UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. -- The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (4-3, 0-0 B1G), under the guidance of head coach Lisa Bervinchak Love, hosts two games this coming weekend. The Nittany Lions open up Big Ten play on Friday, Sept. 27, when they host Indiana (2-4, 0-1 B1G) at 4 p.m. Two days later, the Lions host Lafayette (5-2*) on Sunday, Sept. 29, at 1 p.m. *Lafayette hosts American on Friday as well.

The Nittany Lions are coming off a 2-1 overtime road win at Bucknell on Sunday. Penn State's Phia Gladieux scored twice late to lead Penn State to the win, helping the team to its fourth straight victory.

Gladieux leads Penn State with 26 points off 12 goals and two assists. She has scored in all seven games for Penn State this year. Sophia Mannino has five points off two goals and one assist while Julianne van Bekkum has five off one goal and three assists. Penn State freshman goalie Aby Deverka is 2-3 on the year with 39 saves while senior Lauren Delgado is 2-0 in the cage with three saves.

Indiana enters the week with a 2-4 mark. The Hoosiers battled No. 1 Northwestern tough on Sunday in their last outing, dropping a close 1-0 game in Bloomington. Indiana owns wins over Kent State (3-1) and Ball State (2-0). Penn State owns a 28-4 lead in the all-time series with the Hoosiers.

Lafayette, which hosts American on Friday while Penn State hosts Indiana, enters the week with a 5-2 mark. The Leopards beat Holy Cross 3-0 last Friday in their last outing. They also own wins over Vermont (2-1), Delaware (1-0), Dartmouth (3-0) and Quinnipiac (3-2). Penn State has a 21-2 lead in the all-time series.

Penn State begins a four-game road swing next weekend. The Nittany Lions are at Iowa on Friday, Oct. 4, at 5 p.m. and at Northwestern on Sunday, Oct. 6, at 12 p.m.

NEW STADIUM, NEW INFO! KNOW BEFORE YOU GO...

The Penn State Field Hockey Complex has some new policies in place! Check out the key ones heading into the 2024 season:

- The Field Hockey Complex is not a clear bag facility, however, bags brought into the facility will be checked upon entrance

PENN STATE DOWNS BUCKNELL 2-1 IN OT ON GLADIEUX'S TWO LATE GOALS

Penn State trailed homestanding Bucknell into the fourth quarter on Sept. 22 in Lewisburg, 1-0. But senior Phia Gladieux scored twice late to lead the Nittany Lions to a 2-1 come from behind win in overtime. Gladieux tied the game up in the fourth period and then scored just over 1:00 into extra time to carry Penn State to victory.

GLADIEUX NOTCHES 10 POINTS IN TWO GAMES AS LIONS BEAT KENT STATE AND NO. 15 PRINCETON

Senior Phia Gladieux continued to dominate the competition, collecting 10 points in two games as the Nittany Lions won twice over the weekend. Gladieux has now scored in every one of Penn State's six games. Gladieux scored two goals and had an assist in Penn State's 4-1 win at Kent State on Friday. Two days later, Penn State welcomed No. 15 Princeton to the Penn State Field Hockey Complex and Gladieux notched five points again. She scored Penn State's first two goals, both unassisted, to keep PSU close to the Tigers. She then set up Sophia Mannino's game winning goal with 1:14 left, getting the assist, in the 3-2 win over the ranked Tigers.

PENN STATE TAKES DOWN NO. 15 PRINCETON; DEVERKA'S SEVEN SAVES EARNS BIG HONORS

Phia Gladieux twice and assisted on the third goal as Penn State rallied late for a 3-2 win over No. 15 Princeton on Sept. 15. Gladieux and Madison Tambroni teed up Sophia Mannino for the game winner with just over 1:00 to play, capping off the rally for the win. Freshman keeper Aby Deverka had seven saves in the game as well. Her seven saves against the ranked Tigers earned her a second Big Ten Rookie of the Week award (for the week ending Sept. 15, 2024).

