Daryl Greenan Head Coach Third Season

2006 Big Ten Coach of the Year Daryl Greenan begins his third season as head coach of the University of Iowa women's tennis team.

Last season, Greenan led the Hawkeyes to record-breaking performances in just his second year at the helm. The 2005-06 lowa

squad went 9-1 in the Big Ten and established a school record second place finish. The overall record of 18-6 gave the Hawkeyes their best winning percentage in school history. Iowa qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the third consecutive year and sixth time overall. The results led to a No. 33 final national ranking. Several individuals recorded career-best seasons. Three Hawkeyes finished 9-1 in Big Ten play. Megan Racette, Milica Veselinovic and Jacqueline Lee posted league-leading 9-1 records at the number one, number three and number four positions, respectively. It's the first time three Hawkeyes earned Big Ten leading records for their position in one season.

Racette was awarded all-Big Ten honors and finished 2006 ranked 35th in the nation. She became only the second Hawkeye to qualify for the NCAA singles tournament and the first to win a match in the draw. Veselinovic finished the

season ranked 80th in the nation. Racette and Lee were ranked 48th nationally in doubles play. Freshman Krissy Dowlin was a Division I ITA Scholar-Athlete.

For the 2006-07 preseason, Veselinovic is ranked 57th and Mintz is 123rd, while Mintz and Lee are ranked 50th nationally in doubles.

In his first year with the Hawkeyes, Greenan led Iowa to a 14-10 record and an NCAA Tournament appearance. The Hawkeyes also recorded a 7-3 mark in the Big Ten, finishing a then school-best fourth in the league. The team ended the season ranked 45th by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association. Sophomore Meg Racette earned all-Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season, ending the year ranked 124th. Freshman Milica Veselinovic set the school record for most wins by a freshman (30) in her first season at Iowa. Sophomore Hillary Mintz earned a career-high ITA individual ranking of 78th. Sophomore Hillary Tyler was a Division I ITA Scholar-Athlete. Racette was ranked 88th in the nation by ITA in singles, and the doubles team of Racette and Mintz was ranked 44th in the 2005-06 preseason.

Prior to becoming a Hawkeye, Greenan was an assistant women's tennis coach at the University of Alabama for three years. He worked under Head Coach Jenny Mainz, the Iowa women's tennis coach from 1995-1997. While at Alabama, Greenan was named the 2004 ITA South Region Assistant Coach of the Year. He also helped coach the Crimson Tide to top 40 national rankings and three consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament. Alabama finished in the top 30 nationally twice.

Greenan served as the head coach at Mississippi University for Women, in Columbus, MS, from 1998-2001. Greenan compiled a 41-25 record with the Blues. He was also assistant men and women's coach at Valdosta State (GA) for two years (1996-1998).

Greenan was part of the men's tennis team at Valdosta State from 1986-1988 and from 1994-1996. He was the No. 1 singles player for two seasons, and was part of the No. 1 doubles team for three seasons. Greenan was ranked in the top 20 in singles and achieved his highest doubles ranking in 1995, when he finished second in the nation. He was honored as part of the 2005 all-American team and earned All-Gulf South Conference honors three seasons. Greenan was inducted into the Valdosta State Athletic Hall of Fame in 2004.

Born in Ontario, Canada, Greenan currently resides in Coralville, IA, with his wife, Shannon, their daughter, Willa (1), and two dogs Xochi and Albert. Greenan also has a son, Patrick, who is currently serving in the U.S. Military. Greenan earned his B.S. degree in health and fitness from Valdosta State in 1997.

Toni Neykova Assistant Coach Fifth Season

Toni Neykova begins her fifth season as assistant coach of the Hawkeyes.

Neykova had an illustrious career as a tennis player for Iowa. She played from 1999-2002 and received many accolades, including being named an all-Big Ten selection all four years and Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1999. In 1999 and 2000, Neyko-

va qualified for the NCAA tournament in doubles with teammate Shera Wiegler. In 2002, Neykova became the first woman from the University of Iowa to qualify for the NCAA tournament in singles.

Neykova started playing tennis at age six in a local tennis club in her hometown of Plovdiv, Bulgaria. She learned quickly and was named the Bulgarian Junior National Champion in the Under 10, 12, 14, 16, and 18 age divisions. She teamed up with former Hawkeye Deni Alexandrova to win the Bulgarian National Women's doubles title in 1997, and she became the Bulgarian National Women's singles champion in 1998. Neykova was a member of the Bulgarian Junior National Team for five years and achieved a WTA singles ranking of 650 from 1997-1999.

Neykova received her B.B.A. from Iowa in economics in May 2002 and her M.A. in athletic administration in May 2006. She is married to Ned Mendenhall of Iowa City.



Chris Lueth Volunteer Assistant Coach First Season

Chris Lueth is in his first season as volunteer assistant coach with the Hawkeyes.

