« OPENING DRIVE »

- UTSA won four of its last five games to finish the 2024 season with a 7-6 overall record.
- The Roadrunners registered their second straight bowl win with a 44-15 victory over Coastal Carolina in the 2024 Myrtle Beach Bowl.
- UTSA went undefeated at home in 2024, logging a perfect 6-0 record at the Alamodome.
- The Roadrunners have won a school record-tying 10 consecutive home games and have come out victorious in 17 of the last 18 contests overall at the Alamodome.
- UTSA is 29-3 (.906) at home under sixth-year head coach Jeff Traylor.
- The Roadrunners boast the third-most home wins (29) among FBS teams since 2020. Only Alabama (32) and Ohio State (30) have more during that span.
- UTSA is 46-20 (.697) overall in the Jeff Traylor era, the ninth-most wins in the FBS since 2020.
- Over the past five seasons, UTSA has the most overall wins (46) and home (29) victories among FBS teams in the state of Texas and also among current members of the American Conference.
- The Roadrunners will kick off their 15th season of football on Saturday, Aug. 30, at Texas A&M.
- UTSA has home games scheduled against Texas State (Sept. 6), UIW (Sept. 13), Rice (Oct. 11), Tulane (Oct. 30), East Carolina (Nov. 22) and Army (Nov. 28 or 29).
- The Roadrunners are in their third season as a member of the American Conference and will open league play on Oct. 4 at Temple in what will be their fourth straight conference opener on the road.

UTSA SET FOR THIRD SEASON IN THE AMERICAN

UTSA will enter its third season as a member of the American Conference in 2025. Under the direction of sixth-year head coach Jeff Traylor, the Roadrunners welcome back more than 40 lettermen — including 11 starters — for what will be the 15th season in program history. Capped by a 44-15 victory over Coastal Carolina in the 2024 Myrtle Beach Bowl, UTSA won four of its last five games to finish 7-6 overall and 4-4 in the league last season.

SEASON NO. 15

The Roadrunners will play their 15th season of football this fall. UTSA started its program from scratch and, following a practice year in 2010, played its first season as an FCS Independent in 2011 before joining the Western Athletic Conference for the 2012 campaign. UTSA moved into Conference USA in 2013 and became a full-fledged FBS member starting with the 2014 season. The Roadrunners set NCAA modern startup program records in 2011 by drawing 56,743 fans to their inaugural game against Northeastern State and by averaging 35,521 fans for their six home contests that season. UTSA made its first postseason appearance at the 2016 New Mexico Bowl in its sixth season of play. The Roadrunners made history in 2021 by capturing their first conference championship with a 49-42 decision against WKU and capping a 12-2 ledger with their third bowl game. They repeated as league champions with a 48-27 win over North Texas in 2022 and made their third straight and fourth overall bowl appearance, ending the year with an 11-3 mark. In 2023, the Roadrunners notched their first bowl victory with a 35-17 decision over Marshall in the Frisco Bowl to cap a 9-4 ledger that include a 7-1 mark in their debut in the American. Last year, the UTSA won four of its last five games, starting with a 44-36 victory over No. 25 Memphis for the program's first-ever top-25 win and capping the campaign with a second straight bowl victory with a 44-15 triumph over Coastal Carolina in the Myrtle Beach Bowl to finish at 7-6 overall. UTSA now has posted at least six wins in nine of the 14 seasons in program history and it has reached the seven-win plateau seven times, including in each of the first five years of the Jeff Traylor era.

THE TRAYLOR ERA

Sixth-year head coach Jeff Traylor has taken UTSA to new heights during his time in San Antonio. The Roadrunners are 46-20 (.697) under his direction, the most wins since 2020 among current American Conference teams and among Texas FBS programs. UTSA boasts a 29-3 (.906) home record in the Traylor era, tied for the third-most home wins since 2020 among FBS teams. Only Alabama (32) and Ohio State (30) have more during that span. Since Traylor took over the program, UTSA has captured a pair of conference championships, earned five straight bowl berths with back-to-back bowl wins and made a combined 23 appearances in the three major national polls. He has coached nine All-Americans, three national award finalists, 91 all-conference selections and a pair of NFL Draft picks at UTSA.

