

TEAU CUACH MANDI KOWAL 2006



Mandi Kowal, a member of the United States National Rowing Team for five years ('83, '84, '86-'88), enters her 13th season as the head rowing coach for the University of lowa. Kowal was named the first varsity head coach of the Hawkeyes in 1994.

COACHING EXPERIENCE

Kowal has headed the Hawkeyes since the team's elevation to varsity status in 1994. After two solid spring seasons at Iowa, Kowal's Varsity four was invited to the first-ever NCAA Rowing Championships in 1997. The Varsity 4+ finished the season fourth in the country. In1998, the Hawkeyes' Varsity 4+ returned to the NCAA Championships, ending their season with an eighth-place finish. In the past six seasons, Kowal's Hawkeyes have continued to make strides nationally. In fact, lowa has had crews ranked in the top-20 every year the polls have been in existance. Last season, the Varsity 8+ peaked at No.

15 and ended the year ranked No. 20 in one of the strongest fields in years. The Varsity 8+ finished the 1999 spring season ranked 17th in the country and 18th in the spring of 2000. In 2001, Kowal coached the Hawkeyes to their first-ever team appearance at the NCAA Championships, where lowa finished ninth. The Varsity 8+ boat also received a national ranking of No. 10, it's highest ever ranking. During the 2002 spring season, the Varsity 8+ was named Big Ten Boat of the Week March 25. The Hawkeyes posted an undefeated Spring 2003 Dual Season record for the Varsity 8+ and finished fourth at the Big Ten Championships, where they won the Second Varsity 4+, and won a silver medal in the Second Varsity 8+ and the Varsity 4+. Kowal's Hawkeyes capped an outstanding season with a fifth-place finish at the Central/South Sprints. Three boats, the Second Varsity 8+, First Varsity 4+ and the Second Varsity 4+, took home bronze medals, while the First Varsity 8+ won the Petite Final. Three out of four varsity crews medalled at both Big Ten's and the Central Sprints. Kowal began her coaching career at the University of Wisconsin, where she served as the novice coach for seven years. While coaching the Badgers, she led her team to one gold and three silver medals at the Collegiate National Rowing Championships and 10 Midwest Rowing Championship titles. Her Novice 4+ won the national title in 1993 and placed second in '91, '92 and '94. In addition to her collegiate coaching duties. Kowal was the assistant lightweight coach for the US National Pre-Elite squad for three years, winning four gold and three silver medals at Elite Nationals. Kowal coached the Junior National Team 4- to a gold medal at the Junior World Rowing Championships in Zagreb, Croatia in 2000. She spent the summer in Seattle, WA as the assistant coach, working with the 8+ and the 4-. Kowal concentrated most on the race preparations for the 4-, and has earned three World

Championship gold medals in straight 4 events (two as an athlete, one as a coach). In 2001, she coached the Junior Women's 4- to a silver medal at the Junior World Championships in Duisburg, Germany. In the summer of 2005, Kowal was an assistant coach for the United States Under-23 team.

Kowal began her rowing career at the University of Wisconsin in 1981 while pursing a B.S. in Physical Education and Coaching. She was a member of the Varsity 8+ that placed second at the 1985 Collegiate Nationals. While at Wisconsin, Kowal helped the team to four Midwest Rowing Championships and two Eastern Sprints titles. Kowal joined the Lightweight National Team while still an undergraduate in 1983. As a five-time member of the national team, Kowal was a two-time World Champion in the lightweight four without coxswain (straight four). Her boat won gold in 1986 in England and again in 1987 in Copenhagen, where Kowal's boat posted a world record time of 6:45.0 for the event. Kowal has recently ventured into the world of competitive triathlons. Since 2003 she has competed in 13 triathlons and consistently finished in the top fi ve of her age group. She has raced in five Half Ironmans and in September of 2004 competed in the Wisconsin Ironman, finishing in 12:59.13. She has also raced two half-marathons, winning at the Drake Relays in her age group and placing fourth in her age group at the Disney half-marathon in Orlando, FL.

