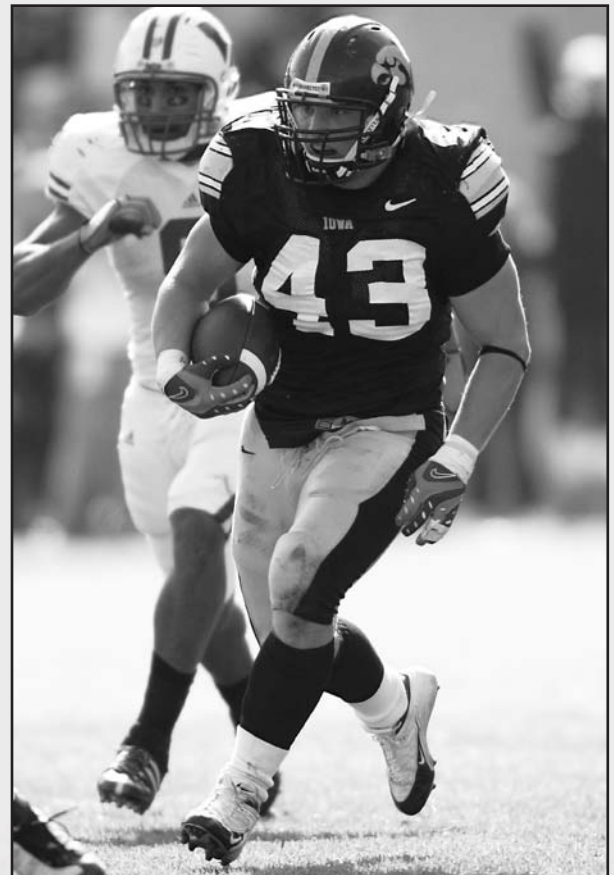

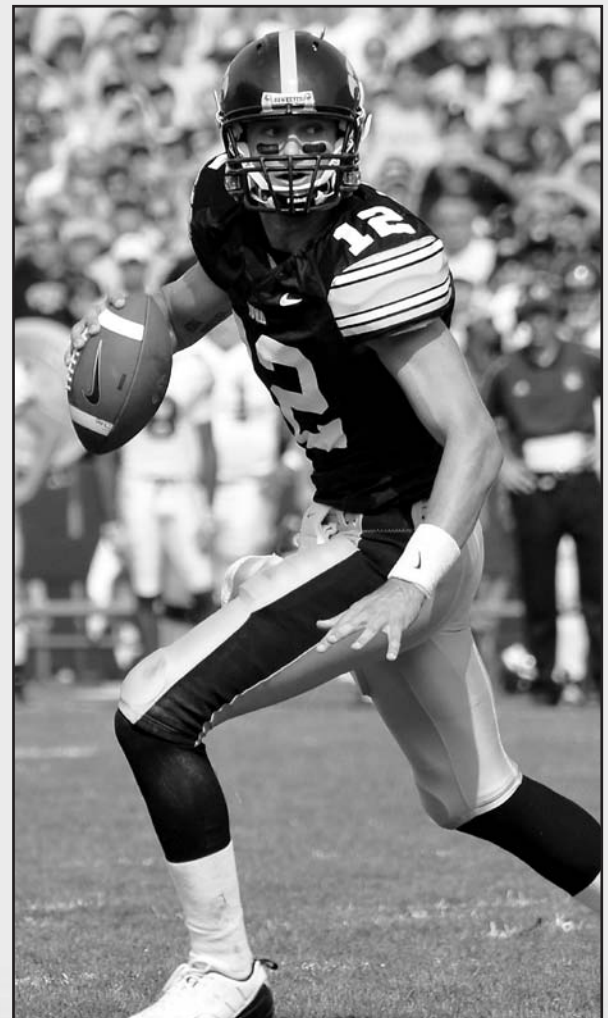

GAME RECAP

Iowa scored touchdowns on its first two possessions and never looked back en route to a 46-3 victory over Maine in Kinnick Stadium. The win was Iowa's eighth-straight season opening triumph under Head Coach Kirk Ferentz.

The Hawkeyes led 14-0 after the first quarter on a one-yard scoring run by RB Shonn Greene and a four-yard touchdown reception by TE Brandon Myers. Iowa added two points on a safety after LB A.J. Edds sacked Maine QB Adam Farkes in the end zone. Field goals by Trent Mossbrucker (35 yards) and Daniel Murray (44 yards) stretched Iowa's advantage to 22-0. Maine converted a 40-yard field goal as time expired in the first half to make the score 22-3.

It was all Iowa in the second half, outscoring Maine 24-0. Mossbrucker's second field goal of the game (33 yards) was the only scoring of the third period. Iowa scored 10 points within 15 seconds in the fourth quarter. RB Paki O'Meara scored his first career touchdown on a one-yard scoring run, giving Iowa a 32-3 cushion. Following the kickoff, Maine's first play was intercepted by LB Pat Angerer. One play later, true freshman RB Jewel Hampton ran 19 yards for the end zone, scoring six points in his first collegiate carry. Hampton later scored from 22 yards on a fourth down play to make the final score 46-3.

QBs Jake Christensen and Ricky Stanzi and PKs Mossbrucker and Murray shared time in the victory. Christensen was 9-15 for 122 yards and a touchdown, while Stanzi completed 9-14 passes for 90 yards and also rushed for 22 yards on two attempts. Mossbrucker was 2-2 on FGs and 2-2 on PATs, while Murray handled all kickoffs and was 3-3 on PATs and 1-1 on FGs.

