## 2019 HOLIDAY BOWL CHAMPIONS



**1** Iowa defeated No. 22 Southern California, 49-24, at the 2019 Holiday Bowl. The bowl win was the ninth for Kirk Ferentz, tying him for second place in Big Ten Conference history (Barry Alvarez). Joe Paterno of Penn State has 10. Since 2001, only Ohio State (10) has more bowl wins among Big Ten programs than Iowa (9).

**2** The Hawkeyes won 47 games from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in program history. Only eight schools have won more games than the Hawkeyes (47) since 2015. They include Clemson (68), Alabama (66), Ohio State (60), Oklahoma (57), Georgia (54), Wisconsin (52), Penn State (51), and LSU (50).

**3** The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games this season, including 3-1 in rivalry games and 1-0 in the postseason. Iowa defended the Cy-Hawk Trophy against Iowa State, the Floyd of Rosedale trophy against #7 Minnesota, and the Heroes Trophy at Nebraska. The Hawkeyes fell to #16 Wisconsin in a battle for the Heartland Trophy.

**4** Iowa's defense ranked in the top 20 in scoring, rushing, passing, and total defense. Iowa was fifth in the country in scoring defense (14.0 ppg), 12th in total defense (308.2 ypg), 14th in rushing defense (112.5), and 19th in passing defense (195.7 ypg). The Hawkeyes held seven-of-13 opponents to their season-low point total.

**5** Three Hawkeyes landed on postseason All-America teams. K Keith Duncan was a consensus All-American. He was named to the FWAA, Sporting News, and AP first teams. OL Tristan Wirfs was named to the FWAA and Walter Camp first teams, and the AP and AFCA second teams. DE A.J. Epenesa was an AP, AFCA, and Walter Camp second-team All-American.

**6** Junior K Keith Duncan was named the Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. He is the first Iowa kicker to earn the conference award since its inception in 2011. Duncan owns Big Ten and Iowa single-season records with 29 made field goals, a total that ranks sixth-best all-time in the NCAA.

**7** Junior OL Tristan Wirfs was named Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. He is the first Hawkeye to earn the offensive lineman award since Brandon Scherff in 2014. The award for offensive line play was first presented in 1984, with Wirfs being the eighth Hawkeye to earn the honor.

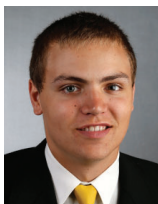
**8** Junior DE A.J. Epenesa was named first team All-Big Ten for the second straight year. He led the Hawkeyes in tackles for loss (14.5-82), sacks (11.5-67), quarterback pressures (nine) and forced fumbles (four). He also had three pass break-ups. Epenesa was named the defensive MVP of the Holiday Bowl.

**9** Senior QB Nate Stanley started 13 games in 2019 and 39 games the past three seasons. Iowa posted a 27-12 record in Stanley's 3 seasons as starting QB. Stanley passed for 2,951 yards with 16 TDs in 2019. He ranks second in career passing TDs (68), passing yards (8,302), completions (673), and pass att. (1,155), and third in career total offense (8,198).

**10** Freshman RB Tyler Goodson started the final four games of the season and became the first true freshman to ever lead the team in single-season rushing yards (638). Goodson led the team with five rushing touchdowns, and had 24 receptions for 166 yards. His 158 combined touches led the team.

**IOWA WRAPS 2019 SEASON WITH WIN OVER USC AT HOLIDAY BOWL**

Iowa (10-3) defeated No. 22 Southern California (8-5), 49-24, at the 2019 Holiday Bowl in San Diego, California, on Dec. 27, 2019. The Hawkeyes improved to 17-15-1 in 32 bowl game appearances. The bowl win was the ninth for Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz, tying him for second place in Big Ten Conference history (Barry Alvarez).

The 49 points scored were the second most scored in a bowl game in school history (55 vs. Texas in 1984 Freedom Bowl). WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette scored three touchdowns at the 2019 Holiday Bowl (all in the first half), tying Shonn Greene's Iowa bowl record. He is the second Hawkeye in program history to score a touchdown via rush, reception, and kickoff return, in a single game (George Rice, vs. Purdue in 1951). He is the first college player since 1998 (Deuce McAllister, Independence Bowl) to score a touchdown via rush, reception, kickoff return in a bowl game.

**END OF A HISTORIC FIVE-YEAR STRETCH**

The Hawkeyes finished the 2019 season 10-3 overall and on a four-game winning streak. The Hawkeyes won 47 games from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in program history. Iowa recorded its sixth 10-win season since 1999. Only nine schools have won more games than the Hawkeyes (47) since 2015. They include Clemson (68), Alabama (66), Ohio State (60), Oklahoma (57), Georgia (54), Wisconsin (52), Penn State (51), and LSU (50).

**WIN, GRADUATE, DO IT RIGHT**

Thirty-one Hawkeyes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors. To be eligible, students must be on a varsity team and carry a minimum grade-point average of 3.0 or higher.

Twelve Hawkeyes wore a decal on their helmets indicating they received their undergraduate degrees from the University of Iowa. The graduates include Shaun Beyer, Drew Cook, John Milani, Landan Paulsen, Levi Paulsen, Colton Rastetter, Brady Reiff, Brady Ross, Ryan Schmidt, Jackson Subbert, Nate Vejvoda, and Nate Wieting.



## HEAD COACH KIRK FERENTZ

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) completed his 21st season as head coach at Iowa. He is the dean of NCAA Division I football coaches and is Iowa's all-time winningest coach, surpassing Hayden Fry in 2019. His contract runs through the 2025 season.



- Named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the fourth time in his career (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015). Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year awards.
- Guided Iowa to Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, and the Big Ten West Division title in 2015.
- Named Woody Hayes, Eddie Robinson, and Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year in 2015. Was a finalist for the Maxwell Football Club, Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year award.
- Ferentz is tied for fourth all-time with 162 overall wins as a member of the Big Ten. He has 97 Big Ten wins, which ranks fourth all-time.
- Named the 2002 Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year.
- Iowa has made two BCS bowl appearances, including a 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, and one CFP Bowl (2016).
- Iowa has played in 11 January bowl games with five January bowl victories (2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl, 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl).
- Iowa has posted a 153-83 (.648) overall mark and an 93-61 (.604) Big Ten record since 2001. Ferentz has placed in the top one-half of the conference 14 times, including Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, a second-place finish in 2009, and a West Division title in 2015.
- At Iowa, Ferentz holds an overall record of 162-104 (.609) and a 97-75 (.564) mark in Big Ten games. He is Iowa's all-time winningest football coach with 162 wins. In 24 seasons as a college head coach, he holds a career mark of 174-125 (.582).
- The only Division I head coach to coach three sons at the same college. Brian, an assistant coach since 2012 and Iowa's offensive coordinator, was a Hawkeye letterman from 2003-05. James was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line before graduating in May, 2013. Steven was a senior offensive lineman in 2016.

