# 2009 BASKETBALL

The University of Iowa and Carver-Hawkeye Arena have been selected by the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee to serve as one of 16 first and second round hosts for the 2009 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship. Games will take place Sunday, March 22 and Tuesday, March 24, 2009 in Iowa City.

The Committee announced in the summer of 2007 that the championship would be expanding to 16 pre-determined first and second round sites beginning in 2009. Additional cities chosen to host first and second round games in 2009 include: Iowa City, IA; Bowling Green, KY; Chattanooga, TN; East Lansing, MI; Notre Dame, IN; San Diego, CA; Seattle, WA and Storrs, CT. A total of three Big Ten institutions will host first and second rounds in 2009 (lowa, Michigan State and Ohio State).

"We are thrilled to have the opportunity to host the first and second rounds of the NCAA Championship in 2009," said Iowa Head Coach Lisa Bluder. "This will give our lowa fans a great opportunity to witness the national tournament first hand. It has been a long time since lowa has hosted the NCAA Championship and we are excited to bring the competition and atmosphere back to Carver Hawkeye Arena!"

"The committee was pleased with the amount of interest generated when we announced that we were going to 16 pre-determined sites again in 2009 and 2010," said Judy Southard, senior associate director of athletics at Louisiana State University and chair of the Division I Women's Basketball Committee. "To be able to get a good blend of cities that have past-hosting experience in combination with a number of new cities and venues is good for the continued growth of the game of women's basketball and our championship."

The UI Department of Athletics first hosted a NCAA Championship site in 1986 when it served as one of four regional final sites. Carver-Hawkeye Arena has hosted NCAA Women's Championship games 11 years (1986-90, 92-94, 96-98). The UI and Carver-Hawkeye Arena have entertained the regional finals four times and first and/ or second rounds nine times. The NCAA Championship expanded to 64 teams in 1994.

The last time lowa City hosted a first and second round site was in 1998. Iowa defeated Massachusetts in the first round, but lost to Kansas in the second round. The Hawkeyes boast a 9-4 record in NCAA Championship games at Carver-Hawkeye Arena.



Every four years, the lowa Women's Basketball team travels overseas to build team chemistry and compete against foreign competition during the summer. The Hawkeyes traveled to the beautiful country of Greece, May 23-June 2, 2007. The chance to visit such a gorgeous country with teammates and friends was an opportunity of a lifetime. The journey generated numerous lifelong memories and gave the team an opportunity to experience another culture, while also competing against one of the best teams in the world.

The University of Iowa women's basketball team will travel to Durham. NC. to meet Duke as part of the second annual ACC/Big Ten Challenge. The game will be held at Cameron Indoor Stadium on Dec. 4.

This will be the first meeting between lowa and Duke. Overall, lowa is 9-3 against teams from the ACC. Last year, the Black and Gold hosted Georgia Tech and lost, 76-57, while the Blue Devils fell at Penn State, 86-84, in the first-ever Challenge.

"We are excited to be playing at Duke in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge," said Iowa Head Coach Lisa Bluder. "Cameron Indoor Stadium is a historic building and they have an exciting women's basketball environment. We look forward to the test of playing in that venue. This game adds to an already challenging non-conference schedule that includes California, Kansas, Texas Tech and Iowa State."

Duke was third in the ACC last season with a 10-4 conference mark and finished the season 25-10 and ranked 10th in the nation after advancing to the "Sweet Sixteen" in the NCAA Championships. Iowa tied for first in the Big Ten a year ago with a 10-5 league mark and finished its season 21-11 after competing in the first round of the NCAA Championships.

The Blue Devils return 10 letterwinners and four starters from a year ago, while the Hawkeyes return eight letterwinners and two starters. Duke is coached by Joanne P. McCallie, who will be in her second season guiding the Blue Devils after mentoring Michigan State for six seasons (2001-07).

The ACC won last season's Challenge, 8-3.



