THE SETTING

Iowa (7-6) meets Cornell University (4-5) Saturday, Dec. 30 in its final non-conference game of the season. Game time is 12:05 p.m. in Carver-Hawkeye Arena (15,500).

Iowa defeated Texas Southern 90-63 Dec. 23 at home in its last action. The Hawkeyes have won five of their last seven games. Cornell lost to Albany 78-75 at home on Dec. 22 in its last outing.

ON THE AIR

Radio: Iowa games are broadcast on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Brent Balbinot will handle the play-by-play, along with color commentator Bob Hansen. The Hawkeye Radio Network coverage includes a 60-minute pre-game show.

Television: ESPN Regional will carry the game to a network of stations that includes KGAN Cedar Rapids, KDSM Des Moines, KWQC Quad Cities, KYOU Ottumwa, Metro Sports, Kansas City, MO, Sportsnet New York (tape-delayed) and cable systems throughout the state of Iowa, including Council Bluffs-Omaha, Rochester-Mason City and Sioux City. The game can also be viewed as part of ESPN's Full Court package. Larry Morgan and Mac McCausland will call the action.

IOWA HISTORY

Iowa has played 2,390 games since beginning basketball in 1902. Overall Iowa's record is 1,428-962 (.597). That includes an 894-307 (.744) record in home games, a 534-655 (.449) record in games away from Iowa City, a 675-658 (.506) mark in Big Ten games and a 300-81 (.787) record in Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

IOWA IN CARVER-HAWKEYE ARENA

Iowa has compiled a 300-81 (.787) record in Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Iowa is 140-67 (.676) in Big Ten games and 160-14 (.920) in non-Big Ten games. Iowa has drawn over 5.4 million fans for men's basketball games since the arena opened in 1983. Iowa has posted a 92-26 (.780) home record under Coach Steve Alford, including a 57-5 (.919) mark in non-conference home games. Iowa has won 24 of its last 25 home games. Two of the five non-conference home losses came in the National Invitation Tournament.

START TIME CHANGE FOR SATURDAY

Saturday's home game vs. Cornell University will start at 12:05 p.m. Originally scheduled for 7:05 p.m., the game time has been moved to avoid a conflict with the Iowa football team's appearance in the 2006 Alamo Bowl. The Hawkeyes meet Texas in the Alamo Bowl Saturday at 3:30 p.m.

Coach Steve Alford

Steve Alford (pronounced ALL-ford) is in his eighth season as head coach at the University of Iowa and his 16th season as a college head coach. Alford holds a career record of 298-175 (.630), including a 142-98 (.592) record at Iowa, a 78-29 (.729) record in four seasons (1992-95) at Div. III Manchester College and a four-year record (1996-99) of 78-48 (.619) at Southwest Missouri State. Alford ranks third among Iowa's head basketball coaches in career wins. Alford's 298 career victories are the most in the nation among all head coaches who are 42-years old or younger.



Alford has posted a 13-5 record in the Big Ten Conference Tournament, leading the Hawkeyes to the tournament title in both 2001 and 2006. His total wins and winning percentage in the event rank tops among all Big Ten coaches. Alford is 52-60 (.464) in Big Ten games after leading Iowa to a second place finish (11-5) in the 2006 regular season. Alford is 8-7 in the NCAA Tournament (3-4 in Div. I and 5-3 in Div. III) and 2-4 in the NIT.

Alford is the only Iowa coach to lead his Hawkeye teams to six consecutive winning seasons. Iowa has advanced to post-season action in each of the past six years and the Hawkeyes have won 20 or more games in three of his seven seasons. Alford led Iowa into the second round of the 2001 NCAA Tournament in his second season and the Hawkeyes returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2005 and 2006. Iowa advanced to the NIT in 2002, 2003 and 2004.

Alford led Southwest Missouri State to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 1999 and in 1995 Manchester advanced to the NCAA championship game before suffering its first defeat of the season.

Alford is a 1987 graduate of Indiana, where he led the Hoosiers to the 1987 NCAA title. Alford was a member of the 1984 U. S. Olympic team that earned the Gold Medal and he was the 26th player selected in the NBA Draft following his senior season. Alford played four seasons in the NBA before beginning his coaching career.

At Indiana, Alford started 120 of 125 games in four seasons. He served as team captain in 1987 when the Hoosiers were 30-4. Steve concluded his college career as Indiana's all-time scoring leader with 2,438 points and he holds the Indiana record for career steals with 178. He was a consensus first team All-American and the Big Ten MVP as a senior.

Alford is a member of the Manchester College M Association Hall of Fame and the Indiana University Athletics Hall of Fame. In 2001 he was named one of the "Top 50 Athletes" in the history of the state of Indiana and was selected as a member of the 15-man Indiana University all-Century team. In 2004 he was one of five players selected to ESPN's Big Ten Conference Silver Anniversary team.

Alford has not coached against Cornell or Big Red Coach Steve Donahue.

HALUKSA NAMED PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Adam Haluska is the Big Ten Player of the Week after leading Iowa to two victories last week, a 101-59 decision over Georgia State and a 90-63 win over Texas Southern.

Haluska scored a career-high 36 points in the win over Georgia State, hitting 13-19 field goals, including 6-11 three-pointers. He also had four assists and two steals. The 36 points matches the most ever scored by an Iowa player in Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

Haluska added 21 points and four rebounds in the win over Texas Southern. In the two games Haluska shot 57.1% (20-35) from the field, 50% (8-16) from three-point range and 90% (9-10) from the free throw line. Haluska leads the Big Ten and ranks among national leaders in free throw percentage (91.8%).

Haluska, who currently ranks third in the Big Ten in scoring (19.5 ppg), was also named Player of the Week on Jan. 30, 2006 after leading Iowa to home wins over Indiana and Ohio State. Along with his scoring, Haluska ranks among Big Ten leaders in five additional statistical categories.

Haluska has started all 111 games during his four-year career, a streak that ranks longest in the nation among active players. He has scored 1,478 career points, including 1,194 in his three seasons at Iowa. He ranks 17th in career scoring.

ALFORD THIRD IN CAREER WINS

Coach Steve Alford has collected 142 victories as Iowa's head coach, a total that ranks third on Iowa's list of coaches in career wins. With Iowa's win over Iowa State, Alford moved past Rollie Williams (139) for third place on Iowa's career win list behind Tom Davis (269) and Lute Olson (168).

