2007 Season Preview

In his fourth season with the Hawkeyes, Iowa Baseball coach Jack Dahm is looking to regain the form that led Iowa to the Big Ten Tournament with his deepest and most talented squad yet. With a solid nucleus of position players returning and a staff full of talented arms, the Hawkeyes are poised for a return to the upper half of the conference and a potential run at a Big Ten title.

"We are looking to take a big step forward this season," Dahm said. "We are very excited about the progress we made in every phase of the game during the off-season. Our goal is to battle for and win the Big Ten Championship every year. There are lots of questions surrounding the team, but they remind me a lot of the 2005 team, which was our most successful season to date."

STARTING PITCHING

For the Hawkeyes to have success in the 2007 season, they are going to have to get quality innings from some inexperienced arms. Iowa lost its top three starters from last year in Austin Seward, Jeff Maitland and Luke O'Loughlin, who combined for 34 starts and 211 $\frac{1}{3}$ innings pitched.

Looking to step up into those roles is a trio of talented arms in David Conroy, Steve Turnbull and Nick Erdman.

"Those three guys really separated themselves during the fall," Dahm said. "Conroy, Turnbull and Erdman all throw the ball very well, and they will all be deserving to get the ball that opening weekend."

Conroy made seven starts last year as a sophomore, including games against No. 4 Nebraska and the class AAA Iowa Cubs. He has good command of three pitches and pounds the strikezone.

"I am extremely impressed with David Conroy," Dahm said. "He has made strides both physically and mentally during the offseason, and he was a different pitcher this fall. David worked really hard over the summer, and has stepped up as a No. 1 starter."

Turnbull earned some experience last season as a freshman, making 15 appearances and starting four games during Big Ten play. He has one of the best arms on the team and the coaching staff feels he could turn into something special.

"Steve has the ability to be an outstanding pitcher in the Big Ten Conference," Dahm said. "We were able to get him some experience late last year, which is good because we are going to need him to throw a lot of innings for us."

The guy who has made the most progress for the Hawkeyes is Erdman. The sophomore threw a handful of innings last year, but was not at

full strength while recovering from an injury suffered during high school basketball. Now healthy and in good shape, the coaches are looking to Erdman to give them a lot of quality innings this spring.

Another arm that could see the starting rotation is Andrew Porter, who spent two years at Black Hawk Community College, then took a redshirt year at IPFW before coming to Iowa.

"Porter has been a pleasant surprise for us," Dahm said. "He is a driven player who had a lot of success at Black Hawk Community College, then sat out last year at IPFW with an injury. He could contribute to the rotation or bullpen this year."

Two wildcards in the starting rotation mix are Casey O'Rourke and Danny Bales – both of whom missed last season due to health concerns.

O'Rourke returns to the hill after sitting out last year battling testicular cancer. As a sophomore, O'Rourke was one of Iowa's top starters and threw 69 $\frac{2}{3}$ innings. Before getting his diagnosis last year, he was a Northwoods League All-Star and on pace to be Iowa's opening day starter.

"Casey got back on the mound this fall and his arm felt outstanding," Dahm said. "His only problem is building back his strength and endurance after all he has been through. He was going to be one of our top starters last year, and we are thrilled to have him back. His strength and endurance will dictate what role he plays on our staff this year."

Bales has missed the last two seasons due to injury, and the coaches are hoping for good things out of him this year.

Chase Stephens returns an experienced arm for the Hawkeyes, having made 12 appearances last year and recording 15 strikeouts in 22 $\frac{2}{3}$ innings.

George Rasiarmios, Brock Alberts and Joe Singer are a trio of talented junior college transfers who could also make some midweek starts or work in long relief out of the bullpen.

"We have a lot of quality arms to provide us with depth this year," Dahm said. "There are a lot of pitchers that could start or work out of the bullpen for us."

RELIEF PITCHING

Like the starting rotation, the bullpen was hit hard by graduation. Two-time all-Big Ten closer Tim Gudex is now playing in the Texas Rangers' farm system, and late inning reliever Kevin Sunderman has graduated.

Junior Mike Schurz will attempt to fill the void left by Gudex in the closer's role. He transfers in from Radford University, and has all the tools to become a quality closer in the Big Ten.

"Mike brings Division I experience with him, and he stood out as one of our top pitchers in the fall," Dahm said. "We love his mentality. He is a high-energy guy who wants the ball late in the game. He has the makeup to get the last out."

Another key arm out of the bullpen will be that of Scott Brune, who is coming off a very successful junior campaign in which he posted a 1.88 ERA in 21 appearances.

"Brune is going to be very important to us early on because of his experience," Dahm said. "We know what we are going to get with him. He is a perfect fit for us in the middle relief and setup role – he gets a lot of ground balls and fields his position well."

Jason Belk will be looked at in the late innings as well, and brings what Dahm calls a "bulldog mentality" to the mound. While he was a closer in junior college, Belk will be used as a middle reliever or setup guy.

A pair of talented freshmen, Michael Jacobs and Kyle Heim, could also make an impact this season, along with Jordan Aurbach and Patrick Schatz.

"Michael Jacobs and Kyle Heim made a lot of progress this fall and will give us some options out of the pen," Dahm said. "Jordan Auerbach and Patrick Schatz are both talented pitchers coming off injuries, but should be full strength by the spring."

Travis Sweet and Justin Toole both saw action on the mound last year, but will be used more sparingly this season as both should see more time in the field.

"Sweet and Toole are both very valuable position players, but they also give us a lot of depth on the mound and some flexibility when putting together our travel roster," Dahm said.

INFIELD

Whereas the pitching staff will undergo a large makeover this year, there will be plenty of familiar faces in the infield. The Hawkeyes return most of their starting infield, which should serve as the foundation for the team.

At third base, sophomore Kevin Hoef returns after a solid rookie season in which he hit .295 with eight doubles and 12 stolen bases. Hoef also has built himself into one of the better defensive third basemen in the Big Ten.

"Hoef is an outstanding athlete, and plays an important part for us both offensively and defensively," Dahm said. "He just keeps making progress, and really competes at the plate. He can be a good middle of the order hitter for us."

Backing him up will be junior Kody McManis, who started ten games last year.

Senior Jason White returns at shortstop primed for a big season. White, who earned all-Big Ten honors as a sophomore at second base, hit .300 last year with eight doubles, five triples and 18 stolen bases. He will provide a steady glove and serve as Iowa's leadoff hitter this season.

"White had an outstanding summer and fall for us," Dahm said. "He is a tremendous athlete that keeps getting stronger. He will really set the tone for us this year."

At second base, sophomore Justin Toole has continued to develop and will enter the season as the starter. He has a great glove and a good feel for the game, and should combine with White for a potent double play combination.

Also in the mix will be Ryan Gryzwa, who made nine starts at second base last season. The Chicago native is extremely versatile and could see action at third base or in the outfield.

At first base, sophomore Wes Freie and junior Dusty Napoleon will hold down the first base job. As a freshman, Freie hit .261 with eight doubles and 15 RBIs.

"Wes has a lot of ability, and we feel he can step up and be a middle of the order run producer," Dahm said. "We also see him becoming an outstanding defensive first basemen after playing shortstop in high school."

Brian Burmester and T.J. Cataldo will provide depth at the position. Cataldo can also play second and third base, while Burmester will serve as the Hawkeyes' primary designated hitter.

CATCHER

The Hawkeyes come into the season with a roster stacked with talented catchers, and the position looks to be a strength of the 2007 team.

After playing first base as a freshman and splitting time between first and catcher last year, junior Dusty Napoleon enters the season as Iowa's No. 1 catcher. He finished last year with a team-high 34 RBIs, and the coaches say he enters this season in the best shape of his life.

"Dusty does a great job handling the staff and gives us the intangibles that you love in a catcher," Dahm said. "He has really stepped up to be the leader of the team."