AWARDS AND HONORS

In 1987, Kowal was honored by the United States Olympic Committee. A nominee for the Sullivan Award honoring the top amateur athlete in the nation, Kowal was named the national "Sportswoman of the Year" by the USOC. Kowal was honored in a White House ceremony along with 84 other USOC amateur athletes. Kowal has been honored twice by her alma mater for her contributions to rowing at Wisconsin. In 1996, The Mandi Kowal Award was created to honor the varsity lightweight athlete who contributes the most to the success of her crew by demonstrating a high level of performance, desire and excellence. In 1999, Kowal was again honored, having a racing eight named after her. In addition to her rowing and coaching responsibilities, Kowal served as a member of the Women's Olympic Committee for the US Rowing Association from 1988-90. She was the Midwest Regional Technical Coordinator of USRA from 1989-91, and was appointed the chair of the planning committee for the Big Ten Rowing Championships in 1999.

Chuck Rodosky will begin his first season at lowa at the start of the year. He comes to the Hawkeye family after coaching for three years at Ohio State and one year at Trinity College.

Though he is new to the Hawkeye squad, he brings with him an immense amount of knowledge and experience.

Rodosky started his coaching career as a novice coach for the Ohio State's competitive club team. While working with the club team the novice eight finished second at the ECAC's in 2001. He then went to work with the well renowned women's crew at Ohio State Uni-

versity. He spent his first two years with the Buckeyes training the second novice eights and led both crews to Central Region Titles. In his third year, he became an assistant for the varsity squad and worked primarily with the varsity fours. There he led the second varsity four to a Regional title and silver in the Big Ten Championships.

He left Ohio State in 2005 to work with the women's Novice team at Trinity college in Hartford, CT. His Novice eight raced second varsity eight all season and went undefeated. The Novice eight was also the second eight at the DIII NCAA Championships in which Trinity College finished third as a team.

Rodosky graduated from Bowling Green State University in 1999 with a Bachelor of Science in Accounting and a minor in Architectural Design. He is currently working on getting his Masters in Architecture.



Carrie Callen enters her first season as an assistant rowing coach at the University of Iowa. She will serve as the varsity assistant coach and assist with all duties within the program.

Before coming to Iowa Callen was at the University of Kansas assisting with the varsity and novice programs, where she also served as the team's equipment manager for two years. Callen was also a coach for the Kansas City Rowing Club in 2006. Callen rowed at Kansas from 2002-2004 and was named a Jayhawk Scholar Student-Athlete.

During her collegiate years, Callen founded and co-edited the KU Business School magazine, The LINK, while serving on the Undergraduate Business Council. The magazine serves as a source to students transitioning into the working world.

Callen graduated from the University of Kansas with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration in 2006.



Emily Wagstrom enters her second season on the lowa coaching staff and her first as the graduate assistant coach. Last season, Wagstrom served as an assistant coach and will serve as the graduate assistant coach this season after being accepted to medical school at the University of lowa.

Before joining the coaching ranks, Wagstrom was a four-year member of the rowing team. As a senior, she was a member of the V8+ that ended the season ranked No. 20 and defeated Texas at the Longhorn Invitational. She was awarded the Robert Ray Award, one of the most prestigious awards given to students, by the UI Board in Control of Athletics.





The University of Iowa rowing team and Head Coach Mandi Kowal look to the 2006-07 season with excitement and anxiousness. A combination of fresh faces and veterans of the sport will help the Hawkeyes make strides in the upcoming season.

Two new faces join the coaching staff with Coach Kowal this year. Chuck Rodosky comes to Iowa after coaching three years at Ohio State University and one year at Trinity College to fill the novice coaching spot and help with recruiting. Another newcomer to the rowing coaching staff is Carrie Callen. Callen is a graduate from the University of Kansas and brings past experience as a coach for the Kansas City Rowing Club.

"I am a strong believer in change and I am excited for the different ideas that both of them have to bring to our program," says Kowal, who returns for her 13th season.

A large class of returning seniors pace the way for the Hawkeyes on and off the water.

"Our seniors this year are leading our team in many different ways, on and off the water. They have suffered some injuries this year, but are showing great leadership," Kowal said.








KALWATCHING

The crew that's making it look easy is most likely the one doing the best job, working very hard and hurting the most. Here's what to watch for:

IDENTIFYING.TEAMS. You can tell different crews apart by their uniforms and their blades. From a distance, you can see the Hawkeyes coming with bright gold blades and a single vertical black stripe.

CROWDS. Like all athletes, rowers love to hear the crowd. It's usually most effective if they are near you on the course and a group does one cheer or chant together.