HOME SWEET DOME

UTSA has been tough to beat at the Alamodome during the Jeff Traylor era, boasting a 29-3 (.906) at the facility since his arrival prior to the 2020 season. The Roadrunners have won a school record-tying 10 straight and 17 of the last 18 at home entering the 2025 season. UTSA boasts the third-most home wins since 2020 among FBS teams, trailing only Alabama (32) and Ohio State (30). The Roadrunners have been victorious in 27 of their last 29 home contests and are 55-30 (.647) all-time in the Alamodome.

BREAKING DOWN THE SCHEDULE

UTSA's 12-game regular season schedule features four non-conference games and eight American Conference contests. The Roadrunners will kick off the campaign on Aug. 30 at Texas A&M with the matchup set for an ESPN broadcast at 6 p.m. UTSA then will host back-to-back home games against Texas State (Sept. 6) and UIW (Sept. 13) before traveling to Fort Collins to face Colorado State (Sept. 20). The Roadrunners are slated to open league play on Oct. 4 at Temple in Philadelphia before hosting Rice for Homecoming the following Saturday. UTSA will face North Texas on Oct. 18 in Denton before back-to-back Thursday night affairs on ESPN or ESPN2 at home against Tulane (Oct. 30) and on the road against South Florida (Nov. 6). Following a road date with Charlotte on Nov. 15, the Roadrunners will close out the regular season with home games versus East Carolina on Nov. 22 and defending conference champion Army on either Nov. 28 or 29. The American Football Championship is set for Friday, Dec. 5 at 7 p.m. CT on ABC.

ROADRUNNERS ON THE TUBE

Half of UTSA's 12 regular-season games have been selected for traditional linear or digital broadcasts. The Roadrunners will open their 15th season of play at Texas A&M in a primetime ESPN broadcast on Aug. 30. UTSA then will host Texas State (Sept. 6) and UIW (Sept. 13) in ESPN+ broadcasts before closing out the non-conference slate on Sept. 20 at Colorado State in a Fox Sports Networks telecast. UTSA has back-to-back Thursday night league games set for either ESPN or ESPN2 at home against Tulane on Oct. 30 and at South Florida on Nov. 6. The American Football Championship is slated for an ABC broadcast on Friday, Dec. 5. Most

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of the remaining start times and television designations will be made on a weekly basis throughout the season as part of the conference's 12-day selection process.

CHALLENGING NON-CONFERENCE SLATE

The Roadrunners' four-game non-conference slate sets up to be one of the toughest in the FBS this season. Texas A&M, Texas State and Colorado State all won eight games in 2024, while UIW registered 11 wins and made a run to the FCS quarterfinal round. That adds up to a combined 35 victories a year ago for UTSA's four non-league foes.

FAMILIAR FOES

UTSA will face familiar foes in 2025, as the Roadrunners have previously faced all 12 teams on the regular season schedule. The most-played series in program history is with North Texas, and the two teams will meet for the 14th time in October with UTSA holding an 8-5 edge. The Roadrunners and Rice will play for the 13th time, also in October, with UTSA boasting an 8-4 advantage. UTSA and Texas State will meet for the seventh time in the home opener with the Roadrunners leading that series, 5-1, while the regular season finale will mark the sixth meeting with Army. UTSA also previously has played Charlotte, Colorado State, East Carolina, Temple, Texas A&M and Tulane twice each and South Florida and UIW once apiece.

BORN TO PLAY QB

Owen McCown was born to play quarterback. The lefthander is the son of current Minnesota Vikings quarterbacks coach Josh McCown, who was a third-round draft pick in 2002 and played 18 seasons in the NFL after a collegiate career at SMU and Sam Houston. Two of his uncles also played the position. Luke McCown starred at Louisiana Tech before he was selected in the fourth round of the 2004 NFL Draft and enjoyed a 12-year NFL career. Randy McCown played quarterback at Texas A&M from 1996-99, helping the Aggies to the 1998 Big 12 Conference Championship. Those three McCown brothers all played for UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor when he was an assistant coach at Jacksonville High School in the 1990s. McCown, who prepped at Myers Park High School in Charlotte as a freshman and sophomore, registered one of the most productive seasons by any UTSA QB in 2024. He completed 294 of 467 passes for 3,424 yards and 25 touchdowns and also rushed for 340 yards and three TDs, giving him 3,764 yards of total offense. The redshirt junior currently ranks second on the school's single-season charts for passing yards, attempts, completions and total offense and third in passing TDs. McCown passed for 254 yards and a TD and added a 35-yard score on the ground in the 44-15 victory over Coastal Carolina in the Myrtle Beach Bowl en route to being named the game's MVP. He set a school record with 434 passing yards versus Tulsa and broke loose for the longest rush by a UTSA quarterback with his 75-yard touchdown dash in the win against North Texas last fall.