Splitting time with Napoleon will be Ben Geelan, who started 29 games behind the plate last year. Geelan is coming off an injury suffered during summer league play, so the coaches will bring him along slowly this year.

Tyson Blaser is another talented young catcher, and Coach Dahm sees a lot of Napoleon's qualities in the freshman. He will see playing time behind the plate this year.

Kody McManis, Tom Moreland, Eric Banwarth and will provide quality depth at the position.

OUTFIELD

There will be some new faces in the outfield this year, as the Hawkeyes lost several players to graduation and the professional ranks.

Junior Travis Sweet moves from second base to centerfield, where he will replace two-year starter Nate Price, who is playing in the Cubs organization. Sweet led the team with a .304 batting average last season, including eight doubles and 27 RBIs. He also had a team-high 22 stolen bases.

"Sweet is a great athlete with a strong arm who can run, so we think he can become a very good centerfielder," Dahm said. "He played some outfield for us last year, but he is still learning to make all the right decisions in center."

In leftfield, the Hawkeyes will look to junior college transfer Caleb Curry. Curry came to Iowa as a shortstop, but has good baseball instincts and a lot of speed.

"Curry is an outstanding athlete who is extremely fast," Dahm said. "He was a very good junior college shortstop – starting the Northwoods League All-Star Game – and we think he can develop into a very good outfielder for us."

The coaching staff expects both Sweet and Curry to go through a bit of a learning curve in the outfield, but is confident they will quickly turn into dependable outfielders.

Matt Wooldrik will return to rightfield for the Hawkeyes, where he started 17 games last year. He is the best defensive outfielder on the team, and should provide a steady presence alongside two new faces.

"Woody is just Steady Eddie for us," Dahm said. "He does everything well, and knows his role on the team."

Another player looking for playing time in the outfield is Kyle Riffel, who joined the team last year after two years on the football team. He is a strong athlete who just needs at bats to produce.

Justin Brauer, Nate Greving, Nick Muhlenbruch, Stavone Martin and Tyson Blaser are all talented freshmen who will battle for playing time.

SCHEDULE

The Hawkeyes will once again face a very daunting schedule, including an early stretch with seven-of-eight games coming against NCAA Tournament teams from a year ago.

Iowa starts with a three-game series at Arkansas-Little Rock, then head to the Stetson Tournament where they will take on Stetson, along with nationally ranked Nebraska and Notre Dame.

The Hawkeyes then head to Fresno for four games with Fresno State and two with Dallas Baptist.

During Big Ten play, Iowa hosts Penn State, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan, and travels to Ohio State, Minnesota, Northwestern and Purdue.

Non-conference highlights include a trip to Nebraska and the fourth annual Corridor Classic against Northern Iowa at Memorial Stadium in Cedar Rapids.

Since taking over the Iowa baseball team in July of 2003, Jack Dahm has brought excitement and optimism, along with success Hawkeye fans hadn't seen in years during his first three seasons. Now, heading into his fourth campaign, Dahm is looking to take the next step with his Iowa team.

Last year, the Hawkeyes continued to build the program on and off the field and ended up with a 23-33 mark.

On the field, the team opened up the year with a 5-1 record, its best start since 1985, winning the Austin Peay Tournament and the Louisiana Cajun Classic by beating Austin Peay, Illinois State, Dayton, Northwestern State and Evansville.

Off the field, the Hawkeyes continued to shine in the classroom with 10 players named Academic All-Big Ten, giving them 26 recipients in the first three years.

Individually, closer Tim Gudex earned first-team all-Big Ten honors for the second-consecutive year, while starting pitcher Austin Seward was named to the second team.

After the season, a pair of Hawkeyes signed professional baseball contracts. Gudex was signed by the Texas Rangers, while Nate Price was signed by the Chicago Cubs.

In his second season, Coach Dahm led the Hawkeyes to their best season since 1990. Iowa posted a 28-29 mark and a 19-13 record in the Big Ten Conference – the second most conference wins in the history of the program. Dahm's squad finished the year third in the conference (just one game out of first place), and advanced to the Big Ten Tournament for just the second time in 15 years.

The Hawkeyes won five four-game series during Big Ten play, including road series at Big Ten Champion Illinois and Michigan, along with homestands against Minnesota, Penn State and Indiana.

The team's success was a reflection of the individual awards the Hawkeye earned, as Iowa had five players named to the all-Big Ten



team. Gudex was named to the first team, Price was on the second team, while catcher Kris Welker, secondbaseman Jason White and shortstop Andy Lytle were all third team honorees.

Gudex was also a second team all-mideast region pick by American Baseball Coaches Association.

In Dahm's 13 years as a head coach, he has had 21 first team all-conference performers, seven freshman All-Americans and two All-Americans.. In his three years at Iowa, Dahm has coached nine all-Big Ten selections, including three first teamers. Iowa had only four first team selections in the previous 14 years before his arrival in Iowa City.

Four of Dahm's players signed professional contracts after the season. Lytle (25th round – Cleveland Indians) and Welker (41st round – Chicago White Sox) were both selected in the MLB Draft, while Nate Yoho (Milwaukee Brewers) and Jesse Brownell (Colorado Rockies) signed free agent contracts.

Twenty-four of Dahm's players have been selected in the MLB Draft in his career, while four have gone on to play in the Major Leagues.

In the classroom, Dahm's teams have had success as well. In each of his first two seasons at Iowa, the head coach saw eight of his players named to the Academic All-Big Ten team. Last year, the baseball team had a team-record ten players named Academic All-Big Ten. That is the best three-year total in the history of the program.

In his first year, the Hawkeyes went 20-35 with a very challenging schedule, and finished eighth in the Big Ten with a 12-20 record.

Dahm helped guide both Nathan Johnson and Yoho to All-Big Ten honors. Johnson was named to the first team, while Yoho earned his way onto the second team.

On the recruiting front, Dahm and his staff gained praise nationally for their first class after it was ranked in the top-50 by Jerry Ford, the National Director of Perfect Game U.S.A., and No. 44 by Collegiate Baseball, who also named it the top class in the Big Ten. Dahm and the Hawkeyes made their mark on the in-state recruiting trail when they inked six of the top eight high school prospects in the state of Iowa, which included the top four pitching prospects.

In year two, another highly respected class was penned by Dahm and his assistants Ryan Brownlee and Nick Zumsande, featuring two of the top players in the Midwest – Kevin Hoef and Wes Freie. Collegiate Baseball listed it as an honorable mention class in its rankings.

Since his arrival in 2003, Coach Dahm has not only been building the foundation on the field, but off it as well.

"In order to build a consistent program we must have a solid foundation and that starts with quality student-athletes who are willing to make personal sacrifices on and off the field," said Dahm. "We must also develop a level of trust and belief in each other and in the program. If we can build that solid foundation the success on the field will start to take care of itself."

Players have been busy giving back to the community by helping raise money for breast cancer and helping the Iowa Children's Museum at the Crystal Ball dinner for the fourth time this year. The Hawkeyes are also involved with the UI's Dance Marathon, Iowa Children's Museum, University of Iowa Children's Hospital and Iowa City Neighborhood Centers.

Dahm was also instrumental in starting the annual Corridor Classic with intrastate rival Northern Iowa. The Corridor Classic, which is held at Veterans Memorial Stadium in Cedar Rapids, has helped raise over \$250,000 for the American Diabetes Association in its three years. It is one of the biggest ADA fundraisers in Iowa history.

Other new and exciting events have been added to the schedule. Last season, the Hawkeyes battled the Triple A Iowa Cubs at Principal Park in Des Moines for the second time in three years. In 2005, Iowa played on national television for the first time when they took on Nebraska on CSTV.

Dahm also started the annual Lead-Off Dinner, which serves to kick-off the season and get fans excited about Iowa baseball. National League Manager of the Year Joe Giardi will speak at this year's dinner. The Lead-Off Dinner has also featured baseball legend Tommy Lasorda, Cubs General Manager Jim Hendry, along with Iowa Cubs owner and Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Michael Gartner.

