GARY FETHKE/GARY BARTA



Interim President Gary Fethke is the former dean of The University of Iowa Henry B. Tippie College of Business and the Leonard A. Hadley Professor of Leadership. A professor of management sciences and economics, he received both his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from The University of Iowa.

He was appointed dean in 1994 after serving one year as interim dean. From 1988 to 1993 Dean Fethke served as the senior associate dean of academic affairs in the Tippie College of Business, and before that he served as chairman of the department of management sciences.

In the years between receiving his Ph.D. at Iowa and returning to the College as a faculty member, he served on the faculty at Bradley University (1968-74). In addition, he taught at the London School of Economics for one year (1981-82) and several summers (1984, '86, '88 and '90). He has published numerous articles in the areas of industrial organization, macroeconomics, and labor economics. His recent research interest focuses on the economics of public higher education.

Dean Fethke spearheaded the expansion of the Evening and Executive MBA Programs. The Evening MBA is currently being offered in Cedar Rapids, Newton, Des Moines, and the Quad Cities. The Executive MBA Program is now available both on campus and in other Iowa cities, as needed, and internationally, in Hong Kong and Beijing, China. A dual degree (MBA-Master's in Systems Engineering) EMBA Program has been taught in Cedar Rapids. During his tenure as dean, the undergraduate program of the College raised the academic profile of entering students and began an early admissions program to admit outstanding high school students directly into the Tippie College in their first year on campus.

Fethke headed the planning and coordination of construction for the John Pappajohn Business Building and the Pomerantz Center on The University of Iowa campus, the UI-Cedar Rapids Area Conference and Education Center in Cedar Rapids, and the MBA facilities at the Des Moines W. A. Krause Center and the Newton Polytechnic Campus.

In his role as dean, Fethke was responsible for coordinating the fundraising endeavors of the College with UI Foundation staff. These efforts led to the development of the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center in 1996, the Hawkinson Institute of Business Finance in 1998, the naming of the Henry B. Tippie College of Business in 1999, and a major commitment from Jerre and Mary Joy Stead in 2003. The Tippie College of Business raised \$125 million in the recent University campaign.

His wife, Carol, is a faculty member of the economics and marketing departments at The University of Iowa. They have two grown sons.



Gary Barta became the University of Iowa's 11th Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on August 1, 2006. His selection was announced on June 23, 2006. He succeeded 15-year AD Robert Bowsby, who left to take over the program at Stanford.

A native Midwesterner, Barta signed a five-year contract to lead one of the most successful athletic programs in the nation. His wife Connie is a native of Waterloo, IA. The two met while Barta was an assistant athletics director at Northern Iowa (hired by Bowsby).

Barta has 19 years of university and athletic administration experience. Before accepting the Iowa position he had been the Wyoming AD since October of 2003. From November 1996 to October 2003, he was senior associate athletic director for external relations and sports programs at the University of Washington in Seattle. From 1990 to 1996, he was associated with the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls, where he was director of athletic development and external relations. He also served as associate director of development at North Dakota State University in Fargo, from 1988-90, where he was responsible for fundraising for athletics, the colleges of business and engineering, and the University's annual fund.

Wyoming received the NCAA Division I-A Program of Excellence Award earlier this year, which honors athletics programs that are superior athletically, academically, and in student-athlete life skill preparation.

The Barta led program at Wyoming was credited with a number of significant accomplishments. The Cowboys played in the 2004 Las Vegas Bowl and posted a victory over UCLA. The women's basketball team won 21 games during the 2005-06 season, a top 20 placing by the women's track team in the NCAA championships in 2005; and a top 25 finish in men's NCAA swimming in 2004. During his three-year tenure, seven Wyoming coaches won Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year awards.

The new Iowa Athletics Director has been a successful fundraiser, having helped secure more than \$150 million in private contributions and corporate sponsorships over the past 10 years. In less than two years, he helped Wyoming raise more than \$22 million, including \$11 million in private contributions and \$11 million in matching state funds.

He was directly involved in major fundraising programs at Washington, including a \$100 million plan for facility renovations.

Prior to taking over at Wyoming, he served as Washington's Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Relations and Sports Programs. He was responsible for generating revenue to fund Washington's \$40 million annual intercollegiate athletics budget. While at Washington, Barta was directly involved in a variety of duties including: hiring of coaches and administrative staff; coordinating the schedule for men's basketball; initiating and managing sponsorship relationships and negotiating radio network contracts.

Upon his arrival at Washington, he directed its highly successful, "Campaign for the Student-Athlete". Barta was a central participant in the design and construction of many facilities at the Seattle campus, including the \$44 million renovation of the Bank of America Arena and a \$30 million renovation of the Dempsey Indoor Practice Facility. During his tenure, annual private support increased from \$6.9 million per year to \$15.8 million.

Barta earned his Bachelor of Science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State University in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championship in 1983, 1985 and 1986. He returned to NDSU to begin his career in 1988 as an associate director of development and later director of development.

While at his alma mater, Barta assisted in the completion of a \$15 million capital campaign, and served on a task force that helped raise funds for the 20,000-seat Fargo Dome on campus. He remained there through 1990. During that same time, he also was a sportscaster for WDAY radio/television in Fargo, ND.

He served as Director of Athletics Development and External Relations at the University of Northern Iowa (1990-96). There he managed all fundraising, marketing and promotions, and media relations activities for the school's 17-sport program.

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (8) and a daughter, Madison (6). He was born Sept. 4, 1963 in Minneapolis, MN.



Kirk Ferentz **Head Football Coach** **Eighth Year at Iowa**

Kirk Ferentz is in his eighth year as head football coach at the University of Iowa. The Hawkeyes, under Ferentz, have put together the greatest four-year run in school history.

Add the 7-5 record of 2005 to 10-2 in 2004, 10-3 in 2003 and 11-2 in 2002 and you end up with the best four-year win total in school history (38-12). Iowa's 25 Big Ten wins in that span are the most ever by a Hawkeye team in any four consecutive years. No team in the Big Ten has won more league championships or games over the past four seasons.

The two-time Big Ten Coach of the Year led the Hawkeyes to a third place Big Ten finish a year ago. With impressive wins over Wisconsin and Minnesota to close the regular season, the Hawkeyes earned a fourth straight bid to a January bowl game in 2005. Iowa is one of four schools to hold that distinction over the past four seasons. Only an overtime loss to Michigan and a last-minute, one point loss at Northwestern kept the Hawkeyes from a second straight Big Ten title.

Ferentz guided Iowa to Big Ten championships in 2002 and 2004, each year earning the Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year honor. He was the national Coach of the Year in 2002. His record is 49-36 in seven seasons at Iowa and his career mark is 61-57 in 10 seasons as a collegiate head coach. His Big Ten record is 32-24 and his contract carries through the 2012 season. Ferentz is one of just seven Big Ten coaches ever to guide a team to 10 wins or more in three straight seasons.

Iowa won a Kinnick Stadium record 22 straight home games before the overtime loss to Michigan last season. The home streak was the fourth longest in the nation. Iowa has won 30 of its last 33 games in Kinnick. The Hawkeyes have sold out their entire home schedule the past two years and have strung together 17 straight home sellouts. The 70,585 average for six home games in 2005 is an Iowa record for average home attendance. Three Iowa players were named to the 2005 first all-Big Ten team and LB Chad Greenway was a first round selection in the 2006 NFL Draft.

Including the last four January bowl games, Iowa has earned five consecutive bowl invitations under Ferentz, winning three of the five. Following a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl, Iowa appeared in the 2003 Orange Bowl vs. USC, defeated Florida in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeated defending national champion LSU in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and returned to play Florida in the 2006 Outback Bowl.

The Hawkeyes finished eighth nationally in the final rankings in 2002, 2003 and 2004, joining Southern Cal, Oklahoma and Georgia as the only teams to rank in the top 10 all three seasons. The Hawkeyes were the highest rated Big Ten Conference team at the end of the 2005 bowl season. On a national scale, Iowa's record over that three year span ranked eighth best in the nation.

And while Ferentz has guided the Iowa program to great success on the field, the Hawkeyes have also made their mark in the classroom. In 2005, Iowa tied Southern Cal and Virginia Tech with the best football

student-athlete graduation rate (58%) among all Division I teams earning a bowl invitation. Among the teams which participated in bowl games following the 2002, 2003 and 2004 seasons, only Iowa and Southern Cal ranked in the top five in graduation rates in each of the three seasons.

Along with Ferentz earning conference and national Coach of the Year recognition, members of his staff have also been well recognized. Norm Parker, Iowa's defensive coordinator, was a finalist for the 2004 and 2005 Frank Broyles Award, which recognizes the top Division I assistant coach in the nation. Lester Erb, Iowa's receivers and special teams coach, was named by Rivals.com as one of the top 25 recruiters in 2005. Ron Aiken, Iowa's defensive line coach, was the American Football Coaches Association Division I Assistant Coach of the Year in 2002.

Under Ferentz and his staff, Hawkeye players have gathered all-Big Ten and national recognition at a record pace. Four Hawkeye players have earned national Player of the Year honors at their position in the past four seasons. Those include offensive lineman Robert Gallery (Outland Trophy), place kicker Nate Kaeding (Lou Groza Award), quarterback Brad Banks (Davey O'Brien Award and AP Player of the Year) and tight end Dallas Clark (John Mackey Award). Banks was also the runner-up in the Heisman Trophy voting in 2002.

Banks was the Big Ten Conference Player of the Year and conference MVP in 2002 and guard Eric Steinbach was the Big Ten Lineman of the Year in 2002. Gallery, in 2003, became the ninth Hawkeye to earn the Lineman of the Year award.

Another part of Iowa's success under Ferentz is reflected in the four most recent NFL drafts. LB Chad Greenway was a first round pick in the most recent draft, with fellow linebacker Abdul Hodge being selected in the third round. Seven Iowa players have been selected in the top 50 picks. Overall, 17 players have been drafted over the past four years. In addition, Five Hawkeye players signed NFL free agent contracts the day after the 2003 draft, nine signed free agent contracts immediately following the 2004 draft, three signed in 2005 and four players signed immediately following the 2006 draft.

Over the past seven seasons, 46 of 54 senior starters under Coach Ferentz, have been selected in the NFL Draft or signed to an NFL free agent contract.

Robert Gallery was the second selection in the 2004 NFL Draft, while Bob Sanders was selected in the second round as the first pick of the Indianapolis Colts. Nate Kaeding, a third round selection of the San Diego Chargers, became the first kicker since 2000 (and just the sixth ever) to be selected on the first day of the draft.

Iowa ranks among Big Ten leaders in number of players drafted over the past five years, having 20 players selected in that time. In the 2005 NFL Draft, DE Matt Roth and DT Jonathan Babineaux were second round selections and DB Sean Considine was selected in the fourth round.

Iowa, in 2004, earned a share of the Big Ten title for the second time in three seasons. After opening conference play with a loss at Michigan, Iowa won its final seven regular season games, defeating Wisconsin 30-7 in Iowa City on the final weekend to earn the title share.



The Hawkeyes capped the season with their eighth straight victory, earning a 30-25 win over defending national champion LSU. Iowa scored on a 56-yard pass play on the final play of the Capital One Bowl in probably the most exciting, and dramatic, win in Iowa history. Seven of Iowa's 12 opponents were ranked at some point during the season.

Lightly regarded by the so-called "experts" heading into the 2003 season, the Hawkeyes fooled the prognosticators by rising into the nation's top 10 four times during the year, getting as high as eighth in the season-ending poll. Iowa put the topping on the 2003 season by beating a favored Florida team (37-17) in the Outback Bowl in Tampa, FL on New Year's Day.

The 2003 Hawkeyes were the only Big Ten team to beat league champion Michigan (30-27). Five Hawkeyes were named to the 2003 first all-Big Ten team and two were named first team all-America. Offensive lineman Robert Gallery was named winner of the 2003 Outland Trophy, which goes to the nation's top collegiate interior lineman.

Kirk was named 2002 Associated Press and The Walter Camp Football Foundation's Coach of the Year. He was also named Big Ten Coach of the Year in a season that saw his team climb as high as third in the national rankings.

Ferentz led his 2002 Iowa team to its first Big Ten title since 1990 and the most wins (11) in school history. The Hawkeyes also played in the BCS's FedEx Orange Bowl for the first time. Iowa finished the year ranked eighth in both major polls. Iowa posted impressive road wins at Penn State and Michigan on its way to the school's first undefeated Big Ten campaign since 1922. The win over Michigan was the most convincing by a Wolverine opponent, in Ann Arbor, since 1967.

The Orange Bowl appearance at the conclusion of the 2002 season followed a successful 2001 season that saw Iowa win three of its final four games. Iowa earned an invitation to the Sylvania Alamo Bowl in San Antonio, TX, where the Hawkeyes defeated Texas Tech 19-16.

The foundation of Kirk's program at Iowa was established in his first two seasons and began to pay dividends late in the 2000 season when the Hawkeyes won in double overtime at Penn State. Iowa returned home the following week to post a 27-17 win over Big Ten co-champion Northwestern, ranked 12th in the nation at the time. That late-season success carried over into the winning campaign of 2001.

Ferentz was named Iowa's 25th head football coach on December 2, 1998. He replaced Hayden Fry, who retired following 20 years at Iowa. Ferentz has been a collegiate head coach 10 years. He joined the Iowa staff after serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach of the Baltimore Ravens of the National Football League. He had been a part of the Baltimore (Cleveland Browns prior to the move) organization for six years.

Ferentz was a member of Hayden Fry's Iowa staff for nine years as offensive line coach (1981-89). Iowa appeared in eight bowl games during the time Ferentz was an Iowa assistant. A pair of Rose Bowls (1982 & 1986), two Holiday Bowl appearances (1986-87) and a pair of Peach Bowl visits (1982 & 1988), along with appearances in the Gator (1983) Freedom (1984) highlighted his previous Iowa stay. Iowa's record in those nine years was 73-33-4 and included two 10-win and two nine-win seasons.

Offensive lines under the direction of Ferentz anchored four of Iowa's highest scoring offenses. Five of Iowa's top offensive teams, in terms of yards gained per game, were operating behind Ferentz coached offensive lines. And, seven of Iowa's top 10 passing teams of all time occurred during the Ferentz years of the 1980's.

Kirk's coaching career began as a student assistant (1977) at his alma mater, Connecticut. The next two years (1978-79) were spent at Worcester Academy, where Kirk also taught English literature. He served as a graduate assistant offensive line coach at Pittsburgh during the 1980 season. That Pittsburgh team (coached by Jackie Sherrill) finished with an 11-1 record and a number two national ranking.

He joined Fry's staff in 1981 and the Hawkeyes won their first conference title and Rose Bowl berth in over 20 years. A string of 19 straight non-winning seasons came to an end in 1981. Ferentz continued as Iowa's line coach thru the 1989 season.

Eleven Hawkeyes, coached by Ferentz, went on to play in the National Football League. They were John Alt, Rob Baxley, Dave Croston, Scott Davis, Mike Devlin, Chris Gambol, Mike Haight, Ron Hallstrom, Joel Hilgenberg, Bob Kratch and Brett Miller. Alt, Haight and Hallstrom were first round picks in the NFL draft and five of his players were first team all-Big Ten.

He was named head coach of the Maine Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years before being hired by Bill Belichick and the Cleveland Browns.

Kirk served as the honorary chair of the University of Iowa's 1999-00 United Way campaign and he serves on the National Advisory Board of the Bethesda Family Services Foundation. Kirk and his wife, Mary, made a \$100,000 gift to the University's College of Liberal Arts in 2003.

Ferentz was born August 1, 1955, in Royal Oak, MI. He attended Upper St. Clair High School in Pittsburgh. He graduated from the University of Connecticut in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in English Education. He was a football captain and an academic all-Yankee Conference linebacker at UConn.

Kirk was inducted into the Upper St. Clair High School Hall of Fame in September, 2002 and inducted into the Western Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in May, 2003.

Kirk and his wife, Mary, have five children. They are Brian (23), Kelly (21), Joanne (19), James (17) and Steven (13). Brian, an offensive lineman, was a senior on the 2005 Iowa squad and signed an NFL free agent contract with Atlanta.

Offensive Coordinator and Quarterbacks
Eighth Year at Iowa
Recruits Connecticut, Pennsylvania and Ohio

Ken O'Keefe is in his eighth season as offensive coordinator at the University of Iowa. O'Keefe is in his seventh season as Iowa's quarterbacks coach after coaching Hawkeye wide receivers in 1999.

Under the direction of O'Keefe, senior quarterback Drew Tate has become one of the nation's top signal callers. He is a viable candidate for all-American honors this season after leading Iowa to consecutive January bowl games in his two years as a starter. Tate ranks fifth on Iowa's career passing charts with 5,669 yards after passing for 2,828 yards and 22 touchdowns in 2005.

In leading Iowa to a share of the Big Ten title and a Capital One Bowl win over defending national champion LSU in 2004, Tate posted big numbers. Forced to the air due to multiple injuries to Iowa running backs, Tate earned first team all-Big Ten honors while passing for 2,786 yards and 20 touchdowns. His 56-yard scoring strike on the final play of the Capital One Bowl will go down as one of, if not the, top plays in Hawkeye history.

Tate completed over 62% of his passes a year ago, ranking second in the Big Ten in passing efficiency (134.7), passing yards (232.2) and fourth in total offense (225.8). He was the MVP of Iowa's 2005 bowl game.

Under O'Keefe's direction, Iowa in 2005 ranked first in the Big Ten in redzone offense and third in passing offense (257.8). In 2004, Iowa ranked second in the Big Ten in passing offense, passing efficiency and redzone offense. When everyone knew Iowa had to pass, the Hawkeyes still passed and passed well, winning their final eight games on the way to a 10-2 final record.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

Iowa has won 45 games overall and 25 Big Ten games over the past five seasons, earning a share of the Big Ten title in both 2002 and 2004. The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl.

In his first year as a starter, Nathan Chandler in 2003 directed the balanced Iowa offense as the Hawkeyes posted a 10-3 overall record. Chandler passed for over 2,000 yards as Iowa's offense averaged 161.2 passing yards and 172.4 rushing yards per game. Senior RB Fred Russell rushed for over 1,000 yards for the second straight season. Chandler signed a free agent contract with Buffalo.

Ken coached QB Brad Banks to all-America honors in 2002. Banks finished second in the Heisman Trophy balloting and was named Associated Press College Football Player of the Year. Banks was also named winner of the Davey O'Brien Quarterback of the Year Award and won the Chicago Tribune's Silver Football, emblematic of the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player. Banks led the nation in passing efficiency (157.1) and is now playing in the Canadian Football League.

Seven Iowa players were named to the all-Big Ten first offensive unit in 2002. That included players' named Offensive Player of the Year (Brad Banks) and Offensive Lineman of the Year (Eric Steinbach). Four offensive players, Banks, Steinbach, TE Dallas Clark and center Bruce Nelson, earned first team all-America recognition.

Several Iowa quarterbacks coached by O'Keefe have had the opportunity to play in the NFL and, over the past eight years, 11 offensive players coached by O'Keefe have been selected in the NFL draft.

In 2001, QB Kyle McCann led the Hawkeyes to seven wins, including a victory over Texas Tech in the Alamo Bowl. McCann ranked second in the Big Ten in pass efficiency while completing 66.3% of his passes and throwing for 2,028 yards. McCann competed for Barcelona in the NFL Europe professional league following his career at Iowa.

Under O'Keefe's direction, Iowa ranked third in the Big Ten in scoring at 28.7 points per game in 2003 after leading the league in scoring offense in both 2001 (32.6 ppg) and 2002 (37.2 ppg). Iowa finished third in the league in total offense in 2002 at 424.5 yards a game, a figure which ranked 13th nationally. The Hawkeyes finished first in the Big Ten and second nationally in passing efficiency (156.3) in 2002. Iowa also led the league in third-down conversions during the 2002 season and QB sacks allowed (12), while ranking second in rushing offense (214.2) and third in total offense (424.5).

O'Keefe was the head coach at Fordham University in 1998 and was the head coach at Allegheny College for eight seasons (1990-97). His career record of 83-17-1 includes a 79-10-1 mark at Allegheny, where his team won five North Coast Athletic Conference titles and the 1990 NCAA Division III national title. O'Keefe led Allegheny to four undefeated regular seasons (1990, 1991, 1994 and 1996) and six NCAA playoffs.

For his outstanding first year at Allegheny, O'Keefe was named NCAA Division III Coach of the Year in 1990. He was also named conference Coach of the Year four times (1990, 1991, 1993 and 1996) while at Allegheny. All eight of his teams ranked among the nation's top 12 at the end of the season and he coached 38 All-Americans.

Prior to becoming head coach at Allegheny, O'Keefe served as offensive line coach (1986-87) and offensive coordinator (1988-89) there. Ken was an assistant coach at the University of New Haven in 1976 and 1977.

In 1985, he coached Fort Worth (TX) Country Day School, and from 1978-84 he led Worcester (MA) Academy to a 37-11 record and three New England Class A prep championships.

In 1992 O'Keefe led a North Coast Athletic Conference all-star team to Moscow, Russia for a game with the semi-pro Moscow Bears. That experience led to a partnership called Friendship Through Football that resulted in the first youth football games ever between the United States and Russia.

O'Keefe earned his B.A. degree in history from John Carroll University in 1975, where he played football and baseball. He was a three-year starter at wide receiver while at John Carroll.

O'Keefe was born Aug. 18, 1953 in Milford, Conn. He and his wife, Joanne, have two children, Brendan and Meghan.

Norm Parker
Defensive Coordinator and Inside Linebackers
Eighth Year at Iowa
Recruits Michigan

Norm Parker is in his eighth year as defensive coordinator at the University of Iowa. He also coaches the Hawkeye linebackers. In his first three years on the Iowa staff he coached the outside linebackers. Parker has been named a finalist for the Frank Broyles Assistant Coach of the Year the last two seasons.

Parker directs an Iowa defense that has earned a reputation as one of the most physical, hard-hitting units in the Big Ten and the nation. Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons, earning a share of the Big Ten title in both 2002 and 2004.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

The Hawkeye defenders did much to turn around Iowa's season last year. The defense was able to shut down a pair of nationally ranked teams (Wisconsin and Minnesota) in the final two games of the regular season. Facing the top rushing team in the nation to close the regular season, Iowa held Minnesota to 129 yards rushing in a 52-28 win that clinched a fourth straight January bowl bid. Iowa led the Big Ten in redzone defense and ranked third in rushing defense and scoring defense.

The defense set the tone for Iowa's championship run in 2004, as Iowa won its final eight games of the season, including the win over LSU, the defending national champion, in the Capital One Bowl. Five of eight league foes scored two touchdowns or less and three were held to seven points or less.

Iowa, for the season, ranked fifth nationally in rushing defense (92.5), 11th in total defense (293.8), sixth in turnover margin (+1.08), 16th in scoring defense (17.6) and 17th in pass efficiency defense (106.7).

The Hawkeyes led the Big Ten in rushing defense and turnover margin, while leading the league in redzone defense for the second straight year. Iowa finished second in the Big Ten in total defense (325 yards) in 2001, third in 2004 (293.8), fourth in 2003 (314.5) and 2005 (382.7) and fifth (355.3) in 2002. Iowa led the league in scoring defense (16.2) in 2003.

Iowa, in 2003, ranked seventh nationally in scoring defense (16.2), eighth in rushing defense (92.7), 16th in total defense (314.5) and 24th in pass efficiency defense (110.3). The Hawkeye defense held eight of 13 opponents to less than 75 rushing yards.

Iowa has ranked among the top 10 in the nation in rushing defense in three of the past four seasons.

Despite an entirely new defensive line that consisted of two freshman and two sophomores, Iowa's defense gained confidence and maturity as the 2005 season progressed. All-American linebackers Abdul Hodge and Chad Greenway led the way, ranking first and second, respectively, in the Big Ten in tackles.

Hodge (third) and Greenway (fifth) are both among Iowa's career tackle leaders. Greenway was a first round selection by Minnesota in the 2006 NFL Draft, while Hodge was selected in the third round by Green Bay.

Four Iowa defensive players were named first team all-Big Ten in 2004, with DE Matt Roth being the only unanimous selection by league coaches. Three Iowa players were named to the 2003 first all-Big Ten team and two others earned second team honors. Roth, DT Jonathan Babineaux and safety Sean Considine were all selected in the first four rounds of the 2005 NFL Draft and all saw significant playing time as rookies.

