TOM BRANDS

Head Coach

University of Iowa, 1992

Five-time Big Ten and three-time NWCA Coach of the Year Tom Brands completed his 16th season as head wrestling coach at the University of Iowa in 2021-22. A 1996 Olympic gold medalist and member of wrestling's Hall of Fame, Brands is only the eighth head wrestling coach at the University of Iowa.

The former Hawkeye wrestler was a four-time All-American and three-time national champion (1989-92) at Iowa. He has a 250-24-1 (.911) overall and 120-11 (.916) Big Ten coaching record at Iowa. He has a 267-44-1 (.857) career mark and a 119-13 (.902) record at Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

In 16 seasons as Iowa's head coach, Brands has led the Hawkeyes to four NCAA and six Big Ten team titles, crowning 13 NCAA champions, 23 Big Ten champions and 94 All-Americans. Iowa has had 156 Academic All-Big Ten recipients, including a school-record 17 in 2019-20. The Hawkeyes have qualified 148 wrestlers for the NCAA Championships in the last 16 years, sending the entire 10-man lineup in 2010, 2014, 2015, 2020, 2021 and 2022. Iowa has won or shared the Big Ten regular season title 12 times in Brands' 16 seasons.

The program set the national collegiate dual meet attendance record of 42,287 when No. 3 Iowa defeated top-ranked Oklahoma State, 18-16, on Nov. 14, 2015 at the Grapple on the Gridiron at Kinnick Stadium. Iowa has led the nation in attendance every year since Brands became head coach in 2006-07, setting an NCAA all-time attendance average of 14,905 in 2021-22.

HEAD COACH TOM BRANDS

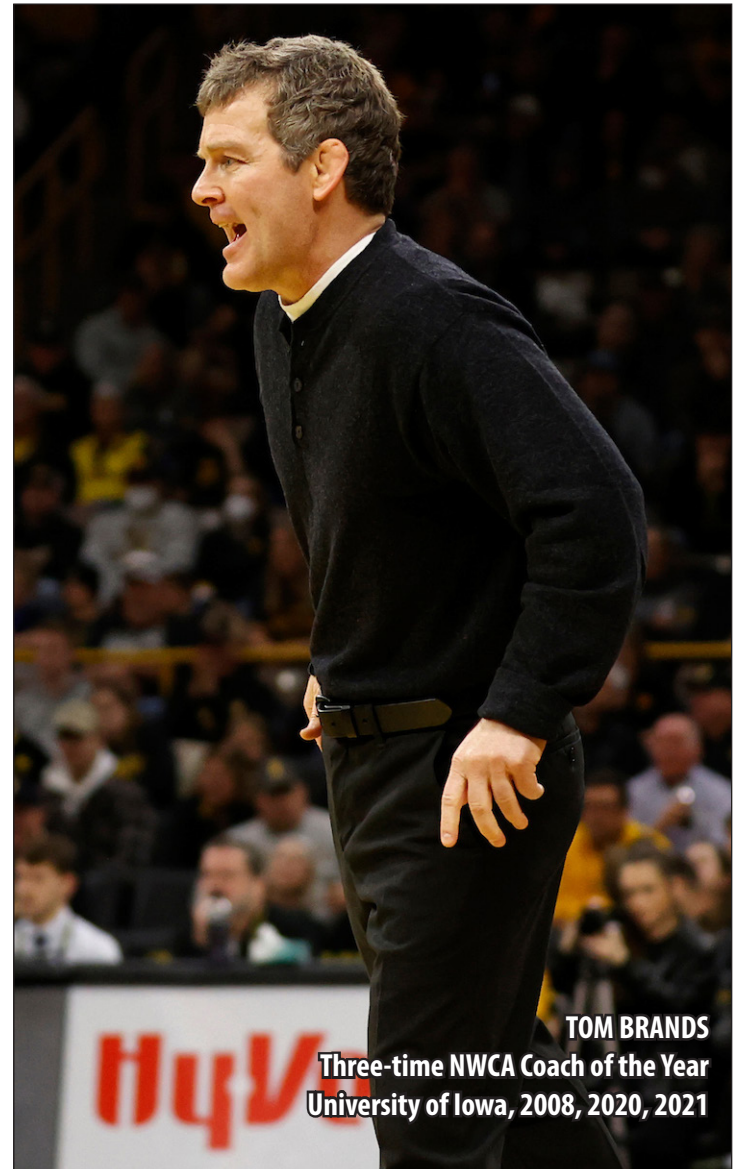
Brands has been named NWCA National Coach of the Year three times. He was first honored in 2008 after leading the Hawkeyes to their first NCAA team title since 2000. He was recognized in 2020 when the top-ranked Hawkeyes won Big Ten regular season and tournament championships and entered the NCAA Championships as the favorite to win the team title. The tournament was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. He most recently won the award in 2021 when Iowa won Big Ten and NCAA team titles.

Brands was named Big Ten Coach of the Year in 2008, 2009, 2010, 2020 and 2021. He is the only coach in program history to earn the award five times.

Brands served as head coach at Virginia Tech University for two seasons (2005-06), recording a 17-20 dual mark. In his first season with the Hokies, Brands led the team to the 2005 regular season Atlantic Coast Conference title, set a school record for dual meet wins (16) and had a school-record five wrestlers qualify for the NCAA Championships.

Prior to taking the helm at Virginia Tech, Brands was an assistant coach at Iowa for 12 seasons (1993-2004). He helped the Hawkeyes to a 177-27 dual record, seven NCAA and eight Big Ten team titles, while crowning 23 NCAA champions, 73 All-Americans and 36 Big Ten champions. He was named the National Wrestling Coaches Association Assistant Coach of the Year in 2000.

