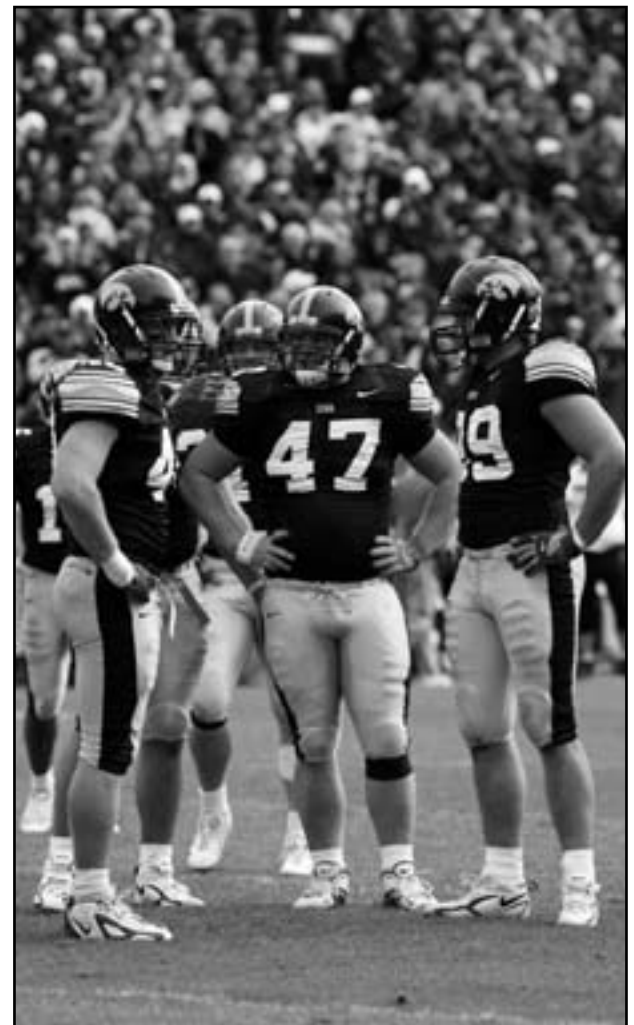

GAME RECAP

Iowa won its sixth-straight season opener, defeating Montana 41-7 in Kinnick Stadium. The win was Kirk Ferentz's 50th win as head coach at Iowa.

The Hawkeyes jumped out to a 17-0 halftime advantage after touchdown receptions by RB Albert Young (5 yards) and WR Dominique Douglas (9 yards) and a 41-yard field goal by Austin Signor.

Montana scored its only points following an Iowa fumble, which it converted into a touchdown in the third quarter. Leading 17-7, Iowa closed the game with 24 unanswered points, scoring on its last four possessions.

QB Drew Tate completed his third touchdown pass when he found TE Scott Chandler in the end zone for a six-yard score to extend Iowa's lead to 24-7 late in the third period.

Young scored on a five-yard run, RB Dana Brown scored from one yard and Signor converted a 35-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

Tate completed 15-28 passes for 223 yards and three touchdowns. Young rushed for 93 yards and a touchdown and also caught four passes for 55 yards and a score. Douglas, a true freshman, had three receptions for 43 yards and a 25-yard punt return.

Signor replaced starting place kicker Kyle Schlicher, who sat out with an injury. The redshirt freshman made all five PATs and both field goal attempts in his first college game.

Iowa's defense was stifling, as it limited Montana to 144 total yards, including just 10 rushing yards. The 10 yards rushing are the second-fewest under Ferentz. The Grizzlies were only able to advance the ball past the Hawkeye 30-yard line once, that following Iowa's lone turnover. Iowa collected an interception and forced Montana to punt five times in its six first-half possessions.

Junior LB Mike Klinkenborg recorded a team and career-high 11 tackles. Junior DE Bryan Mattison and sophomore DL Mitch King combined for 14 tackles, including five for loss.

GAME RECAP

Iowa used a tremendous goal line stand in the second overtime to take a 20-13 win at Syracuse. The Hawkeyes won on the road despite committing four turnovers as starting QB Drew Tate missed the game due to an abdominal strain. Senior Jason Manson led the Hawkeye offense the entire day, earning a victory in his first career start at quarterback.