PEWEE THE PLAYMAKER

Owen Pewee has developed a reputation as a playmaker for UTSA's defense from the money backer position. He registered 42 total tackles, 25 unassisted stops, 6.5 tackles for loss, two sacks, two interceptions, a pair of pass breakups and one forced fumble in 2024. He opened that season with a career-high six tackles, including five unassisted and one behind the line of scrimmage, to go with one pass breakup in the victory over Kennesaw State in what was his first start. He logged his first interception of the season in the third game when he picked off a Quinn Ewers pass and returned it 11 yards in the first quarter versus No. 2 Texas. The Cypress Park High School product posted his second INT of the year to go with four tackles, two TFLs and a sack and in the 38-24 win versus Florida Atlantic. He matched his career best with six stops in the home win against North Texas and he closed the campaign with three solo stops in the 44-15 triumph over Coastal Carolina in the Myrtle Beach Bowl, helping lead the Roadrunners to their second straight bowl win. Originally from Liberia, Pewee had a hand in a tackle behind the line of scrimmage in six different games last season. He will enter his redshirt junior season with 75 tackles, 47 solo stops, 13 TFLs, three sacks, four PBUs, three interceptions and a forced fumble in 30 career contests for the Roadrunners.

TRAYLOR THE HALL OF FAMER

UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor has been inducted into two different halls of fame this calendar year. A legendary high school coach for his hometown Gilmer Buckeyes, he was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame in May in a class that also included Patrick Mahomes II, Robert Griffin III, Pat Thomas, Gary Keithley, Brad Goebel, John C. Norman, David Smoak and Curtis Barbay. Earlier this week, he was recognized as part of the 2025 Texas High School Coaches Associations (THSCA) Hall of Honor

at the organization's annual convention in San Antonio. Traylor built Gilmer into a prep powerhouse during his 15-year tenure at the helm. He posted a 175-26 record (.871) and led the Buckeyes to state championships in 2004, 2009 and 2014, two additional state title game appearances in 2007 and 2012 and 12 district crowns.

GRAHAM MAKES 40 UNDER 40 LIST

UTSA assistant head coach and cornerbacks coach Nick Graham has been chosen for this year's Dave Campbell's Texas Football 40 Under 40. A former standout cornerback at Tulsa and a six-year pro, Nick Graham is in his sixth season as UTSA's cornerbacks coach and second as assistant head coach after serving as defensive pass game coordinator in 2023. During his time in San Antonio, the Roadrunners have enjoyed the most successful five-year run in program history with a 46-20 overall record, 31-8 regular season league mark, two conference championships, five bowl appearances and back-to-back bowl wins. He also has landed one of his cornerbacks on the all-conference first team in each of the past three seasons. Graham also has been instrumental in the development of a pair of NFL Draft picks who starred at cornerback under his tutelage in Tariq Woolen (Seahawks) and Zah Frazier (Bears). This marks the fifth consecutive year a UTSA coach has been honored on the list.

Started all 13 games at quarterback ... completed 294 of 467 passes for 3,424 yards and 25 touchdowns ... also rushed for 340 yards and three TDs ... had 3,764 yards of total offense ... passed for 254 yards and a TD and added a 35-yard score on the ground in the 44-15 victory over Coastal Carolina in the Myrtle Beach Bowl en route to being named the game's MVP ... passed for a school-record 434 yards and four touchdowns at Tulsa ... opened the season by throwing for 340 yards and three scores on 28-of-38 passing in the 28-16 victory over Kennesaw State and was named Manning Award QB of the Week ... also threw for 340 yards and a pair of TDs through the air in the 38-24 win against Florida Atlantic ... passed for 226 yards and three touchdowns in the 45-7 home triumph over Houston Christian ... threw for 256 yards and three scores and rushed for 53 yards at Rice ... landed on the Davey O'Brien Great 8 list after completing 20 of 37 passes for 280 yards and four TDs in the 44-36 win over No. 25 Memphis ... racked up 379 yards and two touchdowns on 29-of-43 passing and added 88 rushing yards to help UTSA tally a school-record 681 yards of offense in the 48-27 win versus North Texas ... earned a spot on the Davey O'Brien Great 9 and Manning Award Stars of the Week lists for his performance against the Mean Green ... completed 20 of 27 passes for 220 yards and a TD and added a 75-yard rushing touchdown — the longest by any Roadrunner quarterback — in the 51-27 home triumph over Temple.