### FERENTZ MOVES UP BIG TEN CHARTS

Head coach Kirk Ferentz has 97 Big Ten wins as Iowa's head coach, the fourth most of any coach in Big Ten Conference history.

Ferentz's 162 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference tie Joe Paterno for fifth all-time in league history. He is one of five coaches in Big Ten Conference history to win at least 150 games as a member of the Big Ten Conference. The top five includes Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonza Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Joe Paterno (162), and Ferentz (162).

Ferentz (162-103) became Iowa's all-time winningest coach on Sept. 1, 2018. The Hawkeyes defeated Northern Illinois, 33-7. It was Ferentz's 144th win as Iowa's head coach, one more than his predecessor, Hayden Fry (143-89-6). Fry coached Iowa for 20 years (1979-98). Ferentz is in his 21st season in 2019.

Both Ferentz (162, 97) and Fry (143, 96) rank in the top five in overall wins and Big Ten wins. Only Iowa and Michigan have two coaches ranked in the top 10 of both win categories (Bo Schembechler 194, 143; and Lloyd Carr 122, 81). Iowa is the only school in the country to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

### FERENTZ TOPS IN LONGEVITY

Kirk Ferentz completed his 21st season as Iowa's head football coach in 2019. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football. Ferentz was named Iowa head coach on Dec. 2, 1998. Gary Patterson of TCU is No. 2 in coaching tenure. Patterson's first year with the Horned Frogs was 2001. Among Big Ten coaches, only Pat Fitzgerald (2006) and Mark Dantonio (2007) have been at their current schools for 10 seasons or more. Iowa is the only school to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

Defensive coordinator Phil Parker and strength and conditioning coach Chris Doyle also completed their 21st seasons on Iowa's staff. Quarterbacks coach Ken O'Keefe was on Ferentz's original coaching staff before he left for the NFL following the 2011 season. He returned to Iowa in 2017 to coach Iowa's quarterbacks.

Ferentz is the only Division I coach to coach three sons. Brian Ferentz, a former Hawkeye letterman and captain (2003-05), enters his eighth season on Iowa's coaching staff. James Ferentz was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line and a team captain before graduating in 2013. Steven was an offensive lineman and letterwinner in 2015 and 2016.

### TROPHY COLLECTION

The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games in 2019, including 3-1 in rivalry games and 1-0 in the postseason. Iowa defended the Cy-Hawk Trophy at Iowa State, the Floyd of Rosedale trophy against #7 Minnesota, and the Heroes Trophy at Nebraska. The Hawkeyes fell at #16 Wisconsin in a battle for the Heartland Trophy.

The Hawkeyes are 16-4 in their last 20 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin), with all four losses coming to Wisconsin, and have won three straight bowl games.

**STANLEY CLIMBS SCHOOL CHARTS**

Senior QB Nate Stanley started all 13 games in 2019 and all 39 games the past three seasons. Iowa posted a 27-12 record in Stanley's three seasons as starting quarterback.

Stanley passed for 2,951 yards with 16 touchdowns in 2019. He ranks second in career passing touchdowns (68), career passing yards (8,302), career completions (673), and career pass attempts (1,155), and third in career total offense (8,198).

Stanley started three bowl games in his career. He is one of five quarterbacks in program history to start three bowl games, and the second to win all three. Chuck Long started four (2-2), and Matt Sherman (2-1), Drew Tate (1-2), and Ricky Stanzi (3-0) started three.

The Hawkeyes averaged 28.4 points per game in Stanley's 39 career starts. His streak of 39 consecutive starts at quarterback ranks second in school history to Long (47). He had 16 touchdown passes this season and 68 in his career, second all-time in program history. He trails Chuck Long (74) on the all-time list.

Stanley is one of three players in program history to throw for 8,000 or more career yards (8,302). He ranks second in career passing yards, trailing Long (10,461) on the all-time list. He ranks third in career total offense (8,198).

Stanley was one of 10 finalists for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, which is presented annually to the top senior or fourth-year quarterback in the nation. He was the only Big Ten quarterback on the list.

Stanley had 20 career multi-touchdown games, including six in 2019. He completed three touchdown passes in the season opener against Miami, Ohio, three more in Week 2 against Rutgers, two against Middle Tennessee in Week 4, two against #16 Wisconsin in Week 9, two against #8 Minnesota in Week 10, and two against #22 USC in the Holiday Bowl. He has 10 career games with at least three passing touchdowns. Only Long has more in program history (11).

Stanley threw 26 touchdown passes in 2018, second most in the Big Ten, one shy of tying Chuck Long (1985) for the most in single season school history, and tied for second most all-time in single season history. Stanley also threw 26 touchdown passes in 2017. Stanley's 52 touchdown passes from 2017-18 are the most ever in school history over a two-year span. Long tossed 49 touchdown passes from 1984 (22) to 1985 (27).

**WIRFS LEADS LIST OF ALL-BIG TEN OFFENSIVE HONOREES**

Junior OL Tristan Wirfs was named Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. Wirfs was named first-team All-Big Ten by league coaches and media.

In addition to Wirfs on the first offensive unit, junior OL Alaric Jackson was a third team selection by coaches and media. Junior WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette and freshman C Tyler Linderbaum received honorable mention recognition by coaches and media. Along with earning the Sportsmanship Award, senior QB Nate Stanley was named honorable mention All-Big Ten by conference coaches.

Wirfs was the first Hawkeye to earn the offensive lineman award since Brandon Scherff in 2014. The award for offensive line play was first presented in 1984, with Wirfs being the eighth Hawkeye to earn the honor.

Wirfs started 10 games at right tackle and three at left tackle while earning Walter Camp and Football Writer's Association of America first-team All-America honors. He had 33 career starts in three seasons. He was one of six semifinalists for the 2019 Outland Trophy. He earned honorable mention honors in 2018, and in 2017 was the first true freshman to start at tackle under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

Jackson earned third team honors after being a second team selection a year ago. Jackson started 10 games at left tackle, missing three games because of injury. He has 34 career starts, all at left tackle.

Linderbaum earned his first all-conference recognition and stated all 13 games at center. The 2019 season was his first on the offensive side of the ball. He played on the defensive line as a true freshman before moving to offense during bowl prep in 2018.

Smith-Marsette was recognized for the second straight season, as he earned the Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year honor in 2018. He led Iowa with 722 receiving yards on 44 receptions. Smith-Marsette scored five receiving touchdowns, three rushing

touchdowns, and two touchdowns via kickoff return. A 95-yard return at Nebraska and a 98-yard return in the Holiday Bowl against USC. He was named offensive MVP in the Holiday Bowl.

Smith-Marsette ranks 17th in career all-purpose yards (2,834) in three seasons. He has amassed 1,270 receiving yards, 1,344 yards on kickoff returns, and 220 rushing yards, scoring 15 total touchdowns. This season he averaged 16.4 yards on 44 receptions, 29.6 yards on 17 kickoff returns, and 8.3 yards on 11 rushing attempts.

