"Building the Foundation." This is the theme new Iowa Head Coach Jack Dahm and his staff are using to lay a solid foundation for the future of the Iowa baseball program.

Dahm inherits 17 letterwinners from 2003. He has stressed the importance of building a team from the ground up. Dahm and his staff have set a priority in the program on pitching and defense. The team will also have an aggressive mentality in all phases of the game.

"We're excited about the season," said Dahm. "The coaching staff is excited about the current talent level in the program. Our players worked extremely hard this off-season and they've had tremendous attitudes. Hopefully, this will allow us to take a step forward this spring."

# **PITCHING**

The pitching staff made great strides last fall under the direction of pitching coach Nick Zumsande. Zumsande has enjoyed success in the Big 12 and Missouri Valley Conferences and Dahm expects that to continue in the Big Ten.

"The staff made a lot of progress and responded well to Coach Zumsande's philosophies and approach to pitching," explained Dahm. "He has established himself as one of the top pitching coaches in the country and I'm totally confident that will continue at Iowa."

In the starting rotation, senior Nathan Johnson returns as the ace of the staff after being the Hawkeyes' top pitcher a year ago. Johnson garnered third team all-Big Ten accolades in 2003 after compiling a 6-2 record with a teamleading 3.38 ERA. Johnson led the team with 53 strikeouts in 58.2 innings.

"Nathan proved that he can be a quality starter in the Big Ten last season," explained Dahm. "He has a maturity about him that he brings to the mound and he possesses the confidence that makes him a legit number one starter. He gives us a good chance to win the series openers."

Behind Johnson, the Hawkeyes lack experience, but the potential is enormous.

Two righthanders that are slotted to appear in the rotation are sophomore Austin Seward and redshirt freshman Ryan Dupic. Seward saw limited action last season as he pitched only five innings.

"Austin and Ryan are both pitchers with tremendous ability," explained Dahm. "Austin

has one of the best arms on our team and the only thing he is lacking is game experience. He just needs to get out there and get some innings to build up his confidence. Ryan has a great arm and is an outstanding athlete. He has the whole package and can develop into a good Big Ten pitcher with experience."

Dahm likes having a southpaw in the starting rotation, so he will turn to junior Jeff Maitland to fill that role. Maitland struck out ten in 28 2/3 innings last season after serving as Iowa's primary mid-week starter.

"Jeff pitched well last summer and it really carried over into the fall," stated Dahm. "He has a good feel for pitching with a strong change-up. He is not afraid to work both sides of the plate."

Freshmen Casey O'Rourke and Michael Washburn could come in and compete for a spot in the rotation after having stellar high school careers. O'Rourke was an Iowa Elite-Team all-state selection, while Washburn holds the Sioux City East school record for strikeouts in a season.

"Casey and Michael both have bright futures," explained Dahm. "Casey has shown a lot of composure and Michael has one of the top arms on the team. Both of these freshmen will get valuable experience early in the year. They will possibly have a shot of earning a spot in the rotation by the middle of the year."

The Hawkeyes return three of their top relievers from a year ago in seniors Chris Maliszewski and Andrew Hanson and junior Brent Jackson.

Maliszewski, a southpaw, appears to be the odds-on-favorite to serve as lowa's closer after appearing in 12 games in 2003.

"Chris is a competitor," explained Dahm. "He has the mentality to get that 27th out and that is hard to find."

Jackson and Hanson were second and third, respectively, on the team in ERA last season. Jackson held batters to a .290 batting average, after he stepped in as one of the team's most reliable pitchers last season. Hanson made a team-high 19 appearances last season, compiling a 3-0 record with three saves.

"Andrew and Brent had solid fall seasons," said Dahm. "We're looking for them to give us quality innings out of the pen. They had success last season and we're looking for them to continue to build on that."

Senior Brian Furlong and redshirt freshman Scott Brune will also serve as valuable righthanders coming out of the bullpen. Furlong, a transfer from Creighton, has experience after pitching in the Missouri Valley Conference.

The diamond in the rough may be sophomore Tim Gudex. After redshirting in 2003, the lefty could be a

key for the Hawkeyes.

"Tim made as much progress as anyone in the program last fall," explained Dahm. "We like having lefties in the pen and Tim will be a valuable asset to the staff in that role along with Maliszewski."

Junior Jeff Felgar, sophomore Aaron Reasland and freshman John Beck will add depth to the pitching staff.

## **CATCHERS**

There will be four new faces behind the plate for the Hawkeyes this season, but junior college transfer Kris Welker appears to be the top candidate.

Welker, a first team allconference selection at the College of Southern Idaho, will be a solid backstop for lowa, as well as providing pop in the middle of the batting order.

"Kris is an outstanding player and has all the qualities you want to see in a catcher," said Dahm. "He has good leadership skills and will provide a solid bat in the lineup."

Junior Clint Bitting will serve as the primary back-up after starting for two years at Cloud Community College. Brian Trumm, John Skay and Zak

Koga also will battle for playing time in 2004.

## **INFIELD**

Dahm is excited about the infield because he has the luxury of having an incredible amount of depth. It starts with shortstop Jeff Gremley.

Gremley started every game for the Hawkeyes last season and will be the foundation for what appears to be a strong infield defense. Gremley is lowa's top returning hitter after batting .313 last year with a team leading

32 RBI.

"Jeff is as talented an infielder as I've worked with," explained Dahm. "He needs to continue to mature as a player. He has all the physical tools to develop into one of the best infielders in the Big Ten."

Gremley's mate up the middle is in question. Three players, Andrew Lytle,

Andy Cox and true freshman Jason White, will be battling for the starting nod.

Lytle started all but one game at second base last season and was second on the team with a .991 fielding percentage. Lytle missed the fall season with an injury and Dahm is hopeful that he'll be healthy when the season begins.

Cox played the role as a utility man in 2003, but the versatility he provides will be an advantage for Dahm.

"Cox is an outstanding athlete that can play first, second or third base for us," explained Dahm. "He worked as hard as anyone in the program this fall, and we feel that he is a player that needs to be in the lineup on a daily basis."

White could prove to be one of the biggest surprises. The two-time all-Colorado first team selection will add depth to the infield as well as a left-handed bat to the lineup.

