TICKETS - - The game is sold out. Iowa's entire seven-game home slate is sold out. This is Iowa's 43rd sellout in its last 45 home games.

2010 RANKINGS - - Iowa opens the season ranked ninth in the Associated Press pre-season poll and 10th in the *USA Today* Coaches poll. The Hawkeyes have been ranked as high as fifth in one pre-season poll (Playboy). Eastern Illinois is ranked 16th in the preseason FCS coaches poll and 18th by the Sports Network.

RADIO - - (Originating Network): Learfield Communications with a network of over 40 stations. Gary Dolphin and Ed Podolak will call the action along with sideline reporter Rob Brooks.

The game can also be heard on Sirius channel 122 and XM channel 143.

TELEVISION - - The game will be televised to a national cable audience by The Big Ten Network (HD). The announcers are Tom Hart, Anthony Herron and sideline reporter Lisa Byington.

2009 RECORDS - - Iowa was 11-2 overall and 6-2 in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes finished the season ranked seventh by both the Associated Press and the *USA Today* Coaches poll. Eastern Illinois was 8-4 overall and won the Ohio Valley Conference title with a 6-2 mark. The Panthers were ranked 15th nationally in the FCS coaches poll.

THE SERIES - - This is the first time the schools have met in football.

COACHING RECORDS - - Kirk Ferentz is in his 15th year as a college head coach and his 12th year as Iowa's head coach. His career record is 93-76 and he is 81-55 at Iowa. He is 32-16 in non-conference games at Iowa. Bob Spoo is in 24th year as Eastern's head coach. He has a career record of 140-113-1. He has led EIU to 11 winning records in the last 15 seasons.

HAWKEYES OPEN AT HOME

Iowa (0-0) hosts Eastern Illinois (0-0) Saturday, Sept. 4 in Kinnick Stadium (70,585) to open the 2010 season. Game time is 11:01 a.m. The game is sold out.

ON THE TUBE

The Big Ten Network (HD) will televise the contest to a national cable audience that includes over 75 million households throughout the United States and Canada. Tom Hart, Anthony Herron and Lisa Byington will call the action.

RADIO BROADCAST

Iowa games are broadcast on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Gary Dolphin handles the play-by-play, with color commentator Ed Podolak and sideline reporter Rob Brooks. The Hawkeye Radio Network includes more than 40 stations throughout the state.

The game can also be heard on Sirius channel 122 and XM channel 143.

IN THE RANKINGS

Iowa is ranked ninth in the Associates Press preseason poll and 10th in the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll. The Associates Press ranking is the highest for Iowa in the initial AP poll of the season since the Hawkeyes were also ninth in 1988. Iowa was ranked fourth in the 1985 preseason AP rankings.

Iowa is also ranked fifth by About.com and Playboy, sixth by Sports Illustrated, eighth by Blue Ribbon Yearbook and nationalchamps.net; 10th by Lindy's, 12th by Athlon's and 13th by Sporting News.

Eastern Illinois is ranked 18th in the FCS in the Sports Network poll and 16th in the initial FCS coaches poll. Eastern Illinois concluded the 2009 season in the FCS playoffs and was ranked 19th in the final Sports Network rankings and 15th in the FCS coaches poll.

Around the Big Ten, Ohio State is ranked 2/2 (AP/USA Today Coaches' Poll), Wisconsin is 12/12 and Penn State is 19/14. Iowa opponents Arizona, Michigan State and Northwestern are listed among teams receiving votes.

REUNION WEEKEND

Two University of Iowa football teams will be honored with reunions as the 2010 Hawkeyes open the season. Iowa's Big Ten championship teams of 1960 and 1985 will be recognized in Kinnick Stadium Saturday. Returning members of both squads will be introduced Saturday and will be available for autographs as part of FryFest activities Friday at the Iowa River Landing in Coralville.



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Weekly Football Press Conference

Iowa Head Coach Kirk Ferentz holds his weekly press conferences every Tuesday throughout the season.

The press conferences are held in the auditorium of the Hayden Fry Football Complex. Coach Ferentz addresses the media at 12:30 p.m. and requested players will be available following the press conference. In case of poor weather, player interviews will be conducted inside the bubble.

Media need to submit their Tuesday player interview requests to Phil Haddy, via e-mail, by 10:30 a.m. CT each Sunday. True freshmen are not available for interviews.

The new class includes: Bob Jeter (Football, 1957-59), Ken Leuer (Wrestling, 1954-56), Tracy Dahl (Cross Country, 1989-92, and Track, 1990-93), Mark Ironside (Wrestling, 1995-98), Anthuan Maybank (Track, 1991-94) and Beth Beglin (Field Hockey, Coach, 1988-99).

ON THIS DATE

Iowa is 2-1 when playing on Sept. 4. The Hawkeyes defeated Tulsa 26-25 in 1993 and Kent State 39-7 in 2004. Iowa lost to Nebraska 42-7 in 1999. It was the first game for Kirk Ferentz as the Hawkeye head coach.

SEASON OPENERS

Iowa is 88-31-2 (.733) in season-opening games, including a 9-2 mark under Coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has averaged 38.2 points and a winning margin of 31.5 in its last nine season-opening victories (Northern Iowa 17-16 in 2009; Maine 46-3 in 2008; Northern Illinois 16-3 in 2007; Montana 41-7 in 2006; Ball State 56-0 in 2005; Kent State 39-7 in 2004 and 51-0 in 2001; Miami, OH 21-3 in 2003; Akron 57-21 in 2002). Last season, Iowa blocked Northern Iowa field-goal attempts on the final two plays of the game to extend the opening-game winning streak to nine.

