## 2009-10 Outlook

As Coach Todd Lickliter enters his third season at Iowa, the foundation is in place for an exciting season of Iowa men's basketball. Lickliter and his staff are confident they have a team with the right work ethic and approach to move the Black and Gold forward.

The Iowa roster is young, but talented, with Big Ten experience. The Hawkeyes welcome back five lettermen, which includes four starters from a year ago. It includes one senior, two juniors, four sophomores, one redshirt freshman and four freshmen. Five of the 12 team members are in their first year at Iowa.

Last season, the Hawkeyes defeated six teams in the RPI Top 100 despite not being at full strength. Ten of Iowa's losses were by eight points or less, including six by four or less. The Hawkeyes won three overtime games and another four by six points or less.

Lickliter, the 2007 National Coach of the Year, holds a career mark of 159-97 (.621) in eight seasons as a head coach. His past successes include four post-season appearances, as he led teams to the second round of the NIT (2002 and 2006) and a pair of trips to the NCAA Sweet 16 (2003 and 2007).

Iowa will again face another challenging schedule in 2009-10. Twenty-three of 31 regular season games are against teams that advanced to post-season play last season, including 15, and possibly 16, contests against teams that participated in the NCAA Tournament.

During the non-conference portion of the schedule, Iowa will meet teams from the Big 12, ACC, Missouri Valley, along with a possible Big East opponent. The Hawkeyes will participate in the O'Reilly Auto Parts CBE Classic, challenging Texas and either Pittsburgh or Wichita State in Kansas City. Iowa will host preliminary round games of the CBE Classic in Iowa City against Duquesne and Illinois-Chicago. The Black and Gold will play two of their three in-state rivalry games on the road, visiting Iowa State and Northern Iowa, while playing Drake at home. The Hawkeyes will also host a Big Ten/ACC Challenge game against Virginia Tech in Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Overall, the Hawkeyes will play 19 home games and two contests at a neutral site.

Within the Big Ten, the Hawkeyes play two games against four of the top six teams from a year ago. Iowa meets Penn State (home) and Wisconsin (away) just once. Iowa opens Big Ten play with four of five games at home, while it concludes the conference slate with three of four on the road. The Big Ten Tournament is held in Indianapolis.

"Overall, it's another challenging schedule," Lickliter said. "Any time you play 18 Big Ten games, an ACC Challenge game and three in-state schools, the schedule will always be demanding. Regardless of whether we are playing back-to-back road games or at home, we are striving for consistency."

The Hawkeyes began preparing for the 2009-10 season in May when the team took a foreign trip to Italy and Greece. The team had 10 practice days before the trip and played three exhibition contests in Europe. Coach Lickliter believes the team benefited from the trip and really showed its appreciation for the opportunity.

"I was pleased with the players' approach to the trip," said Lickliter. "They were fully engaged in the opportunity to learn and grow on and off the court. In regard to our competitive approach, our emphasis was for each player to concentrate on the play at hand and to make the appropriate adjustments that would lead to team success."

Iowa's four returning starters include senior guard Devan Bawinkel (6-5, 210), sophomore guard Matt Gatens (6-5, 210), junior forward Jarryd Cole (6-7, 250) and sophomore forward Aaron Fuller (6-6, 210). Sophomore forward Andrew Brommer (6-9, 235) and sophomore guard Anthony Tucker (6-4, 200) are Iowa's other two returning lettermen. The Hawkeyes return two of its top four scorers from a year ago: Gatens (10.8 ppg) and Tucker (10.4 ppg).

Gatens, who started all 32 contests, had a stellar freshman campaign and was named to the all-Big Ten freshman team. He was also honored as a fourth team freshman all-American by collegehoops.net. The Iowa City native set the Iowa single-season free throw percentage record, shooting at a 90% clip from the charity stripe. But with all the accolades Gatens achieved his rookie season, Lickliter believes the best is yet to come.

"Matt is very deserving of his honors," said Lickliter. "But, he's not satisfied with having a terrific freshman campaign. He's dedicated himself to expanding his game. He's worked hard on being able to drive the ball, finish around the basket and make plays for others. We look for Matt to be an improved player and have an even greater impact in his sophomore season."

Tucker played in 14 games and was Iowa's most consistent 3-point shooter, ranking first on the team in percentage (.427, 38-89). Lickliter believes Tucker benefited the most from the foreign trip, being able to get in 10 really good practices.

"Although Anthony had a setback, he didn't let it define him," said Lickliter. "He continued to work diligently, stepped up his effort on the court, in the weight room and in the classroom. He decided to invest and come out of it a stronger, better player."

As a freshman, Fuller started 19 games, including the last six, averaging 4.0 points per contest. Brommer saw action in 20 games, as a freshman, shooting at a 53 percent clip from the field.

Bawinkel played in all 32 games, starting nine, averaging 4.8 points and sinking the second-most triples on the team (51) his junior year. After suffering a season-ending knee injury his freshman season, Cole started all 32 games, with nine starts, and shot a blistering team-best 67.6% from the floor. Cole and Bawinkel have been named co-captains for the upcoming season.

"I'm really excited about what Jarryd and Devan bring to the team," Licklitter said. "They have the respect of their teammates and appreciate the opportunity to be a Hawkeye. They 'wear the uniform' with pride, not just on game day, but in all circumstances. They understand the key to improvement is investing every day."

Licklitter believes "Hawkeye Basketball" is defined as an approach to the game that includes effort, knowledge of the system, commitment to details, and persevering until complementing one another becomes instinctive. He believes this team is making progress.