Stanley started all 13 games in 2019 and all 39 games the past three seasons. Stanley passed for 2,951 yards with 16 touchdowns in 2019. He ranks second in career passing touchdowns (68), career passing yards (8,302), career completions (673), and career pass attempts (1,155), and third in career total offense (8,198).

**RETURN TO SENDER**

Junior WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette became the first player in school history to return two kickoffs for a touchdown in the same season. He did it in consecutive games to end the season. He had a 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Nebraska, tying for the 10th longest in school history, and a 98-yard return against USC at the Holiday Bowl, the seventh longest in school history, an Iowa bowl record, and tying a Holiday Bowl record.

Smith-Marsette averages 29.9 yards on 45 career kickoff returns, the best in school history and the best in Big Ten history. Smith-Marsette has 1,344 kickoff return yards, fifth all-time in program history.

Smith-Marsette led the team in receiving yards (722) and all-purpose yards (1,333), and ranked second on the team in receptions (44). He had a team-high 10 touchdowns; five receiving, three rushing, and two kickoff returns. He set a career high with 121 receiving yards in Week 11, his second career 100-yard receiving game (Rutgers, 113).

Smith-Marsette has 1,270 career receiving yards, 30th all-time in program history. He has 2,834 all-purpose yards, 17th all-time.

Smith-Marsette scored three touchdowns at the 2019 Holiday Bowl (all in the first half), tying Shonn Greene's Iowa bowl record. He is the second Hawkeye in program history to score a touchdown via rush, reception, and kickoff return, in a single game (George Rice, vs. Purdue in 1951). He is the first college player since 1998 (Deuce McAllister, Independence Bowl) to score a touchdown via rush, reception, kickoff return in a bowl game.

**DUNCAN, EPEÑESA, WIRFS EARN ALL-AMERICA HONORS**

Three University of Iowa football players landed on postseason All-America teams. Junior K Keith Duncan was a consensus All-American, the 26th in school history and 11th under Kirk Ferentz. Duncan was named to the Football Writers (FWAA), Sporting News, and Associated Press first teams. He was a second teamer on the Walter Camp and AFCA awards list.

OL Tristan Wirfs was named to the FWAA and Walter Camp first teams, and the AP and AFCA second teams. DL A.J. Epenesa was an AP, AFCA, and Walter Camp second-team All-American.

Wirfs started 10 games at right tackle and three at left tackle to earn first-team All-Big Ten and Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year honors. He has 33 career starts in three seasons and was one of six semifinalists for the 2019 Outland Trophy. In 2017, he became the first true freshman to start at tackle under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

Duncan set Big Ten and Iowa single-season records with 29 made field goals, a total that ranks sixth-best all-time in the NCAA. He earned the Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten, and was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top kicker.

Epenesa led Iowa in tackles for loss (14-82), sacks (11.5-67), quarterback pressures (nine) and forced fumbles (four). He also had three pass break-ups. He earned All-Big Ten first-team honors for the second straight year and was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week following wins over Minnesota and Nebraska. He was the defensive MVP of the Holiday Bowl.

DUNCAN, EPESESA HIGHLIGHT ALL-BIG TEN DEFENSE AND SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior K Keith Duncan was named the Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. Duncan and junior DE A.J. Epenesa were named first-team All-Big Ten by league coaches and media.

In addition to Epenesa on the first defensive unit, junior DB Geno Stone (coaches) and senior DB Michael Ojemudia (media) earned second-team honors. Ojemudia was a third-team selection by the coaches and Stone earned media honorable mention.

Earning honorable mention recognition from both coaches and media were junior DE Chauncey Golston and senior linebacker Kristian Welch. Senior DT Cedrick Lattimore earned honorable mention from the coaches, while the media extended honorable mention honors to senior P Michael Sleep-Dalton.

Duncan became the first Iowa kicker to earn the conference award since its inception in 2011. The award is named after former Wisconsin kicker Jim Bakken and former Michigan State kicker Morten Andersen. Duncan was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award as the top kicker in the nation.

Duncan set Big Ten and Iowa single-season records with 29 field goals made, a total that ranks sixth-best all-time in the NCAA. Duncan also set a school record with six field goal attempts in Iowa's win over Purdue. His 34 attempts on the season are also a school record. He led the team in scoring with 117 (or 119) points, third highest single-season total in program history.

Epenesa earned first-team honors for the second straight year. He was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week following wins over Minnesota and Nebraska. He led the Hawkeyes in tackles for loss (14.5-82), sacks (11.5-67), quarterback pressures (nine) and forced fumbles (four). He also had three pass break-ups.

Stone earned honorable mention honors for the second straight season after recording 70 total tackles (46 solo). Stone had three tackles for loss, four pass break-ups, three forced fumbles, one interception, and one recovered fumble.

Ojemudia earned his first all-conference recognition, starting 12 games while missing one contest (Minnesota) due to injury. He led the team with three interceptions. He recorded 41 solo tackles and 11 assists and had a team-best nine pass break-ups.

Welch started 10 games at middle linebacker and led the team in tackles (87), despite missing three games due to injury. Welch totaled nine tackles for loss, three sacks, three pass break-ups, and one forced fumble.

Golston was also recognized by both coaches and media while earning his first all-conference honor. He ranked second to Epenesa in tackles for loss (9.5-28). He also had three sacks, five pass break-ups, one interception, and seven quarterback pressures while starting all 13 games.

Lattimore started all 13 games, recording 24 solo tackles and 20 assists. Lattimore also had 3.5 tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks, and a recovered fumble.

Sleep-Dalton averaged 41.7 yards on 58 punts, with a long of 63 yards. He placed 23 punts inside the opponent 20, with just four touchbacks, and had 10 punts of 50 yards or more.

DEFENSE RANKS AMONG NATION'S BEST

First-team All-Big Ten honoree DE A.J. Epenesa led a defense that ranked in the top 20 in scoring, rushing, passing, and total defense. Iowa was fifth in the country in scoring defense (14.0 ppg), 12th in total defense (308.2 ypg), 14th in rushing defense (112.5), and 19th in passing defense (195.7 ypg). Iowa's scoring defense is second in the Big Ten to Ohio State (13.7). The Hawkeyes held seven-of-13 opponents to their season-low point total.

Epenesa earned first-team All-Big Ten recognition for the second straight year. He was named AP, AFCA, and Walter Camp second-team All-American. He led Iowa in tackles-for-loss (14.5-82), sacks (11.5-67), quarterback pressures (9), and forced fumbles (4). He also had three pass break-ups.

Iowa's scoring defense (14.0) is the second lowest total of the Ferentz era (13.0 in 2008). The Hawkeyes allowed just 16.6 first downs per game, 12th fewest in the country and third in the Big Ten. Iowa defensive coordinator Phil Parker was a nominee for the Broyles Award, which honors college football's top assistant coach.

Iowa allowed 21 touchdowns, third fewest in the country (San Diego State 19, Georgia 20). Iowa is one of three schools in the country to allow just six rushing touchdowns or fewer (Georgia 2, Oregon 5, Iowa 6).

Iowa's defense allowed just five first downs against Rutgers in Week 2. That ties for the fewest allowed in the Kirk Ferentz era (Syracuse, 2007). Rutgers' 125 yards of total offense ranks as the fifth lowest total in the Ferentz era.

In its Week 7 win against Purdue, Iowa allowed 33 yards rushing, its lowest total against a Big Ten opponent since 2013.

In Iowa's Week 10 win against No. 10 Minnesota, the Hawkeyes recorded six sacks, matching their highest single-game total since 2013 vs. Northwestern.

**GOODSON LEADS RUNNING BACK BY COMMITTEE**

Iowa running backs Tyler Goodson (638), Mekhi Sargent (563), and Toren Young (432) combined for 1,633 rushing yards. All three running backs started at least one game.

Goodson started the final four games of the season and became the first true freshman to ever lead the team in single-season rushing yards. The last redshirt freshman to lead Iowa in single-season rushing yards was Ladell Betts in 1998 (679 yards). Goodson led the team with five rushing touchdowns, and had 24 receptions for 166 yards. His 158 combined touches led the team.

In Week 12 against Nebraska, Goodson rushed 13 times for a career-high 116 yards and a touchdown. It was his first career 100-yard game. His 55-yard touchdown rush in the first quarter was the longest of his career, the longest rushing touchdown by Iowa in 2019, and the longest by a Hawkeye since Akrum Wadley in 2016 (75 yards vs. Nebraska).

Goodson became the first true freshman to start at running back under Ferentz since 2012 (Greg Garmon) in Iowa's 23-19 win against #8 Minnesota in Week 10. Sargent started Weeks 1-8, and Young was Iowa's Week 9 starter.

Eight different Hawkeyes combined to rush for 17 touchdowns. Nine of those touchdowns came from inside the 2-yard line, 10 from inside the 4-yard line. Goodson (2, 10, 2, 55, 1) led the team with five rushing scores. Sargent (2, 4, 14, 2) ranked second, and WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette (14, 45, 6) ranked third. Five more Hawkeyes had at least one rushing touchdown: WR Tyron Tracy (23), Young (2), QB Nate Stanley (1), FB Brady Ross (1), and QB Spencer Petras (1).

**BIG TEN BOWL GAMES SINCE 2001**

Iowa has posted a 9-8 bowl record under head coach Kirk Ferentz, and has won its last three bowl games, tying its longest such streak in program history. Ferentz's nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history (Joe Paterno, 10).

The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 18 times in the last 19 seasons.

Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (10) has more bowl wins (including FCS Playoffs and the BCS championship game), than Iowa. The following is the record for Big Ten teams in bowl games since 2001:

State, #10 Minnesota, #18 Michigan, #11 Wisconsin,). Those four opponents had a combined 41-11 record.

Iowa was 2-3 against ranked teams this season. Iowa had road losses at #19 Michigan (17-12) and #16 Wisconsin (24-22). The Hawkeyes defeated #7 Minnesota at home (23-19) and lost at home to #10 Penn State (17-12). Iowa defeated #22 USC in San Diego at the 2019 Holiday Bowl.

Iowa defeated Iowa State, 18-17, on Sept. 14. The Cyclones were the first team outside the AP Top 25 when the teams met.

**YOUNG, SARGENT SURPASS 1,000 CAREER RUSHING YARDS**

Junior running backs Toren Young and Mekhi Sargent each surpassed 1,000 career rushing yards in Iowa's win over Middle Tennessee on Sept. 28.

Sargent entered the game with 953 rushing yards and moved past 1,000 for his career on a 12-yard run late in the first period. He ended the contest with 91 rushing yards. His career totals include 1,308 yards on 278 attempts. He was the 48th Iowa running back to surpass 1,000 career yards and currently ranks 31st on the all-time list.

Young entered Week 4 with 950 career yards and surpassed 1,000 on a 15-yard run early in the second quarter, becoming the 49th Iowa running back to surpass the century total. He led the Hawkeyes with a career-high 131 rushing yards against Middle Tennessee. Young now has 1,262 career yards on 262 attempts to rank 33rd on the career list.

Sargent moved over 1,000 career yards on career attempt 207, while Young went past 1,000 yards on career attempt 209.

GRAND THEFT SECONDARY

The Hawkeyes intercepted at least one pass in the final seven games of the season, including a 25-yard interception return for a touchdown by LB Ben Niemann at the 2019 Holiday Bowl. Niemann's interception was the first of his career, Iowa's final score of the season, and extended the Hawkeyes' streak with a pick-six to 12 consecutive seasons. Iowa has had at least one interception returned for a touchdown in 17 of the last 19 seasons.

DB Michael Ojemudia led the team and tied for second in the Big Ten with three interceptions. The Hawkeyes had 12 interceptions this season, and have 53 interceptions since 2017, more than any other team over the last three years.

DUNCAN GETTING HIS KICKS

Junior K Keith Duncan was a consensus first-team All-American and was named the Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. He was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award. Duncan led the country with 29 field goals made. The 29 made field goals are a school and Big Ten Conference single-season record, and tie for sixth all-time in the NCAA. The NCAA record for single-season field goals made is 31. His 34 attempts on the season and his six field goal attempts at Purdue are both school records. He was named to the FWAA, Sporting News, and AP first-team All-America teams.

Duncan was 29-of-34 on field goal attempts and 32-of-32 on PAT attempts. He led the team and is ranked third in the Big Ten in scoring with 119 points. The 119 points rank third all-time in single season history, trailing Shonn Greene (2008) and Nate Kaeding (2002), who share the record with 120 points.

Duncan connected on 14-of-18 kicks of at least 40 yards, and was 12-of-13 on the road. He kicked four field goals at Iowa State, against Purdue, and against Illinois.

Duncan connected on a 48-yard field goal with one second remaining at Nebraska to break a 24-24 tie and give Iowa a 27-24 win. It was Duncan's second of two field goals made in the game (49, 48).

Duncan kicked three field goals at Wisconsin to break Iowa's then-single-season school record. Rob Houghtlin (1987), Nate Kaeding (2002), and Kyle Schlicher (2004) shared the previous school record with 21 made field goals. His 84.4 field goal percentage is the best ever among Iowa kickers with at least 30 field goal attempts.

Duncan saw his first action since 2016, when he made 9-11 field goal attempts and 38-39 PAT attempts (one was blocked). That year he kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired to lift Iowa over #2 Michigan, 14-13.

Three times in 2019 Duncan was named Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week. He earned the honor after kicking the game-winning field goal at Nebraska. He was recognized following a four field goal performance against Illinois on Nov. 23. His first weekly honor of the season came Sept. 16 following his performance at Iowa State. Duncan connected on a career-best four field goals at Iowa State. His final kick from 39 yards provided the margin of victory with 4:51 remaining in the fourth quarter.

He has four career Big Ten weekly honors. He was previously recognized in 2016, earning the weekly honor following Iowa's 14-13 win over Michigan. Duncan contributed two field goals in that win, including the game-winner from 33 yards on the final play of the game.