In his first two years at Iowa Norm coached LeVar Woods, who has played with the NFL's Arizona Cardinals and Chicago Bears the past five seasons. Parker, in his coaching career, has coached 26 players who have gone on to play in the NFL. LB Fred Barr led Iowa in tackles in 2002 and signed an NFL contract with the Tennessee Titans. Kevin Worthy, a 2003 Hawkeye senior linebacker, who also handled deep snaps, signed a free agent contract with the St. Louis Rams.

The 1997 Southeastern Conference Defensive Coordinator of the Year, Parker served in that capacity at Vanderbilt University for two seasons and as linebackers coach there for four seasons. In 1997, Vanderbilt's defense led the SEC and ranked ninth in the nation as all six seniors on that defensive unit went on to sign NFL contracts.

The Vanderbilt defense was one of the SEC's best each year under Parker. As linebacker coach in his first two seasons in Nashville, Parker was instrumental in the development of first team All-American Jamie Duncan.

Parker is familiar with Big Ten style football, having coached 12 seasons (1983-94) at Michigan State, five seasons at Minnesota (1972-76) and three seasons at Illinois (1977-79).

At Michigan State, Parker served as defensive coordinator for five years and also coached the outside linebackers. During his tenure at Michigan State, the Spartans won the 1987 Big Ten title and shared the 1990 championship with the Hawkeyes. Parker helped Michigan State to seven bowl games, including the 1988 Rose Bowl, where the Spartans defeated USC, 20-17.

From 1980-82 Parker served as defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at East Carolina, and he coached outside linebackers and was director of recruiting at Illinois from 1977-79. At Minnesota from 1972-76 Parker helped the Gophers compile winning records in three of five seasons. Parker also coached receivers at Wake Forest from 1969-71.

Parker earned his B.S. degree in special education in 1965 and his M.A. in physical education in 1967 from Eastern Michigan, where he lettered four times in football and was a member of the wrestling squad for two seasons. Parker was the head coach at St. John's High School in Ypsilanti, MI (1965-67) before joining the staff at Eastern Michigan as offensive line coach (1968).

Parker was born Oct. 9 and he is a native of Hazel Park, MI. He and his wife, Linda, have five grown children, Chelly, Joyce, Jim, and Suzy, along with a special Hawk, Jeff, who is deceased. They also have four grandchildren, Tyler, Alyssa, Colton and Roxanne.

Ron Bernard Aiken is in his eighth season as defensive line coach at the University of Iowa. He was named 2002 American Football Coaches Association Division I Assistant Coach of the Year.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons, sharing the league title in both 2002 and 2004.

Iowa's defense has ranked as one of the best in the nation over the last few seasons, and the play of the defensive front has been a key ingredient in the Hawkeye success. After starting last season with four new faces in the front line, the Hawkeyes ended the year ranking 29th nationally in rushing defense (126.0) and 22nd in scoring defense (20.0). Iowa was third in the Big Ten in both categories and fourth in total defense.

Two freshmen and two sophomores started in Iowa's defensive line in 2005. Improving with each game, the unit found its groove late in the season and became a dominant force. End Kenny Iwebema earned first team all-Big Ten honors, while tackle Mitch King was named to several freshman all-America teams.

In 2004, Iowa's front line consisted of four seniors, and each played a key role as Iowa won its final eight games of the year. DE Matt Roth and DT Jonathan Babineaux each earned first team all-Big Ten honors, and each was selected in the second round of the 2005 NFL Draft. Both earned second team all-America recognition.

In addition, DT Tyler Luebke and DE Derrick Robinson both enjoyed the best season of their careers. Iowa led the Big Ten in rushing defense. The Hawkeyes were fifth nationally in rushing defense, sixth in turnover margin and 11th in total defense. Both Luebke and Robinson signed free agent contracts the Monday following the NFL Draft.

Due in large part to the play of the defensive line, Iowa's rushing defense ranked second in the Big Ten for three straight years before leading the league in 2004. The Hawkeyes were fifth in the nation against the run (81.9) in 2002, seventh in 2003 (92.7) and fifth again in 2004 (92.5). Iowa has also ranked among Big Ten leaders in scoring defense, turnover margin, QB sacks and pass efficiency defense.

Aiken coached Hawkeye tackle Colin Cole to all-American honors in 2002. Both Cole and end Howard Hodges were named to the first all-Big Ten team in 2002 and tackle Jared Clauss earned honorable mention recognition.

In 2001, DE Aaron Kampman was first team all-Big Ten and earned academic all-America honors. Cole and DT Derrick Pickens earned honorable mention all-Big Ten honors and Pickens was the Defensive Player of the Game in the Sylvania Alamo Bowl. Iowa's three defensive linemen who were seniors in 2001 all signed NFL contracts. Cole signed an NFL contract with the Minnesota Vikings following his senior season in 2002. Jared Clauss was drafted by the Tennessee Titans in the 2004 NFL Draft and Howard Hodges signed a free agent contract with the San Diego Chargers.

Ron currently serves as the Big Ten Conference representative for the Assistant Coaches Committee of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). He also served as Committee Chair for the AFCA awards banquet in 2003.

Aiken joined the Iowa staff in 1999 after serving as linebackers coach at San Diego State during the 1998 season. Aiken coached defensive tackles at the University of Texas in 1997 and coached the defensive line at Vanderbilt University from 1995-96. Aiken coached linebackers and defensive ends at New Mexico from 1990-94.

In 1998 all three of Aiken's linebackers at San Diego State earned all-conference honors in the Western Athletic Conference. San Diego State finished 35th nationally in total defense in 1998 and the Aztecs earned an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl after winning a share of the WAC title.

During his two years at Vanderbilt Ron worked with Norm Parker, Iowa's current defensive coordinator, helping the Commodores rank as one of the top 30 defensive units in the nation.

While on the staff at New Mexico Aiken coached five players who earned all-WAC honors and at Vanderbilt Ron coached two players who earned all-conference recognition in the Southeastern Conference.

Aiken was the head coach at Langston (OK) from 1986-89, where his teams led the nation (NAIA Div. I) in defense in two of four seasons. The Lions finished 5-5 and 5-4-1 in Aiken's last two seasons there.

Ron was special teams coordinator at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in 1985, he was offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Tarkio College from 1982-84 and he coached the offensive line and special teams at Bethany College from 1979-81. Aiken began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Boiling Springs HS in South Carolina and in 1979 became head coach at Greensville County (VA) High School.

Aiken earned all-conference honors while playing guard and center at North Carolina A&T. He was a team captain in 1976.

Recruits Illinois and Wisconsin

Lester Erb is in his seventh season as wide receivers and special teams coach at the University of Iowa. He became a member of the Hawkeye coaching staff in 2000 after spending one year on the Army staff as tight ends coach.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons, sharing the league title in both 2002 and 2004.

Over the past five years, the play of Iowa's special teams has been a key ingredient in Iowa's success. The Hawkeyes ranked third in the Big Ten in punt returns (13.1) last season and 15th in the nation. Iowa, last season, also led the Big Ten in kickoff coverage, allowing just 14.9 yards per return.

In 2004, Iowa also ranked 15th in the nation in punt returns. The Hawkeyes recorded four blocked punts and two blocked field goals. Two of the blocked punts came in the Capital One Bowl win over LSU, while the two blocked field goals took place in the 23-21 home win over Purdue.

Iowa in 2003 ranked second in the Big Ten in KO returns (22.2) and third in punt returns (13.1), while setting a school record with five blocked punts. In addition, Ramon Ochoa set Iowa single-season marks for punt returns (40) and return yards (495) while ranking among Big Ten leader in both punt and kickoff returns.

Erb coached PK Nate Kaeding to first team all-America honors in both 2002 and 2003. Kaeding was also named winner of the 2002 Lou Groza Placekicker of the Year award and he was one of three finalists for the award in 2003. Kaeding is Iowa's career scoring leader and holds 14 school records. He was drafted in the third round of the NFL draft by the San Diego Chargers, the first kicker since 2000 to be selected on the first day of the draft.

Under Erb's direction, Iowa's 2002 kickoff return team led the nation with a 25.1 yard average. Iowa, in the past three seasons, has ranked third, first and third, respectively, in the Big Ten in kickoff coverage, while also ranking among league leaders in net punting. Iowa's opponents averaged just 7.9 yards on punt returns a year ago.

Over the last four years Erb was instrumental in the development of wide receivers Ed Hinkel and Clinton Solomon, two seniors on the 2005 squad. Both ended their careers with over 100 receptions and over 1,500 receiving yards. Solomon ranks seventh in career receiving yards and his average of 15.8 yards per catch ranks second. Hinkel ranks 14th in career yardage and served as a very dependable punt returner throughout his career. Both signed NFL free agent contracts immediately following the most recent draft.

Wide receivers C.J. Jones and Maurice Brown were both named to the honorable mention all-Big Ten team in 2002. Jones plays in the NFL with the Seattle Seahawks. Brown, as a senior in 2003, had 33 receptions for 507 yards, despite missing all of five games due to injury. Brown signed a free agent contract with the New Orleans Saints following his senior year.

In 2001, Iowa led the Big Ten Conference in punt returns (14.6 yards per return) and ranked fifth in kickoff returns (20.1 yards per return). WR Kahlil Hill was named as the national Special Teams Player of the Year after ranking nationally in both punt and KO returns. Defensively, Iowa's opponents averaged just 7.5 yards on punt returns and 19 yards on kickoff returns.

Iowa's wide receivers also had an excellent season in 2000, with Kevin Kasper setting a single-season record with 82 catches (for 1,010 yards) and Hill catching 58 passes for 619 yards. Hill also ranked among national leaders in both kickoff and punt returns as a junior. Five Iowa receivers, coached by Erb over the last three seasons, have signed NFL contracts.

Erb has two years experience (1997 & 1998) in the National Football League, having worked directly with Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz on the Baltimore Ravens staff. He was Baltimore's offensive quality control coach while working with the offensive line. He was largely responsible for scouting opponent defenses and assisted with special teams.

Erb has gained experience on the Syracuse and Hobart College football staffs. Erb served three years at Syracuse, where his primary responsibilities included helping with the offensive line and scout team preparation. Erb also coached receivers at Hobart College for three years.

Erb was a standout receiver at Bucknell University, where he set records for touchdown receptions in a season and career. He set a school record for average yards per catch in a single game when he averaged 33.7 yards on six catches vs. Fordham. His 902 receiving yards in 1989 ranks second best all-time at Bucknell. He ranks fifth in career all-purpose yards (3,286) and was Bucknell's Most Valuable Player as a senior in 1990.

He earned his B.A. in business administration from Bucknell and his M.A. in high educational administration from Syracuse.

Carl Jackson, a member of the University of Iowa coaching staff from 1979-91, is in his eighth year as running backs coach since re-joining the Iowa staff. Carl previously served in that same capacity for the Hawkeyes from 1979-88 and he was Iowa's offensive coordinator from 1989-91.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons, sharing the league title in both 2002 and 2004.

Iowa's running backs were able to stay healthy in 2005. Sophomore Albert Young was the Big Ten's leading rusher in conference games with 125 yards per game while earning second team all-Big Ten honors. He rushed for over 100 yards in Iowa's final seven regular season games. He totaled 1,334 rushing yards to rank 17th nationally and he ranked 18th in all-purpose yards (146.7 average). He was a semi-finalist for the Doak Walker Award, which recognizes the top running back in the country.

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2004 despite an amazing rash of injuries at the running back and fullback positions. In the first five games of the season, three running backs suffered season-ending injuries. A fourth running back was injured in the sixth game of the year and he did not return until the final game of the regular season and two fullbacks also missed games due to injury.

With walk-on Sam Brownlee and true freshman Damian Sims sharing the rushing game duties, the Hawkeyes still found a way to win, closing the season with an eight game winning streak and winning a share of the league title.

A key part of Iowa's offensive success in 2002 and 2003 was running back Fred Russell. Russell was first team all-Big Ten in 2002 and second team in 2003. He rushed for over 1,000 yards in each of his last two seasons and ended his career with 2,760 yards, fourth best in school history. The MVP of Iowa's 2004 Outback Bowl win over Florida, Russell averaged over 100 rushing yards per game in each of his final two seasons.

Russell signed a free agent contract with the Miami Dolphins to become the fourth Hawkeye running back coached by Jackson in the past six years to move onto the NFL. In addition, fullback Edgar Cervantes, a 2003 senior, signed a free agent contract with the New York Giants.

In 2001 Jackson helped coach running back Ladell Betts to second team all-Big Ten honors and a spot in the Senior Bowl. Betts became the first Iowa player to lead the team in rushing four straight years and he has been a member of the NFL's Washington Redskins the past four seasons. Betts rushed for over 1,000 yards in both 2000 and 2001. Betts ranks second in career rushing and is one of three Iowa RBs (Russell and Sedrick Shaw are the others) to gain over 1,000 yards in more than one season.

Jackson has coached nine of the 11 Hawkeye running backs who have rushed for over 1,000 yards in a season and 12 running backs Jackson has coached in college have gone on to play in the NFL.

During his first 13-year stint with the Hawkeyes Jackson coached five running backs (Tony Stewart, Nick Bell, Dennis Mosley, Rick Bayless and Ronnie Harmon) to 1,000-yard seasons. Mosley in 1979 became the first Iowa player ever to rush for over 1,000 yards in a single season and Stewart ended his career as Iowa's career rushing leader (he currently ranks ninth).

With Jackson on the coaching staff, Iowa has won five Big Ten championships, earning Rose Bowl appearances in 1982, 1986 and 1991. Iowa earned a BCS Orange Bowl appearance in 2002. The Hawkeyes won the 2004 Outback Bowl and the 2005 Capital One Bowl and returned to the Outback Bowl last season. The Hawkeyes have appeared in eight additional bowl games.

The Hawkeyes led the Big Ten in total offense and scoring offense in 1990. Iowa was ranked 11th in scoring offense, 14th in rushing offense and 15th in total offense, nationally. In 1991 the Hawkeyes tied the then-school record with 10 victories and were ranked 5th in the nation in the final CNN/USA Today coaches poll. Iowa led the Big Ten in scoring in both 2001 (32.6) and 2002 (37.2).

Jackson also worked with the Hawkeye kicking game during his previous stint on the Iowa staff. Punter Reggie Roby in 1981 set an NCAA record by averaging 49.8 yards per punt and placekicker Rob Houghtlin was Iowa's career scoring leader before being passed by Nate Kaeding in 2003.

In 1992, Jackson joined the staff of the San Francisco 49'ers as offensive backfield coach. The 49'ers made the NFL playoffs all five of Jackson's seasons in San Francisco (1992-96), winning the Super Bowl in 1995. He also coached two NFL Pro Bowl games in 1993 and 1994.

In 1997 Jackson moved to the University of Texas, serving as offensive backfield coach under head Coach John Mackovic. At Texas, Carl coached NCAA rushing and scoring leader Ricky Williams. He coached Lincoln High School in Port Arthur, TX, in 1998.

Jackson served as running backs coach at North Texas State under Hayden Fry from 1976-78 before coming to Iowa. He coached 14 years (1963-76) in the Texas high school ranks prior to joining Fry at North Texas in 1976.

An outstanding athlete at Prairie View A&M, Jackson was a two-time all-conference quarterback and first team academic All-American. He was named the school's outstanding athlete in 1961. He placed third in the long jump at the NAIA national track meet in 1961 and second in 1962. His career best leap was 25-3 1/2.

Jackson earned his B.S. degree in 1963 and his M.S. in 1975, both from Prairie View A&M.

Eric Johnson is in his eighth year at the University of Iowa. Johnson is in his fourth year as Iowa's recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach after serving as Iowa's quality control assistant for three years. He was a defensive graduate assistant during his first year (1999) at Iowa.

Johnson has been heavily involved in Iowa's recruiting efforts since joining the Hawkeye staff. Iowa's 2005 recruiting class was ranked among the top 10 in the nation by all of the top recruiting services, while Iowa's classes in 2000, 2001, 2003 and 2004 were all ranked in the nation's top 25.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

Jensen later joined the Pittsburgh Steelers and earned a Super Bowl championship last season. All tight ends who have started for Iowa over the last six years have gone on to play for NFL teams.

Johnson joined the Iowa staff after serving as a graduate assistant coach at Vanderbilt University from 1996-98, working one season with the linebackers and two years with the defensive backs. At Vanderbilt Eric worked under Coach Woody Widenhofer for one season and under Norm Parker, Iowa's current defensive coordinator, for two years.

Johnson attended Vanderbilt after his prep career at Whitefish Bay HS in Milwaukee, WI, where he was defensive MVP as a senior linebacker. After a redshirt season Eric was a member of the Vanderbilt squad for one season before being injured.

Johnson was a student assistant coach at Vandy for two seasons, working with Coach Gerry DiNardo. After earning his bachelor's degree in history in 1995, Eric remained at Vanderbilt as Director of Football Operations for one year before serving as a graduate assistant coach. Johnson has completed course work towards his master's degree in health, promotion and education.

Eric was born May 24, 1972 in Milwaukee. Eric and his wife, Patsy, have twin two year old daughters, Jamieson and Sydney.

Offensive Line
Seventh Year at Iowa
Recruits Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota

Reese Morgan, one of the most successful high school coaches in Iowa prep history, is in his seventh year with the Hawkeyes. Morgan is in his fourth season as Iowa's offensive line coach after spending the first three years on the staff as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons, sharing the league title in both 2002 and 2004.

Among the reasons for Iowa's recent success has been the play of Iowa's offensive line, working under the direction of Morgan. Along with boasting the Big Ten's leading rusher in conference action, the Hawkeyes last season led the league in redzone offense and ranked third in passing offense and fourth in total offense.

The Iowa offense averaged 30 points a game behind quarterback Drew Tate and Big Ten rushing leader Albert Young. The offensive line was able to stay healthy, as the same combination of five guys started 11 of the 12 games, even though senior center Brian Ferentz and junior right guard Mike Elgin were the only players to start all 12 games at the same position. Elgin, guard Mike Jones and tackle Marshal Yanda all return in 2006.

Ferentz, who started the final 20 games of his Hawkeye career, signed a free agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons immediately following the 2006 NFL draft. Ferentz had 26 career starts while playing both center and guard for the Hawkeyes.

While the number of injuries sustained by running backs in 2004 hampered the consistency of Iowa's rushing attack, the Hawkeyes adjusted by developing one of the most dangerous passing attack in the nation. With just one senior in the starting group, Iowa's offensive linemen adapted to the change and improved from week to week as the Hawkeyes scored 23 points or more in the final five games of the season, including 30 points in wins over Wisconsin and LSU. For the year, Iowa ranked second in the Big Ten in passing offense, pass efficiency and redzone offense.

The lone senior in 2004, right tackle Pete McMahon, led the way with a standout senior season. Facing two of the more-highly regarded defensive ends in the nation in Iowa's final two games, McMahon led by example by controlling his opponents, who were both first round selections in the NFL Draft. McMahon's talent was recognized, as he was taken in the NFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

Anchored by consensus all-American Robert Gallery, the Outland Trophy winner, at left tackle, Iowa's offensive line had four new starters at the beginning of the 2003 season. By the end of the year, in which the Hawkeyes won 10 games and featured RB Fred Russell with over 1,300 rushing yards, the offensive line had meshed together as one of Iowa's strong points. The Hawkeyes ended the season by scoring 27 points or more in three straight wins over ranked opponents, rushing for over 200 yards in a season-ending win at Wisconsin and in the Outback Bowl win over Florida.

Gallery was named first team on every all-America team at the end of the year. He was the second player selected in the NFL Draft, being taken by the Oakland Raiders. In becoming Iowa's third Outland Trophy winner, he became the second Outland Trophy winner coached by Morgan. As the head coach at Benton Community HS, Morgan coached Chad Hennings, the 1987 winner, who was a defensive tackle at the Air Force Academy. Hennings is a member of the latest class to be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame.

In addition to Gallery being selected in the first round of the 2004 draft, center Eric Rothwell (Kansas City) and tackle Sam Aiello (Chicago) signed free agent contracts immediately following the draft.

As tight ends coach in 2002, Morgan coached tight end Dallas Clark to consensus all-America honors. Clark was also named winner of the John Mackey Award, which goes annually to college football's top tight end. Clark was named to at least seven first team all-America teams.

Morgan became part of the Iowa staff after eight years at West High School in Iowa City. He took a West program that had lost 35 straight games and resurrected the program to elite status in the state. West won state Class 4A (largest class in the state) titles in 1995, 1998 and 1999. Morgan left the program with a 26-game winning streak.

Between 1994 and 1999 his West High School teams were 62-7. His overall record at West was 67-20. He has totaled 146 career prep victories. Morgan is a member of the Iowa High School Coach's Hall of Fame.

He also served as Assistant Principal and Dean of Students at Iowa City West High School.

Reese also served as a teacher (1973-92), assistant football coach (1973-77) and head football coach (1978-91) at Benton Community High School. He led Benton Community to a winning football season in 1978 and guided his teams there into the state playoffs on three occasions.

Morgan attended St. Mary's High School in Lorain, OH. He lettered three times in football and one year in track and field. He was a linebacker on the Wartburg College football team. Reese was a four-year letterman for the Knights and was team captain as a senior in 1971.

Morgan earned his BA degree in education from Wartburg and earned a master's degree in educational administration from the University of Northern Iowa.

Morgan was born June 22, 1950. Reese and his wife, Jo, have two daughters, Jessica and Caitlin, and a granddaughter, Morgan.

Phil Parker is in his eighth season as defensive backs coach at the University of Iowa.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over

the past five seasons. Iowa is one of four teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons, sharing the league title in both 2002 and 2004.

Iowa's defensive secondary has earned a reputation as a solid, hard hitting unit, year in and year out. Last season the Hawkeyes led the Big Ten in redzone defense for the second straight year.

Senior cornerback Antwan Allen, in 2005, was the only player in the nation to start in four straight January bowl games. He ended his career 235 career tackles and eight interceptions. Jovon Johnson, at the opposite corner, also started throughout his career. He ranks third in career interceptions with 17 and had 181 career tackles. Johnson was first team all-Big Ten in 2005 and Allen earned honorable mention recognition.

With two new faces in the starting line-up, Iowa's secondary was solid again in 2004. With senior Sean Considine and sophomore Marcus Paschal stepping into the starting safety positions, the Hawkeyes didn't miss a beat. Considine was drafted in the fourth round of the 2005 NFL Draft by Philadelphia. Paschal, a senior leader in 2006 and three-year starter, had 58 tackles in 2004 and 62 tackles a year ago. Iowa's secondary recorded 13 pass interceptions in 2004.

Under Parker's direction, Bob Sanders became the ninth Iowa player to earn first team all-Big Ten honors for three seasons (2001, 2002, 2003). Sanders earned second team all-America honors in 2003 and was taken by Indianapolis in the second round of the 2004 NFL Draft. He ranks seventh in career tackles (348). Sanders earned all-Pro recognition with the Colts in 2005 and was selected to play in the Pro Bowl.

Free safety Derek Pagel, a former walk-on, earned second team all-Big Ten honors in 2002 and was a fifth round selection of the New York Jets. D.J. Johnson, a senior cornerback in 2002, played for the New York Jets during the second half of the 2005 season after previously playing for Montreal in the Canadian Football League.

In 1999, Iowa's secondary was led by the play of safety Matt Bowen. Bowen led the team in tackles (109) as both a junior and senior. He was voted second team all-Big Ten and was a sixth round selection of the St. Louis Rams in the NFL Draft. Bowen played for the Washington Redskins for the past three years and is now with the Buffalo Bills.

Parker was the defensive backfield coach at Toledo for 11 seasons prior to joining the Iowa staff. During his tenure at Toledo, Parker coached 10 all-conference selections and helped the Rockets win conference division championships in 1997 and 1998.

Toledo won Mid-American Conference championships in 1990 and 1995 and competed in the 1995 Las Vegas Bowl. In 1995 Toledo completed an undefeated season and was ranked 22nd in the final UPI poll and 24th in the CNN poll. Toledo that season led the nation in turnover margin. Three of his Toledo players, Darren Anderson, Clarence Love and Kelly Herndon, went on to play in the NFL. Anderson and Love were NFL draft selections, while Herndon signed as a free agent and played in the 2006 Super Bowl with Seattle. In 1998, Toledo ranked 19th in the nation in scoring defense.

In 1990 the Toledo defense ranked 12th in the nation in total defense. Toledo in 1992 ranked ninth in the nation in pass efficiency defense and 11th in rushing defense.