"Jason had a tremendous fall for a freshman," said Dahm. "Jason is a player with good speed and great baseball instincts. He will gain experience early in the season at second base to show us what he can do"

Luis Andrulonis will provide experience to the infield as he returns to the hot corner for his junior campaign. Andrulonis started all but six games at third

base for the 2003 Hawkeyes and could provide some pop offensively after a strong fall season.

lowa will look to senior Mike Best as an offensive force in the middle of the lineup, while manning first base. Best started 44 games at first base last season and was sixth on the team with a .285 average.

"Mike has the capability to be one of the top offensive players on our ball club," explained Dahm. "He has also made excellent progress defensively."

True freshmen Cole Grandfield (1B), Austin Wilcox (3B), Neal Coleman (middle infield), and Ryan Gardner (corner infield) and junior college transfer Justin Petty (2B) will all compete for playing time.

**OUTFIELD** 

The Hawkeyes should have a strong core of outfielders led by returning starter Nate Yoho.

The junior rightfielder was one of lowa's most productive hitters in 2003 as he was second on the team with 28 RBI.

"Nate is a very talented left handed hitter that has the abilities to be a frontline player," said Dahm.

Yoho will be joined in the outfield by a pair of transfers in Jesse Brownell and L.J. Mims.

Mims has the daunting task of replacing two-time all-Big Ten selection Kyle Thousand in centerfield transferring after Central Arizona. speedy right-hander could come in and serve as a prototypical lead-off hitter for the Hawkeyes.

Brownell provides Dahm with versatility as he can play any of the outfield and catcher. positions Brownell also gives the Hawkeyes another strong bat to add to the middle of the order.

"L.J. is our top defensive outfielder and he a chance to be an outstanding lead-off hitter," said Dahm. "Jesse swung

the bat well in the fall and has good speed. He will be a valuable player in the program."


Sophomore Skyler Moss, redshirt freshmen Mike Mogard and Matt Wooldrik and freshman Jeff Engel will all provide depth and compete for playing time this season.

Mogard should see playing time in left field after having a solid fall showing. Moss also performed well during the fall season before breaking his leg.

Dahm is hopeful that Moss will return to full speed in the spring. Engel is a big left-hander that Dahm feels could develop into a middle of the order type hitter.

Seniors Jim Reid and Gabe Haugland will also provide some depth for the Hawkeyes. Reid played in 20 games a year ago and provided some pop

> offensively. Haugland, a transfer from St. Edwards University in Texas, will provide additional experience in the outfield. According to Dahm, Haugland is a player that can really drive the ball. He could be a valuable designated hitter or pinch



# **SCHEDULE**

Dahm is looking forward to a challenging schedule his first year with the Hawkeyes as he tries to build enthusiasm for lowa baseball.

"We want to get lowa baseball out there in the public eye," said Dahm. "We want to start getting people excited about lowa baseball."

lowa will start the season with two tough road trips. The Hawkeyes will face Centenary in the opener before facing College World Series qualifier, Southwest Missouri State.

From March 12-21, Iowa will travel to Florida to play seven games for its annual spring trip. The trip is highlighted by games with perennial powers Maine and Stetson, a team that has made four consecutive regional appearances. The Hawkeyes will also play dates against Massachusetts, Bucknell, Dartmouth and Army.

On March 26-29, the Hawkeyes will get a taste of professional baseball, as they host a four-team tournament (Minnesota, Northern Illinois and Northern Colorado) at Sec Taylor Stadium, the home of the lowa Cubs, in Des Moines. Iowa will also hope to build some excitement

when it plays an exhibition game on April 7 against the lowa Cubs in Des Moines. In addition, the Hawkeyes will play a neutral site game against Northern Iowa in Cedar Rapids at Veterans Memorial Stadium.

"We have a very competitive schedule that should prepare us for Big Ten play," said Dahm. "It will allow us to develop our team fundamentally and gain confidence. If we continue to work hard and progress, I feel we can be successful in laying a solid foundation towards the future."



# Head Coach Jack Dahm

Jack Dahm enters his first season at lowa and the Big Ten after spending the past 18 years as a member of the Creighton Bluejays baseball program. Dahm left the Bluejays as the winningest coach in school history, having compiled 283 wins against 276 losses in 10 seasons as a head coach.

"Building the Foundation." This is the theme that Coach Dahm has stressed since he was hired in July of 2003.

Dahm's plan for Hawkeye baseball is to build the program from the ground up.

"In order to build a consistent program we must have a solid foundation and that starts with quality student-athletes who are willing to make personal sacrifices on and off the field," said Dahm. "We must also develop a level of trust and belief in each other and in the program. If we can build that solid foundation the success on the field will start to take care of itself."

Even though the Hawkeyes have not played a game in the Dahm era, the foundation has already begun to be laid. The players have been busy giving back to the community by helping raise money for breast cancer and helping the Iowa Children's Museum at the Crystal Ball dinner. Dahm has arranged the first annual leadoff dinner and the guest speaker will be the General Manager of the Chicago Cubs, Jim Hendry.

Other new and exciting events on the schedule will be the I-Cubs/ Hawkeye Classic at Sec Taylor Stadium in Des Moines and an exhibition game against the Triple A lowa Cubs. Also, the Hawkeyes will try to pack the park in April at Veterans Stadium in Cedar Rapids when they battle intrastate rival, Northern Iowa.

Dahm gained praise nationally for his first recruiting class, after it was ranked in the top-50, and perhaps the top-25, by Jerry Ford, the National Director of Perfect Game U.S.A. Dahm and the Hawkeyes made their mark on the in-state recruiting trail when they inked six of the top eight high school prospects in the state of lowa, which included the top four pitching prospects.

Dahm's 283 coaching wins are one more than his mentor, Jim Hendry. Dahm went to Creighton in 1986 to play under Hendry and spent four years as a student-athlete from 1986-89. In 1990, Dahm accepted a position as a graduate assistant coach for Hendry and spent four years helping build Creighton into a Missouri Valley Conference power.