The exciting end in the second overtime came after RB Albert Young had scored Iowa's second touchdown of the day on Iowa's possession. Syracuse used a pass interference penalty to gain a first down at the Iowa two-yard line. Two plays failed to gain a touchdown before another Iowa penalty gave the Orange another first down. The Iowa defense held on four straight running plays from there to earn the victory. All told, Syracuse failed to score after running eight plays from inside the Iowa five yard line.

Both teams had converted short field goals in the first overtime before Iowa's defense slammed the door in the second extra period. The win was the first September road win for Iowa since 2003 and improved Iowa's overtime record to 3-1, including 2-0 in double overtime.

Syracuse marched 78 yards in 13 plays and scored a touchdown on its first possession to take an early 7-0 advantage. The three-yard scoring pass was initially ruled incomplete before the call was changed after instant replay was used. Iowa's defense rallied after the first score and forced the Orange to only three points the remainder of the contest, that coming in the final seconds of the fourth period. The Hawkeyes forced Syracuse to punt seven times and also snuffed out a fake punt attempt.

Manson engineered a nine-play, 67-yard scoring drive to even the game at 7-7 in the second quarter when he connected with TE Scott Chandler for a one-yard scoring strike. Manson was a perfect 4-4 on the drive, throwing for 43 yards. RB Damian Sims rushed for 40 yards and had an 11-yard reception on the drive.

PK Kyle Schlicher put the Hawkeyes in front 10-7 with a 24-yard field goal late in the third quarter. Iowa maintained a three-point lead until Syracuse converted a 41-yard field goal with six seconds left to send the game into overtime.

Manson completed 16-32 passes for 202 yards. He threw one touchdown pass, the first of his career, but had four interceptions. Young carried the ball 18 times for 73 yards and one score. TE Scott Chandler caught six passes for 65 yards and one touchdown, all in the first half.

FS Marcus Paschal and LB Mike Klinkenborg led Iowa with 12 tackles. The 12 stops are a career-high for Klinkenborg and match a career best for Paschal. DE Kenny Iwebema had 11 tackles (9 solo), also a career-high, including three tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks. DL Mitch King equaled Iwebema in tackles for loss and sacks.

GAME RECAP

Trailing 17-10 in the third quarter, Iowa scored 17 unanswered points for a 27-17 victory over in-state rival Iowa State in Kinnick Stadium. The win regains possession of the Cy-Hawk Trophy and marks Iowa's third victory over ISU in the past four seasons.

Iowa State took advantage of a 62-yard KO return to start the game, jumping to a 7-0 advantage. Iowa got on the board later in the first period on a 38-yard field goal from Kyle Schlicher. After ISU had taken a 14-3 lead late in the second period, Iowa responded with a touchdown just before halftime. The score came on an 11-yard pass from Drew Tate to Andy Brodell following a 27-yard completion to TE Scott Chandler.

Tate connected with TE Tony Moeaki on a 19-yard touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17 late in the third period. After forcing an ISU punt, Brodell produced a 31-yard punt return to punt the Hawkeye offense in good field position, giving Iowa a chance for its first lead of the game. Tate concluded the scoring drive with a two-yard scoring strike to FB Tom Busch to give Iowa a 24-17 advantage early in the final period.

The Iowa defense was outstanding in the second half, holding Iowa State to just three points. Iowa State was unable to take advantage of the only turnover in the game midway through the final period and Schlicher converted a 44-yard field goal with 42 seconds remaining to give the Hawkeyes a 27-17 advantage and secure the win.

Tate, who missed the previous week's game due to an abdominal strain, completed 26-38 passes for 274 yards and three touchdowns. He distributed the ball to nine different receivers. Tate also rushed five times for 31 yards.

Leading the Hawkeye receivers was true freshman Dominique Douglas, who had six receptions for 88 yards. Chandler caught five passes for 52 yards.

Defensively, LB Edmond Miles collected a team-high nine tackles (two solo). DB Charles Godfrey tied a career-high with eight stops (all solo), while DB Devon Moylan established a career high with eight tackles (1 solo) in his first career start. LB Mike Klinkenborg, whose father passed away the previous Sunday, started and amassed eight tackles (3 solo), earning national honors as the Walter Camp Defensive Player of the Week.

