Season Preview

The University of Iowa's women's golf team is evenly split among classes after competing with no seniors last season. The team is made up of two seniors. three juniors, two sophomores and one freshman. Everyone's contributions will be crucial to having a successful season

In her first season as Iowa's head women's golf coach, Kelly Crawford is quickly getting to know her team as her players are getting to know her. She has already taken note of the chemistry the 2006-07 Hawkeye squad possesses.

"Underclassmen always look up to the seniors. even from a non golf standpoint. They help freshmen find their classes," Crawford said.

The Hawkeyes improved from fall to spring last year, and Coach Crawford hopes that streak continues this season

"I think I have higher expectations than the girls have seen in the past. We need to get out and get it done," said Crawford. "A combination of effort, commitment and desire will drive the 2006-07 squad to be strong competitors in the Big 10."

Three of the top 25 teams are in the Big Ten Conference and Coach Crawford sees no reason why Iowa cannot be top contenders. Some of the team's goals are to improve from last year, move up in Big Ten rankings, lower the team scoring average and make it to Central Regionals.

Coach Crawford hopes the two seniors, Karla Murra and Amy Riepma, leave the program in better condition than when they started.

Murra's best finish was at the Illini Spring Challenge, where she placed eighth. Her low round of 72 came in the fall at the Legends of Golf Shootout. The native of Sioux Falls, SD, tied for 19th at the Big Ten Championships.

Riepma, a native of Clear Lake, IA, recorded three top ten finishes throughout the season and marked her name in the Iowa record books four times. At the Big Ten Championships, Riepma led the team, tying for 15th while registering her name for top individual performances for 36, 54 and 72-holes.

Juniors Jill Marcum, Melanie Boyles and Maggie Gelber return as upperclassmen for the Hawkeyes. Marcum ranked second on Iowa's overall averages last season, with 77.4. The Clarinda, IA, native finished in the top ten in three tournaments, with a season-best fifth-place finish at the Illini Spring Challenge.

Boyles, Iowa's second junior, started the season off strong with a second place finish at the Hawkeye Intercollegiate. The native of Tempe, AZ, posted an

80.3 scoring average.

Gelber, a native of Winnetka, IL, tied for eighth at the Hawkeye Intercollegiate, posting a season low round of 76. At the Illini Spring Challenge Gelber tied for 19th, also tying her season low round.

Crawford said the underclassmen's contributions will be significant to build a core as Iowa becomes stronger competitors in the Big Ten.

"The underclassmen's contributions will be crucial from a recruiting standpoint because the next couple of classes will be huge," said Crawford. "This includes returning sophomores Tyrette Metzendorf and Becky Quinby."

Metzendorf excelled in her first collegiate competition, finishing first at the Hawkeye Intercollegiate. The Winter Haven, FL, native led the team with an average of 76.4. She finished in the top ten in three tournaments and holds Iowa's all-time record for individual performances for 36-holes, achieved at the Legends of Golf Shootout last fall.

Quinby competed in four tournaments for the Hawkeyes. The native of Plymouth, MN, tied for 19th at the Hawkeye Intercollegiate, carding 244.

One newcomer was added to the squad, Alison Cavanaugh. Cavanaugh hails from Littleton, CO, and can benefit Coach Crawford's goal of building a strong core of younger players.

Her 2005 UCI team finished 18th in the national championship. UCI teams under her direction won nine regular season tournament championships.

In her final season coaching UCI, the Anteaters won three tournaments, including the Big West Championships. Three student-athletes earned first team laurels, while two garnered second team accolades. Crawford was named Big West Coach of the Year and senior Selanee Henderson was honored as Player of the Year.

Crawford, a two-time Big West Conference Coach of the Year honoree (2002 and 2006), had numerous UCI student-athletes named to all-Big West and NCAA post-season teams, conference player of the year and NCAA freshman of the year athletic honors and conference and national academic honors. Crawford coached eight Anteaters to all-league accolades, including two to Big West Player of the Year laurels.

After a slow start to the fall season, the Iowa Hawkeyes followed with a remarkable spring. The team finished in the top five in four of its ten tournaments.

