneen Zug**. We took her out of the midfield and put her into the backfield last spring. She showed a lot of poise out there,

making some good decisions [while showing] some good communication skills. So we're hoping Daneen will be the quarterback of the defensive backfield. We have some returning athletes who can vie for their starting positions. Then you have to throw the freshmen in the mix; they're good athletes as well.

Q: Midfielders?

Morett: Leading into our midfield area, we have **Jessica Longstreth**, who is very dynamic with her speed. We think we have a couple incoming freshmen who can match her speed. If we can get more of our speedy players in the midfield, it will create a lot of difficulty for the opposition.

Q: And finally, the forwards.

Morett: We have Kelsey Amy returning at the forward line. Casey McCartin saw some time at forward as well. We floated Jenny Purvis up there [along with] Natalie Buttinger. There are also some incoming kids — Whitney Reddig and Lauren Purvis — who should really spot some time on the line.

Q: How would you assess the team's overall season outlook?

Morett: I think last year, we just had some difficulty scoring. We had a lot of close games, but couldn't find the goal. Now that Kelsey [Amy] played High Performance for the Pennsylvania senior team this year, that gave her a lot of confidence. Also, with Lauren Purvis coming in with her Under 19 experience, she can be dangerous around the goal cage. Also, Brittany Grzywacz as a corner shooter is someone who has a lot of tools as a freshman, with the drag flick and the straight shot. I think our corner execution will be much more consistent and much more dangerous, which we hope will lead to more goals.



2009 SEASON REVIEW & HIGHLIGHTS

NITTANY LIONS CONCLUDE UP-AND-DOWN SEASON WITH MEMORABLE EFFORT AT BIG TEN TOURNAMENT

- Despite struggling with a 6-12 record heading into November's Big Ten Tournament, the Penn State field hockey team ended on a positive note by beating No. 2 seed Ohio State for the second time to advance to the conference semifinals.
- The Lions ended up falling to Indiana in the semis, but the spirited effort proved to the Big Ten that Penn State is a force to be reckoned with.
- Penn State become only the second No. 7 seed in Big Ten history to win a game in the tournament since the conference expanded to seven teams in 2000.
- The Nittany Lions did finish with a solid RPI (ratings percentage index) of 20, rated as the fourth-best Big Ten squad only behind NCAA Tournament participants Michigan State, Ohio State and Indiana.
- After starting the season 2-8, the squad did rebound down the stretch, winning five of its final 10 games. Included in the wins was a 2-1 overtime thriller over No. 18 Ohio State, a 3-1 triumph over No. 14 Stanford and the Big Ten Tournament win over the Buckeyes.

IMPRESSIVE OPPONENTS

- Penn State has consistently played some of the top teams in the country, which was no different in 2009 as the Nittany Lions faced the second toughest schedule in the country.
- Incredibly, all but one opponent (Pacific) in 2009 was either nationally ranked or received votes when Penn State faced them.
- Old Dominion (16), Virginia (6), Connecticut (5), Maryland (1), Princeton (7), Ohio State (18), Stanford (14), Northwestern (18), Indiana (20) and Michigan State (8) were all ranked on game day vs. the Lions.
- Meanwhile, Lock Haven, American, Lafayette, West Chester, Michigan, Bucknell and Iowa received votes.
- Penn State's seven wins came against teams with great records as well Lock Haven (18-5), Stanford (17-5), Lafayette (14-6), Ohio State twice (13-7), Bucknell (12-7) and Pacific (5-12) for an overall mark of 92-49 (.652).



- With 437 fans at Senior Day (10/31), the Lions finished the season with an average of 400 fans per home game.
- That mark was good for third in the nation and tops among non-ACC schools. First, second and fourth were North Carolina (518), Maryland (493) and Virginia (389).
- The attendance figure also led the Big Ten, well ahead of Michigan in second (372).
- Four of the eight home games drew over 400 fans, including one over 500 (West Chester) and another over 600 (Connecticut).
- In total, 6,499 fans came out to see the Lions play over their 20 games, including 3,204 at home.
- On Sunday, Sept. 6, (vs. No. 5 Connecticut), the third largest crowd in the history of the Penn State Field Hockey Complex (694) witnessed a thrilling game.