Sally Mason became the 20th President of The University of Iowa on August 1, 2007. She holds a full professorship with tenure in the Department of Biological Sciences of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

President Mason served as Provost of Purdue University from 2001-2007, where she was responsible for planning, managing, and reviewing all academic programs at Purdue's West Lafayette and four affiliated branch campuses throughout Indiana. Her accomplishments as Provost included increasing diversity, recruiting top faculty, doubling the research program,

advancing public engagement, and improving the learning environment for students. During President Mason's tenure as Provost, Purdue hired over 800 new faculty, 300 of which were new positions; 56% of those hires were women and/or minorities. She also formed a diversity leadership group while at Purdue. President Mason was instrumental in the development of Purdue's Discovery Park, an interdisciplinary research incubator focused on such topics as nanotechnology, entrepreneurship, and biosciences.

The daughter of an immigrant family and the first child to attend college, President Mason received her B.S. in zoology from The University of Kentucky in 1972, her M.S. from Purdue University in 1974, and her Ph.D. in cellular, molecular, and developmental biology from The University of Arizona in 1978. She subsequently spent two years at Indiana University in Bloomington doing postdoctoral research before joining The University of Kansas in 1981. A strong advocate of undergraduate education, she received awards for outstanding undergraduate advising and teaching, and she was awarded a prestigious Kemper Teaching Fellowship. During her 21 years at Kansas, President Mason served as a full professor in the Department of Molecular Biosciences, Acting Chair of the Department of Physiology and Cell Biology, and Associate Dean in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. In 1995, she was appointed Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the largest academic unit on the University of Kansas campus.

President Mason is the author of many scientific papers and has obtained a number of research grants from the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the Wesley Research Foundation, and the Lilly Endowment. Her research interests have focused on the developmental biology, genetics, and biochemistry of pigment cells and pigments in the skin of vertebrates. She has served as President of both the PanAmerican Society for Pigment Cell Research and the Council of Colleges of Arts and Sciences, and has served as Chair of the Advisory Committee to the National Science Foundation Directorate for Education and Human Resources (EHR) and the Executive Committee of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges (NASULGC) Chief Academic Officers Group. She also served on the Executive Committee of the Committee on Institutional Cooperation (CIC) from 2003-2007 and was appointed to the National Medal of Science Selection Committee from 2006-2008.

President Mason is married to Ken Mason, an educator and textbook author who teaches biological sciences at The University of Iowa.

Gary Barta is in his third year as the Athletic Director at The University of Iowa. He became the University's 11th Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on August 1, 2006. He succeeded Robert Bowlsby, who left after 15 years at lowa to take over the program at Stanford.

A native Midwesterner, Barta signed a five-year contract to lead one of the most successful athletic programs in the nation. His wife Connie is a native of Waterloo, Iowa. The two met while Barta was an assistant athletic director at Northern Iowa. Barta has already put his stamp on

Hawkeye Athletics during his first two years in Iowa City. He oversaw the

final stages of the \$89 million renovation at Kinnick Stadium and the new Paul W. Brechler Press Box. He officially opened Iowa's new Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Center. In the spring of 2007 he hired new head men's Basketball Coach Todd Lickliter from Butler University. Lickliter's hiring came on the heels of his team's Sweet 16 appearance and his being named the NABC Division I national Coach of the Year. Basketball experts from around the country are touting this as an outstanding hire.

During the past year lowa's wrestling team returned to national prominence winning the NCAA title for the 21st time in school history. The Hawkeyes also won the Big Ten title in convincing fashion. The Iowa women's basketball team won a share of the Big Ten championship and qualified for the NCAA tourney. And, the Hawkeye field hockey unit won the Big Ten's tournament championship.

Several other initiatives have been set in motion during Barta's first two years at Iowa. An Athletic Department Strategic Plan has been launched, mapping out the vision and goals for the future. Ground has been broken for a new \$7 million boathouse for the rowing program. Construction is well underway on a new Campus Wellness and Recreation Center, which includes a firstclass aquatic center. It will serve as the new home for the Hawkeye men and women's swimming teams. Carver-Hawkeye Arena is slated to undergo a \$47 million renovation that will add a practice facility, improve the fan experience, and renovate and add office space. In addition to facilities, the Strategic Plan lays out goals for academic achievement, championship success, fiscal growth, and overall student-athlete, coach, and staff performance.

