Peter Kuznick

Peter Kuznick is a Professor of History and Director of the Nuclear Studies Institute at American University. In 2004, he co-founded the Nuclear Education Project. He also spearheaded the 2003 U.S. protest against the Smithsonian's latest display of the Enola Gay and in that capacity organised the Committee for a National Discussion of Nuclear History and Current Policy.

He is the author and co-editor of the following books:

Both Mark Selden and Peter Kuznick were at the heart of the battle to prevent neo-conservatives removing all historical evidence, images of victims, and statements by senior US commanders that challenged the official narrative of why the bomb was dropped from the Smithsonian exhibition of the atomic bomber, the Enola Gay, in 1995.
