IOWA TO MEET KENTUCKY AT VRBO CITRUS BOWL

The 15th-ranked University of Iowa football team will face No. 22 Kentucky in the 2022 Vrbo Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1 in Orlando, Florida. Kickoff is set for noon (CT) from Camping World Stadium and the game will be televised on ABC.

The Hawkeyes will be making their 34th bowl game appearance and their second Citrus Bowl appearance (formerly the Capital One Bowl). Iowa defeated No. 11 LSU, 30-25, on an improbable Drew Tate-to-Warren Holloway 56-yard touchdown pass as time expired on Jan. 1, 2005.

The Hawkeyes have won three straight bowl games and are 25-5 in their last 30 trophy games (includes bowl games). Iowa defeated Boston College, 27-20, at the 2017 Pinstripe Bowl; No. 18 Mississippi State, 27-22, at the 2019 Outback Bowl; and No. 22 USC, 49-24, at the 2019 Holiday Bowl. Iowa was scheduled to face Missouri at the 2020 Music City Bowl but the game was canceled due to COVID.

The Hawkeyes have never faced Kentucky in program history. Iowa is 6-5 all-time in bowl games against current Southeastern Conference opponents.

The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 20 times in the last 21 seasons. Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz is one bowl win shy of tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 9-8 bowl record and has led Iowa to three straight bowl wins, tying its longest such streak in program history. Ferentz's nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history.

Seventeen coaches have won 10 or more bowl games in their career. Among active coaches, only Nick Saban (16), Mack Brown (14), Kyle Whittingham (11), Mike Gundy (10) and Dabo Swinney (10) have more bowl wins than Ferentz.

Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (11) and Wisconsin (10) have more bowl wins (including FCS Playoffs and the BCS championship game), than Iowa. Iowa is 17-15-1 all-time in bowl games.

1ST AND 10

1: Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz is one bowl win shy of tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 9-8 bowl record and has led Iowa to three straight bowl wins, tying its longest such streak in program history. Ferentz's nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history.

2: C Tyler Linderbaum is the 2021 Rimington Trophy winner, which is awarded to the nation's premier center in college football. He is the first Hawkeye to earn the Rimington Trophy. He was also a finalist in 2020. Austin Blythe (2015) and Bruce Nelson (2002) were previously finalists for the award. Linderbaum has started 34 consecutive games at center for the Hawkeyes (26-8). He was also selected as the 2021 Big Ten Conference Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year.

3: Iowa has won 15-straight games against non-conference opponents, including 12 regular season non-conference victories and three bowl wins. The nonconference win streak is the longest in the country. Iowa's last nonconference loss was at the 2017 Outback Bowl (Florida, 30-3).

4: Iowa has three wins this season over ranked opponents (vs. #17 Indiana, 34-6; at #9 Iowa State, 27-17; vs. #4 Penn State, 23-20).

5: Iowa is playing for a trophy this week for the sixth time this season. The Hawkeyes are 3-2 in trophy games this season and 25-6 in their last 31 trophy games (includes bowl games and conference championship games).

6: Iowa leads the country with a school-record 24 interceptions and rank third nationally in takeaways (30). The Hawkeyes have 88 interceptions since 2017, more than any team in the country.

7: LB/DB Dane Belton leads the Big Ten and ties for second in the NCAA with five interceptions. DB Riley Moss has four interceptions, and DBs Matt Hankins and Jermari Harris have three interceptions. Eleven different Hawkeyes have at least one interception this season. Iowa is plus-19 in turnover margin in its 10 wins and minus-five in its three losses.

8: LB Jack Campbell leads the Hawkeyes and ranks second in the Big Ten with 129 tackles. He is the first Hawkeye to record 100 tackles in a single season since Josey Jewell, who had 100+ tackles each year from 2015-17 (126, 124, 136). Campbell has four double-digit tackle performances (11, 18, 17, 16) this season.

9: WR Charlie Jones ranks second in the Big Ten averaging 7.8 yards on a league-high 36 punt returns. He has returned 23 kickoffs for an average of 26.3 yards per return, No. 2 in the Big Ten. He returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown Week 11 against Illinois. Jones' 36 punt returns are the most by a Hawkeye in a single season since Andy Brodell returned 36 punts (10.6 average) in 2008. The school record for punt returns in a single season is 40 by Ramon Ochoa in 2003 (12.4 average).

10: RB Tyler Tyler Goodson leads Iowa's rushing attack with 1,151 yards on 156 attempts, both single-season career highs. His six rushing touchdowns rank ninth in the Big Ten. He is the first Hawkeye to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season since 2017 (Akrum Wadley, 1,109). Goodson rushed for a career-high 156 yards in Iowa's Week 12 win at Nebraska. It was his ninth career 100-yard rushing game and his fourth this season. He's had four 100-yard rushing games this season (153, 141, 132, 156).

SERIES HISTORY

Iowa and Kentucky are meeting for the first time in program history. Iowa is 12-14 all-time against members of the SEC, and 6-5 in bowl games against current members of the SEC.

KENTUCKY HEAD COACH MARK STOOPS

Kentucky head coach Mark Stoops is an Iowa graduate and was a Hawkeye football letterwinner from 1987-1989. He was a graduate assistant coach at Iowa from 1989-91. His brothers, Bob and Mike, are also University of Iowa graduates former Hawkeye football players.

Mike Stoops will be the third Stoops brother to lead a college football program against his alma mater.

Iowa split a pair of games against Mike Stoops and the Arizona Wildcats in 2009 and 2010. Iowa defeated Arizona, 27-17, in Iowa City in 2009, and fell to the Wildcats, 34-27, in Tucson, Arizona, in 2010.

The Hawkeyes lost to Bob Stoops and the Oklahoma Sooners, 31-14, at the 2011 Insight Bowl in Tempe, Arizona.

TROPHY COLLECTION

Iowa is playing for a trophy for the sixth time this season. The Hawkeyes are 3-2 in trophy games this season and 25-6 in their last 31 trophy games (includes bowl games and conference championships). Iowa is undefeated in its last three bowl appearances. Iowa defeated Boston College, 27-20, at the 2017 Pinstripe Bowl; No. 18 Mississippi State, 27-22, at the 2019 Outback Bowl; and No. 22 USC, 49-24, at the 2019 Holiday Bowl. Iowa's 2020 Music City Bowl game was canceled.

Iowa is 22-5 in its last 27 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin).

The Hawkeyes defeated Nebraska 28-21 to capture the Heroes Trophy for the seventh straight year. Iowa retained possession of Floyd of Rosedale with a 27-22 win against Minnesota on Nov. 13. The Hawkeyes lost possession of the Heartland Trophy on Oct. 30 at Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes defeated No. 9 Iowa State, 27-17, on Sept. 11 to win the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Series game for the sixth consecutive time.

PADILLA LEADS IOWA TO WIN IN FIRST CAREER STARTS

QB Alex Padilla led Iowa to two wins in his first two career starts (27-22 vs. Minnesota in Week 10; 33-23 vs. Illinois in Week 11).

Padilla made his first career start Week 10 against Minnesota and passed for career-high 206 passing yards. He ran for one touchdown (1) and threw for two (72, 27), both career firsts. He was 6-17 for 83 yards in his second career start, a Week 11 win against Illinois.

Padilla started Week 12 at Nebraska but was relieved at halftime with Iowa trailing 14-6. QB Spencer Petras started the second half and led Iowa to a 28-21 win.

Padilla entered the game Week 9 at Northwestern on Iowa's fourth drive, substituting for the injured Petras. Padilla finished the game with a then-career high 172 passing yards. He set career best in completions (18) and attempts (28). Padilla also relieved Petras after the opening drive of the second half at the Big Ten Championship game. He finished the game 10-15 for 38 yards and an interception.

Petras had started 17 straight games for the Hawkeyes before missing the Nov. 13 contest against Minnesota.

IN THE RANKINGS

The Hawkeyes are ranked 15th in the AP poll, 17th in the coaches poll and 15th in the CFP rankings.

Iowa reached as high as No. 2 in the AP and coaches polls this season, its highest ranking since Nov. 26, 1985 (#2). Iowa spent five weeks ranked No. 1 in 1985.

Iowa has three wins this season over ranked opponents (vs. #17 Indiana, 34-6; at #9 Iowa State, 27-17; vs. #4 Penn State, 23-20).

Iowa opened the 2021 season ranked 18th in the AP Poll. It marked the third straight season Iowa was ranked in the AP Top 25 preseason poll and its highest preseason appearance since being ranked 17th in 2016.

Iowa's first two opponents were ranked in the AP Top 25 (No. 17 Indiana, No. 9 Iowa State). It marked the fourth time in program history the Hawkeyes have opened a season against consecutive opponents ranked in the AP Top 25 (1960, 1973, 1974). The Hawkeyes started 2-0 in 1960, 1-1 in 1974 and 0-2 in 1973.

Iowa has been ranked in the AP Top 25 at least once in each of the last seven seasons, the third-longest streak in school history. Iowa finished the 2020 season ranked 15th in the coaches poll and 16th in the AP poll. It marked the 26th time in program history that Iowa finished the season ranked in the top 25. Iowa has finished ranked 15th or better in the AP poll six times in 22 completed seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

FERENTZ AMONG BIG TEN'S BEST

Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz has 110 Big Ten wins as Iowa's head coach, the fourth most of any coach in Big Ten Conference history. The Hawkeyes defeated Penn State, 41-21, on Nov. 21, 2020, to earn Ferentz's 100th conference win.

Ferentz's 178 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference rank fourth all-time in league history. He is one of five coaches in Big Ten Conference history to win at least 150 games as a member of the Big Ten Conference. The top five include Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonzo Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Ferentz (178) and Joe Paterno (162).

VRBO CITRUS BOWL NOTES



Ferentz (178-109) became Iowa's all-time winningest coach on Sept. 1, 2018. The Hawkeyes defeated Northern Illinois, 33-7. It was Ferentz's 144th win as Iowa's head coach, one more than his predecessor, Hayden Fry (143-89-6). Fry coached Iowa for 20 years (1979-98). Ferentz is in his 23rd season in 2021.

Both Ferentz (178, 110) and Fry (143, 96) rank in the top 10 in overall wins and Big Ten wins. Only Iowa and Michigan have two coaches ranked in the top 10 of both win categories (Bo Schembechler 194, 143; and Lloyd Carr 122, 81).

Iowa is the only school in the country to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

FERENTZ TOPS IN LONGEVITY

Kirk Ferentz is in his 23rd season as Iowa's head football coach in 2021. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football. Ferentz was named Iowa head coach on Dec. 2, 1998. Among Big Ten coaches, only Pat Fitzgerald (2006) has been at his current school for 10 seasons or more. Iowa is the only school to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

Defensive coordinator Phil Parker is in his 23rd season on Iowa's staff, his 10th as defensive coordinator. He is the longest tenured defensive coordinator in FBS.

Quarterbacks coach Ken O'Keefe was on Ferentz's original coaching staff before he left for the NFL following the 2011 season. He returned to Iowa in 2017 to coach Iowa's quarterbacks.

Ferentz is the only Division I coach to coach three sons. Brian Ferentz, a former Hawkeye letterman and captain (2003-05), is in his 10th season on Iowa's coaching staff. James Ferentz was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line and a team captain before graduating in 2013. Steven was an offensive lineman and letterwinner in 2015 and 2016.

PETRAS AMONG ALL-TIME LEADERS

QB Spencer Petras started 17-consecutive games from the 2020 season opener through Week 9 of 2021. Petras's streak of consecutive starts was snapped when he did not play Nov. 13 against Minnesota due to injury.

Petras owns a 13-5 record (.722) as Iowa's starting quarterback, the seventh best winning percentage by a starting quarterback in program history. Iowa has scored 26.5 points per game in 18 Petras starts. He has 3,263 career passing yards, 13th all-time in program history.

Petras led Iowa to 12-consecutive wins from 2020-21, winning the final six games of 2020 and the first six games of 2021. He was 194-324 with 17 touchdown passes, four interceptions and 2,226 passing yards during Iowa's 12-game winning streak.

Petras matched his career-high with three touchdown passes and set a career-high with two rushing touchdowns Week 5 at Maryland. He became the first Iowa quarterback with multiple passing touchdowns and multiple rushing touchdowns in a game since Brad Banks at Minnesota in 2002.

The Hawkeyes averaged 31.8 points per game in 2020, Petras' first year as starting quarterback. It marked Iowa's highest point per game total since 2002 (36.5). Iowa won its final six games in 2020, outscoring its opponents 214-83.

GOING THE OTHER WAY

Iowa leads the country with a school-record 24 interceptions. The Hawkeyes have 88 interception since 2017, more than any team in the country. Eleven Hawkeyes have at least one interception this season. The last time Iowa had 11 players with an interception in a single season was 1997 (14).

LB/DB Dane Belton is tied for second in the NCAA and shares the Big Ten lead with five interceptions. DB Riley Moss has four interceptions and DBs Matt Hankins and Jermari Harris have three interceptions.

Moss has two interceptions returned for a touchdown, both in Week 1. Jack Campbell returned an interception 32 yards for a touchdown against Illinois in Week 11.

Iowa combined for 10 interceptions in consecutive games against Maryland and Penn State, which ties Miami (2001) for second most over a two-game span over the last 25 years. Mississippi State had 11 in 2002.

Six different Hawkeyes intercepted a pass in Iowa's 51-14 win at Maryland, tying a school record for most players with an interception in a single game (vs. Wisconsin in 1982). The six interceptions are the most in a game since Iowa had a school-record seven interceptions vs. Wisconsin in 1982.

Iowa has turned 30 turnovers into 92 points in 2021. The Hawkeyes' defense has scored 28 points (4 TDs and 2 safeties). Iowa's special teams have two touchdowns (one kickoff return, one blocked punt return).

Iowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 14 seasons and 19 of the last 21.

THAT'S NOT A PUNT... THAT'S A PUNT

Melbourne, Australia, native Tory Taylor ranks fourth in the Big Ten averaging 45.9 yards per punt. Taylor leads the Big Ten and ranks second nationally with 76 punts. He has 25 punts of 50 or more yards, including a career-long 69-yard punt at Iowa State in Week 2. Thirty-eight of his punts have been downed inside the 20 this season. Taylor was recognized as a first-team midseason All-American by The Athletic and was a semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award.

Iowa owned the field position battle in each of its 10 wins. The Hawkeyes averaged 20-plus yards better in field position three times (+20 vs. Penn State; +22 at Maryland; +22 at Iowa State).

This season, Taylor has recorded three of the top nine single-game punting averages in the Ferentz era. Iowa's Week 2 punting average of 51.1 ranks No. 3 all-time in the Ferentz era. Its Week 1 punting average of 49.5 ranks No. 7 and the 49.0 average Week 8 ties for ninth.

Taylor was Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week following Iowa's win at Iowa State. He averaged 51.1 yards on eight punts. Five of his punts were downed inside the 20, while Iowa State had just one punt return.

In Iowa's 23-20 win over No. 4 Penn State, Taylor punted nine times, dropping six inside the 20, five inside the 10 and three punts inside the five.

Taylor was a semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award a preseason first-team All-America honoree by The Athletic. He was one of 10 semifinalists for the Ray Guy Award and was named a first-team Freshman All-American by the FWAA in 2020.

RETURN TO SENDER

WR Charlie Jones ranks second in the Big Ten averaging 7.8 yards on a league-high 36 punt returns. He has returned 23 kickoffs for an average of 26.3 yards per return, No. 2 in the Big Ten. He returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown Week 11 against Illinois.

Jones's 36 punt returns are the most by a Hawkeye in a single season since Andy Brodell returned 36 punts (10.6 average) in 2008. The school record for punt returns in a single season is 40 by Ramon Ochoa in 2003 (12.4 average).

Jones is one of three players in school history to score touchdowns on both kickoff and punt returns. (Jones returned a punt 54 yards for a touchdown vs. Michigan State in 2020). The others include C.J. Jones (100-yard kickoff, 65-yard punt) and Kahlil Hill (two kickoffs: 90, 88; two punts: 62, 57).

CAMPBELL HITS 100

LB Jack Campbell leads the Hawkeyes and ranks second in the Big Ten with 129 tackles. He is the first Hawkeye to record 100 tackles in a single season since Josey Jewell, who had 100+ tackles each year from 2015-17 (126, 124, 136). Campbell has four double-digit tackle performances (11, 18, 17, 16) this season.

Campbell earned national Player of the Week honors when he recorded 18 tackles in Iowa's win over Colorado State. He was a semifinalist for the Dick Butkus Award. He returned a fumble recovery for a touchdown at Iowa State and his fumble recovery against Colorado State led directly to a Hawkeye touchdown.

Campbell recorded his first interception of the season Week 11 against Illinois, returning it 32 yards for a touchdown.

GOODSON LEADS GROUND GAME

RB Tyler Goodson leads Iowa's rushing attack with 1,151 yards on 156 attempts, both single-season career highs. His six rushing touchdowns rank ninth in the Big Ten. He is the first Hawkeye to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season since 2017 (Akrum Wadley, 1,109).

Goodson rushed for a career-high 156 yards in Iowa's Week 12 win at Nebraska. It was his ninth career 100-yard rushing game and his fourth this season. He's had four 100-yard rushing games this season (153, 141, 132, 156).

Goodson has 2,551 career rushing yards, 10th all-time in program history.

In Iowa's 23-19 win against No. 7 Minnesota in 2019, Goodson became the first true freshman to start at running back under Ferentz since 2012 (Greg Garmon). He was also the first true freshman to lead the team in single-season rushing in 2019 (638 yards).

FRESH LEGS

Three true freshman have started at least one game this season. Since 1999, Kirk Ferentz's first season at Iowa, only 31 true freshmen have started for the Hawkeyes.

In Iowa's Week 4 win against Colorado State, OL Connor Colby started at RG and WR Keagan Johnson started at wide receiver. Colby was the first true freshman offensive lineman to start since Tristan Wirfs in 2017. Johnson was the first true freshman wide receiver to start since Ihmir Smith-Marsette in 2017.

WR Arland Bruce IV made his first career start Week 11 against Illinois. He had a career-long 28-yard reception to set up a 2-yard touchdown rush in the second quarter. Johnson started the same game, marking the first time two true freshmen wide receivers started a game in the Ferentz era.

Colby and DL Lukas Van Ness were named Freshman All-American by the Maxwell Football Club. Van Ness ties for the team lead with 6.0 sacks and ranks second with 7.5 tackles-for-loss.

CELEBRATING #300

The Hawkeyes' 30-7 win against Kent State on Sept. 18 was their 300th win at Kinnick Stadium since the stadium opened in 1929. The first game played at Kinnick Stadium was Oct. 5, 1929, a 46-0 Hawkeye win against Monmouth. Iowa's 100th win at Kinnick was a 31-19 victory over Arizona on Oct. 4, 1969. The 200th win at Kinnick Stadium was a 44-19 victory against Miami, Ohio, on Sept. 8, 2001. Iowa became the seventh Big Ten school to celebrate at least 300 wins in its home stadium.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,280 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 676-565-39 (.543). That includes a 420-224-16 (.647) record in home games, a 256-341-23 (.431) record in games away from Iowa City, a 348-385-25 (.476) mark in Big Ten games and a 304-189-15 (.612) record in Kinnick Stadium.

5 HAWKEYES NAMED TO MIDSEASON ALL-AMERICA TEAMS

Five members of the University of Iowa football team were recognized on college football's midseason All-America football teams. Junior center Tyler Linderbaum was named first-team center by the Associated Press, Sporting News, CBS Sports, and The Athletic.

Senior defensive back Matt Hankins, also named first-team by the Associated Press, was named first team by CBS Sports and second team by The Athletic. Senior defensive back Riley Moss was a first team selection by Sporting News.

Sophomore punter Tory Taylor was recognized as a first-team selection by The Athletic, while junior linebacker Jack Campbell was a second-team choice by The Athletic.

Linderbaum was named the Rimington Award winner and the Big Ten's Rimington-Pace offensive lineman of the year. He is one of four finalists for the 2021 Rotary Lombardi Award and one of three finalists for the Outland Trophy. He was tabbed preseason first-team All-Big Ten and preseason first-team All-America by five media outlets, including Associated Press, The Athletic, Athlon Sports, Phil Steele and Sporting News.

Hankins was named Big Ten Co-Defensive Player of the Week, the Rose Bowl Game Big Ten Conference Player of the Week and the Bronko Nagurski and Thorpe Award national Defensive Player of the Week following Iowa's 23-20 win over No. 4 Penn State. Hankins had five tackles and a fourth quarter interception in the win over Penn State. He had two interceptions earlier in the season in Iowa's 27-17 win at No. 9 Iowa State.

Moss has four interceptions this season, including two returns for a touchdown. He has 10 career interceptions, with three returned for touchdowns. Both Moss and Hankins were Jim Thorpe Award semifinalists.

Taylor was one of 10 punters named a semifinalist for the 2021 Ray Guy Award. Taylor has been at his best in the biggest games. Six of nine punts against No. 4 Penn State were inside the 20, including four inside the five-yard line. In Iowa's win at Iowa State Taylor dropped three of his punts inside the 10-yard line.

Campbell earned national Player of the Week honors when he recorded 18 tackles in Iowa's win over Colorado State. He leads the Hawkeyes and ranks second in the Big Ten with 129 tackles and was a semifinalist for the Dick Butkus Award. He returned a fumble recovery for a touchdown at Iowa State and returned an interception 32 yards for a touchdown against Illinois. His fumble recovery against Colorado State led directly to a Hawkeye touchdown.

LINDERBAUM NAMED WINNER OF RIMINGTON TROPHY

C Tyler Linderbaum is the 2021 Rimington Trophy winner, which is awarded to the nation's premier center in college football. The center with the most first-team votes on three All-America teams (Walter Camp Foundation, Sporting News, and Football Writers Association of America) determines the winner of the Rimington Trophy.

Linderbaum will be recognized at the Rimington Trophy banquet in Lincoln, Nebraska, on Jan. 15. He is the first Hawkeye to earn the Rimington Trophy. He was a finalist in 2020. Austin Blythe (2015) and Bruce Nelson (2002) were previously finalists for the award.

Linderbaum has started 34 consecutive games at center for the Hawkeyes after playing as a defensive lineman as a true freshman. Iowa has posted a 26-8 record during that span. The Hawkeyes won their final six games in 2020 and began the 2021 season with six straight wins.

Linderbaum was selected as the Big Ten Conference Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year. He is one of four finalists for the Rotary Lombardi Award and one of three finalists for the Outland Trophy. He was named first-team All-Big Ten by league coaches and media.

CAMPBELL NAMED BUTKUS AWARD SEMIFINALIST

LB Jack Campbell was named one of 16 semifinalists for the Dick Butkus Award. Campbell leads Iowa with 129 tackles, including 53 solo tackles and 76 assists. He ranks second in the Big Ten and fourth in the country in tackles.

Campbell recorded his first interception of the season Week 11 against Illinois and returned it 32 yards for a touchdown. He had his second interception of the season at the Big Ten Championship Game. He also has six pass break-ups, two recovered fumbles, one caused fumble and 3.5 tackles for loss.

Campbell was named a second-team midseason All-American by The Athletic. He was the Bronko Nagurski national and Big Ten Conference Defensive Player of the Week following Iowa's win over Colorado State. He recorded a career-high 18 tackles against Colorado State. He had seven solo tackles and 11 assists and added three pass break-ups to go with his second fumble recovery of the season (touchdown at Iowa State).

Former Iowa linebacker Josey Jewell was a finalist for the Butkus Award in 2016 and a semifinalist in 2017.

IOWA IN OVERTIME

Iowa holds a 7-5 record in overtime games. Iowa won its first overtime contest, defeating Penn State 26-23 on Nov. 4, 2000, in State College, Pa. The Hawkeyes are 3-4 in single overtime, 3-0 in double overtime and 1-1 in triple overtime. Iowa is 2-2 in overtime in Kinnick Stadium and 5-3 in overtime road games. HANKINS, MOSS NAMED THORPE AWARD SEMIFINALISTS

DB Matt Hankins and DB Riley Moss were semifinalists for the 2021 Paycom Jim Thorpe Award, awarded to the best defensive back in college football.

Hankins started 37 straight games in the Iowa secondary from 2018-21. Hankins has four interceptions this season. He has not played since Week 10 due to injury.

Hankins was named Big Ten Co-Defensive Player of the Week, the Rose Bowl Game Big Ten Conference Player of the Week, the Bronko Nagurski national Defensive Player of the Week, and the Thorpe Award Player of the Week following Iowa's 23-20 win over No. 4 Penn State. Hankins had five tackles and a fourth quarter interception in Iowa's win over Penn State. He had two interceptions in Iowa's 27-17 win at No. 9 Iowa State.

Hankins was named a midseason first-team All-American by the Associated Press and CBSSports.com, and a second team selection by The Athletic. He was also recognized by the Thorpe Award following his play in Iowa's win at Iowa State.

Moss is tied for 11th in the country and third in the Big Ten with four interceptions. He missed Weeks 8-10 due to injury. Moss had two interceptions returns for touchdowns in Iowa's opening win over Indiana. He has 10 career interceptions, with three returned for touchdowns.

Moss was named a first-team midseason All-American by Sporting News.

SHUDAK NAMED GROZA AWARD SEMIFINALIST

K Caleb Shudak was one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award, presented by the Orange Bowl. Shudak joined the Iowa program as a walk-on. He is in his third season handling all kickoff duties for the Hawkeyes, and his first season handling field goal duties.

Shudak leads the Hawkeyes in scoring with 103 points. He has been successful on 23-27 field goal attempts, with one miss attributed to a high snap from center. He has connected on all 34 PAT attempts and totaled 41 touchbacks on 68 kickoffs.

Shudak has connected on four field goals of 50-plus yards, including career long of 51 yards in wins at Iowa State, against Illinois and at Nebraska. He connected on a career-high four field goals against the Illini and matched his career-high one week later at Nebraska. He was a perfect 3-3 in field goal attempts in wins against Maryland and Penn State. Eleven of his 23 field goals have covered over 40 yards.

Off the field, Shudak has earned Academic All-Big Ten honors the last four years. He has earned Dean's List recognition during seven semesters and President's List honors.

TAYLOR NAMED RAY GUY AWARD SEMIFINALIST

P Tory Taylor was one of 10 punters named a semifinalist for the 2021 Ray Guy Award. Taylor was recognized on the Ray's 8 list following three games, including contests versus Iowa State, Penn State, and Wisconsin.

Through 13 games Taylor is averaging 45.9 yards per punt, with a long of 69 yards. He has 25 punts of at least 50 yards and has placed 38 punts inside the opponent 20. Hawkeye opponents have just 18 returns for 69 yards, while 24 have resulted in a fair catch. Just 11 Taylor punts have been touchbacks.

In Iowa's win at Iowa State Taylor averaged 51.1 yards on eight punts, with a long of 69 yards. Five of his punts were downed inside the 20, while Iowa State had just one punt return. In the win over Penn State, he averaged 44.2 yards per punt, with six punts inside the 20 and five inside the 10. He averaged 49 yards on seven punts at Wisconsin, with a long of 61 yards. Three of his punts were downed inside the Wisconsin 20, including the 11, 14, and 13-yard lines. The Badgers had just one return for six yards.

Taylor was named a first-team midseason All-American by The Athletic. He was the Big Ten Conference Special Teams Player of the Week following Iowa's 27-17 win at Iowa State.

MOSS EARNS WEEKLY CONFERENCE AND NATIONAL HONORS

DB Riley Moss was named Walter Camp FBS National Defensive Player of the Week and Big Ten Conference Defensive Player of the Week following No. 18 Iowa's 34-6 win over No. 17 Indiana on Sept. 4.

Moss became just the third player in school history to return two interceptions for touchdowns in a single game. He had a 30-yard interception return to give Iowa a 14-0 advantage in the opening minutes of the game. Moss collected his second touchdown in the final minutes of the second quarter, returning the theft 55 yards for the score. Moss added one solo tackle and two pass break-ups against the Hoosiers as the Hawkeye defense allowed just 233 yards total offense.

Moss has 10 career interceptions for 239 yards, including three touchdown returns. The 10 thefts tie for 11th in program history, while his 239 return yards rank second among Iowa's career leaders (Tyler Sash, 392 yards). The three touchdowns tie Desmond King and Tom Knight for the most in school history.