NITTANY LIONS PICK UP ROAD WIN AT KENT STATE

Phia Gladieux scored twice and had an assist in Penn State's 4-1 win at Kent State on Sept. 13. Senior keeper Lauren Delgado had two saves and picked up her first win in the cage for the Lions. Joining Gladieux with goals were senior Sophia Mannino and junior Ella Jennes.

GLADIEUX'S HAT TRICK, STRAWSER AND VAN BEKKUM'S GOALS, LEAD LIONS TO WIN AT UD

Phia Gladieux scored three times, including the game winner late, and true freshman Katelyn Strawser and grad student Julienne van Bekkum each picked up their first goals as Nittany Lions, to lead Penn State to a 5-4 win at Delaware.

GLADIEUX SCORES TWICE, DEVERKA TALLIES 14 SAVES IN TOP-TEN OPENING WEEKEND

Senior Phia Gladieux scored goals in each of Penn State's opening weekend games and true freshman Aby Deverka collected 14 total saves against two top-ten ACC opponents. Gladieux had Penn State's goal (from a Julienne van Bekkum assist) and Deverka had 11 saves in Penn State's 2-1 loss to No. 3 Virginia on opening night, Friday, Aug. 30. Two days later on Sept. 1, Gladieux scored again and Deverka had three saves in a 2-1 loss to No. 10 Syracuse.

DEVERKA EARNS B1G FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS ON OPENING WEEKEND

True freshman Aby Deverka tallied 14 saves against No. 3 Virginia and No. 10 Syracuse on opening weekend for Penn State, her first collegiate games. Starting from the onset, Deverka had 11 saves against the third-ranked Cavaliers and three against No. 10 Syracuse and was honored as Big Ten Freshman of the Week (9/3/24) to begin the season.

SENIOR TRIO NAMED 2024 TEAM CAPTAINS

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team voted seniors Phia Gladieux, Julia Lamb and Drew Taylor as team captains during the second week of preseason practice. This marks the first time each of these Nittany Lions has been voted captain by her teammates.

Penn State Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics Dr. Pat Kraft named Lisa Bervinchak Love the head coach of Penn State's storied field hockey program on February 20, 2023. Bervinchak Love, the long-time associate head coach for the recently retired Char Morett-Curtiss, became the sixth head coach in school history.

Bervinchak Love is entering her second season as the head coach in what will be her 31st year on the Penn State staff. She began her Penn State coaching career in 1994, joining Morett-Curtiss' staff as an assistant coach, was eventually promoted to associate head coach, and has remained a fixture in the Penn State community since.

"We are excited to have Lisa take over the reins of the Penn State field hockey program," said Kraft upon Bervinchak Love's hiring. "Lisa has been a huge part of the program's success for the last 29 years, working alongside the legendary Char Morett-Curtiss. Lisa's fingerprints are all over this program and she is more than ready to take on the challenge of being a head coach. Her love for Penn State, this program and these student-athletes is evident when you talk to her and her passion shines through in every aspect of her coaching."

Her first season, 2023, saw Penn State finish the campaign with a 9-8 overall record, 4-4 in the Big Ten. Her team featured two All-Americans (Sophia Gladioux, first team; Mackenzie Allessie, third team) and the Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year (Gladioux).

"I am truly blessed and honored to be the next head coach for Penn State Field Hockey," said Bervinchak Love in February of 2023. "I want to thank Pat Kraft for giving me this opportunity and Char for all her support, mentoring and the friendship she has given me over the years. Char has been the heart and soul of this program for a long time, and I am truly grateful to have been by her side for 29 of those years. I will do my best to honor Char's legacy and the traditions of Penn State Field Hockey. We will continue to play with heart and strive to be the best both on and off the field. We Are!"

