

GPG 2020 Election Polling Update

October 30, 2020









An unprecedented number of votes have already been cast before Election Day.

So far, over 85 million votes have been cast in the 2020 election, compared to 58.3 million total early ballots in 2016.

In 2016, **nearly 137 million votes** were cast in total. Analysts predict **a record-breaking 150 million votes will be cast this year**.



Florida:

35% of likely voters have already cast a ballot, according to polling.



N. Carolina:

Republicans are narrowing the gap in early voting.

Pennsylvania:

About 70% of preelection votes have been cast by Democrats.



Michigan:

So far, Black voters make up 12% of voters, up from 8% at this time in 2016.



Arizona:


Slightly less than one-third of all registered voters have no party affiliation.



As Election Day approaches, COVID-19 cases are on the rise in 41 states, including in key battleground states Pres. Trump won in 2016.

Nationwide: +22%



Biden goes into the final weekend with a solid lead that is 6 points higher than Hillary Clinton's at this point in 2016.



Biden's lead has been more consistent than all others in recent history.






Current electoral college projections strongly favor Biden, even without Toss Ups.

To win, Pres. Trump needs to:


- ✓ Win all R-leaning states
- ✓ Pick up **all** Toss Up states
- ✓ Pick up at least 22 electoral college votes from D-leaning states





But a lot can change - the race is extremely tight in several battleground states.

Margins in Current Polling Averages




Statewide polling would need to be off by 6 or more points for Pres. Trump to win any of these blue states.




President Trump still has a few possible paths to victory.

Path 1: The South



If Pres. Trump wins the southern states that he won in 2016 (AZ, FL, GA, NC, and TX), he would only need to add one Rust-Belt Lean Democrat state to pull off a win or a tie.

Path 2: Rust Belt and Midwest



If Pres. Trump outperforms in the Rust Belt and Midwest (as he did in 2016) and wins IA, MI, MN, OH, PA, and WI, he can win with just one southern Toss Up or Lean Democrat state.

Path 3: Polling has been wrong



If statewide polling is off by four or five points across the U.S. and has been overestimating Biden's lead, that would put enough states in Pres. Trump's column for a win.

Biden plans to travel to **4 states** (lowa, Wisconsin, Georgia, & Florida).

VP candidate Harris plans to travel to 3 states (Nevada, Arizona, & Texas).

Pres. Trump will have rallies in **7 states** (Arizona, Florida, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, N. Carolina, & Wisconsin).

VP Pence will travel to **4 states** (Wisconsin, Michigan, Iowa, & Nevada).


The 2020 election looks different from 2016 on a few fronts.

Like 2016, this election will come down to key battleground states with very close polling.

There are, however, some key differences.

- **The pandemic:** This is top-of-mind for voters and has led to an increase in early, absentee, and mail-in voting as a result.
- Voters like Biden more than they liked Clinton: Biden has a higher net favorability than Clinton did in 2016 and a wider lead in national polling.
- Voters know how Pres. Trump will lead: He is no longer an unknown entity.
- **Fewer undecided voters:** 15% of voters were undecided in 2016 compared to 8% in 2020.
- No real third-party threat: Both Gary Johnson and Jill Stein were real competitors in 2016.
- **More investment in state polling:** Increased investment in state polling and changes to weighting and turnout modeling will likely make polling more reliable in 2020.
- Two men at the top of the ticket: A female candidate at the helm of the Democrat ticket in 2016 may have mattered to enough people to make a difference four years ago.











There are some important states to watch closely as presidential election results come in.



Florida, North Carolina, Ohio, and Texas

If **one** of these states is called on Election Day for Biden, he will have almost certainly won.

If **all** of these are called on Election Day for Pres.

Trump - and if all Likely and Lean Republican states are as well - it still won't be enough to declare him the winner on Election Day without flipping some states that Lean Democrat.



Pennsylvania and Wisconsin

Results will likely be delayed.

At 20 and 10 Electoral College votes respectively, this could make the difference for either candidate.



Key races may determine control of the Senate.

Expected shifts:





Colorado's Senate seats.

Alabama is expected to be a pick-up for the Republicans.

Close key races:





If Democrats flip seats in Iowa, Maine, and North Carolina - plus the expected shifts pan out - Democrats can take

the Senate.

Potential runoffs:



MT

Both Georgia Senate races could result in run-off elections.

If Democrats flip seats in Kansas, South Carolina, or Montana, it would be somewhat surprising, but put them in position to take the Senate.
