« OPENING DRIVE »

- UTSA and East Carolina will meet for the first time on Saturday afternoon in the annual Homecoming game.
- The Roadrunners have won their last four Homecoming games and are 8-4 all-time in such contests.
- UTSA is tied with SMU and Tulane at 3-0 atop the American Athletic Conference standings.
- The Roadrunners have won 11 straight regular season conference games and 13 consecutive contests against conference foes when including the 2021 and 2022 Conference USA Championship Games.
- Under head coach Jeff Traylor, UTSA boasts a 23-3 (.885) record in regular season conference games and a 25-3 (.893) mark versus league competition when including the two C-USA Championship Games.
- The Roadrunners have won 18 of their last 20 home games and are 20-3 (.870) at the Alamodome under Jeff Traylor.
- UTSA is 34-13 (.723) in the Jeff Traylor era, the most wins and best winning percentage by a UTSA head coach.
- UTSA redshirt sophomore OLB Trey Moore leads the league in sacks (1.29) and tackles for loss (1.6) per game, categories in which he ranks third and sixth, respectively, in the FBS. Additionally, he is the only FBS player to register three-plus sacks in multiple games this season.

SETTING THE SCENE

Winners of three straight games, UTSA will look to keep pace in the American Athletic Conference title race when it hosts East Carolina on Saturday, Oct. 28, for the annual Homecoming game. Kickoff is set for 2:30 p.m. and the game will air on ESPN+ and Sports Radio AM 760 The Ticket. The Roadrunners ran their record to 4-3 on the season and 3-0 in The American with a 36-10 road win over Florida Atlantic last Saturday night. UTSA is tied with SMU and defending champion Tulane atop the league standings. The Roadrunners have won 18 of their last 20 home games and they have been victorious in their last four Homecoming contests.

TUNING IN

Saturday's game will air on ESPN+ and via the ESPN mobile app. Ted Emrich (play-by-play), Doc Holliday (analyst) and Smacker Miles (reporter) will call the action. The game will air live in the San Antonio area on Sports Radio AM 760 The Ticket, online at Ticket760.com and via the free iHeartRadio app. Andy Everett (play-by-play), Jay Riley (analyst) and Pat Evans (reporter) have the call. There will be a two-hour pregame and 45-minute postgame show.

UTSA IN HOMECOMING GAMES

The Roadrunners have won their last four Homecoming games and are 8-4 all time in such contests. In the Jeff Traylor era, UTSA has beaten North Texas last year (31-27), Rice in 2021 (45-0) and UTEP in 2020 (52-21) on Homecoming.

HOME SWEET DOME

UTSA has been tough to beat at the Alamodome during the Jeff Traylor era. The Roadrunners have won 18 of their last 20 home contests and are 20-3 (.870) at the facility since his arrival prior to the 2020 season. UTSA reeled off a school-record 10-game win streak at home that started with a 27-26 victory over Louisiana Tech on Oct. 24, 2020, and ran through the 49-41 win against WKU in the 2021 Conference USA Championship Game before it was snapped in triple overtime against No. 24 Houston in the 2022 season opener. The Roadrunners have won eight of the last nine at home and are 46-30 (.605) all-time in the Alamodome.

PACKING THE DOME

UTSA fans have packed the Alamodome over the past two-plus seasons, as five of the program's nine-largest home crowds have been recorded during that span. Two of the past four home games now rank second and fourth on the all-time chart, as 49,342 fans watched UTSA beat Texas State in the 2023 home opener to mark the second-largest crowd in program history. In the final home contest last season, the Roadrunners raced past North Texas, 48-27, to capture their second straight Conference USA Championship in front of 41,412 fans, which now ranks fourth on the list of largest home crowds. That figure edged the 41,148 fans who watched UTSA outlast WKU, 49-41, in the 2021 C-USA Championship Game, now the fifth-largest home attendance. The 2022 season opener against 24th-ranked Houston drew 37,526 fans, which ranks eighth all-time, just ahead of the 34-31 thriller against UAB in front 35,147 fans in 2021. The UTSA/Texas State crowd is the second-largest in the American Athletic Conference this season behind South Florida's home game versus Alabama that drew 65,138. UTSA ranks third in The American, seventh among state of Texas FBS schools and 68th nationally in average home attendance (33,429). UTSA led C-USA in average home attendance in each of the past two seasons, averaging 28,917 per game last fall and 26,643 in 2021. A total of 465,400

fans have filed into the Alamodome to watch the Roadrunners since the return from COVID-19 protocols for the 2021 season. UTSA set NCAA modern startup program records in its first season by drawing 56,743 fans to the inaugural game against Northeastern State on Sept. 3, 2011, and by averaging 35,521 fans for six home contests.

LAST TIME OUT

UTSA held Florida Atlantic to a season low for total yardage and the Roadrunners piled up 437 yards in a 36-10 win over Florida Atlantic on Saturday night in American Athletic Conference action at FAU Stadium. The Roadrunners limited the Owls to a season-low 162 yards of offense behind a stiff rush defense, surrendering only 20 yards on the ground and registering 13 tackles for loss, including five sacks. Jamal Ligon made five tackles, including 1.5 for loss, while Ken Robinson also posted five stops on the night. Trey Moore logged 1.5 sacks, while Joe Evans, Ronald Triplette and Tai Leonard turned in a sack apiece. Offensively, Frank Harris completed 26 of 35 passes for 261 yards and two touchdowns. His favorite target was Joshua Cephus, who had seven receptions for 57 yards, while Devin McCuin made five grabs for 64 yards. The three-headed backfield monster of Kevorian Barnes, Rocko Griffin and Robert Henry combined to rush for 162 yards and a pair of TDs. Barnes carried 10 times for 56 yards, Henry had 53 yards and a score on 10 attempts and Griffin rushed 16 times for 53 yards and a touchdown.

ROADRUNNERS RACING THROUGH CONFERENCE COMPETITION

The Roadrunners have won their last 13 games against conference opponents. The streak began with the 49-41 victory over Western Kentucky in the 2021 Conference USA Championship and continued with a perfect 8-0 regular season league slate in 2022 before extending the stretch to 10 with a 48-27 triumph over North Texas in the 2022 C-USA Championship Game. UTSA made its American Athletic Conference debut a successful one, racing past Temple, 49-34, on Oct 7 before beating UAB, 41-20, on Oct. 14 and scoring a 36-10 road triumph over Florida Atlantic last Saturday night. The Roadrunners have won 23 of their last 24 contests against conference competition dating back to a three-game win streak that closed out the 2020 C-USA schedule in Jeff Traylor's first season. In fact, UTSA boasts a 23-3 (.885) record in regular season conference games and a 25-3 (.893) mark against league foes in the Traylor era.

SCOUTING EAST CAROLINA

The Pirates fell to 1-6 overall and 0-3 in the American Athletic Conference with a 10-7 home setback to Charlotte on Saturday. East Carolina is 17.4 points and 276.9 yards per game while allowing 24.1 points and 331.3 yards per contest. Julius Wood leads the defense with 49 total tackles and an interception, while Chad Stephens has registered 7.5 tackles for loss, including 1.5 sacks. Alex Flinn (72-143-6, 718 yards, 2 TD) and Mason Garcia (48-95-2, 408 yards, TD) both have seen action at quarterback in all seven games. Rahjai Harris has rushed for 249 yards and four touchdowns, while Garcia has added 227 and a pair of scores on the ground. Chase Sowell is the top receiver with 25 catches for 295 yards. Head coach Mike Houston is 23-30 in his fifth season at the helm.