FALL

Although Iowa's squad was young, with no returning seniors, the Hawkeyes were able to etch their names in the record books 13 times. The squad opened the season with a first place finish at the Hawkeye Intercollegiate.

Iowa's victory at the Hawkeye Intercollegiate marked its only first place finish for the year. Freshman Tyrette Metzendorf placed first in her first collegiate appearance, carding 220 over 54-holes. Sophomore Melanie Boyles finished second and junior Amy Riepma rounded out the top three. Junior Karla Murra had her season best finish, 15th.

In their second tournament, the Hawkeyes struggled, finishing 12th at the Mary Fossum Invite. Sophomore Jill Marcum led Iowa, tied for 26th.

2005-06 Season Review

At the opening tournament of the spring season, the East/West Rio Verde Invitational, the squad finished sixth, carding 928 over 54-holes. Metzendorf had her best spring finish, tying for seventh, with a 225. Iowa excelled at the 19-team Pinehurst Challenge with a fourth place finish. Riepma led the Hawkeyes, carding 230, for tenth place. Marcum finished 12th and Metzendorf finished 14th.

In their third spring tournament, the Hawkeyes tied for fourth place at the BYU Dixie Classic in St. George, Utah. Iowa carded 948 over 54-holes. Marcum finished tied for seventh, carding 14-over par, 230. Murra finished 19th, while Metzendorf continued to shine as she finished tied for 23rd in the 101-player field.

Following their fourth place finish, the Hawkeyes had another impressive showing at their fourth and final tournament before the Big Ten Championships. At the 36-hole Illini Spring Challenge, Iowa finished third. Marcum was in first after the first

A week later, Iowa finished 10th at the Lady Northern Invitational held in Bloomington, IN. The tournament was highlighted by Iowa's season best 18-hole score of 300. Marcum finished 23rd with a low-round 72 and Riepma followed tied for 29th.

Following the Lady Northern, the Hawkeyes placed 11th in the Legends of Golf Shootout. Metzendorf led Iowa, firing a five-over par, 221, to tie for ninth. It was the second time in four tournaments Metzendorf finished in the top ten.

The Hawkeyes' best fall score came in their last competition, the 16-team Lady Razorback Invitational. Iowa carded a season-low 917, for 54-hole tournaments, which placed them eighth on Iowa's all-time team performance. The team's seventh place finish was its best since the Hawkeye Intercollegiate. Riepma led the Hawkeyes in 10th place and Metzendorf finished 12th.

Iowa came to life in the spring, finishing in the top ten in all five tournaments. The Hawkeyes etched their names in the record books with four top team achievements, all attained at the Big Ten Championships. round of play with one-over par, but finished fifth, carding 150 (+6). Murra continued to do well as she finished eighth, carding eight-over par, 152.

To top off a stellar spring season, the 2006 Iowa team made its mark with a school best score at the Big Ten Championships. With a score of 1,223 the Hawkeyes rank first on team performances for 72 holes. The team carded a season low round of 300 for the second time in the season. Their eighth place finish was led by Riepma, who tied for 15th, and Murra, who tied for 19th. Metzendorf followed, tied for 23rd. The team's score also placed the squad in the record books for top team performances for 18 holes, top team performance for 36 holes and top team performance for 54 holes.

Finkbine Golf Course

FINKBINE GOLF COURSE

Home of Hawkeye Golf

Located on the western edge of The University of Iowa campus, just walking distance from Kinnick Stadium and Carver-Hawkeye Arena, is Finkbine Golf Course. It is the full-time practice and competition site for the Iowa women's and men's golf teams.

The course was renovated in the fall of 2003, with the addition of bent grass fairways and parking lot improvements.

The par-73 layout is prized by the University and Iowa City golfing community. Finkbine was the site of the Amana VIP Pro-Am for more than 20-years, and in 1991 became the site of the Ben Hogan Hawkeye Open. As well, Finkbine was also the site of the 1993 and 2003 Big Ten Women's Golf Championship, and served as the 2002 men's league championship.

The course usually opens to the public in early April and remains playable well into November.