SYNCHRONIZATION. Rowers strive for perfect unification matching their body movements and bladework. Strokes per minute vary from boat to boat. An eight can achieve a higher stroke rate than a single. An extremely tall person can take fewer strokes per minute than someone smaller and still move faster.

COMPETITION

Rowing competitions generally fall into two categories: Head Races and 2000m Races.

HEAD.RACES. Head Races usually take place in the fall on rivers - hence, the Head of the lowa, the Head of the Charles, etc. Rowers start the course one after the other, about 15 seconds apart; navigate three miles of river - around bends and under bridges. Whoever completes the course in the shortest amount of time wins.

2000M.RACES. National, World and Olympic competitions are 2000m, or approximately one and one-fourth miles. Most courses are divided into six buoyed lanes, allowing six boats to participate at any one time. This format usually follows a double-elimination, or repechage system, which means each participant gets at least two opportunities to advance to the finals.



ROW GLOSSARY

BLATE The end of the oar that pulls the boat through the water.

CATCH.

Point in the rowing stroke at which the blade enters the water

Amount of interruption of forward progress of the shell, which commonly occurs at the catch and sometimes at the release.

The person who steers the shell, communicates strategy, motivates the rowers and is the on-the-water coach for the crew. A coxswain should weigh 110-115 pounds.

Turning an oar in the water so the release is either forced or impossible to make. An extreme crab may force the boat to come to a complete stop before it is released from the water.

ERGOMETERRowers call it an "erg." An erg is a rowing machine that closely replicates the actual rowing motion. Erg tests are utilized by coaches to ascertain an athlete's power output, aerobic and endurance capabilities. They are used to train during the off-season

NOVICE A rower in the first year of collegiate competition.

OAPModern oars are 12'6" long and made of carbon fiber.

Powerful A coxswain's call for rowers to take 10 powerful strokes. It's a strategy used to gain an advantage over a competitor.

Part of the rowing stroke in which the oar is returned to position for the drive (from release to catch) during which an oarswoman's seat is returned from the bow to the stern end of the boat.

REPASECOND chance race for those crews that do not automatically advance to the finals of an event.

RUH The distance the shell moves during one stroke.

Boat used in rowing. It seats nine people for an Eight and five people for a Four, and ranges in length from 45 feet for a four to 58 feet for an Eight.

Acomplete cycle of moving the blade "through" the water; the rower who sits the closest to the stern looks directly at the coxswain in a stern-coxed boat and sets the rhythm for the shell.

The number of strokes taken per minute. The higher the stroke rating, the more the crew exerts itself. In a sprint race, the first 200 meters are generally rowed at 40-44 strokes per minutes, the middle 1500 meters at 34-36, and the final 300 meters at 40-42.

The hard-to-define (and hard-to-achieve) feeling when nearperfect synchronization of motion and power application occurs in the shell, maximizing the boat's speed.

SKYING THE BLADE Carrying the blade too far off the water during the recovery.

Eights (8+) and fours (4+) are the most common collegiate competitions and the two events held at the NCAA Championships. The plus indicates a coxswain on board.

The Hawkeyes started off the spring at the Longhorn Invitational in Austin, Texas. Over the three days of racing the Hawks faced Wisconsin, Texas, Miami, Duke, and Kasas State and took first in five races. The first day the lowa's first varsity eight boat (6:27.45) defeated Miami (6:28.68). The second day the first novice eight boat (7.21.2) and the second varsity eight boat ((7.02.6) both defeated Duke. Then to finish off the weekend they took two more against Kansas State in the first and second varsity eight races.

4.01.06 MINNESOTA

The University of Iowa rowing team competed against Creighton, Minnesota and Wisconsin on Lake McBride in Solon, Ia. The Hawkeyes were on the water five times, but did not win any races. Iowa's novice rowers finished last in the First and Second Novice Eight races.

4.08.06 WASHINGTON.WASHINGTON STATE.OREGON STATE

The University of Iowa rowing team raced on Lake Washington near the University of Washington campus. The Hawkeyes competed against crews from Washington, Washington State and Oregon State. The Hawkeyes competed in two races. In the women's varsity eight, Iowa competed against three ranked boats and finished fourth (7:05.6). Iowa also finished fourth in the women's junior varsity eight (7:22.6).

4.15.06 MICHIGAN.MICHIGAN STATE

The lowa rowing team competed in a double dual on Lake Wingra in Madison, Wl. The Hawkeyes raced against Michigan, Michigan State and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes won the second novice eight race in 6:54.8. The first novice eight boat was defeated by Michigan. lowa finished second to Wisconsin in the novice four race. The varsity rowers took third in the second varsity eight race. They were defeated by 10th- ranked Michigan in the first varsity eight race. lowa was defeated by Michigan State in both the first and second novice eight races. The varsity Hawkeyes were also defeated by 12th-ranked Michigan State in the first and second varsity eight races.

4.29.06 BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIP

The University of Iowa rowing team competed in the Big Ten Rowing Championships in St. Paul Minnesota. Iowa finished sixth in overall competition and took second place in four petite finals. Rain and 13-15 mile per hour winds were present throughout the day as racing took place on Lake Phalen. The Hawkeyes came in second place in the petite finals of the first and second varsity eight, first varsity four and first novice eight races. Iowa's second novice eight boat beat out Ohio State in the petite final. The second varsity four came in third in the petite final. Ohio State won the Big Ten Championship with 130 points. Iowa was sixth with 45 points. The Hawkeyes improved one spot on the seventh place finish of last year

9.24.05 HEAD OF THE DES MOINES

The Hawkeyes started out the fall strong winning three and placing second in four events at the Head of Des Moines Regatta. The lowa boat took first in the Women's Varsity Eight with a time of 17:36, making this the eighth year in a row that an lowa boat has taken first. The two other first place finishers were Laura Kanaris in the junior women's single and Kat Davy-Traynor and Lydia McGee in the women's open pair. Megan Manijak was a member of the University of Iowa Rowing team from 2000-2004. She was a member of the V8+ for most of her career and was a member of the Big Ten Boat of the week three times.

After college she accepted a job with the Cerner Corporation, a company that creates software for healthcare organizations. She moved to Kansas City, MO and has been a consultant for Cerner for about two years now. She says that "being a rower in college helped me get this job. Companies know it takes a driven, organized, motivated person to juggle the demands of a Division I sport, like rowing, with everything else college requires of you."

She believes that this ability to juggle sports and school tells them more about a person than they can learn in an interview. In her job as a consultant she works with a lot of different types of people on project teams that requires teamwork to ensure that the projects get done on time and meet the client's expectations. "Rowing

taught me unconditional teamwork; everyone, no matter their differences, worked toward a common goal," she said.

Rowing also helped teach her things she uses in everyday life. Things such as sacrifice, self-discipline, self-reliance, and time management have transfered over from rowing into her career. She said, "I joined the rowing team because I thought it would be a good way to stay in shape in college; I got more out of the experience than I ever could have expected."



Michelle Trannel graduated from the University of Iowa Rowing team in May of 2005. Since then she has spent the last year training in Seattle, Washington to make the National Rowing Team. Last summer she was selected to attend a Lightweight Development camp in Seattle. At the end of the camp she competed at the U.S. National Regatta, earning two gold and two silver metals in lightweight double and quad events. After the camp she was invited to return to Seattle as a member of the Pocock Elite Sculling Team. Going back to Seattle, she trained for a year and this spring raced at two of the National Selection Regattas. Currently she is rowing a lightweight quad which will compete both at the U.S. National Regatta and, more importantly, the World Championship Trials on August 2-5. She hopes to meet the standard time so she can compete at the World Championship in late August in Eton, England and thus make the National Team.

During her time at lowa she earned a degree in Biomedical Engineering. With time restraint from her training, she has spent most of her time tutoring high school students in math and science, being an office assistant at a high school, a barista at Starbucks, and a walking companion to nursing home patients. When she is done with rowing, however, she plans on attending graduate school in biomedical engineering.

Trannel believes that her experience at lowa has helped her to get where she is now. She says, "Being a rower at lowa has helped me in the past year both in training and in working by giving me the skills to be an effective leader, instilling in me a high level definition of hard work, making me a high goal setter, and teaching me to use my resources and function well indepently in the real world."

She also said she was lucky to get to be a rower and felt like rowing at lowa was a privilege. "I was always challenged to improve and become better both on the water and in the classroom. This challenge is what kept me excited to go to practice, excited to race, and excited to get the studying done."


