The Hawkeyes will battle 23rd-ranked Ohio State Friday night at 7 p.m., then take on the third-ranked Penn State Nittany Lions Saturday at 8 p.m. All times are Eastern.

Web Conference • Iowa Head Coach Cindy Fredrick will be hosting a weekly "Web Conference" every Tuesday this season. She will address a variety of topics, from the state of the team to that week's opponents.

Last Week • The Hawkeyes dropped a pair of conference games over the weekend, falling to Illinois (3-1) Friday night, then losing to Northwestern (3-1) on Saturday.

The Hawkeyes came out firing in the first game against Illinois, out-hitting the Illini .325 to .068. Jen Barcus was particularly effective in game one, getting five kills and hitting at a .714 clip. lowa never trailed after racing to an 8-2 lead. The Hawkeyes took their first double-digit lead at 18-8 with an Illini error, and held it the rest of the way.

lowa looked to keep the momentum in game two, and took a 10-7 lead early. Illinois began to chip away, and a Stephanie Alde kill gave them the lead at 18-17. A Catherine Smale kill immediately tied things up again, but a pair of errors put lowa in a 20-18 hole and forced a timeout. The Hawkeyes came out of the break fired up and took a 22-21 lead, but Illinois responded with a kill and

an ace to grab a lead it wouldn't relinquish.

In game three, lowa got down early and didn't get its first lead until 25-24. The two teams traded the next nine points, but a pair of Hawkeye errors eventually gave the Illini a 31-29 win.

Game four was a wild affair, featuring eight lead changes and 19 ties. In the end, Illinois fended off a pair of game points, while Iowa fended off six before finally succumbing on a kill by Rachel Henderson.

Against Northwestern, game one was a back-and-forth affair featuring 11 ties and four lead changes. Neither team took more than a three-point advantage at any point in the game. lowa tied the game up at 16-16, 17-17, 18-18, 19-19, 20-20 and 21-21 before the Wildcats began to pull away. The Hawkeyes kept the game within reach, but was unable to get over the top.

The Hawkeyes jumped out to a 5-1 lead in game two, only to have Northwestern claw back to take its first lead at 12-11. Iowa kept close and managed to tie the game up at 21-21, but the Wildcats slowly pulled away and took a 2-0 lead into the intermission.

lowa shot to a 6-3 lead in game three, only to have Northwestern come back and tie things up with three-straight points. The teams exchanged points twice for an 8-8 tie, then lowa got a kill from **Megan Schipper** and never looked back. The Hawkeyes kept a safe distance the rest of the way, and ended things on a Barcus kill at 30-26.

Northwestern responded in game four and took advantage of 12 Hawkeye errors. Iowa's last tie came at 12-12 on a kill from **Melanie Meister**, but Northwestern immediately re-claimed the lead and never gave it back. A Courtnie Paulus kill ended the match at 30-25.

Scouting Ohio State • The Ohio State Buckeyes come into the week with a 17-7 overall record and a 7-7 mark in Big Ten play. Ohio State is ranked 23rd by the AVCA.

Ohio State will host Penn State Wednesday night.

The Buckeye offense is led by a pair of dynamic hitters, Anna Szerszen and Danielle Meyer. Szerszen leads the way with 4.40 kills per game, while Meyer is just behind with 4.39 kills per game. The two Buckeyes are ranked seventh and eighth, respectively, in the Big Ten.

To run its offense, Ohio State relies on two-time all-America setter Marisa Main. The senior averages 12.65 assists per game, which is good for sixth in the conference. Main is also dangerous on the attack, averaging 1.45 kills per game and hitting at a .344 clip. That total is good for fourth in the Big Ten.

The Buckeyes are coached by Jim Stone, who is in his 25th year at the helm.

Ohio State leads the all-time series 44-8, and has won the last 11 meetings. The two teams met earlier this season, with the Buckeyes winning 3-1 at Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

Scouting Penn State • The Penn State Nittany Lions come into the week with a 24-1 record and are atop the Big Ten with a 13-1 mark. Penn State is ranked third by the AVCA, and will travel to Columbus for a game with Ohio State Wednesday.

The Nittany Lion offense leads the Big Ten with a .321 hitting percentage and is second with 16.58 kills per game.

Freshman phenom Megan Hodge leads the team and is second in the Big Ten with 4.72 kills per game. Sophomore Nicole Fawcett is second on the team with 4.24 kills per game. That total is good for ninth in the league.

The Nittany Lions boast the top-three individual hitting percentages in the conference, with Christa Harmotto (.425), Melissa Walbridge (.416) and Cassy Salyer (.351).

On defense, Penn State lead the league in blocks (3.61 per game) and opponent hitting percentage (.111).

The Nittany Lions are coached by Russ Rose, who is in his 28th year.

Penn State leads the all-time series 31-0. The two teams met earlier this season at Carver-Hawkeye Arena, with the Nittany Lions getting a 3-0 win.



Head Coach Cindy Fredrick



Cindy Fredrick is in her third year at the helm of the Hawkeye program.

The Hawkeyes continued to make strides last season, recording more wins (14), Big Ten wins (4), kills (1,709), assists (1,527), service aces (161) and blocks (252) than Fredrick's first year.

