James M. Hoak Family Golf Complex

Since 2013, The James M. Hoak Family Golf Complex has been the exclusive home of Iowa Golf. The complex was made possible by the Hoak family and the generous support of our donors.

Conveniently located on campus, Hoak provides year-round training for both the men's and women's golf teams.

The Hoak Complex features the Transamerica Performance Studio, highlighted by two indoor-outdoor hitting rooms equipped with Trackman radar and SAM Putt Lab technology. The Performance Studio also includes a 3,150 square foot, practice green suited for putting, and short game.

Other features include men's and women's locker rooms, coaches' offices, workout equipment, and a player lounge with a refueling station.

Next to Hoak is a 14,000 square foot putting green and short game area where players can practice any shot imaginable. The practice area sits alongside hole No. 6 at Finkbine, allowing players to wrap up any practice session by playing a few holes.

Finkbine Golf Course

Located on the western edge of The University of Iowa campus, just walking distance from Kinnick Stadium, Carver-Hawkeye Arena and Hillcrest Residence Hall, is Finkbine Golf Course. Founded in 1953 and opened in 1955, Finkbine remains a source of great pride and beauty as the home course for the Iowa golf program.

The 7,280-yard, par-72 layout is prized by the University and Iowa City community alike. A tremendous test of golf, Finkbine was the site of the PGA Amana VIP Pro-Am for more than 20 years featuring the PGA's finest as well as national and local celebrities. In 1991, Finkbine also became the host of the Ben Hogan Tour – Hawkeye Open. Collegiately, Finkbine has been the site for the 1992 and 2002 men's Big Ten Championships, the Hawkeye Intercollegiate and the Big Four Invitational.

Built among the rolling hills and elevation changes of Iowa City, Finkbine challenges golfers of every skill level. The Robert Bruce Harris design features sloped greens and sand bunkering on 17 of the 18 holes. The signature 13th hole is an island green surrounded by water offering multiple tee boxes and two greens.

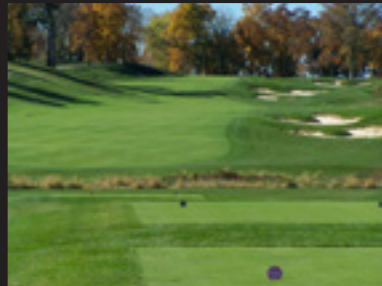
In the fall of 2003, Finkbine renovated the entire golf course with the addition of bent grass fairways, newly grassed greens and tee complexes. The university maintains Finkbine's lush tees, fairways and greens with a state of the art irrigation system. The driving range and practice facility feature four practice greens, short game areas, sand bunkers and a two tier range.

The Iowa golf teams enjoy a dedicated 10,000 square foot practice green, two practice bunkers and two newly renovated bent grass practice tees. Offering unquestionable golf facility advantages, Finkbine Golf Course is indeed the proud home of the Hawkeyes.



BLUE TOP RIDGE

Designed by world-renowned architect Rees Jones, Blue Top Ridge is a world class golf course, offering breathtaking vistas overlooking two rivers, lakes and diverse terrain. It was voted the No. 51 "Top New Course" in 2010 by Golf Digest.



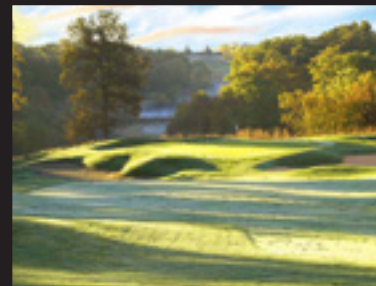
BROWN DEER

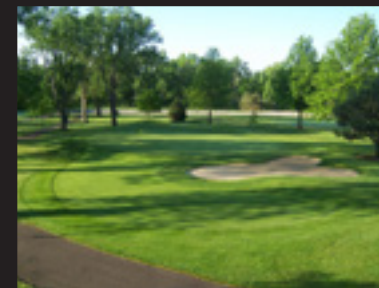
AMANA COLONIES

The Amana Colonies Golf Course is a championship golf course across 300 acres of stately white oak trees and forests. The course features streams, ponds and striking scenery.