"We're going to continue to grow, both individually and, as a team," said Licklitter. "I can see they're making strides toward developing a consistent approach. Our players worked hard over the summer and the foundation they established will pay dividends this season."

In addition to the six lettermen returning, the Hawkeyes welcome six newcomers to the fold. The group of newcomers include: five freshmen, a redshirt freshman and a junior college transfer. Coach Licklitter is excited about the newcomers' competitive spirit.

"I'm excited about what I see as a team-first attitude and a great work ethic," said Licklitter. "I like this group a lot. I really like their attitude and approach. They are going to complement the returning players well. They're a good fit as we continue to build a team that strives to compete for championships."

Devon Archie (6-9, 215) joins the Hawkeyes after playing two years at Vincennes CC in Indianapolis, IN. The junior was a two-time team captain, averaging 6.8 points and six rebounds as a sophomore. Coach Licklitter likes his presence on the inside and his ability to run the floor and put pressure on the defense in transition.

Dubuque native Eric May (6-5, 225), sank a 35-foot shot at the buzzer to lift his Wahlert HS team to a state title his junior year. A two-time all-state honoree, he averaged 24.3 points and 9.1 rebounds, his senior season. May became Wahlert's career and single-game scoring leader. Coach Licklitter likes May's versatility. He can play multiple positions and he can face the basket and post-up, if needed.

Brennan Cougill (6-9, 260) joins the Hawkeye program from Sioux City. Cougill, who is Iowa's tallest freshman, led his Bishop Heelan HS team to the state title as a senior and was tabbed Iowa's "Mr. Basketball". Cougill averaged a double-double his senior campaign (18.2 points and 13.2 rebounds) and became just the 11th player in Iowa prep history to amass over 1,500 points and 1,000 rebounds. Coach Licklitter says Cougill has great court vision, terrific passing skills and has the ability to make players around him better.

Cully Payne (6-1, 190) averaged 21.6 points, 5.4 assists and 2.2 steals as a senior at Schaumburg, IL HS, before missing the final 13 games due to injury. He was named first team all-state and was a four-time team MVP. Coach Licklitter says Payne is a natural point guard, who is a very capable scorer, but is a pass-first point guard.

John Licklitter (5-11, 175) has been with the Iowa program for a year as a walk-on, redshirting last season. He started every game at point guard for Iowa City HS as a senior, joining Gatens in leading the team to a 25-1 record and a state title. Licklitter contributed 11 points and three steals in the title game victory.

Nick Neri (6-2, 185) will join the Hawkeyes this season as a preferred walk-on. As a senior, Neri averaged 14.3 points and 4.9 assists, helping St. Charles, IL HS win 22 games and advance to the state sectional tournament for the first time.

Licklitter would like to see his team transition more effectively this year. Furthermore, he believes being able to score in transition begins on defense.

"The teams in the Big Ten take pride in defending," Licklitter said. "Winning championships is the ultimate goal and I believe defense gives you an opportunity to compete for championships. There's a real thrill in watching players support one another and defend as a team. There are two ends of the court and it's truly gratifying when both are played with equal intensity and focus."

"The best teams are the ones that can balance their scoring opportunities and recognize when to take the early shot and when to be more patient. A team has to be poised enough to pass up a quick, low-percentage shot to pursue an even better one later in the possession. I believe this team will strike that balance and hopefully create opportunities to score more freely in transition, before defenses get set."

## Hawkeye Notes

### IOWA HISTORY

Iowa has played 2,472 games since beginning basketball in 1902. Overall Iowa's record is 1,466-1,006 (.593). That includes a 925-320 (.743) record in home games, a 541-686 (.441) record in games away from Iowa City, a 695-690 (.502) mark in Big Ten games and a 331-94 (.779) record in Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

### IOWA IN CARVER-HAWKEYE ARENA

Iowa has compiled a 331-94 (.779) record in Carver-Hawkeye Arena since the facility opened in January, 1983. Iowa is 156-77 (.670) in Big Ten games and 175-17 (.911) in non-Big Ten games.

### HAWKEYES ARE TOUGH AT HOME

Iowa has won 55 of its 68 games (.809) in Carver-Hawkeye Arena (15,500) over the last four seasons, including win streaks of 21 straight overall and 12 straight Big Ten Conference wins. Iowa has won 10 of its last 16 home games against ranked opponents and was 13-4 at home in 2008-09. Three of Iowa's four home losses were to ranked opponents and three of the four losses were by four points or less. Iowa was a perfect 17-0 at home in 2006, 14-2 in 2007, 10-8 in 2008 and 13-4 a year ago. Iowa has compiled a 24-10 Big Ten Conference record in that time.

### BAWINKEL, COLE NAMED CAPTAINS

Senior guard Devan Bawinkel and junior forward Jarryd Cole have been named Iowa's captains for the 2009-10 season.

Bawinkel averaged 4.8 points and 1.6 rebounds a year ago while starting nine of the 32 contests he appeared. He became one of only three players in school history to make eight three-pointers in a single-game when he drained 8-of-13 vs. Ohio State last season. Cole, a two-time co-captain, shot a team-best 67.6% from the field for the season, including 69.6% in Big Ten games.

### THE RETURNING CAST

Iowa returns four starters and six lettermen from a year ago. The returning starters include senior guard Devan Bawinkel (6-5, 210), junior center Jarryd Cole (6-7, 250), sophomore forward Aaron Fuller (6-6, 210) and sophomore guard Matt Gatens (6-5, 215). Bawinkel started nine games as a junior, averaging 4.8 points and 1.6 rebounds. Cole also started nine games, averaging 3.7 points and 3.0 rebounds. Gatens started all 32 outings, averaging 10.8 points and 3.8 rebounds, shooting at a 40% clip from 3-point range. Additionally, Gatens was a Big Ten all-Freshman and collegehoops.net fourth team all-America Freshman honoree a year ago. Fuller started 19 games, averaging 4.0 points and 2.7 rebounds.

The additional lettermen returning are sophomore guard Anthony Tucker (6-4, 200) and sophomore forward Andrew Brommer (6-9, 235). Tucker averaged 10.4 points and 3.0 rebounds in 14 games played, while Brommer played in 20 games, averaging 1.2 points and 1.2 rebounds.

Iowa's returning players, last season, played 43.2% of all minutes in 32 games, scoring 41.3% of Iowa's points and grabbing 35.6% of Iowa's rebounds. The group also had 33.6% of the steals and 39.8% of the assists last season. They combined to shoot 40.3% from the field, 37.8% from 3-point range and 70.4% from the free throw line.

### HEAD COACH TODD LICKLITER

Todd Lickliter is in his third season as the head basketball coach at the University of Iowa. Lickliter spent six seasons (2001-07) as the head coach at Butler University.

Lickliter, in eight seasons as a college head coach, holds a career mark of 159-97 (.621), including a 28-36 (.438) record in two seasons at Iowa.

Lickliter posted a 131-61 (.682) record as Butler's head coach. He led Butler to four post-season tournament berths, including trips to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 2003 and 2007.

Lickliter was named the 2006-07 Division I Coach of the Year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and was recognized as the High-Major Coach of the Year by collegehoops.net. He was also named 2007 Horizon League Coach of the Year for the second consecutive year after guiding the Bulldogs to a school and league-record 29 victories.

Lickliter served as an assistant coach at Butler and Eastern Michigan and was a high school head coach in Indianapolis and Danville, IL.

Lickliter played his final two collegiate seasons at Butler, where he earned a B.S degree in secondary education in 1979.

### A YOUNG SQUAD

Iowa's roster of 12 players includes four freshmen, one redshirt freshman, four sophomores, two juniors and one senior. The freshmen are forward Brennan Cougill (6-9, 260), guard/forward Eric May (6-5, 225), guard Nick Neari (6-2, 185) and guard Cully Payne (6-1, 190). The redshirt freshman is John Lickliter. The sophomores are Andrew Brommer, Aaron Fuller, Matt Gatens and Anthony Tucker.

In addition, junior forward Devan Archie (6-9, 215) is in his first year at Iowa after attending a junior college in Indianapolis.

### FIVE STATE CHAMPS

Iowa's roster of 12 players includes five players who won state titles during high school. Matt Gatens and John Lickliter won a state title for Iowa City HS in 2008. Eric May won a state title for Dubuque Wahlert HS in 2008. Brennan Cougill's Bishop Heelan HS captured the state title in 2009, while Anthony Tucker won a state title his senior year at Minnetonka HS.

### A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

Iowa's schedule in 2009-10 includes a minimum of 31 games, with 18 of those games slated for Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Following an exhibition game against Marian College (Nov. 8), the Hawkeyes open the regular season by hosting Texas-San Antonio on Sunday, Nov. 15. The home schedule also includes dates with Virginia Tech (Dec. 1) and Drake (Dec. 19).

### IOWA IN CBE CLASSIC

Iowa will play four games while competing in the O'Reilly Auto Parts CBE Classic. Home games against Texas-San Antonio (Nov. 15) and Duquesne (Nov. 17) are preliminary round games. This will mark the second-straight year Iowa will play Texas-San Antonio (Iowa downed UTSA, 73-67 a year ago).

Once in Kansas City, Iowa will meet Texas on Monday, Nov. 23 and face either Pittsburgh or Wichita State the following evening. Texas and Pittsburgh participated in the 2008 NCAA Tournament, while Wichita State competed in the College Basketball Invitational.

The 2009 event will take place Nov. 23-24, 2009 at the Sprint Center in Kansas City, MO. Iowa competed in the inaugural CBE Classic, which was called the Guardians Classic at the time, in 2001.

Syracuse defeated Kansas in overtime in the championship game of the tournament a year ago, while UCLA won the event in 2007. Iowa reached the championship game in the 2005 tournament. The Hawkeyes beat Kentucky before falling to Texas in the championship game.

## Hawkeye Notes

### IOWA PART OF COLLEGE HOOPS MARATHON

Iowa's contest against Duquesne on Nov. 17 will be part of ESPN's second annual College Hoops Tip-Off Marathon, celebrating 24 consecutive hours of college hoops coverage. The marathon will be highlighted by 12 live games in 24 consecutive hours on the ESPN family of networks. Combined, the networks will televise at least 38 total hours of coverage with 19 games – 17 men's and two women's – in a minimum of 25-and-a-half hours.

### HAWKEYES IN ACC/BIG TEN CHALLENGE

Iowa will host Virginia Tech Dec. 1 (8:35 p.m. CT, ESPN2) as part of the 2009 ACC/Big Ten Challenge. All 11 games in the Challenge will be televised on ESPN, ESPN2 or ESPNU.

Iowa is 2-6 in the Challenge after a narrow 57-55 defeat at Boston College last season. Iowa lost to Maryland, in Baltimore, in 2000, defeated Georgia Tech in 2001 in Iowa City, lost at Florida State in 2003 and lost to Duke, in Chicago, in 2002. Iowa did not take part in the event in 2003-04 and 2004-05. Iowa topped NC State in 2005-06.

