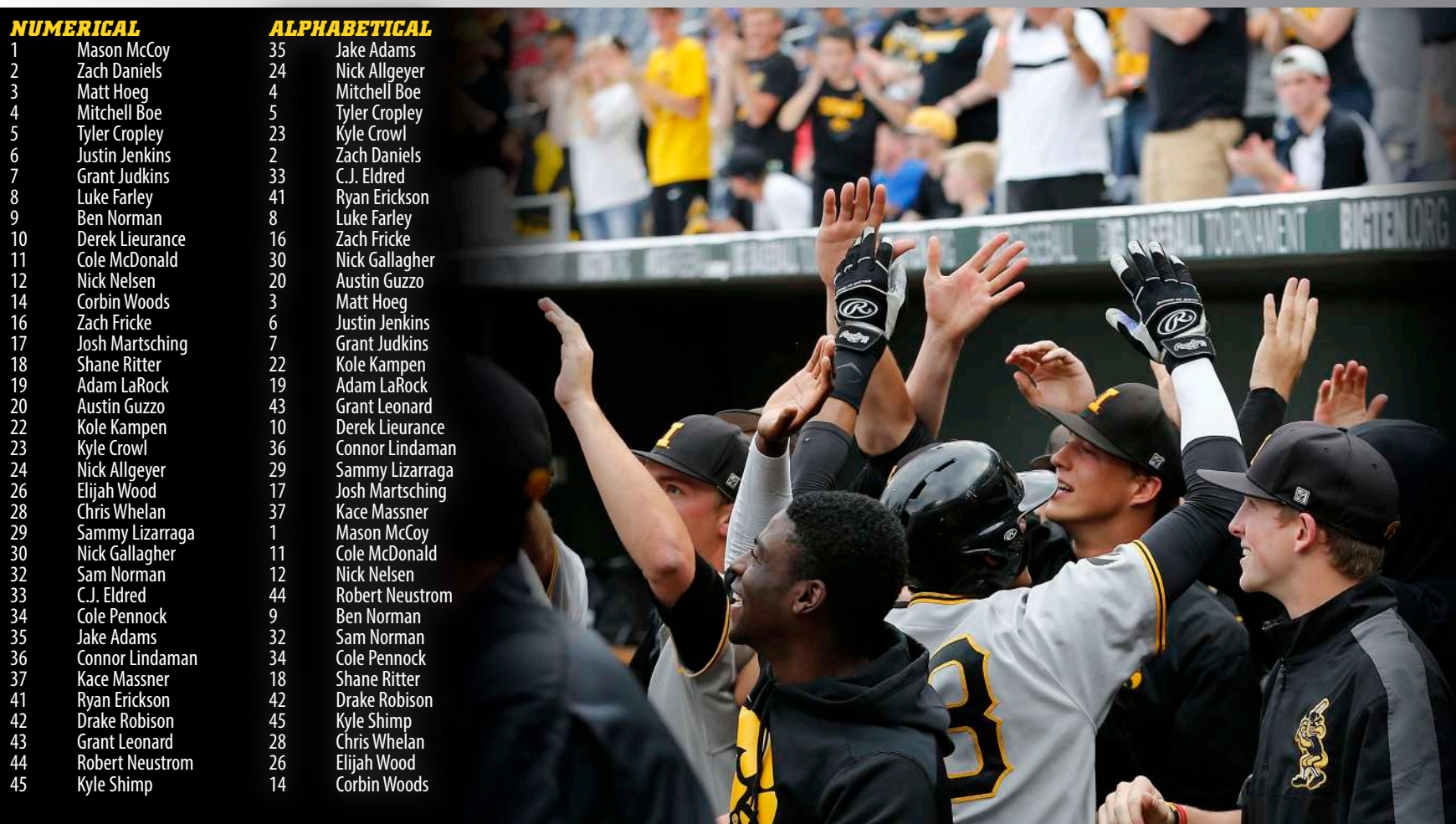

**SEASON OUTLOOK**

After losing 20 players to graduation and/or the Major League Baseball Draft the past two seasons, the the University of Iowa baseball team will look different in 2017.

The Hawkeyes have 17 letterwinners returning from a team that advanced to the Big Ten Tournament title game in 2016, finishing one-win shy of a second straight NCAA Regional berth. Iowa has 2/3 of its starting rotation returning, 10 total pitchers, and three positional starters back in the fold.

But the new faces in Iowa City are vast. The Hawkeyes have a retooled roster with 18 newcomers, including eight transfers. It's a group that will play a big role in the team's success.

Iowa got a jumpstart on the 2017 season with a foreign trip to the Dominican Republic over Thanksgiving Break. The Hawkeyes played four games -- finishing 2-2 -- but it was the togetherness and team-building that will be beneficial heading into the season-opening three-game series at South Florida in February.



**STARTING PITCHING**

Iowa's starting pitching will be a strength with the return of two top of the rotation arms in juniors C.J. Eldred and Nick Gallagher.

Eldred, Iowa's Friday night starter as a sophomore, was a workhorse in his first season as a Hawkeye. The Mount Vernon, Iowa, native tossed 94 1/3 innings to rank ninth in the Big Ten and 10th in a single-season in school history.

Eldred won three games in 2016 and posted a 3.43 ERA. The right-hander pitched Iowa to a Big Ten Tournament victory over top-seeded Minnesota and finished the year with a team-best seven quality starts, including two complete games.

Gallagher is poised to join the weekend rotation after pitching starter innings in a relief role as a sophomore. The right-hander had a breakout season, leading the team with eight wins (tied for second in the Big Ten), going 8-2 with a 2.57 ERA with 59 strikeouts over 63 innings.

The Iowa City, Iowa, native went 4-0 with a 0.38 ERA in his final four relief appearances, posting victories over Michigan, Kansas State, Penn State, and Maryland. Gallagher was named to the Big Ten All-Tournament team after allowing one hit and fanning a career-high nine over six shutout innings in a semifinal victory over the Terrapins.

The Sunday starter role will be up for grabs with senior Drake Robison, sophomores Shane Ritter and Cole McDonald, and freshman Grant Judkins battling to join the weekend rotation.

Robison wasn't on the Hawkeyes' 35-man roster in 2016 after transferring from Mississippi. The Illinois native pitched one season in Oxford following a two-year stint at Iowa Western Community College, where he was a two-time ICCAC honorable mention selection. He won nine games and posted seven saves in two seasons with the Reivers, helping the team to a 2014 NJCAA National Championship.

Ritter and McDonald had solid freshman campaigns in 2016 and could be in line for bigger roles. Ritter went 2-1 with a 3.00 ERA in 13 appearances (two starts). His biggest start came in the Big Ten Tournament where he tossed three shutout innings in a semifinal victory over Maryland.

McDonald was Iowa's primary midweek starter last season, where he went 4-1 with a 3.33 ERA over 24 1/3 innings. The New Hampton, Iowa, native finished with 29 strikeouts to six walks in his first season back following high school Tommy John surgery.

Judkins is a wild card after joining the program as Iowa's Gatorade Player of the Year and the IHSBCA Player of the Year out of Pella High School. As a senior, he went 10-1 with a 0.64 ERA with 123 strikeouts.

**RELIEF PITCHING**

The Hawkeyes will be experienced and deeper in the relief corps in 2017 with four the top relief options returning.

Iowa's depth took a hit when junior southpaw Nick Allgeyer went down with an injury, one that required Tommy John surgery during fall camp, but Heller will have his top long reliever and two back-end arms back in the mix.

Redshirt senior Ryan Erickson elected to return for one final go-round after going 2-1 with a 4.15 ERA last season. In two seasons with the Hawkeyes, the Mason City, Iowa, native is 6-2 with a 3.51 ERA with 52 strikeouts over 89 2/3 innings.

Senior Josh Martsching and sophomore Zach Daniels give the Hawkeyes two quality arms to close out games. Martsching went 2-1 with a 2.41 ERA in 16 appearances and notched four saves in 2016, while Daniels went 1-1 with a 1.50 ERA with a team-best five saves.

Daniels will be primed for a bigger role in 2017 as his focus will go from being a two-way player to strictly being on the mound. The Robins, Iowa, native didn't allow a run in 14 of his 16 appearances last season and he had an 11 1/3 scoreless innings streak in 10 appearances to close out the year.

The Hawkeyes added depth to the bullpen with four transfer arms in juniors Nick Nelsen, Elijah Wood, Derek Lieurance, and senior Sam Norman.

Nelsen, a right-handed submariner was an honorable-mention all-conference selection at Johnson County Community College in 2016. He went 5-1 with a 2.36 ERA in 22 appearances, where he had one save and struck out 44 over 26 2/3 innings.

Wood gives the Hawkeyes another left-hander option in relief. He had three wins -- primarily as a starter -- at Marshalltown Community College, where he had 47 strikeouts over 56 innings. Lieurance was a second-team all-region and all-conference honoree at NIACC after going 9-1 with a 3.99 ERA with 96 strikeouts over 67 2/3 innings.

Norman is the last piece to the transfer puzzle, joining the Hawkeyes after playing three seasons at Creighton. He went 2-0 with a 2.25 ERA in 23 career appearances.

The Hawkeyes are also looking for a big contribution from sophomore right-hander Sammy Lizarraga. The Cedar Rapids, Iowa, native was coming on as a freshman before missing the final month of the season because of injury. He went 1-0 with a 0.79 ERA in eight appearances.

Iowa also has freshman RHP Cole Pennock, RHP Grant Leonard, and redshirt freshman LHP Kyle Shimp as relief options.

### **CATCHERS**

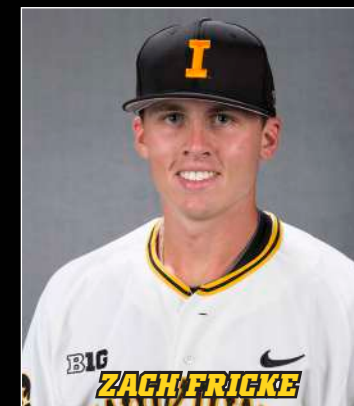
The Hawkeyes will be young -- in a Division I sense -- behind the plate in 2017, but the team will have talent by the way of junior-college transfer Tyler Cropley.

The McCook Lake, South Dakota, native joined the Hawkeyes after earning first-team All-Region XI honors as a sophomore at Iowa Western Community College. He hit .403 with five home runs, nine doubles, 27 RBIs, and 35 runs scored.

Cropley is a strong receiver behind the plate, and is good enough with the bat that he's a candidate to be Iowa's leadoff hitter.

Junior Zach Fricke will be Cropley's main backup in 2017. The Dike, Iowa, native redshirted last season -- his first at Iowa following a two-year stay at NIACC. Fricke could provide Iowa some offensive pop, as he hit .343 with 13 doubles and 12 home runs in his final season as a Trojan.

Junior Austin Guzzo will be an additional option behind the plate. Guzzo saw limited action at catcher in 2016 after starting 11 games behind the dish during his freshman campaign.





**INFIELD**

Iowa will return one full-time starter and one platoon starter in 2017. Senior Mason McCoy will slide to his left to shortstop after being the team's everyday third baseman last season, while sophomore Mitchell Boe is penciled in at second base.

McCoy came on strong for the Hawkeyes down the stretch in 2016, helping the team advance to the title game at the Big Ten Tournament. He had six straight multi-hit games to close out the season -- one where he hit .291 with 37 runs and 34 RBIs. McCoy had 17 multi-hit games, hit for the cycle against Air Force, and had a 13-game hitting streak to finish the year.

McCoy will look to continue Iowa's successful run at the shortstop position; a Hawkeye has earned All-Big Ten honors in each of the last three seasons.

Boe started 18 games at second base as a true freshman, one where he hit .190 with 12 runs and four RBIs. The Naperville, Illinois, native progressed as the season went on and he carried that over to the summer, where he was a CSBL All-Star Game honoree, playing for the Lombard Orioles.

With McCoy moving to shortstop, Iowa will have a new third baseman for the second year in a row. Freshman Kyle Crawl and junior Matt Hoeg are the primary candidates to step in at the hot corner. Hoeg is also an option at first base.

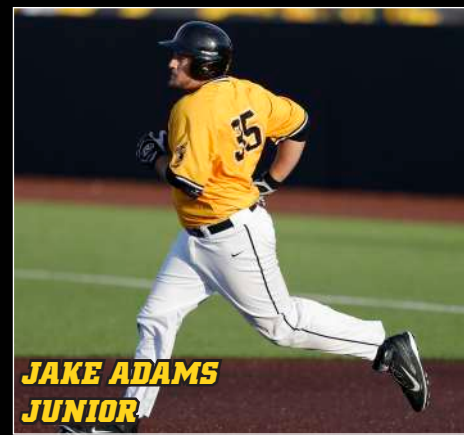
Hoeg, a transfer from Iowa Western Community College, was an NJCAA honorable-mention All-American as a sophomore. He hit .425 with eight home runs, 22 doubles, 60 RBIs, and 47 runs scored. Hoeg had 23 multi-hit games and 15 multi-RBI games in 2016.