During Bervinchak Love's time on the Penn State staff, the Nittany Lion program cemented itself as a national powerhouse. Since her arrival as an assistant coach, Penn State has achieved national success:

- * 23 NCAA appearances
- * 3 trips to the national semifinals
- * 2 trip to the NCAA title game
- * Seven Big Ten Regular-Season Championships
- * Six Big Ten Tournament Championships

Penn State's student-athletes have achieved heralded success during Bervinchak Love's tenure as an assistant:

- * 31 NFHCA first-team All-Americans
- * 31 second team All-Americans
- * 26 third team All-Americans
- * 72 first-team All-Big Ten selections
- * 6 Big Ten Players of the Year
- * 10 Big Ten Offensive Players of the Year
- * 9 Big Ten Defensive Players of the Year
- * Over 300 Academic All-Big Ten selections
- * Nearly 300 NFHCA National All-Academic honorees

"When I returned to Penn State in 1987 Lisa was a talented right wing," said former head coach Char Morett-Curtiss upon her retirement in February of 2023. "She could weave through a defense with skill and speed and make it look easy. More importantly she displayed a love for the game, a fierce competitive spirit, a motivational work ethic and was highly respected by her teammates. She became a humble captain her senior year and a first-team All-American."

"A few years later, searching for an assistant in 1993, I reached out to Lisa," Morett-Curtiss continued. "She always embodied the traditions, values, and pride of Penn State Field Hockey as a player and alum and I knew that she would be an outstanding coach. Twenty-nine years, as a leader by my side, she has exceeded those expectations and has become a coach who has led Penn State to years of consistent success in the classroom and on the field. She values every aspect of a player's collegiate life, coaches with a keen knowledge of the game, and an understanding to prepare weekly for game day decisions and success. Lisa is a proud representative of Penn State University, who is highly respected in the coaching community and amongst her coaching peers on campus. Our years together were successful, fun and special. With Lisa at the helm, Penn State Field Hockey is primed for success."

As a player, Bervinchak Love played three years at Penn State after transferring from Villanova at the conclusion of her freshman year. A three-year letterwinner (1986-88), Bervinchak Love earned a lengthy list of honors during her playing career:

- * First-team NFHCA All-American
- * First-team All-Atlantic 10
- * Atlantic-10 All-Tournament Team
- * Atlantic-10 Player of the Week
- * 28 career goals in three seasons at Penn State
- * Team captain as a senior

Following her graduation from Penn State in 1989, Bervinchak Love continued to play field hockey at the national level. In 1991, she helped guide her team to a Silver Medal at the Olympic Sports Festival in Los Angeles. Bervinchak Love graduated from Penn State with a degree in health policy and administration. She began her professional career as an elementary school teacher in Penn Manor School District and assisted head coaches in field hockey and basketball. She continued teaching in a number of elementary schools before coming to Penn State as an assistant coach.

She is married to her husband Steve Love. They have two daughters, Taylor and Kelsey.

Penn State Athletics chose to advance classes as though 2020-21 was a normal year of eligibility. Student-athletes who were listed as redshirt freshmen in 2021-22 did not officially redshirt in 2020-21, but would have in any other normal year. Extra years of eligibility will be marked on the back end of student-athletes' career (a "+" symbol will be added on the end of "Sr." to indicate the extra year of eligibility being used).

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-1, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 16 in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Coaches Poll, dropped a tough 2-1 game to No. 3 Virginia (1-0) in the season opener for both teams. The Nittany Lions rallied late against the third-ranked Cavaliers but fell short at home. The teams traded early possessions to start the game, with the clock moving down towards the 12:00 mark. The Nittany Lions pushed the ball into the Virginia. The Cavaliers forced a turnover and moved the ball down field quickly, turning the fast break into the game's first goal. Sloan Davidson took a quick pass from Noa Boterman and gave Virginia a 1-0 lead at 10:33. True freshman goalie Aby Deverka, getting the start in her first collegiate game, picked up her first save, knocking back a close shot from Virginia's Suze Leemans at 6:10. The Penn State defense, led by Gery Schnarrs and Julienne van Bekkum, withstood late pressure from Virginia, Deverka notched another save and the Lions withstood a late corner to keep the score at 1-0 Virginia after the opening period. Penn State worked the ball into the Virginia circle early in the second period, with Katelyn Strawser pushing the ball to the right side and feeding the top of the circle. The Cavaliers were able to withstand the early pressure and retook possession. Deverka made a diving save on a subsequent Virginia shot and another hit the post at 11:15 as the Cavaliers pressured the Penn State defense. Senior Phia Gladioux started a fast break that led to a deep Penn State push at the 8:20 mark. The Nittany Lions were forced into a turnover and Virginia forced a penalty corner at 7:24. Deverka made a save on the play and a second Cav shot sailed high at 6:40. Morgan McMenamini stopped a Cavalier push with 6:00 as Penn State worked to regain possession, trailing 1-0. Gladioux raced down the middle of the field on a solo drive at 2:45, nearly working the ball to the Cavalier cage. But the Virginia defense was able to collapse towards the goal and stifle Gladioux's efforts late and the Nittany Lions trailed 1-0 at halftime. Virginia outshot Penn State 13-0 in the first half and had a 2-0 edge in corners. Deverka had 5 saves for Penn State in the first half.