Iowa scored three touchdowns within a 4:08 span in the second quarter to lift the Hawkeyes to a 24-7 victory over Illinois in Memorial Stadium. Kirk Ferentz became Iowa's second all-time winningest coach with the win. The win was also Iowa's fourth-straight over the Fighting Illini, its longest streak in the 67 games of the series that began in 1899.

Tate completed 17-27 passes for 190 yards and a touchdown. Freshman WR Dominique Douglas added 64 yards on five receptions.

The Hawkeye defense sacked Illinois quarterbacks three times and also collected four interceptions. Iowa turned two of the miscues into 10 points. DB Adam Shada collected a career-high two thefts, while DB Miguel Merrick and DB Devon Moylan each intercepted a pass. LB Mike Klinkenborg registered a team-high 10 tackles (3 solo), while LB Edmond Miles was credited with seven stops (4 solo), including one for loss, and one forced fumble.

Punter Andy Fenstermaker had another good day in windy conditions. He averaged 35.8 yards per punt, dropping three of his eight kicks inside the 20 and allowing Illinois a minus one yard on punt return yards.

Jake Christensen started at quarterback for the injured Drew Tate, completing 19-30 passes for 256 yards and two touchdowns. Christensen became Iowa's first left-handed quarterback to start since Phil Sues (1977-80) and the first redshirt freshman to start since Jon Beutjer in 2000.

Iowa took a 17-0 lead in the first half. RB Albert Young scored on a seven-yard run, WR Dominique Douglas caught a six-yard touchdown pass following a Marcus Paschal interception and PK Kyle Schlicher converted a 38-yard field goal.

Northern Illinois' Garrett Wolfe scored on a one-yard run on the first play of the fourth period to cut the Iowa advantage to 17-7. The Huskies added another touchdown on their next possession to trim the Hawkeye lead to 17-14 with 8:40 remaining. Christensen responded by engineering a nine-play, 80-yard drive that consumed 4:44 and culminated with a TE Scott Chandler 10-yard scoring reception with 3:56 remaining, stretching the Iowa advantage to 24-14.

Young eclipsed the century mark for the first time this season, rushing for a game-high 124 yards on 25 attempts. Chandler led Iowa receivers with five catches for 63 yards. WR Andy Brodell caught three passes for 64 yards.

Wolfe, who entered the game as the nation's leading rusher, was limited to 66 rushing yards on 22 attempts. The Hawkeye defense held the Huskies to 196 total yards and 73 yards rushing; entering the contest Northern Illinois averaged 412.2 yards total offense and 201.4 yards rushing.

Iowa's defense was led by LB Edmond Miles, LB Mike Klinkenborg and DE Bryan Mattison. Miles and Klinkenborg each collected a team-best 11 tackles. Klinkenborg also recovered a fumble. Mattison posted nine tackles and was credited with two pass break-ups and OLB Mike Humpal joined Paschal with an interception.

GAME RECAP

Northwestern scored the game's first 14 points and held on to defeat Iowa for the second straight year, 21-7 at Kinnick Stadium. The loss was only Iowa's third in its last 30 games at Kinnick Stadium.

The Wildcats scored touchdowns on two of their first three possessions to grab a 14-0 advantage in the first half. Northwestern's second touchdown came after recovering an Iowa QB Drew Tate fumble on Iowa's six yard line. Iowa's best chance to get on the scoreboard in the second half ended with a pass interception at the Wildcat goal line.

Trailing 14-0, Iowa trimmed the deficit to seven on a three-yard RB Damian Sims scoring run with 3:46 left in the third period. Iowa reached Northwestern territory midway through the final period before being forced to punt and Iowa's final possession ended with a tipped pass being intercepted. Northwestern added its third touchdown late in the fourth quarter to seal the victory.

Tate completed 18-27 passes for 147 yards and had two interceptions and a fumble. RB Albert Young rushed 18 times for 72 yards, while WR Dominique Douglas caught a season-high seven passes for 78 yards to lead the Hawkeye offensive attack.

