NCAA REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

THIS WEEK

The No. 17 University of lowa women's gymnastics team competes at the Champaign NCAA Regional inside the State Farm Center on Saturday. The GymHawks are one of 36 teams nationally and one of seven Big Ten teams to qualify for regional competition.

No. 17 lowa will compete against No. 5 UCLA, No. 8 Oregon State, No. 19 Illinois, No. 22 Eastern Michigan, and No. 26 Ohio State in the Champaign, Illinois regional. Individual competitors from Bowling Green, Ball State, Michigan State, Western Michigan, and Centenary will also compete. Competition will begin at 4 p.m. (CT).

CHAMPAIGN NCAA REGIONAL TICKETS

Fans can purchase tickets online at fightingillini.com/tickets, at NCAA.com/tickets, or fans can call the Illini Ticket Office at 1-866-455-4641 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Tickets may be purchased at the meet beginning at 3 p.m.

Adult single tickets are \$11, while student single tickets are \$7. Groups of 5 or more can purchase tickets at \$6 per person.

NCAA REGIONAL FORMAT

Six teams, four all-around individual competitors, and two individual event specialists per event were named to each of the six predetermined host sites.

The top 18 teams are seeded nationally based on RQS and placed into the bracket. Teams 19-36 are organizaed into three pods (19-24, 25-30, and 31-36) and placed geographically at one of the six sites, beginning with teams 19-24, followed by teams 25-30, and then teams 31-36. Seeding determined at the time of regional selections will be maintained througout the championships. All-around competitors and event specialists are assigned to their respective geographic region.

IOWA'S NCAA POSTSEASON HISTORY

- lowa has had representation at every NCAA Regionals since 2005 -- with three seasons of individual representation and ten team appearances.
- Head coach Larissa Libby has led lowa to ten NCAA Regional appearnaces in 13 seasons, including this season.
- Last year, the GymHawks saw postseason action when they hosted the lowa City, lowa Regional and talled a 195.450 to secure a fourth place finish.
- Nine GymHawks collected 17 top 25 finishes. Mollie Drenth finished at the top of the podium on beam (9.900), fourth on bars (9.900), seventh on vault (9.825), and 13th on floor (9.825). Angel Metcalf tied her teammate for fourth on bars (9.900).

lowa will start with a bye then rotate to floor, vault, bars and beam, with another bye before bars.

NCAA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

The top two teams, as well as the top two all-around competitors who are not on an advancing team from each regional will recieve an automatic bid to the national championship in St. Louis, Missouri, on April 14-15. The event is hosted by the University of Missouri and St. Louis Sports Commission. The top two teams from three regionals will compete in one of two semifinals, and the top two teams from the other three regionals will compete in the other semifinal.

In addition, the invidivual event winners at each regional site will advance to the national championships, if they are not part of a qualifying team or an all-around qualifier.

IN THE RANKINGS

lowa is ranked No. 17 nationally with a regional qualifying score (RQS) of 196.510. The GymHawks rank 14th on beam (49.225 RQS), 19th on bars (49.145), 20th on floor (49.205), and 26th on vault (48.995).

Individually, senior Mollie Drenth ranks 31st nationally in the all-around (39.245 RQS), while freshman Charlotte Sullivan ranks 82nd (38.750). For individual events, Drenth ranks 28th on beam (9.895) and 84th on vault (9.830). Senior Angel Metcalf ranks 30th on bars (9.890) and 47th on beam (9.875). Junior Melissa Zurawski is ranked 49th on floor (9.880) and 51st on bars (9.870). Junior Lanie Snyder and freshman Clair Kaji are tied for 59th on floor (9.875), while Kaji is also ranked 92nd on beam (9.875).

REGIONAL QUALIFYING SCORE

lowa is ranked No. 17 nationally with a regional qualifying score of 196.510. RQS is determined by the six highest scores of the season — at least three of which must be from away meets. The highest score is dropped, and the remaining five scores are averaged.

LAST TIME OUT

The GymHawks posted a 196.400 to finish third at the Big Ten Championships on March 18. This marked their highest score at the championship in history and their best finish since 2010.

Nine GymHawks tallied 12 top 20 finishes to highlight the competition. Senior Mollie Drenth took the only title for the Hawkeyes on beam with a 9.925. Metcalf led the way for lowa, finishing runner-up on bars (9.900), fourth on beam (9.900), fifth in the all-around (39.375), and eighth on vault (9.850). Freshman Clair Kaji tied for fourth on beam (9.900), while junior Nikki Youd tied for 10th (9.850). Junior Lanie Snyder also tied for fifth on floor (9.900) and ninth on bars (9.850), while sophomore Maria Ortiz tied for eighth on vault (9.850).

