October 9, 2020









President Trump has faced a steady drumbeat of controversy over the last two weeks.



Tax Returns Released

The NYTimes released information that damaged his credibility as a successful businessperson.

Chaotic Debate

Pres. Trump's performance in the first debate was seen as off-message and overly combative. 7-in-10 voters who watched left feeling annoyed.


Covid-19 Diagnosis

Large rallies - a trademark of his campaign - are on hold while Pres. Trump recovers from Covid-19.

His diagnosis comes at a time when he was trying to shift the narrative *away* from the pandemic.



Amid these events, the president's job approval has been largely stable.





However, Americans are questioning his decision-making and capacity to lead.

Questioning his judgement

72%

believe Pres. Trump hasn't taken Covid-19 risks seriously enough.

National security concerns

50%

don't believe the president can handle a military or national security crisis while he's in recovery.

His diagnosis has also shaken Americans' confidence when it comes to their own health.

Today, 81% are concerned about contracting Covid-19, up from 72% two weeks ago.

Confirmation hearings for Pres. Trump's Supreme Court nominee will move forward.

Republicans Have a Clear Plan

- When will they begin? Hearings are set to begin Monday, Oct. 12.
- Who won't be there in person? Judiciary
 Committee members Thom Tillis (R-NC) and
 Mike Lee (R-UT) are still in quarantine and may
 need to vote remotely.
- How have Democrats responded?
 Democrats are waging a public campaign denouncing the proceedings but have no path to stop them.

Americans Prefer a Stimulus Package

Americans would prefer for the Senate to prioritize a stimulus package over judiciary proceedings.

Senate should prioritize new legislation to deal with the economic and health impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.



Senate should prioritize confirming a justice to fill the vacant seat on the Supreme Court.







 If Biden wins in all states where he is currently ahead in polls, he could potentially win more Electoral College votes than Pres. Obama in 2008.

Looking back, Clinton also had advantages - but more negatives too.

Biden's national lead is larger than Clinton's was at this point, and his negatives are lower.

Clinton ultimately lost most of the Toss Ups where she led in early Oct.





41 states have already begun voting - including nearly all Toss Up states.



Experts predict roughly **80 million** will vote <u>before</u> Election Day, either in person or by mail.



Voting in 2020 already looks much different compared to 2016.

So far, over 8 million votes have been cast in the 2020 election, compared to only 75,000 at this point in 2016.

In 2016, **nearly 137 million votes** were cast total. Analysts predict **a record-breaking 150 million votes will be cast this year**.

20% of voters expect to know the winner on Election Day. 66% of voters don't expect to know until after Election Day.



What's Ahead: First Presidential Debate

NEXT EVENT: SECOND PRES. DEBATE

Scheduled for Thurs., Oct. 15

The Commission on Presidential Debates announced a plan for candidates to debate virtually, but Pres. Trump has not agreed to this format.

Pres. Trump and Biden are currently weighing in on their preferences. As of now, the next (and potentially final) debate could occur on Oct. 22.