Parker served as a graduate assistant coach for one year at Michigan State. Parker was on the Spartan staff in 1987 when MSU won the Big Ten title and defeated Southern California in the 1988 Rose Bowl.

Phil was a standout defensive back at Michigan State, earning first team all-Big Ten honors in 1983, 1984 and 1985. Parker was named defensive MVP at Michigan State in 1983 and 1985 and was invited to the Hula Bowl following his senior season.

While at Michigan State Parker helped the Spartans earn invitations to the 1984 Cherry Bowl, where he was named Most Valuable Player, and the 1985 All-American Bowl.

Parker earned his B.S. degree from Michigan State in 1986.

Parker was born March 13, 1963 in Lorain, OH. Phil and his wife, Sandy, have two children, Tyler and Paige.

Recruits New Jersey, Delaware, Eastern Pennsylvania (including the greater Philadelphia area) and Florida (Broward County & Jacksonville area)

Darrell Wilson, a coach with collegiate and high school football coaching experience, is in his fifth year on the Iowa staff. He coaches the outside linebackers and special teams.

Featuring a well-balanced offense, a solid, hard-hitting defense and special teams that rank among the best in the nation, Iowa has appeared in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons, sharing the league title in both 2002 and 2004.

The Hawkeye defenders did much to turn around Iowa's season last year. The defense was able to shut down a pair of nationally ranked teams (Wisconsin and Minnesota) in the final two games of the regular season. Facing the top rushing team in the nation to close the regular season, Iowa held Minnesota to 129 yards rushing in a 52-28 win that clinched a fourth straight January bowl bid. Iowa led the Big Ten in redzone defense and ranked third in rushing defense and scoring defense.

The defense set the tone for Iowa's championship run in 2004, as Iowa won its final eight games of the season, including the win over LSU, the defending national champion, in the Capital One Bowl. Five of eight league foes scored two touchdowns or less and three were held to seven points or less.

Iowa, for the season, ranked fifth nationally in rushing defense (92.5), 11th in total defense (293.8), sixth in turnover margin (+1.08), 16th in scoring defense (17.6) and 17th in pass efficiency defense (106.7). The Hawkeyes led the Big Ten in rushing defense and turnover margin, while leading the league in redzone defense for the second straight year.

Iowa, in 2003, ranked seventh nationally in scoring defense (16.2), eighth in rushing defense (92.7), 16th in total defense (314.5) and 24th in pass efficiency defense (110.3). The Hawkeye defense held eight of 13 opponents to less than 75 rushing yards.

A big part of the Iowa defense over the past two seasons has been the play of outside linebacker Ed Miles, a senior in 2006. Miles, last season, ranked third on the team with 68 tackles.

George Lewis started 10 games at outside linebacker in 2004. Lewis recorded 43 tackles and signed a free agent contract with the Miami Dolphins.

Darrell coached Grant Steen at outside linebacker in 2002 and 2003 as Steen earned second team all-Big Ten honors in 2002 and honorable mention recognition as a senior. Steen intercepted three passes in a win at Indiana in 2002, a feat that tied an NCAA record for interceptions in a game by a linebacker. The former walk-on was one of Iowa's steadiest performers as a defensive starter for three seasons and he signed a free agent contract with the Super Bowl champion New England Patriots following his senior season.

Over the past five years, the play of Iowa's special teams has been a key ingredient in Iowa's success. The Hawkeyes ranked third in the Big Ten in punt returns (13.1) last season and 15th in the nation. Iowa, last season, also led the Big Ten in kickoff coverage, allowing just 14.9 yards per return.

In 2004, Iowa also ranked 15th in the nation in punt returns. The Hawkeyes recorded four blocked punts and two blocked field goals. Two of the blocked punts came in the Capital One Bowl win over LSU, while the two blocked field goals took place in the 23-21 home win over Purdue.

Iowa in 2003 ranked second in the Big Ten in KO returns (22.2) and third in punt returns (13.1), while setting a school record with five blocked punts. In addition, Ramon Ochoa set Iowa single-season marks for punt returns (40) and return yards (495) while ranking among Big Ten leader in both punt and kickoff returns.

Wilson joined the Iowa staff after serving as outside linebacker coach and special teams coordinator at the University of Wisconsin for two years (2000-01). One of his star players at Wisconsin was punter Kevin Stemke, winner of the 2000 Ray Guy Punter of the Year Award.

He also coached running backs at Rutgers (1999) and the defensive secondary and wide receivers at Rhode Island (1996-98).

Before his collegiate coaching career began, he compiled a 65-18 record as head coach at Woodrow Wilson High School in Camden, NJ (1988-95). His Wilson HS teams won five conference championships and four times advanced to the South Jersey Group III state finals.

Along with the outstanding success of his teams on the football field, Wilson was named Camden's "Citizen of the Year" by the Rotary Club in 1992.

A former honorable mention Division I-AA all-America defensive back for Connecticut (1976-80), Wilson was named to the Huskies' 100th anniversary all-time team in 1998. He played one year with the New England Patriots (1981) and five seasons (1982-86) with the CFL's Toronto Argonauts. He was a member of the 1983 squad that won the CFL's Grey Cup.

Wilson graduated with a B.A. in sociology from Connecticut in 1981.

Darrell was born July 28, 1958. He and his wife, Monica, have four daughters, Brianna, Kayla, Kiana and Jehlani.

Chris Doyle Strength and Conditioning Eighth Year at Iowa

Chris Doyle is in his eighth year as strength and conditioning coach for the University of Iowa football program. He is credited with giving Iowa players the strength to "Break the Rock", winning the 2002 Big Ten title.

As the head of Iowa's strength and conditioning program, Doyle has seen the Hawkeyes appear in five straight bowl games while winning 45 games over the past five seasons. Iowa is one of three teams nationally to compete in a January bowl game in each of the past four seasons. Iowa's current streak of Bowl games began with a 19-16 win over Texas Tech in the 2001 Alamo Bowl.

The Hawkeyes have won 38 games over the past four years, competing in the 2003 Orange Bowl, defeating Florida 37-17 in the 2004 Outback Bowl, defeating LSU 30-25 in the 2005 Capital One Bowl and earning a return trip to the 2006 Outback Bowl. Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games in the past four seasons, sharing the league title in both 2002 and 2004.

Doyle is a certified strength and conditioning specialist with the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA). That group named him the Big Ten Strength Coach of the Year in 1999. He was one of 20 nominees for the Professional of the Year Award, an award given annually and selected by the NSCA membership. The award recognizes college professionals who have shown excellence in strength training and conditioning programs.

He served as director of strength and conditioning for the University of Utah in 1998. Under Doyle's direction the Utah basketball team played in the national championship game. While in Utah, Doyle also served as state director for the NSCA.

Doyle was assistant strength and conditioning coach at the University of Wisconsin from 1996-98. He oversaw the training programs for football and hockey teams during this time. The Badger football team participated in two bowl games (Copper and Outback) and the hockey team won the WCHA championship during his tenure.

As a strength and conditioning professional, Doyle has tutored 133 student-athletes who have advanced to the professional ranks in the NFL, NHL and NBA. Iowa has had a total of 17 players selected in the past four NFL Drafts, while as many as 22 additional Hawkeye players have signed free agent contracts in the past four years.

Over the past seven years, 46 of 54 Iowa senior starters have been selected in the NFL Draft or signed an NFL free agent contract. In addition, Iowa has seen five former walk-ons drafted over the past four seasons.

Doyle served as offensive line coach at Holy Cross from 1992-95. He also worked as a graduate assistant at Notre Dame in 1991 and Syracuse in 1990. Notre Dame won the 1992 Sugar Bowl following the 1991 season and Syracuse won the 1990 Aloha Bowl.

Doyle was a three-year starter on the offensive line at Boston University from 1986-88. Doyle served as a student assistant for the football program there in 1989.

Chris earned his B.S. in human movement from Boston University in 1990 and his M.Ed. in education from Boston University in 1991.

Doyle was born June 30, 1968. Chris is from Quincy, Mass. and attended Boston College High School. He was inducted into the Boston College High School Hall of Fame in November, 2004. Chris and his wife, Tia, have three sons, Declan, Donovan and Dillon.

2006 SEASON PREVIEW



The 2005 University of Iowa football season ran the gamut of emotions. There were plenty of reasons for happiness and disappointment during the Hawkeye campaign. At the conclusion of the season the Hawkeyes finished as one of only four teams in the nation to have played in a January bowl game in each of the last four years.

The Hawkeyes ended the 2005 campaign with a 7-5 record and in a third place tie in the Big Ten standings. A pair of heartbreaking, last minute losses to Michigan (in overtime) and Northwestern separated Iowa from at least a piece of its third Big Ten title in four years.

To finish 7-5 and having played in a January bowl game says much about the progress the Iowa program has made during the Kirk Ferentz coaching regime. A tremendously successful football program and a great fan following have contributed to make Iowa one of the most attractive bowl teams in college football.

The four year period is unprecedented in Iowa football history. It has resulted in two Big Ten championships (2002 & 2004), four January bowl games and three finishes in the nation's top ten. A 22-game home winning streak (broken in 2005) and 17 straight home sellouts are additional positives of a program on the move. A pair of January bowl wins over highly regarded teams from the Southeastern Conference (Florida & LSU) are two more notches on the Hawkeye win belt.

Moreover, Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year two of the last four years and was the 2002 Associated Press National Coach of the Year. Defensive Coordinator Norm Parker has been a finalist for the Frank Broyles Assistant Coach of the Year Award the last two years. And, Ron Aiken was named Assistant Coach of the Year in college football in 2002

Individually, linebacker Chad Greenway was a second team all-American and linebacker Abdul Hodge was an honorable mention pick last year. Greenway was a first round selection in the 2006 NFL Draft, while Hodge was taken in the third round. Defensive tackle Mitch King made numerous first freshman all-America teams. Greenway, defensive back Jovon Johnson and defensive end Ken Iwebema were named to the first all-Big Ten team. Hodge, running back Albert Young and kicker Kyle Schlicher were named to the second team.

Words cannot aptly describe the loyalty of Iowa fans. Over 20,000 made the trek to Tampa for the 2006 Outback Bowl. That means over 120,000 Hawkeye fans have traveled to Iowa's last four bowl games (Orange, 50,000; 2004 Outback, 20,000; Capital One, 30,000). It is no coincidence that Iowa ranks high on the wish list of virtually every bowl game in America.

As mentioned, the 2005 season was one of highs and lows. The Hawkeyes lost early season road contests at Iowa State and Ohio State. Things started to come together as the offensive and defensive lines developed cohesion. Consecutive wins over Illinois, Purdue and Indiana put things on a positive trail before adversity struck again. Iowa lost at home, in overtime, to Michigan and on the road at Northwestern, surrendering a 13-point lead in the last two minutes. That's as low as it got. The Hawkeyes fought back and won on the road at Wisconsin and at home against Minnesota. Both opponents were nationally ranked. It was Iowa's fourth straight win over Wisconsin and fifth straight over Minnesota. The Hawkeyes dropped a 31-24 decision to Florida in the 2006 Outback Bowl, seeing a fourth quarter rally come up just short.

The center of Iowa's success has been outstanding senior classes. And last year was no exception. The graduates include four from offense (Clinton Solomon, Ben Gates, Brian Ferentz and Ed Hinkel) and four from defense (Abdul Hodge, Chad Greenway, Jovon Johnson and Antwan Allen). The Hawkeyes lost 27 lettermen, 10 more than the previous year.

A total of 43 lettermen return, three less than 2005. That list includes seven returning starters on defense (DE Ken Iwebema, DT Matt Kroul, DT Mitch King, DE Bryan Mattison, LB Ed Miles, SS Miguel Merrick and FS Marcus Paschal) and seven on offense (TE Scott Chandler, LG Mike Jones, RG Mike Elgin, RT Marshal Yanda, QB Drew Tate, FB Tom Busch and RB Albert Young). Punter Andy Fenstermaker and placekicker Kyle Schlicher return for their senior seasons.

Iwebema is a returning first-team all-Big Ten player (Tate was a first-team choice in 2004) while Young and Schlicher were named to the second team. The 2006 Hawkeyes could be very strong offensively with a group that includes Tate, a senior two-year starter at quarterback, and Young, who led the Big Ten in rushing (125 yards) last season in league games.

The Hawkeyes were third in Big Ten passing offense (257.8 yards a game). Iowa was seventh in Big Ten rushing offense, but had the top rusher in the league in Young. A young, but talented group of wide receivers hopes to be on the back end of Drew Tate aerials. Iowa's top three running backs (Young, Damian Sims and Shonn Greene) could be as good a group as there is in the Big Ten. They will operate behind an experienced offensive line.

The Iowa defense finished third in Big Ten rushing defense (126.0) and scoring defense (20.0). A returning defensive line anchors the 2006 defense. Replacing long-time starters Chad Greenway and Abdul Hodge at linebacker and cornerbacks Jovon Johnson and Antwan Allen will be difficult.

The Hawkeyes will play a 12-game schedule that includes seven home games. The opener is Sept. 2nd against Montana. Missing from the Hawkeye schedule again are Big Ten foes Michigan State and Penn State. The Hawkeyes do not have an open date.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"In terms of sheer numbers, it wasn't our heaviest number of personnel losses. But, I think the significant thing is the depth of the experience and leadership we lost. The majority of the guys that we did lose were three and four year starters and strong leaders in the program. That is typical in college football, each year your best players seem to be your seniors or older players. It's a process you go through every year. How you fill those voids often times is as important as anything you do in the spring.

A focus in the spring is replacing guys and developing chemistry. We made progress in that regard for the most part. In some cases maybe we weren't able to judge or evaluate a couple of players as much as we might have liked, due to injuries. Nothing real serious, but in some cases injuries slowed people down. The good news is nobody was seriously hurt so I think by July we should be full strength.

A couple of strengths we have now, running backs and tight ends, were really suspect last year at this time. Now we're fairly experienced and talented at those spots. We were veteran at wide receiver a year ago, now we are very young at that spot, having graduated three seniors.

In the offensive line, I feel we have three guys who have played a lot of football in the past, three guys who are seniors. At quarterback we have Drew back for his third year as a starter. That is certainly something we are excited about, and it's great having Jason Manson, a veteran behind the starter.

From my vantage point, both Abdul Hodge and Chad Greenway performed as sophomores as well as any seniors in the conference at that time. We've had three years of outstanding production from both of those guys. You certainly can't minimize the loss of their talent and leadership, not only for the defense, but the entire football team. The good news is that I think we have some capable people ready to move in there and take over.

Like offense, we have a flip from last year. We were really concerned about our defensive line a year ago, but that group made great strides in the fall and that continued in the spring. We have some things to work on there, but we have a lot more experience than a year ago. We have the potential to be solid up front.

In the secondary, we've had a lot of good play from Jovon and Antwan over the last three to four years. Adam Shada and Charles Godfrey are veteran players, they just need experience. At the safety spots, we return both Marcus Paschal and Miguel Merrick. I'm not sure Marcus was ever at full strength last year, but he looked like he had that zip back in the spring. I think that's going to be a big boost for us."

Here is a look at the Hawkeyes, position by position.

QUARTERBACK

The Hawkeyes begin the season with two-year starter and all-America candidate Drew Tate calling the signals. Tate was a first-team all-Big Ten selection in 2004 while being named Iowa's offensive MVP, the MVP of the Capital One Bowl and College Football News' Big Ten Player of the Year. Tate's numbers were better in 2005 and his ability to scramble and be creative on the run is a definite asset. He is poised for another excellent season as Iowa's quarterback.

Tate (6-0, 192) threw for 2,828 yards and 22 touchdowns, completing 219-352 passes last year. The completions and attempts are the fourth highest single season totals in Iowa history while the yardage rank fifth best. His 2005 passing efficiency (146.35) was fourth in the Big Ten and 20th nationally. In addition, his 235.7 passing yards per game ranked third best in the league.

He currently ranks fifth on Iowa's career passing charts with 5,669 yards. He is expected to move past three others (Matt Sherman, Matt Rodgers and Chuck Hartlieb) with a good 2006 season. Most agree that the almost 3,800 yards needed to become Iowa's career leader (Chuck Long, 10,461) is beyond reach.

Listed behind Tate on the depth charts are senior Jason Manson (6-1, 195) and freshman Jake Christensen (6-1, 205). Christensen was redshirted last season, but Manson saw action in seven games. He completed 24-48 passes for 230 yards.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"Two years ago, we had to strictly rely on Drew because of the injury situation to our running game, and our line situation. Certainly Drew was forced to do an awful lot for us and he responded admirably. Last year we were more balanced, which helped us and helped make him a more effective and efficient quarterback. It's always a plus to have a two-year starter at quarterback, especially a guy with the ability of a Drew Tate.

We will continue experimenting with Jason at wide receiver. He has enough experience at QB where he doesn't require as much time in preparation. We think Jason can mix positions without affecting his efficiency too greatly. To me that's a positive. He helped out on the scout team as a wide receiver as a freshman. I'm confident he's going to be able to make some plays for us.



You hate to see a guy of Jason's character and ability have to sit behind another very good player and not be able to contribute. So we hope to find a way, somehow, to get him involved and help us. The flip side, it opens the door a little more to give Jake an opportunity to gain some experience. I think it's a win, win situation for everyone involved, we just have to make sure we are fair to everyone.

Jake did make strides in the spring. Those 15 practices were extremely valuable to him. It's a little bit like Brad Banks and Nathan Chandler after their first spring, they both had a much better understanding of what the offense was about heading into the fall, and both made a big jump. The experience from the spring will really help him become a better player this summer and I would really expect to see him make quantum leaps in fall camp."

RUNNING BACK

For the third straight year, Iowa is well stocked at running back. However, there was a big difference between 2004 and 2005. Two years ago the Hawkeyes lost their top three running backs to season ending injuries and the fourth and fifth backs were also injured during the season. Last year, personnel at running back stayed relatively healthy and the results showed.

Junior all-America candidate Albert Young (5-10, 209), a second team all-Big Ten selection and a co-MVP on the Iowa team last year, rushed for 1,334 yards and eight touchdowns. He was 17th nationally in rushing yardage and led the league in rushing in Big Ten games only. His 48 points were second best on the team. Albert rushed for 100 yards or more in seven straight games, a team record. He was also Iowa's fifth leading receiver with 24 catches for 244 yards. His excellent speed and ability to take a hit are a great combination. He is a strong candidate for national honors.

Junior Damian Sims (5-9, 185) and sophomore Shonn Greene (5-11, 225) follow Young on the depth chart.

Both did well last year and played well during spring drills. Sims rushed for 296 yards on only 30 carries (9.9 average) and scored four touchdowns. Greene, playing as a true freshman, gained 173 yards on 37 attempts and had one touchdown.

Dependable Sam Brownlee (5-10, 200) also returns for his final season. Brownlee became Iowa's workhorse in 2004 when all the other running backs went down. He started six games in 2004 and led the Hawkeyes in rushing with 227 yards. He rushed for 42 yards and two touchdowns in 2005.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"As was the case following Fred Russell's big year in 2002, we didn't work Albert as extensively in the spring. We've had plenty of exposure to what Albert can and can't do. Albert played extremely well last year, and I know he feels quicker right now. That is part of the process after you have surgery. You are back, practicing and playing, but still not quite the same. With each month you see improvement there. To me he was an all-Big Ten player, but maybe I'm biased. We're excited because we think he'll have the opportunity to be every bit as good, if not better, this year.

I think we saw Damian improve during the course of the season. Shonn may have improved as much as anybody on our football team in the spring. I would parallel Shonn's situation with Dace Richardson, where both got their feet wet last fall, feeling their way around a little bit. Both looked a lot more confident and comfortable in the spring. Shonn had a really good spring.

Sam continues to perform steadily, and to me is a very valued team member. He's a quality player we know we can count on and depend on. It's great to have him in the group."

FULLBACK

Junior Tom Busch (5-11, 231) returns after starting all 12 games last year. Considered an excellent blocker, Busch is deceptively talented with the ball, whether it be receiving or rushing. He rushed only nine times for 31 yards and caught four passes for 29 yards a year ago.

Senior Champ Davis (6-2, 238) will share time with Busch. Davis provides additional flexibility in what he offers and is capable of handling more field time. Davis rushed only once for 10 yards last season, but showed his versatility by catching eight passes for 58 yards and a touchdown.

Iowa's fullbacks have been used primarily as blockers the last few years. This could be a breakout year for this particular position in regards to yardage and run production.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"Tom had a very solid spring, he's very experienced. Champ is a fourth year senior. He's very versatile and has played a lot for us. We're very comfortable with both of those guys. Both are very knowledgeable and both do a very good job.

Blocking is the biggest part of the fullback job description in our offense, that's what Tom does best. Champ gives us a little diversity as well. He has good running skills, but is a guy who can also block and pick up the blitzes. That gives us added flexibility in our one back schemes."

TIGHT END

This is a position in which the Hawkeyes became much stronger last year and should be very well stocked and experienced in 2006. A trio of players saw action in all 12 games and all three have the potential and talent to be Iowa's starter. Moreover, the Hawkeyes could keep doing what they did effectively last year by using any, or all, of the three.

Senior all-Big Ten candidate Scott Chandler (6-7, 257) and senior Ryan Majerus (6-3, 245) will join sophomore Tony Moeaki (6-4, 250) in a battle for playing time. Moeaki played as a true freshman last year. Majerus started twice and Chandler 10 times in 2005. Sophomore Brandon Myers (6-4, 242) played well on special teams in his first season.

Chandler was Iowa's leading receiver last season with 47 catches for 552 yards and two touchdowns. His 6-7 frame gives Tate a highly visible target downfield. Majerus hauled in 10 passes for 95 yards and a pair of TD's. Moeaki had eight receptions for 112 yards. All three have the ability to reap post-season honors. Their presence make this position one of Iowa's strongest.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"We have two seniors who have played well and both had good springs. Scott is a guy who continues to improve with each phase he goes through. He's bigger and stronger and has made a lot of progress since 2003 when he was a converted wide receiver. His blocking continues to improve, due to his added size and strength, and we're looking for big things from him.

Ryan had an excellent spring. Again, he is a senior with a lot of experience and savvy.

Tony's experience last year as a true freshman was valuable. We think we are pretty solid with those three players at that position. Brandon continues to come along as well. He has worked hard on his game and we have high hopes for him as well."

WIDE RECEIVER

The loss of three outstanding receivers makes this an area where the Hawkeyes will need some fresh new talent to step forward. Gone are Ed Hinkel, Clinton Solomon and Matt Melloy, receivers who etched their names in the Iowa record books. Hinkel and Solomon combined for 86 catches, 1,318 receiving yards and 14 touchdowns in 2005. Solomon had 118 career receptions for 1,864 yards and 14 TD's. Hinkel's career numbers show 135 receptions and 1,588 yards. Hinkel was also a valued punt returner. Melloy had five career touchdowns and 21 receptions. Like many others before them, their value will be missed in many more ways than the numbers each posted on the stat sheets. The trio were also superb team leaders.

Following spring drills the starting spots belong to senior Calvin Davis (6-1, 197) and junior Herb Grigsby (6-0, 175). Grigsby started three games last year when Hinkel was injured. The speedster was Iowa's fourth leading receiver with 25 catches for 335 yards and three touchdowns. He also saw part-time duty as a punt and kickoff returner. Davis started four games in 2003 and has 36 career receptions while battling through a number of injuries.

The only other wide receiver to have started a game is sophomore Andy Brodell (6-3, 193) with one start. He caught six passes for 69 yards last year.

Jason Manson (6-1, 195), Iowa's back-up quarterback, saw some time at this spot in the spring and that experiment will continue this fall. Others in the picture are juniors Eric McCollom (6-0, 190) and Kennon Christian (6-2, 209) and redshirt freshman Trey Stross (6-3, 190). McCollom caught two passes and Christian one last year. James Cleveland (6-1, 185) is a true freshman who gained valuable experience by participating in spring drills.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"Jason is a guy who can supplement the group at wide receiver. Herb probably had the best spring of the group, which wasn't a surprise. We saw that coming during the course of last season. He grew and improved with each opportunity. Last year when he had his opportunity he took advantage of it and played well.

Calvin is a guy who has had some setbacks throughout his career due to injuries. We're hoping with his senior year he can stay healthy and really blossom. He has shown flashes of putting things together and we hope this is the year for that. We think he can follow in the path of Ramon Ochoa and Warren Holloway. Those guys were able to really flourish in their senior seasons.

