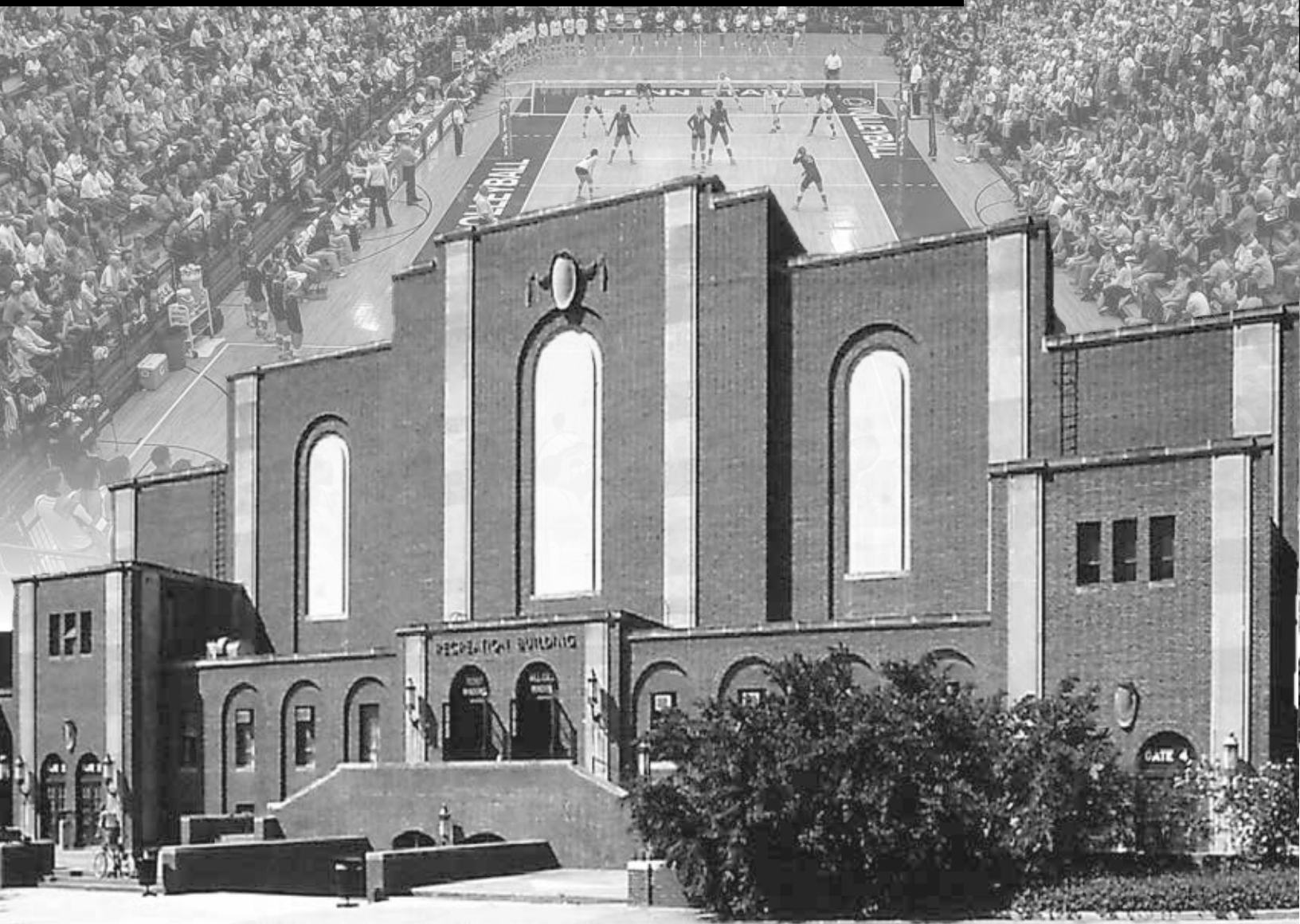

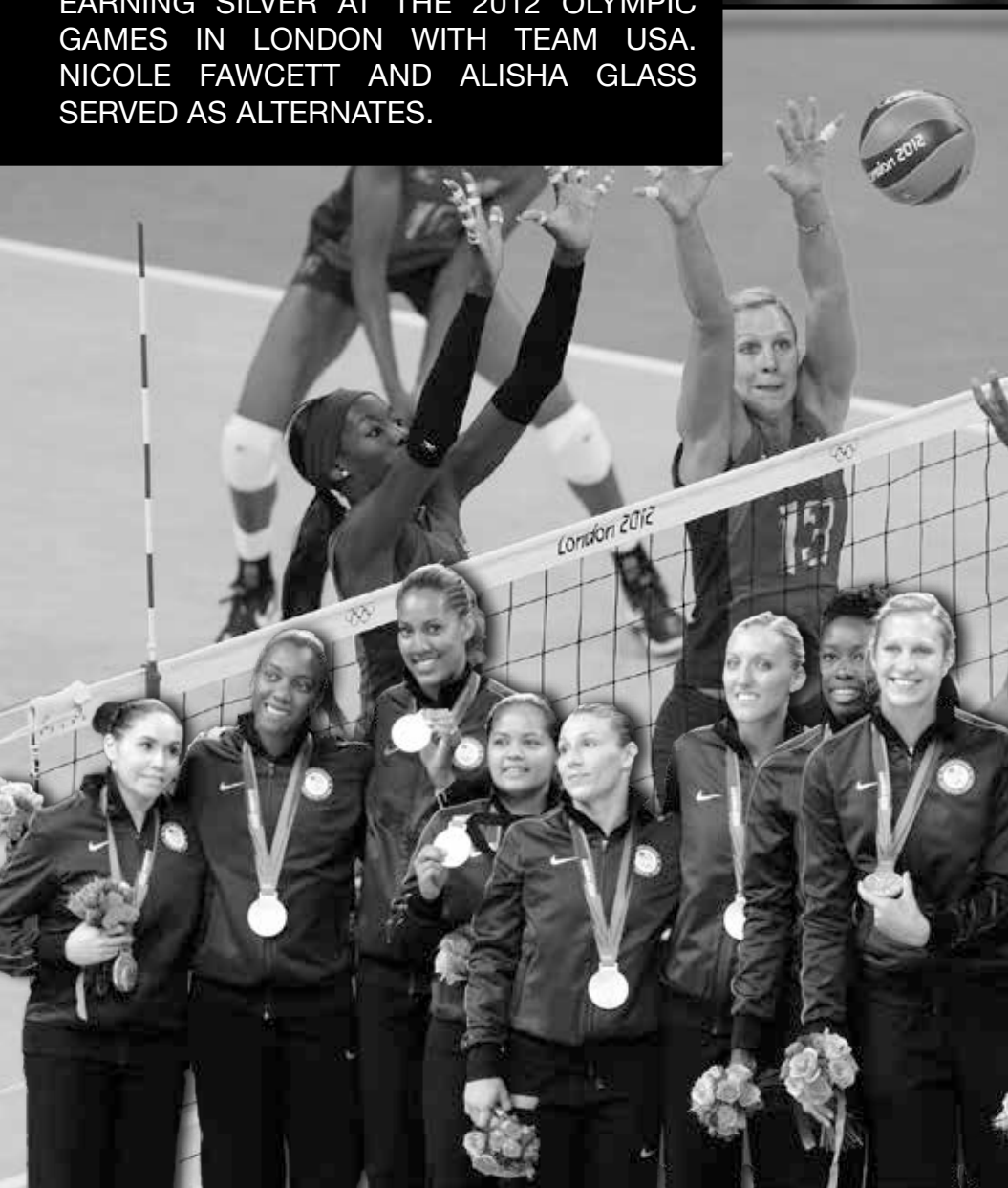

Parking is located the Nittany Parking Deck adjacent to the Nittany Lion Inn, and is free of charge with a valid credential.

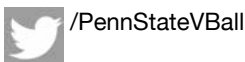

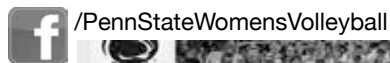
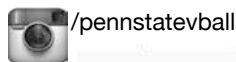

SCHEDULE NOTES

- Despite playing only Big Ten competition this season, Penn State still has 10 matches scheduled against teams that appeared in the AVCA Preseason Coaches Top 25 — two against No. 1 Wisconsin, two against No. 5 Nebraska, two against No. 7 Minnesota, two against No. 13 Purdue and two against No. 24 Michigan.

- More than 60 percent of the Lions' matches are scheduled to be on TV this season, with 12 scheduled to appear on Big Ten Network and one — Feb. 6 against Purdue at Rec Hall — on ESPNU.

- The end of Penn State's regular season schedule is as challenging as it gets and could determine the winner of the conference title. The Lions host preseason No. 1 Wisconsin for a pair of matches before closing things out with two matches at preseson No. 5 Nebraska.

- The NCAA Tournament will have a different look this season. It will be a 48-team bracket. Each conference still gets its automatic bid, so the fight for at-large bids will be something to keep an eye on. Penn State has played in all 39 NCAA Tournaments, all coming under the direction of head coach Russ Rose.

2020-21 OUTLOOK

In a season that is expected to be full of uncertainty that has nothing to do with the strength of the roster, one thing is known for the 2020-21 Penn State women's volleyball team. The junior class is undeniably good. The group has combined for seven All-America awards, seven All-Northeast Region honors and five All-Big Ten awards.

But, of course, more than any other season, no one really knows how their team will look or perform on a week-to-week basis. The Nittany Lions know what they're getting with the junior class, but questions still remain. Will the team be able to fill a couple of huge holes caused by graduation? Who will step up as vocal on-court leaders? Which sophomores put in the work to make the jump in their second season, and which newcomers are ready for the gauntlet that is Big Ten women's volleyball?



And that will be one of the biggest challenges of the 2020-21 season. There is no warmup. There are no non-conference tests to gauge where the team stands at a national level and what needs to be worked on before league play starts. The most competitive conference in the nation starts its battle right away. For Penn State, that challenge begins with two matches at Michigan on Jan. 22-23.

"Normally we have about four weeks in the regular season to kind of ease our way into Big Ten play. In this situation

all 14 Big Ten teams are playing Big Ten competition for 11-straight weeks. Everyone is going to have to be ready to go. It's going to be a little different physically and emotionally right out of the gate for some players," Penn State head coach Russ Rose said.

Each team will play 22 Big Ten matches against 11 opponents. Not including Penn State, five Big Ten teams appear in the AVCA Division I Coaches Top 25 Preseason Poll, and the ninth-ranked Lions play all five. That list of opponents includes No. 1 Wisconsin, No. 5 Nebraska, No. 7 Minnesota, No. 13 Purdue and No. 24 Michigan. The Lions close the regular season with two home matches against the Badgers and two road matches against the Huskers.

Penn State has the most experienced coach in the nation, but despite having 41 years of work in his rearview mirror, even Rose hasn't coached during a situation such as the one brought on by the COVID 19 pandemic. Of course, day-to-day life has changed this season, but relating just to changes on the structure of women's college volleyball, one of the biggest is that this year's NCAA Tournament will feature 48 teams instead of the usual 64. Each conference still gets its automatic bid, so it will be the teams fighting for the at-large spots that will have their eyes on that smaller number.

