HEADLINES AND STORYLINES

- UTSA will open the 42nd season in program history against cross-town foe Trinity for the second straight season on Monday night at 7 p.m.
- UTSA returns seven players who earned starts last season, including senior center Jacob Germany, senior guard Erik Czumbel, junior wing Isaiah Addo-Ankrah, senior forward Aleu Aleu, junior forward Lachlan Bofinger, sophomore guard Christian Tucker and sophomore forward Lamin Sabally.
- Germany earned All-Conference USA Honorable Mention last season after averaging 15.2 points and 7.3 boards.
- Germany already ranks among the program leaders in points scored, rebounds and blocks and looks to continue to climb the record books.
- UTSA is in the midst of an exciting time on campus as the move to The American Conference was announced in the fall of 2021. UTSA has been a member of Conference USA since 2014 after a season in the Western Athletic Conference following a long history in the Southland and will be competing in its final year of Conference USA action.
- UTSA is under the direction of seventh-year head coach Steve Henson, a member of the Kansas State Athletics Hall of Fame and the 2017-18 C-USA Coach of the Year. Henson played seven seasons in the NBA and is the only Conference USA coach who played and coached in the NBA. Henson is one of 24 current college coaches to have played in the NBA.

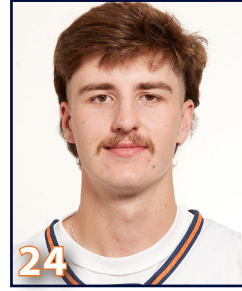

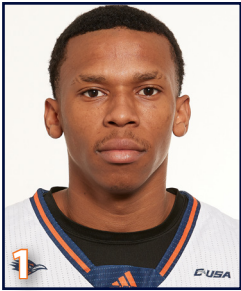

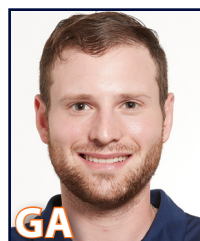

SETTING THE STAGE

- The UTSA men's basketball team officially begins its 2022-23 season tomorrow night, hosting the Trinity Tigers in the season lifter. Tomorrow's game will be streamed on CUSA.tv, broadcast on Ticket 760 AM and is scheduled to tipoff at 7 p.m.
- The Roadrunners are looking to begin the season with a win for the third straight season, having won their openers against Trinity in 2021 and UT Permian Basin in 2020. Trinity on the other hand is trying to carry its momentum from last season into 2022. The Tigers appeared in its conference's title game last season where it fell to St. Thomas in the championship game after finishing second in the conference during the regular season.

LEADING THE RUNNERS

- UTSA returns eight contributing players from last year's team, seven of which had made starts at some point. Amongst the returners are 2021-22 mainstays Jacob Germany and Erik Czumbel. Germany led UTSA in minutes played, field goal percentage, rebounds, blocks and scoring, averaging 15.2 points per contest. Czumbel led the 'Runners in assists, totaling 90, and really controlled the UTSA offense. Other returning contributors include wing Isaiah Addo-Ankrah, forward Aleu Aleu, forward Lachlan Bofinger, forward Josh Farmer, forward Lamin Sabally and guard Christian Tucker.
- Having lost 45.6 points per game from last season, UTSA will look to infuse six newcomers into the fold. The most prominent of the newcomers are JUCO guards John Buggs III and Japhet Medor. Buggs III shot over 40% from three this past season at Hill College and began his collegiate career at UMass before heading to Hill College. He enters UTSA as a redshirt sophomore. Medor comes to UTSA having last played for Hillsborough [Fla.] Community College. Medor is a senior who figures to step into the starting point guard spot.
- Three of the remaining four newcomers are true freshmen and will be experiencing their first taste of college ball this winter. DJ Richards, Massal Diouf and Sam Aldirawi are all in their first season with the Roadrunners and are looking to help contribute. UTSA also welcomes back Azavier Johnson, a redshirt freshman who will also look to contribute in his first college basketball action.
- The final newcomer is Carlton Linguard Jr. who returns to San Antonio after two years with the Kansas State Wildcats. Linguard Jr. was a local star, playing his high school ball at Stevens High School, helping lead the Falcons to 39 wins and consecutive trips to the UIL Class 6A State Tournament over his final two years. As a senior, he averaged 15.3 points, 7.5 rebounds and 1.3 blocks in 31 games for Coach Michael Raynes.