The University maintains Finkbine's lush tees, fairways and greens with its totally automated irrigation system. The system features dual row piping, which not only streamlines the irrigation to the center of the fairways, but supplies water to the outlying areas, as well as to much of the rough.

Indoor practice equipment available to the UI women's golf team in the UI Fieldhouse includes hitting nets and an artifical putting area, a large-screen television for videotaped practices and lessons, and a digital camera/computer system.

Finkbine challenges a golfer virtually every time she addresses the ball. Seventeen holes have bunkers that come into play, and the lone hole that does not, the par-three 13th hole, is surrounded by water. Tee-to-green distance can vary from 5.800 to 6.500 yards.

Gary Fethke Interim President

Interim President Gary Fethke is the former dean of The University of Iowa Henry B. Tippie College of Business and the Leonard A. Hadley Professor of Leadership. A professor of management sciences and economics, he received both his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees

in economics from The University of Iowa.

He was appointed dean in 1994 after serving one year as interim dean. From 1988 to 1993 Dean Fethke served as the senior associate dean of academic affairs in the Tippie College of Business, and before that he served as chairman of the department of management sciences.

In the years between receiving his Ph.D. at Iowa and returning to the College as a faculty member, he served on the faculty at Bradley University (1968-74). In addition, he taught at the London School of Economics for one year (1981-82) and several summers (1984, '86, '88 and '90). He has published numerous articles in the areas of industrial organization, macroeconomics, and labor economics. His recent research interest focuses on the economics of public higher education.

Dean Fethke spearheaded the expansion of the Evening and Executive MBA Programs. The Evening MBA is currently being offered in Cedar Rapids, Newton, Des Moines, and the Quad Cities. The Executive MBA Program is now available both on campus and in other Iowa cities, as needed, and internationally, in Hong Kong and Beijing, China. A dual degree (MBA-Master's in Systems Engineering) EMBA Program has been taught in Cedar Rapids. During his tenure as dean, the undergraduate program of the College raised the academic profile of entering students and began an early admissions program to admit outstanding high school students directly into the Tippie College in their first year on campus.

Fethke headed the planning and coordination of construction for the John Pappajohn Business Building and the Pomerantz Center on The University of Iowa campus, the UI-Cedar Rapids Area Conference and Education Center in Cedar Rapids, and the MBA facilities at the Des Moines W. A. Krause Center and the Newton Polytechnic Campus.

In his role as dean, Fethke was responsible for coordinating the fundraising endeavors of the College with UI Foundation staff. These efforts led to the development of the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center in 1996, the Hawkinson Institute of Business Finance in 1998, the naming of the Henry B. Tippie College of Business in 1999, and a major commitment from Jerre and Mary Joy Stead in 2003. The Tippie College of Business raised \$125 million in the recent University campaign.

His wife, Carol, is a faculty member of the economics and marketing departments at The University of Iowa. They have two grown sons.

Hawkeye Administration

Gary Barta Director of Athletics

Gary Barta became the University of Iowa's 11th Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on August 1, 2006. His selection was announced on June 23, 2006.

A native Midwesterner, Barta signed a five-year

athletic programs in the nation. His wife Connie is a native of Waterloo. IA.

Barta has 19 years of university and athletic administration experience. Before accepting the Iowa position he had been the Wyoming AD since October of 2003. From November 1996 to October 2003, he was senior associate athletic director for external relations and sports programs at the University of Washington in Seattle. From 1990 to 1996, he was associated with the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls, where he was director of athletic development and external relations. He also served as associate director of development at North Dakota State University in Fargo, from 1988-90, where he was responsible for fund raising for athletics, the colleges of business and engineering, and the University's annual fund.

Wyoming received the NCAA Division I-A Program of Excellence Award earlier this year, which honors athletics programs that are superior athletically, academically, and in student-athlete life skill preparation.

The Barta led program at Wyoming was credited with a number of significant accomplishments. The Cowboys played in the 2004 Las Vegas Bowl and posted a victory over UCLA. The women's basketball team won 21 games during the 2005-06 season, a top 20 placing by the women's track team in the NCAA championships in 2005; and a top 25 finish in men's NCAA swimming in 2004. During his three-year tenure, seven Wyoming coaches won Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year awards.