Greene led Iowa's rushers, topping 100 yards for the second time in his career, totaling 109 yards and a touchdown on 22 carries. Hampton had 72 yards and two scores on nine attempts.

Christensen and Stanzi found 10 different receivers, with Myers leading the pack with four catches for 43 yards and a touchdown. WR Andy Brodell amassed a game-high 123 all-purpose yards (62 punt returns, 21 kickoff returns, 24 run and 16 receiving). The 24-yard run was Iowa's longest rush from scrimmage.

Defensively, DE Adrian Clayborn, Angerer and Edds led the Hawkeyes. Clayborn had eight tackles. Edds had seven stops, including two for loss, while Angerer had five and his first career theft.

Iowa's two quarterbacks combined for four touchdown passes en route to a 42-0 shutout over Florida International at Kinnick Stadium.

QB Ricky Stanzi started his first career game, completing 8-10 passes for 162 yards and three touchdowns (8, 23, 59 yards) in only a half of football. He also rushed five times for 30 yards. QB Jake Christensen also had an efficient game, completing 8-12 passes for 99 yards and a touchdown.

Iowa's offense racked-up 512 yards total offense (271 passing and 241 rushing), marking the first time a Hawkeye team eclipsed 500 yards since recording 546 yards (364 passing and 182 running) at Minnesota (Nov. 18, 2006).

The Hawkeyes sprinted out to a 21-0 advantage after one period. Running backs Shonn Greene (11 yards) and Paki O'Meara (17 yards) each found the end zone, while Stanzi connected with WR Derrell Johnson-Koulianos for a career-long 59-yard scoring strike.

Iowa scored touchdowns on its first two second-quarter possessions. Stanzi connected with TE Brandon Myers for 23 yards and WR Colin Sandeman for eight yards to give the Black and Gold a 35-0 halftime lead. After a scoreless third quarter, Sandeman caught his second career score from Christensen on a 23-yard pass to give the Hawkeyes the 42-0 victory.

Greene finished the contest rushing 13 times for 130 yards and a score. In fact, the junior had over 100 yards after the first period, marking the second-straight contest the Hawkeyes had a 100-yard rusher. Johnson-Koulianos finished the game with 131 all-purpose yards (90 receiving, 35 kickoff returns and six rushing). Sandeman finished with 31 yards on two catches - both for touchdowns.

Iowa's defense collected six sacks and three turnovers (two interceptions and one fumble). Leading the charge was LB Jeremiha Hunter and DL Karl Klug, who both posted career numbers. Hunter had a game-high 10 tackles, while Klug had nine stops, two sacks and a forced fumble. Klug was named Big Ten Conference defensive Player of the Week.

Two fourth-quarter touchdowns lifted the Hawkeyes to a 17-5 victory over in-state rival Iowa State Saturday at Kinnick Stadium. Iowa regained possession of the Cy-Hawk Trophy and starts the season 3-0 for the second time in three years.

PK Trent Mossbrucker scored the first half's only points on a 26-yard field goal on Iowa's first offensive possession.

A majority of the third period was contested in Iowa's territory. Iowa State ran 23 plays, to Iowa's seven. The Cyclones opened the second half with a 12-play, 60-yard drive that consumed 7:22, which resulted in no points. Hawkeye SS Tyler Sash intercepted Iowa State QB Austen Arnaud on the goal line to thwart the scoring threat. Two possessions later, the Cyclones tied the game on a 43-yard field goal.

QB Ricky Stanzi started his second-straight game for the Hawkeyes, completing 5-14 passes for 95 yards. QB Jake Christensen was inserted into the lineup late in the third quarter and provided a spark. The junior led the Hawkeyes to the game's only offensive touchdown, driving 65 yards, in six plays, in 2:29. The drive culminated with a RB Shonn Greene five-yard scoring run, his third of the season, to give Iowa a 10-3 margin. Christensen finished the contest, completing 4-5 passes for 27 yards.

Iowa's Andy Brodell pushed the Hawkeye lead to 17-3, returning a punt a career-long 81 yards for a touchdown, which is the 10th-longest punt return in school history. Brodell's performance earned him Big Ten Conference special teams Player of the Week laurels.

The Hawkeye defense held again, stopping an Iowa State drive inside the five-yard line late in the contest. Iowa State turned the ball over on downs. It marked the third time in the game it failed to score inside the red zone, twice inside the five yard-line. Iowa took an intentional safety with seconds remaining to make the final score 17-5.

Greene rushed 20 times for 120 yards and a touchdown. It marked the third time this season, and fourth time in his career, he topped 100 yards rushing. TE Allen Reisner caught a career-high three passes for 65 yards.

Defensively, Iowa intercepted three passes, had eight pass break-ups and two tackles for loss. Sash collected a game and career-high 12 tackles, including a sack and an interception. LB A.J. Edds was credited with 10 tackles, the second time in his career he totaled double-digit stops. Other Hawkeyes collecting thefts were FS Brett Greenwood and CB Amari Spivey.

Pittsburgh scored an early fourth-quarter touchdown to reclaim the lead and held on to defeat Iowa 21-20, at Heinz Field in Iowa's first road game of the season.