Before coming to Iowa City, Dahm spent 18 years as a member of the Creighton Bluejays baseball program. He left the Bluejays as the winningest coach in school history, having compiled 283 wins against 276 losses in 10 seasons as a head coach.

Dahm arrived at Creighton in 1986 to play under Hendry and spent four years as a student-athlete from 1986-89. In 1990, Dahm accepted a position as a graduate assistant coach for Hendry and spent four years helping build Creighton into a Missouri Valley Conference power.

In 1991, Dahm was promoted to a full-time assistant as he helped the Bluejays reach the College World Series. That Creighton squad ended the season as the second-highest hitting club in the nation, batting .355 as a team. The team's 60 triples in 1991 led the nation and remain a school record.

In October of 1993, Dahm was hired as Creighton's head coach, becoming the youngest head coach in Division I at the age of 25. For the next ten years, five of Dahm's ten teams would finish in the top three of the Missouri Valley Conference.

In 1999, Dahm earned his first of two Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year honors as the Bluejays advanced to the NCAA tournament for the first time in the Dahm era. Creighton posted 38 wins that season, the most since Dahm's first year in 1994, before being eliminated from the South Bend Regional.

In 2000, Dahm guided the Bluejays to their second consecutive NCAA Regional appearance at the Arizona State regional in Tempe, AZ, after finishing the season with a 38-23 record. During the season, Dahm led Creighton into the national spotlight as they peaked at No. 15 in the Collegiate Baseball poll and were ranked in the top 25 of the Baseball Weekly/ESPN Coaches' Poll and Baseball America.

Dahm earned his second coach of the year honor in 2002 when the Bluejays finished the season 30-24 against one of the nations toughest schedules. Victories over nationally ranked Nebraska, Notre Dame and Wichita State were overshadowed by the team's best-ever season in the Missouri Valley Conference. Despite hav-

ing a lineup top-heavy with underclassmen, Creighton finished second in MVC play with a 21-10 record.

A native of Morton Grove, IL, Dahm entered Creighton as a highly recruited infielder in 1985. As a player, Dahm shared the dugout with former Major Leaguers Mike Heathcott, Dax Jones, Scott Servais, Dan Smith and Scott Stahoviak.

Besides being a student of the game on the field, Dahm was active in community service, fundraising and his teams have strived academically as well.

The Bluejays were actively involved in the community under Dahm, as they held various free baseball clinics, raised money for the Nebraska Children's Home and were a part of "Operation Bluejay," a program that provided tutoring for young people in Omaha.

Dahm also played a large role in the planning, designing and fund raising for the \$3.5 million Creighton Sports Complex. The Kitty Gaughan Pavilion baseball facility is one of the finest indoor baseball complexes in the country. It featured a state of the art hitting facility, locker rooms, Legends View Club and coaches' offices.

Dahm's teams at Creighton not only had success on the field, but in the classroom as well. During his tenure, Dahm's players were named to 32 spots on the Missouri Valley Conference Scholar-Ath-

lete teams, 10 Verizon Academic all-District honors and three Verizon Academic all-Americans. His teams also consistently finished with G.P.A's around 3.0.

Dahm has also been active in the advancement of college baseball by being a member of the many national committees. He was a ten-year member on the College World Series Board of Directors and served on the American Baseball Coaches Association Change of Season Committee. He was also a part of the NCAA Division I Regional Advisory Committee and was an onsite director of the NCAA Yes Baseball Clinic for 11 years.

The 40-year old Dahm and his wife, Lynn, have been married for 13 years. The couple has three children - sons Casey and Tyler and daughter Lyndsey.

Pitching Coach Nick Zumsande

Nick Zumsande enters his fourth season as Iowa's pitching coach.

Under Zumsande's guidance, the Hawkeye pitching staff has flourished. Iowa has had a pitcher named to the all-Big Ten first team in each of the last three years, one of only two teams to accomplish that feat.

Last season, Zumsande helped closer Tim Gudex to his second-consecutive first team all-Big Ten honors and a professional contract with the Texas Rangers. Starter Austin Seward was named to the second team under his tutelage.

In 2005, Zumsande guided Gudex to a record-breaking season in which he was named first team all-Big Ten, while Nate Johnson earned first team laurels in 2004. Johnson was drafted by the Philadelphia Phillies.

"Coach Zumsande has done a great job with our pitching staff the past three years," Head Coach Jack Dahm said. "He has been instrumental in the development of all-Big Ten performers Nate Johnson, Tim Gudex, Austin Seward and the rest of the staff. I am very confident you will see our pitching staff develop into one of the best in the Big Ten and the country in the near future under Nick's direction."

In each of his three years at Iowa, Zumsande helped the Iowa pitching staff lower its ERA, batting average against, along with hits, doubles and home runs allowed from the year before.

Zumsande was also a big factor in helping Iowa land the top-ranked recruiting class in the Big Ten during the coaching staff's first year of recruiting.

Prior to being named Iowa's pitching coach in August of 2003, Zumsande served as a pitching instructor at Indiana State University. Zumsande joined the Sycamores in 2001 as the pitching instructor and recruiting coordinator. In his second and final season with the Sycamores in 2003, Zumsande guided the Indiana State hurlers to a 36-21 record and a 4.15 earned run average, the second lowest team ERA in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Before arriving at Terre Haute, IN, Zumsande served one year as the pitching coach at Iowa State University. In his lone year at Iowa State, the Cyclones team earned run average lowered nearly two runs and led the team to its first Big 12 Tournament appearance in school history. Zumsande's staff finished the conference season with a 4.38 ERA, which was tied for fourth with Nebraska in the conference.

Zumsande held the head coach's position at Muscatine Community College before accepting the assistant position at his alma mater, Iowa State.



Zumsande headed the Muscatine program from 1988-2000, recording 431 career victories against 195 losses, a .688 winning percentage. During that period, Zumsande earned NJCAA Region IX Coach of the Year honors in 1990, 1994 and 1999.

Over 50 of Zumsande's former MCC players were sent on to major four-year colleges and 30 former players signed professional baseball contracts.

A member of the American Baseball Coaches Association and Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association, Zumsande has twice guided his team to the NJCAA Division I World Series (1994 & 1999). In 1994, the Muscatine baseball program was awarded the Homa Thomas Team Sportsmanship Award by designated members of the media.

In the professional ranks, Zumsande spent the 1993 season working for Major League Baseball International in Northern Europe. While in Europe, he served as an ambassador as he promoted and instructed baseball for MLB.

Zumsande graduated from Iowa State in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He earned his master's degree in Athletic Administration from Northwest Missouri State in 1986.

Ryan Brownlee enters his fourth season as the Iowa hitting, infield instructor and recruiting coordinator.

"We are very fortunate to have Ryan on the coaching staff here at Iowa," Head Coach Jack Dahm said. "Ryan grew up around the game of baseball and he understands the commitment and work ethic it takes to build a championship program. He is definitely one of the bright young coaches in college baseball."

Under his guidance, the Hawkeyes have broken the single-season record for sacrifice hits and hit-by-pitch in each of the last two seasons. They have also broken records in putouts and singles in Brownlee's tenure.

In 2005, Brownlee helped the Hawkeyes to their most successful season in 15 years. Iowa went 28-29 with a 19-13 conference record. The team took third place in the Big Ten and advanced to their second conference tournament since 1990.

As hitting coach, Brownlee saw the team's batting average jump 30 points from 2004 to 2005 (.269 to .299). The team also scored more runs (273 to 352) had more RBIs (249 to 307) and walks (152 to 194).

Brownlee helped a pair of infielders to the all-Big Ten squad in 2005, with shortstop Andy Lytle and secondbaseman Jason White earning third team honors.