In 2004, he was one of three coaches for the U.S. Olympic freestyle wrestling team, participating in Athens, and in 2016 he was named a volunteer coach of the United States Olympic team in Rio. Brands also served as assistant coach for the U.S. Freestyle World Teams in 2001, 2002, 2003, 2013, 2014, and 2015. He was named Freestyle Coach of the Year by USA Wrestling in 2002 and 2003. He has coached a number of other U.S. teams in international competition.

As a competitor, Brands won the 1996 Olympic freestyle gold medal at 136.5 pounds in Atlanta, Georgia. He also won a gold medal at the 1993 World Championships in Toronto, two World Cup gold medals (1994, 1995) and was the 1995 Pan American Games champion. He won four U.S. National titles (1993-96) and made four straight U.S. World or Olympic teams (1993-96). Along with his twin brother, Terry, Tom was named 1993 USA Wrestling Athlete of the Year, the 1993 John Smith Outstanding Freestyle Wrestler, and 1993 Amateur Wrestling News Man of the Year. He was inducted into wrestling's Hall of Fame in 2001.

Brands was a four-time All-American at Iowa (1989-92). During his Hawkeye career, he won three NCAA titles and was named Outstanding Wrestler of the 1992 NCAA Championships. Also a three-time Big Ten champion, Brands won 95 percent of his matches at Iowa. His career mark of 158-7-2 includes an undefeated season in 1991 (45-0).

The Sheldon, Iowa, native was born April 9, 1968. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Iowa in 1992. He and his wife, Jeni, have three adult children, Madigan, Kinsee and Tommy.

SUPERLATIVES

- Iowa has led the nation in attendance every season under Brands leadership, setting an NCAA all-time attendance average of 14,905 in 2021-22.
- During Brands' tenure, Iowa set school records for longest dual unbeaten (84) and winning streaks (69), longest dual road unbeaten (51) and winning streaks (44), most Carver-Hawkeye Arena victories (11) and most dual shutouts (8).
- Set dual meet attendance record of 42,287 on Nov. 14, 2015, at Grapple on the Gridiron.
- Iowa has won or shared 11 of the last 15 Big Ten dual championships.

Two-time World Champion and 2000 Olympic bronze medalist Terry Brands is in his 24th season on the University of Iowa staff. Brands was promoted to associate head coach in 2011 after serving two stints (2008-10 and 1992-2000) as an assistant coach at Iowa.

During the last 14 seasons, Brands has helped Iowa win three NCAA and five Big Ten team titles, crowning 10 NCAA champions, 84 All-Americans, 22 Big Ten champions and 132 academic All-Big Ten honorees. Iowa owns a 205-18-1 dual record since Brands returned to the staff in 2008.

Since returning to campus, Iowa set school records for longest dual unbeaten (84) and winning streaks (69), longest dual road unbeaten (51) and winning streaks (44), most Carver-Hawkeye Arena victories (11) and most dual shutouts (8). Iowa also made another entry in the record books, setting the national collegiate dual meet attendance record of 42,287 when it defeated top-ranked Oklahoma State on Nov. 14, 2015, at Kinnick Stadium in the Grapple on the Gridiron.

Brands rejoined the Hawkeye staff in 2008 after a three-year stint (2005-08) as USA Wrestling's National Freestyle Resident Coach in Colorado Springs, Colorado. During his tenure, Brands worked with 2008 U.S. Olympic freestyle gold medalist Henry Cejudo and 2006 World champion Bill Zadick.

He has coached the Hawkeye Wrestling Club since returning to campus, and in 2014 he was named USA Wrestling's Terry McCann Freestyle Coach of the Year.

His previous collegiate coaching experience includes three years as head coach at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga (2002-05), and as an assistant coach at Montana State-Northern (2001-02), the University of Nebraska (2000-01), and the University of Iowa (1992-2000). At Chattanooga, Brands led the Mocs to the 2005 Southern Conference title, crowning three conference champions and two All-Americans. At Iowa, he helped the Hawkeyes win seven NCAA and Big Ten titles, crowning 19 NCAA and 26 Big Ten champions. Iowa's dual record of 115-12-1 during his tenure included three undefeated seasons (14-0 in 1995, 17-0 in 1996 and 18-0 in 2000).

Brands was one of the nation's greatest freestyle wrestlers, winning World titles in 1993 in Toronto, Canada, and in 1995 in Atlanta, Georgia, at 125.5 pounds (57 kg). He won World Team titles as a member of the 1993 and 1995 U.S. World Teams. In 1993, he won a world title the same year his brother, Tom, was a World champion at 136.5 pounds (62 kg). They became the first U.S. brothers to win World Titles during the same year. Terry was named 1993 USA Wrestling Athlete of the Year, 1993 John Smith Freestyle Wrestler of the Year and 1993 Amateur Wrestling News Man of the Year.

Brands placed second at the 1996 U.S. Nationals and the 1996 Olympic Team Trials, falling just short of making the U.S. Olympic Team. He qualified for the 1997 and 1999 U.S. World Teams, but did not compete. In 2000, he made a comeback and won the U.S. Olympic Team Trials at 127.75 pounds (58 kg). He earned a bronze medal at the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia.

A two-time World Cup champion (1994, 1995), Brands won a gold medal at the 1995 Pan American Games. He was a two-time silver medalist at the respected Yarygin Tournament in Krasnoyarsk, Russia. Brands won three U.S. Nationals titles, and was runner-up three times. He was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame in 2006.

