## INTRODUCTION

**GivHOPE** Africa is a not-for-profit, lay and non partisan social association operating in Cameroon (Central Africa), Côte-d'Ivoire (West Africa) and the USA (Nord America). GivHOPE Africa is regularly registered under the Declaration of creation # 0322/RDA/106/SAAJP/BAPP of March 14, 2016 renewed on January 2017 under no 0000028 RDA/106/SAAJP/BAPP and on October 13, 2020 under #00001469/RDA/JO6/A2/SAAJP/BAPP. This Association is also US registered under EIN 82-5187523 dated April 16, 2018 and 501 © (3) and Côte-D'Ivoire Agreement is pending approval even though activities are ongoing. Sierra Leone is also in the pipeline for the year 2021. GivHOPE Africa was created to accompany the Governments of these different countries in their fight against the phenomenon of social exclusion of the poor and the vulnerable groups, such as street children, school dropouts and IDPs (Internally Displaced Persons) from the war zones of the Northwest and Southwest of Cameroon and since March 2020, the Covid-19 socioeconomically affected elderly persons and the youth.

## CONTEXT AND JUSTIFICATION

The socioeconomic crisis has reached its peak and many vulnerable people live in extreme poverty, most of whom have lost their properties due to the civil war in the two Anglophone regions. The Francophone part of the country is very ethnically divided and can at any moment turn into civil war embracing by the same token the whole country. As if these were not enough, the corona virus came to add more sufferings and challenges in the already poor and vulnerable people's lives. It is within this extremely challenging context that GivHOPE Africa launched its 2020 outreach activities.

## PROGRAM

Last year, GivHOPE Africa launched two core projects due to the corona virus pandemic break out: (i) No One Should Go Hungry during COVID-19 Lifespan: Phase 1 and II; (ii) Improving the Living Conditions of Women and their Families during the Covid-19. These two projects came in addition to the two already existing projects in our Portfolio: (i) Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) and Host Communities and (ii) Mechanisms for Ex-Street Children Home Returns Sustainable Resettlement.

(i) No One Should Go Hungry during COVID-19 Lifespan: Phase 1 and II: The Project overall objective was to rescue the elderly persons, especially women caught by the pandemic to survive through sensitization/awareness campaigns and food bank in the most hit cities in Cameroon. Phase two of this Project laid ground work to increase women and their families' productivity through income generating activities, training, and capacity building to set up small businesses and have access to grants in selected economic areas during these hard times of Covid-19 pandemic.

This project led us to the next project that improved the living conditions of women and their families during the covid-19 pandemic. The project addressed the profound needs of women and their families during this economic and health hardship as a result of coronavirus outbreak by filling three main gaps: Training, empowerment services and financing. It also improved women's living standard and provided support to their families through income generating activities and access to finance for private initiatives. Another project thrust expected to be transformational is encouraging dropouts to go back to school or learn handicraft in vocational training centers. Finally, the project key role helped women and youth who are willing to turn around their vulnerability.

(ii) Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) and Host Communities: This Project objective strived to improve access of IDPs and host communities to basic services and livelihoods in the war zones of the Northwest and

Southwest Regions of Cameroon. But with the pandemic, only few activities were carried out because the populations from the zones of operation were caught between the military and armed separatists, making it hard to cope with the rampant insecurity. GivHOPE Africa therefore decided to work closely with other sister organizations (Community Rehabilitation Center for the Disabled and Disadvantaged (CRCDD) in Bamenda, LinkCorp in Bafut, the Northwest Region and Loum DIASPORA in the Littoral Region.

(iii) Mechanisms for Ex-Street Children Home Returns Sustainable Resettlement: This project remains our core project even though in this phase, we are talking about accompanied mechanisms to make their home returns sustainable and make sure they can't go back to the street.

All four projects have almost the same components that can be resume in reducing extreme poverty and misery among the target groups by taking care of their basic needs (Shelter, health, education, subsistence, etc.) through (i) Rehabilitation, capacity building, empowerment and income generating activities for the parents; (ii) Apprenticeship, vocational training or formal education for the children; (iii) Cash assistance, job placement for those with skills in the private sector or self-employment; (iv) Wellbeing of IDPs by improving the poor and vulnerable refugee and host community households in selected areas.