- Goalie **Ali Meves** had her first-career double digit save performance at Princeton (and had her second on Friday, Oct. 2 vs. Ohio State).
- Fellow goalkeeper **Ayla Halus** picked up her first-career win, which was a shutout vs. West Chester (Sept. 20).
- **Kristen Schaefer** recorded her first-career point against Stanford (Oct. 5), an assist on Amy's go-ahead goal off a penalty corner.

"FRESH" BUNCH LEADING THE WAY

- Among the scoring leaders in 2009 was a pair of freshmen, **Kelsey Amy** and (redshirt freshman) **Hannah Allison**, who led the squad in goals scored. Amy also had the most points with 18 (8g, 2a) while Allison's five goals were tied for second most and 12 points were tied for third.
- Together, the pair finished among the highest-scoring freshman pairs in program history (when looking at ranking within its team).
- The second-best freshman pair this century was in 2004 when **Shaun Banta** was third on the squad (18 pts: 7g, 4a) and **Kiersten Wood** was fifth (11 pts: 3g, 5a). Sophomore **Annelise Legel** was fourth with 13 (6g, 1a).
- After not scoring in the first 10 games of her career, Amy racked up all of her team-leading 18 points over the final 10 games. She racked up at least one point in seven of those contests.
- It all started with her first-career goal on Oct. 2, which was the overtime game-winner against Ohio State.
- Jessica Longstreth was tied for third in points (12) and tied for second in goals (5) meaning the top three goal-scorers and three of the top four point-getters in 2009 were either freshmen or sophomores.
- \bullet Amy and Longstreth were named NFHCA All-Mideast Region First Team honorees.

MEVES' "DOUBLE TRIFECTA"

- Goalkeeper **Ali Meves** enjoyed a strong first season of starting duty which saw 100 as a significant number.
- Meves finished the season with 108 saves to lead the Big Ten, marking the first time that a Penn State goalie reached triple digits since current assistant coach **Annie Zinkavich** had 137 in 2003.
- It happened even with **Ayla Halus** starting twice. It was the first time since 2000 that two Lion goalies played 100 or more minutes while it also saw one reach 100 saves. Zinkavich was part of the 2000 scenario as well.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. - A strong nine save performance from junior Ali Meves wasn't enough as the No. 11 Penn State field hockey team dropped a 1-0 decision to sixth ranked Virginia on Sunday afternoon. The Cavaliers scored with just over 10 minutes remaining in the first half and pitched the shutout despite a valiant Nittany Lion effort.

The Cavaliers were tested early and often, just two days after a convincing 7-0 win over Miami (Ohio). After almost 25 minutes of scoreless action, Virginia took a 1-0 lead off a penalty corner. Inga Stockel's first goal of the season came on a direct shot and was

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - The No. 11 Penn State field hockey team bounced back from a tough first half by scoring three unanswered goals in the second for a 3-1 win over intrastate rival Lock Haven in the home opener on Friday evening. Redshirt freshman Hannah Allison led the charge with two goals and an assist while junior goalkeeper Ali Meves was strong once again with eight saves.

"It was a very good win," said head coach Charlene Morett. "It feels good to get some shots and see our offense get going because that was the one thing we didn't have last weekend. The attack picked us up in the second half.'

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - A spirited second half comeback attempt fell one goal short as the No. 11 Penn State field hockey team dropped a 2-1 final to No. 5 Connecticut in front of 694 fans at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex on Sunday. Sophomore Casey McCartin scored her first-career goal while junior goalkeeper Ali Meves made four saves in defeat.

The attendance total stands as the third largest in facility history, only trailing the 794 fans from last Sept. 1 against Maryland and 770 from Sept. 2, 2007 against these same Huskies. Three of the four largest crowds in facility history have come against Connecticut.

Like Friday, the Lions bounced back from a tough first half to put together a strong final 35 minutes. But unlike Friday, when it scored three goals for the win, Penn State was unable to pull all the way back.

"We played with much better intensity in the second half," said head coach **Charlene Morett**. "The players off the bench played with a good spark, but we need to play with intensity in both halves."

Connecticut controlled play early and converted it into a goal at 12:49 when Loren Sherer scored her fifth of the season. Her deflection of an Ali Blankmeyer shot found the right corner of the cage to put the Lions in an early hole.

The Huskies continued to have Penn State's number, taking a 2-0 lead at 24:07 off a beautiful feed from Sherer. Cara Silverman finished from point blank range, beating Meves inside the left post.