MOVE THE CHAINS

The Hawkeyes set a Ferentz-era record in their 48-3 win over Middle Tennessee in Week 4. Iowa had 644 yards of total offense, the most in the Ferentz era (previous best was 613 vs. Minnesota in 2005), and the most by any Hawkeye team since 1997 (658 vs. Northern Iowa). Iowa rushed for 351 yards against Middle Tennessee, a mark that ranks fourth in the Ferentz era.

HAWKEYES AT NIGHT

Iowa played #9 Penn State on Oct. 12 in the 20th night game in the history of Kinnick Stadium. The Hawkeyes are 13-7 all-time in games played under the lights at Kinnick. Iowa was 1-1 at night in 2019, opening the year with a 38-14 win against Miami, Ohio, and falling to #9 Penn State, 17-12. D.J. JOHNSON NAMED CO-BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK

DB D.J. Johnson was named Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week on Sept. 16 following his performance at Iowa State. In his second career start, Johnson recorded a career-high eight tackles, including six solo tackles and two assists, and added two pass break-ups. The Big Ten weekly honor is the first of his career.

A.J. EPESESA EARNS BIG TEN WEEKLY HONORS

Junior DE A.J. Epenesa was recognized as Big Ten Conference Defensive Player of the Week two times in 2019. He recorded a career-high 14 tackles and 4.5 tackles-for-loss in Iowa's win at Nebraska on Nov. 29. He earned his first honor of the season following Iowa's 23-19 win over seventh-ranked Minnesota on Nov. 16. Epenesa recorded 2.5 of Iowa's six sacks, three solo tackles and one assisted tackle, forced one fumble and had one quarterback pressure. His final tackle of the game came on Minnesota's final possession and resulted in the Golden Gophers facing a third-and-21 in the final two minutes. Riley Moss intercepted a Minnesota pass two plays later to secure the Iowa victory.

KEITH DUNCAN EARNS BIG TEN HAT TRICK

Junior K Keith Duncan was recognized as the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week three times in 2019, most recently Dec. 1 following his game-winning kick at Nebraska. He was recognized following a four field goal performance against Illinois on Nov. 23. His first weekly honor of the season came Sept. 16 following his performance at Iowa State. Duncan connected on a career-best four field goals at Iowa State. His final kick from 39 yards provided the margin of victory with 4:51 remaining in the fourth quarter.

He has four career Big Ten weekly honors. He was previously recognized in 2016, earning the weekly honor following Iowa's 14-13 win over Michigan. Duncan contributed two field goals in that win, including the game-winner from 33 yards on the final play of the game.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,259 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 660-560-39 (.540). That includes a 411-222-16 (.646) record in home games, a 248-338-23 (.426) record in games away from Iowa City, a 335-381-25 (.469) mark in Big Ten games and a 295-187-15 (.609) record in Kinnick Stadium. Oct. 5, 2019 marked the 90th anniversary of the first game in Kinnick Stadium, a 46-0 win over Monmouth. Nov. 16 marked the 130th anniversary of Iowa football, a 23-19 win over Minnesota. The Hawkeyes played their first football game on Nov. 16, 1889, against Grinnell.

4 HAWKEYES DECLARE FOR NFL DRAFT

Four Iowa football players declared for the NFL Draft, forfeiting their remaining college eligibility. Juniors A.J. Epenesa, Geno Stone, Tristan Wirfs, and Toren Young announced their intentions to leave school and pursue professional football careers.

The Iowa football program under Ferentz has sent 180 players to the NFL, including 70 draft picks and 110 free agents. At least one Hawkeye has been selected in the NFL Draft every year since 1978. In the past 12 seasons, 44 Hawkeyes have been taken in the NFL Draft, including six first round selections.

Epenesa, Stone, and Wirfs all played as true freshman and are leaving school after three years. Young played three seasons after redshirting in 2016.

**IOWA FOOTBALL AND THE NFL**

- The Hawkeyes have had 180 former players in the NFL since 1999, Kirk Ferentz's first year as head coach (70 draft picks/110 free agents).
- Iowa lost seven defensive starters following 2018. Five of those players are currently with NFL teams, including DB Jake Gervase, DE Parker Hesse, DB Amani Hooker, DE Anthony Nelson, DT Matt Nelson. Anthony Nelson and Hooker left Iowa following their junior seasons.
- At least one Iowa Hawkeye has been selected in every NFL Draft since 1978 (42 consecutive years).
- TE T.J. Hockenson (eighth overall, Detroit) and TE Noah Fant (20th overall, Denver) became the first tight ends from the same school to be drafted in the first round of a single NFL Draft.
- TE George Kittle (San Francisco) was a first-team All-Pro in 2019. OL Marshall Yanda (Baltimore) was named to second-team All-Pro.
- DB Desmond King (Los Angeles Chargers), LS Casey Kreiter (Denver), TE George Kittle (San Francisco), and OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) were named All-Pro in 2018.
- Over the past 17 years, 150-of-175 (86 percent) of Iowa's senior starters have been drafted in the NFL or signed NFL free agent contracts.
- Over the past 12 years, Iowa has had 44 NFL Draft picks, fourth most in the Big Ten -- Ohio State (63), Wisconsin (45), and Michigan (45). Since 2010, Iowa has had 37 players drafted in the NFL, tied for fourth most in the Big Ten -- Ohio State (62), Penn State (39), and Wisconsin (37).
- Iowa has had six first round picks in the last nine NFL drafts -- OL Bryan Bulaga, 2010; DE Adrian Clayborn, 2011; OL Riley Reiff, 2012; OL Brandon Scherff, 2015, TE T.J. Hockenson, TE Noah Fant.
- Iowa had six players drafted in the 2012 NFL Draft, which tied for the most in the Big Ten and tied for fourth in the country.
- Former Hawkeye Marshal Yanda (Baltimore OL) is a seven-time Pro-Bowler (2011-16, 2018) and was named NFL All-Pro in 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2018, and 2019.
- In NFL 2011 regular season statistics, former Hawkeye linebackers Chad Greenway (Minnesota) and Pat Angerer (Indianapolis) finished third and fourth, respectively, in tackles. Greenway was named to the Pro Bowl in 2012 and 2013.
- Three former Hawkeyes were involved in the 2012 Super Bowl. DB Tyler Sash played for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants, while LB Jeff Tarpinian was on the injured reserve roster of the New England Patriots. Former Iowa center Brian Ferentz, now is his seventh year on staff and first as Iowa's offensive coordinator, was New England's tight ends coach.
- Former Iowa DB Sean Considine and OL Marshal Yanda won Super Bowl rings with the 2012 Baltimore Ravens in the 2013 Super Bowl.
- Former Iowa LB James Morris (injured reserve) earned a Super Bowl ring with the New England Patriots in 2015. Former TE Tony Moeaki played for the Seattle Seahawks in the same game.

**BACK ON CAMPUS**

Four former players are on the University of Iowa football staff in 2019. Brian Ferentz, a three-year letterman from 2003-05, completed his eighth year on staff, his third as offensive coordinator.