SERIES HISTORY

Saturday will mark the first meeting on the gridiron between UTSA and East Carolina. The two teams were both members of Conference USA for the 2013 season before the Pirates left to join the American Athletic Conference.

WHO'S COUNTING

Now in their 13th season of play, the Roadrunners will play the 154th game in program history on Saturday when they host East Carolina. UTSA is 79-74 all-time and 46-30 at home. By comparison, East Carolina has been playing football since 1932 and owns an all-time record of 463-450-11.

MOORE COLLECTS SECOND AAC WEEKLY AWARD

UTSA outside linebacker Trey Moore was named American Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Week for the second time this season on Oct. 16 following his performance in the 41-20 win against UAB at the Alamodome. He registered a career-high 3.5 sacks as part of five total tackles to go with a forced fumble, fumble recovery and quarterback hurry. The Smithson Valley High School product's strip-sack of Jacob Zeno early in the first quarter helped stake the Roadrunners to a 14-0 lead in a contest they never trailed. His 3.5 sacks are tied for the third-most in a game by an AAC player in league history and it marks the second time the sophomore has posted three-or-more sacks in a game this fall. Moore also earned the league's weekly award on Sept. 11 after a three-sack effort in the 20-13 victory over Texas State. Chase Allen also was honored after the win against the Bobcats after he made field goals from 46 and 43 yards and both extra-point attempts.

DOWN TO THE WIRE

UTSA is no stranger to close contests in the Jeff Traylor era, as 29 of the 47 have been one-score ballgames in the fourth quarter. The Roadrunners own a 20-9 record in those games. Dating back to the 2021 campaign, UTSA has seen 16 of the last 26 contests decided in the fourth quarter or later. Additionally, the Roadrunners are 12-4 in games decided by eight points or less since 2021.

WORKING OVERTIME

The Roadrunners were working overtime in 2022, with a program-record three contests needing extra periods to determine the outcome. UTSA played the first back-to-back overtime games in program history to open the campaign. The Roadrunners dropped a 37-35 decision to No. 24 Houston in triple overtime in the opener. One week later, UTSA rallied from a 14-point, second-half deficit to score a 41-38 road triumph over Army West Point in one extra period. On Nov. 5 in Birmingham, the Roadrunners outlasted UAB 44-38 in double overtime to improve to 2-1 last season and 5-3 overall in overtime games. UTSA played overtime, double-overtime and triple-overtime games last season and joined Houston, Navy and Texas Tech as the only FBS teams to have played three overtime contests last year.

UTSA PICKED SECOND IN AAC PRESEASON POLL

The Roadrunners have been picked to finish second in the American Athletic Conference Preseason Media Poll. UTSA received 440 total points and nine first-place votes ahead of its debut campaign in the AAC, good for second behind defending champion Tulane, which garnered 457 points and 20 first-place votes. SMU was projected to finish third, followed by Memphis, Florida Atlantic, East Carolina, North Texas, UAB, Navy, Temple, Tulsa, Rice, South Florida and Charlotte in the 14-team league.

ROADRUNNERS REEL IN PRESEASON HONORS

A total of 14 Roadrunners have landed on watch lists this year. Senior quarterback Frank Harris leads the way with nine nods, while wide receiver De'Corian Clark has six.

TRAYLOR TAKING ROADRUNNERS TO NEW HEIGHTS

Head coach Jeff Traylor has taken UTSA to new heights since taking over the program prior to the 2020 campaign. The Gilmer, Texas, native has turned around the program by instilling his 210 Triangle of Toughness culture, producing results on and off the field. Taking over a team that won a combined seven games in the two seasons prior to his arrival, he has led the Roadrunners to a 34-13 record, the most wins all-time and best winning percentage (.723) by a UTSA head football coach. In the Jeff Traylor era, the Roadrunners own a 23-3 (.885) record in regular season conference games and are 25-3 (.893) against league competition when including the 2021 and 2022 Conference USA Championship Games. Under Traylor's direction, UTSA has won back-to-back conference championships, been nationally ranked in all three major polls in 2021 and 2022 and made three straight bowl appearances. The two-time conference coach of the year has coached six All-Americans, three national award finalists, 12 national award semifinalists, six conference superlative award recipients, 67 all-conference selections, two academic All-Americans and a pair of NFL Draft picks during his UTSA tenure. He was the 2021 AFCA Region 4 Coach of the Year and he has been a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year twice in addition to being a finalist for the 2022 Paul "Bear" Bryant Awards Coach of the Year, 2021 AFCA National Coach of the Year and the 2021 George Munger College Coach of the Year.

SEASON 13

One of the newest FBS programs and now in its first year as a member of the American Athletic Conference, UTSA is playing its 13th season of football in 2023. The Roadrunners started their program from scratch and, following a practice year in 2010, played their first season as an FCS Independent in 2011 before joining the Western Athletic Conference for the 2012 campaign. UTSA moved into Conference USA in 2013 and became a full-fledged FBS member starting with the 2014 season. The Roadrunners set NCAA modern startup program records in 2011 by drawing 56,743 fans to their inaugural game against Northeastern State and by averaging 35,521 fans for their six home contests that season. UTSA made its first postseason appearance at the 2016 New Mexico Bowl in its sixth season of play and registered its first win against a team from the Big 12 Conference the following season with a 17-10 victory over Baylor. The Roadrunners made history in 2021, opening the fall with a road win against Illinois of the Big Ten Conference, capturing their first conference championship with a 49-42 decision against WKU and capping a 12-2 ledger with their third bowl game. They repeated as league champions with a 48-27 win over North Texas in 2022 and made their third straight and fourth overall bowl appearance, ending the year with an 11-3 mark. UTSA has posted at least six wins in seven of the 12 complete seasons in program history and it has reached the seven-win plateau five times, including in each of the first three years of the Jeff Traylor era. The Roadrunners reached double-digit wins in back-to-back seasons (2021-22), joining Baylor and TCU as the only Texas-based FBS teams since 2012 to notch at least 10 wins in consecutive years.

HIGH-SCORING ROADRUNNERS

UTSA has emerged as one of the top scoring offenses in the FBS under head coach Jeff Traylor. In his second season at the helm in 2021, the Roadrunners set school records for scoring, tallying 516 total points in 14 contests for a program-record 36.9 points per game to rank 11th nationally. Last year, the Roadrunners came up just shy of the school record with 515 points in 14 games for an average of 36.8 per game, good for 14th in the FBS. UTSA scored 30-plus points in 12 of the 14 contests, and they topped the 40-point barrier seven times and the 50-point plateau twice. The Roadrunners have exploded for 30-plus points in each of the last three games, tallying 49 in the win at Temple, 41 against UAB and 36 versus Florida Atlantic last Saturday night. In fact, they are averaging 42.0 points per game so far in American Athletic Conference action UTSA now has scored 20-plus points in 36 of the last 39 games dating back to the 2020 campaign. The Roadrunners have tallied 1,573 points in 47 games under head coach Jeff Traylor, good for an average of 33.5 points per game.

CONVERTING ON THIRD DOWN

The Roadrunners have emerged as one of the best in the nation when it comes to converting on third down. UTSA has earned a first down on 48 of 103 third-down attempts this season. That equates to a 46.6% clip, good for first in the American Athletic Conference and 19th in the FBS. The Roadrunners converted a season-high 12 of 21 third-down tries in the 20-13 victory over Texas State on Sept. 9 and they have gained a first down on eight third-down attempts twice, against Tennessee (Sept. 23) and UAB (Oct. 14).