Barta has over 20 years of university and athletic administration experience. Before taking over at Iowa he had been the Wyoming Athletic Director since October of 2003. From November 1996 to October 2003, he was Senior Associate Athletic Director for External Relations and Sports Programs at the University of Washington in Seattle. From 1990 to 1996, he was associated with the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls, where he was the Director of Athletic Development and External Relations. He also served as Associate Director of Development at North Dakota State University in Fargo, from 1988-90, where he was involved in fund-raising for athletics, the colleges of business and engineering, and the University's annual fund.

Wyoming received the NCAA Division IA Program of Excellence Award in 2006 during Barta's tenure there, which honors athletic programs that are superior athletically, academically, and in student-athlete life skills preparation.

The Barta led program at Wyoming was credited with a number of significant accomplishments. The Cowboys played in the 2004 Las Vegas Bowl and posted a victory over UCLA. The women's basketball team won 21 games during the 2005-06 season, a top 20 placing by the women's track team at the NCAA meet in 2005, and a top 25 finish in men's NCAA swimming in 2004. During his threeyear tenure, seven Wyoming coaches earned Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year awards.

Prior to taking over at Wyoming, he served as Washington's Senior Associate Athletic Director for External Relations and Sports Programs. He was responsible for generating revenue to fund Washington's \$40 million annual intercollegiate athletics budget. While at Washington, Barta was directly involved in a variety of duties including: hiring of coaches and administrative staff, coordinating the schedule for men's basketball, initiating and managing sponsor relationships, and negotiating radio network contracts.

Barta earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Mass Communication and Broadcast Journalism from North Dakota State University in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA national championship in 1983, 1985 and 1986. He returned to NDSU to begin his career in 1988 as an Associate Director of Development and later became the Director of Development.

## Lisa Bluder

Ninth Season Northern Iowa, 1983

One of the most respected and admired coaches in collegiate basketball, Lisa Bluder is in her ninth season as head women's basketball coach at the University of Iowa and 25th year overall. Under her direction, the Hawkeyes have advanced to seven post-season appearances (five NCAA and two WNIT). The dean of Big Ten coaches, Bluder has posted a 148-98 (.602) re-

cord at lowa and her 24-year record stands at 504-240 (.677). Her 148 wins at lowa are the second-most of any Hawkeye women's basketball coach, behind Hall of Famer C. Vivian Stringer (269 wins).

Bluder, who is under contract through the 2013 season, is a two-time Big Ten and WBCA Regional Coach of the Year (2001 and 2008). Last season, Bluder mentored the Hawkeyes to a 21-11 overall record, bolstered by a 13-3 home record, and a share of the Big Ten regular season championship. Iowa reached the Big Ten Tournament semifinals and played in its 17th NCAA Championships. On Feb. 10, Bluder notched her 500th career victory at Penn State. Under her tutelage, four Hawkeyes earned all-Big Ten status a year ago. Junior Kristi Smith was recognized on the first team, senior Johanna Solverson was named to the second team, junior Wendy Ausdemore earned honorable mention accolades, while Megan Skouby was selected as

the "Sixth Player of the Year". Additionally, Smith garnered honorable mention all-America laurels.

During her eight years at lowa, Bluder has guided the Black and Gold to five Big Ten first-division finishes. Iowa's 75 league wins the last seven years rank as the fifthhighest in the conference behind Purdue (100), Ohio State (92), Penn State (80) and Michigan State (78). Furthermore, she has mentored lowa to three 20-plus-win seasons during her eight-year tenure.

She has coached six Hawkeye players to all-Big Ten first team status, four each to the second and third teams and three that were named all-freshman, including a Freshman of the Year (Skouby). Additionally, three former Hawkeyes continued their playing careers professionally after graduation. Cara Consuegra, Lindsey Meder and Crystal Smith all had stints in the WNBA.

As a team. Iowa has ranked in the top ten nationally in 3-point accuracy the last two years and rated in

the top ten in assists and free throw two of the last three seasons. Additionally, the Hawkeyes have ranked in the top-half of the Big Ten Conference in scoring and assists every season Bluder has been on the lowa sidelines. Five of lowa's top seven single-season assist averages and free throw percentages in the Hawkeye history books have come under Bluder.

In 2007-08, lowa broke three school records and tied another. The Hawkeyes established new records for field goal percentage in a half (17-23, .739; at Wisconsin), consecutive 3-pointers in a game (seven; vs. Minnesota) and most 3-pointers attempted in an NCAA Championships contest (22; vs. Georgia). Iowa equaled the school mark for triples made in an NCAA Championships game (nine; vs. Georgia).