Rose has never had a problem making the NCAA Tournament. Literally, zero problem. He has led Penn State to an appearance in the championship tournament in all 39 years of its existence. Last year he led the team to a spot in the NCAA Regional Final. The Luons finished seventh in the nation, marking their 17th-straight year with a top-10 finish,

The current junior class played a large part in making that happen. Kaitlyn Hord had a breakout year while earning a spot on the All-America first team. Gabby Blossom took over as the team's starting setter and landed a spot on the All-America third team. Jonni Parker and Serena Gray were each honorable mentions. Jenna Hampton started 15 matches in the back row and is now ready to step up as the team's starting libero.

But the Lions have two huge holes to fill with the graduation of Kendall White, one of the best liberos in league history, and Tori Gorrell, a former middle blocker that made the transition to outside hitter and was possibly the team's best player on the court in the NCAA Tournament.

Joining the team this year are a group of eight newcomers that enter with a wide-range of experience. Five of them are freshmen, while three are transfers — a redshirt sophomore, a junior and a graduate student.

Penn State will turn to Parker and Blossom for leadership this season, as the two were named captains during the offseason.

"They're very strong, competitive women that others respond well, too," Rose said. "Some of the players are independent and more than capable of taking care of themselves, but then there's always that need for younger plays to have that veteran leadership for direction. I think Jonni and Gabby can certainly provide that."





SETTERS

Blossom had to wait her turn to be the team's starting setter, spending her freshman season playing as a defensive specialist, but she sure made the most of the opportunity when it came. Her sophomore season resulted in an All-America nod after ranking second in the Big Ten with 11.36 assists/set. She added 2.33 digs/set and 0.32 blocks/set.

The Lions know what they are getting from Blossom's play, but the next step for her is to become the vocal leader on the court, a role that was often filled by White from her libero position last season.

The good news for Penn State is the team's depth at the position is in a better spot than it was last year. That is fueled by the play of sophomore Emily Oerther, who Rose stated is one of the most improved players on the team.

"Gabby was an All-Big Ten player last year, and we expect Emily to continue to make contributions for us. Sophie Walls is also capable of making contributions."

Walls, a junior, is in her second season with the team after transferring in from the University of Miami following her rookie campaign.

MIDDLE BLOCKERS

It would be tough to find any team in the country that is as strong in the middle as Penn State is this season. The Lions are the only team in the nation that return two players from last year's All-America squad. Hord was a first-team honoree, while Gray was an honorable mention for the second-

straight year.

"We return two All-Americans in Serena and Kaitlyn, and I think both are continuing to get better," Rose said. "They're both stronger physically. The fact that both have worked with Gabby for a couple of years now, they're increasing their range and ability to hit both in front and behind the setter. They continue to develop as offensive players and have already been established as strong blockers."

Hord ranked second in the Big Ten and third in the nation in hitting percentage (.440) while averaging 2.65 kills/set last season. She ranked 23rd in the nation in total blocks (149) and 40th in blocks/set (1.27). Hord improved in nearly every statistical category in her second season, averaging more kills/set, hitting a higher percentage, and averaging more blocks/set. She was the most consistent player on the team, hitting over .300 in 27 of the team's 33 matches. She hit over .500 in 14 matches and had at least five total blocks 18 times.

Gray was 31st in the nation with a .382 hitting percentage that was bolstered by an outstanding performance in the NCAA Tournament. She was voted to the Stanford Regional All-Tournament Team after hitting .636 with 21 kills while not committing a single error on her 33 swings.

Allie Holland, a 6-3 freshman, will provide depth behind the two All-Americans.

"Allie's blocking is ahead of her attacking right now, but she's been working hard. She's a competitive player with a good feel for the game."

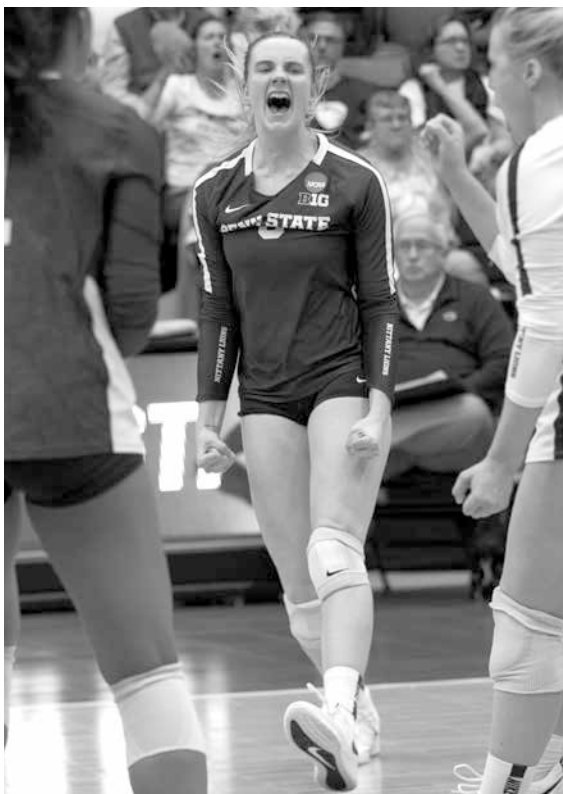
PINS

Parker is unquestionably the leader at this position, where she returns as a right side player with the ability to make the move to multiple other positions. She followed up a rookie season that saw her win the Big Ten Freshman of the Year award by earning her second-straight All-America nod.

Parker continued to be one the most versatile players in the conference last season. She was a unanimous first-team All-Big Ten selection while averaging 3.53 kills/set on .264 hitting, 1.67 digs/set, 0.38 aces/set and 0.63 blocks/set.

"Jonni continues to develop her game. She has great range as an attacker," Rose said.





Joining Parker as potential right side players that can also make the switch to the outside are Hannah Flowers, a graduate student that transferred to Penn State from Memphis, and freshman Macy Van Den Elzen, the Pennsylvania Gatorade Player of the Year in high school last season.

"Hannah had a different role on her team at Memphis. I think she's a good attacker. We will see how she can do in the conference," Rose said. "Macy is a versatile player that could also be a fourth middle for us."

Lauren Clark is the only other returning outside hitter for the Lions. The sophomore played in 40 sets over 21 matches as a freshman. Rose noted her along with Oerther as the team's most improved players and that she may be the team's strongest hitter.

A transfer and a freshman could play key roles in the team's success this season. Anastasiya Kudryashova, a redshirt sophomore, comes to Penn State after spending two years at Rutgers, while Annie Cate Fitzpatrick comes in as a highly-touted rookie.

"Anastasiya is coming off an injury while she was at Rutgers. Getting her healthy and transitioning from playing middle to the outside is what we have been working on with her. I think she has potential to be a successful outside attacker in the Big Ten. She has good size and good touch on the ball," Rose said.

"AC is a six-rotation player," Rose said. "Although she's undersized, she plays hard. She will have to develop the shots and knowledge necessary to play at this competitive level. A great deal of our success will be based on how she learns and what the rate of her knowledge curve is."

DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST/LIBERO

White graduated and is now playing professionally in France, but the situation at libero is far from dire for the Lions. Jenna Hampton has put in two solid seasons in the back row and is ready to take over as the leader of the defense.

"Right now, Jenna is the player most likely to be at the libro position," Rose said. "She has the most experience and confidence."

Hampton was one of the team's top servers with 27 aces as a freshman but an injury prevented her from showcasing that part of her game last year. Now recovered, she could display that strength again this season.

Helping fill out the back row will be sophomore Macall Peed, junior Keaton Broughton and freshman Maddy Bilinovic. Peed played in 44 sets over 25 matches as a freshman, while Broughton is a transfer from West Virginia. Rose said he expects Bilinovic to transition into a larger role in the future, but that she will first need to adapt to the speed and physicality of the college game.

Also providing depth in the back row, including at the service line, will be sophomore Molly Russell and Sam McCool. Russell saw time in five matches last season.



CLOSING THOUGHTS

"Losing Kendall White and Keaton Holcomb to graduation is a big challenge, because those two passed the most number of balls for us," Rose said. "It will be interesting to see how we do there. Also, losing Tori Gorrell is a challenge because she had such a good year for us last year as an outside hitter. We'll see how we can replace the contributions that she made."

"We're all excited to start the season. It's been a long preseason. That's how I would refer to the August-January timeline," Rose said. "The players are enthusiastic and excited about the opportunity to play some new opponents and see where they stand. From a coaching standpoint we are looking forward to seeing the development of some of our players. It's been a challenging period of time, and it's great that everyone even gets an opportunity to play. We're appreciative of that opportunity and hope that the players embrace it and play really hard."

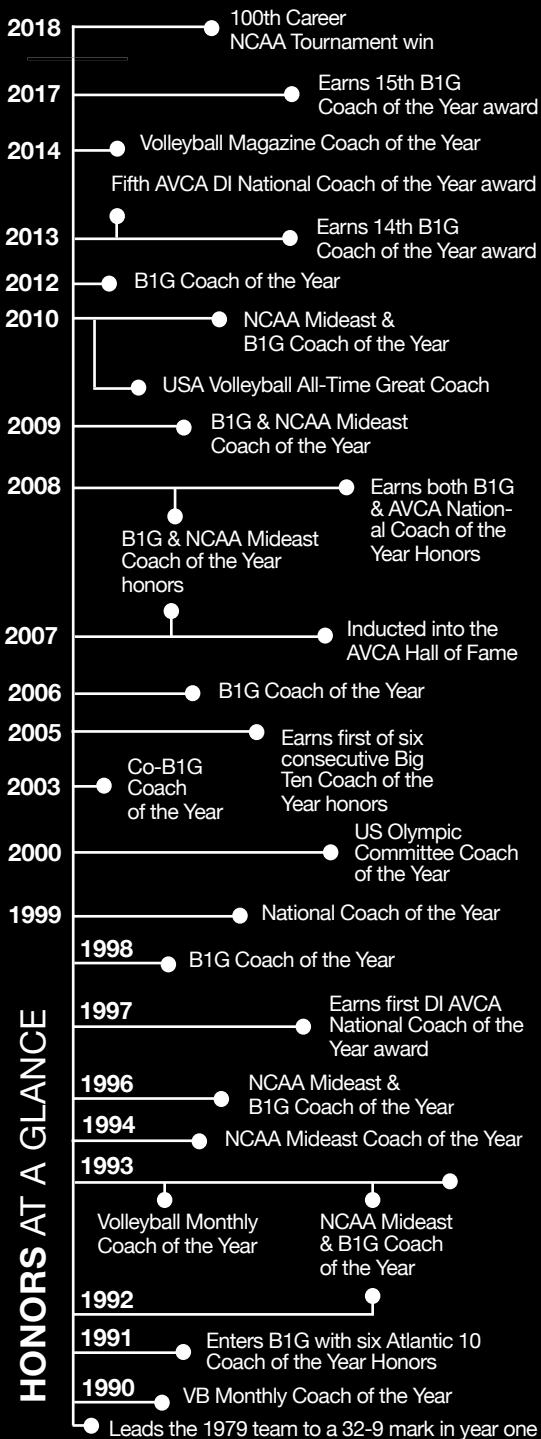

42nd year | George Williams '75
Career record: 1,299-212



It's been more than four decades since Russ Rose arrived on campus in Happy Valley. Entering his 42nd season at the helm of the Penn State women's volleyball, his name has become synonymous with the pride and tradition of the storied program. The leader of arguably the nation's most elite women's volleyball program, his record-setting seven NCAA national titles and 17 Big Ten championships speak directly to the confidence and character he's passed along throughout his career.