THREE NAMED TO ALL CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM

Four GymHawks received individual conference awards following the 2017 Big Ten Championships. Seniors Mollie Drenth and Angel Metcalf were named to the All-Championship Team for the third consecutive year, and junior Lanie Snyder received her first honor. Sophomore Nicole Chow collected the Sportsmanship Award.

COACH LIBBY NAMED BIG TEN COACH OF THE YEAR

In her 13th year as head coach and 17th year at lowa, head coach Larissa Libby was named the Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year after leading the GymHawks to a 7-2 conference record and a third-place regular season finish. lowa finished the regular season with a 15-6 overall record and a No. 16 national ranking. Libby led the team to a third-place finish at the Big Ten Championships with their highest championship score in history (196.725). She also coached a record five gymnasts to the All-Big Ten Team and three gymnasts to the All-Championship Team. Libby helped nine GymHawks be named to Academic All-Big Ten, the most gymnasts to be honored since 2010.

9 GYMHAWKS NAMED WINTER ACADEMIC ALL-BIG TEN

Nine University of Iowa women's gymnasts were named to the 2017 Big Academic All-Big Ten Team. Misty-Jade Carlson (art and informatics), Nicole Chow (human physiology), Sydney Hogan (journalism and mass communications/sports and recreation managment), Maria Ortiz (human physiology), Rose Piorkowski (sociology), Lanie Snyder (english/education), Tessa Walsh (computer science), Nikki Youd (human physiology), and Melissa Zurawski (health and human physiology) all recieved the honor.

To be eligible for Academic All-Big Ten recognition, student-athletes must be in at least their second academic year at the institution. They must also carry a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better.

SCOUTING THE BRUINS

- UCLA tied for third at the Pac-12 Championships (197.100) on March 18.
- The Bruins own a No. 5 national ranking with a RQS of 197.500.
- UCLA is ranked second on bars (49.460), third on beam (49.495), seventh on floor (49.435), and eighth on vault (49.250).
- Five Bruins -- Madison Kocian (First Team AA, Second-Team FX), Christine Peng-Peng Lee (First Team BB), Hallie Mossett (Second Team FX), Katelyn Ohashi (First Team BB), and Kyla Ross (First Team BB, UB)-- earned a total of seven regular season All-American honors (five First Team and two Second Team) from the National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches/Women.
- Kocian and Ross are both U.S.A. Olympic gold medalists. Kocian won the team gold and captured the silver medal on uneven bars at the 2016 Rio Olympics. Ross was a member of the gold medal winning 2012 Olympics team.
- UCLA is led by head coach Valorie Kondos Field, who is in her 26th season.

SCOUTING THE BEAVERS

- Oregon State scored a 197.400 to finish second at the Pac-12 Championships on March 18.
- The Beavers are ranked eighth nationally with a RQS of 197.115.
- Oregon State is ranked eighth on beam (49.305), 10th on bars (49.265) and floor (49.320), and 12th on vault (49.195).
- Four Beavers Erika Aufiero (Second Team UB), Madleine Gardiner (First Team BB), Kaytianna McMillan (Second Team AA, FX), and Dani Dessaints (Second Team V)— earned a total of five regular season All-American honors (one First Team and four Second Team) from the National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches/Women.
- The Beavers are led by head coach Tanya Chaplin, who is in her 20th season.

SCOUTING THE FIGHTING ILLINI

- Illinois claimed second (196.875) at the Big Ten Championships on March 18.
- The Fighting Illini rank No. 19 nationally with a RQS of 196.365.
- Illinois is ranked 11th on beam (49.290), 15th on floor (49.230), 23rd on bars (49.095), and 36th on vault (48.875).
- Four Illini -- Mary Jane Horth, Lizzy LeDuc, Bridget Hodan, and Brielle Nguyen -- garnered All-Big Ten honors. Horth and Leduc were named first team, while Hodan and Nguyen were honored to second team.
- The Fighting Illini are led by head coach Kim Landrus, who is in her seventh season.

SCOUTING THE EAGLES

- Eastern Michigan became the Mid-American Conference Champions with a score of 196.500 on March 18.
- The Eagles rank 22nd nationally with a RQS of 195.970.
- Eastern Michigan is ranked 14th on bars (49.215), 25th on beam (49.030), 38th on vault (48.835), and 39th on floor (49.000).
- Eagles junior Kendall Velentin earned regular season All-American honors from the National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches/Women (NACGC/W). Valentin earned first team honors on bars with a regular season RQS of 9.925.
- UCLA is led by head coach Valorie Kondos Field, who is in her 26th season.