Crawl, the 367th-best prospect by Perfect Game, was a first-team all-state selection at Abraham Lincoln High School in Council Bluffs, Iowa, where he was the team's starting shortstop. He hit .440 as a senior with six home runs, 33 RBIs, and 14 steals.

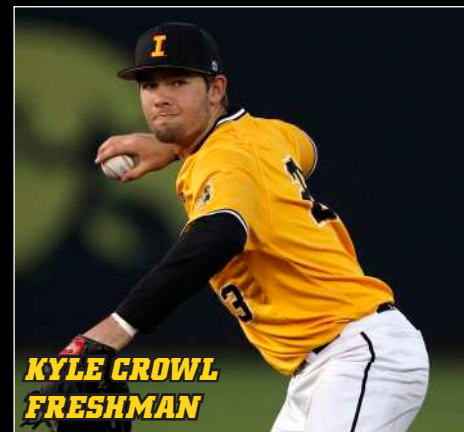
Junior power hitter Jake Adams will replace Tyler Peyton at first base, giving the Hawkeyes a powerful bat in the middle of the lineup. Adams was a first-team All-American at Des Moines Area (Iowa) Community College as a sophomore in a season where he hit .360 with 25 home runs, 75 RBIs, and scored 59 runs. Iowa hit 26 home runs as a team in 2016.

The Brandon, South Dakota, native ranked second in the nation in home runs, fourth in slugging percentage, seventh in total bases, and 10th in RBIs. Adams hit 42 home runs -- a DMACC school record -- in two seasons.

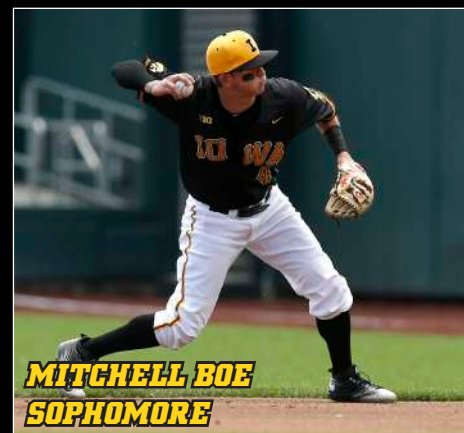
Sophomore Chris Whelan will give Iowa a versatile option as both an infielder and outfielder in 2017. The Parkland College transfer -- who played his freshman season at Bradley -- hit .299 with six doubles and a home run in 2016 and he scored 37 runs and posted a .420 on-base percentage. Whelan was a tough out, striking out just 17 times in 134 at-bats.

**OUTFIELD**

The path to playing time in the outfield is open for a second straight season with the Hawkeyes returning just one starter -- sophomore right fielder Robert Neustrom.

The Sioux City, Iowa, native started 38 games as a true freshman -- a season where he hit .307 with 24 runs and 21 RBIs. Neustrom posted 12 multi-hit games during the season and surged late, hitting .462 during the Hawkeyes' Big Ten Tournament run.

Iowa will turn to a pair of true freshman in center field to replace first-team All-Big Ten and all-region selection Joel Booker. Indiana native Justin Jenkins and Des Moines, Iowa, native Ben Norman will see a bulk of the playing time.

Jenkins, the son of a college baseball coach, is a ball player. He was a four-time all-conference and all-district selection at Terre Haute South (Indiana) High School (where he was also a three-time team captain). He holds the school record in career triples (12) and hit .413 with 37 RBIs and nine steals as a senior. Jenkins was a top-500-rated player by Perfect Game.

Norman joined the Hawkeyes as the No. 1-rated outfielder in the state of Iowa, where he was a three-time all-conference honoree and a two-time all-district selection. As a senior, Norman hit .386 with 24 RBIs and 29 steals -- a Roosevelt High School record.

The Hawkeyes will have plenty of options to platoon in left field in juniors Matt Hoeg and Tyler Cropley (on days off behind the plate), and sophomores Chris Whelan and Luke Farley. Farley battled injury as a true freshman, a season where started 14

games and hit .239 with 12 RBIs and 10 runs scored. The Denver, Iowa, native was the 183rd-best prospect nationally by Perfect Game coming out of high school.

Iowa also has a pair of freshmen -- Kace Massner and Adam LaRock -- to provide outfield depth.

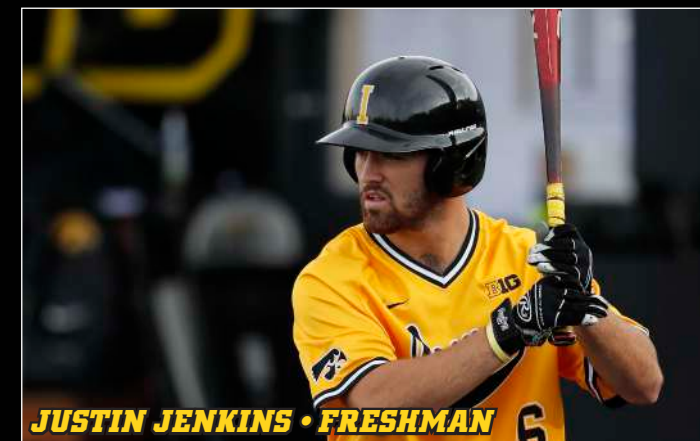
**DESIGNATED HITTER**

Heller will be able to play the hot hand at the designated hitter position in 2017 with a lot of quality bats at his disposal.

Guzzo started 23 games at DH in 2016, a season where he hit .264 with three home runs, 25 RBIs, and 18 runs. The Canada native was a force at the Big Ten Tournament, hitting .356 with five RBIs and two runs scored in four contests. He was a Big Ten All-Tournament team selection.

Adams will be another option, especially on days where he isn't in the lineup at first base and a healthy Farley will be in the mix when he isn't on the lineup card as an outfielder. Farley hit .400 in each of his four prep seasons at Waterloo Columbus High School.

Senior Zach Fricke and freshman Grant Judkins are also options at DH. Fricke is a left-handed bat with some extra-base pop (13 doubles and 12 home runs in 2015 at NIACC), while Judkins hit .421 with six home runs, 39 runs, and 12 steals as a high school senior.

Iowa native Rick Heller is entering his fourth season as head coach of the University of Iowa baseball program. Heller was tabbed as the 20th head coach in program history on July 12, 2013.

Heller, an Eldon, Iowa, native, has been head coach at four institutions -- Iowa (2014-present), Indiana

State (2009-13), Northern Iowa (1999-2009), and Upper Iowa (1987-99) -- leading all four schools to NCAA postseason play. He is one of nine coaches all-time and one of five active coaches to lead three different Division I programs to NCAA Regional play.

In 2015, Heller guided the Hawkeyes to an at-large berth into NCAA Regional play and posted the school's first NCAA Tournament win since 1972. He led Indiana State to its first outright Missouri Valley Conference title in 2012, and Northern Iowa to the MVC title and into the NCAA Tournament in 2001, the first and only regional appearance for the Panthers as a Division I program.

Heller has rejuvenated the Iowa program in just three seasons, going 101-67, making him the winningest coach in his first three seasons in school history. He is the first Iowa coach to lead the program to the postseason in three consecutive years, he has coached at least one first-team All-Big Ten selection each season, and has 11 Major League Baseball Draft picks in three seasons -- the most in a three-year stretch since 1991-93.

The success has translated on the recruiting trail, where Heller has turned the Hawkeyes into a major player on the national recruiting scene. Iowa had the top-rated class in the Big Ten -- and 18th-best nationally -- in 2015, and the 2016 class was ranked third in the league.

In 29 seasons as a head coach, Heller owns a career record of 791-632-4. He is one of two Iowa head coaches to lead the program to the NCAA Tournament.

Heller took the Iowa baseball program to the Dominican Republic over Thanksgiving Break in 2016 and the Hawkeyes will represent the United States in August, 2017, at the World University Games in Taiwan.

In 2016, Heller's team faced the toughest Big Ten Conference schedule, facing six of the eight Big Ten Tournament qualifiers. The Hawkeyes closed out the regular season with back-to-back series wins over Michigan State and Penn State to qualify for the Big Ten Tournament for a third straight season. The Hawkeyes carried that momentum into Omaha, where they won their first three games to advance to the Big Ten title game, and the Iowa faithful followed.

Hawkeye fans flocked to TD Ameritrade Park, as a pro-Iowa crowd 10,350 filled the stands to see the program's first championship game appearance since 2010. Iowa fell just short of its second straight NCAA Regional bid, as Ohio State plated a ninth-inning run to hand the Hawkeyes an 8-7 defeat. Iowa ended the year with a 30-26 record, reaching the 30-win plateau for a third straight season -- a first for the program since 1983-85.

Two Iowa players -- outfielder Joel Booker and shortstop Nick Roscetti -- earned first-team All-Big Ten honors at season's end. They are the first Hawkeye duo since 2007 to receive first-team recognition in the same season. Heller has coached two first-team All-Big Ten shortstops in three seasons.

Booker led a resurgent Iowa offense that ranked in the top six of the Big Ten in virtually every offensive category as he emerged as a semifinalist for the Gregg Olson Breakout Player of the Year Award after tying for the Big Ten Conference lead in hits (87) and ranking in the top 12 in the league in eight offensive categories. Roscetti, meanwhile, was a semifinalist for the Brooks Wallace Shortstop of the Year Award.

Booker, Roscetti, and Tyler Peyton were selected in the 2016 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft come season's end. Booker was taken in the 22nd round by the Chicago





White Sox, Roscetti in the 26th round by the Milwaukee Brewers, and Peyton in the 29th round by the Chicago Cubs.

Iowa's pitching staff posted the second-best ERA (3.54) in program history and ranked in the top four in the Big Ten for a second straight season. Sophomore Nick Gallagher led the team with an 8-2 record and a 2.57 ERA to rank second in the league in wins and seventh in ERA. The Hawkeye defense was again its strong suit, finishing the season ranked in the top 15 nationally.

Iowa had a breakthrough season in Heller's second season in Iowa City, going 41-18 with the 41 victories being the second-most all-time and just the fourth 40-win season in program history. Iowa earned the school's first NCAA Regional berth since 1990, where it went 2-2 at the Springfield Regional for the program's first NCAA Tournament win since 1972.

The Hawkeyes rolled to a 15-5 start and won its first 11 series of the season, including a school-record eight consecutive Big Ten series wins dating back to the 2014 season. Iowa swept No. 19 Indiana to open Big Ten play to catapult the Hawkeyes into the national rankings for the first time in 25 years. Iowa climbed to as high as No. 13 before finishing the year 20th by Collegiate Baseball, 25th by Baseball America, and 28th by the NCBWA -- the program's first appearance in the final rankings in school history.

Heller guided Iowa to a Big Ten runner-up (three games ahead of the third place finisher) finish in a year where the league was at its all-time best with a record five NCAA Regional participants. Iowa went 19-5 in conference play for a .792 winning percentage -- the best winning percentage by a second place team since the Big Ten returned to single division play in 1988.

In NCAA Regional play, Heller led the Hawkeyes to a pair of wins over Oregon in Springfield, Missouri, and lost two games to No. 8 national seed Missouri State by a combined three runs. Senior reliever Nick Hibbing was tabbed as the Springfield Regional's Most Outstanding Player and was named to the all-tournament team.

Under Heller's watch, Iowa had a pair of players earn three All-America distinctions, had a school-record six All-Big Ten selections, and a semifinalist for the John Olerud Two-Way Player of the Year Award. Tyler Peyton earned third-team All-America honors as a utility from DTBaseball.com and the NCBWA, while starting pitcher Blake Hickman was a Louisville Slugger third-team All-American.

The Hawkeyes won with Hellerball -- a term coined to highlight the team's gritty style of play. Iowa's pitching and defense both finished in the top 16 nationally (fielding percentage, 11th; ERA, 16th) in 2015 and the team had a never-say die attitude, posting six walk-off wins and going 18-9 in games decided by two runs or less.

The pitching staff shattered the school ERA record, posting a 2.95 ERA in 59 games and had a school-record 19 saves. It was a remarkable turnaround for the Hawkeye hurlers -- a unit that had a 4.34 ERA with virtually the same cast in 2014.

At season's end, five players had their name called in the 2015 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, tying a program record. Hickman was selected in the seventh round by the Chicago White Sox -- the highest Hawkeye draftee since 1999. Heller has seen eight players drafted, including two top-eight round picks in two seasons.

On the recruiting trail, Heller has helped Iowa become a player on the national recruiting scene. The Hawkeyes' 2015 recruiting class was rated tops in the Big Ten Conference and the 40th-best class nationally. It boasted 11 top-500 prospects by Perfect Game.