LeVar Woods, a three-year letterman from 1998-2000, completed his 12th year on the Iowa staff. Woods was named Special Teams Coordinator in 2017. He coached tight ends from 2015-17 and linebackers from 2012-14. He rejoined the program as an administrative assistant in 2008.

Kelvin Bell joined the Iowa program as a defensive lineman in 2000, but had his career cut short due to injury. He returned to the program as a graduate assistant and served as director of on-campus recruiting from 2012-13. He was named recruiting coordinator and defensive assistant coach in February, 2016, and was named defensive line coach in 2019.

Broderick Binns, a four-year letterman from 2008-11, was named director of player development in April, 2016. Binns previously served as a graduate assistant in 2014 and 2015, working with Hawkeye special teams.

**HAWKEYE LEGACIES**

Iowa had seven players on its 2019 roster whose father played for the Hawkeyes: TE Drew Cook (Marv, 1985-88), DL A.J. Epenesa (Epenesa, 1997), DE Joe Evans (Spence, 1989), DB Thomas Hartlieb (Jim, 1989-92), WR Henry Marchese (John, 1985), DE Nathan Nelson (Jeff, 1990-92), and QB Ryan Schmidt (Rick, 1984-85).

Iowa has two sets of the brothers on the team: OL Landan Paulsen and OL Levi Paulsen, and TE Bryce Schulte and WR Quinn Schulte.

Iowa has three players whose brothers played at Iowa: LB Nick Niemann (Ben in 2014-17), FB Johnny Plewa (Macon in 2013-15), and DL Brady Reiff (Riley in 2008-11).

LS Austin Spiewak is the grandson of Gary Grouwinkel, who played for Iowa in the 1957 and 1959 Rose Bowl games.

LB Dillon Doyle is the son of head strength and conditioning coach Chris Doyle.

**SEEING DOUBLE**

Senior offensive linemen Landan and Levi Paulsen started Weeks 1-4, becoming the first set of twin brothers to start for the Hawkeyes since SS Kent Ellis and CB Kevin Ellis in 1980. The last brothers to start in the same game for the Hawkeyes were James and LeShun Daniels. James was Iowa's starting center in the 2016 season opener against Miami (Ohio), and LeShun was Iowa's starting running back.

The Paulsens are the sixth set of twins to play football at the University of Iowa. The offensive linemen from Woodbury High School in Northwest Iowa join the company of Leo and Lloyd Jensvold (1929-30), Harold and Herbert Shoener (1946-47), Kent and Kevin Ellis (1977-80), Aaron and Evan Kooiker (1992), and Shane and Shaun Prater (2008).

IOWA PROGRAM NOTES

- Only eight schools have won more games than the Hawkeyes (47) since 2015. They include Clemson (68), Alabama (66), Ohio State (60), Oklahoma (57), Georgia (54), Wisconsin (52), Penn State (51), and LSU (50).
- Iowa had 47 wins from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in school history.
- The Hawkeyes earned bowl eligibility in 18 of the last 19 seasons. Iowa is 9-8 in bowl games since 2001. Only Ohio State (9) has more bowl wins among Big Ten teams since 2001. The Hawkeyes are 17-15-1 in 33 bowl games. Iowa has won five January bowl games under Ferentz.
- Iowa is the only school to have two head football coaches since 1979. Hayden Fry took over prior to the 1979 season and coached through the 1998 season, posting a record of 143-89-6. Current coach Kirk Ferentz (156-102) replaced Fry and just completed his 21st season in 2019. Ferentz also served as Iowa's offensive line coach from 1981-89 under Fry.
- Iowa played in the Big Ten title game for the first time in program history on Dec. 5, 2015. Iowa earned Big Ten Conference championships in 2002 and 2004 and placed second in 2009. Iowa (8-0, 2002; 8-0, 2015) is one of three Big Ten teams to post a perfect mark in conference play since 1998 (BCS era), joining Michigan State (1) and Ohio State (5).
- Iowa has ranked in the top 10 in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today coaches polls five times since 2002, including a ranking of seventh in both polls at the conclusion of the 2009 season. Iowa ranked eighth in 2002, 2003 and 2004. The Hawkeyes finished 2015 ranked ninth in the AP poll and 10th in the USA Today Coaches Poll. In the Big Ten, only Ohio State has more top 10 finishes since 2002.
- Since 1936 when the first AP poll was released, Iowa has appeared in the poll 334 times, the fifth highest total in the Big Ten (Ohio State, Michigan, Wisconsin, and MSU). Iowa has been the top-ranked team in the country 11 times.
- Iowa set a school record with 12 wins in 2015. The Hawkeyes won 11 games in 2002 (11-2), and 2009 (11-2). In 2009, Iowa started 9-0 and won 10 regular season games for just the fourth time in school history.
- Iowa won 10 or more games in three consecutive years (2002-04) for the first time in school history.
- Kirk Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015) and was named National Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2015. Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year honors. Iowa's Hayden Fry and Penn State's Joe Paterno both won the award three times.
- Iowa has had 10 individual national award winners under head coach Kirk Ferentz. They include Brad Banks (2002 Davey O'Brien, Top Quarterback; 2002 Associated Press National Player of the Year); Dallas Clark (2002 Mackey, Top Tight End); Nate Kaeding (2002 Groza, Top Kicker); Robert Gallery (2003 Outland, Top Lineman); Shonn Greene (2008 Doak Walker, Top Running Back); Brandon Scherff (2014 Outland, Top Lineman), Desmond King (2015 Jim Thorpe), Josey Jewell (2017 Lott IMPACT), T.J. Hockenson (2018, Mackey, Top Tight End).

Iowa (1-0) defeated Miami, Ohio (0-1), 38-14 on Saturday at Kinnick Stadium

#### INDIVIDUAL NOTES

QB Nate Stanley threw 3 touchdowns to raise his career total to 55, 1 behind Ricky Stanzi (56) for third all-time in program history. He has 15 career multi-touchdown games.

QB Nate Stanley had 252 yards passing, raising his career total to 5,603 and passing C.J. Beathard for eighth all-time in school history.

LG Landan Paulsen and RG Levi Paulsen became the first set of twin brothers to start for the Hawkeyes since SS Kent Ellis and CB Kevin Ellis in 1980. The last brothers to start in the same game for the Hawkeyes were James and LeShun Daniels. James was Iowa's starting center in the 2016 season opener against Miami (Ohio), and LeShun was Iowa's starting running back.

K Keith Duncan scored 8 points (1 FG, 5 PAT). Duncan had not played in game since January 1, 2017 at the Outback Bowl.

WR Oliver Martin made his Hawkeye debut and caught a 9-yard touchdown. Martin had one receiving touchdown for Michigan in 2018.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

Iowa is 97-32-2 (.740) in season-opening games, including a 18-3 mark under coach Kirk Ferentz. The Hawkeyes have won six straight season openers and are 18-1 since 2001. Iowa has won nine straight nonconference games over the last two seasons.