Andy had a nagging injury (bone bruise) in the spring. It was hardly a serious injury, but troublesome enough that it kept him from being out there much. He made major strides last fall when he had the opportunity during the second half of the year.

Eric is doing some good things, Kennon is a guy who had been around and contributed on special teams. Trey is a young guy who showed some signs in the spring. He's a guy we think, at some point, will help us. James was a first term player in the spring and that experience will be beneficial. We'll know more about how quickly they can come along and help us when September gets here."



2006 SEASON PREVIEW



OFFENSIVE LINE

Iowa's 2006 offensive line should be a nice blend of talent and experience. That's music to the ears of a veteran quarterback and a strong stable of running backs. Gone are the starting left tackle (Ben Gates) and center (Brian Ferentz) along with a couple of valuable backups (David Walker and Ben Cronin). That's the bad news.

The good news is the return of players who have considerable experience as starters. Senior all-star candidates include Mike Jones (6-5, 302), Mike Elgin (6-4, 288) and Marshal Yanda (6-4, 305). All are considered extremely versatile linemen with the ability to play many positions. Just last year Jones started at left and right tackle and left guard. Yanda split starting time between left guard and right tackle.

Elgin started every game at right guard last year after having played center in 2004. His ability to play well at both guard and center will come in handy as Iowa coaches look for the best combination. Elgin is also a first-team academic all-American.

Jones will stay at the left guard spot. He started the final eight games there last year and has played both guard and tackle as a starter since midway through his freshman season. Yanda proved to be a consistent performer at right tackle while starting the final eight games there.

Sophomore Dace Richardson (6-6, 306) played as a true freshman last season and earned the left tackle spot in the spring.

Redshirt freshman Rafael Eubanks (6-3, 288) and sophomore Seth Olsen (6-5, 301) are battling for the final spot with the first group. Eubanks played well at center in the spring, leaving Elgin at right guard. Olsen has played both guard and tackle and started one game a year ago.

A number of young, but talented, players will need to step up and be ready to fill in, especially with three seniors among the first unit. That list includes sophomore Rob Bruggeman (6-3, 280) and redshirt freshmen Andy Kuempel (6-7, 295), Dan Doering (6-7, 290) and Kyle Calloway (6-7, 295).

KIRK COMMENTS:

"We have two guys who have great experience in Mike Elgin and Mike Jones. Both are three-year starters who have done a great job. Marshal was a newcomer last year, who I thought played excellent football for us. Those three seniors have played extremely well and we're counting on them to lead the way."

Dace got significant playing time last year when we made the decision to take the redshirt off him. Our thoughts were that he had a chance to be a three year starter for us, and based on what we saw in the spring, that looks realistic. We're counting on him to play very well for us.

Our biggest decision, based on the spring, is that Rafael and Seth are in a battle for the fifth spot, with Mike Elgin being the pivot guy there. Mike can play either guard or center, so we'll continue to evaluate that situation. Hopefully, it would be nice to know how things will shape up by about the midway point in camp. It's important to get the quarterback and center comfortable with each other for a prolonged period of time. We'll give it the time it needs, and see what happens about halfway through camp.

The next group, Rob, Andy, Dan, Kyle, is the group of young guys that we are waiting to see where they are in the fall and how they shake out. We'll watch that as August goes along. One thing for sure, we graduate three guys at the end of the season, so all of those guys have to keep moving forward."

DEFENSIVE LINE (Includes ends)

It took about half the 2005 season before Iowa's defensive front found itself. But when it did a warning was given to all opponents that a typically sound Hawkeye defense, absent for a portion of last year, was back.

The Hawkeyes had the benefit of outstanding defensive fronts from 2002 thru 2004. Many of those players are now playing in the National Football League. Iowa paid the price of those great defenses by having to re-load with virtually an entirely new line last year. And it took a good portion of the season before that line gelled into a solid unit.

The result for the 2006 season is expected to be a young, but experienced defensive line that should be very good. This area of the team is expected to be one of the strongest in terms of returnees with experience.

At the tackle spots, sophomores Matt Kroul (6-3, 271) and Mitch King (6-3, 264) saw extensive duty as redshirt freshmen. King was named to several freshman all-America teams and was an honorable mention all-Big Ten pick. He was Iowa's sixth leading tackler with 60. He had 10.5 tackles-for-loss for a minus 28 yards and three hits forcing a fumble. Kroul had 48 tackles, four tackles for loss and one interception. He started all 12 games, while King was a starter in the final nine contests. King won Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors following his performance in the win at Wisconsin.

Hoping to push Kroul and King will be sophomore Ryan Bain (6-2, 282). Bain played as a true freshman last year and registered 21 tackles and four sacks. Redshirt freshman Vernon Jackson (6-1, 265) had a solid spring and the coaching staff is hoping sophomore Ettore Ewen (6-0, 275) can get on the field after two seasons of injuries.

A pair of junior all-star candidates return at defensive end. Both Kenny Iwebema (6-4, 270) and Bryan Mattison (6-3, 272) should be a force on the defensive front. Iwebema was a first team all-Big Ten choice last year after totaling 48 tackles, 10 for a minus 51 yards. He had seven quarterback sacks, a forced fumble and two blocked kicks. Iwebema is a pre-season candidate for the Ted Hendricks Award, the Bednarik Trophy and the Lott Trophy.

Mattison was just about a mirror on the other side with 9.5 tackles for loss (-30 yards) and four sacks. Both Mattison and Iwebema started all 12 games last year.

Sophomore Alex Kanelis (6-4, 281) and redshirt freshman Justin Collins (6-2, 250) will back up the starting ends. Both are considered excellent prospects and will see plenty of action in 2006. Kanelis played in 11 games last year and had nine tackles while gaining very good experience.

If Iowa's defensive line stays healthy, it could be one of the Big Ten's best again. Something Iowa fans are used to seeing under the tutelage of line coach Ron Aiken.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"We saw these young guys grow immensely during the course of last season. October was a big time for growth on our entire football team last year. Our defensive line grew as much as any group on the field. Ron does a very good job with those guys. The good news is that there were six guys out there competing who Ron could get in there freely, including Ryan and Alex. Two true freshmen were out there at critical times during the latter part of the season. Those six guys give us a good base to start with. Certainly we have to continue to improve our pass rush. The 2004 group did a great job there. That has to be part of the progression."

The biggest thing is understanding tempo and being able to compete at the level you have to in a very physical conference. Any time you play young linemen, on either side of the football, the tempo and the physical maturity is always an area of concern.

Last year, it wasn't pretty, early on. To their credit, they stayed the course, kept playing and working hard, and took to the coaching they were getting. It started to turn around in October and November, when opponents had to put some effort into trying to block us."

LINEBACKERS (includes outside linebackers)

Last year the Hawkeyes had what many considered the top linebacking duo in college football with Chad Greenway and Abdul Hodge. The pair were both named to all-America teams and accounted for 314 of Iowa's 1,103 tackles last year. Hodge was the Big Ten's leading tackler with 158 stops and Greenway was second with 156. They had a total of 21 tackles for loss. Both were named all-Big Ten numerous times. Abdul and Chad finished their careers with 453 and 416 tackles to rank third and fifth, respectively, on Iowa's career tackle charts. The loss of linebacking and leadership skills provided by the pair will be a major void for the Hawkeyes. However, like in past years, it will be time for some new blood to step forward and be Iowa's, "next man in".

Senior Edmond Miles (6-1, 228), a Bednarik Trophy candidate, started every game last year and two games the year before at outside linebacker. He will provide leadership and the only extensive experience to the linebacking position while moving to the weak side position. He was Iowa's third-leading tackler in 2005 with 68 stops, nine tackles for loss (-23 yards) and one interception.

The task of trying to replace Greenway and Hodge goes to juniors Mike Humpal (6-2, 232) and Mike Klinkenborg (6-2, 240). Humpal, who had 25 tackles and played in all 12 games last year, is set to go at the outside spot. Klinkenborg played in 11 games, while fighting the injury bug, and had 11 tackles. He is set to fill in for Hodge at the middle linebacker spot. Klinkenborg was a first-team district academic all-American last year. Both he and Humpal are considered hard-nosed football players who could become very good collegiate linebackers.

Senior three-year letterman Zach Gabelmann (6-1, 233) is the only other linebacker with significant playing time. He played in every game last season and was a key ingredient to Iowa's special teams. Gabelmann had 17 stops and one tackle for loss and will play the middle spot with Klinkenborg.

Junior Bryon Gattas (6-1, 233) joined the program from junior college and will share time with Miles at the weak side position. Junior Chris Brevi (6-2, 232) is listed behind Humpal on the outside and redshirt freshman Pat Angerer (6-1, 222) had a solid spring and will also figure in the mix, both at the weak side and on special teams.

Iowa linebacking has a reputation of being good, hard-hitting football players. New names and a solid recruiting class make this the area in most need of re-loading in 2006.



2006 SEASON PREVIEW



KIRK COMMENTS:

"Realistically, we had great linebacking play at the outside position with Levar Woods and Grant Steen, both those guys really commanded the position well. We've been kind of stop gaping the last couple of years, as Ed really is more of an inside player. Ed played well at the weak side spot in the spring.

Getting Bryon was a little bit like the recruiting of Brad Banks a few years ago. We weren't necessarily looking for a junior college linebacker. He was in the Chicago area, so we knew about him coming out of high school. He went to a small college as a running back, then decided he wanted to be a linebacker and went to junior college. He is an excellent student. We were impressed when we visited with him and decided he was a guy we wanted to target. He handles himself well, runs well, he's a tough and aggressive guy. We think he is going to fit in well with what we do.

Mike Humpal performed real well in the Spring. He's what you are looking for at that position. I think we have solidified ourselves out there and I think we have Ed in a position where he is more comfortable and probably going to be a little more effective.

At the middle position, Mike had some nagging injuries in the spring so we didn't see him as much as we would have liked. We're looking at a two man battle between Mike and Zach, a guy who came on last year on special teams and then had a good spring. Pat as well, played well in the spring. I see him being a good special teams player who will battle for playing time in the near future."

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The loss of two four-year starters at the corner positions will surely be felt. But the return of both starting safeties and a number of highly experienced candidates will ease the transition. Gone are Antwan Allen and Jovon Johnson. Allen started 47 times during his Hawkeye career and totaled 235 tackles and eight interceptions. Johnson, a first-team all-Big Ten selection, had 17 career interceptions to rank third on Iowa's all-time list. He started 38 games as a Hawkeye and had 181 career tackles.

The return of starting safeties Marcus Paschal (6-0, 207) and Miguel Merrick (6-0, 203), both senior all-Big Ten candidates, provide somewhat of a security blanket. Paschal has 23 career starts and Merrick 12. Paschal was an honorable mention all-Big Ten pick last year and had 62 tackles, while Merrick totaled 59. Both will be expected to provide leadership in the 2006 defensive backfield. Paschal has the flexibility to play either of the two spots.

Senior Devan Moylan (5-10, 201) is the only experienced safety back behind Paschal and Merrick. Moylan played in all 12 games last year and had 13 tackles, primarily on special teams. Redshirt freshman Marcus Wilson (6-3, 198) stepped forward in the spring to earn a spot on the depth chart, but he has no game experience.

Juniors Charles Godfrey (6-1, 208) and Adam Shada (6-1, 185) will fill the positions vacated by Allen and Johnson at the corners. Each started three games last season. Godfrey is making the change from safety, where he amassed 35 tackles in 2005. Shada had 22 tackles and three interceptions while being named district academic all-American last year. Both could be in line for breakout seasons as they gain steady playing time.

Backing them up will be seniors Ma'Quan Dawkins (5-9, 166) and sophomore Bradley Fletcher (6-2, 195). Both have game experience, though not extensive. Dawkins missed the second half of 2005 with an injury, while Fletcher played well during spring practice.

Coach Phil Parker could have a very good backfield, despite being thin on depth. Keeping top line players healthy will be crucial. A priority will be to develop depth and experience among the young players.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"At the corner positions, it is a positive that both Adam and Charles have been in the defensive system for a couple of years and have played. I would compare them to Mike Humpal. He could have been a starter, but he was playing behind the wrong guy (Greenway). There is a good reason they didn't play a lot, because of the guys in front of them. I think its their time to play. The only thing you can't give a player is experience. They are capable, ready and very willing.

Charles has played corner in the past, and he has played safety. No doubt it's a good fit for him. We're confident he will handle it well. He did a nice job in the spring. Bradley made good strides in the spring, he's a talented guy. Things started to click for him, as he looked better in the spring than at any other time since he has been here.

Marcus and Miguel both have good attitudes and are experienced. Marcus has great position flexibility, in that he can play either safety spot, which is always helpful. We feel good about those two and need both to be great leaders for us."

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior placekicker Kyle Schlicher (5-9, 184) was second team all-Big Ten and a semi-finalist for the 2005 Lou Groza Kicker of the Year Award. He was Iowa's leading scorer for the second straight year with 94 points. He made 43 of 44 extra points and was 17 of 21 on field goals. Three of his four misses came between 40-49 yards. Two years ago he put

his name in the Iowa record books when he kicked five field goals and had 17 kicking points against Minnesota. That tied for the second most field goals ever kicked in a Big Ten game. Schlicher has made 38 of 47 career field goals and 75 of 79 PAT's. The 21 field goals in a season (2004) tied the Iowa record.

The Hawkeyes also return senior punter Andy Fenstermaker (6-3, 225). He averaged 38.5 yards on 49 punts and had 21 downed inside the 20 yard line, a year ago, in his first season of duty. Fenstermaker was also a second team district academic all-American.

Both Fenstermaker and Schlicher are candidates for post-season honors and are extremely important to Iowa's success.

Along with both kickers, the Hawkeyes return punt snapper Daniel Olszta (5-11, 222) and Clint Huntruds (6-5, 270), who handled all placement snaps.

The Hawkeyes ranked first in the Big Ten in kickoff coverage and field goal percentage (81%) last season. Iowa was third in the Big Ten and 15th nationally in punt returns (13.1).

Iowa needs to show improvement on its kickoff return average of 16.2 yards. That number ranked last in the league and 115th nationally. The Hawkeyes have blocked 14 kicks over the last three years, but got to only three last year.

Special teams are vitally important in the Kirk Ferentz system. With so many young players on the roster, this is a good area to gain the attention of the coaches. Strong special teams play is a great ticket to earning additional playing time.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"The good news is all our specialists are back. Kyle returns for a third year and he can be as good as he wants to be. We're expecting big things from him. Andy is the same way. For the most part he performed very, very well. He had a very strong year and we think he's got great potential.

Dan Olszta, who handles deep snaps, did a tremendous job last year when we were a little nervous. Also, Clint Huntruds returns as short snapper as well. We have the experience, now it's a matter of all those guys being focused on improvement.

We're worried about losing a guy like Ed Hinkel, and then Jovon Johnson, who filled in when Ed was injured. We have the potential there. We did spend a little time on that in the spring. We are always looking at young guys who can contribute on special teams. I think we are in good shape on our coverage teams.

We haven't had much success in the kickoff return part the past couple of years, so that is a concern. We had to watch the running back situation a year ago, it's a position where we have been thin due to injuries. Now we have the potential to make a major step forward in kickoff returns."

THE SCHEDULE

Iowa will play a 12-game regular season schedule with no off week. The Hawkeyes have traditionally played one of the nation's top schedules and this year is no different. Seven of Iowa's 2006 opponents were ranked in the nation's top 25 at some point during the 2005 season. In addition, Montana was highly ranked in the 2005 I-AA polls. Seven of last year's opponents appeared in bowl games and Northern Iowa played in the I-AA national championship game. New to Iowa's non-conference schedule is season-opening foe Montana, along with Syracuse and Northern Illinois.

Included in Iowa's 12-game regular season schedule are seven home contests. In addition to non-conference home games against Montana, Northern Illinois and Iowa State, the Hawkeyes have Kinnick Stadium encounters with Ohio State, Purdue, Northwestern and Wisconsin. Road contests are against Syracuse, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota. Michigan State and Penn State are Big Ten teams not on the Iowa schedule for the second straight year.

KIRK COMMENTS:

"Experience is a factor in early season play. Even in 2002, when we played extremely well on the field in October and November, we sputtered early, with a loss at home and near loss at Miami, OH. Some people forget about that one. As good as we were in November, we were a lot less than that in September.

The more we can do to speed up the process, the better. We've kicked some things around as a staff and will visit with the team about some things which need to be addressed. Hopefully more awareness will help. Still, the facts are we tend to be more of a development team, but we want to speed up the process.

Our conference is extremely competitive. Based on the past, history dictates that we are going to be in a lot of close games, looking over the last four years and looking ahead. How you handle those situations and how you respond, is critical.

There's historical value in this coming season. We have a 50th and 25th anniversary Rose Bowl teams, celebrating two very significant teams in this program. To me, tying that in with the renovation of Kinnick Stadium, the timing is unique. This is an exciting historical period for our ball club and the program."



2006 PRESEASON NOTES



COACH KIRK FERENTZ

The 2002 Associated Press, Walter Camp and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year and two-time Big Ten Coach of the Year, Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents), is in his eighth season as Iowa's head football coach. Ferentz guided Iowa to Big Ten titles twice in the last four years and four straight January bowl games, including back-to-back New Year's Day bowl victories (2004 Outback Bowl and 2005 Capital One Bowl). Iowa has posted a 38-12 (.760) overall mark and a 25-7 (.781) Big Ten record the last four seasons. Ferentz, at Iowa, holds an overall record of 49-36 (.576) and a 32-24 (.571) mark in Big Ten games. In 10 seasons as a college head coach his career mark is 61-57 (.517).

Twenty-nine of Iowa's 85 games over the last seven seasons have been decided by seven points or less (14-15) and 29 were played against opponents who were ranked in the top 25 at the time (12-17).

IOWA CITY: BEST IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

The *Sporting News* ranked Iowa City as the best college football city in America in its August, 2005 publication. The Hawkeyes' success, tradition, history, fans and the city's atmosphere on game days were all considered in naming Iowa City No. 1.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,078 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 547-492-39 (.526). That includes a 345-192-16 (.638) record in home games, a 202-298-23 (.408) record in games away from Iowa City, a 270-330-25 (.452) mark in Big Ten games and a 228-157-15 (.589) record in Kinnick Stadium.

HAWKEYES TO PLAY 12

After two years of playing an 11-game regular season schedule, Iowa returns to a 12-game slate. The Hawkeyes will play seven home games in renovated Kinnick Stadium, where they have posted a 24-2 record the last four seasons. Eight of Iowa's 2006 opponents posted seven wins or more a year ago, with six of the eight competing in bowl games. Iowa adds three new opponents to its 2006 slate: Northern Illinois from the Mid-American Conference, Syracuse from the Big East Conference and Montana from the Big Sky Conference (Division I-AA). Iowa's opener against Montana marks the second consecutive year the Hawkeyes will play a Division I-AA opponent. Other home games include in-state rival Iowa State, Northern Illinois and Big Ten foes Ohio State, Purdue, Northwestern and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes' only non-conference road contest is at Syracuse, while they travel to play conference foes Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota. Iowa's regular season finale at Minnesota on November 18 will be the 100th meeting between the Hawkeyes and Golden Gophers.

The Hawkeyes will not face Michigan State or Penn State this year. Furthermore, this year will be the last time Iowa will face Michigan and Ohio State until 2009, as the two schools come off Iowa's conference schedule in 2007 and 2008.

IOWA OPENS BIG TEN PLAY ON ROAD

Iowa will begin its quest for a 12th Big Ten championship Sept. 23 at Illinois. This year marks the seventh time in eight years, including the last five, the Hawkeyes will open league play away from Iowa City. Iowa's lone conference home opener, under Coach Ferentz, came in 2001 when it defeated Penn State.

IOWA LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

Iowa's Leadership Council for the 2006 season includes six seniors, three juniors, four sophomores, one redshirt freshman and one true freshman. A member of the incoming freshman class will be added this fall. Permanent team captains are named at the conclusion of each season. The Leadership Council for this season includes seniors Mike Elgin, Jason Manson, Miguel Merrick, Marcus Paschal, Drew Tate and Marshal Yanda; juniors Mike Humpal, Bryan Mattison and Albert Young; sophomores Mitch King, Matt Kroul, Tony Moeaki and Seth Olsen and redshirt freshman Jake Christensen.

TELEVISION SCHEDULE

A majority, if not all, of Iowa's games this season will be selected for television. The Big Ten Conference announces game times and television stations no later than 12 days prior to game days. Four Hawkeye games have already been selected for television. Iowa will make its ESPNU debut in the season opener vs. Montana at 11:05 a.m. The following week's road contest at Syracuse will be televised regionally on ABC at 2:35 p.m. The Hawkeyes' home game vs. intra-state rival Iowa State will be televised nationally on ESPN at 11:05 a.m. Iowa's home conference opener vs. Ohio State will be aired on either ABC or ESPN at 7:05 p.m., marking the fifth time Kinnick Stadium will host a night game. All times listed are central time. Iowa's bowl game vs. Florida on Jan. 2, 2006, marked the 52nd consecutive game the Hawkeyes have appeared on television. The last Iowa contest not televised was vs. Minnesota on Nov. 17, 2001.

IOWA AMONG THE BIG TEN'S ELITE

Iowa is tied with Michigan and Ohio State for the most conference victories the last four years. All three schools have amassed 25 wins during that time. Michigan (19) has won the most league contests the last three years, followed by Iowa (17) and Ohio State (17).

HAWKEYES BY THE NUMBERS

Iowa returns 43 lettermen from 2005, including 23 on offense, 18 on defense and two specialists. The Hawkeyes return seven starters on offense and seven on defense, plus placekicker Kyle Schlicher and punter Andy Fenstermaker. The lettermen breakdown includes 11 three-year lettermen, 12 two-year lettermen and 20 one-year lettermen.

The total roster has 109 players, and includes 21 seniors, 16 juniors, 30 sophomores, 23 redshirt freshmen and 19 true freshmen. The pre-season depth chart includes 16 seniors, 14 juniors, 10 sophomores and nine redshirt freshmen.

STARTERS RETURNING

Iowa returns seven starters on offense and seven on defense, in addition to PK Kyle Schlicher. The returning starters on offense include guards Mike Jones and Mike Elgin, tackle Marshal Yanda, running back Albert Young, fullback Tom Busch, tight end Scott Chandler and quarterback Drew Tate. The defensive starters returning include ends Kenny Iwebema and Bryan Mattison, tackles Matt Kroul and Mitch King, linebacker Edmond Miles and safeties Marcus Paschal and Miguel Merrick.

THE SPORTING NEWS LIKES HAWKEYES

The *Sporting News* has a number of Hawkeyes listed in its preseason rankings. The publication ranks Drew Tate as the fourth-best quarterback in the nation, while it also ranks Marcus Paschal as the fourth-best free safety. Kyle Schlicher was chosen as the fifth-best placekicker and Mike Jones was selected as the fifth-best offensive guard. Albert Young is picked the seventh-best running back, while Kenny Iwebema is ranked the eighth-best defensive end.

RETURNING WITH HONORS

Iowa returns five players who earned all-Big Ten honors a year ago. That list includes defensive end Kenny Iwebema, who was a first team honoree. Placekicker Kyle Schlicher and running back Albert Young earned second team laurels. Defensive tackle Mitch King and safety Marcus Paschal earned honorable mention accolades. King was also named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week on Nov. 14.

DISCIPLINED HAWKEYES

Iowa was only penalized 52 times for 447 yards in 2005. The Hawkeyes ranked fourth nationally in fewest penalties per game (4.3) and fifth in fewest penalty yards per game (37.25). The Hawkeyes were penalized two times or less in four games.

TATE CLIMBS CAREER CHARTS

QB Drew Tate, who is on the Maxwell Award Watch List, enters the 2006 season ranked high in all the Iowa career passing charts. The senior ranks second in touchdown passes (43), third in completion percentage (.621), fourth in completions (458) and fifth in attempts (738), yards (5,669) and total offense (5,680). Tate is within reach to climb into second in completions, attempts, yards and total offense. The all-Big Ten performer is only 1,265 yards behind second place Chuck Hartlieb for yards and 1,175 yards behind second place Matt Rodgers for total offense. He is 92 completions and 167 attempts from tying Matt Rodgers for second. Chuck Long is Iowa's all-time leader in completions (782), attempts (1,203), yards (10,461) and total offense (10,254).

Tate garnered first team all-Big Ten laurels from the coaches and second team recognition by the media in 2004. He became the first Iowa sophomore quarterback to make first team all-Big Ten since Chuck Long was honored in 1983. Tate was also recognized as the Big Ten Player of the Year by www.collegefootballnews.com.