Northwestern QB C.J. Bacher completed 19-29 passes for 218 yards and a touchdown. RB Tyrell Sutton carried the ball 28 times for a game-high 168 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, Iowa collected interceptions by DB Charles Godfrey and DB Miguel Merrick. Iowa had two players post double-figures tackles: linebackers Mike Klinkenborg and Edmond Miles. Klinkenborg collected a career-high 16 tackles, including a sack, while Miles was credited with 10 stops, including one for loss, and a pass break-up.

GAME RECAP

Wisconsin snapped a four-game losing streak to Iowa with a 24-21 victory in Kinnick Stadium. The win gives the Badgers' possession of the Heartland Trophy for the first time since it was introduced in 2004.

Wisconsin back-up QB Tyler Donovan completed 17-24 passes and threw two touchdown passes and WR Luke Swan caught four passes for a game-high 113 yards and a touchdown to lead the Badgers to victory.

The Badgers grabbed an early 10-0 lead, but the Hawkeyes erased the early deficit with consecutive seven-play touchdown drives capped by QB Drew Tate scoring passes to TE Tony Moeaki (four yards) and FB Tom Busch (three yards). Wisconsin reclaimed the lead 17-14 on a 42-yard touchdown pass from Donovan to Swan with 42 seconds left in the half.

The Badgers scored their final touchdown on a 15-play, 97-yard drive that consumed 7:40 early in the fourth period. Tate connected with WR Trey Stross for a 26-yard touchdown with 10:20 left to cut the Badger advantage to 24-21. The scoring reception was the first of Stross' career. Iowa had two more possessions, but failed to score.

Wisconsin, who had allowed only three passing touchdowns the previous 10 games combined, allowed Tate to complete three in Iowa's home finale. In addition to the three scoring strikes, Tate completed 10-31 passes for 170 yards. RB Damian Sims rushed seven times for 53 yards.

Wisconsin dominated time of possession, holding the ball for 38:48, compared to Iowa's 21:12.

Defensively, Iowa had four players post double-digit tackles. DB Marcus Paschal was credited with a game and career-high 14. LB Mike Klinkenborg tallied 12, LB Edmond Miles amassed 11 and DT Matt Kroul collected a career-high 10. DT Mitch King had eight tackles (seven solo), including 1.5 for loss. DB Charles Godfrey and Bradley Fletcher each forced a fumble, while King and Paschal each recovered a fumble.

GAME RECAP

Minnesota turned five Iowa turnovers into 21 points, snapping its five-game losing streak to Iowa with a 34-24 win in the 100th meeting between the two teams in the Metrodome. The Golden Gophers reclaimed possession of Floyd of Rosedale with the victory.

Iowa scored points on three of its first five possessions on a WR Andy Brodell 50-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate, a RB Albert Young one-yard scoring run and PK Kyle Schlicher 37-yard field goal.

Trailing 20-17, Iowa had first-and-goal from the three yard line late in the second period, but Minnesota intercepted Tate at the goal line to thwart the Iowa threat.

Iowa's first two second-half possessions ended in interceptions, which Minnesota converted into 14 points to build a 34-17 advantage. TE Scott Chandler caught a three-yard touchdown pass midway through the fourth quarter to trim the Hawkeye deficit to 34-24, but Iowa was unable to score on its final two possessions.

Tate completed 26-36 passes to 11 different receivers for 354 yards and two touchdowns and finished with 365 yards of total offense. The 354 yards passing, rank 15th-best in Iowa single-game annals while the 365 yards total offense rank 13th-best. Tate has eclipsed 300 yards passing in seven career games.

Brodell finished with seven receptions for 159 yards and a score, both career highs. His performance ties him with Marv Cook for Iowa's 13th-highest single-game receiving total.

Young carried the ball 25 times for a season-high 133 yards, topping the 100-yard plateau for the second time this season and tenth time in his career. The 133 yards moved him past Dennis Mosley and into eighth in Iowa career rushing with 2,141 yards.

Minnesota RB Amir Pinnix rushed 23 times for 119 yards and two touchdowns, while QB Bryan Cupito completed 18-30 passes for 267 yards and two touchdowns.

LB Mike Klinkenborg amassed a team-high 10 tackles. LB Edmond Miles became the 56th Iowa Hawkeye to collect 200 career stops as Miles' four tackles increased his career total to 200.