GivHOPE Africa, however, strived to unfold its agenda in the following categories: (i) Facilitation of the social reinsertion of selected target groups; (ii) Reinforcement of accompanied mechanisms and guarantees; (iii) Assistance and empowerment of identified members during the corona virus pandemic breakout and post; (iv); Capacity building of key actors; (v) Knowledge/experience sharing and partnership; and (vi) Search for key individuals, networks, groups and institutions that GivHOPE Africa outreach program can engage with and establish effective working relationships with them, via strategic communications/outreach activities covered by local and international media.

#### DISBURSEMENT AND CASH DONATION RECAP : 1US\$ = 540 XAF (Statutory rate)

- 2020 Disbursement: **13,634,015** Cameroonian francs out of which 69% represent social charges to the poor and the vulnerable people for income generating activities ; help to single nursing mothers and street children for home returns, resettlement and education/health care and 31% operational costs.
- 2020 cash donations: **11, 940,203** Cameroonian francs and **1, 693,762** Cameroonian Francs of personal financial contribution.

#### GivHOPE AFRICA's KEY YOUTH 2020 ACHIEVEMENTS:

Reenrollment of five (05) high school and two (02) university students in formal educational system for the academic year 2020/2021. Four (4) ex-street children reunited with their families and communities: Bello went back in Ngaoundere, the Adamawa region and got married in May, Martin graduated from the Mutenguene Police Higher Training Center in Limbe, the Southwest Region in September and now works with the GMI Brigade; Richard became carpentry owner and Jacques a physically psychomotor challenged young man graduated from the Etoug-Ebe Handicap Training Center (Centre des Handicapés d'Etoug-Ebe) and opened his mosaic factory where he makes sandals, shoes, bracelets, necklaces, rings, earrings, etc. with pearls.

#### DETAILED ACTIVITIES:

From January 1st to December 31, 2020, after a short break that allowed us to consolidate the 2019 yearly performance results and work on the new plan of actions, we geared up with new challenges going places to advocate for poverty reduction in poor communities through multifaceted approach such as counseling and training sessions on thematic issues related to social inclusion and protection, small projects management.

grants and gifts hand over to our different in need target groups: street children, dropouts, vulnerable families, widows, orphans and IDPs (Internally Displaced Persons). Due to the pandemic lockdown, deployment in remote areas was no longer possible and key activities were limited to Yaoundé and its environs for the corona virus economically affected elderly persons, and others covered by our Partners in their localities. This report crowns our 2020 annual activities per project listed in our portfolio, as follows:

No One Should Go Hungry during the Covid-19 Lifespan Phase I and II: Phase I was launched through sensitization/awareness campaigns and food bank Caravan in the poorest neighborhoods of Yaoundé. From April 11th to June 30, 2020, the Caravan toured 14 neighborhoods in Yaoundé, the Center region and neighborhood7 in Tonga, the West region. The initiative came about after consultation meetings with the traditional rulers at the peak of the pandemic outbreak when many vulnerable people, mainly the elderly and street children in the poorest neighborhoods in Yaoundé did not know who to turn to and where to go to get help. During our discussions with their rulers, we learned that many of them who were in small businesses have lost their capitals and they could hardly have a meal per day or care for their families. In agreement with the local authorities, GivHOPE Africa team decided to organize several awareness/sensitization campaigns on barrier measures, frequent hand wash or use of sanitizers and food bank Caravan. During almost three months we were on the road every other week and distributed 46 bags of rice, 15 cartons of soaps, 5 cartons of tomatoes, 8 cartons of sardines and 8 ballots of clothes worth 5,000.00 US\$ equivalent and fed more than 1,000 household in fourteen neighborhoods in Yaoundé and one inTonga.

Phase II of the above-mentioned project consisted of putting the small business owners who lost their capitals during the pandemic lockdown back to business. July 14, the first batch of 67 small businesses received grants for those who could not afford to pay back and loans for the others. Four months later we hosted our 5th batch of recipients bringing the total number of small business owners to 120 within just few months as post covid-19 relief package.