Bluder garnered her 300th Division I victory vs. Indiana on Feb. 26, 2006. Two years ago, she reached two additional milestones, coaching in her 700th career game and her 200th on the lowa sidelines.

"Our success has always been based on playing up-tempo basketball," said Bluder. "We want to put lots of points on the board. The fast break is our number one offense. That type of basketball is exciting for fans and its fun for our players. When we do get into a half court game, everyone has a role. Our goal is to have four or five players averaging in double figures. We want everyone involved. Defensively, we work hard at never letting anything be easy for our opponent. We play tough player-to-player defense hoping to capitalize on steals to set up our break."

Two seasons ago, Iowa broke or tied 12 school and/or Carver-Hawkeye Arena records, including shattering the school's 3-point (.402) and free throw (.788)

percentage single-season records. Iowa's free throw percentage and 3-point field goal percentage ranked second and fifth in the country and first and third in Big Ten single-season history, respectively.

Bluder guided a young and mostly inexperienced group of Hawkeyes to a 17-12 overall record and a fifth place finish in the Big Ten with a 10-6 mark in 2005-06. Even with a season plagued by knee injuries, the Hawkeyes persevered with strong senior leadership and talented play from its freshman class. Bluder orchestrated one of her best years of coaching, with a team that tied for 15th in the nation with the most underclassmen on its roster. Undaunted, lowa's freshmen class shined and helped propel the Hawkeyes to an NCAA Tournament at-large berth.

lowa's 2005-06 squad was led by senior Crystal Smith and freshman Megan Skouby. Smith was named consensus all-Big Ten first team, earned all-conference defensive team accolades and was named to the WBCA Region VI all-America team. Skouby was named Iowa's third Big Ten Freshman of the Year recipient and also earned all-Big Ten second team laurels. In addition to the sensational play of Smith and Skouby, lowa's supporting cast helped lift Bluder and the Hawkeyes to another successful season.

"My players are truly an extension of my family," said Bluder. "I care about them in all aspects of their lives. I want to help them succeed as athletes, but especially as people. I have an open-door relationship with my players. Hopefully, they benefit from my perspective as their coach, as a former athlete and as a mother. They can come to me with anything and get help. Along with that aspect, I consider myself a disciplinarian. I don't have a lot of rules, but I do have a lot of expectations. Those revolve around moral and ethical values that are the foundation of our program."

In 2004-05, Bluder mentored lowa to a 23-10 overall record and advanced to the WNIT Final Four. The 23 victories are the most by a Bluder coached lowa team and the most victories since the 1995-96 season. Additionally, the 23 triumphs are the second-most by Bluder in her 17 years coaching at the Division I level. She had two 25-win seasons while coaching Drake.

lowa started the 2004-05 campaign 13-0 and were the last Division I undefeated team standing. Bluder navigated the Hawkeyes through a difficult schedule and ultimately finished the season ranked 38th in the RPI. Iowa opponents averaged only 64.4 points and 33.1 rebounds, which is the lowest average by Hawkeye opponents in eight years. Jamie Cavey earned second team all-Big Ten laurels, while Crystal Smith earned third team recognition. Krista Vande-Venter burst onto the scene and became lowa's all-time freshman single season rebounding leader and earned a spot on the all-Big Ten Freshman team.

In 2003-04, Bluder and the Hawkeyes finished with a 16-13 record while playing the 14th most difficult schedule in the nation and tied for fourth in the league with a 10-6 mark. In addition, eight of its 16 victories came on the road, marking the most road wins by a Hawkeye team since the 1993-94 season. Led by seniors Jennie Lillis and Kristi Faulkner and junior Jamie Cavey, Iowa was one of only two Big Ten squads to have three players selected to all-Big Ten teams. The trio became the first to score 450 points each in a single season at Iowa. The trio helped led the Hawkeyes to their 15th NCAA Tournament appearance.

Bluder mentored her third lowa team to another exciting run in the Big Ten Tournament and WNIT in 2003. The seventh-seeded Hawkeyes opened the league tournament with a win over Northwestern. In the quarterfinals, lowa treated its fans to a thrilling upset victory over 13th-ranked and secondseeded Minnesota. The Hawkeyes opened postseason play with wins over Saint Louis and Marguette before falling to the Missouri Valley Conference co-champion Creighton Bulldogs in the WNIT.