Moss is the sixth Hawkeye to earn the Walter Camp national award, which is in its 18th year of being presented on a weekly basis to one offensive and one defensive player. Previous Hawkeye honorees include linebacker Chad Greenway (2004), linebacker Mike Klinkenborg (2006), linebacker Josey Jewell (2017), defensive back Josh Jackson (2017) and quarterback Nate Stanley (2018).

The weekly conference honor was the second of his career. He was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week in 2018 following a pair of interceptions at Minnesota.

TAYLOR NAMED B1G CO-SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

P Tory Taylor was named Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week following No. 10 Iowa's 27-17 win at No. 9 Iowa State on Sept. 11 in the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Series. He was also named to the Ray Guy Award's Ray's 8 list following Iowa's Week 2 win, following Iowa's win over Penn State, and after Iowa's game at Wisconsin.

Taylor earned the Big Ten honors after playing a key role in Iowa's 27-17 win at Iowa State. He averaged 51.1 yards on eight punts, with a long of 69 yards. Five of his punts were downing inside the 20, while Iowa State had just one punt return.

The Big Ten Player of the Week honor was a career first for Taylor. He was named a Ray Guy Award semifinalist on Nov. 10. He was also a semifinalist for the award in 2020. Taylor was the Eddleman-Fields Big Ten Conference Punter of the Year in 2020 while earning first-team All-Big Ten honors. He was named first-team Freshman All-America by the FWAA and second-team All-America by The Athletic.

CAMPBELL NAMED B1G DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

LB Jack Campbell was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week following No. 5 Iowa's 24-14 win over Colorado State on Sept. 25. He was also named the Bronko Nagurski national Defensive Player of the Week.

Campbell led Iowa's defensive effort in the 24-14 win over Colorado State as the Hawkeyes rallied from a 14-7 halftime deficit. Campbell recovered a Colorado State fumble at the six-yard line in the third quarter, which led to Iowa scoring on the next play to tie the contest, 14-14.

Campbell recorded a career-high 18 tackles against Colorado State. He had seven solo tackles and 11 assists and added three pass break-ups to go with his second fumble recovery of the season (touchdown at Iowa State).

The Big Ten weekly honor was the first of Campbell's career.

HANKINS NAMED B1G DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

DB Matt Hankins was named Big Ten Co-Defensive Player of the Week following No. 3 Iowa's 23-20 win over No. 4 Penn State on Oct. 9. He was also named Nagurski, Thorpe and Rose Bowl Game National Player of the Week following his Week 6 performance.

Hankins was credited with five tackles in Iowa's win over Penn State, including three solo stops and two assists, along with Iowa's fourth and final interception of the day. Hankins was credited with a solo tackle on a Penn State fourth-and-three attempt with 3:39 remaining, stopping a PSU drive that reached the Iowa 45-yardline.

Hankins then stopped Penn State's next possession with an interception on fourth down, his third of the season. Hankins had two interceptions earlier this season in Iowa's 27-17 win at No. 9 Iowa State.

The Big Ten weekly honor was the first of Hankins' career.

SHUDAK NAMED B1G SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

K Caleb Shudak was named Big Ten Conference Special Teams Player of the Week for his play in the Hawkeyes' 28-21 win at Nebraska on Nov. 26.

Shudak connected on all four field goal attempts against Nebraska, connecting from 51, 48, 36, and 44 yards. The four made field goals matches a career high, set the previous week in Iowa's 33-23 win over Illinois.

Shudak has made a career-long 51-yard field goal in three different games this season, including wins over Iowa State, Illinois, and Nebraska. For the season he has made 23-of-27 attempts with just one miss from less than 50 yards.

For the season, Shudak leads the Hawkeyes in scoring with 103 points, adding 34-of-34 PAT attempts to go with his 23 made field goals. Shudak's 103 points rank as the eighth-highest single season total in school history. He also handles kickoff duties, recording 41 touchbacks.

The Big Ten weekly honor was the first of Shudak's career.

IOWA STREAK HITS, ENDS AT 12

Iowa finished the 2020 season with six straight wins and opened the 2021 season with six consecutive wins. The Hawkeyes outscored those 12 opponents, 403-161, averaging 33.6 points per game offensively and allowing 13.4 ppg during the winning streak.

The 12-game win streak was Iowa's longest since opening the 2015 season with 12 straight wins. Iowa reached the Big Ten Championship game that season and accepted an invitation to the 2016 Rose Bowl game. The 12-game winning streak ranks fourth all-time in school history (20, 1920-23; 14, 1899-00; 13, 2008-09).

Iowa's 12-game streak including nine straight wins against Big Ten opponents (2020-21). It marked the second longest streak of consecutive Big Ten wins. Iowa won 10 straight from 2001-02.

HAWKEYES OPENED 6-FOR-6

Iowa opened the season with six straight wins for the third time in the Kirk Ferentz era. Iowa started 9-0 in 2009 and 12-0 in 2015.

BIG TEN BOWL GAMES SINCE 2001

Iowa will play Kentucky at the 2021 VRBO Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2022. The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 20 times in the last 21 seasons. Iowa accepted an invitation to the 2020 Music City Bowl, but the game was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz is one bowl win shy of tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 9-8 bowl record and has led Iowa to three straight bowl wins, tying its longest such streak in program history. Ferentz's nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history.

Seventeen coaches have won 10 or more bowl games in their career. Among active coaches, only Nick Saban (16), Mack Brown (14), Kyle Whittingham (11), Mike Gundy (10) and Dabo Swinney (10) have more bowl wins than Ferentz.

Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (11) and Wisconsin (10) have more bowl wins (including FCS Playoffs and the BCS championship game), than Iowa. Iowa is 17-15-1 all-time in bowl games. The following are the records for Big Ten teams in bowl games since 2001:

Kirk Ferentz
Moon Family Head Football Coach
23rd Year at Iowa

Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz is completing his 23rd year as head football coach at the University of Iowa, and his 32nd season overall at the University. The position of UI head football coach was endowed in 2021 by Will and Renee Moon. The Bettendorf, Iowa couple are UI alumni and longtime Hawkeye supporters.

With Iowa's 33-7 win over Northern Illinois in the opening game of the 2018 season, Ferentz recorded win No. 144 as Iowa's head coach, surpassing the late Hayden Fry as the winningest football coach in program history. Fry was Iowa's head coach for 20 seasons (1979-98).

Ferentz is the longest tenured head football coach in the nation. Ferentz and Fry are the only head coaches to lead a Division I football program for 20 years, consecutively. With a 63-0 win at Illinois in 2018, Ferentz became just the fifth coach in Big Ten Conference history to win 150 games as a Big Ten head coach. Ferentz earned his 100th career Big Ten win at Penn State (Nov. 21, 2020).

Ferentz holds a 178-109 record at Iowa, including 110-79 in conference games. The 178 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten rank fourth all-time in league history and his 110 conference victories also rank fourth in Big Ten history. His 25-year record as a college head coach is 190-130.

Under Ferentz' leadership the Iowa football program has earned 19 bowl game invitations since 2001. That success has been achieved with strong commitments to the program, the University of Iowa, and the ideals that represent Hawkeye football – hard work, determination, player development and character, on and off the field.

Iowa's appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl is the 12th January bowl game for the Hawkeyes under Ferentz, who has posted five January wins as Iowa's head coach. The Hawkeyes have won three straight bowl games for the second time under Ferentz (2008-10 and 2017-19).

With the 10 wins in 2021, Iowa has won 10 games or more for the seventh time under Ferentz. The Hawkeyes have won 19 conference games over the past three seasons, the most successful three-year stretch since winning 20 league games from 2002-04. Iowa has won at least six conference games in three straight seasons for the first time under Ferentz.

Iowa opened the 2021 season with six straight wins, including three victories over ranked opponents while being ranked as high as second in the nation. Following consecutive losses, the Hawkeyes rallied to win their final four regular season games to earn the Big Ten's West Division title.

The Hawkeyes won 47 games from 2015-19, the best five-year win total in school history. Just eight programs in the nation won more games during that time frame. Ferentz guided the Hawkeyes to eight wins or more in five consecutive seasons (2015-19) and 13 seasons overall since 2003.

On the field, Ferentz's approach can be described as smart, tough, and physical. Off the field, academics and character development are a focus. In 2020, the University of Iowa outperformed its peers nationally in the classroom for the 10th consecutive year, according to data released by the NCAA.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes scored at least 26 points in each of the six wins, while holding three opponents to just seven points. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories

over Minnesota, Nebraska, and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the nation in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll, 16th by the Associated Press. Iowa's Music City Bowl date with Missouri in December was canceled.

Iowa concluded the 2019 season with three straight wins over border rivals Minnesota, Illinois, and Nebraska, followed by the 49-24 Holiday Bowl win over No. 22 Southern California. Following a 24-22 loss at Wisconsin to open November, the Hawkeyes handed seventh-ranked Minnesota its first loss of the season to maintain possession of Floyd of Rosedale. A 27-24 win over the Cornhuskers in the final game of the season kept the Heroes Trophy in Iowa City. Iowa's three losses came by a combined 14 points to three teams who were ranked in the top 20 at the time. Iowa also maintained possession of the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Trophy with a non-conference win at Iowa State in September.

Iowa won six of its first seven games in 2018 and closed the season with wins in the final three games, including the 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State. The four losses came by a total of 23 points, and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa's defense ranked second nationally in interceptions after leading the nation in 2017. Iowa's 53 interceptions over the past three seasons ranks first nationally.

Iowa's 8-5 record in 2017 included wins in three of four trophy games, with victories over Iowa State, Minnesota, and Nebraska, plus the Pinstripe Bowl win to conclude the season. Iowa also began November with a 55-24 win over third-ranked Ohio State. Nine of Iowa's 12 regular season opponents were bowl eligible (posting an 8-1 record) as the Hawkeyes faced one of the strongest schedules in the nation.

Iowa closed the 2016 regular season with three straight wins, including two over ranked opponents. Iowa posted a 6-3 record in Big Ten play to tie for second place in the West Division and finished the season at 8-5 overall.

Highlights of the year included Iowa defeating second-ranked Michigan and 15th-ranked Nebraska in the final month of the season, as well as earning a January bowl invitation for the 10th time during the Ferentz era.

The Iowa football program enjoyed a historic season in 2015, posting a final 12-2 record. Ferentz led the 2015 Hawkeyes to a perfect regular season, setting a school record with 12 wins. The Hawkeyes won the Big Ten Conference West Division (8-0) before falling to Michigan State, 16-13, in a close championship game that was decided in the final minute of play. The Hawkeyes earned their sixth invitation to the Rose Bowl, which was Iowa's first appearance in Pasadena in 25 years.

Ferentz was recognized with both the Hayes-Schembechler and Dave McClain Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year awards in 2015. He was named Eddie Robinson (FWAA) and Woody Hayes national Coach of the Year (Columbus Touchdown Club), and received the Dodd Trophy, presented by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region 3 Coach of the Year.

Coaching History

Ferentz' coaching career began as a student assistant (1977) at his alma mater, the University of Connecticut. The next two years (1978-79) were spent at Worcester Academy, where he also taught English literature. He then served as a graduate assistant offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh during the 1980 season. That Pittsburgh team (coached by Jackie Sherrill) finished with an 11-1 record and a number two national ranking.

Ferentz joined Hayden Fry's Iowa staff as the offensive line coach in 1981, which became Iowa's first winning seasons in 19 years. The season was highlighted by the Hawkeyes winning a conference title and earning a Rose Bowl berth – both of which had not occurred in 20 years.

He continued as Iowa's offensive line coach through the 1989 season and had great success coaching offensive lines that, to date, have anchored four of Iowa's highest scoring offenses. In addition, eight of Iowa's top 10 offensive teams, in terms of yards gained per game, have operated with Ferentz as the head coach or offensive line coach. And Iowa's top nine passing teams of all time have occurred with Ferentz as the head coach, or offensive line coach.

Ferentz was named head coach of the University of Maine Black Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years before being hired by Bill Belichick and the Cleveland Browns to coach the offensive line. He remained with the organization after it moved to Baltimore and became the Baltimore Ravens, serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach. In all, he worked six years with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens of the National Football League.

He rejoined the Hawkeyes as head coach in 1999 and is Iowa's longest tenured head football coach.

Personal History

Off the field, family is the top priority for Ferentz. Ferentz and his wife, Mary, have been married for 42 years. They have five children: Brian, Kelly, Joanne, James, and Steven. They also have four granddaughters (Presley, Blakely, Connolly, and Jolie), and six grandsons (John, Forest, Nixon, Lincoln, Beckett, and Marshall). All five of their children graduated from City High School in Iowa City and earned degrees from the University of Iowa; and each of the boys had the incredible experience of playing football at the University of Iowa with their father as head coach.

Kirk and Mary are very enthusiastic supporters of the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital. They serve as advocates for the Children's Hospital, hosting and speaking at events across the state to raise awareness and support for the hospital. Kirk and Mary established the "Ferentz Family Pediatric Research and Education Endowment Fund" in 2007. In honor of their granddaughter, Mary and Kirk donated more than \$1 million in 2017 to establish the Savvy Elizabeth Ferentz Neonatology Research Fund. In addition, the Iowa Ladies' Football Academy has donated \$2.5 million to the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital, which opened across the street from Kinnick Stadium in December, 2016.

Ferentz has also been involved in supporting a number of community and university-related initiatives, including serving as the honorary chair of the University of Iowa's United Way campaign. Kirk and Mary have also contributed generously to the University of Iowa, including donations to the University's College of Liberal Arts. Another significant gift was a \$500,000 commitment to support the Iowa Football Legacy Campaign, which included two key projects benefitting the Hawkeye football program; the indoor practice facility; and the Stew and LeNore Hansen Football Performance Center.

Ferentz was born August 1, 1955, in Royal Oak, Michigan. He attended Upper St. Clair High School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and graduated from the University of Connecticut in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in English Education. He was a football captain and an academic all-Yankee Conference linebacker at Connecticut.

Ferentz received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Neag School of Education at the University of Connecticut in May, 2009. He was inducted into the Upper St. Clair High School Hall of Fame in September, 2002, and the Western Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in May, 2003.

Iowa extended its winning streak to seven games. Iowa has outscored its last seven opponents, 248-89, averaging 35.4 points per game offensively and allowing 12.7 ppg during the winning streak.

The 34 points scored are the most in a Big Ten opener since scoring 42 at Penn State in 2002.

Noah Shannon (4), John Waggoner (4), Jestin Jacobs (3), Logan Lee (3) and Ethan Hurkett (3) recorded career highs in tackles.

MISCELLANEOUS

Iowa has played 23 straight games without surrendering 25 points, the longest streak in the nation among Power 5 teams.

Iowa has won seven straight Big Ten games for the fifth time in the last 30 years. Iowa won eight straight conference games in 2015 and 2008, and seven straight in 2004 and 1991.

Iowa has scored at least 25 points in each of its wins during its winning streak. It is the second time in school history Iowa has scored 25 points or more in seven straight wins (2015, seven games).

QB Spencer Petras connected with RB Tyler Goodson for a 67-yard touchdown in the third quarter. It was a career-long pass for Petras and a career-long reception for Goodson.

Iowa scored 31 points in the second quarter, the most points scored in a single quarter since scoring 37 in the first quarter against Akron on Aug. 31, 2002. The 31 points scored in a Big Ten game are the most by a Hawkeye team since putting up 35 points on Illinois in the first quarter in 1985.

Six different Hawkeyes intercepted a pass Friday, tying a school record for most players with an interception in a single game (vs. Wisconsin in 1982). The six interceptions are the most in a game since Iowa had a school-record seven interceptions vs. Wisconsin in 1982. Iowa leads the Big Ten with 12 interceptions. Iowa has 76 interceptions since 2017, more than any team in the country.

Iowa had seven takeaways, its most in a single game since 1987 against Northwestern (8). The Hawkeye defense has scored 20 points this season (3 TDs and 1 safety).

Iowa scored points following its first four takeaways, turning the four takeaways into 24 points. The Hawkeyes have scored 75 points on 16 takeaways this season.

Iowa has won 12 consecutive games. The Hawkeyes have outscored their last 12 opponents, 403-161, averaging 33.6 points per game offensively and allowing 13.4 ppg during the winning streak. DB Riley Moss had an interception in the second quarter, his fourth of the season. Moss has 10 career interceptions for 239 yards, including three touchdown returns. The 10 thefts tie for 11th in program history.

DB Matt Hankins fourth-quarter interception was his third of the season, sixth of his career.

WR Nico Ragaini's fourth-quarter touchdown (44 yards) was his first of the season and third of his career. Ragaini's team-high 73 yards receiving are a career best.

DT Logan Lee had a career-high seven tackles.

Iowa leads the country with 16 interceptions. The Hawkeyes have 79 interception since 2017, more than any team in the country.

The Hawkeyes have scored 78 points on 20 takeaways this season.

Iowa has won six straight games against ranked opponents dating back to 2019. The last time Iowa won six straight against ranked opponents was a six-game stretch in 1960.

Iowa had four interceptions Saturday, extending its streak of consecutive games with an interception to six. Iowa has had at least three interceptions in a game four times this season.

WR Charlie Jones returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter. The return ties a school record. He is this fourth player in program history to return a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown. Jones's previous career long was 77 yards. The last Hawkeye to return a kickoff for a touchdown was Ithmar Smith-Marssette (98 yards vs. USC at 2019 Holiday Bowl).

WR Charlie Jones is just the third player in school history to return both a kickoff and a punt for touchdowns in a career. (Jones returned a punt 54 yards for a touchdown vs. Michigan State in 2020). The others include C.J. Jones (100 kickoff, 65 punt) and Kahlil Hill (two kick-offs: 90, 88; two punts: 62, 57).

RB Tyler Goodson rushed 27 times for 132 yards, his eighth career 100-yard game. Goodson has been Iowa's leading rusher for 14 straight games, the longest streak by a Hawkeye since Ladell Betts was Iowa's top rusher for 37 straight games from 1998-2001. Betts is now Iowa's running backs coach.

RB Tyler Goodson has 2,345 career rushing yards, 10th all-time in program history. He passed Shonn Greene (2,228) and Ronnie Harmon (2,271) on Iowa's all-time career rushing list.

WR Arland Bruce made his first career start. He is the 31st true freshman in the Ferentz era to start, and third this season (OL Connor Colby, WR Keagan Johnson). Bruce had a career-long 28-yard reception to set up a 2-yard touchdown rush in the second quarter. The touchdown was the third of his career (second rushing).

Iowa started two true freshman wide receivers in a game for the first time in the Ferentz era. WR Keagan Johnson made his seventh career start. WR Arland Bruce made his first career start.

K Caleb Shudak connected on a career-high four field goals (51, 48, 29, 32). Shudak tied his career-long with a 51-yard field goal in the second quarter. He has three field goals of 50-yards or better this season.

DB Dane Belton had an interception in the second quarter, his fifth of the year, best in the Big Ten.

LB Jack Campbell intercepted a pass and returned it 32 yards for a touchdown, his first of the season and second of his career.

Iowa leads the country in interceptions (21) and ranks third nationally in takeaways (26). The Hawkeyes have 85 interception since 2017, more than any team in the country. Eleven different Hawkeyes have at least one interception this season. Iowa is plus-18 in turnover margin in its nine wins and minus-six in its two losses.

DB Matt Hankins did not play. He had started 37 consecutive games.

IOWA NOTES

Iowa clinched a share of the Big Ten West Division title.

Iowa scored the final 22 points of the game and outscored the Huskers 19-0 in the fourth quarter. Iowa erased a 12-point fourth quarter deficit (trailed 21-9), its largest fourth-quarter deficit in a win since trailing by 14 points against Pittsburgh in 2011. The last double-digit fourth quarter deficit erased by Iowa in a win was in 2014 (trailed Ball State 13-3 entering the fourth).

Iowa has won 19 conference games over the last three seasons, the most successful three-year stretch since Iowa won 20 conference games from 2002-04. Iowa has won at least six conference games in three straight years for the first time under Kirk Ferentz (19 wins). The last time Iowa won at least six conference games in three straight seasons was 1981-83 (19 wins).

Iowa has won 10 games or more for the seventh time under head coach Kirk Ferentz (2002, 2003, 2004, 2009, 2015, 2019, 2021).

DB Jermari Harris intercepted Nebraska on its 2-yard line on the Huskers' final offensive play of the game. The interception is the second of the season for Harris and the 22nd of the season for Iowa. Iowa leads the country in interceptions (22). The Hawkeyes have 86 interception since 2017, more than any team in the country. Eleven different Hawkeyes have at least one interception this season. Iowa is plus-19 in turnover margin in its 10 wins and minus-six in its two losses.

RB Tyler Goodson rushed 23 times for a career-high 156 yards, his ninth career 100-yard game. Goodson has been Iowa's leading rusher for 15 straight games, the longest streak by a Hawkeye since Ladell Betts was Iowa's top rusher for 37 straight games from 1998-2001. Betts is now Iowa's running backs coach. Goodson has 2,501 career rushing yards, 10th all-time in program history.

RB Tyler Goodson has 1,101 rushing yards on 238 attempts, both single-season career highs. The last time a Hawkeye rushed for 1,000 yards in a single season was 2017 (Akrum Wadley, 1,109).

K Caleb Shudak was perfect on four field goals attempts today (51, 48, 36, 44), matching a career high set last week. Shudak connected on a 51-yard field goal in the second quarter, matching his career long. It was this third 51-yard field goal of the season.

K Caleb Shudak was good on both PAT attempts and scored 14 points today, raising his season total to 100, the eighth highest single season point total in school history.

LB Jack Campbell had a game-high 16 tackles, raising his season total to 124 (tied 28th in school history). Campbell has four double-digit tackle performances (11, 18, 17, 16) this season.

Iowa WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette tied a bowl record with a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. Southern California in the 2019 Holiday Bowl. He also set a record for kickoff return average with a 47.3 average (3-142 yards).

Iowa set individual and team marks for Kickoff Return Yards in the 2019 Outback Bowl, as Ihmir Smith-Marsette had 150 yards on five returns.

Iowa set team records for the Outback Bowl for Fewest First Downs Allowed (11), Fewest Penalties (0) and Fewest Penalty Yards (0).

Running back Akrum Wadley set Pinstripe Bowl records for kickoff returns (5) and KO return yards (171) in the 2017 Pinstripe Bowl win over Boston College.

DE Anthony Nelson tied the Pinstripe Bowl record with two QB sacks, P Colten Rastetter tied the record for most punts (6), and DB Jack Gervase and DB Josh Jackson tied the bowl record with one interception.

Kickoff returner C.J. Jones set an Orange Bowl record when he returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown against Southern California in the 2003 Orange Bowl.

Kickoff returner Jordan Cotton set an Outback Bowl record for KO return average when he averaged 42.7 yards (3 for 128 yards) per return in the 2014 Outback Bowl vs. LSU.

Linebacker Abdul Hodge broke the Outback Bowl record for most tackles when he registered 19 against Florida in 2006.

Punters Nick Gallery (1996) and Jason Baker (1997) established bowl records for longest punt in two of Iowa's bowl games. Gallery had a 59-yard punt in the 1996 Alamo Bowl and Baker had a 76-yard punt in the 1997 Sun Bowl.

The Hawkeye ground attack churned for 217 yards. Hughes finished with eight tackles, while Rollins added five. Sophomore Jared DeVries finished with two sacks and five tackles, three for a loss. Shaw and DeVries were named offensive and defensive MVP's, respectively.

McCann completed 19-26 passes for 161 yards, with no interceptions.

Fifth-year senior Warren Holloway caught an improbable 56-yard game-winning touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate as time expired to lift Iowa to a thrilling 30-25 triumph over 11th-ranked LSU in the 2005 Capital One Bowl. The 56-yard bomb on the final play was arguably the best finish in bowl history. The reception was Holloway's first career touchdown.

Iowa grabbed an early 7-0 lead when Tate connected with WR Clinton Solomon on a 57-yard score on its first possession. LSU cut the Hawkeye lead to 7-6 on a pair of field goals midway through the second quarter. LSU rallied with a pair of touchdown passes to WR Skyler Green (22 and three yards) as the Tigers took their first lead of the game, 25-24, with 46 seconds left.

Tate drove the Hawkeyes to the 44-yard line before throwing the pass to Holloway as the final seconds clicked off the clock. Tate was named the Capital One Bowl MVP, while DL Jonathan Babineaux was recognized as Iowa's Defensive MVP. Tate completed 20-32 passes for 287 yards and two touchdowns. The scoring passes of 56 and 57 yards marked the first time an Iowa quarterback has tossed two touchdowns over 50 yards in a bowl game. WR Ed Hinkel caught a career and game-high 10 passes for 93 yards. Solomon caught four passes for 81 yards and one score, while Holloway caught four passes for 72 yards and one touchdown.

GAME RECAP

Florida scored the game's first 17 points and held off a late Iowa surge to defeat the Hawkeyes 31-24 in the 2006 Outback Bowl at Tampa, FL.

The Gators blocked and returned an Iowa punt for a score on Iowa's first possession to take a 7-0 advantage. Florida then added a 21-yard field goal and returned an interception 60 yards to take a 17-0 lead with 1:57 left in the first half.

Iowa scored its first points on a 20-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate to WR Clinton Solomon.

Florida added a 38-yard touchdown pass for the only score of the third quarter, but Iowa rallied to score 17 fourth-quarter points to make for an exciting finish. WR Ed Hinkel caught touchdown passes of four and 14 yards from Tate, while PK Kyle Schlicher converted a 45-yard field goal to cut the Florida lead to 34-21 with 1:24 left.

Iowa's comeback fell short as the Hawkeyes failed to recover an onside kick. On the previous play, Iowa recovered the onside kick, only to be flagged for an offside penalty.

Tate completed 32-55 passes for 346 yards and three scores; the 32 pass completions and 55 attempts established Iowa bowl records. Hinkel caught a team-high nine passes for 87 yards and tied an Iowa bowl record with two touchdown receptions. Damian Sims tied an Iowa bowl record with five kickoff returns for 107 yards.

LB Abdul Hodge amassed an Outback Bowl and Iowa bowl record 19 tackles (14 solo) to lead the Hawkeye defense. DB Antwan Allen and DB Marcus Paschal each added 10 tackles, while LB Chad Greenway recorded nine stops.

GAME RECAP

Texas outscored Iowa 23-10 in the final three quarters en route to a 26-24 Alamo Bowl victory over the Hawkeyes in front of a bowl-record 65,875 fans in the Alamodome. The game also marked the most watched bowl game ever on ESPN.

Iowa sprinted out of the gates, scoring touchdowns on its first two possessions. RB Albert Young scored on a one-yard run and WR Andy Brodell caught a 63-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate.

The Longhorns scored the next 10 points on a 43-yard field goal and a 72-yard touchdown pass to grab a 20-14 advantage midway through the third period. Iowa quickly answered with a four-play, 68-yard drive that culminated with a 23-yard touchdown reception by Brodell.

Texas responded with a touchdown on its following possession to go ahead 26-21. Iowa added a PK Kyle Schlicher 38-yard field goal late with 6:20 remaining to cut the deficit to 26-24.

Tate completed 15-25 passes for 274 yards and two touchdowns. Brodell tied an Iowa bowl record with two touchdown receptions and matched a career high with 159 receiving yards on six receptions.

Texas QB Colt McCoy was named the Most Outstanding Offensive Player. Four Hawkeyes recorded seven tackles or more. DB Miguel Merrick had a team-high eight tackles. DB Charles Godfrey and LB Ed Miles each were credited with seven stops. LB Zach Gabelmann, who started in place of the injured LB Mike Klinkenborg, also collected a career-high seven tackles.

GAME RECAP

Iowa forced five South Carolina turnovers and scored the game's first 31 points en route to a convincing 31-10 victory at the 2009 Outback Bowl in Raymond James Stadium at Tampa, FL. Iowa finished the season winning six of its last seven games and pushed its all-time bowl record to 12-10-1.

RB Shonn Greene was named the bowl's Most Valuable Player after rushing for 121 yards and three touchdowns on 29 carries. The 29 attempts, three rushing scores and 18 points are new Iowa bowl records. Greene finished his junior campaign with a school single-season record 20 rushing touchdowns and 1,850 rushing yards. Additionally, he rushed for over 100 yards in all 13 games, also an Iowa single-season record.

QB Ricky Stanzi completed 13-19 passes for 147 yards and a touchdown. He completed a six-yard touchdown to WR Trey Stross on Iowa's opening drive. Iowa's tight ends combined for seven receptions and 92 yards – Brandon Myers had four catches for 49 yards, while Tony Moeaki had three for 43 yards.