SCHLICHER THE KICKER

PK Kyle Schlicher returns for his senior campaign after earning second team all-conference accolades last season. Schlicher ranked first in team scoring his junior year (17-21 FGs, 43-44 PATs - 94 points), sixth in Big Ten scoring and third in league kicking points. He ranked 26th in the nation in field goals per game (1.42) and 39th in overall scoring per game (7.8). Additionally, the 94 points rank seventh-most in a single season at Iowa. His .810 field goal percentage was tops in the Big Ten.

The Ankeny native enters 2006 with 189 career points, which ranks 10th in Iowa career scoring. He is only three points from equalling Ronnie Harmon and Tim Dwight (192) for eighth place. He is 37-46 in career field goal attempts, including 6-13 from beyond 40 yards, and 70-74 on PATs. He has made two field goals or more in 11 career contests.



2006 PRESEASON NOTES



YOUNG LEADS IOWA'S RUSHING ATTACK

All-Big Ten RB Albert Young, who is on the Maxwell Award Watch List, returns after carrying the ball 249 times for 1,334 yards (111.2 avg.) and a team-best eight touchdowns in 2005. He ranked 17th nationally and fourth in the Big Ten for all games. Young, who was a second team all-Big Ten selection by the media and honorable mention pick by the coaches, averaged 125.2 yards in conference games to lead the league by 0.3 yards per game over Minnesota's Laurence Maroney (124.9). Young also ranked second in all-purpose yards in league games, only 0.9 yards behind leader Brandon Williams (177.9) of Wisconsin. Young rallied to become the first Hawkeye to lead the conference in rushing (league games only) since Dennis Mosley in 1979. The sophomore ranked fifth among all rushers after five Big Ten games and then climbed to No. 1 following big games against Northwestern, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

He rushed for over 100 yards in seven straight games (an Iowa record) and eight times in 2005 (Iowa State, Illinois, Purdue, Indiana, Michigan, Northwestern, Wisconsin and Minnesota). He averaged 139.6 yards rushing per game during the streak. Iowa has had a 1,000-yard rusher in five of the last six years. Ladell Betts (2000-01), Fred Russell (2002-03) and Albert Young (2005). Young also surpassed 200 all-purpose yards in four of the last seven games. He ranked fifth in the Big Ten and 18th nationally in all-purpose yards (146.7).

Young enters the 2006 season ranked 20th in Iowa career rushing with 1,426 yards. Another solid campaign will move him into the top ten. The junior needs only 501 yards to tie Levi Mitchell for 10th (1,927).

FERENTZ CLOSES IN ON MILESTONES

Head Coach Kirk Ferentz is only one victory from collecting his 50th overall win at the University of Iowa. Additionally, he is only three triumphs from tying Forest Evashevski (1952-60) for the second-most wins by a Hawkeye head coach. Ferentz's next conference victory will also tie Evashevski for second at Iowa with 33. Hayden Fry (1979-98) is Iowa's all-time winningest coach with 143 overall wins and 96 league victories.

IOWA NOTES

- Iowa retained possession of two traveling trophies in 2005: Floyd of Rosedale (52-28 win over Minnesota) and the Heartland Trophy (20-10 win over Wisconsin).
- Iowa has won 34 of its last 43 regular season contests.
- Iowa is one of only four teams (USC, Georgia and Florida State) in the nation to go to four straight January bowl games.
- In the last four years, Iowa is 33-3 when leading at the half and 37-2 when leading after three quarters.
- Iowa ranked second nationally in red zone proficiency in 2005, scoring 93.3 percent of the time. The Hawkeyes scored on 42 of its 45 trips inside the red zone. SMU ranked first (93.8 percent), but only marched inside the red zone 32 times.
- Iowa had its 22-game home winning streak snapped when Michigan escaped with a 23-20 overtime win on Oct. 22. The Hawkeyes boasted a 24-point winning margin during the school-record streak. The Hawkeyes have won 30 of their last 33 games in Kinnick Stadium, dating back to the end of the 2000 season. Iowa's three losses came against Iowa State (36-31 in 2002) and Michigan (32-26 in 2001 and 23-20 in overtime in 2005).
- All six of Iowa's home games in 2005 were sellouts (Ball State, Northern Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota). Iowa's 2005 home attendance average of 70,585 is a school record.
- Iowa enters the 2006 season with a consecutive home sellout streak of 17, dating back to the 2003 season. The last Hawkeye game not sold out was vs. Buffalo (9/6/03). All seven home contests this season are expected to be sellouts.
- Iowa tied for third in the Big Ten in 2005 and now has 47 first-division finishes in the conference, including 11 championships and eight additional finishes among the top three in the league. The Hawkeyes have finished among the top three in the Big Ten standings three of the last four years.

IOWA LIKES STARTING ON OFFENSE

Iowa has started on offense in 72 of its last 79 games. Iowa's games vs. Minnesota (11/19/05), vs. Michigan (10/22/05), at Purdue (10/8/05), at Minnesota (11/13/04), vs. Purdue (11/6/04), at Miami, OH (9/7/02) and at Michigan State (9/27/03) are the only contests that the Hawkeyes didn't start on offense. Iowa won five of those seven games. Iowa has started the game on offense in 74-of-85 games under Kirk Ferentz.

HOME GROWN HAWKEYES

Iowa's roster of 109 players includes 37 players from Iowa. The roster includes 12 players from Illinois; nine from Florida, New Jersey and Ohio; eight from Texas; three from Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska and Pennsylvania; two from Indiana, Missouri and Wisconsin and one from Arkansas, Georgia, South Carolina, South Dakota and Utah.

MORE THAN ONE

Ten high schools have contributed more than one player to the current Iowa football roster. The leader is Iowa City West with four. Robert E. Lee (Texas) and Ankeny (Iowa) high schools have three, while seven schools have two players on the roster.

THE NAME GAME

Iowa has two players named Davis (Calvin and Champ, no relation) and Smith (Derrick and Julian, no relation).

Mike is the most popular first name. There are four Mike's (Elgin, Humpal, Jones, Klinkenborg). There are three players named Andy (Brodell, Fenstermaker, Kuempel) and Ryan (Bain, Donahue, Majerus). There are two Adam's (Farnsworth, Shada), Austin's (Postler, Signor), Bryan's (Mattison, Ryther), Chris' (Brevi, Rowell), Kyle's (Calloway, Schlicher), Dan's (Doering, Olszta), Drew's (Gardner, Tate), Jordan's (Den Hartog, McLaughlin), Justin's (Collins, Edwards), Marcus' (Paschal, Wilson) and Tyler's (Blum, Gerstandt). Two Hawkeye players go by initials, A.J. Edds and B.J. Travers.

THE HAWKEYES, SIZE WISE

Freshman WR Paul Chaney, Jr. is the lightest Hawkeye player at 160 pounds. Sophomore OL Wesley Aeschliman is the heaviest at 315 pounds. A total of five Hawkeye players are listed over 300 pounds.

The tallest player is 6-8 OL Wesley Aeschliman, while the shortest players, at 5-9, are DB Ma'Quan Dawkins, PK Kyle Schlicher, RB Damian Sims and Chaney, Jr.

The average Hawkeye player is 6-2 and weighs 230 pounds. That is the exact height and three pounds lighter than the average Iowa player in 2005.

IOWA STATS ON THE INTERNET

Statistics and play-by-play accounts of Iowa football games are available live on the Internet. The statistical program allows viewers to read the play-by-play action just moments after it takes place, and to view all individual and team statistics while the game is in progress. The program can be accessed through www.hawkeyesports.com and then clicking on the Gametracker link. This feature is available for all games during the 2006 season.

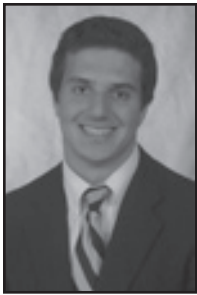

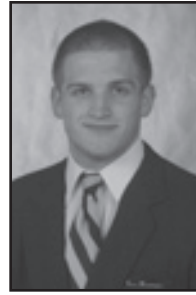

2005 FINAL NOTES



IOWA AMONG NATION'S ELITE

The 2005 football season was definitely one with extreme highs and lows for the University of Iowa program. Despite a year of triumphs and disappointments, the Hawkeyes finished the year as one of only four teams in the nation to have played in January bowl games the last four years.

The Hawkeyes finished the 2005 season with a 7-5 record and in a third place tie in the Big Ten standings. A pair of heartbreaking, last minute losses to Michigan and Northwestern is all that separated Iowa from at least a piece of its third Big Ten title in four years.

Linebacker Chad Greenway, defensive back Jovon Johnson and defensive end Ken Iwebema were named to the first all-Big Ten team. Linebacker Abdul Hodge, running back Albert Young and kicker Kyle Schlicher were named to the second team.

To finish 7-5 and having played in a January bowl game says much about the progress the Iowa program has made during the Kirk Ferentz coaching regime.

IOWA'S SENIOR CLASS POSTS 38 VICTORIES

Iowa won 38 games the last four years, a total that ties the 2001-04 teams with the most wins over any four-year span in Hawkeye history.

Additionally, Iowa won 25 conference games over the last four years, a total that ties Iowa's 1982-85 and 2001-04 teams for the most over any four year span.

IOWA AMONG THE BIG TEN'S ELITE

Iowa is tied with Michigan and Ohio State for the most conference victories the last four years. All three schools have amassed 25 wins in that time. Michigan (19) has won the most league contests the last three years, followed by Iowa (17) and Ohio State (17).

NORM PARKER FINALIST FOR BROYLES AWARD

For the second straight year, Iowa Defensive Coordinator Norm Parker was named one-of-six finalists for the Broyles Award, which recognizes the nation's top Division I assistant football coach.

Parker's defensive unit ranked 22nd nationally in scoring defense (20.0) and 29th in rushing defense (126.0).

HAWKEYES RECOGNIZED NATIONALLY

The *Sporting News* named DT Mitch King to its first all-Freshman team, while TE Tony Moeaki was an honorable mention selection. King and OL Seth Olsen were also chosen to the all-Big Ten Freshman team by the publication. King also earned FWAA, Rivals.com and collegefootballnews.com first Freshman all-America team accolades.

SI.com named LB Chad Greenway to its second all-America team, while LB Abdul Hodge garnered honorable mention laurels. Greenway also earned second team all-America accolades by the Walter Camp Football Foundation and first team laurels by Pro Football Weekly.

IOWA CITY: BEST IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

The *Sporting News* ranked Iowa City as the best college football city in America in its August 2005 publication. Iowa's success, tradition, history, fans and the city's atmosphere on game days were all considered in naming Iowa City No. 1.

IOWA FOOTBALL AWARD WINNERS

RB Albert Young and WR Ed Hinkel were named Iowa's offensive MVPs, while linebackers Chad Greenway and Abdul Hodge were named defensive MVPs.

PK Kyle Schlicher was named the Special Team Specialist of the Year, while LB Zach Gabelmann and Charles Godfrey were named the overall Special Teams Players of the Year.

Iowa's permanent team captains for 2005 included LB Chad Greenway, LB Abdul Hodge, WR Ed Hinkel, OL Brian Ferentz and RB Marcus Schnoor.

MAKING THE LIST

The 2005 Iowa team cracked the school record books in three offensive categories. The Hawkeyes rank fourth in total offense per game (432.4), fifth in passing offense per game (257.8) and 10th in scoring offense (30.0).

Individually, RB Albert Young ranks fourth in single season rushing yards (1,334), QB Drew Tate ranks fifth in passing yards (2,828) and total yards (2,869), WR Clinton Solomon ranks 13th in receiving yards (800), PK Kyle Schlicher ranks seventh in scoring (94), LB Abdul Hodge ranks second in tackles (158), and LB Chad Greenway ranks third in tackles (147).

FOUR HAWKEYES EARN ACADEMIC HONOR

OL Mike Elgin earned first team academic all-America accolades. He was one of only three Big Ten athletes to be named to the first team.

Elgin, DB Adam Shada, LB Mike Klinkenborg and P Andy Fenstermaker were named to the District VII Academic All-America squad. Elgin, a mechanical engineering major, Shada, a pre-business major and Klinkenborg, a pre-elementary education major, earned first team accolades. Fenstermaker is an elementary education major and earned second team laurels. This is the first honor for Shada, Klinkenborg and Fenstermaker, while it is the second for Elgin.

HAWKEYES EARN ACADEMIC LAURELS

Fifteen Hawkeyes were named to the 2005 Academic All-Big Ten team. DB Adam Shada, DL Matt Kroul, DB Andrew Becker, P Andy Fenstermaker, LB Bret Chinander, QB Cy Phillips, LS Daniel Olszta, FB Paul Wilson, LB Mike Klinkenborg, and FB Kevin Sherlock earned the honor for the first time. TE C.J. Barkema, OL Mike Elgin and LB Mike Humpal earned league academic laurels for a second time. WR Matt Melloy and Ryan Majerus earned the honor for a third team.

DISCIPLINED HAWKEYES

Iowa was penalized 52 times for 447 yards in 2005. The Hawkeyes ranked fourth nationally in fewest penalties per game (4.3) and fifth in fewest penalty yards per game (37.25). The Hawkeyes were penalized two times or fewer in four games. Iowa was flagged a season-high 11 times for 94 yards vs. Michigan.

YOUNG ESTABLISHED SCHOOL RECORD

Albert Young rushed for 100 yards or more in Iowa's final seven regular season contests to establish a school record for consecutive games of 100 yards rushing or more. Overall, Young rushed for 100 yards or more eight times in 2005. The previous record was four games set three times. Sedrick Shaw surpassed 100 yards four consecutive games in 1995, while Tavian Banks eclipsed 100 yards four straight games twice during the 1997 season.

Young's streak started against Illinois (102) and continued against Purdue (165), Indiana (125), Michigan (153), Northwestern (202), Wisconsin (127) and Minnesota (103). He averaged 139.6 yards rushing per game during the streak.

He carried the ball 249 times for 1,334 yards in 2005. Iowa has had a 1,000-yard rusher in five of the last six years. Ladell Betts (2000-01), Fred Russell (2002-03) and Albert Young (2005).

HODGE JOINS ELITE LIST

LB Abdul Hodge joins Larry Station (1982-85) and Tom Rusk (1976-78) as the only Hawkeyes players to lead an Iowa team in tackles three consecutive seasons. Hodge amassed a team-best 141 tackles in 2003, 116 in 2004 and 158 in 2005.

MOVING THE CHAINS

WR Ed Hinkel touched the ball 41 times (40 receptions, 1 rush) on offense in nine games, with 29 of his 41 touches going for first downs. All seven of his receptions in Iowa's regular season finale moved the chains, including catching a career-high four touchdowns. Seven of his nine receptions vs. Florida in the Outback Bowl were for first downs.

Hinkel caught six touchdowns in Iowa's last two games. He caught a Kinnick Stadium record four vs. Minnesota on Nov. 19, while he tied a Hawkeye bowl record with two vs. Florida in the Outback Bowl.

FAMILY AFFAIR

Iowa Head Coach Kirk Ferentz and his son, Brian, were believed to be one of only five father-son duos in Division I in 2005. They joined Art Briles and his son Kendal from Houston, Rickey Bustle and his son Brad from Louisiana-Lafayette, Bill Cubit and his son Ryan from Western Michigan and Mike Bellotti and his son Luke from Oregon.

- Iowa's offense produced 20 points or more in all but two games – a 23-3 loss at Iowa State and a 31-6 defeat at Ohio State.
- Iowa had its 22-game home winning streak snapped when Michigan escaped with a 23-20 overtime win on Oct. 22. The Hawkeyes boasted a 24-point winning margin during the school-record streak. The Hawkeyes have won 30 of their last 33 games in Kinnick Stadium, dating back to the end of the 2000 season. Iowa's three losses came against Iowa State (36-31 in 2002) and Michigan (32-26 in 2001 and 23-20 in overtime in 2005).
- The Hawkeyes sold out their last home game against Minnesota, marking the 17th straight Kinnick Stadium sellout dating back to the 2003 season. The last Iowa game not sold out was vs. Buffalo (9/6/03).
- Michigan, Ohio State and Iowa are the only Big Ten teams to have posted seven wins or more the last five years -- Ohio State (49), Iowa (45) and Michigan (44).
- Iowa's 2005 home attendance average (70,585) is a new school record.
- Iowa retained possession of two traveling trophies: Floyd of Rosedale (52-28 win over Minnesota) and the Heartland Trophy (20-10 win over Wisconsin).
- Iowa opponents converted only six of their 14 field goal attempts (.429).
- Iowa scored touchdowns on its first possession in seven of 12 games. The Hawkeyes posted touchdowns on their first possession in games against Ball State, Northern Iowa, Illinois, Purdue, Michigan, Northwestern and Minnesota.
- Only two Iowa opponents scored (both touchdowns) on their opening possession (Purdue and Ohio State).
- Instant Replay was used at least once in every Iowa game this season except games vs. Ball State and Northern Iowa.
- Iowa scored touchdowns on five consecutive possessions vs. Minnesota and Ball State.
- Six of Iowa's 2005 opponents played in bowls (Iowa State, Ohio State, Michigan, Northwestern, Wisconsin and Minnesota).

- Norm Parker was named Defensive Coordinator of the Week by the Master Coaches Survey after the Hawkeyes limited Wisconsin to a season-low 10 points and then-fourth-ranked RB Brian Calhoun to a season-low 18 yards. Iowa yielded only 94 second-half yards, 68 of which came on the last drive in the final minutes of the game.
- Hawkeye RB Damian Sims carried the ball 30 times for 296 yards (9.9 yards per carry). Sims tallied touchdown runs of 71, 66, 39 and 30 yards in 2005. He also recorded Iowa's longest kickoff return of the season (47 yards vs. Florida).
- Sixty of Iowa opponents' 151 offensive drives started inside the 20-yard line (39.7%). Iowa ranked first in the conference in kickoff coverage.
- In the last four years, Iowa is 33-3 when leading at the half and 37-2 when leading after three quarters.
- Iowa's three quarterbacks, Drew Tate (9-10), Jason Manson (9-9) and Cy Phillips (1-1) combined for 19-20 (.950) passes for 200 yards and two touchdowns vs. Ball State.
- Iowa's 56-point win over Ball State was the 26th-largest margin of victory in school history and largest margin under Ferentz.
- Scoring their first career touchdowns in 2005 were Jovon Johnson, Shonn Greene, Sam Brownlee, Herb Grigsby, Damian Sims, Ryan Majerus and Champ Davis.
- Eighteen players caught at least one pass, while 15 different Hawkeyes recorded at least one rushing attempt.
- OL Brian Ferentz was a game captain for 11-of-12 games. Purdue was the only game he wasn't a captain.

BIG PLAY HAWKEYES

Iowa posted 56 offensive plays of 20 yards or more, 18 on the ground and 38 via the pass. RB Damian Sims produced Iowa's three-longest running plays of 2005. He ran for a career-long 71-yard touchdown vs. Minnesota, 66-yard score vs. Illinois and a 39-yard touchdown vs. Northern Iowa. The Hawkeyes' longest pass was a 78-yarder from QB Drew Tate to WR Clinton Solomon at Purdue. Tate also connected with Solomon for a 71-yard score vs. Northern Iowa. Iowa posted a season-high nine plays (8 pass, 1 rush) of 20 yards or more vs. Minnesota.

Iowa's defense allowed 41 offensive plays of 20 yards or more.

IOWA BY QUARTERS

Iowa outscored its 2005 opponents 119-37 in the first quarter, 95-79 in the second, 61-41 in the third and 82-77 in the fourth. Hawkeye opponents owned a 6-3 edge in the first overtime period.

Iowa outscored its opponents 91-0 in the first quarter in its six home games in 2005.

ON THE AVERAGE

Iowa averaged 6.8 yards on 393 first down plays, 5.9 yards on 258 second down plays, 5.6 yards on 161 third down plays and 6.8 yards on eight fourth down plays.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Iowa scored a total of 45 points following opponent turnovers.

Hawkeye opponents scored a total of 47 points off Iowa turnovers.

AVERAGE SCORING DRIVES

Iowa's 58 scoring drives averaged 6.8 plays, 58.9 yards and 2:31 elapsed time. Forty-one of Iowa's 58 scoring drives covered 50 yards or more.

Iowa opponents recorded 33 scoring drives, averaging 9.2 plays, 67.7 yards and 3:41 elapsed time. Six of the 33 scoring drives followed Iowa turnovers.

IOWA IN THE RED ZONE

The Hawkeyes marched inside the red zone 45 times and scored 42 of those times (93.3%). Iowa scored on its first four red zone possessions vs. Northern Iowa and its first 10 of the season before turning the ball over on downs late in the third quarter with a large lead. Twenty-seven of the 42 scores (61.5%) were for touchdowns. The Hawkeyes failed to reach the red zone at Iowa State, marking the first time Iowa did not reach the red zone at least once since a loss at Nebraska in 1999 – Coach Ferentz's first game as Iowa's head coach.

Hawkeye opponents advanced inside the red zone 35 times and scored only 25 times (71.4%).

Iowa's red zone offense (93.3%) and defense (71.4%) both were tops in the conference.

IOWA LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

Iowa's Leadership Council for the 2005 season included 13 players, including five seniors, three juniors, two sophomores, two redshirt freshmen and one true freshman. Brian Ferentz, Ed Hinkel, Chad Greenway, Abdul Hodge and Marcus Schnoor were named permanent team captains for 2005.

The Leadership Council for 2005 included seniors Ferentz, Greenway, Hinkel, Hodge and Jovon Johnson; juniors Mike Elgin, Jason Manson and Drew Tate; sophomores Bryan Mattison and Mike Klinkenborg; redshirt freshmen Matt Kroul and Seth Olsen and true freshman Tony Moeaki.

Iowa had 12 players, six on offense and defense, start all 12 games in 2005. That list included OL Mike Jones, OL Brian Ferentz, OL Mike Elgin, OL Marshal Yanda, QB Drew Tate, FB Tom Busch, LB Abdul Hodge, LB Chad Greenway, LB Edmond Miles, DE Kenny Iwebema, DT Matt Kroul and DE Bryan Mattison.

GAME RECAP

Iowa cruised to a 56-0 win over Ball State for its fifth-consecutive season opening victory. The shutout was the Hawkeyes' first since blanking Kent State (51-0) in the 2001 season opener.

The Hawkeyes scored points on seven of their eight first half possessions, with all seven scoring drives resulting in touchdowns. RB Marcus Schnoor scored on a one-yard run to open the scoring, followed by a RB Albert Young two-yard plunge.

Jovon Johnson tallied Iowa's third score on a 90-yard punt return. The return came following a quick kick by Ball State QB Joey Lynch from shotgun formation on fourth down. The punt return is the fourth longest in school history and the third longest in Kinnick Stadium.

QB Drew Tate connected with WR Clinton Solomon for a seven-yard touchdown to give the Hawkeyes a 28-0 advantage at the end of the first quarter.

Iowa scored three more times in the second quarter on a 33-yard reception by WR Herb Grigsby and a pair of RB Sam Brownlee runs (11 yards and one yard). After a scoreless third quarter, RB Shonn Greene became the eighth Hawkeye to score a point on a six-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Hawkeye quarterbacks combined for 19-20 passing for 200 yards and two touchdowns. Tate completed 9-10 passes for 99 yards and two touchdowns, Jason Mason completed 9-9 passes for 92 yards and Cy Phillips completed his only attempt for nine yards.

Greene led all rushers, carrying the ball 18 times for 116 yards, while Young gained 61 yards on just five carries. Moeaki led all Iowa receivers with three receptions for 28 yards.

Iowa's defense recovered one fumble and collected seven tackles for loss, including three sacks. DB Devan Moylan recorded a team-best six tackles (4 solo) and DE Bryan Mattison had five tackles.

GAME RECAP

Iowa State scored all 23 of its points off Iowa turnovers en route to a 23-3 victory over the Hawkeyes in Jack Trice Stadium. The victory snapped a two-game Iowa winning streak over Iowa State and the Cyclones regained possession of the Cy-Hawk Trophy.

Iowa State WR Austin Flynn caught a 12-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter after the Cyclones recovered a fumble on the Hawkeyes' 12-yard line (PAT attempt missed). Iowa State added a 29-yard field goal and returned an interception 28 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter to take a 16-0 advantage into half.

Hawkeye starting quarterback Drew Tate was forced to leave the game in the second quarter after suffering a concussion on a tackle attempt following an interception. Tate finished the game completing 5-11 passes for 57 yards.