The Panthers scored a touchdown with 6:06 remaining in the opening period, the first allowed by Iowa this season and the first points allowed by Iowa in the first period this season. Pittsburgh scored touchdowns on two of its first three possessions to grab an early 14-3 advantage. Iowa RB Shonn Greene tallied his fourth rushing touchdown of the season, from six yards, to close the deficit to 14-10 at halftime.

QB Jake Christensen gave Iowa a 17-14 lead with 5:33 left in the third period after finding the end zone from two yards for his second career rushing score. Following an exchange of punts, Pittsburgh answered with its third touchdown drive of the afternoon, capped by a RB LeSean McCoy 27-yard scoring run to put the Panthers up 21-17.

Iowa PK Trent Mossbrucker, who converted a 26-yard field goal to end Iowa's second drive of the game, split the uprights from a career-long distance of 39 yards to close within one point (21-20) with 10:58 remaining in the game. However, Iowa's last three offensive possessions stalled and Pittsburgh held on for the victory.

Greene sparked the Hawkeyes offensively, posting career highs in attempts (23) and rushing yards (147). Greene topped the 100-yard plateau and scored a touchdown for the fourth-straight game to start the season. WR Derrell Johnson-Koulianos caught a season-high six passes for 75 yards, while TE Brandon Myers had four receptions for 35 yards. Christensen started the game, completing 12-24 passes for 124 yards. Ricky Stanzi also saw time under center, completing 7-10 passes for 79 yards.

Pittsburgh QB Bill Stull completed 11-25 passes for 129 yards. McCoy was held to 78 yards rushing, 27 of which came on his game-winning touchdown scamper.

Defensively, Iowa was led by LB Pat Angerer, LB Jeremiha Hunter and DB Amari Spivey. Angerer had a team-high seven tackles, while Hunter had six stops, including one for loss. Spivey was credited with five tackles, forced his first career fumble and intercepted a pass for the second time in as many weeks. Iowa's defense collected two takeaways and forced Pittsburgh to punt eight times.

Northwestern scored 19 unanswered points and took advantage of five Iowa turnovers to beat the Hawkeyes, 22-17, on Iowa's homecoming at Kinnick Stadium. Northwestern started three of its drives inside the Iowa 40-yard line.

The Hawkeyes jumped out to a 17-3 advantage in the first half. PK Trent Mossbrucker converted a 30-yard field goal for the first quarter's only points. RB Shonn Greene scored on an 18-yard run to give Iowa an early 10-point cushion. Northwestern PK Amando Villarreal split the uprights for a 37-yard field goal to make the score 10-3. WR Andy Brodell caught a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Ricky Stanzi to give Iowa a 17-3 lead. However, Northwestern capitalized on an Iowa fumble late in the half. WR Rasheed Ward caught a one-yard scoring pass from QB C.J. Bacher with only 17 seconds remaining in the second period.

Northwestern closed within 17-16 after WR Eric Peterman caught a 15-yard touchdown pass, but Villarreal missed the extra point, wide-left. The Wildcats took the lead at the 7:54 mark of the fourth quarter on Peterman's second touchdown reception, a three-yard scoring strike from Bacher. That scoring drive was a result of Iowa's fifth turnover of the game.

Iowa had an opportunity to reclaim the lead in the final 90 seconds. The Hawkeyes had the ball first-and-goal on the Northwestern eight-yard line, but were unable to find the end zone with four incomplete passes.

Greene eclipsed the 100-yard plateau and scored at least one touchdown for the fifth-straight game, scampering a career-high 159 yards on 21 attempts and scoring a touchdown. Greene left the game early in the fourth quarter due to injury and did not return.

In his third career start, Stanzi completed 21-30 passes for a career-high 238 yards and a touchdown. Brodell caught eight passes for a season-high 126 yards and a score, surpassing 1,000 career receiving yards.

Defensively, LB Jeremiha Hunter, LB Pat Angerer and DT Matt Kroul paced the Hawkeyes. Hunter posted a game and career-high 12 tackles and returned an interception 21 yards. Angerer collected a career 11 stops, while Kroul had nine tackles. The nine tackles put Kroul over 200 for his career. DE Christian Ballard blocked a 37-yard field goal attempt, Iowa's first block of the season.

Iowa mounted a second-half comeback but came up short in a 16-13 loss to Michigan State in Spartan Stadium. With Iowa trailing by three with just over two minutes remaining, Michigan State's defense stopped the Hawkeyes on a fourth-and-one in Spartan territory to secure the victory.

Michigan State scored the game's first 13 points. TE Charlie Gantt caught a four-yard touchdown pass from QB Brian Hoyer in the first period for a 7-0 advantage. The Spartans increased their lead to 13-0 on a pair of PK Brett Swenson field goals (29 and 32 yards) in the second quarter. With three seconds remaining in the half, Iowa PK Trent Mossbrucker converted a 25-yard field goal to cut Iowa's deficit to 13-3.

Swenson, who was named Big Ten co-Special Teams Player of the Week, made his third field goal (25 yards) to regain a 13-point cushion. However, the Black and Gold continued to fight back, scoring a Mossbrucker 33-yard field goal and converting a Michigan State fourth-quarter interception into a touchdown to make the score 16-13. Iowa QB Ricky Stanzi connected with WR Andy Brodell for a 31-yard touchdown in the back of the end zone with 8:47 left in the fourth period.