SCOUTING THE BUCKEYES

- Ohio State took fifth (195.525) at the Big Ten Championships on March 18.
- The Buckeyes rank 26th nationally with a RQS of 195.825.
- Ohio State is ranked 20th on vault (49.055), 25th on bars (49.090), 26th on floor (49.120), and 41st on beam (48.810).
- Buckeye gymnasts Alexis Mattern and Kaitlyn were named to the All-Big Ten Team. Mattern was named first team, while Hofland earned second team..
- The Buckeyes are led by head coach Carey Fagan, who is in her 13th season.

5 GYMHAWKS EARN ALL BIG-TEN HONORS

- A record number of University of Iowa women's gymnasts earned All-Big Ten selections, the conference office announced on March 14. Seniors Mollie Drenth and Angel Metcalf earned first-team allocades, while juniors Melissa Zurawski and Lanie Snyder and freshman Clair Kaji were named to second-team.
- The Hawkeyes earned five All-Big Ten honors for the first time in the team's history, surpassing their previous high of three.
- Drenth, a 2016 All-American, garners her second straight conference honor. She leads the Hawkeyes in the all-around in 2017. The Riverview, Florida, native ranks fourth in the Big Ten in the all-around with an RQS of 39.245. Drenth's season high of 39.350 came against lowa State on March 4 and Ohio State on Jan. 21. She claimed the event title both times. She is also tied for the team lead on vault (9.875) and has the third-best score all-time on beam (9.950).
- Metcalf led lowa on uneven bars (9.950) and in the all-around (39.375) in 2017 on her way to her second All-Big Ten honor. The Swansboro, North Carolina, native is fifth in the Big Ten on uneven bars with an RQS of 9.875. At the Big Five meet on March 11, Metcalf tied for the second-highest score all-time on uneven bars with a score of 9.950 to take home the event title.
- Zurawski earns her first all-conference selection. She has competed on three events (vault, uneven bars, floor exercise) for the Hawkeyes this season. She is seventh in the conference on floor and uneven bars with RQS scores of 9.880 and 9.870, respectively. Her score of 9.925 on uneven bars against Maryland on January 29 is tied for third all-time.
- Snyder has competed on floor in every meet this season for the Hawkeyes. The Omaha, Nebraska, native is 10th in the Big Ten on floor with an RQS of 9.865. Her season high on the event came against lowa State on March 4. Her score of 9.950 is tied for second all-time.
- Kaji has competed on three events as a freshman this season. She recorded 9.925 on floor against lowa State on March 4th. That is tied for the third-highest all-time. Her RQS on floor is ninth in the Big Ten.

BIG WINS THIS SEASON

lowa defeated three top-25 ranked teams in their 11 wins this season. The Hawkeyes begain by upsetting No.18 Ohio State, 196.175-195.525, on the road on Jan. 21. On Feb. 11, they defeated No. 21 Illinois with a score of 196.475 in a tri-meet inside Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Lastly, they defeated No. 20 George Washington in a field of five teams with a score of 196.400 in Washington, D.C., on Feb. 17.

KAJI EARNS BIG FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK FOR A SECOND TIME

Freshman Clair Kaji earned Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors on March 6. This is Kaji's second weekly honor. The freshman last recieved the award on Jan. 23.

Kaji earned her second beam title of the year with a score of 9.850 against lowa State in Carver-Hawkeye Arena on Saturday. She also finished runner-up on floor with a season-high 9.925. This tied the third-best floor routine score in lowa history.

The Vancouver, Canada, native has earned six titles this season. She took first on floor against California (9.825), Ohio State (9.900), and Maryland (9.900). Kaji also earned titles on bars at Northern Illinois (9.875) and on beam against Michigan State (9.850).

ZURAWSKI NAMED FEBRUARY STUDENT-ATHLETE OF THE MONTH

Junior Melissa Zurawski, a health and human physiology major, was named to student-athlete of the month for February. This honor, voted on by her peers, recognizes a student-athlete who has excelled not only in their sport, but in the classroom as well.

Zurawski earned Big Ten Gymnast of the Week honors on Jan. 30 after lowa defeated Maryland. Zurawski holds the team's season high on uneven bars with a 9.925, which tied the thirdbest in program history.

SULLIVAN EARNS SECOND BIG FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONOR

Charlotte Sullivan was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week on Feb. 13. This was Sullivan's second weekly honor. The freshman last received the award on Jan. 9.