Virginia Tech won the only previous meeting between the two programs, claiming a 69-65 victory in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge played in Blacksburg, VA on Nov. 29, 2006.

Virginia Tech posted a 19-15 record in 2008, including a 7-9 mark in league play. The Hokies advanced to the second round of the NIT, ending the season with a loss to Baylor. Virginia Tech is coached by Seth Greenberg, who has posted a 107-85 record in six seasons at Virginia Tech.

### HAWKEYE SCHEDULE NOTES

- Iowa's schedule includes 18 home games, along with an exhibition game against Marian College.
- Thirteen of Iowa's first 18 games will be played in the friendly confines of Carver-Hawkeye Arena, with two of the contests being played on a neutral floor.
- The Black and Gold will play two of its three in-state rivalry games on the road, visiting Iowa State and Northern Iowa, while playing Drake at home.
- The Hawkeyes will also host a Big Ten/ACC Challenge game this season, facing Virginia Tech in Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Overall, the Hawkeyes will play 18 home games and two contests on a neutral floor.
- Within the Big Ten, the Hawkeyes play two games against four of the top six teams in the league a year ago. Iowa meets Penn State (home) and Wisconsin (away) just once. Iowa opens Big Ten play with four of five games at home, while it concludes the conference slate with three of four on the road. The Big Ten Tournament is held in Indianapolis.
- Iowa's Big Ten opener vs. Purdue on Dec. 29 is its earliest conference opener since the 1952 season. That year the Hawkeyes opened with Michigan on Dec. 13 in an 18-game league schedule.
- Iowa's Big Ten schedule includes four weekend home dates and five games during the week.

### POST-SEASON OPPONENTS

Twenty-two of Iowa's 31 games during the regular season are against teams that advanced to post-season play last season. That includes 15 games, and possible 16, against teams that participated in the NCAA Tournament. During the non-conference portion of the schedule Iowa will meet teams from the Big 12, ACC and Missouri Valley, along with a possible Big East opponent. Iowa will participate in the O'Reilly Auto Parts CBE Classic, challenging Texas and either Pittsburgh or Wichita State, in Kansas City. Iowa, in 2008-09, played 22 of 32 games against teams that advanced to post-season play. That included 10 teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament (3-12), three opponents who competed in the NIT (2-2) and three opponents who participated in the CBI Tournament (2-1).

### IOWA ON THE BIG TEN NETWORK

The majority of Iowa games throughout the season can be seen on the Big Ten Network, a national cable television network that now reaches over 70 million homes in its third year. The Big Ten Network is available on Mediacom, which provides cable service to over 400,000 customers throughout Iowa and the Midwest.

The Big Ten Network has agreements with more than 250 affiliates, including DirectTV, Dish Network, AT&T U-Verse, Comcast, Cox, Insight, Time Warner Cable and Verizon FiOS.

### IOWA ON THE TUBE

All 31 Iowa regular-season games this season are slated to be televised. The Hawkeyes will appear on the ESPN family of networks six times, 20 times on the Big Ten Network, three times on Mediacom Connections, and the Cyclone Television Network and Panther Sports Network once.

### LICKLITER VS. RANKED TEAMS

Iowa Coach Todd Lickliter holds a 7-17 record when coaching against nationally ranked opponents, including a 1-12 mark at Iowa (0-7 in 2008-09) and a 6-5 record in six seasons at Butler.

Iowa, in 2008-09, dropped a 68-65 contest at No. 23 Ohio State and lost a 52-49 decision to No. 19/22 Minnesota in Iowa City. Iowa was defeated 75-53 at No. 19/19 Purdue and the Boilermakers won at Iowa City (49-45) while ranked No. 20/23. Iowa lost 71-56 to No. 9/9 Michigan State at home 62-54 to the No. 9/9 Spartans at East Lansing, and 62-54 at No. 19/20 Illinois.

In 2007-08, Iowa defeated sixth-ranked Michigan State (43-36), while dropping decisions to 11th-ranked Indiana (76-79), 24th-ranked Wisconsin (51-64), seventh-ranked Indiana (43-65), eighth-ranked Wisconsin (54-60) and 17th-ranked Michigan State (52-66).

Lickliter's Butler teams defeated ranked opponents Louisville (14th), Maryland (18th), Mississippi State (20th), Ball State (21st), Tennessee (22nd) and Gonzaga (23rd). His teams are 0-3 vs. top five opponents, including losses to third-ranked Oklahoma in 2003, third-ranked Florida in 2007 and fifth-ranked Duke in 2003.

### NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Iowa Coach Todd Lickliter was named the 2007 Division I national Coach of the Year by the National Basketball Coaches (NABC) after leading Butler to 29 wins and a spot in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. Four current Big Ten Conference head coaches have earned national Coach of the Year honors.

### NO 3-POINTERS

Since the 3-point shot became part of the college game, Iowa has played 14 games in which it has failed to make a 3-point attempt. Iowa had made at least one 3-point basket in 53-straight games before missing all five attempts in a 71-61 home win over Purdue in 2004. Iowa's current streak includes at least one 3-point basket in 182 straight games.

## Hawkeye Notes

### IOWA IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

Iowa made its 22nd appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2006. Iowa earned the Big Ten Conference's automatic bid by virtue of claiming the league's tournament title.

The Hawkeyes hold an overall record of 27-24 in the tournament, advancing to the Final Four in 1955 (fourth), 1956 (second) and 1980 (fourth). Iowa reached the regional championship in 1987 and lost in the regional semi-final in 1988 and 1999.