GAME RECAP

Texas outscored Iowa 23-10 in the final three quarters en route to a 26-24 Alamo Bowl victory over the Hawkeyes in front of a bowl-record 65,875 fans in the Alamodome. The game also marked the most watched bowl game ever on ESPN.

Iowa sprinted out of the gates, scoring touchdowns on its first two possessions. RB Albert Young scored on a one-yard run and WR Andy Brodell caught a 63-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate. The 63-yard pass is the longest touchdown pass in Iowa bowl history.

After a Texas field goal, Iowa looked to stretch its lead to 21-3 on a nine-yard touchdown reception by TE Scott Chandler, but a flag negated the score. Texas intercepted a Tate pass in the end zone on the very next play. The Longhorns took advantage of Iowa's misfortune and turned the turnover into seven points. Iowa maintained a 14-10 lead at halftime.

The Longhorns scored the next 10 points on a 43-yard field goal and a 72-yard touchdown pass to grab a 20-14 advantage midway through the third period. Iowa quickly answered with a four-play, 68-yard drive that culminated with a 23-yard touchdown reception by Brodell.

Texas responded with a touchdown on its following possession to go ahead 26-21. Iowa added a PK Kyle Schlicher 38-yard field goal late with 6:20 remaining to cut the deficit to 26-24.

Tate completed 15-25 passes for 274 yards and two touchdowns. Brodell tied an Iowa bowl record with two touchdown receptions and matched a career high with 159 receiving yards on six receptions. Furthermore, the 159 yards is an Alamo Bowl receiving record, besting Michigan's Amani Toomer's 135 yards, set in 1995.

Texas QB Colt McCoy was named the Most Outstanding Offensive Player. McCoy completed 26-40 passes for 308 yards and two scores.

Four Hawkeyes recorded seven tackles or more. DB Miguel Merrick had a team-high eight tackles. DB Charles Godfrey and LB Ed Miles each were credited with seven stops. LB Zach Gabelmann, who started in place of the injured LB Mike Klinkenborg, also collected a career-high seven tackles.

The Iowa Hawkeyes play their home football games in Kinnick Stadium (capacity 70,585), located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes drive from Interstate 80 and 380 and is less than 30 minutes from the Eastern Iowa Airport in Cedar Rapids.

The Paul J. Brechler Press Box at Kinnick is on the west side and accessible by elevator or stairs. The facility is named in honor of the former UI athletic director (1947-60). It was completed prior to the 2006 season as part of the two-year, \$90 million renovation of Kinnick Stadium.

The four-level facility extends from goal line to goal line. The media section, including the press section, radio and television booths and game management operations, are located on the fourth level. Level one includes private suites and indoor club seating, level two includes outdoor club seating and level three is private suites.

Refreshments and snacks are available throughout each game and a pre-game meal is served for the media.

Ferentz Conferences/ Interview Requests

Coach Kirk Ferentz holds a media conference each Tuesday at 12:30 p.m. during the football season. Players are also available, upon request, at 1 p.m. following the media conference.

Player requests must be made on Saturdays, following each game, for the following week. Out of town media should contact the sports information office on Mondays to arrange telephone interviews.

Coach Ferentz is also available each Tuesday during the Big Ten Conference coaches tele-conference (11:40 a.m., CT), and, he is also available via tele-conference for visiting media outlets. Those tele-conferences are held each Tuesday at noon. Contact Iowa Sports Information for the tele-conference phone number and details.

Credentials

Season and single-game credential requests for Iowa football must now be requested online. Please contact Theresa Walenta (theresawalenta@uiowa.edu) for instructions. Season requests must be received by August 24 to assure a season seat in the press box.

Once a credential request is submitted, you will receive an automatic reply stating that your request has been received. You will receive another notification when your request has been approved or denied. Credentials will be mailed if the request is received 10 days prior to a game. Credentials may also be picked up in the Sports Information Office on the Friday prior to game day or left at the media will call gate (Gate I) at Kinnick Stadium on game day.

Reporters may not use a credential to cover the game for another newspaper, TV station, radio or internet site. Failure to comply will result in both agencies credentials being revoked for the entire season.