Brands was a two-time NCAA champion, three-time All-American and three-time Big Ten champion for the Hawkeyes (1989-92) at 126 pounds. He ended his career at Iowa with a 137-7 record. He ranks fourth in single-season victories (43 - 1990-91), and fifth in career winning percentage (.951) and career wins (137). He ranks sixth in career pins (48) and 10th in single-season pins (18 - 1990-91). He is one of 19 Hawk-eyes in program history to post an undefeated season record, going 35-0 in 1991-92.

The Sheldon, Iowa, native was born April 9, 1968. He earned a bachelor of science degree in human development from the University of Iowa in 1992. He and his wife, Michelle, have a son, Nelson, and a daughter, Sydney.

Ryan Morningstar joined the Hawkeye staff in 2012 and has helped lead Iowa to one NCAA team championship, three Big Ten Conference tournament titles and six Big Ten regular season dual titles.

The Hawkeyes have earned 60 All-America honors over the past nine seasons, crowning six NCAA champions.

Morningstar's collegiate career included four NCAA appearances (2007-10) as a Hawkeye. He earned All-America honors in 2009 and 2010, and was a member of three NCAA championship teams (2008-10).

Morningstar placed third at the NCAA championships and was a Big Ten runner-up at 165 pounds in 2009. He suffered a knee injury during his senior season (2010) but still went on to place seventh at the NAAs and fourth at the Big Ten Championships. That same year he was named Iowa's Big Ten Sportsmanship Award winner, and won the Mike McGivern Award, which is given annually to the team's most courageous wrestler.

A four-year letterwinner from 2007-10, Morningstar owns a career record of 110-40. He was a member of the Hawkeye Wrestling Club in 2010-11 and qualified to compete in the 2012 U.S. Olympic Team Trials at 163 pounds (74 kg).

The Lisbon, Iowa, native graduated from Iowa in 2009 with a bachelor's degree in health and sports studies. He was a three-time Iowa high school state champion at Lisbon High School and was inducted into the Iowa High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 2022.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP SEASONS

No team has dominated collegiate wrestling like the University of Iowa Hawkeyes since the mid 1970s. Iowa captured nine straight NCAA titles from 1978-86 and has won 24 of the last 48. During that span Iowa boasts 286 All-Americans and 66 individual champions. Following are summaries of Iowa's 24 NCAA championship seasons.

1975

Iowa posted an undefeated dual season (17-0-1), set a school mark for wins and won its first NCAA title. The team had a school-record five All-Americans, national champs in Chuck Yagla and Dan Holm, and four dual shutouts.

1976

Iowa won its second straight NCAA title and captured 14 of 15 duals. A school-record three Hawkeyes (Brad Smith, Chuck Yagla and Chris Campbell) won NCAA titles. Yagla won his second straight title and was the meet's Outstanding Wrestler. Iowa won the title by almost 40 points and amassed a national record 123 1/4 points.

1978

The Hawkeyes started their nine-year string of national championships and were 15-1 in duals. Iowa's one-half point margin of victory at the NCAA meet gave the Hawkeyes their third title in four years. This team was the first in college history to win the national championship without an individual champion.

1979

Coach Dan Gable's first undefeated and untied (19-0-0) team included NCAA champs Bruce Kinseth and Randy Lewis. Kinseth, who had a school-record 23 pins, was named Outstanding Wrestler at the NCAA Meet. He pinned all four opponents at Big Tens and all five at nationals.

1980

Iowa won its third straight national title with a school-record eight all-Americans, including NCAA champions Randy Lewis (134) and Ed Banach (177). A 34-match dual winning streak was snapped by Cal-Poly, 27-12.

1981

The winningest team (21-1) in Iowa annals boasted nine All-Americans and seven Big Ten champs. Brothers Ed and Lou Banach won NCAA titles. The 10-man lineup had an overall record of 302-45-2. Iowa won the NCAA title by 29 1/2 points.

1982

Three NCAA champions — Barry Davis, Jim Zalesky and Pete Bush — paced the undefeated (16-0-1) national champions. Davis set the Iowa season mark for wins with 46. The Hawkeyes had eight All-Americans and piled up a record 131 3/4 points at the NCAAs.

1983

Iowa set a Big Ten record with nine league champs, compiled a 17-1 dual record and won a sixth consecutive NCAA crown. Iowa had nine All-Americans, a tournament record. Ed Banach won his third NCAA title in four years. Carver-Hawkeye Arena opened its doors with a 35-7 victory over Oklahoma.

1984

The Hawkeyes were 16-1 in duals and won both NCAA and Big Ten titles. Jim Zalesky, named Outstanding Wrestler at the NCAAs, posted his second straight undefeated campaign and closed his career with 89 straight wins. Five Hawkeyes made the national championship match.

1985

Gable's second perfect season record (18-0-0) was accomplished with nine All-Americans and eight Big Ten champions. Davis, who won his third NCAA title, earned Outstanding Wrestler. For the second year in a row, five Hawkeyes wrestled in NCAA title matches.

1986

The Hawkeyes' record-tying ninth straight national team title was a record-shattering performance. Iowa set all-time NCAA records for points scored (158), margin of victory (73.25) and national champs (five)! Marty Kistler was the Hawkeyes' third straight NCAA Outstanding Wrestler award winner. Six wrestlers won at least 30 matches. The ninth straight NCAA championship tied the all-time record for consecutive titles.

1991

Iowa regained the national title that had eluded it since 1986, crowning nine All-Americans at the NCAA meet in Iowa City. Tom Brands (134) won his second straight title and was joined on the victory stand by Mark Reiland (167). Tom Brands ended the year with a perfect 45-0 record. Iowa's team total of 157 was just one shy of the NCAA record, set by Iowa in 1986. The Hawkeyes won their 18th straight Big Ten title.

1992

Gable's third perfect season (16-0-0) was accomplished by nine All-Americans, including NCAA champs Terry Brands, Tom Brands, and Troy Steiner. Tom Brands won his third consecutive NCAA title and was named Outstanding Wrestler. The Hawkeyes won their 19th straight Big Ten crown (6 champs) and second straight NCAA title. The Iowa-Iowa State dual meet (a 29-8 Iowa victory) drew an NCAA record 15,291 fans in Iowa City.

1993

Iowa rebounded from a midseason slump to win a third straight NCAA title and 20th consecutive Big Ten title. The Hawkeyes fell from the top of the Amateur Wrestling News poll with a 24-20 loss to Nebraska at the National Duals in Lincoln, NE, in late January, but regrouped to go 8-0 down the stretch. Seven Hawkeyes earned All-America honors, headlined by national champs Lincoln McClravy and Terry Steiner. Steiner was named Outstanding Wrestler at the NCAA Meet, and his brother Troy was selected Big Ten Athlete of the Year. Gable was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the first time.

1995

The Hawkeyes won their 15th NCAA title and 22nd consecutive Big Ten title while posting an undefeated dual meet record (14-0). Nine Hawkeyes were named to the All-America team for the sixth time in school history. The All-Americans were Ray Brinzer, Mark Ironside, Jeff McGinness, Lincoln McClravy, Mike Mena, Matt Nerem, Joel Sharratt, Daryl Weber and Bill Zadick.

1996

Iowa finished its second consecutive dual meet season undefeated, posting a 17-0 record. The Hawkeyes won their 23rd consecutive Big Ten title and their 16th national title. Gable was named Big Ten Co-Coach of the Year and sophomore Mark Ironside was selected Big Ten Wrestler of the Year. Seniors Daryl Weber and Bill Zadick and sophomore Joe Williams all won their first NCAA titles. Seven Hawkeyes earned All-American honors, including Lee Fullhart, Ironside, Mike Mena, Mike Uker, Weber, Williams and Zadick.

1997

The Hawkeyes scored an NCAA record 170 team points en route to their 17th national title in Dan Gable's final season as head coach. Iowa crowned five national champions (Jessie Whitmer, Mark Ironside, Lincoln McClravy, Joe Williams and Lee Fullhart), and eight All-Americans. McClravy was named Outstanding Wrestler of the NCAA Championships. The Hawkeyes also won their 24th consecutive Big Ten title, and Ironside was named Big Ten Wrestler of the Year for the second consecutive year.

1998

Led by head coach Jim Zalesky, the Hawkeyes won their 25th consecutive Big Ten title and their 18th national title. Seniors Mark Ironside, Jeff McGinness and Joe Williams all won Big Ten and NCAA individual titles. Ironside was named Big Ten wrestler of the Year, McGinness was selected Outstanding Wrestler of the Big Ten meet and Williams garnered Outstanding Wrestler honors at the NCAA meet. Junior Lee Fullhart, freshman Eric Juergens and sophomore Wes Hand earned All-America honors.

1999

Iowa won its eighth NCAA title in the 1990's and their 19th overall at an exciting national meet in University Park, PA. The Hawkeyes' two-point victory margin was the closest in 20 years. Sophomores Doug Schwab and T.J. Williams each won their first national titles, while sophomore Eric Juergens and seniors Lee Fullhart and Jamie Heidt earned All-America honors. Heidt, Schwab and Williams all won Big Ten titles.



2000

The Hawkeyes won seven consecutive matches, scoring 23 1/2 points, in the consolation round to come from behind and win their sixth consecutive NCAA Championship in St. Louis, MO. Iowa crowned one individual national champion in junior 133-pounder Eric Juergens, while juniors Jody Strittmatter, Doug Schwab and T.J. Williams, sophomore Mike Zadick and senior Wes Hand earned All-America honors. The Hawkeyes went 18-0 in duals, and recaptured the conference team title. Big Ten individual champs were Strittmatter, Juergens, Schwab and Williams.

2008

After an eight-year absence, the Hawkeyes regained the top spot on the NCAA Championship podium by winning the school's 21st national title. The team crowned two individual champions - senior Mark Perry (165) and sophomore Brent Metcalf (149) - and had seven All-Americans. Iowa won its 32nd Big Ten title and went 21-1 in dual competition and 8-0 in Big Ten duals. Head Coach Tom Brands was named Coach of the Year by the NWCA, *W.I.N. Magazine* and the Big Ten. Metcalf was named the Dan Hodge Trophy winner, the Jesse Owens Big Ten Male Athlete of the Year, Outstanding Wrestler at the NCAA and Big Ten Championships and Big Ten Wrestler of the Year.