Over the last six seasons of coaching, Brownlee has had 11 players he coached or recruited drafted. Two more signed free agent contracts. In five years of coaching summer collegiate leagues, he has seen 30 of his players sign pro contracts including Khalil Green of the Padres and Luke Scott of the Astros.

Prior to joining the Iowa staff, Brownlee served as the infield/baserunning coach and assisted with hitting and recruiting at James Madison University for four years. Brownlee did a variety of gameday assignments during his tenure at JMU, including coaching first base, bench coach, infield shifts, defensive plays and opponents' scouting reports. In back-to-back years (2001-02), Brownlee guided the Dukes to school record .967 and .968 fielding percentages. Also in 2002, the Dukes broke the school record for wins in a season with 43 and advanced to the NCAA Southeast Regional at Columbia, SC, after winning the Colonial Athletic Association crown.

Before joining the James Madison coaching staff, Brownlee served as an assistant coach under his father, James, at Evansville for two seasons. While at Evansville, Brownlee was responsible for outfield, catching and hitting instruction. Brownlee advanced to the Purple Aces' coaching ranks after excelling as a player for four seasons. A four-year starter at second base, Brownlee earned all-MCC honors in 1994 and all-MVC accolades in 1996. He was also selected to the American Baseball Coaches Association all-Region squad. In 1997, Brownlee was tabbed a TPX preseason third-team all-American and he received the University of Evansville's William V. Slyker award for the most outstanding male athlete at the university.

Brownlee, a native of Evansville, graduated with a bachelor's degree in psychology with a minor in biology in 1997. He received his Master's in athletic administration in 2002 from James Madison. He and his wife, Aimee, have two children – Jackson (4) and Norah (1).

Hawkeyes in the Pros

The Iowa baseball program has a long history of former athletes competing on the professional level. Over 100 Iowa players have been sent into the pro ranks. Recently, under Head Coach Jack Dahm, the Hawkeye baseball program has reached new heights by combining talented student-athletes with first class facilities and superior coaching. In his career, Coach Dahm has sent 24 players to the Major Leagues.

Last year, Tim Gudex and Nate Price each signed professional contracts - Gudex with the Texas Rangers and Price with the Chicago Cubs.

Two Hawkeyes were selected in the 2005 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Andy Lytle was taken by the Cleveland Indians, while Kris Welker was selected by the Chicago White Sox. Another pair of Hawkeyes signed free agent contracts, with Nate Yoho joining the Milwaukee Brewers organization and Jesse Brownell getting inked by the Colorado Rockies.

In 2004, first team all-Big Ten pitcher Nate Johnson was selected by the Philadelphia Phillies in the MLB Draft.

Two Hawkeyes prolonged their 2003 baseball seasons at the professional level. Junior Kyle Thousand surrendered his final year of eligibility to pursue a professional career with the Toronto Bluejays. The two-time all-Big Ten centerfielder was selected in the 26th round of Major League Baseball's amateur draft. Former Hawkeye MVP and right-handed pitcher Reed Pawelk signed a free-agent contract with the Florida Marlins following Iowa's 2003 season.

Four Hawkeyes were drafted by the major leagues after the 1999 season. Pitcher, Wes Obermueller was drafted in the second round by the Kansas City Royals, second baseman Brian Mitchell went in the 40th round to the Toronto Blue Jays and pitcher, Matt Sawvell signed a pro contract with the New York Mets.

Obermueller started the 2002 season as a member of the Wichita Wranglers, a Double-A affiliate of the Kansas City Royals, before being promoted to the parent club and making his Major League debut September 20th, against the Cleveland Indians. In 2003, Obermueller was traded to the Milwaukee Brewers, where he won two games and struck out 34 hitters in 65 2/3 innings. He went 6-8 with a 5.80 ERA in 118 innings pitched in 2004 and 1-4 with a 5.26 ERA in 2005 before being traded to the Atlanta Braves last December.

Signed by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, hurler Jim Magrane set Iowa's single season records for innings pitched (107.2) and strikeouts (110) during the 1999 season and is currently a member of the Durham Bulls, a Triple-A affiliate of the Devil Rays.

In 1998, Iowa infielder, Nate Frese, was drafted in the 10th round by the Chicago Cubs. He advanced to play for the Iowa Cubs, a Triple-A affiliate of the Cubs, before injuries forced him to retire.

In 1993 outfielder Bo Porter was drafted by the Chicago Cubs. During the 1999 season, Porter was brought up from the minors by the Cubs. Porter saw action in 24 games, while starting five in the outfield. Porter was the opening day centerfielder for the Texas Rangers during the 2001 season.

Outfielder Chris Hatcher was drafted following the 1990 season. He has been a member of many minor league organizations, compiling a .275 batting average in 953 games. During the 1998 season, Hatcher was a member of the Kansas City Royals, where he saw action in eight games.

Tim Costo was a first-round draft pick of the Cleveland Indians in 1990 before being traded to Cincinnati. He spent the 1995 season at the Indians AAA class Buffalo team, playing in 105 games. He was also a member of the St. Louis and Toronto organizations.

Cal Eldred was a first-round draft pick by Milwaukee in 1989 and remained there until he was traded to the White Sox in 2000. In 1994, he had the honor of being the opening day pitcher, and led the American League in starts (25). Eldred made a name for himself in 1992 by going 11-2 for Milwaukee, winning 10 straight decisions. In 1993 he led the American League in innings pitched (258). After a two-year stint on the Chicago south side, Eldred signed a free-agent contract with the St. Louis Cardinals in 2003. In 2004, he was a key part of the Cardinal team that advanced to the World Series.

Mike Boddicker, a native of Norway, Iowa earned all-Big Ten honors as a pitcher and infielder during his campaign as a Hawkeye (1976-78). In 1983, he was named the American League "Rookie of the Year." After pitching in the major leagues for 11 years, Boddicker retired in 1993. He played for the Baltimore Orioles and Kansas City Royals.

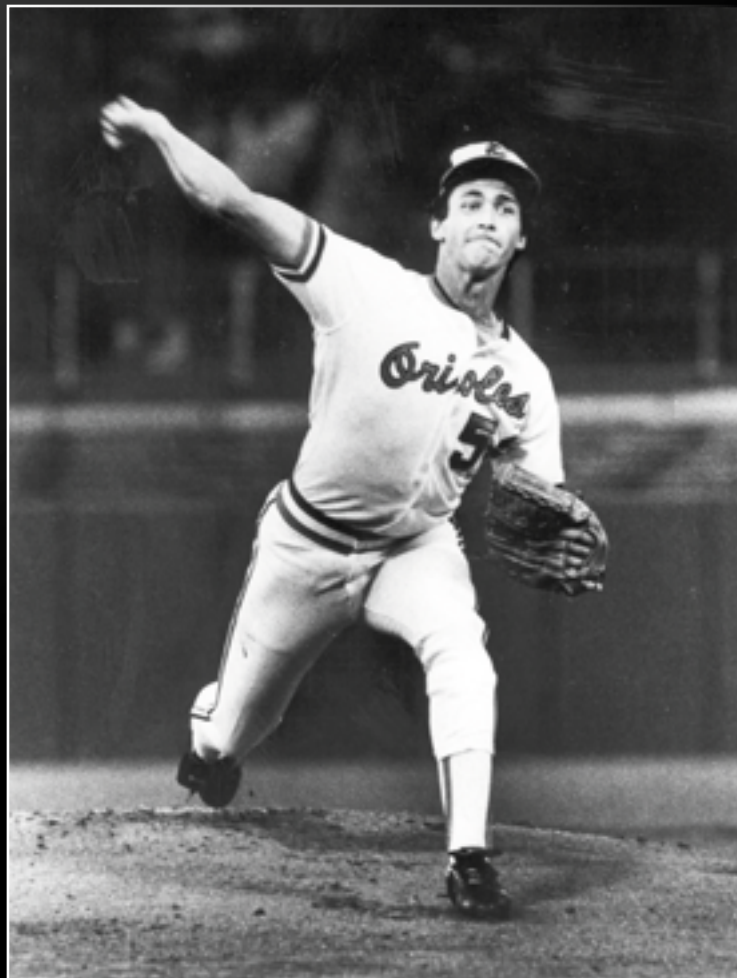

Infielder Nate Frese received the scholarship in 1997 and 1998, Iowa City native Brian Mitchell won the scholarship in 1999, and the 2000 and 2001 scholarships were awarded to outfielder Andy Jansen, a Bancroft, Iowa native. Four-year starter Ian Mattiace received the scholarship in 2002 and former *Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American* Reed Pawelk has benefited from the scholarship in 2003 and 2004. Kris Welker was the 2005 recipient, and Travis Sweet has gotten the scholarship the last two seasons.