Davis coached the Hawkeyes from 1987-99, Olson was the Iowa coach from 1975-83 and Williams coached the Hawkeyes from 1930-42 and in 1950-51. Following is a list of Alford's significant career victories:

CORNELL COACH STEVE DONAHUE

Steve Donahue is in his seventh season as a college head coach, all at Cornell University. Donahue holds a career record of 58-106. Donahue has led Cornell to 13 wins in each of the last two seasons, placing second in the Ivy League in 2005 and third last season.

Prior to joining the Cornell staff, Donahue served as an assistant coach at Pennsylvania from 1990-2000, helping that school post a record of 182-90 while earning five NCAA Tournament berths in 10 seasons. Donahue was also an assistant coach for two seasons at Philadelphia Textile (NCAA Div. II), helping that team post a 44-14 mark from 1988-90.

Donahue has not coached against Iowa or Hawkeye Coach Steve Alford.

THE SERIES

Iowa holds a 2-0 series advantage, with both previous meetings taking place in tournament action.

Iowa defeated Cornell 73-68 in December, 1957 in the first round of the Queen City Tournament in Buffalo, NY. The Hawkeyes defeated Syracuse to win that tournament.

Iowa defeated Cornell 59-56 in overtime in the consolation bracket of the Rainbow Classic early in the 1984-85 season. Iowa lost to Maryland, also in overtime, in the first round of the Rainbow before defeating Cornell and Arkansas to win the consolation bracket. Here are the series results:

IOWA, CORNELL NOTES

- Iowa is 10-1 all-time against current members of the Ivy League. Along with two wins over Cornell, the Hawkeyes have played Brown (1-0), Dartmouth (2-0), Harvard (1-0), Penn (2-1) and Princeton (2-0).
- Cornell holds an all-time mark of 11-29 against members of the Big Ten Conference, having played all but Indiana and Wisconsin. The Big Red recorded a 64-61 win at Northwestern to begin the current season.
- Cornell senior center Andrew Naeve is a native of Miles, IA who attended East Central HS as a prep. The Cornell roster also includes players from Indiana, Kansas, Minnesota, Nebraska and Ohio.
- Mark Vershaw is in his first season as an assistant coach at Cornell. Vershaw had a stellar playing career at Wisconsin, where he led the team in scoring as a junior when the Badgers advanced to the Final Four. Vershaw helped Wisconsin post a 5-2 record vs. Iowa during his playing career.
- Cornell President Dr. David Skorton, in his first year in Ithaca, previously served as the President of the University of Iowa.

SMITH AMONG FRESHMAN LEADERS

Iowa's Tyler Smith ranks high among freshmen in the Big Ten in nearly all statistical categories. He is first in scoring (15.4), second in assists (3.4), third in steals (1.4), fifth in rebounding (4.5), eighth in three-point FG% (.381), 12th in field goal percentage (.482) and 15th in free throw percentage (.694). In free throw percentage, Smith is the only freshman in the league who meets the NCAA minimum of two made per game.

HENDERSON BACK IN ACTION

Senior guard Mike Henderson, who missed Iowa's first seven games after suffering a hand injury in practice on Oct. 30, saw his first action of the season in Iowa's win over Coppin State on Dec. 2. Henderson suffered a fracture to the pinkie finger on his right hand and underwent surgery two days later. Henderson had the cast removed Nov. 27 before playing eight minutes vs. Coppin State and 11 minutes vs. Northern Iowa. Henderson scored eight points in 15 minutes vs. Iowa State and played 26 minutes in the loss at Drake. He returned to the starting line-up for the first time vs. Georgia State and had a career-high nine assists and eight points. He added nine points, nine assists and three steals in the most recent win over Texas Southern.

Henderson (6-3, 200), a Waterloo, IA native, started all 34 games a year ago. He averaged 7.6 points and 3.9 rebounds per outing while shooting 46.4% from three-point range. He earned the team "Most Improved Award" at the conclusion of the season.

As a junior Henderson scored in double figures in 11 games. He matched a career-high with 17 points in a win at Purdue and scored 16 points vs. Michigan State in the Big Ten Tournament and in a home win over Penn State. Henderson added 15 points and seven rebounds in an early season win over ninth-ranked Kentucky as Iowa was 11-0 when he scored in double figures.

IOWA NOTES

- As a team, Iowa leads the Big Ten Conference and ranks 15th in the nation in free throw percentage, making 77.3% (174-225) of its attempts. Individually, Adam Haluska is shooting 91.8% (51-55) from the line to rank 21st.

History & Record Book Online

Iowa's History and Record Book, the supplement to the 2006-07 basketball media guide, is available online at hawkeyesports.com, the official website of the University of Iowa athletic department. - Iowa completed a five-game road swing in November that saw the Hawkeyes travel nearly 8,000 miles while competing in the Paradise Jam in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands, along with playing single games at Arizona State and Virginia Tech. Iowa has played in four different time zones (Atlantic, Eastern, Central, Mountain). This marks the first time since early in the 2000-01 season that Iowa has played five straight games away from home. Like this season, that five-game stretch in 2000-01 also included three games at a neutral site (Rainbow Classic). Iowa's longest consecutive road game streak under Steve Alford occurred in 1999-00 when the Hawkeyes played at Northern Iowa, Iowa State, Missouri and Drake, winning two of the four.
- Iowa shot a season-best 89.2% (33-37) from the free throw line in the most recent win over Texas Southern. The made free throws and the free throw attempts are the most for Iowa since the Hawkeyes converted 32-42 in a home loss to Michigan State on 2/5/05.
- Iowa has already played seven opponents from six of the stronger leagues in the nation, including the Atlantic Coast (Virginia Tech), Big East (Villanova), Big 12 (Iowa State), Missouri Valley (Drake & Northern Iowa), Pac-10 (Arizona State) and Southeastern (Alabama).
- Senior guard Adam Haluska has started all 111 games in his career, a streak that ranks as the longest in the nation among current players.
- Senior guard Adam Haluska was recently named one of 50 candidates named to the pre-season Watch List for the Naismith Award, which goes annually to the Player of the Year.
- With 18 points in Iowa's loss to Villanova, Adam Haluska became the 39th Hawkeye player to surpass 1,000 career points. Haluska is in his third season at Iowa and has 1,194 points to rank 17th on Iowa's career list. His career total, including one season at Iowa State, stands at 1,478.
- Freshman Tyler Smith was named to the all-tournament team at the Paradise Jam. Smith scored in double figures in all three games. He led Iowa to its win over Toledo on the first round, collecting 28 points, six rebounds and five assists. Smith added 19 points in the loss to 10th-ranked Alabama and 13 points in the loss to Villanova.

IOWA WIN'S HAWKEYE CHALLENGE

Iowa once again claimed the title of its own Hawkeye Challenge, defeating Texas-Pan American 62-46 in the first round and Coppin State 83-67 in the title game. Iowa has won its own invitational 24 times in the 25 year history of the event.

Senior guard Adam Haluska claimed Most Valuable Player honors, while junior Justin Johnson and freshman Tyler Smith were also named to the all-tournament team.

HAWKEYE TIDBITS

- Four Hawkeye opponents (Alabama, Villanova, Arizona State, Drake) have shot better than 50% from the field. In 34 games a year ago, Iowa allowed just three opponents to shoot as well as 50% from the field. Those were road games at Michigan State, Purdue and Minnesota, with Iowa losing two of the three. Iowa is 4-12 over the past four seasons when its opponent shoots 50% or better from the field.
- Iowa is 3-0 when scoring 80 points or more, 3-0 when scoring between 70-80 points, 1-4 when scoring between 60-70 points and 0-2 when scoring less than 60 points.
- Iowa is 4-1 when holding its opponent to less than 60 points, 3-2 when holding its opponent between 60-70 points and 0-3 when the opponent scores over 70 points.
- Iowa is 6-2 when collecting more assists than the opponent and 1-4 when the opponent has more assists.
- Iowa is 6-4 when having fewer turnovers than its opponent and 1-2 when the opponent has fewer turnovers.
- Iowa is 4-3 when collecting more steals than its opponent, 1-3 when the opponent has more steals and 2-0 when steals are equal.
- Iowa has had four players score in double figures in one game (Toledo) and three players score in double figures in nine games. Iowa is 1-0 when four reach double figures, 5-4 with three score in double figures and 0-3 with two players in double figures.
- Iowa is 7-2 when leading at halftime and 0-4 when trailing at intermission.
- Iowa is 3-3 when controlling the opening tip and 4-3 when not controlling the tip.
- Iowa is 0-3 in games decided by 10 points, including a 0-3 record in games decided by five points or less.

OVERCOMING DEFICITS

The biggest deficit Iowa has overcome to get a victory is six points, that vs. Toledo.

The biggest deficit overcome by an Iowa opponent is 13 points, that by Northern Iowa.

SCORING BY HALVES

Iowa has outscored its opponents 443-369 in the first half and 486-472 in the second half. Iowa has led at halftime in nine games and the Hawkeyes have outscored their opponent in the second half in nine games.

IOWA SHOOTS PAST TEXAS SOUTHERN

Iowa jumped to an early lead and never looked back in taking a 90-63 win over Texas Southern in Iowa City. The Hawkeyes shot 50% from the field in the opening half, building a 49-27 advantage by intermission. The Hawkeyes led 10-4 after three minutes and built the margin to 21-6 after eight minutes. Along with shooting well to start the game, Iowa held Texas Southern to 37.9% shooting from the field in the first half and forced 13 turnovers.

The visitors scored the first basket of the second half, but would get no closer than 20 points the rest of the way. Iowa shot just 32% from the field in the second half, but made up for the cool shooting from the field with a solid afternoon at the free throw line. For the game the Hawkeyes hit 33-37 (89.2%) free throws, including 23-25 attempts in the second half.

The Iowa defense remained strong throughout the contest. Texas Southern was guilty of 24 turnovers as the Hawkeye defense collected 11 steals. Iowa also had a season-low nine turnovers in the game.

Freshman Tyler Smith led Iowa's scoring with 25 points, including 17 in the first half as the Hawkeyes were breaking the game open. Smith hit 8-15 field goals, including 4-5 three-point shots. Adam Haluska added 21 points and Seth Gorney matched a career-high with 10. Kurt Looby led the Hawkeyes with six rebounds and Mike Henderson matched his career-high for the second straight game with nine assists.

CORNELL FALLS TO ALBANY

Albany shot 63.6% from the field in the second half in taking a 78-73 win at Cornell last Friday. Cornell used a perfect half from the foul line (12-12) to take a 34-32 lead at halftime after trailing by as many as nine points early in the half. Albany came out shooting in the second half, connecting on 14-22 field goal attempts. Albany shot 50% (3-6) from three-point range and 75% (15-20) from the free throw line over the final 20 minutes as well.

Cornell freshman guard Louis Dale scored seven straight points late in the game to give his team a 68-66 advantage with 3:29 remaining before Albany rallied. Cornell got within one point in the final minute before two Albany free throws left the final margin at three after a Cornell three-point shot at the end was off target.

Cornell shot 49% from the field and 89.5% (17-19) from the free throw line, but lost the rebounding battle by a 32-24 margin. Dale led the Big Red with 22 points. Ryan Wittman added 20 and Graham Dow scored 12. Iowa native Andrew Naeve led Cornell with nine rebounds and three blocked shots.

HALUSKA NAMED CAPTAIN

Senior Adam Haluska is Iowa's 2006-07 team captain. Haluska is a native of Carroll, IA who has started every game for the Hawkeyes over the past three seasons. A year ago he earned third team all-Big Ten recognition.

Haluska averaged 13.9 points and 4.7 rebounds last season. He has scored 1,478 career points, including 1,194 with the Hawkeyes. He was named the tournament MVP in Iowa's Hawkeye Challenge after scoring 31 points and collecting nine rebounds and nine assists in the title game. His 36 points in a win over Georgia State match the most ever scored by an Iowa player in Carver-Hawkeye Arena and he was named Big Ten Player of the Week after leading Iowa to wins over Georgia State and Texas Southern.

Through 13 games Haluska ranks among Big Ten leaders in six statistical categories, including free throw percentage (1st), three-point field goals per game (2nd), scoring (3rd), steals (9th), assists (14th) and assist/turnover ratio (11th).