The game featured two of the nation's top running backs. Iowa's Shonn Greene finished the contest with a game-high 157 yards on a season-high 30 carries, while Iowa's defense held Michigan State's Javon Ringer to only 91 yards on 25 attempts, with 29 of the 91 yards coming on one play. Greene is one of only two running backs in the country to rush for 100 yards in all six games to start the season (Connecticut's Donald Brown).

Stanzi completed 15-22 passes for 158 yards and a touchdown in his second-straight start. Hoyer completed 13-24 passes for 184 yards and a score for the Spartans.

Brodell paced the Hawkeye receivers for the second-consecutive week, catching five passes for a game-high 79 yards. WR B.J. Cunningham had a team-high four receptions and 76 yards for Michigan State.

Iowa's Jewel Hampton returned four kickoffs for 116 yards, which is the most kickoff return yardage in a single-game by a Hawkeye since C.J. Jones had 169 yards on four returns vs. USC in the 2003 Orange Bowl.

Defensively, LB Pat Angerer collected a career-high 11 tackles for the second straight game. DT Matt Kroul had eight stops and LB Jeremiha Hunter and DT Mitch King each had seven tackles.

Iowa scored the final 28 points, scoring touchdowns on four of its five second-half possessions, to propel the Hawkeyes to a convincing 45-9 victory over Indiana in Memorial Stadium.

The Hawkeyes had two running backs eclipse 100 yards rushing for the first time since their 2007 season-opener vs. Northern Illinois in Chicago (Albert Young and Damian Sims). Shonn Greene and Jewel Hampton combined for 229 yards and four touchdowns. Greene had 23 attempts for a game-high 115 yards and a 12-yard scoring run. Hampton, who is an Indianapolis native, had 22 carries for 114 yards and touchdown runs of one, one and 10 yards. Greene is the only Division I running back to top 100 yards in his first seven games of the 2008 season.

Iowa took a 17-9 lead into the break. Iowa PK Trent Mossbrucker converted a 26-yard field goal and Greene (12 yards) and Hampton (one yard) each ran for a score in the first half. Indiana PK Austin Starr made a 46-yard field goal and QB Kellen Lewis found WR Ray Fisher in the end zone from 17 yards out to close the first-half scoring.

It was all Hawkeyes the final 30 minutes. Iowa QB Ricky Stanzi connected with WR Andy Brodell for a 34-yard scoring strike to push Iowa's lead to 24-9. It marked the third-straight game Brodell caught a touchdown pass from Stanzi, all over 30 yards. On Iowa's next possession, Stanzi threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to TE Brandon Myers to make the score 31-9 after three periods. Hampton posted scoring runs of one and 10 yards in the fourth quarter.

Stanzi completed 12-20 passes for 184 yards and two touchdowns. Lewis completed 13-18 passes for 108 yards and a score in the first half. Lewis did not play the second half due to injury.

Brodell caught four passes for a game-high 95 yards and a score, while Myers had four receptions for a career-high 64 yards.

Defensively, DB Amari Spivey collected a career-high eight tackles, all solo stops. DT Mitch King had six stops, including three for a minus 19 yards and a QB sack. His six tackles increase his career totals to 204, becoming the 60th Hawkeye to register 200 tackles. Iowa's defense held the Hoosiers without a first down on six of their first eight possessions.

GAME RECAP

Iowa RB Shonn Greene rushed for 217 yards and tied three single-game records with his four rushing touchdowns as Iowa posted a 38-16 triumph over Wisconsin in Kinnick Stadium. With the victory, Iowa reclaimed possession of the Heartland Trophy.

Greene equaled a school-record with four rushing touchdowns (12, 34, 52 and 34 yards). His four scores also matched the Kinnick Stadium record, by an Iowa player, and his 24 points tied the school record held by eight others. His 217 rushing yards tie Nick Bell for the sixth-most in a single-game in Iowa history. Greene's performance garnered him Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week accolades.

Greene gave Iowa an early 14-0 advantage on scoring runs of 12 and 34 yards in the first and second period, respectively. The 34-yard run was selected as ESPN's top Play of the Day. Wisconsin closed within 14-9 with 6:15 remaining in the third quarter after Badger PK Philip Welch converted three-consecutive field goals (42, 40 and 35 yards).

The Hawkeyes responded by scoring on four of their next five possessions. Greene scampered 52 yards for his third score of the game to increase Iowa's lead to 21-9. QB Ricky Stanzi, who completed 11-18 passes for 114 yards and a touchdown, then connected with TE Allen Reisner for a 16-yard score. In the fourth quarter, Iowa added 10 more points on a 34-yard touchdown run by Greene and a PK Trent Mossbrucker 35-yard field goal.

Wisconsin RB Zach Brown tallied a 21-yard touchdown run late in the game for the only Badger touchdown. Badger QB Dustin Sherer completed 17-34 passes for 161 yards and two interceptions. RB John Clay rushed 16 times for a team-high 89 yards to lead the Badgers.

Greene became the first Iowa running back to ever eclipse the century mark in eight-straight contests. Also, he became the 12th Iowa player, and second-fastest, to reach 1,000 rushing yards in a single-season.