### IOWA IN TOURNAMENT PLAY

Iowa has fared well while taking part in regular-season tournaments over the past 27 years. In that time Iowa has won the Great Alaska Shootout (1986-87), the Cal-Irvine Anteater Classic (1986-87), the Maui Classic (1987-88), the San Juan Thanksgiving Shootout (1992-93), the San Juan Christmas Shootout (1997-98), the Big Ten Conference Tournament in 2001 and 2006 and its own invitational 24 times.

In addition, Iowa was runner-up in the 1985-86 Far West Classic, the 1987-88 All-College Tournament, the 1988-89 Chaminade Classic, the 1991-92 Tampa Tribune Holiday Invitational, the 1994-95 Rainbow Classic, the 1995-96 Great Alaska Shootout, the 1999-00 Coaches vs. Cancer Classic, the 2001-02 Guardians Classic, the 2005-06 Guardians Classic, the 2002 Big Ten Conference Tournament and the 2004 Maui Invitational.

## Todd Lickliter, Head Coach

Todd Lickliter is in his third season as The University of Iowa's head men's basketball coach after being named to the position on April 3, 2007. Lickliter joined the Iowa program after serving as the head coach at Butler University for six seasons (2001-07). He is Iowa's 21st men's basketball coach.

Lickliter holds a career record of 159-97 (.621), including a 28-36 (.438) mark at Iowa. He posted a 131-61 (.682) record as Butler's head coach. He led Butler to four post-season tournament berths, including trips to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 2003 and 2007.

In his second season at Iowa, Lickliter led the Hawkeyes to a 15-17 overall record. Iowa ranked 16th in the nation in scoring defense (59.6), 24th in free throw percentage (.744) and 30th in three-point field goals per game (8.1).

The Hawkeyes defeated six teams in the RPI Top 100 despite not being at full strength. Ten of Iowa's losses were by eight points or less, including six by four points or less. The Hawkeyes won three overtime games and another four games by six points or less.

Iowa's top scorer in non-conference action missed the entire second semester, top rebounder Cyrus Tate missed all of nine games due to injury and assist leader Jeff Peterson missed the final seven games, also due to injury.

His first Iowa team posted 13 regular season wins while suffering two major injuries, as junior Tony Freeman missed 10 games and freshman Jarryd Cole missed the entire Big Ten season. Both were in the starting line-up when healthy. The Hawkeyes allowed just 58 points per game, ranking second in the Big Ten Conference and fifth in the nation in scoring defense.

Lickliter was named the 2006-07 Division I Coach of the Year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and was recognized as the High-Major Coach of the Year by collegehoops.net. He was also named 2007 Horizon League Coach of the Year for the second consecutive year after guiding the Bulldogs to a school and league-record 29 victories.

He led Butler to the regular season championship in the Horizon League in 2007. The Bulldogs advanced to the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament before falling to eventual national champion Florida (65-57). Butler, in 2008, repeated as Horizon League champions.

In posting a 29-7 record in 2006-07 Butler led the nation in fewest turnovers per game (9.5), ranked fifth in scoring defense (57.1), seventh in free throw percentage (76%), 13th in won-loss percentage (.806), 17th in scoring margin (10.5) and 20th in three-point field goals per game (8.9).



Butler was ranked in the national top 25 for 16 consecutive weeks during the 2006-07 season and became the first team in the history of the Horizon League to be ranked in the top 10. The Bulldogs won three games over top 25 opponents (Tennessee, Gonzaga, Maryland) and recorded eight victories over teams that participated in the NCAA Tournament.

Butler averaged 22 wins in six seasons under Lickliter, winning league titles in 2002, 2003 and 2007. The Bulldogs won four in-season tournaments, including the 2006 NIT Season Tip-Off and the 2006 Wooden Classic.

Along with winning at least 20 games in four of six seasons at Butler, Lickliter's student-athletes also excelled in the classroom. Butler's graduation rate of 82% for men's basketball in Lickliter's final season ranked best among all Sweet Sixteen teams in the 2007 NCAA Tournament and guard A.J. Graves joined Iowa's Adam Haluska on the 2007 academic all-America first team. Butler also held the top graduation rate among NCAA Sweet Sixteen teams when the Bulldogs advanced past Mississippi State and Louisville in the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

Lickliter's 2006-07 team captured the Midwest Region title of the NIT Season Tip-Off with back-to-back victories over Notre Dame and Indiana. The Bulldogs continued their roll in New York, defeating 22nd-ranked Tennessee and 23rd-ranked Gonzaga to capture the pre-season NIT.

The Bulldogs began the 2006-07 season with 10 straight victories, including a triumph over Purdue in the Wooden Tradition. The 10 wins matched the second-fastest start in school history and the fifth-longest winning streak in school annals. Butler cracked the "Top 25" on Nov. 27 and was nationally-ranked for a school and league record 16 consecutive weeks. Lickliter's club became the first team in Horizon League history to break into the nation's "Top 10" on Feb. 5.

At mid-season Lickliter was named the Jim Phelan National Coach of the Year, presented by Collegeinsider.com. He also earned the mid-season Hugh Durham Award, which at mid-season recognizes the top coach at the mid-major level.

The 2006-07 Bulldogs became the first team in league history to record 20 wins before February and the first Horizon League team to win 26 regular season games. Butler had three wins over teams that were ranked in the "Top 25" and eight victories over squads that advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

Lickliter became the first coach in Horizon League history to be honored by the NABC as Coach of the Year. He owns three of the top single-season win totals in Butler history, including 29 wins in 2007, 26 in 2002 and 27 in 2003. The Bulldogs also won 20 games in 2004.

