October 16, 2020









## With just 18 more days until election day, three narratives drove the week.

## Pres. Trump's Health

- Since his recovery from COVID-19, the president has tweeted that he is immune to contracting it again and unable to pass it to others, which some health experts have disagreed with.
- Pres. Trump has hit the campaign trail hard this week with back-to-back rallies in Florida, Pennsylvania, Iowa, North Carolina and Georgia.

## **Competing Town Halls**

- The second debate was canceled by the Commission on Presidential Debates last week, leading both candidates to make new plans.
- Joe Biden participated in a town hall on Thursday hosted by ABC; Pres. Trump participated in a separate, simultaneous town hall hosted by NBC.

## **The Supreme Court**

- As confirmation hearings for Judge Amy Coney Barrett took place this week, Biden has said that he is "not a fan" of the idea of court packing but will take a clear position before election day.
- Only 1 in 5 voters favor increasing the number of seats on the Supreme Court, while nearly half oppose. Even among Democrats, only 1 in 3 support the idea.

## **Key Senate Race Dynamics**



**Sen. Graham** may benefit from free TV exposure and excite his base by defending a conservative justice, but joking about the "good old days" of segregation on a national stage could also damage him.



Local news outlets in NC continue to mention **Sen. Tillis'** diagnosis and in-person participation in the hearings - highlighting a weakness with NC voters.



**Sen. Ernst's** participation provides a chance to distance her message from the president's and re-assert herself as an independent voice in the Senate, a trait she campaigned on six years ago.



Biden's odds of winning have steadily increased since the first debate.






# Based on current ratings, Biden could win the Electoral College with D-leaning states alone.

If Biden wins all states where he is leading in the polls, he would win the Electoral College 375 to Trump's 163.

To stay in the game, Trump needs to win all toss-up and R-leaning states AND pick up at least 22 votes from states currently leaning Democrat.

# But Arizona and Nevada could be tipping point states if they break for Pres. Trump.

#### **Arizona**

**Electoral votes: 11** 

**2016 margin: Trump +4** 

Current average polling: Biden +4

**How could Pres. Trump take AZ?** 

- ✓ Older voters defy polls and break for Pres. Trump again.
- ✓ Maricopa county leans more heavily in favor of Pres. Trump than polls suggest.
- ✓ Pres. Trump could pick off more of the 32% of the Arizona electorate that didn't vote in 2016, who currently lean Biden.



**Electoral votes:** 6

2016 margin: Clinton +2

**Current average polling: Biden +5** 


How could Pres. Trump take NV?

- ✓ He picks up the 6% of Nevada's undecided voters.
- ✓ Unionized casino workers, who have been more difficult to mobilize this year, don't show up.
- ✓ COVID-19 cases decline in coming weeks, and NV voters focus on Pres. Trump's economy messaging instead.






# Voting in 2020 already looks much different compared to 2016.


# So far, over 21 million votes have been cast in the 2020 election, compared to only 1.4 million this point in 2016.

Expected remaining votes


So far, most mail in ballots have been cast by Democrats.\*

Tuesday, Nov. 3.

#### STATES TALLY MAIL-IN BALLOTS

Expected to continue into the weeks after Nov. 3.



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