Iowa's defense collected three interceptions and two sacks and forced seven punts, blocking one. LB Pat Angerer posted career bests in tackles (16) and interceptions (2). Twelve of his game-high 16 stops came in the first half. His efforts earned him Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week laurels. DT Matt Kroul was credited with seven tackles and a QB-Hurry. DB Lance Tillison collected his first career interception, while RB Paki O'Meara recorded Iowa's first blocked punt in over three years.

GAME RECAP

Illinois PK Matt Eller made a 46-yard field goal with 24 seconds remaining to propel the Illini to a 27-24 victory over Iowa at Memorial Stadium. The win was Illinois' first in six tries over the Hawkeyes.

Iowa trailed 24-9 in the fourth quarter, but mounted a furious comeback to tie the game with 2:46 left. WR Andy Brodell caught a 29-yard touchdown from QB Ricky Stanzi at the 11:42 mark to make the score 24-16. Later in the period, the Hawkeye defense collected its third takeaway of the game. Iowa drove 36 yards in five plays and 1:24 to score its second touchdown of the period on a RB Shonn Greene five-yard run. Down 24-22, Iowa attempted its first two-point conversion of the year and was successful, as TE Allen Reisner caught the three-yard pass from Stanzi.

However, Iowa's defense was unable to stop Illinois in the closing minutes. The Illini converted two third downs to keep the chains moving and drive into field goal territory for the game-winning field goal.

Freshman PK Trent Mossbrucker scored Iowa's first nine points, converting field goals of 19, 26 and 27 yards. He did miss a 30-yarder, from an angle, in the second period; only his second miss of the season.

Greene rushed 21 times for 103 yards and a touchdown. He is the only FBS running back in the country to top 100 rushing yards in nine games in 2008. Stanzi completed 11-29 passes for 191 yards and a touchdown, with two interceptions. Brodell caught a team-high three passes for 81 yards and a touchdown. Brodell, who leads the country in punt return attempts, returned four punts for 48 yards.

Illinois QB Juice Williams completed 22-37 passes for 272 yards and a touchdown, with two interceptions. WR Arrelious Benn caught a game-high seven passes for 96 yards.

Iowa held the nation's 11th-best team in total offense to 332 yards, including only 60 rushing yards, and forced three turnovers that resulted in 11 points. DT Mitch King amassed a game and season-high 10 tackles, including two for loss, and caused his third career fumble. LB Pat Angerer was credited with nine tackles.

Iowa punter Ryan Donahue punted five times for a 44.6 average. Two of his punts were downed inside the 20-yard line and he had a long punt of 51, marking the sixth time in seven games he has had at least one punt travel over 50 yards.

GAME RECAP

Iowa scored 10 fourth-quarter points, capped off by a PK Daniel Murray 31-yard field goal with one second remaining, to lift the Hawkeyes to a 24-23 victory over third-ranked Penn State at Kinnick Stadium. The win was Iowa's first over a top-five ranked team since a 54-28 win over No. 5 Illinois in 1990.

Iowa jumped out to a quick 7-0 lead on a RB Shonn Greene 14-yard touchdown run at the 13:54 mark of the first period. The initial score was set up by a sack and caused fumble by DE Adrian Clayborn. Although Penn State recovered the fumble, the Hawkeyes were able to establish very good field position for their first possession.

Following Iowa's score, Penn State controlled the majority of the first half. The Nittany Lions totaled 203 yards on 47 offensive plays, while the Hawkeyes had 70 yards on only 15 plays, in the first stanza. Penn State closed the half with three-straight scoring drives, all topping 11 plays, 70 yards and 5:00 possession time.

PSU PK Kevin Kelly kicked field goals of 24, 25 and 31 yards and RB Evan Royster ran for a two-yard touchdown to give the Nittany Lions a 16-7 cushion early in the third quarter.

WR Derrell Johnson-Koulianos caught a 27-yard touchdown pass from QB Ricky Stanzi, on a third-and-13, to cut the deficit to two points at the 4:43 mark of the third period. Penn State answered with a WR Derrick Williams nine-yard scoring run to reclaim a nine-point advantage.

Greene scored his second touchdown of the game from six yards out with 9:20 remaining to make the score 23-21.

Stanzi engineered a 15-play, 57-yard drive, that included three third-down conversions (one via penalty), to put the Hawkeyes in position for the game-winning kick.

Stanzi completed 15-25 passes for 171 yards and a score. Greene rushed a game-high 28 times for 117 yards and two touchdowns. Johnson-Koulianos caught a game-high seven passes for 89 yards and a score.

Defensively, four Hawkeyes posted double-digit tackles, LB Pat Angerer (12), LB Jeremiha Hunter (12), DB Brett Greenwood (12) and LB A.J. Edds (11). In addition to an interception in the fourth quarter, Sash added eight tackles and was recognized as the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week.

Iowa running back Shonn Greene rushed for 211 yards and two touchdowns to propel the Hawkeyes to a 22-17 victory over Purdue at Kinnick Stadium on "Senior Day".

Greene, who was named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week and The Sporting News' Player of the Day, became only the third Hawkeye tailback to eclipse 200 yards rushing in a game twice in one season (Tavian Banks and Sedrick Shaw). The 211 yards is the ninth-most by an Iowa player in a single-game. Furthermore, the junior tallied scoring runs of 14 and 75 yards, with the 75-yarder being a career long and the 19th-longest rush in school annals.