Lickliter ranks fourth on Butler's all-time list for basketball coaching victories. He ranks second among Butler head coaches with at least three seasons in winning percentage (.682) and second in number of 20-win seasons (four). He became the first Butler coach to reach 50 career wins in just two seasons and the first to achieve 100 vic-

tories in five seasons. And, he's one of just four coaches in the history of the Horizon League to guide a team to the NCAA "Sweet Sixteen".

Lickliter led the Bulldogs to an unbeaten home record (12-0) in 2002-03, and mentored Butler to a 70-12 (.854) home mark in his six seasons. Lickliter also directed Butler to 61 victories away from Hinkle Fieldhouse. His Bulldog teams were 6-5 against teams ranked in the "Top 25" in the nation.

In 2005-06, Butler's men's basketball program earned the Horizon League Outreach Award, compiling the highest number of community service hours among all teams at Butler University. In his six seasons as the head coach at Butler, 19 of 20 seniors earned their degree.

In his first season as Butler's head coach, Lickliter guided the Bulldogs to a then school-record 26 victories and a third consecutive Horizon League regular season title. He led Butler to regular season tournament championships at the Top of the World Classic in Alaska and Indiana's Hoosier Classic. The win at the Top of the World Classic marked Butler's first regular season tournament title in 41 years. The victory at the Hoosier Classic ended Indiana's streak of 19 consecutive titles in the 20-year history of the event.

Lickliter was the first basketball coach in Butler history to win his first 13 games, and he became the first coach to lead Butler to more than 20 regular season wins. He set school and conference records for most wins by a first-year coach, and he led the Bulldogs to the third-highest single season win total in league history. He had Butler ranked in

the "Top 25" for the first time in 53 years, and guided the Bulldogs to their first-ever unbeaten non-conference record.

Lickliter guided the 2003 Bulldogs to an even more impressive season in his second year. He led Butler to a 27-6 record, breaking the single-season mark for victories for a second consecutive year. His squad earned a second straight Horizon League regular season title and returned to post-season play for the second consecutive year. Butler earned its first "at-large" bid to the NCAA Tournament since 1962, and the Bulldogs went on to reach the Sweet Sixteen with upset victories over fifth-seeded Mississippi State and fourth-seeded Louisville.

Lickliter was named Butler's basketball coach in May, 2001, following a strong lobbying effort by Butler players (Horizon League "Player of the Year" Rylan Hainje called Lickliter "... a great coach." Mike Monserez said, "Coach Lickliter treats us with respect; he treats us like men." Guard Brandon Miller added that Lickliter "... is one of the smartest coaches I've ever been around.").

He replaced his former boss, Thad Matta, who left the Bulldogs after one season to become head coach at Xavier. Lickliter, who became Butler's third head coach in three seasons, had served as an assistant coach under the Bulldogs' previous two head coaches, Barry Collier and Matta. He was also an assistant coach (1988-89) for one season at Butler under Coach Joe Sexson. He became the third consecutive former Butler player to guide the Bulldogs.

A 1979 Butler graduate, Lickliter played a prominent role in refining Butler's basket-

ball system ("The Butler Way") while serving as an assistant coach. During his three seasons on the staff of the two former head coaches, Lickliter helped the Bulldogs post three 20-win seasons, three conference regular season titles, three league tournament crowns and three trips to the NCAA Tournament. In his final two seasons as a Butler assistant coach, the Bulldogs compiled a 47-18 record, including "Top 25" wins over 10th-ranked Wisconsin and 23rd-ranked Wake Forest. The win over the Demon Deacons in the 2001 NCAA Tournament was Butler's first NCAA Tournament victory in 39 years.

Lickliter began his collegiate coaching career at Butler in 1988-89 under Sexson, his former college coach. He left Butler after one year to accept a head coaching job at Danville, IN High School, where he remained for three seasons. He returned to the collegiate ranks in 1996 as an administrative assistant on Collier's staff at Butler. Lickliter accepted an assistant coaching position at Eastern Michigan in 1997 and remained on the Eagles' staff for two seasons before returning to Butler in 1999. In six Division I seasons, he contributed to teams that won three conference regular season championships, four conference tournament titles, made four NCAA Tournament appearances, and compiled a 106-73 record.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Lickliter had high school head coaching stints at Park Tudor High School in Indianapolis (1979-87) and Danville High School (1987-88, 1989-92). He also coached a partial season in Saudi Arabia with the Ah Ahli Sports Club-Jeddah.

Lickliter has had a presence in Indiana basketball dating back to his days as a three-year starting guard at North Central High School in Indianapolis, where he played for his father, Arlan. He began his college career at North Carolina-Wilmington before transferring to Central Florida Community College. He played one season at Central Florida, earning his associate degree in 1977, and then transferred to Butler, where he played his final two collegiate seasons, 1977-79. He earned a B.S degree in secondary education from Butler in 1979.

Lickliter was born April 17, 1955. He and his wife, Joz, have three sons, Ry, Garrett and John, and a daughter-in-law, Molly.

## *Joel Cornette, Assistant Coach*

Joel Cornette, a former player at Butler University under Coach Todd Lickliter, is in his third year as an assistant coach at Iowa after joining the program in April, 2007.

Cornette joined the Iowa staff after serving as the coordinator of basketball operations at Butler during the 2006-07 season, where he helped the Bulldogs post a 29-7 overall record. Butler shared the 2007 Horizon League regular season title and advanced to the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament before a loss to eventual national champion Florida.