However, through all the studying she said she probably learned the most out on the water. "I learned the definition of the low maintenance - high return athlete. I learned to be a leader and the importance of different types of leaders. I learned the importance of teamwork and that you must not only improve yourself but you must help others to improve in order to produce speed on the water. I also take with me important lessons in patience, trust, humility, and friendship."

In all that she has experienced and learned, the advice that she left for future Hawkeye Rowers was this: "Know how lucky you are - to be a hawkeye, to compete in the Big Ten Conference, to be a Division I athlete. Be thankful for the tough competition that you have - a champion wants a challenger who just might have the strength to knock her down. The water now belongs to you - command it! Enjoy every second that you get as a hawkeye because soon it will be gone and you will remember it as one of the best times of your life - I do."

Trannel did compete at the World Championship and placed 5th, rowing with a time of 6:40:86 in the stroke seat Lw4x!



AUMINISTRATION ROWING2006



Interim President Gary Fethke is the former dean of The University of Iowa Henry B. Tippie College of Business and the Leonard A. Hadley Professor of Leadership. A professor of management sciences and economics, he received both his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from The University of Iowa.

He was appointed dean in 1994 after serving one year as interim dean. From 1988 to 1993 Dean Fethke served as the senior associate dean of academic affairs in the Tippie College of Business, and before that he served as chairman of the department of management sciences.

In the years between receiving his Ph.D. at lowa and returning to the College as a faculty member, he served on the faculty at Bradley University (1968-74). In addition, he taught at the London School of Economics for one year (1981-82) and several summers (1984, '86, '88 and '90). He has published numerous articles in the areas


of industrial organization, macroeconomics, and labor economics. His recent research interest focuses on the economics of public higher education.

Dean Fethke spearheaded the expansion of the Evening and Executive MBA Programs. The Evening MBA is currently being offered in Cedar Rapids, Newton, Des Moines, and the Quad Cities. The Executive MBA Program is now available both on campus and in other lowa cities, as needed, and internationally, in Hong Kong and Beijing, China. A dual degree (MBA-Master's in Systems Engineering) EMBA Program has been taught in Cedar Rapids. During his tenure as dean, the undergraduate program of the College raised the academic profile of entering students and began an early admissions program to admit outstanding high school students directly into the Tippie College in their first year on campus.

Fethke headed the planning and coordination of construction for the John Pappajohn Business Building and the Pomerantz Center on The University of Iowa campus, the UI-Cedar Rapids Area Conference and Education Center in Cedar Rapids, and the MBA facilities at the Des Moines W. A. Krause Center and the Newton Polytechnic Campus.

In his role as dean, Fethke was responsible for coordinating the fundraising endeavors of the College with UI Foundation staff. These efforts led to the development of the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center in 1996, the Hawkinson Institute of Business Finance in 1998, the naming of the Henry B. Tippie College of Business in 1999, and a major commitment from Jerre and Mary Joy Stead in 2003. The Tippie College of Business raised \$125 million in the recent University campaign.

His wife, Carol, is a faculty member of the economics and marketing departments at The University of Iowa. They have two grown sons.



Gary Barta became the University of lowa's 11th Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on August 1, 2006. His selection was announced on June 23, 2006.

A native Midwesterner, Barta signed a five-year contract to lead one of the most successful athletic programs in the nation. His wife Connie is a native of Waterloo. IA.

Barta has 19 years of university and athletic administration experience. Before accepting the lowa position he had been the Wyoming AD since October of 2003. From November 1996 to October 2003, he was senior associate athletic director for external relations and sports programs at the University of Washington in Seattle. From 1990 to 1996, he was associated with the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls, where he was director of athletic development and external relations. He also served as associate director of development at North Dakota State University in Fargo, from 1988-90, where he was responsible

for fund raising for athletics, the colleges of business and engineering, and the University's annual fund.

Wyoming received the NCAA Division I-A Program of Excellence Award earlier this year, which honors athletics programs that are superior athletically, academically, and in student-athlete life skill preparation.

The Barta led program at Wyoming was credited with a number of significant accomplishments. The Cowboys played in the 2004 Las Vegas Bowl and posted a victory over UCLA. The women's basketball team won 21 games during the 2005-06 season, a top 20 placing by the women's track team in the NCAA championships in 2005; and a top 25 finish in men's NCAA swimming in 2004. During his three-year tenure, seven Wyoming coaches won Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year awards.

