2006 Season Preview

In his second year at the head of the Iowa Baseball program, Jack Dahm guided his Hawkeye to its best finish in 15 years. Heading into season three with a solid nucleus returning, Coach Dahm and his staff are looking to climb higher in the Big Ten standings and make a run at the team's first conference championship since 1990.

STARTING PITCHING

The backbone of the 2006 team should be its pitching staff, as almost the entire staff returns from last year, including the complete starting rotation. In addition to the returnees, a solid group of talented freshmen arms will compete for innings.

"We are very excited about our pitching staff with all the arms we have returning, plus the addition of some talented newcomers," Dahm said. "We should have a solid staff with a lot of depth. This pitching depth has led to a great deal of internal competition on our staff and we believe this will make us stronger and more prepared to make a run at a conference championship."

Friday starter Luke O'Loughlin returns after offseason back surgery and should be 100-percent heading into his senior season. In ten starts last year, O'Loughlin posted a 3.86 ERA with 40 strikeouts.

"Luke proved to be a very good starting pitcher for us last season," Dahm said. "We expect him to make even more progress this season, as his back should be fully healthy for the first time."

Also returning is senior southpaw Jeff Maitland, who re-joined the rotation at midseason last year after missing a year and a half due to injury. He posted a 2-1 record and a 4.15 ERA in seven starts last season, and started the first game of the Big Ten Tournament for the Hawkeyes.

"Maitland just keeps getting stronger and stronger coming back off his injury," Dahm said. "He had an outstanding fall and will give us a solid starter from the left side. The success he had last year has motivated him that much more for the upcoming season."

Senior Austin Seward returns after serving as a starter for the last two years. Last season, he was 3-2 with a 5.46 ERA and was one of the most consistent starters for Iowa at the end of the year. Over the summer, Seward was an all-star selection in the Northwoods League.

"Austin has matured into a very solid weekend starter for us," Dahm said. "He gained a lot of confidence at the end of last year and

over the summer, and we expect a solid season from Austin." Also competing for starts are sophomore David Conroy, redshirt freshman Danny Bales and transfer Chase Stephens. The coaching staff has been impressed with Stephens during the preseason, and feel comfortable that he will throw a lot for the Hawkeyes this spring.

Conroy made six starts last season and picked up his first collegiate win over Big Ten Champion Illinois.

"We are very excited about the progress David Conroy has made over the past season," Dahm said. "We feel he could be a very solid weekend starter in the Big Ten."

Bales is coming off surgery that caused him to miss all of last season, but was one of Iowa's top recruits when he joined the program.

"Bales has a very bright future," Dahm said. "He's getting close to full strength, but we are going to bring him along slowly. We look forward to getting him back around midseason."

A pair of freshmen will also look to burst into the starting rotation.

Wes Freie is a talented two-way player who was named Iowa's Class 2A Pitcher of the Year and Player of the Year as a prep senior. His career record on the hill was 39-3 and he recorded 417 strikeouts. Freie has a very good arm and could either start or come out of the bullpen for the Hawkeyes.

Steve Turnbull is a 6-5 righthander from White Bear Lake, MN, and has what Coach Dahm says is the best arm on the staff. He will most likely start mid-week games to gain experience.

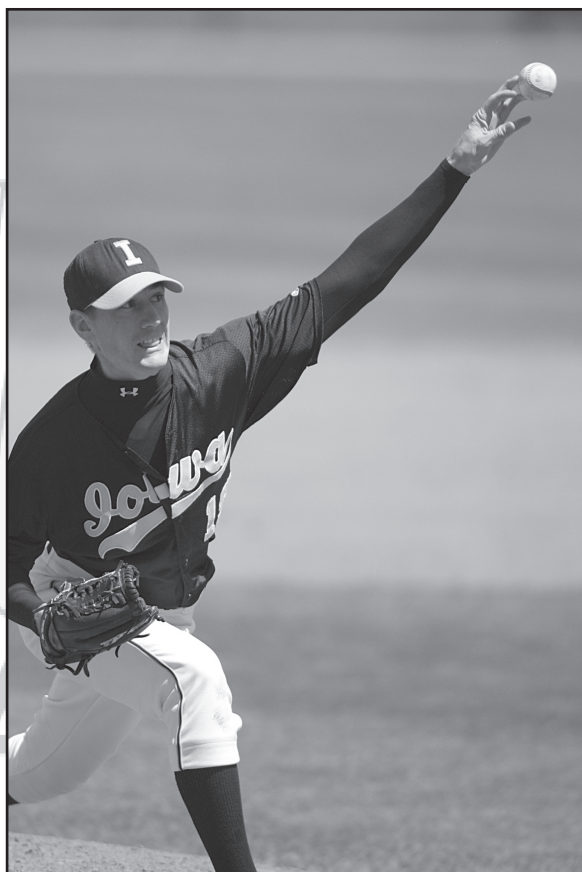
"We are looking forward to watching the development of Steve," Dahm

said. "He can be as good as he wants to be, and we are excited about his progress so far."

The Hawkeyes will be without the services of starter Casey O'Rourke, who was diagnosed with testicular cancer during the off-season. He will sit out the season while receiving treatment, then return to the team next year.

BULLPEN

Anchoring the bullpen will be first team all-Big Ten closer Tim Gudex. The senior reliever is coming off an amazing season in which he posted a 9-4 record with a 2.55 ERA and six saves. Gudex became the first hurler to lead the Big Ten in wins and saves during conference play.

"It is nice to know who our closer is from the beginning of the season," Dahm said. "Gudex is one of the most competitive players I have ever been around and you always know he will leave everything on the mound when he goes out there."

Sophomore Travis Sweet will serve as the Hawkeyes' setup man this year after a successful freshman campaign. He enjoyed a very successful offseason and will be able to help the staff with his versatility.

In middle relief, the Hawkeyes will look to seniors Aaron Reasland and Kevin Sunderman, juniors Scott Brune and southpaw Chris Zinn, sophomore Sean Radke, redshirt freshman Josh Wheatly, and true freshmen Jordan Auerbach, Nick Erdman and Justin Toole.

"Reasland, Brune, Sunderman and Zinn have gained valuable experience over the past couple of seasons and will have a very important role on our staff," Dahm said.

CATCHER

The departure of senior Kris Welker to the professional ranks leaves a huge hole behind the plate, which the coaching staff hopes to fill with the combination of sophomores Ben Geelan and Dusty Napoleon.

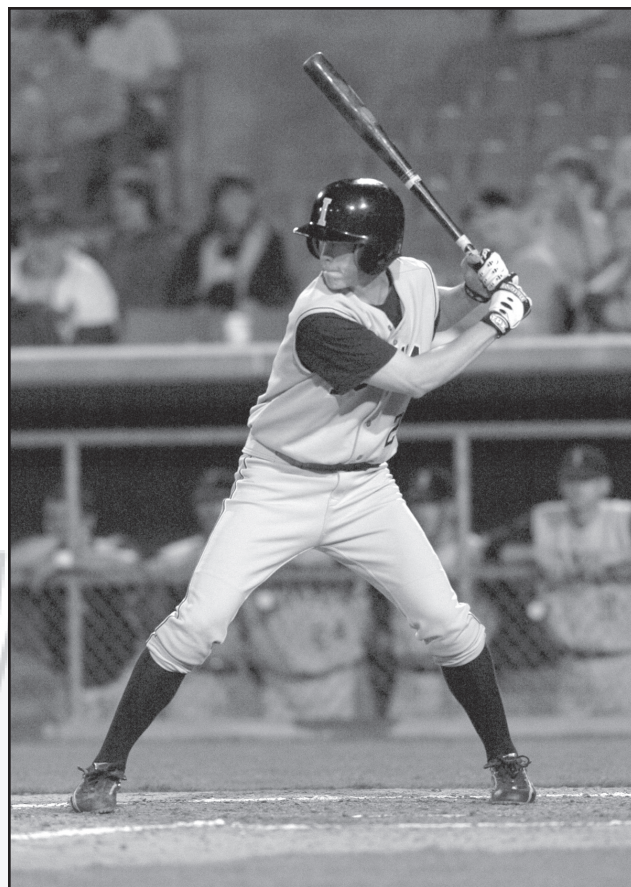
Both backstops have shown strong promise early in their careers, and both should see plenty of action.

"We are in as good of a position to replace a player the caliber of Kris Welker as you can be," Dahm said. "Both Ben and Dusty have shown they are ready to be a quality catcher in the Big Ten. Neither has jumped up and grabbed the job, but I don't think we lose anything with either of them behind the plate."

Kody McManis, Brian Burmester, Tom Moreland and Chase Metzger will provide depth behind the plate.

INFIELD

The Hawkeye infield faces some turnover from last season, losing the entire left side to graduation in Andy Lytle, Andy Cox and Luis Andrulonis.

Looking to replace Cox and Andrulonis at third base will be Travis Sweet, redshirt freshman Kody McManis and Wes Freie.

Sweet, who will also see action out of the bullpen, is a tough-minded throwback player who can also play second base. He hit .413 with 10 RBIs in 21 games as a freshman.

McManis had a chance to seize the third base job last season before a season-ending injury ended his campaign. He is coming off a solid fall and should provide the Hawkeyes with a steady presence at the hot corner.

Freie is a prototypical third baseman with the potential to be a big bat in the middle of the Hawkeye order.

Second baseman Jason White will slide over to shortstop this season after earning all-Big Ten honors last season. White led the team with a .383 average in Big Ten play and hit .317 overall. He had a team-best four triples and knocked in 26 RBIs.

"We feel very comfortable that Jason will develop into a very good shortstop for us," Dahm said. "He has gained valuable experience over the past two years at second base and we believe it

should be smooth transition for him.”

Looking to replace White at second will be Sweet and freshman Justin Toole.

“Toole is a gritty player that always plays hard,” Dahm said. “He has a high baseball IQ and great instincts.”

Freshman Kevin Hoef will also be in the mix at second, shortstop and third base.

“Kevin is a very gifted athlete who has all the tools to develop into a special player,” Dahm said. “He will get playing time in the infield early in the season and we are looking forward to his development.”

Sophomores Neal Coleman and T.J. Cataldo will be valuable utility players for Iowa, with the ability to play third, second and shortstop. Freshmen Ryan Gryzwa and Nick Muhlenbruch will also provide depth to the infield.

At first base, sophomore Dusty Napoleon returns after a very successful rookie year in which he hit .352 in conference play. He will also see time behind the plate this season.

“Dusty turned into a very good firstbaseman last year after having never played the position,” Dahm said.

Skyler Moss, who saw action at first, designated hitter and the outfield last year, will most likely play firstbase when Napoleon is behind the plate. Brian Burmester, Wes Freie and Cataldo could also be in the mix.

OUTFIELD

The anchor of the Hawkeye outfield will be all-Big Ten centerfielder Nate Price. The senior hit .320 last year (.351 in Big Ten play) with seven doubles, two home runs and 28 RBIs. He was also 15-of-17 in stolen bases and served as Iowa’s leadoff hitter.