Few have come close to matching Rose's impressive win total, as he's collected victories at a staggering pace. Having never posted less than 22 wins in a season, his 1,299 career wins rank first all-time among NCAA DI head coaches.

As each year passes, his list of accomplishments continue to swell, but a quick snapshot of his legendary tenure might read something like this: The leader of a women's volleyball powerhouse who has kept his program among the nation's elite for 42 years, amassing a stunning career record of 1,299-212. He has guided his teams to a record-setting seven NCAA titles, including an unprecedented four consecutive championships from 2007-10. Along with 17 Big Ten titles, his program is one of only two women's volleyball schools to compete in all 39 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball National Championship tournaments. He has produced multiple Olympians, four AVCA National Players of the Year, 14 Big Ten Conference Players of the Year and at least one AVCA All-American in 40-of-41 seasons. His student-athletes excel in the classroom as well, with an outstanding 199 Academic All-Big Ten selections and 12 Academic All-Americans, who have earned 19 selections.

>> HE PREFERS NOT FOCUS ON PERSONAL ACCOLADES

Rose is the first to tell anyone who asks that he prefers to place the focus on the student-athlete, rather than his own personal accolades. As both a coach and an educator, Rose's impact at Penn State runs much deeper than women's volleyball. He teaches a yearly course in coaching ethics that regularly meets capacity each fall. He has also opened up several cultural opportunities for his student-athletes, taking his teams on five foreign trips to five different countries in the last 19 years.

>> AMONG THE ELITE: THE WINNINGEST DI COACH OF ALL TIME

It seemed only fitting that Rose's 1,000th career victory came against Hawaii's Dave Shoji, who was the only other active DI head coach to reach the milestone mark. It was December 18, 2009 when the top-ranked Nittany Lions advanced to the NCAA National Championship match with a 3-1 win against the No. 12 Rainbow Warriors. Victory number 1,001 came just two days later as Rose guided Penn State to its third consecutive National Championship with a thrilling come-from-behind five-set victory against No. 2 Texas.

Another 132 wins later, Rose entered the fourth week of the 2014 season just one win shy of tying Shoji for first place on the list of winningest active Division I head coaches with 1,132 victories. After a 4-0 weekend at home, he moved into first place, ahead of Shoji with 1,136 career wins. The two went back and forth throughout the season, but Penn State's run to its seventh National Championship in 2014 vaulted Rose 11 wins ahead of Shoji, placing him firmly atop the active Division I career standings at the conclusion of the season.

Prior to topping the list of Division I winningest active coaches by victories, his .861 career winning clip ranked first on the percentage chart for several years. Now at the top of both lists, he's one of just two active NCAA Division I coaches to amass more than 1,200 career wins and one of four active coaches across all three divisions to join the 1,000 victories club.

>> HE'S WON SEVEN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

After reaching the NCAA title match for two consecutive seasons from 1997-98, Penn State swept past top-ranked Stanford in the 1999 national final to earn the program's first NCAA Championship. It had been seven years since the Nittany Lions reached the field of final four teams when Penn State arrived in Sacramento, California for the 2007 national semifinals. Having already won their fifth consecutive Big Ten title with a perfect 20-0 mark in conference play, Penn State's group of four AVCA All-Americans helped the Nittany Lions to a thrilling five-set victory against Stanford for the program's second NCAA National Championship crown.

Rose's Nittany Lions improved upon 2007's result the very next season, winning their third national title to become the sixth women's volleyball program to win back-to-back championships and the fourth team to win it with an undefeated record. The 2008 team featured an entire starting front row of AVCA All-Americans, including National Player of the Year, Nicole Fawcett, who helped Penn State to a yet another perfect 38-0 record.

The Nittany Lions had won a record-breaking 111 consecutive sets on their way to the title before entering 2009 on a NCAA record-breaking 64-match winning streak. Penn State had set the scene once again in 2009 with another 20-0 record in conference play, helped out by four returning All-Americans in Megan Hodge, Alisha Glass, Arielle Wilson and Blair Brown.

Back-to-back national titles proved not enough for the Nittany Lions, who became the first team in Division I women's volleyball history to win three in a row with a come-from-behind triumph against No. 2 Texas in the 2009 national final. Along the way, Rose guided Penn State to a 38-0 record for the second-straight season, helping the team extend its record-breaking winning streak to 102-consecutive matches, a feat that has never been accomplished by any other team in NCAA women's volleyball history. He also mentored Hodge to AVCA National Player of the Year honors.



Rose was inducted into the AVCA Hall of Fame, held in conjunction with the 2007 NCAA National Championship in Sacramento, California.

Aside from those who believed Penn State's luck had run out, the Nittany Lions were unfazed and began a quest for a fourth-straight NCAA National Championship in 2010. In an unfortunate turn of events early in the season, Penn State's record-breaking winning streak came to an end at 109 consecutive matches. Stanford, the last team to defeat PSU in 2007, upended the Nittany Lions September 11, 2010 in the Nike Big Four Classic.

The Nittany Lions regrouped and won their eighth-straight and 14th overall Big Ten title to earn an automatic berth to NCAA Tournament. Proving unstoppable through tournament play, Penn State stormed past Texas in the national semifinal before capturing a 3-0 win against No. 8 California for an unprecedented fourth consecutive crown.

Just two seasons passed before the Nittany Lions were back in the NCAA final match, this time on the heels of their 16th Big Ten title in program history. Penn State was taking on fellow conference opponent Wisconsin in the first-ever all Big Ten title match in 2013. Penn State held off the Badgers in four sets to earn the program's sixth NCAA National Championship. Seniors Deja McClendon, Ariel Scott, Katie Slay and Maddie Martin rounded out their careers with two NCAA National Championships and a total of 10 AVCA All-America honors between the four of them.

With such key departures, many counted the Nittany Lions out of contention for the 2014 NCAA National Championship. Led by AVCA DI National Player of the Year Micha Hancock, the Nittany Lions pushed past top-ranked Stanford in the national semifinal before sweeping BYU to win its seventh NCAA National Championship.

Penn State's seven NCAA national championships stand as the second most of any women's volleyball program in history. With Rose at the helm of the program for all seven titles, he's the only Division I head coach in NCAA women's volleyball history to collect seven crowns at one school.

>> HE'S A GREAT DANCER

The Nittany Lions are one of only two NCAA Division I women's volleyball programs to compete in all 39 NCAA Championship postseason tournaments since 1981. In tournament play, the Nittany Lions own a 104-32 all-time record, having made 13 appearances in the final four.

Since 2007, Penn State has made more appearances in the NCAA national semifinals than any other program. PSU has participated in eight of the last 13 final fours.

Having never lost a first round matchup, the Nittany Lions are regular contenders in the later rounds of the event. Rose has guided his tournament teams to a total of 10 appearances in the NCAA national final. In the 2014 NCAA national final, Penn State captured a straight-set victory against BYU for its sixth NCAA National Championship in a span of eight years. PSU has not lost an NCAA title match since 1998. The BYU victory also marked the third time in history Penn State swept its national final opponent.

>> BY THE NUMBERS

Among all the victories, honors, title and awards, perhaps one of the most astounding set of numbers is Penn State's impressive home court record at Rec Hall. Rose has guided his teams to a total of 17 undefeated regular-season slates at home. The Nittany Lions have also put together a combined home court record of 655-42 across all 41 years of women's volleyball at Penn State, including a 287-24 record in home matches against current Big Ten opponents under the direction of Rose. Only one current Big Ten school has been able to top Penn State more than three times at home since joining the conference in 1991.

To date, Rose has guided his teams to no less than 22 wins per year, while also earning 30 or more wins in 27 seasons. Averaging it out, Rose's teams win 31.7 matches per year, while surrendering less than six losses (5.1) per season.

Rose's year-end finishes include: 39 consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament, wins in every single first round matchup, 10 national final appearances, 12 trips to the national semifinals and seven National Championships. In conference action, he guided his teams to eight consecutive Atlantic 10 championships from 1983-90, while also earning 17 Big Ten titles since joining the league in 1991.

>> COACHING HONORS

Across his tenure as head coach, Rose has been honored with a plethora of coaching awards. Most recently, Rose was honored as the Big Ten Coach of the Year in 2019. That award was not the first for Rose, who's earned National Coach of the Year honors five times and Big Ten Coach of the Year laurels on 16 occasions. Rose has also earned both national and conference Coach of the Year awards in the same season three times during his career.

In 2007, Rose was one of three coaches inducted into the America Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) Hall of Fame. In the same year, he was also honored as the AVCA DI National Coach of the Year, the AVCA Mideast Region Coach of the Year and the Big Ten Coach of The Year. In 2008, Rose repeated with the same trio of prestigious honors.

From 2005-10, Rose earned six consecutive Big Ten Coach of the Year awards, while also earning the back-to-back national recognition in 2007 and 2008. In the last 16 years, he's been voted the Big Ten Coach of the Year 10 times, receiving two-straight selections from 2012-13. Additionally, Rose has earned AVCA Regional Coach of the Year honors a total of 11 times.

Prior to the Big Ten Conference, Rose earned Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year honors six times, while guiding his teams to eight consecutive championships. In seven seasons of round-robin play, the Nittany Lions never lost a conference match, putting together a string of 49 consecutive wins before heading into the Big Ten Conference in 1991.

>> HE HAS AN ICE CREAM FLAVOR

In 2014, Penn State's renowned Berkey Creamery unveiled a new "Hall of Fame" ice cream flavor named after Rose. The flavor, Russ "digs" Roseberry, joins the creamery's lineup of "Hall of Fame" permanent flavors, which pay tribute to Penn State people and institutions that have had significant impact on the university and wider community.

The ice cream variety is made with black raspberry puree, whole strawberries, red raspberry sauce and Wilbur's chocolate in a strawberry base. The addition of Rose's flavor marked the first time in more than 20 years that the Berkey Creamery released a "Hall of Fame" flavor, with the last release being "Peachy Paterno" in honor of Joe Paterno.

>> INTERNATIONAL INVOLVEMENT & OTHER NOTABLE AWARDS

Throughout his career, Rose has been called upon to share his expertise with the coaches and players who represent the United States in international competition. Rose served as head coach of the United States men's team, which won the bronze medal at the 1985 Maccabiah Games, and the United States women's silver medal team in the 1981 Maccabiah Games. He won bronze medals as an assistant coach of the women's team in the 1982 National Sports Festival and as the East women's head coach at the 1983 Festival.

In 1989, he was an assistant coach with the United States men's national team for an exhibition series with Canada and the Soviet Union.

In 1990, Rose worked with members of the men's national and developmental teams during training camp in San Diego. In 1993, he assisted in the U.S. men's matches with Canada and the women's team against China. He also assisted the U.S. men as they prepared for the 2000 Olympics in Sydney.

In the summer of 2002, Rose assisted the U.S. men's team on a 13-day tour of Italy where they competed against the world's top teams, including Brazil, Italy, Yugoslavia, Russia and Holland. In 2014, he went with the U.S. men's team to the World League matches against Bulgaria.