Lueth was a member of the Drake University tennis team, and earned team captain honors in 2006. He earned many academic honors including Drake University Sophomore, Junior and Senior of the Year awards, and Intercollegiate Tennis Association and

Missouri Valley Conference Scholar-Athlete Awards. Lueth was also on the President's Honor Roll with a 4.0 GPA and a member of the Alpha Lambda Delta National Honor Society.

Lueth graduated Magna Cum Laude from Drake University in 2006 with a B.S. in Business Administration. He is currently pursuing a Doctorate of Jurisprudence at the University of Iowa Law School.

lowa returns five players from last year's record-breaking season. Hillary Mintz, Milica Veselinovic, Jacqueline Lee, Kayla Berry and Merel Beelen all return to the Hawkeyes for the 2007 season. New additions include Kelcie Klockenga and Jennifer Barnes. Iowa hopes to build on the momentum of a 9-1 Big Ten record and 18-6 overall record in 2006. The Hawkeyes finished second in the Big Ten and ranked 33rd nationally-both of which were history making for the Hawkeyes.

Several players earned national rankings and Head Coach Daryl Greenan was named Big Ten Coach of the Year.

"A lot of things went our way last year and we won a lot of close matches," Greenan said. "We worked hard and were rewarded with wins. It was very exciting to see the team improve as the season went on. They managed to find a way to improve each week, and going 9-1 in the Big Ten was something we are all very proud of. A lot of key players return and with two new additions we are looking forward to new challenges this year brings."

Hillary Mintz

Hillary is the lone senior on the team this year. She was named team captain and is motivated to lead the Hawkeyes during her final campaign. A consistent performer at the No. 2 position during her first three years, Mintz is expected to once again be an impact player in the top half of the line-up. Strong in both singles and doubles, she possesses the skills and competitive fire to win a lot of matches. Mintz held the lowa record for most wins





after her freshman year and has been nationally ranked in both singles and doubles.

"Hillary has all the skills to be successful in singles and doubles," said Greenan. "She has been a consistent performer using intelligence and competitiveness to win a lot of big matches. She has been fun to coach and has been a huge asset to the Hawkeyes. I expect she will play high in the line-up once again."

Milica Veselinovic

Veselinovic is one of three juniors competing for the Hawkeyes this season. With 58 wins under her belt after two seasons (including a school record 30 in her first year), she is on track to shatter the lowa career record of 102 wins. She played at the fourth position her first year, third her second and is expected to make an impact in the top half of the line up once again.

Veselinovic was one of three Hawkeyes to earn conference leading 9-1 records at her position in 2006. She went 19-2 overall at the number three position and earned a FILA Collegiate Final Ranking 80th for the 2006 season. She started the 2006-07 season with a career high ranking of 57th.

"Mili is an amazing competitor and an exciting player to watch and coach," said Greenan. "She plays with terrific energy and wears her heart on her sleeve. She has slowly worked her way up the Hawkeye lineup and will likely hold her own in one of the top two singles positions this year."

Jacqueline Lee

Lee is another of three juniors on this year's squad. She is coming off an outstanding sophomore year where she went 19-2 at the No. 4 position including a 9-1 mark in Big Ten play. She also had a 15-match win streak and went 15-5 in doubles. Leee played most of the season at number one doubles with Meg Racette, earning a final 2006 ranking of No. 48 in the FILA Collegiate Tennis Rankings. She was also a 2006 Big Ten Sportsmanship Award Honoree.

"Jacqueline is a hard worker," said Greenan. "She is focused, dedicated and one of the most improved players in the Big Ten. Her determination and work ethic has paid off as she has worked her way from the bottom to the top of the Hawkeye lineup. She will surely embrace playing in one of the top two positions this season."



Kayla Berry

Kayla is the third of three returning juniors on this year's squad. She completed her first year of competition as a Hawkeye after transferring from NAIA Brenau. Her first season as a Hawkeye was highlighted by a 12-10 doubles record, including eight wins against Big Ten opponents.

"Kayla is a well-rounded player possessing all the skills necessary for success in singles and doubles," said Greenan. "Her doubles skills were an important ingredient to our success last year. She worked on her game through the summer and came back playing better and with more confidence. I think Kayla could surprise people this year."

Merel Beelen

Beelen battled injuries last season but enters this season healthy. She recorded nine singles wins in her freshman season. Merel is expected to add depth to the Hawkeye line-up in singles and will have a chance to play doubles this year. She is a big hitter who is going to get better as the season goes on.

"Merel is a lot better player than her results showed last year," said Greenan. "It was her freshman season and the injury slowed her progress. She is very intelligent and fun to coach. She is another player I think will surprise people this year. Merel has huge potential and the passion for tennis to tap that potential."

Jennifer Barnes

Barnes walked on to the team this year and has impressed everybody. With the Hawkeyes being a little short staffed with only six scholarship players this season she will be called upon if someone gets hurt. Barnes will also fill the number six singles position and number three doubles. She is a great athlete and works very hard at practice every day.