HARRIS ON HISTORIC RIDE

Frank Harris is on a historic ride as UTSA's starting quarterback. The Schertz Clemens High School product owns 38 school records, including 14 career marks, and he recently eclipsed 10,000 passing yards and 12,000 total offense yards as a Roadrunner. The 2022 Conference USA Most Valuable Player and first-team all-conference performer owns a 35-12 record as UTSA's starting QB, and despite missing two games in September, he still ranks fourth among active signal-callers with 47 starts behind only Oregon's Bo Nix (54), Notre Dame's Sam Hartman (53) and LSU's Jayden Daniels (51). The left-hander appears on nine different preseason watch lists this year, including the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award, of which he was a finalist for in 2022, and the Davey O'Brien Award, which he has been a semifinalist for in each of the last two seasons. Harris is coming off a record-setting 2022 that saw him complete 328 of 471 passes (69.6%) for 4,063 yards and 32 TDs and a 160.7 passing efficiency — all school records — to help lead UTSA to an 11-3 record and a second straight league crown. He logged seven 300-yard passing games, including a UTSA record 414 in the 45-30 win at Middle Tennessee, and he totaled 400-plus yards of offense three times, highlighted by a school record 423 in the same contest. Harris added 602 rushing yards — the program standard for a QB — and nine scores on the ground. He opened the 2023 campaign by throwing for 209 yards and a TD and rushing for 45 yards against Houston, and he followed that by completing 26 of 37 passes for 214 yards and a score in the 20-13 victory over Texas State before missing his first start and game since 2020 to snap a streak of 36 consecutive starts. He returned to the lineup in the 49-34 win at Temple and threw for 338 yards and three touchdowns on 25-of-33 passing, earning a spot on the Davey O'Brien Award Great 8, Manning Award Stars of the Week list and AAC Weekly Honor Roll for his performance. He completed 19 of 30 passes for 171 yards and a pair of scores in the 41-20 victory over UAB and then threw for 261 yards and two TDs on 26-of-35 passing in the 36-10 road victory over Florida Atlantic in his last outing. For his career, Harris has thrown for 10,549 yards and 83 touchdowns on 930-of-1,382 passing to go with 1,916 rushing yards and 25 scores on 411 carries to give him UTSA's total offense record with 12,465 yards, which ranks sixth among active FBS quarterbacks. Additionally, he stands fourth in touchdowns responsible for (109), fifth in completion percentage (.673), eighth in touchdown passes (83), 10th in passing yards (10,549) and 23rd in passing efficiency (147.18) among active signal-callers. He is one of only four FBS quarterbacks with 12,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards under his belt, joining Nix, Daniels and San Jose State's Chevan Cordeiro.

EXPERIENCE UP FRONT

UTSA once again boasts one of the most experienced offensive lines in the FBS this fall. The Roadrunners own more than 200 combined games played within the unit, a total that ranks in the top 25 nationally. Additionally, UTSA's returning starters of Terrell Haynes (32), Makai Hart (22), Ernesto Almaraz (8), Walker Baty (7) and Venly Tatafu (7) had combined for 76 starts entering the season, the 14th-best tally in the FBS. Almaraz and Tatafu have started seven contests in 2023, while Haynes and Hart have upped their career starts tally to 38 and 24, respectively.

IMPROVED PROTECTION

With the start of American Athletic Conference play this month, the Roadrunners have solidified protection on the offensive line. The lineup of left tackle Venly Tatafu, left guard Terrell Haynes, center Luke Lapeze, right guard Cory Godinet and right tackle Ernesto Almaraz has started each of the past three games. The group has allowed only two sacks through the first three league contests, one apiece against Temple and UAB before not yielding a sack in the 36-10 win at Florida Atlantic.

THREE-HEADED MONSTER

The Roadrunners boast a three-headed monster in the backfield this season. Running backs Kevorian Barnes, Rocko Griffin and Robert Henry have combined to rush for 997 yards and 11 touchdowns on 198 attempts, a combined average of 5.04 yards per carry. Barnes, a redshirt sophomore from San Augustine, Texas, paces the unit with 469 yards and four TDs on 104 carries, while Henry, a junior transfer from Lumberton, Mississippi, has tallied 359 yards and a team-best five scores on 53 totes, an average of 6.8 yards per attempt. Griffin, a sophomore transfer from Vanderbilt, has rushed 41 times for 169 yards and a pair of scores despite missing the UAB contest. The trio is responsible for 91.4% of the Roadrunners' rushing yards and 91.7% of their rushing TDs this fall.

BARNES BACK AFTER BREAKOUT CAMPAIGN

Kevorian Barnes enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2022 that saw him collect Conference USA Freshman of the Year honors after rushing for 845 yards and six touchdowns on 135 carries. The San Augustine, Texas, native had just six rushes for 20 yards through the first five contests last fall before his breakout game of 128 yards and two touchdowns on 20 rushes in the 30-10 victory at FIU on Oct. 14. In fact, 825 of his yards were accumulated over the final eight contests. He topped the 100-yard mark on the ground five times and averaged 6.3 yards per rush, capping the year with a 132-yard output against No. 23 Troy in the Cure Bowl. Barnes' 2022 rushing total ranks sixth on UTSA's single-season list. The Doak Walker Award Watch List member opened his redshirt sophomore season with another 100-yard contest, piling up 103 yards and a TD on 16 carries against Houston. He matched that with 103 yards on 26 totes in the 20-13 win over Texas State to also eclipse the 1,000-yard plateau for his career. Barnes has rushed for 263 yards combined over the last five contests and now has 469 yards this season and 1,330 in 22 career contests.

SURE-HANDED CEPHUS

Joshua Cephus has built a reputation as a wide receiver who does not drop anything thrown his way. The senior from Houston has been tagged with only nine drops in 380 targets during his career for a drop rate of 3.2% according to Pro Football Focus. A graduate of Dekaney High School, he caught 87 passes for 985 yards and six touchdowns en route to second-team all-conference accolades in 2022. Cephus opened his final campaign with a career night, catching nine balls for a career-best 123 yards and a touchdown against Houston, and he was named to the American Athletic Conference Weekly Honor Roll for his performance. He caught seven balls for 40 yards in the 20-13 win over Texas State and added 84 receiving yards and a TD on eight grabs versus Army before hauling in seven passes for 58 yards and a score at No. 20 Tennessee. He was on the receiving end of seven passes for 81 yards and a touchdown in the 49-34 win at Temple and he collected seven balls for 55 yards and a pair of scores in the 41-20 triumph over UAB in his last outing, also taking down the program record for career receptions with his first TD grab. He had seven receptions for 57 yards in the 36-10 win at Florida Atlantic and leads UTSA with 52 catches, 498 receiving yards and six receiving TDs this season. He currently stands second in the American Athletic Conference and eighth nationally in receptions per game (7.4), fifth in the league and 52nd in the FBS in receiving yards per game (71.1) and third in the AAC and 17th in the country in receiving TDs (6). He also ranks among the nation's best when it comes to consecutive games with a reception. A member of the Paul Hornung Award and Reese's Senior Bowl Watch Lists, he has caught a pass in 46 straight contests, the fourth-longest active stretch in the nation behind only Sam Pinckney of Coastal Carolina (52), Jacob Cowing of Arizona (51), and Franklin (49), who is now at Ole Miss. Among active FBS players, he currently ranks third in career receptions (276), and fifth in receiving yards (2,986) and receiving TDs (24).