In 1991, Dahm was promoted to a full-time assistant as he helped the Bluejays reach the College World Series. That Creighton squad ended the season as the second-highest hitting club in the nation, batting .355 as a team. The team's 60 triples in 1991 led the nation and remain a school

In October of 1993, Dahm was hired as Creighton's head coach, becoming the youngest head coach in Division I at the age of 25. For the next ten years, five of Dahm's ten teams would finish in the top three of the Missouri Valley Conference.



In 1999, Dahm earned his first of two Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year honors as the Bluejays advanced to the NCAA tournament for the first time in the Dahm era. Creighton posted 38 wins that season, the most since Dahm's first year in 1994, before being eliminated from the South Bend Regional.

In 2000, Dahm guided the Bluejays to their second consecutive NCAA Regional appearance at the Arizona State regional in Tempe, AZ, after finishing the season with a 38-23 record. During the season, Dahm led Creighton into the national spotlight as they peaked at No. 15 in the Collegiate Baseball poll and were ranked in the top 25 of the Baseball Weekly/ESPN Coaches' Poll and Baseball America.

Dahm earned his second coach of the year honor in 2002 when the Bluejays finished the season 30-24 against one of the nations toughest schedules. Victories over nationally ranked Nebraska, Notre Dame and Wichita State were overshadowed by the team's best-ever season in the Missouri Valley

Conference. Despite having a lineup top-heavy with underclassmen, Creighton finished second in MVC play with a 21-10 record.

A native of Morton Grove, IL, Dahm entered Creighton as a highly recruited infielder in 1985 and left 18 years later as the all-time winningest coach in school history. As a player, Dahm shared the dugout with former Major Leaguers Mike Heathcott, Dax Jones, Scott Servais, Dan Smith and Scott Stahoviak. Eighteen of Dahm's players have been selected in the Major League draft since 1994, four of which have played at the Major League level. Since 1994, Dahm has produced 16 first-team all-MVC players, seven freshman All-Americans and two All-Americans.

Besides being a student of the game on the field, Dahm was active in community service, fundraising and his teams have strived academically as well.

The Bluejays were actively involved in the community under Dahm, as they held various free baseball clinics, raised money for the Nebraska Children's Home and were a part of "Operation Bluejay," a program that provided tutoring for young people in Omaha.

Dahm also played a large role in the planning, designing and fund raising for the \$3.5 million Creighton Sports Complex. The Kitty Gaughan Pavilion baseball facility is one of the finest indoor baseball complexes in the country. It featured a state of the art hitting facility, locker rooms, Legends View Club and coaches' offices.

Dahm's teams have not only had success on the field, but in the classroom as well. During his tenure at Creighton, Dahm's players were named to 32 spots on the Missouri Valley Conference Scholar-Athlete teams, 10 Verizon Academic all-District honors and three Verizon Academic all-Americans. His teams also consistently finished with G.P.A's around 3.0.

Dahm has also been active in the advancement of college baseball by being a member of the many national committees. He was a ten-year member on the College World Series Board of Directors and served on the American Baseball Coaches Association Change of Season Committee. He was also a part of the NCAA Division I Regional Advisory Committee and was an onsite director of the NCAA Yes Baseball Clinic for 11 years.

The 37-year old Dahm and his wife, Lynn, have been married for 10 years. The couple has three children-sons Casey and Tyler, and a daughter Lyndsey.

On Dahm's first recruiting class:

"Jack Dahm is off to a running start at Iowa. He glued in on the lowa high school players with pitching being his biggest concern. This is the best class of recruits going to lowa in well over 10 years. Dahm and his recruiters signed nearly all the top in-state pitchers. This is a very rare class that ranks in the top-50 nationally, and perhaps the top 25. It shouldn't be too long before Iowa baseball regains it reputation as a strong program."

"Overall, this class brings in the top four Iowa high school pitchers and a couple of top JUCO transfers, two top infielders who can really hit and two catchers that scouts claim are the best in their states. # Nick Zumsande

Pitching Coach

Nick Zumsande enters his first season aslowa's pitching coach after collecting 14 years of collegiate coaching experience throughout the Midwest.

"Coach Zumsande is a proven winner that has had success everywhere he has coached. He has developed outstanding pitching staffs in the Big 12 and Missouri Valley Conferences and I believe he will do the same in the Big Ten," said Dahm. "Zumsande has the unique ability to teach

Prior to being named lowa's pitching coach in August of 2003, Zumsande served as a pitching instructor at Indiana State University. Zumsande joined the Sycamores in 2001 as the pitching instructor and recruiting coordinator. In his second and final season with the Sycamores in 2003, Zumsande guided the Indiana State hurlers to a 36-21 record and a 4.15 earned run average, the second lowest team ERA in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Before arriving at Terre Haute, IN, Zumsande served one year as the pitching coach at Iowa State University. In his Ione year at Iowa State, the Cyclones team earned run average lowered nearly two runs and led the team to its first Big 12 Tournament appearance in school history. Zumsande's staff finished the conference season with a 4.38 ERA, which was tied for fourth with Nebraska in the conference.

Zumsande held the head coach's position at Muscatine Community College before accepting the assistant position at his alma mater, lowa State. Zumsande headed the Muscatine program from 1988-2000, recording 431 career victories against 195 losses, a .688 winning percentage. The Indians finished in the national polls six times in the 1990's under Zumsande's guidance. During that period, Zumsande earned NJCAA Region IX Coach of the Year honors in 1990, 1994 and 1999.

Over 50 of Zumsande's former MCC player were sent on to major four-year colleges and 30 former players signed professional baseball contracts.

A member of the American Baseball Coaches Association and Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association, Zumsande has twice guided his team to the NCJAA Division I World Series (1994 & 1999). In 1994, the Muscatine baseball program was awarded the Homa Thomas Team Sportsmanship Award by designated members of the media.

In the professional ranks, Zumsande spent the 1993 season working for Major League Baseball International in Northern Europe. While in Europe, he served as an ambassador as he promoted and instructed baseball for MLB.

Zumsande graduated from Iowa State in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He earned his master's degree in Athletic Administration from Northwest Missouri State in 1986.



## Ryan Brownlee

Assistant Coach

Ryan Brownlee enters his first season as the lowa hitting coach, infield instructor and recruiting coordinator.