Sullivan earned her second uneven bars title of the year with a score of 9.850 against No. 21 Illinois and UIC inside Carver-Hawkeye Arena on Feb. 10. She also finished runner-up on beam with a career-high 9.875.

The Christchurch, New Zealand, native has earned six event titles this season. She took first in the all-around against Michigan State (39.050), California (38.275), and Maryland (38.775). Sullivan also earned titles on vault against Ohio State (9.800) and on uneven bars against Maryland (9.925). Her career-best 9.925 on bars tied the third-best score in lowa history.

ZURAWSKI NAMED BIG GYMNAST OF THE WEEK

Junior Melissa Zurawski was named Big Ten Co-Gymnast of the Week after her performance against Maryland. Zurawski received this honor with Nicole Artz of Michigan. This is lowa's first Gymnast of the Week honor since Rebecca Simbhudas earned the title on Feb. 1, 2010.

The junior earned first or runner-up in every event she competed in. The Darien, Illinois, native earned her second event title of the season on uneven bars with a career-high 9.925 to tie the third best score in lowa history. She set another career high on vault with a 9.850 to place second overall. She earned an additional runner-up title on floor with a score of 9.875.

The junior has earned two other event titles so far this season. She took the event title on floor with a score of 9.875 at lowa's season opener at Northern Illinois. She also won on uneven bars against No. 18 Ohio State on Jan. 21.

SULLIVAN NAMED JANUARY STUDENT-ATHLETE OF THE MONTH

Freshman Charlotte Sullivan was named the student-athlete of the month for January. This honor, voted on by her peers, recognizes a student-athlete who has excelled not only in their sport, but in the classroom as well.

Sullivan earned five event titles through the team's first five meets and was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week for her runner-up finish in the Northern Illinois Quad Meet on Jan. 8. Sullivan also tied the third-best score in lowa history on uneven bars with a score of 9.925 to win the event against Maryland on Jan. 29.

DRENTH, METCALF NAMED TO BIG WATCH LIST

Seniors Mollie Drenth and Angel Metcalf were named to the 2017 Big Ten Gymnasts to Watch List for the second consecutive year.

Metcalf, who has been featured on the Big Ten Watch List for three consecutive years, took part in all 14 meets during the 2016 season and competed in the all-around in 13 meets. At the Big Ten Championships, she took 12th on beam (9.825), 20th on uneven bars (9.825), and finished ninth in the all-around (39.225) to be named to the All-Big Ten Championship Team for the second year in a row. She ended the season at her third NCAA Regionals with a fourth-place finish on bars (9.900) and 10th-place result in the all-around (38.650) to be selected to the All-Championship Team.

Drenth competed in every meet in the all-around during the 2016 season and owns lowa's individual season best on vault (9.950 at No. 13 Denver, Feb. 27), beam (9.925 at lowa State, March 4), and in the all-around (39.475 vs. No. 14 Nebraska, Feb. 6). The senior earned a runner-up finish on vault (9.925) and placed 20th on uneven bars (9.825) at the Big Ten Championships to be named to the All-Big Ten Championship Team. At the NCAA Regionals, she finished seventh on vault (9.825), fourth on uneven bars (9.900), 13th on floor (9.825), third in the all-around (39.450), and was the beam champion with a 9.900 to make the All-Championship team and qualify for the NCAA Championships as an individual. She finished the season with a third-place finish (9.9125) on beam at the NCAA Championships and earned All-American honors.

HAWKEYE NEWCOMERS

The Hawkeyes welcome five new freshmen -- Charlotte Sullivan, Clair Kaji, Breanna Fitzke, Gina Leal, and Annie Kustoff-- to the 2017 squad.

Sullivan is from Christchurch, New Zealand, and is a five-time New Zealand Nationals champion. She also won a bronze medal on beam at the World Cup in Portugal (2015).

Kaji is from Vancouver, Canada. She is a four-time Canadian Championship qualifier and a four-time Elite Canada competitor. In 2015, she placed sixth in the all-around at the Canada Winter Games to help her team take home the bronze.

Fitzke is from West Allis, Wisconsin. She is a three-time regional qualifier and a two-time state qualifier. Fitzke finished fifth in the state on floor in 2014 and fourth in 2015.

Leal is from Glastonbury, Connecticut. In 2012, she was the state champion on vault and bars and runner-up on floor and in the all-around, was the regional champion on vault and bars, and won vault at the Western National Championship.

Kustoff is from San Antonio, Texas. In 2014, she placed first on bars and second in the all-around at state competition, won bars at regionals, and was the champion on beam and runner-up on bars at the Western National Championship.