SCOUTING TRINITY

- Trinity returns 16 players from last season, including its top five scorers from a year ago. Two different Tigers averaged double-digit points (Enzo Sechi and Tanner Brown) and figure to again be featured heavily on offense.
- Sechi, last year's leading scorer, averaged 14.4 points per game and returns to head the Trinity offense in the post. Sechi is flanked on the perimeter by the four other top returning scorers. Brown (13.3 ppg) was the biggest threat last season while A.J. Clark (9.2), Jacob Harvey (8.3) and Kaleb Jenkins (9.3) will also be players to watch.

SAN ANTONIO -- UTSA had little issue with Schreiner University in its exhibition match on Wednesday evening, defeating the Mountaineers 93-60 at the Convocation Center behind a complete team performance.

UTSA had 11 student-athletes contribute points toward the 33-point victory, led by JUCO transfer John Buggs III. Buggs poured in 17 points as he was one of five Roadrunners who tallied double-digit points on the night. Jacob Germany (15), Isaiah Addo-Ankrah (12), DJ Richards (12) and Josh Farmer (10) were the other Roadrunners who scored in double figures.

Six Roadrunners shot at least 50% from the field and the Roadrunners as a team recorded a 51.5 shooting percentage from the field. UTSA's efficiency carried beyond the arc too, as the Roadrunners knocked down their threes at a 42.9% clip.

UTSA outrebounded Schreiner 44-21 and had 21 second-chance points due to its hard work on the glass. The Roadrunners also got great production from its bench as the second unit chipped in 45 points, just under half of the team's total points.

UTSA and Schreiner got out to a pretty back-and-forth affair in the early goings of the game as each team sat with 10 points at the first media timeout. Out of the break, UTSA was able to gain some distance, putting itself up by five as the two teams reached the under-twelve timeout. UTSA found its footing from there, ripping off a 20-8 run and taking a commanding 37-20 lead. At the under-eight, Jacob Germany was the first player to reach double-digits as the Kingston, Okla. native had 10 early points. The Roadrunners were able to coast into halftime comfortably, holding a 56-29 lead.

The second half was more of the same for the Roadrunners as the team came out firing, expanding its lead to 28 and forcing a Mountaineer timeout. Germany had moved to 15 points while both Addo-Ankrah (12) and Buggs (11) joined him in the double-figure scoring column. The Roadrunners' second-half lead grew to be as large 34 before Schreiner rattled off a 12-0 run to bring the game closer. UTSA countered with a new lineup, regaining its 34-point lead and eventually going on to win the game by 33.

BASKETBALL RUNS IN THE FAMILY

Basketball is a part of life for every UTSA player, but for two Roadrunners, basketball runs in the family. Sophomore forward Lamin Sabally and freshman guard DJ Richards each have siblings that are set to compete in the upcoming WNBA season. Sabally, a 6-8 wing born in Berlin, Germany, comes from a deep basketball family. His oldest sister, Satou, was the No. 2 overall pick in the 2020 WNBA Draft out of Oregon and currently plays for the Dallas Wings. His other sister Nyara, a 6-5 forward from Oregon, was drafted fifth overall in 2022 by the New York Liberty and is set to make her debut this year after missing the 2022 campaign with injury. Richards, a 6-5 guard out of Houston, comes from a professional basketball family too as his sister also plays in the WNBA. His sister? None other than former national champion from Baylor, DiDi Richards. Richards won the Naismith Defensive Player of the Year in college and was selected in the 2021 WNBA draft by the New York Liberty. Richards is teammates with Sabally's sister Nyara on the Liberty. After her rookie year, Richards was named to the WNBA All-Rookie Team.

GERMANY CLIMBING THE RECORD BOOKS

Senior center Jacob Germany is back for his fourth year as a Roadrunner and looks to build upon his already impressive resume. Last season, Germany led UTSA in scoring and rebounding and was named an Honorable Mention All-Conference USA. Germany ranks highly among school leaders in points, rebounds and blocks. Entering tonight, Germany ranks 22nd in points scored (923), tenth in rebounds (531) and sixth in blocks (80). Germany has also cracked the top ten in two other statistical categories for the Roadrunners. His 50.1 career field goal percentage places him as the eighth-best efficient scorer in school history. Last season, Germany made 196 field goals, giving him the tenth most made field goals in a single season in school history.