Iowa led 21-0 at halftime on two Greene one-yard runs and Stross' six-yard touchdown reception. The Gamecocks scored the final 10 points on a 10-yard pass and a 48-yard field goal.

Defensively, Iowa collected three interceptions, which tied an Iowa bowl record, and recovered two fumbles. Four of the five South Carolina miscues came in the first 30 minutes. SS Tyler Sash tied an Outback Bowl and Iowa bowl record with two thefts. He returned the two interceptions 74 total yards, which is an Iowa bowl record. DB Bradley Fletcher recorded the other interception in the end zone and also forced a fumble. LB A.J. Edds recovered both South Carolina fumbles.

GAME RECAP

Iowa turned in another dominating defensive performance in defeating ninth-ranked Georgia Tech, 24-14, in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl. The Hawkeyes won their second straight January bowl game and evened their record at 1-1 in BCS games.

The Iowa defense limited Georgia Tech to 155 yards total offense, including just 12 passing yards. The Yellow Jackets entered the game ranked second in the nation in rushing offense. Georgia Tech was held to just 32 net yards on 20 offensive plays in the first half and rushed for just 143 net yards in the contest.

Iowa quarterback Ricky Stanzi, after missing the final two games of the regular season due to injury, completed his first eight pass attempts in leading the Hawkeyes to a 14-0 advantage in the first period. Stanzi connected with TE Tony Moeaki for a 54-yard gain to set up the first score of the game, a four-yard completion to WR Marvin McNutt.

Iowa added a second touchdown on its next possession, as Stanzi connected with WR Colin Sandeman on a 21-yard scoring play. Stanzi completed 17-29 passes for 231 yards and the two scores.

Georgia Tech used a pass interception return for its only points of the first half, leaving Iowa with a 14-7 advantage at the break. The Hawkeyes increased the advantage to 17-7 late in the third period on a 33-yard field goal by Daniel Murray.

After Tech narrowed the margin to 17-14 early in the final period, Iowa again turned to its defense. Senior LB A.J. Edds had a pass interception and the Iowa defense forced another Tech punt with 4:54 remaining. Freshman RB Brandon Wegher sealed the win with a 32-yard scoring run with 1:56 left to play.

Wegher ended the game with 113 rushing yards on 16 carries. Moeaki had 85 yards on four receptions, Sandeman had four receptions for a career-best 53 yards and Derrell Johnson-Koulianos had four receptions for 63 yards before leaving the game in the second quarter due to injury.

DE Adrian Clayborn had nine solo tackles and was named the Most Valuable Player. Senior LB Pat Angerer added 10 tackles and Clayborn had two of Iowa's three QB sacks.

GAME RECAP

Iowa used record setting performances on both offense and defense to earn a 27-24 win over 12th-ranked Missouri in the 2010 Insight Bowl. The win was the third straight bowl victory for the Hawkeyes and the fourth of the season (in eight games) against a nationally-ranked opponent.

Freshman RB Marcus Coker was the key player for the Iowa offense, rushing 33 times for 219 yards and two touchdowns. Both the rushing attempts and yards established Iowa bowl records.

Sophomore DB Micah Hyde scored the winning points with 5:32 remaining in the game on a 72-yard interception return for a touchdown. That set an Iowa bowl record and ranks as the eighth longest return in school history.

Coker gave the Hawkeyes an early 7-0 advantage with a one-yard scoring run to complete the opening drive. Missouri responded with a field goal on its first drive, but Coker added a 62-yard scoring run early in the second period to give Iowa a 14-3 advantage.

The Hawkeyes added a 34-yard Mike Meyer field goal later in the period before Missouri scored on a 10-yard run to cut Iowa's halftime advantage to 17-10.

Iowa's only offensive points of the second half came midway through the third period when Meyer added a 21-yard field goal for a 20-10 advantage, capping a 93-yard scoring drive. The Tigers cut the lead to 20-17 later in the third quarter and took their first advantage at 24-20 with under a minute left in the period.

Hyde's interception return, the fourth for the Hawkeyes in 13 games, was the only scoring in the final quarter. Stanzi complemented Coker's rushing effort by completing 11-21 passes for 200 yards.

The Iowa defense was led by Greenwood, who collected 11 tackles to go with a second quarter interception. DB Shaun Prater added nine tackles and LB James Morris had seven.

Iowa rallied in the second half, closing to within a touchdown with 6:56 remaining, but 14th-ranked Oklahoma controlled the ball over the final eight minutes in recording a 31-14 win at the 2011 Insight Bowl.

Oklahoma built a 21-0 advantage before Iowa got its offense going in the second half. Iowa used a 16-play drive that consumed 7:50, scoring on a 5-yard pass from QB James Vandenberg to TE C.J. Fiedorowicz on the second play of the final quarter.

After holding Oklahoma to three plays on consecutive possessions, the Iowa offense drove 78 yards in 12 plays, cutting the deficit to 21-14 on a 9-yard pass from Vandenberg to RB Jordan Canzeri. Oklahoma was able to add a field goal with 2:33 remaining for a 24-14 advantage. After Iowa failed on a fourth down attempt, the Sooners added a final touchdown in the closing minute.

Oklahoma took a 7-0 lead in the first period, covering five yards in two plays following a pass interception. Oklahoma's only extended offensive drive of the second quarter covered 66 yards in 13 plays as the Sooners led 14-0 at halftime. Iowa's defense held the Sooners to just 89 yards total offense in the first half. Oklahoma, which entered the game ranked fourth in the nation in total offense, was held to 275 yards total offense, its lowest output of the season.

Vandenberg completed 23-44 passes for 216 yards and two scores, with one interception. Canzeri led Iowa's ground attack with 58 yards on 22 carries and he added six pass receptions for 28 yards and a touchdown. WR Marvin McNutt, Jr. recorded four receptions for 46 yards.

The Iowa defense was led by senior LB Tyler Nielsen with eight tackles, while LB Christian Kirksey added seven. Senior DT Mike Daniels recorded three tackles for loss and two QB sacks among his five tackles.

No. 14 LSU scored 14-first-half points and ultimately held on to defeat Iowa, 21-14, at the 2014 Outback Bowl in Tampa.

The Tigers drove 77 yards on the first possession of the game to grab a 7-0 advantage.

In the second quarter, LSU capitalized on a Kevonte Martin-Manley fumbled punt at the 39-yard line, scoring seven plays later on a 14-yard rush to take a 14-0 halftime lead.

John Lowdermilk provided a spark in the third quarter, intercepting QB Anthony Jennings and returning his first career theft 71 yards to the 1-yard line. The 71-yard interception return is the 12th-longest in school history. Three plays later RB Mark Weisman scored on a 2-yard rush to cut the deficit to 14-7.

Midway through the fourth quarter, Iowa marched inside the LSU red zone, but a fourth down interception at the LSU 8-yard line thwarted a game-tying scoring drive.

LSU scored its third touchdown on a Jeremy Hill 37-yard rush, his second score of the game, with 1:50 left to play.

Iowa's Jordon Cotton returned the ensuing kickoff a career-long 96 yards to the LSU 4-yard line. The 96-yard kickoff return is the eighth-longest return in school history and longest non-touchdown kickoff return in Iowa annals. Two plays later, QB C.J. Beathard connected with Martin-Manley in the end zone for a 4-yard touchdown for the final score.

QB Jake Rudock completed 9-of-22 passes for 102 yards before leaving in the third period due to injury. Beathard completed 4-of-7 passes for 55 yards and a score.

Weisman rushed 18 times for 37 yards, while TE C.J. Fiedorowicz caught a game-high four passes for 46 yards.

Cotton's 42.7 kickoff return average on three attempts broke the Outback Bowl record for kickoff return average.

LB James Morris recorded eight tackles and reached 400 career tackles in his career -- becoming only the sixth Hawkeye to accomplish that feat.

Tennessee scored the game's first 28 points en route to a 45-28 win over Iowa at the TaxSlayer Bowl in Jacksonville, Florida.

RB Mark Weisman rushed for two scores, while QB C.J. Beathard threw for two touchdowns to account for Iowa's scoring. Weisman scored on runs of three and one yard in the second and fourth quarters, respectively. The Hawkeye senior finished his career with 32 rushing touchdowns, one shy of the school record held by Sedrick Shaw and Tavian Banks.

Beathard connected with TE Ray Hamilton (31 yards) and WR Matt VandeBerg (18 yards) in the fourth period. Beathard finished the game completing 13-of-23 passes for 145 yards. The two passing touchdowns were a single-game career best.

WR Kevonte Martin-Manley caught three passes for 23 yards. His third reception broke the school record for career catches by a Hawkeye with 174. He finished his career with 1,799 career receiving yards, No. 13 all-time. The bowl game was the 51st career game for the Hawkeye senior; Martin-Manley joins five other players to play in 51 career games during the Kirk Ferentz era.

Jordan Canzeri led the Hawkeye ground attack, rushing 12 times for 120 yards -- his second career 100-yard game. His game totals pushed him over the 1,000 yards rushing, becoming the 45th Iowa player to accomplish the feat.

LB Josey Jewell led all players with a career-best 14 tackles and was named Iowa's TaxSlayer Bowl MVP. Jewell, a redshirt freshman, made his fourth career start. LB Quinton Alson (11) and CB Desmond King (10) also reached double-digits in tackles. CB Maurice Fleming (five) and LB Ben Niemann (four) recorded career bests in tackles.

CB Desmond King recorded his second career interception in the third quarter (37-yard return). Iowa's defense has had at least one interception in six straight bowl games.

GAME RECAP

Stanford raced out to a 38-0 advantage and ultimately defeated Iowa, 45-16, in the 2016 Rose Bowl. The 45 points were the most the nationally-ranked Hawkeyes allowed in 14 games.

The Cardinal scored their first four touchdowns four different ways -- pass, run, interception return, and punt return. Heisman runner-up Christian McCaffrey totaled 368 all-purpose yards, including a 75-yard scoring reception on the first play from scrimmage and a 63-yard punt return in the second period.

Stanford QB Kevin Hogan completed 12-of-21 passes for 223 yards and accounted for four touch-downs (three passing and one rushing).

Iowa was held to 287 yards of total offense, including a season-low 48 yards rushing.

Iowa quarterback C.J. Beathard completed 21-of-33 passes for 239 yards passing and two touch-downs. Beathard threw a pair of fourth-quarter scores, first a 36-yard to WR Matt Vandenberg and then a 31-yard pass to RB Akrum Wadley. Vandenberg finished the contest with a team-high four receptions for 64 yards.

Running backs LeShun Daniels and Akrum Wadley rushed for 37 and 33 yards, respectively.

Junior DB Desmond King had 182 all-purpose yards, returning seven kickoffs for 144 yards and 38 yards on one punt. He also collected five tackles on defense.

SS Miles Taylor and LB Josey Jewell led the team in tackles, each being credited with seven stops. Jewell also collected an interception, his fourth of the season and second in as many games.

Senior center Austin Blythe made his 45th consecutive start and appeared in his 50th career game. He became the 12th player to play 50 or more games under Kirk Ferentz.

GAME RECAP

No. 17 Florida scored the game's final 30 points in a 30-3 victory over Iowa at Raymond James Stadium in the 2017 Outback Bowl. It marked the third time in 11 years that Iowa faced Florida in the Outback Bowl.

The Hawkeye defense intercepted the Gators on their first two drives, converting the second interception into three points as a result of a Keith Duncan 36-yard field goal.

Florida evened the score at 3-3 later in the first quarter on an Eddy Pineiro 44-yard field goal.

The Gators scored a touchdown late in the second period to take a 10-3 advantage into halftime. Mark Thompson caught his only pass of the game from QB Austin Appleby and took the reception 85 yards for a touchdown.

Florida added two touchdowns and a pair of field goals in the second half.

Iowa quarterback C.J. Beathard completed 7-of-23 passes for 55 yards and three interceptions. RB Akrum Wadley totaled 136 all-purpose yards, rushing for a game-high 115 yards on 22 attempts and catching a team-best four balls for 21 yards. It marked the fourth game this season that the Hawkeye tailback led the squad in receiving.

Defensively, Josey Jewell had a game-high 10 tackles, including one sack. The Hawkeye linebacker finished the season with 100-plus tackles for the second straight year (124).

DB Desmond King appeared in his 53rd career game and made his 51st career start, both program records. King recorded an interception on Florida's second possession. It was King's 14th career interception, tying Damien Robinson for fourth all-time.

Iowa's second defensive theft came from FS Brandon Snyder. Both Snyder and King finished the 2016 season with three interceptions apiece.

Appleby finished the contest completing 14-of-35 passes for 222 yards, two touchdowns, and two interceptions. RB Jordan Scarlett rushed for a team-best 94 yards on 14 carries.

GAME RECAP

Iowa forced three turnovers and RB Akrum Wadley amassed a career-high 283 all-purpose yards in a 27-20 Iowa victory in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium. The win snapped Iowa's five-game bowl losing streak.

Wadley, who was named Pinstripe Bowl MVP, totaled an Iowa bowl record 171 yards on five kickoff returns. He also totaled 88 rushing yards and 24 yards receiving.

The game was played in frigid temperatures, 23 degrees at kickoff with wind chills in the lower teens, and is the coldest Pinstripe Bowl on record. The Hawkeyes totaled 200 yards of offense, its lowest total in a bowl game win in program history.

Jake Gervase intercepted his third pass of the season on the third play from scrimmage, which resulted in a Miguel Recinos 24-yard field goal for the game's first score.

Boston College RB A.J. Dillon, who rushed a game-high 32 times for 157 yards, scored his only touchdown on a 4-yard run with five seconds left in the first period.

Iowa answered on its next possession with a TE Noah Fant 8-yard scoring reception from QB Nate Stanley. The TD pass was the 26th for Stanley, tying Brad Banks (2002) for second most in a single season in program annals. The score was set up by Wadley's 72-yard kickoff return, a career best.

The Eagles closed the half scoring 10 straight points -- a 39-yard pass play and a 30-yard field goal -- to take a 17-10 advantage into halftime.

Wadley scored his 35th career touchdown, which tied Sedrick Shaw for second most in program history, on a 5-yard rush midway through the third quarter to even the score.

Both teams traded field goals in the fourth quarter before the Iowa defense collected two turnovers in the final five minutes. With the game tied (20-20), DE Anthony Nelson sacked QB Darius Wade and forced a fumble that DE Parker Hesse recovered in Boston College territory. Three plays later, FB Drake Kulick scored his first career rushing touchdown on a 1-yard plunge into the end zone for the eventual game-winning score.

All-American CB Josh Jackson helped seal the win by collecting his eighth interception of the season, tying a school single-season record, on Boston College's next possession. DB Amani Hooker led Iowa's defense with 12 tackles, including two touchdown-saving stops. He was named to the Associated Press All-Bowl teams for his efforts.

WR Matt VandeBerg played in his 54th career game, more than any other player in school history. VandeBerg ended his career having at least one reception in 32 consecutive games played.

GAME RECAP

Iowa posted an impressive 27-22 win over No. 18 Mississippi State at the 2019 Outback Bowl, its second straight bowl victory. The win was Iowa's first over a nationally-ranked opponent this season and first over a ranked bowl opponent since 2010.

Iowa was able to rally from a 6-0 deficit in the first quarter to upend the Bulldogs, due in large part to scoring 17 points off three turnovers and not committing a penalty.

WR Nick Easley was voted the game's MVP, catching eight passes for a career-high 104 yards and two touchdowns -- the first multi-touchdown game of his career.

The Bulldogs got on the board first, kicking a pair of first-quarter field goals. Iowa answered with 17 unanswered points in the second quarter. Miguel Recinos kicked the first (44) of his two field goals, followed by touchdown passes from QB Nate Stanley to Easley (75 yards) and WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette (15 yards). The 75-yard play is an Iowa bowl record for longest completion and longest touchdown reception.

The Bulldogs recaptured the lead early in the third quarter, capitalizing on two Hawkeye turnovers. Mississippi State scored two touchdowns in 18 seconds.

Easley's second TD catch (8 yards) later in the third quarter gave the Hawkeyes a 24-19 advantage, a lead they did not relinquish. Mississippi State and Iowa traded field goals in the fourth quarter.

Iowa's defense stood tall on the Bulldogs' final possession, forcing Mississippi State to turn the ball over on downs at Iowa's 32-yard line.

Stanley completed his first eight pass attempts, finishing the contest with 214 yards passing and three TD's on 21-of-31 attempts.

TET.J. Hockenson caught three passes for 43 yards. Smith-Marsette matched his career best with four receptions and set an Outback Bowl record with 150 kickoff return yards.

DT Chauncey Golston and FS Jake Gervase collected Iowa's two interceptions, raising its season total to 20, second most in the country. Golston also recovered a fumble in the second quarter, which set the table for Iowa's second score.

DB Matt Hankins led all tacklers with nine, while CB Michael Ojemudia matched his career high with eight stops. DE A.J. Epenesa had a forced fumble on a sack, raising his season total a team-best 10.5, the highest single-season total by a Hawkeye since Adrian Clayborn (11.5 sacks in 2009).

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette (offense) and DE A.J. Epenesa (defense) were named Most Valuable Players of the 2019 Holiday Bowl.

Iowa's 49 points scored are the second most scored in a bowl game in school history (55 vs. Texas in 1984 Freedom Bowl).

Iowa won its third straight bowl game, tying its longest such streak in program history (2009 Outback, 2010 Orange, 2010 Insight).

Kirk Ferentz is 9-8 all-time in bowl games. The bowl win was the ninth for Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz, tying him for second place in Big Ten Conference history (Barry Alvarez). Joe Paterno of Penn State has 10.

WR Smith-Marsette's 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the second quarter tied a Holiday Bowl record and is the seventh-longest kickoff return in school history. He is the first player in program history to return two kickoffs for touchdowns in a single season (Nebraska, 95 yards).

WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette is the second Hawkeye in program history to score a touchdown via rush, reception, and kickoff return, in a single game.

DE A.J. Epenesa tied an Iowa bowl record and matched his career high with 2.5 sacks.

QB Nate Stanley finished his career with 8,302 passing yards, second all-time in program history (Chuck Long 10,461). Stanley started his third bowl game (3-0) and became the second quarterback in school history to win three bowl games (Ricky Stanzi, 3-0).

K Keith Duncan scored seven points today, raising his season total to 119, third all-time in single-season program history. Duncan made 29 field goals this season, a single-season school record, a Big Ten record, and tied for the sixth most in NCAA single-season history.

RB Tyler Goodson finished the season as Iowa's leading rusher (638 yards). He is the first true freshman to ever lead the team in single-season rushing yards.

Title: Zach VanValkenburg learning to own his role as a leader on Iowa defensive line

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Zach VanValkenburg came to Iowa in 2019 after three years at Hillsdale College, and two years later was one of the coveted three Hawkeyes on the podium at the 2021 Big Ten Media Days.

“You're learning a new defense, you have new coaches that know nothing about you, you're fighting against people that the coaches know, it's tough,” VanValkenburg said. “But having played already three years of college football, I knew the importance of surrounding yourself with coaches, good people, to model yourself after.”

VanValkenburg was the Defensive Lineman of the Year in the NCAA Division-II Great Midwest Athletic Conference in 2018 after tallying 70 tackles, including 14.5 tackles for loss, a league-leading 8.5 sacks and three forced fumbles.

He saw playing time at Iowa in 2019, but his breakout season was last year when he led the nation with four fumble recoveries. He also had 30 total tackles, including 8.5 for loss, and 3.5 sacks, earning second team all-Big Ten honors by coaches and media.

When asked about how he viewed the transfer portal at Big Ten Media Days, Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz noted he's seen more success in the past from experienced players at lower levels, like VanValkenburg and Mekhi Sargent (Iowa Western Community College).

VanValkenburg's three years of experience before coming to Iowa, he said, played a role in his quick transition. This spring, Ferentz felt VanValkenburg looked more confident than ever on the field.

“Some call (VanValkenburg) a marquee guy, but he wasn't two years ago, not a big story, but he turned out to be a really good fit,” Ferentz said.

Now a leader of a young defensive line group, VanValkenburg said the difference between Day 1 and Day 15 of spring practice was staggering for him and his teammates, which was needed for a unit that lost three key veterans last season. Redshirt freshmen tackle Yahya Black and right end Deontae Craig made their way on the pre-fall depth chart.

“Yahya surprises me every day, I just walked by him like this guy is as big as offensive tackles, and he's super athletic and really smart,” VanValkenburg said. “I think the strength is, everyone is selfless, ready to play their role. It's not an NFL locker room where you're just grabbing people and throwing them together — we're a tight-knit group. We've been together for a while, even the freshmen have been here a couple years.”

That selflessness transfers into his off-the-field branding. Recently, VanValkenburg joined teammates Jack Koerner and Tommy Kujawa to launch an apparel line called “The Walk-On Mentality,” where 50 percent of the money made off the apparel or company partnerships will benefit a scholarship fund for walk-on athletes across the country. While not a walk-on himself, VanValkenburg believes the message can resonate with Division II transfers like him.



“Technically, I’m not a walk-on, I’m a Division II transfer, but I do understand the power of that mentality,” VanValkenburg said in an interview with KGGO radio station on Monday. “My two roommates are walk-ons, so I’ve seen the work they’ve had to go through to be successful. You don’t get the same preferred privileges or scholarships, but you still do all the work, obviously school as well.”

VanValkenburg completed his undergraduate degree in history, master’s degree in Eastern European Studies and will focus on continuing his education in Russian language this fall. While football may be his immediate future, VanValkenburg said he sees himself working in government or running for public office someday.

Part of that will come from the leadership skills he’s building while being an Iowa Hawkeye.

“I think that’s really the chance you have to make the most impact on guys because at some point you realize it’s not all about you,” he said. “It’s about the team and who can I help along the way.”

Title: Joe Evans on the edge of being Iowa's next big playmaker on defensive line

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Two years ago, a redshirt freshman Joe Evans faced the media after a breakout performance against Northwestern. The young walk-on from Ames had just tallied his first career statistics as a Hawkeye, one solo tackle and one assist, while also adding a QB pressure and 1.5 sacks. “I’ve never played defensive end before, so just figuring out the moves to work and whatnot,” Evans told reporters after the game. “Being a linebacker, you’re about 5 yards behind the ball, now you’re just one-on-one against the offensive line.”

In his half-sack, which forced a holding penalty on the Wildcats, Evans maneuvered his way to the outside of an offensive lineman, bursting around the edge before hooking quarterback Aidan Smith, who collapsed under additional pressure. “I think I worked a stab club,” Evans said. “As I got around him, I saw the whole defensive line swarm around him.” The game that stood out to Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz, though, was against Minnesota that same year. Evans once again had 1.5 sacks, two solo stops and one assist. “I think I speak for everybody when I say we have total confidence in Joe,” Ferentz said following this year’s first spring open practice in April, adding that his skill level was in line with that of fellow lesser-experienced, highpotential defensive linemen John Waggoner and Noah Shannon.

That 2019 season was enough to earn Evans a scholarship, which was announced in front of the whole team, but not caught on video. Ferentz likes these moments to be private and not flaunted like others that go viral on Twitter. “Nobody jumps out of a cake and hands a scholarship paper to guys,” Ferentz said. “Joe has just been going hard ever since he got here. He just has such a high motor. The question was: is he going to be big enough to do some things? I’m thinking of the Minnesota game in '19, he helped give us a little juice out there.”

Evans finished the 2020 season with three solo tackles, four assists, two tackles for loss, one sack, four pressures and one pass break-up. From joining the team as a quarterback-turned-linebacker-turned-defensive lineman, Evans is now a regular competitor for the left end position. Defensive line a work in progress Senior Zach VanValkenburg commands the right edge as the most seasoned player on the defensive line after the departure of three players last year. The hope is, with the spring and fall camps, the defensive line won’t experience the learning curve it did in the first few games last year.

“When you come into camp, you don’t want to be making the same mistakes twice,” VanValkenburg said. “Hopefully, by the time the first game comes around, you’re ready to go. John Waggoner, Noah Shannon and Joe Evans have all been great leaders and that’s really what’s going to form the core of this unit.”

Evans and Waggoner played left end with the first-team offense in all three open practices. During the 2020 season, Waggoner recorded three assisted tackles and one quarterback pressure through four games of action. In 2019, he had one solo tackle, two assists and one sack. “I feel like I’m prepared,” Waggoner said. “I try to pick out things each day in my game, so today it was pad level. I write that down and see how I did.” The biggest questions remain on the interior, which seemed to struggle during the Kids Day scrimmage on Aug. 14. Starting defensive tackle Shannon wasn’t playing and, in his place, redshirt freshman Lukas Van Ness took the first-team reps. Yahya Black and Logan Lee were playing at the right



tackle position. Shannon is an undersized, 6-foot, 289-pounder, but makes up for it in other areas.

Van Ness is 6-5, 264 pounds while Lee is the same height at 277 pounds. Black, the largest of the interior linemen on the depth chart, is the same height at 287 pounds. "I feel for some guys like Yahya and Logan, like they're 6-5 in middle, so I believe it does help me staying low, keeping my pads low," Shannon said. "I'm not the tallest guy, don't have the longest arms, so my technique has to be spot-on every play." To get to the level of consistency the line needs, players focus on Iowa defensive line coach Kelvin Bell's four fundamentals: leverage, blow delivery, separation and locating the ball. "We focus in the D-line room on attention to detail and honest self-evaluation," Evans said. "I really just wanted to focus on improving in the weight room, whether that'd be my speed or my strength. I'm not the biggest guy in the world, but trying to work on the run game, getting my pads down and getting faster as I come off the edge."

Most college football players wouldn't be around to pounce on this opportunity six years in the making. A half decade-plus without true starting status is a recipe for the transfer portal — if not retirement altogether — and Shudak certainly toyed with both.

But this Iowa kicker envisioned something greater, something beyond the realm of reasonable at times. With less than three weeks until the Hawkeyes' Sept. 4 season-opener against Indiana, Shudak seemingly has what he's been searching for: a chance to add to Iowa's lofty special-teams standard one field goal attempt at a time.

"Couldn't imagine a different journey," Shudak said during media day last week. "I'm incredibly thankful for everything I've gone through."

As beloved as Keith Duncan was, from freshman sensation to upperclassman All-American with a bench-warming stop in between, Shudak's circuitous path might be even more improbable. A peek back to his early Iowa years reveals why.

He arrived in 2016 with decent walk-on credentials, having earned second-team all-state honors as a four-position senior at Lewis Central. Along with time spent at running back, linebacker and defensive back, Shudak had developed into a decent kicker, going 5-for-8 on field goals, 27-for-27 on PATs and 31-for-34 on touchbacks in 2015. He finished his prep tenure with a 66% field-goal conversion rate on 35 attempts.

Shudak figured that'd be enough for some type of role at Iowa, yet what followed were three empty seasons of contemplation and exasperation. No action in 2016. No action in 2017. One PAT attempt to end a 63-0 stomping in 2018. The lone lingering hope was that all-conference honorable mention kicker Miguel Recinos was graduating after 2018.

Perhaps Shudak's time had finally arrived for a breakthrough ...

No. Not yet.

A tight battle between Duncan and Shudak throughout 2019 fall camp finally swung the former's way, with Duncan handling field goals and PATs while Shudak manned kickoffs only.

It wasn't a total lost season — Shudak averaged 58.2 yards on 75 kickoffs with 31 touchbacks — but as Duncan reached folk hero status with clutch boots and one unforgettable smooch, riding this out seemed like a futile endeavor. Duncan would be back in 2020. Shudak didn't see an opening any time soon.

As the 2019 campaign wound down, the 5-foot-8 Council Bluffs native did what many would've done months, even years, earlier. Shudak officially entered the transfer portal on Nov. 13, 2019, three days before the Hawkeyes pulled a top-10 upset over unbeaten Minnesota. Shudak was set to head elsewhere as a graduate transfer, trading Iowa comfort for a shot at substantial playing time.



"He really just wanted to become the best kicker he could be," said Iowa long snapper Austin Spiewak, who's been Shudak's roommate since both arrived on campus in 2016. "It wasn't like he was turning his back on this program or anything. He really just wanted the opportunity to kick. And Keith was obviously also a really good kicker.

"We had plenty of conversations about that, and I was supporting him no matter what he chose to do. That was his decision."