2009

Despite crowning no individual champions, the Hawkeyes collected their second straight team title at the 2009 NCAA Championships in St. Louis, MO. Iowa scored 96.5 points, edging runner-up Ohio State by 4.5 points, to record its 22nd NCAA team title. It's the closest margin of victory since Iowa won the 1999 team title by two points. It also marks only the second time in school history the Hawkeyes have won the NCAA title without an individual champion. Iowa also accomplished that feat in 1978. The Hawkeyes had a total of five All-Americans in juniors Brent Metcalf (149-2nd), Daniel Dennis (133-7th), Ryan Morningstar (165-3rd), Phillip Keddy (184-4th) and Dan Erikson (Hwt.-4th). The Hawkeyes posted a perfect 24-0 dual meet record, going 8-0 in Big Ten duals, and won their 33rd Big Ten team title. Iowa also set the national collegiate dual meet attendance record of 15,955 when it hosted Iowa State at Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

2010

Iowa closed out the 2009-10 season on the winner's stand, bringing the Big Ten and NCAA team trophies back to Iowa City. Iowa won its 23rd NCAA and 34th Big Ten titles while crowning three NCAA champions, eight All-Americans and two Big Ten champions. The team was undefeated at 23-0 in dual competition, marking the 13th perfect season in school history. Iowa was also 11-0 at Carver-Hawkeye Arena and 8-0 in Big Ten duals, winning its third straight conference regular season title. Iowa won the 2009 Midlands and 2010 NWCA/Cliff Keen National Duals Division I team titles, ending the season on a 61 dual-match winning streak and shutting out eight opponents - both of which are school records. Seniors Brent Metcalf and Jay Borschel, and redshirt freshman Matt McDonough won individual NCAA titles, while seniors Daniel Dennis, Dan Erikson, Phillip Keddy and Ryan Morningstar, and sophomore Montell Marion each earned All-America honors. Borschel and Erikson were Iowa's two Big Ten champions. McDonough was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year, and Head Coach Tom Brands was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the third straight season.

2021

The Hawkeyes finished the 2020-21 season as Big Ten and NCAA champions. The conference title was the 37th and the national title was the 24th in program history. Iowa crowned one NCAA individual champion, seven All-Americans, four Big Ten individual champions and 13 academic All-Big Ten honorees. The Hawkeyes were 5-0 overall and 5-0 in the Big Ten, sharing the regular season conference title with Penn State.



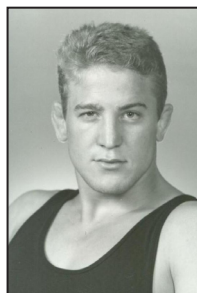

**DAN HODGE TROPHY**

The WIN Magazine/Culture House Dan Hodge Trophy, presented by ASICS, is awarded annually to the nation's most dominant college wrestler. It is named for the undefeated, three-time NCAA champion from Oklahoma University. Hodge has the highest pinning percentage in collegiate history, and was known for his dominating style of wrestling. The award was first presented in 1995. Iowa's award winners are Mark Ironside (1998), Brent Metcalf (2008), and Spencer Lee (2020, 2021).



Mark Ironside was a four-time All-American, four-time Big Ten Champion and two-time NCAA Champion from 1995-98. A three-time Big Ten Wrestler of the Year, he was named Outstanding Wrestler of the 1997 Big Ten Championships.



Brent Metcalf was a three-time All-American, two-time NCAA Champion and two-time Big Ten Champion from 2008-10. The 2008 Jesse Owens B1G Athlete of the Year, Metcalf was named Outstanding Wrestler of the 2008 NCAA Championships.



Spencer Lee outscored his opponents, 234-18, in 2020. He scored bonus points in 17 of 18 wins, recorded four first-period falls and nine technical falls, and averaged 5.0 team points per match. He finished the season 18-0 and was named Big Ten Wrestler of the Year and NCAA Most Dominant Wrestler.



Spencer Lee outscored his five opponents at the national tournament, 59-8, capturing his third career NCAA title and leading Iowa to the team title for the first time since 2010. Lee was 12-0 in 2021, scoring bonus points in 11 matches and recording five first-period falls. He outscored his 12 opponents, 141-15, and his 91.6 bonus-point percentage led the country.

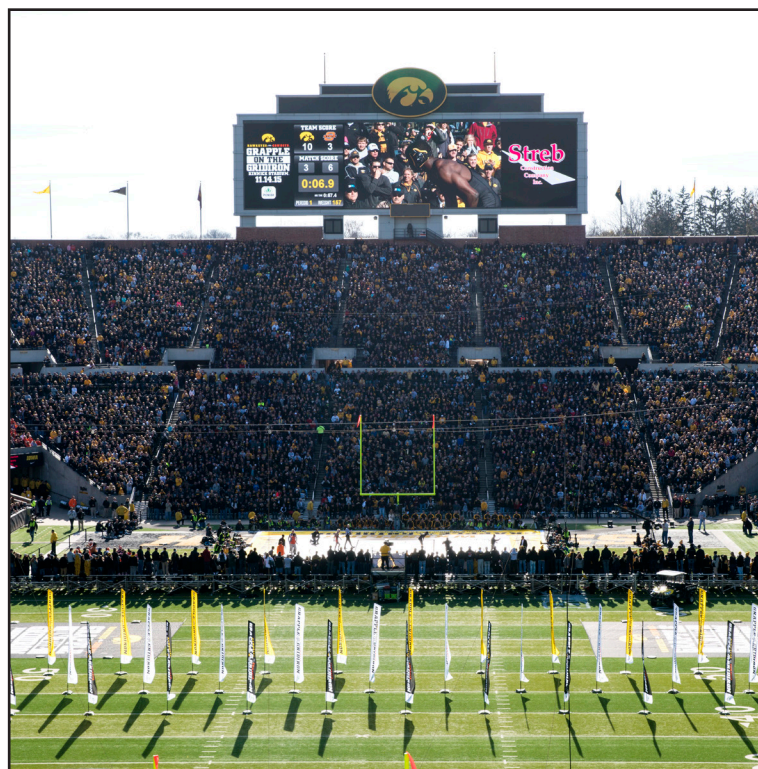
ALWAYS ON THE BIG STAGE

Iowa led the nation in attendance for the 15th consecutive season in 2021-22, setting an NCAA average attendance record of 14,905 fans, selling out the entire season at Carver-Hawkeye Arena. The 2021-22 season marked the 13th straight year that Iowa averaged more than 8,000 fans.