ROADRUNNERS GET OLDER, GAIN EXPERIENCE

It's not often you see a starting lineup in college where each player is in their fourth year of college, however, that is exactly what UTSA has. JUCO product Japhet Medor spent two seasons at Santa Fe [Fla.] College before enrolling at Hillsborough College for the 2021-22 campaign. This upcoming season will be his fourth collegiate season. JUCO product John Buggs III began his collegiate career at UMass where he had to redshirt due to injury. After his freshman campaign, he transferred to Hill College where he again had to redshirt due to injury. Finally healthy, Buggs III competed in the 2021-22 campaign for Hill, shooting over 45% from deep. Though technically a redshirt sophomore, Buggs III will be in his fourth year of college. Junior wing Isaiah Addo-Ankrah had an unusual path to the starting lineup at UTSA, as the Houston native originally was a practice player for the University of Houston women's basketball team. Addo-Ankrah then transferred to UTSA after one year at Houston and was a walk-on who eventually forced Coach Henson's hand into playing him and has evolved into a starting-caliber player as he enters his fourth year of school.

THE STORY OF ISAIAH ADDO-ANKRAH

- 6'7" wing Isaiah Addo-Ankrah's path to playing time isn't one you see often. Addo-Ankrah began his collegiate career at Houston where he worked as a practice player on the women's basketball team. He got a call from Coach Peck asking if he'd come to UTSA and walk on to the program.
- During his first season with UTSA, as a walk-on, Addo-Ankrah found himself helping program legends Jhivvan Jackson and Keaton Wallace run their individual shooting drills. Isaiah would emulate the duo's workout after helping and started to become a better player because of it.
- During his sophomore season, when UTSA traveled to UTEP on Jan. 20, 2022, with just six scholarship players due to injuries and COVID-19 concerns, the Roadrunners threw Addo-Ankrah into the playing rotation. Addo-Ankrah staked a claim to playing time with his performance in that game and hasn't looked back, seeing his role continue to expand.

REDISTRIBUTING ROLES

- Having lost 45.6 points per game from last season, UTSA will look to fill the scoring void. Amongst the possible solutions are JUCO guards Japhet Medor and John Buggs III who will likely be the starting backcourt and pace the Roadrunner offense. Jacob Germany will continue to be the focal point in the paint while Erik Czumbel and Isaiah Addo-Ankrah will flank the backcourt. Czumbel will move off-ball after being the primary ball-handler last year and Addo-Ankrah enters the starting lineup after starting just six games last year. Aleu Aleu, Lachlan Bofinger, Josh Farmer, Lamin Sabally and Christian Tucker figure to be featured heavily off the bench, stabilizing their roles.

SOLIDIFYING THE STARTING LINEUP

- UTSA used 14 different starting lineups last season and is hoping that the redistributed roles stick for the 2022-23 campaign. Injuries, COVID eligibility and cohesion were the main issues that forced so many roster changes.

GERMANY POSTING DOUBLE-DOUBLES

- Senior center Jacob Germany had ten double-doubles last year, a new career best for the Kingston, Okla., native. A 6-foot-11 former four-star recruit, Germany has 16 double-doubles in his career. He also has seven games where he missed out on a double-double by one or two rebounds.

REBOUNDING AMONG THE ELITE

- Last season, UTSA ranks among the NCAA leaders in rebounds, offensive rebounds and rebounds per game. UTSA checked in at No. 16 in the nation in offensive rebounds per game (12.72) and No. 61 in total rebounds, also ranking 39th in rebounds per game.

RETURNING FROM THE 2021-22 ROSTER

- UTSA returns several key contributors from the 2021-22 team. In total, UTSA returns eight letterwinners and seven players who have started a game at UTSA.
- Among the returnee is senior center Jacob Germany, who averaged 15.2 points and 7.3 rebounds per game, starting all 32 games. Fellow senior, guard Erik Czumbel, started 16 of 32 games, averaging 4.8 points and 2.4 assists per game. Junior wing Isaiah Addo-Ankrah made six starts as a sophomore.
- The Roadrunners averaged 67.3 points per game in 2021-22, allowing 72.3 points. UTSA shot 39.6 percent and 29.4 percent from 3-point range, with a 68.2 percent clip from the free-throw line. Opponents shot 45.6 percent as a team and 35.9 percent from range. UTSA owned a 38.3 average in rebounds per game, with 6.2 steals and 3.2 blocks.