The two months that followed proved more significant than Shudak could've ever fathomed. Options were considered. Outcomes of a difficult choice swayed in the wind, like a field goal fluttering toward the upright after several seconds of hope. Shudak flip-flopped on this move, unsure if leaving four years of cemented friends and teammates was worth an unguaranteed stab at on-field success.

Shortly after the calendar flipped, Shudak had a decision.

On Jan. 24, 2020, he withdrew from the transfer portal.

"I just realized this is where I want to be," Shudak said. "My best friends are here. It became a no-brainer just to stay here.

"Initially it was tough knowing I'm going to have to sit here and wait behind Keith, an All-American and what should've been a Lou Groza year for him (in 2019). He's such a great kicker that I knew I'd have to wait (through 2020). But that faded eventually. Keith is one of my best friends, and I've just been surrounded by so many amazing people that the patience was worth it. It grew into one of those appreciative things."

Given the COVID-19 chaos that arrived shortly after withdrawing from the transfer portal, things like kicking competitions and playing time became largely trivial. Like the rest of the Hawkeyes, Shudak was simply happy to have a 2020 Iowa football season after the Big Ten took its schools through an emotional roller-coaster spanning several weeks. He again handled kickoff duties as Duncan never relinquished his field-goal role.

It wasn't Shudak's desired spot, but the decision to continue his Iowa grind heavily resonated with Kirk Ferentz and special teams coach LeVar Woods. At a position where outside perception can fluctuate tremendously — kicking legend one week, despised man on campus the next — Shudak's obstacle-filled career has created the perfect mindset to finally handle first-team opportunities.

"Someone who's been through adversity and knows the ups and downs is one of the trademarks of a Hawkeye specialist," Woods said. "You're able to handle the success when you make the game-winner and then move on when you miss the next one. We have that in Caleb and all the guys in the (special teams) room."

So what's on tap for Shudak's final act?

Plenty of chances for stardom in all likelihood. It could come quickly, too, with Iowa opening against back-to-back ranked foes in Indiana and Iowa State. An offense still trying to fully find its aerial footing may need to rely on Shudak plenty this fall.

Still standing five years later, Shudak has already bucked college football's instant gratification trend. Now comes time for his magic moment.

Title: Lighthearted Riley Moss leads brilliant Iowa defensive performance in blowout win over Indiana

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Was it preparation or premonition?

Even Riley Moss seemed unable to explain how he managed to turn Saturday's highly anticipated Iowa football season opener into a first-half highlight reel starring himself, then a real bore of a second half.

No. 18 Iowa pummeled No. 17 Indiana 34-6 in front of 68,166 fans who were thrilled to be back inside Kinnick Stadium. Moss, a senior cornerback from Ankeny, was as excited to see them as they were to see him score a pair of touchdowns, even if that meant the Big Ten Conference showdown everyone expected was laughably one-sided instead.

"It's weird and it's hard to explain," Moss said afterward, "but sometimes I just feel like something's going to happen. And I don't know what that is. But I just go with it."

Moss was still trying to fathom what he'd just accomplished after becoming the first Hawkeye defensive back to return two interceptions for touchdowns in the same game since Josh Jackson did so at Wisconsin in 2017. Moss idolized Jackson during his all-American season, he said.

And now he had mimicked him.

Moss struck first on Indiana's opening possession. The Hawkeyes were in a Cover-2 defense on a third-and-6 play. Moss had receivers in front of and behind him, but seemed to sense immediately that Hoosier quarterback Michael Penix Jr. was going to try to connect with his closest target. The pass had more velocity than was required. Moss saw an ideal scenario unfolding.

"I was ready to break on it and tackle him, and then I see the ball pop up and I got super excited. I was foaming from the mouth, caught the ball and took off quick," said Moss, a high school track star. "It happened quick, and I didn't realize I scored a touchdown until I was on the bench and I was like, 'Holy cow, that just happened.'"

It was a 30-yard jaunt into the north end zone that gave Iowa a 14-0 lead just 2 minutes and 15 seconds into the game.

How do you top that? Moss found a way.

Just before halftime, Indiana appeared to get a huge break it desperately needed. The Hoosier defense recovered a fumble near midfield to set up an offense that has a reputation for being explosive. Indiana trailed 21-3 and was set to receive the second-half kickoff. A touchdown would make for an uneasy intermission for the home crowd.

The Hawkeye defense was in cover-3 this time.

"I just read the quarterback, and he was staring down the whole time. I didn't even back up," Moss said. "I just played the ball, and a good thing came of it."

Moss darted in front of an Indiana receiver along his own sideline this time, catching Penix's pass in stride and breezing 55 yards for another touchdown. It was the third of his career, on his eighth interception.



It was game over. Indiana, which entered Kinnick Stadium with offensive star power in Penix, wide receiver Ty Fryfogle and running back Stephen Carr, was just the latest victim of a Phil Parker-coached Iowa defense. The Hoosiers looked dumbfounded as they ran 64 plays and found that nothing worked.

Penix completed 14 of 31 passes for 156 yards and three interceptions before being benched in the fourth quarter. Another five of his passes could have been picked off. He was on his heels and off target all game.

Fryfogle caught five passes for 84 yards, his two biggest catches setting up the two Hoosier field goals.

Carr carried 19 times for 57 yards, with a long gain of 14. He was never a factor. Indiana punted eight times and gained only 233 yards.

“We absolutely won because of film (study) and our preparation for today,” Moss said.

“It was all (Parker), to be honest with you. It was him and coach (Seth) Wallace. ... It’s always the little things that they preach that make us a little bit better than the rest. Those little things matter in big situations. Third-down stops. Shedding blocks. Staying on top. Jamming. Those type of things.”

It’s that constant work on small details that apparently allows Moss to get that feeling that “something’s about to happen.”

But it’s not just him.

Junior Dane Belton, who plays the vital “cash” position in Iowa’s defense, got his first career interception moments after Moss scored his second touchdown. Belton, a childhood friend of Penix from back in Tampa, Florida, noticed that the Hoosier quarterback wasn’t getting much elevation on passes that he was intending to throw out of bounds. Sure enough, Belton found himself covering a running back in the flat, trying to decide whether to stay put or rush Penix, when a pass whistled his direction.

Belton has been working with passing machines for a year-and-a-half to strengthen his hands and sharpen his reflexes for just such moments.

“It was a quick play and it was natural,” he said with pride of the difficult catch he made look easy.

It set up an Iowa field goal. That meant that half of Iowa’s points came from the three turnovers the defense generated.

Not a bad day’s work.

“They demand a lot out of us. They keep that standard set,” Belton said of Iowa’s defensive coaches.

“We’re confident against anybody.”

Iowa extended its streak of seasons with at least one pick-six to 14. The Hawkeyes have played 23 consecutive games without surrendering 25 points, the longest streak in the nation among Power 5 teams. This offseason, Parker became the program’s first assistant coach to be given a salary of \$1 million or more. All of those facts certainly go hand in hand.

As for Moss, the shaggy-haired, earring-wearing, devil-may-care cornerback from Ankeny who refers to the opposing quarterback as “their dude?”

Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz pointed out that it wasn’t until Moss’s junior year at Ankeny Centennial that his staff began recruiting him in earnest. He just kept impressing the Hawkeyes, although he wasn’t the biggest star on the recruiting trail. Once he got to campus, Moss continued on that path.

“He’s a little bit loose and light. He’s a lighthearted guy,” Ferentz said.



"But he competes hard out there. He's got a lot of pride in what he does."

AMES, Iowa — The Iowa Hawkeyes are 2-0 on their way to 4-0 on their way to who-knows-how-many-and-0. They survived Saturday's 91-degree heat, survived going without much offense in any quarter but the second, survived a Jack Trice Stadium crowd that came to roar. Then the Hawkeyes stuffed State in the second half with defense and punting and defense and punt-returning and defense and never turning the ball over, which they never do against ISU. Punting the way Tory Taylor punted is winning. Picking off passes the way Iowa has in two weeks with six interceptions against two ranked teams is dominating.

Iowa still is Iowa in the Iowa-Iowa State football series. Iowa State still is Iowa State. There's no other way to cut it after the No. 10 Hawkeyes came into the Jack Trice Stadium madhouse and played their usual sound, turnover-free ball against the Cyclones in their 27-17 win. A 91-degree day felt like Cyberia for the home folks. That play on words isn't as wretched as they feel, and many of them understandably headed for the exits well before the fourth quarter was done. The Cyclones didn't win for the first time in their last six games against Iowa? At home, with a pedigreed senior quarterback in Brock Purdy, and three AP first-team Preseason All-Americans, and the head coach in Matt Campbell who gets mentioned for every big college job and some in the NFL whenever they open? Then when? Before this series disappears after the Big Ten finalizes its future relationship with the ACC and Pac12 and Iowa State is playing Big 12 games against UCF and BYU instead of Oklahoma and Texas?

That clock is ticking, and loudly. Hey, that's a back-burner issue. Living in the present, it's still a Hawkeye state. And it's a No. 10 Hawkeyes team that will be hiking up the rankings Sunday. ABC's Kirk Herbstreit said they should be No. 4 or 5 based on what they've done so far. He's right. It took a top 5-type team to come to Trice and do what the Hawkeyes did to the Cyclones this day, and Iowa was more than up to that task.

"They made it tough," Iowa quarterback Spencer Petras said. "Their defense is really, really good." "Heck of a team," Hawkeye linebacker Jack Campbell said about the Cyclones. Iowa was held to 173 yards. That's its lowest output since a 66-yard debacle at Wisconsin four years ago. It didn't matter a whit. They were 173 yards without a turnover compared to Iowa State's 339 with four giveaways. Iowa's special teams were superior, too. They were spectacular, actually. Charlie Jones made a big impact with his punt returns. Taylor was otherworldly. It sounds absurd, but his 69-yarder wasn't even one of his best boots. Taylor pinned ISU inside its 10 on four occasions and with an average of 51.1 yards for his eight kicks. The Aussie is off to an All-America start. Could he have been any better here?

"I can have eight inside the 20 and no touchbacks," he said. Then he credited all the players on the punt team for "hustling down the field. It makes my job easier. Massive credit to those guys." Iowa's defense was opportunistic to the max. Three interceptions for a second-straight week against a highly-regarded quarterback on a ranked team. Terrific cornerback Matt Hankins had two. Six picks in two weeks. Oh my. "The standard is the standard," Hankins said. "Every day we come into practice setting the standard for four turnovers a day and that's what we strive to do. "It's not luck. It's the work we put in during the week." The harshest cut for the Cyclones' offense was a fumble, not an interception. Iowa linebacker



Jestin Jacobs stripped the ball from ISU running back Breece Hall at the ISU 5, and fellow LB Jack Campbell scooped it up and trotted it in for a touchdown.

“I didn’t even know it was a fumble,” Jacobs said, “till I saw Jack running it into the end zone.” A 14-10 game was 21-10, and a result in question suddenly had its answer. Jacobs called Campbell “a monster.” Campbell said he didn’t know if that was true, preferring to credit “11 different guys flying around the ball.” Hall wasn’t vintage Hall. Purdy wasn’t vintage Purdy. Their offensive line got whipped. One of Purdy’s interceptions went through Xavier Hutchinson’s hands. Petras, starting a game in front of a road crowd for the first time in his college career like many teammates, picked a raucous place to do it. His first quarter wasn’t great. Nor was his third quarter. He passed for 106 yards. His second quarter, however, was the most-consistent, most-productive quarterback play by anyone in the game.

Petras’ 21-yard pass to tight end Sam LaPorta on third-and-15 a split-second before he was about to get decked was a wow play. His 26-yard touchdown pass to Charlie Jones to finish that drive and give the Hawkeyes a 14-3 lead was perfect, lofted over ISU defensive backs Isheem Young and Datrone Young. Purdy had a 49-yard beauty of his own to Darren Wilson late in the second quarter, and Iowa State finished that drive with a Hall touchdown to cut the gap to 14-10 at halftime. That created a buzz at intermission. This felt like a potential fang-and-claw contest, with anything possible. That feeling faded as the third quarter progressed. The Hawkeyes had the defense, the punting, the ball protection. And they still have the state.

Title: Young Iowa defensive tackles have answered every question and emerged as a strength for the surging Hawkeyes

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Logan Lee was always hurt. Noah Shannon is too short. Yahya Black gets too high out of his stance. Lukas Van Ness looks too skinny.

The questions about Iowa's defensive tackles were perpetual during the preseason, and the group's inexperience added to the volume. For the third straight year, the Hawkeyes had to replace their two-gap tone setters, who provide immeasurable balance to Iowa's defense. When the defensive tackles do their job, they might not register a statistic, but they'll ensure those around them will have plenty.

When they do their job, Iowa can line up with only six or seven defenders in the box, which allows the Hawkeyes to play elite coverage on the back end. When they don't do their job, the defense instantly becomes vulnerable at all three levels.

Iowa lost unanimous first-team All-American and Big Ten defensive payer of the year Daviyon Nixon and steady performer Jack Heflin, both of whom are on NFL rosters. The program has reloaded at that position in the past, but only Shannon had any starting experience entering the season — one game, against Nebraska in 2020.

"Going into this season, that's probably been my biggest concern, the amount of guys that we've had that really haven't been through a lot," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said.

Van Ness, Craig and Black are redshirt freshmen. So is Logan Jones, who has returned to practice this week after injuring his knee in spring football. Lee is a sophomore who has missed plenty of time, and Shannon averaged only 20 snaps per game last year. Considering Iowa's first two games were against a top-20 Big Ten foe in Indiana and at top-10 in-state rival Iowa State, there was urgency attached with the position group, and not just in training camp last month.

Things couldn't have come together any better for the Hawkeyes. None of their first three opponents have rushed for more than 90 yards, and Iowa is allowing a paltry 2.46 yards per carry. Opponents have completed just 54.5 percent of their passes, with two touchdowns and six interceptions. The defense registered seven sacks last week, which was the most in a single game for Iowa since 2000.

"It's a day-to-day process, and it started all the way back last spring," assistant defensive line coach Jay Niemann said. "When you get to the conclusion of one season and the beginning of another, it's obvious that some of those players that have been successful here in the past aren't here anymore, and you just got to pick up and move along. But I think the biggest thing that (defensive line) coach (Kelvin) Bell and I have tried to do impress on these guys is just the importance of building the fundamental base and making sure that you're stacking good days and then good weeks of practice together, which they did throughout the spring and have done so far throughout the fall."

The 6-foot-5, 265-pound Van Ness came to Iowa as a defensive end but slid inside during the spring. He broke out in the win over Kent State with two sacks and seven tackles, including a share of a first-quarter safety. He has an angular build with growth potential, but his motor was apparent in open practices and scrimmages. He has developed enough to play inside on pass-rush situations as part of Iowa's "fast-guy" unit.

"I've always been a relatively taller guy," Van Ness said. "I've struggled a bit with my pad level and I played defensive end all high school and came in and moved inside. I think it's been great for me just to really work



on my pad level and my hands, my extension, because everything happens off faster in there. I thought at first I wouldn't like it, but I love it in there."

Niemann said: "He's a unique guy physically because he has really good length and size. But he also runs very well for someone who's built like he is. He's got good explosiveness. He's even being used on some special teams."

Lee, 6-5 and 277 pounds, initially was recruited as a tight end, then flipped to the defensive side after arriving at Iowa in 2019. He was hurt most of his first year and played in only two games last year. He sat out the spring due to injury but remained healthy during fall camp and has started all three games alongside Shannon at defensive tackle.

"(Logan has) been a pleasant surprise," Niemann said. "Not that we're really surprised by that, but with him being banged up and missing a lot of spring and just having some of the injury issues that he's had in the past, we haven't really had the opportunity to get with him and allow him to create a body of work for himself without interruption."

"I'm just excited for Logan because I know what he's been through his first couple of years having battled through injuries," Shannon said. "I know that can be very mentally tough, so I'm just happy he's made it this far and he's still progressing."

Lee is blessed with huge hands and is a student of the game. He sometimes sits with senior offensive lineman Kyler Schott to watch tape and discuss their one-on-one reps.

Black might have the most potential but requires the most growth. He has a massive frame (6-5, 287), but he often struggles staying low against double teams. Black also has dealt with an assortment of odd injuries, including a soft-tissue issue this summer from slipping in the shower. Late in camp, he was still working his way into the lineup when Lee moved past him into the starting lineup. Black still has earned plenty of reps during game action.

"He has a huge upside," Lee said. "He's a freak athlete who puts in a lot of work, very hard worker, and he's willing to do whatever it takes to make the team better."

Shannon has emerged as the unit's leader, in voice and in action. Early in his career, Shannon (6-0, 289) was told to hone his technique because of his lack of height.

"(Coach Bell was) like, 'You're not the tallest guy. You don't have the longest arms. Your technique has to be spot on every play if you want a chance at making a play.'" Shannon said. "I definitely took that to heart, and I've been working on it every day."

In three games, Shannon has six tackles and two quarterback hurries.

Other players have taken snaps at defensive tackle, including freshman Deontae Craig, Isaiah Bruce and sophomore Louis Stec. Craig primarily rotates at defensive end but has slid inside in a pinch. Starting left end John Waggoner joins Van Ness at tackle in the pass-rushing package.

It can be difficult to keep track of who enters and exits the lineup inside, but the staff has no plans to trim the rotation in order to keep everyone fresh. Their growth so far is obvious — as is their production.

"We're hardly there yet, but at least we're making progress, and we've held up in some tough circumstances and situations," Ferentz said. "So, it gives you encouragement certainly."

Title: Jack Campbell's chip-on-shoulder mentality comes from the heart

IOWA CITY, Iowa — There's total tackles and solo tackles, but add a new stat line that reads, "Jack Campbells." A "Jack Campbell" is a collection of game-changing plays, like recovering fumbles three weeks in a row, collecting a career-high in tackles (11) only to beat it by seven the following week and adding two pass breakups as the cherry on top. The Iowa junior linebacker is not just a stat line, he's the oxygen to every combustion reaction — a cataclysmic essential to spark the flame. That's not something that comes with practice — it comes from the heart.

At every postgame interview, Campbell leans on the podium with two hands, grasping onto it like it might be the last time he stands there. Or maybe because he's left so much on the field that he's supplying what little oxygen he has left into his low-toned, raspy speech. Despite towering over others, the leaned posture positions him to peer up at you, almost like he's still trying to prove something. Or that he's ready for you to attack his team's performance, and he's lined up in defense of its honor, like a service dog protecting his defenseless owner.

"Throughout my life, a lot of people say, 'A 6-5 linebacker? Oh you must not be able to move,'" Campbell said. "I'm not going to say what coaching staff said this to me, but I didn't have the right ankle bend or something? Just being able to move on, but having this great opportunity to play for the Iowa Hawkeyes and being from the state of Iowa, it's one of the best things that's ever happened in my life, but I'm also trying to have that chip-on-my-shoulder approach and just never be satisfied."

It's not just his own mentality, he said, it's bred in the linebacker room by linebackers coach Seth Wallace, who worked his way up from Coe and Lake Forest colleges, then to Iowa as a graduate assistant, spending four years at Division-II Valdosta State before earning a spot back at Iowa in 2014. To Campbell, it's inspiring, and two weeks ago, Campbell likened his team to the "mutts," of college football — he thinks they were all overlooked. Maybe all it took was a little extra digging for a coach to notice that the Cedar Falls standout was someone who could be a difference-maker.

"I remember his senior year, it was one of the best basketball practices I've ever seen," Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz said. "He was just a hack in basketball, he got fouls really fast. He could pick them up, but he's always been a football player, just had a high motor. He's got one speed." He's the guy whose difference-making plays, like recovering a fumble from Colorado State running back A'Jon Vivens at the CSU 6 in the third quarter, that turn games around for the Hawkeyes. "I could hear that momentum," Iowa quarterback Spencer Petras said. "It was the first time I had to shush the crowd a little bit on that play to Tyrone (Tracy)."

Campbell had eight tackles in the first quarter alone, which was well on pace to his career-high of 11 from last week. By the end of the day, seven of his 18 tackles were solo. Fellow linebacker Seth Benson had 11 this game, including 1.5 tackles for loss, which was close to his best of 13 with 10 solo tackles against Northwestern last October. They're best friends, Benson said. They go to Bible studies together off the field and push each other on the field, and as two of Iowa's leading linebackers, always on the field, their combined 29 tackles comes up in the conversation. He asks how many tackles Campbell had, and in response to the 18, he smiles and lets out a loud sigh, as if delivering condolences to the other team before saying, "Man, that's awesome!" For perspective — the most by a Hawkeye since now Kansas City Chiefs linebacker Anthony Hitchens had 19 tackles against Iowa State in 2012.

Campbell's response is different when asked if he knew he was having a good day. "Honestly, no it didn't feel like it," Campbell said. "We're going to need a lot of improvements, it starts with how we recover and how we take on all aspects of this next week." Then he credits the defensive line for his third fumble in three weeks.

Title: With 10 straight wins under his belt, Iowa football quarterback Spencer Petras is full of confidence

IOWA CITY , Iowa — Iowa quarterback Spencer Petras is in a completely different place than he was on Oct. 31, 2020. Then, Petras, making only his second career start, threw 50 passes and three interceptions against a veteran Northwestern secondary.

The Hawkeyes lost the game, falling to 0-2 and instantly putting Petras under heavy criticism. Now, 334 days and 10 consecutive wins later, things are much different.

Last Saturday was arguably Petras' career-best game. He completed 15 of 23 passes for 224 yards and two touchdowns, Pro Football Focus awarded him a 91.7 grade.

But most importantly, Petras threw the ball deep and threw it accurately. He completed five passes of 20-plus yards. The deep pass was a big part of his game at Marin Catholic High School in California, but it's taken time to happen at the college level.

"In high school, I could just sit back there for five seconds and let my guy outrun them," Petras said. "And even back then, I could throw the ball a long ways so I would just throw it and let him go get it.

"A lot less time in college. But yeah, it's a big part of my game and when our offense is playing to our potential, we're hitting our deep shots."

The results of Petras' downfield performance were two-fold: Fans got the glimpse of him they've been waiting for, and it confirmed the coaches' confidence in him to hit when opportunities arise.

That confidence within the facility has always been there. But through four games, with 684 passing yards, a 60% completion rate and a 4-to-1 touchdown-to-interception ratio, outside support is growing, too. Entering Friday night's game at Maryland, he has 12 starts (the equivalent of one full regular season) under his belt.

"I feel like as he goes, the offense goes," wide receiver Nico Ragaini said. "The more confidence he has, the better the offense will be."

Iowa's team understands the importance of a balanced offensive attack. With opposing teams putting a concentrated effort on stopping the run, there'll be opportunities for Petras to exploit by connecting on more deep plays.

That was the case in the Colorado State game and will be again this Friday with Maryland's tendency to play a single-high safety look.

"Unless we're running a dead play, which at that point is my fault because I got to get us out of it, there's opportunity out there," Petras said. "In the pass game, any concept we run, there's going to be a route or concept that should put pressure on a defense and should win if we do things right."

Petras' continued understanding of opposing defenses and, in turn, how to direct the offense from there, coincides with his biggest next step: better decision-making.



Although his streak of consecutive passes without an interception ended against Colorado State on an ill-advised throw, it was the longest such streak in the Kirk Ferentz era. The trust that Ferentz has always shown in Petras is beginning to show dividends this season.

"I'm not sure people always appreciate how hard a job it is to be the quarterback," Ferentz said. "Yeah, sometimes the best thing to do is throw it away, or sometimes you have to eat the ball. That's regrettable. You don't want to do that. So those are hard things. They're just really hard things to get across.

"That's part of the process. He'll be learning as long as he's playing, just like all of us are. We're all learning too. We're very thrilled he's our quarterback."

Petras' arm will be needed to make a difference Friday vs. Maryland. He got valuable high-stakes, crunch-time experience two weeks ago at Iowa State. His 21-yard pass to tight end Sam LaPorta on a third-and-long that set up his 26-yard touchdown dime to receiver Charlie Jones in double coverage at the end of the first half is the Spencer Petras that Iowa needs for the remainder of the season.

It cannot be overstated how important a full and regular offseason, spring, summer and fall were to his development. He's grown to love the process and as a result, it's paying off in more pass opportunities and team wins.

"I'm very confident and comfortable in my preparation and process," Petras said. "That's the biggest thing is that I've learned the one thing you really have control of is the present moment.

"The only thing we as a team can control is the week-to-week and if we have a great week of preparation, we can expect to go in and win. I've learned that with time and I think that's a good mindset. I like that mindset. It works for me."

Title: Kirk Ferentz really likes this Iowa football team. It's easy to see why

COLLEGE PARK, Md. — The term “special season” gets thrown around a lot when discussing the Iowa football program. There is always a hope for Hawkeye fans that this could be one of those years.

They're hard to come by. But we have enough history in the Kirk Ferentz era to know special seasons do happen. And when they come around — 2002, 2009 and 2015 are at the top of the list — we can look back and pinpoint breakthrough moments along the journey.

As I think about each of those teams — the only three under Ferentz to make a New Year's Six level bowl — it is always the road wins that stand out.

Most recently in 2015, the defining day in that 12-0 regular season occurred in Evanston, Illinois. Were the 6-0 Hawkeyes for real? A banged-up bunch answered with authority in a 40-10 rout of a 10-win Northwestern team that nobody saw coming.

Take your pick of three very-special road wins in 2009, but the 21-10 win at fifth-ranked Penn State has become unforgettable. Adrian Clayborn's blocked-punt touchdown helped the Hawkeyes rally from a 10-0 deficit that rainy night in Happy Valley and reminded a fan base that it was OK to believe.

And then there was 2002. In my observance of the 23-year Ferentz era, there was no win that signaled the Hawkeyes' arrival like the day of Oct. 26 in Ann Arbor, Michigan. That was when 7-1 Iowa went from a neat story to a national story. The Hawkeyes not only beat the eighth-ranked Wolverines, they annihilated them. By the time the 34-9 rout was complete, the Big House had become a party scene for the horde of Hawkeye fans that relished every second of the breakthrough win.

The Associated Press lead from that day read, “The Iowa Hawkeyes beat Michigan so badly that they were able to celebrate and sing with their fans in a mostly empty Michigan Stadium.”

I'm not saying this team is 2002-level — the gold standard of the Ferentz era — after five games. But what we witnessed Friday night at Maryland felt like that validating checkpoint that a special season is afoot. And, oh yes, there was fight-song singing between fans and players after this one, too.

Thought to be a tight game in prove-it spot in a prime-time national spotlight, the fifth-ranked Hawkeyes dismantled previously unbeaten Maryland, 51-14. They caused seven turnovers and committed none. They scored 31 points in the second quarter alone.

“A really good win for our team and a really important one,” Ferentz said. “I felt that all week long. Couldn't be much prouder of our guys.”

The reward was a giant Hawkeye party for most of the second half, as the thousands of gold-clad fans who infiltrated the Terrapins' “Blackout” attempt stayed until the clock read 0:00 at around Midnight ET ... and beyond.

“Those guys are amazing,” marveled running back Tyler Goodson, whose 67-yard touchdown catch gave Iowa a 41-7 lead early in the third quarter. “They took up half the stadium. They're everywhere.”

Ferentz quipped afterward, “I'm not really sure where they all came from. I guess we have a lot of people out East.”



There's something about a road win that means more. Ferentz agrees with that, too. Those road trips can stack additional odds against a team but also become a bonding experience if things go well, like they did for Iowa on Friday.

"We were saying before the game we were going to storm through the front door," said cornerback Riley Moss, who had the first of the Iowa secondary's six interceptions. "And we're going to take what's ours."

Ferentz told his team last Sunday that this short week of preparation for the longest road trip of the regular season would be a test of Iowa's maturity. Did the top-five Hawkeyes have what it took to overcome being targeted by a rising home team's upset bid?

Did they ever.

And now? Even more hype yet.

The Hawkeyes could exhale Saturday as the rest of the college-football world duked it out. But they're about to get even more attention, more scrutiny. Because up next is what will be one of the biggest games of the college football season: Penn State at Iowa.

Ferentz is skilled at keeping his teams focused on daily tasks and on guard for a letdown. Iowa will get a lot of love leading into this potential top-five showdown at Kinnick Stadium after laying 51 points on the Terrapins and scoring on nine straight possessions.

But none of those 51 points will be added to Iowa's starting total against the Nittany Lions, who will be seeking payback for a 20-point home loss to the Hawkeyes last year.

"When it's all said and done, we're a 5-0 team that still has a lot of work to do," Ferentz said. "I think our guys understand that. They've also seen, though, if we work hard, maybe some good things can happen."