Penn State came out of the locker room with a vengeance to nearly tie the score. After almost 10 minutes of play, McCartin cleaned up a rebound chance off a penalty corner, beating UConn goalie Andrea Mainiero for her first-career goal to give the crowd life.

The teams played an up-and-down final 25 minutes, which included a number more offensive opportunities. The Lions dominated possession and got off a

number of quality chances, but the Huskies' defense held its ground. When Penn State was able to get a shot on goal, Mainiero came up big to make some crucial saves.

One of the Nittany Lions' best chances came late in the contest when senior **Bethany Marvel** fired a shot that went in. It clearly came from just outside the circle, though, so it was disallowed.

Final shots were 10-8 in favor of Connecticut while Penn State controlled penalty corners with nine to only three for the Huskies. Meves made four saves for the Linos while Mainiero had five for the Huskies.

The game featured two of the four winningest coaches in Division I history. UConn's Nancy Stevens is the second winningest, with a 484-156-24 record while Penn State's Morett is fourth with a 390-148-16 mark.

Fleetwood added her second marker at 50:32 to give Indiana the three-goal

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. - Freshman Kelsey Amy and junior Daneen Zug each scored twice while junior Jenny Purvis and senior Gina Bartolacci added their first goals of the season to lead the Penn State field hockey team to a 6-4 win over Pacific on Saturday afternoon. The Nittany Lions jumped out to a quick 3-0 lead, but the Tigers fought back to even the score at three before Penn State responded with three consecutive scores for the decisive victory.

Saturday was Penn State's second neutral site game of the season and first-ever meeting against Pacific. Rebounds were a theme of the day as three goals came off rebound chances while three of the six goals were scored off penalty corners.

The offensive output was the most since last Sept. 19 when the Nittany Lions scored six in a 6-0 home win over Georgetown. Two Lions also finished with multiple goals for the first time since Sept. 17, 2006 when Shaun Banta had three and Allison Scola added two in a 6-0 victory over West Chester.

Purvis got the scoring started with her first-career goal at 2:37, turning a rebound attempt off a penalty corner into a 1-0 lead.

Amy then made it 2-0 at 16:16 when she corralled her own rebound and found the back of the cage. It was 3-0 only 4:20 later when Bartolacci beat Pacific goalkeeper Christina Niccum from the right side. Bartolacci's first goal of the season (and second of her career) was assisted by Amy, marking the second assist in as many days for the freshman from Sweet Valley, Pa.

The Tigers wouldn't quit and they capitalized on their opportunities with goals at 24:14, 24:41 and 36:54 to even the score at three.

Penn State continued its pressure and retook the lead at 52:42 when Zug converted her second goal of the season off a clean corner attempt. Redshirt senior Christine Dudek made the feed to fellow senior Amy Bonenberger, who made the stop for Zug's blast.

Less than three minutes later, Zug intercepted a clearing attempt then beat Niccum for her second goal of the game and third of the season to make it 5-3.

Amy added her second at 63:28 to extend the Lions' lead to 6-3. Pacific's Kim Keyawa responded less than a minute later with her second of the game as well, which made it 6-4 at 64:13.

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - Despite battling neck-and-neck through much of the first half, No. 8 Michigan State scored just before halftime and rode that momentum to three more second-half goals on their way to a 5-1 win over the Penn State field hockey team in Saturday's regular season finale. The win capped off an undefeated 6-0 Big Ten mark for the league's regular-season champion and upped its winning streak to 10 games. The Nittany Lions enter the Big Ten Tournament as the No. 7 seed and will play second-seeded Ohio State in Thursday's opening round.

Senior Gina Bartolacci scored the Nittany Lions' lone goal, but it wasn't enough to offset a career day by Michigan State's Floor Rijpma, who netted a hat trick. Junior goalkeeper Ali Meves stood tall with five saves to up her season total to 100, the first Penn State goalkeeper to reach triple digits since 2003.

Michigan State jumped out to a quick lead when Rijpma converted on her first goal of the day and 16th of the season, finishing a pass off a penalty corner at the 3:37 mark.

The teams played toe-to-toe the next 30 minutes which included sensational defensive saves from seniors Brooke Hoffsmith and Amy Bonenberger. The offense had its chances as well, including great opportunities from Bonenberger and freshman Kelsey Amy. Michigan State goalkeeper Elissa Unger was strong, as she was all afternoon, in making both stops.