Parking

Requests for parking should be made when requesting credentials online. Media parking is located in the parking ramp at the northeast corner of Kinnick Stadium, at the corner of Hawkins Drive and Stadium Drive.

Media Entrance

Members of the media are encouraged to enter Kinnick Stadium at the northeast corner of the stadium (near the old Iowa lockerroom entrance) and proceed through the north and west concourses to elevator F, located at the midway point of the west stands. The media may also enter through Gate I on the west side of Kinnick and proceed to elevator F.

Photo/TV Credentials

Photo credentials must be requested following the same guidelines as mentioned above. A photographer's room is located at the northwest corner of Kinnick Stadium. Photo credentials must be presented in order to receive an armband for sideline photography. Entrance to the photo room is through the tunnel in the middle of the west concourse. From the playing field, the photo room may be accessed through the tunnel at the Northwest corner of the field.

Television stations are not allowed to video tape from the press box. A splitter board is available in the photo room for all TV stations to receive the overhead video provided by Iowa's football video department (or the network midfield camera). TV camera personnel on the sidelines must adhere to all sideline policies.

Services

Complete play-by-play, halftime statistics, final team and individual stats, complete defensive stats, drive charts, participation charts and quotes from both head coaches are available following each home game. The Kinnick Stadium press facility closes four hours following each home game.

Telephones

Iowa provides a limited number of telephones in the main press box area for use on a first-come, first-serve basis. Media requiring their own phone lines should call 319-335-2945 and ask for a work order clerk.

High Speed Internet Access

Hard wire high speed internet access is available at every media seat in the Kinnick Stadium press box. Wireless internet access is available in the post-game interview rooms.

FAX Machine

A FAX machine is available in the Kinnick Stadium press box, and information will be faxed upon request.

Post-Game Information Via E-Mail

All game statistics, notes and quotes will be e-mailed from Kinnick Stadium following Iowa home games when requested. This information is filed in pdf format and is sent within 30-45 minutes following home games. To receive this information, contact a member of the Iowa sports information staff. This information is also posted on the Iowa website, www.hawkeyesports.com, following each Iowa game throughout the season.

Accommodations

A directory of hotels, motels, restaurants and available air transportation can be found on page 15 of this guide. The Iowa sports information office does reserve a block of rooms at the Quality Inn & Suites in Iowa City, and those are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Contact Theresa Walenta in the Iowa Sports Information office (319-335-9411) for reservations.

Post-Game Interviews

Both team lockerroom facilities are located under the south end zone. All player and coaches interviews will take place in the designated media rooms. You may follow a member of the Iowa Sports Information staff from the press box or ask for written directions on getting to the post-game media rooms.

Both head coaches are available (in different areas) following the cooling off period, with player interviews to follow. Coach Ferentz' post game comments are televised on the monitors throughout the Kinnick Stadium press box and quotes from both head coaches are distributed following the interview sessions.

Members of the media should contact Iowa SID Phil Haddy with player requests prior to leaving the press box. Iowa Sports Information staff will be departing the press box with approximately three minutes remaining in the game.

THE HAWKEYE RADIO NETWORK

Fans of the University of Iowa following the Hawkeyes on radio can tune in on their favorite station throughout the state of Iowa and the Midwest.

The radio voice of the Hawkeyes is Gary Dolphin, a Cascade, IA native who handles all play-by-play action of both Iowa football and men's basketball throughout the season. In addition, Dolphin also serves as the host of the weekly coaches shows during the season with football Coach Kirk Ferentz and men's basketball Coach Todd Lickliter. Dolphin, in 2001, was named the Iowa Sportscaster of the Year. He is in his 12th year of broadcasting Iowa football and basketball on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Dolphin, overall, is in his 35th year of play-by-play broadcasting. That includes six years of broadcasting basketball games for Northwestern University.



The Iowa radio broadcasts throughout the football season feature the play-by-play commentary of Gary Dolphin (right) and color analysis provided by former Hawkeye standout Ed Podolak.