“Nate Price just keeps getting better and better,” Dahm said. “Once Nate got comfortable in our system last year, we felt that he was one of the best players in the Big Ten. He continued to work hard over the summer and won the silver glove award as the top defensive outfielder in the Northwoods League.”

Senior L.J. Mims returns to patrol leftfield after a broken arm forced him out of action for most of last season. Also fighting for playing time in left is the speedy Ryan Considine and Matt Wooldrik. Both Mims and Considine can also play center.

In right, Jeff Engel has stepped up big during the fall season and looks to be a major contributor to the Hawkeye lineup. Engel was the highlight of the fall season and should be a powerful bat in the middle of the order.

Also fighting for playing time in the outfield will be Brett Lockas and Kyle Riffle, who comes to the program after playing two years with the Iowa Football team.

“I am excited about the options we have in the outfield,” Dahm said. “We should be a very good defensive ballclub with plenty of options versus lefthanded or righthanded pitching.”

The Hawkeyes will probably be without the services of outfielder Mike Mogard, who may miss the entire 2006 season with an injury.

SCHEDULE

The Hawkeyes will play a very challenging schedule this season, facing seven teams that made the NCAA Tournament last year. Iowa will play in four preseason tournaments – the Austin Peay Tournament (Clarksville, TN), the Louisiana Cajun Classic (Lafayette, LA), the Texas-San Antonio Tournament (San Antonio, TX) and the Notre Dame Tournament (San Antonio, TX).

Iowa’s home schedule is one of the best in school history, highlighted by College World Series participant Nebraska visiting Duane Banks Field. The Hawkeyes will also play at home against the top three teams in the Big Ten preseason rankings – Ohio State, Purdue and Minnesota. Other non-conference home games include IPFW, Illinois State, North Dakota State and Western Illinois.

There are a pair of special events on the Hawkeye schedule this season, led by an exhibition with the AAA Iowa Cubs on Tuesday, April 2 at Principal Park in Des Moines. Iowa will also battle Northern Iowa in the third annual Corridor Classic at Veterans Stadium in Cedar Rapids on April 26.

When he took over the Iowa baseball team in July of 2003, Jack Dahm brought excitement and optimism in his first year at the helm. In his second season, he brought success that Iowa baseball had not seen in 15 years. Now, at the beginning of his third season, Dahm is looking to take the next step with his Iowa team.

In just his second season, Coach Dahm led the Hawkeyes to their best season since 1990. Iowa posted a 28-29 mark and a 19-13 record in the Big Ten Conference – the second most conference wins in the history of the program. Dahm's squad finished the year third in the conference (just one game out of first place), and advanced to the Big Ten Tournament for just the second time in 15 years.

The Hawkeyes won five four-game series during Big Ten play, including road series at Big Ten Champion Illinois and Michigan, along with homestands against Minnesota, Penn State and Indiana.

The team's success was a reflection of the individual awards the Hawkeye earned, as Iowa had five players named to the all-Big Ten team. Closer Tim Gudex was named to the first team, centerfielder Nate Price was on the second team, while catcher Kris Welker, second baseman Jason White and shortstop Andy Lytle were all third team honorees.

Gudex was also a second team all-mideast region pick by American Baseball Coaches Association.

In Dahm's 12 years as a head coach, he has had 20 first team all-conference performers, seven freshman All-Americans and two All-Americans.. In his two years at Iowa, Dahm has coached two first team all-Big Ten selections. Iowa had only four in the previous 14 years before his arrival in Iowa City.



Four of Dahm's players signed professional contracts after the season. Lytle (25th round – Cleveland Indians) and Welker (41st round – Chicago White Sox) were both selected in the MLB Draft, while Nate Yoho (Milwaukee Brewers) and Jesse Brownell (Colorado Rockies) signed free agent contracts.

Twenty-four of Dahm's players have been selected in the MLB Draft in his career, while four have gone on to play in the Major Leagues.

In the classroom, Dahm's teams have had success as well. In each of his two seasons at Iowa, the head coach has seen eight of his players named to the Academic All-Big Ten team. That is the second-best two-year total in the history of the program.

In his first year, the Hawkeyes went 20-35 with a very challenging schedule, and finished eighth in the Big Ten with a 12-20 record.

Dahm helped guide both Nathan Johnson and Yoho to All-Big Ten honors. Johnson was named to the first team, while Yoho earned his way onto the second team.

On the recruiting front, Dahm and his staff gained praise nationally for their first class after it was ranked in the top-50 by Jerry Ford, the National Director of Perfect Game U.S.A., and No. 44 by Collegiate Baseball, who also named it the top class in the Big Ten. Dahm and the Hawkeyes made their mark on the in-state recruiting trail when they inked six of the top eight high school prospects in the state of Iowa, which included the top four pitching prospects.

In year two, another highly respected class was penned by Dahm and his assistants Ryan Brownlee and Nick Zumsande. Collegiate Baseball listed it as an honorable mention class in its rankings.

Since his arrival in 2003, Coach Dahm has not only been building the foundation on the field, but off it as well.

“In order to build a consistent program we must have a solid foundation and that starts with quality student-athletes who are willing to make personal sacrifices on and off the field,” said Dahm. “We must also develop a level of trust and belief in each other and in the program. If we can build that solid foundation the success on the field will start to take care of itself.”

Players have been busy giving back to the community by helping raise money for breast cancer and helping the Iowa Children's Museum at the Crystal Ball dinner for the third time this year. The Hawkeyes are also involved with the UI's Dance Marathon and visit patients at the University of Iowa Children's Hospital.

Dahm was also instrumental in starting the annual Corridor Classic with intrastate rival Northern Iowa. The Corridor Classic, which is held at Veterans Memorial Stadium in Cedar Rapids, has helped raise over \$170,000 for the American Diabetes Association in its two years. It is one of the biggest ADA fundraisers in Iowa history.

Other new and exciting events have been added to the schedule. For the second time in three years, the Hawkeyes will battle the Triple A Iowa Cubs at Principal Park in Des Moines. In 2005, Iowa played on national television for the first time when they battled Nebraska.

Dahm also started the annual Lead-Off Dinner, which serves to kick-off the season and get fans excited about Iowa baseball. Legendary manager Tommy Lasorda spoke at this year's dinner. The Lead-Off Dinner has also featured Cubs General Manager Jim Hendry, along with Iowa Cubs owner and Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Michael Gartner.

Before coming to Iowa City, Dahm spent 18 years as a member of the Creighton Bluejays baseball program. He left the Bluejays as the winningest coach in school history, having compiled 283 wins against 276 losses in 10 seasons as a head coach.

Dahm arrived at Creighton in 1986 to play under Hendry and spent four years as a student-athlete from 1986-89. In 1990, Dahm accepted a position as a graduate assistant coach for Hendry and spent four years helping build Creighton into a Missouri Valley Conference power.

In 1991, Dahm was promoted to a full-time assistant as he helped the Bluejays reach the College World Series. That Creighton squad ended the season as the second-highest hitting club in the nation, batting .355 as a team. The team's 60 triples in 1991 led the nation and remain a school record.

In October of 1993, Dahm was hired as Creighton's head coach, becoming the youngest head coach in Division I at the age of 25. For the next ten years, five of Dahm's ten teams would finish in the top three of the Missouri Valley Conference.

In 1999, Dahm earned his first of two Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year honors as the Bluejays advanced to the NCAA tournament for the first time in the Dahm era. Creighton posted 38 wins that season, the most since Dahm's first year in 1994, before being eliminated from the South Bend Regional.

In 2000, Dahm guided the Bluejays to their second consecutive NCAA Regional appearance at the Arizona State regional in Tempe, AZ, after finishing the season with a 38-23 record. During the season, Dahm led Creighton into the national spotlight as they peaked at No. 15 in the Collegiate Baseball poll and were ranked in the top 25 of the Baseball Weekly/ESPN Coaches' Poll and Baseball America.

Dahm earned his second coach of the year honor in 2002 when the Bluejays finished the season 30-24 against one of the nation's toughest schedules. Victories over nationally ranked Nebraska, Notre Dame and Wichita State were overshadowed by the team's best-ever season in the Missouri Valley Conference. Despite having a lineup top-heavy with underclassmen, Creighton finished second in MVC play with a 21-10 record.

A native of Morton Grove, IL, Dahm entered Creighton as a highly recruited infielder in 1985. As a player, Dahm shared the dugout with former Major Leaguers Mike Heathcott, Dax Jones, Scott Servais, Dan Smith and Scott Stahoviak.

Besides being a student of the game on the field, Dahm was active in community service, fundraising and his teams have strived academically as well.

The Bluejays were actively involved in the community under Dahm, as they held various free baseball clinics, raised money for the Nebraska Children's Home and were a part of "Operation Bluejay," a program that provided tutoring for young people in Omaha.

Dahm also played a large role in the planning, designing and fund raising for the \$3.5 million Creighton Sports Complex. The Kitty Gaughan Pavilion baseball facility is one of the finest indoor baseball complexes in the country. It featured a state of the art hitting facility, locker rooms, Legends View Club and coaches' offices.

Dahm's teams at Creighton not only had success on the field, but in the classroom as well. During his tenure, Dahm's players were named to 32 spots on the Missouri Valley Conference Scholar-Athlete teams, 10 Verizon Academic all-District honors and three Verizon Academic all-Americans. His teams also consistently finished with G.P.A.'s around 3.0.

Dahm has also been active in the advancement of college baseball by being a member of the many national committees. He was a ten-year member on the College World Series Board of Directors and served on the American Baseball Coaches Association Change of Season Committee. He was also a part of the NCAA Division I Regional Advisory Committee and was an onsite director of the NCAA Yes Baseball Clinic for 11 years.

The 39-year old Dahm and his wife, Lynn, have been married for 12 years. The couple has three children - sons Casey and Tyler and daughter Lyndsey.

Nick Zumsande enters his third season as Iowa's pitching coach.

Last year, Zumsande guided closer Tim Gudex to a record-breaking season in which he was named first team all-Big Ten. Gudex is the second hurler to earn all-Big Ten honors in Zumsande's two years at Iowa, with Nate Johnson earning first team laurels in 2004. Johnson was eventually drafted by the Philadelphia Phillies.

"Coach Zumsande has done a great job with our pitching staff the past two years," Head Coach Jack Dahm said. "He has been instrumental in the development of all-Big Ten performers Nate Johnson, Tim Gudex and the rest of the staff. I am very confident you will see our pitching staff develop into one of the best in the Big Ten and the country in the near future under Nick's direction."