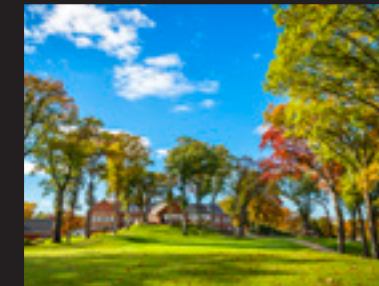
ELMCREST

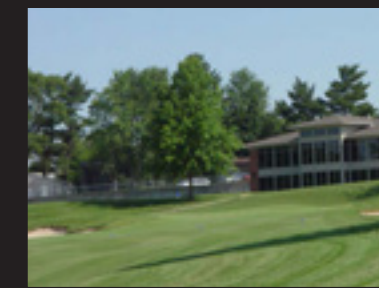
CRCC

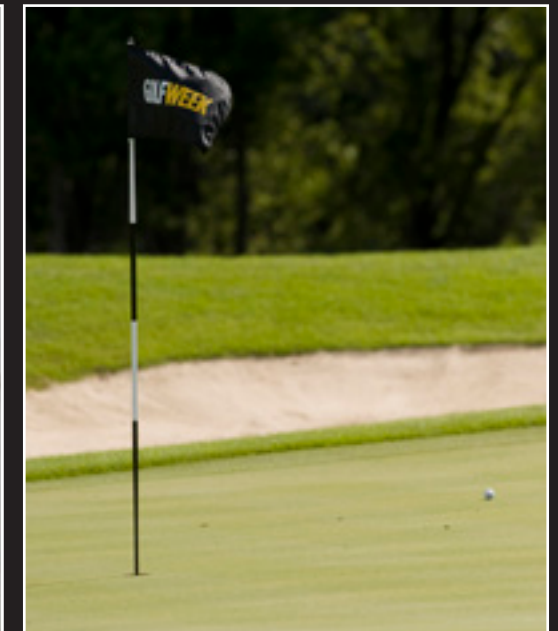


HAWKEYES HOST ELITE EVENT

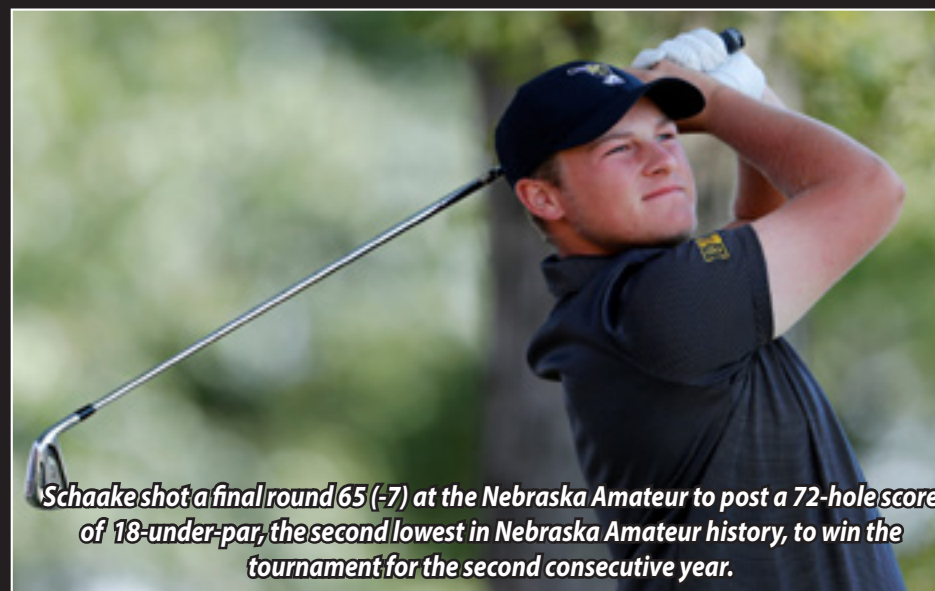

Alex Schaake won the Waterloo Open Amateur Championship and the 109th Nebraska Amateur Championship.



Schaake shot a final round 65 (-7) at the Nebraska Amateur to post a 72-hole score of 18-under-par, the second lowest in Nebraska Amateur history, to win the tournament for the second consecutive year.



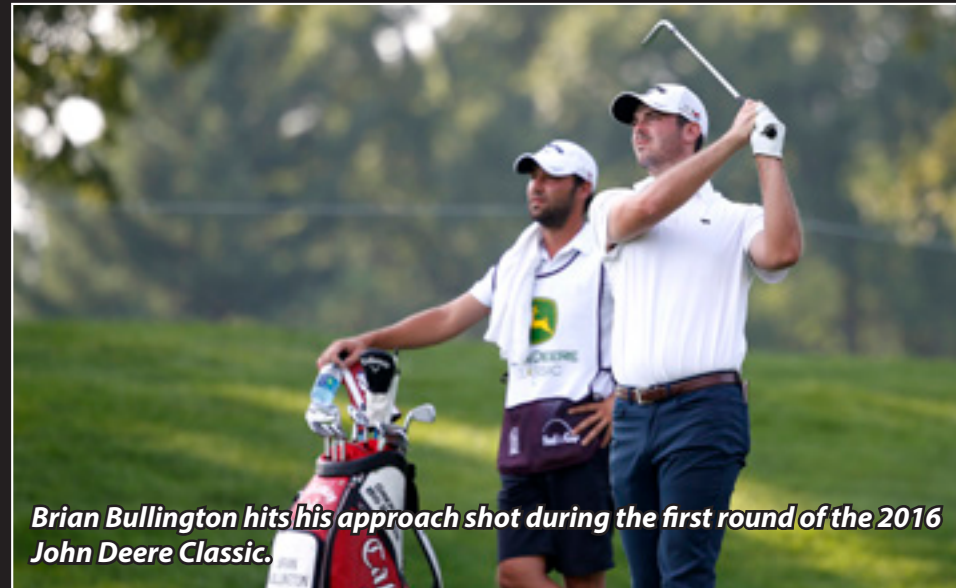
Schaake birdied five of the final nine holes of the Waterloo Open to win the tournament by one stroke with a three-round 205 (-11).



Alex Moorman qualified for the U.S. Amateur, claiming co-medalist honors with a 36-hole total of 133 (-6; 71, 67). Moorman registered back-to-back rounds under par with six birdies and one eagle.

JOHN DEERE CLASSIC

Since 2013, three Hawkeyes have made their PGA Tour debut via a sponsor's exemption at the John Deere Classic. Brian Bullington competed in 2016, Carson Schaake in 2015, and Steven Ihm in 2013 and 2014. In addition, Raymond Knoll Monday qualified for the tournament in 2014, and Steven Ihm did the same in 2016.

TYLER STITH

Head Coach
Fourth Season
Alma Mater: Iowa



Tyler Stith is in his fourth year as head coach at the University of Iowa in 2017-18 after being named the UI head coach on Aug. 22, 2014. Stith, a former assistant coach and student-athlete at Iowa, served as assistant coach at Minnesota from 2011-2014.

In his first three years as head coach of the Hawkeyes, Stith has coached three

All-Big Ten honorees, including Carson Schaake, co-medalist of the 2015 Big Ten Championship, and six Division I PING All-Midwest Regional Team selections. He has also guided the black and gold to a pair of second place finishes at the Big Ten Championships and to three NCAA Regional appearances, extending Iowa's current streak to nine.

Stith captured his first tournament title as head coach of the Hawkeyes in the fall of his second year, guiding Iowa to a team title at the GolfWeek Conference Challenge. Junior Raymond Knoll claimed co-medalist honors with a 54-hole total of 205 (-11; 66, 67, 72) -- the lowest three-round total in program history.