Dolphin is joined on all University of Iowa football broadcasts by former Hawkeye and NFL great Ed Podolak. A native of Atlantic, IA, Podolak was a three-year letterman for the Hawkeyes (1966-68) as a quarterback and running back before his lengthy professional career with the Kansas City Chiefs. He has been a part of Iowa football broadcasts for over 25 years. Iowa's sideline reporter is Rob Brooks, son of Hall of Fame broadcaster, Bob Brooks.

The Hawkeye Radio Network, a production of Learfield Communications, Inc. of Jefferson City, MO, blankets the state of Iowa and bordering states with more than 50 stations providing live coverage. The Hawkeyes can also be heard on the world wide web (hawkeyesports.com), on XM Satellite radio and over the telephone on "TEAMLINE."

Your hosts in the Kinnick Stadium pressbox include Sports Information Director Phil Haddy, associate Steve Roe and assistants Aaron Blau, Traci Wagner and Matthew Weitzel. Theresa Walenta is the office secretary. The sports information staff also includes student staff members Lauren Dickson, Jordyn Hatcher, Jake Holtorf, Brad Rudner, Patrick Sojka, Jenni Stumpf and Carson Tigges.

Haddy became part of the Hawkeye staff in 1971 and was named director of sports information in July, 1993. A native of Cedar Rapids, he holds two degrees from Iowa and has worked for two radio stations. Phil and his wife, Elaine, have a son, Jason, and a daughter, Jamie. Weitzel has served as an assistant sports information director since 1998. BIG TEN TELEVISION AGREEMENTS

Over the last few years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

ABC/ESPN

In June of 2006, the Big Ten signed a new 10-year national rights contract with ABC/ESPN. Big Ten action has been featured on ABC since 1966 and on ESPN since 1979, the network's first year. The new agreement, which begins during the 2007-08 season, includes up to 41 televised Big Ten football games – up to 17 on ABC and up to 25 on ESPN or ESPN2. In addition, all regional afternoon football games aired on ABC will be aired by ESPN/ESPN2 in outer-markets, making these games nationally available. Additionally, through ESPN's collection of new media outlets such as ESPN.com, Mobile ESPN, ESPN360 and ESPN VOD, fans will receive live events (including simulcasts), extended video highlights including in-progress games, features and more. Big Ten coverage will also be available on ESPN Classic and throughout the world through ESPN International.

BIG TEN NETWORK

In June 2006, the Big Ten announced the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. Available to all cable and satellite providers nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television (HDTV), the network will allow fans to see their home teams, regardless of where they live.

The network is led by President Mark Silverman, a former Disney executive who came to the network after serving as the general manager and senior vice president of ABC Cable Networks Group since April of 2004, managing the company's equity in such channels as Lifetime Television, A&E Network and the History Channel, each of which recorded their best financial performance in 2005. Silverman was also responsible for developing and launching new cable channels, shows and other key initiatives.

The Big Ten Network launches its inaugural season in August 2007 with football, men's and women's basketball, a nightly studio show, classics and coaches shows, along with more Olympic sporting events and exposure for women's sports than has ever been aired on any other network. In June 2007, the Big Ten announced that the Big Ten Network will become the first national network to commit to "event equality" for men's and women's sports on all network-controlled media within the first three years of launch. This dedication to "event equality" highlights the Big Ten's ongoing dedication to gender equity, which is aligned with the commitment of conference institutions to provide fairness for all female student-athletes.

The programming on the Big Ten Network and alternative network-controlled platforms will include, but is not limited to:

- ⊙ More than 35 football games each season
- ⊙ More than 105 regular season men's basketball games
- ⊙ A nightly studio show including segments from each campus
- ⊙ Women's sports, including basketball, volleyball, soccer and softball
- ⊙ More than 170 Olympic sporting events including baseball, soccer, tennis, volleyball, swimming, diving and more
- ⊙ Classic games and historical footage from ESPN and ABC libraries
- ⊙ Original campus programming produced by Big Ten member universities showcasing their academic excellence, talented students and award-winning programs
- ⊙ Weekly coaches shows

Big Ten Network Studio Host

Located in the historic Montgomery Ward building in Chicago, the Big Ten Network is the first national television network to call the largest city in the Midwest its home. The original section of the building was designated as a historic landmark in 2000 for its significant role in American retail history. The space includes two studios and three control rooms as well as a 20,000 square-foot office space.