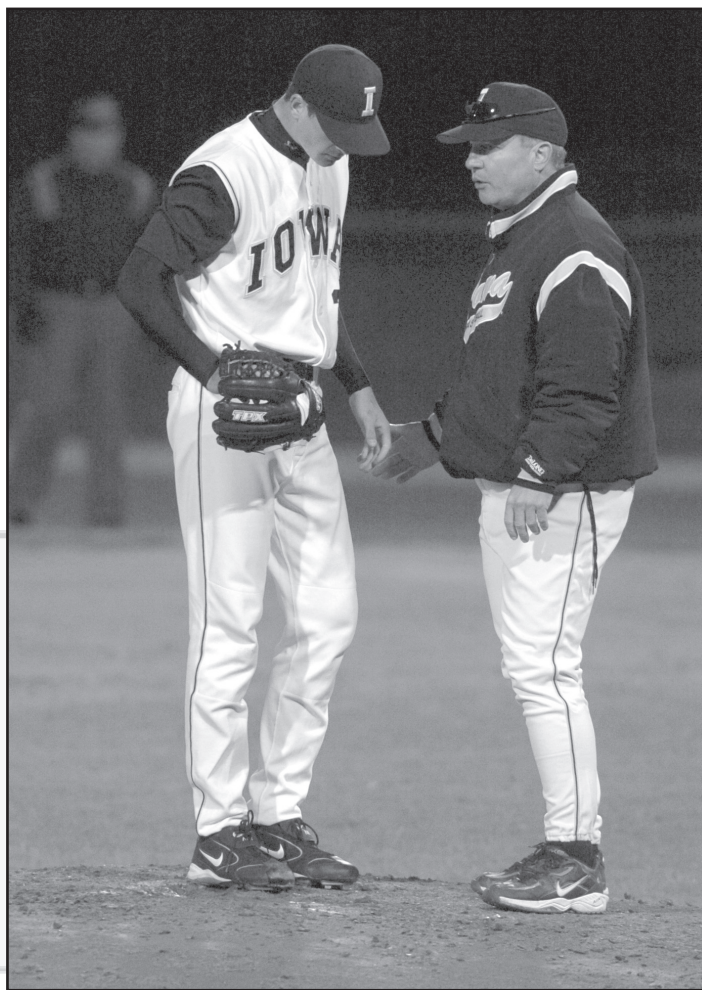
Zumsande also helped the Iowa pitching staff shave .70 off its ERA from the year before (5.71 to 5.01). Iowa also cut its batting average against (.315 to .284), along with hits (577-513), doubles (104-87) and home runs allowed (36 to 29) – while throwing more innings.

Zumsande was also a big factor in helping Iowa land the top-ranked recruiting class in the Big Ten during the coaching staff's first year of recruiting.

Prior to being named Iowa's pitching coach in August of 2003, Zumsande served as a pitching instructor at Indiana State University. Zumsande joined the Sycamores in 2001 as the pitching instructor and recruiting coordinator. In his second and final season with the Sycamores in 2003, Zumsande guided the Indiana State hurlers to a 36-21 record and a 4.15 earned run average, the second lowest team ERA in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Before arriving at Terre Haute, IN, Zumsande served one year as the pitching coach at Iowa State University. In his lone year at Iowa State, the Cyclones team earned run average lowered nearly two runs and led the team to its first Big 12 Tournament appearance in school history. Zumsande's staff finished the conference season with a 4.38 ERA, which was tied for fourth with Nebraska in the conference.

Zumsande held the head coach's position at Muscatine Community College before accepting the assistant position at his alma mater, Iowa State. Zumsande headed the Muscatine program from 1988-2000, recording 431 career victories against 195 losses, a .688 winning percentage. The Indians finished in the national polls six times in the 1990's under Zumsande's



guidance. During that period, Zumsande earned NJCAA Region IX Coach of the Year honors in 1990, 1994 and 1999.

Over 50 of Zumsande's former MCC player were sent on to major four-year colleges and 30 former players signed professional baseball contracts.

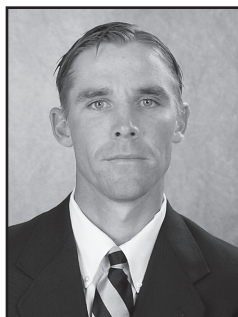
A member of the American Baseball Coaches Association and Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association, Zumsande has twice guided his team to the NCJAA Division I World Series (1994 & 1999). In 1994, the Muscatine baseball program was awarded the Homa Thomas Team Sportsmanship Award by designated members of the media.

In the professional ranks, Zumsande spent the 1993 season working for Major League Baseball International in Northern Europe. While in Europe, he served as an ambassador as he promoted and instructed baseball for MLB.

Zumsande graduated from Iowa State in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He earned his master's degree in Athletic Administration from Northwest Missouri State in 1986.

Ryan Brownlee enters his third season as the Iowa hitting, infield instructor and recruiting coordinator.

"We are very fortunate to have Ryan on the coaching staff here at Iowa," Head Coach Jack Dahm said. "He has made a tremendous impact on our program with his recruiting efforts and his development of our players. Ryan grew up around the game of baseball and he understands the commitment and work ethic it takes to build a championship program."

Last season, Brownlee helped the Hawkeyes to their most successful season in 15 years. Iowa went 28-29 with a 19-13 conference record. The team took third place in the Big Ten and advanced to their second conference tournament since 1990.

As hitting coach, Brownlee saw the team's batting average jump 30 points from 2004 to 2005 (.269 to .299). The team also scored more runs (273 to 352) had more RBIs (249 to 307) and walks (152 to 194). Under his guidance, the Hawkeyes broke the single-season record for putouts (1,394), sacrifice hits (54), hit by pitch (71) and singles (425).

Brownlee helped a pair of infielders to the all-Big Ten squad in 2005, with short-stop Andy Lytle and secondbaseman Jason White earning third team honors.

Over the last six seasons of coaching, Brownlee has had 11 players he coached or recruited drafted. Two more signed free agent contracts. In five years of coaching summer collegiate leagues, he has seen 30 of his players sign pro contracts including Khalil Green of the Padres and Luke Scott of the Astros.



Prior to joining the Iowa staff, Brownlee served as the infield/baserunning coach and assisted with hitting and recruiting at James Madison University for four years. Brownlee did a variety of gameday assignments during his tenure at JMU, including coaching first base, bench coach, infield shifts, defensive plays and opponents' scouting reports. In back-to-back years (2001-02), Brownlee guided the Dukes to school record .967 and .968 fielding percentages. Also in 2002, the Dukes broke the school record for wins in a season with 43 and advanced to the NCAA Southeast Regional at Columbia, SC, after winning the Colonial Athletic Association crown.

Before joining the James Madison coaching staff, Brownlee served as an assistant coach under his father, James, at Evansville for two seasons. While at Evansville, Brownlee was responsible for outfield, catching and hitting instruction. Brownlee advanced to the Purple Aces' coaching ranks after excelling as a player for four seasons. A four-year starter at second base, Brownlee earned all-MCC honors in 1994 and all-MVC accolades in 1996. He was also selected to the American Baseball Coaches Association all-Region squad. In 1997, Brownlee was tabbed a TPX preseason third-team all-American and he received the University of Evansville's William V. Slyker award for the most outstanding male athlete at the university.

Brownlee, a native of Evansville, graduated with a bachelor's degree in psychology with a minor in biology in 1997. He received his Master's in athletic administration in 2002 from James Madison. He and his wife, Aimee, have two children – Jackson (3) and Norah (6 months).

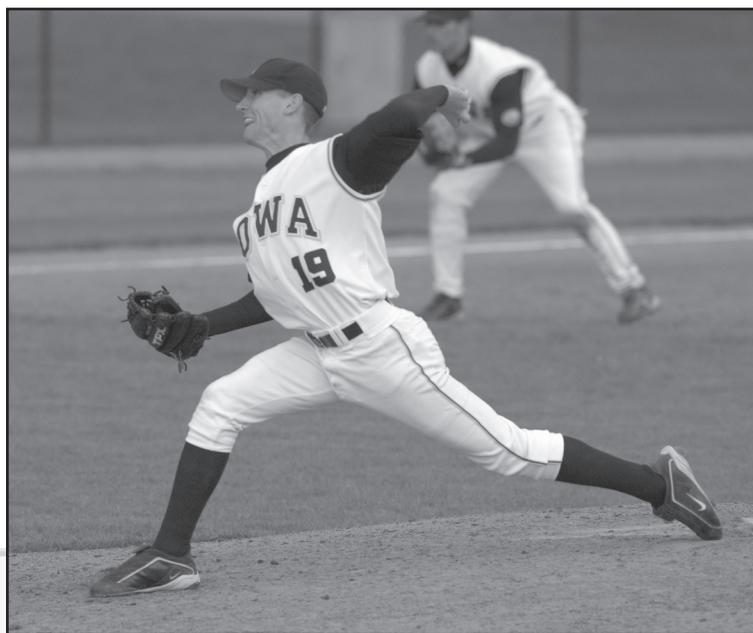
Hawkeye Walk-Ons

In his career, Coach Dahm has had eight players begin as walk-ons and end up playing professional baseball.

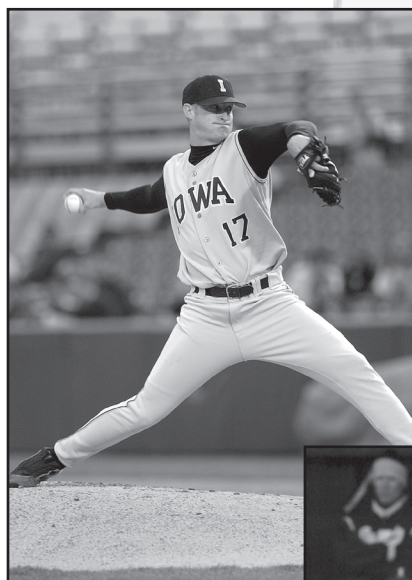

Three members of the current team, **Austin Seward**, **Skyler Moss** and Gudex began as walk-ons, became strong contributors and have now been put on scholarship.

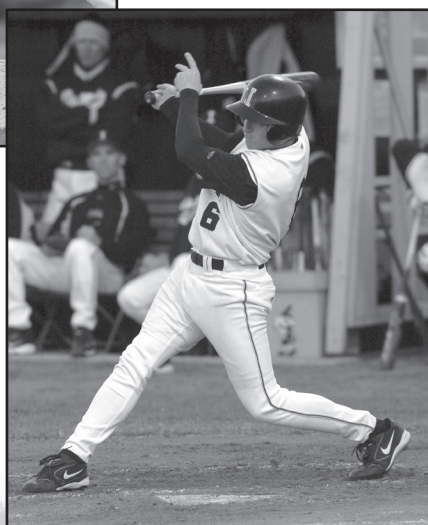

Hawkeyes in the Pros

The Iowa baseball program has a long history of former athletes competing on the professional level. Over 100 Iowa players have been sent into the pro ranks. Recently, under Head Coach Jack Dahm, the Hawkeye baseball program has reached new heights by combining talented student-athletes with first class facilities and superior coaching.

Last year, two Hawkeyes were selected in the 2005 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Andy Lytle was taken by the Cleveland Indians, while Kris Welker was selected by the Chicago White Sox. Another pair of Hawkeyes signed free agent contracts, with Nate Yoho joining the Milwaukee Brewers organization and Jesse Brownell getting inked by the Colorado Rockies.