He also served as team manager for the U.S. men's team at the Four Nations Tournament in Leipzig, Germany, in May of 2008. Rose was also inducted into the National Jewish Sports Hall of Fame in 2010.

In June 2011, Rose served as the team leader to the U.S. Women's National Team at the Montreux Volley Masters in Montreux, Switzerland. He joined former Nittany Lions, Megan Hodge, Alisha Glass and Nicole Fawcett. The squad went 2-1 in pool play and finished fourth overall.

An instructor in the USVBA coaches certification program, Rose has previously served as a national referee and evaluator and state director for volleyball for the Special Olympics. In 2005, USA Volleyball named Rose one of their All-Time Great Coaches, making him the first Big Ten coach to ever receive the honor.

An active clinician, Rose also coached professional men's volleyball in the Superior League in Puerto Rico in 1976 and has continued to do clinics on the island as well as in the United States and

Europe. Rose was also member of the NCAA Division I Volleyball Committee for six years and the NCAA representative to the United States Volleyball Association Rules Committee.

Rose was selected as the recipient of the 2013 Honorary Penn State Alumni award. A prestigious honor, the Honorary Alumni Awards are presented to individuals who are not Penn State graduates, but have made significant contributions to the welfare, reputation and prestige of the institution. The award is only given when the Alumni Association wishes to honor an exceptional person.

>> A ROSE IN HAPPY VALLEY

Rose graduated from George Williams College in 1975, having played volleyball on the school's 1974 National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics National Championship team.

Following graduation, Rose remained at George Williams for two years as a part time coach, helping the women's team win two state titles, as well as a sixth-place finish in national competition.

He also served as an assistant for the men's team that won the NAIA national championship in 1977.

In 1978, he completed his master's degree at Nebraska, while also serving as the defensive coach for the Cornhuskers.

While writing his thesis on volleyball statistics, he led the junior varsity team to a two-year varsity mark of 52-5.

After leaving Nebraska, Rose had plans to continue his postgraduate education at BYU before a last minute change of plans brought him to Happy Valley.

"I was accepted at BYU to get my EdD," Rose said. "I received a teaching assistantship. I was ready to go. I met with the resident bishop and then I was offered the Penn State job."

It was 1979 when Rose arrived on campus, set to take the reigns of the women's volleyball program from legendary Penn State men's and women's volleyball head coach Tom Tait.

"I had just turned 25," Rose said. "I was happy I had a coaching job, I didn't know what I didn't know. I didn't have an office. I didn't have a telephone, I didn't have anything. I had 16 or 18 classes to teach a year, no assistant coach. I thought I had a good deal."

His first career victory at Penn State came September

21, 1979, when Rose guided the Nittany Lions to a 2-0 (17-15, 15-13) win against Navy in the season opener at the George Washington Invitational.

Rose led the 1979 Penn State women's volleyball team to a 32-9 overall record in his first season at the helm of the program. The result of a successful season? A \$400 raise.

Rose married Lori Barberich, a former three-time All-American at Penn State, in 1986. Together, they have four sons, Jonathan, Michael, Christopher and Nicholas.

Russ Rose has taken Penn State from the regionally competitive level to that of an NCAA power since he took over the Penn State women's volleyball program in 1979. The development has been complete and successful, because of excellent talent and an equally sound method. The following is "the Russ Rose coaching philosophy."

COACH'S ROLE

"I believe the coach has numerous roles that require constant review and attention. First, and foremost, is the recruitment of quality student-athletes. With effective coaching, athletes have always been the key to a team's success."

"Secondly, we as a staff have to relate to the players what we feel is important for their growth and success. All the knowledge in the world will prove to be useless if we can't prepare our team for competition. We've shown this to be one of our strengths. I have great confidence that Katie, having played for me as well as Dennis and Chris understand me and the program. I know they will do whatever it takes to help the players improve and pursue their dreams."

"Third, we have to prepare the team, physically, tactically and mentally. The physical preparation is easy, as the entire Penn State environment encourages the pursuit of excellence as shown by our years of high finishes in the Director's Cup results. The fact that all of our fall sports teams have won Big Ten titles more than reinforces that school of thought. The mental aspect of our players' development is one of the areas that I feel has separated us from our competition. We are committed as a group to reaching the highest levels possible - year in and year out. The team understands the need to be accountable, and I'm not hesitant to get their focus headed in the right direction."

"Certainly our time in the Big Ten has demonstrated to us the importance of making sure that the players are aware of what is going to be expected of them in a conference as strong as the Big Ten. It's been the strongest conference in the country as determined by the RPI and has led the nation in attendance for a number of years."

"Outside the Big Ten, we commit to play a competitive non-conference schedule. We continually strive to meet teams during the regular-season that have advanced in the national championship playoffs. It is a goal of mine for Penn State to always be in the top five in strength of schedule. We reached that goal in 2018 as we finished at No. 5 in the RPI."

"I contend that the best way to see where our team is and where we aspire to be, is to play the nation's best teams. Our administration has allowed us to compete annually for the national championship. Universities enable teams to compete for the national championship. I have been blessed to have an administration that possessed the vision to support our program and I feel we have been able to deliver. It starts at the top with a University President and Athletic Director and staff who guide and assist the program."

"I think our role here is to attract the type of player who wants to be at Penn State, understands what we are about and knows what it will take to fit into our program. I refuse to be in the position where we are going to be saying one thing to get a player interested in Penn State and then change our story once the athlete arrives on campus. I am interested in players who are willing to be up front, committed and passionate in what they see in their own development and what we can do to help them succeed. I want players that want to be at Penn State rather than telling players what they want to hear."

"In turn, players must be willing to commit to the process and accept the culture of our program. They must work to be the best they can be every day in training, at practice and in matches. When those things happen, the results speak for themselves. It is a collaborative effort. Every team is different and has its own methods and paths to follow with the ultimate goal of being successful."



"Over the years I have been contacted by numerous schools as well as the U.S. National Team and foreign professional teams regarding vacant coaching positions, however I feel that the support I receive from the administration at Penn State is perfect for me, and I have no interest in coaching anywhere but Penn State. The opportunity to work and travel with our men's and women's national teams is perfect and it has allowed me to see the best volleyball played in the world."

TEAM PLAY

"Team play really deals with volleyball being the ultimate team sport. The last few years, we've not only had outstanding talent but we've had a great team spirit. Talent can get you only so far. If players aren't working together and committed to achieve great things, sacrificing and willing to embrace the needs of the team, then the team isn't going to shine. I can't guarantee recruits that we're going to win a conference championship or play for a national championship, albeit our goals should be along those lines. I guarantee them they're going to get better, be treated fairly and will receive an opportunity to play. We have multiple players in the USA program and that showcases our product."

"The team that is willing to emphasize the pursuit of excellence at its own personal expense is the team that most often succeeds. Our success over the years, where we have won numerous conference titles and advanced to the national semifinal and championship matches, continues to reinforce these beliefs. The seven national championships are clearly the icing on the cake. A national championship does not validate a coach, a player or their program and its alumni. It highlights the efforts of many and allows the community to celebrate the actions of the team. Our goal is to remain at that level and even if we fall short, we know that we are in the game. The pursuit is the challenge and getting to the final match is the reward."

FUNDAMENTALS

"Fundamentals and the player's development of them are the most important aspect of the game. The game is played by players who have to be able to execute the basic skills of the game. We try to recruit student-athletes who are great volleyball players but the game always comes down to the execution of the core fundamentals."

"I will not sacrifice the time necessary to develop a strong foundation. This is where a team's discipline and confidence is first introduced and developed. Our commitment to each team is for every one of our players to be challenged to become the best they can be every day. I know our players are constantly improving their game here. I can't guarantee victories but I can guarantee a player will improve at Penn State, and that is evidenced by the number of athletes who have received individual awards or chosen to further their careers with the national team or receive the opportunity to play professionally. The fact that no school has more players playing professionally speaks for the training they receive."

TEAM DEFENSE

"Team defense is always an area we pride ourselves on and has always been one of the staples of our program. The pursuit of the ball in a game can only occur through preparation and repetition. I believe that everyone in the program has to rally around certain principles. At Penn State, we play hard, controlled defense, which means every player pursues every ball or they are taken out. I believe if you train hard, then the game itself begins to appear easy. If a player starts making decisions on what ball they think they can get and what they think is somebody else's ball, that's when we try to make some adjustments and get someone else involved in the play. Our defensive philosophy is to keep every ball in play – every day of each season in practice as well as games. I believe we have shown this works over the long haul. Defense and winning are an attitude and we attempt to do the latter by emphasizing the former. I feel our defense and grit in multiple title matches was the key to our victories."

STUDENT-ATHLETE

"The term student-athlete is a very valid one here at Penn State and in the Big Ten. We recruit not only quality athletes, but quality students as well. There is no question in my mind that the well-rounded individual will be better prepared to deal with the numerous challenges faced in life. The programs available at Penn State are geared for success. The opportunity to pursue your potential, both academically and athletically, is in place and working well at Penn State. The student support services at Penn State and the job Jim Weaver does with our team is outstanding. It is a reflection of the entire athletic department's commitment to provide the necessary services for the student-athletes to pursue and achieve their dreams."

"I expect a commitment both to academics and athletics. I take great pride in the fact that every young woman who has entered our program and completed her playing eligibility has received or is working toward her degree. Rankings of the 31 athletic programs on campus reveal that the women's volleyball team annually posts one of the highest cumulative grade-point averages. With proper emphasis on the importance of maintaining high academic standards, I know we will achieve continual success. At Penn State, we have had the most members of the Academic All-Big Ten team as a sport and an institution since joining the conference, and we take great pride in always have two or three academic All-Americans each year. That speaks volumes about our student-athletes as well as our academic advising staff."

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

"The Big Ten, in my opinion, continues to be the strongest conferences in the country in both fan support and performance. It is a conference that is totally committed to the pursuit of excellence. The opportunity to play volleyball in the Big Ten truly enhances our program. The excitement generated by the athletes and fans at matches is great for the sport. It continues to be a great environment in which to compete. The conference has been ranked No. 1 in the volleyball RPI ratings since 1998 and has been a national leader in attendance the past ten years. Additionally, no conference has had more teams advance to the final four."

PENN STATE UNIVERSITY

"Penn State as a school has been very fortunate and good for women's volleyball. I don't think there is another school in the country that has the support of everyone from the president of the university and the athletic director, to the residents of State College. Our players really reap the benefits of being at Penn State. I am extremely optimistic on the future of Penn State women's volleyball and there is no place in the country I'd rather be than Penn State. The community has supported us during our development and the university's commitment is to be the best in everything it offers, from academics and research to music and the arts as well as athletics."

RECRUITING

"Recruiting is the life blood of a program and a team. It is our goal to encourage quality student athletes to visit Penn State with their parents to get a realistic view of what is really entailed with what we refer to as the 'Penn State Experience.' The campus, the environment and face of State College truly separates us from many of the other schools in the country as we exemplify the meaning of a 'college town.' The chemistry that exists between the team members is what has kept us competitive and the energy that exists between the university and the town of State College keeps the juices flowing. We want players that want to make a commitment to be the best that they can be. We also want players to be aware of the fact that I am looking for a level of accountability from them as well. I'm

not looking for a situation where I'm going to spend 24 hours a day, seven days a week trying to monitor their lifestyles or get involved in preventing them from having a good time. I believe the college experience at this time in their lives is the greatest opportunity to have fun and explore. I think you live hard and play hard and at Penn State, the students have a great opportunity to have fun in multiple areas."