"We are very fortunate to have Ryan on the coaching staff here at Iowa," said Dahm. "Ryan grew up around the game of baseball and he understands the commitment and work ethic it takes to build a championship program. He is definitely one of the bright young coaches in college baseball."

Prior to joining the Iowa staff, Brownlee served as the infield/baserunning coach and assisted with hitting and recruiting at James Madison University for four years. Brownlee did a variety of game day assignments during his tenure at JMU including coaching first base, bench coach, infield shifts, defensive plays and opponents' scouting reports. In back-to-back years, 2001 and 2002, Brownlee guided the Dukes to school record .967 and .968 fielding percentages. Also, in 2002, the Dukes broke the school record for wins in a season with 43 and advanced to the NCAA Southeast Regional at Columbia, SC, after winning the Colonial Athletic Association crown.

Before joining the James Madison coaching staff, Brownlee served as an assistant coach under his father, James, at Evansville for two seasons. While at Evansville, Brownlee was responsible for outfield, catching and hitting instruction. Brownlee advanced to the Purple Aces' coaching ranks after excelling as a player for four seasons. A four-year starter at second base, Brownlee earned all-MCC honors in 1994 and all-MVC accolades in 1996. He was also selected to the American Baseball Coaches Association all-Region squad. In 1997, Brownlee was tabbed a TPX preseason third-team all-American and he received the University of Evansville's William V. Slyker award for the most outstanding male athlete at the university.



Former lowa standout Mike Boddicker, and his family, have established the Mike Boddicker Scholarship. The scholarship goes each year to a member of the lowa baseball team who is an lowa resident, is in good academic standing and displays outstanding character and personality.

Boddicker, a native of Norway, Iowa earned all-Big Ten honors as a pitcher and infielder during his campaign as a Hawkeye (1976-78). In 1983, he was named the American League "Rookie of the Year." After pitching in the

major leagues for 11 years, Boddicker retired in 1993. He played for the Baltimore Orioles and Kansas City Royals.

The Mike Boddicker Scholarship was established in 1993. Pitcher Colin Mattiace was the first recipient and held the scholarship all four years of his Hawkeye career. Infielder Nate Frese received the scholarship in 1997 and 1998, Iowa City native Brian Mitchell won the scholarship in 1999, and the 2000 and 2001 scholarships were awarded to outfielder Andy Jansen, a Bancroft, Iowa native. Four-year starter Ian Mattiace received the scholarship in 2002 and former Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American Reed Pawelk has benefited from the scholarship in 2003 and 2004.

The lowa baseball program has a long history of former athletes competing on the professional level. Over 100 lowa players have been sent into the pro ranks.

The baseball program has reached new heights, by combining talented student-athletes with first class facilities and superior coaching.

Two Hawkeyes prolonged their 2003 baseball seasons at the professional level. Junior Kyle Thousand surrendered his final year of eligibility to pursue a professional career with the Toronto Bluejays. The two-time all-Big Ten centerfielder was selected in the 26<sup>th</sup> round of Major League Baseball's amateur draft. Former Hawkeye MVP and right-handed pitcher Reed Pawelk signed a free-agent contract with the Florida Marlins following lowa's 2003 season.

Four Hawkeyes were drafted by the major leagues after the 1999 season. Pitcher, Wes Obermueller was drafted in the second round by the Kansas City Royals, second baseman Brian Mitchell went in the 40th round to the Toronto Blue Jays and pitcher, Matt Sawvell signed a pro contract with the New York Mets.

Obermueller started the 2002 season as a member of the Wichita Wranglers, a Double-A affiliate of the Kansas City Royals, before being promoted to the parent club and making his Major League debut September 20th, against the Cleveland Indians. In 2003, Obermueller was traded to the Milwaukee Brewers, where he won two games and struck out 34 hitters in 65.2 innings.

Signed by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, hurler Jim Magrane, set Iowa's single season records for innings pitched (107.2) and strikeouts (110) during the 1999 season. He also tied a 63-year old school record with 17 strikeouts against Western Illinois. Magrane pitched a 9-3 complete game win over nationally ranked Miami (FL). Magrane is currently a member of the Durham Bulls, a Triple-A affiliate of the Devil Rays.

In 1998, Iowa infielder, Nate Frese, was drafted in the 10th round by the Chicago Cubs. He currently serves as shortstop for the Iowa Cubs, a Triple-A affiliate of the Cubs.

In 1993 outfielder Bo Porter was drafted by the Chicago Cubs. During the 1999 season, Porter was brought up from the minors by the Cubs. Porter saw action in 24 games, while starting five in the outfield. Porter was the opening day centerfielder for the Texas Rangers during the 2001 season.

Outfielder, Chris Hatcher was drafted following the 1990 season. He has been a member of many minor league organizations, compiling a .275 batting average in 953 games. During the 1998 season, Hatcher was a member of the Kansas City Royals, where he saw action in eight games.



After posting a 7-4 record with a 3.74 earned run average with the Cardinals, St. Louis rewarded the Iowa native with another one-year deal through 2004. In 12 Major League seasons, Eldred has collected 82 wins and compiled a 4.52 ERA.

# Cal & Christi Eldred Fund Lights

2004 IOWA BASEBALL



Cal Eldred has lit up Hawkeye baseball once again. But this time, instead of employing his expert pitching, the major-league star and his wife, Christi, made a gift to fund the installation of lights at lowa's Duane Banks Field. The Cedar Rapids couple gave \$245,000 for the installation of lights at the baseball field named after Cal Eldred's former coach.

The gift, the largest ever from a current professional athlete's family to lowa athletics, allowed the project to be completed in September 2001. The Hawkeyes won the first night game played at Banks Field April 10, 2002, against Northern Illinois, 11-9. The University of Iowa officially dedicated the lights Saturday, April 13, 2002.

Iowa Athletic Director Bob Bowlsby hailed the Eldreds' generosity, saying, "Cal and Christi's gift shows that once a Hawkeye, always a Hawkeye. Cal has been representing lowa well for years, first with the Milwaukee Brewers, then with the Chicago White Sox and now with the St. Louis Cardinals, all the while making us all proud. But the fact that he and Christi have remained true to their lowa roots in this very generous way makes us even prouder."