In 2004, first team all-Big Ten pitcher Nate Johnson was selected by the Philadelphia Phillies in the MLB Draft.

Two Hawkeyes prolonged their 2003 baseball seasons at the professional level. Junior Kyle Thousand surrendered his final year of eligibility to pursue a professional career with the Toronto Bluejays. The two-time all-Big Ten centerfielder was selected in the 26th round of Major League Baseball's amateur draft. Former Hawkeye MVP and right-handed pitcher Reed Pawelk signed a free-agent contract with the Florida Marlins following Iowa's 2003 season.

Four Hawkeyes were drafted by the major leagues after the 1999 season. Pitcher, Wes Obermueller was drafted in the second round by the Kansas City Royals, second baseman Brian Mitchell went in the 40th round to the Toronto Blue Jays and pitcher, Matt Sawvell signed a pro contract with the New York Mets.

Obermueller started the 2002 season as a member of the Wichita Wranglers, a Double-A affiliate of the Kansas City Royals, before being promoted to the parent club and making his Major League debut September 20th, against the Cleveland Indians. In 2003, Obermueller was traded to the Milwaukee Brewers, where he won two games and struck out 34 hitters in 65.2 innings. He went 6-8 with a 5.80 ERA in 118 innings pitched in 2004 and 1-4 with a 5.26 ERA in 2005 before being traded to the Atlanta Braves last December.

Signed by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, hurler Jim Magrane, set Iowa's single season records for innings pitched (107.2) and strikeouts (110) during the 1999 season and is currently a member of the Durham Bulls, a Triple-A affiliate of the Devil Rays.

In 1998, Iowa infielder, Nate Frese, was drafted in the 10th round by the Chicago Cubs. He currently serves as shortstop for the Iowa Cubs, a Triple-A affiliate of the Cubs.

In 1993 outfielder Bo Porter was drafted by the Chicago Cubs. During the 1999 season, Porter was brought up from the minors by the Cubs. Porter saw action in 24 games, while starting five in the outfield. Porter was the opening day centerfielder for the Texas Rangers during the 2001 season.

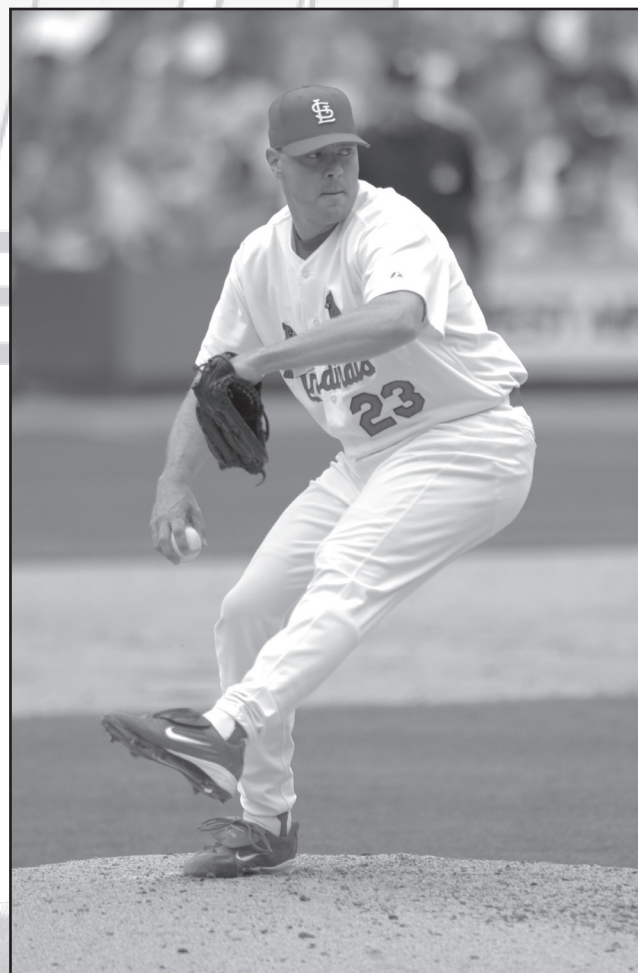
Outfielder, Chris Hatcher was drafted following the 1990 season. He has been a member of many minor league organizations, compiling a .275 batting

average in 953 games. During the 1998 season, Hatcher was a member of the Kansas City Royals, where he saw action in eight games.

Tim Costo was a first-round draft pick of the Cleveland Indians in 1990 before being traded to Cincinnati. He spent the 1995 season at the Indians AAA class Buffalo team, playing in 105 games. He was also a member of the St. Louis and Toronto organizations.

Cal Eldred was a first-round draft pick by Milwaukee in 1989 and remained there until he was traded to the White Sox in 2000. In 1994, he had the honor of being the opening day pitcher, and led the American League in starts (25). Eldred made a name for himself in 1992 by going 11-2 for Milwaukee, winning 10 straight decisions. In 1993 he led the American League in innings pitched (258). After a two-year stint on the Chicago south side, Eldred signed a free-agent contact with the St. Louis Cardinals in 2003. In 2004, he was a key part of the Cardinal team that advanced to the World Series.

Mike Boddicker, a native of Norway, Iowa earned all-Big Ten honors as a pitcher and infielder during his campaign as a Hawkeye (1976-78). In 1983, he was named the American League "Rookie of the Year." After pitching in the major leagues for 11 years, Boddicker retired in 1993. He played for the Baltimore Orioles and Kansas City Royals.

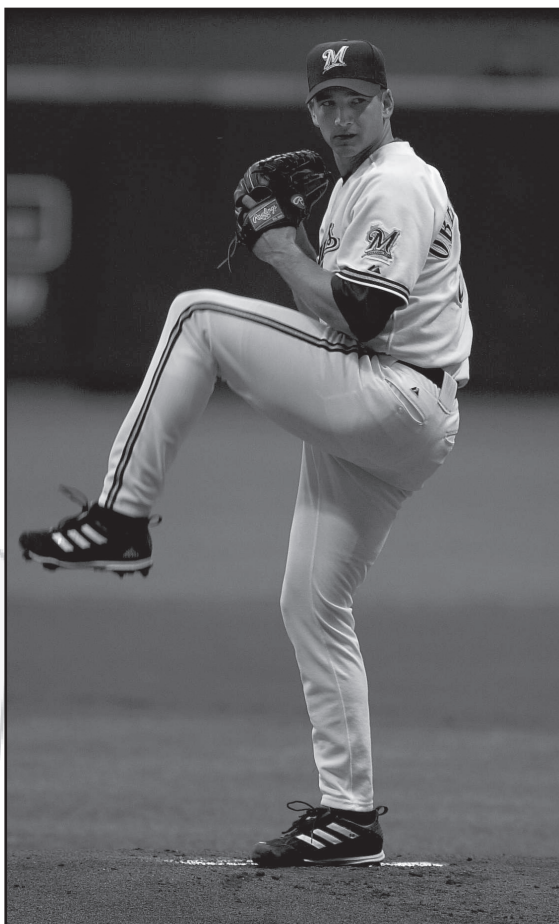

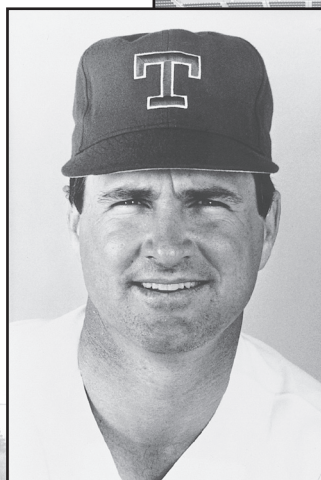

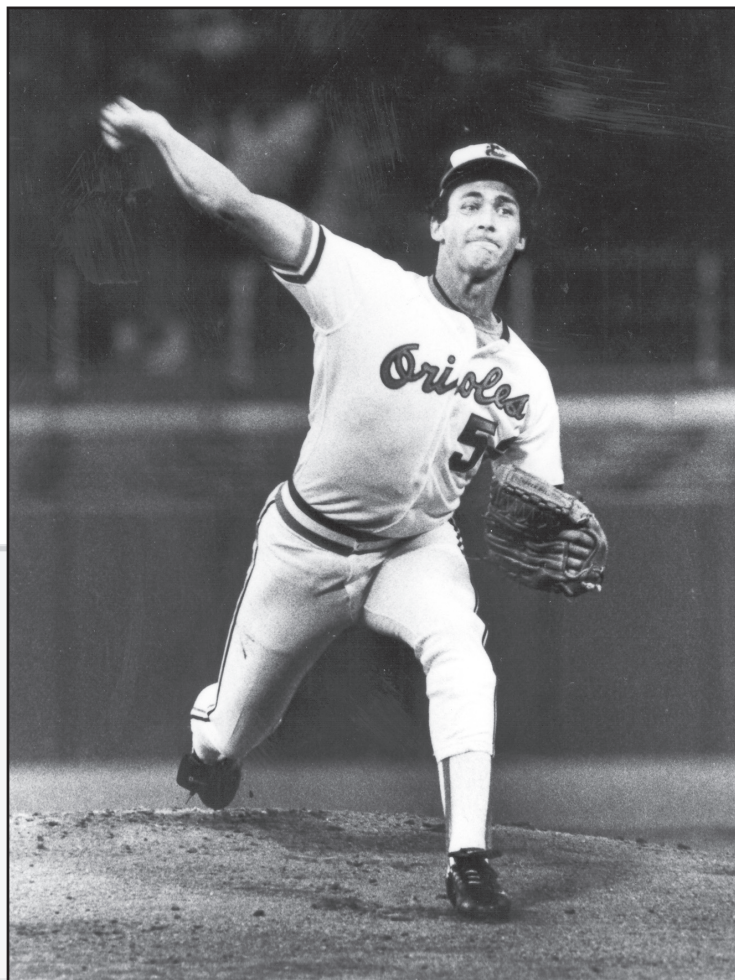
Baseball Scholarship

Mike Boddicker Scholarship

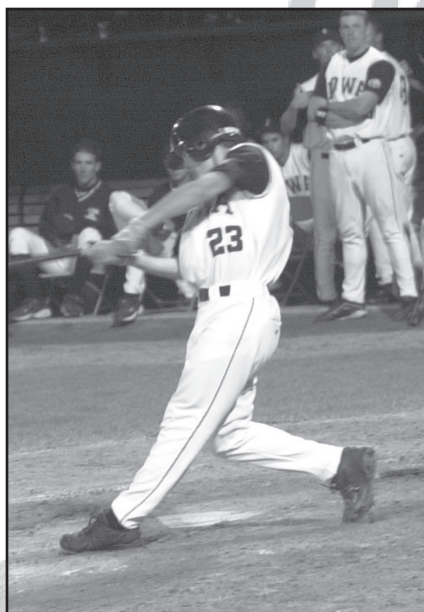
Former Iowa standout Mike Boddicker, and his family, have established the Mike Boddicker Scholarship. The scholarship goes each year to a member of the Iowa baseball team who is in good academic standing and displays outstanding character and personality.