The Bulldogs set a school record for wins in 2007 after opening the season with 10 straight victories. Butler won the NIT Season Tip-Off Tournament with wins over Notre Dame, Indiana, Tennessee and Gonzaga.

Butler led the nation in fewest turnovers per game (9.5), ranked fifth in scoring defense (57.1), seventh in free throw percentage (76%), 13th in won-loss percentage (.806), 17th in scoring margin (10.5) and 20th in three-point field goals per game (8.9).

At Butler, Cornette handled administrative and operational duties, including team travel arrangements and duties related to Butler's summer basketball camp program. He also worked closely with the Blue Team, Butler's men's basketball booster organization.



As a player, Cornette is the only player in Butler basketball history to play in 100 victories before concluding his playing career in 2003. Cornette helped lead Butler to a four-year record of 100-28 (.781). He played a part in four Horizon League regular season championships, two Horizon League tournament titles, three trips to the NCAA Tournament and one berth in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). He played in every game of his Butler career, setting an all-time school record of 128 games played. He was in Butler's starting lineup in his final 97 games as a college player.

Cornette is one of just 30 Butler players to score 1,000 career points. He led Butler in rebounding for three straight years and topped the Bulldogs in blocked shots for four consecutive seasons. He finished his career in ninth place on Butler's all-time rebounding list.

Cornette was named to the Horizon League all-Defensive team for three straight years and he earned all-league honors once. He was picked to the league all-Tournament team in both 2001 and 2003 and was named to the NCAA East Region all-Tournament team in 2003. He was selected as Butler's co-Most Valuable Player in 2003 and was named Butler's co-Most Outstanding Male Athlete as a senior.

Cornette served as a student assistant coach at Butler in 2003-04. He played professional basketball for two seasons, both with the Nebraska Cranes of the United States Basketball League and in Australia.

Cornette earned his bachelor's degree in marketing from Butler in 2004. He is a native of Cincinnati, OH, where he attended St. Xavier HS. He was the conference Player of the Year as a senior in 1999.

Cornette was born June 22, 1981. He is single.

## *LaVall Jordan, Assistant Coach*

LaVall Jordan, a former Butler University assistant coach and player under Coach Todd Lickliter, is in his third year as an assistant coach at Iowa after joining the program as an assistant coach in April, 2007.



Jordan served three seasons (2004-07) as a full-time assistant coach at Butler after spending the 2003-04 season as Butler's coordinator of basketball operations. As an assistant coach, he held on-the-court coaching and teaching chores, game preparation duties and prospect evaluation responsibilities. He also had duties related to Butler's summer basketball camps.

As an assistant coach at Butler, Jordan helped the Bulldogs post a 29-7 record in 2006-07. Butler shared the Horizon League regular season title in 2007 and advanced to the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament before a loss to eventual national champion Florida.

The Bulldogs set a school record for wins in 2007 after opening the season with 10 straight victories. Butler won the NIT Season Tip-Off Tournament with wins over Notre Dame, Indiana, Tennessee and Gonzaga.

Butler led the nation in fewest turnovers per game (9.5), ranked fifth in scoring defense (57.1), seventh in free throw percentage (76%), 13th in won-loss percentage (.806), 17th in scoring margin (10.5) and 20th in three-point field goals per game (8.9).

Jordan helped the Bulldogs to a remarkably successful run as a four-year letterman from 1997-2001. He helped the Bulldogs win three conference tournament titles and two Horizon League regular season championships while participating in four consecutive post-season tournaments.

He was a starting guard for the Bulldogs in 2000-01, as Butler won the conference regular season and tournament championships and defeated Wake Forest in the NCAA Tournament. It was Butler's first NCAA Tournament win in 35 years. Jordan was named CBS "Player of the Game" in Butler's second-round contest after scoring 17 points against nationally-ranked Arizona. He was the first player in Butler basketball history to play in four NCAA Tournament games and he also played in three NIT games.

Jordan was Butler's Most Valuable Player in 2000-01. He was a two-time all-conference performer and was named MVP of the 2001 league championship. He contributed to 91 victories in four years, a Butler record at the time. He completed his career in sixth place on Butler's career list for three-point field goals (151) and he currently stands eighth on Butler's all-time list for three-pointers. Jordan tallied 977 points, 365 rebounds and 179 assists during his four-year career.

After earning his bachelor's degree in journalism in 2001, Jordan played professional basketball in Europe. He was the first Butler player to participate in the National Basketball Developmental League, playing for the Huntsville Flight.

Jordan returned to Butler in the fall of 2003 and took over administrative and operational duties for the men's basketball program. The Bulldogs posted a 20-13 record in 2005-06 in his second year as an assistant coach, placing second in the league standings while earning an NIT post-season bid.

Jordan was born April 16, 1979 and is a native of Albion, MI. He and his wife, Destinee, have two daughters, Ava (four) and Alanna (two).

## ***Chad Walthall, Assistant Coach***

Chad Walthall is in his third year at the University of Iowa and 22nd overall as a coach.

Walthall served seven seasons at Loras College as head basketball coach (2000-07), becoming the third winningest coach in school history. He also served as Director of Athletics from 2004-07.

Walthall was named 2006-07 Iowa Intercollegiate Conference (IIC) Coach of the Year while leading the Duhawks to a 15-1 conference record and the IIC title. It was the first IIC title for Loras since the 1950-51 season and its most conference wins in school history. Along with achieving regular season success, Walthall led Loras to its first IIC tournament title and first NCAA tournament berth in school history. His seven-year mark at Loras was 116-69.