The new lowa Athletics Director has been a successful fund raiser, having helped secure more than \$150 million in private contributions and corporate sponsorships over the past 10 years.

Prior to taking over at Wyoming, he served as Washington's Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Relations and Sports Programs. He was responsible for generating revenue to fund Washington's \$40 million annual intercollegiate athletics budget. While at Washington, Barta was directly involved in a variety of duties including: hiring of coaches and administrative staff; coordinating the schedule for men's basketball; initiating and managing sponsorship relationships and negotiating radio network contracts.

Barta earned his Bachelor of Science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State University in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championships in 1983, 1985 and 1986. He returned to NDSU to begin his career in 1988 as an associate director of development and later director of development.

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (8) and a daughter, Madison (6). He was born Sept. 4, 1963 in Minneapolis, MN.



HAWKEYE ATHLETICS NVINC2006

The University of Iowa Athletic Department, under the direction of first-year Athletic Director Gary Barta, is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation.

The men's and women's departments, operating separately for over 25 years, merged in 2001 under Bowlsby's direction. It combined nationally recognized programs for both genders into one successful and progressive athletic unit.

Combining their successes on the playing fields with continued success and recognition in the classroom, UI student-athletes practice and perform in some of the best facilities in the nation, while knowing the support of their efforts and attendance by Hawkeye fans ranks among the best in the country.

While the Hawkeyes continue to compete with the best in the nation in a variety of sports, lowa continues to boast some of the most impressive athletic facilities in the nation, operated by one of the most respected departments.

Several new projects are underway on the lowa campus. Some of the latest additions to the UI campus are the Roy G. Karro Athletics Hall of Fame and Visitors Center and the Russell and Ann Gerdin Athletic Learning Center.

Kinnick Stadium recieved a major up-grading and renovation that will be completed just prior to the 2006 season. The \$90 million project includes the replacing of the south end zone stands and building a four-level press box that will house 47 guest suites, along with new scoreboards, video walls, cocession stands and restrooms.

Additional priorities for the lowa program include the establishment and development of endowments for all sports programs, the continued enhancement of graduation rates, and the implementation of a long-range plan to ensure lowa's financial, academic and competitive future. As an example, all of lowa's 13 scholarships for men's basketball are fully endowed.

The graduation rate of lowa's studentathletes has improved in each of the past 10 years and has consistently ranked above the graduation rate of all UI students. Hawkeye athletes have garnered more than 70 academic All-America honors since 1992. The 2005-06 school-year saw the University of Iowa produce 138 academic all-Big Ten athletes.

lowa athletes have been recognized as all-Americans in their sport on 207 occasions during the past 15 years.

lowa's athletic teams during the 2005-06 athletic year continued its trend of success, on the playing fields and in academic pursuits.

The Hawkeye football team enjoyed another good year on the gridiron, going 7-5 and making it's fourth-consecutive January bowl game when it was selected to play the Florida Gators in the Outback Bowl.

lowa followed its 11-2 mark of 2002 with a 10-3 record in 2003 and a 10-2 mark in 2004, finishing each of those seasons ranked eighth nationally.

lowa's men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to post-season play in each of the last six seasons. The men's squad finished with a 25-9 record and won the Big Ten

Tournament. They earned a No. 3 seed in the 2006 NCAA tournament.

The women's team advanced to the NCAA tournament for the 16th time.

The lowa wrestling squad will be under new leadership this season as former Hawkeye three-time NCAA Champion and Olympic Gold Medalist Tom Brands returns to his alma mater as head coach. He will be joined on his staff by the legendary Dan Gable, who led lowa to 15 NCAA titles and 21 Big Ten Championships in his 21 seasons as head coach.

lowa's men's and women's and gymnastics teams continue to rank among the best in the nation. The men's team again advanced to the NCAA Championships and the women's gymnastics squad has been in the NCAA meet two of the last four years.

The Hawkeye men's cross country team advanced to the NCAA Championships for the second-consecutive year in the fall of 2004, while sophomore Kineke Alexander won the NCAA Championship in the women's indoor 400-meters.

lowa's women's softball team advanced to NCAA regional action for the 11th time in 13 seasons. Iowa has advanced to the softball World Series on four occasions over the past 12 seasons and Coach Gayle Blevins is one of three coaches to reach 1,000 career victories.