Penn State had an early chance to start the third period, working the ball deep into the Cavalier circle. But once again, the Virginia defense held. Deverka made an early save after a quick Virginia fast break and another Cav shot hit the post again as the clock moved towards the 11:00 mark. True freshman Morgan Snyder and the Penn State defense continued to hold back a fierce Virginia attack, keeping the game close through the 9:00 mark and a handful of penalty corners. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-2, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 16 in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Coaches Poll, dropped a tough 2-1 contest to No. 10 Syracuse (2-0) to close out the first weekend of the 2024 season. Nittany Lion senior Phia Gladioux scored for Penn State as the Lions opened up the season with two home games. Penn State worked the ball into the Syracuse circle, with Ella Jennes feeding Natalie Freeman. Freeman's shot was blocked but it forced an early corner for Penn State. Penn State ticked off three shots with Syracuse goalie Louise Pert saving two and the third just wide, all in the first two minutes. Penn State maintained possession through the 11:00 mark before Syracuse was able to briefly work the ball into the Penn State zone. PENN STATE 4, KENT STATE 1

Friday, Sept. 13, 2024 -- Kent, Ohio

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (2-3, 0-0 B1G) used a fourth quarter offensive burst to pick up a 4-1 road win at Kent State (0-6) on Friday. Senior Phia Gladieux scored twice in the final period to spark the Nittany Lions to the win. The Nittany Lions controlled action early. Gladieux had a quick shot sail just over the cage then Penn State nearly took a lead just two minutes into the game when Drew Taylor nearly connected, but the Flash defense knocked the ball away and regained possession for Kent State. The Nittany Lions forced a penalty corner with 10:00 left in the period. Ella Jennes' shot off the set was blocked. Gladieux had a second shot stopped by Kent State and the Flash regained possession at 8:00. The Penn State defense, anchored by freshman Morgan Snyder, kept the Flash from working the ball into the circle. Kent State briefly worked the ball into the Lion circle with under 5:00 on the clock, but Lion Madison Tambroni forced a turnover. Kent State increased its pressure a bit as the clock hit 4:00 but the Lion defense held. Penn State pressed deep into the Flash circle late in the period, but Kent State held, and the game moved to the second period tied 0-0. Penn State pressured Kent State early in the first but could not break through the Flash defense. The Flash returned action to the Lion side of the field briefly, but Sophia Mannino forced a quick turnover, and the Nittany Lions regained the ball. Penn State forced a second penalty corner at the 11:00 mark. Gladieux's shot off the set was saved by KSU goalie Lieve Jansen. Mannino's shot off the rebound led to another corner. A third was called on the Lion shot off the second. Penn State connected on the third. Julienne van Bekkum fed Gladieux, who slid the ball to Mannino, who connected at 10:37 to give the Nittany Lions a 1-0 lead. Kent State got its first shot off 8:30 when Emma Seger forced Penn State keeper Lauren Delgado into a save. Delgado was making her first start of the season. The Flashes kept the pressure on Penn State and picked up their first corner at 6:28 but could not connect on the play. Penn State forced another penalty corner with 4:47 left in the half. The Lion shot off the play was blocked but the rebound shot led to another corner. Natalie Freeman had a backhand blocked on the ensuing shot but the Lions picked up a third corner right away. Jansen made a save on a Julia Lamb shot with 3:30 left and the ball moved back to midfield. Penn State returned the ball to the KSU circle and picked up its eighth corner of the half with 2:46 on the clock. Gladieux's shot was kicked aside by Jansen. Penn State had one last chance with a late corner, but the Flash defense was up to the task. Kent State pushed the ball downfield and Delgado made another save on a late Flash shot. The Nittany Lions settled for a 1-0 lead at the break. Penn State outshot Kent State 11-2 and had a 9-1 edge in penalty corners. Delgado had two saves for the Nittany Lions and Jansen had five for KSU.

