UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. -- The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-3, 1-0 B1G), hits the road for two Big Ten games this weekend. Penn State is at Iowa (5-3, 0-2 B1G) on Friday, Oct. 4, at 6 p.m. Eastern and then visits Northwestern (10-0, 3-0*) on Sunday, Oct. 6, at 1 p.m. Eastern. *Northwestern hosts Rutgers on Friday as well.

The Nittany Lions are coming off another two-win weekend. Penn State opened up the week with a 3-2 win over visiting Indiana in its Big Ten opener on Friday, Sept. 27. Two days later, the Nittany Lions downed visiting Lafayette 5-1 for their sixth straight win.

Phia Gladieux continues to lead Penn State (and the nation) in scoring. Gladieux had three goals and two assists in last weekend's games and has scored at least one goal in every game this year. She has 34 points off 15 goals and four assists. Julienne van Bekkum has eight points off two goals and four assists while Sophia Mannino has five off two and one. Freshman goalie Aby Deverka has 48 saves with a .727 percentage this season, having played in eight of Penn State's nine games.

lowa heads into the weekend with a 5-3 mark, 0-2 in the Big Ten. Iowa dropped a 3-2 (1-3 shootout) game at Rutgers last Friday then rebounded for a 2-0 in at Villanova on Sunday. The Hawkeyes lead the all-time series with Penn State 33-28-1.

Northwestern, which hosts Rutgers on Friday, enters the weekend with a perfect 10-0 overall record, 3-0 in the conference. The Wildcats won at Maryland last Friday, 1-0, then beat Princeton 3-2 in New Jersey. Only two teams have scored on NU this year. Penn State owns a 34-8-1 advantage in the all-time series.

Penn State continues a four-game road swing next weekend, visiting Ohio State on Friday, Oct. 11, at 3 p.m. and Ohio University on Sunday, Oct. 13, at 12 p.m. for a non-conference game..

GLADIEUX NAMED B1G OFFENSIVE A.o.W. (9/29)

Phia Gladieux was named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week for the week ending Sept. 29, 2024. Gladieux had an eight point weekend, leading the Nittany Lions to wins over Indiana (3-2) and Lafayette (5-1) at the Field Hockey Complex. She had a goal and an assist vs. IU on Friday (9/27) and two goals and an assist against the Leopards two days later (9/29).

FOUR DIFFERENT NITTANY LIONS SCORE IN 5-1 WIN OVER LAFAYETTE

Four different Penn Staters scored goals in Penn State's 5-1 non-conference win over visiting Lafayette on Sunday, Sept. 29. Phia Gladieux had two goals and an assist, Natalie Freeman scored for the second time this year, Julienne van Bekkum picked up her second goal of the season and Morgan McMenamin tallied her first career goal in the victory. Katelyn Strawser and van Bekkum also had assists while freshman goalie Aby Deverka had six saves.

PENN STATE DOWNS INDIANA 3-2 IN B1G OPENER

Penn State held on for a 3-2 win over visiting Indiana on Friday, Sept. 27, in the conference opener for the Nittany Lions. Natalie Freeman and Phia Gladieux scored in the first half to give Penn State a 2-1 lead at the break. Drew Taylor notched a third quarter goal that proved to be the difference in the 3-2 win.

PENN STATE DOWNS BUCKNELL 2-1 IN OT ON GLADIEUX'S TWO LATE GOALS

Penn State trailed homestanding Bucknell into the fourth quarter on Sept. 22 in Lewisburg, 1-0. But senior Phia Gladieux scored twice late to lead the Nittany Lions to a 2-1 come from behind win in overtime. Gladieux tied the game up in the fourth period and then scored just over 1:00 into extra time to carry Penn State to victory.

GLADIEUX NOTCHES 10 POINTS IN TWO GAMES AS LIONS BEAT KENT STATE AND NO. 15 PRINCETON

Senior Phia Gladieux continued to dominate the competition, collecting 10 points in two games as the Nittany Lions won twice over the weekend. Gladieux has now scored in every one of Penn State's six games. Gladieux scored two goals and had an assist in Penn State's 4-1 win at Kent State on Friday. Two days later, Penn State welcomed No. 15 Princeton to the Penn State Field Hockey Complex and Gladieux notched five points again. She scored Penn State's first two goals, both unassisted, to keep PSU close to the Tigers. She then set up Sophia Mannino's game winning goal with 1:14 left, getting the assist, in the 3-2 win over the ranked Tigers.

PENN STATE TAKES DOWN NO. 15 PRINCETON: DEVERKA'S SEVEN SAVES EARNS B1G HONORS

Phia Gladieux twice and assisted on the third goal as Penn State rallied late for a 3-2 win over No. 15 Princeton on Sept. 15. Gladieux and Madison Tambroni teed up Sophia Mannino for the game winner with just over 1:00 to play, capping off the rally for the win. Freshman keeper Aby Deverka had seven saves in the game as well. Her seven saves against the ranked Tigers earned her a second Big Ten Rookie of the Week award (for the week ending Sept. 15, 2024).

NITTANY LIONS PICK UP ROAD WIN AT KENT STATE

Phia Gladieux scored twice and had an assist in Penn State's 4-1 win at Kent State on Sept. 13. Senior keeper Lauren Delgado had two saves and picked up her first win in the cage for the Lions. Joining Gladieux with goals were senior Sophia Mannino and junior Ella Jennes.

GLADIEUX'S HAT TRICK, STRAWSER AND VAN BEKKUM'S GOALS, LEAD LIONS TO WIN AT UD

Phia Gladieux scored three times, including the game winner late, and true freshman Katelyn Strawser and grad student Julienne van Bekkum each picked up their first goals as Nittany Lions, to lead Penn State to a 5-4 win at Delaware.

GLADIEUX SCORES TWICE. DEVERKA TALLIES 14 SAVES IN TOP-TEN OPENING WEEKEND

Senior Phia Gladieux scored goals in each of Penn State's opening weekend games and true freshman Aby Deverka collected 14 total saves against two top-ten ACC opponents. Gladieux had Penn State's goal (from a Julienne van Bekkum assist) and Deverka had 11 saves in Penn State's 2-1 loss to No. 3 Virginia on opening night, Friday, Aug. 30. Two days later on Sept. 1, Gladieux scored again and Deverka had three saves in a 2-1 loss to No. 10 Syracuse.

DEVERKA EARNS B1G FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS ON OPENING WEEKEND

True freshman Aby Deverka tallied 14 saves against No. 3 Virginia and No. 10 Syracuse on opening weekend for Penn State, her first collegiate games. Starting from the onset, Deverka had 11 saves against the third-ranked Cavaliers and three against No. 10 Syracuse and was honored as Big Ten Freshman of the Week (9/3/24) to begin the season.

SENIOR TRIO NAMED 2024 TEAM CAPTAINS

Penn State Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics Dr. Pat Kraft named Lisa Bervinchak Love the head coach of Penn State's storied field hockey program on February 20,2023. Bervinchak Love, the long-time associate head coach for the recently retired Char Morett-Curtiss, became the sixth head coach in school history.

Bervinchak Love is entering her second season as the head coach in what will be her 31st year on the Penn State staff. She began her Penn State coaching career in 1994, joining Morett-Curtiss' staff as an assistant coach, was eventually promoted to associate head coach, and has remained a fixture in the Penn State community since.

"We are excited to have Lisa take over the reins of the Penn State field hockey program," said Kraft upon Bervinchak Love's hiring. "Lisa has been a huge part of the program's success for the last 29 years, working alongside the legendary Char Morett-Curtiss. Lisa's fingerprints are all over this program and she is more than ready to take on the challenge of being a head coach. Her love for Penn State, this program and these student-athletes is evident when you talk to her and her passion shines through in every aspect of her coaching."

Her first season, 2023, saw Penn State finish the campaign with a 9-8 overall record, 4-4 in the Big Ten. Her team featured two All-Americans (Sophia Gladieux, first team; Mackenzie Allessie, third team) and the Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year (Gladieux).

"I am truly blessed and honored to be the next head coach for Penn State Field Hockey," said Bervinchak Love in February of 2023. "I want to thank Pat Kraft for giving me this opportunity and Char for all her support, mentoring and the friendship she has given me over the years. Char has been the heart and soul of this program for a long time, and I am truly grateful to have been by her side for 29 of those years. I will do my best to honor Char's legacy and the traditions of Penn State Field Hockey. We will continue to play with heart and strive to be the best both on and off the field. We Are!"

During Bervinchak Love's time on the Penn State staff, the Nittany Lion program cemented itself as a national powerhouse. Since her arrival as an assistant coach, Penn State has achieved national success:

- * 23 NCAA appearances
- * 3 trips to the national semifinals
- * 2 trip to the NCAA title game
- * Seven Big Ten Regular-Season Championships
- * Six Big Ten Tournament Championships

Penn State's student-athletes have achieved heralded success during Bervinchak Love's tenure as an assistant:

- * 31 NFHCA first-team All-Americans
- * 31 second team All-Americans
- * 26 third team All-Americans
- * 72 first-team All-Big Ten selections
- * 6 Big Ten Players of the Year
- * 10 Big Ten Offensive Players of the Year
- * 9 Big Ten Defensive Players of the Year
- * Over 300 Academic All-Big Ten selections
- * Nearly 300 NFHCA National All-Academic honorees

"When I returned to Penn State in 1987 Lisa was a talented right wing," said former head coach Char Morett-Curtiss upon her retirement in February of 2023. "She could weave through a defense with skill and speed and make it look easy. More importantly she displayed a love for the game, a fierce competitive spirit, a motivational work ethic and was highly respected by her teammates. She became a humble captain her senior year and a firstteam All-American."

"A few years later, searching for an assistant in 1993, I reached out to Lisa," Morett-Curtiss continued. "She always embodied the traditions, values, and pride of Penn State Field Hockey as a player and alum and I knew that she would be an outstanding coach. Twenty-nine years, as a leader by my side, she has exceeded those expectations and has become a coach who has led Penn State to years of consistent success in the classroom and on the field. She values every aspect of a player's collegiate life, coaches with a keen knowledge of the game, and an understanding to prepare weekly for game day decisions and success. Lisa is a proud representative of Penn State University, who is highly respected in the coaching community and amongst her coaching peers on campus. Our years together were successful, fun and special. With Lisa at the helm, Penn State Field Hockey is primed for success."

As a player, Bervinchak Love played there years at Penn State after transferring from Villanova at the conclusion of her freshman year. A threeyear letterwinner (1986-88), Bervinchak Love earned a lengthy list of honors during her playing career:

- * First-team NFHCA All-American
- * First-team All-Atlantic 10
- * Atlantic-10 All-Tournament Team
- * Atlantic-10 Player of the Week
- * 28 career goals in three seasons at Penn State
- * Team captain as a senior

Following her graduation from Penn State in 1989, Bervinchak Love continued to play field hockey at the national level. In 1991, she helped guide her team to a Silver Medal at the Olympic Sports Festival in Los Angeles. Bervinchak Love graduated from Penn State with a degree in health policy and administration. She began her professional career as an elementary school teacher in Penn Manor School District and assisted head coaches in field hockey and basketball. She continued teaching in a number of elementary schools before coming to Penn State as an assistant coach.

She is married to her husband Steve Love. They have two daughters, Taylor and Kelsey.

Penn State Athletics chose to advance classes as though 2020-21 was a normal year of eligibility. Student-athletes who were listed as redshirt freshmen in 2021-22 did not officially redshirt in 2020-21, but would have in any other normal year. Extra years of eligibility will be marked on the back end of student-athletes' career (a "+" symbol will be added on the end of "Sr." to indicate the extra year of eligibility being used).

Friday, Aug. 30, 2024 -- University Park, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-1, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 16 in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Coaches Poll, dropped a tough 2-1 game to No. 3 Virginia (1-0) in the season opener for both teams. The Nittany Lions rallied late against the third-ranked Cavaliers but fell short at home. The teams traded early possessions to start the game, with the clock moving down towards the 12:00 mark. The Nittany Lions pushed the ball into the Virginia. The Cavaliers forced a turnover and moved the ball down field quickly, turning the fast break into the game's first goal. Sloan Davidson took a quick pass from Noa Boterman and gave Virginia a 1-0 lead at 10:33. True freshman goalie Aby Deverka, getting the start in her first collegiate game, picked up her first save, knock-ing back a close shot from Virginia's Suze Leemans at 6:10. The Penn State defense, led by Gery Schnarrs and Julienne van Bekkum, withstood late pressure from Virginia, Deverka notched another save and the Lions withstood a late corner to keep the score at 1-0 Virginia after the opening period. Penn State worked the ball into the Virginia circle early in the second period, with Katelyn Strawser pushing the ball to the right side and feeding the top of the circle. The Cavaliers were able to withstand the early pressure and retook possession. Deverka made a diving save on a subsequent Virginia shot and another hit the post at 11:15 as the Cavaliers pressured the Penn State defense. Senior Phia Gladieux started a fast break that led to a deep Penn State push at the 8:20 mark. The Nittany Lions were forced into a turnover and Virginia forced a penalty corner at 7:24. Deverka made a save on the play and a second Cav shot sailed high at 6:40. Morgan McMenamin stopped a Cavalier push with 6:00 as Penn State worked to regain possession, trailing 1-10. Cladicity aread down the middle of the field on a solo drive at 2:45, nearly working the ball to the Cavalier cage. But the Virginia defense was able to collapse towards the goal and stifle Gladieux's efforts late and the Nittany Lions trailed 1-0 at halftime. Virginia outshot Penn State 13-0 in the first half and had a 2-0 edge in corners. Deverka had 5 saves for Penn State in the first half.

Deverka made an early save after a quick Virginia fast break and another Cav shot hit the post again as the clock moved towards the 11:00 mark. True freshman Morgan Snyder and the Penn State defense continued to hold back a fierce Virginia attack, keeping the game close through the 9:00 mark and a handful of penalty corners. Ella Jennes forced a turnover at the 7:30 mark. Aubrey Semler briefly worked the ball into the Virginia zone, but the Cavs regained possession. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-2, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 16 in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Coaches Poll, dropped a tough 2-1 contest to No. 10 Syracuse (2-0) to close out the first weekend of the 2024 season. Nittany Lion senior Phia Gladieux scored for Penn State as the Lions opened up the season with two home games. Penn State worked the ball into the Syracuse circle, with Ella Jennes feeding Natalie Freeman. Freeman's shot was blocked but it forced an early corner for Penn State. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (2-3, 0-0 B1G) used a fourth quarter offensive burst to pick up a 4-1 road win at Kent State (0-6) on Friday. Senior Phia Gladieux scored twice in the final period to spark the Nittany Lions to the win. The Nittany Lions controlled action early. Gladieux had a quick shot sail just over the cage then Penn State nearly took a lead just two minutes into the game when Drew Taylor nearly connected, but the Flash defense knocked the ball away and regained possession for Kent State. The Nittany Lions forced a penalty corner with 10:00 left in the period. Ella Jennes' shot off the set was blocked. The teams traded possessions early in the first period with a consistent rain falling on the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Indiana worked the ball into the Lion zone at the 12:45 mark but Julienne van Bekkum and the Nittany Lion defense pushed the early effort aside. #19 PENN STATE 5, LAFAYETTE 1

Sunday, Sept. 29, 2024 -- University Park, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-3, 1-0 B1G), ranked No. 19 in the latest NFHCA Coaches Poll, rolled to a 5-1 win over visiting Lafayette (5-4) in non-conference action. Senior Phia Gladieux scored twice and had an assist as Penn State won its sixth straight contest. The game was preceded by the official dedication of Char Morett-Curtiss Field at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex, the legendary former Penn State head coach. Lafayette moved the ball into the Lion zone a minute into the game, but Penn State's defense forced a turnover and puet the ball back to the midfield. The teams traded possessions through the 11:00 mark. Lafayette pressured the Lion zone with 10:30 on the clock. Gery Schnars forced a turnover at 10:00 and fed Ella Jennes to start a fastbreak back to the Leopard side of the field. Lafavette's defense held and pushed the ball to the Lion circle. The Cougars set up on offense at 6:00, getting off the game's first shot. But Lea Good's shot was wide of the Lion cage and the game remained scoreless. Morgan Snyder stole the ball at the midfield with 3:30 on the clock to break up a quick Lafayette break, allowing Penn State to reset on offense. Senior Phia Gladieux and the Lion offense pushed the ball into the Leopard zone at 2:40. But Lafayette was able to regain the ball, moved into the Lion zone and picked up the game's first penalty corner with 2:06 on the clock. The shot off the play was wide and the game moved to the second period tied 0-0. Penn State came out fast to start the second period, moving in on the Lafayette cage. Freshman Katelyn Strawser took a shot that forced LC keeper Raffi Fragomeni into making a save on, nearly notching the first goal of the game just :30 into the period. Penn State kept the pressure on Lafayette through the 12:00 mark, keeping the ball primarily on its side of the midfield stripe. A Penn State turnover gave the Leopards the ball deep in the Penn State zone at 10:00. The Penn State defense scrambled while Deverka came out and pressured the Lafayette push. Senior Julia Lamb made a defensive save on a quick Leopard shot but Lafayette picked up another corner. Deverka then made a nice save on the play and the remained scoreless with 9:20 left in the half. Penn State gave up a green card at 8:08 to give the Leopards a player edge. It was Penn State, however, who got on the board during the penalty. Gery Schnarrs lifted a long pass down the left side. After sliding past an LC defender, junior Morgan McMenamin gathered the ball, pivoted around Fragomeni, and scored at 6:57 to give Penn State a 1-0 lead. Jennes was tripped up on a break at 2:46, giving Penn State its first corner of the game. Penn State could not connect on the play and Lafayette quickly moved into the Penn State circle, picking up a corner of their own at 2:26. Penn State's Madison Tambroni blocked the hard shot off the set and Penn State held its lead through the 2:00 mark. Gladieux worked the Lafayette zone, forcing a corner at :46. Gladieux's first shot off the play was blocked, but the Lion senior quickly collected the ball and launched it past Fragomeni with :39 on the clock to send Penn State into the halftime break leading 2-0. Lafayette outshot Penn State 6-4 in the first half and had a 3-2 edge in penalty corners. Deverka had a save and Lamb notched a defensive one for Penn State. Fragomeni also had a save for Lafavette.

The Nittany Lions came out hot in the third period, moving quickly into the Leopard zone. Gladieux sent a long pass close to the cage. Strawser tipped it past the keeper and Natalie Freeman knocked the ball for Penn State's third goal at the 14:08 mark. The Leopards pressured the Penn State defense for the next few minutes, keeping the ball on the Lion side through the 10:0 mark. Morgan Snyder made a sweet steal at 9:51 to stop the press and give the ball back to the Nittany Lions. Deverka intercepted a hard pass with 7:20 on the clock to stop another deep Lafyette push. Penn State was hit for a green card at 6:36. The Lion defense was able to kill the penalty and keep Lafayette from threatening Deverka and the cage. The Leopards were able to force a penalty corner with 3:36 on the clock. Deverka made three saves after the first corner, another after a quick second, a fifth after a quick third corner, and Snyder blocked a shot on a fourth consecutive corner. Penn State maintained its 3-0 lead as the clock moved to the 2:00 mark. Penn State was able to return the ball to the Lafayette side of the field with 1:00 left in the period and led by three after three. Lafayette forced a quick penalty corner to open up the fourth period. Tambroni made a block on the shot off the set and then Snyder made a defensive save off the rebound shot to keep Lafayette off the board. Sofia Acosta made two steals on two quick Lafayette breaks as the clock hit the 12:00 mark as Penn State battled in the midfield. Jennes fed Gladieux breaking to the top of the circle and the Lions picked up a penalty corner with 9:27 left in the game. Julienne van Bekkum fed the ball into Gladieux, top left on the circle, and Gladieux knocked the ball into the back of the cage at 9:21 to put Penn State up 4-0. Madison Britton worked the ball into the Leopard circle a minute later and forced another PSU corner with 8:29 on the clock. Penn State's van Bekkum had a shot blocked off the set, but she quickly gathered the ball and drove the rebound in for the goal at 8:21 to give the Nittany Lions a 5-0 lead. Lafayette got on the board at the 5:50 mark when Emma Maher scored off a Lineke Spaans assist to cut the lead to 5-1. Jennes controlled the midfield for Penn State as the clock hit 3:00 as Penn State worked to continue to pressure the Leopard circle. Penn State worked the Leopard side of the field for the remainder of the game and posted the convincing 5-1 win. Lafayette outshot Penn State 16-10 and had a 9-4 lead in corners. But Deverka's six saves, and two defensive ones (Lamb, Snyder) allowed the Lions to roll to the win. Fragomeni had two saves for the Leopards.