STAFF

"I feel great about our staff. Some people would think that having people who are from their alma mater would be a negative but I see it as a positive. It's a positive thing to have people with experience involved because they know in this program, they are going to be encouraged to have an opinion and their opinions are going to be heard. I respect what my former players have to say and the players can turn to them and get good feedback and not be dependent on having to interact with me all of the time. An additional benefit that is important in our philosophy is that we try and look at the strengths of the players and how best to get them to contribute as well as continue to meet their goals. We think it's a tremendous bonus."

"I am thrilled to have Katie Schumacher-Cawley return to Penn State as an assistant. She was a terrific student-athlete here for both women's volleyball and women's basketball, and has had an extended career as a head coach at both the University of Illinois-Chicago as well as a season at Penn. Katie brings a great awareness of the history and the demands of being a Penn State women's volleyball student-athlete. She will make great contributions in working with the players with their transition to college as she is a person that the players will naturally gravitate towards. I have great confidence that she will be able to share with the players about being a student-athlete and being a young woman, and contributing to our program."

"One of the great things about Dennis Hohenshelt returning as an assistant is that we have worked together before. We know each other's strengths and weaknesses. I have a great confidence in Dennis and his abilities to work with the players. I believe he is a far smarter coach from his five years as a head coach at Virginia, and I think those years and experiences will make him even more valuable to the Penn State volleyball community."

"We're one of five schools in the country who have had a men's and a women's team that have won a national championship in volleyball and the only school outside of California and Hawaii that can make that claim and I think it's terrific that volleyball is on the map here year round. The interaction between the men's and women's programs here is exceptional. Both schools winning the national title's during the same academic year allow the sport to be recognized nationally and valued here by our many fans and the great student support."

BOOSTER CLUB

"Our Booster Club has been outstanding with everything we've asked them to be involved in. They funded our five foreign trips (Cuba, Italy and Brazil and Europe), pay for our banquet and support us at home and on the road. They also provide a welcoming environment for the players away from home where they can go for dinner and can interact with people who are supportive of the program. The Boosters are incredibly welcoming. I always get comments from parents of recruits about how welcoming everyone is. I think that's a part of Penn State and State College and it's been a big part of our program. The program has a lot of moving parts, but we are lucky that they are all moving in the right direction."

IN THE COACHING RANKS AFTER PENN STATE

Head coach Russ Rose has produced many of the nation's top players in his 42 years at the helm of the Penn State program. However, his players and staff don't end their paths once they graduate or move away. A great number of Nittany Lion alumni have successful professional volleyball careers and are also pursuing coaching careers at high schools, clubs and universities across the country. Listed to the right are the names of former staff members and student-athletes who have entered the coaching ranks after spending time at Penn State.

After three seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Texas at San Antonio, two-time national champion Dominique Gonzalez was hired as an assistant coach at Michigan State in January 2020. Gonzalez wrapped up her career at Penn State ranked fourth on the Nittany Lion career digs list with 1,474 all-time.

Stanford head women's volleyball coach Kevin Hambly announced the hiring of Alisha Childress (Glass) as an assistant coach on January 18, 2019. Childress helped the Cardinal win the 2020 national title. She was a three-time All-American setter while leading Penn State to three consecutive national titles (2007-09).

In conjunction with Penn State's 50 years of Women in Sport celebration during the 2014 season, the Nittany Lions hosted the first-ever Penn State Alumni Classic. The tournament featured four opponents who were all former Nittany Lions including: former Eastern Illinois head coach Kate Price (2008), former DePaul head coach Nadia Edwards (2001), former University of Illinois-Chicago head coach Katie Shumacher-Cawley (2002) and East Carolina's Julie Torbett (1990).

Dennis Hohenshelt rejoined the Penn State women's volleyball staff as a volunteer assistant prior to the 2017 season and then was promoted to assistant coach prior to the 2018 season. Hohenshelt spent 16 seasons at Penn State with the men's and women's volleyball teams prior to a five-year stint as the women's volleyball coach at Virginia.

Hohenshelt spent the 2017 season as the volunteer assistant coach for the Nittany Lions, and was a key component to Penn State's NCAA Tournament semifinal run. The team then went 53-14 and advanced to back-to-back NCAA Regional Finals in the two seasons since he was promoted to his current assistant coach position.

Prior to his return to Happy Valley, Hohenshelt spent five seasons as the head coach at the University of Virginia, being named head coach in January 2012. Hohenshelt led the Cavaliers to three .500-plus seasons, in both ACC play and on the season.

In his second season at UVa, the Cavaliers doubled their win total from the previous season and finished with an 18-14 record and an 11-9 record in ACC play. The Cavaliers' 18 overall and 11 conference wins were the most since 2007, when the team finished 18-13, 13-9 ACC.

Under his direction, the Cavaliers had eight All-ACC selections, the 2013 ACC Freshman of the Year, 2015 East Coast Region Freshman of the Year and four All-ACC Freshman team honorees. Virginia also had its first AVCA All-American since 2007 when Lauren Fuller was named to the honorable mention team in 2015. Additionally, four Hoos claimed AVCA All-Region accolades during Hohenshelt's tenure.

Before taking the reins at UVa, Hohenshelt was an assistant coach with the Penn State women's team for six seasons after spending 10 campaigns with the Nittany Lion men's team.

With the women's program at Penn State, which won four consecutive NCAA titles from 2007-10, Hohenshelt was involved in match preparation, player development and recruiting. He helped guide Arielle Wilson to set the NCAA Division I record for career hitting percentage at .468 and earn 2007 Big Ten Freshman of the Year and University Park NCAA Regional Championship Most Outstanding Player honors.

Hohenshelt helped the Penn State men's team to the 2006 National Championship match for the first time in 11 years and assisted in recruiting the core of the 2008 team that won the NCAA crown.

During Hohenshelt's tenure, the women's program compiled a 199-18 (.917) record, while the men's team went 237-82 (.743) with Hohenshelt on staff.

A native of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, Hohenshelt received his bachelor's degree in secondary education and social studies from Juniata College in 1993, where he led the Eagles to consecutive Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association (EIVA) titles in 1992 and 1993 and earned Most Valuable Player honors his senior year.

Hohenshelt began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Huntingdon (Pa.) High School from 1993-95 and was an assistant at Juniata from 1994-95. After being promoted to head coach in 1996, he led the Eagles to an 18-8 record and a second-place finish in the EIVA Division III Tournament.

He currently resides in State College with his wife, Tara, and three children, Jacob, Reese and Axl. Tara, formerly Rowlyk, was a four-year defender for the women's lacrosse team at Penn State. She helped lead the Lions to the 1995 NCAA National Semifinals and the quarterfinals in both 1996 and 1997.

Katie Schumacher-Cawley, a two-time All-American and a member of Penn State's 1999 National Championship team, recently finished her second season as an assistant coach on the Nittany Lions' women's volleyball staff. She returned to State College after serving as a head coach for the previous nine seasons at Penn and Illinois-Chicago (UIC).

Penn State advanced to the NCAA Regional Final in each of the two seasons that Schumacher-Cawley returned to Penn State, finishing sixth in the 2018 national rankings and seventh in 2019. Seven Nittany Lions combined for 11 All-America honors as the team went 53-14 over those two seasons.

During the 2017 season at Penn, Schumacher-Cawley led the Quakers to a 12-11 record, while going 7-7 in Ivy League play. The seven wins in the Ivy League were the most by a Penn head coach in their first year. She also guided the Quakers to notable conference wins, including defeating Yale for the first time since 2010.

Prior to her tenure at Penn, Schumacher-Cawley spent 14 years coaching at UIC, including eight as the head coach (2009-16). She recorded 113 wins as the Flames' head coach, which is third on the program's all-time list, and oversaw UIC's run to the Horizon League Championship match and a runner-up finish in 2012.

While at UIC, she mentored a two-time Horizon League Player of the Year in Stephanie Yancy (2014 & 2015), along with 11 All-Horizon League selections and three Horizon League All-Newcomer Team recipients.

A 2002 graduate of Penn State, Schumacher-Cawley helped lead the Nittany Lions to the 1999 NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship, the program's first national title, and three Big Ten Conference crowns during her career. She was a two-time American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-American, three-time All-Big Ten selection and three-time AVCA All-Region selection. Schumacher ended her career with 1,310 kills, 772 digs and 299 blocks. Schumacher-Cawley also played basketball for the Lady Lion Basketball team in 2001-02.

A Chicago native, Schumacher-Cawley played volleyball and basketball at Mother McAuley High School and led the Mighty Macs to state and national titles in volleyball. She was inducted into both the Girls Catholic Athletic Conference (GCAC) Hall of Fame and the Catholic League Hall of Fame in 2003. In 2008, a resolution in the Illinois House of Representatives congratulated Schumacher-Cawley for her achievements. On October 15, 2008, she was inducted into the prestigious Chicagoland Sports Hall of Fame for her contributions to the sport of volleyball as an athlete and a coach. She was part of a class that also included Pro Football Hall of Famers Dick Butkus, Gale Sayers and Marv Levy; Chicago Cubs great Andre Dawson and Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley.

Schumacher-Cawley earned her Bachelor of Arts in communications from Penn State in May 2002. She is married to Mike Cawley, who was a James Madison University football student-athlete from 1993-95, and they have three daughters, Stella, Nora and Shea.

Jeremy Garcia enters his first season as a volunteer assistant coach with the Penn State women's volleyball program. He arrives after spending four years working with the University of Texas team as a student manager/volunteer assistant while pursuing his undergraduate degree.

During his time working at Texas, the Longhorns were a perennially nationally-ranked team. They won four straight Big XII titles and were a two-time NCAA Regional finalist.

In addition to his work with Texas, Garcia was an assistant coach with the Austin Junior Volleyball program from 2017-20. He helped guide teams to a USA Volleyball Girls' Junior Nationals bronze medal in 2018 and to a fifth-place finish in 2019.

Brian Toron is in his first year as the director of operations for the Penn State women's volleyball team. He arrived in State College after spending the past two seasons as an assistant coach at Hofstra.

Hofstra went 42-20 overall and 23-9 in the CAA during the two seasons with Toron on staff. In his first season as an assistant coach, the Pride went 25-8 overall and earned a berth in the NCAA Tournament after winning the CAA regular season and Tournament titles. It was the team's first CAA title since 2014.

Prior to his time at Hofstra, Toron worked as a technical coordinator with the Northwestern volleyball team.

Toron began his coaching career at Delaware, where he served in a variety of roles from 2014-2016. He started as a volunteer assistant before moving up the coaching ladder to become the director of volleyball operations for a year before being named the interim head coach during the 2016 campaign. After being named the interim head coach, Toron led Delaware to a 10-3 record and a spot in the CAACHampionship match.

Toron has extensive experience with USA Volleyball as he works with the A2 HP program.

Kaitlyn Hord won Penn State's lone Big Ten Player of the Week award in 2019. She went on to earn first-team AVCA All-America recognition, was a unanimous selection on the All-Big Ten first team and earned a spot on the AVCA All-Northeast Region Team.



Kaitlyn Hord's outstanding sophomore season earned her a spot on the ACVA All-America first team. She was an honorable mention in 2018.