In his first year as head coach at Iowa, Stith guided the Hawkeyes to their seventh straight NCAA Regional. Iowa finished sixth at the event, one stroke behind eventual national champion LSU. Sophomore Carson Schaake led the Hawkeyes to a second place finish at the 2015 Big Ten Championships after earning co-medalist honors and becoming the first Hawkeye to win the event since Brad Klapprott in 1992. Schaake and fellow sophomore Raymond Knoll earned All-Big Ten honors in addition to garnering PING All-Region honors.

In his time at Minnesota, the Gophers won the 2014 Big Ten title, their first team conference crown since 2007. Jose Mendez captured medalist honors to become Minnesota's first individual

Big Ten champion since 2003. The Gophers went on to finish ninth at the NCAA Raleigh Regional, their first regional appearance since 2009. Minnesota won four tournaments during the 2013-14 season, marking the program's first victories since 2006-07.

In Stith's three seasons in Minneapolis, the Gophers' national ranking climbed from No. 104 to No. 68. The Gophers also improved in the classroom, earning GCAA All-Academic Team recognition during all three seasons (2012-14) and the Gopher Athletics' Norman Borlaug Commitment to Academic Excellence Award in 2014.

Stith served as an assistant coach to Hankins for three-and-a-half seasons at Iowa prior to joining the Minnesota staff. During that time, the Hawkeyes' national ranking improved from No. 155 to No. 9. Iowa recorded a school-record 10th-place finish at the 2011 NCAA Championships, eclipsing a previous program-best 17th place finish at the 2009 NCAA Championships. He was named a semifinalist for the Jan Strickland Award in 2011, an honor given to the top assistant in NCAA golf.

As a Hawkeye, Stith was a four-year letterwinner and a team captain during his senior season. The Mount Pleasant, Iowa, native graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in management information systems in 2002.

Stith heads a program that has advanced to NCAA competition in each of the last nine seasons, joining Illinois as the only Big Ten teams selected to NCAA Regional competition in each of the last nine seasons. Iowa has advanced to the NCAA Championship finals three times since 2009.





Jeff Schmid

Jeff Schmid enters his first full season as assistant coach at the University of Iowa after being named interim assistant coach in January of 2017. Schmid brings 18 years of professional golf experience and nine years of instruction and coaching experience to the Hawkeyes. He has served as a golf instructor and golf professional at country clubs in Columbia,

Missouri, and worked for 15 years in managing corporate golf outings for Fortune 500 companies around the world.

In his first season as assistant coach, Schmid helped lead the Hawkeyes to a ninth straight NCAA Regional appearance, as well as a tied for fourth place finish at the 2017 Big Ten Championship at Baltimore Country Club. As a team the Hawkeyes set 18 and 54-hole records en route to a 74.93 team scoring average.

Schmid earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Iowa in 1990. He is married to current Iowa head women's tennis coach, Sasha Schmid.

As a former team captain and letterwinner with the University of Iowa men's golf team, Schmid earned All-Big Ten honors in 1989 and Academic All-Big Ten accolades in 1990. He received medalist honors at three tournaments during his Hawkeye career, winning the Spartan Invitational (1988-89), Purdue Invitational (1989-90), and the Drake Relays Invitational (1989-90).

In 1991, Schmid began his career as a touring golf professional where he remained until 2008. He has also served as a volunteer assistant golf coach for both the men's and women's teams at the University of Missouri (2012-17) and the women's golf team at Stetson University (2008-10).

Fall 2016 -- Competed in all five tournaments, averaging 74.91 strokes per round, posting one round at or below par... season best finish came at the Gopher Invitational, finishing in a tie for third individually with a three-round total of 214 (-2)... lowest round of the season came during the final round of the Royal Oaks Intercollegiate carding an even par 71.

Chuck Zwiener served as men's golf coach at the University of Iowa from 1958 through 1989, coaching the Hawkeyes for 32 years.

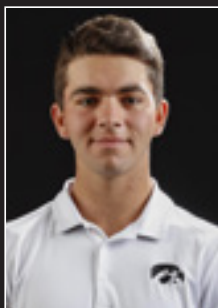
In his honor, family and friends established the Chuck Zwiener Scholarship in 1992, to be awarded each year to an outstanding member of the Iowa golf team.

Upon taking over the Iowa program in 1958, Zwiener immediately led his first three Hawkeye teams into NCAA postseason action. During his tenure, Zwiener placed six players on the PGA tour, one of which went on to become a two-time PGA club winner of the year. Sixteen of Zwiener's former players went on to become head PGA professionals at some of the finest golf courses in the state of Iowa. He also led the Hawkeyes to 10 first division finishes in the Big Ten and eight Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten honors.

Jack & Ailene Liechty Scholarship

The E.J. Liechty Scholarship, for men's intercollegiate athletics, was established in 1995 by Ailene Liechty in memory of her husband, E.J. "Jack" Liechty. Since 1997, the annual scholarship has been awarded to a deserving student-athlete who is a member of the Iowa golf team.

Jack Liechty was a devoted supporter of the University of Iowa, especially in the areas of athletics and arts. He was known for his humor and his willingness to lend a helping hand.

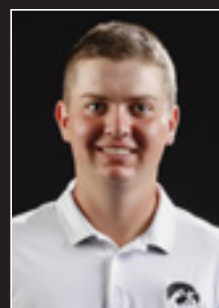
Jack was a newspaperman all his life, entering the business in 1930 as the Iowa City circulation manager for the Des Moines Register. He joined the Iowa City Press-Citizen in 1934 as circulation manager, and went on to become president and publisher from 1962-1966. He was named president of Speidel Newspapers, Inc., the parent company of the Press-Citizen, in 1966. Jack retired in 1972, although he continued to serve on the executive committee until 1977, when Speidel merged with Gannett Co., Inc., the nation's largest newspaper company.