The previous average dual attendance record was 12,568, set by Iowa in 2019-20. Iowa has led the nation in attendance in 19 of the 20 seasons it has been tracked.

The Dan Gable Wrestling Complex was a part of the \$47 million revitalization and expansion of Carver-Hawkeye Arena. The complex features an extended training space, a new locker room, new coaches locker room, student-athlete video center, and a new office suite.

Carver-Hawkeye Arena has been the home of Iowa wrestling since 1983. The facility is one of the finest of its kind in the world, and it seats 15,077 fans for a dual wrestling meet. The arena is named after the late Roy J. Carver, a long-time friend and contributor to the University. Carver had a love for Iowa athletics and a lifelong affection for wrestling. Carver died in 1981 at the age of 71.

Iowa's basketball, gymnastics, and volleyball squads also compete in the bowl-shaped arena. The multi-purpose building has also been the site of banquets, concerts, exhibition shows, and graduation ceremonies. Besides the main floor, where dual meets are staged, the arena boasts one of the best wrestling training rooms in the nation. The Dan Gable Wrestling Complex features three mats, a locker room, sauna, weight-lifting facilities, and retractable bleachers.

The Board of Regents, State of Iowa approved the schematic design, project description, budget, and financing plan for a \$47 million addition and revitalization of the arena that was completed in 2011. The Carver-Hawkeye Arena – Addition and Renovation Project added a practice facility immediately north of the arena for use by the Hawkeye men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs; renovation of the practice, fitness and weight-training facilities utilized by the wrestling program; renovation and expansion of other fitness and weight-training space in the arena utilized by the majority of Iowa's 22 sports; the renovation and expansion of locker rooms in the facility; and the renovation of existing and the creation of new office, meeting, and storage space for use by administrative and coaching staff of the Athletics Department. The project began in the fall of 2009 and the UI Department of Athletics moved back into the facility in July, 2011.

The revitalization of the arena also extends into spaces used by the general public on game days and nights. This includes renovation of select concessions and restroom facilities, and the creation of hospitality and meeting spaces. There are also club facilities for fans of the Hawkeyes who choose to participate in a variety of premium seating options similar to those available in the Paul W. Brechler Press Box at Kinnick Stadium.

In 2016, a new four-sided centerhung video system was installed in the main arena. The video screen can display any combination of live video, instant replays, statistics, game information, animations and sponsorship messages.

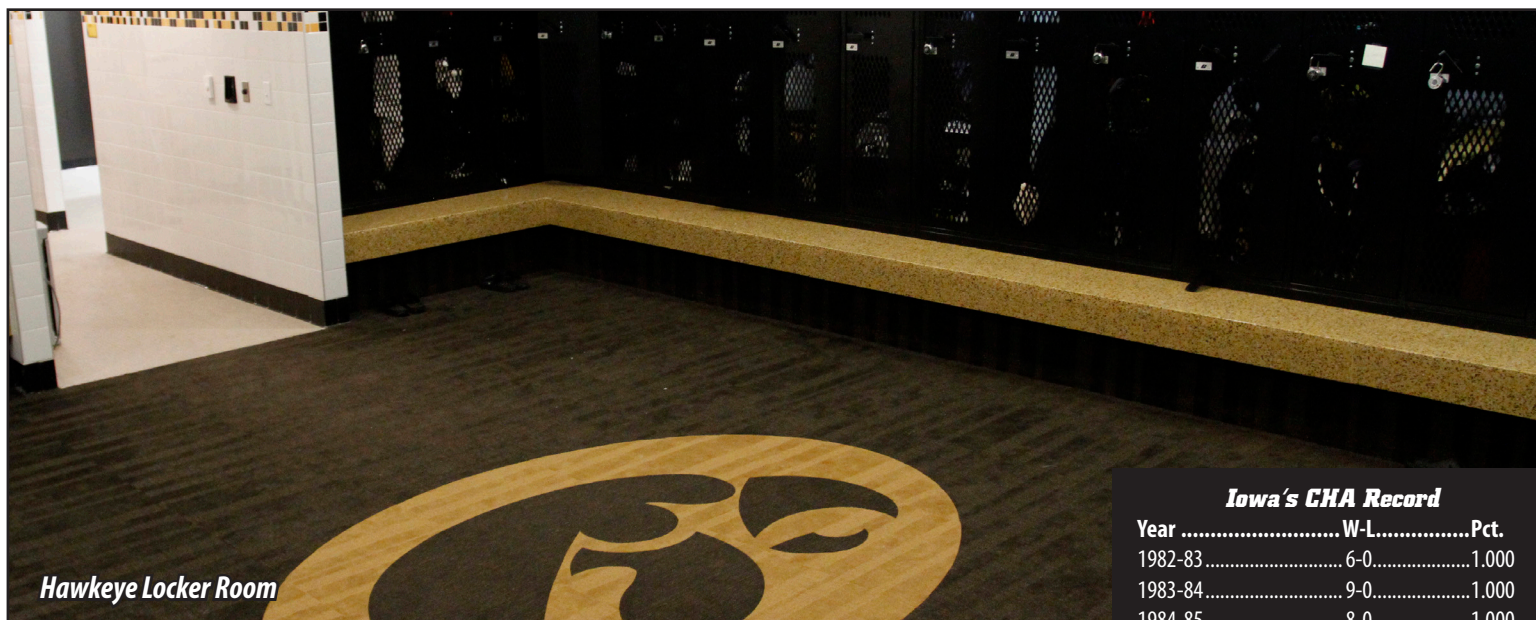
The Hawkeyes have a .912 winning percentage at Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Iowa's 269-26 all-time mark in the building includes a record 11 home wins during the 2010 and 2015 seasons. The Hawkeyes have recorded 23 undefeated seasons in Carver-Hawkeye, with the most recent occurring in 2020-21. The first event held in the arena was a wrestling meet on January 3, 1983. Iowa beat Oklahoma 35-7. Iowa all-American Tim Riley won the first match contested in the arena.