The new Iowa Athletics Director has been a successful fund raiser, having helped secure more than \$150 million in private contributions and corporate sponsorships over the past 10 years

Prior to taking over at Wyoming, he served as Washington's Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Relations and Sports Programs. He was responsible for generating revenue to fund Washington's \$40 million annual intercollegiate athletics budget. While at Washington, Barta was directly involved in a variety of duties including: hiring of coaches and administrative staff; coordinating the schedule for men's basketball; initiating and managing sponsorship relationships and negotiating radio network contracts.

Barta earned his Bachelor of Science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State University in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championships in 1983, 1985 and 1986. He returned to NDSU to begin his career in 1988 as an associate director of development and later director of development

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (8) and a daughter, Madison (6). He was born Sept. 4, 1963 in Minneapolis, MN.

A Total Program

The University of Iowa Athletic Department, under the direction of Athletic Director Bob Bowlsby for the past 14 years. is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate

The men's and women's departments, operating separately for over 25 years, merged in 2001 under Bowlsby's direction It combined nationally recognized programs for both genders into one successful and progressive athletic unit.

Combining their successes on the playing fields with continued success and recognition in the classroom, UI studentathletes practice and perform in some of the best facilities in the nation, while knowing the support of their efforts and attendance by Hawkeye fans ranks among the best in the country

While the Hawkeyes continue to compete with the best in the nation in a variety of sports, Iowa continues to boast some of the most impressive athletic facilities in the nation, operated by one of the most respected departments

Several new projects are underway on the Iowa campus. Some of the latest additions to the UI campus are the Roy G. Karro Athletics Hall of Fame and Visitors Center and the Russell and Ann Gerdin Athletic Learning Center.

Kinnick Stadium received a major upgrading and renovation that was completed just prior to the 2006 season. The \$90 million project includes the replacing of the south end zone stands and building a four-level press box that will house 47 guest suites, along with new scoreboards, video walls, cocession stands and restrooms

Additional priorities for the Iowa program include the establishment and development of endowments for all sports programs, the continued enhancement of graduation rates, and the implementation of a long-range plan to ensure Iowa's financial, academic and competitive future. As an example, all of Iowa's 13 scholarships for

Kinnick Stadium completed a \$90million renovation this past summer.

men's basketball are fully endowed.

The graduation rate of Iowa's studentathletes has improved in each of the past 10 years and has consistently ranked above the graduation rate of all UI students. Hawkeve athletes have garnered more than 70 academic All-America honors since 1992. The 2005-06 school-year saw the University of Iowa produce 138 academic all-Big Ten

Iowa athletes have been recognized as all-Americans in their sport on 207 occasions during the past 15 years.

Iowa's athletic teams during the 2005-06 athletic year continued its trend of success, on the playing fields and in academic pursuits.

The Hawkeye football team enjoyed another good year on the gridiron, going 7-5 and making it's fourth-consecutive January bowl game when it was selected to play the Florida Gators in the Outback Bowl.

Iowa followed its 11-2 mark of 2002 with a 10-3 record in 2003 and a 10-2 mark in 2004, finishing each of those seasons ranked eighth nationally.

Iowa's men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to post-season play in each of the last six seasons. The men's

squad finished with a 25-9 record and won the Big Ten Tournament. They earned a No 3 seed in the 2006 NCAA tournament

The women's team advanced to the NCAA tournament for the 16th time

The Iowa wrestling squad will be under new leadership this season as former Hawkeve three-time NCAA Champion and Olympic Gold Medalist Tom Brands returns to his alma mater as head coach. He will be joined on his staff by the legendary Dan Gable, who led Iowa to 15 NCAA titles and 21 Big Ten Championships in his 21 seasons as head

Iowa's men's and women's and gymnastics teams continue to rank among the best in the nation. The men's team again advanced to the NCAA Championships and the women's gymnastics squad has been in the NCAA meet two of the last four years.