Over the years, Jack contributed to many projects across the University of Iowa campus, and in 1983 he received the Distinguished Friend Award from the UI Alumni Association. Jack died in 1994 at the age of 85. His son, John Liechty, was a second team All-American in 1958 and three-time golf letter winner for head coaches Bucky O'Connor and Chuck Zwiener.

Bucky O'Connor Scholarship

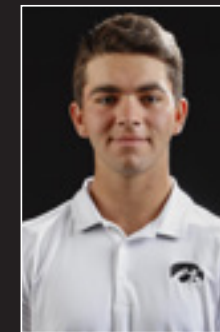

James Hoak Scholarship

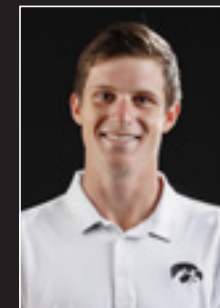
While at Iowa, James M. Hoak lettered in golf and roomed with UI football legend Nile Kinnick. Hoak attended the M.B.A. program at Harvard University in the early 1940's and after service in the Navy during World War II, joined the family business, the Wheeler Lumber Company, headquartered in Des Moines. He served as the firm's president for more than 20 years before retiring in 1985. Hoak and his wife, Jane, a 1941 UI graduate, have been UI supporters and volunteers for many years, and are members of the Presidents Club, which recognizes the UI's most generous contributors.

"Jim graduated from the university nearly 68 years ago, and I left campus in 1953, but neither of us has ever lost his enthusiasm for the university, and for its mission of equipping students with the tools to succeed in life after college," said Johnson. "Jim's been so important to the university over the years, and I wanted to do something to honor his love for the U of I while he and his family could enjoy and participate in that recognition."

"The James Hoak Scholarship represents a real win-win for the UI athletics program," UI Athletics Director Gary Barta said. "The student-athletes who earn the Hoak Scholarship will have the distinction of knowing that their awards carry the name of one of our most loyal and generous graduates -- someone who knew Nile personally, and who represents the proud history and integrity of the UI athletics program." Iowa's new golf complex is the James M. Hoak Family Golf Complex.

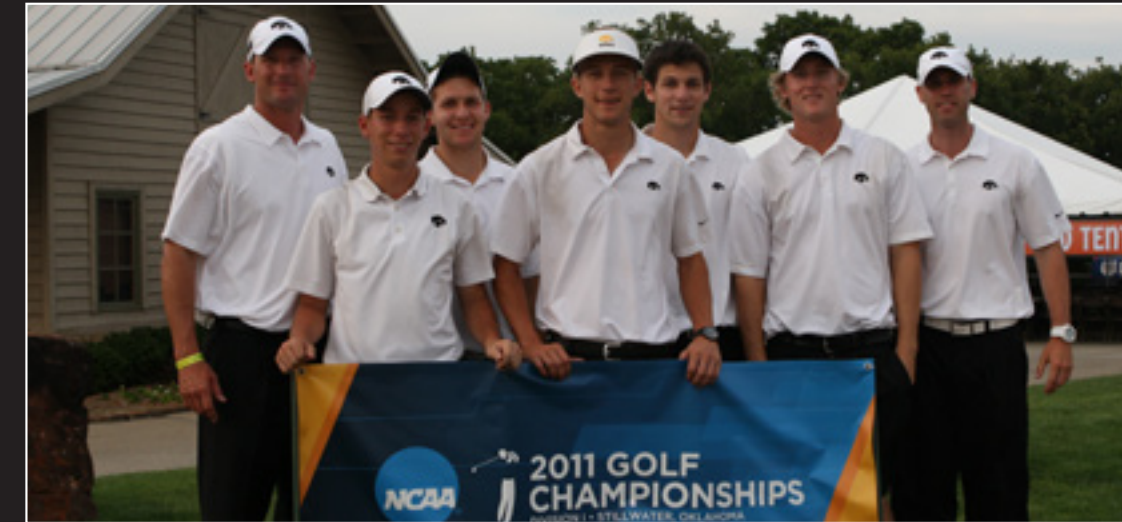

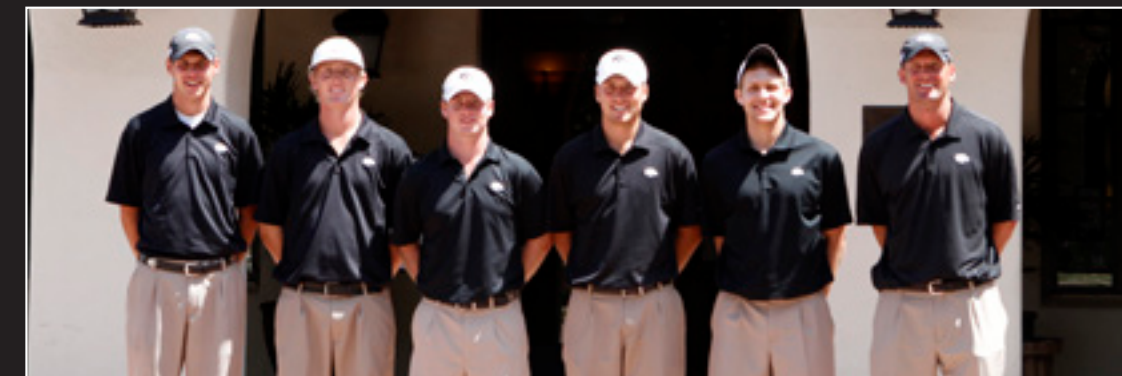

**GARY BARTA
ATHLETICS
DIRECTOR**

Gary Barta is in his 12th year as the director of athletics at the University of Iowa, where he occupies the Henry B. and Patricia B. Tippie Director of Athletics Chair. The position was recently endowed by the Tippies, longtime supporters of the University of Iowa and Hawkeye Athletics. Henry B. Tippie earned his UI degree in 1952 and was presented an honorary degree in 2011.