Improving the Living Conditions of Women and their Families during the Covid-19: This project was the amplifier of « No One Should Go Hungry » project. Components I to IV went successfully. They laid emphasis

on: (i) Capacity building and empowerment, access to basic priority services such as health, education, access to water and sanitation ; (ii) Expansion of the wellbeing of women and their families by improving the conditions of the poor and vulnerable households living in selected areas; (iii) Improvement of the resilience of the poorest/most vulnerable households through cash assistance, job placement in the private sector or funding of micro-projects for others, including in-kind donations in clothes, food, mattresses, masks, sanitizers, beds, bed sheets, lingerie, feminine hygiene pads, books, school bags, business tables and shelves to groups in need such as schools, women and their families; (iv) Post covid-19 advocacy and awareness campaigns and project financing and management to lift up the women in selected areas, jointly with all stakeholders (Traditional rulers, faith groups, administrative officers, civil society, health centers, municipalities, the media and the communities). They also helped contribute to maintaining or improving socioeconomic development in targeted areas such as the creation of fast food in war and most hit by covid-19 zones. They mainstreamed gender and youth dimensions in all related activities, training and funding of investment initiatives in economic activities where women and their families predominate. Among the 120 households that went back to business, 80 women, 10 men and 30 youths were able to put food on the table, send their children back to school and take care of their basic needs. The Midterm evaluation to measure the real impact of this project on beneficiaries will take place in June 2021.

Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) and Host Communities Project: All expectations about this project could not prosper due to the covid-19 attack and especially to the rampant insecurity in Bamenda, Bafut and Ndop, the zones of operation. Thanks to the bravoure of our Partners, CRCDD and LinkCorp, only 20 IDPs received 400,000 Cameroonian francs grants for income generating activities and 60 girls were offered sanitary pads, items badly needed for their hygienic protection during their menstruations.

Mechanisms for Ex-street Children Home Returns Sustainable Resettlement: Four ex-street children returned home with sustainable accompanied measures that allowed them to fully be reinserted in the society. Bello got married in May; Martin became a policeman in September, and he is soon to be a father; Richard is a carpentry business owner and Jacques a self-employed with a factory of mosaic fabrics made of sandals, bracelets, necklaces, earrings, belts, rings, etc.

Apart from the above-mentioned project activities, we reached out to 5 (five) single nursing mothers entangled in some health facilities in Bangangte and Bangwa, the West region of Cameroon with hospitalization and medical bills. We provided for their basic needs (Food, clothes, soaps) and paid hospital bills for 4 of them and the one with triplets was entirely cared for, including her triplets. The latter will remain in our portfolio while we are looking for extra help to build her a decent house where she can live with her children. Meanwhile she is fully taken in charge by us for their primary needs, including that of her old aunt.

Notwithstanding the double sanitary and sociopolitical crises (The corona virus lockdown and the civil war in the Northwest and Southwest regions of Cameroon), our 2020 agenda was behind schedule due also to the lack of resources. But with the little funds we received from Friends and other Well Wishers, we were able to effectively deploy our efforts as much as we could and to disburse more than **13 million Cameroonian francs** in cash –grants/loans- and in-kind gifts to (i) IDPs, mainly women and girls in our portfolio; (ii) Street children for their home returns and socioeconomic reinsertion; (iii) The Covid-19 affected victims; (iv) Single nursing moms entangled in two Health facilities in the West region due to unpaid hospital bills; (v) Dropouts reenrollment and (vi) assistance to other sister organizations.

Our field visits were limited to Yaoundé and its environs, the Center region and Tonga, Bangangte (Jointly with Shann'Ze) and Bangwa, the West region. Other outreach activities were carried out by our Partners, CRCDD in Bamenda, LinkCorp in Bafut, the Northwest region and Loum DIASPORA in the Littoral region.

Out of Cameroon, experience/knowledge sharing with Washington, DC Dream Center we started in 2017 was enhanced through virtual communications on issues of common interest such as the mentoring/tutoring programs. In a parallel direction to our expansion, we've engaged negotiations with the Côte-d'Ivoire and Sierra Leone authorities for the launch of GivHOPE Africa's activities in these two countries.

The different stages were widely covered by the national media and some international TV channel correspondents: Print press, radio, TV and online news such as HTv, AFRICable, STv, NB One Radio, Anecdote and La Nouvelle Expression Newspapers. They carried our voices beyond the national frontiers.