In his first season at the UI, Heller guided the Hawkeyes to a 9-1 start -- the program's best start since 1940 -- a Big Ten Tournament berth and conference tournament win. Iowa finished the year with a 30-23 record for just the third 30-win season since 1993. The 30 victories are the most by a first-year coach in Iowa history.

Heller won his 700th career game in a 13-1 rout of Georgetown on March 15 at the Snowbird Classic in Florida. The Hawkeyes also took 2-of-3 games from Nebraska to open the Big Ten regular season -- Iowa's first conference-opening series win since 1998 and took 2-of-3 games against Minnesota for the first time since 2005.

Under Heller's direction, Iowa became one of the most potent offensive teams in the Big Ten in 2014. The Hawkeyes led the conference in four offensive categories (batting average, hits, runs and on-base percentage) and ranked second in four more (slugging percentage, RBIs, home runs and total bases). Iowa finished with 23 home runs -- a season after the team had two long balls in 49 contests.

Heller coached five student-athletes to All-Big Ten recognition, the most for the program since 2007. Junior shortstop Jake Yacinich garnered first-team All-Big Ten honors after ranking second in the league in batting average and steals. He was the first Iowa first-teamer since 2009.

Heller came to the UI after a strong four-year run at Indiana State. He led the Sycamores to their first outright Missouri Valley Conference championship in school history and back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1995 during the record-setting 2012 season. Indiana State finished 41-19, including a 14-7 record in conference play to claim the regular season crown and earn an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament. The 41 wins were the most for the program since 1991.

Heller was named the 2012 Dan Callahan MVC Coach of the Year, while junior Jeremy Lucas earned the Joe Carter MVC Player of the Year award -- the first student-athlete in ISU history to earn the league's MVP -- and junior Dakota Bacus was selected as the MVC Newcomer of the Year. Eight members of the team were named All-MVC. Following the season, two Sycamores were drafted in the top-12 rounds and a total of three signed contracts to begin their professional careers.

Heller led Indiana State to its fifth-consecutive winning season in 2013, and to a semifinal appearance in the MVC Tournament. The Sycamores, who finished 26-25 overall, had four players earn All-MVC honors, including Sean Manaea, the 34th overall selection in the 2013 MLB Draft by the Kansas City Royals. The draft selection was the second-highest in ISU baseball program history. Manaea became the 16th Sycamore to either be drafted or sign a professional free agent contract since Heller became head coach in 2009.

Heller led Indiana State to a 35-19 record in his first season in Terre Haute, Ind. -- the most wins for any first-year coach in ISU baseball history -- and a third place MVC finish. The Sycamores were one of two MVC teams to receive votes in the national polls during the season. In 2011, Indiana State went 29-28 and advanced to the semifinals of the MVC Tournament -- its deepest run since 2002.

During his tenure at Northern Iowa, Heller's teams won 270 games, including the 2001 Missouri Valley Conference championship and NCAA Regional Berth. While building the Panthers into an annual contender, Heller coached three MVC Most Valuable Players, one MVC Pitcher of the Year and helped put 22 players in professional baseball.

While at UNI, Heller's teams broke a total of 57 team or individual records, including setting team records for hits, runs batted in, doubles and extra base hits during the 2001 season. Heller led the Panthers to four MVC tournaments, winning the championship in 2001. All-American Ryan Brunner claimed the league MVP award and All-American Nic Ungs was named Pitcher of the Year.

The Panthers recorded back-to-back 30-plus win seasons in 2001 and 2002 for the first time in school history and set the school single-season record with 35 wins in 2001. Heller also coached two Academic All-Americans in Brunner and Travis Welsch.





**BIG BASEBALL**



Before taking over the Northern Iowa program prior to the 2000 season, Heller spent 12 years as a head coach at Upper Iowa University, a Division III institution. While at Upper Iowa, Heller recorded a 291-194-3 overall record and was named the Iowa Conference Coach of the Year four times.

Heller won his first conference championship in 1993 -- the first for Upper Iowa in 20 years -- while advancing to the NCAA Division III Regionals. His team won the Iowa Conference title and advanced to NCAA Regionals again in 1995, finishing 19th in the national rankings as Heller won his third Coach of the Year honor.

He repeated Coach of the Year honors again in 1996 when the Peacocks won the Iowa Conference and Central Regional to advance to the NCAA Division III College World Series. His team finished the year ranked sixth nationally and he was named NCAA Division III Central Region Coach of the Year.

In 1997, his team was ranked seventh nationally in the pre-season poll and won the Iowa Conference Tournament. In 1998, his team was ranked as high as 10th nationally while finishing with a 38-8 record to set a school record for winning percentage (.826). His final UIU team finished 30-15-1 and finished third in the Iowa Conference while setting five school records.

As a player at Upper Iowa from 1982-86, he was a four-year starter at shortstop and he also lettered in football and basketball. He is a member of the Upper Iowa Athletic Hall of Fame.

Heller is a member of the American Baseball Coaches Association and serves on the ABCA All-American Committee. He is also a member of the Indiana and Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Associations. In 2008, he was inducted into the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Heller has three daughters -- Tara, Alyssa, and Vivienne. His wife's name is Rachelle.



**SCOTT BRICKMAN**

**Pitching Coach  
Fourth Season  
Northern Iowa, 1998**

Scott Brickman is entering his fourth season as pitching coach for the University of Iowa baseball program.

In three seasons in Iowa City, Brickman has helped guide the Hawkeyes to 101 wins, an NCAA Regional appearance and two Big Ten runner-up finishes -- in the regular season in 2015 and Big Ten Tournament in 2016. Iowa has had three All-Americans, three all-region, and 13 All-Big Ten selections.

Eleven players have had their names called in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft -- the most in a three-year stretch for the program since 1991-93.

Brickman has transformed Iowa's pitching into one of the top staffs in the Big Ten on a year-in, year-out basis. Under his tutelage, the Hawkeyes have posted the top two team ERAs in school history and set the program record for single-season strikeouts. Iowa has finished in the top four in the Big Ten in ERA in each of the past two seasons.

On the recruiting trail, Brickman has helped Iowa become a player on the national recruiting scene. The Hawkeyes' 2015 and 2016 recruiting classes were ranked among the best in the Big Ten Conference. Iowa's 2015 class was tops in the league and 18th-best nationally, while the 2016 class was rated as the third-best in the conference.

In 2016, Iowa posted a 30-26 record, reaching the 30-win plateau for a third consecutive season for the first time since 1983-85. The Hawkeyes won their final two league series to qualify for the Big Ten Tournament for a third straight season and carried their momentum into Omaha, where they won their first three games to advance to the tournament title game for the first time since 2010.

Brickman's pitching staff posted a 3.54 team ERA -- the second-best ERA in program history -- and the Hawkeyes finished with a school-record 382 strikeouts in 56 contests. Sophomore Nick

Gallagher won a team-high eight games, going 8-2 with a 2.57 ERA, to rank second in the Big Ten in wins and seventh in ERA. Senior Tyler Peyton surged down the stretch, going 3-0 with a 0.90 ERA in four starts, which included a 26 1/3 scoreless innings streak. He finished his career with 16 wins and ranked in the top 10 all-time in innings pitched and strikeouts.

Peyton became the fifth Iowa pitcher drafted in the past three seasons when he was selected in the 29th round by the Chicago Cubs.

In 2015, Brickman helped lead Iowa to one of the top seasons in program history. The Hawkeyes went 41-18 and earned an at-large berth into NCAA Regionals -- the first berth since 1990. The 41 wins were the second-most in program history. Iowa, which won two games at the Springfield Regional for its first NCAA Tournament win since 1972, finished the season ranked 20th by Collegiate Baseball, 25th by Baseball America, and 28th by the NCBWA -- the program's first appearance in the final rankings in school history.

Brickman's work with the Iowa pitching staff fueled the team's success. The Hawkeyes finished with a 2.95 ERA to rank 16th in the nation and ranked 10th in hits allowed per nine innings (7.69). The 2.95 ERA shattered the program's school record of 3.63 set in 1971, and the team posted a school record 19 saves.

It was a remarkable turnaround for the Hawkeye pitching staff -- a unit that had a 4.34 ERA with virtually the same cast in 2014.

Under Brickman's watch, Blake Hickman developed from a thrower into a pitcher. The converted catcher earned Louisville Slugger third-team All-America and first-team All-Big Ten honors after going 9-2 -- the program's most wins since 2005 -- with a 2.99 ERA in his first full season as a starting pitcher. Hickman was a seventh round MLB selection by the Chicago White Sox -- the highest Iowa draftee since 1999.

Tyler Peyton garnered a pair of All-America distinctions by D1Baseball.com and NCBWA -- the first Hawkeye since 1990 to earn two All-America honors -- as a utility player, and he was a semifinalist for the John Olerud Two-Way Player of the Year Award. Peyton went 7-4 with a 3.03 ERA as Iowa's Friday night starter.





Iowa's third starter -- Calvin Mathews -- and top reliever -- Nick Hibbing -- garnered second-team All-Big Ten recognition. Mathews went 5-3 with a 2.45 ERA, while Hibbing had a career-year, going 4-1 with a 1.57 ERA with 47 strikeouts to five walks. Hibbing was the Springfield Regional's Most Outstanding Player.

Brickman got the most out of his staff as student-athletes improved nearly across the board. Luke Vandermaten went 2-0 with a 1.06 ERA in 22 appearances, walk-on Ryan Erickson was 4-1 with a 2.79 ERA, and Brandon Shulista had a career year, going 3-2 with a 3.67 ERA.

In his first season in Iowa City, Brickman helped guide the Hawkeyes to a 9-1 start -- the program's best start since 1940 -- a Big Ten Tournament berth and conference tournament win. Iowa finished the year with a 30-23 record for just the third 30-win season since 1993.

Brickman pieced together a mix-and-match pitching staff that was forced to battle through injuries throughout the season. Under Brickman's tutelage, Mathews became a front-of-the-line pitcher, posting a 3-3 record with a 2.72 ERA before going down with an injury, and walk-ons Jared Mandel (2-1, 2.70 ERA) and Tyler Radtke (2-2, 3.89 ERA, three saves) developed into major pieces in the Iowa bullpen.

Brickman also worked with Hickman in his transition from catcher to the mound. Hickman went 2-2 with a 3.93 ERA in his first year as a pitcher, and he was the starter in game two at the Big Ten Tournament -- a 2-1 Hawkeye victory.

Brickman joined the Iowa coaching staff in 2013 after serving four seasons as head coach at NCAA Division II Belmont Abbey, where he led the Crusaders to a 104-82 record, a

2012 Conference Carolinas Western Division Championship, and a pair of top-25 national rankings -- the first in school history. Brickman departed the school with the best winning percentage in the program's 22-year history.

In 2013, Brickman guided the Crusaders to a 27-17 record, and the squad earned a top-25 ranking during the regular season for the second time in program history. Five players garnered all-conference recognition, and pitcher Emilio Pagan was selected in the 10th round of the 2013 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, the program's highest draftee in its history.

Brickman led the Crusaders to the Conference Carolinas Western Division title in 2012 -- the third crown in school history and first in more than a decade. Brickman coached Pagan to ABCA/NWBCA All-America honors and two Crusaders earned all-conference and All-Southeast Regional honors. Steven Thiele was also tabbed as the Conference Male Academic Scholar Athlete of the Year for the second-straight season.

In his second season as head coach, Brickman led the Crusaders to an 11-win turnaround from his first season, winning 29 games and earning the first top-25 ranking in program history. Brickman coached six players to all-conference recognition and one All-Southeast Regional honoree. Three Crusaders also earned academic all-conference honors, and Thiele was the Conference's Male Academic Scholar Athlete of the Year.

From 2007-09, Brickman served as an assistant coach at Northern Iowa. In two seasons with the Panthers, five pitchers were drafted or signed by Major League Baseball organizations, accounting for 20 percent of the players drafted

at UNI since 1962. During the 2008 season, Brickman helped guide the Panthers to 30 wins for just the fourth time in the school's 103-year history, while posting the fourth-best ERA (4.75) since the move to Division I in 1981.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Brickman spent five seasons as an assistant coach at Wofford College, where he coached two Freshman All-Americans and helped the Terriers win the 2007 Southern Conference Championship and an NCAA Tournament berth.

Brickman also served as head coach of the Florence Redwolves, a summer collegiate team in Florence, S.C., in 2004-05. The 2005 team advanced to the Coastal Plains League championship game and set the franchise record with 33 wins. Twelve of his players were drafted or signed by MLB teams, including 2006 first-round pick, Clemson University's Tyler Colvin.

From 2000-02, Brickman was an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Muscatine Community College. During his tenure, he saw three pitchers and 15 total players earn all-region honors, and four players were selected in the MLB Draft. Brickman also was an assistant coach at Wartburg College in 1998-99, helping the Knights win the Iowa Conference and advance to the 1999 NCAA Tournament.

As a pitcher at Northern Iowa, Brickman led the Panthers to a second-place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference in 1997, and he was a twice named Missouri Valley Pitcher of the Week.

The Denver, Iowa, native earned his bachelor's degree from Northern Iowa in 1998. He is married to the former Cassandra Mucks, and they have a son, Eastin.

Marty Sutherland is entering his fourth season as an assistant coach for the University of Iowa baseball program. Sutherland is the Hawkeyes' recruiting coordinator after serving as the hitting coach for his first three seasons.

In three seasons in Iowa City, Sutherland has helped guide the Hawkeyes to 101 wins, an NCAA Regional appearance, and two Big Ten runner-up finishes -- in the regular season in 2015 and Big Ten Tournament in 2016. Iowa has had three All-America, three all-region, and 13 All-Big Ten selections. Eleven players have had their names called in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft -- the most in a three-year stretch for the program since 1991-93.

On the recruiting trail, Sutherland has led the charge, helping Iowa become a player on the national recruiting scene. The Hawkeyes' 2015 and 2016 recruiting classes were ranked among the best in the Big Ten Conference. Iowa's 2015 class was tops in the league and 18th-best nationally, while the 2016 class was rated as the third-best in the conference.

In 2016, Iowa posted a 30-26 record, reaching the 30-win plateau for a third consecutive season for the first time since 1983-85. The Hawkeyes won their final two league series to qualify for the Big Ten Tournament for a third straight season and carried their momentum into Omaha, where they won their first three games to advance to the tournament title game for the first time since 2010.

The Hawkeyes had two first-team All-Big Ten position players in outfielder Joel Booker and shortstop Nick Roscetti -- the first duo to earn first-team honors in the same season since 2007.

Booker enjoyed a breakout senior season, hitting .370 with 87 hits, 19 doubles, five home runs, and 23 steals to be a semifinalist for the Gregg Olson Breakout Player of the Year Award. Booker's 87 hits were tied for the Big Ten Conference lead and were the second-most in a single season in school history, while his 19 doubles were tied for the third-most all-time. He ranked in the top-12 in the conference in eight different categories.

Roscetti was steady with his bat and superb with his glove en route to being named a semifinalist for the Brooks Wallace Shortstop of the Year Award. The senior hit .305 with 72 hits and a team-best 39 RBIs while committing just five errors in 249 chances to anchor Iowa's top-15-ranked defense.

Booker and Roscetti were the fifth and sixth position players drafted in the past three seasons at season's end. Booker was selected in the 22nd round by the Chicago White Sox, while Roscetti was a 26th round pick by the Milwaukee Brewers.

The Hawkeyes' offense came to life late in the season to finish the year ranked in the top six in the Big Ten in virtually every offensive category. Iowa had five players reach double-digits in doubles and had 134 extra base hits for the year, which included 26 home runs.

Sutherland helped lead Iowa to one of the top seasons in program history in 2015. The Hawkeyes went 41-18 and earned an at-large berth into NCAA Regionals -- the first berth since 1990. The 41 wins were the second-most in program history. Iowa won two games at the Springfield Regional for its first NCAA Tournament win since 1972 and finished the season ranked 20th by Collegiate Baseball, 25th by Baseball America, and 28th by the NCBWA-- the program's first appearance in the final rankings in school history.

With Sutherland's assistance, Iowa was one of the top defensive teams in the country, ranking 11th overall and No. 2 in the Big Ten. Offensively, the Hawkeyes battled until the final pitch, as evident by their six walk-off wins and 18-9 record in games decided by two or fewer runs.





Sutherland coached junior Tyler Peyton to All-America honors as a utility player by D1Baseball.com and NCBWA, and he was a semifinalist for the John Olerud Two-Way Player of the Year Award. Peyton hit a team-best .337 with 31 runs and 31 RBIs.

The Hawkeyes had a school-record six All-Big Ten selections in 2015, including three positional players. Five players had their names called in the 2015 Major League Baseball Draft, tying a program record for most draftees in a single season.

In his first season in Iowa City, Sutherland helped guide the Hawkeyes to a 9-1 start -- the program's best start since 1940 -- a Big Ten Tournament berth and conference tournament win. Iowa finished the year with a 30-23 record for just the third 30-win season since 1993.

Iowa's offense thrived under Sutherland, as the Hawkeyes led the Big Ten in four offensive categories (batting average, hits, runs and on-base percentage) and ranked second in four more (slugging percentage, RBIs, home runs and total bases). Iowa finished with 23 home runs -- a season after the team had two long balls in 49 contests.

Five Iowa student-athletes garnered All-Big Ten recognition, the most for the program since 2007, which included first-team All-Big Ten shortstop Jake Yacinich. He was the first Hawkeye to earn a first-team nod since 2009.

Sutherland, a former player and coach under UI head coach Rick Heller at Northern Iowa, was an assistant for the Panthers from 2003-09, helping lead the team to 154 victories over six seasons. He coached 12 All-Missouri Valley Conference selections and an MVC Newcomer and Player of the Year honoree.

Sutherland also served as an assistant coach at Wartburg College during the 2002-03 season. Most recently, Sutherland was an assistant coach at Cascade (Iowa) High School and a hitting/fielding instructor at Bases Loaded Academy in Dubuque, Iowa.

Sutherland was an infielder at Northern Iowa during the 2001 and 2002 seasons, helping the team to its first back-to-back 30 win seasons in program history. He also played at Kirkwood Community College from 1998-2000.

During his two seasons in Cedar Falls, Sutherland batted .318 with 25 doubles and 29 stolen bases. He also finished his career with 64 RBIs.

In 2001, Sutherland was a second team All-MVC and second team All-Midwest region honoree after UNI won a school-record 35 games and claimed the Missouri Valley Conference Tournament title en route to the first NCAA Tournament berth in school history. Sutherland batted .349, and the Panthers finished 10th in the nation and led the MVC in hitting with a .333 batting average.

In 2002, UNI won 30 games and finished fourth in the Missouri Valley. The squad finished with a .327 batting average in conference games to lead the league.

The Cascade, Iowa, native earned his associate's degree from Kirkwood Community College in July, 2000, and his bachelor's degree from Northern Iowa in Dec., 2002.

 University of Iowa, 2015

University of Iowa graduate Sean Moore is in his first season as the volunteer assistant coach with the University of Iowa baseball program.

After wrapping up his playing career in 2015, Moore joined the coaching staff at Des Moines Area Community College as the program's hitting and strength and conditioning coach. The Bears won 30 games during the 2016 season, where they hit .331 as a team with 78 home runs, 126 doubles, and 15 triples.

Moore coached current Hawkeye Jake Adams to first-team All-America honors. Adams hit .360 with 25 home runs, 75 RBIs, and 59 runs scored. He ranked second in the nation in home runs and was in the top 10 in four categories.

The Coralville, Iowa, native has also served as director of baseball operations at Diamond Dreams Sports Academy, where he has continued researching the biomechanical movements of each phase of the swing.

Moore's collegiate playing career consisted of three stops. He played two seasons at DMACC, where he helped the Bears to an NJCAA World Series berth in 2011 before earning All-Region XI honors in 2012.

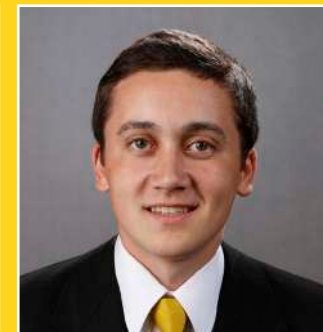

Moore, a certified hitting instructor, graduated from the University of Iowa with a degree in leisure studies in 2015. He is a graduate of Iowa City West High School.

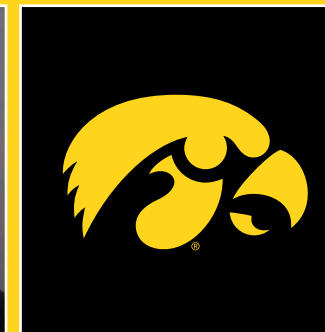

**DESI DRUSCHEL**  
**Director of Baseball Operations**  
**Third Season**  
**Mount Mercy, 1998**

Desi Druschel is entering his third season as the University of Iowa baseball program's director of baseball operations and director of Iowa baseball camps.

In his first two seasons in Iowa City, Druschel has helped lead Iowa to 71 wins, an NCAA Regional appearance, and two Big Ten Conference runner-up finishes. The Hawkeyes were the regular-season runner-ups in 2015 and finished

second at the 2016 Big Ten Tournament.

Iowa has had three All-America, two all-region, and eight All-Big Ten selections in the past two seasons and eight players have been selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

In 2016, Druschel helped the Hawkeyes to a 30-26 record -- the program's third straight 30-win season. Iowa won its final two league series to qualify for the Big Ten Tournament for a third consecutive season and carried its momentum into Omaha, where it won its first three games to advance to the tournament title game for the first time since 2010.

The Hawkeyes had two first-team All-Big Ten position players in outfielder Joel Booker and shortstop Nick Roscetti -- the first duo to earn first-team honors in the same season since 2007. Booker was a semifinalist for the Gregg Olson Breakout Player of the Year Award, while Roscetti was a semifinalist for the Brooks Wallace Shortstop of the Year Award.

Three players -- Booker, Roscetti, and Tyler Peyton -- were selected in the 2016 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

In his first season in Iowa City, Druschel helped lead the Hawkeyes to one of their best seasons in program history. Iowa won 41 games -- the second-most all-time -- and earned an at-large berth into NCAA Regional play for the first time since 1990. Iowa won two games at the

Springfield Regional for their first NCAA Tournament victory since 1972. The Hawkeyes finished in the final national rankings for the first time in school history, coming in at No. 20 by Collegiate Baseball, 25th by Baseball America, and 28th by the NCBWA.

Iowa had three All-America and a school-record six All-Big Ten selections, and five players had their names called in the 2015 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, including Blake Hickman, who was the program's highest draftee since 1999.

Before joining the Iowa coaching staff, Druschel won 172 games, advanced to a pair of NIAA Region VII Tournaments and posted two conference runner-up and two third-place finishes as head coach at Mount Mercy College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, from 2006-14. He coached three honorable mention All-Americans, 22 all-conference selections, and 12 Gold Glove honorees.

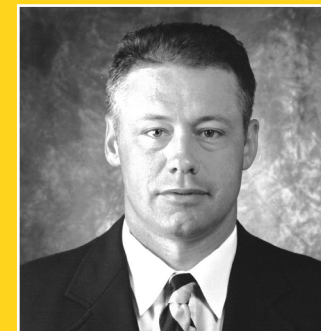
Druschel also coached three NAIA Scholar Athletes, three all-region scholar athletes and 33 academic all-conference selections. Druschel initially joined the Mount Mercy staff prior to the 2005 season as an assistant coach before being promoted to the head position a year later.

Druschel has also served as head coach at The Franciscan University (now Ashford University) in Clinton, Iowa, from 2001-04, where he helped the Saints set 45 school records. He also was an assistant at Mount St. Clare College (2000-01), Indiana University (1999-00), and Vinton-Shellsburg (Iowa) High School (1996-2000) during his coaching career.

Druschel, a member of the American Baseball Coaches and Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Associations, played baseball and basketball collegiately at Upper Iowa and Mount Mercy from 1994-98.

The Vinton, Iowa, native graduated from Mount Mercy with a bachelor's degree in management in 1998, and he earned his master's degree in athletic administration from Indiana in 2001. He and his wife, Jessica, have two children, Jace and Halle.

**GARY BARTA  
ATHLETICS  
DIRECTOR**

A record-setting, perfect regular season, which included a Big Ten West Division title for the Hawkeye football team, set the tone for a successful 2015-16 for the University of Iowa Athletics Department, as Gary Barta completed his first decade as the UI's Director of Athletics.

As Barta enters his 11th year as the leader of Hawkeye athletics, he does so with a five-year contract extension and

recognition as the 2015-16 Under Armour Athletics Director of the Year, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

In the past year, Iowa athletics staff, coaches, and, most importantly, Hawkeye student-athletes, have continued to raise the bar in their daily approach to: Win. Graduate. Do it Right. There is tremendous momentum surrounding the entire athletics program in all three areas.

The Hawkeye football team earned a spot in the Big Ten Conference Championship game after an undefeated regular season and made its sixth Rose Bowl appearance. The Iowa men's and women's basketball teams advanced to postseason play, and the Iowa wrestling program was once again in the thick of the battle for the national title.