Cal Eldred Lights Fund

Cal Eldred has lit up Hawkeye baseball once again. But this time, instead of employing his expert pitching, the major-league star and his wife, Christi, made a gift to fund the installation of lights at Iowa's Duane Banks Field. The Cedar Rapids couple gave \$245,000 for the installation of lights at the baseball field named after Cal Eldred's former coach.

The gift, the largest ever from a current professional athlete's family to Iowa athletics, allowed the project to be completed in September 2001. The Hawkeyes won the first night game played at Banks Field April 10, 2002, against Northern Illinois, 11-9. The University of Iowa officially dedicated the lights Saturday, April 13, 2002.

Former Iowa Athletic Director Bob Bowsby hailed the Eldreds' generosity, saying, "Cal and Christi's gift shows that once a Hawkeye, always a Hawkeye. Cal has been representing Iowa well for years, first with the Milwaukee Brewers, then with the Chicago White Sox and now with the St. Louis Cardinals, all the while making us all proud. But the fact that he and Christi have remained true to their Iowa roots in this very generous way makes us even prouder."

Former Iowa Baseball Coach Scott Broghamer noted that the Eldred's gift is another chapter in their long association with baseball in the state. "I coached Cal when he played for Urbana High School in the mid-1980's, and he and Christi have been Hawkeye supporters for years," Broghamer said. "This gift will make Iowa's field one of the finest anywhere. We're very excited and grateful."

The Eldred's cited their desire to give back to Iowa and to honor former Hawkeye coaches Banks and Broghamer—who they said are their good friends and longtime mentors—as reasons for making the gift. The gift was commemorated by a plaque at the field.

Cal Eldred, who grew up in Urbana and attended Iowa for three years before being drafted by the Milwaukee Brewers in 1989, said, "My experience at Iowa helped shape me as a player and as a person. And Coach Banks has stayed involved in my life and has always been there for me. I couldn't be happier about making this gift for Hawkeye baseball. I hope others will consider helping out however they can."

In the fall of 2001, the Iowa baseball field was re-named The Duane Banks Baseball Field in honor of the Hawkeyes' former head coach. Banks, the winningest coach in Iowa history, served as Iowa's head baseball coach from 1970-1997.

Banks Field was originally built in 1974. The 3,000-seat stadium has dimensions of 330 feet down the lines, 375 in the power alleys and 400 to centerfield. As a whole, the complex is one of the top facilities in the Big Ten and the Midwest.

During this last offseason, Banks Field underwent some renovations, including new, pro-style dugouts on the first and third base sides. In 2005, the Hawkeyes got new seating in the grandstands. The new grandstand seating may look familiar to Hawkeye fans, as it came from the North endzone of Kinnick Stadium.

In 2002, former Hawkeye and current Major Leaguer Cal Eldred donated \$245,000 to fund the installation of lights at Banks Field. It is the largest donation by a current professional athlete to Iowa Athletics.

The infield was re-designed following the 1999 season with a new playing surface and ten-foot fences were added to the outfield. The field's drainage system was also improved. Both bullpens were re-structured and the hitter's background was replaced. Located next to the Hawkeye bullpen are two Astro Turf batting cages.

The complex features locker rooms for both teams and umpires. In 1998, Iowa's clubhouse was expanded, giving the Hawkeyes one of the best college baseball environments in the nation.

Prior to the 1996 season a Daktronics state-of-the-art scoreboard system was installed. In addition to providing spectators with pertinent game information, the system also has a marquee that is capable of displaying player information.

A new press box was built in 1989 and renovated in 2002. It can accommodate several radio stations and up to 25 media members.

During inclement weather, the Hawkeyes can move to the Bubble, Iowa's indoor facility located right next to Banks Field. The Bubble is a 120-yard expanse of state-of-the-art "Prestige XT" artificial surface that includes four full-size batting cages and five raised pitching mounds. The bubble gives the Hawkeyes a top-notch facility to train in year-round.

Dedicated in 1998, the Pavilion at Banks Field is in memory of Diane Mitchell, mother of Hawkeye athletes David, Mark and Brian Mitchell, and wife of former football player Bob Mitchell. Diane died in an automobile accident en route to the 1996 Alamo Bowl. During her life, Diane never missed an inning or a down of her son's games and was always their biggest supporter. Her dedication to the Hawkeyes was surpassed only by her love for her family.

Academic Student Services

Since its inception in 1979, Athletics Student Services has evolved from a two-person, academic support service to a broad-based, nationally prominent student support services operation. Its purpose is to assist student athletes to become tomorrow's leaders by offering academic and personal support services to assist them in making timely and satisfactory progress toward their degrees.

Athletic Student Services focuses on four important areas — academic counseling and monitoring, educational and support programs, retention programs and compliance services — when working with student-athletes. Following are descriptions of some of the programs, services and opportunities available to student-athletes in those areas.

Athletics Learning Center

The \$4.6 million Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletics Learning Center opened in August of 2003 and gives all Iowa student-athletes a state of the art facility to help them with their educations.

The Athletics Learning Center is a multi-level, 20,000 square foot facility which provides a computer center, study areas, classes and meeting places for all Hawkeye student-athletes.

The Learning Center features an auditorium that converts into two classrooms, separate study rooms for under and upper-class student-athletes that feature 28 study carrels, a computer lab, five tutorial rooms, the book loan repository,

office space for Iowa's Student Services staff and a display area to recognize the academic accomplishments of Iowa's student-athletes.

Academic Counseling and Monitoring

Athletics coordinators work closely with student-athletes and their university-assigned advisors from the time they arrive on campus until the time they leave the University. Along with focusing on academic planning matters such as goal-setting, plans of study, choosing majors and degree requirements, athletics coordinators also help student-athletes understand NCAA,

Big Ten and University academic policies. They also solicit feedback from instructors on academic progress made by student-athletes.

Tutoring

Tutoring is available free of charge to all student-athletes. Tutors, who are post-graduates and teachers, help with course content as well as study strategies and are available in virtually all general education program subjects.

Retention

A full-time staff member directs the retention program, which identifies student-athletes

who may need tailored academic assistance and structure, and implements individualized learning plans to help them succeed. Such plans may include daily and weekly planning sessions with athletics coordinators and retention staff, tutoring, study groups, mainstreaming into on-campus services like the writing center, math labs and services for students with learning disabilities.

Transition Seminar

The Transition Seminar runs for 12 weeks (90 minutes per week) at the beginning of the fall semester. This seminar, which is attended by all new students, explores personal and academic issues stemming from the transition from high school to college and adjustment issues that are unique to student-athletes. Its purpose is to help student-athletes improve their performance and persistence at Iowa.

These are highly interactive sessions with emphasis on group discussion in order for the student-athletes may learn from each other. Some of the topics are introduction to the University library, personal and academic goal-setting, time management, personal responsibility and accountability, substance abuse, relating to professors, study skills, diversity and ethics.

Educational Programs

Throughout the year, Athletic Student Services sponsors and conducts educational programs. These are seminars, speakers, workshops and short courses on issues of personal growth and life skills, with a primary focus on alcohol and other drugs. These programs, which are often topics suggested by student-athletes, appeal to a variety of audiences, including specific teams, age groups (i.e., freshmen, fourth-year seniors) or department-wide.