Former Iowa Baseball Coach Scott Broghamer noted that the Eldred's gift is another chapter their association

with baseball in the state. "I coached Cal when he played for Urbana High School in the mid-1980's, and he and Christi have been Hawkeye supporters for years," Broghamer said. "This gift will make lowa's field one of the finest anywhere. We're very excited and grateful."

The Eldred's cited their desire to give back to lowa and to honor former Hawkeye coaches Banks and Broghamer-who they said are their good friends and longtime mentors-as reasons for making the gift. The gift was commemorated by a plaque at the field.

Cal Eldred, who grew up in Urbana and attended lowa for three years before being drafted by the Milwaukee Brewers in 1989, said, "My experience at Iowa helped shape me as a player and as a person. And Coach Banks has stayed involved in my life and has always been there for me. I couldn't be happier about making this gift for Hawkeye baseball. I hope others will consider helping out however they can."

### **Duane Banks Field**

The lowa baseball program has some of the top facilities in the Big Ten and the Midwest. In the fall of 2001, the lowa baseball field was re-named The Duane Banks Baseball Field in honor of the Hawkeyes' former head coach. Banks, the winningest coach in Iowa history, served as lowa's head baseball coach from 1970-1997.

Banks Field was originally built in 1974. The 3,000-seat stadium has dimensions of 330 feet down the lines, 375 in the power alleys and 400 to centerfield.

The infield was re-designed following the 1999 season with a new playing surface and ten-foot fences were added to the outfield. The field's drainage system was also improved. Both bullpens were restructured and the hitter's background was replaced. Located next to the Hawkeye bullpen are two Astro Turf batting cages.

The complex features locker rooms for both teams and umpires. In 1998, lowa's clubhouse was expanded, giving the Hawkeyes one of the best college baseball environments in the nation.

Prior to the 1996 season a Daktronics stateof-the-art scoreboard system was installed. In addition to providing spectators with pertinent game, the system also has a marques that is capable of displaying player information.

A new press box was built in 1989 and again renovated in 2002. It can accommodate several radio stations and up to 25 media members. The official scorer, scoreboard operator and announcer are housed in the press box.

Banks Field is maintained by Larry Putney and Ted Thorn and the Iowa grounds crew is headed by Pete Vanelswyk.

# Dr. David Skorton

#### **University President**

David J. Skorton was appointed the 19th president of The University of Iowa on March 1, 2003. He has been a faculty member at the University since 1980. He holds joint appointments at the rank of professor in the Departments of Internal Medicine, Electrical and Computer Engineering, and

Biomedical Engineering. President Skorton was appointed vice president for research in 1992 and, additionally, interim vice president for external relations in 2000. He served as vice president for research and external relations from March 2002 until he assumed the presidency. As vice president, he oversaw more than 30 administrative units and headed a research and development program that ranks among the nation's top 20 public research universities in obtaining external funding. He also continued his role as a physician, caring for adolescents and adults with inborn heart disease.

Co-founder and co-director of the UI Adolescent and Adult Congenital Heart Disease Clinic at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics, President Skorton has focused his research on congenital heart disease in adolescents and adults, cardiac imaging, and computer image processing. He has published numerous articles, reviews, book chapters, and two major texts in the areas of cardiac imaging and image processing. He has served in a variety of administrative positions at The University of Iowa, including director of the Cardiovascular Image Processing Laboratory (1982-1996), director of the Division of General Internal Medicine (1985-1989), and associate chair for clinical programs in the Department of Internal Medicine (1989-1992).

À national leader in research ethics, President Skorton is charter president of the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, Inc., the first entity organized specifically to accredit human research protection programs. He has served on the boards and committees of many national organizations, including the American College of Cardiology, the American Heart Association, the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine, the American Society of Echocardiography, the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, the Association of American Universities, the Council on Competitiveness, and the Korea America Friendship Society. He has traveled widely in Europe and Asia on behalf of both academic and community projects.

President Skorton is actively engaged in service to the community and to the state of Iowa, particularly in regional and state economic development. He serves on and chaired the Iowa City Area Development Group, and currently serves on the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce Priority One Advisory Committee, the Technology Corridor Committee, and the Cedar Rapids Symphony Orchestra Board of Directors. He has also served on committees of the Iowa Business Council, the Iowa Department of Economic Development Board, the Governor's Life Sciences Advisory Committee, and the Iowa Research Council, of which he was president from 1999-2001.

President Skorton earned his bachelor's degree in psychology in 1970 and an M.D. in 1974, both from Northwestern University. Following a medical residency and cardiology fellowship at The University of California, Los Angeles, he came to The University of Iowa in 1980 as an instructor. He was named assistant professor of internal medicine in 1981 and assistant professor of electrical and computer engineering in 1982. He was promoted to associate professor in 1984 and to professor in 1988.



# Robert Bowlsby

#### **Director of Athletics**

Bob Bowlsby, in his 13th year as director of athletics at The University of Iowa, heads a team of coaches and athletic staff members that has merged men's and women's programs to form one department that continues to rank among the nation's best. The combined entity encompasses

24 varsity sports and an annual budget in excess of \$34 million.

As the chief administrator for Iowa's athletic department Bowlsby has earned a reputation as one of the most respected, energetic and ambitious athletic administrators in the nation. His hiring of new head coaches in football, men's and women's basketball and wrestling, all in the past five years, will enable Iowa to maintain its standing as one of the most visible and successful Division I athletic programs.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named Bowlsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year. Bowlsby was one of only four athletic directors selected in the Division I-A category. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities.

A Waterloo native, Bowlsby became Iowa's 10th Athletic Director in June, 1991 after serving in the same role at the University of Northern Iowa since 1984. He previously served as Assistant Athletic Director for Facilities at Northern Iowa.

Bowlsby earned his bachelor's degree from Moorhead State University (Minnesota) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978.

Bowlsby has served as chair of the Big Ten Championships and Awards committee, as a member of the league's Conference and National Structure committee and was appointed as one of two Big Ten representatives to the NCAA Management Council. Bowlsby was elected to chair the Management Council for the first two years of its existence.

Bowlsby managed five NCAA Wrestling Championships as chair of the Wrestling Committee and has served on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics. Bowlsby is in the second year of a four-year term on the NCAA Division I Basketball Tournament Committee.