Barta was recognized by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) as a 2015-16 Under Armour Athletics Director of the Year. In 2016, Barta received a contract extension keeping him in Iowa City through 2021.

In the past year, Iowa Athletics staff, coaches, and Hawkeye student-athletes have continued to raise the bar in their daily approach to: "Win. Graduate. Do It Right." There is tremendous momentum surrounding the entire Athletics program in all three areas.

Barta has engineered a significant Senior Staff reorganization the past few years. The recent changes have allowed the ability to fill a number of key positions with new faces, while realigning staff assignments to fit the needs of Hawkeye coaches, staff, and student-athletes.

In 2016-17, the UI's annual operating budget exceeded \$100 million for the first time, with 100 percent of the revenue generated by the UI Athletics Department through external funding. The majority of revenue is derived from traditional revenue sources that include: Big Ten Conference revenue share (including media rights), sales of tickets to athletic events on the UI campus, and contributions from loyal Hawkeye fans throughout Iowa and across the country.

Support for Hawkeye Athletics has grown significantly under Barta's leadership. An all-time record \$42 million in fundraising activity was achieved in 2016-17. This philanthropic support has been critical to the long list of Athletics facilities either built or renovated during Barta's 11 years at Iowa.

Barta's involvement in the UI campus and the greater Iowa City community extends beyond his position as director of the UI's Intercollegiate Athletics programs. He is a member of the President's Cabinet, comprised of vice presidents and other campus leaders that provide counsel to the UI's president.

Barta remains active at the conference and national level. He serves on the Rose Bowl Management Committee and is currently involved in the NCAA Transfer Working Group. He is also regularly involved in NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) and LEAD1 (formerly known as the Division IA Athletic Directors Association).

From a community standpoint, Barta is currently serving as the Chair of the United Way of Johnson and Washington Counties Board of Directors. He is a long-standing member of the Partnership for Alcohol Safety Committee, and has been a regular participant in numerous Chamber and Convention and Visitor Bureau initiatives during his tenure.

Barta often suggests to his staff that "Hope is not a strategy," which is why the Department is undergoing a comprehensive review and rewriting of the strategic plan for the UI Athletics Department and continues to work with the UI's leadership on a long-term financial plan.

• Win •

- Rick Heller and the Iowa baseball program won the 2017 Big Ten Conference tournament championship for the first time in program history and returned to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three seasons. The Hawkeyes posted 39 victories—the fifth most in school history—and reached the Big Ten title game for a second consecutive season. Iowa's line-up featured national home run leader Jake Adams, who set Iowa and Big Ten records with 29 home runs.
- Four players were selected in the 2017 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, moving the four-year total to 15 under Heller—the most in school history. Jake Adams and Mason McCoy were selected within seven picks of each other in the sixth round. They were the highest Iowa draft picks since 1999 and the highest by a position player since 1992.
- Joey Woody's track and field team matched a school record by sending 15 individuals to the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The men's squad scored 15 points to finish 17th in the nation, Iowa's best finish in 50 years. Aaron Mallett (110-meter hurdles, 4th), Reno Tuufuli (discus, 5th) and the 1,600-meter relay team (3rd), earned first-team All-America honors. Junior Brittany Brown (200 meters, 7th) and Laulauga Tausaga (discus, 7th) paced the women's team as first-team All-Americans.

- The Iowa men's track team earned the Hy-Vee Cup at the Drake Relays, recording the highest point total of all university men's teams competing in one of the premier track and field meets in the nation.
- Under fifth-year head coach Andrew Carter, the Iowa rowing program was selected to the NCAA Championships for the second time in program history, ending a 16-year drought. The Hawkeyes finished fourth in the Big Ten and were ranked as high as 11th in the nation during the season. Carter was named NCAA Regional Coach of the Year.
- Tom Brands' Iowa wrestling squad finished third in the Big Ten and fourth at the NCAA Championships. Senior Cory Clark won an NCAA title at 133 pounds and the Hawkeyes crowned five All-Americans. Thomas Gilman and Sammy Brooks won Big Ten individual championships; Michael Kemerer and Cash Wilcke were named to Amateur Wrestling News All-Rookie Team.
- Iowa football appeared in its fourth straight January bowl game following the 2016 season, as the Hawkeyes have won 20 games over the past two seasons.
- Iowa football participated in the Big Ten Conference football championship game in 2015 and appeared in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game.
- Iowa football has appeared in 14 bowl games under head coach Kirk Ferentz, including 10 January bowl games.
- Under Fran McCaffery, the Iowa men's basketball team advanced to the postseason for a sixth consecutive season (three NCAA, three NIT), reaching the second round of the NIT before falling to the eventual tournament champion in overtime. Two Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten honors, including first-team selection Peter Jok. The Hawkeyes have had a first-team All-Big selection for four consecutive seasons.
- Lisa Bluder's Hawkeye women's basketball team advanced to postseason play for the 10th straight season while fielding a very young team comprised of nine underclassmen and five upperclassmen. Iowa advanced to the fourth round of the WNIT, collecting postseason wins over Missouri State, South Dakota, and Colorado. Three Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten honors and five earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition.
- The UI men's golf team, under the direction of third-year head coach Tyler Stith, competed in its ninth straight NCAA Tournament. The Hawkeyes placed fourth in the Big Ten Championships.
- Larissa Libby's GymHawks advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the ninth time in the last 10 seasons, where they finished third (195.050). Senior Angel Metcalf and freshman Clair Kaji advanced as individual competitors at the NCAA Championships. The GymHawks were third at the Big Ten Championships, with five gymnasts earning All-Big Ten honors.
- JD Reive's UI men's gymnastics squad placed fifth at the Big Ten Championships and saw Matt Loochtan garner first-team All-Big Ten recognition. Five student-athletes advanced to NCAA individual event finals.
- First-year head coach Sasha Schmid led the women's tennis team to a plus-five improvement in conference wins from the previous season and guided Iowa back to the Big Ten Tournament for the first time since 2014. Elise van Heuvelen was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year and first-team All-Big Ten.