From the rankings on the courts and playing fields, to the rankings in the classroom, to the rankings in fan and community support, to the ranking as a program that boasts some of the best athletic facilities in the nation, it's easy to understand why lowa fans everywhere truly believe, "It's great to be a Hawkeye."



ACADEMIC STUDENT SERVICES 2006

Since its inception in 1979, Athletics Student Services has evolved from a two-person, academic support service to a broad-based, nationally prominent student support services operation. Its purpose is to assist student athletes to become tomorrow's leaders by offering academic and personal support services to assist them in making timely and satisfactory progress toward their degrees.

Athletic Student Services focuses on four important areas — academic counseling and monitoring, educational and support programs, retention programs and compliance services — when working with student-athletes. Following are descriptions of some of the programs, services and opportunities available to student-athletes in those areas.

Athletics Learning Center

The \$4.6 million Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletics Learning Center opened in August of 2003 and gives all lowa student-athletes a state of the art facility to help them with their educations.

The Athletics Learning Center is a multilevel, 20,000 square foot facility which will provide a computer center, study areas, classes and meeting places for all Hawkeye studentathletes.

The Learning Center will feature an auditorium that converts into two classrooms, separate study rooms for under and upper-class student-athletes that feature 28 study carrels, a computer lab, five tutorial rooms, the book loan repository, office space for lowa's Student Services staff and a display area to recognize the academic accomplishments of lowa's student-athletes.

Academic Counseling and Monitoring

Athletics coordinators work closely with student-athletes and their university-assigned advisors from the time they arrive on campus until the time they leave the University. Along with focusing on academic planning matters such as goal-setting, plans of study, choosing majors and degree requirements, athletics coordinators also help student-athletes understand NCAA, Big Ten and University academic policies. They also solicit feedback from instructors on academic progress made by student-athletes.

Tutoring

Tutoring is available free of charge to all student-athletes. Tutors, who are post-graduates and teachers, help with course content as well as study strategies and are available in virtually all general education program subjects.

Retention

A full-time staff member directs the retention program, which identifies student-athletes who may need tailored academic assistance and structure, and implements individualized learning plans to help them succeed. Such plans may include daily and weekly planning sessions with athletics coordinators and retention staff, tutoring, study groups, mainstreaming into on-campus services like the writing center, math labs and services for students with learning disabilities.

Transition Seminar

All new student-athletes attend an eight-week transition seminar during the fall semester that is geared toward helping them make the transition from high school to college successfully. Seminar



topics include time management skills, learning and study strategies, the culture and rules of the university, and life skills concerning alcohol and other substances, relationships and intimacy, diversity, tolerance, values and character.

CHAMPS/Life Skills

Life skills programs are conducted throughout the year with and for student athletes on quality of life issues critical to personal growth, such as personal accountability, responsible use and nonuse of alcohol, diversity and gambling.

Career Guidance and Development

Planning a meaningful career and a fulfilling life is an ongoing process of expanding and narrowing choices, beginning when student-athletes arrive on campus and continuing throughout their college career and lifetime. The professional staff works with other career development professionals on campus to offer individual consultation, career development seminars, workshops, referrals to other campus offices and special events like the Senior Recognition Banquet for graduating student-athletes.

Minority Enrichment Program

This program offers a culturally supportive environment in which minority student-athletes have the opportunity to develop friendships and a support network in the university. A core focus group of students and staff coordinate programs such as guest speakers, holiday celebrations, community service activities with the local neighborhood centers, events with Cultural Centers and networking with minority faculty, staff, professional and business leaders.

Compare the Numbers

lowa's student-athletes have outperformed the University's entire student population each year since the NCAA started requiring a report of student-athlete graduation rates.



STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The University of Iowa has two 2,000-square-foot facilities for strength and conditioning training of Olympic sport athletes. One facility is located in Carver-Hawkeye Arena and the other is located in the Recreation Building. Each facility has eight squat racks, eight Olympic platforms, multiple physio- and medicine balls, padded plyometric boxes and over 10,000 pounds of free weights. Iowa Strength and Conditioning staff Bill Maxwell, David Marmon and Damon Davis oversee the programs.