In her first season as the starting setter, Gabby Blossom was voted to the ACVA All-America third team.



Jonni Parker was a third-team AVCA All-America selection as a freshman and was named an honorable mention as a sophomore.



Serena Gray was an honorable-mention AVCA All-American as a freshman in 2018 and then again as a sophomore in 2019.

AVCA ALL-AMERICANS

Five Nittany Lions were selected to the AVCA DI All-America teams in 2019. Kaitlyn Hord was named a first-team All-American, Kendall White was voted to the second team, Gabby Blossom made the third team, and Jonni Parker and Serena Gray were honorable mentions.

Penn State now has 50 All-American athletes who have collected 108 All-America honors since 1979.

Hord, a middle blocker, made a huge jump in her second season with the Nittany Lions, moving all the way up to the first team after receiving honorable mention recognition in 2018. She ranked second in the Big Ten and third in the nation in hitting percentage (.440) while averaging 2.65 kills/set. She ranked 23rd in the nation in total blocks (149) and 40th in blocks/set (1.27).

White left Penn State as the most prolific libero in program history with a record 1,994 career digs. That number, as well as her reception and passing abilities, led to her becoming the first libero in program history to earn three All-America honors, adding to her first team award as a junior and her third team award as a sophomore.

Blossom earned a spot on the third team in her first season as the team's starting setter after guiding Penn State to the second-highest hitting percentage in the Big Ten. She averaged 11.36 assists/set, good enough for second in the Big Ten, and added 25 aces, 2.33 digs/set, and 0.32 blocks/set.

Parker averaged more kills/set (3.53 to 3.00), a higher hitting percentage (.264 to .260) and more aces/set (0.38 to 0.21) than she did when she made the third team in 2018. She added 1.67 digs/set and 0.63 blocks/set.

Gray, a middle blocker, was 31st in the nation with a .382 hitting percentage that was bolstered by an outstanding performance in the NCAA Tournament. She was voted to the Stanford Regional All-Tournament Team after hitting .636 with 21 kills while not committing a single error on her 33 swings.

BIG TEN POSTSEASON AWARDS

Penn State women's volleyball picked up two major awards from the Big Ten and had four players make all-conference teams on Wednesday. Senior Kendall White was voted the Defensive Player of the Year for the second-straight season, while Russ Rose was named the Coach of the Year in a vote of the league's 14 head coaches.

Joining White as unanimous first team All-Big Ten selections were sophomores Kaitlyn Hord and Jonni Parker. Gabby Blossom earned a spot on the second team. Emily Sciorra received a Big Ten Sportsmanship Award.

White, a three-time All-America selection at libero, is the first two-time Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year in Penn State history. The award was first handed out in 2001. It is the fifth time a Penn State player has earned the award and the third-straight year the award was given to a Nittany Lion player.

Rose was voted the Big Ten Coach of the Year for the 16th time in the 37 years the award has existed. Penn State was picked fourth in the league's preseason poll but finished tied for second in the final standings with a 24-5 overall record and a 17-3 mark in the conference. Rose had the Lions in a position for a chance to win the Big Ten heading into the final match of the season.

Penn State made the NCAA Tournament for a 39th consecutive season. The Lions are one of just two programs to compete in every NCAA Tournament, while Rose is the only head coach to lead a team in all 39 championship tournaments.

AVCA TOP 25 2019 COACHES POLL

Penn State opened the season at No. 8 and rose to as high as No. 4 in the poll. The Nittany Lions finished the season at No. 7 in the poll.

2019 NCAA TOURNAMENT IN REVIEW

With a 104-32 all-time record in the NCAA tournament, Penn State made its 17th consecutive trip to the NCAA regional semifinal ... Penn State advanced to the regional final game for the third-straight year, with the Blue & White falling at the hands of the eventual National Champion, Stanford. The Nittany Lions' streak of appearances in the round of 16 remains the longest active DI stretch.

Penn State improved to 25-5 all-time in true second round matches (beginning in 1998) of the NCAA Tournament after a four-set victory over Towson. The win against the Tigers also marked PSU's 17th consecutive second-round victory, since 2002, when Temple knocked PSU out of the tourney.

PSU has hosted the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament 33 times since 1981, welcoming three teams to Rec Hall for 30 consecutive years. Penn State improved to 34-5 all-time in opening matches of the tourney, after topping Princeton.



Penn State welcomed 6,305 fans Saturday, Nov. 11, 2017, for a matchup against Maryland. The Nittany Lions swept past the Maryland for its first sell out of the year, and the largest crowd since welcoming USC to Rec Hall Aug. 27, 2011 for the AVCA Showcase.

CONFERENCE-WIDE SUCCESSES

The Big Ten advanced two programs to the NCAA national semifinals, No. 4-seed Wisconsin and No. 7-seed Minnesota. Wisconsin and Minnesota's national semifinal berths mark the 17th-straight year that the Big Ten has had at least one team in the national semifinals. Since 1981, at least one conference team has reached the national semifinals 21 times and two teams have appeared a total of 12 times. Wisconsin advanced to the NCAA women's volleyball national championship match.

Four active Big Ten coaches have recorded at least 600 career wins: Penn State's Russ Rose (1,299), Nebraska's John Cook (749), Michigan State's Cathy George (653) and Michigan's Mark Rosen (638).

Thirteen Big Ten volleyball student-athletes were selected as AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) All-Americans, as announced by the AVCA. Four Big Ten student-athletes were first-team All-America selections. Represented on the first team were Penn State's Kaitlyn Hord, Wisconsin's Sydney Hilley and Dana Rettke, and Minnesota's Regan Pittman.

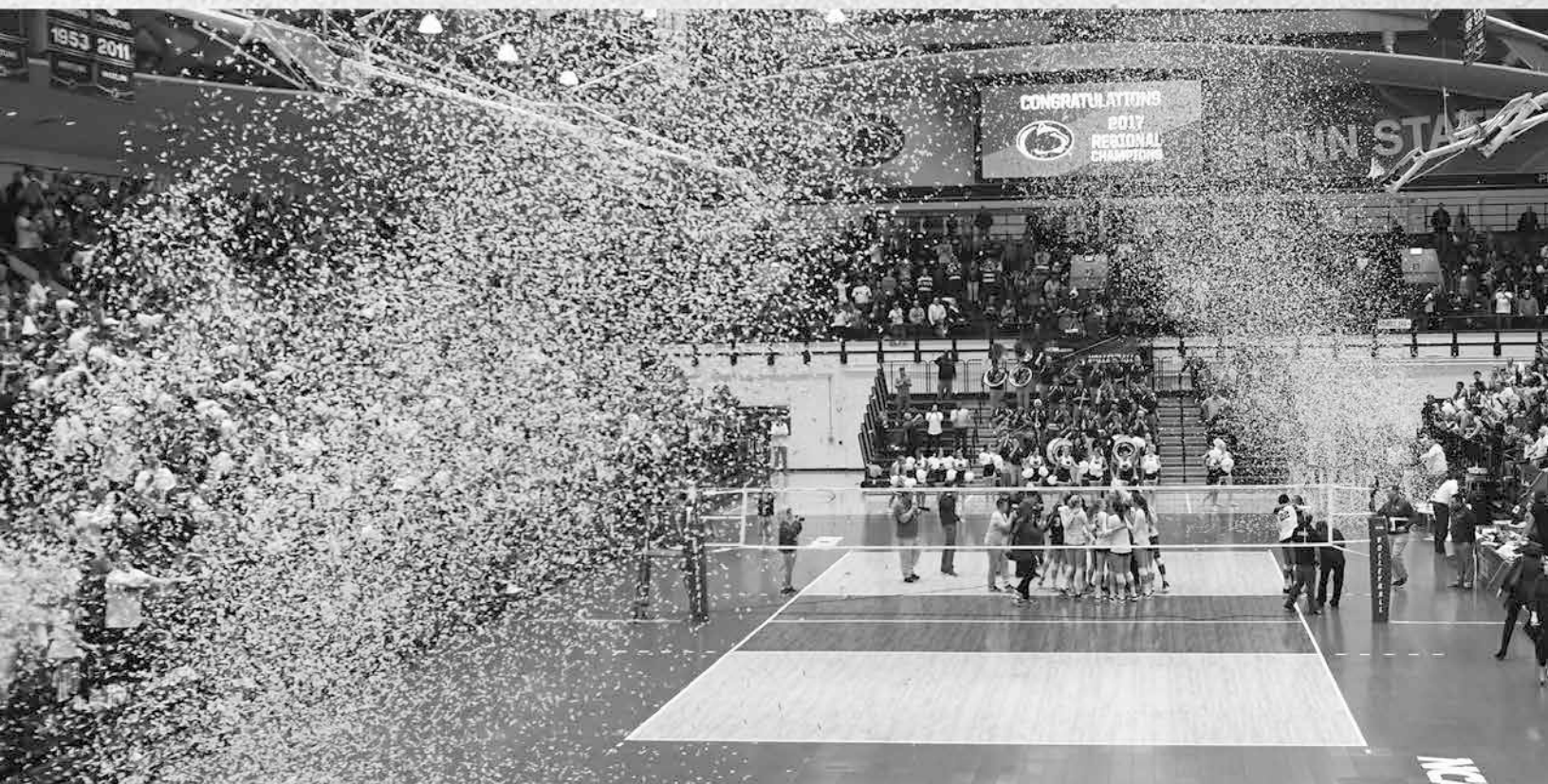

1999 NCAA TOURNAMENT NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



HONOLULU, Hawaii Dec. 18, 1999 -- In just one hour and 20 minutes, the top-ranked Penn State women's volleyball team erased memories of five game losses in the previous two title matches by sweeping Stanford for the first NCAA volleyball national championship in school history. Penn State defeated the Cardinal, 15-2, 15-10, 15-7, in front of a sold-out crowd of 10,252 at the Stan Sheriff Center.

It was a perfect ending for the three seniors who started in the previous two title matches. Each member of the trio played one of their best matches of the year, including senior Lauren Cacciamani, who was named the Most Outstanding Player after pounding out a match-high 20 kills with eight blocks.

"We did get an opportunity to watch a lot of film and we knew that we had to come out and jump on them," Cacciamani said. "We were going to try to go out there and dictate instead of having them show us what was going to go on. We were planning on going out strong and with a lot of fight."

Seniors Bonnie Bremner and Carrie Schonveld were also named to the NCAA Championship All-Tournament team. Bremner dished out 37 assists with four kills of her own. She also hit .333 with six digs. Schonveld had nine kills to go with her team-high 10 digs. The outside hitter hit .368 on the night and also aided at the net with three blocks (1 BS, 2 BA).

The Penn State blockers created a wall that the Stanford hitters could not avoid. Fueled by Cacciamani's eight blocks, the Lions held the Cardinal to a season-low -.008 hitting percentage as 1999 Co-Player of the Year Kerri Walsh zeroed out (11-11-33).

Redshirt-freshman Mishka Levy and sophomore Katie Schumacher added five blocks each--both with one solo and four assisted. Each of the six players that rotated to the front row recorded at least one block as Penn State ended the evening with 15 to Stanford's 10.5. Schumacher also added nine kills with three each from Levy and sophomore Amanda Rome.