Bob has served as an Executive Committee member with both the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association and currently serves as President of the I-A Directors group.

Bowlsby was also elected chair of the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee and represented the NCAA as one of two voting members on the United States Olympic Committee. Bowlsby also was appointed by former United States Olympic Committee President LeRoy Walker to the NCAA/USOC Liaison Committee, chaired by George Steinbrenner and NCAA Executive Director Cedrick Dempsey. Bob has also served as a member of the Board of Governors for the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.

Bowlsby is a charter member of the Iowa Olympics Committee and a current member of the Board of Directors of the Iowa Games. Bob is a board member of the Iowa Scholarship Fund, Inc. and a Board member on the Honda Awards program, which recognizes our nation's top female collegiate athletes each year.

He and his wife, Candice, have four children, Lisa, Matt, Rachel and Kyle. Bowlsby was born Jan. 10, 1952.



## Iowa Hawkeye Athletics

The University of Iowa Athletic Department, under the direction of Athletic Director Bob Bowlsby for the past 12 years, is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation.

The men's and women's departments, operating separately for over 25 years, merged in 2001 under Bowlsby's direction. It combined nationally recognized programs for both genders into one successful and progressive athletic program.

Combining their successes on the playing fields with continued success and recognition in the classroom, UI student-athletes practice and perform in some of the best facilities in the nation, while knowing the support of their efforts and attendance by Hawkeye fans ranks among the best in the country.

While the Hawkeyes continue to compete with the best in the nation in a variety of sports, Iowa continues to boast some of the most impressive athletic facilities in the nation, operated by one of the most respected departments.

Several new projects are underway on the Iowa campus. The goal is to improve all areas of the collegiate experience for Hawkeye student-athletes. One of the latest additions to the UI campus is the Roy G. Karro Athletics Hall of Fame and Visitors Center. The Hall of Fame and a varsity soccer complex make up the first phase of a \$37 million project.

Phase two of the project includes new swimming and diving pools, and indoor and outdoor tennis facilities, in addition to bicycle and walking paths. More than \$15 million of the total cost will be generated through private giving.

Additional priorities for the Iowa program include the establishment and development of endowments for all sports





programs, the continued enhancement of graduation rates, and the implementation of a long-range plan to ensure Iowa's financial, academic and competitive future. As an example, all of Iowa's 13 scholarships for men's basketball are fully endowed.

The graduation rate of Iowa's studentathletes has improved in each of the past 10 years and has consistently ranked above the graduation rate of all UI students. Hawkeye athletes have garnered more than 50 academic All-America honors since 1992. In 1998-99 Iowa led the Big Ten in academic all-Big Ten selections and Iowa ranked second in 1999-00. In 2002-03, over 140 male and female Iowa athletes earned academic all-Big Ten recognition.

Iowa athletes have been recognized as all-Americans in their sport on more than 175 occasions during the past 12 years.

The University of Iowa student body is a fixture at all Hawkeye athletic events, making Iowa City a very difficult place for opposing teams to visit.

perfect 8-0 Big Ten record in winning the league title. Iowa participated in the 2003 Orange Bowl and ended the season ranked eighth nationally in both major polls. Iowa's men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to post-season play in each of the last three seasons, while Iowa's wrestling and gymnastics teams continue to rank among the best in the nation. Iowa has won six of the last nine NCAA wrestling titles and nine of the last 13 championships.

Iowa's men's gymnastics team placed sixth in the nation, while the women's gymnastics squad also advanced to the team competition at the NCAA championships. The women's softball team earned both the Big Ten regular season and post-season tournament titles, advancing to NCAA regional action for the eighth time in 10 seasons.

Iowa's field hockey squad was ranked in the top 15 in the nation throughout the 2002 season, while individual performers in track and field and women's tennis also qualified for NCAA championship competition.

From the rankings on the courts and playing fields, to the rankings in the classroom, to the rankings in fan and community support, to the ranking as a program that boasts some of the best athletic facilities in the nation, it's easy to understand why Iowa fans everywhere truly believe, "It's Great to be a Hawkeye."



#### Athletic Student Services



Since its inception in 1979, Athletics Student Services has evolved from a two-person, academic support service to a broad-based, nationally prominent student support services operation. Its purpose is to assist student athletes to become tomorrow's leaders by offering academic and personal support services to assist them in making timely and satisfactory progress toward their degrees.

Athletic Student Services focuses on four important areas — academic counseling and monitoring, educational and support programs, retention programs and compliance services — when working with student-athletes. Following are descriptions of some of the programs, services and opportunities available to student-athletes in those areas.

#### **Athletics Learning Center**

The \$4.6 million Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletics Learning Center, scheduled to open in August of 2003, will give all Iowa student-athletes a state of the art facility to help them with their educations.

The Athletics Learning Center is a multilevel, 20,000 square foot facility which will provide a computer center, study areas, classes and meeting places for all Hawkeye student-athletes.

The Learning Center will feature an auditorium that converts into two classrooms, separate study rooms for under and upperclass student-athletes that feature 28 study carrels, a computer lab, five tutorial rooms, the book loan repository, office space for Iowa's Student Services staff and a display area to recognize the academic accomplishments of Iowa's student-athletes.

# Academic Counseling and Monitoring

Athletics coordinators work closely with student-athletes and their university-assigned advisors from the time they arrive on campus until the time they leave the University. Along with focusing on academic planning matters such as goal-setting, plans of study, choosing majors and degree requirements, athletics coordinators also help student-athletes understand NCAA, Big Ten and University academic policies. They also solicit feedback from instructors on academic progress made by student-athletes.

#### **Tutoring**

Tutoring is available free of charge to all student-athletes. Tutors, who are post-graduates and teachers, help with course content as well as study strategies and are available in virtually all general education program subjects.



#### Retention

A full-time staff member directs the retention program, which identifies student-athletes who may need tailored academic assistance and structure, and implements individualized learning plans to help them succeed. Such plans may include daily and weekly planning sessions with athletics coordinators and retention staff, tutoring, study groups, mainstreaming into on-campus services like the writing center, math labs and services for students with learning disabilities.