- The Iowa women's swimming and diving team placed 26th as a team at the 2017 NCAA Championships under Marc Long – the program's highest finish since 2005. The Hawkeyes had two first-team All-Americans in Emma Sougstad and Calli Head.
- The Iowa men's and women's swimming and diving teams both tallied Top-40 finishes at the NCAA Championships under head coach Marc Long. The program had two student-athletes—junior Emma Sougstad (100 breast) and senior Roman Trussov (100 breast, 200 breast)—garner three All-America distinctions.
- In his third year as head coach, Bond Shymansky guided the volleyball team to one of the best volleyball seasons in program history. Iowa finished the regular season with a 19-13 overall record and a 9-11 mark in Big Ten play, recording the program's first winning season since 2000. Loxley Keala became the eighth player in program history to garner 2,000 assists, a feat she accomplished in just two years with the program. As a senior, Keala amassed 1,212 assists and became the first Hawkeye to earn All-Big Ten honors since 2001.

• Graduate •

- In November 2017, the NCAA reported Iowa's student-athletes tied a Hawkeye record by posting a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) score of 90 percent. Iowa student-athletes also earned a 77 percent Federal Graduation Rate (FGR), which ranks third in the Big Ten and is the seventh straight year UI student-athletes have graduated at a 70-percent rate or better.
- Fifteen of Iowa's 24 teams posted GSR's above the national average of 87 percent..
- The grade point average for all UI student-athletes has reached 3.0 or above for the past two years, which exceeds the GPA average for all students attending the University of Iowa.
- Last May, the NCAA reported all 24 of Iowa's sports programs were comfortably above the APR threshold for the seventh straight year. The NCAA also singled out the men's golf, women's swimming and diving, and men's gymnastics teams for APR scores that ranked in the top 10 percent of their peer groups.
- Women's basketball senior Ally Disterhoft was named College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-American of the Year for the second straight year. Disterhoft is just the fifth scholar-athlete to win the prestigious award in back-to-back years since its inception in 1987-88 and the second Big Ten athlete to accomplish the feat.
- One-hundred-eighty-three UI student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition throughout the year.
- Forty-five UI student-athletes earned the Big Ten Conference Distinguished Scholar Award.
- The women's rowing program featured 15 Academic All-Big Ten selections and four Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association National Scholar-Athletes.
- Men's gymnastics tied a school record with nine Academic All-Big Ten selections. Senior Jack Boyle was named a finalist for the Nissen-Emery Award, given to the country's most outstanding senior gymnast in the gym and in the classroom.
- Seven men's and women's swimming student-athletes were named College Swimming Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) Scholar All-Americans and 21 earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition.
- Wrestlers Michael Kemerer, Alex Meyer, and Brandon Sorensen were named to the National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA) All-Academic Team.





• **Do It Right** •

- The UI provides a superior experience for the more than 650 talented student-athletes who participate in the program annually and the more than one million friends and fans of the UI who attend Hawkeye events on the UI campus while being responsible and productive citizens of the greater Iowa City and University of Iowa community.
- Iowa remains among the handful of intercollegiate athletics programs nationally that successfully maintains its status as 100 percent self-supporting.
- UI student-athletes, coaches, and staff are also active local leaders, logging 15,000 hours of community service and spearheading efforts to support a wide variety of causes ranging from construction of the UI's new Stead Family Children's Hospital, to the UI's extremely successful Dance Marathon, to involvement with Coaches vs. Cancer.
- Iowa football has been involved with the Stead Family Children's Hospital "Kid Captain" program for 11 years. UI Athletics teamed with the UI Alumni Association on the "Black and Gold Fridays" outreach program and partnered with the College Football Playoff Foundation on "Extra Yard for (K-12) Teachers" program.
- Iowa's annual "Day of Caring" serves as the foundation upon which all these outreach activities rest. Now in its 22nd year of existence, the Day of Caring happens each April and typically involves representatives of most, if not all, of Iowa's sports programs who provide a wide variety of assistance to myriad not-for-profit organizations that serve the greater Iowa City community.
- "Doing It Right" also encompasses efforts aimed at improving the student-athlete experience. The UI Athletics Department invested more than \$1.7 million directly into food cost for its student-athletes in 2014-15 in response to NCAA legislation aimed at providing a higher quality student-athlete experience, with that figure exceeding \$1.9 in 2016-17. That commitment will continue annually and is complemented by increases to the value of the scholarships awarded the UI's student-athletes as part of the NCAA's effort to fully address cost of attendance.
- The Ladies Football Academy, spearheaded by Mary and Kirk Ferentz, has donated more than \$1.8 million to the University of Iowa's Stead Family Children's Hospital, which opened recently across the street from Kinnick Stadium.
- Margaret and Fran McCaffery have been champions for Coaches vs. Cancer and the American Cancer Society (ACS). The McCafferys have been actively involved with the Coaches vs. Cancer program and have raised more than \$2 million to support ACS efforts.