Iowa opened the season under the lights at Kinnick Stadium for the first time in program history. Iowa has hosted 19 night games in Kinnick Stadium's history, holding a 13-6 record in those contests.

Miami won the toss and elected to defer. The Hawkeyes have played 254 games under head coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has opened the game on offense 190 times (117-73). The Hawkeyes have opened the game on defense 64 times (36-28).

Ten different Hawkeyes had at least one reception. Including career firsts from TE Sean Beyer, WR Oliver Martin (first as a Hawkeye), and RB Tyler Goodson.

Saturday's game is the second event in the 16th annual Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk series. Iowa leads the 2019-20 Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Series, 5-0 with wins in soccer and football.

#### INDIVIDUAL NOTES

QB Nate Stanley totaled 222 yards of offense, raising his career total to 5,979, seventh most in school history. He passed James Vandenberg (5,853) and Matt Sherman (5,948) in today's game.

K Keith Duncan set a career high with four field goals (25, 40, 42, 39). His 39-yard field goal with 4:51 left in the fourth quarter proved to be the game winner. He is 8-8 on field goal attempts this season, and 4-4 on attempts 40 yards or longer.

P Michael Sleep-Dalton averaged 47.2 yards on five punts. He had punts of 50 and 51 yards.

### IOWA NOTES

Iowa is bowl eligible for the 18th time in the last 19 seasons.

Kirk Ferentz has 94 Big Ten Conference wins, one shy of tying Joe Paterno for No. 5 all-time in conference history.

Iowa has four shutouts in its last 11 Big Ten Conference games (Rutgers and Northwestern in 2019, Maryland and Illinois in 2018). No other Big Ten team has more than one shutout since the start of 2018.

QB Nate Stanley's 50-yard touchdown pass to WR Tyrone Tracy in the first quarter was the 62nd touchdown pass of his career, No. 2 all-time in program history (Chuck Long, 74). Stanley entered the game tied with QB Drew Tate (61) on the all-time list.

WR Tyrone Tracy's 50-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter was his longest career reception, and second career touchdown. The play was Iowa's third longest of the season (Smith-Marsette 58-yard touchdown reception vs. Rutgers; Toren Young 52-yard rush against Middle Tennessee State).

DE Chauncey Golston recorded an interception (3 yards) in the first quarter, his second career interception (2019 Outback Bowl).

QB Nate Stanley made his 34th consecutive start, the second longest streak by a Hawkeye QB in program history (Long, 47).

RB Mekhi Sargent's 1-yard rushing touchdown in the third quarter was his fourth rushing touchdown of the year, and Iowa's 10th of the season. Among Iowa's 10 rushing scores, five have been from the 1-yard line, each by a different Hawkeye (QB Nate Stanley, FB Brady Ross, QB Spencer Petras, RB Tyler Goodson, Sargent).

DB Dane Belton made his first career start and recorded five tackles. He is the 25th true freshman in the Ferentz era to start.

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette's 7-yard reception in the first quarter put him over 1,000 career receiving yards. He is the 42nd player in program history to reach 1,000 yards receiving. He has 71 career receptions for 1,011 yards.

TE Sam LaPorta's 41-yard reception in the second quarter was his first career reception.

WR Tyrone Tracy caught 2 passes for a career-high 88 yards.

K Keith Duncan connected on two field goals today (40, 28). He missed from 46 yards. Duncan is 11-13 on field goal tries of 40-yards or more this season. He has 19 made field goals this season, the most since Daniel Murray had 19 in 2009, and tied for the fifth most in single-season history.

## IOWA NOTES

### INDIVIDUAL NOTES

K Keith Duncan connected on three field goals today (24, 40, 39). He has 22 made field goals this season, a new single-season school record. The record of 21 was previously shared by Rob Houghtlin (1987), Nate Kaeding (2002), and Kyle Schlicher (2004). Duncan is 22-25 on field attempts this season, and 12-14 on field goal tries of 40-yards. Duncan has 29 career made field goals, tying Miguel Recinos for eighth all-time.

WR Tyrone Tracy's 75-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter was Iowa's longest play of the season, the longest reception of Tracy's career, and ties for the longest pass of QB Nate Stanley's career (Nick Easley, 2019 Outback Bowl).

WR Tyrone Tracy set career highs in receptions (5) and receiving yard (130). It is his first career 100-yard receiving game, and the most receiving yards by a Hawkeye since Jake Duzey had 6 receptions for 138 yards against Ohio State in 2013. It is the most receiving yards by a Hawkeye wide receiver since Marvin McNutt had 8 receptions for 130 yards against Michigan State in 2011.

QB Nate Stanley threw for 208 yards, raising his career total to 7,509 and passing Ricky Stanzi (7,377) for third all-time in program history. Stanly had 205 yards total offense, raising his career total to 7,377 and passing Stanzi (7,373) for third all-time in program history.

QB Nate Stanley threw two touchdowns today (3, 75). He has 64 career touchdown passes in his career, No. 2 all-time in program history (Chuck Long, 74). Stanley has 18 career multi-touchdown games, including four this season. Stanley made his 35th consecutive start, the second longest streak by a Hawkeye QB in program history (Long, 47).

Two true freshmen made their first career starts. TE Sam LaPorta is the first true freshman in the Ferentz era to start at tight end, and LB Jack Campbell is the fourth true freshman in the Ferentz era to start at linebacker (James Morris, 2010; A.J. Edds, 2006; Fred Barr, 1999). Since 1999, 27 true freshmen have started for the Hawkeyes.

LB Barrington Wade made his first career start.

CB Matt Hankins' interception in the fourth quarter was the first of his career, and Iowa's seventh of the season. Hankins had a game-high eight tackles.

WR Nico Ragaini caught a 3-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter, the first touchdown of his career.

DE A.J. Epenesa had 2.5 of Iowa's season-high six sacks. It is the most sacks by a Hawkeye defense since 2013 (Northwestern).

K Keith Duncan connected on one field goal today (27). He has 23 made field goals this season, a single-season school record. Duncan is 23-26 on field attempts this season, and 12-14 on field goal tries of 40-yards. Duncan has 32 career made field goals, tying Daniel Murray for seventh all-time.

QB Nate Stanley threw two touchdowns today (21, 5). He has 66 career touchdown passes in his career, No. 2 all-time in program history (Chuck Long, 74). Stanley has 19 career multi-touchdown games, including five this season. Stanley made his 36th consecutive start, the second longest streak by a Hawkeye QB in program history (Long, 47).

RB Tyler Goodson made his first career start. He is the fourth true freshman to start this season, and the 28th true freshman to start under Ferentz. He is the fifth true freshman running back to start in the Ferentz era, and the first since Greg Garmon in 2012 (Goodson 2015, Garmon 2012, Canzeri 2011, Coker 2010, Wegher (2009).

RB Tyler Goodson's 10-yard touchdown rush in the first quarter was his first career touchdown.