Iowa's last season-opening loss came to Kansas State (27-7) in the 2000 Eddie Robinson Classic at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City, MO.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,129 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 579-510-39 (.530). That includes a 365-199-16 (.643) record in home games, a 214-312-23 (.411) record in games away from Iowa City, a 285-344-25 (.455) mark in Big Ten games and a 248-163-15 (.600) record in Kinnick Stadium.

IOWA LEADERSHIP GROUP

Iowa's Leadership Group for the 2010 season includes seven seniors, four juniors, two sophomores and two freshmen (redshirt). A member of the incoming freshman class will be added this fall. Permanent team captains are named at the conclusion of each season. The Leadership Group for this season includes seniors Adrian Clayborn, Brett Greenwood, Karl Klug, Brett Morse, Ricky Stanzi, Jeff Tarpinian and Julian Vandervelde; juniors Broderick Binns, Marvin McNutt, Tyler Nielsen and Tyler Sash; sophomores Greg Castillo and James Vandenberg; and redshirt freshmen Shane DiBona and Brett Van Sloten.

TICKET UPDATE

Iowa has sold all tickets for its seven home games. Iowa has issued over 59,000 season tickets, which includes more than 10,000 student tickets. The Iowa record for average home attendance is 70,585, set in 2005, 2006 and 2007. Iowa has sold out Kinnick Stadium 42 of the last 44 games heading into the 2010 season. In addition, Iowa has sold its allotment of tickets to road games at Arizona, Michigan, Northwestern and Minnesota.

FERENTZ NAMED COACH OF THE YEAR

Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz was named the Dave McClain Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year for the third time in 2009. Ferentz was a finalist for the Liberty Mutual national Coach of the Year award and was one of 15 semi-finalists for the George Munger Award, presented by the Maxwell Football Club to the College Coach of the Year. The American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) named Ferentz its 2009 Region Three Coach of the Year.

Ferentz was also the league Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2004. He was the Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year in 2002.

Ferentz has led nine straight Iowa teams to bowl eligibility and the Hawkeyes have finished in the Big Ten's first division eight of the past nine seasons.

THE SERIES

This is the first meeting between the two teams. This will also mark Iowa's first contest against any current member of the Ohio Valley Conference.

EIU COACH BOB SPOO

Bob Spoo is entering his 23rd year as a college head coach, all at Eastern Illinois. In addition, he was at Eastern Illinois in 2006 but did not coach due to illness. He holds a career record of 140-113-1 (.553). Among the longest tenured Division I head coaches at the same school, Spoo is tied for fourth behind Penn State's Joe Paterno, Bob Ford of Albany and Andy Talley of Villanova. He had led Eastern Illinois to nine FCS playoff appearances, including a year ago, when the Panthers lost at Southern Illinois in the first round.

Prior to taking his current position, Spoo was an assistant coach at Purdue (1978-86) and Wisconsin (1973-77). Spoo earned his degree from Purdue (1960), where he was a three-year letterman and Purdue's starting quarterback in 1957 and 1958.

IOWA/EIU NOTES

- The Iowa roster features 14 players from the state of Illinois. There are no Iowans on the Eastern Illinois roster.
- Iowa and Eastern Illinois played one common opponent last season. Iowa won 21-10 at Penn State, while Eastern Illinois lost 52-3 at Penn State.
- This is the third straight season Iowa has opened its schedule against an FCS opponent. Iowa defeated Maine 46-3 to open the 2008 season and defeated Northern Iowa 17-16 to open the 2009 campaign.
- Eastern Illinois is 0-3 vs. current Big Ten Conference teams, having lost to Illinois, Penn State and Purdue, all under current Coach Bob Spoo.
- Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz and Eastern Illinois Coach Bob Spoo have both been named conference Coach of the Year in their current leagues three times, including both earning the honor a year ago. Both Ferentz and Spoo were finalists for the Liberty Mutual national Coach of the Year, in their division, last season.

- EIU Coach Bob Spoo lettered at Purdue in 1956, when Iowa scored a 21-20 win over the Boilermakers. Iowa and Purdue did not play the following two years when Spoo was Purdue's starting quarterback.
- Iowa posted a 5-4 record against Purdue when EIU Coach Bob Spoo was an assistant there from 1978-86. Iowa was 2-3 against Wisconsin when Spoo was a Badger assistant from 1973-77.
- Eastern Illinois assistant Roc Bellantoni began his college coaching career at Buena Vista University in Storm Lake in 1995 and was an assistant coach at Drake University from 1998-00.
- EIU assistant Roy Wittke was an assistant at Northern Illinois when Iowa defeated the Huskies 16-3 in Chicago in 2007.
- EIU assistant Mike Lynch was an assistant coach at Utah State when Iowa defeated the Aggies 48-7 in 2002.
- EIU assistant Matthew Smiley was a walk-on wide receiver at Illinois.

A GLANCE AT THE SCHEDULE

Iowa will play four of its first five games in Kinnick Stadium. Following the opening contest, the Hawkeyes host Iowa State (Sept. 11, 2:30 p.m., ABC). Iowa travels to Arizona (Sept. 18, 9:30 p.m. CT, ESPN) for its only non-conference road game before hosting Ball State. The Hawkeyes open the Big Ten schedule against Penn State (Oct. 2, 7 p.m., ABC/ESPN) in a prime-time contest at Kinnick Stadium. This season marks just the third time in Ferentz' 12 years at Iowa that the Hawkeyes will open the conference season at home. After an open week, Iowa travels to Michigan before home games against Wisconsin and Michigan State. The Hawkeyes play at Indiana and Northwestern before hosting Ohio State in the home finale. The final game of the regular season is at Minnesota the Saturday after Thanksgiving.

For the second straight season, Iowa does not play Illinois or Purdue. Eight of Iowa's 2010 opponents competed in bowl games at the conclusion of last season, posting a 4-4 record. Of the eight bowl participants, Ohio State, Penn State and Northwestern played in January bowl events.