• **Facilities** •

- Providing the resources for UI student-athletes and coaches to be successful is a priority for Barta and his senior management team. That process includes providing state-of-the-art facilities, which is why Barta continues to work closely with institutional leadership on the finalization of a comprehensive master plan for the facilities available to the Hawkeyes. Recently completed and additional facility projects on the horizon include:
- Initial phases of the Kinnick Edge, an \$89 million project over the next two years that includes complete replacement of the north end zone in Kinnick Stadium that will provide new and improved indoor and outdoor seating and amenities, additional video wall, and a new playing surface in Iowa's historic football stadium.
 - Construction of the \$55 million Stew and LeNore Hansen Football Performance Center, completed in 2015.
 - Center-hung videoboards in Carver-Hawkeye Arena, along with new sound and lighting systems.
 - Forty-seven million dollar revitalization of Carver-Hawkeye Arena.
 - Installation of a new video wall and video ribbon board at Kinnick Stadium.
 - Partnered in construction of a new indoor turf facility that accommodates Olympic sports such as baseball, softball, golf, and soccer.
 - Renovation of the practice space inside the UI Fieldhouse for the men's and women's gymnastics teams.
 - Construction of the James M. Hoak Family Golf Complex for the men's and women's golf programs.
 - Installation of FieldTurf on the outdoor football practice fields, matching the playing surface of Kinnick Stadium.
 - Design and construction of a new clubhouse and pro shop at Finkbine Golf Course scheduled for completion in 2019.
 - Renovation and upgrades for the Gerdin Athletic Learning Center, home to the UI's Student-Athlete Academic Services staff, scheduled for completion spring 2018.
 - Installation of a banked track in the UI Recreation Building, home of UI indoor track programs.
 - Stadium upgrades to the baseball (Duane Banks Field) and softball (Bob Pearl Field) facilities.
 - Olympic sport improvements for soccer, gymnastics, volleyball, field hockey, and several other teams.

• **Fan Support** •

- In 2016-17, Iowa ranked in the Top 25 in home attendance for football, women's basketball, and men's basketball, while once again leading the nation in wrestling home attendance.
- Iowa ranked 20th in the nation in football home attendance in 2016 (69,656)
- Iowa ranked in the Top 25 in the nation in men's basketball home attendance in 2016-17 (12,548).
- Iowa ranked 19th in the nation in women's basketball home attendance in 2016-17 (4,395).
- Iowa led the nation in wrestling home attendance in 2016-17 (10,591). The Hawkeyes have led the nation in attendance for the 11 straight seasons.

• **Personal** •

- As the director of athletics at the University of Wyoming for three years, seven different Wyoming coaches were named Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year. Barta spearheaded a fundraising effort that netted the Cowboy athletics program \$11 million in private support and \$11 million in matching state funds.
- As the senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington, he directed the "Campaign for the Student-Athlete," was a participant in the design, construction and/or renovation of several Washington athletics facilities, including Bank of America Arena and the Dempsey Indoor Practice Facility. In addition to almost doubling the amount of annual private support received by Washington, Barta also managed the department's external relations division, a task that included managing corporate sponsorship and radio contracts. His responsibilities at Washington expanded over time to include hiring coaching and administrative staff, and the day-to-day oversight of several Huskie sport teams.
- The roots of his development experience extend to his first two positions: director of development at his alma mater, North Dakota State University, and director of athletics development and external relations at the University of Northern Iowa.
- Barta earned a bachelor of science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championship in 1983, 1985, and 1986.
- Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (19), and a daughter, Madison (17). He was born September 4, 1963, in Minneapolis.

IOWA CONTINUES TO BUILD FOR SUCCESS

The UI Department of Athletics is under the direction of Gary Barta and is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation. Once again, the Hawkeyes enjoyed success both athletically and academically in 2016-17.

Academically, the UI's federal graduation rate of 77 percent (for student-athletes who enrolled in the fall of 2010) marks the seventh straight year UI student-athletes have graduated at a 70-percent rate or better. For the sixth consecutive year, all 24 of Iowa's teams exceeded the Academic Progress Rate (APR) benchmark and the program posted a record-tying 90 percent in the NCAA's "Graduation Success Rate." It is the 12th time in 13 years of the GSR's existence that Iowa's student-athletes scored 80 percent or better.

Six UI teams scored a perfect 100 on their GSR: field hockey, men's golf, women's golf, women's gymnastics, rowing, and volleyball. Fifteen of Iowa's 24 teams posted GSR's above the national average of 87 percent.

Athletically, Hawkeye teams enjoyed another outstanding year in 2016-17, as a significant number of Iowa's 24 programs reached postseason play. The Iowa football team played in the 2017 Outback Bowl Game, the baseball team won the Big Ten Tournament and competed in the NCAA Tournament, the men's basketball team advanced to second round of the NIT, the women's basketball team advanced to the postseason for a 10th consecutive season, the wrestling team had one individual NCAA champion and placed fourth as a team at the NCAA Championships; the women's gymnastics team advanced to NCAA Regionals for the eighth time in nine seasons, and the men's golf team qualified for NAAs for an ninth straight year.

Facilities upgrades remain at the forefront with Carver-Hawkeye Arena being the latest facility receiving an upgrade with new LED video technology being installed by Daktronics. The new four-sided centerhung video system is the centerpiece of the installation, while four auxiliary displays -- two on each end of the arena -- have recently been installed. The Hawkeye Tennis and Recreation Center installed PlaySight Smart Court Technology -- a video component with live streaming capabilities, transforming the HTRC into a fully interactive practice and competition venue.

The gymnastics practice venues inside the UI Fieldhouse were completely renovated more than doubling the training space for the men's and women's programs, and a second indoor practice facility was constructed on the west campus -- Iowa Turf -- for sports like baseball, softball, and soccer in a partnership with recreation services.

Renovations continue with a north end zone project at Kinnick Stadium on the horizon, a new banked track in the UI Recreation Building, a new clubhouse at Finkbine Golf Course, and a renovation to the Gerdin Athletics Learning Center -- the home to the UI's Athletic Student Services.

IOWA FOOTBALL

The Iowa football team followed up its 2015 undefeated regular season and Big Ten West title with first division finishes and bowl appearances each of the last two years. Josey Jewell was recognized as the Lott IMPACT Trophy winner, Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year, while Josh Jackson became the third Iowa cornerback in six seasons to each the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year award. The Hawkeye duo became the 24th and 25th consensus All-Americans in program history.

IOWA WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

UI head coach Lisa Bluder led the women's basketball team to its 10th straight postseason appearance in 2016-17. Three Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten honors, five were Academic All-Big Ten selections, and senior Ally Disterhoft garnered Academic All-America of the Year honors for the second straight year.