The major goals of the University of Iowa strength and conditioning program are the enhancement of athletic performance while reducing the risk of injury through a progression of free weight, multi-joint exercises. Those goals are achieved through Olympic lifts, squats, plyometrics, medicine ball and physioball exercises. These multi-joint movements improve synchronization of movement, intramuscular coordination and stabilizer muscle groups.

Located next to Kinnick Stadium, the hospital creates a cutting-edge environment where staff physicians, interns, and residents can care for studentathletes with successful outcomes. 

Ninety percent of freshmen choose to live in one of the University's 10 residence halls. Each team has its own rules regarding residence of incoming freshmen. Most student-athletes live at least two years on campus.

The University residence halls provide students full-service dining rooms, study lounges, laundry facilities, recreational facilities, as well as vending and bank machines. Residence hall rooms currently have high-speed ethernet connections that give students e-mail and Internet access in your room. Iowa also offers wireless networking in 32 buildings and several outdoor areas, providing more than 170 access points across campus.

The University of Iowa's library system is the largest in the state and has over 4 million volumes. Students also have access to the collections of other libraries throughout the Big Ten Conference via computer network. Besides the Main Library, The University has 12 departmental libraries: Art Library, Biological Sciences Library, Business Library, Chemistry-Botany Library, Engineering Library, Geology Library, Hardin Library for the Health Sciences, Mathematical Sciences Library, Rita Benton Music Library, Physics Library, Psychology Library and Law Library.

There are 26 Instructional Technology Centers all over the campus which are filled with 1,200 computers. These facilities are open at least 50 hours a week. Some are open 24 hours. Also, the Information Arcade in the Main Library provides a variety of specialized computing tools.

The Computer Demo Center provides information for students who want to purchase computers and software.

There are three houses on campus that offer students from different ethnic backgrounds a place to congregate, the Latino and Native American Cultural Center, the Afro American Cultural Center and the Asian Pacific American Cultural Center.

Finding and pursuing a career takes careful planning. The Career Center is extremely valuable for student-athletes. The program suggests a time line each student-athlete may follow throughout his or her stay at lowa. The components of the program include:

- *Individualized career counseling
- *Career information programs
- *Summer job/internship opportunities
- *Resume and cover letter writing
- *Portfolio development
- *Prenaring for life after college athletics



The University provides Skills Labs to help students improve a variety of skills necessary to succeed at lowa: writing, reading, speaking, science, note taking, time management, test taking and foreign languages.

The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available. Students at Iowa can go to Student Health Services, which is open six days a week. Student Health Services is supported by a fee paid by all full-time students. It offers students unlimited free office visits (there is a charge for other procedures done in the office such as blood tests).

There are six bus routes throughout the lowa campus. The University Cambus provides over four million free rides to class and to the dorms for students each year. Some routes run seven days a week, and some run until 2:30 a.m. Cambus also operates a specialized transportation service for persons with disabilities.



OLD CAPITOL

One of the most recognizable sites in lowa City is the gold dome of the Old Capitol which is situated in the heart of downtown. Built in 1840, it is lowa City's most historic building. The Old Capitol was the site of the first governor inauguration as well as the first six lowa General Assemblies. It is also where the state's Constitution was drafted. When the capital was moved to Des Moines in 1857, the Old Capitol was dedicated to The University of lowa, becoming the first building owned by the University.

CORALVILLE LAKE

Just north of Iowa City is Coralville Lake, an outdoor recreational area that offers a variety of opportunities for the public. Coralville Lake offers picnic shelters, biking, hiking, fishing, boating, swimming, hunting, camping, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, golf and disc golf.


PEDESTRIAN MALL

CORAL RIDGE MALL



HAWKEYE TRADITIONS W/ 1/2006

HANICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago.

The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, The Last of the Mohicans, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of lowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawkeye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.



The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at lowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized lowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the lowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at lowa athletics events.





For 40 years lowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide what are now the school official colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of lowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.

SCHOOL FIGHT

The lowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, lowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man," Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of Iowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletics events the year around.

The word is Fight, Fight, Fight for IOWA
Let every loyal lowan sing;
The word is Fight, Fight, Fight for IOWA
Until the walls and rafters ring
(Go Hawks!)

Come on and cheer, cheer, cheer for IOWA
Come on and cheer until you hear the final gun.
The word is Fight, Fight, Fight for IOWA
Until the game is won