There were plenty of highlights on the year, including an 11-4 start and the team's first win over in-state rival Northern lowa in 16 years.

In the first year of the Fredrick Era, the Hawkeyes not only improved both their overall and Big Ten Conference record, but became more competitive in every aspect in the game. The coaching staff worked hard to install a new winning attitude in the team, which helped the Hawkeyes to an 8-3 start.

The coaching staff also made great strides in recruiting, pulling in the 30th-ranked class in the nation according to prepvolleyball.com.

Turning struggling volleyball programs into winning programs has been a big part of Fredrick's past, most recently as head coach at Washington State University (Pullman, WA). During her 15 year tenure at Washington State, Fredrick earned more wins than any coach of a women's sport with a 278-192 record and in seven seasons she had 20 or more wins. In 1995, after guiding her squad to a national ranking of fifth, the highest rank of any men's or women's team in school history, she was named Pac-10 and AVCA District VIII Coach of the Year. Fredrick also led the Cougars to ten NCAA tournament appearances, including two Elite Eight finishes and one Sweet 16 berth. In 1992 her squad was the NIVC Champions. In the 2002 NCAA tournament, the Cougars posted a 3-0 victory over Northern lowa to advance to the Elight Eight.

Fredrick's success also translated into individual accolades for three of her players. Fredrick recruited the only three all-Americans in Cougar volleyball history, setter Keri Killebrew (second team, 1992), setter Stephanie Papke (second team, 1996) and middle hitter Sarah Silvernail (second team, 1995 and first team, 1996). Silvernail was also named 1996 Pac-10 Player of the Year.

Prior to coaching at Washington State, Fredrick coached at Weber State (Ogden, UT). When Fredrick first took over the Wildcat program in 1985, she led her team to a sixth place finish in the Mountain West Conference. By the time she left after the 1988 season, her team had finished first in the Big Sky Conference, earned an NCAA tournament birth and Fredrick was named Big Sky Coach of the Year.

Fredrick's first collegiate coaching experience came as an assistant at the University of Iowa from 1982-84 under Sandy Stewart. The 1983 squad finished with a 22-9 record, which stood as the school's winningest record until 1994. The 1983 and 1984 Hawkeyes also placed third in the Big Ten Conference standings.

Fredrick's volleyball ties to the state of lowa run deeper than just the University of Iowa. Fredrick began her coaching career as the head coach at Davenport Central High School from 1974-82. In 1981, she led her squad to a 33-0 season record and a state championship. From 1983-85 she was head coach of the USVA Junior Development team in eastern Iowa that won four state Midwest championships. In the summer of 1985, Fredrick was named head coach for the United States Volleyball Association team for the state of Iowa that competed throughout Canada.

Ace High • Sophomore setter **Kiley Fister** is dangerous from the service line, where she has recorded a team-best 27 aces.

Meister With the Block • Senior middle blocker **Melanie Meister** is averaging a career-best 1.14 blocks per game.

In Big Ten play, the West Des Moines native is ninth in the conference with 1.20 blocks per game.

Barcus Plays Big • Senior middle blocker **Jen Barcus** had a good weekend for lowa, averaging 4.12 kills per game, 1.75 blocks per game and a .346 hitting percentage. Against Northwestern, she had 18 kills and seven blocks.

In the Top Five • Sophomore setter Kiley Fister is already among the all-time leaders at lowa in assists.

Fister has amassed 2,324 assists, which puts her fifth on the all-time list. She is now behind Barb Zvonek (1995-98), who is in fourth with 3.153

Janet Moylan (1987-90) is Iowa's all-time leader with 5,471.

Costanzo Digging Into Top Ten • Junior **Tiana Costanzo** is currently 11th on lowa's all-time digs list with 1,067. The Escondido, CA, native is just nine digs behind Ellen Mullarkey (1984-87) for 10th on the list.

Janet Moylan (1987-09) is lowa's all-time leader with 1,931.

Attendance Up • The Hawkeyes have been seeing more faces in Carver-Hawkeye Arena this season. The team is averaging a school-best 983 fans per game, good for 35th in the nation.

The Hawkeyes have drawn more than 1,000 fans seven times this season, after having done that just seven times previously. Iowa has seen the top six crowds of all-time this season and seven of the top nine crowds in school history this year. Iowa drew a school-record 1,690 fans to the Iowa State game on August 26.

Digstown • As a team, the Hawkeyes are second in the Big Ten with 16.97 digs per game. Michigan leads the way with 17.35 digs per game.

Win Number 400 • Iowa Head Coach **Cindy Fredrick** won her 400th career collegiate game on October 6 with a 3-0 (30-20, 30-24, 30-23) win over Indiana.

Coach Fredrick is now 400-292 in her career, with a 36-49 record at the University of Iowa.

Take Me To Your Leader • Senior middle blocker **Melanie Meister** and sophomore libero **Emily Hiza** are the Hawkeye captains this season.

The Assistant Coaches • Dr. Mashallah (Farokh) Farokhmanesh and Chad Hanson will serve as assistants to Head Coach Cindy Fredrick again this season. Farokh, the associate head coach, is the husband of Coach Fredrick.