Iowa's regular season strength of schedule a year ago ranked 27th strongest in the nation. Iowa's 12 opponents compiled a 77-61 (.558) record. Including its Orange Bowl win, Iowa was 8-2 against bowl eligible opponents.

HAWKEYES BY THE NUMBERS

Iowa returns 47 lettermen from 2009, including 21 on offense, 22 on defense and four specialists. The 47 lettermen are one less than the number from 2009. The Hawkeyes return six starters on offense, eight on defense and their kicker and punter. The lettermen breakdown includes 15 three-year lettermen, 13 two-year lettermen and 19 one-year lettermen.

The total roster has 122 players, and includes 26 seniors, 22 juniors, 25 sophomores, 16 redshirt freshmen and 33 true freshmen. The first game depth chart includes 19 seniors, 18 juniors, 12 sophomores, five redshirt freshmen and two true freshmen.

Just two Division I programs, Hawaii (31) and Louisville (27), have more returning seniors than Iowa, while Texas-El Paso also returns 26 seniors and Ohio State returns 25.

DOMINANT AT HOME

Iowa has won 44 of its last 53 games (.830) in Kinnick Stadium, dating back to the 2002 season. The nine Hawkeye losses came to Western Michigan (28-19 in 2007), Indiana (38-20 in 2007), Michigan (23-20 in overtime in 2005), Ohio State (38-17 in 2006), Northwestern (21-7 in 2006, 22-17 in 2008 and 17-10 in 2009), Wisconsin (24-21 in 2006) and Iowa State (36-31 in 2002). Iowa recorded a school-record 22-game home winning streak between 2002-05, which ended in the overtime loss to Michigan.

Iowa's 44-9 (.830) home record from 2002 thru 2009 is the 11th-best winning percentage in the nation and ranks second in the Big Ten to Ohio State.



Head Coach Kirk Ferentz

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) is in his 12th season as head football coach at the University of Iowa.

Ferentz was named the 2009 Dave McClain Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year. He was one of 15 semi-finalists for the 2009 George Munger Award, presented by the Maxwell Football Club to the College Coach of the Year. He was the 2009 AFCA Region Three Coach of the Year and was one of 10 finalists for the Liberty Mutual national Coach of the Year.

Ferentz was honored as the 2002 Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and was the AFCA Regional Coach of the Year that season, as well. He has been named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year in 2002, 2004 and 2009. Ferentz has guided Iowa to Big Ten titles twice in the last eight years.

Iowa has made two BCS bowl appearances, including a 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl. Iowa has played in six January bowl games and has four January bowl victories (2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl and 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl). Iowa has posted a 70-31 (.693) overall mark and a 42-22 (.656) Big Ten record the last eight seasons. Ferentz has guided the Hawkeyes to eight first division finishes, including a second-place finish in 2009. His Hawkeye teams are 5-3 in bowl games.

Ferentz, at Iowa, holds an overall record of 81-55 (.596) and a 49-39 (.557) mark in Big Ten games. In 14 seasons as a college head coach his career mark is 93-76 (.550). Ferentz boasts the second-most victories by a Hawkeye head coach (Hayden Fry, 143 wins).

Ferentz joined the Iowa staff after serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach of the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. He had been part of the Baltimore (Cleveland Browns prior to the move) staff for six years.

Ferentz was named head coach of the Maine Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years. Ferentz was a member of Hayden Fry's Iowa staff for nine years as offensive line coach (1981-89). He coordinated Iowa's running game during his first coaching stint with the Hawkeyes. Iowa appeared in eight bowl games during the time Ferentz was an Iowa assistant, posting a 4-4 record. A pair of Rose Bowls (1982 & 1986), two Holiday Bowl appearances (1986 & 1987) and a pair of Peach Bowl visits (1982 & 1988), along with appearances in the Gator (1983) and Freedom bowls (1984) highlighted his previous Iowa stay. Iowa's record in those nine years was 73-33-4 and included two 10-win and two nine-win seasons.

Ferentz was born in Royal Oak, MI, and attended high school in Pittsburgh, PA. Kirk earned his bachelor's degree in English Education from the University of Connecticut in 1978, where he was a football captain. Kirk received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Neag School of Education at the University of Connecticut in May, 2009. He was inducted into the Upper St. Clair High School Hall of Fame in September, 2002 and the Western Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in May, 2003.



Iowa was 6-1 at home in 2009, with wins over Northern Iowa, Arizona, Arkansas State, Michigan, Indiana and Minnesota and a loss to Northwestern. Iowa is 12-2 at home the last two seasons.

THEY STARTED THEM ALL

Iowa had 10 players start all 13 games in 2009, plus punter Ryan Donahue and PK Daniel Murray. Returning players who started every game a year ago, along with Donahue and Murray, include FB Brett Morse, DE Adrian Clayborn, DT Karl Klug, DT Christian Ballard, DE Broderick Binns, and SS Tyler Sash. Free safety Brett Greenwood started 29 straight games before missing the Northwestern game.

STARTERS RETURNING

Iowa returns six starters on offense, eight on defense and three specialists. The returning starters on offense include: guard Julian Vandervelde, tackle Riley Reiff, receiver Derrell Johnson-Koulianos, quarterback Ricky Stanzi, running back Adam Robinson and fullback Brett Morse (plus part-time starter WR Marvin McNutt).

The defensive starters returning include: ends Adrian Clayborn and Broderick Binns, tackles Christian Ballard and Karl Klug, linebacker Jeremiha Hunter and backs Brett Greenwood, Tyler Sash and Shaun Prater. Punter Ryan Donahue and PK Daniel Murray also return, along with PK Trent Mossbrucker, who used 2009 as a redshirt season after lettering as a freshman in 2008.

RETURNING WITH HONORS

Iowa returns 11 players who earned all-Big Ten honors a year ago. Among those returning, DE Adrian Clayborn and DB Tyler Sash were first team selections by both league coaches and media. WR Derrell Johnson-Koulianos and DB Brett Greenwood were second team selections. Those earning honorable recognition included DT Christian Ballard, DT Karl Klug, P Ryan Donahue, RB Adam Robinson, DE Broderick Binns, QB Ricky Stanzi and PK Daniel Murray.

In addition, Clayborn was the MVP of Iowa's Orange Bowl win and was named national Defensive Performer of the Year by College Football Performance Awards.

Clayborn and Sash are two of four returning defensive players who earned first team all-Big Ten honors a year ago.

HAWKEYES TO WATCH

Eight Hawkeye players have been named to 19 different pre-season "Watch Lists" for individual national awards. Those players include junior DE Broderick Binns (Ted Hendricks, Rotary Lombardi), senior DE Adrian Clayborn (Walter Camp, Ted Hendricks, Chuck Bednarik, Rotary Lombardi, Bronko Nagurski), senior punter Ryan Donahue (Ray Guy), senior WR Johnson-Koulianos (Paul Hornung, Fred Biletnikoff), senior DT Karl Klug (Outland Trophy), senior PK Daniel Murray (Lou Groza), junior DB Tyler Sash (Jim Thorpe, Chuck Bednarik, Lott Trophy, Bronko Nagurski) and senior QB Ricky Stanzi (Maxwell, Davey O'Brien, Manning).

Iowa is one of three programs (joining Oklahoma and Texas) to have five different individual players earn national Player of the Year honors at their position since 2002.

IOWA LIKES STARTING ON OFFENSE

Iowa has started on offense in 113 of its last 130 games. Iowa games vs. Ohio State (11/14/09), Indiana (10/31/09), Purdue (11/15/08), Penn State (11/08/08), Wisconsin (10/10/08), Minnesota (11/10/07), at Northwestern (11/3/07), vs. Michigan State (10/27/07), at Penn State (10/6/07), vs. Iowa State (9/16/06), vs. Minnesota (11/19/05), vs. Michigan (10/22/05), at Purdue (10/8/05), at Minnesota (11/13/04), vs. Purdue (11/6/04), at Miami, OH (9/7/02) and at Michigan State (9/27/03) are the only contests that the Hawkeyes didn't start on offense. Iowa won 13 of those 17 games. Iowa started the game on offense in 115 of 136 games under Kirk Ferentz and 11 of 13 in 2009.

RETURNING STAT LEADERS

Iowa returns several players who enter the 2010 season having already entered their name in the Iowa record books:

- Senior QB Ricky Stanzi ranks ninth in single-season touchdown passes (17 in 2009) and sixth in career scoring passes (31). A year ago, he completed 171-304 attempts for 2,417 yards. His season yardage total ranks 11th best and his career total of 4,373 passing yards ranks sixth. He is seventh in career completions (321), eighth in attempts (562) and sixth in total offense (4,362). Stanzi has led Iowa to an 18-4 record as a starter, including a 10-2 record in Kinnick Stadium and a 10-4 record in Big Ten games. His 18 wins as Iowa's starting quarterback ranks eighth among active Division I quarterbacks heading into the season.
- Senior WR Derrell Johnson-Koulianos has led Iowa in receiving in each of the past three seasons, becoming just the third receiver to accomplish that feat. He had 45 receptions for 750 yards a year ago, improving his career totals to 127 receptions for 1,871 yards and seven touchdowns. He ranks seventh in both career receptions and yards. He also averaged 31.5 yards on 12 KO returns a year ago, including a 99-yard return for a touchdown at Ohio State. He has totaled over 1,000 all-purpose yards in each of his three seasons, including a career-best 1,128 yards in 2009. He has matched Jim Gibbons (1955-57) and Tim Dwight (1995-97) as a receiving leader in three seasons. No Hawkeye has led the team in receiving four years.
- Junior DB Tyler Sash led Iowa with six interceptions in 2009, a total that ties as sixth best in a single season. He tied Iowa's single-game record with three interceptions in a win at Iowa State. His 203 return yards in 2009 are a single-season record and his career total of 350 return yards is a school record. He has 11 career interceptions, which ties for sixth best. His total return yards rank fifth best all-time, in the Big Ten Conference, for all games.
- Junior WR Marvin McNutt had eight touchdown receptions in 2009, which ties for the fourth best total in school history. In his first season as a wide receiver, McNutt had 34 receptions for 674 yards, including the game-winner on the final play of Iowa's win at Michigan State. McNutt (674) and Johnson-Koulianos (750) combined to give Iowa two receivers with over 600 yards for just the ninth time in school history.
- Senior PK Daniel Murray led Iowa in scoring with 89 points in 2009, making 19-26 field goal attempts and 32-33 PATs. His career totals include 32-45 field goals and 62-65 PATs. His 89 points last season tie as 11th best for a single season and he is 13th in career scoring (158 points).

- Sophomore RB Adam Robinson led Iowa's rushing attack with 834 yards in 2009, despite missing all of two games and portions of others. The yardage is the most ever for an Iowa freshman. He rushed for over 100 yards in wins over Arizona and Michigan State. Robinson gained 952 all-purpose yards, a total that ranks fifth best among Iowa freshmen.
- RB Brandon Wegher set an Iowa freshman record with eight rushing touchdowns in 2009, the final score coming in the FedEx Orange Bowl win over Georgia Tech. He rushed 162 times for 641 yards as a true freshman, surpassing 100 yards in three games. His rushing total ranks third best for an Iowa freshman and his all-purpose yardage (967 yards) ranks fourth best.
- Sophomore RB Jewel Hampton rushed 91 times for 463 yards and seven touchdowns as a freshman in 2008 before missing last season due to injury. His rushing total ranks fifth best for an Iowa freshman and his seven touchdowns tied a freshman record that was eclipsed last season by Brandon Wegher. Hampton totaled 1,000 all-purpose yards in 2008, third best among Iowa rookies.

STANZI AMONG VETERAN RETURNING OBS

With 18 wins as Iowa's starting quarterback, senior Ricky Stanzi ranks eighth among returning signal callers in victories. Stanzi trails the following: Andy Dalton, TCU (29), Kellen Moore, Boise State (26), Tyrod Taylor, Virginia Tech (23), Case Keenum, Houston (22), Colin Kaepernick, Nevada (19), Josh Nesbitt, Georgia Tech (19) and Terrell Pryor (19).

AMONG IOWA'S TOP FRESHMEN

Running backs Adam Robinson and Brandon Wegher in 2009 each ranked among Iowa's top freshmen in rushing yards and all-purpose yards. Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series

The Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series is in its seventh season in 2010-11. The series is tied 3-3 in the in-state competition against Iowa State that began in 2004-05. Iowa State captured the Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series a year ago by a 16-11 margin.

Last season, Iowa captured victories in football, women's soccer, wrestling, women's gymnastics and women's tennis. The Cyclones recorded wins in volleyball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's basketball, women's swimming and diving, women's gymnastics and softball.

Iowa captured the inaugural Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series (13-8) in 2004-05 and won again in 2006-07 (13-8) and 2008-09 (21-4). Iowa State won the competition in 2005-06 (13-8) and 2007-08 (18-9) and 2009-10 (16-11).

The 12-event series awards two points (except football, which is worth three) to the winning school in each head-to-head match-up between the two institutions. Additionally, two points are awarded to an institution if the graduation rate of its student-athletes is greater than the national average as reported each fall by the NCAA.

A commemorative Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series Cup, which stands 31 inches tall and weighs 19 pounds, is displayed on the winning team's campus for an entire year after a victory. Replica cups are also presented as "traveling trophies" for individual victorious teams in the head-to-head competition.

Academic Opportunities

Two points for an institution if the student-athlete graduation rate for all student-athletes is greater than the national average for all student-athletes, according to the annual graduation rate report issued each September/October by the NCAA.

HAWKEYE NOTES

- Dating back to 2008, Iowa has won seven of its last eight games away from Iowa City. A six-game streak was snapped in the overtime loss at eighth-ranked Ohio State. The streak included wins at Minnesota, Iowa State, Penn State, Wisconsin and Michigan State, along with a victory over South Carolina in the 2009 Outback Bowl. The road winning streak was the longest for Iowa since the Hawkeyes won all five of their road games during the 2002 regular season. That streak was six straight games away from home, including the 2001 Alamo Bowl. Iowa's five road opponents last season were a combined 26-9 (.743) at home. Outside of the game against Iowa, those five teams were 25-5 (.833) at home.
- Iowa's 2009 win at No. 4/5 ranked Penn State marked Iowa's first road win over a team ranked in the top five since 1990. That season the Hawkeyes scored a 54-28 win at fifth-ranked Illinois. Iowa concluded the 2009 season with a neutral site win over ninth-ranked Georgia Tech in the Orange Bowl.
- Iowa has won nine straight games over the last three seasons with a trophy on the line. The current streak began with a win over Minnesota in 2007 for possession of Floyd of Rosedale. Iowa also won the battle for Floyd in both 2008 and 2009, along with earning the Cy-Hawk (Iowa State) and Heartland (Wisconsin) trophies the last two seasons. The streak includes wins in the 2009 Outback and 2010 FedEx Orange bowls.
- For the second straight year, Iowa will face two teams that have former Hawkeye players as their head coach. Bret Bielema (1989-92) is the head coach at Wisconsin and Mike Stoops (1981, 1983-84) is the head coach at Arizona. Iowa defeated Arizona 27-17 last Sept. 19 in Iowa City and defeated Wisconsin 20-10 Oct. 17 in Madison. Both Stoops and Bielema led their teams to bowl games in 2009.
- Iowa, in 2009, won four games by three points or less for the first time ever in a single season. Iowa was 4-1 in 2009 when trailing after three periods and 1-1 when tied after three quarters. Iowa blocked two field goal attempts in the final seconds of a win over Northern Iowa and scored on the final play in a win at Michigan State. The Hawkeyes lost at Ohio State in overtime.
- Iowa played four games under the lights in 2009 and won all four. Iowa won at Penn State (21-10 on ABC national) in its first night contest. The Hawkeyes defeated Michigan 30-28 in Kinnick Stadium on Oct. 10, also on ABC national television. The 15-13 win at Michigan State (Oct. 24) was televised by the Big Ten Network. Iowa defeated Georgia Tech 24-14 in the Orange Bowl, with FOX televising to a national audience. Iowa has won six straight night games since a 2006 home loss to Ohio State.

PROGRAM NOTES

- Iowa is one of eight college football programs in the nation to compete in six January bowl games over the last eight seasons. Iowa's 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl marked the second BCS bowl appearance since 2002 and fifth win in a January bowl game since 2003.
- Iowa has been bowl eligible in each of the last nine seasons. The Hawkeyes have played in eight bowl games since 2001. Iowa played in the 2001 Alamo Bowl, 2003 Orange Bowl, 2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2006 Outback Bowl, 2006 Alamo Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl and 2010 Orange Bowl.
- Iowa earned Big Ten Conference championships in 2002 and 2004 and placed second in 2009.
- Iowa has ranked in the top 10 in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today coaches polls in four of the past eight seasons, including a ranking of seventh in both polls at the conclusion of the 2009 season. Iowa ranked eighth in 2002, 2003 and 2004 and the Hawkeyes were also 20th in 2008.
- Iowa established a school record with 11 wins in 2002 (11-2) and matched that record in 2009. Iowa, in 2009, won 10 regular season games for just the fourth time in school history.