UI student-athletes continued to attack their work in the classroom—the "Graduate" leg of the Hawkeyes' three-legged stool. All of Iowa's 24 sports teams again exceeded the NCAA's Annual Progress Report while holding steady their record, established a year ago, with a 89 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR). The average grade point average for all student-athletes reached an impressive 3.0.

The "Do it Right" column was filled with success as well. Under Barta's leadership, the Hawkeyes continued their significant service and contribution to the greater Iowa City area and beyond, taking a leadership position in matters related to

student-athlete welfare. Iowa remains among the handful of intercollegiate athletics programs nationally that successfully maintains its status as 100 percent self-supporting.

Iowa's "Wins" also occurred at the turnstiles, where the Iowa wrestling program once again led the nation in home attendance. Iowa was one of just five programs in the country to rank in the top 25 in home attendance for football, women's basketball, and men's basketball. When the Hawkeye baseball team reached the Big Ten Tournament championship game, more than 10,000 Hawkeye fans were in Omaha to cheer on the Hawkeyes on a Sunday afternoon.

While the record-setting performance by the football team led the way in 2015-16, a number of other Hawkeye athletics teams also enjoyed outstanding success:

- The 2016 Rose Bowl marked Iowa's 13th postseason bowl game under the leadership of Kirk Ferentz and its ninth January bowl event. Junior defensive back Desmond King earned unanimous consensus All-America honors while winning the Jim Thorpe Trophy and was recognized as the Tatum Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year. He is Iowa's 23rd consensus All-American. Fifteen Hawkeye players earned All-Big Ten recognition.

- Lisa Bluder's women's basketball team advanced to postseason play for the ninth straight season while fielding a very young team comprised mainly of underclassmen. Three Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten honors, six earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition, and junior Ally Disterhoft garnered Academic All-America honors for the second straight year.

- The Iowa men's basketball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the third straight season, winning its opening game for the second consecutive year before a second round loss to the eventual national champion, Villanova. Coach Fran McCaffery's team was ranked as high as third in the nation while earning a second straight third-place finish in the Big Ten Conference. Two Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten honors, including first-team selection Jarod Uthoff.

- Jarrod Uthoff (men's basketball) and Ally Disterhoft (women's basketball), were named Academic All-Americans of the Year for their respective sports. Iowa became the first Division I program to claim both the male and female basketball recipients of the award in the same season. Uthoff is the first Iowa men's

basketball student-athlete to earn both consensus All-America and Academic All-America honors.

- Tom Brands' Iowa wrestling squad finished second in the Big Ten and fifth at the NCAA Championships. The Hawkeyes crowned two Big Ten individual champions, featured three NCAA finalists, and had six All-Americans. Iowa wrestling set a national dual meet attendance record as 42,287 were on hand to see the Hawkeyes hand top-ranked Oklahoma State an 18-16 defeat in Kinnick Stadium to open the season.

- Iowa baseball made another late season charge under coach Rick Heller, reaching the Big Ten Tournament title game for the first time since 2010. Only a one-run loss in the championship game kept the Hawkeyes from a second straight NCAA Regional appearance. Two Hawkeyes earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and three players were selected in the 2016 Major League Baseball Draft, moving the three-year total to 11 under Heller—the most for the program since 1991-93.

- Coach Megan Menzel's women's golf program was represented in the national tournament as senior Amy Ihm competed as an individual after earning first-team All-Big Ten honors. Ihm became the first UI women's golfer to compete in NCAA postseason competition since 1990 and just the second in program history.

- The UI's men's golf team, under the direction of second-year head coach Tyler Stith, competed in its eighth straight NCAA Tournament. The Hawkeyes placed second in the Big Ten Championships as three Hawkeyes—juniors Carson Schaake and Raymond Knoll, along with true freshman Matthew Walker—earned all-tournament recognition.

- Larissa Libby's GymHawks advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the seventh time in the last eight seasons, hosting the event in Carver-Hawkeye Arena in 2016. Iowa recorded dual meet wins over five conference foes, including three Big Ten teams who were nationally ranked at the time. Two Hawkeyes were named to the All-Championship team, with Mollie Drenth representing Iowa as an individual competitor at the NCAA Championships. Drenth, Iowa's first NCAA Championships qualifier since 2011, placed third on beam at the NCAA Championship, earning first-team All-America accolades. She is the program's first All-American since 2004.

- JD Reive's UI men's gymnastics squad placed fifth at the Big Ten Championships and saw Matt Loochtan garner first-team All-Big Ten recognition. The Hawkeyes fell short of making team finals at the NCAA Championships, but saw five student-

athletes advance to individual event finals. The youthful roster excelled in the classroom, tying a school record with nine Academic All-Big Ten selections. Senior Jack Boyle was also named a finalist for the Nissen–Emery Award, an award given to the country’s most outstanding senior gymnast in the gym and in the classroom.

- Joey Woody’s second season as head coach of the UI’s men’s and women’s track and field teams resulted in a record number of performers advancing to the NCAA Outdoor Championships. A total of 15 Hawkeyes advanced to the national championships, including Big Ten champions Briana Guillory (200 meters), Aaron Mallett (110 meter hurdles), men’s 400-meter relay, and women’s 1,600-meter relay.

- The Iowa men’s and women’s swimming and diving teams both tallied top-40 finishes at the NCAA Championships under head coach Marc Long. The program had two student-athletes—junior Emma Sougstad (100 breast) and senior Roman Trussov (100 breast, 200 breast)—garner three All-America distinctions. Ten student-athletes were named CSCAA Scholar All-Americans and 35 earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition.

- Under third-year head coach Andrew Carter, the Iowa rowing program continued to make significant strides forward. The Hawkeyes were represented in the top-20 national rankings for the first time in six seasons. The squad placed fifth in the Big Ten Championships with 95 points, its highest championship point total since 2009. Senior Beth Baustian earned second-team Pocock All-America accolades, becoming the fourth All-American in program history and the second in the last three seasons. The Hawkeyes excelled off the water with 20 Academic All-Big Ten selections, the most for the program since 2009, and five Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association Scholar Athletes.

- Under second-year head coach Bond Shymansky, the UI volleyball team compiled a 10-3 record in nonconference action—the best overall start for the program since 2006 (11-1). The Hawkeyes won eight straight matches from Sept. 6-19, including a 3-1 victory over

Iowa State -- Iowa’s first win over the Cyclones since 1997 -- and a 3-1 win over No. 25 Texas A&M.

In October 2015, the NCAA reported that Iowa’s student-athletes had tied the record set the previous year by posting a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) score of 89 percent. That mark ranked six points better than the national average.

The NCAA also noted the UI had posted a federal graduation rate of 71 percent. This was also a record, three points better than the national average—and tops the three State of Iowa Board of Regents’ institutions.

Last May, the NCAA reported that all 24 of Iowa’s sports programs were comfortably above the Academic Progress Rate (APR) threshold. The NCAA also singled out the UI’s volleyball, men’s golf, and women’s swimming and diving for APR scores that ranked in the top 10 percent of their peer group. These three teams have each registered a perfect score of 1,000 in each of the past four years.

Along with Uthoff and Disterhoft earning Academic All-American of the Year accolades, the Hawkeyes also boasted Academic All-Americans in football (senior defensive back Jordan Lomax) and wrestling (senior Nathan Burak). In addition, 167 UI student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten recognitions throughout the year, and wrestler Alex Meyer earned academic recognition from the National Wrestling coaches Association (NWCA).

“Doing it Right” for Barta and the more than 225 staff of the UI Athletics Department is a charge that encompasses a long and varied list of responsibilities, including maintaining the department’s status as one of a handful of intercollegiate athletics programs nationally that successfully operates its sports programs and auxiliary enterprises in a fiscally responsible manner and without any institutional or taxpayer financial support. The UI provides a superior experience for the more than 650 talented student-athletes who participate in the program annually and the more than one million friends and fans of the UI who attend Hawkeye events on the

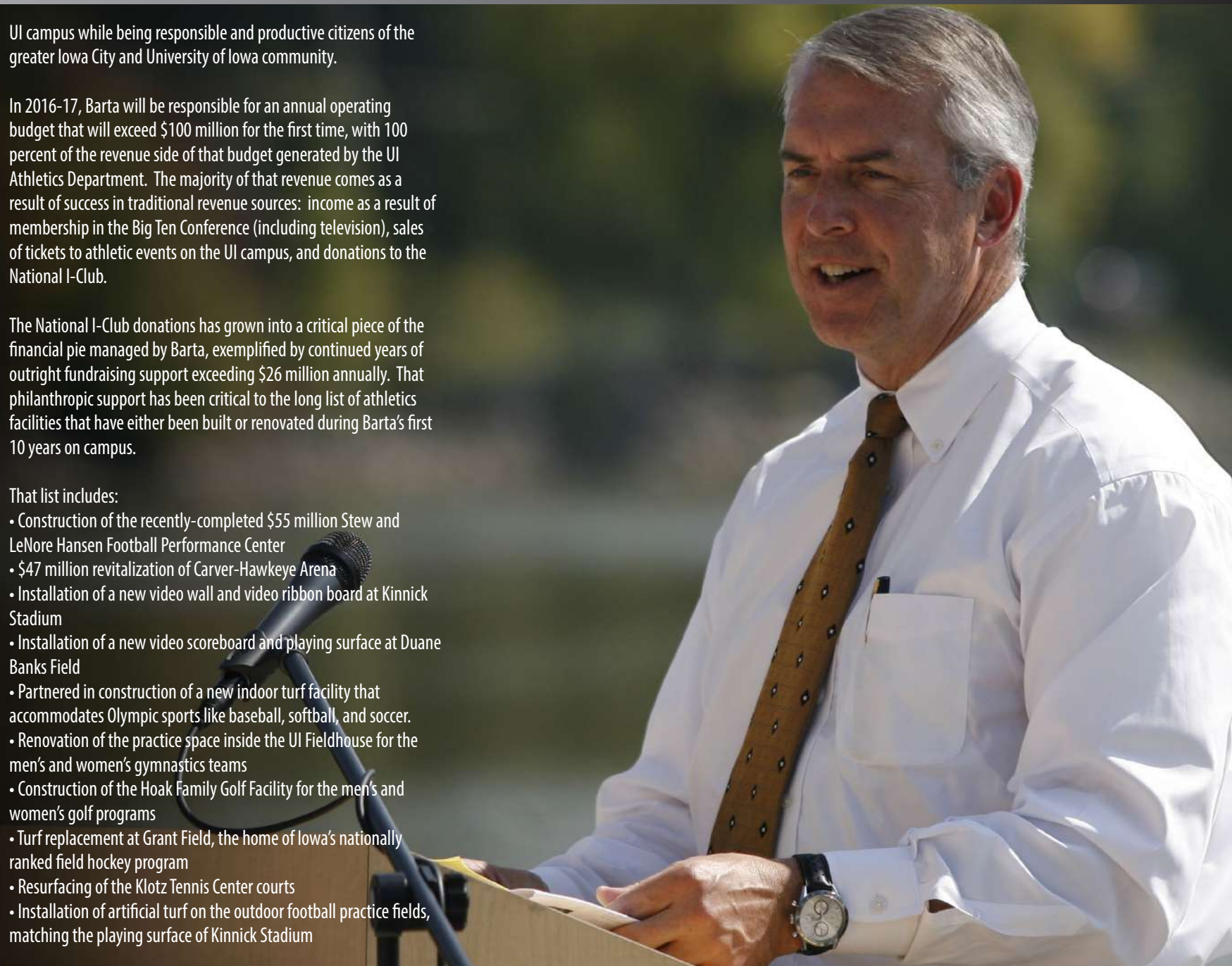
UI campus while being responsible and productive citizens of the greater Iowa City and University of Iowa community.

In 2016-17, Barta will be responsible for an annual operating budget that will exceed \$100 million for the first time, with 100 percent of the revenue side of that budget generated by the UI Athletics Department. The majority of that revenue comes as a result of success in traditional revenue sources: income as a result of membership in the Big Ten Conference (including television), sales of tickets to athletic events on the UI campus, and donations to the National I-Club.

The National I-Club donations has grown into a critical piece of the financial pie managed by Barta, exemplified by continued years of outright fundraising support exceeding \$26 million annually. That philanthropic support has been critical to the long list of athletics facilities that have either been built or renovated during Barta’s first 10 years on campus.

That list includes:

- Construction of the recently-completed \$55 million Stew and LeNore Hansen Football Performance Center
- \$47 million revitalization of Carver-Hawkeye Arena
- Installation of a new video wall and video ribbon board at Kinnick Stadium
- Installation of a new video scoreboard and playing surface at Duane Banks Field
- Partnered in construction of a new indoor turf facility that accommodates Olympic sports like baseball, softball, and soccer.
- Renovation of the practice space inside the UI Fieldhouse for the men’s and women’s gymnastics teams
- Construction of the Hoak Family Golf Facility for the men’s and women’s golf programs
- Turf replacement at Grant Field, the home of Iowa’s nationally ranked field hockey program
- Resurfacing of the Klotz Tennis Center courts
- Installation of artificial turf on the outdoor football practice fields, matching the playing surface of Kinnick Stadium





Providing the resources for UI student-athletes and coaches to be successful is a priority for Barta and his senior management team. That process includes providing state-of-the-art facilities, which is why Barta continues to work closely with institutional leadership on the finalization of a comprehensive master plan for the facilities available to the Hawkeyes.