Subjects that have been addressed in the past include alcohol and self-esteem, healthy intimacy, sexual assault, personal responsibility and accountability, communicating with coaches, stress management, racial diversity, time management, learning strategies and transitions from college to professional life.

Minority Enrichment Program

This program offers a culturally supportive environment in which minority student-athletes have the opportunity to develop friendships and a support network in the university. A core focus group of students and staff coordinate programs such as guest speakers, holiday celebrations, community service activities with the local neighborhood centers, events with Cultural Centers and networking with minority faculty, staff, professional and business leaders.

Compare the Numbers

Iowa's student-athletes have outperformed the University's entire student population each year since the NCAA started requiring a report of student-athlete graduation rates.

Career Guidance and Development

Planning a meaningful career and a fulfilling life is an ongoing process of expanding and narrowing choices, beginning when the student-athlete arrives on campus and continuing throughout their college career and lifetime. This process includes learning about who you are (e.g., your values, abilities and interests) and using that information to choose courses leading eventually to an academic major by the end of the second year.

The process continues with “building a resume” and exploring other college and community activities (e.g., campus organizations, student government, community service, church involvement). An important step is to learn about the world of work, growing industries, employment forecasts and how the student-athlete interests and abilities fit. Summer internships, fieldwork and volunteering are all valuable experiences that lead to reasonable decisions about a career.

As the student-athlete approaches their senior year, they need to explore their options for life after graduation (i.e., full time work, graduate or professional school or professional sports). Those decisions will require further planning, whether it is to develop a job strategy and resume, or to apply to graduate schools and take entrance exams.

Athletic Student Services offers individual consultation, career development seminars and workshops, referrals to other campus offices and special events, such as the Polk County Senior Recognition Banquet for graduating student-athletes. This event is an opportunity for graduating seniors to be recognized by the governor for their contributions to the people of Iowa and to meet and network with professional and business executives across the state of Iowa.

Athletic counselors and staff members from Athletic Student Services help student-athletes identify their choices, clarify their plans and refer them for further assistance to other student service offices on campus.

- Complete all graduate/professional school applications; register and take graduate entrance exams
- Attend senior transition workshops

On April 21, 2004, the University of Iowa and the University of Northern Iowa ushered in a new era of Iowa collegiate baseball with the inaugural I-380 Corridor Classic. The game, played at Memorial Stadium – home of the Class A Cedar Rapids Kernels, will pit the two intrastate rivals against each other annually.

The game is a real event for eastern Iowa baseball fans, featuring spirit squads from both teams, variety of outstanding promotions, fireworks and the “Kiss a Pig” contest where fans are able to see local celebrities lip-lock with a pig while getting a chance to win a trip valued at over \$5,000. The “Kiss a Pig” promotion is sponsored by the American Diabetes Association.

In 2005, Hawkeye football players Drew Tate and Warren Holway re-enacted their famous, game-winning Hail Mary from the 2005 Capital One Bowl for the ceremonial first pitch.

Hawkeyes in the Media



If Hawkeye baseball fans can't make it out to Banks Field for a game, they are in luck because all Iowa home games and most road games, including all Big Ten contests, are broadcast on AM 800 KXIC in the Iowa City area. Brent Balbinot calls the play-by-play for the Hawkeyes.

For Hawkeye baseball fans who can't get enough Black and Gold news, Head Coach Jack Dahm has a weekly call-in show hosted by the voice of Iowa baseball, Brent Balbinot. The show originates every Monday night from Flannigan's Bar and Grill in Coralville.

On top of the radio coverage, Iowa City is a media saturated environment. And with no professional teams in the area, the Hawkeyes get tremendous coverage from newspapers, television and the internet.

Launching in August of 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering both the athletic and academic content of the Big Ten member institutions on a national level. Showcasing a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by the conference's 11 institutions, the Big Ten Network will operate 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It will be available to all carriers and distributors nationwide. The Big Ten Network's first affiliate, DIRECTV, will deliver the Network to its Total Choice Package subscribers at launch. Many events will be produced in High-Definition television (HDTV). In addition to traditional distribution through cable and satellite, select Big Ten Network content will also be available through alternative media platforms such as the Internet, iPods, cell phones and/or other emerging technologies.



The Big Ten Network will carry many of the games and events previously available only through syndication, providing greater exposure for these and other Big Ten sports. The sports programming on the Big Ten Network and/or through alternative Big Ten Network platforms will include multiple baseball games each season, along with the Big Ten Tournament.

In addition, each school will have the right to provide 60 hours of its own content annually. The Big Ten Network will launch

in August 2007 and will be available for cable operators and satellite distributors nationwide to carry on their basic tiers. Fox will work to secure carriage agreements with all distributors. Fox has already entered into a charter affiliation agreement with DIRECTV, which will carry the Network at launch nationwide on Total Choice, its most broadly distributed package, currently received by more than 15.4 million households.

Our Strength and Conditioning mission is to provide scientifically based and continually progressive training methods that will increase athletic potential and decrease injuries.

The University of Iowa Baseball Strength and Conditioning program is composed of two main objectives, injury prevention and performance improvement. These are developed through a year-round, progression based training program. Injury prevention is accomplished through individual evaluation and assessment, which is addressed using joint stability and flexibility exercises. Performance is increased through improvements in work capacity strength, power and speed. Each is addressed year round with one having a greater emphasis at times throughout the year.

- Work Capacity – capability to perform repeated efforts and recover quickly
- Strength – ability to apply maximal force
- Power – capacity to apply force quickly
- Speed – maximum velocity in shortest time possible.



Our training objectives are met through incorporating three basic training principles when choosing methods of training. The majority of all exercises selected should be ground based (standing), multi-joint and multi-dimensional. These principles apply to almost all sports requirements and are therefore important for inclusion into the strength and conditioning program. Training is performed in smaller groups to allow more individualization for each athlete. Athletic nutrition is emphasized to help maximize recovery, improve body composition (muscle v. fat) and increase energy for competition and practice.

Strength and Conditioning

The Hawkeye Baseball team lifts weights in the Recreation Building training room, which is right next door to Banks Field. The room features Olympic style free weights, along with nontraditional training devices like exercise balls and plyometric boxes.

Walk-ons

With the NCAA limiting the number of scholarships a team can give, a successful walk-on program is essential for any team hoping to compete at a high level. No where is this more evident than at the University of Iowa, where Head Coach Jack Dahm has a history of developing walk-on players.

In his career, Coach Dahm has had nine players begin as walk-ons and end up playing professional baseball.

Over the last two years, former walk-on Tim Gudex enjoyed unprecedented success as the Hawkeye closer. He was a two-time first team all-Big Ten selection after leading the league in conference wins (7), saves (6), ERA (1.11), appearances (19), games in relief (19), games finished (19) and opponent's batting average (.205). He also led the conference in overall ERA at 2.56.

Last year, former walk-on Austin Seward turned in a career season and earned second team all-Big Ten laurels.

"Joining the University of Iowa baseball team as a walk-on gives a young player the chance to grow and mature as an athlete, as well as an opportunity to get an outstanding education," Dahm said. "The entire coaching staff is committed to the development of our walk-on program, because there is no question that in order to build a championship caliber program, you need a program that allows kids to develop and contribute to the success of the team."