In 2001-02, Bluder coached the Hawkeyes to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year and a fourth place finish in the Big Ten. Iowa finished with an 18-11 overall record and a 10-6 mark in league play.

In her first season with the Black and Gold, Bluder transformed a struggling program into a 21-game winner. Iowa received the Big Ten's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament with a victory over Purdue to capture the 2001 Big Ten Tournament. Furthermore, the Hawkeyes advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament after receiving a No. 4 seed and finished the season ranked No. 16 in the final Associated Press poll.

Competing in one of the most demanding conferences in the country, Bluder directed the Hawkeyes to a 21-10 overall record, a second-place finish in the conference regular season and captured lowa's second-ever Big Ten Tournament title. Iowa played the 16th toughest schedule in the country and finished the season ranked 18th in the RPI.

Individually, Cara Consuegra, Lindsey Meder and Randi Peterson were all voted to the all-Big Ten first team in 2001. Consuegra was voted the Big Ten

Tournament Most Outstanding Player, while Peterson was selected to the all-Big Ten Tournament Team. Meder was voted the Big Ten Player of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service and became the first Iowa female basketball player to be named to the Verizon Academic All-America first team.

Bluder's success earned her numerous accolades. She became lowa's third coach to be named Big Ten Coach of the Year. She was also honored as the College Coach of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service and was named the Women's Basketball Coaches Association District VI Coach of the Year.

Her presence on the lowa sidelines turned heads across the country. Virginia and USA Basketball Head Coach Debbie Ryan chose Bluder to help coach team USA as an assistant coach at the 2001 World University Games in Beijing, China.

The USA team marched into the gold medal game against host-team China and won 87-69. Team USA finished the games with a 7-1 mark.

"This was a new experience for me," commented Bluder after winning the gold medal. "Just to reach the gold medal game was a thrill. It's something I will always remember. What I think is really wonderful about this experience is each game I felt team USA improved. I was honored to be chosen to represent the United States and experience international coaching for the first time."

Bluder has reached five coaching milestones while coaching lowa. During her first season, she collected her 200th victory at the Division I level when the Hawkeyes defeated Minnesota. During her third season, Coach Bluder captured career win No. 400 in Iowa's triumph over Iowa State and victory No. 450 when lowa topped Creighton in the first round of the WNIT. She garnered win No. 300 at the Division I level with Iowa's regular season finale win over Indiana in 2006. And last year, she recorded career win No. 500 at Penn State.

Bluder, alongside her husband David and daughter Hannah, was introduced as the Hawkeyes' fifth head coach in front of a packed press room in Carver-Hawkeye Arena on April 7, 2000. The native of Marion, IA, came to Iowa after spending 10 successful seasons at Drake University.



Under Bluder's guidance, Iowa won 11 of its last 13 regular season games last year to claim a share of the Big Ten championship.

#### **Bluder Career Notes**

- Student-athletes who have played under Lisa Bluder have a 100% job placement rate following their career, and all of her recruited student-athletes have earned their degree.
- · Lisa Bluder has taken her team to post-season action 12 of the last 14 years, including nine trips to the NCAA Tournament.
- · Over the past 14 seasons, Lisa Bluder coached teams have averaged 20 wins per season.
- · Lisa Bluder has been named conference coach of the year five times and national coach of the year once.
- · Lisa Bluder coached teams have won five conference tournament titles and four regular season crowns.
- · During her tenure as Iowa's head coach, Lisa Bluder's teams have ranked in the top five in the Big Ten in scoring and assists all eight seasons.

Bluder compiled a 187-106 (.638) record at Drake in 10 seasons and a 169-36 (.824) record in six seasons at NAIA St. Ambrose University. She currently sits 32nd in career winning percentage (.678) for Division I active coaches.

During her tenure at lowa, three former players have gone on to become coaches. Randi Peterson is the head coach at Coe College, while Cara Consuegra and Jennie Lillis are assistant coaches at Marquette.

On January 22, 1998 at Evansville, Bluder, at the age of 36, notched her 300th career win, which tied her as the fifth youngest coach to reach the 300-victory plateau.