- Iowa won 10 or more games in three consecutive years (2002-04) for first time in school history.
- Iowa has compiled an eight-year record of 70-31 (.693), 2002-09, second best in the Big Ten. The 70 victories tie as the 16th best total in the nation.
- Iowa has posted a 42-22 Big Ten record from 2002-09, which ranks second among league teams over the last eight seasons.
- Kirk Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year three times (2002, 2004 & 2009) and he was named National Coach of the Year in 2002. Ferentz joins Michigan's Bo Schembechler (four) and Penn State's Joe Paterno (three) as the only coaches to be honored in more than two seasons.
- With five bowl victories, Kirk Ferentz ranks fifth all-time among Big Ten Conference coaches in bowl wins.
- Four of Iowa's five bowl wins under Coach Kirk Ferentz have been in January. Under Ferentz, the Hawkeyes have bowl wins over teams from the Southeastern (three), Big 12 and Atlantic Coast conferences.
- Iowa is one of 11 Division I programs to have the same full-time coaching staff for a third straight year or more in 2010. The others include Baylor, Indiana, Navy, Nebraska, North Carolina State, Penn State, Alabama-Birmingham, Vanderbilt, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest.
- Iowa has had national award winners in: Robert Gallery (2003 Outland, Top Lineman); Brad Banks (2002 Davey O'Brien, Top Quarterback; 2002 Associated Press National Player of the Year); Dallas Clark (2002 Mackey, Top Tight End); Nate Kaeding (2002 Groza, Top Kicker); Shonn Greene (2008 Doak Walker, Top Running Back). Iowa is one of three football programs (joining Oklahoma and Texas) to have five different individual players earn national Player of the Year honors at their position since 2002.

LOOKING BACK AT 2009

- Iowa's 11 wins in 2009 equal (2002) the program record for victories in a season. The regular season win total of 10 was achieved for only the fourth time. For the first time ever, the Hawkeyes won the first nine games of a season. And, for the sixth time in eight years, Iowa played in a January bowl game. And, more importantly, Iowa won a BCS caliber bowl game for the first time since 1959.
- The Hawkeyes finished the 2009 season with an 11-2 overall record and a 6-2 Big Ten mark, good enough for a second place tie with Penn State. The Hawkeyes have won at least nine games for the fifth time in the last eight years and it's the seventh time in school history the program has won 10 games or more.
- Iowa concluded the season ranked seventh by the Associated Press and in the *USA Today* coaches poll. The ranking is Iowa's highest at the end of a season since 1960 when the Hawkeyes were ranked third. Iowa ranked eighth nationally at the conclusion of the 2002, 2003 and 2004 seasons, giving the Hawkeyes four top 10 rankings over the last eight seasons. Iowa was ninth in the BCS Standings prior to the bowl season.
- Iowa ranked ninth in the final BCS rankings prior to the bowl season. Iowa was ranked as high as fourth earlier in the season, its highest BCS ranking ever. The Hawkeyes were ranked fifth during the final three weeks of the 2002 season. The BCS rankings are a combination of the Harris Interactive poll, the USA Today coaches poll and computer rankings.
- The Big Ten Conference led all conferences with four teams ranked among the top 16 and three among the top 10 in the final Associated Press poll. The SEC was the only other conference with multiple teams (two) in the final top 10.
- DE Adrian Clayborn was named the Most Valuable Player in Iowa's 24-14 win over Georgia Tech in the FedEx Orange Bowl. Clayborn recorded nine solo tackles as the Hawkeye defense held the Yellow Jackets to just 155 yards total offense.
- Iowa won four games by three points or less for the first time ever in 2009. The two Iowa losses were by seven and three points in overtime. Iowa won three games by three points or less in 2004, 1987 and 1986.

- Iowa opened the season with nine straight wins for the first time ever. The Hawkeyes won their first seven games on the way to the 1985 Big Ten title. Iowa also won its first seven games in 1900, 1921 and 1922.
- Iowa's regular season strength of schedule rated 27th strongest in the nation. Iowa's 12 opponents compiled a 77-61 (.558) record. Including its Orange Bowl win, Iowa was 8-2 against bowl eligible opponents.
- Iowa collected 30 turnovers, including 21 pass interceptions, in 2009. Iowa tied for fifth in the nation in interceptions and tied for 11th in total turnovers. The Hawkeyes had 23 interceptions in 2008.
- Iowa committed 28 turnovers, with 17 of those taking place in the seven home games. Iowa committed 11 turnovers in six road games.
- Nine of Iowa's opponents scored 17 points or less, including a shutout win over Minnesota. Two of four opponents who scored over 20 points were aided by a defensive touchdown.
- Iowa had eight players earn Big Ten Player of the Week honors in seven games.

IOWA JOINS ANOTHER TOP 20

Iowa has 70 wins since the start of the 2002 season, which ties as the 16th highest total in Division I football. The list includes the following: Boise State (93); USC (91); Texas (89); Ohio State (87); Oklahoma (86); LSU (81); Georgia (82); Virginia Tech (80); TCU (79); Florida (80); West Virginia (75); Utah (74); Boston College (72); Auburn (72); Wisconsin (71); IOWA (70); Texas Tech (70); Miami, FL (69), Penn State (67) and California (67).

BEST DECADE FOR IOWA FOOTBALL

Iowa's football record in the 2000 decade was 80-45 (.640), a record that ranks as the best decade in Iowa football history, based on total wins. Iowa posted a record of 77-40-4 (.652) during the 1980's and the Hawkeyes were 62-53-2 (.538) in the 1990's.