The Spartans made it 2-0 with under one minute remaining in the first half behind a beautiful conversion from Rijpma for her second goal of the game. Jessica Lindner made a beautiful centering pass from the end line to set up the redirection in front of the cage.

Jantine Steinmetz upped Michigan State's lead to 3-0 at 49:42 when she was sprung on a semi-breakaway, made a move around Meves, then found the open cage.

Penn State answered right back when Bartolacci scored her second goal in as many games off a penalty corner to make it 3-1 at 52:32. Amy's hard shot into traffic was double-deflected into the top corner of the goal. On the play, redshirt freshman Hannah Allison was credited with her first assist since the home opener.

Michigan State added two more goals, at 56:25 and 60:38 for the 5-1 final.

Final shots were 16-6 in favor of the Spartans while penalty corners were knotted at five apiece. Meves' five saves came in the first 65:05 while redshirt freshman saw her first action since Sept. 20 and made one stop. Unger finished the day with four saves.

It was also Senior Day as seven Nittany Lion seniors (Bartolacci, Bonenberger, Laura Cahill, Christine Dudek, Hoffsmith, Bethany Marvel and Jen Miller) were all honored prior to gametime.

The Lions now look ahead to next week's Big Ten Tournament hosted by Michigan State. The first-round game against Ohio State is set for Thursday while the conference semifinals are Friday and the championship game is Sunday.

Game 19 • November 5 Big Ten First Round Ralph Young Field Penn State 2, #12 Ohio State 1

EAST LANSING, Mich. - Riding two first half goals from freshman **Kelsey Amy** and strong goalkeeping from junior **Ali Meves**, the seventh-seeded Penn State field hockey team jumped out to a 2-0 lead and held off a late Ohio State surge for a thrilling 2-1 upset victory in the opening round of the Big Ten Tournament on Thursday afternoon. The win marked only the second time in conference history that a seventh seed has defeated the No. 2 seed.

"I was really pleased with the way we played both halves," said head coach **Charlene Morett.** "We had a very exciting first half and played with a lot of poise. We got into a little bit of a panic mode in the second half, but I was really proud of the way they stayed strong inside our defensive 25. Ali Meves did a nice job in goal too. It was a great game for us."

Not only did Penn State become only the second No. 7 seed in Big Ten history to win a game in the tournament, but with a win on Friday, it would become the first-ever squad to advance to the championship game.

The Lions came out strong and took it to the Buckeyes early on. After a number of failed opportunities, they converted at 29:49 off a penalty corner when Amy rocketed a shot past Ohio State goalkeeper Lindsay Quintiliani for a 1-0 advantage. Senior **Amy Bonenberger** and sophomore **Jessica Longstreth** were credited with the assists on the play.

Penn State made it 2-0 off another corner attempt, but this coming at 35:00 of the first half. With time winding down, Longstreth made a steal at mid-field to create an attacking opportunity. The penalty corner was awarded before the time had expired, so Penn State was still allowed to take the attempt. The play paid off when another Amy shot found the back of the cage to make it 2-0.

Ohio State came out strong in the second and converted a Penn State turnover into a goal to cut the lead in half. Berta Queralt was on the receiving end of the feed and came in all alone on Meves. She made a move around the junior goal-keeper and easily found the open goal to make it 2-1 at 49:01.

The Buckeyes kept attacking with shots and penalty corners, but could not solve Meves for a second time. Six of their eight corners came in the second half including five in the span of 6:32.

EAST LANSING, Mich. - Despite tying the score midway through the first half, the Penn State field hockey team couldn't fight all the way back, allowing two second half goals in a 3-1 defeat to Indiana in Friday's Big Ten Semifinals. With the win, the Hoosiers advance to face Michigan State in the Big Ten Championship Game.

"I'm proud of the way we played," said head coach **Charlene Morett**. "We fought for 70 minutes and showed great competitive spirit. Give credit to Indiana, who played great around the goal. Our goalie, Ali Meves played great today as well."

Freshman **Kelsey Amy** accounted for the Lions' lone score to finish with three for the tournament which is tied for 10th all-time in one Big Ten Tournament. Meves was strong in making three incredible saves to keep Penn State close.