Penn State trailed only once during the match. Down 3-1 in game two, the Nittany Lions rolled off three-consecutive points to take over the lead and never looked back. It was the first time this season the Cardinal had been swept. Penn State closed out the season with a 36-1 mark with the only loss coming in the season opener to Florida on Aug. 27.

"We didn't peak at the beginning of the season, obviously," Cacciamani said. "We lost our first match so we knew we wouldn't go undefeated. We did a good job playing as a team. We progressed and got better as the season went on.

"I think we set the stage for the win in the first game when we had 10 blocks. We had a great game plan and the players played with passion and enthusiasm right out of the chute. I believe the players are the ones that placed themselves in a position to get into this situation and I thought they handled all the distractions that normally come in a match like this as well as they possible could." - Russ Rose

2007 NCAA TOURNAMENT NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



SACRAMENTO, Calif., Dec. 15, 2007 - Top-ranked Penn State women's volleyball team captured the program's second NCAA Championship, winning a dramatic five-game final, 3-2, against No. 4 Stanford in Arco Arena. The Nittany Lions won the thriller, 30-25, 30-26, 23-20, 19-30, 15-8, posting their 26th consecutive victory since a five-game loss to the Cardinal exactly three months prior.

"It's an amazing feeling," said junior outside hitter Nicole Fawcett. "This year's team was so determined. After the fourth game we were determined to get our focus back."

After taking a 2-0 lead, Penn State saw the top-seeded Stanford rally to tie the match, 2-2. The Cardinal took a 4-3 lead in the fifth set, but the Nittany Lions scored seven consecutive points to take control at 10-4. Junior middle hitter Christa Harmotto and sophomore setter Alisha Glass each had two kills during the critical run.

Kills by Fawcett and freshman middle hitter Arielle Wilson pushed Penn State's lead to 13-7. A block by Wilson and freshman opposite Blair Brown made it 14-8. The Nittany Lions immediately seized the opportunity on their first match point, as sophomore outside hitter Megan Hodge delivered her 26th kill of the match to secure the victory.

Penn State won set one, 30-25. Stanford led 15-13, but PSU scored five consecutive points to take a 18-15 lead. The game was tied at 22-22, but Penn State took the lead for good on a service error by the Cardinal and a kill by Harmotto. A block by Fawcett made it 29-24 and she delivered the game-winning kill for the 30-25 margin.

The Nittany Lions captured set two, 30-26. Penn State took the lead for good on a Fawcett kill to make it 13-12. Another Fawcett kill made it 29-25 and a block by Glass and Harmotto gave the Lions the 30-26 win and a 2-0 lead. Penn State hit .525 in the game, while the Cardinal hit .357.

Stanford won set three, 30-23, snapping a streak of 17 consecutive winning games for the Nittany Lions in the 2007 NCAA Tournament. Penn State took its last lead at 7-6 on a block by freshman middle hitter Arielle Wilson, but the Cardinal took the lead for good at 9-8.

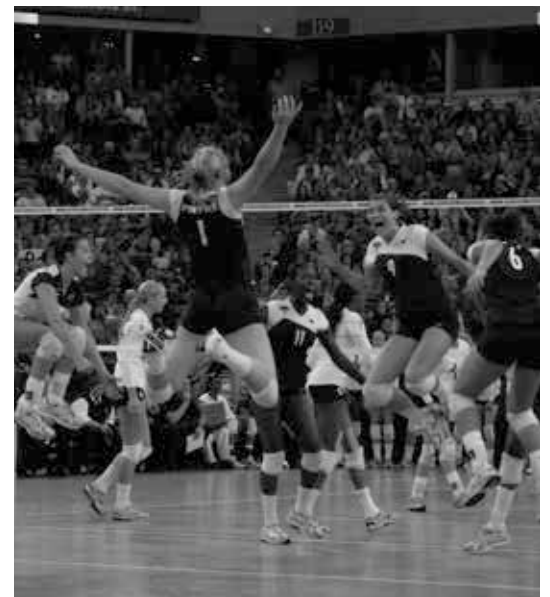
The national championship match was the fifth in program history for the Nittany Lions, as they also advanced in 1993, 1997, 1998 and 1999, capturing the title in 1999. Penn State defeated Stanford (15-2, 15-10, 15-7) on Dec. 18, 1999 in Honolulu, Hawaii, to give the Nittany Lions their first NCAA Championship.

The two teams met earlier in 2007 in New Haven, Conn., with Stanford outlasting Penn State in five games (30-23, 23-30, 27-30, 30-28, 15-9) on Sept. 15. The Nittany Lions had won 25 consecutive matches since the loss entering the title match.

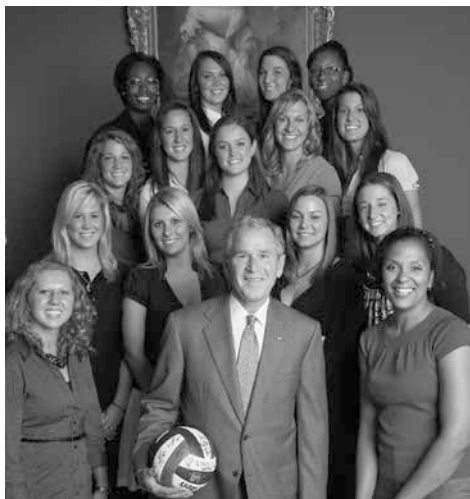

2008 NCAA TOURNAMENT NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 20, 2008 - Top-ranked Penn State capped a record-setting season with its second consecutive NCAA title with a 3-0 win over No. 2 Stanford (25-20, 26-24, 25-23) at the Qwest Center in Omaha, Neb. The Nittany Lions finish the 2008 campaign with a perfect 38-0 record, only the fourth team ever in Division I women's volleyball history to finish the season with an unblemished slate.

Stanford took the 3-0 lead to start the match, but a Christa Harmotto and Blair Brown block along with two Harmotto kills helped pull Penn State within two at 6-4. The Nittany Lions trailed for much of the game, but forced two Stanford time-outs to steal the momentum. PSU went on to win the game, 25-20.

Penn State jumped out to the early lead in game two and held on to take a 2-0 lead in the match. Penn State had a 12-9 advantage midway through the frame, but a Stanford kill and block again trimmed the Lion lead to one at 12-11. The squads traded points before a Cardinal kill and block put Stanford up 14-13. Penn State kills from Blair Brown and Megan Hodge put the Lions ahead 15-14 heading into a time out. Penn State maintained the lead for the remainder of the set, but Stanford didn't let the Lions go unchallenged. A Stanford kill and a Lion attack error tied the score 24-24 before kills from Nicole Fawcett and Hodge gave PSU the set, 26-24.

A Harmotto and Brown block gave the Nittany Lions the 3-1 lead in the third game, but Stanford tied the game at 3-3. The Lions controlled the set until Stanford recorded three kills to pull within two at 23-21 forcing a Penn State time out. Out of the break, the Cardinals recorded another kill trimming the lead to one, 23-22, but Hodge responded with a cross-court kill that clipped the line to make it 24-22. Stanford recorded a kill before a Fawcett kill off the block ended the game, 25-23 giving the Nittany Lions earned their third NCAA title.

Penn State became just the sixth team in history to win back-to-back NCAA Championships, joining Hawaii (1982-83), Pacific (1985-86), UCLA (1990-91), Stanford (1996-97) and USC (2002-03). The Penn State volleyball programs also became only the third school to have its men's and women's teams capture their respective championships in the same calendar year, as the Penn State men captured their championship in May.

Penn State joins UCLA (1984) and Stanford (1997) as the only programs in history to accomplish the feat. Stanford (1996-97) and Penn State (2007-08) are the only two to win both titles in the same academic year. Penn State finished the season with a 114-2 individual game record and pushed its current NCAA-record match winning streak to 64 dating back to a five-game loss to 2008 NCAA runner-up Stanford on Sept. 15, 2007.

"I don't think it was the prettiest match to determine the national championship, but it was a match that was played very hard by both teams. I thought we hung in there defensively and gave ourselves opportunities and chance for Megan to take big swings at the end. I thought it was a group effort in a lot of areas. It certainly wasn't a match that had the same energy from the match a couple of nights ago. That one had the significance to get us here. Tonight's has special significance, especially for the seniors."

TAMPA, Fla., Dec. 19, 2009 - Top-ranked Penn State made history, becoming the first team to win three consecutive national titles with a 3-2 (22-25, 20-25, 25-23, 25-21, 15-13) come-from-behind victory against No. 2 Texas.

Senior Megan Hodge led the Nittany Lions with 21 kills, while both junior Blair Brown and freshman Darcy Dorton contributed 13 kills each. The Nittany Lions had five with double-digit digs led by junior libero Alyssa D'Errico, who posted a career-high 22.

Penn State and Texas kept it tight for most of the opening frame until the Longhorns pulled ahead, 13-11 after a PSU error and a UT kill. Penn State trailed for the next few plays until Hodge and Balza teamed up for a block and a monster kill to tie it at 14-14. UT worked up to a 17-15 lead stayed ahead courtesy of two kills and an ace. PSU came alive and rallied to tie the set at 22-22. Penn State called a timeout, but Texas closed out the set with two kills for a 25-22 win.

Texas took control in set two, jumping out to an 8-4 lead forcing the Nittany Lions to call an early timeout. Penn State managed to come within two, 10-8, but the Longhorns pulled ahead with a 7-1 run for a 17-9 lead. Penn State battled back with a 6-2 run to come within four, 23-19, but Texas rallied to take set two, 25-20.

PSU came out hot in the third set, building a six-point lead, 11-5, for its largest lead of the match. Texas didn't come closer than two as PSU took the set, 25-23.

Tied at 3-3 early in the fourth set, the Lions went on a 5-0 run to develop a five-point advantage, 8-3. UT answered back with a 9-3 run for a one-point lead, 12-11. The score tied four times before Hodge put down two consecutive kills for a 17-15 lead. A Texas timeout allowed the Longhorns to regroup and tie the set once again. Penn State maintained at least a one-point lead until a Wilson kill, a Texas error and Hodge put down after a long rally sent the match to a fifth and final set.

Texas jumped out to a 3-1 lead in set five before a Dorton kill and a Texas attack error allowed the Nittany Lions to tie it up at 3-3. The two squads traded points until UT's Adams posted a kill and a block for a 7-5 lead against the Lions. Hodge and Wilson notched one kill each to tie the set at 7-7, but Hooker posted one of her own to put UT ahead, 8-7. After a timeout, Balza and Glass registered a joint stuff to make it 8-8.

Trailing by one in the fifth set, 11-10, Dorton and Wilson posted back-to-back kills for a 12-11 edge. Dorton tallied another kill before a UT attack error made it set-point Penn State. Texas held off the attempt before Hodge closed out her collegiate career with the final kill of the match for the 15-13 triumph.

"It was a very strange match. It's one of those examples where you don't win the statistics war, but we found a way to win at critical times. Certainly Texas had a great season and has a great team. We feel like we played two great teams here in the Final Four that really were great representatives of their conference and the sport of college volleyball."

2010 NCAA TOURNAMENT NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



KANSAS CITY, MO. Dec. 18, 2010 - Fourth-seeded Penn State made history once again, sweeping California (25-20, 27-25, 25-20) for the 2010 NCAA national championship. The Nittany Lions are the first DI women's volleyball team to win four consecutive national championships in history.