The Hawkeye men's cross country team advanced to the NCAA Championships for the second-consecutive year in the fall of 2004, while sophomore Kineke Alexander won the NCAA Championship in the women's indoor 400-meters.

Iowa's women's softball team advanced to NCAA regional action for the 11th time in 13 seasons. Iowa has advanced to the softball World Series on four occasions ove the past 12 seasons and Coach Gayle Blevins is one of three coaches to reach 1,000 career victories.

From the rankings on the courts and playing fields, to the rankings in the class room, to the rankings in fan and community support, to the ranking as a program that boasts some of the best athletic facilities in the nation, it's easy to understand why Iowa fans everywhere truly believe, "It's great to be a Hawkeye.'

Retention

A full-time staff member directs the retention program, which identifies stu-

fulfilling life is an ongoing process of expanding and narrowing choices, beginning when student-athletes arrive on campus and continuing throughout their college career and lifetime. The professional staff works with other career development professionals

on campus to offer individual consultation, career development seminars, workshops, referrals to other campus offices and special events like the Senior Recognition Banquet for graduating student-athletes.

dent-athletes who may need tailored academic assistance and structure, and implements individualized learning plans to help them succeed. Such plans may include daily and weekly

planning sessions with athletics coordinators and retention staff, tutoring, study groups, mainstreaming into on-campus services like the writing center, math labs and services for students with learning disabilities.

Transition Seminar

All new student-athletes attend an eight-week transition seminar during the fall semester that is geared toward helping them make the transition from high school to college successfully. Seminar topics include time management skills, learning and study strategies, the culture and rules of the university, and life skills concerning alcohol and other substances, relationships and intimacy, diversity, tolerance, values and character.

Minority Enrichment Program

This program offers a culturally supportive environment in which minority student-athletes have the opportunity to develop friendships and a support network in the university. A core focus group of students and staff coordinate programs such as guest speakers, holiday celebrations, community service activities with the local neighborhood centers, events with Cultural Centers and networking with minority faculty, staff, professional and business leaders.

Compare the Numbers

Iowa's student-athletes have outperformed the University's entire student population each year since the NCAA started requiring a report of student-athlete graduation rates.

Sports Medicine and Athletic Training

Strength and Conditioning

The University of Iowa has two 2,000-square-foot facilities for strength and conditioning training of Olympic sport athletes. One facility is located in Carver-Hawkeye Arena and the other is located in the Recreation Building. Each facility has eight squat racks, eight Olympic platforms, multiple physio- and medicine balls, padded plyometric boxes and over 10,000 pounds of free weights. Iowa Strength and Conditioning staff Bill Maxwell, David Marmon and Damon Davis oversee the programs.

The major goals of the University of Iowa strength and conditioning program are the enhancement of athletic performance while reducing the risk of injury through a progression of free weight, multi-joint exercises. Those goals are achieved through Olympic lifts, squats, plyometrics, medicine ball and physioball exercises. These multi-joint movements improve synchronization of movement, intramuscular coordination and stabilizer muscle groups.

Carver-Hawkeye Arena Weight Room

Athletic Training

Continuing to set the standard in Sports Medicine Service, The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most upto-date and highest-quality medical care available.

Services from the UI Hospitals and Clinics, among the world's largest university-owned teaching hospitals, support the efforts of a dedicated sports medicine staff. Located next to Kinnick Stadium, the hospital creates a cutting-edge environment where staff physicians, interns, and residents can care for student-athletes with successful outcomes. Dedicated research and education result in outstanding

Athletic Training Services connect student-athletes to the various resources and specialty areas. Iowa's staff of 10 full-time athletic trainers are committed to providing quality health care, injury rehabilitation programs, and prevention programs. With physical conditioning as one of the major components of a prevention program, the athletic trainers work closely with strength coaches to pave the way for safe and effective participation.