Iowa scored its only points when PK Kyle Schlicher split the uprights for a 44-yard field goal on the Hawkeyes' first possession of the second half. The Hawkeye offense was sluggish most of the game, turning the ball over five times (3 fumbles, 2 interceptions).

Iowa State scored its final points on a two-yard touchdown run with 3:50 left in the fourth quarter.

WR Scott Chandler caught a career-high seven passes for 72 yards, while RB Albert Young rushed 18 times for a career and game-high 140 yards. Reserve QB Jason Manson completed 10-31 passes for a career-high 117 yards and one interception. He also rushed nine times for 57 yards.

Linebackers Chad Greenway and Abdul Hodge both recorded 13 tackles, while DB Marcus Paschal added 10. DE Mike Follett contributed five tackles, including a career-high two sacks.

GAME RECAP

Iowa scored on five of its six first half possessions en route to a 45-21 victory over Northern Iowa in Kinnick Stadium. The win was the Hawkeyes' 20th straight home win, which ties the school record.

The Hawkeyes scored the first 21 points on two RB Albert Young touchdown runs and a DB Jovon Johnson interception return for a score. Young posted scoring runs of 10 and one yard in the first quarter, while Johnson returned his 15th career pick 18 yards for a touchdown.

Northern Iowa scored a touchdown to trim Iowa's lead to 21-7, but the Hawkeyes scored the next 17 points. PK Kyle Schlicher connected on a 23-yard field goal and WR Clinton Solomon caught touchdowns passes of 11 and 71 yards from QB Drew Tate to stretch Iowa's lead to 38-7.

The Panthers added two fourth quarter touchdowns, before Iowa RB Damian Sims scampered for a 39-yard touchdown with 30 seconds left to give the Hawkeyes a 45-21 victory. The touchdown was the first of Sims' career.

Tate completed 15-18 passes for 247 yards and two touchdowns. The 247 yards moved him over 3,000 career yards passing and into seventh on Iowa's career passing chart. He also rushed three times for 33 yards. Young led the Hawkeye ground attack, recording 13 carries for 97 yards and two scores. Solomon posted four catches 114 yards and two touchdowns, while WR Ed Hinkel contributed five receptions for 42 yards.

Iowa's linebacking duo of Chad Greenway and Abdul Hodge spearheaded the Hawkeye defense. Greenway collected a game and career-high 20 tackles (12 solo), including one for loss and one pass break-up to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors for the third time in his career. Hodge recorded 12 stops (6 solo) and recovered his sixth career fumble.

GAME RECAP

Iowa lost its fifth consecutive game at Ohio State with a 31-6 setback in Ohio Stadium.

The Hawkeye offense was unable to generate any offense as the Ohio State defense forced Iowa to punt on its first seven possessions. Iowa was only able to score on two PK Kyle Schlicher field goals of 52 and 37 yards in the third and fourth quarters, respectively. The 52-yarder is a career long for Schlicher.

Ohio State scored touchdowns on two of its first three possessions to grab an early 14-0 advantage. The Buckeyes lead 17-0 at the half and added touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters to put the game out of reach.

Ohio State had 530 yards total offense, including 314 yards rushing, and maintained possession for 39:23. Iowa's offense generated only 137 yards total offense, including -9 yards rushing. The Hawkeyes were only able to convert 1-of-12 third downs.

QB Drew Tate completed 22-39 passes for 146 yards. RB Albert Young rushed 10 times for 25 yards. WR Ed Hinkel caught a team-high six passes for 47 yards - all in the second half.

Highlighting Iowa's special teams play was punter Andy Fenstermaker. Fenstermaker averaged 43.4 yards on seven punts, including downing three punts inside the 20. Ohio State had just two returns for no yards.

The Hawkeye defense was able to force five Ohio State fumbles, but only recovered two. The two fumbles recovered were both inside the five-yard line to stop scoring threats. LB Chad Greenway collected a game-high 14 tackles (8 solo). LB Abdul Hodge tallied nine stops (4 solo) and also forced a fumble. DE Kenny Iwebema recorded six tackles (4 solo), including one sack and one forced fumble.

Iowa won its school record 21st consecutive home game with a 35-7 victory over Illinois on homecoming in Kinnick Stadium. The win was also the Hawkeyes' sixth straight homecoming victory.

The Hawkeyes jumped on the Fighting Illini early, scoring touchdowns on their first two possessions. RB Marcus Schnoor scored his second touchdown of the season on a three-yard run, while WR Ed Hinkel scored on a 20-yard reverse to put the Hawkeyes up 14-0.

Illinois threatened to score three times in the first half, all resulting in missed field goals on consecutive possessions. PK Jason Reda had two field goals blocked (44 and 31 yards) by Iowa DE Kenny Iwebema and missed a 21-yarder wide left. The two blocked field goals tie an Iowa record for blocked kicks by an individual in a single game.

After a scoreless second quarter, Iowa scored on its first three second-half possessions. Hinkel scored his second touchdown of the game on a 10-yard pass from QB Drew Tate, followed by a TE Scott Chandler seven-yard touchdown reception and a RB Damian Sims 66-yard scoring run. Iowa posted season highs in first downs (25) and rushing yards (301).

Tate completed 17-22 passes for 175 yards and two touchdowns. It marked the 11th time in his career that he has thrown two touchdowns or more in a game, including eight of his last 10 games dating back to last season.

RB Albert Young led the Hawkeyes in rushing and receiving. Young carried the ball 13 times for 102 yards and caught four passes for 51 yards.

Defensively, Iowa had four players record double digit tackles. LB Abdul Hodge collected a game and career-high 18 tackles (11 solo), including two for loss to earn Big Ten co-Defensive Player of the Week for the first time in his career. LB Chad Greenway registered 15 stops (10 solo) and two sacks. DB Miguel Merrick posted 13 tackles (7 solo), while LB Edmond Miles tallied a career-high 10 stops (6 solo), including one for loss. Additionally, DB Jovon Johnson intercepted his second pass of the season and 16th of his career.

Iowa snapped a four-game winless streak at Purdue with a 34-17 victory. The win was the Hawkeyes' first under Head Coach Kirk Ferentz at Ross-Ade Stadium.

Iowa QB Drew Tate celebrated his 21st birthday in style, throwing for a career-high 357 yards and matching a career high with three touchdown passes. Tate engineered three straight scoring drives to start the game while completing 19-33 passes in the game.

Tate connected with WR Clinton Solomon on Iowa's opening possession for a season-long 78-yard scoring pass play. On Iowa's next possession, TE Ryan Majerus hauled in a three-yard Tate pass for his first career score. PK Kyle Schlicher completed Iowa's third offensive possession with a 33-yard field goal. Schlicher finished the game with a season-high 14 points (4 field goals and 2 PATs).

With Iowa clinging to a 23-17 fourth-quarter lead, LB Edmond Miles intercepted his first career pass in the Iowa end zone to thwart Purdue's attempt to reclaim the lead. The Hawkeyes converted the game's only turnover into a touchdown when Solomon scored on a 36-yard reception from Tate to stretch Iowa's lead to 29-17. Iowa added a team safety and a field goal late in the fourth quarter.

RB Albert Young posted career highs in rushing yards (165), all-purpose yards (217) and rushing attempts (36). Solomon caught five passes for a career-high 166 yards and two touchdowns.

Iowa outscored Purdue 17-3 in the second half and maintained possession 21:31 to Purdue's 8:29 over the final two periods.

LB Chad Greenway accumulated 10 tackles (9 solo) and one pass break-up and DB Jovon Johnson collected a career-high nine stops (8 solo) to lead the Hawkeye defense. The Hawkeye defense posted a season-high eight pass break-ups en route to victory.

GAME RECAP

Iowa claimed its 22nd consecutive home victory with a 38-21 win over Indiana in Kinnick Stadium. The win was Iowa's third straight over the Hoosiers.

The Hawkeyes jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter on a WR Matt Melloy eight-yard touchdown reception from QB Drew Tate and a 31-yard RB Albert Young scoring run. Indiana cut the deficit in half on a QB Blake Powers one-yard plunge, but the Hawkeyes responded with a PK Kyle Schlicher 35-yard field goal as the first half clock expired to take a 17-7 advantage.

After an Indiana three-and-out on its first second-half possession, Iowa got a quick strike when Tate connected with WR Clinton Solomon on a 42-yard touchdown pass. Indiana rallied and scored 14 straight points to trim the Hawkeye lead to 24-21 with 9:51 remaining in the game. Iowa scored the game's final 14 points on touchdown runs of 26 and 30 yards by Young and RB Damian Sims, respectively.

Indiana dominated the stat sheet, but lost in the final score. The Hoosiers posted 101 plays and maintained possession for 40:09, compared to Iowa's 19:51. Powers completed 37-57 passes for 360 yards and two touchdowns. The 37 pass completions established a new Kinnick Stadium record, besting Iowa's Scott Mullen's 36 pass completions vs. Indiana (10/23/99).

Tate completed 12-24 passes for 265 yards and two touchdowns, with no interceptions. Young rushed for over 100 yards for the third straight game, accumulating 125 yards on 25 attempts. TE Scott Chandler caught four passes for 87 yards, while Solomon caught three passes for 79 yards and one score.

For the second game this season, Iowa had four defensive players record double-digit tackles. LB Abdul Hodge matched a career high with 18 stops (11 solo). DB Jovon Johnson collected a career-high 17 tackles (13 solo). Michigan out-scored Iowa 10-3 in the second half as the Wolverines outlasted the Hawkeyes 23-20 in overtime to snap Iowa's 22-game home winning streak in Kinnick Stadium.

Iowa scored touchdowns on two of its first three possessions to grab a quick 14-7 advantage in the first half. However, Michigan's defense clamped down and allowed only 107 combined yards on Iowa's next eight possessions.

Trailing 14-7, Michigan scored the game's only third-quarter points on a 26-yard field goal to trim the Hawkeye lead to 14-10. On Michigan's second fourth-quarter possession, WR Steve Breaston scored a 52-yard touchdown on a screen pass to claim a 17-14 advantage.

Trailing by three points with 2:42 left, Iowa QB Drew Tate engineered a nine-play, 74-yard drive that culminated with a PK Kyle Schlicher 32-yard field goal as time expired to send the game into the first overtime contest in Kinnick Stadium history.

Schlicher converted a 28-yard field goal on Iowa's overtime possession. Michigan followed with a touchdown on a one-yard plunge on third down to win the game and hand the Hawkeyes their first home conference setback since Michigan defeated Iowa (32-26) in 2001. Iowa is now 2-1 in overtime games.

Tate completed 27-39 passes for 288 yards and two touchdowns. RB Albert Young rushed 30 times for 153 yards. TE Scott Chandler caught eight passes for 90 yards and WR Clinton Solomon caught eight passes for 76 yards. WR Herb Grigsby caught five passes for 66 yards and scored Iowa's two touchdowns.

Linebackers Abdul Hodge and Chad Greenway led the Hawkeye defense. Hodge collected a career-high 20 tackles (14 solo) and also forced a fumble, while Greenway registered 16 stops (10 solo). DB Miguel Merrick accumulated five tackles and returned an interception 20 yards.

GAME RECAP

Iowa surrendered two late touchdowns as Northwestern overcame a 13-point fourth quarter deficit to outlast the Hawkeyes 28-27 at Ryan Field.

Iowa scored on four of its six first-half possessions, but the Wildcats stayed within striking distance and pulled out the come-from-behind victory. The loss snapped a three-game Iowa winning streak over the Wildcats.

PK Kyle Schlicher missed a 41-yard field goal with 5:35 remaining in the fourth quarter that would have extended Iowa's lead to 16 points. Two possessions later, RB Tyrell Sutton culminated a 77-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run to trim Iowa's advantage to 27-21 with 2:10 left.

Following the score, Northwestern attempted and recovered an on-side kick and proceeded to drive 47 yards on six plays, with QB Brett Basanez connecting with WR Ross Lane for a nine-yard game-winning touchdown.

RB Albert Young posted career highs in rushing attempts (38), rushing yards (202), all-purpose yards (274) and kickoff return yardage (70). The sophomore also scored two touchdowns. The 38 rushing attempts rank as the fourth most in a single game at Iowa, while the 202 rushing yards tie as the ninth-most in a single game. Young's 202 yards rushing increased his season total to 1,070 yards, becoming only the fourth Iowa sophomore running back to eclipse 1,000 yards in a season. It also marked the first time a Hawkeye rushed for 200 yards or more in a single game since Tavian Banks amassed 314 yards vs. Tulsa on Sept. 13, 1997.

QB Drew Tate completed 21-35 passes for 273 yards and rushed for one touchdown. Wide receivers Herb Grigsby and Andy Brodell posted career highs in receptions and receiving yards. Grigsby caught a team-high seven passes for 84 yards, while Brodell caught four passes for 46 yards.

Iowa posted season highs in total plays (81) and first downs (27) and had no turnovers for the third time in nine games.

Linebackers Abdul Hodge (12 tackles) and Chad Greenway (11) led the Hawkeye defense. Iowa collected two interceptions for the first time in nine games. DB Adam Shada intercepted his team-leading third pass, while DT Matt Kroul intercepted his first career pass.

A strong second half lifted the Hawkeyes to a 20-10 come-from-behind victory over Wisconsin in Camp Randall Stadium in Barry Alvarez's last home game as Badger head coach. The victory snapped a two-game losing streak and also snapped Wisconsin's 11-game home winning streak. Iowa also retained the Heartland Trophy, which was introduced as a traveling trophy in 2004.

Wisconsin scored the game's first 10 points in the first quarter before Iowa got a 35-yard field goal from Kyle Schlicher in the second quarter to trail 10-3 at halftime.

Most of the second half was played in a driving rain storm, in which the Hawkeye offense and defense came alive. Iowa scored touchdowns on two of its first three third-quarter offensive possessions to claim a 17-10 advantage. FB Champ Davis caught a six-yard touchdown reception from QB Drew Tate, recording his first career TD. TE Ryan Majerus recorded his second career touchdown on a 13-yard pass from Tate.

Iowa's defense suffocated the Badger offense the entire second half, limiting Wisconsin to only 39 total yards in the third quarter and 55 in the fourth, for a total of 94 yards in the second half. The Badgers gained 68 of their 94 second half yards on their final drive in the closing minutes. Nine of Wisconsin's 12 offensive possessions resulted in punts, including eight straight. Iowa limited RB Brian Calhoun, who entered the game as the nation's fourth-leading running back, to a season-low 18 yards on 15 carries, and also stopped his 10-game consecutive scoring streak.

Tate completed 21-34 passes for 224 yards and two touchdowns. RB Albert Young rushed 26 times for 127 yards and also caught four passes for 45 yards. WR Ed Hinkel returned to action after missing the previous three games due to injury, and collected four receptions for 50 yards.

LB Chad Greenway accumulated a game-high 12 tackles (7 solo). Iowa's defensive line combined for five QB sacks. Mitch King and Kenny Iwebema each collected two sacks, while Ryan Bain had one sack. King was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the first time in his career.

Iowa led from start to finish en route to a 52-28 victory over Minnesota on "Senior Day" in Kinnick Stadium. The victory keeps Floyd of Rosedale in Iowa City a fifth consecutive year. The 52 points is the second-most by Iowa in the 99-game series history.

Iowa finished in a four-way tie for third place in the Big Ten, marking the fifth-straight season it recorded an upper division league finish.

For the second straight year Iowa scored on its first five possessions against Minnesota. The Hawkeyes scored on six of their seven first half possessions, including touchdowns on their first five.

WR Ed Hinkel shined in his final game in Kinnick Stadium, collecting career highs in receptions (7), receiving yards (151) and touchdowns (4). Hinkel's efforts earned him Big Ten co-Offensive Player of the Week honors.

Running backs Albert Young and Damian Sims both rushed for over 100 yards. Young carried the ball 21 times for 103 yards and one touchdown, while Sims collected 104 yards and one score on eight attempts. His 71-yard touchdown run in the second quarter is a career long and the longest rush from scrimmage this season for the Hawkeyes.

QB Drew Tate completed 19-32 passes for 351 yards and a career-high four touchdowns. Tate topped 300 yards passing for the second time this season and fifth time in his career.

Iowa posted season highs in total yards (613) and first downs (28). The 613 yards is the most gained since the Hawkeyes racked-up 602 total yards vs. Northwestern on Nov. 10, 2001.

Defensively, LB Abdul Hodge collected a game-high 19 tackles (13 solo), while LB Chad Greenway registered 15 tackles (10 solo). DB Jovon Johnson, who is the NCAA Division I active career interceptions leader, intercepted his 17th career pass and also registered nine tackles (6 solo).

WR Ed Hinkel caught touchdown passes of four and 14 yards from Tate, while PK Kyle Schlicher converted a 45-yard field goal to cut the Florida lead to 34-21 with 1:24 left.

Iowa's comeback fell short as the Hawkeyes failed to recover an onside kick. On the previous play, Iowa recovered an onside kick, only to have it flagged for offside.

Tate completed 32-55 passes for 346 yards and three scores; the 32 pass completions and 55 attempts established Iowa bowl records. Hinkel caught a team-high nine passes for 87 yards and tied an Iowa bowl record with two touchdown receptions. Damian Sims tied an Iowa bowl record with five kickoff returns for 107 yards.

Florida QB Chris Leak completed 25-40 passes for 278 yards and two scores. Leak's two touchdown passes went to Outback Bowl MVP, WR Dallas Baker, who caught 10 passes for 147 yards.

LB Abdul Hodge amassed an Outback Bowl and Iowa bowl record 19 tackles (14 solo) to lead the Hawkeye defense. DB Antwan Allen and DB Marcus Paschal each added 10 tackles, while LB Chad Greenway recorded nine stops. Allen became the first Iowa player to start in four January bowl games.

IOWA FOOTBALL HISTORY



- 1889**
Played first intercollegiate game.
- 1899**
Admitted to Western Conference of Big Ten on Dec. 1. First undefeated season (8-0-1) was recorded under Coach Alden Knipe. Hawkeyes posted shutouts in every game except 5-5 tie with Chicago.
- 1900**
Second consecutive undefeated season highlighted by five shutouts to open the year. A 5-5 tie at Northwestern was only blemish.
- 1901**
Loss to Minnesota ended string of 23 games in a row without defeat.
- 1919**
Lester Belding became Iowa's first consensus all American.
- 1921**
First unbeaten and untied team (7-0) won an outright Big Ten title under direction of Coach Howard Jones. Aubrey Devine was the consensus all American quarterback.
- 1922**
Another perfect season (7-0) included outright conference championship and selection of consensus all American FB Gordon Locke.
- 1923**
Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.
- 1939**
Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the legendary Ironmen team to 6-1-1 mark. Halfback Nile Kinnick was recipient of the Heisman, Maxwell and Walter Camp Trophies.
- 1955**
Guard Calvin Jones received the Outland Award and was consensus all American for the second year in a row.
- 1956**
Won the Big Ten race and appeared in first Rose Bowl for Coach Forest Evashevski. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.
- 1957**
Consensus all American tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.
- 1958**
Big Ten champions again and made California a victim in the Rose Bowl. Honors included No. 1 ranking by the Football Writers and Grantland Rice Trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Consensus all American Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1960**
Shared Big Ten title with Minnesota and compiled an 8-1 record.
- 1963**
Notre Dame game was cancelled following the assassination of President Kennedy.
- 1964**
Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten offensive records were broken despite 3-6 season.
- 1968**
Set Big Ten scoring and total offense marks. Ed Podolak rushed for an Iowa record 286 yards (17 attempts) against Northwestern.
- 1972**
Iowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.
- 1981**
Coach Hayden Fry's third season produced a Big Ten co championship and Rose Bowl berth, earning Iowa's first winning season in 19 years. DE Andre Tippett and P Reggie Roby were consensus all Americans.
- 1982**
Fourth straight first division Big Ten finish and a 28-22 Peach Bowl win over Tennessee.
- 1983**
Offense breaks 35 school records on way to 9-3 mark and third straight bowl trip (Gator) under Coach Hayden Fry.
- 1984**
Played in a postseason bowl game for the fourth straight year, defeating Texas 55-17 in the inaugural Freedom Bowl. Shut out Michigan for the first time since 1929 and won first game in 28 years at Purdue.
- 1985**
Won a school record 10 games enroute to the Big Ten championship and played in the Rose Bowl (vs. UCLA) for the second time in five seasons. Spent five weeks ranked No. 1 in the nation. QB Chuck Long (winner of the Maxwell Trophy and Davey O'Brien Quarterback Award) and Larry Station were consensus all Americans.
- 1986**
Champion of the ninth annual Holiday Bowl with a 39-38 triumph over San Diego State. A 9-3 overall mark helped Hayden Fry's Hawkeyes win at least eight games for the sixth consecutive season.
- 1987**
Ten victories tied the school record and included Holiday Bowl triumph over Wyoming (20-19). Six game winning streak to end the year earned Iowa its fifth consecutive Top 20 finish.
- 1988**
Iowa played North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl, the school's eighth straight postseason appearance. A 6-4-3 season set an Iowa record for ties. TE Marv Cook was a consensus all American.
- 1989**
A natural grass playing surface (PAT) was installed in Kinnick Stadium.
- 1990**
The capacity of Kinnick Stadium was expanded to 70,220. Iowa earned its third Big Ten title and Rose Bowl berth under Hayden Fry, posting an 8-4 overall record. Iowa's "Road Warriors" earned the trip to Pasadena by defeating Michigan State, Michigan and Illinois, all on the road. Hawkeyes ended season ranked 18th nationally. RB Nick Bell was named Big Ten MVP.
- 1991**
Iowa tied the school record of 10 wins, posting a 10-1-1 record. The only loss came at the hands of Big Ten champion Michigan as the Hawkeyes were 7-1 in league play. The Hawkeyes made their third appearance in the Holiday Bowl, which ended in a 13-13 tie with BYU. DE Leroy Smith earned consensus all America status and was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year. Iowa ended the season ranked 10th nationally by both the AP and CNN/USA Today.
- 1992**
Iowa appeared in its second Kickoff Classic and hosted No. 1 Miami (FL) in first night game ever played in Kinnick Stadium. Iowa's fifth place Big Ten finish was the 13th first-division finish for Iowa in 14 seasons under Hayden Fry.
- 1993**
Iowa closed the regular season with four straight wins to earn an invitation to the inaugural Alamo Bowl in San Antonio, TX. Iowa lost to California (37-3) in the bowl game and ended the season with a 6-6 record. Iowa's 21-3 win over Minnesota in the season finale not only assured the bowl invitation, but was also win No. 200 in the coaching career of Hayden Fry.
- 1994**
Iowa again closed the season fast, earning three wins and a tie in the last four games to post a 5-5-1 mark. The Hawkeyes fought back from injuries at the quarterback position to score 98 points in the final two games, wins over Northwestern and Minnesota. Five Iowa quarterbacks were injured during the year.



1995

Following the trend of the past few seasons, Iowa closed fast, winning its final two games of the regular season to earn an invitation to the Sun Bowl. Iowa ended the year in fine fashion, racing past Pac-10 co-champion Washington 38-18 in the Sun Bowl and ending the year with an 8-4 record, including a 4-4 Big Ten mark. Iowa was ranked in the top 25 in the final polls by the Associated Press, UPI and CNN/USA Today.

1996

Iowa posted a 9-3 record, including a 27-0 win over Texas Tech in the Builder's Square Alamo Bowl. The Hawkeyes posted a 6-2 Big Ten record, earning a tie for third place with Penn State. Iowa ended the season ranked 18th in the nation in both the AP poll and the CNN/USA Today coaches poll. PR Tim Dwight and DT Jared DeVries earned All-American honors and RB Sedrick Shaw rushed for over 1,000 yards for the third consecutive season.

1997

If ever the Hawkeyes had a season that could have been, 1997 would be the year. Iowa posted a 7-5 overall record (4-4 in the Big Ten) and participated in the Norwest Sun Bowl, earning its third straight bowl invitation. But narrow road losses at national champion Michigan (28-24), Wisconsin (13-10) and Northwestern (15-14) put a damper on what could have been a great season. RB Tavian Banks, WR Tim Dwight and DT Jared DeVries earned All-American honors and Dwight led the nation in punt returns.

1998

On November 25, 1998, Hayden Fry announced his retirement as head coach after a successful 20-year career with the Hawkeyes. Fry had a record of 143-89-6 at Iowa and a 232-178-10 mark over his 37 seasons as a college head football coach.