- Named the recipient of the 2006-07 Anson Mount Scholar/Athlete Award. The award is presented by Playboy Magazine and recognizes a student-athlete who excels in the classroom and on the court. The magazine will donate \$5,000 to the University of Iowa general scholarship fund.
- Named to pre-season all-Big Ten team, as selected by vote of media representatives attending Big Ten Conference Basketball Media Day.
- One of 50 players named to the pre-season Watch List for the John R. Wooden all-America team.
- One of 50 players named to the pre-season Watch List for the Naismith Award, which goes each year to the national Player of the Year.

Hawkeyes Add Three Recruits

Iowa basketball has signed three recruits, all high school seniors, to join the program next season.

Those players include guard Dairese Gary from Concord HS in Elkhart, IN, forward Jake Kelly from Carmel HS in Carmel, IN and forward Jarryd Cole from Winnetonka HS in Kansas City, MO.

Gary (6-1, 205) has been in the starting line-up at Concord since his freshman season. As a junior, he averaged 22.3 points, four rebounds and two assists per game and was team captain. He has scored 896 career points heading into his final season after averaging 11 points a game as a sophomore.

Gary was a unanimous first team all-conference selection in the Northern Lakes Conference after earning honorable mention recognition as a sophomore. He was named to all-area and all-sectional teams and selected to the Indiana Junior All-Stars.

Gary helped a veteran Concord team post a 22-2 record his sophomore season, winning the sectional title. With a young team a year ago Concord posted an 11-10 record. In summer action, Gary has played with the Indiana Elite AAU team each of the past three summers.

Cole (6-7, 240), a native of Gladstone, MO, averaged 19 points and 14 rebounds per game as a junior at Winnetonka HS and is regarded as a relentless rebounder. He attended Iowa's Elite Camp this summer and had a solid summer with his Kansas City area AAU team.

Kelly (6-5, 175) is considered to be an outstanding shooter. He averaged 11.3 points, 4.9 rebounds and 2.3 assists as a prep junior. He made a solid impression at the Adidas Superstar Camp last spring and continued to shine throughout the summer.

Kelly helped his prep team post a 17-7 mark a year ago, shooting 51.2% from the field, 35% from three-point range and 81.8% from the free throw line. He was a first team all-conference selection and was named to the Indiana Junior All-Stars. He has earned pre-season all-state recognition heading into his senior season.

Iowa has just two seniors on its 2006-07 roster in guards Adam Haluska and Mike Henderson.

IOWA RECORD BY CONFERENCE

Iowa has played one team each from the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big 12, Mid-American, Mid-Eastern, Pac-10, Southern, Southeastern and Southwestern Athletic conferences, two teams from the Missouri Valley and one independent. Following is a breakdown of Iowa's record by conference:

THE HAWKEYE ROSTER

The Iowa roster includes 14 players. One of those players, David Palmer, will redshirt as a transfer from another Division I program. The squad includes two seniors, three juniors, six sophomores and three freshmen. Nine of the players are in their first year with the Iowa program.

Along with the four Iowans on the roster, there are two players from Illinois, Indiana and Tennessee and one from California, Ohio and Texas and St. John's, Antigua.

THE RETURNING CAST

Iowa returns two starters and five lettermen from 2006. The returning starters include seniors Adam Haluska and Mike Henderson, who each started all 34 games last season. Haluska was a third team all-Big Ten selection and an academic all-American.

With just five players returning from a year ago, Iowa returns 38.8% of its scoring, 27.9% of its rebounding, 40.8% of its assists and 41.8% of its steals. Iowa's returning players shot 42.9% from the field, 34.9% from three-point range and 77.4% from the free throw line.

HALUSKA OVER 1,000 POINTS

Guard Adam Haluska heads into his final season as Iowa's most honored player, both on the court and off. Along with earning third team all-Big Ten honors a year ago, Haluska is a two-time academic all-Big Ten honoree and a year ago he was recognized as an academic all-American.

Haluska has scored 20 or more points in seven of 13 games, including a career-high 36 points vs. Georgia State and 31 vs. Coppin State. He added 21 points in a win over Texas Southern and is the current Big Ten Player of the Week.

Haluska has raised his career scoring total to 1,478, including 1,194 in three seasons at Iowa. His 185 three-point field goals attempts last season rank sixth best at Iowa. He ranks fifth in career three-point field goals (161) and career attempts (439).

Haluska began the season with 29 points in the win over The Citadel, matching his career high. He also added five rebounds and six assists. Haluska scored 24 points in close road losses at Arizona State and Virginia Tech and had 21 points and seven rebounds at Drake.

He added 18 points vs. Villanova and increased his consecutive free throw streak to 21 (including three last season) before missing his final attempt vs. Villanova. He is shooting 91.8% (56-61) from the free throw line to rank 21st in the nation in free throw percentage.

Haluska has started all 111 games in his career. His consecutive starts streak ranks as the longest in the nation among all Division I players, according to STATS -- Chicago.

HENDERSON NUMBERS IMPROVED

Guard Mike Henderson played a key role in Iowa's 2006 success, improving his numbers in several categories from his sophomore season while earning the team "Most Improved Award".

Henderson missed the first seven games of this season with a hand injury before returning to see limited action in Iowa's last six games. He scored eight points in 15 minutes in the win over Iowa State and played 26 minutes at Drake.

Henderson returned to the starting line-up in a win over Georgia State, scoring eight points while collecting a career-best nine assists in a season-best 30 minutes of action. He added nine points, nine assists and three steals in a win over Texas Southern.

Henderson, last season, averaged 7.6 points and 3.9 rebounds per outing, improving his shooting to 48.7%. In Big Ten games only, he ranked sixth in league field goal percentage (54.9%). Henderson scored in double figures in 11 games after scoring 10 or more points just three times in his first two seasons.

SMITH STEPS FORWARD IN PARADISE

Freshman Tyler Smith, who had just two points in his first college game, led Iowa with 28 points in a win over Toledo in the first round of the Paradise Jam. Smith connected on 11-17 field goal attempts and 5-8 free throws. He also led Iowa with five assists and collected six rebounds in 32 minutes of action.

Smith had another solid outing in a semi-final loss to Alabama, collecting 19 points, six rebounds, four assists and two steals in 37 minutes. Against Villanova, he added 12 points and three rebounds and he added 12 points, five assists, four rebounds and two steals at Arizona State. Smith had 12 points, five rebounds, four steals and three assists vs. Texas-Pan American and 16 points and seven rebounds vs. Coppin State.