Boddicker, a native of Norway, Iowa earned all-Big Ten honors as a pitcher and infielder during his campaign as a Hawkeye (1976-78). In 1983, he was named the American League "Rookie of the Year." After pitching in the major leagues for 11 years, Boddicker retired in 1993. He played for the Baltimore Orioles and Kansas City Royals.

The Mike Boddicker Scholarship was established in 1993. Pitcher Colin Mattiace was the first recipient and held the scholarship all four years of his Hawkeye career. Infielder Nate Frese received the scholarship in 1997 and 1998, Iowa City native Brian Mitchell won the scholarship in 1999, and the 2000 and 2001 scholarships were awarded to outfielder Andy Jansen, a Bancroft, Iowa native. Four-year starter Ian Mattiace received the scholarship in 2002 and former *Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American* Reed Pawelk has benefited from the scholarship in 2003 and 2004. Kris Welker was the 2005 recipient.

Donald W. and Marilyn Heineking Baseball Scholarship

Don Heineking established the Donald W. and Marilyn Heineking Baseball Scholarship in 2004, with the first recipient to be named for the 2005-06 season. Don is a long-time supporter of Iowa athletics, a member of the Johnson County I-Club Board of Directors and member of the Iowa Scholarship Fund Board of Directors. In 2002, Don and Marilyn established scholarships in football and women's basketball. Then, in 2003, they added a wrestling scholarship and men's basketball manager's scholarship. Most recently, they added baseball, softball and volleyball scholarships.

Don lives in Iowa City and is a member of the President's Club of the UI Foundation. Marilyn passed away in February of 2004.

Cal Eldred Lights Fund

Cal Eldred has lit up Hawkeye baseball once again. But this time, instead of employing his expert pitching, the major-league star and his wife, Christi, made a gift to fund the installation of lights at Iowa's Duane Banks Field. The Cedar Rapids couple gave \$245,000 for the installation of lights at the baseball field named after Cal Eldred's former coach.

The gift, the largest ever from a current professional athlete's family to Iowa athletics, allowed the project to be completed in September 2001. The Hawkeyes won the first night game played at Banks Field April 10, 2002, against Northern Illinois, 11-9. The University of Iowa officially dedicated the lights Saturday, April 13, 2002.

Iowa Athletic Director Bob Bowsby hailed the Eldreds' generosity, saying, "Cal and Christi's gift shows that once a Hawkeye, always a Hawkeye. Cal has been representing Iowa well for years, first with the Milwaukee Brewers, then with the Chicago White Sox and now with the St. Louis Cardinals, all the while making us all proud. But the fact that he and Christi have remained true to their Iowa roots in this very generous way makes us even prouder."

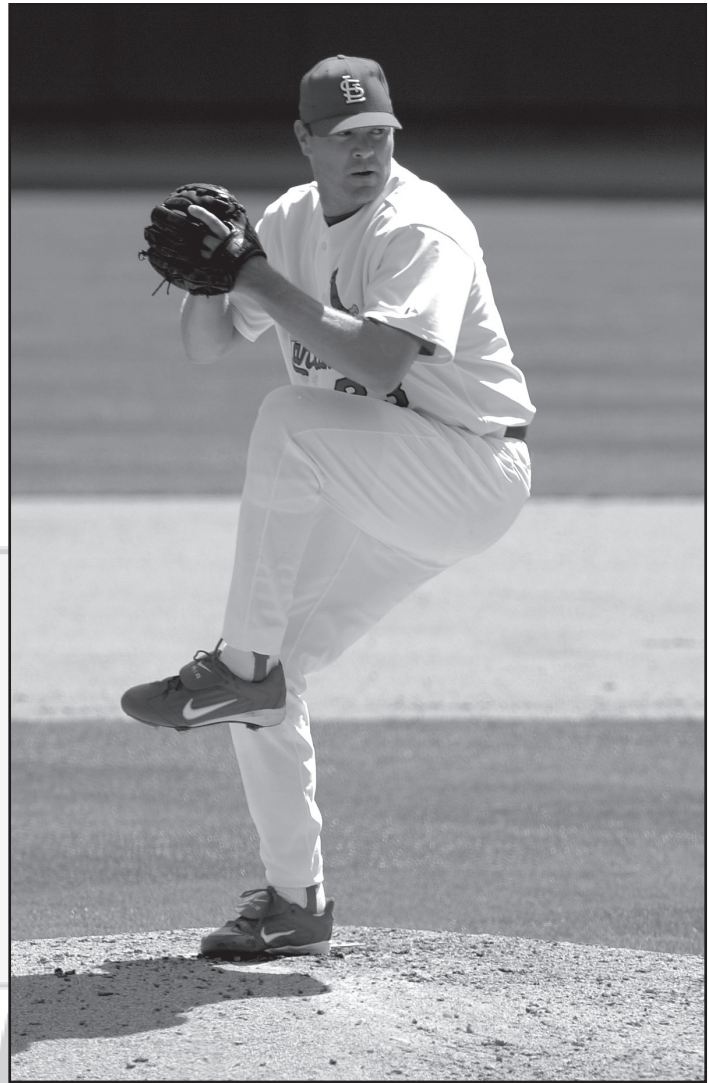

Former Iowa Baseball Coach Scott Broghamer noted that the Eldred's gift is another chapter in their long association with baseball in the state. "I coached Cal when he played for Urbana High School in the mid-1980's, and he and Christi have been Hawkeye supporters for years," Broghamer said. "This gift will make Iowa's field one of the finest anywhere. We're very excited and grateful."

The Eldred's cited their desire to give back to Iowa and to honor former Hawkeye coaches Banks and Broghamer—who they said are their good friends and longtime mentors—as reasons for making the gift. The gift was commemorated by a plaque at the field.

Cal Eldred, who grew up in Urbana and attended Iowa for three years before being drafted by the Milwaukee Brewers in 1989, said, "My experience at Iowa helped shape me as a player and as a person. And Coach Banks has stayed involved in my life and has always been there for me. I couldn't be happier about making this gift for Hawkeye baseball. I hope others will consider helping out however they can."

In the fall of 2001, the Iowa baseball field was re-named The Duane Banks Baseball Field in honor of the Hawkeyes' former head coach. Banks, the winningest coach in Iowa history, served as Iowa's head baseball coach from 1970-1997.

Banks Field was originally built in 1974. The 3,000-seat stadium has dimensions of 330 feet down the lines, 375 in the power alleys and 400 to centerfield. As a whole, the complex is one of the top facilities in the Big Ten and the Midwest.

During this last offseason, Banks Field underwent some renovations, getting new seating in the grandstands. The new grandstand seating may look familiar to Hawkeye fans, as it came from the North endzone of Kinnick Stadium.

In 2002, former Hawkeye and current Major Leaguer Cal Eldred donated \$245,000 to fund the installation of lights at Banks Field. It is the largest donation by a current professional athlete to Iowa Athletics.

The infield was re-designed following the 1999 season with a new playing surface and ten-foot fences were added to the outfield. The field's drainage system was also improved. Both bullpens were restructured and the hitter's background was replaced. Located next to the Hawkeye bullpen are two Astro Turf batting cages.

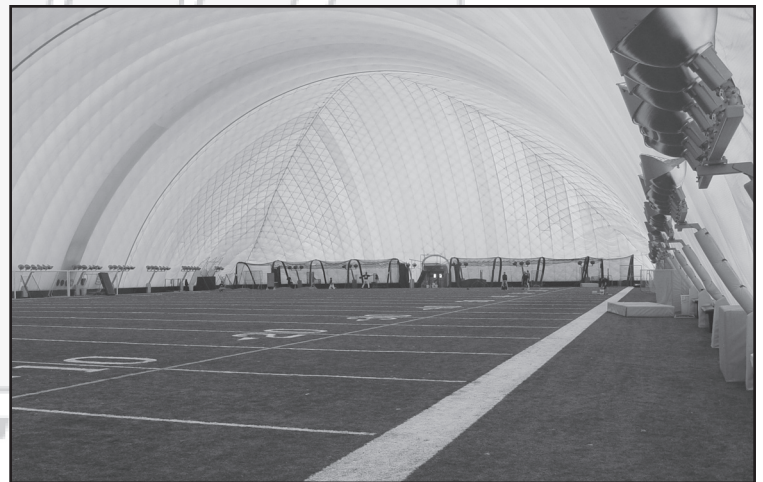

The complex features locker rooms for both teams and umpires. In 1998, Iowa's clubhouse was expanded, giving the Hawkeyes one of the best college baseball environments in the nation.

Prior to the 1996 season a Daktronics state-of-the-art scoreboard system was installed. In addition to providing spectators with pertinent game information, the system also has a marquee that is capable of displaying player information.

A new press box was built in 1989 and renovated in 2002. It can accommodate several radio stations and up to 25 media members.

During inclement weather, the Hawkeyes can move to the Bubble, Iowa's indoor facility located right next to Banks Field. The Bubble is a 120-yard expanse of state-of-the-art "Prestige XT" artificial surface that includes four full-size batting cages and five raised pitching mounds. The bubble gives the Hawkeyes a top-notch facility to train in year-round.

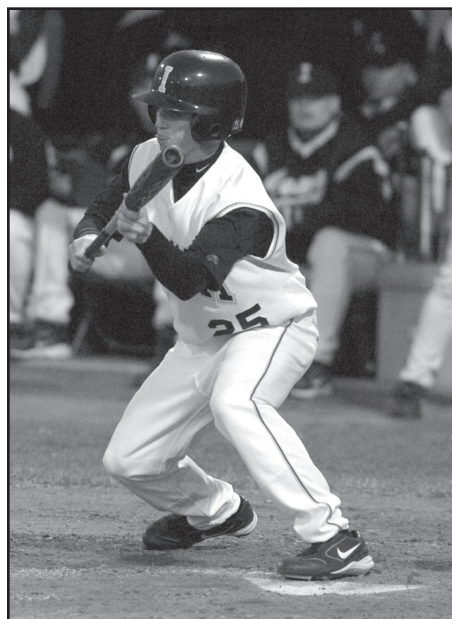
Dedicated in 1998, the Pavilion at Banks Field is in memory of Diane Mitchell, mother of Hawkeye athletes David, Mark and Brian Mitchell, and wife of former football player Bob Mitchell. Diane died in an automobile accident en route to the 1996 Alamo Bowl. During her life, Diane never missed an inning or a down of her son's games and was always their biggest supporter. Her dedication to the Hawkeyes was surpassed only by her love for her family.

Academic Student Services

Since its inception in 1979, Athletics Student Services has evolved from a two-person, academic support service to a broad-based, nationally prominent student support services operation. Its purpose is to assist student athletes to become tomorrow's leaders by offering academic and personal support services to assist them in making timely and satisfactory progress toward their degrees.

Athletic Student Services focuses on four important areas — academic counseling and monitoring, educational and support programs, retention programs and compliance services — when working with student-athletes. Following are descriptions of some of the programs, services and opportunities available to student-athletes in those areas.