WR Tyrone Tracy had a career-high six receptions for 77 yards. He has 16 receptions for 323 yards the last four games. He had 12 receptions for 190 yards in the first six games.

Iowa's defense held Minnesota to a season-low 19 points. The Gophers had scored at least 31 points in eight straight games.

The Hawkeyes played their third trophy game of the season (2-1). Iowa defended the Cy-Hawk Trophy with an 18-17 win at Iowa State on Sept. 14, lost at Wisconsin 24-22 on Nov. 9, and defeated Minnesota, 23-19, today. The Hawkeyes are 15-4 in their last 19 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin), with all four losses coming to Wisconsin.

Nov. 16, 2019 marks the 130th anniversary of Iowa football. The Hawkeyes played their first football game on Nov. 16, 1889, against Grinnell. Iowa has played 1,256 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 657-560-39 (.539).

Kirk Ferentz has 96 Big Ten Conference wins, tying Hayden Fry for No. 4 all-time in conference history.

The win was Iowa's eighth of the season. Iowa has five straight seasons with at least eight wins, its longest such stretch since 1981-87. Iowa has 12 seasons with eight or more wins since 1999.

### INDIVIDUAL NOTES

K Keith Duncan connected on four field goals today (23, 45, 24, 29) to break the Big Ten single-season record. The four made field goals ties a career high (Iowa State, Purdue). He has 27 made field goals this season, a single-season school record. His six field goal attempts today are a career best. Duncan is 23-26 on field attempts this season, and 12-14 on field goal tries of 40-yards. Duncan has 36 career made field goals, sixth all-time.

LB Kristian Welch had a team and career-high 12 tackles. Ten of the tackles were solo stops. His 12th tackle was a sack on the final play of the game. Welch has led Iowa in tackles six times this season.

QB Nate Stanley recorded his fifth career 300-yard passing game. He finished 18-35 for 308 yards. Eight of Stanley's 18 completions were 20-yards or more, including all four completions to WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette. Stanley's first five completions were at least 18 yards.

SS Geno Stone's sack in the second quarter was the first of his career. Stone is the only Hawkeye this season to have at least one sack, one interception, one pass breakup, on forced fumble, and one recovered fumble.

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette had a career-high 121 receiving yards on four receptions. It is his second career 100-yard receiving game, and second this season (Rutgers, 113).

DB Michael Ojemudia and DB Matt Hankins recorded interceptions for Iowa. It is the second multi-interception game for Iowa this season (Rutgers, 2). Ojemudia matched his career-high with eight tackles.

### MISCELLANEOUS

Iowa had three takeaways. Illinois had one. It is the first time this season the Illini had fewer than two takeaways in a game.

Kirk Ferentz has 97 Big Ten Conference wins, passing Hayden Fry (96) for fourth all-time in conference history.

Kirk Ferentz has 161 wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference, fifth all-time and one win from tying Joe Paterno (162) for fourth all-time.

K Keith Duncan connected on a 48-yard field goal with one second remaining to break a 24-24 tie and give Iowa a 27-24 win. It was Duncan's second of two field goals made today (49, 48). He has 29 made field goals this season, a single-season school record, a Big Ten record, and tied for the sixth most in NCAA single-season history.

K Keith Duncan's game-winning field goal was the third fourth-quarter winning field goal of his career. He kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired to defeat Michigan in 2016, and made a 39-yard field goal with 4:51 left in the fourth quarter to defeat Iowa State, 18-17, in 2019.

DE A.J. Epenesa set career highs in tackles (14) and tackles-for-loss (4.5-22 yards). He added two sacks (12 yards).

FS Jack Koerner (11) and LB Kristian Welch (10) had double-digit tackle games. Koerner recorded his first career interception (20 yard return) to thwart Nebraska's final drive of the first half. Welch has 33 tackles in his last three games.

QB Nate Stanley passed for 99 yards today, raising his career total to 8,089. He is the third player in program history to pass for 8,000 or more yards (Chuck Long 10,461; Drew Tate 8,292).

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette's 45-yard touchdown rush in the first quarter was a career-long. The rush put Smith-Marsette over 2,500 career all-purpose yards. He is the 20th player in program history to reach that total. Smith-Marsette has 2,631 all-purpose yards, 20th all-time.

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette's 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown ties for the ninth longest in school history. It is the first kickoff returned for a touchdown by the Hawkeyes since Jordan Cotton returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Penn State in 2012.

RB Tyler Goodson rushed 13 times for a career-high 116 yards and a touchdown. It is his first career 100-yard game. His 55-yard touchdown rush in the first quarter was the longest of his career and the longest rushing touchdown by Iowa this season, and the longest by a Hawkeye since Akrum Wadley in 2016 (75 yards vs. Nebraska).

RB Tyler Goodson is Iowa's leading rusher this season (590 yards). No true freshman has ever led the team in single-season rushing yards. The last redshirt freshman to lead Iowa in single-season rushing yards was Ladell Betts in 1998 (679 yards).

## IOWA NOTES

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette (offense) and DE A.J. Epenesa (defense) were named Most Valuable Players of the 2019 Holiday Bowl.

Iowa's 49 points scored are the second most scored in a bowl game in school history (55 vs. Texas in 1984 Freedom Bowl).

Iowa won its third straight bowl game, tying its longest such streak in program history (2009 Outback, 2010 Orange, 2010 Insight).

Kirk Ferentz is 9-8 all-time in bowl games. The bowl win was the ninth for Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz, tying him for second place in Big Ten Conference history (Barry Alvarez). Joe Paterno of Penn State has 10.

Iowa recorded its sixth 10-win season since 1999. The Hawkeyes have 47 wins over the last five years, the most of any five-year period in program history.

WR Smith-Marsette's 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the second quarter tied a Holiday Bowl record and is the seventh-longest kickoff return in school history. He is the first player in program history to return two kickoffs for touchdowns in a single season (Nebraska, 95 yards).

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette is the second Hawkeye in program history to score a touchdown via rush, reception, and kickoff return, in a single game.

DE A.J. Epenesa tied an Iowa bowl record and matched his career high with 2.5 sacks today (Babineaux 2005 Capital One; Hodge 2005 Capital One), and raised his season total to 11.5, the most by any Hawkeye since Adrian Clayborn had 11.5 in 2009.

QB Nate Stanley passed for 213 yards today, raising his season total to 2,951, a new single-season career high and the sixth best single-season total in school history. Stanley finished his career with 8,302 passing yards, second all-time in program history (Chuck Long 10,461).

QB Nate Stanley started his third bowl game (3-0) and became the second quarterback in school history to win three bowl games (Ricky Stanzi, 3-0).

K Keith Duncan scored seven points today, raising his season total to 119, third all-time in single-season program history. Duncan made 29 field goals this season, a single-season school record, a Big Ten record, and tied for the sixth most in NCAA single-season history.

RB Tyler Goodson rushed for 48 yards and one touchdown today. He finished the season as Iowa's leading rusher (638 yards). He is the first true freshman to ever lead the team in single-season rushing yards.