"Jennifer works very hard and is improving rapidly," said Greenan. "She is a real pleasure to coach and have on the team. Jennifer has already proven she can win at the Division I level and will just keep getting better in time."



Klockenga is the lone freshman on this year's team. She came to lowa from Overland Park, KS, where she trained at the Mike Wolfe Academy. She has proven successful in both singles and doubles during her junior career. She is an intelligent player who is expected to add depth to the Hawkeye lineup.

"Kelcie has been a great addition to the Hawkeye family," said Greenan. "She is a smart player who is going to get better as she adjusts to college tennis. Kelcie possesses the tools to be successful and I expect she is going do very well as a student-athlete at lowa."



As part of the West Campus Tennis Recreation Center and Sports Activity Fields project, construction of the Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Complex was completed in the summer of 2006 and the building officially opened July 31, 2006.

The new complex is used by the Hawkeye men's and women's tennis, field hockey and soccer teams, as well as students and the public for general recreation. Along with eight indoor courts and 12 outdoor courts, the new facility includes sports medicine facilities, team and public locker rooms, meeting rooms and video rooms. The building also houses lowa tennis offices and a reception area.

For the general public, there is Fitness West - a 2,700 square foot fitness area, an indoor turf facility for intramural and club sports teams and a 3,500 square foot Touch The Earth Outdoor Rental & Resource Center.

Lova Women's Tennis 2006 Season Review ____

The University of Iowa women's tennis team made history in 2006. The Hawkeyes ended the regular season with a 9-1 Big Ten record for a second place conference finish, the best in the history of Iowa women's tennis. The Hawkeyes advanced to the semifinals of the Big Ten Tournament and were invited to compete in the NCAA Tournament.

The Hawkeyes started the season with two home meets, defeating Marquette, 7-0, before falling to Baylor, 2-5. **Meg Racette**, ranked 21st, defeated defending NCAA Champion, Zuzana Zemenova, ranked 17th. lowa then traveled to Colorado to take on Denver and Colorado State. The Hawkeyes, ranked 43rd, lost to 49th-ranked Denver, 5-2, after a hard-fought battle and defeated Colorado State, 6-1.

lowa, continuing competition on the road, defeated Minnesota, 4-3 claiming three singles matches as well as the doubles point. The Hawkeyes also competed against Dartmouth in Minneapolis, winning 5-2. Iowa then traveled to Lincoln, NE, to face Missouri State and Nebraska. Iowa crushed Missouri State, winning 7-0, and after a tough competition against Nebraska, came out with the win, 4-3. In defeating Nebraska, the Hawkeyes also snapped the team's 69 match home non-conference winning streak.

With a 6-2 record and ranked 48th, the Hawkeyes traveled to Drake winning, 7-0. lowa then had a week off before returning to action at Kansas, facing Kansas and Kansas State. The Hawkeyes defeated 74th-ranked Kansas, 4-3, before upsetting No. 45 Kansas State, 4-3.

Now halfway through the season, the 38th-ranked Hawkeyes traveled to No. 2 Notre Dame and No. 66 Ohio State. Iowa was defeated by Notre Dame, 6-1, but unranked **Jacqueline Lee** upset No. 110 Kelcy Tefft (6-4, 7-5). With the win, Lee improved her winning streak to 10 matches. Iowa then defeated 66th ranked Ohio State, 4-3. Ohio State put up a good fight against the Hawkeyes, and the singles tiebreaking match between **Hillary**

Mintz and Ohio State's Sonia Ruzimovsky was the longest of the season at three hours and twenty minutes.

After a long road campaign, the Hawkeyes returned home to host Michigan State and Michigan in April. These matches would mark the first time lowa played in its new home facility, the Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Complex. The 40th-ranked Hawkeyes defeated the Spartans, 6-1, improving their record to 11-3, including 3-0 in Big Ten play. Iowa then went on to upset No. 32 Michigan, winning 5-2. Lee was successful against both teams, improving her win streak to 13 and her spring record to 14-1.

lowa remained at home for another week, hosting Northwestern and Wisconsin. Iowa defeated Wisconsin, 6-1, before losing to No. 9 Northwestern, 5-2. Although the Hawkeyes lost, **Milica Veselinovic** upset 24th ranked Alex Prousis (6-1, 6-2).

Next, lowa traveled to Penn State and Indiana for its last two road meets of the regular season. Iowa, ranked 37th, defeated Penn State, 4-3, and upset No. 35 Indiana, 4-3. Racette and Lee upset Indiana's 57th ranked Batty/McGaffigan, 8-6. The Hawkeyes improved their record to 15-4 overall, including 7-1 against Big Ten opponents.