Smith led Iowa with 20 points (9-15 FGs) and added six rebounds vs. Northern Iowa and he added 16 points and a career-best six assists in the win over Iowa State. He added 16 points and five rebounds in a loss at Drake and 15 points, five rebounds, five assists and two steals in a win over Georgia State. He scored 25 points (4-5 treys, 5-5 FTs) and five assists in a win over Texas Southern.

Smith was named to the Paradise Jam all-tournament team and the Hawkeye Challenge all-tournament team. He is averaging 15.4 points, 4.5 rebounds and 3.4 assists per game.

FREEMAN SOLID IN GUARD COURT

Guard Tony Freeman had a solid first season with the Hawkeyes a year ago and had a career high 11 assists and six rebounds in the opening game this season. He added a career-best eight rebounds in the win over Toledo and added 16 points, four rebounds and three assists against Alabama. He led Iowa with five assists vs. Villanova and added 11 points (4-5 FGs, 2-2 FTs) against Virginia Tech. Freeman collected 10 points and five assists in the win over Texas-Pan American and six points and five assists vs. Coppin State. He scored 11 points and added four rebounds and four assists vs. Northern Iowa. Freeman led Iowa with three steals in the win over Iowa State and he added 11 points and five assists. He scored 12 points (3-4 treys) in a win over Georgia State. He is averaging eight points and 4.4 assists per game.

JOHNSON LEADS FROM LONG RANGE

Junior guard Justin Johnson is making his mark in his first season with the Hawkeye program, as he currently ranks fourth in the Big Ten in three-point field goal percentage. Johnson has started six games, averaging 7.5 points and 2.7 rebounds per game while shooting 49.1% (27-55) from three-point range. He made 4-5 three-point shots in the loss at Drake, including three straight in a one-minute span in the second half. Johnson added eight points, six rebounds and four assists in the win over Georgia State and nine points and two steals vs. Texas Southern. Johnson, who did not attempt a free throw in Iowa's first 11 games, has made all eight of his attempts in Iowa's last two games.

Johnson contributed nine points and six rebounds at Virginia Tech and he led the team with 14 points and five rebounds in a win over Texas-Pan American. Johnson added 13 points, five rebounds and four assists in Iowa's win over Coppin State and was named to the Hawkeye Challenge all-tournament team.

LOOBY HITS THE BOARDS

After sitting out last season as a redshirt, junior Kurt Looby began to prove that his hard work from a year ago will pay dividends. Looby led Iowa with 14 rebounds in the win over The Citadel and added three blocked shots as well. After playing just two minutes in the first half against Toledo, he ended the game with 13 points and nine rebounds, all in the second half. Looby added 13 points, seven rebounds and three blocked shots vs. Villanova and he added six points, four rebounds and three blocked shots vs. Virginia Tech. Looby had 12 rebounds to go with six points, four blocked shots and two steals in the win over Georgia State and he led the team with six rebounds and two blocks in a win over

Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series

Iowa currently leads the third annual Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series 11-4. Iowa has been victorious in women's soccer (1-0, OT), football (27-17), wrestling (24-6), men's basketball (77-59) and women's swimming and diving (181.5-117.5), while Iowa State won volleyball (3-2) and women's basketball (80-74) events.

The University of Iowa captured the inaugural Cy-Hawk Series in 2005 registering a 13-8 margin of victory. Iowa State evened the competition with its 13-8 triumph in 2006.

The nine-sport series awards two points (except football, which is worth three) to the winning school in each head-to-head match-up between the two institutions. Additionally, two points are awarded to an institution if the graduation rate of its student-athletes is greater than the national average as reported each fall by the NCAA. Iowa has earned the academic points in both 2005 and 2006, whereas Iowa State has failed to earn the extra points. Iowa garnered a 69% graduation rate in 2005, which was seven points higher than the national average of 62 percent.

For the first time in three years, volleyball was added to the competitive slate between the two schools. A new total of 21 points is up for grabs in 2006-07.

A commemorative Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk Series Cup, which stands 31 inches tall and weighs 19 pounds, is displayed on the winning team's campus for an entire year after a victory. Replica cups are also presented as "traveling trophies" for individual victorious teams in the head-to-head competition.

Gorney hit 4-7 field goals and 2-2 free throws in 25 minutes. Gorney added 10 points (4-6 FGs) and five rebounds vs. Toledo and he had 10 points and three assists in the loss to Alabama. He added eight points and four rebounds in a win over Texas-Pan American and added eight points and a team-high nine rebounds vs. Northern Iowa. Gorney added six points and four rebounds in the win over Iowa State, he had five rebounds vs. Drake and eight points and five rebounds in a win over Georgia State.

Gorney made his first four field goal attempts in the win over Texas Southern, improving his streak to eight straight made attempts over three games before missing a shot in the second half. He ended the contest with 10 points, three rebounds and two steals.

He is averaging 6.3 points and 3.9 rebounds per game while shooting 57.8% from the field and 88.9% from the free throw line.

A STITCH IN TIME

Junior Justin Johnson has taken over the team lead in stitches. Johnson was cut above the right eye in the late stages of the game at Drake and had to get three stitches. Freshman Tyler Smith had two stitches after suffering a cut during Iowa's win over Coppin State in the Hawkeye Challenge.

IOWA SEEKS SEVENTH STRAIGHT

Iowa, in 2007, is seeking its seventh consecutive winning season. The current streak of six straight ranks as the second longest in the history of Iowa basketball. Iowa's record for consecutive winning seasons is seven, from 1950 through 1956. Pops Harrison, Bucky O'Connor and Rollie Williams all coached the Hawkeyes during those years. Only a 10-10 record in 1949 kept Iowa from 13 consecutive winning seasons (1944-56).

Harrison coached Iowa to five straight winning seasons from 1944-48, Lute Olson coached Iowa to winning seasons from 1979-83, George Raveling and Tom Davis combined to coach Iowa to winning seasons from 1985-89 and Davis coached Iowa to winning seasons from 1995-99. Iowa had five consecutive winning seasons on three occasions, 1979-83, 1985-89 and 1995-99.

Iowa is one of four Big Ten teams to post a winning record in each of the last six seasons, joining Illinois, Michigan State and Wisconsin. Iowa, in 2006, advanced to post-season play for the sixth straight season and returned to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight season.