CARDENAS IS CLUTCH

UTSA tight end Oscar Cardenas has built a reputation for making clutch catches in key moments of games during his career. The San Antonio Brandeis High School product played a role in one of the iconic moments in program history, hauling in the game-winning TD reception after a tipped

pass with three seconds left in the 34-31 victory over UAB in 2021. He also had a 28-yard catch on that game-winning drive versus the Blazers to help the Roadrunners clinch the Conference USA West Division title. Last year, Cardenas caught two balls in the opener against No. 24 Houston, including a key 25-yard reception that set up the game-tying field goal as time expired. He also made a one-handed grab and then hurdled a defender for a 35-yard play on the final drive of the 31-27 victory over North Texas last October to set up the game-winning touchdown pass on the following play. A member of the John Mackey Award Watch List for the second straight season, he caught 31 passes for 438 yards — both career highs — and two TDs en route to honorable mention all-conference accolades in 2022. Cardenas has 17 catches for 153 yards this season including four receptions for 31 yards versus No. 20 Tennessee and five grabs for 51 yards in the 49-34 win at Temple. He now owns 67 receptions for 870 yards and four touchdowns as a Roadrunner.

SACK ATTACK

UTSA has spent much time in the opposing backfield this season. The Roadrunners have registered 58 tackles for loss and 24 sacks in 2023, including a school-record seven sacks in the 20-13 victory over Texas State and a season-high 13 tackles behind the line of scrimmage — one shy of the program standard — in the 36-10 road triumph over Florida Atlantic. In fact, UTSA has tallied 25 TFLs and 11 sacks over the last two games. UTSA lead the American Athletic Conference and ranks fifth in the FBS in tackles for loss per game (8.3). The Roadrunners also pace the league and stand eighth nationally in sacks per game (3.43).

TOUGH AGAINST THE RUN

With the start of American Athletic Conference play, the Roadrunners have emerged with a stout rush defense. UTSA has surrendered only 221 rushing yards through the first three league games, an average of 73.7 per contest. The Roadrunners have held two of their first three conference foes to fewer

than 100 yards on the ground, as Temple gained only 70 yards while Florida Atlantic was limited to a season-low 20, the fewest allowed since holding Rice to five rushing yards last November. UTSA also yielded only 31 rushing yards in the win over Texas State, while Houston barely topped the century mark with 101 in the season opener.

TURNING THE TIDE FOR TAKEAWAYS

After going through the first three games without a takeaway, the Roadrunners have forced eight turnovers over the past four contests. UTSA came up with its first takeaway on a muffed punt return that was recovered by Kelechi Nwachuku against No. 20 Tennessee. On Oct. 7 in the American Athletic Conference-opening win at Temple, UTSA forced a pair of fumbles to push their season tally to three. The Roadrunners doubled their takeaway total by coming up with three in the 41-20 victory over UAB, as Trey Moore registered a strip-sack that he recovered in the first quarter, while Kam Alexander and Elliott Davison each had an interception. Owen Pewee and Nicktroy Fortune each picked off passes in the 36-10 road triumph at Florida Atlantic to up the takeaway total to eight, four fumble recoveries and four interceptions.

MOORE EMERGES ON THE EDGE

UTSA redshirt sophomore Trey Moore has emerged as one of the top young edge defenders in the nation. The Smithson Valley High School product enjoyed a breakout 2022 campaign, posting 59 total tackles, 30 solo stops, 18 tackles for loss, eight sacks, six pass breakups, five quarterback hurries, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery en route to being named a Freshman All-American by three different organizations. A Conference USA All-Freshman Team and honorable mention all-conference selection, he broke 2018 NFL First Round draft pick Marcus Davenport's school single-season record for tackles for loss in his first full season as a starter. A member of the preseason watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Moore has picked up where he left off so far this season with 29 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss and nine sacks — just 1.5 shy of Clarence Hicks' school record 11 in 2021 — through seven contests. He posted seven stops, including three sacks, in the 20-13 win over Texas State. Moore produced another monster output in the 41-20 victory against UAB, recording five tackles, 3.5 sacks, one forced fumble, a fumble recovery and a quarterback hurry. His 3.5 sacks are the second-best total by a Roadrunner in a game, trailing on Marlon Smith's school record of 4.0 against McMurry in 2011. He is the only FBS player to have three-or-more sacks in multiple contests this season and one of only 16 with at least three in a game in 2023. Moore leads the American Athletic Conference and ranks third nationally with 1.29 sacks per game and he paces the league and stands sixth in the FBS with 1.6 tackles for loss per contest. Despite being just a redshirt sophomore, Moore ranks second among active FBS players in career tackles per loss per game (1.23) and third in sacks per contest (0.71). He currently stands second in program history with 17 sacks and third with 29.5 TFLs in only 24 career games.

D-LINE DEPTH KEEPS ROADRUNNERS FRESH

UTSA utilizes a deep rotation on the defensive line to keep players fresh throughout the course of a game. The Roadrunners played as many as 10 d-linemen in a game in 2022, and they have opened 2023 by rotating at least nine in each of the first seven contests, including 10 in three games and 11 versus UAB. UTSA's front features first-team all-conference performer Brandon Brown, honorable mention all-conference selections in Nick Booker-Brown, Joe Evans and Brandon Matterson, Conference USA All-Freshman Team picks in Christian Clayton and Tai Leonard, to go along with Asyrus Simon, Ronald Triplette and Trumane Bell II, who is tied for fourth in school history with 12.5 career sacks.

LINEBACKER LEADER

Jamal Ligon is back for his fourth season as one of UTSA's two starting inside linebackers. The Tyler, Texas, native earned second-team all-conference honors in 2022 after recording a team-high 90 total tackles, 43 solo stops, six tackles for loss, one sack, four quarterback hurries, two forced fumbles, one pass breakup and a fumble recovery. A member of the Shrine Bowl 1,000, he has tallied 29 stops, 3.5 TFLs, two quarterback hurries, and a PBU through seven games this year. Ligon set the program's single-game

standard with 19 tackles as a true freshman in the 37-35 win over Middle Tennessee in 2020 and he currently ranks fourth in school history with 252 career stops.

WISDOM IN THE SECONDARY

Rashad Wisdom is back for his fifth and final season in a UTSA uniform as one of the most productive defensive backs in program history. The Converse Judson High School product started six games last fall but suffered a season-ending injury and shut it down after the road win over FIU on Oct. 14. A two-time first-team all-conference safety, he opened his final campaign with five total tackles — including four unassisted — versus Houston before posting three stops in the 20-13 win over Texas State. He turned in five solo and seven total stops against Army, four tackles plus a pair of PBUs at No. 20 Tennessee and five unassisted tackles in the 49-34 win at Temple. Over the last two games, he has upped his school-record tally to 202 career solo tackles, third among active FBS players, Wisdom has his eyes on UTSA's career tackles mark of 293 set by Triston Wade (2011-14), as he has made 284 total stops, good for 18th on the active FBS list. The Bronko Nagurski Trophy and Chuck Bednarik Award Watch List member also has five interceptions, 10 pass breakups, 11 tackles for loss, four forced fumbles, three sacks and a pair of fumble recoveries in 51 games as a Roadrunner.

PUNTER FROM DOWN UNDER

Lucas Dean is back for his fifth season as one of the best to ever punt for UTSA. A product of Prokick Australia and the first Roadrunner from Down Under, he has used an Australian Rules Football background to help provide UTSA with a weapon in the kicking game since his arrival on campus in 2019. The three-time all-conference performer owns the program standard for career punting average with a 43.6 mark, which places him 18th among active FBS players. This season, he is averaging 40.3 yards on 28 punts with nine inside the 20-yard line and four that have gone 50-plus yards. Dean has registered the top three marks on the school's single-season chart with a 45.98 average in 2020, 45.23 in 2021 and 45.05 last fall. He also boasts seven of the eight longest punts in UTSA annals, headlined by his school-record 76-yard kick against Texas Southern in 2022. The 2020 Conference USA Special Teams Player of the Year was a second-team All-American by the Sporting News and a fourth-team selection by Phil Steele that season. Also an excellent student who has been named Academic All-District twice and to the 2021 Conference USA All-Academic Team, Dean is a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy and appears on the preseason watch list for the Ray Guy Award this year.

TV BIRDS

Saturday's game will air on ESPN+, marking 132 straight televised/streamed appearances for the Roadrunners. The last UTSA game that was not broadcast was the 2012 season finale against Texas State.

A FOCUS ON RECRUITING TEXAS

UTSA's 113-man roster features 88 players — 78% — who hail from the state of Texas. Georgia and Louisiana stand second with four players apiece, while there are three from Mississippi and two each from Florida and Tennessee. Alabama, California, Hawai'i, Iowa, New Jersey, Oregon, Pennsylvania and Virginia each have produced one current Roadrunner. Lucas Dean is the lone UTSA player from Australia and Cory Godinet is the first Roadrunner from American Samoa.

« KEEPING THEM HOME »

UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor and his staff have placed an emphasis on recruiting the city of San Antonio and surrounding area. This year's roster includes 20 players from the San Antonio area.

Since his arrival in December 2019 head coach Jeff Traylor has instilled into the program his 210 Triangle Of Toughness — run the football, be physical on defense and be sound on special teams — and its Culture Pillars: Integrity, Passion, Mental & Physical Toughness, Selfless and Perfect Effort. As part of that culture, the players voted during fall camp on who would earn single-digit jersey numbers, a reward for representing mental and physical toughness on and off the field. Offensive linemen **Ernesto Almaraz (64)**, **Makai Hart (77)** and **Terrell Haynes (58)** also received the necessary votes but cannot change to a single-digit number due to their position.

PRO 'RUNNERS

UTSA currently has four players on NFL active rosters and a trio on practice squads. Marcus Davenport became the first Roadrunner to be selected in the first round of the NFL Draft when the Saints picked him 14th overall in 2018. The sixth-year veteran defensive end is in his first season as a starting outside linebacker for the Vikings. Tariq Woolen was selected by the Seahawks in the fifth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. Now in his second year as a starter at cornerback, he led the league with six interceptions and was a Pro Bowl selection as a rookie. Spencer Burford was a fourth-round pick by the 49ers in 2022 and is in his second year as a starter at offensive guard in San Francisco. Kevin Strong Jr. is in his fifth year in the NFL and first season as a starting defensive lineman for the Arizona Cardinals. Additionally, Eric Banks (Cardinals), Sincere McCormick (Raiders) and Leroy Watson (49ers) are on practice squads.

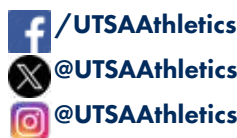

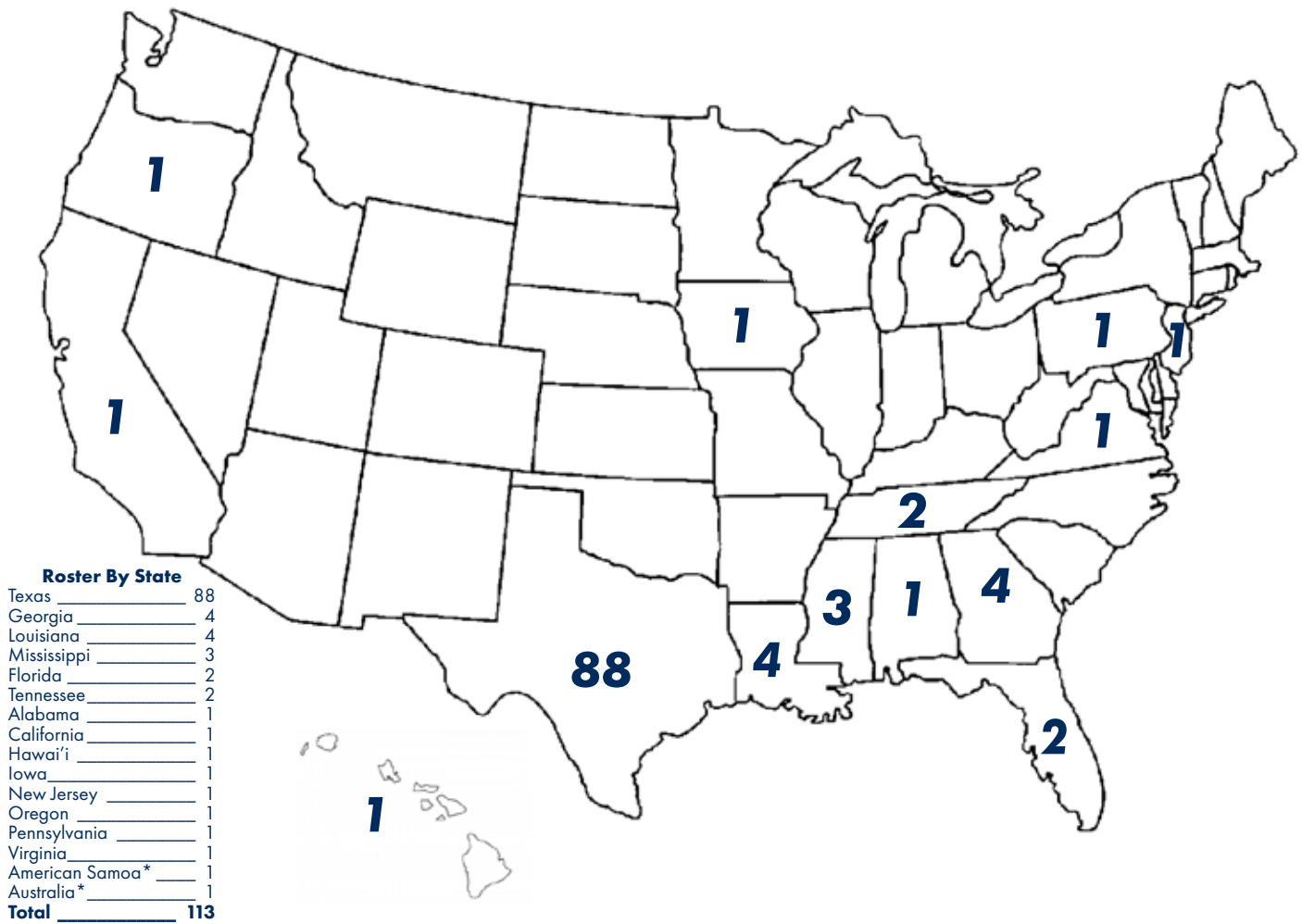

Named UTSA's third head coach on Dec. 9, 2019, Jeff Traylor has had an immediate impact on the program, university and city of San Antonio in a short period of time.

Traylor has turned around the UTSA football program by instilling his 210 Triangle of Toughness culture, which has led to positive results on and off the field. The Gilmer, Texas, native took over a team that won a combined seven games in the two seasons prior to his arrival and has led the Roadrunners to a 30-10 record in his first three years at the helm, already the most wins and best winning percentage (.750) by a coach in program history.

In 2022, Traylor guided UTSA to an 11-3 record, a second straight Conference USA title after defeating North Texas 48-27, a top-25 ranking in all three major polls for the second consecutive season and the third bowl appearance in a row with the Cure Bowl matchup against Troy. He repeated as C-USA Coach of the Year and was chosen as a finalist for the Eddie Robinson and Paul "Bear" Bryant Awards Coach of the Year, as well as a semifinalist for the George Munger College Coach of the Year Award.

Under Traylor's guidance, UTSA collected a school-record 30 C-USA postseason honors, as 27 made the 2022 all-conference teams—including six first-team and five second-team selections—while 16 received honorable mention and three landed on the C-USA All-Freshman Team. Frank Harris was voted the league's MVP and Kevorian Barnes was tabbed C-USA Freshman of the Year. Harris (4) and Jared Sackett (5) combined to earn nine C-USA Player of the Week accolades that season.

Also in 2022, wide receiver Zakhari Franklin was named an honorable mention All-American by Phil Steele, the sixth Roadrunner to receive All-America accolades in the Traylor era. Additionally, Harris was named a finalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award and a semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien Award.

Under Traylor's tutelage, UTSA enjoyed a record-setting campaign in 2021. The Roadrunners won their first 11 games, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time in school history and captured the program's first league title by winning the C-USA Championship with a 49-41 victory over Western Kentucky. UTSA capped the season with its second straight and third overall bowl appearance against San Diego State in the Frisco Bowl.

Traylor was honored as the 2021 C-USA Coach of the Year, the AFCA FBS Regional Coach of the Year for Region 4 and a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award, AFCA National Coach of the Year and George Munger College Coach of the Year Award. A member of the Paul "Bear" Bryant Awards Coach of the Year watch list, he was chosen as the 2021 San Antonio Express-News Sportsman of the Year.

A total of 23 Roadrunners received recognition on the all-conference and C-USA All-Freshman teams in 2021 with Sincere McCormick earning C-USA Offensive Player of the Year accolades for the second straight season.

McCormick garnered All-America accolades from three different organizations in 2021, while Spencer Burford and Clarence Hicks were tabbed honorable mention All-Americans by Phil Steele. McCormick also was an Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award for the second straight year. Harris landed on semifinalist lists for the Davey O'Brien and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Awards, while Hunter Duplessis was a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy for the second year in a row. Harris and McCormick each collected Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award National Player of the Week honors, while Harris also

was a Manning Award Quarterback of the Week. Additionally, UTSA collected nine C-USA weekly awards during the 2021 season.

Traylor guided the Roadrunners to a 7-5 overall record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the 2020 First Responder Bowl in his first season at the helm. The Roadrunners received votes in a national poll (AP Top 25) for the first time in program history after a 3-0 start and the seven wins mark the most by a first-year UTSA head coach.

Lucas Dean, Duplessis and McCormick received All-America accolades, while McCormick also was a finalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award. Additionally, Duplessis (Campbell Trophy, Lou Groza) and McCormick (Doak Walker) were national award semifinalists, while Harris made the Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2020. Dean was tabbed C-USA Special Teams Player of the Year and McCormick was named C-USA Offensive Player of the Year, while a total of 23 Roadrunners were recognized by the league's head coaches, including 19 as all-conference and four on the all-freshman team. The Roadrunners collected a program-record 11 C-USA Player of the Week certificates and a trio of national player of the week accolades in McCormick (Earl Campbell Tyler Rose National Player of the Week), Dean (Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week) and Rashad Wisdom (Jim Thorpe Award Player of the Week).

Traylor has overseen the development of several Roadrunners who have moved on to the professional ranks. In April 2022, UTSA doubled the number of NFL draft picks on one afternoon, as the 49ers selected Spencer Burford in the fourth round while the Seahawks picked Tariq Woolen one round later. Burford has earned the starting spot at right guard and Woolen has picked off half a dozen passes in his rookie campaign en route to being selected to the Pro Bowl. Additionally, Clarence Hicks (Bengals), Sincere McCormick (Raiders), Charles Wiley (Ravens, Giants) and Leroy Watson (49ers) all signed free-agent deals in 2022.

UTSA student-athletes have been honored for their work in the classroom under Traylor, as well. Ahofitu Maka became the third Roadrunner to be named a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy and the second to be selected as a College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-American when he landed on the first team in 2022. He also earned spots on the CSC Academic All-District Team for a third time and the C-USA All-Academic Team for the second straight season. Duplessis was a two-

time C-USA Football Scholar Athlete of the Year, a 2021 CSC Academic All-American, a two-time C-USA All-Academic Team selection and a two-time CSC Academic All-District pick. Dean earned 2021 C-USA All-Academic Team recognition and CSC Academic All-District Team accolades in 2021 and 2022.

Traylor has more than 30 years of coaching experience including a highly successful 15-year career as head coach at Gilmer High School, where he led teams to three state championships and two state runner-up finishes and won more than 87% of his games, a winning percentage that ranks 10th all-time in Texas high school history.

Prior to coming to the Alamo City, the Gilmer native served as associate head coach and running backs coach for two seasons at Arkansas, where he helped sign the school's first top-20 recruiting class. Prior to that, he served in the same role at SMU for the 2017 season. He

began his collegiate coaching career as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Texas in 2015 before becoming the Longhorns' associate head coach for offense and wide receivers coach the following year.

Traylor's impact on the offense was felt immediately in his first season at Arkansas, as his running backs corps racked up 1,721 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2018. The unit was led by Rakeem Boyd, who rushed for more than 100 yards in three different SEC games, including a season-best 113 against Vanderbilt. The Houston Stratford High School product took over the starting tailback role in the fifth game of the season and his most impressive stretch of the season came during a four-game stretch against Alabama, Ole Miss, Tulsa and Vanderbilt, as he topped the century mark three times and totaled 423 yards. His 102 yards against Alabama made him the first Arkansas running back to eclipse 100 yards against the Crimson Tide since Darren McFadden in 2007.

In Traylor's second season coaching the Arkansas running backs, Boyd rushed for 1,133 yards and eight touchdowns on 184 carries (6.2 avg.) to spearhead a ground game that accumulated 1,766 yards. Boyd topped 100 yards in five contests, including a season-best 185 and two scores on just eight attempts against Western Kentucky. He also rushed for 100-plus against Portland State (114), Colorado State (122), Kentucky (134) and Mississippi (114).

Jeff Traylor led UTSA to the 2021 Conference USA Championship, the first league crown in program history.

Prior to his time at Arkansas, Traylor spent the 2017 season as associate head coach and running backs coach at SMU under Chad Morris. He also served as the Mustangs’ interim coach before joining Morris’ staff at Arkansas.

During his one year at SMU, Traylor’s running backs piled up 2,223 yards on the ground. Three players rushed for 500-plus yards, with Xavier Jones leading the group at 1,075. The Mustangs topped the 200-yard mark on the ground six times, including a season-best 311 in a win against Arkansas State. SMU ranked in the top 20 nationally in several offensive categories, including 12th in scoring offense and 15th in total offense.

Prior to his time in Dallas, Traylor spent two seasons at Texas. He was the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator in 2015 and then the associate head coach for offense and wide receivers coach in 2016, when the Longhorns boasted the nation’s No. 16-ranked offense that averaged 491.3 yards per game. During his time as the lead recruiter, he helped the Longhorns sign the No. 7-ranked recruiting class in the country in back-to-back years and was named Scout.com’s Big 12 Recruiter of the Year. He recruited punter Michael Dickson, who went on to earn multiple All-America honors, win Big 12 Conference Special Teams Player of the Year in 2016 and 2017 as well as the 2017 Ray Guy Award, and currently punts for the Seattle Seahawks.

Traylor built his hometown program into a prep powerhouse during his 15-year tenure leading the Buckeyes.

A four-time Texas High School Coach of the Year, he posted a 175-26 record (.871 winning percentage) and led Gilmer to five state championship game appearances, three state titles (2004, ‘09, ‘14) and 12 district crowns. The Buckeyes turned in a pair of perfect 16-0 seasons, won 10-or-more games 11 times and registered seven 13-win seasons and three 15-win campaigns during his career.

In 2014, his undefeated Class 4A Division II state championship team boasted one of the most prolific offenses in Texas prep history. Gilmer scored 950 points, the second-most in state history, averaging 59.4 points and 536.1 yards over the 16-game season. The Buckeyes topped 60 points nine times, including two 80-point performances. Gilmer also averaged 536.1 total yards per game (8,577 yards) behind a balanced 293.9 passing yards and 242.1 rushing yards per contest. The defense was equally dominant, allowing only 276 points (17.3) with five single-digit efforts and two shutouts, while recording 23 interceptions and forcing 17 fumbles. Gilmer closed out the season with a win over West Orange-Stark and had eight different players earn 4A All-State honors from either the Associated Press or Texas Sports Writers Association.

Gilmer’s two other state titles under Traylor both came in Class 3A in 2004 (Division II) and 2009 (Division I), before the change in class structure in Texas high school football moved the school into 4A. After 15 years on its sidelines, Gilmer renamed Buckeye Stadium to Jeff Traylor Stadium to honor his successful career.

Inducted into the East Texas Coaches Association Hall of Honor in 2019, Traylor has received numerous coaching honors, including being named Coach of the Decade (2000s) by the Tyler Morning Telegraph. He is a 12-time District Coach of the Year, four-time East Texas Coach of the Year and a four-time Ted Jeffries Award winner. He has received the Carl Padilla Coach of the Year, KYKX Coach of the Year and Old Coach Network Coach of the Year awards twice each.

Traylor began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Big Sandy High School in 1990-93 before a seven-year stint (1994-2000) at Jacksonville High School where he served as passing coordinator, defensive backs coach, receivers coach and special teams coordinator. There, he helped coach future NFL quarterbacks Josh McCown and Luke McCown and former Texas A&M standout signal-caller Randy McCown.

A 1986 graduate of Gilmer High School, Traylor earned both undergraduate (1990) and graduate (2002) degrees in education from Stephen F. Austin while playing football as a walk-on.

He and his wife, Cari, have three children: Jordan, Jacob and Jaci.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 2 HOUSTON 17, UTSA 14 HOUSTON (TDECU STADIUM)

SAN ANTONIO — Kevorian Barnes posted his sixth career 100-yard rushing game, Joshua Cephus had a career-high 123 receiving yards and Trey Moore and Donyai Taylor combined for five tackles for loss, but it was not enough as UTSA dropped a 17-14 decision at Houston in the season opener on Saturday night at TDECU Stadium.

Playing in their first game as a member of the American Athletic Conference, the Roadrunners displayed a balanced offense with 208 rushing yards and 209 passing yards against the Cougars, who were making their Big 12 Conference debut. Barnes rushed for 103 yards and a touchdown on 16 carries, averaging 6.4 yards per tote. Dating back to last season, it marked the third straight 100-yard output for the redshirt sophomore from San Augustine, Texas.

Cephus caught nine passes in registering his top receiving yardage total and fifth 100-yard game as a Roadrunner. The senior from nearby Dekaney High School hauled in a pass over the middle late in the contest, juiced a defender and found the end zone to help pull UTSA within 17-14 with 5:42 left to play.

Taylor, a senior from Shiner, Texas, recorded five total tackles with three behind the line, including one of three sacks turned in by the visitors. Moore, a sophomore out of Smithson Valley High, also made five stops with two TFLs and one sack.

Kam Alexander paced the defense with six tackles along with a pass breakup and quarterback hurry in his UTSA debut, while Avery Morris, Ken Robinson and Rashad Wisdom contributed five stops apiece. The Roadrunners held the Cougars to 334 yards of offense, including only 101 on the ground.

Cephus' score brought UTSA within three points after trailing by 10. Houston converted a third-down-and-three with a 6-yard pass from Donovan Smith to Mike O'Laughlin. Faced with another third-and-three with the clock winding down to fewer than three minutes, Smith scrambled up the middle and initially was ruled short of the line to gain. However, replay review changed the spot of the ball and the Cougars were awarded a first down following a chain measurement to seal the win.

Houston got on the board first after Smith found Joseph Manjack open in the end zone for an 8-yard touchdown reception. The score was set up by 48-yard punt return by Malik Fleming down to the UTSA 22-yard line.

UTSA answered with an eight-play, 80-yard drive to knot the score at 7-7. Frank Harris completed passes of 16 yards to Chris Carpenter and 17 to Dan Dishman on back-to-back plays before a David Amador II jet sweep around the left end for 20 yards set up a 4-yard TD plunge by Barnes.

The two teams traded missed field goals early in the second quarter, but Jack Martin gave Houston a 10-7 halftime advantage when he split the uprights from 31 yards as time expired in the half.

Houston upped its lead to 10 points late in the third quarter when Matthew Golden hauled in a 6-yard touchdown pass from Smith at the 3:54 mark.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 9 UTSA 20, TEXAS STATE 13 SAN ANTONIO (ALAMODOME)

SAN ANTONIO — Trey Moore registered three sacks and Frank Harris passed for 214 yards to help lead UTSA to a 20-13 victory over Texas State in front of 49,342 fans on Saturday afternoon at the Alamodome.

With the win, the Roadrunners improved to 1-1 on the season and notched their first victory as a member of the American Athletic Conference in front of the second-largest home crowd in program history, trailing only the inaugural game attendance of 56,743.

Moore totaled five tackles and his three sacks are tied for the second most recorded by a Roadrunner in a game. The outside linebacker from Smithson Valley High School helped lead a defense that limited the Bobcats to 242 total yards, including just 31 rushing yards.

UTSA posted 10 total tackles for loss including six sacks, as Nick Booker-Brown, Avery Morris and Jimmori Robinson contributed one apiece.

The Roadrunners took a 10-0 lead in the first half only to see the Bobcats rally to tie things up by halftime.

UTSA grabbed the lead for good when Willie McCoy made a highlight-reel catch on the sideline for a 20-yard touchdown reception with 3:14 left to play in the third quarter. Chase Allen's extra point made it 17-10 in favor of the Roadrunners.

Texas State cut it to 17-13 on a 43-yard field goal from Mason Shipley with 10:37 left to play, but UTSA answered with a 43-yard field goal from Allen at the 5:47 mark of the fourth quarter.

The UTSA defense forced a punt on the Bobcats' next possession and the Roadrunners ran out the clock with a pair of first downs to seal the win.

TJ Finley completed 16 of 30 passes for 211 yards to lead Texas State's offense, while Brian Holloway paced all players with 16 tackles.

Allen put UTSA on the board first when he split the uprights from 46 yards at the 3:01 mark of the opening period.

Rocko Griffin helped the Roadrunners pad their lead with a 20-yard dash to paydirt early in the second stanza to cap a six-play, 57-yard drive.

Texas State pulled within 10-7 on Jahmyl Jeter's 3-yard plunge that ended an 11-play, 66-yard march.

A pair of UTSA starters went down with injuries on the ensuing possession, and the home team was forced to punt the ball back to the visitors with 1:28 left in the half. The Bobcats drove 64 yards in eight plays, the last a 42-yard field goal by Shipley that knotted the score with fewer than 20 seconds left in the half.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 15 ARMY 37, UTSA 29 SAN ANTONIO (ALAMODOME)

SAN ANTONIO — Eddie Lee Marburger passed for 239 yards and three touchdowns in his first career start and Martavius French posted a career-high 10 tackles, but Army West Point held off a second-half UTSA rally in a 37-29 decision on Friday night in front of 27,138 fans at the Alamodome.

The Black Knights (2-1) built an early 14-0 lead and kept the Roadrunners (1-2) at bay in winning for the third time in three visits to the Alamodome for the four-game series. Army used a 44:25-15:35 edge in time of possession and ran 83 offensive plays compared to 49 for UTSA, rushing for 254 yards on 65 attempts — the most by an opponent in school history.

Marburger completed 17 of 25 passes in starting under center for the first time in his career for the injured Frank Harris, who missed his first game and start since the 2020 season to snap a stretch of 36 consecutive starts. The redshirt sophomore signal caller from Sharyland Pioneer High School completed passes to seven different receivers, paced by Joshua Cephus' eight catches for 84 yards.

Facing a 20-7 deficit with time running out in the first half, Marburger and Tykee Ogle-Kellogg connected on a 46-yard, Hail Mary pass to make it a one-score contest at the break.

Army kicker Quinn Maretzki drilled his third field goal of the night from 36 yards to make it 23-14 with 9:13 on the clock.

UTSA answered when Cephus turned a short screen pass in the right flat into a 44-yard scoring play. Chase Allen's extra point pulled the home team within 23-21 with 7:04 left in the third.

However, the Black Knights covered 80 yards in only two plays, a 55-yard pass from Markel Johnson to Isaiah Alston on a trick play followed by a 28-yard TD catch by Noah Short, to push the lead back out to nine less than one minute later.

Army increased its advantage to 16 when Bryson Daily scored on a 3-yard quarterback keeper with 6:45 left to play, only to have UTSA respond quickly on a 72-yard touchdown reception by true freshman Devin McCuin. Marburger then found McCuin open for a successful two-point conversion to make it 37-29 with just over six minutes to play.

UTSA's defense came through with a three-and-out on the next possession, forcing a punt. However, Army returned the favor with a sack on a third-down play to force a UTSA punt. The Black Knights then ran out the clock with a pair of first downs to secure the victory.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 23 TENNESSEE 45, UTSA 14 KNOXVILLE (NEYLAND STADIUM)

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — UTSA redshirt freshman quarterback Owen McCown completed 18 of 20 passes for 170 yards and two touchdowns, all in the second half, but No. 20 Tennessee stormed out to an early lead and never looked back in a 45-14 decision on Saturday afternoon in front of 101,915 fans at Neyland Stadium.

The Volunteers (3-1) built a 14-point lead through the first five minutes and withstood a third-quarter push from the Roadrunners (1-3) in the first meeting between the two schools on the gridiron.

McCown came off the bench and completed his first 10 pass attempts to spark the UTSA offense and cut the deficit to 31-14 with a little more than five minutes remaining in the third quarter.

Trailing by 31 points at the break, UTSA marched 75 yards in 15 plays on the opening possession of the second half to get on the board. McCown completed all eight pass attempts on the drive capped by a 3-yard touchdown to Joshua Cephus.

The UTSA defense then came up with a three-and-out to force a punt. McCown kept his completions streak alive with two more, including a 43-yard catch-and-run by Tykee Ogle-Kellogg, who played at nearby Alcoa High School, to help pull the visitors within 31-14.

The Vols pushed their lead back out to 24 early in the fourth quarter with Jabari Small's 1-yard plunge that put an end to a 12-play, 66-yard drive.

Dylan Sampson broke loose for a 41-yard touchdown dash later in the final frame to provide the final margin.

It did not take long for Tennessee to strike first, as Joe Milton scampered 81 yards on a quarterback keeper on the first play from scrimmage to put the home team up 7-0.

The Vols forced a three-and-out and a punt, then drove 62 yards in nine plays, the last a 10-yard TD rush up the middle by Sampson to push the lead to 14 at the 10:05 mark of the opening period.

UTSA had to settle for another punt on its next possession. Tennessee partially blocked the kick and then tried to pick up the loose ball for a return but fumbled, resulting in a recovery by Kelechi Nwachuku for the Roadrunners' first takeaway of the season. UTSA then marched to the Vols 19-yard line but a fourth-down pass attempt sailed incomplete to end the drive.

Tennessee tacked on a pair of touchdowns and a field goal in the second quarter on an 18-yard reception by Kaleb Webb, a 48-yard grab by Ramel Keyton and a 29-yard field goal by Charles Campbell with 3:21 left in the half.

SATURDAY, OCT. 7 UTSA 49, TEMPLE 34 PHILADELPHIA (LINCOLN FINANCIAL FIELD)

PHILADELPHIA — Frank Harris returned to the lineup to throw for 338 yards and three touchdowns to help lead UTSA to a 49-34 victory over Temple in the Roadrunners' inaugural American Athletic Conference game on Saturday afternoon at Lincoln Financial Field.

UTSA scored on back-to-back drives to take a 21-14 lead at the 10:17 mark of the second stanza. Harris found Cephus open in the end zone on a 17-yard pass to put an exclamation point on an 11-play, 65-yard march. The defense then forced a punt and UTSA drove 57 yards on seven snaps, the last a 1-yard quarterback sneak by Harris to give the Roadrunners their first lead of the afternoon.

The Owls tied things up again with a 31-yard touchdown pass on a flea-flicker from Warner to John Adams with 6:14 left until halftime.

The Roadrunners reclaimed the lead thanks to a second takeaway of the half when Jimmori Robinson's strip-sack led to a fumble recovery by Ronald Triplette at the Temple 6-yard line. On the next play, Robert Henry dashed six yards up the middle, while Chase Allen's extra point made it 28-21 with three minutes remaining until the break.

Temple threatened to trim the deficit just before halftime but Camden Price's 41-yard field goal attempt sailed wide left.

UTSA wasted little time extending the lead to start the second half, as Ogle-Kellogg hauled in a 40-yard touchdown pass from Harris over the middle to help make it 35-21 in favor of the visitors to cap a six-play, 92-yard drive to open the third quarter.

The Owls pulled within one score early in the fourth quarter when Warner found Peter Clarke open in the end zone on a fourth-and-goal play from the 2-yard line. Temple chose to go for two points and was stopped short of the goal line, leaving the score at 35-27 with 10:15 on the clock.

The Roadrunners responded on the next drive, as Henry broke loose for a 43-yard touchdown run to push the lead back to two scores, 42-27.

Temple scored again on a 13-yard touchdown reception by Smith with 6:29 left to play, but UTSA iced it with a 29-yard TD catch by McCuin followed by a defensive stop in the red zone in the final minutes.

SAN ANTONIO — Trey Moore posted a career-high 3.5 sacks and Joshua Cephus became UTSA career receptions leader, as the Roadrunners ran away from UAB, 41-20, on Saturday night in American Athletic Conference action at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners stormed out to a 14-0 lead through the first four minutes and nine seconds. Henry capped an eight-play, 75-yard drive with a 19-yard touchdown dash on the opening possession.