Iowa struggled to a 3-8 record on the field, with five of the eight losses coming to teams ranked in the final top 25. Three Hawkeye losses came at the hands of teams ranked in the top six in the country.

Iowa was led on offense by three freshmen, as QB Kyle McCann led the team in passing, RB Ladell Betts led the team in rushing and WR Kahlil Hill led the team in receiving. Senior DT Jared DeVries earned consensus all-America honors.

1999

Kirk Ferentz began a new coaching era as Iowa finished the season with a 1-10 record while facing what was regarded as the fourth strongest schedule in the nation. Three of Iowa's losses went down to the final play of the game, with the Hawkeyes allowing a score at Northwestern and failing to score from inside the 10-yardline in home losses to Indiana and Minnesota.

2000

Iowa opened the season in the Eddie Robinson Classic against Kansas State on August 26, marking the earliest date ever for an Iowa football game. The Hawkeyes, facing the sixth-strongest schedule in the nation, posted a 3-9 overall record. The Hawkeyes won their first overtime game ever, 26-23 at Penn State, in double overtime. A late season 27-17 win over Northwestern forced the Wildcats to share the Big Ten title. Iowa finished strong, winning two of final three games to set the table for the success of 2001 and 2002.

2001

Iowa opened the season with three straight wins and ended the season winning three of its final four games, including a 19-16 victory over Texas Tech in the Alamo Bowl. The Hawkeyes posted an overall 7-5 record and tied for fourth in the Big Ten with a 4-4 mark. All five of Iowa's setbacks came by less than 10 points. Iowa led the Big Ten in scoring (32.6) as Coach Kirk Ferentz led Iowa to a bowl win in just his third season.

2002

Iowa posted a perfect 8-0 record in Big Ten play to earn a share of the conference title with Ohio State. After a 3-1 start in non-conference play, the Hawkeyes began league play with a 42-35 overtime win at Penn State and went on to earn the league title in Coach Kirk Ferentz' fourth year. Iowa posted a final mark of 11-2 after a loss to Southern California in the 2003 Orange Bowl in Miami, FL. Iowa earned its first-ever Bowl Championship Series invitation.

Ferentz earned Big Ten and national Coach of the Year honors, while 11 Hawkeyes were named first team all-Big Ten. QB Brad Banks placed second in the voting for the Heisman Trophy and was the Big Ten Conference MVP. Banks was also the Associated Press Player of the Year and earned the Davey O'Brien Award as the top quarterback in the nation. OL Eric Steinbach was the Big Ten Lineman of the year, while TE Dallas Clark earned the John Mackey Award and PK Nate Kaeding earned the Lou Groza award.

Iowa averaged over 37 points a game in leading the Big Ten in scoring for the second straight season, while the Hawkeye defense ranked fifth in the nation against the run.

2003

For the first time in school history, Iowa won 10 or more games in consecutive seasons after posting a 10-3 mark, putting an exclamation mark on the season with a 37-17 win over Florida in the 2004 Outback Bowl.

Iowa's 21 wins over the past two seasons are the most ever for Iowa football in a two-year period. The Hawkeyes finished the season ranked eighth in the final polls, the first back-to-back top 10 finishes for Iowa football since the 1950's. Coupled with the 2003 Orange Bowl, Iowa also has played in January bowl games in consecutive seasons for the first time in the history of the program.

The Hawkeyes opened the season with four straight wins in non-conference play. After a loss at Michigan State, Iowa returned home for a 30-27 win over Michigan, handing the Wolverines their only loss in Big Ten play. After a loss at Purdue in early November, Iowa closed the regular season with wins over Minnesota and Wisconsin. The bowl win over Florida gave the Hawkeyes three straight wins over ranked opponents.

Offensive tackle Robert Gallery was named a consensus all-American and became Iowa's third Outland Trophy winner as the nation's top interior lineman. PK Nate Kaeding was also a first team all-American for the second straight season, becoming Iowa's all-time scoring leader while setting 14 school records during his career.

2004

Winning its last eight games of the season, Iowa posted a 10-2 record, sharing the Big Ten Conference title for the second time in three seasons. The Hawkeyes defeated Wisconsin in Kinnick Stadium on the final day of the regular season to earn the title share with Michigan.

Playing in its third straight January bowl game, Iowa scored a thrilling 30-25 win over defending national champion LSU in the Capital One Bowl. The Hawkeyes scored the winning touchdown on a 56-yard pass from QB Drew Tate to senior WR Warren Holloway. After leading throughout the contest, Iowa fell behind with 46 seconds left in the game before winning on the final play.

Iowa started the season with a 2-2 mark before making its championship run. The win over Wisconsin increased Iowa's winning streak to 18 straight home games and 13 straight conference games, both school records.

Due to a number of injuries at the running back position, Iowa used a rock solid defense and the arm of Tate, a sophomore in his first season as a starter, to produce a third straight season of at least 10 wins.

Tate, DE Matt Roth, LB Chad Greenway and LB Abdul Hodge were named first team all-Big Ten, while Coach Kirk Ferentz was named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons.

2005

Iowa finished the season with a 7-5 record and in a third place tie in the Big Ten standings. A pair of heartbreaking, last minute losses to Michigan and Northwestern is all that separated Iowa from at least a piece of its third league title in four years. The Hawkeyes' success earned them their second Outback Bowl appearance in three years.

Despite a year of triumphs and disappointments, Iowa finished the year as one of only four teams in the nation to have played in January bowl games the last four years.

LB Chad Greenway, DB Jovon Johnson and DE Kenny Iwebema were named all-Big Ten first team, while LB Abdul Hodge, RB Albert Young and PK Kyle Schlicher earned second team accolades.

Iowa's attempt to become the winningest team in Hawkeye history came up just short at the hands of Ty Detmer and Brigham Young. The 1990 Heisman Trophy winner passed for 350 yards in rallying the Cougars back from a 13-0 halftime deficit. Iowa built its lead on two touchdown runs by Mike Saunders. Saunders joined Iowa's exclusive 1,000-yard in a season club. He had 103 yards on 19 carries in the Holiday Bowl to give him 1,022 for the season and 1,476 career rushing yards. Iowa QB Matt Rodgers completed 19 of 28 passes for 221 yards. Jon Filloon caught a career-high seven passes for 107 yards in his final game as a Hawkeye. All-American defensive end Leroy Smith was injured in the first half and never returned to the Iowa lineup. BYU had a chance to win the game with under 30 seconds to play. The Cougars had a first down on the Iowa 18-yard line with the score tied. However, Detmer's final pass was intercepted by Carlos James at the goal line. Teddy Jo Faley led Iowa's defenders with 14 tackles, including 13 solo stops. The Hawkeyes finished the season ranked 10th in both the AP and CNN/USA Today polls with a 10-1-1 record.

In its first trip back to San Antonio since losing to California 37-3 in the inaugural 1993 Alamo Bowl, Iowa's defense put on a clinic in stopping the run - one runner in particular. Iowa's group of run-stoppers, headed by sophomore linebackers Matt Hughes and Vernon Rollins, held Doak Walker Award winner and 2,000-yard rusher Byron Hanspard to 64 yards rushing on 18 attempts. In the process the Hawkeyes shut down Texas Tech for a dominating 27-0 win. Hanspard's longest run of the evening was 17 yards, as Iowa controlled the line of scrimmage and limited the Red Raiders to 60 yards total rushing. The victory was Iowa's second shutout of the season (the Hawkeyes also blanked Wisconsin 31-0). And while Hanspard was held in check throughout, Iowa senior Sedrick Shaw was unstoppable as he rushed for 113 yards on 20 carries and one touchdown. Shaw's second touchdown run was impressive, as he broke three tackles enroute to the end zone. Matt Sherman led a consistent Iowa offense with 126 yards passing - 105 to wide receiver Tim Dwight. The Hawkeye ground attack churned for 217 yards. Hughes finished with eight tackles, while Rollins added five. Sophomore Jared DeVries finished with two sacks and five tackles, three for a loss. Shaw and DeVries were named offensive and defensive MVP's, respectively.

Iowa's Nate Kaeding kicked a 47-yard field goal with 44 seconds to play in the game and defensive back Bob Sanders intercepted a Texas Tech pass in the endzone on the final play as Iowa defeated the Red Raiders 19-16 in the 2001 Alamo Bowl. The Hawkeyes ended the season with a 7-5 overall record with the bowl victory. The crowd of 65,232 marked the second largest crowd in Alamo Bowl history.

The Hawkeye drove 53 yards in eight plays for the final score of the game, which was the fourth field goal of the day for Kaeding. Texas Tech had tied the score at 16-16 with 2:05 remaining before Iowa's game winning drive.

Iowa QB Kyle McCann accounted for most of the yardage in the final scoring drive. He completed three straight passes for 41 totals yards and then scrambled for 16 yards to the Tech 26-yardline to set up Kaeding's game winning kick.

Kaeding tied an Iowa record with the four field goals, which came from 36, 31, 46 and 47 yards. Iowa took an early 10-0 lead in the first half, using a ball control offense to keep the Red Raider passing attack on the sidelines. Tech got on the scoreboard on the final play of the half on a 50-yard field goal and tied the score at 10-10 on its first possession of the third quarter.

An interception by Iowa's Derrick Pickens led to an Iowa field goal for a 13-10 advantage and good field position led to Kaeding's 46-yard effort that put Iowa in front 16-10.

Pickens was named the Outstanding Defensive Player of the Game, while RB Aaron Greving earned that award for offense. Filling in for the injured Ladell Betts, Greving rushed 25 times for 115 yards, including a one-yard scoring run for Iowa's only touchdown. McCann completed 19-26 passes for 161 yards, with no interceptions.

Along with the interception on the final play of the game, Sanders led the Iowa defense with 11 tackles. Grant Steen added eight stops and Benny Sapp had seven tackles and an interception. Iowa's defense held Texas Tech to just 80 net rushing yards.

Southern Cal's big second half lifted the Trojans past Iowa, 38-17 in the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl. Iowa, which saw its nine-game winning streak come to an end, completed the season with an 11-2 overall record and an eighth place ranking in the final polls.

Hawkeye C.J. Jones opened the game by returning the kickoff an Orange Bowl record 100 yards, giving Iowa an early 7-0 lead. The Trojans quickly answered with a four-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a Justin Fargas four-yard run.

Iowa and USC each added 35-yard field goals before the half. Iowa had an opportunity to take the lead, but a seven-play, 41-yard drive stalled on the USC one-yard line as the half ended and USC blocked an Iowa field goal attempt on the final play.

USC controlled the second half by scoring touchdowns on its first three possessions. USC's defense stifled the Hawkeyes.

Heisman Trophy winning QB Carson Palmer led USC by completing 21 of 31 passes for 303 yards and one touchdown. He was named the Orange Bowl MVP. Fargas became only the second Hawkeye opponent to eclipse 100 rushing yards as he gained 122 in 20 attempts. His rushing numbers included a 50-yard scoring scamper that marked the longest run against the Iowa defense all season.

QB Brad Banks completed 15-36 passes for 204 yards and one touchdown. Banks threw 103 consecutive passes without an interception before USC's Jason Leach picked one off in the fourth quarter. Banks also rushed eight times for 36 yards. His 423 rushing yards is an Iowa record for quarterbacks in a season.

WR Maurice Brown and TE Dallas Clark led the Iowa receivers. Brown had six receptions for 63 yards and a touchdown, while Clark tallied four receptions for 97 yards. Brown's 18-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter broke the school record for TD receptions in a season.

Jones ran back four kickoffs for 169 yards, which is an Orange Bowl record and an Iowa bowl game record for return yards.

Defensive backs Bob Sanders and Derek Pagel led Iowa's defensive unit recording 13 and 10 tackles, respectively. The Iowa defense sacked Palmer four times, which included DE Matt Roth's team-leading 11th sack in the second quarter.

GAME RECAP

After falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter, Iowa scored 27 unanswered points en route to a 37-17 triumph over No. 17 Florida in the 2004 Outback Bowl. The victory was Iowa's first over the Gators and its first January bowl win since the 1959 Rose Bowl. After allowing an early Florida touchdown, Iowa scored on three of its next four possessions to end the half.

WR Maurice Brown caught a three-yard touchdown pass from QB Nathan Chandler to even the game at 7-7 late in the first quarter. PK Nate Kaeding converted a 47-yard field goal to give Iowa the lead, and the Hawkeyes followed with a Chandler five-yard scoring run. A 32-yard Kaeding field goal gave Iowa a 20-7 halftime lead.

Iowa maintained momentum in the second half after holding Florida to a three-and-out on its first possession. Matt Melloy blocked the Florida punt and also recovered it in the end zone for a touchdown. It marked the first time in Iowa bowl history that a Hawkeye player both blocked and recovered a punt for a touchdown.

The Gators added a field goal on their next possession, but two possessions later Iowa RB Fred Russell, who was named Outback Bowl MVP, scampered 34 yards for a touchdown to give Iowa a commanding 34-10 advantage. Kaeding added a 38-yard field goal to end Iowa's scoring.

Russell finished with 204 all-purpose yards. He carried the ball 21 times for 150 yards and one touchdown and returned three kickoffs for 54 yards. Chandler completed 13-25 passes for 170 yards, one passing touchdown, one rushing score and no interceptions. Brown caught six passes for 96 yards and one score.

Defensively, Iowa held the Gators to an Outback Bowl record-low 57 rushing yards, marking the eighth time in 2003 that the Hawkeyes held their opponents to 75 yards or less on the ground. DB Sean Considine collected a game-high nine tackles (three solo, six assists). LB Abdul Hodge registered eight stops (three solo, five assists). DT Tyler Luebke, DE Matt Roth and DE Howard Hodges each recorded one sack.

The 56-yard bomb on the final play was arguably the best finish in bowl history. The reception was Holloway's first career touchdown.

Iowa grabbed an early 7-0 lead when Tate connected with WR Clinton Solomon on a 57-yard score on its first possession. The 57-yarder tied Iowa's longest touchdown reception in a bowl game (Dave Moritz from Chuck Long in the 1982 Peach Bowl). LSU cut the Hawkeye lead to 7-6 on a pair of field goals midway through the second quarter. Iowa extended its lead to 14-6 when Miguel Merrick blocked a punt and Sean Considine returned the ball seven yards for a touchdown. The Tigers answered on their next possession with a 74-yard touchdown run, but failed to convert the extra point.

PK Kyle Schlicher scored the only points of the third quarter on a 19-yard field goal to stretch Iowa's lead to 17-12. RB Marques Simmons scored on a four-yard run with 12:48 remaining to give the Hawkeyes a 24-12 advantage. LSU rallied with a pair of touchdown passes to WR Skyler Green (22 and three yards) as the Tigers took their first lead of the game, 25-24, with 46 seconds left.

Tate drove Iowa to the 44-yard line before throwing the pass to Holloway as the final seconds clicked off the clock. The victory gave Iowa its 10th win of the year, marking the third straight season the Hawkeyes have collected 10 wins or more.

Tate was named the Capital One Bowl MVP, while DL Jonathan Babineaux was recognized as Iowa's Defensive MVP. Tate completed 20-32 passes for 287 yards and two touchdowns. The scoring passes of 56 and 57 yards marked the first time an Iowa quarterback has tossed two touchdowns over 50 yards in a bowl game.

WR Ed Hinkel caught a career and game-high 10 passes for 93 yards, one reception shy of an Iowa bowl record. Solomon caught four passes for 81 yards and one score, while Holloway caught four passes for 72 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, Iowa recorded 10 tackles for loss, including five sacks. LB Abdul Hodge racked up a game-high 15 tackles (10 solo), including 2.5 sacks. LB Chad Greenway tallied nine tackles (seven solo), including one for loss. Babineaux registered seven tackles (five solo), including 4.5 for loss and 2.5 sacks. Additionally, the Hawkeyes' special teams blocked two punts, including returning one for a touchdown.

Iowa finished the season ranked eighth for the third consecutive year. The Hawkeyes finished in the top 10 three straight seasons for only the second time ever (1956-58).

GAME RECAP

Florida scored the game's first 17 points and held off a late Iowa surge to defeat the Hawkeyes 31-24 in the 2006 Outback Bowl at Tampa, FL.

The Gators blocked and returned an Iowa punt for a score on Iowa's first possession to take a 7-0 advantage. Florida then added a 21-yard field goal and returned an interception 60 yards to take a 17-0 lead with 1:57 left in the first half.

Iowa scored its first points on a 20-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate to WR Clinton Solomon. However, the Gators answered the Hawkeye score with a touchdown with one second left in the period to take a 24-7 halftime advantage.

Florida added a 38-yard touchdown pass for the only score of the third quarter, but Iowa rallied to score 17 fourth-quarter points to make for an exciting finish. WR Ed Hinkel caught touchdown passes of four and 14 yards from Tate, while PK Kyle Schlicher converted a 45-yard field goal to cut the Florida lead to 34-21 with 1:24 left.

Iowa's comeback fell short as the Hawkeyes failed to recover an onside kick. On the previous play, Iowa recovered the onside kick, only to be flagged for an offside penalty.

Tate completed 32-55 passes for 346 yards and three scores; the 32 pass completions and 55 attempts established Iowa bowl records. Hinkel caught a team-high nine passes for 87 yards and tied an Iowa bowl record with two touchdown receptions. Damian Sims tied an Iowa bowl record with five kickoff returns for 107 yards.

Florida QB Chris Leak completed 25-40 passes for 278 yards and two TDs. Leak's two touchdown passes went to Outback Bowl MVP, WR Dallas Baker, who caught 10 passes for 147 yards.

LB Abdul Hodge amassed an Outback Bowl and Iowa bowl record 19 tackles (14 solo) to lead the Hawkeye defense. DB Antwan Allen and DB Marcus Paschal each added 10 tackles, while LB Chad Greenway recorded nine stops. Allen became the first Iowa player to start in four January bowl games.

NATIONAL AWARDS



Throughout the years, a number of Iowa football players have been honored by winning national awards for their outstanding play on the football field. The individual awards earned by the 2002 and 2003 Hawkeye football program are unprecedented in the history of Iowa football as four individual earned national awards.

Offensive tackle Robert Gallery in 2003 was the recipient of the Outland Trophy, which goes to the best interior lineman in college football. Gallery was named the Big Ten Lineman of the Year and he was a consensus all-American. He is the third Hawkeye player to earn the Outland Trophy.

PK Nate Kaeding earned the Lou Groza Award as the top kicker in the nation in 2002 as a junior. He also earned consensus all-America honors in 2003 and was one of three finalists for the Groza Award as a senior.

Also in 2002, Dallas Clark earned the John Mackey Award as the top tight end in the nation and QB Brad Banks was recognized with the Davey O'Brien Award as the top signal caller in the nation.

Along with having three players earn Player of the Year awards for their positions (QB Brad Banks, TE Dallas Clark and PK Nate Kaeding) in 2002, Iowa had a total of 11 players earn first team all-Big Ten honors. In addition to earning the Davey O'Brien Award as the top quarterback, Banks was named Associated Press National Player of the Year, placed second in the Heisman Trophy voting and was named the Most Valuable Player and Offensive Player of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. Banks was also a finalist for the Maxwell Award and the Walter Camp Foundation Player of the Year.

Center Bruce Nelson in 2002 was a finalist for the Rimington Award, which goes to the top center in the nation, while Clark and OL Eric Steinbach earned consensus all-America honors. The 2002 and 2003 seasons marked just the third and fourth seasons in which Iowa has had more than one consensus selection. Steinbach, in 2002, preceded Gallery as the Big Ten Lineman of the Year.

In addition to the player honors, Coach Kirk Ferentz in 2002 was named national Coach of The Year by the Walter Camp Foundation and the Associated Press. The American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) selected Ron Aiken as the 2002 national Assistant Coach of the Year.

Ferentz repeated as the Big Ten Coach of the Year in 2004 as Iowa earned its second title in three seasons. Norm Parker, Iowa's defensive coordinator, was a finalist for the Broyles Award, which recognizes the nations top Division I assistant coach and five Hawkeye players earned first team all-Big Ten recognition.

Along with Kinnick earning the award in 1939, Iowa has had a player finish in the Top 10 in the voting on eight other occasions, including the 2002 season when QB Brad Banks placed second in the balloting. Banks became the fourth Iowa player to place second in the voting, joining Alex Karras in 1957, Randy Duncan in 1958 and Chuck Long in 1985.

Nile Kinnick Heisman Award Acceptance Speech

"Thank you very, very, kindly, Mr. Holcombe. It seems to me that everyone is letting their superlatives run away with them this evening, but none the less, I want you to know that I'm mighty, mighty, happy to accept this trophy this evening.

Every football player in these United States dreams about winning that trophy, and of this fine trip to New York. Every player considers that trophy the acme in recognition of this kind. And the fact that I am actually receiving this trophy tonight almost overwhelms me, and I know that all of those boys who have gone before me must have felt somewhat the same way.

From my own personal viewpoint, I consider my winning this award as indirectly, a great tribute to the coaching staff at the University of Iowa, headed by Dr. Eddie Anderson, and to my teammates sitting back in Iowa City. A finer man and a better coach never hit these United States, and a finer bunch of boys, never graced the gridirons of the Midwest, than that Iowa team in 1939. I wish that they might all be with me tonight to receive this trophy. They certainly deserve it.

I want to take this grand opportunity to thank collectively, all the sportswriters and all the sportscasters, and all those who have seen fit, have seen their way clear to cast a ballot in my favor for this trophy. And I also want to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Prince and his committee, the Heisman award committee, and all those connected with the Downtown Athletic Club for this trophy, and for the fine time that they're showing me. And not only for that, but for making this fine and worthy trophy available to the football players of this country.

Finally, if you will permit me, I'd like to make a comment which in my mind, is indicative, perhaps, of the greater significance of football, and sports emphasis in general in this country, and that is, I thank God I was warring on the gridirons of the Midwest, and not on the battlefields of Europe. I can speak confidently and positively that the players of this country, would much more, much rather struggle and fight to win the Heisman award, than the Croix de Guerre.

The University's first consensus All-American... earned first team all-American honors as a sophomore... an Eckersall All-America pick in 1919 (third team), 1920 (second) and 1921 (third)... first Hawkeye named to a major all-American team... three-time first team all-Big Ten selection... starred in track at Iowa and captained team in 1921... one of the nation's premier collegiate pass catchers of his era.

AUBREY DEVINE

Quarterback, 1921, Des Moines, Iowa

Member of Iowa Lettermen's Club Hall of Fame... on Iowa's all-time football team... won conference medal for excellence in athletics and academics... inducted to National Football Foundation Hall of Fame... three-time first team all-Big Ten... captain of 1921 Big Ten champs... led Hawkeyes in rushing, passing and scoring in 1919 and 1920... drop-kicked a FG to beat Notre Dame 10-7 and break the Irish' 20-game winning streak in 1921.

No single player or team captured the imagination of Hawkeye fans more than Nile Kinnick and his legendary Ironmen team of 1939. Kinnick, a stalwart on the playing field and in the classroom was THE model Iowa football player.

As a student, Kinnick was senior class president. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the national scholastic honor society.

Maintaining a 3.4 GPA while participating in two sports, Kinnick earned a degree from the College of Commerce in 1940. He enrolled in the Iowa Law College.

As a player, his achievements are unmatched in Hawkeye history. He culminated a brilliant career in 1939 by winning the Heisman, Walter Camp and Maxwell Trophies as the nation's top player.

He made virtually every all-America team and was the Big Ten MVP. Nile is a member of Iowa's all-time football team and was named its outstanding player.

Kinnick was the spirit of Coach Eddie Anderson's Ironmen unit of '39. The Hawkeyes' 6-1-1 mark included a 7-6 upset of Notre Dame when Kinnick scored every point. He also punted 16 times for 731 yards, both Iowa records, versus the Fighting Irish.

Kinnick died in the Caribbean sea in a crash of his fighter plane while on a training flight June 2, 1943 as an ensign in the United States Navy.

Cal Jones
Lineman
Steubenville, Ohio

62

Jersey No. 62 was never worn more proudly than the three seasons Cal Jones donned it at Iowa.

One of the most intimidating linemen to wear the old gold and black, Jones was a three-time first team all-Big Ten guard. He made 22 all-American teams during his career, including a record 15 in 1954.

As team captain in 1955, Jones earned the prestigious Outland Trophy, given to the nation's top interior lineman. He was a consensus all-American twice, one of only two at Iowa. Cal is an elected member of the National Football Foundation and Helms Athletic Foundation Halls of Fame.