Part of the Hawkeye success is due to the stability in the program, as Iowa has had just two head coaches since 1979. Hayden Fry took over prior to the 1979 season and coached through the 1998 season, posting a record of 143-89-6. Current Coach Kirk Ferentz replaced Fry, leading the program for the last 11 seasons. Ferentz also served as Iowa's offensive line coach from 1981-89 under Fry.

In a January, 2010 release, espn.com ranked Big Ten programs over the last decade in the following order: Ohio State, Iowa, Michigan, Penn State, Wisconsin, Purdue, Northwestern, Minnesota, Michigan State, Illinois and Indiana. Factors such as Big Ten titles, BCS bowl appearances, bowl record and number of losing seasons played a role in the rankings.

LOOKING AT THE NUMBERS

Among Big Ten teams, Iowa and Michigan lead the way with eight returning defensive starters, while Illinois returns seven.

Among returning Big Ten players, DE Adrian Clayborn ranks second in QB sacks in 2009 (11.5), while DE Broderick Binns (6.5) ranks fourth.

Among returning players, Iowa's Tyler Sash had the most interceptions (six) a year ago.

Iowa's defensive unit last season held five of 13 opponents to their lowest scoring output of the season. Those teams included Iowa State (3), Wisconsin (10), Michigan State (13), Minnesota (zero) and Georgia Tech (14).

Among returning Big Ten players, Iowa's Derrell Johnson-Koulianos leads all receivers with 1,871 career receiving yards.

Iowa's roster includes three players who have over 450 career rushing yards, including Adam Robinson (834 yards in 2009), Brandon Wegher (641 yards in 2009) and Jewel Hampton (463 yards in 2008). Only three times in school history has Iowa had two running back surpass 1,000 career rushing yards in the same season. That took place in 1992 (Lew Montgomery and Marvin Lampkin), 1987 (Kevin Harmon and David Hudson) and 1983 (Norm Granger and Owen Gill).

Iowa's depth chart for the opening contest includes 15 players who originally joined the program as a walk-on. That includes six players on offense, five defense and four specialists. The list includes OL Matt Tobin, OL Kyle Haganman, OL Josh Koeppel, RB Paki O'Meara, WR Don Nordman, OL Woody Orne, DL Thomas Nardo, DB Brett Greenwood, DB Kyle Steinbrecker, DB Tom Donatell, DB Nick Nielsen, PK Daniel Murray, P Eric Guthrie, PK Michael Meyer and LS Andrew Schulze.

BIG PLAY HAWKEYES

Iowa had 45 pass plays and 10 rushing attempts over 20 yards in 2009. Iowa's defense allowed 26 offensive plays (19 passing, seven rushing) of 20 yards or more in 13 games.

IOWA BY QUARTERS

Iowa outscored its opponents 71-54 in the first period, but was outscored 65-48 in the second period a year ago. Iowa held a 61-16 margin in the third period and a 121-62 margin in the fourth period. Iowa was outscored 3-0 in its only overtime game.

Iowa had a 182-78 advantage in second half scoring, including 114-44 in eight Big Ten games.

ON THE AVERAGE

In 2009 Iowa averaged 5.6 yards on first down, 4.5 yards on second down, 5.7 yards on third down and 0.5 yards on fourth down.

AVERAGE SCORING DRIVES

Iowa's 51 scoring drives averaged 6.8 plays, 55.1 yards and 3:18 in elapsed time.

Iowa's opponents had 27 scoring drives, averaging 9.7 plays, 58 yards and 4:11 in elapsed time.

For the season, 15 opponent possessions started on Iowa's side of the field, with 12 of those 15 taking place in the last five games.

IOWA IN THE RED ZONE

Iowa was 32-38 in the red zone (20 touchdowns) in 2009. Iowa failed to score from the red zone at the end of the 35-3 win at Iowa State, missed a field goal vs. Arkansas State and Ohio State and turned the ball over on downs vs. Michigan, Wisconsin and Georgia Tech. The Hawkeyes scored on 63 of their last 69 red zone possessions (39 TDs and 24 FGs) dating back to the Michigan State game in 2008. Iowa is 44-49 combined inside the red zone in its last 16 games.

Iowa's opponents in 2009 were 24-29 in the red zone, with 14 touchdowns and 10 field goals.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Iowa scored 87 points (11 TDs, four FGs) following 31 opponent turnovers in 2009 (21 interceptions, nine fumbles, one blocked punt). Iowa has recorded at least one takeaway in 44 of its last 48 games, dating back to the 2006 campaign. Iowa collected at least one turnover in 20 consecutive games before collecting no turnovers in the win at Michigan State.

Iowa was guilty of 28 turnovers (20 interceptions, eight fumbles). Iowa opponents scored 61 points (seven touchdowns, four field goals) following those turnovers. Four interceptions were returned for touchdowns and Northwestern recovered a fumble in the end zone for a touchdown.

HAWKEYES ON THE TUBE

All Iowa football games this season will be televised on either ABC, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU or the Big Ten Network. The last Iowa contest not televised was vs. Minnesota on Nov. 17, 2001. Iowa has appeared on television in its last 103 games. Iowa will play night games against Arizona (9:30 p.m. CT, ESPN) and Penn State (7 p.m., ABC/ESPN) and late afternoon games (2:30 p.m. CT) against Iowa State and Michigan (ABC).

BIG TEN MEDIA CENTER

The conference office has a Big Ten football media center on bigten.org, providing a single site for media to access information on every Big Ten football program.