IOWA VS. RANKED FOES

Steve Alford has posted a 28-35 record against ranked opponents as Iowa's head coach, including a 10-4 mark in 2005-06. Iowa has played one ranked opponent this season, dropping a 72-60 decision to 10th-ranked Alabama.

The Hawkeyes, last season, defeated seventh-ranked Kentucky (67-63), 21st-ranked North Carolina State (45-42), sixth-ranked Illinois (63-48), 11th-ranked Indiana (73-60), 16th-ranked Ohio State (67-62), 20th-ranked Michigan (94-66), 21st-ranked Indiana (70-67), 16th-ranked Michigan State (66-54), 25th-ranked Wisconsin (59-44) and seventh-ranked Ohio State (67-62). Iowa dropped a 68-59 decision to second-ranked Texas, fell 66-52 at 24th-ranked Wisconsin, was defeated 85-55 at 11th-ranked Michigan State and lost at eighth-ranked Illinois, 71-59.

Alford's Hawkeye teams are 9-15 when playing teams ranked in the top 10, including wins over top-ranked Connecticut (70-68 in 1999-00), second-ranked Missouri (83-65 in 2001-02), fifth-ranked Ohio State (67-64 in 1999-00), sixth-ranked Illinois (63-48 in 2006), seventh-ranked Ohio State (67-60 in 2005-06), seventh-ranked Kentucky (67-63 in 2005-06), seventh-ranked Illinois (78-62 in 2000-01), eighth-ranked Illinois (68-61 in 2002-03) and 10th-ranked Michigan State (71-69 in 2005).

The 15 losses to top 10 teams have been three times to No. 1 (Duke, 2001-02 and Illinois twice in 2004-05), once to second-ranked (Texas, 2005-06), once to third-ranked (Illinois, 2000-01), twice to fourth-ranked (Michigan State, 1999-00 and 2000-01), twice to fifth-ranked (Tennessee, 2000-01 and Missouri, 2001-02), once to eighth-ranked Illinois, 2005-06), once to ninth-ranked (Kentucky, 2000-01) and four times to 10th-ranked (Michigan State, 2000, Illinois, 2002, Michigan State, 2005 and Alabama, 2006-07).

In the 63 games against ranked teams, Alford and his Iowa team are 13-9 in home games, 11-12 at neutral sites and 4-14 when playing ranked teams in their home arena.

IOWA PROGRAM REACHES 1,400 WINS

The Iowa basketball program reached 1,400 wins (now at 1,428) with a 79-46 victory over Texas-San Antonio on Nov. 26, 2005. Iowa is one of 37 NCAA Division I programs with as many as 1,400 wins. Iowa's basketball history includes 72 winning seasons and 24 years in which the Hawkeyes have won 20 or more games. Iowa (with 22) is one of 31 programs to earn more than 20 invitations into the NCAA Tournament.

ANOTHER STRONG SCHEDULE

Playing five of its first six games on the road, Iowa again faces a demanding schedule in 2006-07. After opening the season at home, Iowa participated in the Paradise Jam, defeating Toledo before falling to Alabama and Villanova.

Iowa also played at Arizona State and Virginia Tech in November. The in-state series included home dates with Northern Iowa and Iowa State and a visit to Drake.

Alabama was ranked 10th at the time of its win over Iowa, while Villanova and Virginia Tech were listed among teams receiving votes in the early season rankings.

Iowa will play 17 regular season games against teams that advanced to post-season play a year ago. That includes two games vs. Illinois (NCAA), Indiana (NCAA), Michigan State (NCAA) Wisconsin (NCAA), Penn State (NIT) and Minnesota (NIT) and single games vs. Northern Iowa (NCAA), Ohio State (NCAA) and Michigan (NIT) Alabama (NCAA) and Villanova (NCAA).

IOWA ON THE TUBE

Nearly every Iowa game throughout the 2006-07 season will be televised, with the only exception being the first round of the Paradise Jam in November. Fox Sports televised the semi-finals and third place game of the eight-team tournament.

The majority of Iowa's non-conference games will be televised on ESPN Regional. Games at Drake and Virginia Tech were on ESPNU and the contest at Arizona State was on Fox Sports.

During the Big Ten season, Iowa games vs. Michigan State, Indiana (twice), at Wisconsin and at Penn State will be televised on ESPN. Iowa's home game with Wisconsin can be seen on CBS and the home finale against Illinois could appear on either CBS or ESPN. All other conference games will be on ESPN Regional, while several conference games will be televised throughout the Big Ten Conference viewing area as part of the Big Ten regional network agreement with ESPN.

IOWA SCHEDULE NOTES

- Iowa has reached the title game in 12 of 14 in-season tournaments under Coach Steve Alford. The Hawkeyes have won their own Hawkeye Challenge in each of the eight years. Iowa was second in the Guardians Classic in both 2002 and 2006, second in the Maui Invitational in 2005 and second in the IKON Coaches vs. Cancer Classic in 2000. In the only events Iowa did not advance to the title game, the Hawkeyes placed third in the Rainbow Classic in 2001 and lost in the semi-finals of the 2006 Paradise Jam. Under Alford, Iowa is 28-7 while playing in tournament events during the season, plus 13-5 in the Big Ten Tournament and a combined 3-6 in the NIT and NCAA tournaments.

- Iowa is slated to play two schools which are headed by former University of Iowa presidents. Mary Sue Coleman is the President at the University of Michigan and David Skorton at Cornell University.
- Herb Sendek, the first year coach at Arizona State, was the head coach at North Carolina State a year ago when the Hawkeyes defeated the Wolfpack 45-42 in Iowa City as part of the ACC/Big Ten Challenge.
- Iowa Coach Steve Alford and LaSalle Coach John Giannini met when both were coaching in the NCAA Division III ranks. Alford's Manchester College team defeated Giannini and Rowan University 79-66 in the national semi-final game of the NCAA Tournament. Manchester lost to Wisconsin-Platteville in the title game that season before Alford left to become the head coach at Southwest Missouri State. Giannini led Rowan to the Division III national title the following season.
- Seth Greenberg, now the head coach at Virginia Tech, was the head coach at Long Beach State when Iowa defeated the Forty-Niners 101-79 in the finals of the 1993 Hawkeye Challenge.

IOWA HAS STRONG FINISH

Following is a list of Iowa's accomplishments in 2006:

- Posted 25 wins, which ranks as the second highest total in school history. The Hawkeyes won 30 games in 1987 and 24 games in 1988. The 22 regular season wins tie as the second most in school history. The Hawkeyes won 27 regular season games in 1987 and 22 in both 1988 and 1989.
- Posted 10 wins in 14 games against top 25 teams. Iowa was 3-2 against top 10 teams.
- Prior to tournament play, Iowa was the only Division I team in the nation to record 10 wins against teams that were ranked in the top 25 at the time of the game.
- Posted 11 Big Ten wins, the most for an Iowa team since the 1996-97 team won 12 conference games. The 11 Big Ten wins are the most for Iowa since the Big Ten went to a 16-game league schedule in 1998.
- Won the Big Ten Conference Tournament with three straight wins. Iowa also won the event in 2001 and was second in 2002. Iowa is one of three teams with two tournament titles and Coach Steve Alford is the only Big Ten coach to take three teams to the championship game.
- Earned a tie for second place in the regular season standings. Iowa had not placed as high as second in the regular season since earning a tie for second with a 12-6 record in 1997.
- Earned a third seed in the NCAA Tournament. The three seed is the highest since the Hawkeyes were seeded second in the 1987 event. Iowa was also a three seed in 1981.
- Earned the No. two seed in the Big Ten Tournament. Iowa's previous best seed in the event was fourth in 2004.
- Advanced to the title game of the Big Ten Conference Tournament for the third time since 2001.
- Defeated seven top 25 opponents in Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Iowa set school records for home wins and total wins over ranked opponents last season.
- Completed its first-ever undefeated home season in Carver-Hawkeye Arena, which opened in 1983, and its first undefeated home season since 1966.
- Completed the seventh year in Iowa history with a perfect home record. Iowa was also undefeated at home in 1902 (3-0), 1926 (9-0), 1945 (11-0), 1948 (12-0), 1950 (6-0) and 1966 (12-0).
- Established a school record 17 home wins in one season. The previous record of 16 was established in 1985.
- Improved its overall home winning streak to 18 games, a streak that ranks longest in the Big Ten and fourth best in the nation.

HOME, AWAY COMPARISONS

In its seven home games, Iowa has outscored its opponents by a 77.6-57.7 margin, shooting 45.2% from the field while holding its opponent to 38.3% shooting. Iowa's opponents hold a 36.9-36.4 rebounding advantage.

In six games away from Carver-Hawkeye Arena (three neutral site games), Iowa has been outscored 72.8-64.3. The Hawkeyes are shooting 41.7% from the field while opponents are shooting 47.7%. The opponents hold a 33.8-32.2 rebounding margin.

NO THREE-POINTERS

Since the three-point shot became part of the college game, Iowa has played 14 games in which it has failed to make a three-point attempt. Iowa had made at least one three-point basket in 53 straight games before missing all five attempts in a 71-61 home win over Purdue in 2004. The five three-point attempts are the fewest attempted by a Steve Alford team at Iowa. Iowa's current streak includes at least one three-point basket in 100 straight games.

Following is a list of games in which Iowa did not make a three-point basket (11-3 record). During the 1982-83 season, when the three-point shot was first added, the number of three-point attempts in some games is unavailable.

IOWA AT NEUTRAL SITES

Iowa is 1-2 in neutral site games this season, with all three games in the Paradise Jam. Iowa's three games in the Paradise Jam are the only neutral site games for the Hawkeyes prior to the 2007 Big Ten Tournament at the United Center in Chicago.

Iowa played six neutral site games in 2006, posting a 4-2 record. The Hawkeyes split neutral site games in the Guardians Classic, defeating ninth-ranked Kentucky in the semi-finals before falling to second-ranked Texas in the title game.

Iowa won three straight neutral site games at Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis to claim the 2006 Big Ten Tournament title before falling in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at The Palace of Auburn Hills in Auburn Hills, MI.

IOWA IN TOURNAMENT PLAY

Iowa has fared well while taking part in regular-season tournaments over the past 24 years. In that time Iowa has won the Great Alaska Shootout (1986-87), the Cal-Irvine Anteater Classic (1986-87), the Maui Classic (1987-88), the San Juan Thanksgiving Shootout (1992-93), the San Juan Christmas Shootout (1997-98), the Big Ten Conference Tournament in 2001 and 2006 and its own invitational 24 times.

In addition, Iowa was runner-up in the 1985-86 Far West Classic, the 1987-88 All-College Tournament, the 1988-89 Chaminade Classic, the 1991-92 Tampa Tribune Holiday Invitational, the 1994-95 Rainbow Classic, the 1995-96 Great Alaska Shootout, the 1999-00 Coaches vs. Cancer Classic, the 2001-02 Guardians Classic, the 2005-06 Guardians Classic, the 2002 Big Ten Conference Tournament and the 2004 Maui Invitational.

IOWA IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

Iowa made its 22nd appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2006, falling to Northwestern State in the opening round at The Palace of Auburn Hills. Iowa earned the Big Ten Conference's automatic bid by virtue of claiming the league's tournament title.

The Hawkeyes hold an overall record of 27-24 in the tournament, advancing to the Final Four in 1955 (fourth), 1956 (second) and 1980 (fourth). Iowa reached the regional championship in 1987 and lost in the regional semi-final in 1988 and 1999.

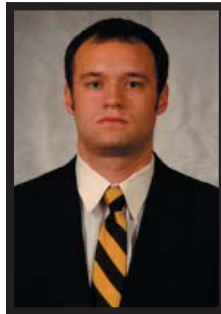

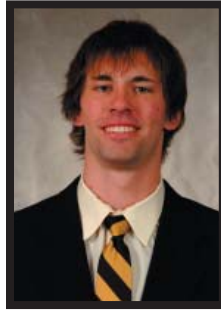

2006-07 Game Summaries

November 13, 2006, Carver-Hawkeye Arena, Iowa City, IA

Senior guard Adam Haluska matched a career-high with 29 points in leading Iowa to a 75-53 season-opening win over The Citadel in Iowa City. Haluska connected on 8-16 field goal attempts, including 6-14 treys, and added 7-7 free throws. He also had five rebounds and six assists.

The win marked Iowa's 29th straight win in a season opening game and extended Iowa's home court winning streak to 19 games.

