

# **GPG 2020 Election Polling Update**

October 23, 2020









## Pres. Trump's pandemic approval rating drops as cases rise.

Coronavirus cases are up across the country, especially in the battleground:



**Wisconsin:** A record number of new cases were announced Friday, Oct. 16 just before Pres. Trump held a rally in Janesville on Saturday.



**Ohio:** Cases have hit record high numbers three times in less than a week in Ohio.



**Michigan:** The seven-day average for new cases is at its highest point since early April in Michigan.



**Iowa:** lowa's positive test rate is currently four times the national average.

Biden has maintained his lead nationally, and has been more consistently ahead in polling than Clinton was in 2016.



Biden's lead has been more consistent than Clinton's was - but both narrow as Election Day approaches.





## Notable differences between 2016 and 2020.



2020	Biden +8	+3	-9	No notable third candidates pulling votes from Biden.	<b>8%</b> two weeks before the election, still enough to swing the election depending on the state.



# Biden could win the Electoral College with Dem-leaning states alone if current ratings hold.

If Biden wins all states where he is leading in the polls, he would win the Electoral College 375 to Trump's 163.

To stay in the game, Trump needs to win all toss-up and R-leaning states AND pick up at least 22 votes from states currently leaning Democrat.








# With millions of ballots cast, Biden voters are more confident than Trump voters that results will be known after all mail and absentee ballots are counted.

# So far, over 50 million votes have been cast in the 2020 election, already 36% of the total votes cast in 2016.


There are still many more votes expected to be cast.

Things to keep in mind about election polling in the final days of the election.

- Most of the votes being cast pre-Election Day are believed to favor Biden over Pres.

  Trump. Pollsters are accounting for this well-observed trend in their modeling and predictions.
- Since 2016, **more has been invested in state polls**, which were underfunded in some cases four years ago. That allows for higher-quality work and will help prevent the mispredictions in certain states in 2016.
  - **Pollsters have learned a lesson about weighting.** In 2016, some pollsters did not adjust for the over-representation of college graduates in their surveys: polls that did not correctly weight their data therefore over-estimated support for Clinton which was higher among college-educated Americans. Most well-established pollsters are weighting their samples correctly this time around.



## What's Ahead: Final days

### **OCTOBER**

#### **SCOTUS CONFIRMATION**

 The Senate Judiciary Committee advanced Judge Amy Coney Barrett's nomination to the full Senate on Thursday, Oct. 22. The full Senate is expected to vote on Pres. Trump's nomination the week of Oct. 26.

#### **COVID-19 STIMULUS**

 There has been some progress on a potential \$2 trillion aid agreement, though it may not pass before Election Day.

### **NOVEMBER**

#### **ELECTION DAY**

Tuesday, Nov. 3.

#### STATES TALLY MAIL-IN BALLOTS

Expected to continue into the weeks after Nov. 3.



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