Additional facility projects on the horizon include:

- Center-hung videoboards in Carver-Hawkeye Arena, along with new sound and lighting systems being installed this summer
- A north end zone project at Kinnick Stadium that will provide additional premium seating options and additional upgrades
- Installation of a new banked track in the UI Recreation Building, home of UI indoor track programs
- Renovations to the Gerdin Athletics Learning Center, home to the UI's Athletic Student Services staff
- Stadium upgrades to the baseball (Duane Banks Field) and softball (Bob Pearl Field) facilities
- A new clubhouse at the UI's Finkbine Golf Course
- Additional olympic sport improvements for soccer, gymnastics, volleyball, and other teams.

Iowa's contributions to the greater Iowa City community go far beyond the multi-million dollars of economic impact generated as a result of the staging of hundreds of annual regular season, postseason, and special events annually. Barta and UI student-athletes, coaches, and staff are also active citizens, logging thousands of hours of community service and spearheading efforts to support a wide variety of causes ranging from construction of the UI's new Children's Hospital, to the UI's extremely successful Dance Marathon, to involvement with Coaches vs. Cancer.

Iowa football has been involved with the Children's Hospital "Kid Captain" program for 10 years. UI athletics teamed with the UI Alumni Association on the "Black and Gold Friday" outreach program; partnered with the College Football Playoff Foundation on "Extra Yard for (K-12) Teachers" program; and partnered with select colleges on the staging of the first "Academic Day" as part of Homecoming in 2015.

Iowa's annual "Day of Caring" serves as the foundation upon which all these outreach activities rest. Now in its 21st year of existence, the Day of Caring happens each April and typically involves representatives of most, if not all, of Iowa's sports programs who provide a wide variety of assistance to an equally-wide variety of not-for-profit organizations that service the greater Iowa City community.

"Doing it Right" also encompasses efforts aimed at improving the student-athlete experience. The UI Athletics Department invested more than \$1.7 million directly into food cost for its student-athletes in 2014-15 in response to NCAA legislation aimed at providing a higher quality student-athlete experience. That commitment will continue annually and is complemented by increases to the value of the scholarships awarded the UI's student-athletes as part of the NCAA's effort to fully address cost of attendance.

Barta's involvement in the UI campus and the greater Iowa City community extends beyond his position as Director of the UI's Intercollegiate Athletics programs. He is a member of the President's Cabinet, comprised of vice presidents and other campus leaders that provide counsel to the UI's president.

Barta represents the UI and the Hawkeyes at the conference and national level as a member of the Rose Bowl Management Committee. During his tenure, he has participated in the creation and implementation of the Big Ten Network (BTN), the expansion of the Big Ten Conference and realignment of athletics conferences.

Barta remains active on the conference and NCAA level. He is involved in committee work with NCAA Football, the Division IA Athletic Directors Association, and is an ongoing participant in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

Barta is also involved in a variety of community groups, including the United Way of Johnson and Washington Counties and the Partnership for Alcohol Safety, a joint effort between UI campus leaders and the city of Iowa City.

Barta often suggests to his staff that "Hope is not a strategy," which is why the Department has completed a comprehensive review and rewriting of the strategic plan for the UI Athletics Department and continues to work with the UI's leadership on a long-term financial plan.

As the Director of Athletics at the University of Wyoming for three years, seven different Wyoming coaches were named Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year. He also spearheaded a fundraising effort that netted the Cowboy athletics program \$11 million in private support and \$11 million in matching state funds.

As the senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington, he directed the "Campaign for the Student-Athlete," was a participant in the design, construction and/or renovation of several Washington athletics facilities, including Bank of America Arena and the Dempsey Indoor Practice Facility. In addition to almost doubling the amount of annual private support received by Washington, Barta also managed the department's external relations division, a task that included managing corporate sponsorship and radio contracts.

His responsibilities at Washington expanded over time to include hiring coaching and administrative staff, and the day-to-day oversight of several Huskie sport teams.

The roots of his development experience extend to his first two positions: director of development at his alma mater, North Dakota State University, and director of athletics development and external relations at the University of Northern Iowa.

Barta earned a bachelor of science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championship in 1983, 1985, and 1986.

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (18), and a daughter, Madison (15). He was born Sept. 4, 1963, in Minneapolis.

**IOWA CONTINUES TO BUILD FOR SUCCESS**

The UI Department of Athletics is under the direction of Gary Barta and is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation. Once again, the Hawkeyes enjoyed success both athletically and academically in 2015-16.

Academically, the UI's federal graduation rate of 78 percent (for student-athletes who enrolled in the fall of 2008), meaning UI student-athletes have graduated at a rate of 70 percent or better in five straight years. For the sixth consecutive year, all 24 of Iowa's teams exceeded the Academic Progress Rate (APR) benchmark and the program posted a record 89 percent in the NCAA's "Graduation Success Rate." That mark tied a school record. It is the 11th time in 12 years of the GSR's existence that Iowa's student-athletes scored 80 percent or better.

Seven UI teams scored a perfect 100 on their GSR: Men's basketball, field hockey, men's golf, women's golf, men's tennis, field hockey, women's golf, women's tennis, and volleyball. All counted, the GSR for 17 of Iowa's 24 teams was better than the national average among its peer sport group.

Athletically, Hawkeye teams enjoyed another outstanding year in 2015-16, as a significant number of Iowa's 24 programs reached postseason play. The Iowa football team played in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game, the UI men's basketball team advanced to second round of the NCAA Tournament for a second straight year, the women's basketball team advanced to the postseason for a ninth consecutive season, the wrestling team had three NCAA finalists en route to a fifth place finish at the NCAA Championships, the women's gymnastics team advanced to NCAA Regionals for the seventh time in eight seasons and the men's golf team qualified for NCAAs for an eighth straight year.

Facilities upgrades remain at the forefront with Carver-Hawkeye Arena being the latest facility receiving an upgrade with new LED video technology being installed by Daktronics. The new four-sided centerhung video system is the centerpiece of the installation, while four auxiliary displays -- two on each end of the arena -- will also be installed. The Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Center installed PlaySight Smart Court Technology -- a video component with live streaming capabilities, transforming the HTRC into a fully interactive practice and competition venue.

The gymnastics practice venues inside the UI Fieldhouse were completely renovated more than doubling the training space for the men's and women's programs, and a second indoor practice facility was constructed on the west campus -- Iowa Turf -- for sports like baseball, softball, and soccer in a partnership with recreation services.

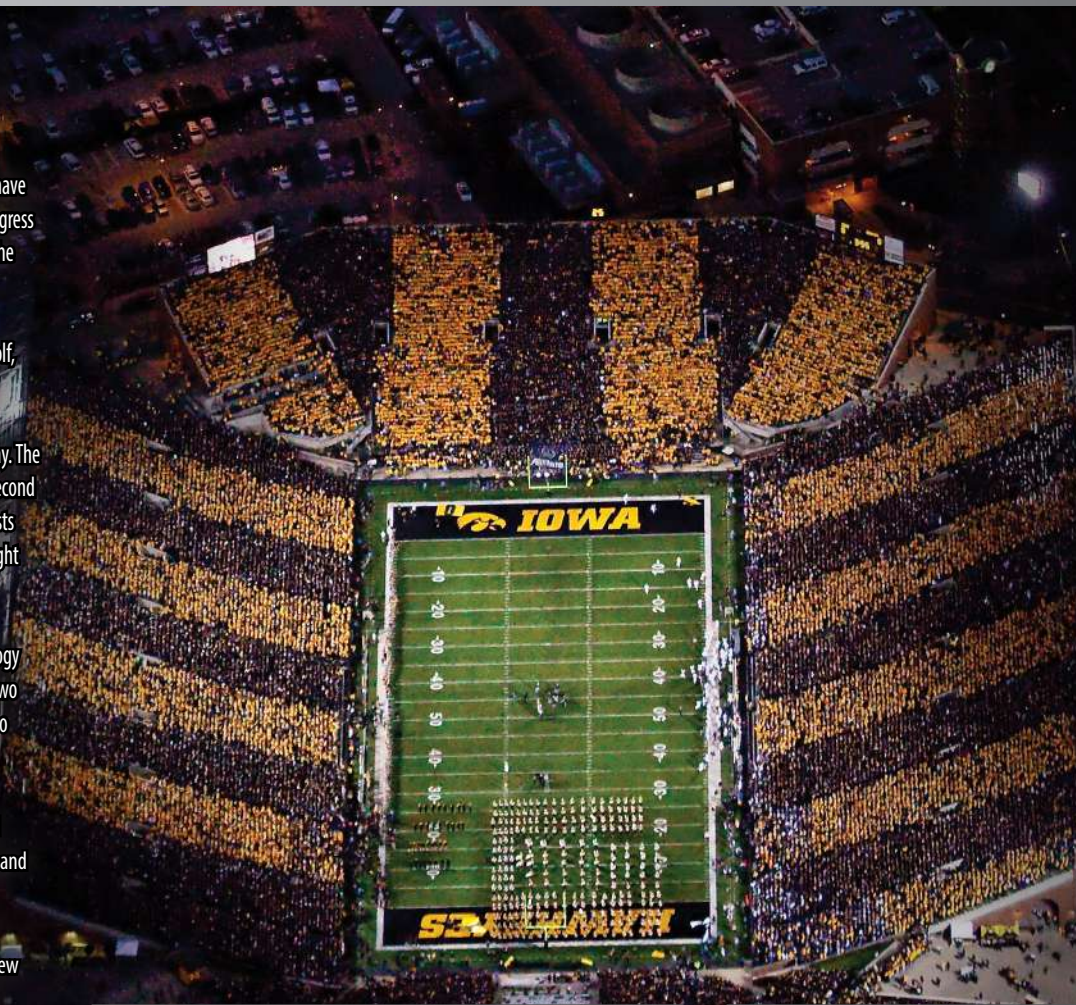
Renovations continue with a north end zone project at Kinnick Stadium on the horizon, a new banked track in the UI Recreation Building, a new clubhouse at Finkbine Golf Course, and a renovation to the Gerdin Athletics Learning Center -- the home to the UI's Athletic Student Services.

**IOWA FOOTBALL**

The Iowa football team went 12-0 during the regular season en route to the Big Ten West Division title and played in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game. Junior defensive back Desmond King earned consensus All-America honors while winning the Jim Thorpe Trophy and being recognized as the Tatum Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year.

**IOWA WOMEN'S BASKETBALL**

UI head coach Lisa Bluder led the women's basketball team to the postseason for a ninth consecutive season. Three Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten honors, six were Academic All-Big Ten selections, and junior Ally Disterhoft garnered Academic All-America honors for the second straight year and was the Academic All-American of the Year.

**IOWA WRESTLING**

The Hawkeyes finished the 2015-16 season as the Big Ten team runner-up and finished fifth at the NCAA Championships. Iowa crowned two Big Ten individual champions, featured three NCAA finalists, and had six All-Americans. The program set a national dual meet attendance record when 42,287 were on hand to see the Hawkeyes defeat top-ranked Oklahoma State in Kinnick Stadium to open the season.

**IOWA MEN'S BASKETBALL**

Sixth-year head coach Fran McCaffery led the men's basketball team to the NCAA Tournament for a third straight season, winning its opening game for a second consecutive year before a second round loss to eventual NCAA champion, Villanova. The Hawkeyes were ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation while earning a third-place Big Ten finish. Two players earned All-Big Ten recognition.

**IOWA WOMEN'S GYMNASTICS**

The Gymhaws advanced to NCAA Regionals for the seventh time in the last eight seasons, hosting the event in Carver-Hawkeye Arena in 2016. Mollie Drenth represented the program at the NCAA Championships where she earned first-team All-America honors -- Iowa's first All-American since 2004.

**IOWA MEN'S & WOMEN'S GOLF**

Head coach Tyler Stith led the Hawkeyes to their eighth straight NCAA Regional appearance in 2016 and Iowa was the team runner-up at the Big Ten Championships. Senior Amy Ihm qualified individually for the NCAA Tournament, becoming the first UI women's golfer to compete in NCAA postseason competition since 1990 and just the second in program history.

**IOWA TRACK & FIELD**

The Hawkeyes had a record number of NCAA performers at the 2016 NCAA Championships with 15 student-athletes advancing to Eugene, Oregon. Iowa crowned Big Ten champions in four events, including the men's 400-meter relay and women's 1,600-meter relay.