The media center includes downloadable PDFs of media guides for the conference and every school, weekly releases, statistics, player of the week selections, information on the weekly coaches teleconference (along with links to the live and archived audio) and more. In addition, it features schedules broken down by school and week, which will include game notes for each team, final stats and game recaps. Every Big Ten school also has an individual page containing information on the football contact, media guides and schedules.

WATCHING FROM ABOVE

Iowa's coaches in the press box are Lester Erb (running back and special teams), along with quality control Scott Southmayd and graduate assistant coaches David Raih and Charlie Bullen. That leaves Ken O'Keefe (offensive coordinator), Erik Campbell (receivers and tight ends), Phil Parker (defensive backs), Reese Morgan (offensive line), Darrell Wilson (linebackers and special teams), Rick Kaczynski (defensive line) and Eric Johnson (assistant linebackers) on the sidelines.

Due to health reasons, Defensive Coordinator Norm Parker coached from the press box in Iowa's final four regular season games in 2009 and is expected to be in the box again this year.

ROSE BOWL EXPERIENCE

Four members of the Iowa coaching staff have coached or played in the Rose Bowl. Kirk Ferentz coached in two Rose Bowl games while on the Iowa staff. Norm Parker and Phil Parker both coached in the Rose Bowl while on the staff at Michigan State. Erik Campbell played in one Rose Bowl during his Michigan career and coached in four others while on the Wolverine coaching staff.

HOME GROWN HAWKEYES

Iowa's roster of 122 players includes 55 players from Iowa. The roster includes 14 players from Illinois; 13 from Ohio; five from Minnesota and Missouri; four from Florida; three from Maryland and Wisconsin; two from Indiana, Michigan, Nebraska, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, South Dakota and Texas; one from Georgia, Kansas, Massachusetts and Montana and one from Australia and Canada.

MORE THAN ONE

Seventeen high schools have contributed more than one player to the current Iowa football roster. The leader is Iowa City High (Iowa) with seven. Those with three include Washington HS in Cedar Rapids; Regina HS in Iowa City; Humboldt HS; and Glenville (Ohio). Twelve other high schools have two players on the roster, with five of those 12 in Iowa.

BROTHER ACT

Iowa has three sets of brothers on the roster. That includes A.J. and Zach Derby from Iowa City, Nick and Tyler Nielsen from Humboldt and Broderick and Marcus Binns from St. Paul, MN. A.J. and Zach's father, John, was an Iowa linebacker (1988-91).

THE NAME GAME

James is the most popular first name on the Iowa roster, with that list including Ferentz, Hurt, Morris, Vandenberg and Jim Poggi. There are four named John (John Chelf and Wienke, Jonathan Gimm, Jonny Mullings); Marcus/Markus (Binns, Coker, Kloos, Zusevics) and Mike/Michael (Daniels, Hardy, Meyer and Stoeker). In addition, four players use initials, including A.J. Derby, B.J. Lowery, C.J. Fiedorowicz and T.J. Fisher.

There are three Brett's (Greenwood, Morse, Van Sloten); three Joe's (Audlehelm, Forgy and Gaglione); three Jordan's (Bernstine, Cotton and Price); and three named Thomas/Tom/Tommy (Gaul, Nardo and Donatell).

There are two named Adam (Gettis and Robinson); Andrew/Andy (Donnal and Schulze); Anthony (Ferguson, Jr. and Hitchens); Brad (Herman and Rogers); Brandon (Scherff and Wegher); Casey (Kreiter and McMillan); Christian (Ballard and Kirksey); Colin/Collin (Sandeman and Sleeper); Don (Nordman and Shumpert); Kyle (Haganman and Steinbrecher); Matt/Matthew (Meyers and Tobin); Nick (Kuchel and Nielsen); Steve/Steven (Bigach and Staggs); Tyler (Nielsen and Sash) and Zach (Derby and Furlong).

THE HAWKEYES. SIZE WISE

The three lightest Hawkeye players, weighing 170 pounds, include junior WR Paul Chaney, Jr., freshman WR John Chelf and freshman QB Evan McMillan. Freshman OL Brandon Scherff is the heaviest at 310 pounds. A total of eight Hawkeye players are listed over 300 pounds.

The tallest players, at 6-7, are freshman OL Andrew Donnal, freshman TE C.J. Fiedorowicz, sophomore OL Brett Van Sloten and freshman TE Austin View. The shortest player, at 5-8, is freshman De'Andre Johnson.

The average Hawkeye player is 6-2 and weighs 233 pounds. That is the exact same height and two pounds heavier than the average Iowa player in 2009.

HAWKEYES RANK HIGH IN GRADUATION RATES

The Iowa Hawkeyes were among the nation's leaders in academic success for college football teams that competed in bowl games following the 2008 season.

Iowa ranked 16th in graduation rate for its football student-athletes, according to data collected by the NCAA among the 68 college football teams that participated in the 34 college football bowl games.

Iowa's graduation rate of 75% ranked third among teams that appeared in the 2008 final top 25 rankings.

A year ago, Iowa's GSR of 74% ranked second among the 10 teams that competed in 2010 BCS bowl games.

The graduation rate for Iowa's 2009 nationally ranked football program was 67 percent for the second consecutive year. The national average was 55 percent.

THREE HAWKEYES EARN ACADEMIC HONORS

In 2008, three Iowa players were named to the ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA District Seven first all-academic team.

Under Kirk Ferentz in the last 11 years, 15 Hawkeye players have combined to earn academic all-America honors on 28 occasions. Four players, DL Aaron Kampman, OL Andy Lightfoot, LB Mike Klinkenborg and DB Adam Shada, were three-time honorees. Current senior Julian Vandervelde earned regional honors in each of the past two seasons.

Iowa, in 2006, was the only Division I program in the nation to have three players earn first team academic all-America recognition. In addition, Iowa players have been honored 130 times over the past 10 seasons with academic all-Big Ten recognition.