Indiana took the quick lead less than five minutes into the game when it converted its second corner attempt. After Katie Griswold's insert, Kelsey Kiper made a nifty pass to Morgan Fleetwood, whose shot beat Meves inside the right post at 4:48.

The Hoosiers continued their relentless pressure, but couldn't beat the junior goalkeeper for a second time. After a number of golden opportunities, including a one-on-one chance by redshirt freshman **Hannah Allison**, the Nittany Lions made it 1-1 when Amy scored yet another goal off a penalty corner. This time, sophomore **Jessica Longstreth** made the insert to redshirt freshman **Kristen Schaefer**. Amy's blast was deflected by an Indiana defender high and past goalkeeper Alex Mann to make it 1-1 at 21:46.

Penn State nearly fell into another hole with under eight minutes remaining in the first, but Meves came up with a pair of incredible saves in succession to keep the score knotteed at one. She first came out strong on Griswold, who was sprung in all alone. After making the stop on the end line, she somehow got back in position to make a stick save of a Kiper attempt.

After over 13 minutes of scoreless second half play, Indiana retook the 2-1 lead at 48:47 when Brooke Borneman converted an odd man rush. Redshirt senior **Jen Miller** made a huge defensive save on the first shot, but couldn't stop the rebound as Borneman fifth goal of the season gave the Hoosiers the lead for good.

Corey Brautigam scored an inusrance goal off a penalty corner attempt at 52:00 for the 3-1 final.

Final shots were 11-4 in favor of Indiana while Meves and Mann each had three saves. Indiana held the 6-4 edge in penalty corners.

The Nittany Lions end their season at 7-13, including three wins against ranked foes and two versus Ohio State. They also made history in becoming only the second No. 7 seed in Big Ten history to win a tournament game.



COLLEGE PARK, Md. - In the game featuring Penn State and Virginia on August 26 in the first weekend of the season, Virginia scored a first half goal and led 1-0 at halftime before Penn State rallied with three unanswered secondhalf goals for a 3-1 victory. In another matchup with the Cavaliers in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, the game was very similar to the first meeting as Penn State overcame a 1-0 halftime deficit with three second half goals. The Nittany Lions held on for a narrow 3-2 victory at the Maryland Field Hockey and Lacrosse Complex.

The win moved the Nittany Lions into the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year and for the second straight year they moved on to face the host Terrapins in the second round.

Penn State's top three goal scorers led the way. **Britney Long** scored her team-leading 13th goal to tie the score early in the second half. **Mallory Weisen** scored her 10th goal to give the Nittany Lions the 2-1 lead while **Shaun Banta** netted her seventh to give the Nittany Lions what would prove to be a much-needed insurance goal.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Britney Long scored a first half goal in the 22nd minute and the Penn State defense played its best game of the year as Penn State stunned two-time defending national champion Maryland 1-0 on its home field in the NCAA Quarterfinals to advance to the NCAA Semifinal round. The Nittany Lions ended up returning to College Park for its seventh NCAA Semifinal in school history and its 10th all-time trip to a semifinal, counting the AIAW as well.

Penn State converted on an opportunity at the 21:54 mark to take a 1-0 lead. The Lions were awarded a free hit from just outside the circle on the right side of the cage. **Shaun Banta** took the hit and sent a hard ball into the circle, where Long was waiting on the weak-side post to tip in the pass for her 14th goal of the year and her second of the NCAA Tournament.

The Terps kept the ball on Penn State's side of the field for the vast majority of the final 10 minutes of the second half, but what shots they were able to get off were either saved by Beaumont or went wide. Beaumont made nine saves in an outstanding effort in the cage.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Mallory Weisen scored a first half goal in the 14th minute and Shaun Banta added a late goal with just over 10 minutes to play in the second half and the Penn State defense once again stifled one of the country's top ranked teams as the Nittany Lions knocked off No. 2 Wake Forest 2-0 in the National Semifinals, five days after knocking off third-ranked Maryland on the same field.

With the win, Penn State moved on to its second NCAA Championship Game appearance in program history.

In the 15th minute, Penn State was awarded the first penalty corner of the game. Weisen's shot went off the foot of a Wake Forest defender and deflected into the cage to give the Nittany Lions a 1-0 lead at the 14:03 mark. **Jen Long** and **Allison Scola** were credited with assists on the play.