Hey, maybe special seasons are on a six-year cycle at Iowa — 2009, 2015 ... and now 2021?

After Friday, there's a lot to feel good about. Including the sometimes-embattled quarterback. It's becoming clear that Spencer Petras is an ideal leader for this team. He's got the arm talent, sure, but he's careful with the football (one turnover all season) and has the support of the entire locker room. He's got a measured mindset and assured us Friday that the team isn't buying into the national rankings.

"If we keep winning, it's going to be more and more hype and more and more buzz," Petras said. "But it's all about winning. And to win, you need to practice well."

Ferentz, 66, finished his press conference with a funny quip about how when he was the head coach at Maine in the early 1990s, people up there were more excited about hunting season than one of his team's important football games.

"If you're in 'big games,' the circus will come to town. We've got to deal with that," Ferentz said. "It's a helluva lot better than playing the fifth game at Maine in 1991, you know? It wasn't a circus, I know that."

The circus — and maybe ESPN's College GameDay — is coming to Iowa City soon.

Are the Hawkeyes ready?

"We're going to find out," Ferentz said. "Today was a good indicator."

Title: Iowa beating Penn State “was like the biggest of big-time,” says Nico Ragaini

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Nico Ragaini’s uncle was in a daze in a Kinnick Stadium concourse early Saturday night.

“If you ask me something,” Paul Ragaini said amid a postgame crowd noise unlike few Kinnick Stadium has produced, “I won’t know what to say.”

But he was asked the million-dollar question, anyhow. What was it like to see your nephew so open on the pass that led to a crowd roar that may have loosened a few of the old brick house’s moorings?

“I jumped out of my seat,” he said. “I watch nothing but Nico. I see the same thing he sees. I was the only person in the stadium who was looking out and seeing nothing but space around him.”

It was 44 yards, junior quarterback Spencer Petras of California to senior wide receiver Ragaini of Connecticut. Midway between their two home states on a patch of turf in Eastern Iowa, the two connected and sent Hawkeye fans into orbit with 6:26 left in Iowa’s football game against Penn State.

No. 3 Iowa had a 23-20 lead that held to the end, thanks to defense that wouldn’t let No. 4 Penn State’s No. 2 quarterback, Ta’Quan Roberson, breathe. That, combined with over 69,000 screamers in the crowd, made it nearly impossible for Roberson and his offensive linemen to do something as elementary as snap the ball without committing a false start.

That’s no joke. The Nittany Lions had eight — eight! — false start infractions after Roberson entered the game late in the first half following the ribs injury Iowa linebacker Jack Campbell cleanly inflicted on starting QB Sean Clifford.

How much of the linemen moving too soon was due to the Hawkeyes’ omnipresent defensive heat, and how much was caused by fans who came to give it the old 110 percent?

“I think credit should be shared there,” Iowa defensive tackle Logan Lee said, “but definitely, the fans made a really, really big difference.”

“We knew they’d be ready to go at the start,” Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz said, “and they were more ready than we were. We just wanted to make sure our team knew that they can’t play the game for us.”

Well, the reason those fans kept the faith for four quarters is because their team did likewise. The fans’ payoff was Petras’ big pass to Ragaini. That ended a game-long slog that felt uphill all the way, and put the Hawkeyes in front, and in the comfortable place of letting the defense bring it home.

Petras was 1-of-9 passing in the first quarter for 14 yards, with one interception. His quarterback rating at the end of the quarter was 1.96. You get more than 2 for spelling your name correctly.

Iowa trailed 14-3 after the quarter, its first double-digit deficit in 18 games. This didn’t look good. No, this didn’t look good whatsoever, and it looked worse when it was 17-3.

But Campbell clocked Clifford, who walked gingerly to his sideline’s medical tent, then went to street clothes for the second half. He had been doing a beautiful job to that point, even with two interceptions. He put up two touchdowns, a herculean task this day with these two defenses.



Iowa proceeded to go on a 75-yard touchdown drive to make it 17-10 and have its fans all fired up when Roberson entered. The sophomore had thrown seven passes all season, eight in his career. Iowa's defenders were made aware of that by their coaches at halftime. But those defenders had already gotten into Roberson's head, and the heads of his blockers.

This was no time or place for a newbie QB. Before even reaching halftime, here's how the first five snaps or near-snaps went for Roberson. Near-lost fumble. Near-interception. False start, false start, false start.

Roberson got Penn State close enough to the end zone for three third-quarter points and a 20-10 lead. Iowa's offense was going to have to win this game, somehow. Right?

It didn't look promising for a long time.

Two field goals by Caleb Shudak — one of Iowa's bevy of sensational special-teams performers — made it 20-16 with 8:08 left. The Hawkeyes still needed a touchdown, and a continuation of its misery-making for Roberson and company kept Iowa within a touchdown of the lead.

So the Lions faced fourth-and-29 from their 6 on their next possession. They punted to their 44.

One play. Ragaini was as open as the mouth of his uncle who watched in part nervousness, part excitement, part disbelief. Nothing but space, Paul Ragaini saw. Nothing but space, Nico Ragaini saw. Nothing but space, Petras would see.

A Petras play-fake to running back Tyler Goodson on the left. A roll to the right. Ragaini slowed up at midfield then shot toward the left sideline, with no Lion within eight yards of him. Petras put the ball into Ragaini's hands for the receiver's first touchdown catch in almost two years.

"Don't really have a name for it," Ragaini said about the play, but it definitely was one the team had rehearsed. He said Petras hit him on a 70-yarder in practice during the week on the same route.

"Which was pretty wild," said Ragaini. "He put the ball on the line straight to me."

This was a mere 44 yards, and the last 17 of it was Ragaini running. PSU linebacker Curtis Jacobs hit Ragaini at the 4, and the momentum rocketed him into an end zone pylon for the touchdown.

That was followed by FOX announcer Gus Johnson screaming like only he can, and the Kinnick crowd screaming like little if anything else you've ever heard in person.

"Yeah, this was like the biggest of big-time," Ragaini said, "which was pretty awesome.

"I mean, honestly today, like sitting on the sideline I was so emotionally drained and just screaming for the defense so much, like I truly almost teared up a little bit out there because we all care about each other so much.

"That's the beauty of our team. I think we all really want each other to succeed and we all trust each other so much."

Trust in Petras may have been a lot less in the stands and in TV Land than it was on Iowa's sideline. But the quarterback once again didn't buckle. When the Hawkeyes needed a throw, *the* throw, he saw it and floated it right into Ragaini's able hands.

"Heck of a route," Petras said about Ragaini's handiwork. "Perfect call," he said about offensive coordinator Brian Ferentz's decision-making.



“It was a huge play.”

About the game, Petras said “Nothing about it was easy.”

Easy? How could this be easy? You can’t be Iowa in a top-5 football matchup and go sailing on a Saturday afternoon. That’s not how it works here.

This had to make you fret and sweat and fret a lot more. It had to be hard. You couldn’t have the indelible clutch moments, the mental snapshots that will endure for years, nay, decades, if things were breezy.

The snapshots were taken and will endure. Defense, defense, defense. Field-goal kicking, punting and punt coverage that was impeccable. And, Petras-to-Ragaini, joining Banks-to-Clark, Tate-to-Holloway, Stanzi-to-McNutt and Beathard-to-Smith as all-time passes of importance in the Ferentz era.

It was as clutch as clutch can be.

Iowa found a way to stay in the Top 3 and set itself up for a run at a 12-0 regular season. That’s something you don’t have to explain. You did it, everybody who cares about college football saw it or heard about it or watched the highlights, and it’s worth a thousand traveling trophies.

Frettin’ and sweatin’. And finally, a crowd storm. The fans covered the field like Iowa’s defense covered the Nittanies.

Oh, that noise. That sound emanating from Kinnick Stadium probably bounced off every oak in Lone Tree, scared the cattle outside Holstein, loosened lug nuts in Mechanicsville.

This was 69,000 fans repeatedly emptying their lungs for over three hours because their team kept pushing against a ferocious foe.

The Hawkeyes, somehow, refused to leave the national discussion. Not that any of their fans had any voice left for it Saturday night.

Title: A big win for Iowa football. A bigger win for the Hawkeyes fan base

IOWA CITY, Iowa — As the black-and-gold striped sections of Kinnick Stadium emptied onto the turf of Duke Slater Field after third-ranked Iowa's 23-20 vanquishing of No. 4 Penn State, Hawkeye players were out of time to plan their exits.

Matt Hankins, a fifth-year senior who experienced the stunning 2017 win against Ohio State as a true freshman, made the veteran move of darting to the players' tunnel safely, right away.

Others who were slower to react had more intimate fan experiences. Spencer Petras got knocked to the ground briefly, emerging quickly so he wouldn't get trampled. (What a downer that would've been to lose your starting quarterback in the celebration.)

Tyler Linderbaum joked that so many fans hit him in the helmet on his journey through the masses, that he might need to go into concussion protocol.

"That was the hardest part about the game," the all-American center quipped. "Trying to get out of that mosh pit."

Running back Tyler Goodson missed the start of the Hawkeyes' locker-room party, relishing the historic moment that had just occurred on the field. So did free safety Jack Koerner, but he didn't mind. The fifth-year senior from Dowling Catholic used to be one of those Iowa kids that were partying on the field Saturday evening, taking selfies with their parents. He knows what this win meant to everyone who stormed the field.

"I grew up a Hawk fan my whole life, going to Kinnick as a little kid," Koerner said. "High-fiving so many little kids, screaming 'Go Hawks!' about 150 times is a moment I'll never forget."

And neither will you, Iowa fans.

While this one means a lot to the players and coaches and a ton to the hopes of Iowa's 2021 season, this win was for — and on many levels, about — you.

Those of you that were here, you had as much a part of rattling Penn State's backup quarterback as anything.

Seven false starts by the Nittany Lions' offensive line? Chalk that up to poor preparation from Penn State coach James Franklin — who was being criticized by his fans afterward for not having anything more than a hand clap to direct the snaps. But you the fans knew there was a vulnerable signal-caller in Ta'Quan Robinson, and you were all over it.

You showed up early. You never stopped screaming. I've heard from countless fans who have been in Kinnick for decades: This was the loudest it's ever been. And it didn't stop, from start to finish.

You deserve to get some tea for those hoarse vocal chords; and to keep celebrating.

"I've never seen anything like it," said Nico Ragaini, whose 43-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter was the jolt of offense that the crowd (and defense) needed to finish strong. "It was rowdy. I truly will never forget what it was like."



Said Petras: "The loudest I've ever heard that stadium. ... It was really crazy from the kickoff to the end."

Added Linderbaum: "I've been a part of a lot of big games. I don't know if (there's) anything like this. Just the energy our fans brought today was amazing. The ups and downs, the fans were with us the whole game."

Two-time major golf champion (and noted Hawkeye fan) Zach Johnson even gave you the nod with this three-word headline submission for our postgame podcast: "Kinnick fans WON!"

Hawkeye fans have had some euphoric moments during the 23-year Kirk Ferentz era. But in the only three previous top-six matchups under Ferentz, the Hawkeye fan passion was on epic display ... only for their team to lose in gut-punch fashion.

Those three big-stage moments:

The 2003 Orange Bowl, as some 40,000 to 50,000 Iowa fans made their way to Miami only to see their team get shellacked by USC, 38-17.

The 2015 Big Ten Championship Game, as Iowa fans dried up most of the beer in downtown Indianapolis but watched their team suffer a 16-13 heartbreaker to Michigan State.

The 2016 Rose Bowl was another Hawkeye party of epic proportions, but that 45-16 loss to Christian McCaffrey and Stanford was over in the first quarter.

There was a notion from the fan base that it was time to come out on top in one of these moments in the ultimate national-spotlight stage. For many fans — those that weren't alive or too young to remember Iowa's 1-vs-2 win against Michigan in 1985 — this was their first such experience.

The Hawkeyes deserve to be the No. 3 team in the nation after a 6-0 start with wins against Indiana, at Iowa State, at Maryland and now against a very good Penn State team.

Anyone that wants to take away from Iowa's win because its rally occurred after knocking Sean Clifford from the game isn't appreciating Iowa's physical brand of defense. As Ferentz said afterward, the hard hit by Iowa middle linebacker Jack Campbell on Clifford "is part of the game. It's a hard game."

The Hawkeyes deserve (and get) credit for rallying from a slow start and 17-3 first-half hole.

As Ferentz joked — sort of — Hawkeye fans "were more ready than we were."

Player after player that came into Iowa's interview room spoke about how Iowa's coaches preach that it's a 60-minute game. Staying patient can be hard when things aren't going well, but it's the way Iowa operates. It wins around a no-frills defense and elite special-teams play.

It's a style Iowa fans who yelled in every situation Saturday appreciate and understand.

"Iowa football fans have always been smart," Ferentz said. "They know when to cheer. They've always appreciated defense — at least in my 30-plus years here."

As the fight song goes: "Fight! Fight! Fight! For Iowa ... until the game is won."

That's what the Hawkeyes — and their fans — did Saturday.

Title: How Iowa coordinator Phil Parker blends intensity and insight to lead a defense that outperforms its perceived pedigree

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Phil Parker doesn't employ a fancy scheme that has writers calling him a defensive wizard. He doesn't land five-star defensive backs or dazzle the airwaves with oodles of charisma.

Parker, 58, just recruits players who think like him and match the intensity that turned him into a three-time All-Big Ten safety at Michigan State. Then he coaches 'em up and makes their production look like magic.

"I'm trying to find out the right kid that really loves the game of football," said Parker, Iowa's defensive coordinator. "He enjoys it and is going to do whatever it takes to be the best that he can be. And when they want to get here, I'll tell him and I'll tell their parents, too, that I'm not easy to play for, because I expect a lot and I'm going to be demanding with them. And if they do it once, I know they can do it again. And then they set the standards themselves."

The ball-hawking Iowa secondary has set a standard with 76 interceptions since 2017, by far the most among FBS programs. This year, No. 3-ranked Iowa (5-0) leads the country with 12, including six last week at Maryland. Eight different defenders have picks. All three Power 5 quarterbacks Iowa has faced, left the game early after combining for three touchdowns and 11 interceptions.

With geometrically based quarters coverage coupled with intense preparation and a secondary consisting of five players with starts dating to at least 2019, the Hawkeyes were expected to rattle a few passing games. Yet this year, Iowa's ruthless efficiency has devoured offenses.

"You don't really know where the ball is going to go during the game, but most of the plays that are scripted up in practice are their favorite plays during the game," said cornerback Riley Moss, who leads the Hawkeyes with three interceptions, including two returned for touchdowns. "When it comes to the game, it's the Wild West."

Iowa's six interceptions last week were the most by the defense in a game since 1982. As much as physical skill played a role, the defenders' knowledge of the system was just as important. It's something every defensive back starts to learn at a base level on their first day with Parker.

"We start teaching them offensive formation, recognition, personnel groupings to try to get an understanding because they're going to need to know how to line up," Parker said. "They are going to need to know their assignments. They need to know their keys and responsibility. But really, we start base one, everybody. 'Hey, what personnel is in the game on the offense? What formations are going to get to you?' And then obviously we start talking about tendencies and splits and all that other stuff later on."

Iowa's secondary success under Parker hardly is unusual. From 2009 through last year, Parker has molded 11 first-team All-Big Ten defensive backs, eight of which were unanimous. Only Ohio State exceeds the total number and equals the unanimous figure over the same time frame. Since the Big Ten began naming a defensive back of the year in 2011, four Hawkeyes have taken that crown. No other program has more than two.



Perhaps even more impressive, only one of those four defensive backs held a Power 5 offer coming out of high school, and that was at running back. Micah Hyde (2012) and Josh Jackson (2017) were two-star recruits. Amani Hooker (2018) didn't have a Power 5 offer, including from his hometown Minnesota Gophers, while Desmond King (2015) was committed to a MAC squad. All four players entered college football with perceived physical limitations but developmental skills. All four still are on NFL rosters.

King, who won the 2015 Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back, was a late recruit for Iowa. Parker won the trust of King's mother Yvette Powell, who now calls him "Uncle Phil." Nobody has more starts than King in Iowa history.

"(Parker) taught (King) to separate himself through preparation," said Rod Oden, King's high school coach at East English Village in Detroit. "He taught him to become a film room junkie, to play the mental part of the game. He had all the physical tools but because you're considered to be undersized, there are certain things that you needed to pick up through preparation that'll help you along the way — defending a 6-3 receiver, defending a 4.4 receiver. I think Phil helped him with those intangibles."

Iowa's current starting secondary has five defenders with the combined pedigree of two Ohio State recruits. Moss was a two-star recruit, as was safety Kaevon Merriweather. Cash defender Dane Belton was a three-star prospect along with cornerback Matt Hankins. Free safety Jack Koerner began his career as a walk-on but was a second-team All-Big Ten defensive back last year.

Merriweather's story is unusual at large but typical with Parker. Merriweather received Division I offers to play basketball and transferred from Romulus (Mich.) High School to Belleville (Mich.) before his senior year. Merriweather didn't start initially his senior football season, but eventually worked into a talented defensive backfield.

With the Detroit area as his recruiting ground, Parker was intrigued with Merriweather as an athlete and watched him play basketball. Merriweather then met with Parker for about 90 minutes to discuss football, which surprised Merriweather, who added, "I didn't know nothing about football."

That didn't bother Parker.

"I knew he was a good kid, he'd give good effort and the kid wanted to be good," Parker said. "I watched him play basketball, and I thought he had the ability to do it. He had an ability to lead."

"I didn't think anybody would take me seriously," Merriweather said. "He kept it real with me. He said, 'You're just a raw athlete, you have a lot to learn, but if you can come in here and learn everything you need to learn and come in here and focus, I think you could be a really good player for us.' And I just took that to heart."

Merriweather committed to Iowa, then played special teams as a true freshman. He started one game in 2019 before he injured his foot. He redshirted that year, and Koerner had taken over that position. Parker pulled Merriweather aside after the season and told him he wanted to see more from him. Because of their relationship, Merriweather bought in and became the fifth starter in 2020.

As much as Parker has dealt with success, he also has to massage damaged egos of younger players. When Moss was a freshman, he gave up three touchdowns at Purdue and two were on long scoring passes. Parker looked at the situation as a learning opportunity for his young cornerback.

"Every kid is different in how you handle him," Parker said. "Everybody, even in the NFL, everybody gets beat, but what you want to try to do is minimize the risk. And a lot of that stuff has to do with



fundamentally teaching guys about space of the field, where your dividers are, understanding the receiver splits. There's so much information that you need to have."

To an extent, Parker can tolerate physical limitations, but mental mistakes send him over the edge. For a generation of Iowa defenders, Parker's blowups at times have provided comic relief but only in retrospect. When told that Parker had mellowed compared with a decade ago, one defender's eyebrows furled upward and his lips clenched.

"It's not fun at all but you understand where he's coming from and he wants us to be better so you understand fully," Merriweather said.

"I can't really get into what he was saying but just getting after the defense a little bit," defensive end John Waggoner said about a training camp rant.

The offensive players enjoy antagonizing their defensive teammates — and Parker — during practice, especially when they hit for a big play.

"It's always fun to hear him, 'What are you doing?'" Iowa tight end Sam LaPorta said with a grin. "Yep, that was because of me."

Cornerback Terry Roberts came to Iowa from Erie, Pa., where former Iowa cornerback Jovon Johnson serves as a mentor. Johnson had 17 career interceptions and told Roberts that Parker is "intense" but added, "he's arguably one of the best coaches to ever coach the game."

"He's very detailed with everything," said Roberts, who intercepted a pass last week. "Stances, alignments, everything. But Jovon kind of got me ready for that when I was on my way here, but coach Parker, he's one of a kind. Very rare coach, but I love him."

If there's one secret Parker has left, it's his game film from his Michigan State days. Parker was known as one of the toughest safeties to play Big Ten football, yet his players cannot seem to find video clips of him. It's not for a lack of trying, however.

"We've heard stories about how crazy he was," Merriweather said with a laugh. "I think that's why he's a little messed up in the head now."

Messed up. Crazy. Rare. All are terms of endearment from Iowa players toward Parker. When it comes to love, that emotion seems mutually reciprocal, both in words and performance.

Title: Iowa, ready to examine its issues, won't be undefeated, but 'everything else is out there for our taking'

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Maybe it's for the best that Iowa struggled in all facets — and not just one — in its 24-7 loss to Purdue on Saturday.

The defense gave up 24 points to the Boilermakers, tying the most by an Iowa opponent in 29 consecutive games. The offense totaled its lowest scoring output in a home game in 10 seasons. There were no interceptions collected by Iowa's self-proclaimed "Doughboys" secondary. There were four thrown by Hawkeyes quarterback Spencer Petras, including three in the final four minutes. The running game couldn't mount a consistent attack, and the defense couldn't get off on third down.

It was collective, and it was complete. Now, it's time to re-evaluate.

Iowa (6-1 overall, 3-1 Big Ten) fell from No. 2 to No. 11 in both national polls. The Hawkeyes have a week off before five straight of divisional border rivalries, including three trophy games. That stretch ultimately will define Iowa's season, and everything the program could have wanted at the beginning of the season is still there for the taking.

"Our goals are all in front of us at this point," Petras said. "The one thing we can't do is be undefeated. But everything else is out there for our taking. We've done a lot of good throughout the last seven weeks, a lot of bad. Probably most of that (on Saturday). But we've just got to regroup and get some rest."

If there's one positive coming from a loss like the one Saturday, it's the stripping away of the figurative duct tape that covers problem areas. A decisive loss forces coaches to enact a thorough examination. Perhaps for some players, it's as simple as applying better fundamentals and attention to details. In other situations, the problems could be schemes, play calling or personnel.

That's what the coaches must evaluate over the next few days as they give the starters some rest and give the reserves a heavier workload.

"This is a game for mentally tough people," coach Kirk Ferentz said. "If you're not mentally tough, you'll dwell on it and let it fester. Anytime you don't have success, everybody's got an opinion about it. So, if you're not careful, you start second-guessing yourself and doubting this or that and whatever. The whole trick is to get your eyes back on what you're trying to do and work to improve. Not worry about what went wrong. There was plenty of that, in large part to our opponent's credit.

"We've done a lot of good things in six weeks prior to this game, and what we need to do is make sure we get back playing the way we want to play and how we need to play."

Iowa still leads the Big Ten West Division, still is ranked No. 11 nationally and still won 12 games in a row until Saturday. There still is a path to Indianapolis and the program's first Big Ten championship appearance since 2015. It still has one of the nation's top defenses, although it was sliced open way too often. Despite a missed chip-shot field goal, it still has an elite special-teams unit. It still has an upper-level running back and the best center in college football, despite the lack of consistent offensive output.

But there also are areas that require immediate attention, starting with the running game. Iowa lost three starters from last year's offensive line that cleared the way for 4.62 yards per carry. The



replacements have been inconsistent and rarely click collectively on an outside slant run. The drop in production up front has been much steeper than anyone could have expected. This year, Iowa averages 3.11 yards per carry, which ranks 118th nationally. The Hawkeyes have allowed 56 tackles for loss, which ranks 125th among FBS schools. In combination with a challenged passing game, Iowa's 4.61 yards per play not only is less than what it averaged running the ball last year, but it's also 122nd in the country.

Iowa had six runs of at least 5 yards against Purdue, but all were in the first half. The Hawkeyes had 92 rushing yards by halftime but finished with 76 yards because of second-half sacks. Iowa also frequently fell behind the chains on first down, with five runs of 1 yard or less.

"I felt like we had some decent runs in there, but also there's a lot of times where we started second- and-14 just by them making some big plays," center Tyler Linderbaum said. "It is what it is. I'm excited to see the film, excited to see what we did wrong and learn from it."

Schematically, Iowa could involve more jet-sweep motion, as it did last year. The Hawkeyes averaged 7.12 yards per carry when jet motion was applied (26 rushes, 185 runs). Through seven games, the Hawkeyes have used jet motion for ghost movements or sweeps 18 times for 66 yards (3.7 yards per carry). Without a fumbled handoff, that number grows to 4.6 yards per carry (17 carries, 79 yards).

What the motion does is force second- and third-level defenders to hesitate at the snap and enable the offensive line to reach blocks without always cutting defenders. Defensive ends become indecisive about containing the jet sweep or crashing into the running back. The strategy gains better cutback lanes for the running backs and limits the chance of a high-low block on a defensive lineman.

Iowa added the wildcat formation last year and gained 115 yards on 17 carries (6.8 yards per rush). This year, the offense has used only five wildcat snaps for 11 rushing yards.

The passing attack has sprinkled in big moments amid inconsistency. Petras' four interceptions Saturday were an aberration; he had thrown just four in the previous 12 games combined. The biggest question revolves around receivers' snaps and targets. Tyrone Tracy, who was expected to break out this year, has just 12 catches for 83 yards and a score. Over the past four games, he has three catches in 13 targets.

True freshmen Arland Bruce and Keagan Johnson continue to make an impact, as have upperclassmen Nico Ragaini and Charlie Jones. While none of the four has emerged as a consistent threat, the players have had their moments.

Although the defense stumbled against Purdue, it remains a team strength. A young defensive line needs to generate more pressure over its final five regular-season games. That's based on health, basic fundamentals and perhaps tweaks and rotation changes. The special-teams unit continues to shine.

But for Iowa to secure a Big Ten West Division title, it comes down to the offensive line and the running game. To play their style of defense, the Hawkeyes need a ground-acquisition running attack with an offensive line that frequently wins along the line of scrimmage. Since 2015, the Hawkeyes are 55-5 when they rush for more than 100 yards and 4-17 when they don't. Two of those wins, plus Saturday's loss, featured less than 100 yards rushing this year. That's not a comfortable statistical outlier for Iowa.

Perhaps the Hawkeyes won't reach the College Football Playoff, but immediate growth in the running game could earn them an appearance in the Big Ten title game. At that point, anything is possible. But it all comes down to the offensive line and the running game, the foundation of the Ferentzes' system. They have two weeks to make it serviceable.

Title: "We need to find ways to get him the football more": Iowa looking to get Keagan Johnson involved in pass game

IOWA CITY, Iowa - Iowa's offense has been up and down to start the 2021 season.

The Hawkeyes rank near the bottom of the Big Ten in passing and rushing yards per game but are 6-1 to start the year. Iowa has found ways to come up with big plays offensively, but the consistency overall has not been there.

Through seven games, a bright spot of the Iowa offense has been the play of true freshman wide receiver **Keagan Johnson**. The Bellevue (Neb.) West product was a four-star recruit coming out of high school, and early enrolled at Iowa this past January to get a head start with the program. In the early months of his college career, Johnson started to create a buzz around the program with his game and production.

Johnson saw limited snaps in Iowa's first three games of the season against Indiana, Iowa State, and Kent State, but recorded his first career reception in the fourth contest against Colorado State, a 43-yard touchdown to start the scoring for the Hawkeyes. Johnson also had a 49-yard reception in the win over the Rams.

In the two most recent games against Penn State and Purdue, Johnson combined for four receptions and 137 yards, including a 42-yard reception against the Nittany Lions that set up a score for Iowa and helped turn the momentum in favor of the Hawkeyes.

Iowa has a handful of experienced receivers in the mix along with Johnson, and fellow true freshman **Arland Bruce IV**. Johnson is not an every-down receiver and has seen more snaps as of late, but many have asked why Iowa is not getting him the ball more with the explosiveness he's shown on his long receptions.

"I've been really pleased with what Keagan has done," Iowa offensive coordinator **Brian Ferentz** said on Wednesday. "It goes back to the question about the offensive line, you're looking at him in the spring, and you're excited, but you also know that it's a big role, and can we get him ready to do that in a short amount of time. It's not all physical, and it's not just all football because you start adding the layers of being a college student, the social aspect of just being young, and then the pressures of being young, too, and not having any experience."

"So for him to get where he got, he didn't have a catch until the Colorado State game. I can't say I remember the last guy whose first touch in college football was a 54-yard touchdown. That was good, and his numbers are pretty impressive per catch. We need to get him more now. We need to find ways to get him the football more because he is a guy we think about that X position, and we want a guy that can win in single coverage situations."

Of Iowa's starting receivers, Johnson has the least receptions with six. However, he is second amongst the receivers in total receiving yards with 187. **Nico Ragaini** is in the lead with 234 yards and 17 receptions.



Iowa is ninth in the Big Ten in pass plays of 30 yards or more. The Hawkeyes are not known for putting the ball down the field with one big play, but with the talent they have at the receiver position, that's something they want to improve.

Iowa is well aware of Johnson's capability of making a big play and is trying to get him more touches when he's on the field.

"The game is simple," Ferentz said. "We put a guy here, we put everybody else over here, you decide what you want to do, and if you're going to put everybody else over here, then you're going to play with one guy over there, we're going to have to make you pay for that. I think Keagan is becoming. I don't want to put the car before the horse, but we certainly need to find him more opportunities to be involved."

Title: Iowa sparked by new quarterback, well-timed turnovers in 17-12 win over Northwestern

EVANSTON, ILL. — Iowa quarterback Spencer Petras said Tuesday the “sky is not falling” for the Hawkeyes. He was right, as No. 22 Iowa snapped its two-game losing skid with a 17-12 win over Northwestern Saturday night. The Hawkeyes (7-2, 4-2 Big Ten) proved that mostly without their starting quarterback, though. After Petras tried to play three drives despite an injury and struggled, backup Alex Padilla took over and led the Hawkeyes to their best offensive performance since the 51-14 Maryland win on Oct. 1. Padilla completed 64 percent of his passes for 172 yards. “For Alex to come in there and look as comfortable and superior as he did, it’s just amazing to see,” running back Tyler Goodson said. In Petras’ three drives, he completed 2-of-4 passes for 4 yards, including an uncharacteristically-underthrown pass to wide receiver Keagan Johnson.

Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz said Petras suffered the injury on a hit in the Wisconsin game. “He hit the turf pretty hard and was nursing it all the way through the week,” Ferentz said. Petras “made pretty good progress,” Ferentz said, and appeared to be healthy enough to play on Friday. He then noticed in warmups that Petras “didn’t look like he had a lot of zip on the ball.” Goodson said the injury “had something to do with his shoulder” although he didn’t know specifics. “It was in everybody’s best interests to get him out of there,” Ferentz said.

Iowa’s defense, meanwhile, forced several important turnovers. Iowa linebacker Dane Belton grabbed the Hawkeyes’ first interception in four weeks, and cornerback Jermari Harris picked off an offline throw in the fourth quarter at a crucial time. The Wildcats (3-6, 1-5) had an eight-play, 60-yard drive developing, and a score would’ve sliced Iowa’s lead to one possession. Instead, Harris’ interception set up a drive lasting almost four minutes. Sloppy tackling by the Hawkeyes eventually allowed Northwestern to cut the double-digit lead to just 17-12, on a 31-yard catch-and-run by Evan Hull with 2:21 left in the game.

Iowa’s inability to score on all but one drive also contributed to its once-comfortable lead becoming quite uncomfortable in the second half. But after the Wildcats held Iowa to a fast three-and-out, Belton then grabbed a second interception of Northwestern quarterback Andrew Marty to end a potential game-winning drive and seal the win.

“That was obviously a big relief to see him make that play,” defensive end Zach VanValkenburg said. “I was really excited, really relieved, but I can’t say I was surprised.” Belton said Iowa’s defense was familiar with the play Northwestern ran that led to the interception. “It was just a route concept that we had studied all week,” Belton said. “A lot of teams like to do it against us, and we had practiced it.” Iowa’s offense saw a much-improved rushing attack, averaging 4.9 yards per carry, a stark contrast from the 2.9 yards per carry through the first eight games. The Hawkeyes’ 185 rushing yards were more than in their last two games combined. “To come back and be successful in the run game is a big deal,” Goodson said.

Goodson led the team with 141 rushing yards, the most for him since the Kent State win on Sept. 18. He also had three receptions for 25 receiving yards. “Any time our offense is getting yards and flowing well, we’re going to get excited for them,” VanValkenburg said. “We had some good complementary football.” Iowa’s improved results on offense came against a Northwestern defense that ranked 12th in the Big Ten entering play with 27.1 points allowed per game.



Iowa's defense showed improvements beyond just the turnovers, holding the Wildcats scoreless on their first six drives. It was the longest Iowa has held an opposing offense scoreless in 2021. It also kept a Northwestern offense that relies heavily on running the ball in check — the Wildcats averaged just 3.0 yards per carry. Marty had two 11-yard rushes in the first four minutes of the game, but the senior never had a run for more than 6 yards after that. Marty hit receivers several times on deep throws — he had five completions of 20-plus yards — but his accuracy was problematic. He finished with a 57 percent completion rate along with the two interceptions.

The win was just Iowa's second in the last six games against the Wildcats. Iowa is now in a four-way tie for first place in the Big Ten West at 4-2. "We needed a win," Ferentz said. The Hawkeyes will return to Kinnick for a high-stakes game against Minnesota (6-3, 4-2) on Nov. 13. Ferentz is hopeful Petras will be healthy enough to play in that. "I don't think it's anything major," Ferentz said. "Hopefully Monday, Tuesday, he'll be back to full speed."

Title: A win for some Hawkeyes who weren't supposed to be here

IOWA CITY — Maybe a mathematician, statistician, logician or tactician can explain Iowa's strategy on its final offensive possession Saturday. For the record, though, the next time the Hawkeyes are ahead 24-22 with the ball at their opponent's 3-yard line and 2:17 left, they may want to consider slamming it in the end zone for a 9-point lead instead of lopping time off the clock and then kicking a field goal for a 5-point edge. The Gophers got one more shot with 71 yards and 39 seconds to go, but Iowa's defense put the lid on a 27-22 win that was weird, wild, and if you're the Hawkeyes, wonderful. Had Minnesota found a way to reach the end zone with a stunning play like its 68-yard touchdown pass with 5:28 left that pulled it within 24-22? Iowa City-Coralville Walmarts would quickly have run out of torches and pitchforks Saturday night. Instead, the strategy was one last quirk in a game filled with them. Minnesota possessing the ball for 83 plays and 40 minutes to Iowa's 49 and 20? Just a quirk. The Gophers playing turnover-free ball, gaining 132 more yards than the Hawkeyes, and still losing? Big-time quirky.

It's still about making one play more than your opponent with a game on the line, and the Hawkeyes' Joe Evans sacked Minnesota quarterback Tanner Morgan to finally end this thing. Iowa could have laid a big egg. Instead, it kept the bacon at home, again. Floyd of Rosedale went no further Saturday night than from Kinnick across the parking lot to the Hawkeyes' football compound. We puff this stuff up so much, but it's all really quite funny. College football followers get so wrapped up in recruiting. Where are we in the recruiting rankings? Who was in for a recruiting visit this weekend? Did they have a good time? Where else have they visited? Did they have a good time there? Who's leaning to coming here, who's leaning the other way, who is Player B if Player A ditches us for someone else? Then look at some of the most-important players for Iowa Saturday. Alex Padilla got his first start at quarterback and did just fine. You know who was offering Padilla scholarships when he was a high school kid in Colorado? Mountain West Conference and Ivy League programs, mostly. Penn, Cornell, Dartmouth, Yale and Columbia all wanted him. Big Ten coaches? Not until Iowa quarterbacks coach Ken O'Keefe got wind of Padilla, checked him out, and sold head coach Kirk Ferentz on him. Georgia made a late pitch to Padilla once he verbaled to the Hawkeyes. "Won't be visiting there," Padilla told the recruiting bird dogs at Hawkeye Report. "Done with recruiting."

Saturday, the former darling of Ivy League coaches threw two touchdown passes and ran for Iowa's other TD. "I've been dreaming of this moment ever since I was a little kid," Padilla said. Charlie Jones caught one of those touchdown passes. It was a 72-yarder early in the third quarter that gave Iowa a lead it somehow never surrendered. Jones made a double-cut, left Gopher cornerback Justin Walley behind him, caught the pass, and saw nothing but green ahead. Jones wasn't supposed to be here. His FBS scholarship offer out of high school in suburban Chicago was with Buffalo. He took it, played a season there, caught 18 passes, returned kickoffs and punts, scored four touchdowns, did a very nice job for a freshman. He wanted more. He didn't define himself as a Mid-American Conference player. So Jones joined Iowa as a walk-on in 2019, sitting out that season as a transfer. Last year, he returned punts and did it quite well, breaking one for a touchdown against Michigan State. He played well enough to be put on scholarship, again. But he hadn't caught a pass. This year, he's still returning kicks artfully. Receivers want to receive, though. Saturday he got a 72-yarder in a tight November Big Ten game.

"This is exactly why I came here," Jones said. "I was playing in the MAC, left the scholarship because I knew I could play in the Big Ten. "It was tough on me, tough on my family, but we knew it was worth it.



Moments in games like this is exactly why I came here.” Ferentz once may not have been so sure why he took in Jones. “Charlie, to me was a real wild card,” Ferentz said. “He almost kind of annoyed me earlier when he got here, and he knows this. Some idiosyncrasies, and I’m sure he feels the same about me. “You see him in live action, once you get to live action — and we don’t practice kicking live — we knew pretty quickly last year that, boy, this guy has great judgment fielding balls. He is reckless and just daring on the return part of it. “The other part he has really developed into a good receiver, as we saw today. That’s a real credit to him. He has worked really hard at that. ... Love players like that.”

How about Iowa defensive end Zach VanValkenburg? He sacked Morgan at the Minnesota 3 late in the game. He had two other tackles for losses, and 10 stops total. He was fantastic, and has been fantastic. VanValkenburg came here from Division II Hillsdale College in Michigan. He sold defensive line coach Kelvin Bell on him. Bell met him in a Hillsdale coffee shop, got a good feeling about him right away. But Bell couldn’t know if the player could truly handle the leap from D-II to the Big Ten.

VanValkenburg, however, did know. He played great ball last year and enjoyed it so much that he used the one-year eligibility waiver the NCAA gave athletes last year because of the pandemic to become a sixth-year senior. This season, he’s better. He leads Iowa in tackles for losses with 9.5. He leads the team in quarterback hurries with 8. If there are two defensive ends voted ahead of him for the All-Big Ten team, they better be incredible.

“It’s hard to evaluate looking at the Division II film,” Ferentz said, “but the one thing about him, he went hard, and he is a smart, mature guy. You feel like if you get a little time, maybe this guy can grow into something. He has.” Recruiting? Hillsdale wanted him out of Zeeland, Mich. So he went to Hillsdale. Saturday was why he came here. “Yeah, just big-time football,” VanValkenburg said. “Every week they’re great games, they’re great contests. The competition is obviously a lot higher than what I used to play, just physically. “Just being able to test yourself and being part of a team that can go and do things like this, it’s a great feeling.” Padilla, Jones and VanValkenburg all thought they were better than the world thought they were, if they could prosper on larger stages than where they originally were pegged. Saturday’s was a tough, nutty game. It’s a tough, nutty sport for tough, nutty people. But those three guys are winners, and earned a tough, nutty win.

Title: Iowa QB Alex Padilla not perfect, but impressive in first career start

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Walking onto Duke Slater Field in front of nearly 70,000 fans to lead the Hawkeyes' offense on Saturday, Alex Padilla was experiencing "everything I dreamed of." "Couldn't imagine being in this position as a kid," Padilla said after the game. As Padilla lived out his childhood dreams, he also impressed his coaches and teammates. "I thought he did a really good job," Ferentz said. "He made some really good throws." The sophomore quarterback's rollouts extended plays, giving the young offensive line ahead of him more leeway. He showed the ability to target receivers deep downfield. He had three touchdowns — two in the air, one on the ground — and threw for 206 yards. Padilla's performance wasn't perfect, though. He completed just 45.8 percent of his passes, a lower mark than in any of Petras' eight games this season. He also had a couple near-interceptions that Minnesota couldn't take advantage of, and one of his passing touchdowns involved wide receiver Keagan Johnson breaking through tackles from two defenders before sprinting down the sideline. Many of Padilla's incompletions were catchable passes, though. Johnson was responsible for a few of the drops, and he was the first to admit it. "I feel like I need to do my part better," Johnson said. "The game wasn't perfect, and I wasn't perfect."

Unlike the Northwestern game, Padilla spent the practice week as the known starter for the Minnesota game. He said after the Northwestern game that he prepares every week like he's the starter. "Obviously it was a little bit different this week when I'm the actual starter," Padilla said. Padilla said he had "a little bit of added stress and anxiety" with being the No. 1 quarterback. Ferentz said the staff didn't make it a big deal that this was Padilla's first career start. "We just acted like it's his turn," Ferentz said. "It's his time." "His time" marked the first time an Iowa quarterback threw for more than 200 yards since Petras threw for 259 yards against Maryland. "I felt like this was our best game offensively, just as far as moving the ball," Johnson said. The offensive game plan shifted with Padilla under center instead of Petras. While Petras was more of a pocket passer — he once said, "I'm not like Lamar Jackson back there" — the Hawkeyes implemented more quarterback rollouts to get Padilla outside of the pocket. The offense also took more deep shots down the field although much of that was a result of what Minnesota's defense presented. "We thought there'll be some favorable coverages for us to take some shots on," Padilla said. "They were starting to load the box a little bit with those safeties. ... Stuff down the middle of the field was open, and our guys ran well. The offensive line blocked really well."

The next step for Padilla, Ferentz said, is to "just keep playing and keep growing, like every guy out there." "There's no specific thing that he is really lacking, other than experience," Ferentz said. Although Padilla was the only quarterback to contribute on the field Saturday, Petras still found ways to help the team without throwing. Johnson brought up how Petras "has supported Alex through this week" and has been "a great leader on the sidelines." Padilla agreed. "Having an experienced starter who could see stuff from the sidelines was really helpful," Padilla said. "He suggested a lot of great plays for us, and I'm super thankful for him. He helped me all the way." Petras kept his tips simple to avoid any overthinking. His main piece of advice? "Just rip it." That advice "eased my nerves a little bit," Padilla said. Padilla wasn't the only one to get wisdom from Petras on Saturday. After Johnson's drops, Petras, a "great teammate," was there to console him. "Obviously I didn't have a perfect game," Johnson said. "Spencer was over there encouraging me. ... That's a big testament to Spencer's character."



It's not clear how much longer Petras will need to lead without using his arm. Ferentz said the team will continue to take Petras' recovery from the shoulder injury "day by day." "I think we're gaining ground," Ferentz said. "It's going a little slower than maybe we thought." The progression of Padilla gives Ferentz less reason to worry about how long Petras' recovery will take. "The good news is I feel like we've got two quarterbacks now that we have faith and trust in," Ferentz said. Who will be the starter once both those trusted quarterbacks are healthy remains a mystery. "We'll see what happens in practice," Ferentz said. "I don't know."

Title: Iowa football's Tyler Goodson dominates in November. Is another big month in store for Hawkeye runner?

IOWA CITY, Iowa - Iowa running back Tyler Goodson has learned to accept the ebbs and flows of his position.

Every run won't go for positive yardage.

Every game won't be a 100-yard game.

Sometimes it's a slow grind and all you can do is put your head down and fight forward. That's been the 2021 season pretty much for the shifty junior.

Before last Saturday's game at Northwestern, Goodson went 87 consecutive carries (five games) without a touchdown. In their 17-12 win, he scored a 13-yard touchdown on his eighth carry ending the drought at 94 carries, the longest of his career.

It was a breakout game for Goodson — 141 yards on 17 carries, one part of a statement performance by his team to keep themselves in the middle of the Big Ten West race.

Goodson admitted after the game that it felt good to get back into the end zone but more than anything that the entire rush offense made strides, and that can lead to more wins.

"It felt amazing," Goodson said after the game. "Especially when you start the season well in the run game then unfortunately these last two weeks we didn't do too well. To come back and be successful is a big deal. I said at the beginning of the week that we were close to getting done what we want to get done and it showed (last Saturday)."

Goodson's effort against Northwestern was the latest in his list of notable November performances. The mark of good teams is how they perform down the stretch of the season. Goodson applies the same mantra to his own game and has spoken numerous times this year about getting stronger as the season progresses.

"I focused a lot on my body (during the bye week)," Goodson said. "Little joints that may need a little work here and there so that's been a difference. I made sure I got massages, went to the chiropractor just to make sure that going into the second half of the season I'm prepared for 20-25 carries (a game). Or any amount as long as I'm helping the team."

Head coach Kirk Ferentz said after the Northwestern game and again this week ahead of Saturday's bout with Minnesota that establishing the run game this time of year is critical. If history is any indication, a heady dose of Goodson is exactly what Iowa needs right now.

A look at the numbers:

Goodson averages 95 rushing yards per game in November (most of any month).

He has five career 100-yard rush games in November.

Iowa 8-0 all-time when Goodson has 20+ carries (five of those games in November).



Goodson's first career start came in November 2019 against their opponent on Saturday: Minnesota. In two career games against the Golden Gophers, Goodson's rushed for 236 yards, averaged 7.1 yards per carry and scored three touchdowns.

"He's dynamic. He does it all," Fleck said of Goodson at Big Ten media days. "Great pass-catcher, can run through tackles and can run all types of schemes. He's a phenomenal player, we're looking forward to another game against him coming up and another game in the rivalry."

When both teams meet on Saturday, each side will want to put their best foot forward for the month. Iowa and Minnesota are two of a four-way tie (Purdue, Wisconsin) for first place in the Big Ten West. Another loss would all but end any chance at a trip to the Big Ten championship game.

Minnesota's No. 8 nationally-ranked defense will present a greater challenge than Northwestern, which ranks last in the Big Ten in rush defense. Nonetheless, Iowa has to run the ball effectively to win.

Quarterback Alex Padilla is making his first career start on Saturday. Like last Saturday, getting the run going to settle the game down, and set up play-action pass attempts is key. Fortunately, Goodson and the run game gained much needed momentum and confidence heading into Saturday.

"Certainly it was good to get Tyler going a little bit," Ferentz said. "It's going to help us, especially in November in the Big Ten."

Goodson's responsibility has grown even more recently with a foot injury sidelining senior Ivory Kelly-Martin. Prior to that, Iowa played two veteran backs; now redshirt freshman Gavin Williams is handling carries in major moments for the first time.

"A lot of little things come from a veteran who's played in big games," said Williams, a recent high school star at Southeast Polk and Dowling Catholic. "Just from the aspect of what he sees out there and what he thinks the defense is doing helps me improve faster and take bigger steps to improve myself."

Goodson and Williams form a duo that's going to have to run into the teeth of Minnesota's defense for yardage. Saturday's contest could fare similarly to Iowa's Oct. 9 game against Penn State, another athletic defense. Goodson carried the ball 25 times for 87 yards.

Not eye-popping numbers but did enough to keep Iowa's offense steady until the pass offense came alive.

Or it could be like their previous two meetings where Goodson is running freely toward another 100-yard-plus game. Either way, a large part of Iowa's success on Saturday and the final stretch of the season hinges on Goodson's production.

"Some games require me to stick my head in for two yards, others might be 10-15 yards," Goodson said. "I just study the guys we face each and every week to see what type of game it'll be and I go from there. And then for me it's about staying positive, being patient and letting those big runs come to me."

Title: Just rip it: How downfield throws and improvisation helped Iowa reclaim “Floyd” in Alex Padilla’s starting debut

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Amid the snow flurries that fell from the sky and deafening roar that swirled inside Kinnick Stadium, Iowa’s players sprinted toward the north end zone to reclaim the iconic Floyd of Rosedale trophy, hoisted the 98-pound bronze pig on their shoulders and carried it 120 yards until reaching the south end zone tunnel and into their locker room.

The No. 20-ranked Hawkeyes beat Minnesota 27-22 in an unusual method for the home team by repeatedly attacking downfield on big pass plays. Iowa quarterback Alex Padilla, who was making his first career start, twice hooked up with Charlie Jones on passes of 72 and 34 yards. The former was a touchdown and the second one led to another one.

The game statistics almost made the result a complete outlier for the Hawkeyes. Minnesota kept the ball for 40 minutes and 2 seconds. Iowa failed to rush for more than 100 yards and completed less than 50 percent of its passes. With a premium on possessions, Iowa had the game’s only turnover and it led to a Minnesota field goal going into halftime. The Hawkeyes trailed at the half and gave up two scoring passes of 37 and 68 yards.

Yet the final score was what really mattered in beating the Gophers for the seventh straight season. How did Iowa do it? Largely with quality quarterback play.

Padilla’s day at first glance looks subpar. The sophomore completed just 11 of 24 passes, but for the first time since Oct. 1, the Hawkeyes surpassed the 200-yard passing barrier at 206. Iowa averaged 8.6 yards per attempt — second-highest for a game this season — and a whopping 18.7 yards per completion. That’s the highest number for an Iowa quarterback in a single game since 2011.

Iowa’s aggressive downfield strategy paid off on the 72-yard strike from Padilla to Jones. Early in the third quarter with the ball at its 28, Padilla dropped back without a play fake, and Jones juke corner back Justin Walley like he was headed toward the sideline. Walley bit on the move and Jones cut inside of him and was wide open on the hashmark on a post route. Padilla delivered a clean ball, Jones caught it in stride at the Minnesota 40 and raced into the end zone for a touchdown.

“Charlie ran a great route, really had the corner on his heels and just ran right by him,” Padilla said. “He was wide open. It’s one of those ones that you just try not to overthrow because he’s so wide open but he ran a great route.”

“First of all, it was a great call, a perfect time for it,” Jones said. “We knew that (Walley) was going to be playing outside of me, and it was just a double move route, fake the out and then go to the post. Alex threw a great ball, right where I could get it and had a lot of space.”

When Padilla hooked up with Jones on a 34-yard completion, Iowa had heavy personnel on the field for a third-and-2 play at the Minnesota 39. The tendency was for Iowa to run when it had two tight ends and two running backs, so Padilla play-faked and found Jones in single coverage. Padilla slightly overthrew Jones, but the receiver dove and caught the ball at the 5-yard line. Iowa punched it in the end zone two plays later.

“We were kind of geared up for that; it was third and short,” Padilla said. “He was able to get behind them, just a tremendous catch. If I threw kind of a better ball, he’s probably able to score on that one. But a tremendous catch by Charlie, a credit to him.”

“He put it in a good spot,” Jones said. “He put it out there for only me to go get it. I knew I was going to have to probably lay out and it worked out.”



Several other times Iowa attacked down the field but couldn't connect. Late in the game, in a traditional clock-killing situation, Padilla threw deep for receiver Arland Bruce, but the pass was broken up.

"It's part of the plan during the week," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said of throwing deep. "The one thing you never know is what are they going to do Saturday because people change up a lot. You are never quite sure. The big play to Charlie, it was one that we were kind of tracking what they were doing on first downs, and we figured, 'Hey, it might be time to take a shot,' and luckily, it was there. It was a good job by both Alex and Charlie working up there."

"We thought there will be some favorable coverages for us to take some shots on," Padilla said. "They were starting to load the box a little bit with those safeties, corners playing outside, so stuff down the middle of the field was open."

Just as important was Padilla's ability to improvise. On Iowa's first touchdown drive, the Hawkeyes faced third-and-12 and lined up with an empty backfield. Flushed from the pocket, Padilla scrambled to his left and saw tight end Sam LaPorta and they connected for 17 yards.

While the Hawkeyes had three drops, the receivers also made plays for their new quarterback. On the team's first offensive possession, Padilla hit LaPorta short on a third-and-6. LaPorta was about two yards shy of the first-down marker at contact but twisted away and lunged for a first down.

Early in the fourth quarter with a one-point lead, Padilla threw a quick screen to receiver Keagan Johnson three yards behind the line of scrimmage. Minnesota cornerback Coney Durr and defensive lineman Thomas Rush collapsed on Johnson before left tackle Jack Plumb could block either one. Johnson absorbed hits from both players, spun to his left and ran up the sideline for a 27-yard touchdown. The score helped erase a pair of early drops for the true freshman earlier in the game.

"I caught the ball and I (saw) two people in my face," Johnson said. "In my head, I was thinking, 'Stay up.' And when I did stay up, I just saw green grass and I just ran as fast as I could. I tried to get as low as possible because I knew they were both coming."

"It takes some strength," Ferentz said. "The bigger thing is it just takes a guy who is really competitive."

Everyone around Padilla helped him pull through, including predecessor Spencer Petras, who was sidelined with a shoulder injury. Petras was in uniform but did not participate in any pregame drills. Unlike in many of Iowa's previous quarterback competitions, Padilla and Petras are close friends. They were in constant communication on the sideline, and Petras dispensed plenty of advice throughout the game.

"You can start to overthink things when you're making your first start, trying to force stuff, but Spencer's word of advice was, 'Just rip it,'" Padilla said. "So that just kind of eased my nerves a little bit. That's what I tried to do today."

As for Petras' status next week against Illinois and in the season finale at Nebraska, it remains unclear.

"I think we're gaining ground. It's going a little slower than maybe we thought," Ferentz said. "We'll continue to take it day by day, and the good news is I feel like we got two quarterbacks now that we have faith and trust in."

Ferentz didn't offer a direct indication of which quarterback would start when Petras is healthy, but indirectly it seems likely Padilla will continue in that role.

"We just all acted like it's (Padilla's) turn, it's his time," Ferentz said. "He is the starter this week, and he is pretty even-keel, as you have probably seen. I thought he did a really good job. He made some good throws. Would have been nice if we could have hit that last one to Arland Bruce down there, but we'll see it on tape. Good decisions. The ball security part. Played clean football."

Padilla got away with two throws that could have been intercepted, but they weren't. Overall, he executed a win to help Iowa maintain possession of the historical traveling trophy. For the first time, the Hawkeyes (8-2 overall, 5-2) lead the Gophers all-time in the battle for the pig, 43-42-2. In the end, that accomplishment is all that really matters for Padilla.

Title: Keagan Johnson keeps up with more experienced Iowa wide receivers as true freshman

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Growing up in Bellevue, Neb., as the youngest of three sons, Keagan Johnson wanted to compete with his older brothers.

“What drives him is two older brothers that played at high level, and, ‘I want to be like that and better,’” his father Clester Johnson said. “We played basketball in the driveway. We’d play cards at home. ... It was a natural competition.”

He often competed with kids in older age groups in organized basketball and football, too.

Now, Keagan Johnson is competing, and succeeding, with his older unofficial brothers on the Iowa football team.

Johnson, a true freshman, has the most receiving yards among Iowa’s wide receivers with 316, despite having only 15 receptions.

“It feels good just helping the team in any way I can,” Johnson said earlier this month. “When my name is called upon, I just try to do as much as I can, and that’s what my mindset has been.”

After a quiet first couple games, he emerged as a big-play option with two 40-plus-yard catches against Colorado State.

He doesn’t have the 1.875 receptions per Iowa’s games played yet to qualify for the Big Ten leaderboard for yards per completion, but his 21.1 yards per catch would be one of the best in the conference.

Johnson is just the sixth wide receiver in the Kirk Ferentz era to start a game as a true freshman and the second to start at least four games.

Leaders in the wide receiver room have told Johnson to “just keep it up,” he said.

Johnson had a head start. He enrolled at Iowa last spring, giving him an extra semester of practices at the collegiate level.

“It seems like some of the best players across the country, that’s one of the routes that they want to go,” Clester said. “His mission was to play football, so we just planned it out, and I think he’s happy he did it.”

It didn’t take long after Johnson arrived in Iowa City for fellow wideout Charlie Jones to see the young prospect’s potential.

“Right away, you can tell he’s really talented,” the senior said. “He’s got a lot of things that are going to help this team.”

Johnson is already reaping the benefits of the early enrollment, especially after Iowa’s quarterback change to Alex Padilla.

Padilla and Johnson often worked together on the second team in practices. When both moved to the first team, the chemistry was already there.



“We've gotten a lot of work together, so we're super comfortable with each other out there,” Padilla said. “We have a great relationship. We can kind of think what the other person's thinking in a way.”

The Hawkeyes' young big-play threat had a career-high five receptions in Padilla's first game with significant playing time.

Then in his second game working significantly with Padilla, he resurrected a screen play that appeared to have no chance of success.

After Johnson caught the ball, two Minnesota defenders were right there to tackle him. He broke through, though, and ran for an improbable 27-yard touchdown reception.

“That was sweet. We were going crazy on the bench,” cornerback Riley Moss said. “He little-bodied those people.”

Jones couldn't see Johnson's physics-defying touchdown reception well because he was on the opposite side of the field, but he saw the replay “plenty of times” over the next two days.

“It's pretty special,” Jones said. “Each week he is just going to continue to do things like that.”

A different play earlier in the Minnesota game caught offensive coordinator Brian Ferentz's eye, although it had much less of a spotlight than the touchdown.

“We run a pin-and-pull play out to the field, and Keagan's out there burying the corner,” Ferentz said. “He's got as devastating of a standing block as anybody on the field had.”

Ferentz, who is focused on “if we can improve and be better this week,” is hesitant to “go into prognostications” about Johnson's future success. Jones sees him improving with every week, though.

“As the weeks go on, each week, he's just learning and picking up more and more and adding it to his toolbox,” Jones said.

It's going better than some of those card games in Bellevue.

“Well, Keagan was the little guy,” Clester said with a laugh.

Not so little anymore.

Title: Kyle Schott enjoys 'almost unexplainable' path from walk-on to Iowa start

IOWA CITY, Iowa — As a couple throwers tried to compete in the shuttle hurdle relay in a track meet in Van Horne about five years ago, much of the spectators' attention was glued to a far more entertaining sight.

One athlete from North Linn and one from Mount Vernon had some time and a football in their hands.

"Each of them were throwing it about 50, 60 yards," North Linn football coach Jared Collum said. "Everybody's watching them."

The Mount Vernon athlete was Tristan Wirfs. The North Linn athlete was Kyler Schott. Both would become Iowa offensive linemen.

Schott's path at Iowa — he described it as "almost unexplainable" — hasn't been as easy or straightforward as those heaves between him and Wirfs, though.

"He was a walk-on that didn't look like much when he showed up here," Iowa football coach Kirk Ferentz said.

Walking on at Iowa: 'I had to try it'

Schott didn't know if walking on at Iowa would work out, but it seemed like a better option than playing at the Division III level for Coe College or Wartburg College.

"It was a pretty easy decision for me," Schott said. "(It) was either come to Iowa and pay for school or go to Wartburg and pay even more, so I figured, even if it didn't work out, I had to try it."

In his first few Iowa practices, Schott said he "didn't know what to do at all."

"That was not pretty," he said.

It didn't help that he was invited to fall camp late.

"Coach (Reese) Morgan called me, and they were already like four days in," Schott said. "He was like, 'Hey, do you want to come to fall camp?' I'm like, 'When?'" He said, 'Tomorrow.'"

Earning a scholarship — and a starting spot

Schott redshirted in 2017 and played in one game in 2018, the same year Ferentz noticed his development accelerate.

The offensive lineman saw more playing time starting in 2019. He made six starts that year and two starts in 2020.

The Coggon native also experienced some adversity in those years. He missed five games in 2019 because of an injury and three games in 2020 because of an illness.

"Obviously he's faced some injuries, but he's battled through them and a lot of adversity," Iowa center Tyler Linderbaum said.



About two years ago, Ferentz pulled Schott aside and had a special message for him.

“He said, ‘You’re never going to have to pay for school again. You’re going to be on scholarship for the rest of your time here,’” Schott said. “I got a little emotional. Me and Wirfs were hugging and crying.”

After a delayed start to the 2021 season after breaking his foot leaping off a pile of hay bales, Schott has started Iowa’s last six games and provided a veteran presence on a young offensive line.

Kirk is not the only Ferentz to sing Schott’s praises.

“He’s playing his best football right now,” said Brian Ferentz, Iowa fifth-year offensive coordinator.

Brian Ferentz attributed it to Schott’s hard work since arriving on campus in 2017.

“I wish we could take credit for Kyler’s development,” Brian Ferentz said. “All the credit lies with Kyler. It’s the work he puts in, and really it’s the toughness and the grit he’s shown to persevere through a lot of hardship.”

Linderbaum has seen Schott especially “try to be a better leader” this year.

“Within this last year, just his investment into the team and into the players ... has just skyrocketed,” Linderbaum said.

Linderbaum said Schott’s lack of recruiting interest from other schools leads to “a little chip on your shoulder.”

“I think having that mentality — try to prove people wrong — has helped him,” Linderbaum said.

Schott doesn’t necessarily show that chip in his off-the-field interactions.

“He definitely lights up the room when he comes in,” Linderbaum said.

Brian Ferentz has been “excited to be around him and see him every day.”

North Linn’s Collum has seen Schott’s fun personality plenty of times. Once, Schott and his high school teammates ran a 400-meter relay with a football instead of a baton.

“Then he spiked it as he crossed the finish line,” Collum said. “Of course we got DQ’ed, but it was pretty great.”

The 6-foot-2 offensive lineman is far from the biggest guy Iowa has ever had up front, but he still finds ways to produce results.

“You have to look beyond what he looks like sometimes.” Kirk Ferentz said. “I don’t mean that in a derogatory sense, but he doesn’t look like Tristin Wirfs.”

No one has to tell that to Linderbaum.

Linderbaum views Schott as a “great friend” and “great teammate.” Schott also has been quite the competitor for Linderbaum, starting on the high school wrestling mats.

“Shooter won,” Linderbaum said. “We wrestled one time.”

It was close, though.

“We ended up having a really good match,” Linderbaum said. “I think it came down to, like, the last 10 seconds.”



When Linderbaum came to Iowa **initially as a defensive lineman**, he then had to go up against the winning wrestler in practice.

“He was pretty tough then,” Linderbaum said. “He’s just continuing to get better.”

Now that they’re both offensive linemen, the wrestling match still comes up from time to time.

“I want my rematch,” Linderbaum said.

A sixth year for Shooter?

The time for that rematch may be dwindling. Schott, a senior, could be playing his last game at Kinnick Stadium on Saturday.

“I don’t think that it’s really going to hit me until I run out on that field,” Schott said. “It’s really going to come over me like a tidal wave. Hopefully I can keep it in a little bit.”

Schott has not decided yet whether he’ll stay for his **extra year of eligibility because of COVID-19**. He’s “been focusing on every game this season,” which doesn’t leave much time to think about 2022.

Some of the factors going into the decision, he said, will be “how your body feels” and what the team needs on the offensive line in 2022.

If he plays another year, that would mean going through another physically-taxing Big Ten season.

“To put my body through another (season) when I’ve already had a few injuries in my time here, it’d be tough to do for sure,” Schott said.

The criminal justice major also has to consider whether he wants to take college classes for a sixth year.

“I already graduated last year, so I’m just kind of taking random classes right now,” Schott said. “I don’t know if I can find enough classes to take.”

Underwater basket weaving? “I think they got rid of that.”

If it is his last home game, he’s had quite the journey since his days as a walk-on.

“You knew you were going to have to work your tail off, but just to be at this point, it’s awesome,” Schott said.

He’ll have some time to make that decision, though.

It will almost certainly come more on his terms than the end of the game of catch at Benton Community High School’s track meet with his future Iowa teammate.

“The Benton Community guy got on (the microphone), ‘Athletes from Mount Vernon and North Linn, will you please put the football away,’” Collum said with a big laugh.

Title: With 3 key secondary pieces out, Iowa Hawkeyes find contributions from others

IOWA CITY, Iowa — As Iowa called Matt Hankins' name during Saturday's pregame Senior Day ceremony, the speedy cornerback wasn't so speedy.

As his fellow seniors ran from the southwest tunnel to their parents, he had to walk.

He had his No. 8 jersey on, but sweats were underneath it instead of shoulder pads.

While Hankins was the only senior recognized not in uniform, he was certainly not the only key piece of the secondary unable to play.

Hankins and safety Jack Koerner started each of the Hawkeyes' first 10 games in 2021. But both were unavailable Saturday.

Koerner was in uniform and able to run during the team's Senior Day ceremony. He'll "hopefully" be ready for the Nebraska game, Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz said.

"Jack tried to go," Ferentz said. "He practiced yesterday. Limped around a little bit and tried to go today but just couldn't."

Hankins, on the other hand, doesn't have as promising of an outlook. He has "a ways to go" before coming back, Ferentz said.

That was in addition to fellow cornerback Terry Roberts' lingering bone bruise that has sidelined him for the last four games.

"The one thing I've learned (about bone bruises) is they're hard to put a temperature gauge on," Ferentz said. "So I think he's close. He seemed encouraged yesterday. But it would help to get him back."

Until then, and with Riley Moss' absence for much of October, other players in the secondary have needed to play larger roles.

Dane Belton is certainly not a new face to the secondary. He has started every game in 2020 and 2021, either at safety or at the cash position.

He has found more opportunities to produce, though, amid Iowa's injury-plagued secondary in 2021.

He recorded his team-best fifth interception in Iowa's 33-23 win over Illinois. Belton was already tied for the lead in the Big Ten for interceptions going into Saturday's contest.

He didn't have any interceptions in 2019 or 2020.

"Each year, I'm gaining experience," Belton said.

With that experience, he improved at recognizing "the route combinations that offenses try to beat us on," Belton said.

Three of Belton's five interceptions were in the last three games.



The secondary's injury problem led to more playing time for defensive backs like cornerback Jermari Harris and safety Quinn Schulte.

Schulte, a former Cedar Rapids Xavier standout, played his first collegiate game with a significant number of snaps. Ferentz said he was "really proud of him" after the sophomore's performance.

"He stepped in and allowed us to keep doing the things we want to do," Ferentz said. "He played a lot of snaps today. Did a good job."

Koerner's absence also meant someone else had to handle the calls the senior usually makes.

Belton said a variety of players were making the calls instead during practice, so the group was prepared for Koerner's absence.

"The whole week we were ready for this," Belton said. "We just went out and played football together."

The next-player-up mentality certainly wasn't perfect. Illinois' Brandon Peters had 248 passing yards, the most for him in a game since 2019.

A drive with fewer than two minutes to go where Peters racked up 85 passing yards in about a minute inflated those numbers.

Evaluating a secondary based on how it performs when leading by 17 with fewer than two minutes left has its shortcomings, though. Excluding that drive, Iowa's numbers against Illinois' aerial attack look more respectable.

Before that drive, Peters threw for 163 yards while completing about 42 percent of his passes.

Iowa also stifled a running attack that averages 152.3 yards per game, limiting the Illini to 63 rushing yards on 25 carries.

"Overall, the guys really did a good job defensively," Ferentz said.

Title: If this was Tyler Linderbaum's last home game, it was a gem

IOWA CITY, Iowa - Iowa has been outgained by its opponent in its last five football games.

Yet the 9-2 Hawkeyes are on a three-game winning streak and ranked 12th in the latest coaches' poll after Saturday's 33-23 win against Illinois.

Much of the postgame credit went to Iowa's special teams and defense. On this week's DVR Monday film review, we shine the spotlight on Brian Ferentz's offense. What went well? What didn't? What can be built upon heading into Friday's 12:30 p.m. game at Nebraska?

Let's start in the middle of the action.

In probably his last time playing at Kinnick Stadium, this was the Tyler Linderbaum game.

I asked Kirk Ferentz after the game where this Hawkeye team would be without its all-American center.

"It would be really interesting. Yeah, really interesting," the head coach said, the wheels in his head probably going to some dark scenarios. "Not only is he playing well, but he's also setting the bar for everybody else in the room."

Ferentz has highlighted the preseason injuries to expected starting guards Kyler Schott and Cody Ince and the extreme inexperience at tackle as the main issue holding back this Iowa team. But Linderbaum, the Outland Trophy semifinalist, has been the one constant. And he had another vintage performance Saturday, with the Hawkeyes' offense moving right behind No. 65.

With Iowa backed up to its own 7-yard line in the second quarter, the Hawkeyes ran Tyler Goodson up the middle for a quick and necessary 23 yards. Linderbaum manned up Illinois 335-pound defensive tackle Calvin Avery and shoved him out of the play like he weighed 135 pounds.

Linderbaum continually frustrated the Illini in the run game. He bulldozed such a clean path on Gavin Williams' 7-yard run in the third quarter that he was actually the furthest Hawkeye downfield by the time the whistle blew to break up his blocks.

No surprise, Linderbaum was Iowa's highest-graded player by Pro Football Focus against Illinois, with a rating of 86.2. No other offensive lineman was above 70. Freshman wide receiver Arland Bruce IV was next, at 83.3.

Linderbaum won't publicly address his NFL future until after the season, but if this was it for him at Kinnick, he went out on a high note.

Tired of seeing Iowa's outside zone? Apparently Brian Ferentz was, too.

The Hawkeyes came out of the halftime locker room by running three straight inside-zone running plays to Goodson for gains of 6, 6 and 13, and that was a common play call from Iowa's offensive coordinator throughout the second half.

That repeated success in the run game should have set up Iowa for a big offensive day, but critical drops and misplays on third down (more on that soon) held the Hawkeyes back.

Nonetheless, they enjoyed a lot of success with variations of up-the-middle runs behind Linderbaum, Schott and Connor Colby. With Iowa needing to salt away a 23-16 game with under five minutes to go, Brian Ferentz went back to the well again, and his blockers delivered. In a one-back set, Iowa's offensive line flowed



its zone blocking to the right as offset tight end Sam LaPorta cut behind that wall of linemen as a lead blocker for Goodson, who cut back and raced through the hole for 21 big yards and put the Hawkeyes in field-goal-clinching range.

On the very next play, Williams got the call on a straight-ahead inside zone for 16 more yards to help chew clock and eventually allow Caleb Shudak to punch through his fourth field goal.

Not counting jet sweeps or tosses, Iowa tried six outside runs on handoffs that netted exactly zero yards.

But when on the bread-and-butter calls up the middle? I counted 29 attempts for 180 yards, a terrific 6.2 yards-per-carry average. No wonder Kirk Ferentz continues to be optimistic about what he's seeing in practice with Iowa's running game.

How costly were the dropped passes?

The six pass completions (on 18 attempts) were the fewest for Iowa since a 34-27 win against Michigan State in 2007. Receiver drops were the biggest reason for that hard-to-believe stat Saturday. A "drop" is certainly subjective, but let's just say there were seven balls thrown by Alex Padilla that were on target and not caught.

A breakdown:

Second-and-4 from Illinois' 44, first quarter. A strike to LaPorta went off the tight end's hands at the first-down line to gain. He was double teamed, but could've made the catch. Calling it a drop.

Third-and-2 from Iowa's 33, second quarter. A two-minute drill was stopped when Nico Ragaini had a quick slant bounce off his hands. He had two defenders closing, but the ball was shoulder high and catchable. Drop.

Third-and-8 from Illinois' 39, second quarter. A good call which has worked well this season had Goodson run a quick route over the middle with a catch-and-run opportunity. Padilla's pass went off Goodson's left hand and Iowa settled for a (failed) 57-yard field goal try. That one's probably on the QB for having too much zip on a short throw.

Third-and-3 from Illinois' 30, third quarter. The most glaring drop of the day cost Iowa 10 yards and a red-zone opportunity. Padilla's quick slant to Ragaini was on target, but the fourth-year wideout had the ball carom off his hands. Shudak did convert the subsequent 48-yard field goal.

Third-and-9 from Iowa's 37, third quarter. Padilla did a nice job buying time in the pocket and staying patient. His pass over the middle to tight end Luke Lachey was on target for a potential 13-yard gain. But as the ball appeared to arrive between the 8 and 5 on his jersey, Illinois' Kendall Smith chopped at Lachey and swatted the ball to the ground. Let's call that a good defensive play, but it was also a catchable pass. (All that said, a holding call on Iowa would've waved it off, so it wasn't costly.)

First-and-10 from Iowa's 37, fourth quarter. Another fastball from Padilla went off Keagan Johnson's hands for what probably would've been a 2- or 3-yard gain on a shallow cross, but who knows? We've seen Johnson break big plays out of nothing. It should've been caught, and it was almost intercepted on the deflection. Iowa would go three-and-out.

Third-and-goal from Illinois' 10, fourth quarter. Another tough play in traffic, but one Johnson could've made as he posted up at the goal line after Padilla scrambled right. Padilla's pass arrived on target. Illinois linebacker Isaiah Gay might've slightly tipped the pass. Let's call this another good defensive play.

Padilla finished the day 6-for-17 for 83 yards, and Johnson was held on the deep-shot interception in the fourth quarter. I think it's reasonable to say that three or four of the above seven passes would have been



caught in most circumstances. By my math, that would've changed Padilla's day to 10-for-17 for 105 yards and extended at least three Iowa drives.

All in all, Padilla ran the offense well and actually had a higher PFF grade than he did last week vs. Minnesota. Padilla can learn from his mistakes, like sliding too soon on a potential first-down scramble. He can also take some heat off his short throws. But the sophomore definitely deserves another start Friday against Nebraska.

Excellent third-down play gives the defense some rest.

Illinois gained 80 yards on its first touchdown drive that smacked Iowa in the mouth. It gained 85 more yards on its quick-strike final drive against Iowa's backup defense.

On the 13 possessions in between? Just 147 yards, five first downs and six points on 44 plays.

Afterward, players said adjustments were minimal.

On tape, the credit starts with Noah Shannon. We don't talk about Iowa's undersized defensive tackle much, and he only had two assisted tackles. But he was a consistently disruptive force against Illinois' vaunted run game, which gained just 64 yards for the day.

That type of gritty play allowed Iowa's back seven to shine and get third-down stops. After its first drive, Illinois was 2-for-13 on third down.

Iowa's third-down heroes on defense were plentiful. Linebacker Seth Benson, cash corner/safety Dane Belton, cornerback Riley Moss and defensive lineman Zach VanValkenburg were among those that made critical one-on-one plays to force kicks. And credit Quinn Schulte for a fantastic effort on Illinois' fourth-and-3 try in a 23-16 game with 5:41 to go. Schulte knocked the ball out of tight end Luke Ford's hands as he fell to the ground with an apparent first-down catch.

The body of defensive work was quite the contrast to last week's game against Minnesota, in which the defense couldn't get off the field and played 80-plus snaps.

On Saturday? After VanValkenburg's 53 snaps, no defensive lineman played more than Lukas Van Ness' 33. Linebacker Jack Campbell, who averaged 79.4 snaps in Iowa's previous five games, logged "only" 58 and Benson had 55. That's an improvement in workload, and it can be credited to strong third-down defense.

A few final observations

Upon further review, punter Tory Taylor should've come up with the low first-quarter snap by Luke Elkin. It was a poor snap, sure, but the ball was at ankle level and went through Taylor's legs for a 29-yard loss. Still, credit to Taylor for hustling back to fall on the football. There were three hard-charging Illinois punt-rushers on his heels, and Taylor did a nice job pulling the ball in with his right arm. Had it squirted away, Illinois probably is up 14-0 instead of 10-0 (after the defense held) in the early going. ... Iowa will have a difficult decision to make about Cooper DeJean. The true freshman has played in four games, meaning if he doesn't play again this season he could take a redshirt. DeJean's terrific special-teams tackle on the next-to-last play of the third quarter helped flip field position in a 20-16 game. ... Wide receiver Tyrone Tracy Jr. logged a season-low six snaps on a week that began with him using social media to express a desire for more playing time. Johnson played 62 and Bruce 30.

Title: How unheralded recruits Riley Moss, Kyler Schott and Zach VanValkenburg found Iowa scholarship success

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Two years removed from a traditional senior day ceremony, Iowa football will have 16 players slide their figurative football tassels from one side to the other as they greet their parents at midfield on Saturday.

It's a small senior class this year with four players concluding their super-senior seasons because of a COVID-19 exemption granted by the NCAA. The others could stay for one more season, provided they fold into the 85-scholarship limit. That leaves questions for both the players and coaching staff as they try to piece together the 2022 roster puzzle during bowl preparation.

As that uncertainty lingers, the present promises emotion and plenty of it for this group of seniors. Six players from Iowa's 2017 recruiting class already are on NFL rosters. The rest from that group — and a few others from 2016 and 2018 — are an improbable collection of players from all corners. Five of Iowa's 13 scholarship seniors began their Iowa careers as walk-ons, including receiver Charlie Jones who left a full ride at Buffalo to pay tuition at Iowa and three-year starting safety Jack Koerner. Four others were Rivals' two-star recruits. Two were lower-division graduate transfers. Only super-senior cornerback Matt Hankins and running back Ivory Kelly-Martin were original three-star prospects.

Every senior has his story. Among these, offensive lineman Kyler Schott, cornerback Riley Moss and defensive end Zach VanValkenburg have made Iowa tick this year after inauspicious recruiting trajectories. Schott walked on and didn't earn a scholarship until midway through his third year. Moss paid for his own summer classes before picking up a full ride. VanValkenburg wasn't on anyone's radar until he completed his third year at a Division II college.

"The one commonality, those guys, they get here and work hard," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said. "They really like football and work hard. If guys can have those two attributes, they have a chance."

Background

Schott was a four-sport athlete at North Linn High School, located about 30 miles north of Iowa City. He barely was a college prospect but displayed toughness and a work ethic combined with a farming and wrestling background that intrigued former Iowa recruiting extraordinaire Reese Morgan. Standing around 6 feet, Schott was too short for most schools to take as a walk-on and his only options were two Iowa Division III non-scholarship programs. Height never was an issue for Morgan, so he gave Schott a chance.

"I know Coach Morgan's kind of the wizard behind all that stuff. So, I trusted him," Schott said.

"It was pretty much here, Coe or Wartburg. And it was a pretty easy decision for me — either come to Iowa and pay for school or go Wartburg and pay even more. I figured the opportunity, even if it didn't work out, I had to try it."

Priority walk-ons are invited to training camp, along with most scholarship players. Schott didn't work out at Iowa during the summer or even crack the program's top 105 players entering his first fall in 2017. Then a camp injury took place.

"Coach Morgan called me and they were already like four days in and was like, 'Hey, you want to come to fall camp?'" Schott said. "And I'm like, 'When?' He said, 'Tomorrow?'"

"I was not in great shape. I got here a week late in the fall camp, and it was not pretty."



Needless to say, a short, out-of-shape offensive lineman didn't make an impression right away.

"He was a walk-on that didn't look like much when he showed up here," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said.

Moss arrived a summer later and was unheralded but undeterred. A two-star prospect, Moss was a late bloomer at Ankeny (Iowa) Centennial High School. As a senior, Moss recorded the fastest 110-meter hurdles time by an Iowa high school athlete.

Iowa signed five other defensive backs in 2018, including two who were considered major prospects. Moss received a grayshirt offer, in which he was responsible for school initially and then would pick up a scholarship after the first semester. Following his high school graduation, Moss moved to Iowa City and paid for summer school. During workouts, Moss made a positive impression with the strength-and-conditioning staff and his status changed before fall camp — "in a really cool way."

"(Ferentz) actually typed out a note and sent it to my parents," Moss said. "My parents knew before I knew that I was on scholarship. We were at the Des Moines Farmers Market and I remember sitting, eating breakfast burritos at some breakfast burrito place downtown. My dad pulls out this note, gives it to me, and I read it. And now it says you're on scholarship. It was really special, especially, being able to share with my parents, and I'm glad that they did the way they did. It was an amazing surprise.

"I started kind of tearing up; my mom was crying. It was a really special moment. I'll never forget it. It was incredible."

VanValkenburg was completely overlooked in Hudsonville, Mich., where he led Zeeland West High School to consecutive state titles. VanValkenburg garnered modest interest from Yale, Lehigh and Air Force before committing to Division II Hillsdale College. He redshirted his first season in 2016, then played two seasons at Hillsdale. In 2018, VanValkenburg was named the G-MAC's defensive lineman of the year while leading the league in sacks (8.5) and was third in tackles for loss (14.5). He graduated in three years with a bachelor's degree in history.

In 2019, Van Valkenburg wanted to move to a higher level athletically coupled with the right graduate program. He landed at Iowa, where he could spell All-American defensive end A.J. Epenesa and work on a master's degree in Eastern European political studies.

"One of the pressing questions coming from D-II to the Big Ten was like, 'What is the difference? What is the level of play?'" VanValkenburg said. "Then you see a guy like that (Epenesa) and you're like, 'Well, that's the standard. If I can be that good, I know I'll be good.' And when I got there, I was like, 'Well, I'm not that good yet.' So, it gives you a benchmark to compare yourself. It gives you something you've got to look up to, gives you a guy to kind of model after, take some of his techniques. I think it definitely made me a better player."

Making it happen

Moss impressed right away during his first camp. He blocked a field goal in a practice and prompted defensive coordinator Phil Parker to discuss Moss as a possible special teamer as a true freshman. In every practice, Moss gave maximum effort.

"My dad said that day (he got the scholarship), 'I'm really proud of you, but now you start and now you go,'" Moss said. "That definitely stuck with me, and it's kind of helped me throughout my career here at Iowa.

"I came in with the attitude like you're not supposed to be here, so show them that you're supposed to be here. That started out in practice, showing the coaches that. Then once I gained the coaches' trust, then it became when I played in games, showing these dudes, 'I deserve to play here, and I'm going to try and dominate you ever play.'"



In his fifth game at Iowa, Moss was thrown in a difficult situation. With two starters out, Moss and fellow true freshman Julius Brents (now at Kansas State) were slated to open at cornerback against Minnesota, which featured current NFL receivers Rashod Bateman and Tyler Johnson. Although he was burned for a touchdown, Moss also intercepted two passes to earn Big Ten freshman of the week honors.

"That was like, 'All right, you're with the big boys, now it's time to go,'" Moss said. "That was definitely probably my 'Welcome to Iowa' moment."

"I'm glad I was thrown in that position. Because I was ready, even though I didn't know it, but Coach (Phil) Parker did. I think that's one of the best things about Coach Parker is you might not see it, but he sees it and he believes in you."

Schott was in a different spot entering the 2019 season. He still was a walk-on and mixed some second-team reps during training camp but had dramatically improved his technique. His growth was obvious in Iowa's season opener when starting left tackle Alaric Jackson went down with a knee sprain just 15 plays into the game.

"Coming out of (2019) camp, I just made the observation, you have to look beyond what he looks like sometimes," Ferentz said. "I don't mean that in a derogatory sense, but he doesn't look like (first-round tackle) Tristin Wirfs, I'll put it that way. You just watch him. The guy's really producing. He's really doing a good job, and he's not that freshman that didn't know how to do anything like most first-year guys don't. He just worked hard, clearly was listening and paying attention. And it was showing up in his play."

The Hawkeyes shifted around the offensive line with Wirfs moving to left tackle and guard Levi Paulsen kicking outside to right tackle. Schott entered the starting lineup at guard that night. There were multiple scholarship linemen on the bench but based on camp production, the Hawkeyes brass felt an undersized walk-on was the best option.

"I had the hot hand at the time so they trusted me to get the job done," Schott said. "They don't care what your name is or scholarship-no scholarship. If you're going to give them the best chance to win, you're going to be in the game."

When players arrive at Iowa, their scholarship status doesn't enter the weight room or practice field. As Ferentz said, "You get judged on performance." It has helped the program recruit non-scholarship players by promising them an opportunity to compete for a spot and an eventual full ride.

"Essentially, if you earn playing time, and you're in a pivotal role, you're going to be rewarded with a scholarship," recruiting director Tyler Barnes said. "That's the nice thing about Coach Ferentz. He's one of the best in the country when it comes to rewarding walk-on scholarships. And not everybody operates that way."

After practice during the week of Iowa's 2019 season finale, Schott met privately with Ferentz.

"We broke it down as a team and he pulled me aside and he said, 'You'll never have to pay for school again. You're going to be on scholarship for us for the rest of your time here,'" Ferentz told Schott. "I got a little emotional. Me and Wirfs were hugging and crying together."

Schott then called his parents and tearfully told them about his scholarship status. As of today, eight former walk-ons are scholarship players at Iowa.

VanValkenburg landed a scholarship right away, but in his first season, he made only a slight impact. In fall 2020, that changed. VanValkenburg tied for the national lead with four fumble recoveries and finished with 8.5 tackles for loss in eight games. He was named second-team All-Big Ten. Instead of heading to the NFL like



former lineman Chauncey Golston (Dallas), Daviyon Nixon (Carolina) and Jack Heflin (Green Bay), VanValkenburg opted to play a sixth collegiate year because of the COVID-19 exemption.

“You have to be honest with yourself,” VanValkenburg said. “I have confidence in myself that I could make an NFL roster as a free agent or something of that sort. But then I also saw the opportunity to come back and make strides and also grow as a leader. That’s not an option you’re going to get as a free agent in the NFL.”

Next step

All three players will greet their parents and hand a rose to their mothers about 15 minutes before kickoff on Saturday. VanValkenburg is the leading tackler among Iowa’s defensive linemen and has 9.5 tackles for loss and eight quarterback hurries. Following the season, he’s off to either pro football or eventually work for the U.S. State Department.