BOUNCING BACK

- The major storyline for the Roadrunners in 2022-23 is how will UTSA stabilize itself after a season that didn't meet program standards? Now two years removed from the departure of program stars Jhivvan Jackson and Keaton Wallace, UTSA is still looking to find a consistent scoring threat. The pair combined as the second-highest scoring duo from the same recruiting class in NCAA history, behind only Duke's Johnny Dawkins and Mark Alaire. For four seasons, UTSA's offense revolved around getting quality looks for the two best scorers in program history and with the pair off to professional basketball.
- The Roadrunners will utilize senior center Jacob Germany, an athletic three-year starter, 6 foot

point guard Japhet Medor and redshirt sophomore guard John Buggs III as key elements in the offense.

HENSON IN SEVENTH YEAR LEADING ROADRUNNERS

- The Roadrunners are led by seventh-year head coach Steve Henson, the 2017-18 Conference USA Coach of the Year.
- Henson, a former star player at Kansas State (1986-90), took over at UTSA for the 2015-16 season and has quickly transitioned the Roadrunners in an up-tempo, high-scoring offensive unit.
- The native of Kansas took over at UTSA after five years as an assistant at Oklahoma for Lon Kruger. Henson was also on the staff with Kruger for seven seasons at UNLV after a season at South Florida and with the Atlanta Hawks.
- A member of the Kansas State Athletics Hall of Fame who led K-State to four straight NCAA Tournaments, Henson owns program records for assists, assists per game, free-throw percentage, minutes played, minutes per game, starts, consecutive games played and consecutive starts. He ranks among the program best in nine categories, including 3-point field goals and percentage, steals, free throws, scoring and assist to turnover ratio.
- A two-sport standout at K-State, he was a decathlete and placed third as a sophomore and junior at the Big Eight Championships.
- He was a second-round pick of the Milwaukee Bucks in the 1990 NBA Draft – going 44th overall – and played seven years in the NBA and two seasons in Italy and Greece.
- Henson is one of 24 coaches in the NCAA who played in the NBA.
- Henson earned Mr. Basketball honors while playing for his legendary father at McPherson High School.
- Henson has a knack for coaching elite scoring guards, including former Oklahoma standout Buddy Hield and former UTSA standouts Jhivvan Jackson and Keaton Wallace.

RECRUITING SUCCESS

- UTSA has transformed the way the Roadrunners recruit under seventh-year head coach Steve Henson. Henson, along with assistant coaches Mike Peck, Adam Hood and Scott Thompson, have brought in four of the top five recruits in program history. The Roadrunners have two former four-star recruits on the roster in 2022-23, including senior center Jacob Germany and freshman 6-foot-10 forward Josh Farmer.

CARLTON COMES HOME

- UTSA's roster got considerably taller when Carlton Linguard Jr. announced his pledge to the Roadrunners this past offseason. Linguard Jr., a 7-foot San Antonio native, played his high school ball at Stevens and returns to the Alamo City hoping to help the Roadrunners. Linguard Jr. hopes to be eligible for the second semester as transfer rules have the seven-footer sidelined until further notice. Linguard Jr. comes to UTSA after two seasons with the Kansas State Wildcats. Across his two seasons in Manhattan, Linguard Jr. averaged 1.8 points per game as well as 1.3 rebounds per game. Linguard Jr. posted a career-high in points against the Iowa State Cyclones in 2021, putting 10 on the board. He tallied a career-high five boards against West Virginia in the 2022 campaign. Prior to his time as a Wildcat, Linguard Jr. spent a year at Temple CC. At Temple, Linguard Jr. helped lead the team to a 24-7 record, where he averaged 13.3 points – on 51.4 percent shooting and 9 of 34 from deep – with 9.5 rebounds and 3.6 blocks per game in 30 outings. Linguard had 12 double-doubles in his lone junior college year. He scored in double figures in 25 of 30 games, had double-figure boards in 13 games and at least four blocks in 15 outings, including an 11-block outing. He was a three-year letterwinner and a two-year starter at Stevens High School where he helped lead the Falcons to 39 wins and consecutive trips to the UIL Class 6A State Tournament over his final two years. As a senior, he averaged 15.3 points, 7.5 rebounds and 1.3 blocks in 31 games for Coach Michael Raynes.