IOWA WRESTLING

The Hawkeyes finished the 2016-17 season with a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. Thomas Gilman and Sammy Brooks both won Big Ten titles, and Cory Clark won the 133-pound NCAA title at the national championships. Iowa crowned five All-Americans, and led the nation in attendance for the 11th consecutive season.

IOWA MEN'S BASKETBALL

Fran McCaffery has led Iowa to new heights as head coach the past seven seasons. McCaffery has guided Iowa to six straight postseason tournaments (3 NCAA, 3 NIT). McCaffery and his coaching staff are the first in program history to win 18 games or more in six straight seasons. The Hawkeyes have had a player voted to the All-Big Ten First Team each of the last four seasons, its longest streak in seven decades. Iowa has ranked in the Top-25 in national attendance each of the last five seasons.

IOWA BASEBALL

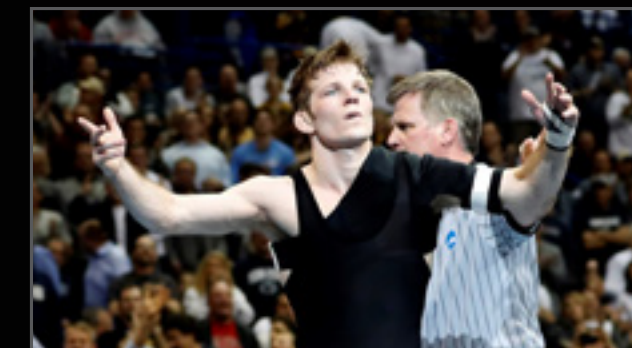
Rick Heller led the baseball team to the first Big Ten Tournament title in school history in 2017 and he guided the Hawkeyes, competing as Team USA, to a silver medal at the 2017 World University Games in Taiwan. Iowa won 39 games and advanced to NCAA Regional play for a second time in three seasons. First baseman Jake Adams was the unanimous Big Ten Player of the Year and a consensus All-American after leading the nation in home runs. The Hawkeyes had four players taken in the 2017 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, giving the program 15 selections in four seasons -- the most in four-year stretch in school history.

IOWA MEN'S & WOMEN'S GOLF

Head coach Tyler Stith led the Hawkeyes to their ninth straight NCAA Regional appearance in 2017 and Iowa was the team runner-up at the 2016 Big Ten Championships. Senior Amy Ihm qualified individually for the 2016 NCAA Tournament, becoming the first UI women's golfer to compete in NCAA postseason competition since 1990 and just the second in program history.

IOWA TRACK & FIELD

The Hawkeyes had their most successful season in 50 years in 2017. The men's 4x400-meter relay placed third at the NCAA Outdoor Championships with a school record time of 3:01.91 as the men went on to finish 17th in the country. On the women's side Laulauga Tausaga (Discus) and Brittany Brown (200-meters) were named first team All-Americans. Brown became the first Hawkeye to earn All-America honors in the 200-meters in program history.

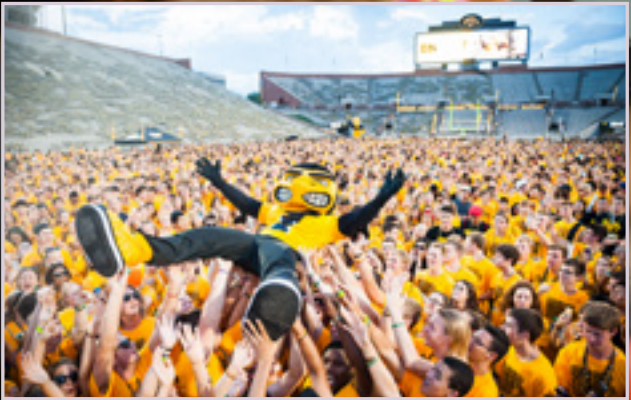
A CAMPUS ON THE MOVE

The University of Iowa represents a strong presence in the community while enhancing the quality of life in Iowa City.

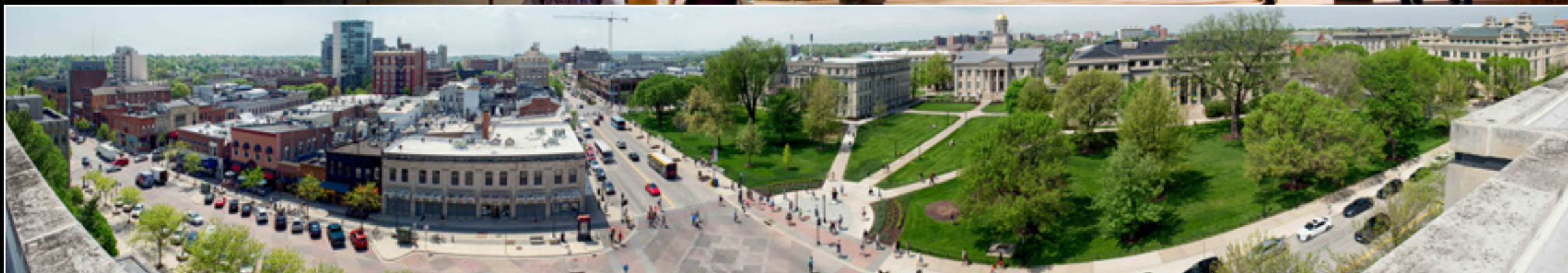

ATHLETIC LEARNING CENTER**

The University of Iowa Russell and Ann Gerdin Athletic Learning Center opened in the fall of 2003. The Learning Center is a multi-level, 20,000-square foot facility, which provides one all-purpose area for the academic pursuits for Iowa's male and female student-athletes. The facility is centrally located on the UI campus for easy access by all student-athletes and staff.

The Learning Center, which is currently undergoing a \$6 million renovation, features an auditorium, two classrooms, study lounges for freshmen and upper-class student-athletes, a computer lab, a teaching lab, the athletic library, office space for Iowa's Academic Student Services staff and a display area to recognize the academic accomplishments of Iowa's student-athletes.

THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawkeye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.
Herky The Hawkeye

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.