The teams traded possessions in the first minute of the third period. Penn State forced a quick corner at the 12:30 mark but the Flash defense kept Penn State from getting a shot on goal. Penn State continued to pressure the KSU defense, however, and forced another quick corner less than two minutes later. Gladieux's shot was knocked back by Jansen, but Mannino was right there for the rebound, tipping it through the KSU goalie's leg. But the play was reviewed and waived off. Kent State immediately worked the ball downfield deep into the Penn State zone. But van Bekkum and the Lion defense kept the Flash from getting off a shot as the clock moved below the 10:00 mark. Taylor led a fast break that pressured Jansen and the Flash cage, but the goalie held off the threat. Kent State then moved downfield and forced a corner with 6:14 left in the period. Kent State's first shot off the set hit the post, but Emma Rolston scored off the rebound to tie the game with 5:47 on the clock. Gladieux speared a fast break late in the period, but Jansen made a kick save on the Lion's effort. Seconds later, Penn State picked up a penalty corner but could not connect and the game moved to the fourth period tied 1-1. Junior Ella Jennes quickly put Penn State back on top. She moved the ball in from left of the KSU cage towards the endline and then finessed a shot just past Jansen into the KSU cage at the 13:16 mark. Less than a minute later, Lion freshman Katelyn Strawser pressured the Flash cage and, after a scramble in front of the cage, Penn State was awarded with a penalty stroke. Gladieux connected on the penalty and Penn State led 3-1 at 12:27. The Lions continued to pressure the Flash, keeping the ball on the KSU side of the field. The Nittany Lions forced a corner at 10:33 but the Lion shot off the set was just wide. Morgan McMenamin kept the pressure on KSU for Penn State, sparking an energized Lion offensive push. Taylor made a steal minutes later, drove down field, dripped right then left and fed Gladieux with a perfect pass for Gladieux's second goal of the game. Gladieux's score came with 8:24 left to put Penn State up 4-1. Freeman had a solid backhand shot kick-saved by Jansen off another corner with under 5:00 on the clock. Freeman drove down the middle of the field and forced a penalty stroke on the drive. She took the penalty shot at 2:16 but Jansen made a diving save on the shot to keep the score 4-1 in PSU's favor. Freeman and the Lion offense continued to pressure Kent State for the remainder of the game, but Jansen and the Flash defense held. Penn State outshot Kent State 22-4 over the course of the game. The Nittany Lions had a 14-2 edge in penalty corners as well. Delgado had two saves for Penn State while Jansen had 16 for Kent State.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (3-3, 0-0 B1G) rallied late, scoring twice in the fourth quarter to post a 3-2 win over No. 15 Princeton (2-2) in non-conference field hockey action. Phia Gladieux tallied five points and Sophia Mannino scored late for the win at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The Nittany Lions pushed the ball into the Princeton zone early after the opening whistle after an Ella Jennes steal. After a quick Princeton stop, Penn State regained possession and worked to keep the ball on the Tiger side of the field. Princeton once again held then moved the ball down to the Penn State side. After a Lion turnover, the Tigers found the back of the cage when Talia Schenck scored off a Beth Yeager assist at the 12:15 mark. Penn State's Gladieux nearly tied the score a minute later with a blistering backhand, but Princeton keeper Robyn Thompson made a nice save to keep the Lions off the board. The teams traded possessions through the 6:00 mark. Penn State picked up its first corner at the 4:55 mark. Gladieux's shot off the first corner was blocked, leading to a second corner, then a third at 4:35. But Princeton held through all three sets. Princeton worked its way into the Lion circle for a corner at 1:33. But the Tiger shot off the play was wide, and the clock moved past 1:00. Penn State trailed 1-0 after the opening period. The teams battled in the midfield through the first two minutes of the second period. The Tigers entered the Lion zone at 12:55. Penn State keeper Aby Deverka made a save on a quick Princeton shot and the Nittany Lions returned the ball to the Princeton side of the field. But the Tigers forced a turnover and regained possession at 11:30. Penn State battled and regained the ball with 9:35 on the clock as the teams continued to trade barbs in the middle of the field. Princeton moved into the Lion circle at 9:00 and pressed the Penn State defense. Yeager got off a solid shot for the Tigers, but Deverka swatted it aside to keep the Nittany Lions close. Carly Seal and the Penn State defense held off a late Tiger press and pushed the ball back to the Tiger side of the field. Princeton's Yeager finished off a Tiger break late in the period, launching a backhand into the Lion cage at 0:15 to give Princeton a 2-1 lead at the break. Princeton outshot Penn State 6-5 in the first half. Deverka had three saves for the Nittany lions while Thompson had two for the Tigers. Penn State owned a 3-1 edge in penalty corners over the first 30:00.