Athletics Learning Center

The \$4.6 million Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletics Learning Center opened in August of 2003 and gives all Iowa student-athletes a state of the art facility to help them with their educations.

The Athletics Learning Center is a multi-level, 20,000 square foot facility which will provide a computer center, study areas, classes and meeting places for all Hawkeye student-athletes.

The Learning Center will feature an auditorium that converts into two classrooms, separate study rooms for under and upper-class student-athletes that feature 28 study carrels, a computer lab, five tutorial rooms, the book loan repository, office space for Iowa's Student Services staff and a display area to

recognize the academic accomplishments of Iowa's student-athletes.

Academic Counseling and Monitoring

Athletics coordinators work closely with student-athletes and their university-assigned advisors from the time they arrive on campus until the time they leave the University. Along with focusing on academic planning matters such as goal-setting, plans of study, choosing majors and degree requirements, athletics coordinators also help student-athletes

understand NCAA, Big Ten and University academic policies. They also solicit feedback from instructors on academic progress made by student-athletes.

Tutoring

Tutoring is available free of charge to all student-athletes. Tutors, who are post-graduates and teachers, help with course content as well as study strategies and are available in virtually all general education program subjects.

Academic Student Services

A full-time staff member directs the retention program, which identifies student-athletes who may need tailored academic assistance and structure, and implements individualized learning plans to help them succeed. Such plans may include daily and weekly planning sessions with athletics coordinators and retention staff, tutoring, study groups, mainstreaming into on-campus services like the writing center, math labs and services for students with learning disabilities.

Transition Seminar

All new student-athletes attend an eight-week transition seminar during the fall semester that is geared toward helping them make the transition from high school to college successfully. Seminar topics include time management skills, learning and study strategies, the culture and rules of the university, and life skills concerning alcohol and other substances, relationships and intimacy, diversity, tolerance, values and character.

CHAMPS/Life Skills

Life skills programs are conducted throughout the year with and for student athletes on quality of life issues critical to personal growth, such as personal accountability, responsible use and nonuse of alcohol, diversity and gambling.



Located near Hillcrest residence hall, the Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletics Learning Center is easily assessable to Hawkeye athletes.

Career Guidance and Development

Planning a meaningful career and a fulfilling life is an ongoing process of expanding and narrowing choices, beginning when student-athletes arrive on campus and continuing throughout their college career and lifetime. The professional staff works with other career development professionals on campus to offer individual consultation, career development seminars, workshops, referrals to other campus offices and special events like the Senior Recognition Banquet for graduating student-athletes.

Minority Enrichment Program

This program offers a culturally supportive environment in which minority student-athletes have the opportunity to develop friendships and a support network in the university. A core focus group of students and staff coordinate programs such as guest speakers, holiday celebrations, community service activities with the local neighborhood centers, events with Cultural Centers and networking with minority faculty, staff, professional and business leaders.

Iowa's student-athletes have outperformed the University's entire student population each year since the NCAA started requiring a report of student-athlete graduation rates.

The Corridor Classic

The game, played at Memorial Stadium – home of the Class A Cedar Rapids Kernels, will pit the two intrastate rivals against each other annually.

The game is a real event for eastern Iowa baseball fans, featuring spirit squads from both teams, variety of outstanding promotions, fireworks and the “Kiss a Pig” contest where fans are able to see local celebrities lip-lock with a pig while getting a chance to win a trip valued at over \$5,000. The “Kiss a Pig” promotion is sponsored by the American Diabetes Association.

Last year, Hawkeye football players Drew Tate and Warren Holloway re-enacted their famous, game-winning Hail Mary from the 2005 Capital One Bowl for the ceremonial first pitch.

The Panthers won the first Corridor Classic, 8-3, in front of 2,098 fans. UNI took the second Corridor Classic by a score of 8-6.

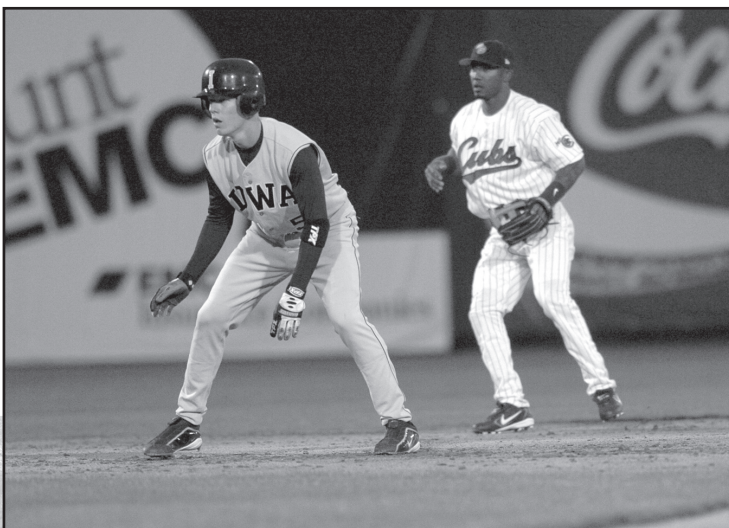
In front of 4,173 fans, the Hawkeyes gave the I-Cubs all they could handle before falling 4-2.

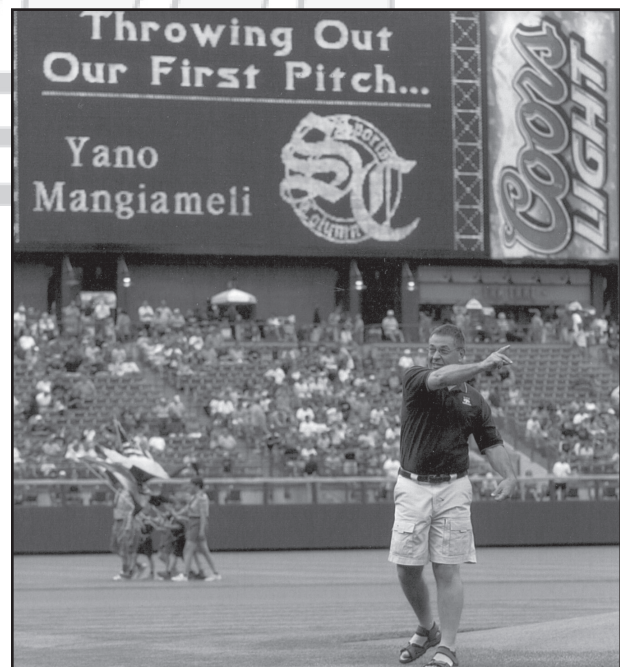


Baseball Legend Tommy Lasorda with Iowa Coach Jack Dahm at the 2006 Lead-Off Dinner.

Hawkeyes on the Air

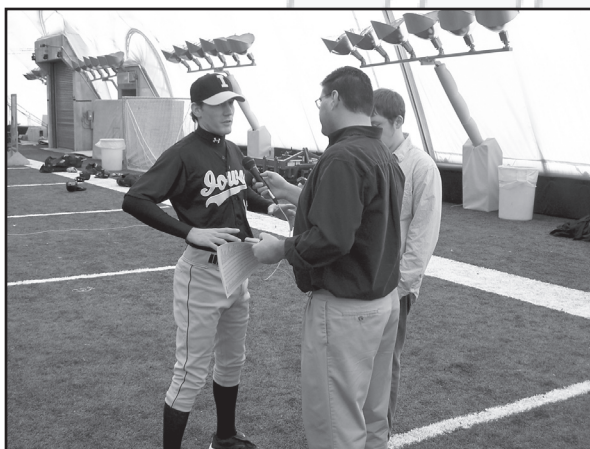

Strength and Conditioning

Strength and Conditioning Coach
First Year

Our Strength and Conditioning mission is to provide scientifically based and continually progressive training methods that will increase athletic potential and decrease injuries.

The University of Iowa Baseball Strength and Conditioning program is composed of two main objectives, injury prevention and performance improvement. These are developed through a year-round, progression based training program. Injury prevention is accomplished through individual evaluation and assessment, which is addressed using joint stability and flexibility exercises. Performance is increased through improvements in work capacity strength, power and speed. Each is addressed year round with one having a greater emphasis at times throughout the year.

- Work Capacity – capability to perform repeated efforts and recover quickly
- Strength – ability to apply maximal force
- Power – capacity to apply force quickly
- Speed – maximum velocity in shortest time possible.

Our training objectives are met through incorporating three basic training principles when choosing methods of training. The majority of all exercises selected should be ground based (standing), multi-joint and multi-dimensional. These principles apply to almost all sports requirements and are therefore important for inclusion into the strength and conditioning program. Training is performed in smaller groups to allow more individualization for each athlete. Athletic nutrition is emphasized to help maximize recovery, improve body composition (muscle v. fat) and increase energy for competition and practice.



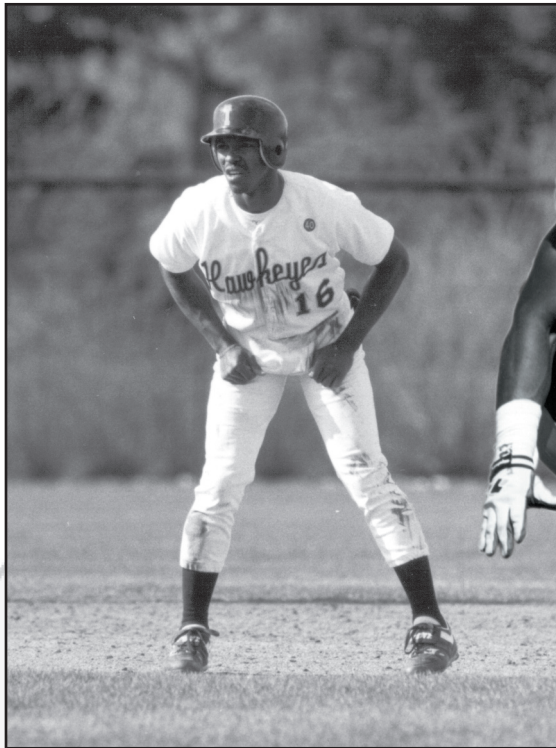

Multi-Sport Athletes

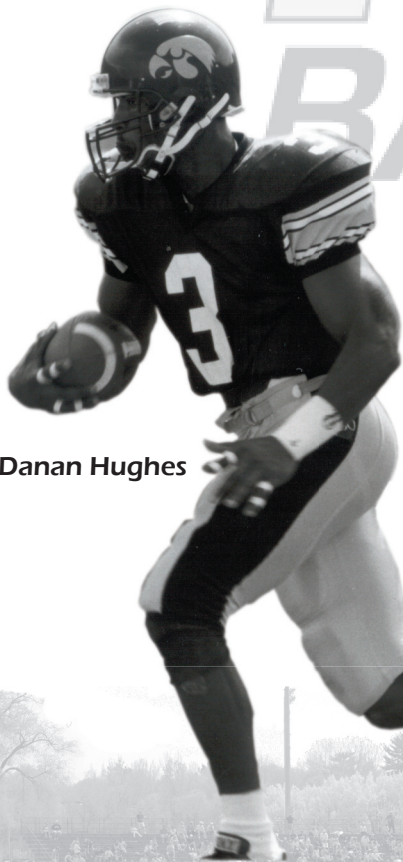
Student-athletes who have the talent and desire to excel in two sports have the opportunity to do so at the University of Iowa.