Carver-Hawkeye Arena Training Room

Carver-Hawkeye Arena Training Room

The recently remodeled Carver-Hawkeye Arena (CHA) training room is one of the most modern, respected facilities in the nation. Traditional therapies include whirlpools, hot and cold units, rehabilitation weights, pulleys, and machines. Other therapeutic equipment available for athletes include ultrasound, electrical stimulation, traction, and external compression units. Also available are such unique optional equipment as the CYBEX 6000 (isokinetic exercise and testing

device). Preparation activities, medical care and rehabilitation are provided for the basketball, softball, field hockey, volleyball, golf, and wrestling teams.

Jacobson Training Room

Jacobson training room is used primarily by the football team for rehabilitation, treatment and team preparation. The facility features a lap pool, treadmill, CYBEX weight equipment, Biodex isokinetic machine, Fastex, slide board, surface floors, two stairmasters, five bikes and six whirlpools.

The Field House Training Room

The Field House training room is used by the Hawkeye swimming and diving, gymnastics and rowing teams, along with the cheer squad. It supports medical care with ultrasound, whirlpools, hot and cold packs, high-voltage galvanic stimulation, electrical stimulation, and

THE COLLEGES

Freshmen who enroll at The University of Iowa are admitted to either the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences or the College of Engineering. The General Education Program allows students to sample courses in more than 100 areas of study. At Iowa, students are required to take electives, major courses, and general education course work.

LIBERAL ARTS & SCIENCES

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Arts (BA) and Science (BS) in 58 major fields; Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Music (BM) and of Liberal Studies (BLS).

Admission - Freshmen and transfer students are to meet the college's admissions requirements.

ENGINEERING

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Science in Engineering (BSE) in six majors- biomedical, chemical, civil, electrical, industrial, and mechanical engineering.

Admission - Students must meet the college's high admissions requirements.

BUSINESS

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) in six majors: accounting, economics, finance, management, management information systems, and marketing.

Admission - Requires two years of pre-business study in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Details at www.biz.uiowa.edu/upo/admissions.

EDUCATION

Teacher Education Programs - Elementary Education, Art Education, English Education, Foreign Language Education, Mathematics Education, Music Education, Science Education, and Social Studies Education. Additional teaching minors in Coaching, ESL (English as a Second Language), Hearing Impaired, Journalism, and Talented and Gifted.

NURSING

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN)

Admission - Students complete one year of pre-requisite courses in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and apply for admission during the second semester of the first year. The College of Nursing has competitive admission. The BSN requires three years of study once the student earns admission.

PHARMACY

Professional Degree Offered - Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD)

Admission - Students must successfully complete required pre-pharmacy course work in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. These requirements may be met in two years but do not guarantee admission. Students must also complete the Pharmacy College Admission

GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL DEGREES

Many student-athletes who have attended The University of Iowa and completed their undergraduate degrees continue their education at the University.

Student-athletes who attend graduate or professional school must first complete course work toward a bachelor's degree in their field of study. The University also offers undergraduates the opportunity to participate in research and overseas study programs, as well as internships that will help prepare them for graduate school. RESIDENCE

Each athletics team has its own rules regarding residence of incoming freshmen. Across the University, about 90 percent of freshmen choose to live on campus in one of the 10 residence halls. Most

SKILLS LABS

Many academic departments offer skills labs to help students improve skills necessary to succeed at Iowa, such as writing, speaking, math, science, and foreign language. Assistance with skills such as student-athletes live at least two years on campus. The residence halls have full-service diring rooms, study lounges, laundry facilities, recreational facilities, vending, and bank machines. Each room has high-speed computer connections for e-mail and Internet access. Iowa also offers wireless networking in 52 buildings and several outdoor areas, providing more than 265 access points across campus.

SAFETY

- * 11:55 p.m. 2:10 a.m.: Free SafeRide buses take students home Fridays and Saturdays during the fall and spring semesters.
- * Special telephones with blue lights are stationed across campus with a direct link to the UI Department of Public Safety.
- * University of Iowa Police personnel educate students on safety during summer orientation.
- * The Rape Victim Advocacy Program cooperates with the UI Department of Public Safety and participates in Sexual Crime Awareness Week

LIBRARIES

The University of Iowa Libraries supports the academic achievement of all student-athletes with specialized courses, one-on-one consultations with librarians, 24/7 access to electronic resources through the web site (www.lib.uiowa.edu), and extended hours, which can accommodate complicated practice and travel schedules. UI Librarians help students find answers, whether they're on a web site, in a book, journal, government document, or database. Librarians also plan and teach students how to find, evaluate, and use information from a variety of sources—skills they will use throughout their lives.