WALLACE STARS IN THE G LEAGUE

- UTSA basketball great Keaton Wallace was picked in the second round with the ninth overall selection in the 2021 NBA G League Draft by the Wisconsin Herd and traded to the Los Angeles Clippers affiliate G-League team, the Ontario Clippers.
- Wallace, a native of Dallas, Texas, played the 2021 NBA Summer League with the Memphis Grizzlies where he exploded for a team-high 20 points in his summer league debut against the Utah Jazz summer league roster before playing the G-League season with the Clippers.
- Wallace averaged 18.1 points per game with the Ontario Clippers over the 2021-22 season, shooting 46.7% from the field and a blazing 41.3% from beyond the arc. Wallace's all-around game translated too as he averaged 5.7 rebounds and 5.2 assists to go along with his 18.1

points per game. Wallace was the second-leading scorer for the Ontario Clippers and led the team in steals with 1.7. Wallace signed an Exhibit-10 contract with the Los Angeles Clippers this offseason before being waived and returning to the Ontario roster.

THE AMERICAN COMES CALLING

- UTSA is in the midst of the most exciting time in its athletic history during the fall of 2022. The Roadrunners football team broke into the top-25 for the first time in their 12-year history last season as it went on to win the Conference USA Championship. UTSA has also announced that it will officially transition into The American Conference this summer after functioning as a member of Conference USA since 2014.
- "We are thrilled to be joining The American Conference. Our growth as a university and athletics program has been exciting to be involved in and this is one of the most important days in UTSA history," UTSA head coach Steve Henson said on the day of the announcement. "The American is one of the top basketball conferences in the nation, consistently putting multiple teams into the NCAA Tournament, and we will be honored to have the opportunity to compete in such a basketball-rich league. This is a tremendous opportunity to elevate our brand as a university and provide great opportunities for our student-athletes. We want to thank Dr. Campos and Commissioner Aresco for their vision for the future of our conference and university."

UTSA ATHLETICS PLANNING MORE IMPROVEMENTS

- The Roadrunners moved into the RACE (Roadrunner Athletic Center of Excellence) building, a \$45.4 million facility, in the fall of 2021. The building features among others, an academic center, practice fields, sports medicine and strength and conditioning centers, meeting rooms, student-athlete lounges and coaching and staff offices.
- The basketball staff has taken over the former football building and construction is underway on a new practice court for the facility and a renovated office space for Coach Steve Henson and the staff. It marks a big moment for UTSA athletics, which has been around just since 1981 and has only been playing football since 2011, with the university celebrating a 50th anniversary in 2019-20.
- UTSA is also in the process of finishing renovations at Park West, the home of UTSA soccer and T&F. The Park West renovations are just the next step in the long run of improvements UTSA has scheduled. As mentioned, basketball will be receiving a new practice court facility and improvements to both baseball and softball fields are also in the fold.

AUSTRALIAN BRUISER

- The Roadrunners return a junior bruiser in the post in 6-foot-7, 220-pound Lachlan Bofinger. A native of Sydney, Australia, who prepped at Montverde Academy in Florida, Bofinger adapted well to collegiate basketball in 2020-21 and has taken steps to improve his skill level entering his third season. A dedicated force in the weight room, Bofinger has the ability to jump out of the gym and has developed a soft shooting touch in the offseason.

BASKETBALL: COACH HENSON STYLE

- A hallmark of Coach Steve Henson's philosophy in building a program is the ability to play a fast-tempo style. The Roadrunners have ranked among the NCAA's top teams for the last five years in pace of play, including checking in 37th in adjusted tempo in 2020-21 according to KenPom rankings. UTSA ranked among the top in college basketball and consistently second or third in Conference USA in pace of play, allowing its student-athletes to play with a free style and showcase their talents to run the floor and shoot 3-pointers.
- Coach Henson has made it a focus to eliminate tough jumpers from the shot chart this offseason, preaching to his team to try for points at the hoop, three pointers, or getting fouled in the act of scoring. He and the other coaches have been high on effective field goal percentage and have really taken that stat into account over the offseason.

ALEU ALEU FULLY LOADED

- UTSA senior forward Aleu Aleu is healthy and ready for the 2022-23 season. Last year, Aleu was in and out of practice with injuries and was only able to participate in 10 games where he made four starts. With a full offseason behind him, the Austin product is ready to compete and contribute to the Roadrunners night in and night out.

THE POSTSEASON BELONGS IN SAN ANTONIO

- UTSA hosted the NCAA South Regional March at the AT&T Center last season where it saw (2) Villanova defeat (5) Houston on its way to the Final Four. (11) Michigan and (1) Arizona were the other schools that competed in the Regional.