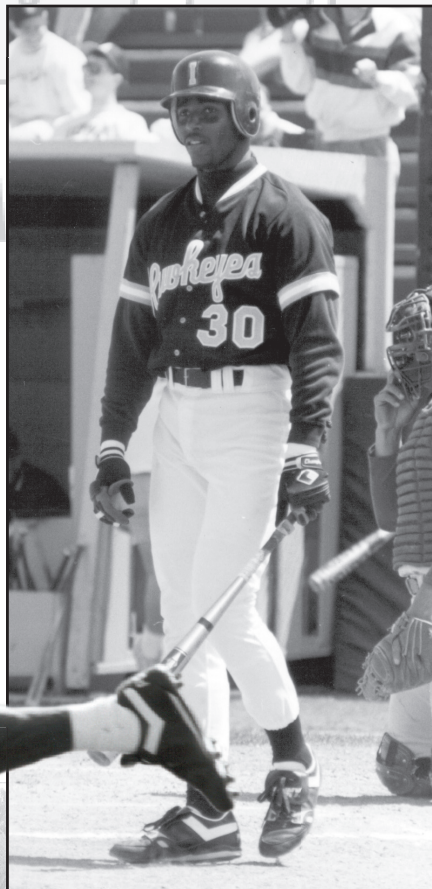

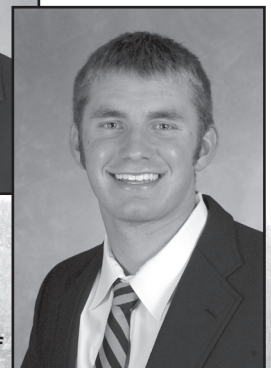

Dr. David Skorton
University President

David J. Skorton was appointed the 19th president of The University of Iowa on March 1, 2003. He has been a faculty member at the University since 1980. He holds joint appointments at the rank of professor in the Departments of Internal Medicine, Electrical and Computer Engineering, and Biomedical Engineering. President Skorton was appointed vice president for research in 1992 and, additionally, interim vice president for external relations in 2000. He served as vice

president for research and external relations from March 2002 until he assumed the presidency. He also continued his role as a physician, caring for adolescents and adults with inborn heart disease.

Co-founder and co-director of the UI Adolescent and Adult Congenital Heart Disease Clinic at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics, President Skorton has focused his research on congenital heart disease in adolescents and adults, cardiac imaging, and computer image processing. His research was supported by the National Institutes of Health, the Department of Veteran Affairs, the American Heart Association and by private industry. He has published numerous articles, reviews, book chapters, and two major texts in the areas of cardiac imaging and image processing. He has served in a variety of administrative positions at The University of Iowa, including director of the Cardiovascular Image Processing Laboratory (1982-1996), director of the Division of General Internal Medicine (1985-1989), and associate chair for clinical programs in the Department of Internal Medicine (1989-1992).

A national leader in research ethics, President Skorton is charter past-president of the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, Inc., the first entity organized specifically to accredit human research protection programs. He has served on the boards and committees of many national organizations, including the American College of Cardiology, the American Heart Association, the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine, the American Society of Echocardiography, the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, the Association of American Universities, the Council on Competitiveness, and the Korea America Friendship Society.

President Skorton is actively engaged in service to the community and to the state of Iowa, particularly in regional and state economic development. He served on and chaired the Iowa City Area Development Group, served on the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce Priority One Advisory Committee and the Technology Corridor Committee, and currently serves on the Cedar Rapids Symphony Orchestra Board of Directors. He is also a member of the Iowa Business Council and had served on the Iowa Department of Economic Development Board, the Governor's Life Sciences Advisory Committee, and the Iowa Research Council, of which he was president from 1999-2001.

President Skorton earned his bachelor's degree in psychology in 1970 and an M.D. in 1974, both from Northwestern University. Following a medical residency and cardiology fellowship at The University of California, Los Angeles, he came to The University of Iowa in 1980 as an instructor. He was named assistant professor of internal medicine in 1981 and assistant professor of electrical and computer engineering in 1982. He was promoted to associate professor in 1984 and to professor in 1988.

As a musician, Dr. Skorton worked as a professional jazz and R&B musician in the Chicago area. He has continued to study saxophone and flute in Iowa City and hosts a weekly program, "As Night Falls-Latin Jazz," on KSUI, the University's public FM radio station.



Robert Bowsby
Director of Athletics

Director of Athletics Bob Bowsby is in his 15th year as the head of the University of Iowa intercollegiate athletics program.

As the chief administrator for Iowa's athletic department, Bowsby has earned a reputation as one of the most respected, energetic and ambitious athletic administrators in the nation. Over the past five years, Bowsby has guided and supervised the merger of the women and men's athletics de-

partments. The combined entity encompasses 24 varsity sports and an annual budget in excess of \$50 million.

As the head of Iowa athletics, Bowsby has been involved in the hiring of new head coaches in football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball, swimming and wrestling, enabling Iowa to maintain its standing as one of the most visible, successful and progressive departments in college athletics.

A Waterloo native, Bowsby became Iowa's 10th Athletic Director in June, 1991, after serving in the same role at the University of Northern Iowa since 1984. He previously served as Assistant Athletic Director for Facilities at Northern Iowa.

Bowsby earned his bachelor's degree from Moorhead State University (Minnesota) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named Bowsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and Sports Business Journal selected him from the four regional award winners as the National Athletics Director of the Year. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities. Bowsby was part of a 15-member commission on Opportunities in Athletics headed by US Secretary of Education, Rod Paige.

Bowsby served as chair of the NCAA Wrestling Committee and has served on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics. Bowsby just ended a five-year term on the NCAA Division I Basketball Tournament Committee, serving as committee chairman two years (2004 & 2005). The committee selects, seeds, brackets and manages all rounds of the NCAA Basketball Tournament, including the Final Four.

Bob has served as an Executive Committee member with both the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association and served in 2002-03 as President of the I-A Directors group.

Bowsby was also elected chair of the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee and represented the NCAA as one of two voting members on the United States Olympic Committee. Bowsby also was appointed by former United States Olympic Committee President LeRoy Walker to the NCAA/USOC Liaison Committee, chaired by George Steinbrenner and former NCAA President Cedric Dempsey. Bob has also served as a member of the Board of Governors for the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.

Bowsby is a charter member of the Iowa Olympics Committee and a current member of the Board of Directors of the Iowa Games. Bob is a board member of the Iowa Scholarship Fund, Inc. and a Board member on the Honda Awards program, which recognizes our nation's top female collegiate athletes each year.

He and his wife, Candice, have four children, Lisa, Matt, Rachel and Kyle. Bowsby was born Jan. 10, 1952.

Hawkeye Athletics

The University of Iowa Athletic Department, under the direction of Athletic Director Bob Bowsby for the past 14 years, is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation.

The men's and women's departments, operating separately for over 25 years, merged in 2001 under Bowsby's direction. It combined nationally recognized programs for both genders into one successful and progressive athletic unit.

Combining their successes on the playing fields with continued success and recognition in the classroom, UI student-athletes practice and perform in some of the best facilities in the nation, while knowing the support of their efforts and attendance by Hawkeye fans ranks among the best in the country.

While the Hawkeyes continue to compete with the best in the nation in a variety of sports, Iowa continues to boast some of the most impressive athletic facilities in the nation, operated by one of the most respected departments.

Several new projects are underway on the Iowa campus. Some of the latest additions to the UI campus are the Roy G. Karro Athletics Hall of Fame and Visitors Center and the Russell and Ann Gerdin Athletic Learning Center.

Kinnick Stadium is getting a major up-grading and renovation that will be completed just prior to the 2006 season. The \$90 million project includes the replacing of the south end zone stands and building a four-level press box that will house 47 guest suites, along with new scoreboards, video walls, cocession stands and restrooms.

Additional priorities for the Iowa program include the establishment and development of endowments for all sports programs, the

continued enhancement of graduation rates, and the implementation of a long-range plan to ensure Iowa's financial, academic and competitive future. As an example, all of Iowa's 13 scholarships for men's basketball are fully endowed.

The graduation rate of Iowa's student-athletes has improved in each of the past 10 years and has consistently ranked above the graduation rate of all UI students. Hawkeye athletes have garnered more than 60 academic All-America honors since 1992. The 2004-05 school-year saw the University of Iowa produce 130 academic all-Big Ten athletes.

Iowa athletes have been recognized as all-Americans in their sport on more than 195 occasions during the past 14 years.

Iowa's athletic teams have continued their trend of success in the last year, on the playing fields and in academic pursuits.

The Hawkeye football team had another successful season that ended in the Outback Bowl in Tampa, FL. on January 2 against

Florida. Iowa has played in January bowl games in each of the last four years and has finished three-of-the-last-four years ranked in the top ten nationally.

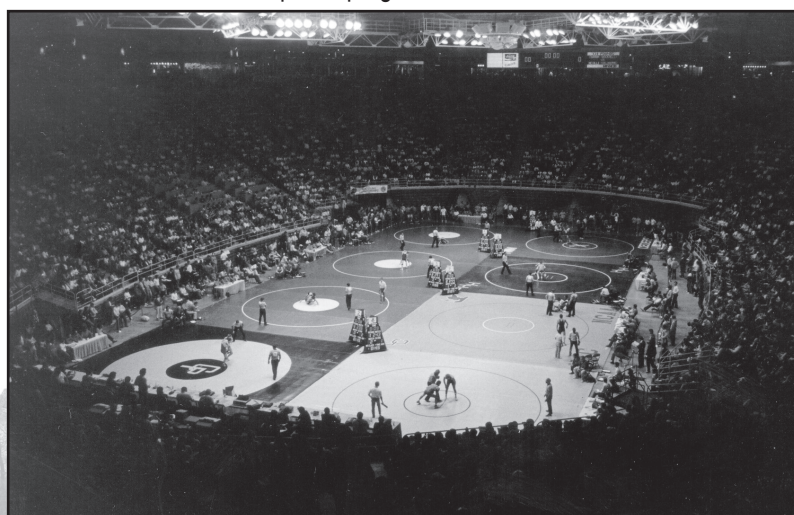
Iowa's men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to post-season play in each of the last five seasons. The men's squad earned a berth in the 2005 NCAA tournament while the women made it to the semi-finals of the 2005 National Invitation Tournament.

The Iowa wrestling squad earned the 2004 Big Ten title and went on to place second in the nation at the NCAA Tournament. Coach Jim Zalesky was named Big Ten Coach of the Year. Iowa has won six of the last 11 NCAA wrestling titles and nine of the last 15 championships. They continue to be one of the top programs in the nation.