Princeton moved into the Lion zone early in the third where Schenck had a quick shot saved by Deverka. Princeton was able to pressure the Penn State defense for the first three minutes of the period, but the Nittany Lions held. Penn State had a brief push into the Tiger circle but did not threaten the cage. A quick Gladieux fast break was turned aside by the Tigers at the 9:30 mark. But Gladieux stole the ball seconds later to keep action in the Tiger zone. Princeton held and worked down to the Lion zone, getting off a couple shots that were blocked by Nittany Lion defenders. Deverka made a save on a Pru Lindsey shot to keep the Lions close at 4:00. Deverka made a kick save on a Schenck shot with 2:40 left in the period. Lion freshman Katelyn Strawser had a shot sail just wide at 1:05 after a Penn State break. Princeton then pressured the Lion zone for the final minute, but Penn State's defense held, and the game moved to the fourth period with Princeton leading 2-1. The two teams traded possessions over the first 4:00 and Gladieux go high with 11:30 on the clock. Penn State worked to keep the ball on the Princeton side of the field, but the Tigers grabbed the ball and pushed it to the other side of the field. Schnarrs blocked a hard Tiger shot with 10:45 on the clock to keep Penn State within one but the Tigers continued to pressure the Nittany Lion defense. Penn State forced a turnover and worked the ball into the Tiger circle. Thompson made a save on a tight Gladieux shot with just under 9:00 to play. But Gladieux kept up the pressure and tied the game at 2-2 with 7:14 on the clock. The senior drove down the right side of the field and rocketed the ball past Thompson for the tying goal, unassisted. Princeton forced a quick corner after they tying goal with 6:57 on the clock. Deverka made a diving save on the ensuing shot. The Nittany Lion defense held through the 6:00 mark as the Tigers pressured the cage. The tie score held into the final minutes of the period. Princeton was hit with a green card at 3:47, giving the Lions a player edge. Princeton was able to kill off the penalty as the clock moved below 2:00. Sophia Mannino tipped a Gladieux pass (off a Tambroni set) into the cage with 1:14 to play and Penn State led for the first time, 3-2. Penn State was able to kill the final seconds and walked away with the come from behind 3-2 win. Princeton owned a 13-10 edge in shots on goal, but the Nittany Lions had a 4-2 lead in corners. Deverka came up big in the second half for Penn State and collected seven saves in total. Thompson had three for Princeton.

Senior Phia Gladieux scored both goals for Penn State, one in the fourth period and the other in overtime to spark Penn State to a come from behind win. The teams battled evenly for the game's first four-plus minutes with neither goal threatened. Penn State forced the game's first penalty corners with 9:30 on the clock. Katelyn Strawser's shot off the set was just a bit wide and the game continued on scoreless. Bucknell returned the ball downfield for its first shot at 7:48, with Lion goalie Aby Deverka notching a save to keep the Bison off the scoreboard. Deverka made a second save three minutes later as the first period hit the 5:00 mark.