On Dec. 6, 2008, Iowa set the then-NCAA wrestling dual meet attendance record when 15,955 fans saw the Hawkeyes defeat Iowa State, 20-15, in Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

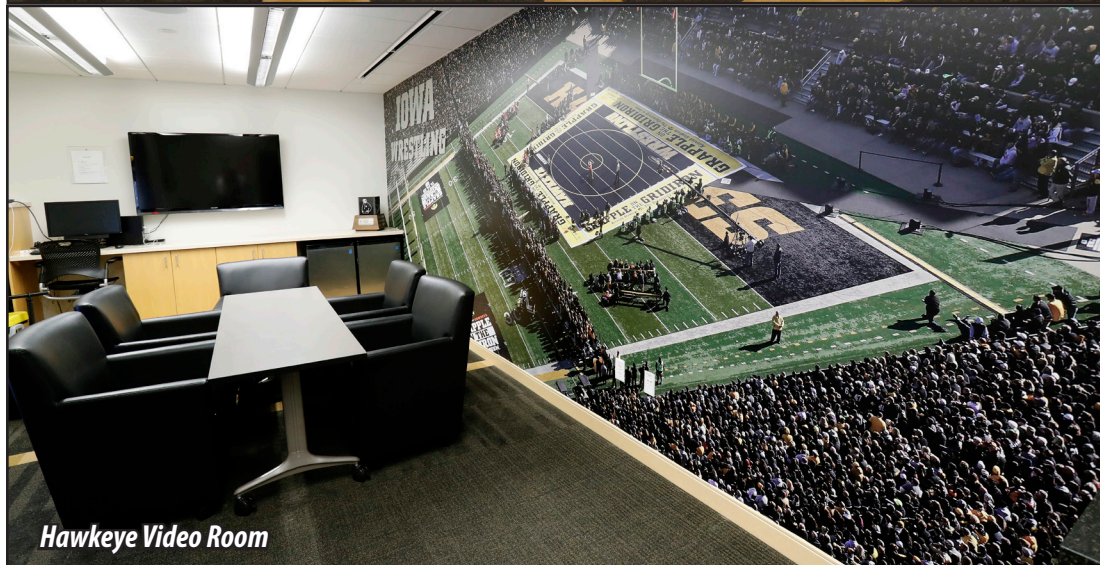
In all, the Hawkeyes have hosted several conference and national tournaments. Four Big Ten (1983, 1994, 2005, and 2016) and four NCAA Championships (1986, 1991, 1995 and 2001) were held in Carver-Hawkeye Arena, with Iowa winning the team title five of the eight times. Carver-Hawkeye Arena also hosted the 2012 and 2016 U.S. Olympic trials, the annual N.W.C.A. All-Star Wrestling Classic in 1993 and 1996, and the Cliff Keen/N.W.C.A. National Duals in 1998 and 1999.

In April 2018, Carver-Hawkeye Arena hosted the UWW World Cup, an international dual tournament featuring the top eight wrestling teams in the world.