COMPUTERS

There are 26 Instructional Technology Centers all over the campus which are filled with 1,200 computers. These facilities are open at least 50 hours a week. Some are open 24 hours. Also, the Information Arcade in the Main Library provides a variety of specialized computing tools.

The Computer Demo Center provides information for students who want to purchase computers and software.

CAREER PLANNING

Finding and pursuing a career takes careful planning. The Pomer antz Career Center is extremely valuable for student-athletes and can help identify stills that transfer from athletics to the workplace. The program suggests a timeline each student-athlete may follow throughout his or her stay at Iowa. The components of the program include:

- *Individualized career advising
- *Career education programs
- *Summer job/internship opportunities
- *Resume and cover-letter development
- *Preparing for life after college athletics

note-taking, time-management, and test-taking are available through resources such as the College Transition Seminar (a credit-bearing course offered through University College), University Counseling Services, and Athletic Student Services staff.

HEALTH SERVICES

The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available. Students at Iowa can go to Student Health Service, which is open Monday through Friday. The service is supported by a fee paid by all full-time students. It offers students unlimited free office visits (there is a charge for other procedures done in the office, such as blood tests).

CULTURAL CENTERS

Four cultural centers on campus provide a welcoming setting where students from various cultures can find cultural, academic, and personal support services: the Latino and Native American Cultural Center, the Afro American Cultural Center, the Asian Pacific American Cultural Center, and the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Resource and Education Center.

CAMBUS

There are six primary bus routes throughout the Iowa campus. The University Cambus provides over three million free rides to class and to the dorms for students each year. Some routes run seven days a week, and some run until 2:30 a.m. Cambus also operates a specialized transportation service for persons with disabilities.

OLD CAPITOL

One of the most recognizable sites in Iowa City is the gold dome of the Old Capitol which is situated in the heart of downtown. Built in 1840, it is Iowa City's most historic building. The Old Capitol was the site of the first governor inauguration as well as the first six Iowa General Assemblies. It is also where the state's Constitution was drafted. When the capital was moved to Des Moines in 1857, the Old Capitol was dedicated to The University of Iowa, becoming the first building owned by the University.

CORALVILLE LAKE

Just north of Iowa City is Coralville Lake, an outdoor recreational area that offers a variety of opportunities for the public. Rockwell Collins, American College Testing and Procter & Gamble help keep the city booming. In Coralville, a branch office of Geico Auto Insurance has provided many residents with employment opportunities.

Culturally, Iowa City is alive with concerts, art exhibits, readings, plays and art events of all kinds. Located on the University of Iowa campus, Hancher Auditorium is a nationally-known performance center that brings in the best of Broadway, classical and jazz music, dance and other performances. The University of Iowa Theater Arts department also produces a full schedule of plays each year, featuring the work of student performers and directors. So whether you enjoy the arts as a spectator or as an outlet for your own creativity, Iowa City has the opportunities.

CORAL RIDGE MALL

The Coral Ridge Mall is a 1.2-million-square-foot shopping center located just minutes from the UI campus. The center combines a mix of over 120 specialty shops and strong department stores including Dillards, JC Penney, Sears, Target and Younkers. Coral Ridge also offers entertainment features such as an NHL-regulation-sized indoor ice arena, state-of-the-art 10-screen movie theatre and a large carousel along with a 1,000-seat food court with sit-down restaurants. Hawkeye Traditions

THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago.

The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, The Last of the Mohicans, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison

Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawkeye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

HERKY THE HAWKEYE

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar

SCHOOL FIGHT SONG

The Iowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, Iowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man" Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni

figure at Iowa athletics events.

Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of lowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletics events the year around.

SCHOOL COLORS

For 40 years Iowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide what are now the school official colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of Iowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich
