ON THE MAT

The Hawkeyes finished the 2020-21 season as Big Ten and NCAA champions. The conference title is the 37th in program history and the national title is the 24th in program history. Iowa crowned one NCAA individual champion, seven All-Americans, four Big Ten individual champions and 13 academic All-Big Ten honorees. The Hawkeyes were 5-0 overall and 5-0 in the Big Ten, sharing the regular season conference title with Penn State.

HAWKEYES WIN NCAA TOURNAMENT TITLE

The top-ranked University of Iowa wrestling team won the 2021 NCAA Championships on March 20 at the Enterprise Center in St. Louis. Iowa scored 129 points, 15.5 clear of second-place Penn State. The team title is the 24th in program history and the first since 2010.

The Hawkeyes qualified 10 wrestlers for the NCAA Championships. Those wrestlers combined for a 38-13 overall record with 21 bonus-point wins, good for 27 bonus points. Iowa crowned seven All-Americans, more than any other team.

Senior Spencer Lee won the 125-pound championships for the third time in his career. Seniors Jaydin Eierman (141) and Michael Kemerer (174) reached the finals for the first time in their careers, placing runner-up at 141 and 174.

Austin DeSanto (133), Kaleb Young (157) and Jacob Warner (197) earned All-America honors for the third time in their careers. Tony Cassioppi earned his second career All-America honor at 285.

The Hawkeyes have won a team trophy in 12 of the last 13 national tournaments.

SPENCER LEE WINS 2021 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Senior Spencer Lee won the 125-pound NCAA Championship, becoming the seventh three-time national champion in program history and putting an exclamation point on the Hawkeyes' 2021 NCAA team title.

Lee defeated Arizona State's Brandon Courtney, 7-0. He scored four points in the second period from an escape, caution point and takedown, and added another takedown in the third to go along with one minute, 44 seconds of riding time. He was 5-0 in the tournament, outscoring his opponents, 59-8. His seven-point margin of victory was the largest of any of the 10 championships matches.

Lee is the seventh three-time NCAA champion in program history, joining the ranks of Ed Banach (1981, 81, 83), Barry Davis (1982, 83, 85), Jim Zalesky (1982-84), Tom Brands (1990-92), Lincoln McClravy (1993, 94, 97) and Joe Williams (1996-98).

SPENCER LEE WINS HODGE TROPHY

University of Iowa national champion Spencer Lee was awarded the WIN Magazine/Culture House Dan Hodge Trophy. The award is presented annually to the nation's most dominant college wrestler.

For the just the second time in its 27-year history, the Hodge committee determined two wrestlers worthy of recognition. Minnesota heavyweight Gable Steveson is also being recognized as a 2021 Hodge Trophy winner. The only other time two trophies were awarded in the same season was 2001, when Cael Sanderson and Nick Ackerman were both recognized.

Lee won the 125-pound NCAA Championship on March 20. He outscored his five opponents at the national tournament, 59-8, capturing his third career NCAA title and leading Iowa to the team title for the first time since 2010.

Lee was 12-0 in 2021, scoring bonus points in 11 matches and recording five first-period falls. He outscored his 12 opponents, 141-15, and his 91.6 bonus-point percentage led the country.

Not one of Lee's first eight matches went the seven-minute distance. He had five first-period falls and recorded three technical falls, including a 21-3 win by technical superiority in the finals of the Big Ten Championships. He did not allow a point in the NCAA finals, winning 7-0, the largest margin of victory of any of the 10 NCAA finals matches.

Lee finished the season riding a 35-match winning streak, outscoring his opponents 432-42 during the stretch.

Lee is one of five multi-winners in the history of the award, and one of three Hawkeyes to win the award since its inception in 1995. Mark Ironside was honored in 1998 and Brent Metcalf earned the award in 2008.

SPENCER LEE NAMED BIG TEN WRESTLER OF THE YEAR

Junior Spencer Lee was named 2021 Big Ten Conference Wrestler of the Year. He also won the award in 2020. He is the third Hawkeye in program history to win the award more than once (Royce Alger, 1987-88; Mark Ironside, 1996-98).

Lee finished the 2021 regular season 4-0 overall and won his second straight Big Ten conference title at 125 pounds. He outscored his four regular season opponents, 38-0, recording for first-period falls.

Lee was 3-0 at the conference tournament winning twice by technical fall and once by fall, outscoring his three opponents, 44-7. The Big Ten Conference title is the second of his career. He is the 57th multi-Big Ten champion in program history.

TOM BRANDS NAMED NWCA COACH OF THE YEAR

The National Wrestling Coaches Association announced March 17 that for the second straight year University of Iowa head wrestling coach Tom Brands has been named NWCA National Coach of the Year.

The NWCA coaching honor is the third of Brands' career. He was recognized in 2020 and 2008. The 2008 team won the NCAA Championship and the 2020 team was the heavy favorite to win the national title prior to the tournament's cancellation.

The 2021 Hawkeyes were ranked atop the national polls since the beginning of the season and won the 2021 Big Ten and 2021 NCAA Championships. Iowa crowned four Big Ten champions, one NCAA Champion and had a tournament-best seven All-Americans at the NCAA Championships. The Hawkeyes were 5-0 during the regular season.

The NWCA award is presented to the coach that has demonstrated outstanding effort throughout the season in developing and elevating their program on campus and in the community.

Brands was also named Interim Coach of the Year for the second straight year.

BRANDS NAMED BIG TEN COACH OF THE YEAR

Following Iowa's 2021 conference title, Tom Brands was named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year for the fifth time in his career, more than any other coach in school history. He was previously recognized in 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2020 following conference titles. Iowa has six Big Ten championships under Brands (2008, 2009, 2010, 2015, 2020, 2021).

The Hawkeyes scored 159.5 points, its highest since 1995 (185) and won the team race by 35.5 points, the largest margin of victory by a conference champion since Iowa won by 37 points in 2010. Iowa crowned four individual champions (Spencer Lee, Jaydin Eierman, Alex Marinelli, Michael Kemerer) en route to its sixth conference title under Brands. It was the first time since 2001 Iowa crowned four individual champions at the Big Ten Championships (Eric Juergens, Doug Schwab, Jody Stritmatter, T.J. Williams).

HAWKEYES IN THE FINALS

Spencer Lee, Jaydin Eierman and Michael Kemerer advanced to the finals of the 2021 NCAA Championships to extend Iowa's streak of NCAA finals appearances to 31 consecutive tournaments. Lee won the title at 125 pounds. Eierman (141) and Kemerer (174) each placed runner-up.

Iowa has had at least one wrestler in the NCAA finals every year since 1990, and in 45 of the last 46 tournaments dating back to 1975.

ALL-AMERICAN STREAK

Seven Hawkeye Wrestlers earned All-America honors at the 2021 NCAA Championships, more than any other school.

The Hawkeyes have crowned at least one All-American in 50 consecutive tournaments, a stretch dating back to 1972. Iowa has totaled 312 All-America honors during that stretch.

Iowa's 2021 All-Americans included Spencer Lee (125), Austin DeSanto (133), Jaydin Eierman (141), Kaleb Young (157), Michael Kemerer (174), Jacob Warner (197) and Tony Cassioppi (285).

Iowa has had at least five All-Americans in eight straight seasons and 13 times in head coach Tom Brands' 15 seasons.

The seven All-Americans represent Iowa's highest total since 2010, and five Hawkeyes place third or better for the first time since 2010.

ALL-AMERICAN DOMINANCE

The Hawkeyes seven All-Americans were a combined 33-8 with nine major decisions, six technical falls and three pins at the NCAA tournament. The All-Americans had a combined season record of 83-15. Spencer Lee, Jaydin Eierman and Michael Kemerer became four-time All-Americans. Austin DeSanto, Kaleb Young and Jacob Warner earned their third career All-America honor, and Tony Cassioppi earned his second.

FOUR-TIME ALL-AMERICANS

Spencer Lee, Jaydin Eierman and Michael Kemerer became four-time All-Americans in St. Louis. Lee and Kemerer are the 21st and 22nd Hawkeyes in program history to earn four All-America honors wrestling for the Hawkeyes. Eierman earned his first All-America honor at Iowa. He was a three-time All-American at Missouri from 2017-19.

There have been 22 four-time All-Americans in the history of Iowa Wrestling. Joe Scarpello was Iowa's first four-timer. He won the NCAA title in 1950 to earn his fourth All-America honor.

Tom Brands has coached six four-timers since his first national tournament as Iowa's head coach in 2007. Mark Perry won NCAA titles in 2007 and 2008, the third and fourth All-America honors of his career.

Derek St. John, Cory Clark and Brandon Sorensen were four-timers under Brands. St. John won a national title in 2013 and was an All-American from 2011-14. Clark capped his fourth straight All-America honor with a national championship in 2017. Sorensen earned All-America honors from 2015-18.

10 QUALIFIERS

The Hawkeyes sent a 10-man lineup to the NCAA Championships for the fifth time since 2007, Tom Brands first year as head coach (2010, 2014, 2015, 2020, 2021).

Nine of Iowa's 10 qualifiers earned automatic bids to the NCAA tournament at the 2021 Big Ten Championships. Junior Max Murin received an at-large bid from the NCAA selection committee.

The Hawkeyes won national titles with a 10-man line-up in 2010 and 2021. The Hawkeyes placed fourth in 2014 and second in 2015. The 2020 NCAA Championships were cancelled due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Iowa has sent at least eight athletes to the NCAA Championships in each of head coach Tom Brands' 15 seasons.

HAWKEYE WRESTLING HISTORY

The Hawkeyes have won 24 national titles and 37 Big Ten titles. Iowa's 55 NCAA Champions have won a total of 85 NCAA individual titles, crowning seven three-time and 16 two-time champions. The Hawkeyes' 117 Big Ten champions have combined for 207 conference titles. There have been seven four-time, 19 three-time, and 31 two-time Big Ten champions from Iowa.

Iowa's 161 All-Americans have earned All-America status 352 times, including 22 four-time, 40 three-time and 41 two-time honorees.

CHASING THE HAWKEYES

Gary Kurdelmeier led Iowa to its first NCAA Championship in 1975, and in the 47 years since, the Hawkeyes have accumulated 24 team titles, more than any other school -- Penn State (9), Oklahoma State (7), Minnesota (3), Iowa State (2), Ohio State (1) and Arizona State (1).

HAWKEYES WIN BIG TEN TOURNAMENT TITLE

The top-ranked University of Iowa wrestling team won the 2021 Big Ten Championship on March 7 in University Park, Pennsylvania, scoring 159.5 team points and crowning four individual champions. The Hawkeyes' 159.5 points were their most since 1995 (185). Iowa won the team race by 35.5 points, the largest margin of victory by a conference champion since Iowa won by 37 points in 2010.

Iowa's team title was the 37th in program history, more than any other school in the Big Ten.

Iowa crowned four individual champions (Spencer Lee, Jaydin Eierman, Alex Marinelli, Michael Kemerer) en route to its sixth conference title under Brands. It was the first time since 2001 Iowa crowned four individual champions at the Big Ten Championships (Eric Juergens, Doug Schwab, Jody Strittmatter, T.J. Williams).

Marinelli became the Hawkeyes' first three-time champion since T.J. Williams in 2001. There have been 19 three-time champions and seven four-time champions in program history.

Lee defended his 125-pound conference title, becoming the 57th multi-Big Ten champion in program history.

Kemerer and Eierman became first-time Big Ten champions, the 116th and 117th conference champions in program history.

Following Iowa's 2021 conference title, Tom Brands was named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year for the fifth time in his career, more than any other coach in school history. He was previously recognized in 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2020 following conference titles. Iowa has six Big Ten championships under Brands (2008, 2009, 2010, 2015, 2020, 2021).

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG TEN

Thirteen Hawkeyes were among the 73 University of Iowa student-athletes named to the 2020-21 Big Ten Winter Academic All-Conference Team.

To be eligible for Academic All-Big Ten selection, students must be on a varsity team, as verified by being on the official squad list as of March 1 for winter sports, who have been enrolled fulltime at the institution for a minimum of 12 months and carry a cumulative grade-point average of 3.0 or higher.

Iowa wrestling Academic All-Big Ten honorees include Zach Axmear, Tony Cassioppi, Connor Corbin, Aaron Costello, Zach Glazier, Michael Kemerer, Spencer Lee, Alex Marinelli, Max Murin, Cobe Siebrecht, Justin Stickley, Jacob Warner and Kaleb Young.

BIG TEN REGULAR SEASON CO-CHAMPS

The Big Ten Conference announced Feb. 23 that Iowa and Penn State were co-champions of the 2021 conference regular season. The top-ranked Hawkeyes finished the dual season 5-0.

Iowa has won or shared the Big Ten regular season title 12 times in the last 14 years, and 13 times since the conference starting recognizing a dual meet champion in 1999. Iowa won the title outright in 2000, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2020, and shared the title in 2003, 2014, 2016, 2019 and 2021.

The Hawkeyes have 10 undefeated conference seasons since 2006-07, head coach Tom Brands' first year.

HEAVY LIFTING LIGHTWEIGHTS

Since 2010, Iowa's starting 125-pounders have combined for five NCAA titles, 11 All-America honors, and seven NCAA finals appearances.

The total includes three NCAA titles from Spencer Lee (2018, 2019, 2021) and two from Matt McDonough (2010, 2012). McDonough earned All-America honors from 2010-12, and was an NCAA finalist in 2011.

Thomas Gilman earned All-America honors from 2015-17, reaching the NCAA finals in 2016. Cory Clark placed fifth at the 2014 NCAA Championships.

Since 2007, Tom Brands first as Iowa's head coach, the Hawkeyes' starting 125-pounder (NCAA qualifier) has a 384-49 overall record (.887) and a 212-12 (.946) mark in duals.

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Tom Brands Head Coach University of Iowa, 1992

Five-time Big Ten and three-time NWCA Coach of the Year Tom Brands completed his 15th season as head wrestling coach at the University of Iowa in 2020-21. A 1996 Olympic gold medalist and member of wrestling's Hall of Fame, Brands is only the eighth head wrestling coach at the University of Iowa. The former Hawkeye wrestler was a four-time All-American and three-time national champion (1989-92) at Iowa. He has a 236-23-1 (.909) overall and 113-10 (.917) Big Ten coaching record at Iowa. He has a 253-43-1 (.852) career mark and a 114-12 (.905) record at Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

In 15 seasons as Iowa's head coach, Brands has led the Hawkeyes to four NCAA and six Big Ten team titles, crowning 13 NCAA champions, 23 Big Ten champions and 89 All-Americans. Iowa has had 142 Academic All-Big Ten recipients, including a school-record 17 in 2019-20. The Hawkeyes have qualified 138 wrestlers for the NCAA Championships in the last 15 years, sending the entire 10-man lineup in 2010, 2014, 2015, 2020 and 2021. Iowa has won or shared the Big Ten regular season title 12 times in Brands' 15 seasons.

The program set the national collegiate dual meet attendance record of 42,287 when No. 3 Iowa defeated top-ranked Oklahoma State, 18-16, on Nov. 14, 2015 at the Grapple on the Gridiron at Kinnick Stadium. Iowa has led the nation in attendance every year since Brands became head coach in 2006-07, setting an NCAA all-time attendance average of 12,568 in 2019-20.

Brands has been named NWCA National Coach of the Year three times. He was first honored in 2008 after leading the Hawkeyes to their first NCAA team title since 2000. He was recognized in 2020 when the top-ranked Hawkeyes won Big Ten regular season and tournament championships and entered the NCAA Championships as the favorite to win the team title. The tournament was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. He most recently won the award in 2021 when Iowa won Big Ten and NCAA team titles.

Brands was named Big Ten Coach of the Year in 2008, 2009, 2010, 2020 and 2021. He is the only coach in program history to earn the award five times.

Brands served as head coach at Virginia Tech University for two seasons (2005-06), recording a 17-20 dual mark. In his first season with the Hokies, Brands led the team to the 2005 regular season Atlantic Coast Conference title, set a school record for dual meet wins (16) and had a school-record five wrestlers qualify for the NCAA Championships.

Prior to taking the helm at Virginia Tech, Brands was an assistant coach at Iowa for 12 seasons (1993-2004). He helped the Hawkeyes to a 177-27 dual record, seven NCAA and eight Big Ten team titles, while crowning 23 NCAA champions, 73 All-Americans and 36 Big Ten champions. He was named the National Wrestling Coaches Association Assistant Coach of the Year in 2000.

In 2004, he was one of three coaches for the U.S. Olympic freestyle wrestling team, participating in Athens, and in 2016 he was named a volunteer coach of the United States Olympic team in Rio. Brands also served as assistant coach for the U.S. Freestyle World Teams in 2001, 2002, 2003, 2013, 2014, and 2015. He was named Freestyle Coach of the Year by USA Wrestling in 2002 and 2003. He has coached a number of other U.S. teams in international competition.

As a competitor, Brands won the 1996 Olympic freestyle gold medal at 136.5 pounds in Atlanta, Georgia. He also won a gold medal at the 1993 World Championships in Toronto, two World Cup gold medals (1994, 1995) and was the 1995 Pan American Games champion. He won four U.S. National titles (1993-96) and made four straight U.S. World or Olympic teams (1993-96). Along with his twin brother, Terry, Tom was named 1993 USA Wrestling Athlete of the Year, the 1993 John Smith Outstanding Freestyle Wrestler, and 1993 Amateur Wrestling News Man of the Year. He was inducted into wrestling's Hall of Fame in 2001.

Brands was a four-time All-American at Iowa (1989-92). During his Hawkeye career, he won three NCAA titles and was named Outstanding Wrestler of the 1992 NCAA Championships. Also a three-time Big Ten champion, Brands won 95 percent of his matches at Iowa. His career mark of 158-7-2 includes an undefeated season in 1991 (45-0).

The Sheldon, Iowa, native was born April 9, 1968. He earned his B.S. degree in physical education from Iowa in 1992. He and his wife, Jeni, have three adult children, Madigan, Kinsee and Tommy.