The NCAA national championship title is also the fifth career for Hall of Fame Head Coach Russ Rose.

Senior Blair Brown led all student-athletes with 18 kills, while freshman Deja McClendon tallied 16 and senior Arielle Wilson posted 12. Sophomore setter Kristin Carpenter dished out 46 assists. Senior Alyssa D'Errico led the team with 13 digs, while Brown contribute 10. Freshman Katie Slay had a match-high seven total blocks.

The Nittany Lions opened the match taking a 3-1 lead, but the Bears fought back and tied it at 4-4. Back-to-back kills by Ariel Scott put PSU back on top, 6-4. Penn State maintained the lead and was leading by five, 12-7, when Cal called its first timeout. The Bears came within one, 12-11, but kills from McClendon, Brown and Wilson and a D'Errico ace moved PSU up by four, 16-12. A 3-0 Cal run had the Bears trailing by one, 16-15, but the Nittany Lions did not look back, closing out set one, 25-20.

The second frame was close from the start with neither team able to develop any momentum to take a strong lead. Tied at 17-17, a block by Brown and Slay put the Lions in the lead, 18-17. Penn State and Cal continued to trade points before a Scott kill edged PSU ahead, but Cal was right there with a kill of its own to make it 21-21.

The score tied twice more before two straight Bear kills put Cal in the lead, 24-23. Following a timeout by the Nittany Lions, Brown and Wilson teamed up for a block to tie the set at 24-24. However, Cal's Carli Lloyd tallied a kill to put Cal at set-point for a second time. Penn State followed with a block by Carpenter and Slay teamed up for a block to keep it tied, 25-25. Brown pounded a kill to secure set two for Penn State, 27-25.

Penn State remained on top for most of the third set until two consecutive Cal points put the Bears within three, 18-15. The teams each registered a point each before PSU used a 4-0 run to pull ahead by seven, 23-16. Cal cut off the Penn State run with a block, but a Wilson kill put Penn State in match-point position. The Bears held Penn State to three match-points before Slay closed out the set and the match with a kill.

"We came out very strong in the first game. The second game, it was going back and forth and we were fortunate enough to win that second game, and I think that's probably where most of the momentum really came from. I thought the staff did a great job in helping devise a game plan, the kids listened well and we played hard and we were in a great position. The kids feel great. It's great for the university and the Big Ten Conference, and we're just as thrilled as we can be at this point in time."

2013 NCAA TOURNAMENT NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



SEATTLE - Dec. 21, 2013 - No. 2 Penn State women's volleyball team (34-2) captured its sixth NCAA women's volleyball national championship in program history, rallying past No. 12 Wisconsin in four sets (25-19, 26-24, 20-25, 25-23) at KeyArena. The NCAA national championship marks the fifth title for the Nittany Lions in the last seven years.

Senior Ariel Scott fueled the offense with a match-high 21 kills, adding five digs. Senior Katie Slay also tallied double-digit kills with 14. Senior Deja McClendon rounded out the double-digit performers with 11 kills. The trio all earned spots in the NCAA All-Tournament team.

Junior Micha Hancock paced all three of her top attackers to double-digit kills, dishing out 48 assists to go along with 16 digs and three aces for a double-double to earn NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player honors.

The Nittany Lions maintained a narrow advantage up until the midway point in the first frame, when Wisconsin climbed within one, 16-15, following a Badger kill. Regrouping, PSU put together a 4-0 streak to move ahead by five, 20-15, forcing the Badgers to call timeout. Following the break, Wisconsin fought within four, 22-18, but PSU closed out a 25-19 win in the first set.

The Nittany Lions led by as many as six in the opening portion of the second set before the Badgers rallied to knot the frame, 15-15. Penn State and Wisconsin battled back-and-forth for the remainder of the set, until the Badgers used a late 3-1 spurt to make it 24-23. A service error tied the stanza, 24-all, but Scott answered with two consecutive kills to lock up a 26-24 win in the second set.

Penn State came out of the break firing, using a 5-1 streak for an early lead. Wisconsin quickly erased the advantage, using a 4-0 run to knot the frame, 5-5. The Badgers and Penn State tied up the stanza three more times before the Nittany Lions used a 3-1 strike to crack open an 8-8 tie, moving up by two, 10-8.

With Penn State unable to sustain the momentum in set three, the Badgers took the frame 25-20 to force a fourth set.

Tied at 13-13 in the fourth, a kill from Scott and a block from Slay and Courtney kept the Nittany Lions on top, 15-13. Unable to shake the Badgers, Wisconsin and PSU continued to fight point-for-point until UW broke open an 18-all tie with a 4-1 streak to move ahead by three, 22-19. Hanging on, Penn State answered with a 4-1 run to tie the score, 23-23. A clutch ace from Hancock and a kill from McClendon finished off a 25-23 win for the victory.

"I thought it was a great match and all three times that we played Wisconsin this year was a battle. They play great defense. They play really hard. They're passionate kids, and I want to applaud the University of Wisconsin, their staff, as well as Washington."

2014 NCAA TOURNAMENT NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. - Dec. 20, 2014 - Fifth-seeded Penn State swept past BYU in straight sets (25-21, 26-24, 25-14) at Chesapeake Arena to capture its seventh NCAA national championship in program history. Claiming the title in six of the last eight years, the Nittany Lions now have more national championship than any other women's volleyball program in history.

Redshirt junior Aiyana Whitney and junior Megan Courtney led the offense with 11 kills each. Courtney added 14 digs for her second consecutive double-double performance, while also leading the blocking unit with five blocks. Senior Micha Hancock paced the team to a .233 hitting clip, dishing out 36 assists. Both Hancock and Frantti earned NCAA Tournament All-Tournament team honors while Courtney was named the Most Outstanding Player.

Leading by four at the midway point in set one, 15-11, the Nittany Lions came out of the break with a block to widen the margin to five, 16-11. The Cougars chipped away at the lead with a 6-3 run to arrive within two, 19-17. A kill from Grant and a BYU attack error brought PSU back up by four, 21-17. A PSU attack error out of a timeout made it 21-18, but Penn State followed with a 3-1 spurt to arrive at set point, 24-18. BYU held off two attempts before Courtney put down a kill to secure a 25-21 win in the first set.

Leading by one, 3-2, in set two, a trio of kills from the Cougars lifted BYU ahead, 5-3. The Nittany Lions responded with a kill from Whitney and an ace from Grant to knot the stanza, 5-5. Penn State and BYU continued to keep it close, until the Cougars pulled away from a 7-7 tie with a 5-1 stretch to go up by four, 12-8, prompting PSU to call a timeout.

Penn State could not find momentum out of the break as BYU managed to maintain at least a two-point lead throughout the second half of the frame. Down by two, 19-17, PSU rallied with a 3-1 strike to tie the score, 20-20, causing the Cougars to take a timeout. PSU and BYU continued to battle point-for-point, until a kill from Whitney broke open a 23-23 tie to put Penn State at set point, 24-23. The Cougars held off two attempts before Hancock and Washington posted up for a block to lock up set two, 26-24.

Holding on to a slim lead, 4-2, in set three, Penn State used a 3-2 stretch to widen the margin to three, 7-4, causing BYU to call a timeout. The Cougars came out of the break with a kill, but Penn State responded with a 6-3 streak capped off with an ace from Hancock to make it 13-7. Penn State continued to roll, using an 8-2 streak to push the lead to well into double digits, 20-9. BYU looked to halt the momentum with a kill, 20-10, but Penn State cruised to a 25-14 win in the third set with a 5-4 stretch to complete the sweep.

The winning streak stands alone in Division I women's volleyball. It ranks second in NCAA history among organized sports, second only to the Miami men's tennis team's 137-match winning streak from 1957- 64. The record-breaking span of victories lasted more than 35 months, encompassing an NCAA record 111 wins in straight sets across 1,085 days.

Almost three years to the day the streak began, it comes to an end after a 3-0 loss to Stanford, the same team which sparked the record-breaking stretch in 2007.

May 17, 2005:

After winding through the Italian hillsides, our team arrived in the town of Comunanza. The town was small with a population of around 3,000 people. We stayed where executives generally stayed when they would visit the major factory just outside of the town. It was very nice place to stay as five of the girls got to stay in a 3-bedroom apartment that had two bathrooms and a dining room. Once we got settled in our rooms the team got on our jerseys and walked to the gym. We played a club team from Amandola. Their team was short a few players so Ashley Fidler volunteered to play with the other team. We won the match in 3 games, while Kris Brown and Kaleena even got a chance to play front row. That night we had what most of the team considered our best meal of the trip. It was a traditional Italian family meal with multiple courses and elaborate dishes. One of the first dishes we ate was intestine and eggs. It was a long meal the lasted late into the night. The next morning we were off to begin our long drive to Rome. We wove through the mountains and hills on roads that you wouldn't think buses could travel.

After nearly a five-hour trip we finally arrived in Rome, the 'eternal city.' We checked into the hotel and were immediately off to the Metro station just a few blocks away. The Metro is very small and crowded because the designers of the Metro wanted to avoid digging railways under ancient Roman architecture. Our first stop took us to see the Spanish Steps, which was a series of three levels of steps leading up to a church. The lining of the steps was covered in flowers and it was a great place to take a team picture. Our next stop was the Trevi Fountain. This was the first elaborate sculpture work we saw in Rome and we were in awe. It is said that you must throw a coin into the fountain but you must throw the coin with your back facing the fountain. The number of coins you throw also determines your fortune. One coin and you'll return to Rome, two coins and you'll fall in love. With our backs facing the fountain, Maggie, Cassy, Fidler, and I threw in two coins each.

Our last stop of the day was to visit the Pantheon. As we walked inside we were amazed by the massive pillars holding the structure up. They lead us into a large circular dome with more sculptures and a roof with a giant circular hole allowing sunlight to pour inside. The basement of the building is also a resting place for people such as Raffaello a famous painter, Voltaire a philosopher, Murrie and Piere Currie both famous scientists as well as Victor Hugo the first president of unified Italy. After seeing the Pantheon we were all tired and grabbed some dinner, found the Metro and went back to our hotel.

Today we got up and again took the Metro to see the Coliseum. I stepped out of the station and all I could see was the building. The structure was built between 12AD and 80AD and most of it still remains standing today. When it was first built it was called the Amphitheatre Flavium, and held up to 50,000 people. It was used to hold battles between animals and humans along with chariot races and mock naval battles. The rest of the day we were able to tour around and explore the city of Rome. Other sites we saw included the Forum, the Arch of Constantine, and the Monument of Vittoriale. All of the sites were unique and amazing in their own respect. It was odd to see such monuments scattered amongst current shops and restaurants including McDonalds.

Tonight we played our sixth and final match in a town of Usaro, which is 30 minutes to an hour away from Rome depending on traffic. We played one of our more competitive matches against a club team called As Fidia Ladispoli. We won all five games although it was a bittersweet victory. It was the last time our three seniors; Tab, Syndie and Ashley would play in their PSU uniforms. The club team had ordered pizza for us and we shared it with them before getting on the bus and heading back to Rome.

Tomorrow is our last full day. We are going to see the Vatican City in the morning and the Pope may be speaking. The trip is almost over and it is going very fast but I'm very excited to get up tomorrow and see the Sistine Chapel.