The second phase of the Duane Banks Field renovation was completed in 2015 when AstroTurf replaced the outfield grass and warning track. The infield was changed to the surface prior to the 2014 season meaning there is now zero dirt or natural grass at the Hawkeyes' home venue.

Phase II renovations also included the installation of a state-of-the-art videoboard in right center field and a new padded wall on the outfield fence and down the foul lines.

With the first two phases complete, Phase III calls for brand new stadium seating and a new press box to be constructed surrounding the existing playing field.

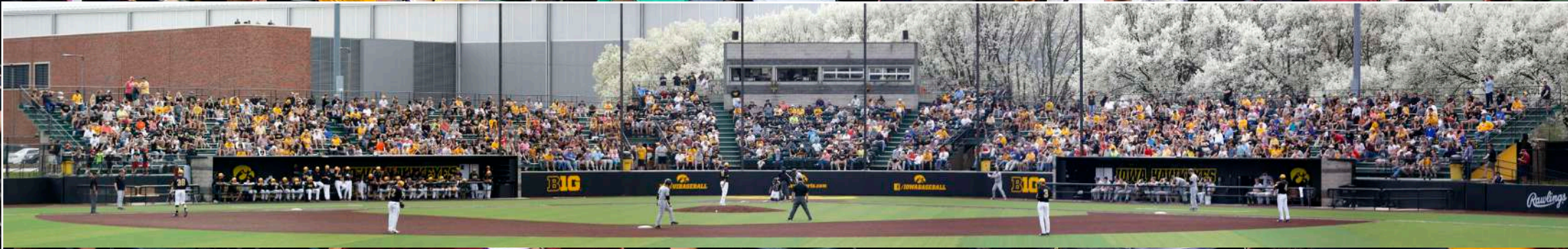
The facility was renamed as Duane Banks Baseball Field in honor of the Hawkeyes' former head coach in 2001. Banks, the winningest coach in Iowa history, served as Iowa's head baseball coach from 1970-1997.

Banks Field was originally built in 1974. The 3,000-seat stadium had dimensions of 330 feet down the lines, 375 in the power alleys and 400 to centerfield. That has decreased slightly and currently sits at 329 down the lines and 395 to centerfield.

In 2002, former Hawkeye and former Major Leaguer Cal Eldred donated \$245,000 to fund the installation of lights at Banks Field.

The complex at Banks Field features locker rooms for both teams and umpires and a press box that was initially built in 1989 and renovated in 2002.

The Hawkeyes utilize the Indoor Practice Facility located directly south of Banks Field throughout the winter and a hitting-only facility is located off the Jacobson Building adjacent to Banks Field. Iowa also utilizes a second turf facility on the campus' west side.

The Hawkeyes added the Jacobson Hitting Facility in January, 2015, -- a facility that is located adjacent to Duane Banks Field. The facility has four drop-down batting cages, as well as additional nets for tee work. Self-feeding machines, tees, equipment, and areas for front toss are available for student-athletes to utilize in their training. The facility is available for players to get extra repetitions at their convenience.

The UI Athletics Department also added a second indoor facility -- Iowa Turf at the HTRC -- which gives the Hawkeyes a second location for practices during the winter months. Both the Indoor Practice Facility and Iowa Turf have drop-down batting cages and give the team a first-class practice facilities.

In addition to their main locker room inside the UI Recreation Building, the Hawkeyes have a clubhouse in the bowels of Duane Banks Field, which was renovated in the fall of 2014.

Duane Banks, following 28 years as Iowa's head baseball coach retired from coaching following the 1997 season.

Banks was inducted into the 2011 UI Hall of Fame. Banks led the Hawkeyes to its only College World Series appearance in 1972 and won Big Ten Championships in 1972 and 1990, as well as a share of the Big Ten crown in 1974. In 1981, Banks led Iowa to 44 wins, the most in school history. He earned Big Ten Conference and District Coach of the Year honors in 1990 and was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1991. Banks posted a career record of 901-585-4, while coaching six All-Americans, 31 All-Big Ten selections, 33 Academic All-Americans, and 57 players who signed professional contracts. In the fall of 2001, Iowa's home field was officially designated as the Duane Banks Baseball Field.

In 1990, Banks led Iowa to a Big Ten title and to the NCAA playoffs for the first time since 1975. The 1990 squad won a record 22 Big Ten games and placed a record-tying five players (Tim Costo, John DeJarld, Chris Hatcher, Keith Noreen and Brian Wujick) on the all-Big Ten squad.

Many of his former Hawkeyes have earned pro contracts and five—Mike Boddicker, Cal Eldred, Jim Sundberg, Tim Costo and Jeff Jones—made it to the major leagues. Tim Costo was the eighth pick overall in 1990 draft, marking the second straight season Banks produced a first round draft choice. Eldred was selected in the first round by Milwaukee in 1989. Fifty-seven of Banks' former players signed pro contracts.



Banks served as an assistant coach for half a season at Iowa. The Hawkeyes won 14 of their final 27 games under his direction. Duane's next club won 28 games, at that time an Iowa record, in his first full campaign (1971).

Banks' 1972 team won Big Ten and District Four Championships to earn a berth in the College World Series, claiming Iowa's first outright Big Ten title in 33 years. As a result, Banks was named District Coach of the year.

Banks became Iowa's all-time winningest coach in 1985, passing Hall of Famer Otto Vogel, who won 440 games in 35 years. He joined the Iowa staff as an assistant coach in 1969, after serving in the same capacity at Colorado State. He spent two seasons at Parsons (Iowa) College, compiling a 91-10 mark in 1967-68. He was an assistant coach at Parsons in 1966.

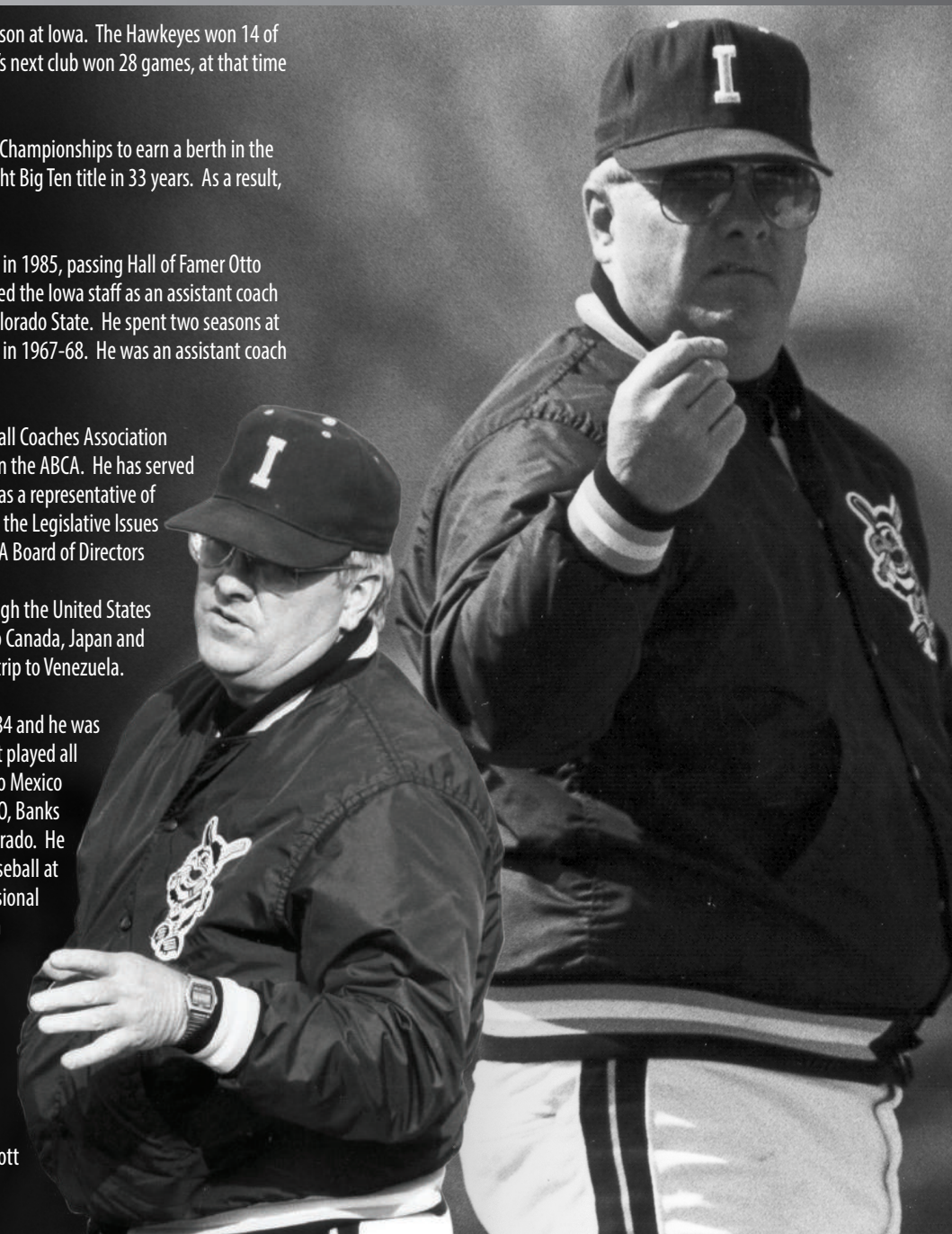
Banks is a past president of the American Baseball Coaches Association and has held a number of administrative posts in the ABCA. He has served as chairman of the NCAA Division I coaches and as a representative of District Four. A member of the Hall of Fame and the Legislative Issues committees, Banks is a past member of the ABCA Board of Directors.

Banks was active in international baseball through the United States Baseball Federation. He took an all-star team to Canada, Japan and Korea in 1985 and coached another squad on a trip to Venezuela.

Banks and his Iowa team went to Holland in 1984 and he was on the staff of the USA college all-star team that played all over the world in 1982. He took an Iowa team to Mexico in the mid-1970s. A native of Grand Junction, CO, Banks played baseball and basketball at Northern Colorado. He was all-league and all-district three times in baseball at Northern Colorado and played on year of professional baseball with the Atlanta Braves organization in 1964.

Banks attended Mesa (Colorado) Junior College, received his bachelor's degree from Northern Colorado in 1965 and his master's degree from Colorado State in 1969.

Duane and his wife, Jeanette, have two sons, Scott and Kirk and a grandson Nile.

- Build the right strength and flexibility in the upper body to create not only better arm strength but healthier arms and shoulders.

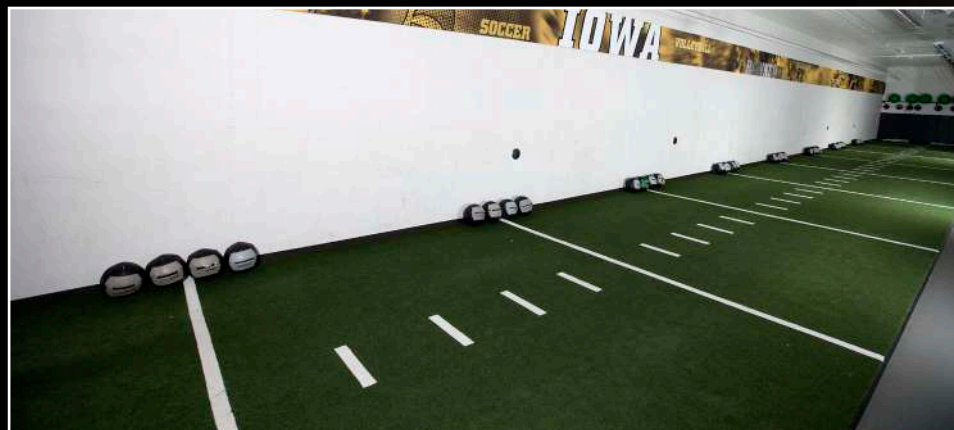

**DONALD W. & MARILYN HEINEKING BASEBALL SCHOLARSHIP**

Don Heineking established the Donald W. and Marilyn Heineking Baseball Scholarship in 2004. Don is a long-time supporter of Iowa athletics, a member of the Johnson County I-Club Board of Directors and member of the Iowa Scholarship Fund Board of Directors. In 2002, Don and Marilyn established scholarships in football and women's basketball. Then, in 2003, they added a wrestling scholarship and men's basketball manager's scholarship. Most recently, they added baseball, softball and volleyball scholarships.

Don lives in Iowa City and is a member of the President's Club of the UI Foundation. Marilyn passed away in February of 2004.

**CAL ELDRED LIGHTS FUND**

Cal Eldred lit up Hawkeye baseball once again, instead of employing his expert pitching, the former Major League Baseball star and his wife, Christi, made a gift to fund the installation of lights at Iowa's Duane Banks Field. The Cedar Rapids couple gave \$245,000 for the installation of lights at the baseball field named after Cal Eldred's former coach.