Jones most recently was inducted into the inaugural class of Iowa Lettermen's Club Hall of Fame. He was also chosen to the Iowa all-time football team in 1989.

A physical education major at Iowa, Jones earned a 3.0 grade-point average. He earned praise from Coach Forest Evashevski, who called him "the greatest lineman I ever coached."

The two-way guard was part of the "Steubenville Trio" (along with Frank Gilliam and Eddie Vincent) to come to Iowa from Steubenville, Ohio in the mid-1950s.

Jones died as a result of a plane crash in Canada on Dec. 9, 1956.

HALL OF FAME

Nineteen men who have been associated with Iowa football are members of Halls of Fame, named by the National Football Foundation, the Helms Athletic Foundation or the College Football Hall of Fame.

Seven men have been named to the Halls of both foundations: Howard Jones, coach; Nile Kinnick, player; Gordon Locke, player; Fred (Duke) Slater, player; Dr. Edward Anderson, coach; Edward (Slip) Madigan, coach; Calvin Jones, player.

Five men have been named to the Hall of the Helms Foundation: Calvin Jones, player; Ossie Solem, coach; Emlen Tunnell, professional player; Eric Wilson, publicist.

Aubrey Devine, Randy Duncan, Alex Karras and Chuck Long have been named to the National Football Foundation Hall as players, while Earl Banks was inducted on the merits of his long-time coaching tenure at Morgan State. Former Iowa Coach Forest Evashevski was honored into the Hall of Fame in December of 2000 in New York City and Hayden Fry is the latest Iowa coach to be inducted.

Evashevski coached Iowa from 1952-60, compiling a 42-27-4 record. The Hawkeyes finished in the top five nationally in 1956, 1957, 1958 and 1960 under Evashevski, who later served as Iowa's Athletic Director.

Fry was inducted as a member of the 2003 Hall of Fame class at the 46th annual awards dinner on Dec. 9, 2003 at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City. The newest class was officially enshrined at the Hall in South Bend, IN, in August, 2004. Fry is Iowa's winningest head coach with 143 wins. He led the Hawkeyes to three Big Ten titles and Rose Bowl appearances and coached the Hawkeyes in 14 bowl games.

NATIONAL IOWA VARSITY CLUB HALL OF FAME

Inductees are selected by a vote of all dues-paying members of the National Iowa Varsity Club. All former Hawkeye athletes who have won at least one major letter and completed their eligibility at least 10 years prior to selection are eligible for the Hall of Fame.

A coach or administrator must have retired or left the university at least five years prior to selection. A maximum of seven inductees may be selected to the Hall of Fame each year.

Floyd of Rosedale

To the winner of the Iowa-Minnesota football game goes possession of a statue of a pig named “Floyd of Rosedale.”

A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation.

After Iowa lost the 1935 game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a full-blooded champion pig and a brother of BlueBoy from Will Rogers’ movie *State Fair*. Olson gave the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned St. Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd’s image.

The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high. Floyd currently resides in Iowa City as a result of Iowa’s 52-28 victory last season in Kinnick Stadium. Minnesota holds a 38-31-2 advantage in the series with Floyd of Rosedale on the line.

The winning university is entitled to keep the trophy until it loses the annual battle.

Winner of In State Battle Earns Cy-Hawk Trophy

When The University of Iowa resumed its football series with Iowa State in 1977, the Des Moines Athletic Club donated a trophy to be awarded to the winner of the annual in-state battle.

The Cy-Hawk Trophy features a football player in the classic running back pose, and also includes a likeness of both Herky the Hawkeye and Cy the Cardinal on the front of the trophy.

The Hawkeyes hold a 35-19 advantage in the series that began in 1894, including a 19-10 margin since 1977 when the Cy-Hawk Trophy was first awarded. The Cy-Hawk Trophy currently resides in Ames as a result of Iowa State’s 23-3 win in Jack Trice Stadium last season.

Iowa and Wisconsin Battle for Heartland Trophy

The Heartland Trophy was inaugurated in 2004 and goes each year to the winner of the football battle between Iowa and Wisconsin.

The trophy was designed and crafted by artist and former Iowa football player Frank Strub. The trophy, which is a bull mounted on a walnut base (native to both Wisconsin and Iowa), has been inscribed with the scores of all games in the long-time series. The teams have met 81 times, with Iowa leading the series, 40-39-2.

The Hawkeyes are 2-0 in the series since the introduction of the Heartland Trophy in 2004. The trophy currently resides in Iowa City as a result of Iowa’s 20-10 triumph in Camp Randall Stadium last season.

Herky and the Hawkeyes

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago.

The name Hawkeye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawk-Eye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism.

The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth over 50 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since then Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletic events.

Kinnick Stadium, home for the Iowa football team, is in its 77th season of hosting Hawkeye football games. One of the 25 largest college-owned stadiums in the nation and one of college football's finest facilities, Kinnick Stadium is routinely filled on Saturdays each fall.

A two-year, \$88 million restoration and renovation project for the stadium was completed prior to the start of the 2006 season. The project, which was the largest such undertaking ever for Iowa athletics, includes an entirely new south endzone and a new press and hospitality facility. The endzone project, which included new lockerrooms, training room and media facilities for the Hawkeye football team on game days, was completed prior to the 2005 season. The new four-level press and hospitality facility will be operational for the 2006 season. The facility extends the full length of the west side of the stadium. It includes 47 private viewing suites and over 1,000 club seats.

The renovation also provides a new entry plaza to the south entrance, wider seats throughout most of the stadium, new and upgraded restroom facilities and concession areas, new scoreboards and a modernized sound system. It also raised the official capacity of Kinnick Stadium to 70,585.

Iowa draws sellout crowds for a majority of all home games, including all 12 home games in the last two years and 17 straight games over the past three seasons.

The Hawkeyes annually rank among the top 25 schools in the nation in home attendance. Iowa ranked 21st in home attendance in 2005 with its average of 70,585. Big Ten Conference football games in 2005 drew over 5 million fans as the conference annually ranks first or second nationally in home attendance. Conference games a year ago averaged over 72,000 fans per contest.

Construction on the original 53,000-seat stadium was completed Oct. 5, 1929 at a cost of \$497,151.42. Original construction took six months, but it has undergone several facelifts since. Seats were added to the south end zone in 1956, raising the capacity to 60,000. The north end zone was enclosed and capacity increased to 66,000 prior to the 1983 season. With three more expansion projects completed since, Kinnick now seats 70,585. Kinnick Stadium has 20 miles of bleacher seats and is 79 rows high on each side.

Beside the expansions, an artificial surface was installed in 1972. That carpet was replaced in 1981. Prior to the 1989 season a natural grass playing field, Prescription Athletic Turf, was installed. The playing surface was replaced with new sod prior to the 1997 season and during the 2005 season.

The original five-floor press box was constructed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,628.62, and was located between the 25-yard lines on the west side of the stadium. Between 1995 and 1999, the Kinnick Stadium press box underwent a \$3 million improvement and renovation project, which included the addition of 18 private viewing suites and the remodeling of all five levels. The original press box was demolished in December 2005.

Spectators attending home games of the Iowa Hawkeyes enjoy all the benefits of watching a game on television, thanks to the installation of all new video boards and scoreboards in 2005. The large scale video display units offer spectators live game action, instant replays and other features, such as highlights from other college football games being played across the nation. A complete new sound system was also installed.

Kinnick Stadium has a rich history, beginning with a 46-0 Hawkeye win over Monmouth in the facility's first game. The Hawkeyes tied Illinois 7-7 in the dedication game Oct. 19, 1929.

In 1972, the name was changed from Iowa Stadium to Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's 1939 Heisman Trophy winner, Nile Kinnick. His No. 24 jersey was retired by the school because of his success as a scholar-athlete at the University.

Iowa's all-time record in Kinnick Stadium is 228-157-15. Iowa's longest home winning streak of 22 games spanned the 2002 to 2005 seasons. The Hawkeyes have had 11 undefeated home seasons, including both 2003 and 2004. Iowa posted a 5-1 home record in 2005 and a 6-1 mark in 2002.

The school's all-time home attendance record was set in 2003 (460,584 fans). The 2005 average of 70,585 established a school record. Iowa's record season attendance mark for all games is 905,840 set in 1990, a 75,487 per game average.

Beginning with the 2006 season, all Division-I conferences and independent institutions will have the option of using a version of instant replay standardized by the NCAA – a system based upon an instant replay model created by the Big Ten Conference three years ago.

The road to a collegiate version of football instant replay was paved in 2003. At that time, the Big Ten began discussions with head coaches, directors of athletics and conference office staff to create a system to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during all conference games. The Big Ten conducted a pilot program during the 2003 season, and based on the data collected, was given approval by the NCAA to institute the instant replay system at all games played at conference stadiums in 2004. Following a successful initial year, the Big Ten submitted a proposal to the NCAA to allow all conferences and independent institutions to experiment with the use of video replay for the 2005 season. The NCAA approved the proposal and after another year of experimentation, added instant replay to the football rules book for the 2006 campaign.

The objective of football instant replay is to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during games. Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

As instant replay enters its third year on the Big Ten landscape, the details of the system appear below:

INSTANT REPLAY Q&A

Q. How is the NCAA system different than the Big Ten model?

A. The current model is similar to the system used in 2005, with the addition of a coaches' challenge system.

Q. How will the new coaches' challenge system work?

A. Head coaches may now utilize a timeout to request a review of a play no more than once per game. A coach initiates this challenge by taking a timeout before the ball is in play and informing the official that the ruling on the previous play is being challenged. If the ruling is overturned, the timeout will be returned to the team. If the ruling is not overturned, the team will lose that timeout. A team must have a timeout in order for the coach to challenge a play and a coach can only challenge one play per game. Head coaches may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped by the Technical Advisor and a decision has already been made on that specific ruling. If a head coach requests a timeout to challenge a ruling and the play is not reviewable, the team will lose that timeout. The Technical Advisor will continue to examine all reviewable plays during a game.

Q. Are the instant replay procedures used by the NCAA the same as those of the NFL?

A. Even though the desired outcome of replay is the same - getting the play right - the manner in which football replay is used in college football is different than any method the NFL has previously used. In the collegiate model, stoppages and reviews will be conducted by a Technical Advisor in a secure area of the press box and may occur at any point of the game. In the NFL, the replay booth may only stop a game in the final two minutes of a half. Also in the NFL, head coaches are allowed to challenge two plays per game. The collegiate model now allows head coaches to challenge one ruling per game by using a timeout (see above).

Q. Which games will have instant replay?

A. While all conferences may use the instant replay system, the NCAA does not require the use of the system. For non-conference games, the home team will make the decision whether or not to utilize the instant replay system – the visiting team does not have the option of declining the use of the system as in the past. In the Big Ten, all conference games will utilize the system while home non-conference games appearing on television will also use the system.

Q. Will all conferences have the same instant replay system?

A. All conferences will have the option of utilizing the NCAA version of instant replay. However, some conferences may use different video sources, such as video from stadium video boards. In the Big Ten Conference, all reviewable video will come directly from the television production of the game and no other source. The review process will be limited to what is provided by the television production.

Q. Who can initiate a review of an official's call?

A. The Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game can initiate reviews throughout the game. The head coach can initiate one review per game by calling a timeout. Game officials may not ask for a review.

Q. When can a game be stopped to review an official's call?

A. The Technical Advisor will look at nearly every reviewable play during the course of the game in search of indisputable video evidence. However, the game will not be stopped unless there is reasonable video evidence that an error may have occurred during a reviewable play – unless a head coach uses his one challenge. Technical Advisors are also advised to avoid unnecessary interruptions unless it appears that an officiating call may be in error and that the call would have a direct, competitive impact on the game.

Q. Who will be making the decision if a call is overturned or not?

A. The Technical Advisor will have the sole authority to change a call, or no call, on the field. Unlike the NFL model, officials working Big Ten games will not have the ability or capacity to view the replay(s).

Q. How will the Technical Advisor know that an on-field call by an official will need to be changed?

A. Unless in the judgment of the Technical Advisor there is reasonable video evidence that the call on the field was incorrect, then no stoppage of play will occur. If there is reasonable video evidence that an official's call on the field was incorrect, then the Technical Advisor will notify the referee to stop play while the call is further reviewed and corrected.

Q. What will be the source of the video for replays?

A. In the Big Ten Conference, all reviewable video will come direct from the television production of the game and no other source. If a Big Ten game will not be televised, then the conference will arrange for a television production of the game in order to provide the same, consistent coverage throughout the conference season.

Q. Who are the Technical Advisors?

A. Technical Advisors are former college and/or NFL officials who observe, evaluate and rate game officials' performances and mechanics during games. They report to and are evaluated by David Parry, the Big Ten coordinator of football officials.

Q. Will the length of games be affected?

A. The use of instant replay did not significantly affect game times in 2004 or 2005. The length of games during the 2003 season, which did not feature instant replay, was three hours and 13 minutes. The length of games utilizing instant replay increased to three hours and 17 minutes in 2004 and decreased to three hours and 16 minutes in 2005. Approximately one stoppage occurred per game in both 2004 and 2005 and the Big Ten's average length of review was only one minute and 44 seconds last season, compared to the national average of one minute and 55 seconds for all conferences. The National Football league averaged over three minutes per review for its instant replay system.

Q. When can a play be reviewed?

A. Only until the ball is put into play on the next play. At that point, the previous play cannot be changed.

Q. Is there a time limit on how long a play can be reviewed?

A. There is no time limit...only the standard of indisputable video evidence. If the television replay does not allow the Technical Advisor to apply this standard in a manner that changes the call on the field, then the game plays on.

Q. Briefly describe the mechanics of how a play is reviewed?

A. The Technical Advisor will signal the officials on the field that he is reviewing a play, and that game action should be halted. The Technical Advisor will then view replays for as long as necessary to determine whether indisputable video evidence exists for the ruling on the field to be acknowledged as incorrect. Once reviewed the Technical Advisor will notify the referee of the correct call, and time, down and distance, who will announce such to the crowd. Communication between the Technical Advisor in the press box and the referee on the field will be by radio (with a backup phone line).

Q. What if a team is using a hurry-up offense and the Technical Advisor does not have enough time to view a replay to decide whether or not the play is reviewable?

A. The decision to stop the game must be made before the ball is snapped. Similar to the NFL, if a team is in a hurry-up offense, it may curtail the ability to completely review some plays.

Q. Is the Technical Advisor limited to the number of plays that can be reviewed?

A. No

Q. Will there be sufficient camera angles to review plays from anywhere on the field?

A. The replay process will be limited to what is viewable by television cameras. Sometimes a particular angle that might be better will not be immediately available.

Q. What happens if TV comes back from a commercial break after Team A kicks a PAT and shows a better replay that the Team A runner actually did fumble the ball before he crossed the goal line?

A. The play still stands as called on the field, since there was no indisputable video evidence to the contrary at the time the touchdown call was made. However, if Team B has called a timeout prior to the PAT, and TV returns from a commercial break with the better replay showing the Team A runner fumbling before crossing the goal line, then the play would be subject to review by the Technical Advisor.

THE PLAYS

The NCAA has established the following list of plays that are reviewable by the collegiate instant replay system.

- Plays governed by a sideline, goal line or an end line:
 - Scoring Plays, including a runner in possession of a live ball breaking the plane of a goal line.
 - A pass ruled complete, incomplete or intercepted at a sideline, goal line or an end line.
 - A runner or pass receiver ruled in or out of bounds.
 - Recovery of a loose ball in or out of bounds in the field of play or an end zone.
- Plays involving passes:
 - A pass ruled complete, incomplete or intercepted anywhere in the field of play or an end zone.
 - A forward pass touched by an ineligible receiver.
 - A forward pass touched by a defensive player.
 - A fumble ruled on the part of a potential passer. (Note: If the on-field ruling is forward pass and the pass is incomplete, the play is not reviewable).
 - A forward pass or forward handing ruled when a runner is beyond the line of scrimmage.
 - A forward pass or forward handing ruled after a change of possession.
 - A pass ruled forward or backward when thrown from behind the line of scrimmage. (Exception: If the pass is ruled forward and is incomplete, the play is not reviewable).
- Miscellaneous plays:
 - A runner ruled to have fumbled. (Note: If a runner is ruled down, the play is not reviewable).
 - A runner's forward progress with respect to a first down.
 - Touching of any type of kick by any player.
 - The number of players participating by either team during a live ball.
 - A scrimmage kicker beyond the line of scrimmage when the ball is kicked.
 - Clock adjustment when a ruling on the field is reversed.
 - A fumble recovery by a Team A player during fourth down or a try and before any change of possession.



BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES



Now in its ninth season, the Bowl Championship series was established to determine a champion for college football while maintaining and enhancing the bowl system which has provided significant support to college football for nearly a century. The BCS is a showcase for the sport, matching the premier teams in top bowl games. The Big Ten Conference is a key component in the championship agreement.

The Bowls and the Teams

The BCS consists of the Rose Bowl, Nokia Sugar Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl. In addition to the Big Ten, the Atlantic Coast, Big 12, Big East, Pacific-10 and Southeastern Conferences also have automatic berths for their champions into one of the four contests.

For the first time, following the 2006 season, each bowl will host two games once every four years -- its traditional game plus a National Championship contest approximately one week after the New Year.

This season the national championship game will be played January 8 in Glendale, AZ. FOX-TV will televise three of the Bowl Championship Series games (Fiesta, Orange, Sugar) and the national title game, while ABC-TV will continue to televise the Rose Bowl.

Eligibility

Any Division I-A independent team, or champion of the Western Athletic Conference, Conference USA, Mountain West Conference or any other Division I-A Conference, which is ranked No. 6 or higher in the BCS standings, also will be eligible for the Bowl Championship Series.

Otherwise, any Division I-A team can qualify for selection in the BCS if it has won at least nine football games during the most recently completed regular season (not to include wins in exempted games) and is ranked in the top 12 of the final Bowl Championship Series standings.

Team Selection

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac 10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac 10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC or Big East champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

The Hardware

The Waterford Crystal football that sits atop the Sears Trophy takes an artisan three months to create. The Sears Trophy is part of the Sears Collegiate Champion Program – a comprehensive trophy and academic scholarship program which recognizes both men’s and women’s sports equally.

Sears, Roebuck and Co. and the AFCA also present a \$20,000 academic scholarship to the school that wins the Sears Trophy. The scholarship is earmarked for an outstanding freshman who does not participate in intercollegiate athletics. In total, more than 2,200 trophies and more than a quarter of a million dollars in academic scholarships are awarded to NCAA Division I, II and III and NAIA institutions annually.

The Iowa Hawkeyes play their home football games in Kinnick Stadium (capacity 70,585), located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes drive from Interstate 80 and 380 and is less than 30 minutes from the Eastern Iowa Airport in Cedar Rapids.

The Paul J. Brechler Press Box at Kinnick is on the west side and accessible by elevator or stairs. The completely new facility is named in honor of the former UI athletic director (1947-60). It was recently completed as part of the two-year, \$90 million renovation of Kinnick Stadium.

The four-level facility extends from goalline to goalline. The media section, including the press section and radio and television booths, and game management operations, are located on the fourth level. Level one includes private suites and indoor club seating, level two includes outdoor club seating and level three is private suites.

Refreshments and snacks are available throughout each game and a pre-game meal is served for the media.

Ferentz Conferences/Interview Requests

Coach Kirk Ferentz holds a media conference each Tuesday at 12:30 p.m. during the football season. Players are also available, upon request, at 1 p.m. following the media conference.

Player requests must be made on Saturdays, following each game, for the following week. Out of town media should contact the sports information office on Mondays to arrange telephone interviews.

Coach Ferentz is also available each Tuesday during the Big Ten Conference coaches tele-conference, and, he is also available via tele-conference for visiting media outlets. Those tele-conferences are held each Tuesday at noon. Contact Iowa Sports Information for the tele-conference phone number and details.

Credentials

Credential requests should be directed in writing or e-mail to Phil Haddy, Sports Information Director, University of Iowa, 157 Carver-Hawkeye Arena, Iowa City, Iowa 52242. Requests should be filed early enough to allow time for processing. The FAX number is 319-335-9417 and Phil's e-mail address is phillip-haddy@uiowa.edu.

Credentials will be mailed when time allows. Credentials are non-transferable.

Parking

Requests for parking should be made when requesting credentials. Media parking is located in the parking ramp at the northeast corner of Kinnick Stadium, at the corner of Hawkins Drive and Stadium Drive.

Media Entrance

Members of the media are encouraged to enter Kinnick Stadium at the northeast corner of the stadium (near the old Iowa lockerroom entrance) and proceed through the north and west concourses to elevator F, located at the midway point of the west stands. The media may also enter through Gate I on the west side of Kinnick and proceed to elevator F.

Photo/TV Credentials

Photo credentials must be requested following the same guidelines as mentioned above. A photographer's room is located at the northwest corner of Kinnick Stadium. Photo credentials must be presented in order to receive an armband for sideline photography. Entrance to the photo room is through the tunnel in the middle of the west concourse. From the playing field, the photo room may be accessed through the tunnel at the Northwest corner of the field.

Television stations are not allowed to video tape from the press box. A video splitter board is available in the photo room for all TV stations to receive the overhead video provided by Iowa's football video department (or the network midfield camera). TV camera personnel on the sidelines must adhere to all sideline policies.

Services

Complete play-by-play, halftime statistics, final team and individual stats, complete defensive stats, drive charts, participation charts and quotes from both head coaches are available following each home game. The Kinnick Stadium press facility closes four hours following each home game.

Telephones

Iowa provides a limited number of telephones in the main press box area for use on a first-come, first-serve basis. Media requiring their own phone lines should call 319-335-2945 and ask for a work order clerk.

High Speed Internet Access

Hard wire high speed internet access is available at every media seat in the Kinnick Stadium press box.



FAX Machine

A FAX machine is available in the Kinnick Stadium press box, and information will be faxed upon request.

Post-Game Information Via E-Mail

All game statistics, notes and quotes will be e-mailed from Kinnick Stadium following Iowa home games when requested. This information is filed in pdf format and is sent within 30-45 minutes following home games. To receive this information, contact a member of the Iowa sports information staff. This information is also posted on the Iowa website, www.hawkeyesports.com, following each Iowa game throughout the season.

Accommodations

A directory of hotels, motels, restaurants and available air transportation can be found on page 182. The Iowa sports information office does reserve a block of rooms at the Quality Inn & Suites in Iowa City, and those are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Contact Theresa Walenta in the Iowa Sports Information office (319-335-9411) for reservations.

Post-Game Interviews

Both team lockerroom facilities are located under the south end zone. All player and coaches interviews will take place in the designated media rooms. You may follow a member of the Iowa Sports Information staff from the press box or ask for written directions on getting to the post-game media rooms.

Both head coaches are available (in different areas) following the cooling off period, with player interviews to follow. Coach Ferentz' post game comments are televised on the monitors throughout the Kinnick Stadium press box and quotes from both head coaches are distributed with the final statistical packets.

Members of the media should contact Iowa SID Phil Haddy with player requests prior to leaving the press box. Iowa Sports Information staff will be departing the press box with approximately three minutes remaining in the game.

The Hawkeye Radio Network

Fans of the University of Iowa following the Hawkeyes on radio can tune in on their favorite station throughout the state of Iowa and the Midwest.

The radio voice of the Hawkeyes is Gary Dolphin, a Cascade, IA native who handles all play-by-play action of both Iowa football and men's basketball throughout the season. In addition, Dolphin also serves as the host of the weekly coaches shows during the season with football Coach Kirk Ferentz and men's basketball Coach Steve Alford. Dolphin, in 2001, was named the Iowa Sportscaster of the Year. He is in his 11th year of broadcasting Iowa football and basketball on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Dolphin, overall, is in his 34th year of play-by-play broadcasting. That includes six years of broadcasting basketball games for Northwestern University.

Dolphin is joined on all University of Iowa football broadcasts by former Hawkeye and NFL great Ed Podolak. A native of Atlantic, IA, Podolak was a three-year letterman for the Hawkeyes (1966-68) as a quarterback and running back before his lengthy professional career with the Kansas City Chiefs. Iowa's sideline reporter is Rob Brooks, son of Hall of Fame broadcaster, Bob Brooks.

The Hawkeye Radio Network, a production of Learfield Communications, Inc. of Jefferson City, MO, blankets the state of Iowa and bordering states with more than 50 stations providing live coverage. The Hawkeyes can also be heard on the world wide web (hawkeyesports.com), on XM Satellite radio and over the telephone on "TEAMLINE."