As senior day approaches for Moss and Schott, they’re invested in the ceremony but still considering their future options. Schott already has graduated and would return for a possible sixth year if he stays. Moss, who has four interceptions this year and 10 in his career, has played four years and harbors NFL hopes. A torn PCL in his left knee in early October could prompt Moss to stay at Iowa rather than risk an unforgiving draft process.

“I’m going to treat it as it is my last (home game) but I don’t even know,” Moss said. “There’s still some time for me to make that decision. But just in case, I’m going to make sure that I get the full experience in this weekend.

“It’s what you hear from the little birdies up in the NFL, what they’re kind of telling you about where they see you. I think that plays a factor and then what my coaches here are telling me. After the season, I’ll sit down with my parents and kind of figure out what I want to do.”

Another full year of school could impact Schott’s decision, although he won’t take underwater basket weaving, which he joked, “I think they got rid of that.”

“I’m just kind of taking random classes right now. I don’t know if I can find enough classes to take for two more semesters.”

Key contributors like Schott, Moss, Jones and Koerner will have to weigh their futures before considering a return. Likewise, Iowa has a small 2022 recruiting class and the staff will need to make decisions balanced between immediate and future needs.

“We’ll talk more specifically once the season is over,” Ferentz said. “There’s all kinds of time in December to start thinking a little bit more vividly about that or concretely about that.”

Emotion will fill the air Saturday at Kinnick, something of which the 2020 seniors missed. Whether it’s the final conclusion for Iowa’s current seniors or a 2022 encore is in store, their impact is measured not by their stars, but by their substance.

Title: How a rare mentality made Iowa center Tyler Linderbaum a likely All-American and perhaps the perfect Hawkeye

IOWA CITY, Iowa — In the years to come when Big Ten defensive line coaches tell ghost stories of Iowa center Tyler Linderbaum, the embellishment will grow and straddle the line between fact and fact-based.

Yet none of the stories will have a false premise because the nation's best center by every measurement does everything better than anyone around him. Despite a modest frame for a Division I center, the 290-pound Linderbaum regularly overpowers defensive linemen who outweigh him by 40 or 50 pounds. And nobody executes a reach block after snapping the football better than Linderbaum.

Those are the physical gifts of which Linderbaum was blessed and shaped through years of strength training and conditioning. Then there is the attitude that he takes into every competition, which places the fourth-year junior on a different level.

"I think what really separates Tyler from his peers and everybody else he plays against is just the mentality," Iowa defensive line coach Kelvin Bell said. "He plays it like a defensive player. He's aggressive, he tries to finish. There's nothing that's just good enough for Tyler. He's trying to push on to punish you. Take the physical attributes out of it. It's the mindset of this guy to want to dominate you, play in and play out."

"Their center, in my opinion, is probably one of the most complete centers I've ever witnessed and seen," Illinois coach Bret Bielema said. "Very athletic. What he's able to do from a football standpoint fundamentally is really, really high level."

Linderbaum strikes like a defender because he was one in his first season at Iowa. Linderbaum uses leverage and balance like a wrestler because he was one in high school. The center attacks every opponent relentlessly through the whistle because ... well, that's unusual.

"That's a decision that a player makes and it's rare," said Iowa offensive coordinator Brian Ferentz, a former starting center at Iowa. "You can encourage it. You can coach some of it. But when it's just a competitive gene ... it's got to be innate, right? It's not even a desire to win. It's a desire to compete and physically punish another human being. Tyler has that."

Take a simple inside zone run midway through the third quarter against Illinois on Saturday. It's second-and-1, and Linderbaum starts with a combo block on the nose tackle. Linderbaum slips to the second level and meets linebacker Tarique Barnes one yard past the line of scrimmage. The Iowa center then drives Barnes 11 yards down the field.

The players continued to shove one another until their teammates joined in and officials separated Linderbaum from Barnes. No flags were thrown, Iowa picked up seven yards on the running play and both players returned to their huddles. But Linderbaum delivered a message, one he did repeatedly against the Illini.

In one of the Hawkeyes' better rushing days this year, they totaled 172 yards on 52 carries, counting a 29-yard miscue on a punt. Many of those runs took place on inside zones behind Linderbaum. According



to Pro Football Focus, the Hawkeyes ran 23 times between the guards for 122 yards. Linderbaum was instrumental on those runs.

“That’s not surprising,” said Iowa running back Tyler Goodson, who rushed for 132 yards on 27 carries. “Lindy’s always getting to the doubles. When he’s pulling, he’s somehow making his way up to the secondary because he’s just that type of guy.”

“Tyler had a critical role,” Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said. “The way they play defense, he’s covered basically almost every play. They started shifting around a little bit at the end of the game, once we found some things that were working maybe. But run or pass, he was covered. I kind of said you’re going to be bored this week because you’re going to be blocking the same guy every play. But Tyler did a really good job.”

Linderbaum grew up in Solon, Iowa, which sits 15 miles north of Kinnick Stadium. He was a four-sport athlete, competing in football in the fall, wrestling in the winter, field events during the spring and baseball in the summer. He switched from basketball to wrestling as a high school sophomore and frequently competed in all sports against Tristan Wirfs, who attended Solon’s archrival, Mount Vernon. Wirfs was blessed with athletic ability unlike any athlete in Iowa, perhaps ever, for his size.

The disparity showed up most in wrestling. Both were novices when it came to technique, but Wirfs had advantages in every physical area and pinned Linderbaum every time.

“He whooped my butt for sure,” Linderbaum said. “That’s probably what made me try to get better at wrestling, so I don’t get my butt whooped.”

There was something about Linderbaum that left Wirfs unsettled. Other opponents were intimidated by Wirfs’ size, but Linderbaum attacked his larger rival every time they battled. The result never mattered; Linderbaum fought with the same tenacity in every match.

“I was always nervous because he’s like a bulldog,” Wirfs said previously. “He’d come out all fighting and stuff. I’m like, ‘All right. I’ve got to slow things down. This is too fast.’”

Their final match took place in a 2017 Class 2A regional dual, which featured a massive crowd between the towns located nine miles apart. Near the match’s conclusion, Wirfs tried to throw Linderbaum as he did in every previous match. This time, Linderbaum caught Wirfs, powered him to his back and pinned him.

That Wirfs ultimately won the individual Class 2A heavyweight title a week later didn’t matter. Linderbaum’s desire overcame every roadblock in his path to victory for his team that night and ultimately Solon claimed the Class 2A state team title.

“A guy like Wirfs made me a lot better in high school, especially in wrestling,” Linderbaum said. “When I’m wrestling other people, I always think like, I try to get up to his level.”

Along with competitive desire, ferocity and his skill set, a noticeable characteristic about Linderbaum is his humility. He’s visibly uneasy with compliments. He continues to describe wrestling as the most difficult sport and it’s “not even close.” Every time someone brings up his win, he winces and quickly references his many losses to Wirfs, who he worked alongside at Iowa in 2019. Wirfs now plays right tackle for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

“I stalled a lot, that’s for sure,” Linderbaum said. “I tried not to get him to throw me because that’s what he likes to do. So, I think the refs were on my side that match.”



Time after time, Linderbaum's work ethic came through in other sports. He always juggled workouts for one sport while competing in another. After he signed with Iowa, Linderbaum faced his biggest dilemma. With Iowa high schools competing in baseball in June and July, his final sports season at Solon coincided with summer workouts at Iowa.

Nearly every incoming football player quits baseball, but Linderbaum wanted to do both. He began daily football workouts at 6 a.m., then attended classes afterward. By mid-afternoon, Linderbaum drove to Solon for either a practice or a game. Sometimes, Solon played doubleheaders located more than an hour's drive away. The bus often didn't return to the school until 10:30 or 11 p.m., and Linderbaum then left for his dorm room on Iowa's campus. Linderbaum missed just one baseball game, and he helped his team reach the state tournament in late July. Barely a week later, Linderbaum was at his first college training camp. Four months beyond that, Ferentz asked Linderbaum to switch from defensive tackle to center.

"The first couple of days I was kind of down just because I built such a good connection with the older guys in that defensive line room," Linderbaum said. "They were tremendous with me, just helping me out and teaching me how to be an Iowa Hawkeye. That was the only thing that was making me not want to go over to offensive line. It wasn't the position. It wasn't playing D-tackle or offensive line; it's just the connections that I built with the defensive linemen.

"Obviously, I move over and it's the same guys on their side, guys who care about each other. The Paulsen brothers; I was locker mates with Levi Paulsen. So, having guys like them bring you in is what makes Iowa special."

From the moment Linderbaum switched positions, he became embedded as the team's center. He has started 32 consecutive games and is likely to become Iowa's 28th consensus All-American. *The Athletic* NFL Draft analyst Dane Brugler lists Linderbaum as the No. 10 overall prospect. Linderbaum hasn't declared for the draft, but he will graduate in December with a degree in enterprise leadership. He will have earned his degree in 3 1/2 years.

Linderbaum's combination of skill and smarts, toughness and tenacity, power and grace, leadership and unselfishness, make him the perfect fit for any NFL franchise. As for right now, he's the perfect Hawkeye.

"You either have that or you don't and I've been very fortunate in my career to be around players that do have that," Brian Ferentz said. "It's fun to watch and it's fun to be around and you better enjoy it while you have it. It doesn't last forever, so enjoy the show. It's like good art."

Title: Tory Taylor entrenched at Iowa for another year

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Hey Iowa football fans, we'll start with the good punting news.

Though 24 years and 4 months old, Hawkeye punter Tory Taylor will return for his junior season next year.

Given his age, you may have wondered if he was a sure thing to return. Taylor didn't wonder at all.

"I'll be coming back, definitely," he said Tuesday. "(Leaving) hasn't even crossed my mind at all."

"I think he's really enjoying the ride right now," said Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz.

"He's just been not only a really good player on the team, but such a positive addition to our football team because he appreciates each and every day."

The bad news? Taylor wasn't one of the **three finalists named Tuesday for the Ray Guy Award**, given to college football's top punter.

Despite how consistently terrific Taylor has been this fall, it would have been a surprise if he had made the final cut. Great punters have never been in such large surplus, especially in the Big Ten, where six of the nation's top 22 in yards per punt reside.

Two of those are Ray Guy finalists, Rutgers' Adam Korsak and Penn State's Jordan Stout. It would be a surprise if the winner isn't Matt Araiza of San Diego State, with his average of 51.8 yards, and 34 of his 67 punts landing inside the 20-yard line.

Nonetheless, Taylor is siding with his Australian friend, Korsak. He averages 46.0 yards and has put 35 of his 66 punts inside the 20.

"I just feel like there's no one punting the ball better than he is at the moment," Taylor said. "He deserves to win the Ray Guy Award."

Taylor wouldn't have been an unworthy finalist himself, with 67 punts for an average of 45.8 yards and 32 inside the 20 to just 10 touchbacks.

He, however, said he feels the Hawkeye who was slighted Tuesday is kicker Caleb Shudak, who didn't make it to the final three of the Lou Groza Award despite making 18 of 21 field goals, with one of the misses from 57 yards. Again, two of the three finalists were from the Big Ten.

Shudak, Taylor said, "has been performing all year and has been testing himself with longer kicks, whereas I think there's a couple guys on that list that really haven't."

On Twitter, Taylor said "Absolute disgrace" in response to the Groza Award's announcement of its finalists.

Shudak is a sixth-year senior looking at his regular-season finale Friday when Iowa visits Nebraska. Taylor is a second-year sophomore who says life beyond the Hawkeyes for him can wait.



“What do I have, probably 67, 68 punts,” Taylor said, “and there’s probably 10 to 15 I would really like back. So there’s a lot for me to work on and improve, but that’s what I think is the most exciting thing.”

Only 32 NFL jobs are available as punter, and punters have long shelf lives if they remain good at their craft. Taylor is old enough to be a sixth-year senior, but didn’t start college until he was 23.

“I’m only a year-and-a-half in now,” he said. “I’ve still got a while.

“If anything, it’d be such a great satisfaction for me and my family if I got my degree.”

Taylor said “the NFL, it’s not going to define me or anything like that,” but he wants to kick there eventually.

“But the NFL’s not going anywhere, I hope,” he said. “It’s obviously a dream and something I kind of want to do as a career. I’m not going to sit here and lie. Those guys make a lot of money doing what they’re doing, as they should because you’re not in there for long. So long-term, that’s the goal.

“I’m just focused on Nebraska, and having a good time and enjoying myself, getting my degree, building relationships and networks while I’m here. Because you can only go to college once.”

If you’ve been to Hawkeye games in Iowa City this season, you’ve probably seen people wearing “Punting is Winning” T-shirts with an outline of Australia on the front, and the name “Taylor” with his number 9 on the back.

“I’ll be coming back next year,” said Taylor, “and then I will reassess from there. But I love Iowa. I love the place, I love the people. It’s a really hard place to leave.”

Title: Cedar Rapids Kennedy grad Connor Colby among those to step up on Iowa's inexperienced offensive line

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Last fall, Connor Colby was playing on the offensive line at Cedar Rapids Kennedy, never with more than a couple thousand fans in the stands.

Fast forward a year, and Colby is in the midst of a “great learning experience” as one of Iowa’s offensive linemen to be thrust into a larger role in 2021.

“Sometimes the best way to learn is just being out there,” Colby said.

And he’s certainly been out there a lot. The true freshman has been Iowa’s starting right guard since late September.

While it’s been “pretty fun,” he’s not content with what he’s accomplished so far.

“I can keep growing as a football player,” Colby said.

That’s been Colby’s mentality before he enrolled at Iowa in the spring. When Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz visited him at Cedar Rapids Kennedy, Ferentz saw a kid who “couldn’t wait to get out of high school and get on to his next step.”

“I was like, ‘Hey, slow it down, enjoy the prom, all that stuff,’” Ferentz said. “When he got here last January, he was ready.”

Junior Jack Plumb is one of the other offensive linemen to fill a larger role in 2021. Plumb has started Iowa’s last four games after starting just two games in his first three years on campus.

“It’s a process that I’ve been working on for a while,” Plumb said. “But it feels awesome to be out there for everybody playing.”

Plumb has certainly done enough in those four starts to impress Ferentz.

“He’s grown immensely in that year’s time certainly, but most importantly we’ve really seen it this past month,” Ferentz said.

Colby and Plumb are part of an offensive line group that has a combined 93 starts going into Friday’s Nebraska game. Last year’s offensive line, in comparison, had 148 starts.

Veteran center Tyler Linderbaum has more than a third of those starts. Eleven games into 2021, no other offensive lineman has more than 16 career starts.

Ferentz said the process of giving experience to an inexperienced line has been “really slow.”

“But I think this past month has been encouraging,” Ferentz said. “Our guys are playing with a little bit more confidence now.”

Colby and Plumb have worked on trying to “see the big picture” on each play.

Offensive line coach George Barnett has told him to be “taking off the blinders in my stance,” Plumb said.



Colby has seen his technique improve as he is no longer “running at someone just because you’ve got to go hit someone.” His football IQ has also improved.

“Earlier in the season, I didn’t really know a whole lot about the whole concept of the offense,” Colby said.

The improvements are important for Iowa’s offensive scheme that relies on running the ball effectively to set up play action.

“When you can’t block consistently up front, it’s just hard,” Ferentz said. “It’s really hard because you can only scheme so much. It’s hard to move the ball without blocking.”

That shows in the Hawkeyes’ rushing stats. Despite having repeat Doak Walker Award watch list honoree Tyler Goodson in the backfield, Iowa averages only 3.1 yards per carry. Purdue is the only team with a lower average in the Big Ten.

Football Outsiders tracks **line yards per carry**, which weighs an offensive line’s contributions to a team’s rushing success. The Hawkeyes rank 125th in the stat in the FBS out of 130 teams and 13th out of the 14 teams in the Big Ten.

Some stats also show the offensive line’s recent improvements, though.

Iowa has more rushing yards during its three-game winning streak than in its previous five games combined.

The offensive line still is far from some of the heralded lines to previously call Kinnick Stadium home, but it’s doing enough for Iowa to win games.

“I’m not saying we’re the Monsters of the Midway by any stretch, but we’re closer to where we need to be,” Ferentz said.

Title: Alex Padilla's intelligence 'shows on the football field' as he takes Iowa quarterback reins

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Some Iowa quarterbacks have fared better in the classroom than others.

Drew Tate? “He'd rather have a ball in his hand than a pen,” Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz said.

“I'll let you draw your own conclusions,” Ferentz said with a subtle grin.

Alex Padilla? That's a different story.

“He's a smart guy,” running back Tyler Goodson said. “It shows on the football field, and it shows off the football field when I'm just hanging around him.”

Padilla, his roommate Goodson said, “has a lot of power in his mind upstairs.”

That intelligence has helped Padilla, a neuroscience major, take the reins of Iowa's pro-style offense that puts a lot of responsibility on the quarterback smoothly in the middle of the season.

“Normal major college football is so simplified right now to try to just expedite the best athlete getting on the field,” said Tim Jenkins, a former NFL quarterback and Padilla's private throwing coach. “Iowa puts as much on their quarterback as the Denver Broncos do.”

Most of that added responsibility comes after the play call and before the snap.

Tight end Sam LaPorta said Iowa's play calls “quite often” have two plays for the quarterback to choose from.

“So they go up and kill the first play, and we're running the second play,” LaPorta said. “You'd be surprised. Ten or 15 checks happen every game that kind of go unnoticed. They just happen so quickly.”

It's not like Padilla — or former starter Spencer Petras or whoever else is at quarterback — is entirely changing plays throughout the game, though.

“It's not one of those things where they go up to the line like Peyton Manning-style and they give like 40 code words,” LaPorta said. “No Omahas.”

Having an intelligent quarterback is nothing new for Iowa. Ferentz grouped Padilla's football IQ with that of most of his starting quarterbacks in recent history.

“That room has been pretty cerebral throughout, so yeah, none of these guys surprise me,” Ferentz said.

The 23-year head coach also has seen cases of academic intelligence not translating to football intelligence.

“I used to joke that engineers don't always make good football players,” Ferentz said. “Mike Elgin broke that rule.”

That being said, Ferentz realizes Padilla's intelligence “doesn't hurt” when taking over Iowa's offense.

Jenkins pointed to the attribute as a major part of the seamless Petras-to-Padilla transition, though.



“That's why he can step in and play despite not getting that many reps, and why he's been successful early,” Jenkins said.

Some of Padilla's numbers in three games running the offense would not exactly be a passing grade on a neuroscience test.

After completing a respectable 64.3 percent of his passes against Northwestern, the sophomore has been successful on less than half of his passes in his two starts.

Against Minnesota, he hit 45.8 percent of his throws. Against Illinois, he was at 35.3 percent.

Had Iowa receivers caught the nine passes that were dropped in Padilla's two starts, his completion percentage as a starter would be 63.4. Four of nine passes caught — some drops are inevitable — would mean 51.2. Instead, it's 41.5.

Jenkins also made the case that Padilla was taking some high-reward, low-percentage throws that dampened his completion rate.

“When you're at a school like Iowa, you don't get a lot of stat-padding,” Jenkins said. “You don't get the Ohio State bubble screen completion as often.”

Padilla had only one throw at or behind the line of scrimmage against Illinois, although he had five against Minnesota and eight against Northwestern.

Ferentz has been hesitant to overtly declare Padilla as Iowa's permanent No. 1 quarterback, at least publicly.

“If we were playing tomorrow, he'd be our quarterback,” Ferentz said Tuesday, moments before also praising Petras.

He didn't reveal much after **Saturday's win over Illinois** either. When asked if Padilla is officially the starter moving forward, Ferentz quipped, “Well, officially, today he was, yeah.”

Ferentz's actions leave little doubt as to who the starter is, though.

Padilla has been the starter on the weekly depth chart for the last three weeks, including two weeks in which Petras was available.

Throughout pregame warmups, Padilla took all of the first-team reps, so it was clear his coyness — he didn't even name Padilla the starter in his pregame radio interview — wasn't fooling anybody.

Padilla was the guy — pen in hand studying neuroscience and ball in hand at Kinnick — last week.

Title: "Special teams" doesn't begin to describe Iowa's

LINCOLN, Neb. — One team finds ways to win, the other finds way to lose.

Leave the dwelling of how Nebraska could score as many points as their opponents in conference play and still go 1-8 in the Big Ten to Iowa's western neighbors. All nine of its losses this year, insanely, were by single-digits.

No, let's focus on as improbable a 10-win team as you're as likely to see. You wouldn't call Iowa a marvelous club, yet you can't help but marvel at how it has kept winning.

Now, the Hawkeyes will finish no worse than in a tie for first place in the Big Ten West with Wisconsin.

"Go Gophers!" more than one Hawkeye said in the team's postgame interviews. That's how crazy this year has gotten.

This game certainly was nutty. It seemed to be fluttering out of the Hawkeyes' reach when it reached the start of fourth quarter at Memorial Stadium. Iowa's offense was stymied and its defense had allowed a long touchdown drive in each of the first three periods.

Then it was time for the team's true specialty, special teams. The unglamorous, necessary unit, but the one that tips fields and tips over opponents.

Leading 21-9 in the first minute of the final quarter, Nebraska lined up to punt from its 27. Henry Marchese, a fifth-year Iowa senior, soared unblocked at Husker punter William Przystup and dived at his feet.

Marchese got the ball. It popped up in the air. Kyler Fisher, a walk-on sophomore linebacker from a little Iowa town called Farnhamville, caught it and returned it 14 yards to the end zone.

Iowa was still behind 21-16, but both teams and all 86,541 fans had to know what would follow a sharp turn like that. The Hawkeyes added a safety, a field goal and a touchdown drive. Their special teams, defense and offense all scored in the fourth quarter, and Iowa was a 28-21 winner.

Punter Tory Taylor, kicker Caleb Shudak and kick-returner Charlie Jones have all taken their bows this fall as special teams stars. Here were Marchese and Fisher, faces in the crowd on Iowa's campus, making a major moment.

Marchese is a scholarship player who never ascended the depth chart. He came to Iowa as a receiver, moved to defensive back, made his bones on special teams.

"Really proud of him and probably a lot of guys I could name like that," Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz said. "They get the value of how important it is."

"He embodies a Hawkeye football player," Iowa linebacker Jack Campbell said about Marchese, noting he could have left to find a place where he could play more, but wanted to do no such thing.



Marchese said praise from a teammate like Campbell is “all I really look for. It doesn’t matter about the stats for me or the recognition. All I care about is the respect of my teammates and the respect of my coaches.”

After blocking the kick, Marchese said “I rolled over and saw the ball just skyrocket in the air. and I saw Fish, Kyler Fisher, catch the ball. Great catch. That was a great catch over his shoulder. As soon as he caught it, I just went bananas.”

Marchese is a LeVar Woods guy. Fisher is a Woods guy, from Farnhamville, part of Woods’ recruiting territory in northwest/north central Iowa. Shudak, so great again Friday with four field goals, is a Woods guy. Woods helped bring Taylor to Iowa from Australia.

Woods has done a brilliant job in four years as the special teams coordinator. He had a terrific playing career at Iowa, spent six years on NFL rosters, then joined Iowa’s staff in 2008 as an administrative assistant before working his way up to assistant coach four years later.

He’d be a good head coaching candidate for a lot of programs. He’s great at coaching, great at representing a program in public, and excellent at relating to recruits and the players who end up learning from him.

“He’s worked at it, that’s the first thing I’d say,” Ferentz said. “Twenty-some years ago when he went to the NFL, one thing I told the (NFL) guys was I’m not sure he’s fast enough to make the final cut, but I know this: If he makes a mistake on Monday, he won’t make it Tuesday. He’ll go home and straighten it out, he’ll be back the next day.

“So he carved out a really nice NFL career being mostly a reserve linebacker, but also a key special teams guy,” Ferentz said. “So genealogy-wise, there’s a little bit of that in his blood, maybe.”

Ferentz said Woods the coach “really has jumped in both feet, works extremely hard at it all year-round.”

Woods had the right guys on the field in the punt-return unit, had Nebraska figured out, had Marchese in the right spot to succeed.

“That one, I knew,” Marchese said.

When it happened, Iowa’s players and everyone else knew something. The Hawkeyes would go from that moment to a 10th victory celebration. A Big 10.

Title: Iowa football's Henry Marchese's patience sparks game-turning plays in final two games

IOWA CITY, Iowa - In a lot of ways, Iowa's 28-21 win over Nebraska symbolized who they are this year and what the program is built on.

It wasn't pretty, it required all three phases of the game and somehow, the Hawkeyes found a way to win at the end.

A number of notable Iowa players stood behind the podium in the postgame presser with standout performances: running back Tyler Goodson, who rushed for over 150 yards; quarterback Spencer Petras, who led a second-half comeback; or linebacker Jack Campbell, who had 16 tackles. Yet for the second straight week, a considerable amount of attention went to a player with far less star power: fifth-year senior Henry Marchese.

And for good reason. The unquestioned play of Friday's game arrived at the 14:16 mark in the fourth quarter when Marchese blocked a Nebraska punt that linebacker Kyler Fisher returned for a touchdown to cut their deficit to 21-16. That play seized the momentum and Iowa never looked back.

"We needed a play. We needed a spark," Marchese said. "That's what special teams is for, to help the team out in any situation. I rolled over and saw the ball just skyrocket in the air and saw (Fisher) catch it, and as soon as he did I just went bananas."

Similarly, Marchese was a crucial part of another special teams spark last Saturday against Illinois. Down 10-0, Iowa wide receiver Charlie Jones returned a kick 100 yards for a touchdown with Marchese setting the springing block on the play. Take away those two plays, and it's much harder to visualize Iowa as Co-Big Ten West champions.

Marchese is a utility player rotating between wide receiver and defensive back. He's never started a game and hardly has any statistics as a career special teams player but in back-to-back weeks provided the necessary "spark." Friday's game symbolized who Iowa's program is and Marchese is a microcosm of that: hard work and dedication yielding winning moments at the right time.

"What a great example of a kid in his fifth year who didn't have to come back," Jack Campbell said. "Nowadays people decide this isn't working so I'll leave or I'm not starting so I'll leave. He embodies a Hawkeye football player. I can't even explain it but that's what makes the game of football so great are those people in a locker room."

A two-sport star in high school, Marchese turned down Major League Baseball for a scholarship at Iowa. He was a 34th round selection by the San Diego Padres in 2017. Big Ten football is in Marchese's blood: His dad played for Iowa from 1982-1985 and three brothers — Joe (Maryland), Jimmy (Illinois) and Michael (Illinois) — have played football in the Big Ten.

He spent the first few years trying to find his way, alternating between positions during that time. A role in the regular playing rotation wasn't in the cards, but a niche opportunity opened up for Marchese after awhile: special teams. It's not always easy for coaches to get backup players to invest in special teams, much less ones who at one point had professional prospects in another sport.



But Marchese embraced the role for reasons like what happened on Friday. For him, it's not about personal accolades — it's about the team. The praise he received postgame is all he could ask for.

"My college career has been switching positions," Marchese said. "Wide receiver, defensive back, it doesn't matter. Just staying true to myself and my teammates and trusting my coaches. It doesn't matter about stats or recognition. All I care about is the respect of my teammates and coaches."

Marchese's obsession with helping the team paired perfectly with special teams coordinator LeVar Woods' obsession with maximizing Iowa's special teams' play. The two game-changing plays Marchese has made over the last two weeks illustrate that:

Jones' 100-yard kickoff against Illinois was a special-designed play by Woods based on something he had seen from Illinois' kickoff unit that had only allowed four returns all season to that point.

Marchese's blocked punt turned Kyler Fisher touchdown against Nebraska was another play specifically for that situation.

"We just got a great call, great situation on our left hash (mark), Marchese said. "(Nebraska) points out the guys they're going to block. I knew they weren't going to point at me so I knew I had a free shot at the punter. Just trying to do my job, trusting my coaches to put me in that situation and executing."

For the second straight week, Iowa's special teams dominated the day and within that, the team's spark came from Marchese. He is one of the many examples throughout the Kirk Ferentz era of capitalizing on the opportunity presented. And Marchese's story was a catalyst in the historic 10-win regular season finish.

"If a guy's willing to work hard and has a good attitude then there's room for him on our team," Ferentz said. "You never a guy's going to help you. I promise you if you said this was going to happen three years ago all of the coaches would've said, 'no way,' even two years ago. But you watch this guy, he took ownership over what was open to him and it's really good."

"You feel good for a guy like Goodson who had 150 (rushing yards), Petras, the quarterback or whomever but this is maybe more gratifying. Seeing the guys take pride in helping the team, that's what it's all about."