#### **Transition Seminar**

All new student-athletes attend an eightweek transition seminar during the fall semester that is geared toward helping them make the transition from high school to college successfully. Seminar topics include time management skills, learning and study strategies, the culture and rules of the university, and life skills concerning alcohol and other substances, relationships and intimacy, diversity, tolerance, values and character.

#### **CHAMPS/Life Skills**

Life skills programs are conducted throughout the year with and for student athletes on quality of life issues critical to personal growth, such as personal accountability, responsible use and nonuse of alcohol, diversity and qambling.

#### Career Guidance and Development

Planning a meaningful career and a fulfilling life is an ongoing process of expanding and narrowing choices, beginning when student-athletes arrive on campus and continuing throughout their college career and lifetime. The professional staff works with other career development professionals on campus to offer individual consultation, career development seminars, workshops, referrals to other campus offices and special events like the Senior Recognition Banquet for graduating student-athletes.

#### **Minority Enrichment Program**

This program offers a culturally supportive environment in which minority studentathletes have the opportunity to develop friendships and a support network in the university. A core focus group of students and staff coordinate programs such as guest speakers, holiday celebrations, community service activities with the local neighborhood centers, events with Cultural Centers and networking with minority faculty, staff, professional and business leaders.



# Strength and Medical Care



#### **Strength and Conditioning**

The University of Iowa has two 2,000-square-foot facilities for strength and conditioning training of Olympic sport athletes. One facility is located in Carver-Hawkeye Arena and the other is located in the Recreation Building. Each facility has eight squat racks, eight Olympic platforms, multiple physio- and medicine balls, padded plyometric boxes and over 10,000 pounds of free weights. Iowa Strength and Conditioning staff Bill Maxwell, Paul Longo and Chad Bower oversee the programs.

The major goals of the University of Iowa strength and conditioning program are the enhancement of athletic performance while reducing the risk of injury through a progression of free weight, multi-joint exercises. Those goals are achieved through Olympic lifts, squats, plyometrics, medicine ball and physioball exercises. These multi-joint movements improve synchronization of movement, intramuscular coordination and stabilizer muscle groups.



#### **Carver-Hawkeye Arena Training Room**

The recently remodeled Carver-Hawkeye Arena (CHA) training room is one of the most modern, respected facilities in the nation. Traditional therapies include whirlpools, hot and cold units, rehabilitation weights, pulleys, and machines. Other therapeutic equipment available for athletes include ultrasound, electrical stimulation, traction, and external compression units. Also available are such state-of-the-art equipment as the CYBEX 6000 (isokinetic exercise and testing device). Preparation activities, medical care and rehabilitation are provided for the basketball, softball, field hockey, soccer, volleyball, golf, wrestling, track and cross country teams.

#### **Jacobson Training Room**

Jacobson training room is used primarily by the football team for rehabilitation, conditioning and team preparation. The facility features a lap pool, treadmill, CYBEX weight equipment, Biodex isokinetic machine, Fastex, slide board, partial basketball floor, two stairmasters, five bikes and six whirlpools.

#### The Field House Training Room

The Field House training room is used by the Hawkeye swimming and diving, gymnastics, and rowing teams. It supports medical care with ultrasound, whirlpools, hot and cold packs, high-voltage galvanic stimulation, electrical stimulation, and T.E.N.S.

#### **Athletic Training**

Dedicated research and education result in outstanding care.

Athletic Training Services connect student-athletes to the various resources and specialty areas. Iowa's staff of 10 full-time athletic trainers are committed to providing quality health care, injury rehabilitation programs, and prevention programs. With physical conditioning as one of the major components of a prevention program, the athletic trainers work closely with strength coaches to pave the way for safe and effetive participation.

#### THE COLLEGES

Almost all freshmen who enroll at The University of Iowa are admitted to the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. General Education Program Requirements (GER) allow students to sample courses in over 100 areas of study. At Iowa, students are required to take electives, major courses, and GER's.

#### LIBERAL ARTS & SCIENCES - Enrollment - 16,276

**Degrees Awarded** - Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) and Science (B.S.) in 58 major fields; Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A) in Music (B.M.) and of Liberal Studies (B.L.S.).

**Admission** - Freshmen and transfer students are to meet the college's admissions requirements.

#### **ENGINEERING -** Enrollment - 1,159

**Degrees Awarded** - Bachelor of Science in Engineering (B.S.E.) in six majors- biomedical, chemical, civil, electrical, industrial, and mechanical engineering.

**Admission -** Students must meet the college's high admissions requirements.

#### **BUSINESS - Enrollment - 1,553**

**Degrees Awarded** - Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) in six majors: accounting; economics; finance; management and organizations; management science; and marketing.

**Admission** - Students must satisfactorily complete two years of prebusiness study in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

#### **EDUCATION - Enrollment - 818**

**Teacher Education Programs** - Elementary education, health occupations, art, communication studies, English, foreign languages, journalism, mathematics, music, physical education, science education, and social studies.

**Admission** - Students must satisfactorily complete one year of appropriate course work in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

#### **NURSING - Enrollment - 554**

**Degrees Awarded - Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.)** 

**Admission** - Students must satisfactorily complete three to four semesters of pre-nursing course work in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

#### PHARMACY - Enrollment - 426

**Degrees Awarded** - Six-year Pharm.D. degree.

**Admission** - Students must successfully complete pre-pharmacy course work in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. As well, students must take the PCAT (Pharmacy College Admission Test) during October of their freshman year.

#### **GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL DEGREES**

Many student-athletes who have attended The University of Iowa and completed their undergraduate degrees continue their education at the University.



#### RESIDENCE

Ninety percent of freshmen choose to live in one of the University's ten residence halls. Each team has its own rules regarding residence of incoming freshmen. Most student-athletes live at least two years on campus.

The University residence halls provide students full-service dining rooms, study lounges, laundry facilities, recreational facilities, as well as vending and bank machines. Residence hall rooms currently have high-speed ethernet connections that give you e-mail and Internet access in your room.

#### **SAFETY**

- \*11:55 p.m. 2:25 a.m.: Free SafeRide buses take students home Fridays and Saturdays.
- \*15 special telephones with blue lights are a direct link to the Department of Public Safety and are situated throughout the Iowa campus.
- \*During summer orientation, campus security personnel educate students on safety.
- \*Rape Victim Advocacy Program cooperates with the Department of Public Safety and participates in Sexual Crime Awareness Week.