In the three years prior to Walthall's arrival, Loras had only won 35% of its conference games, including a 10th place finish in league play in 1999-2000, a year prior to his arrival. In Walthall's first season of rebuilding the program, Loras dramatically improved to finish fourth in the league and hosted its first conference tournament game in school history. From that first season, Walthall progressively built Loras into a perennial league contender and one of the top Division III programs in the West Region.

Walthall led Loras to winning seasons in the very competitive Iowa conference in each of his seven seasons. In his last three years, Loras won an impressive 77% (37-11) of its league games, more than any other basketball program in the conference. In his final two seasons, Loras posted a 22-3 home record, including 11-game winning streaks in both 2005-06 and 2006-07.

With the rebuilding job complete, Walthall joined the Iowa program and left the Loras basketball program in excellent shape, as the Duhawks returned their entire starting line-up, including the returning IIC MVP. Loras began the 2007-08 season ranked eighth in the country and as a unanimous selection to repeat as Iowa Conference champions. Loras went on to repeat as IIC tournament champions and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year.



Walthall has proven he is a highly successful recruiter, as those graduating seniors had the best conference (50-14) and overall record of any IIC team during their four-year career. Also, they ended with the second best winning percentage of any four-year period in school history. Walthall recruited 19 all-conference selections, including a two-time IIC Player of the Year, two-time all-region honoree and a two-time all-American, and five 1,000-point scorers. In 2005, Loras was recognized as the best small college recruiting class in Chicago by Hoop Scoop magazine.

In addition to building and leading the Duhawks to success on the court, Walthall focused on helping student athletes make a difference off the court, as he implemented several community outreach programs in the Dubuque area during his tenure.

Walthall took over the Loras program after serving as assistant coach at Eastern Michigan for two years (1998-2000), where he worked with Iowa Coach Todd Lickliter. Walthall was previously an assistant coach at St. Olaf College for four years (1994-98) and served as head coach at Redwood Valley High School in Minnesota for one season (1993-94). He was a graduate assistant coach at St. Cloud State University for two years (1991-93). While at St. Cloud State he also served as the head coach for a Collegiate All-Star team that toured Europe.

Walthall attended Concordia College in Moorhead, MN, earning a bachelor's degree in Physical Education and Health in 1991. While at Saint Cloud State he earned his master's degree in Athletics Administration (1993).

As a collegiate athlete at Concordia, Walthall played quarterback and was part of two Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) football championships. He earned all-conference honors in that sport as a junior and senior. He also served as student assistant basketball coach during his time there.

As a high school athlete in Staples, MN, Walthall was team captain and three-year starter in football, basketball and baseball, earning numerous all-conference honors. His 1986 basketball team placed as a state runner-up and he was selected to play point guard in the Minnesota All-Star basketball game as a senior.

Walthall was born Sept. 13, 1968 and is a native of Staples, MN. He and his wife, Jenni, have four children, a daughter Brooke (nine), twin sons Brady and Blake (seven), and son Beau (three).

## *Jerry Strom, Director of Operations*

A longtime member of the Athletic Department and the Iowa basketball staff, Jerry Strom is in his 29th season as a member of the University of Iowa basketball staff.



Strom joined the Iowa staff in 1981 as a graduate assistant coach under Lute Olson. He served in that capacity for two years prior to being promoted to an administrative position in 1983.

Strom works closely with the Hawkeye basketball staff, helping to coordinate and carry out the day-to-day activities of Iowa basketball program. Strom served as tournament director for Iowa's Hawkeye Challenge for 26 years, and for six years did color commentary with Jim Zabel for Iowa basketball on the Palmer Radio Network.

When Jerry first joined the Iowa staff he implemented the school's first Iowa Basketball Coaches Clinic, as well as bringing in and directing the 1988 national 19-and-under A.A.U. Tournament, held in Iowa City. He has been a member of four basketball staffs that have competed in 23 NCAA and NIT tournaments.

Strom has served on the Iowa athletic department's Student Athlete Assistance Program. He is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and has served on a number of NABC committees.

Strom came to Iowa from Monmouth College, where he was assistant to the athletic director, as well as assistant basketball and baseball coach from 1979-81. The 1979 Monmouth baseball squad competed in the NCAA Division III College World Series and the Monmouth basketball team won the Midwest Conference basketball championship.

Strom was athletic director and head basketball and track coach at Martin Luther King High School in New York City for four years. His 1976 King squad won the New York City Thru-way City League championship and his track squads were three-time League city champions.

Strom graduated from Fontanelle (IA) High School, where he earned all-state honors in basketball, football and baseball, as well as being selected to Iowa Boys State. He attended Concordia (NE) College, where he played basketball, baseball and golf. Jerry earned his master's degree (athletic administration) from Western Illinois in 1980 and worked towards his doctoral degree at Iowa.

Jerry was born March 1, 1955. He and his wife, Melody, have a daughter (Jessica, 22) and a son (Justin, 21).

Garrett Licklitter is in his second year as a graduate manager on the University of Iowa basketball staff.

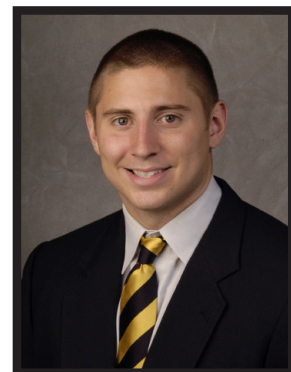