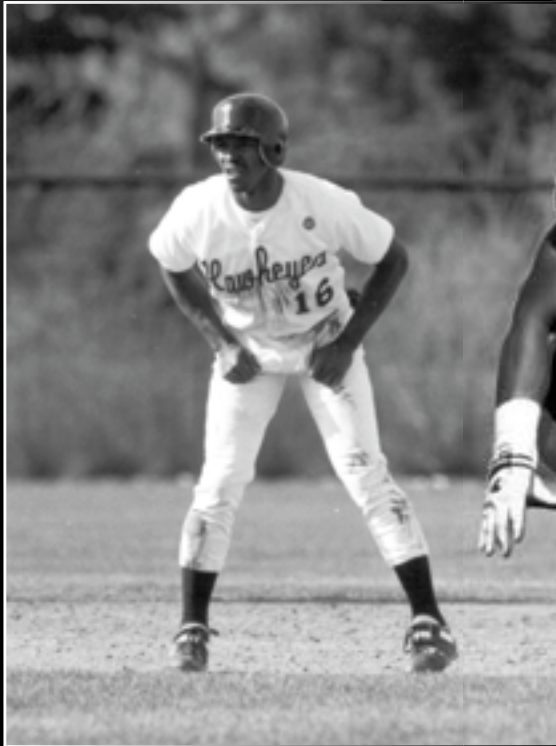

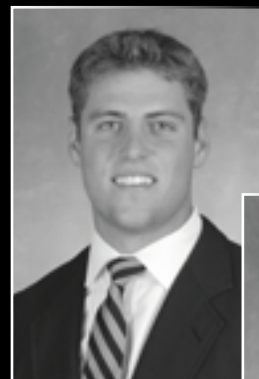

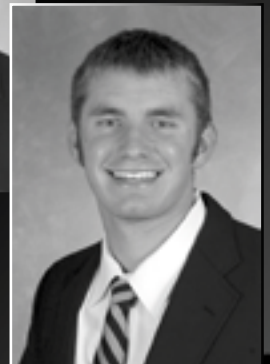

Gary Fethke
Interim President

Interim President Gary Fethke is the former dean of The University of Iowa Henry B. Tippie College of Business and the Leonard A. Hadley Professor of Leadership. A professor of management sciences and economics, he received both his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from The University of Iowa.

He was appointed dean in 1994 after serving one year as interim dean. From 1988 to 1993 Dean Fethke served as the senior associate dean of academic affairs in the Tippie College of Business, and before that he served as chairman of the department of management sciences.

In the years between receiving his Ph.D. at Iowa and returning to the College as a faculty member, he served on the faculty at Bradley University (1968-74). In addition, he taught at the London School of Economics for one year (1981-82) and several summers (1984, '86, '88 and '90). He has published numerous articles in the areas of industrial organization, macroeconomics, and labor economics. His recent research interest focuses on the economics of public higher education.

Dean Fethke spearheaded the expansion of the Evening and Executive MBA Programs. The Evening MBA is currently being offered in Cedar Rapids, Newton, Des Moines, and the Quad Cities. The Executive MBA Program is now available both on campus and in other Iowa cities, as needed, and internationally, in Hong Kong and Beijing, China. A dual degree (MBA-Master's in Systems Engineering) EMBA Program has been taught in Cedar Rapids. During his tenure as dean, the undergraduate program of the College raised the academic profile of entering students and began an early admissions program to admit outstanding high school students directly into the Tippie College in their first year on campus.

Fethke headed the planning and coordination of construction for the John Pappajohn Business Building and the Pomerantz Center on The University of Iowa campus, the UI-Cedar Rapids Area Conference and Education Center in Cedar Rapids, and the MBA facilities at the Des Moines W. A. Krause Center and the Newton Polytechnic Campus.

In his role as dean, Fethke was responsible for coordinating the fundraising endeavors of the College with UI Foundation staff. These efforts led to the development of the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center in 1996, the Hawkinson Institute of Business Finance in 1998, the naming of the Henry B. Tippie College of Business in 1999, and a major commitment from Jerre and Mary Joy Stead in 2003. The Tippie College of Business raised \$125 million in the recent University campaign.

His wife, Carol, is a faculty member of the economics and marketing departments at The University of Iowa. They have two grown sons.



Gary Barta
Director of Athletics

Gary Barta became the University of Iowa's 11th Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on August 1, 2006. His selection was announced on June 23, 2006.

A native Midwesterner, Barta signed a five-year contract to lead one of the most successful athletic programs in the nation. His wife Connie is a native of Waterloo, IA.

Barta has 19 years of university and athletic administration experience. Before accepting the Iowa position he had been the Wyoming AD since October of 2003. From November 1996 to October 2003, he was senior associate athletic director for external relations and sports programs at the University of Washington in Seattle. From 1990 to 1996, he was associated with the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls, where he was director of athletic development and external relations. He also served as associate director of development at North Dakota State University in Fargo, from 1988-90, where he was responsible for fund raising for athletics, the colleges of business and engineering, and the University's annual fund.

Wyoming received the NCAA Division I-A Program of Excellence Award earlier this year, which honors athletics programs that are superior athletically, academically, and in student-athlete life skill preparation.

The Barta led program at Wyoming was credited with a number of significant accomplishments. The Cowboys played in the 2004 Las Vegas Bowl and posted a victory over UCLA. The women's basketball team won 21 games during the 2005-06 season, a top 20 placing by the women's track team in the NCAA championships in 2005; and a top 25 finish in men's NCAA swimming in 2004. During his three-year tenure, seven Wyoming coaches won Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year awards.

The new Iowa Athletics Director has been a successful fund raiser, having helped secure more than \$150 million in private contributions and corporate sponsorships over the past 10 years.

Prior to taking over at Wyoming, he served as Washington's Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Relations and Sports Programs. He was responsible for generating revenue to fund Washington's \$40 million annual intercollegiate athletics budget. While at Washington, Barta was directly involved in a variety of duties including: hiring of coaches and administrative staff; coordinating the schedule for men's basketball; initiating and managing sponsorship relationships and negotiating radio network contracts.

Barta earned his Bachelor of Science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State University in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championships in 1983, 1985 and 1986. He returned to NDSU to begin his career in 1988 as an associate director of development and later director of development.

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (8) and a daughter, Madison (6). He was born Sept. 4, 1963 in Minneapolis, MN.

A Complete Program

The University of Iowa Athletic Department, under the direction of Athletic Director Gary Barta, is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation.

The men's and women's departments, operating separately for over 25 years, merged in 2001 under Bowsby's direction. It combined nationally recognized programs for both genders into one successful and progressive athletic unit.

Combining their successes on the playing fields with continued success and recognition in the classroom, UI student-athletes practice and perform in some of the best facilities in the nation, while knowing the support of their efforts and attendance by Hawkeye fans ranks among the best in the country.

While the Hawkeyes continue to compete with the best in the nation in a variety of sports, Iowa continues to boast some of the most impressive athletic facilities in the nation, operated by one of the most respected departments.

Several new projects are underway on the Iowa campus. Some of the latest additions to the UI campus are the Roy G. Karro Athletics Hall of Fame and Visitors Center and the Russell and Ann Gerdin Athletic Learning Center.

Kinnick Stadium received a major up-grading and renovation that will be completed just prior to the 2006 season. The \$90 million project includes the replacing of the south end zone stands and building a four-level press box that will house 47 guest suites, along with new scoreboards, video walls, concession stands and restrooms.

Additional priorities for the Iowa program include the establishment and development of endowments for all sports programs, the continued enhancement of graduation rates, and the implementation of a long-range plan to ensure Iowa's financial, academic and competitive future. As an example, all of Iowa's 13 scholarships for men's basketball are fully endowed.

The graduation rate of Iowa's student-athletes has improved in each of the past 10 years and has consistently ranked above the graduation rate of all UI students. Hawkeye athletes have garnered more than 70 academic All-America honors since 1992. The 2005-06 school-year saw the University of Iowa produce 138 academic all-Big Ten athletes.

Iowa athletes have been recognized as all-Americans in their sport on 207 occasions during the past 15 years.

Iowa's athletic teams during the 2005-06 athletic year continued its trend of success, on the playing fields and in academic pursuits.

The Hawkeye football team enjoyed another good year on the gridiron, going 7-5 and making it's fourth-consecutive January bowl game when it was selected to play the Florida Gators in the Outback Bowl.