Returning home for its final regular season meets, Iowa hosted Purdue and Illinois. No. 30 Iowa defeated No. 46 Purdue, 5-2, before defeating Illinois, 5-2. With the wins, the Hawkeyes finished the regular season with the best Big Ten record in school history. In addition, Iowa finished second in the conference with a 9-1 record (18-6 overall).

lowa went into the Big Ten Tournament as the second seed. No. 30 lowa received a first round bye and then defeated Illinois, 4-0, in the quarterfinals. No. 37 Racette defeated No. 62 Macall Harkins (6-4, 6-1) and No. 82 Veselinovic defeated Brianna Knue (6-1, 6-3). lowa fell to No. 31 Michigan, 4-3, in the semfinals. lowa's doubles due of Racette/Lee pulled an

upset, defeating 30th ranked Delicata/Streifler, 8-6. Racette, Lee and Veselinovic each went 9-1 in Big Ten play at their respective singles positions.

The No. 31 Hawkeyes traveled to Maimi, FL, to face No. 39 Florida International in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. FIU upset lowa, 4-1, and the Hawkeyes ended their season with an 18-6 overall record. Racette was selected to compete at the NCAA Individual Championships in Palo Alto, CA, and advanced to the second round after defeating Alex McGoodwin of UCLA (6-4, 5-7, 6-2). Racette was then defeated by Daniela Bercek of Duke (6-4, 6-2). Racette ended her collegiate career on a strong note, going 28-9 in her final season as a Hawkeye.

Throughout the season, the Hawkeyes claimed several honors. Iowa Head Coach **Daryl Greenan** was named Big Ten Coach of the Year. Racette earned one Big Ten Player of the Week honor, and was named to the All-Big Ten team. Lee was named a Big Ten Sportsmanship Award honoree. She and Veselinovic earned academic all-Big Ten honors.



The 2006-07 Hawkeyes posted a 9-1 Big Ten record, going 18-6 in dual competition. Head Coach Daryl Greenan was named Big Ten Coach of the Year and senior Meg Racette earned all-Big Ten honors.



Gary FethkeInterim University President

Interim President Gary Fethke is the former dean of The University of Iowa Henry B. Tippie College of Business and the Leonard A. Hadley Professor of Leadership. A professor of management sciences and economics, he received both his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from The University of Iowa. He was appointed Dean in 1994 after serving one year as Interim Dean. He will step down on June 30, 2006, but will continue on the faculty.

From 1988 to 1993 Dean Fethke served as the Senior Associate Dean of Academic Affairs in the College, and before that he served as Chairman of the Department of Management Sciences. In the years between receiving his Ph.D. at Iowa and returning to the College as a faculty member, he served on the faculty at Bradley University (1968-74). In addition, he taught at the London School of Economics for one year (1981-82) and several summers (1984, '86, '88 and '90). He has published numerous articles in the areas of industrial organization, macroeconomics, and labor economics. His recent research interest focuses on the economics of public higher education.

Dean Fethke spearheaded the expansion of the Executive MBA and the MBA for Professionals and Managers (MBA-PM) Programs. The MBA-PM program is currently being offered in Cedar Rapids, Newton, Des Moines, and the Quad Cities. The Executive MBA Program is now available both on campus and in other lowa cities, as needed, and internationally, in Hong Kong and Beijing, China. A dual degree (MBA-Master's in Systems Engineering) EMBA Program has been taught in Cedar Rapids. During his tenure, the Undergraduate Program of the Tippie College has raised the academic profile of students entering the College and has begun an Early Admissions Program that admits outstanding high school students directly into the Tippie College in their first year on campus, rather than their junior year.

The Sioux City, IA, native headed the planning and coordination of construction for the John Pappajohn Business Building and the Pomerantz Center on The University of Iowa campus, the UI-Cedar Rapids Area Conference and Education Center in Cedar Rapids, and the MBA facilities at the Des Moines W. A. Krause Center and the Newton Polytechnic Campus. He continues an active teaching presence in the EMBA Program.

He is responsible for coordinating the fundraising endeavors of the College with UI Foundation staff. These efforts led to the development of the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center in 1996, the Hawkinson Institute of Business Finance in 1998, the naming of the Henry B. Tippie College of Business in 1999, and a major commitment from Jerre and Mary Joy Stead in 2003. The Tippie College of Business raised \$125 million in the recent University Campaign.

His wife, Carol, is a faculty member of the Economics and Marketing Departments at The University of Iowa. They have two grown sons.



Gary BartaAthletics Director

Gary Barta became the University of Iowa's 11th Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on August 1, 2006. His selection was announced on June 23, 2006.

A native Midwesterner, Barta signed a five-year contract to lead one of the most successful athletic programs in the nation. His wife Connie is a native of Waterloo, IA.

Barta has 19 years of university and athletic

administration experience. Before accepting the lowa position he had been the Wyoming AD since October of 2003. From November 1996 to October 2003, he was senior associate athletic director for external relations and sports programs at the University of Washington in Seattle. From 1990 to 1996, he was associated with the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls, where he was director of athletic development and external relations. He also served as associate director of development at North Dakota State University in Fargo, from 1988-90, where he was responsible for fund raising for athletics, the colleges of business and engineering, and the University's annual fund.

Wyoming received the NCAA Division I-A Program of Excellence Award earlier this year, which honors athletics programs that are superior athletically, academically, and in student-athlete life skill preparation.

The Barta led program at Wyoming was credited with a number of significant accomplishments. The Cowboys played in the 2004 Las Vegas Bowl and posted a victory over UCLA. The women's basketball team won 21 games during the 2005-06 season, a top 20 placing by the women's track team in the NCAA championships in 2005; and a top 25 finish in men's NCAA swimming in 2004. During his three-year tenure, seven Wyoming coaches won Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year awards.

The new lowa Athletics Director has been a successful fund raiser, having helped secure more than \$150 million in private contributions and corporate sponsorships over the past 10 years.

Prior to taking over at Wyoming, he served as Washington's Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Relations and Sports Programs. He was responsible for generating revenue to fund Washington's \$40 million annual intercollegiate athletics budget. While at Washington, Barta was directly involved in a variety of duties including: hiring of coaches and administrative staff; coordinating the schedule for men's basketball; initiating and managing sponsorship relationships and negotiating radio network contracts.

Barta earned his Bachelor of Science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State University in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championships in 1983, 1985 and 1986. He returned to NDSU to begin his career in 1988 as an associate director of development and later director of development.

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (8) and a daughter, Madison (6). He was born Sept. 4, 1963 in Minneapolis, MN.

The University of Iowa Athletic Department, under the direction of Athletic Director Gary Barta, is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation.

The men's and women's departments, operating separately for over 25 years, merged in 2001. It combined nationally recognized programs for both genders into one successful and progressive athletic unit.


Combining their successes on the playing fields with continued success and recognition in the classroom, UI student-athletes practice and perform in some of the best facilities in the nation, while knowing the support of their efforts and attendance by Hawkeye fans ranks among the best in the country.

While the Hawkeyes continue to compete with the best in the nation in a variety of sports, lowa continues to boast some of the most impressive athletic facilities in the nation, operated by one of the most respected departments.

Several new projects are underway on the Iowa campus. Some of the latest additions to the UI campus are the Roy G. Karro Athletics Hall of Fame and Visitors Center, the Russell and Ann Gerdin Athletic Learning Center and the West Campus Tennis-Recreation Center and Sports Activity Fields.


Kinnick Stadium recieved a major up-grading and renovation that was completed in August 2006. The \$89 million project included replacing of the south end zone stands and building a four-level press box that houses 47 guest suites, along with new scoreboards, video walls, cocession stands and restrooms.

Additional priorities for the lowa program include the establishment and development of endowments for all sports programs, the continued enhancement of graduation rates, and the implementation of a long-range plan to ensure lowa's financial,

academic and competitive future. As an example, all of lowa's 13 scholarships for men's basketball are fully endowed.

The graduation rate of lowa's student-athletes has improved in each of the past 10 years and has consistently ranked above the graduation rate of all UI students. Hawkeye athletes have garnered more than 70 academic All-America honors since 1992. The 2005-06 school-year saw the University of Iowa produce 138 academic all-Big Ten athletes.

lowa athletes have been recognized as all-Americans in their sport on 207 occasions during the past 15 years.

lowa's athletic teams during the 2005-06 athletic year continued its trend of success, on the playing fields and in academic pursuits.

The Hawkeye football team enjoyed another good year on the gridiron, going 7-5 and making it's fourth-consecutive January bowl game when it was selected to play the Florida Gators in the Outback

Bowl. lowa followed its 11-2 mark of 2002 with a 10-3 record in 2003 and a 10-2 mark in 2004, finishing each of those seasons ranked eighth nationally.

lowa's men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to post-season play in each of the last six seasons. The men's squad finished with a 25-9 record and won the Big Ten Tournament.

They earned a No. 3 seed in the 2006 NCAA tournament. The women's team advanced to the NCAA tournament for the 16th time.

The lowa wrestling squad will be under new leadership this season as former Hawkeye three-time NCAA Champion and Olympic Gold Medalist Tom Brands returns to his alma mater as head coach. He will be joined on his staff by the legendary Dan Gable, who led lowa to 15 NCAA titles and 21 Big Ten Championships in his 21 seasons as head coach.

lowa's men's and women's and gymnastics teams continue to rank among the best in the nation. The men's team again advanced to the NCAA Championships and the women's gymnastics squad has been in the NCAA meet two of the last four years.