The Hawkeyes scored first on a RB Jewel Hampton 22-yard scoring run. The rush equaled Hampton's career long. PK Trent Mossbrucker missed the first of two PAT attempts after the scoring run.

Purdue PK Carson Wiggs capped a 17-play, 45-yard drive that consumed 8:46 with a 27-yard field goal. Greene then scampered 75 yards to give Iowa a 12-3 cushion in the second period. The Boilermakers cut the deficit to 12-10 with 34 seconds left in the half on a WR Desmond Tardy 12-yard touchdown reception.

Iowa led 15-10 after a PK Daniel Murray season-long 45-yard field goal, which was the only third-period scoring. Greene posted his second scoring run of the game from 14 yards out to give the Hawkeyes a 22-10 advantage with 12:48 left in the game. Painter connected with WR Greg Orton for an eight-yard touchdown completion to close within five points (22-17). Painter later drove the Boilermakers into Iowa territory, but his final pass attempt from the Iowa 27-yardline fell incomplete, out of the end zone, on the last play of the game.

Iowa QB Ricky Stanzi completed 8-15 passes for 72 yards. Painter completed 24-30 passes for 190 yards and two touchdowns, while Tardy had a game-high 13 receptions for 131 yards and a score.

Defensively, Hawkeye FS Brett Greenwood collected a game and career-high 14 tackles. DT Mitch King had five tackles, including three for loss and a sack, and also forced a fumble. LB Pat Angerer accumulated nine tackles and intercepted his team-leading fifth pass of the year on Iowa's five-yard line to silence a Purdue scoring threat. DT Matt Kroul, who tied a school record with his 48th-consecutive start, had two tackles. Additionally, the Hawkeye defense held the Boilermakers to just 86 net yards rushing.

GAME RECAP

Iowa kept Floyd of Rosedale with a convincing 55-0 win at Minnesota. The win was Iowa's largest margin of victory ever over the Gophers. Iowa finished Big Ten play in a tie for fourth place with a 5-3 record, marking the seventh Big Ten first-division finish under Coach Ferentz.

The Hawkeyes dominated play on both sides of the ball. Iowa, who maintained possession for 37:37, totaled 483 yards of offense, compared to 134 for Minnesota. The Gophers rushed for only seven yards on 21 attempts. Iowa's defense forced three turnovers, while its offense turned those miscues into 21 points.

Sparking the Hawkeyes, offensively, were RB Shonn Greene, QB Ricky Stanzi and WR Derrell Johnson-Koulianos. Greene amassed a game-high 144 yards and two TDs on 22 carries. His rushing totals against the Gophers pushed him past Tavian Banks to become Iowa's single-season rushing leader (1,729 yards). Additionally, he topped 100 rushing yards for the 12th-straight contest, the only FBS tailback to accomplish the feat this season.

Johnson-Koulianos caught seven passes for a career-high 181 yards and a score. The sophomore recorded long catches of 29, 30, 48 and 50 yards at Minnesota. The 181 receiving yards are the eighth-most by an Iowa receiver in a single-game and the most since Tim Dwight had 187 yards on eight receptions vs. Iowa State on Nov. 20, 1997.

Stanzi completed 15-28 passes for a career-high 255 yards and three scores and rushed six times for 17 yards.

Six different Hawkeyes scored touchdowns: Greene (2), Johnson-Koulianos, RB Jewel Hampton, TE Brandon Myers, TE Tony Moeaki and DB Amari Spievey. Spievey returned an interception 57 yards for a score in the final minute of the second quarter. The 57-yard interception return ties as the 12th-longest in school history.

Two quarters after Spievey's return, SS Tyler Sash returned a theft 58 yards in the fourth quarter. The 58-yard return is the 11th-longest in school history. LB Pat Angerer had a team-best nine tackles, including 1.5 for loss, to lead the Hawkeye tacklers. DT Matt Kroul, who had two tackles, started for the 49th-straight game to establish a new school record. Hawkeye defenders recorded six tackles for loss, collected three turnovers and forced nine punts.

Iowa punter Ryan Donahue only had to punt four times, but averaged 48.5 yards, including booming one 57 yards and having another punt downed inside the 20-yard line. Donahue was rewarded for his efforts, earning Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

Iowa forced five South Carolina turnovers and scored the game's first 31 points en route to a convincing 31-10 victory at the 2009 Outback Bowl in Raymond James Stadium at Tampa, FL. The game marked Iowa's third appearance in six years at the Outback Bowl. Iowa finished the season winning six of its last seven games and pushed its all-time bowl record to 12-10-1.

RB Shonn Greene was named the bowl's Most Valuable Player after rushing for 121 yards and three touchdowns on 29 carries. The 29 attempts, three rushing scores and 18 points are new Iowa bowl records. Greene finished his junior campaign with a school single-season record 20 rushing touchdowns and 1,850 rushing yards. Additionally, he rushed for over 100 yards in all 13 games, also an Iowa single-season record.

QB Ricky Stanzi completed 13-19 passes for 147 yards and a touchdown. He completed a six-yard touchdown to WR Trey Stross on Iowa's opening drive. Iowa's tight ends combined for seven receptions and 92 yards - Brandon Myers had four catches for 49 yards, while Tony Moeaki had three for 43 yards.