Iowa followed its 11-2 mark of 2002 with a 10-3 record in 2003 and a 10-2 mark in 2004, finishing each of those seasons ranked eighth nationally.

Iowa's men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to post-season play in each of the last six seasons. The men's squad

finished with a 25-9 record and won the Big Ten Tournament. They earned a No. 3 seed in the 2006 NCAA tournament.

The women's team advanced to the NCAA tournament for the 16th time.

The Iowa wrestling squad will be under new leadership this season as former Hawkeye three-time NCAA Champion and Olympic Gold Medalist Tom Brands returns to his alma mater as head coach. He will be joined on his staff by the legendary Dan Gable, who led Iowa to 15 NCAA titles and 21 Big Ten Championships in his 21 seasons as head coach.

Iowa's men's and women's and gymnastics teams continue to rank among the best in the nation. The men's team again advanced to the NCAA Championships and the women's gymnastics squad has been in the NCAA meet two of the last four years.

The Hawkeye men's cross country team advanced to the NCAA Championships for the second-consecutive year in the fall of 2004, while sophomore Kineke Alexander won the NCAA Championship in the women's indoor 400-meters.

Iowa's women's softball team advanced to NCAA regional action for the 11th time in 13 seasons. Iowa has advanced to the softball World Series on four occasions over the past 12 seasons and Coach Gayle Blevins is one of three coaches to reach 1,000 career victories.

From the rankings on the courts and playing fields, to the rankings in the classroom, to the rankings in fan and community support, to the ranking as a program that boasts some of the best athletic facilities in the nation, it's easy to understand why Iowa fans everywhere truly believe, "It's great to be a Hawkeye."

THE COLLEGES

Freshmen who enroll at The University of Iowa are admitted to either the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences or the College of Engineering. The General Education Program allows students to sample courses in more than 100 areas of study. At Iowa, students are required to take electives, major courses, and general education course work.

LIBERAL ARTS & SCIENCES

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Arts (BA) and Science (BS) in 58 major fields; Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Music (BM) and of Liberal Studies (BLS).

Admission - Freshmen and transfer students are to meet the college's admissions requirements.

ENGINEERING

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Science in Engineering (BSE) in six majors- biomedical, chemical, civil, electrical, industrial, and mechanical engineering.

Admission - Students must meet the college's high admissions requirements.

BUSINESS

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) in six majors: accounting, economics, finance, management, management information systems, and marketing.

Admission - Requires two years of pre-business study in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Details at www.biz.uiowa.edu/upo/admissions/.

EDUCATION

Teacher Education Programs - Elementary Education, Art Education, English Education, Foreign Language Education, Mathematics Education, Music Education, Science Education, and Social Studies Education. NURSING

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN)

Admission - Students complete one year of pre-requisite courses in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and apply for admission during the second semester of the first year. The College of Nursing has competitive admission. The BSN requires three years of study once the student earns admission.

PHARMACY

Professional Degree Offered - Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD)

Admission - Students must successfully complete required pre-pharmacy course work in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. These requirements may be met in two years but do not guarantee admission. Students must also complete the Pharmacy College Admission Test (PCAT).

GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL DEGREES

Many student-athletes who have attended The University of Iowa and completed their undergraduate degrees continue their education at the University.

Student-athletes who attend graduate or professional school must first complete course work toward a bachelor's degree in their field of study. The University also offers undergraduates the opportunity to participate in research and overseas study programs, as well as internships that will help prepare them for graduate school.

RESIDENCE

Each athletics team has its own rules regarding residence of incoming freshmen. Across the University, about 90 percent of freshmen choose to live on campus in one of the 10 residence halls. Most student-athletes live at least two years on campus.

The residence halls have full-service dining rooms, study lounges, laundry facilities, recreational facilities, vending, and bank machines. Each room has high-speed computer connections for e-mail and Internet access. Iowa also offers wireless networking in 52 buildings and several outdoor areas, providing more than 265 access points across campus.

LIBRARIES

The University of Iowa Libraries supports the academic achievement of all student-athletes with specialized courses, one-on-one consultations with librarians, 24/7 access to electronic resources through the web site (www.lib.uiowa.edu), and extended hours, which can accommodate complicated practice and travel schedules. UI Librarians help students find answers, whether they're on a web site, in a book, journal, government document, or database. Librarians also plan and teach students how to find, evaluate, and use information from a variety of sources--skills they will use throughout their lives.

COMPUTERS

There are 26 Instructional Technology Centers all over the campus which are filled with 1,200 computers. These facilities are open at least 50 hours a week. Some are open 24 hours. Also, the Information Arcade in the Main Library provides a variety of specialized computing tools.

The Computer Demo Center provides information for students who want to purchase computers and software.

CAREER PLANNING

Finding and pursuing a career takes careful planning. The Pomerantz Career Center is extremely valuable for student-athletes and can help identify skills that transfer from athletics to the workplace. The program suggests a timeline each student-athlete may follow throughout his or her stay at Iowa. The components of the program include:

- *Individualized career advising
- *Career education programs
- *Summer job/internship opportunities
- *Resume and cover-letter development
- *Preparing for life after college athletics

SKILLS LABS

Many academic departments offer skills labs to help students improve skills necessary to succeed at Iowa, such as writing, speaking, math, science, and foreign language. Assistance with skills such as note-taking, time-management, and test-taking are available through resources such as the College Transition Seminar (a credit-bearing course offered through University College), University Counseling Services, and Athletic Student Services staff.



HEALTH SERVICES

The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available. Students at Iowa can go to Student Health Service, which is open Monday through Friday. The service is supported by a fee paid by all full-time students. It offers students unlimited free office visits (there is a charge for other procedures done in the office, such as blood tests).

CULTURAL CENTERS

Four cultural centers on campus provide a welcoming setting where students from various cultures can find cultural, academic, and personal support services: the Latino and Native American Cultural Center, the Afro American Cultural Center, the Asian Pacific American Cultural Center, and the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Resource and Education Center.

CAMBUS

There are six primary bus routes throughout the Iowa campus. The University Cambus provides over three million free rides to class and to the dorms for students each year. Some routes run seven days a week, and some run until 2:30 a.m. Cambus also operates a specialized transportation service for persons with disabilities.

Attractive in size and friendliness, Iowa City is big in the sense that it offers all the advantages and conveniences of much larger metropolitan areas like summer and permanent employment opportunities, live entertainment and concerts, fine dining and shopping, industry and commerce.

Iowa City is known regionally for the excellence of small bands that originate here and its resident comedy troupes.

Iowa City is located in the heart of eastern Iowa, within easy driving distance of several major Midwestern cities including the state capital, Des Moines, as well as Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City and Minneapolis.

Each year, the University of Iowa boasts a student population that includes young men and women from all 50 states and more than 100 foreign countries. The record shows that Hawkeyes don't grow up only in Iowa—they come from virtually all parts of the world.

According to a recent annual report conducted by Morgan Quitno Press, a publishing and research company located in Lawrence, KS, Iowa ranks as the second most livable state. The report is based on 43 factors which assess a state's quality of life.

The state of Iowa ranks as the fifth best state to raise a family, according to a recent study released by the Children's Rights Council, a Washington, D.C. based organization.

According to the annual study by Forbes Magazine, Iowa City ranks third among small cities on a national list of best places to do business and advance careers. Iowa City has ranked in the top three in the Forbes rankings in four of the past five years.

The Best Places list, released on Forbes' website, ranked 200 of the nation's largest metropolitan areas, based on government data for employment and wage growth over both one- and five-year periods. The study was based on salary and job growth and high-tech output and included cities that range in size from 24,000 to 83,000.

Hawkeye Traditions

THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago.

The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the *Fort Madison Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawkeye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

HERKY THE HAWKEYE

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.

SCHOOL COLORS

For 40 years Iowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide what are now the school official colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of Iowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.



SCHOOL FIGHT SONG

The Iowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, Iowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man," Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of Iowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletics events the year around.