The Hawkeye men's cross country team advanced to the NCAA Championships for the second-consecutive year in the fall of 2004, while sophomore Kineke Alexander won the NCAA Championship in the women's indoor 400-meters.

lowa's women's softball team advanced to NCAA regional action for the 11th time in 13 seasons. lowa has advanced to the softball World Series on four occasions over the past 12 seasons and Coach Gayle Blevins is one of three coaches to reach 1,000 career victories.

From the rankings on the courts and playing fields, to the rankings in the classroom, to the rankings in fan and community support, to the ranking as a program that boasts some of the best athletic facilities in the nation, it's easy to understand why lowa fans everywhere truly believe, "It's great to be a Hawkeye."

Iowa Women's Tennis Athletics Student Services

Since its inception in 1979, Athletics Student Services has evolved from a two-person, academic support service to a broad-based, nationally prominent student support services operation. Its purpose is to offer academic and personal support services that will assist student-athletes in making timely and satisfactory progress toward their degrees and becoming tomorrow's leaders.

Athletics Student Services focuses on four important areas — academic counseling and monitoring, educational and support programs, retention programs and compliance services — when working with student-athletes. Following are descriptions of some of the programs, services and opportunities available in those areas.



The \$4.6 million Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletics Learning Center opened in August of 2003 and gives all lowa student-athletes a state of the art facility to help them with their educations.

The Athletics Learning Center is a multi-level, 20,000 square foot facility which provides a computer center, study areas, classes and meeting places for all Hawkeye student-athletes.


The Learning Center features an auditorium that converts into two classrooms, separate study rooms for under and upper-class student-athletes with 28 study carrels, a computer lab, five tutorial rooms, the book loan repository, office space for Iowa's Student Services staff and a display area to recognize the academic accomplishments of lowa's student-athletes.

Academic Counseling & Monitoring

Athletics coordinators work closely with studentathletes and their university-assigned advisors from the time they arrive on campus until the time they leave the University. Along with focusing on academic planning matters such as goal-setting, plans of study, choosing majors and degree requirements, athletics coordinators also help student-athletes understand NCAA, Big Ten and University academic policies. They also solicit feedback from instructors on academic progress made by student-athletes.

Transition Seminar

All new student-athletes attend an eight-week transition seminar during the fall semester that is geared toward helping them make the transition from high school to college successfully. Seminar topics include time management skills, learning and study strategies, the culture and rules of the university, and life skills concerning alcohol and other substances, relationships and intimacy, diversity, tolerance, values and character.

Retention

A full-time staff member directs the retention program, which identifies student-athletes who may need tailored academic assistance and structure, and implements individualized learning plans to help them succeed. Such plans may include daily and weekly planning sessions with athletics coordinators and retention staff, tutoring, study groups, mainstreaming into on-campus services like the writing center, math labs and services for students with learning disabilities.

Minority Enrichment Program

This program offers a culturally supportive environment in which minority student-athletes have the opportunity to develop friendships and a support network in the university. A core focus group of students and staff coordinate programs such as guest speakers, holiday celebrations, community service activities with the local neighborhood centers, events with Cultural Centers and networking with minority faculty, staff, professional and business leaders.

CHAMPS/Life Skills

Life skills programs are conducted throughout the year with and for student athletes on quality of life issues critical to personal growth, such as personal accountability, responsible use and nonuse of alcohol, diversity and gambling.

Tutoring

Tutoring is available free of charge to all studentathletes. Tutors, who are post-graduates and teachers, help with course content as well as study strategies and are available in virtually all general education program subjects.

Career Guidance & Development

Planning a meaningful career and a fulfilling life is an ongoing process of expanding and narrowing choices, beginning when student-athletes arrive on campus and continuing throughout their college career and lifetime. The professional staff works with other career development professionals on campus to offer individual consultation, career development seminars, workshops, referrals to other campus offices and special events like the Senior Recognition Banquet for graduating student-athletes.

lowa's student-athletes have outperformed the University's entire student population each year since the NCAA started requiring a report of student-athlete graduation rates.



Athletic Training & Sports Medicine

Continuing to set the standard in athletic training and Sports Medicine Service, The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with exemplary medical care. Athletic Training Services connect student-athletes to University Hospitals & Clinics (UIHC) resources and specialty areas. Iowa's staff of 10 full-time licensed athletic trainers and 7 graduate assistant licensed athletic trainers provide health care services within of five athletic training rooms: injury rehabilitation programs and prevention programs. With physical conditioning as a major component of a prevention programs, the athletic trainers combine with strength and conditioning coaches to pave the way for safe, effective, and enhanced participation in intercollegiate athletics.

Services from the UIHC, among the world's largest university-owned teaching hospitals, support the efforts of the athletic trainers and other specialty sports medicine staff. Located next to Kinnick Stadium, the hospital offers a cutting-edge environment where staff physicians, sports medicine fellows, sports physical therapists, and athletic trainers care for student-athletes and produce successful outcomes. Dedicated research and education result in outstanding care.