Iowa led 21-0 at halftime on two Greene one-yard runs and Stross' six-yard touchdown reception. PK Daniel Murray converted an 18-yard field goal and Greene scored his third touchdown from 11 yards out to stretch Iowa's cushion to 31-0. The Gamecocks scored the final 10 points on a 10-yard pass and a 48-yard field goal.

Defensively, Iowa collected three interceptions, which tied an Iowa bowl record, and recovered two fumbles. Four of the five South Carolina miscues came in the first 30 minutes. SS Tyler Sash tied an Outback Bowl and Iowa bowl record with two thefts. He returned the two interceptions 74 total yards, which is an Iowa bowl record. DB Bradley Fletcher recorded the other interception in the end zone and also forced a fumble. LB A.J. Edds recovered both South Carolina fumbles. LB Pat Angerer had six tackles and a sack and LB Jeremiha Hunter was credited with four tackles, including two for loss, and a pass break-up.

Iowa dominated time of possession, controlling the ball for 35:54, compared to only 24:06 for South Carolina.

The Iowa Hawkeyes play their home football games in Kinnick Stadium (capacity 70,585), located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes drive from Interstate 80 and 380 and is less than 30 minutes from the Eastern Iowa Airport in Cedar Rapids.

The Paul J. Brechler Press Box at Kinnick is on the west side and accessible by elevator or stairs. The facility is named in honor of the former UI athletic director (1947-60). It was completed prior to the 2006 season as part of the two-year, \$90 million renovation of Kinnick Stadium.

The four-level facility extends from goal line to goal line. The media section, including the press section, radio and television booths and game management operations, are located on the fourth level. Level one includes private suites and indoor club seating, level two includes outdoor club seating and level three is private suites.

Refreshments and snacks are available throughout each game and a pre-game meal is served for the media.

FERENTZ CONFERENCES/INTERVIEW REQUESTS

Coach Kirk Ferentz holds a media conference each Tuesday at 12:30 p.m. during the football season. Players are also available, upon request, at 1 p.m. following the media conference.

Player requests must be made on Saturdays, following each game, for the following week. Out of town media should contact the sports information office on Mondays to arrange telephone interviews.

Coach Ferentz is also available each Tuesday during the Big Ten Conference coaches tele-conference (11:40 a.m., CT), and, he is also available via tele-conference for visiting media outlets. Those tele-conferences are held each Tuesday at noon. Contact Iowa Sports Information for the tele-conference phone number and details.

CREDENTIALS

Season and single-game credential requests for Iowa football must now be requested online. Please contact Theresa Walenta (theresawalenta@uiowa.edu) for instructions. Season requests must be received by August 15 to assure a season seat in the press box.

Once a credential request is submitted, you will receive an automatic reply stating that your request has been received. You will receive another notification when your request has been approved or denied. Credentials will be mailed if the request is received 10 days prior to a game. Credentials may also be picked up in the Sports Information Office on the Friday prior to game day or left at the media will call gate (Gate I) at Kinnick Stadium on game day.

Reporters may not use a credential to cover the game for another newspaper, TV station, radio station or internet site. Failure to comply will result in both agencies credentials being revoked for the entire season.

Credential language, which appears on all credentials issued for Iowa football, is printed on the following page of this guide. All rules and regulations listed are enforced by the University of Iowa Athletics Department and the Big Ten Conference.

PARKING

Requests for parking should be made when requesting credentials online. Media parking is located in the parking ramp at the northeast corner of Kinnick Stadium, at the corner of Hawkins Drive and Stadium Drive.

MEDIA ENTRANCE

Members of the media are encouraged to enter Kinnick Stadium at the northeast corner of the stadium (near the old Iowa locker-room entrance) and proceed through the north and west concourses to elevator F, located at the midway point of the west stands. The media may also enter through Gate I on the west side of Kinnick and proceed to elevator F.

PHOTO/TV CREDENTIALS

Photo credentials must be requested following the same guidelines as mentioned above.

A photographer's room is located at the northwest corner of Kinnick Stadium. Photo credentials must be presented in order to receive an armband for sideline photography. Entrance to the photo room is through the tunnel in the middle of the west concourse. From the playing field, the photo room may be accessed through the tunnel at the Northwest corner of the field.

Television stations are not allowed to video tape from the press box. A splitter board is available in the photo room for all TV stations to receive the overhead video provided by Iowa's football video department (or the network midfield camera). TV camera personnel on the sidelines must adhere to all sideline policies.

SERVICES

Complete play-by-play, halftime statistics, final team and individual stats, complete defensive stats, drive charts, participation charts and quotes from both head coaches are available following each home game. The Kinnick Stadium press facility closes four hours following each home game.

TELEPHONES

Iowa provides a limited number of telephones in the main press box area for use on a first-come, first-serve basis. Media requiring their own phone lines should call 319-335-2945 and ask for a work order clerk.

HIGH SPEED INTERNET ACCESS

Hard wire high speed internet access is available at every media seat in the Kinnick Stadium press box. Wireless internet access is available in the post-game interview rooms.

FAX MACHINE

A FAX machine is available in the Kinnick Stadium press box, and information will be faxed upon request.

POST-GAME INFORMATION VIA E-MAIL

All game statistics, notes and quotes will be e-mailed from Kinnick Stadium following Iowa home games when requested. This information is filed in pdf format and is sent within 30-45 minutes following home games. To receive this information, contact a member of the Iowa sports information staff. This information is also posted on the Iowa website, www.hawkeyesports.com, following each Iowa game throughout the season.