In her 10 years as Drake University women's basketball coach, Bluder brought great success and tradition to the Bulldog program and established herself as one of the top coaches in the country. She led Drake to five 20-plus-win seasons in the last six years, including five post-season appearances. She guided the Bulldogs to eight Missouri Valley Conference tournament appearances, reaching the semifinals six times and winning the tournament four times. Bluder was also named the Conference Coach of the Year three times at Drake.

Bluder's 1999-2000 Drake squad registered a 23-7 record. The Bulldogs won both the MVC regular-season and tournament titles and earned the school's fourth trip to the NCAA Tournament under Bluder.

The 1997-98 team finished the season 25-5, Bluder's best record at Drake, and won the MVC regular-season title, recording Drake's best conference finish with a 17-1 record. The Bulldogs also won the MVC Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the third time in four years. She was named the MVC Coach of the Year for the second straight year as Drake was ranked No. 22 in the final Associated Press ranking.

In 1998-99, Drake posted a 21-10 record in the MVC. It marked the fourth time in five years the Bulldogs reached the 20-win plateau, while advancing to the semifinals of the WNIT Tournament.

Bluder began her coaching career at St. Ambrose University, where she coached six successful seasons building the Bees into a NAIA powerhouse.

During her tenure at St. Ambrose, Bluder recorded a 169-36 (.824) mark and guided the Bees to four straight national tournaments, including two consecutive Final Four appearances. The 1990 St. Ambrose team was ranked No. 1 and Bluder was named the NAIA Converse Coach of the Year.

She is also committed to her team's academic success. While at Drake, she coached two Academic All-America Players of the Year in current Hawkeye Associate Head Coach Jan Jensen (1991) and Tricia Wakely (1996). As a team, the Bulldogs ranked fourth in 1995 graduation rate success among teams ranked in the USA Today/CNN final top-25 Coaches' Poll. Current senior, Wendy Ausdemore, is a two-time academic all-District honoree.

While on the lowa sidelines, student-athletes have been named academic all-Big Ten 35 times by a total of 15 players. In 2004, a team record eight studentathletes were named academic all-Big Ten. Additionally, Lindsey Meder was a two-time Academic all-American (2001, 2002). Student-athletes who have played under Coach Bluder have a 100 percent job placement following their career, and all of her recruited athletes have earned degrees.

Bluder's successful coaching record speaks for itself, however her commitment to her players extends far beyond the records book.

During the summer of 2003, Bluder was elected Division I Midwest Representative of the WBCA Board of Directors. This season marks her sixth season on the WBCA Board of Directors. She has also served on the WBCA Kodak All-American selection committee for three terms and the Midwest Regional Advisory Committee for the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championships.

A graduate of Linn-Mar High School in Marion, IA, Bluder was a three-year starter at Northern Iowa. She graduated from UNI in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in marketing. On Sept. 4, 2008, Bluder was inducted to the Linn-Mar Athletic Hall of Fame.

Bluder and her husband David have two daughters, Hannah (11) and Emma (8) and one son, David (6).

Student-athletes who have played under Coach Bluder at the University of Iowa have gone on to successful careers in basketball after their collegiate careers. Some of lowa's most decorated athletes continued their playing careers, started a coaching career or even worked in the front office.

Cara Consuegra, Jennie Lilllis, Leah Magner and Randi Peterson, all of whom played together and started on Iowa's 2001 Big Ten Tournament championship team are in the coaching ranks. Peterson (1997-01) is the head coach at Coe College in Cedar Rapids, while Magner (1997-01) is Peterson's assistant. Consuegra (1997-01) and Lillis (2000-04) are assistant coaches at Marquette.

Crystal Smith (2002-06) was drafted by the WNBAs Phoenix Mercury in 2006 and was a reserve point guard her rookie season. The past two seasons, she has played for the Houston Comets and Washington Mystics. She the Comets' starting point guard in only her second year in the league. Jamie Cavey (2001-05) did not get drafted by a WNBA team, but traveled overseas and played professional ball for a team in Portugal in 2005. Cavey earned the MVP trophy of the league. Johanna Solverson is the newest Hawkeye to continue her playing career after graduation as she is playing professional ball in

Greece. In fact, Cavey rejoins her former college teammate on the same team in Greece in 2008-09.