Athletic trainers form a team with orthopaedic and primary care physicians for every Hawkeye sport. Many of the physicians are fellowship trained in their specialty area and lecture locally, nationally, and around the world. In addition each athlete has access to orthodontists, nutritionists, psychologists, and specialty physicians at the UIHC. Immediate accessibility to see physicians and other health care professionals provides expertise for comprehensive health care that returns the student-athlete to practice and competition.

Tennis Athletic Training Facilities

The University of Iowa women's tennis team utilizes the Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Complex Athletic Training Room as the practice and competition athletic training room. The Hawkeyes also use the Recreation Building Athletic Training Room along with the Iowa men's tennis, baseball, cross country, track and field and soccer teams. The athletic training staff for the both facilities consists of associate director Doug West, PhD, LAT, CSCS and three graduate assistant licensed athletic trainers.



The Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Complex Athletic Training Room has excellent facilities to conduct evaluations, treatments, and rehabilitation for women's tennis student-athletes.

Both facilities have excellent spaces to conduct evaluations, treatments, and rehabilitation for the student-athlete. Within the Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Complex is a spacious room with equipment to enhance treatment, rehabilitation, cardiopulmonary, and strength performance. Equipment utilized by the student-athletes includes: ellipticals, treadmills, and bikes by Precor, strength equipment and open space to conduct rehabilitation and prevention techniques. There are also traditional electrical stimulation, ultrasound, and moist heat treatment options. The Recreation Building Athletic Training Room offers the LeMond independent pedal bike with PowerCranks, and the Keiser Functional Trainer, as well as TENS, hydrocollator, and hydrotherapy treatment options in addition to the treatment and strength performance equipment available in the Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Complex. The treatment, rehabilitative and preventive options in both facilities keep the Hawkeye's on the court for practice and competition.

The Hawkeye Strength Training Program

The program is designed to develop strength, explosiveness, speed, coordination, balance and flexibility. All qualities are developed through progression of exercises in four phases of training:

- 1. work capacity ability to perform work for a prolonged time and recover quickly
- 2. strength ability to exert force
- 3. **power** ability to exert strength quickly
- 4. **speed** ability to move the body in shortest time possible

The highest level of performance is achieved by training under close supervision, in a year-round program. Improvement is monitored closely through the newest and best technology. Electronic timing devices are used to measure sprints, while a microcomputer device is used to monitor peak velocity and power outputs in weight training movements. With this technological support, the athletes are constantly receiving immediate feedback on their development.

Strength & Conditioning Mission

"The mission of our strength and conditioning program is performance enhancement, while reducing the risk of injury through a detailed progression of exercises."



The 1,800-square foot Recreation Building strength training facility is equipped with eight Olympic platforms, squat racks, medicine balls, physio balls and over 10,000 pounds of free weights.

The Colleges

Freshmen who enroll at The University of Iowa are admitted to either the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences or the College of Engineering. The General Education Program allows students to sample courses in more than 100 areas of study. At Iowa, students are required to take electives, major courses, and general education course work.

Liberal Arts & Sciences

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Arts (BA) and Science (BS) in 58 major fields; Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Music (BM) and of Liberal Studies (BLS).

Admission - Freshmen and transfer students are to meet the college's admissions requirements.

Engineering

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Science in Engineering (BSE) in six majors- biomedical, chemical, civil, electrical, industrial, and mechanical engineering.

Admission - Students must meet the college's high admissions requirements.



Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Business Administration

(BBA) in six majors: accounting, economics, finance, management, management information systems, and marketing.

Nursing

Undergraduate Degrees Offered: Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN).

Admission: Students complete one year of pre-requisite courses in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and apply for admission during the second semester of the first year. The College of Nursing has competitive admission. The BSN requires three years of study once the student earns admission.

Pharmacy

Professional Degree Offered - Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD)

Admission - Students must successfully complete required pre-pharmacy course work in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. These requirements may be met in two years but do not guarantee admission. Students must also complete the Pharmacy College Admission Test (PCAT).

Graduate and Professional Degrees

Many student-athletes who have attended The University of Iowa and completed their undergraduate degrees continue their education at the University.

Student-athletes who attend graduate or professional school must first complete course work toward a bachelor's degree in their field of study. The University also offers undergraduates the

opportunity to participate in research and overseas study programs, as well as internships that will help prepare them for graduate school.

Housing

Each athletics team has its own rules regarding residence of incoming freshmen. Across the University, about 90 percent of freshmen choose to live on campus in one of the 10 residence halls. Most student-athletes live at least two years on campus.

The residence halls have full-service dining rooms, study lounges, laundry facilities, recreational facilities, vending, and bank machines. Each room has high-speed computer connections for e-mail and Internet access, plus there are wireless networking hot spots in a variety of locations across campus. Iowa also offers wireless networking in 52 buildings and several outdoor areas, providing more than 265 access points across campus.