2023

Played in seven contests with one start ... completed 43 of 58 passes for 442 yards and four touchdowns ... boasted a .741 completion percentage ... also rushed for 51 yards ... made his first start as a Roadrunner in the 35-17 victory over Marshall in the Frisco Bowl, the program's first-ever bowl win ... threw for 251 yards and two TDs on 22-of-31 passing in that bowl game victory against the Thundering Herd ... set the program's single-game completion percentage record against No. 20 Tennessee, connecting on 18 of 20 passes for 170 yards and a pair of scores ... also saw action in wins over UAB, East Carolina, Rice and South Florida.

Prior to UTSA

A left-handed quarterback transfer from Colorado who played as a true freshman for the Buffaloes, appearing in four games with three starts ... completed 57 of 100 passes for 600 yards and two touchdowns, also carrying the ball for 38 yards and a pair of scores ... in his first career start, completed 26 passes for 258 yards and a touchdown against UCLA — the second-most passing yards for a debut in program history ... was a consensus three-star recruit coming out of Rusk High School in East Texas ... Rivals ranked him as the No. 26 quarterback in the class and No. 67 player from Texas, 247Sports Composite listed him as the No. 48 quarterback and No. 106 Texas player, while ESPN listed him as the No. 47 quarterback, No. 159 player from Texas and No. 214 player from the region ... started his career in Charlotte, N.C. at Myers Park High School, playing his final two seasons at Rusk ... produced a 39-12 career record and completed 363-of-588 passes for 4,576 yards with 45 touchdowns, also rushing 176 times for 678 yards and 20 scores ... helped guide Rusk to a 9-3 record in 2021 for a four-win improvement ... was named the District 10-4A-II Offensive MVP, first-team all-district and honorable mention all-state as a senior after completing 262 of 388 passes for 3,362 yards with 36 touchdowns, running the ball 88 times for 371 yards and 11 scores ... also played basketball and competed in track & field ... as a guard in basketball for the Eagles, was named first-team All-District 17-4A in both his junior and



senior seasons ... averaged 19.6 points and 5.3 assists per game his junior campaign ... his father, Josh McCown played at Sam Houston State before being drafted in the third round of the NFL Draft and played 17 seasons as an NFL quarterback before his retirement in 2020 ... both of his uncles played college football — Randy McCown was a quarterback at Texas A&M, while Luke McCown was a quarterback at Louisiana Tech and went on to a 17-year NFL career, retiring in 2017 ... all three McCown brothers were coached by Jeff Traylor at Jacksonville High School.

Named UTSA's third head coach on Dec. 9, 2019, Jeff Traylor has had an immediate impact on the program, university and city of San Antonio during his tenure.

Traylor has turned around the UTSA football program by instilling his 210 Triangle of Toughness culture, which has led to positive results on and off the field. The Gilmer, Texas, native took over a team that won a combined seven games in the two seasons prior to his arrival and has led the Roadrunners to a 46-20 record in his first five years at the helm, the most wins and best winning percentage (.697) by a coach in program history. Under his watch, UTSA has recorded the most wins (46) among FBS teams from the state of Texas since 2020.

Traylor also has helped turn UTSA's home facility — the Alamodome — into a true homefield advantage with a 29-3 (.906) home record during his tenure. In fact, the Roadrunners own the third-most home wins among FBS teams since 2020, trailing only Alabama (32) and Ohio State (30).

During the Traylor era, UTSA has captured a pair of conference championships, earned five straight bowl berths with back-to-back bowl wins and made a combined 23 appearances in the three major national polls. He has coached nine All-Americans, three national award finalists, 91 all-conference selections and three NFL Draft picks.

That success is not limited to just the gridiron. The Roadrunners also have received numerous honors for their work in the classroom under Traylor's leadership, including three College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-Americans, a William V. Campbell Trophy finalist, 13 CSC Academic All-District Selections, four conference all-academic team selections and the AFCA Academic Achievement Award.

In 2024, Traylor guided UTSA to seven wins and its fifth consecutive bowl appearance under his watch, a 44-15 triumph over Coastal Carolina in the Myrtle Beach Bowl. UTSA also went undefeated at the Alamodome for the second time during his tenure with a 6-0 mark, pushing the home winning streak to a school record-tying 10 games.

Eight Roadrunners earned All-American Conference accolades in 2024, including outside linebacker Jimmori Robinson, a fourth-team All-America selection by Phil Steele who was chosen as Defensive Player of the Year to mark the second straight season a USA player has garnered that award. Zah Frazier, a cornerback who set the program record with six interceptions and later was selected in the sixth round of the NFL Draft by the Bears, joined Robinson on the All-American Conference First Team and was named an All-American by Phil Steele (third team) and CBS Sports (honorable mention). Additionally, UTSA boasted a pair of national player of the week honorees in Robinson (Walter Camp) and quarterback Owen McCown (Manning Award)

and also reeled in three conference weekly awards during the season.

In 2023, Traylor led the Roadrunners to a 9-4 record, a 7-1 mark in their debut campaign in The American and the program's first bowl win with a 35-17 victory over Marshall in the Frisco Bowl. UTSA received votes in both the final Associated Press Top 25 and USA TODAY Sports Coaches Poll for the third consecutive season.

A total of 16 Roadrunners collected all-conference honors in 2023, led by five first-team honorees in Defensive Player of the Year and outside linebacker Trey Moore, quarterback Frank Harris, wide receiver Joshua Cephus, cornerback Kam Alexander and safety Rashad Wisdom. Moore was named a second-team All-American by the AFCA, while Harris was chosen as a semifinalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award for the third year in a row and to the Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2023, his fourth career appearance on that annual list. Harris also was named national player of the week by those two organizations, while the Roadrunners hauled in five American Conference Player of the Week awards.

In 2022, Traylor guided UTSA to an 11-3 record, a second straight Conference USA title, a top-25 ranking in all three major polls for the second consecutive season and the third bowl appearance in a row with the Cure Bowl matchup against Troy. He repeated as Conference USA Coach of the Year and was chosen as a finalist for the Eddie Robinson and Paul "Bear" Bryant Awards Coach of the Year, as well as a semifinalist for the George Munger College Coach of the Year Award.

Under Traylor's guidance, UTSA collected a school-record 30 league postseason honors, as 27 made the 2022 all-conference teams — including six first-team and five second-team selections — while 16 received honorable mention and three landed on the Conference USA All-Freshman Team. Harris was voted the league's MVP and Kevorian Barnes was tabbed Conference USA Freshman of the Year. Harris (4) and Jared Sackett (5) combined to earn nine player of the week accolades during the season.

Also in 2022, wide receiver Zakhari Franklin was named an honorable mention All-American by Phil Steele, the sixth Roadrunner to receive All-America accolades in the Traylor era. Additionally, Harris was named a finalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award and a semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien Award.

Under Traylor's tutelage, UTSA enjoyed a record-setting campaign in 2021. The Roadrunners won their first 11

games, were nationally ranked as high as No. 15 and captured the program's first league title. UTSA capped the season with its second straight and third overall bowl appearance against San Diego State in the Frisco Bowl.

Traylor was honored as the 2021 Conference USA Coach of the Year, the AFCA FBS Regional Coach of the Year for Region 4 and a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award, AFCA National Coach of the Year and George Munger College Coach of the Year Award. A member of the Paul "Bear" Bryant Awards Coach of the Year watch list, he was chosen as the 2021 San Antonio Express-News Sportsman of the Year.

A total of 23 Roadrunners received recognition on the all-conference and Conference USA All-Freshman teams in 2021 with Sincere McCormick earning Offensive Player of the Year accolades for the second straight season.

McCormick garnered All-America accolades from three different organizations in 2021, while Spencer Burford and Clarence Hicks

were tabbed honorable mention All-Americans by Phil Steele. McCormick also was an Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award for the second straight year. Harris landed on semifinalist lists for the Davey O'Brien and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Awards, while Hunter Duplessis was a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy for the second year in a row. Harris and McCormick each collected Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award National Player of the Week honors, while Harris also was a Manning Award Quarterback of the Week. Additionally, UTSA collected nine league weekly awards.

In his first season at the helm, Traylor guided the Roadrunners to a 7-5 overall record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the 2020 First Responder Bowl. The Roadrunners received votes in a national poll (AP Top 25) for the first time in program history after a 3-0 start and the seven wins are the most by a first-year UTSA head coach.

Dean, Duplessis and McCormick received All-America accolades, while McCormick also was a finalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award. Additionally, Duplessis (Campbell Trophy, Lou Groza) and McCormick (Doak Walker) were national award semifinalists, while Harris made the Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2020. Dean was tabbed Conference USA Special Teams Player of the Year and McCormick was named the league's offensive player of the year, while a total of 23 Roadrunners were recognized by the league's head coaches, including 19 as all-conference and four on the all-freshman team. The Roadrunners collected a program-record 11 C-USA Player of the Week certificates and a trio of national player of the week accolades in McCormick (Earl Campbell Tyler Rose National Player of the Week), Dean (Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week) and Rashad Wisdom (Jim Thorpe Award Player of the Week).

During his time in San Antonio, Traylor has overseen the development of several Roadrunners who have moved on to the professional ranks. In April 2022, UTSA doubled the number of NFL draft picks on one afternoon, as the 49ers selected Spencer Burford in the fourth round while the Seahawks picked Tariq Woolen one round later. Burford earned the starting spot at right guard in year one and Woolen picked off half a dozen passes in his rookie campaign en route to being selected to the Pro Bowl. Additionally, his former players Cephus, Hicks, McCormick, Leroy Watson, Charles Wiley and Wisdom all have made active rosters or practice squads.

UTSA student-athletes have been honored for their work in the classroom under Traylor, as well. In 2023, UTSA was one of 13 schools to receive the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) 2023 Academic Achievement Award for posting the highest graduation rate among FBS programs in the most recent NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) report.

Individually, Ahofitu Maka became the third Roadrunner to be named a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy and the second

to be selected as a College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-American when he landed on the first team in 2022. He also earned spots on the CSC Academic All-District Team for a third time and the Conference USA All-Academic Team for the second straight season. Duplessis was a two-time Conference USA Football Scholar Athlete of the Year, a 2021 CSC Academic All-American, a two-time Conference USA All-Academic Team selection and a two-time CSC Academic All-District pick. Dean was a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy in 2023 and he earned 2021 Conference USA All-Academic Team recognition and CSC Academic All-District Team accolades in 2021-23. Kaedric Cobbs, Cory Godinet, Trey Moore and Tate Sandell also made the 2023 CSC Academic All-District Team, while Jameian Buxton was named academic all-district and Cardenas made the Campbell Trophy semifinalist list in 2024.

Traylor has more than 30 years of coaching experience including a highly successful 15-year career as head coach at Gilmer High School, where he led teams to three state championships and two state

runner-up finishes and won more than 87% of his games, a winning percentage that ranks 10th all-time in Texas high school history.

Prior to coming to the Alamo City, the Gilmer native served as associate head coach and running backs coach for two seasons at Arkansas, where he helped sign the school's first top-20 recruiting class. Prior to that, he served in the same role at SMU for the 2017 season. He began his collegiate coaching career as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Texas in 2015 before becoming the Longhorns' associate head coach for offense and wide receivers coach the following year.

Traylor's impact on the offense was felt immediately in his first season at Arkansas, as his running backs corps racked up 1,721 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2018. The unit was led by Rakeem Boyd, who rushed for more than 100 yards in three different SEC games, including a season-best 113 against Vanderbilt. The Houston Stratford High School product took over the starting tailback role in the fifth game of the season and his most impressive stretch of the season came during a four-game stretch against Alabama, Ole Miss, Tulsa and Vanderbilt, as he topped the century mark three times and totaled 423 yards. His 102 yards against Alabama made him the first Arkansas running back to eclipse 100 yards against the Crimson Tide since Darren McFadden in 2007.

In Traylor's second season coaching the Arkansas running backs, Boyd rushed for 1,133 yards and eight touchdowns on 184 carries (6.2 avg.) to spearhead a ground game that accumulated 1,766 yards. Boyd topped 100 yards in five contests, including a season-best 185 and two scores on just eight attempts against Western Kentucky. He also rushed for 100-plus against Portland State (114), Colorado State (122), Kentucky (134) and Mississippi (114).

Prior to his time at Arkansas, Traylor spent the 2017 season as associate head coach and running backs coach at SMU under Chad Morris. He also served as the Mustangs' interim head coach before joining Morris' staff at Arkansas.

During his one year at SMU, Traylor's running backs piled up 2,223 yards on the ground. Three players rushed for 500-plus yards, with Xavier Jones leading the group at 1,075. The Mustangs topped the 200-yard mark on the ground six times, including a season-best 311 in a win against Arkansas State. SMU ranked in the top 20 nationally in several offensive categories, including 12th in scoring offense and 15th in total offense.

Prior to his time in Dallas, Traylor spent two seasons at Texas. He was the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator in 2015 and then the associate head coach for offense and wide receivers coach in 2016, when the Longhorns boasted the nation's No. 16-ranked offense that averaged 491.3 yards per game. During his time as the lead recruiter, he helped the Longhorns sign the No. 7-ranked recruiting class in the country in back-to-back years and was named Scout.com's

Big 12 Recruiter of the Year. He recruited punter Michael Dickson, who went on to earn multiple All-America honors, win Big 12 Conference Special Teams Player of the Year in 2016 and 2017 as well as the 2017 Ray Guy Award, and currently punts for the Seattle Seahawks.

Traylor built his hometown program into a prep powerhouse during his 15-year tenure leading the Gilmer Buckeyes.

A four-time Texas High School Coach of the Year, he posted a 175-26 record (.871) and led Gilmer to five state championship game appearances, three state titles (2004, '09, '14) and 12 district crowns. The Buckeyes turned in a pair of perfect 16-0 seasons, won 10-or-more games 11 times and registered seven 13-win seasons and three 15-win campaigns during his career.

In 2014, his Class 4A Division II state championship team boasted one of the most prolific offenses in Texas prep history. Gilmer scored 950 points, the second-most at that time in state history, averaging 59.4 points and 536.1 yards over the 16-game season. The Buckeyes topped 60 points nine times, including two 80-point performances. Gilmer also averaged 536.1 total yards per game (8,577 yards) behind a balanced 293.9 passing yards and 242.1 rushing yards per contest. The defense was equally dominant, allowing only 276 points (17.3) with five single-digit efforts and two shutouts, while recording 23 interceptions and forcing 17 fumbles. Gilmer closed out the season with a win over West Orange-Stark and had eight different players earn Class 4A All-State honors from either the AP or Texas Sports Writers Association.

Gilmer's two other state titles under Traylor both came in Class 3A in 2004 (Division II) and 2009 (Division I), before the change in class structure in Texas high school football moved the school into Class 4A. After 15 years on its sidelines, Gilmer renamed Buckeye Stadium to Jeff Traylor Stadium to honor his successful career.

Inducted into the East Texas Coaches Association Hall of Honor in 2019, Traylor received numerous honors during his prep coaching career, including being named Coach of the Decade (2000s) by the Tyler Morning Telegraph. He is a 12-time District Coach of the Year, four-time East Texas Coach of the Year and a four-time Ted Jeffries Award winner. He has received the Carl Padilla Coach of the Year, KYKX Coach of the Year and Old Coach Network Coach of the Year awards twice each. He will be inducted into both the Texas High School Coaches Association (THSCA) Hall of Honor and the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame in 2025.

Traylor began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Big Sandy High School in 1990-93 before a seven-year stint (1994-2000) at Jacksonville High School where he served as passing coordinator, defensive backs coach, receivers coach and special teams coordinator. There, he helped coach future NFL quarterbacks Josh McCown and Luke McCown and former Texas A&M standout signal-caller Randy McCown.

A 1986 graduate of Gilmer High School, Traylor earned both undergraduate (1990) and graduate (2002) degrees in education from Stephen F. Austin while playing football as a walk-on.

He and his wife, Cari, have three children: Jordan, Jacob and Jaci.