- UTSA also served as the host institution for all 64 teams in the women's NCAA Tournament with the entirety of the tournament moved to the Alamo City for COVID precautions in 2020.

HOUSTON 'RUNNERS

- UTSA likes to recruit Texas players, but no city was recruited harder than Houston was. This season, four Roadrunners call H-Town home as Josh Farmer (Sharpstown HS), Isaiah Addo-Ankrah (Second Baptist HS), DJ Richards (Cypress Creek HS) and Sam Aldirawi (Cinco Ranch HS) all hail from Houston.
- Other Texas players include: Carlton Linguard Jr. (San Antonio/Stevens HS) and Aleu Aleu (Austin/Austin HS).

DEFENDING HOME COURT

- Under head coach Steve Henson, UTSA has posted a 64-28 record at the Convocation Center. The Roadrunners went 11-3 at home in 2016-17, 12-4 in 2017-18, 11-4 in 2018-19, 10-5 in 2019-20, 12-2 in 2020-21 and 8-10 in 2021-22.
- Prior to the Henson era, UTSA last posted consecutive 11-win home campaigns when the program went 11-3 in 2008-09, 2009-10 and 2010-11 as members of the Southland Conference.
- The 1991-92 team was the last Roadrunners squad to win more than 12 games at home, finishing 14-1.

NEW FACES ON THE BENCH

- The Roadrunners are not only welcoming six newcomers to the court, but are also welcoming three newcomers to the bench.
- Kyle Drennan joins the Roadrunners as their Director of Basketball Operations after serving as either a coach or a director of operations for the last four seasons. Most recently, he was an assistant coach at Maine after previously serving as the operations director at Illinois-Chicago. He was the head coach at McCook [Neb.] College in 2019-20 after serving as the director of operations at McNeese.
- Zac Rogers enters his first season season with the Roadrunners staff after spending three years with Oklahoma Baptist as an assistant coach. Rogers has been tabbed as the Player Development Coach and has helped develop three NBA players (Buddy Hield, Isaiah Cousins, Mason Jones) during his time with Coach Henson and Lon Kruger at Oklahoma.
- Luke Stuart joins the Roadrunners as a graduate assistant after a three-year playing career at Trinity. Stuart was named to the SCAC All-Sportsmanship Team (2019-20) and was a two-time SCAC Winter Academic Honor Roll student. Stuart graduated from Trinity in the spring of 2022 with a degree in Environmental Geo Science. He will assist directly in the day-to-day management of the UTSA basketball program, including practice execution.

RUNNERS PACE

- This offseason, coach Steve Henson implemented a new team acronym for his program; Runners PACE. The phrase was the idea of the coaching staff who was hoping to instill a new sense of culture and admittedly was inspired by the football team's 210 Triangle of Toughness.
- PACE stands for P)rocess, A)ccountability, C)onsistency and E)xcellence. These four pillars are mindsets/attitudes that the 2022-23 Roadrunner team plans to hang its hat on and emulate in the season.

INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR

- UTSA has four student-athletes on the roster who were not born in the United States. Erik Czumbel (Italy), Lachlan Bofinger (Australia), Lamin Sabally (Germany) and Massal Diouf (Netherlands) each give UTSA some international flavor.

HENSON ONE OF 23 FORMER NBA PLAYERS COACHING IN NCAA

- UTSA seventh-year head coach Steve Henson is one of 23 former NBA players to ascend to head coaching jobs during the 2022-23 season and is the only coach in Conference USA with NBA playing experience.
- Henson played nine years professionally, including time with the Milwaukee Bucks (1990-92), Atlanta Hawks (1992-93), Charlotte Hornets (1993), Portland Trailblazers (1994-95) and Detroit Pistons (1998-99).
- A Kansas State Athletics Hall of Famer as a two-sport athlete with the Wildcats, Henson was the 44th overall selection in the 1990 NBA Draft by the Bucks.
- Henson was a four-year starting point guard at Kansas State from 1986-90. He earned All-Big Eight Conference honors as a junior and senior and also was named an honorable mention All-American and team captain during each of his final two seasons. He was the first player in school history to play in four consecutive NCAA Tournaments and as a sophomore in 1987-88, he helped guide the Wildcats to a 25-9 record and a spot in the Elite Eight.
- Henson led Kansas State in scoring his final two years by averaging 18.5 points per game as a junior and 17.4 points per game as a senior. He holds three of the top four single-season free throw percentages in school history, including an NCAA-leading .925 mark as a sophomore, while he finished second in the country as a junior (.920).
- He still holds all-time program records for assists (582), assists per game (4.58), free-throw percentage (.900), minutes played (4,474), minutes per game (35.2), starts (118), consecutive games played (127) and consecutive starts (118). Henson ranks among the best in school annals in nine other categories, including 3-point field goals (240/2nd), 3-point field goal percentage (.447/2nd), steals (190/2nd), 3-point field goal attempts (537/3rd), free throws (361/4th), assist-to-turnover ratio (1.98/4th).