The gift, the largest ever from a current professional athlete's family to Iowa athletics, allowed the project to be completed in Sept. 2001. The Hawkeyes won the first night game played at Banks Field, April 10, 2002, against Northern Illinois, 11-9. The University of Iowa officially dedicated the lights Sat., April 13, 2002.

The Eldred's said their desire to give back to Iowa and to honor former

Hawkeye coaches Duane Banks and Scott Broghamer -- who they said are their good friends and longtime mentors -- as reasons for making the gift. The gift was commemorated by a plaque at the field.

Cal Eldred, who grew up in Urbana and attended Iowa for three years before being drafted by the Milwaukee Brewers in 1989, said, "My experience at Iowa helped shape me as a player and person. Coach Banks has stayed involved in my life and has always been there for me. I couldn't be happier about making this gift for Hawkeye baseball. I hope others will consider helping out however they can."

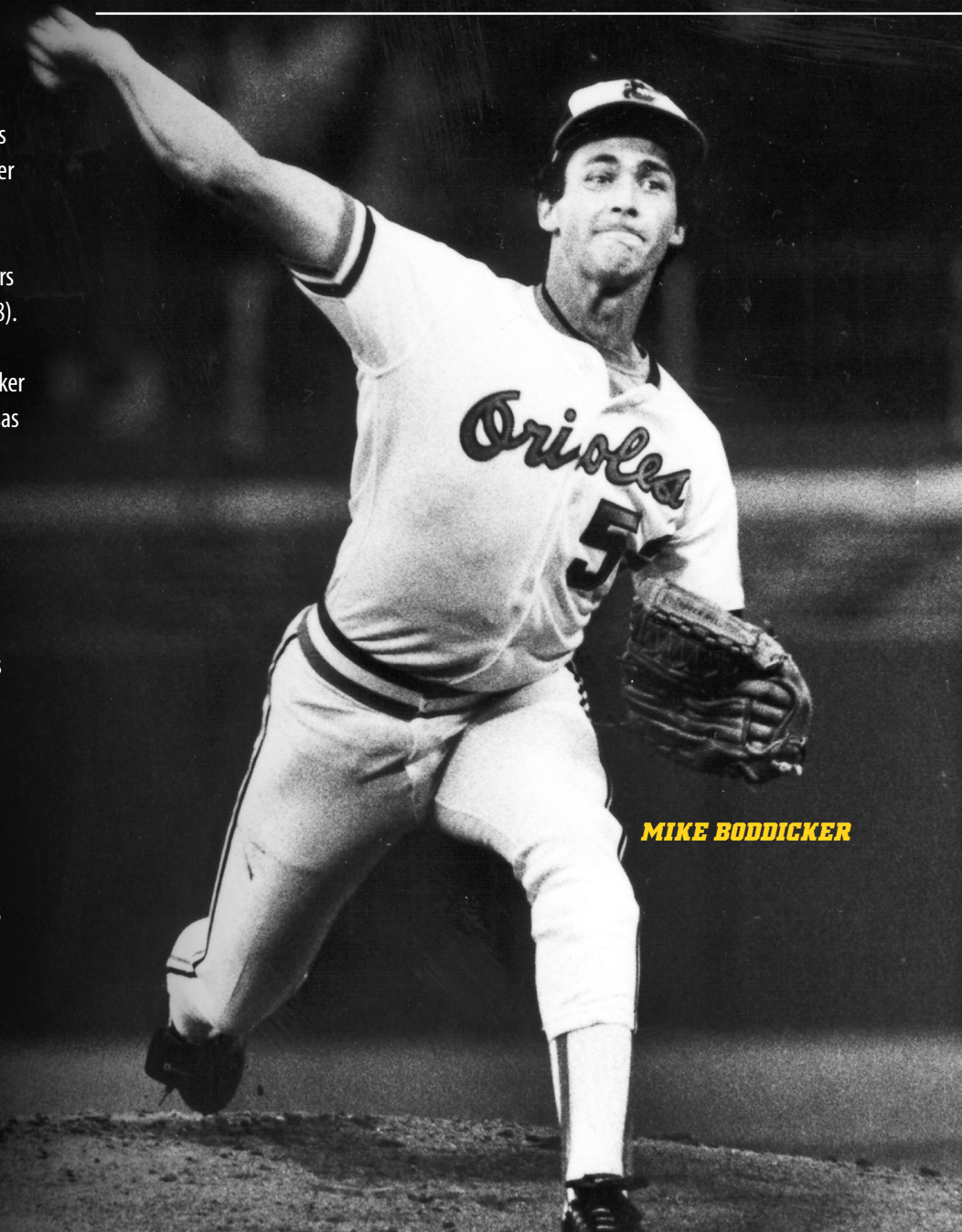


**MIKE BODDICKER SCHOLARSHIP**

Former Iowa standout Mike Boddicker, and his family, have established the Mike Boddicker Scholarship. The scholarship goes each year to a member of the Iowa baseball team who is in good academic standing and displays outstanding character and personality.

Boddicker, a native of Norway, Iowa, earned All-Big Ten honors as a pitcher and infielder during his Hawkeye career (1976-78). In 1983, he was named the American League "Rookie of the Year." After pitching in the major leagues for 11 years, Boddicker retired in 1993. He played for the Baltimore Orioles and Kansas City Royals.

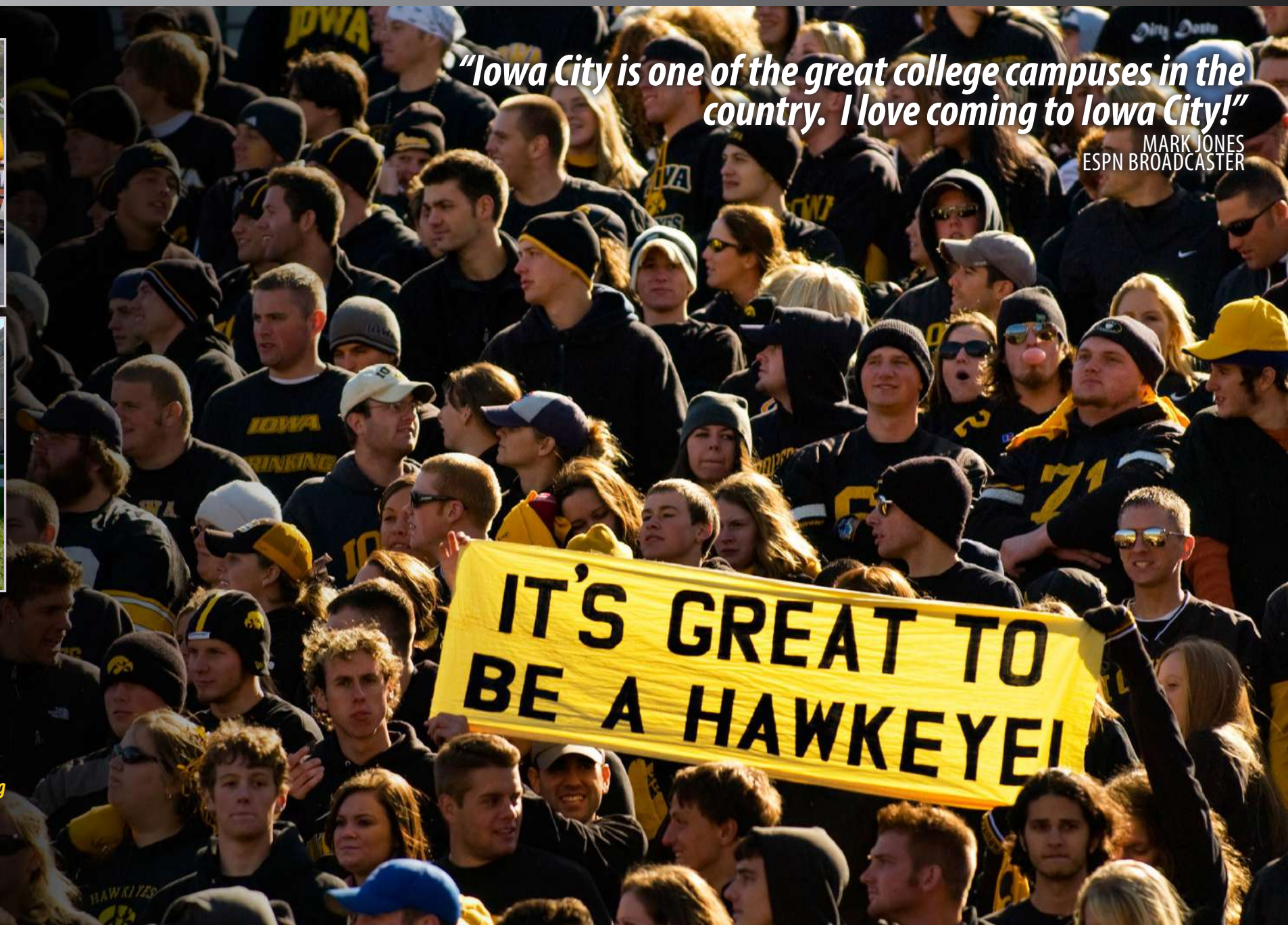

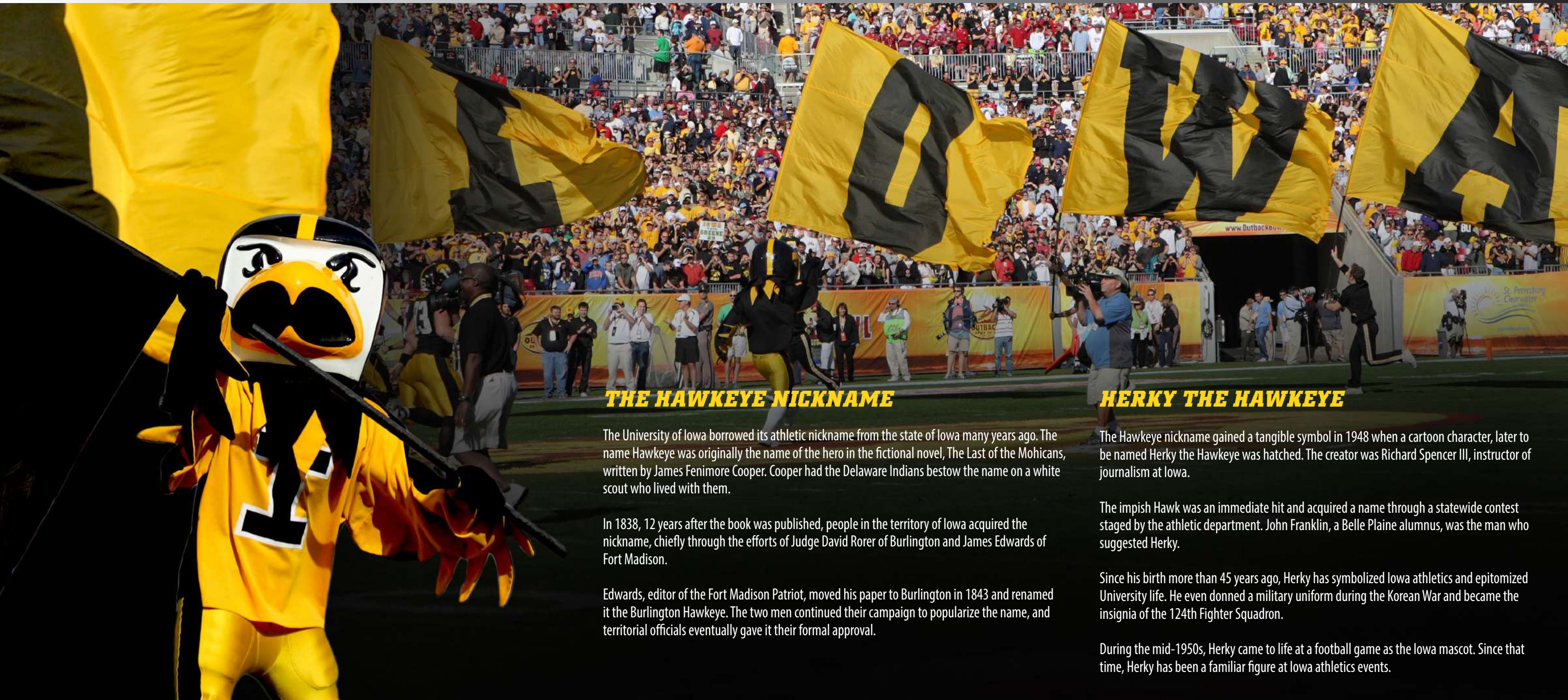

**THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME**

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the *Fort Madison Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawkeye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

**HERKY THE HAWKEYE**

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.
