Children in Ohio have more hospital admissions for asthma than children in most other states.




Vision for Ohio's Children

80% of children who fail vision screening do not have a comprehensive eye exam.




Dental for Ohio's Children





Level of integration is dependent on the delivery model. The delivery model determines the amount of time spent within a particular building/district.









Partnership Timeline








We Take Care of the Whole Person Mind – Body – Spirit





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
Removing Barriers to Accessible Healthcare

Success Stories - Student

A 16 year old female student came to the SBHC referred by the school nurse. The student fell a few days prior and had an abrasion on her knee. The student had an elevated BMI, which trigger further screening for diabetes risk factors. The SBHC provider completed an A1C. The student's A1C was an 11.6% which indicates that the student is diabetic.

The student did not have a previous diabetes diagnosis. The student informed staff that her grandmother recently died as a result of diabetes complications and her father had uncontrolled diabetes.


The SBHC staff have continued to follow the student closely. The student's A1C has reduced to 6.1%. The staff will continue to follow her closely to help support the student on her road to health. The health center staff have also provided behavioral health supports and placed a referral to the embedded behavioral health support.



Success Story – Student



A senior in high school received a comprehensive vision exam from the Vision Outreach Team. The student required glasses. The student completed the school required vision screenings in kindergarten, first, third, fifth, seventh, nineth, and eleventh grades. The student never received a comprehensive exam despite the failed vision screenings. The vision outreach team worked with the student to pick out glasses and dispensed the glasses to him after the glasses were received to ensure appropriate fit.



Success Stories - Student

Student has presented to the health center with ongoing physical concerns as well as mental health concerns, including suicidal ideation. Patient has a history of inconsistency with medication and irregularly engaging in outpatient services. Through work with medical provider, patient was able to stabilize physical concerns and through behavioral health provider meeting with patient regularly, patient has learned coping strategies to manage suicidal ideations. Additionally, during a crisis situation, BHP was able to link patient with ongoing mental health services through community mental health. Patient has re-started medication, is consistently taking medication and attending therapy. Patient has noted a significant improvement in mood and is doing well.




Success Stories – School Staf

42-year-old male with past medical history of diabetes and hypertension presented with concerns of elevated blood sugars. Patient had been feeling very sick over the previous days, which prompted him to check his blood sugars, which were running in the 200-300 range.


Patient was previously on medication for diabetes management, but admitted it had been some time since he had been treated. Medications were initiated but close follow up was kept with patient.

After just two visits with patient, he started to feel much better and more like himself. He was able to get back to work and blood sugars were within control. He then entrusted us to take care of his wife and stepson.