SAN ANTONIO -- Jacob Germany had 24 points to lead four UTSA men's basketball standouts in double figures, fueling a 97-66 win over Trinity [Texas] in the season opener for the Roadrunners, on Tuesday night at the Convocation Center.

UTSA (1-0) rolled to a season-opening win over Trinity (1-0) on Tuesday night behind the quartet of double-figure scorers. Germany had 24 points on 10 of 15 shooting in just 19 minutes of action, adding three rebounds and two blocks.

Sophomore guard Jordan Ivy-Curry chipped in 19 points with two assists and two steals in 26 minutes, sinking three 3-pointers in the second half. Newcomer Dhieu Deing had 13 points, five rebounds, four assists and two steals and fellow newcomer Darius McNeill had 11 points, six assists, four rebounds and a steal in 28 minutes.

The Roadrunners shot 47.4 percent in the game on 36 of 76 shooting, sinking seven 3-pointers. UTSA limited Trinity to 44.4 percent from the field, owning a 44-37 advantage on rebounds, a 52-38 margin in points in the paint, a 32-11 margin in fast-break points and an 18-6 lead in second-half points. UTSA owned a 49-30 halftime advantage and outscored TU by 12 in the second half.

UTSA also got six points and a team-leading seven rebounds from Cedrick Alley Jr., who added three assists and two blocks. Lachlan Bofinger had six points, six rebounds and three assists in 15 minutes.

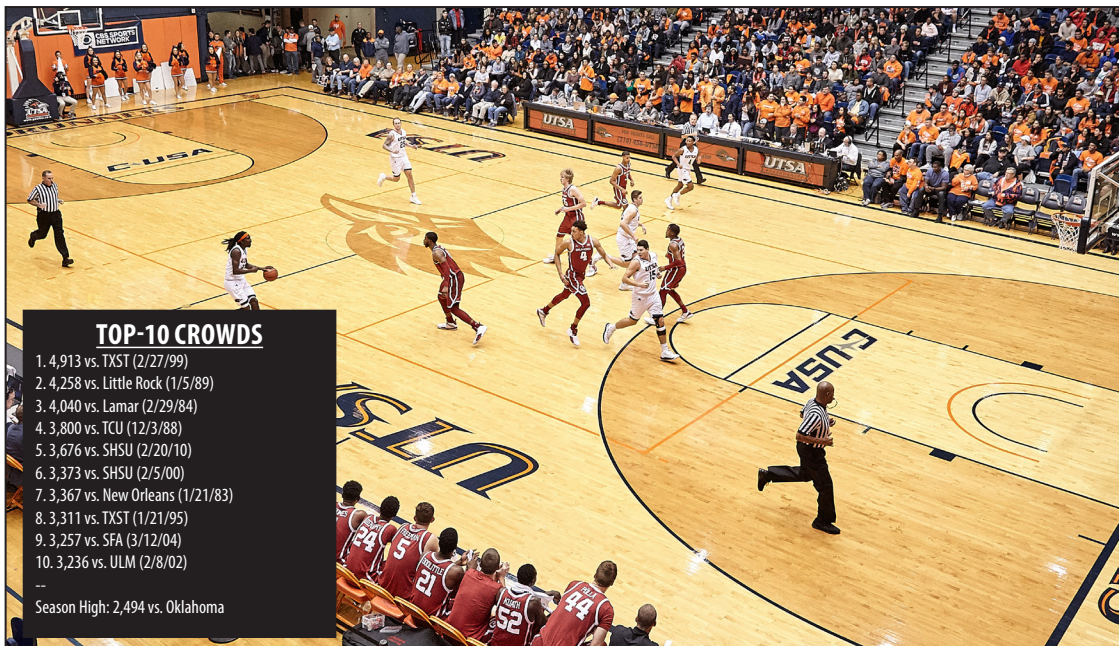