Kristi Faulkner (2001-04) currently works for the WN-BAs Chicago Sky as the marketing/community relations manager. The Sky just completed their third season.

Other Hawkeyes who gave professional basketball a run, but are no longer playing include, Beatrice Bullock (1998-02), Cara Consuegra (1997-01), Lindsey Meder (1998-02) and Jerica Watson (1998-02). Both Meder and Watson were drafted by WNBA teams.

"It's a really special feeling to know that our former student-athletes enjoyed their experience so much at the University of Iowa that they want to continue in that as a career path," said Bluder. "Obviously, if they didn't have an enjoyable experience or a rewarding experience they wouldn't pursue it as a career, so I think it solidifies that we know that our student-athletes are having a good experience here and they understand the value of coaching and teaching as well as making an impact on

### Jan Jensen

#### Ninth Season Drake University, 1991

Jan Jensen is in her ninth season with the lowa Hawkeyes, her sixth as associate head coach. A nationally known presence on the recruiting scene, Jensen serves as the recruiting coordinator and also works with the post players. Jensen is in her 20th season in women's college basketball as a player and coach.

The native of Kimballton, IA, helped guide the Iowa Hawkeyes to a 21-11 overall record, bolstered by a 13-3 home record, and a share of the Big Ten regular season championship last season. Iowa also reached the Big Ten Tournament semifinals and played in its 17th NCAA Championships in 2008. She helped coach four Hawkeyes to all-Big Ten status last year.

Jensen was instrumental in helping Head Coach Lisa Bluder garner the 2008 and 2001 Big Ten Coach of the Year and WBCA Regional Coach of the Year awards. She has helped mentor lowa to seven post-season appearances, including five NCAA Championship berths, a Big Ten regular season co-championship (2008) and a Big Ten Tournament championship (2001). Jensen has also helped guide the Black and Gold to five first-division conference finishes.

Jensen is integral in developing and maintaining top-level recruiting classes at lowa. In 2001, Jensen spearheaded lowa's efforts in landing the eighth-best recruiting class in the nation according to the Blue Star Index.

Under Jensen's tutelage, four Hawkeye post players have earned all-Big Ten accolades seven different times. Jennie Lillis garnered all-Big Ten first team

laurels in 2003 and second team honors in 2002 and 2004. Randi Peterson was recognized on the first team in 2001, while Jamie Cavey and Megan Skouby were named to the second team in 2005 and 2006, respectively. Furthermore, Skouby was honored as Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 2006 and Sixth Player of the Year in 2008.

As a team, lowa has ranked in the top ten nationally in 3-point accuracy the last two years and rated in the top ten in free throw percentage and top-25, two of the last three years. Additionally, lowa has ranked in the top-half of the Big Ten Conference in scoring and assists every season under the current coaching staff.

Before becoming a Hawkeye, Jensen also served as Coach Bluder's first assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Drake Her recruiting efforts were University. enough to land the Bulldogs two top 13 and two top 40 classes.

As a player, Jensen was one of the best Bluder ever coached at Drake. Her senior year, she led the nation in scoring with 29.6 ppg and was the Gateway Conference Most Valuable Player. That year she was a Kodak Honorable Mention All-American, a member of the All-Gateway team and the GTE Academic All-America Player of the Year. Jensen was also Sports Illustrated's National Player of the Week.

She currently ranks fourth on Drake's all-time scoring list, third in field goal percentage and fifth in steals, rebounds and rebound average. Jensen is one of only two Drake players to have her number retired in the Knapp Center.

After college, Jensen played professionally in the European Professional Basketball League for BTV-Wuppertal in Germany. She played there from 1992-93 and helped her club win the German Club Championship. She then returned to the United States to begin her coaching career. In 1993, Jensen was also inducted to the Iowa Girls High School Basketball Hall of Fame.

Jensen graduated from Drake in 1991 with a degree in Public Relations. She earned her Masters in Higher Education five years later.

In February 2007, Jensen was one of four former Drake student-athletes to receive the Drake Double D Award. The award is presented annually to Drake letterwinners for achievements in their chosen field or endeavor and/or community service since leaving Drake. The Double D Award is the highest honor Drake bestows on its student-athletes.