Safety

- 11:55 p.m. 2:10 a.m.: Free SafeRide buses take students home Fridays and Saturdays during the fall and spring semesters.
- Special telephones with blue lights are stationed across campus with a direct link to the UI Department of Public Safety.
- University of Iowa Police personnel educate students on safety during summer orientation.
- The Rape Victim Advocacy Program cooperates with the UI Department of Public Safety and participates in Sexual Crime Awareness Week.

Libraries

The University of Iowa Libraries supports the academic achievement of all student-athletes with specialized courses, one-on-one consultations with librarians, 24/7 access to electronic resources through the web site (www. lib.uiowa.edu), and extended hours, which can accommodate complicated practice and travel schedules. UI Librarians help students find answers, whether they're on a web site, in a book, journal, government document, or database. Librarians also plan and teach students how to find, evaluate, and use information from a variety of sources—skills they will use throughout their lives.

Career Planning

Finding and pursuing a career takes careful planning. The Pomerantz Career Center is extremely valuable for student-athletes and can help identify stills that transfer from athletics to the workplace. The program suggests a timeline each student-athlete may follow throughout his or her stay at lowa. The components of the program include:

Computers

There are 26 Instructional Technology Centers all over the campus which are filled with 1,200 computers. These facilities are open at least 50 hours a week. Some are open 24 hours. Also, the Information Arcade in the Main Library provides a variety of specialized computing tools. The Computer Demo Center provides information for students who want to purchase computers and software.

Skills Labs & Support

Many academic departments offer skills labs to help students improve skills necessary to succeed at lowa, such as writing, speaking, math, science, and foreign language. Assistance with skills such as note-taking, time-management, and test-taking are available through resources such as the College Transition Seminar (a credit-bearing course offered through University College), University Counseling Services, and Athletic Student Services staff.

Health Services

The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available. Students at Iowa can go to Student Health Service, which is open Monday through Friday. The service is supported by a fee paid by all full-time students. It offers students unlimited free office visits (there is a charge for other procedures done in the office, such as blood tests).

Cultural Centers

Four cultural centers on campus provide a welcoming setting where students from various cultures can find cultural, academic, and personal support services: the Latino and Native American Cultural Center, the Afro American Cultural Center, the Asian Pacific American Cultural Center, and the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Resource and Education Center.

Cambus

There are six primary bus routes throughout the lowa campus. The University Cambus provides over three million free rides to class and to the dorms for students each year. Some routes run seven days a week, and some run until 2:30 a.m. Cambus also operates a specialized transportation service for persons with disabilities.



lowa City is located in eastern lowa and is an easy trip to such cities as Des Moines (the capital of lowa), Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, and Minneapolis. Also, Cedar Rapids, a city of more than 150,000, is just a short drive north of lowa City. The Eastern lowa Airport, which links residents to every major airport in the Midwest, nation and world, is only 20 minutes away.



The "Ped Mall" is a relaxed, no-carsallowed outdoor plaza in the heart of downtown lowa City which has cafes, boutiques, outdoor food vendors and street performers.

Old Capitol

One of the most recognizable sites in Iowa City is the gold dome of the Old Capitol which is situated in the heart of downtown. Built in 1840, it is Iowa City's most historic building. The Old Capitol was the site of the first governor inauguration as well as the first six Iowa General Assemblies. It is also where the state's Constitution was drafted. When the capital was moved to Des Moines in 1857, the Old Capitol was dedicated to The University of Iowa, becoming the first building owned by the University.

Coralville Lake

Just north of Iowa City is Coralville Lake, an outdoor recreational area that offers a variety of opportunities for the public. Coralville Lake offers picnic shelters, biking, hiking, fishing, boating, swimming, hunting, camping, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, golf and disc golf.

Pedestrian Mall

Located downtown and in walking distance of many of the University's dormitories is the Pedestrian Mall. It is a perfect place to sit outside and study or hang out with friends. During the fall, spring and summer months there are concerts and art festivals in the Pedestrian Mall.

Coral Ridge Mall

The Coral Ridge Mall is a 1.2-million-square-foot shopping center located just minutes from the UI campus. The center combines a mix of over 120 specialty shops and strong department stores including Dillards, JC Penney, Sears, Target and Younkers. Coral Ridge also offers entertainment features such as an NHL-regulation-sized indoor ice arena, state-of-the-art 10-screen movie theatre and a large carousel along with a 1,000-seat food court with sit-down restaurants. Specialty stores include Abercrombie & Fitch, Barnes & Noble, Gap, Old Navy, Scheels All Sports and Pier 1 Imports.

The Hawkeye Nickname

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, The Last of the Mohicans, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them. In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison. Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawkeye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.


Herky The Hawkeye

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa. The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky. Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron. During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.



For 40 years lowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide what are now the school official colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of lowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.





School Fight Song

The lowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, Iowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man," Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of Iowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletics events the year around.