Sophomore Cyrus Tate, in his first game at Iowa, came off the bench to add 13 points on 6-7 field goals. Junior center Seth Gorney added 10 points and three steals and junior forward Kurt Looby, also in his first game as a Hawkeye, led both teams with 14 rebounds and collected three blocked shots. Sophomore point guard Tony Freeman had 11 assists, seven points and six rebounds.

Iowa started strong at both ends of the floor. The Hawkeyes shot 50% from the field in the opening half, while allowing The Citadel to shoot just 29.6%. Iowa built a 42-22 halftime advantage and was never threatened in the second half.

Iowa shot 49.1% from the field and 37.5% from three-point range, while holding The Citadel to 33.9% shooting. Iowa won the rebounding battle 40-33 and had 25 assists.

(9) NORTHERN IOWA 57, IOWA 55 December 5, 2006, Carver-Hawkeye Arena, Iowa City, IA

Northern Iowa used a 17-4 scoring run over the final five minutes to take a 57-55 win in Iowa City Tuesday, ending Iowa's home winning streak at 21 games. Iowa led 51-40 with 5:31 remaining before the Panthers scored 13 straight points to take a 53-51 lead with 1:42 to play. Iowa tied the score on a basket by Adam Haluska with 1:24 to play and tied the game at 55-55 on a basket by Tyler Smith with 52 seconds remaining. Northern Iowa's final basket came with 32 seconds to play. The Hawkeyes then missed two shots, including a three-point attempt in the closing seconds.

After falling behind 5-2 in the opening minutes, Iowa controlled the game until the final five minutes. The Hawkeyes led 28-18 at halftime and led by as many as 13 points in the second half. Iowa did not shoot well from the field, connecting on just 34.9% of its field goals. Northern Iowa, after shooting just 23/8% in the first half, shot 44.4% from the field in the final 20 minutes to raise its percentage to 35.4% for the game.

The difference came at the free throw line and on the backboards. Northern Iowa made 21-29 free throw attempts, compared to just 5-7 for Iowa. UNI held a 44-34 rebounding advantage. Iowa was guilty of just 10 turnovers, compared to 15 for Northern Iowa.

Freshman Tyler Smith led Iowa's scoring with 20 points and he added six rebounds. Tony Freeman added 11 points and four assists and Seth Gorney led Iowa with nine rebounds.

Iowa's defense held Iowa State to 38.6% shooting from the field and forced 26 turnovers as the Hawkeyes defeated the Cyclones 77-59 in Iowa City. Iowa scored the first four points of the game, led 9-3 after four minutes and never trailed. Iowa shot 50% from the field in the first half, including 66.7% (4-6) from three-point range. The Hawkeyes led 42-30 at intermission after leading by as many as 17 in the first half.

The Hawkeyes built a 46-30 advantage early in the second half before Iowa State rallied to within eight points, 46-38. A three-point basket by Adam Haluska helped Iowa regain the momentum as the Hawkeyes used a 15-3 scoring run to build a comfortable 59-41 advantage with eight minutes to play.

Iowa shot 45.9% from the field for the game, including 75% (6-8) from three-point range, and added 15-19 (78.9%) free throws. The Hawkeyes collected 17 assists and 13 steals while committing just 12 turnovers.

Haluska led Iowa's scoring with 18 points. Freshman Tyler Smith added 16 and Tony Freeman scored 11. Kurt Looby led Iowa with six rebounds, Smith collected a career-high six assists and Freeman led the Hawkeyes with three steals.

(11) DRAKE 75, IOWA 59
December 16, 2006, Knapp Center, Des Moines, IA

Drake University used a strong shooting night from the field and a large rebounding advantage to defeat Iowa 75-59 in Des Moines, ending a 27-game losing streak in the series. The Bulldogs won their sixth straight game as Iowa lost for the first time in the Knapp Center after seven straight wins.

The Hawkeyes played well in the early going, hitting eight of their first 12 field goal attempts. The score was tied at 22-22 before Drake used a 13-2 run over a three minute span to gain control. Drake eventually built a 38-28 advantage at the break.

Drake built the advantage to 15 points with 13 minutes to play before Iowa rallied behind the outside shooting of Justin Johnson. Johnson hit three consecutive three-pointers within one minute to cut the deficit to 53-45 with 10 minutes remaining. Drake was able to pick up the defensive pressure from there, holding Iowa scoreless for just over five minutes in rebuilding the margin to 63-45 with five minutes remaining.

Drake shot 53.1% from the field and held a 41-23 rebounding advantage while playing in front of the largest crowd ever (7,268) at the Knapp Center.

Adam Haluska led Iowa with 21 points and seven rebounds. Freshman Tyler Smith added 16 points and five rebounds and Johnson ended the game with 12 points, hitting 4-5 three-pointers. Iowa shot just 39.2% from the field and was outscored 18-10 at the free throw line.

Iowa used a solid shooting performance and a strong all-around game in defeating Georgia State 101-59 in Iowa City. A three-point basket by Adam Haluska gave Iowa a 17-15 advantage with 12:30 left in the opening half, and the Hawkeyes were in control from there. Haluska's basket began a 13-2 scoring run that gave Iowa a 27-15 lead with nine minutes remaining. He added another three-pointer in the final seconds to give Iowa its biggest advantage, 49-29, at the break. Iowa scored the first seven points of the second half and was never threatened, leading by as many as 50 points.

Iowa played well in nearly every phase of the game. The Hawkeyes shot 52.9% from the field, including 52.4% (11-21) from three-point range. Iowa held Georgia State to 34.5% shooting and won the rebounding battle 44-35. Iowa also forced 25 turnovers and collected 26 assists.

Haluska led Iowa with a career-best 36 points, hitting 13-19 field goals, 6-11 three-pointers and all four of his free throws. The 36 points matches the highest scoring total by an Iowa player in Carver-Hawkeye Arena, which opened in 1983.

Freshman Tyler Smith added 15 points, five rebounds, five assists and two steals. Tony Freeman added 12 points and Kurt Looby led both teams with 12 rebounds. Mike Henderson, in his first start of the year, added eight points and a career-best nine assists.

Iowa jumped to an early lead and never looked back in taking a 90-63 win over Texas Southern in Iowa City. The Hawkeyes shot 50% from the field in the opening half, building a 49-27 advantage by intermission. The Hawkeyes led 10-4 after three minutes and built the margin to 21-6 after eight minutes.