ACCOMMODATIONS

A directory of hotels, motels, restaurants and available air transportation can be found on page 15 of this guide. The Iowa sports information office does reserve a block of rooms at the Quality Inn & Suites in Iowa City, and those are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Contact Theresa Walenta in the Iowa Sports Information office (319-335-9411) for reservations.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

Members of the media should contact Iowa SID Phil Haddy with player requests prior to leaving the press box. Iowa Sports Information staff will be departing the press box with approximately three minutes remaining in the game.

Both team locker room facilities are located under the south end zone. All player and coaches interviews will take place in the designated media rooms. You may follow a member of the Iowa Sports Information staff from the press box or ask for directions on getting to the post-game media rooms.

Both head coaches are available (in different interview rooms) following the cooling off period, with player interviews to follow. Coach Ferentz' post-game comments are televised on the monitors throughout the Kinnick Stadium press box. Quotes from both head coaches are distributed following the interview sessions.

The Iowa locker room is closed to the media. Requested Iowa players are available in the interview area, and quotes from selected Iowa players are also distributed following the interview sessions.

THE HAWKEYE RADIO NETWORK

Fans of the University of Iowa following the Hawkeyes on radio can tune in on their favorite station throughout the state of Iowa and the Midwest.

The radio voice of the Hawkeyes is Gary Dolphin, a Cascade, IA native who handles all play-by-play action of both Iowa football and men's basketball throughout the season. In addition, Dolphin also serves as the host of the weekly coach's shows during the season with football Coach Kirk Ferentz and men's basketball Coach Todd Lickliter. Dolphin, in 2001, was named the Iowa SportsCaster of the Year. He is in his 14th year of broadcasting Iowa football and basketball on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Dolphin, overall, is in his 37th year of play-by-play broadcasting. That includes six years of broadcasting basketball games for Northwestern University.

Dolphin is joined on all University of Iowa football broadcasts by former Hawkeye and NFL great Ed Podolak. A native of Atlantic, IA, Podolak was a three-year letterman for the Hawkeyes (1966-68) as a quarterback and running back before his lengthy professional career with the Kansas City Chiefs. He has been a part of Iowa football broadcasts for over 26 years. Iowa's sideline reporter is Rob Brooks, son of Hall of Fame broadcaster, Bob Brooks.

The Hawkeye Radio Network, a production of Learfield Communications, Inc. of Jefferson City, MO, blankets the state of Iowa and bordering states with more than 50 stations providing live coverage. The Hawkeyes can also be heard on the World Wide Web (hawkeyesports.com) and on XM Satellite radio.

Theresa Walenta is the office secretary. The sports information staff also includes student staff members Ashley Carlson, Stephanie Dittmer, Nick Hegland, Nathan Sheehan, Patrick Sojka and Jenni Stumpff.

Haddy became part of the Hawkeye staff in 1971 and was named Director of Sports Information in July, 1993. A native of Cedar Rapids, he holds two degrees from Iowa and has worked for two radio stations. Phil and his wife, Elaine, have a son, Jason, and a daughter, Jamie. They are grandparents of Nick (9) and William (6) Haddy and Evelyn (4) and Marty (2) Powers.

Roe joined the Hawkeye staff in 1990 and was named associate director in 1997. The Iowa City native earned his bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University and his master's degree from Northeast Louisiana University. He is the author of "HAWKEYES FOR LIFE", published in 2007. Steve and his wife, Janet, have a daughter, Nike, and a son, James, and a granddaughter, Teagan (5).

Wagner is in her 11th year as a fulltime assistant after previously serving as a student assistant for four years and as an intern for two years. A native of Iowa Falls, Wagner earned her degree in 1997 with a double major in journalism and communication studies. Traci and her husband, Jason, have a son, Nicholas, and a daughter, Sydney.

Weitzel has served as an assistant sports information director since 1998. Matthew graduated from the University of Iowa in 1997 with a Bachelor's of Arts degree in Journalism and Mass Communication, with an emphasis in Business. The native of Mundelein, IL was a student in the sports information office for three years.

Blau is in his third year as an assistant in the Iowa sports information office. Aaron graduated from the University of Iowa in 2007 with a double major in Journalism and Mass Communications and Sports Studies, along with a minor in American Studies. Blau, a native of Latimer, IA, served as a student assistant in the UI sports information office for five years. His wife's name is Mandy.

PRESS CREDENTIAL LANGUAGE

This working credential is subject in all respects to the media credential criteria and policies set forth by the University of Iowa as in effect from time to time. This working credential is issued for the sole purpose of providing facility access to an accredited agency's employee who has a legitimate working function (media or game service) in conjunction with this game or games. It is non-transferable and non-assignable and any duplication or alteration of this document is prohibited. Any unauthorized use of this credential subjects the bearer to ejection from the facility and prosecution for criminal trespass.

Any secondary use of any picture, photograph, audio description, video, film/tape, drawing or other description of a game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including, but not limited to use in delayed editorial or non-editorial advertising, sales promotion or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval of the University of Iowa or the Big Ten Conference.

A maximum of two minutes (2:00) of game video footage (without audio) may be utilized during the one week period following the conclusion of the game solely within regularly scheduled bona fide news programming distributed via television, and may not be distributed via the internet, wireless or other forms of media.