#### **LIBRARIES**

The University of Iowa's library system is the largest in the state and has over 4 million volumes. Students also have access to the collections of other libraries throughout the Big Ten Conference via computer network. Besides the Main Library, The University has 12 departmental libraries: Art Library, Biological Sciences Library, Business Library, Chemistry-Botany Library, Engineering Library, Geology Library, Hardin Library for the Health Sciences, Mathematical Sciences Library, Rita Benton Music Library, Physics Library, Psychology Library and Law Library.

#### **COMPUTERS**

There are 26 Instructional Technology Centers all over the campus which are filled with thousands of computers. These facilities are open at least 50 hours a week. Some are open 24 hours. Also, the Information Arcade in the Main Library provides a variety of specialized computing tools.

The Computer Demo Center provides information for students who want to purchase computers and software.

#### **CAREER DECISIONS**

Finding and pursuing a career takes careful planning. The Career Center is extremely valuable for student-athletes. The program suggests a time line each student-athlete may follow throughout her stay at Iowa. The components of the program include:

- \*Individualized career counseling
- \*Career information programs
- \*Summer job/ internship opportunities
- \*Resume and cover letter writing
- \*Portfolio development
- \*Preparing for life after college athletics

#### **SKILLS LABS**

The University provides Skills Labs to help students improve a variety of skills necessary to succeed at Iowa: writing, reading, speaking, science, note taking, time management, test taking and foreign languages.



#### **HEALTH SERVICES**

The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available. Students at Iowa can go to Student Health Services, which is open six days a week. Student Health Services is supported by a fee paid by all full-time students. It offers students unlimited free office visits (there is a charge for other procedures done in the office such as blood tests).

#### **CULTURAL CENTERS**

There are three houses on campus that offer students from different ethnic backgrounds a place to congregate, the Latino and Native American Cultural Center, the Afro American Cultural Center and the Asian Pacific American Cultural Center.

#### **CAMBUS**

There are six bus routes throughout the Iowa campus. The University Cambus provides over four million free rides to class and to the dorms for students each year. Some routes run seven days a week, and some run until 2:30 a.m. Cambus also operates a specialized transportation service for persons with disabilities.



# The Iowa City Community



Iowa City is a diverse, highly cosmopolitan community of 60,000 set in the natural scenic beauty of Iowa's rolling hills and woods along the tree-lined banks of the Iowa River. Iowa City has all the art galleries, ethnic foods, historic architecture and vibrant atmosphere of a much larger city, but with the compactness and friendly feeling of a small town.

As a place to live, Iowa City keeps winning awards and accolades - Named one of the ten most enlightened towns in the country by *Utne Reader*, listed in the book *The 100 Best Small Art Towns in America* and selected the number-one place to live in the nation by *Editor & Publisher* magazine.

Economically, businesses such as Rockwell Collins, American College Testing and Procter & Gamble help keep the city booming. In Coralville, a branch office of Geico Auto Insurance has provided many residents with employment opportunities.

Culturally, Iowa City is alive with concerts, art exhibits, readings, plays and art events of all kinds. Located on the University of Iowa campus, Hancher Auditorium is a nationally-known performance center that brings in the best of Broadway, classical and jazz music, dance and other performances. The University of Iowa Theater Arts department also produces a full schedule of plays each year, featuring the work of student performers and directors. So whether you enjoy the arts as a spectator or as an outlet for your own creativity, Iowa City has the opportunities.

Residents of Iowa City are not only economically and culturally enriched, they also take advantage of the numerous recreational facilities offered around town. The area's more than 30 parks provide opportunities for year-round activities including boating, hiking, swimming, fishing and skiing.

The city's greatest charm, however, remains the sincere friendliness of its citizens, the cosmopolitan atmosphere and the successful partnership built between the community and the University.



Iowa City is located in eastern Iowa and is an easy trip to such cities as Des Moines (the capital of Iowa), Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, and Minneapolis. Also, Cedar Rapids, a city of more than 150,000, is just a short drive north of Iowa City. The Eastern Iowa Airport, which links residents to every major airport in the Midwest, nation and world, is only 20 minutes away.

#### OLD CAPITOL

One of the most recognizable sites in Iowa City is the gold dome of the Old Capitol which is situated in the heart of downtown. Built in 1840, it is Iowa City's most historic building. The Old Capitol was the site of the first governor inauguration as well as the first six Iowa General Assemblies. It is also where the state's Constitution was drafted. When the capital was moved to Des Moines in 1857, the Old Capitol was dedicated to The University of Iowa, becoming the first building owned by the University.

#### **CORALVILLE LAKE**

Just north of Iowa City is Coralville Lake, an outdoor recreational area that offers a variety of opportunities for the public. Coralville Lake offers picnic shelters, biking, hiking, fishing, boating, swimming, hunting, camping, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, golf and disc golf.

#### **PEDESTRIAN MALL**

Located downtown and in walking distance of many of the University's dormitories is the Pedestrian Mall. It is a perfect place to sit outside and study or hang out with friends. During the fall, spring and summer months there are concerts and art festivals in the Pedestrian Mall.

#### **CORAL RIDGE MALL**

The Coral Ridge Mall is a 1.2-million-square-foot shopping center located just minutes from the UI campus. The center combines a mix of over 120 specialty shops and strong department stores including Dillards, JC Penney, Sears, Target and Younkers. Coral Ridge also offers entertainment features such as an NHL-regulation-sized indoor ice arena, state-of-the-art 10-screen movie theatre and a large carousel along with a 1,000-seat food court with sit-down restaurants. Specialty stores include Abercrombie & Fitch, Barnes & Noble, Gap, Old Navy, Scheels All Sports and Pier 1 Imports.

# Hawkeye Traditions

#### THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago.

The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the *Fort Madison Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawkeye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

#### **HERKY THE HAWKEYE**

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.





#### **SCHOOL FIGHT SONG**

The Iowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, Iowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man," Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of Iowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletics events the year around.

Let every loyal Iowan sing;

#### SCHOOL COLORS

For 40 years Iowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide what are now the school official colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of Iowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.