In May, the Big Ten Network announced its first on-air hire, signing ESPN college sports expert Dave Revsine to be its lead studio host. Revsine joined ESPN in October of 1996 as an anchor for ESPNNews and filled a variety of roles for the network over the past 10 years. The Northwestern graduate has anchored SportsCenter, hosted ESPN Radio's College GameDay for the last six years and hosted ESPN Radio's coverage of several BCS Championship games. He also hosted studio halftimes for basketball and co-hosted ESPN's coverage of the last two men's Final Fours.

In addition to airing more coverage of Big Ten sports than ever before, the Big Ten Network will also provide numerous benefits to communities around the Big Ten. Those include increased exposure for women's sports, providing positive role models for girls; a greater economic impact to the communities from added sporting event production, with the potential to generate higher attendance; and greater national exposure for the excellence that surrounds the academic endeavors of Big Ten universities, some of the most highly regarded in the nation. Also, an internship program at each of the 11 universities will offer students training for careers in sports, television and entertainment.

The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks. For more information regarding the Big Ten Network, visit www.BigTenNetwork.com.

In 2006, all 13 Iowa games were again televised, including a primetime telecast on ABC-TV from Kinnick Stadium when the Hawkeyes hosted top-ranked Ohio State. Iowa has appeared on television in each of its last 65 games and, with the addition of the Big Ten Network, will continue to have all football games televised. Iowa's 2007 schedule includes two primetime games, including the home contest with Syracuse (Big Ten Network) and the opening Big Ten game at Wisconsin (ABC).

ESPN's universe is 88.9 million households and ESPN2's universe is 87.2 million households. In addition, 97 percent of ESPN subscribers can also receive ESPN2. The Big Ten Conference viewing area includes over 25% of all households.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Iowa's 26-24 loss to Texas, the defending national champion, in the 2006 Alamo Bowl, ranks as the most watched college bowl game ever on ESPN. Based on the game's 6.0 rating, it is estimated that 5.5 million television households and 8.83 million viewers tuned in to the game.

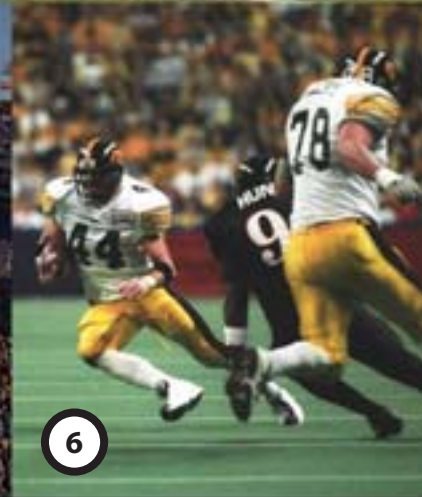

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE AND THE BCS

The Big Ten Conference was represented by seven teams in bowl games following the 2006 season, continuing a trend that has seen the Big Ten lead the nation in bowl game participation. Eight Big Ten teams participated in bowl games following the 2003 season, while seven Big Ten teams also participated in bowl games following the 2006, 2002 and 1999 seasons.

Iowa has appeared in six straight bowl games, including four straight January bowl games following the 2002-05 seasons. During that time, Iowa was one of four schools in the nation to play in January at the conclusion of four straight seasons.

Under the direction of Coach Kirk Ferentz, Iowa has played in the 2001 Alamo Bowl, 2003 Orange Bowl, 2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2006 Outback Bowl and 2006 Alamo Bowl.

- 1.) In 2002, Southern Cal's Carson Palmer and Iowa's Brad Banks placed first and second, respectively, in balloting for the Heisman Trophy before meeting in the 2003 Orange Bowl in Miami, FL.
- 2.) Iowa rallied in the final quarter before Florida held on at the end for a 31-24 win at the 2006 Outback Bowl in Tampa, FL.
- 3.) Defending national champion Texas was pushed to the limit before a late rally allowed the Longhorns to escape with a 26-24 win over Iowa in the 2006 Alamo Bowl.
- 4.) Warren Holloway's famous touchdown catch on the final play of the game lifted Iowa to a 30-25 win over defending national champion LSU in the 2005 Capital One Bowl in Orlando, FL.