Iowa's men's and women's and gymnastics teams continue to rank among the best in the nation. The men's team again advanced to the NCAA Championships and the women's gymnastics squad has been in the NCAA meet two of the last three years.

Iowa's women's softball team advanced to NCAA regional action for the 10th time in 12 seasons. Iowa has advanced to the softball World Series on four occasions over the past 11 seasons and Coach Gayle Blevins is one of three coaches to reach 1,000 career victories.

From the rankings on the courts and playing fields, to the rankings in the classroom, to the rankings in fan and community support, to the ranking as a program that boasts some of the best athletic facilities in the nation, it's easy to understand why Iowa fans everywhere truly believe, "It's great to be a Hawkeye."

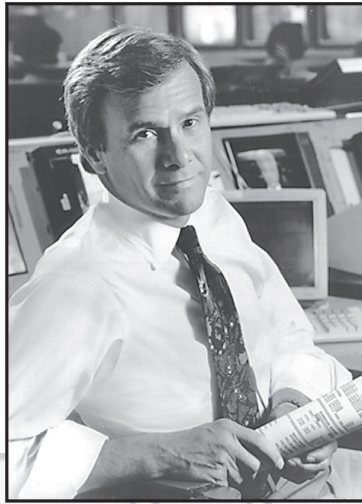

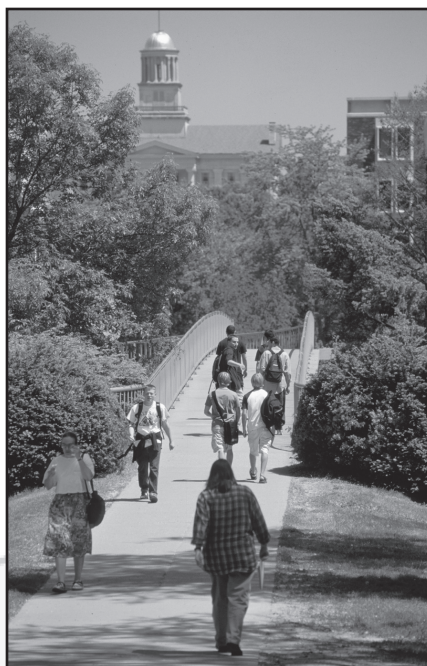

Admission - Freshmen and transfer students are to meet the college's admissions requirements.

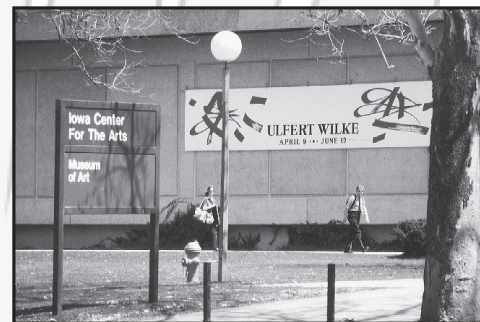
GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL DEGREES

RESIDENCE

Ninety percent of freshmen choose to live in one of the University's 10 residence halls. Each team has its own rules regarding residence of incoming freshmen. Most student-athletes live at least two years on campus.

The University residence halls provide students full-service dining rooms, study lounges, laundry facilities, recreational facilities, as well as vending and bank machines. Residence hall rooms currently have high-speed ethernet connections that give students e-mail and Internet access in your room. Iowa also offers wireless networking in 32 buildings and several outdoor areas, providing more than 170 access points across campus.

SAFETY

*11:55 p.m. - 2:25 a.m.: Free SafeRide buses take students home Fridays and Saturdays.

*Special telephones with blue lights are a direct link to the Department of Public Safety and are situated throughout the Iowa campus.

*During summer orientation, campus security personnel educate students on safety.

*Rape Victim Advocacy Program cooperates with the Department of Public Safety and participates in Sexual Crime Awareness Week.

LIBRARIES

The University of Iowa's library system is the largest in the state and has over 4 million volumes. Students also have access to the collections of other libraries throughout the Big Ten Conference via computer network. Besides the Main Library, The University has 12 departmental libraries: Art Library, Biological Sciences Library, Business Library, Chemistry-Botany Library, Engineering Library, Geology Library, Hardin Library for the Health Sciences, Mathematical Sciences Library, Rita Benton Music Library, Physics Library, Psychology Library and Law Library.

COMPUTERS

There are 26 Instructional Technology Centers all over the campus which are filled with 1,200 computers. These facilities are open at least 50 hours a week. Some are open 24 hours. Also, the Information Arcade in the Main Library provides a variety of specialized computing tools.

The Computer Demo Center provides information for students who want to purchase computers and software.

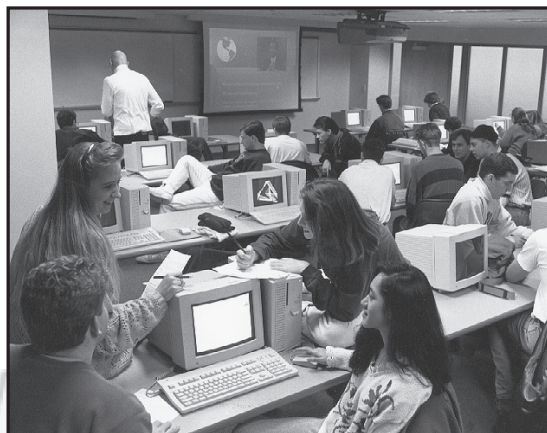
CAREER DECISIONS

Finding and pursuing a career takes careful planning. The Career Center is extremely valuable for student-athletes. The program suggests a time line each student-athlete may follow throughout his or her stay at Iowa. The components of the program include:

SKILLS LABS

The University provides Skills Labs to help students improve a variety of skills necessary to succeed at Iowa: writing, reading, speaking, science, note taking, time management, test taking and foreign languages.



HEALTH SERVICES

The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available. Students at Iowa can go to Student Health Services, which is open six days a week. Student Health Services is supported by a fee paid by all full-time students. It offers students unlimited free office visits (there is a charge for other procedures done in the office such as blood tests).

CULTURAL CENTERS

There are three houses on campus that offer students from different ethnic backgrounds a place to congregate, the Latino and Native American Cultural Center, the Afro American Cultural Center and the Asian Pacific American Cultural Center.

CAMBUS

There are six bus routes throughout the Iowa campus. The University Cambus provides over four million free rides to class and to the dorms for students each year. Some routes run seven days a week, and some run until 2:30 a.m. Cambus also operates a specialized transportation service for persons with disabilities.

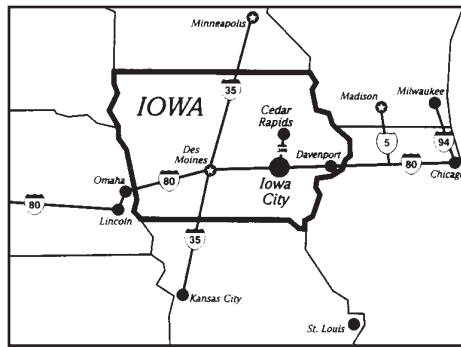

Economically, businesses such as Rockwell Collins, American College Testing and Procter & Gamble help keep the city booming. In Coralville, a branch office of Geico Auto Insurance has provided many residents with employment opportunities.

Culturally, Iowa City is alive with concerts, art exhibits, readings, plays and art events of all kinds. Located on the University of Iowa campus, Hancher Auditorium is a nationally-known performance center that brings in the best of Broadway, classical and jazz music, dance and other performances. The University of Iowa Theater Arts department also produces a full schedule of plays each year, featuring the work of student performers and directors. So whether you enjoy the arts as a spectator or as an outlet for your own creativity, Iowa City has the opportunities.

Residents of Iowa City are not only economically and culturally enriched, they also take advantage of the numerous recreational facilities offered around town. The area's more than 30 parks provide opportunities for year-round activities including boating, hiking, swimming, fishing and skiing.

The city's greatest charm, however, remains the sincere friendliness of its citizens, the cosmopolitan atmosphere and the successful partnership built between the community and the University.



Iowa City is located in eastern Iowa and is an easy trip to such cities as Des Moines (the capital of Iowa), Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, and Minneapolis. Also, Cedar Rapids, a city of more than 150,000, is just a short drive north of Iowa City. The Eastern Iowa Airport, which links residents to every major airport in the Midwest, nation and world, is only 20 minutes away.

OLD CAPITOL

One of the most recognizable sites in Iowa City is the gold dome of the Old Capitol which is situated in the heart of downtown. Built in 1840, it is Iowa City's most historic building. The Old Capitol was the site of the first governor inauguration as well as the first six Iowa General Assemblies. It is also where the state's Constitution was drafted. When the capital was moved to Des Moines in 1857, the Old Capitol was dedicated to The University of Iowa, becoming the first building owned by the University.

CORALVILLE LAKE

Just north of Iowa City is Coralville Lake, an outdoor recreational area that offers a variety of opportunities for the public. Coralville Lake offers picnic shelters, biking, hiking, fishing, boating, swimming, hunting, camping, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, golf and disc golf.

PEDESTRIAN MALL

Located downtown and in walking distance of many of the University's dormitories is the Pedestrian Mall. It is a perfect place to sit outside and study or hang out with friends. During the fall, spring and summer months there are concerts and art festivals in the Pedestrian Mall.

CORAL RIDGE MALL

The Coral Ridge Mall is a 1.2-million-square-foot shopping center located just minutes from the UI campus. The center combines a mix of over 120 specialty shops and strong department stores including Dillard's, JC Penney, Sears, Target and Younkers. Coral Ridge also offers entertainment features such as an NHL-regulation-sized indoor ice arena, state-of-the-art 10-screen movie theatre and a large carousel along with a 1,000-seat food court with sit-down restaurants. Hawkeye Traditions

THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago.

The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the *Fort Madison Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawkeye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

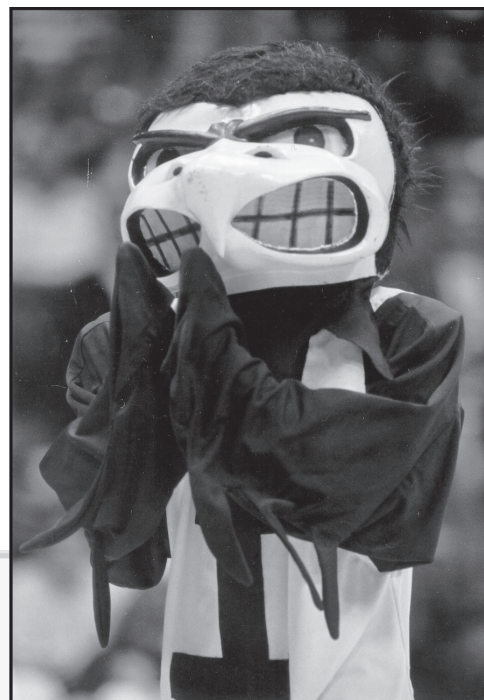
The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.

SCHOOL COLORS

For 40 years Iowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide what are now the school official colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of Iowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.



SCHOOL FIGHT SONG

The Iowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, Iowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man," Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of Iowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletics events the year around.