Hawkeye Locker Room



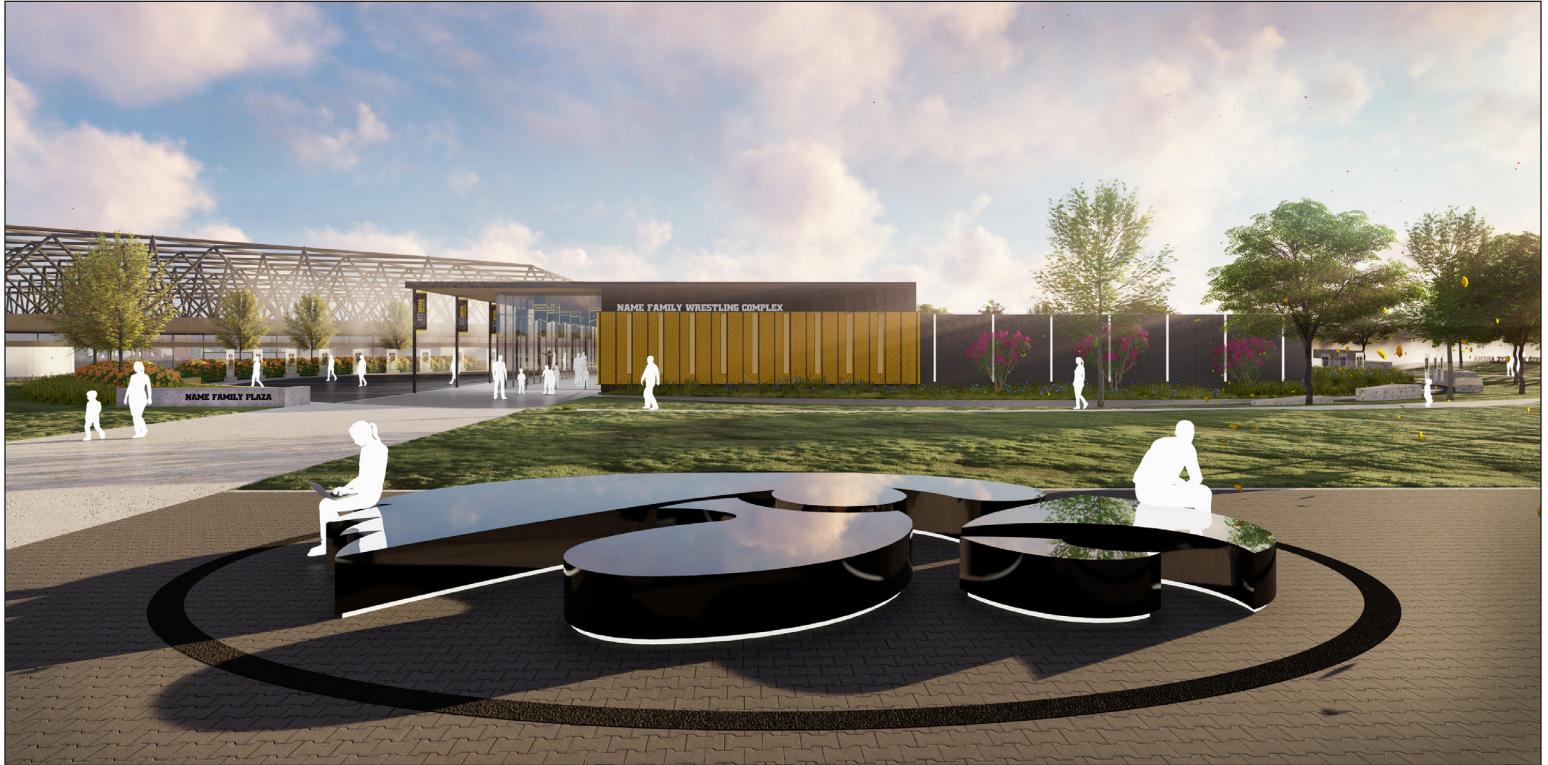

Construction on the \$31 million facility began in June 2022. This new 38,500-square-foot training complex next to Carver-Hawkeye Arena — with a tunnel connecting the two facilities — will nearly double the amount of training space for Iowa wrestlers and establish a street-level hall of champions that will properly display the success of Iowa wrestlers of past, present, and future. Iowa's wrestling teams have practiced in Carver-Hawkeye Arena since its opening in 1983.

"This facility is a very important piece of Iowa athletics' future, and we are doing it right," said head coach Tom Brands, whose Hawkeyes won the 2021 Big Ten and NCAA Championships. "The support for Iowa wrestling is at an all-time high. Our fans are the best fans in the world. Our donors are the best donors in the world. They stepped up, and because of them, we have momentum for building the best training facility in the world."

The new facility will allow the university to continue its tradition of hosting the world's top senior level and international wrestling events, including the U.S. Olympic Trials and the United World Wrestling Cup, which attract tens of thousands of wrestling fans to Iowa City and delivers a multi-million dollar economic impact to the community.

Hawkeye Visions is an on-going campaign, which seeks to build an endowment capable of covering the cost, via earnings, of UI student-athlete scholarships. The program currently includes almost 200 scholarships ranging from fully endowed scholarships, partially endowed, in development or scholarships pledged via an estate gift. The following scholarships were given for the specific benefit of Hawkeye Wrestling.

John and Ruth Beckman Wrestling Scholarship

The Beckman Wrestling Scholarship, along with similar scholarships for football and the Hawkeye Marching Band, was established in 1985 by the Beckmans. John worked for Hawkeye Castings, Inc. in Manchester, IA. He passed away in 1991. Ruth passed away in 2006.

John and Mary Ann Colloton Wrestling Scholarship

The Colloton Wrestling Scholarship was established in 1998 with a generous gift from longtime Hawkeye fans John and Mary Ann Colloton of Iowa City. John, who earned degrees from Loras College and the UI, was director of UI Hospitals and Clinics from 1971-93. He is the UI's Vice President Emeritus for Statewide Health Services and received a Distinguished Alumni Award from the UI in 1999. Mary Ann, a 1957 UI graduate, served as a staff nurse at the UIHC from 1957-63 and passed away in 2014. The Collotons also generously established scholarships benefitting football, men's basketball and women's basketball.

Russ and Ann Gerdin Family Wrestling Scholarship

In 2008, Russ and Ann Gerdin extended their Hawkeye legacy with the largest athletic scholarship gift in University history: a \$5 million commitment to establish the Russ and Ann Gerdin Family Athletic Scholarship Fund. As part of that gift, the Gerdin Wrestling Scholarship was established. Russ Gerdin was the founder, and former president and chief executive officer of Coralville-based trucking company Heartland Express, Inc. Russ passed away in 2011. The Gerdins have supported the Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletic Learning Center, the UI Athletics Hall of Fame and Visitors Center, the J. Hayden Fry Center for Prostate Cancer Research, the aforementioned athletic scholarships, and the renovation of Kinnick Stadium.

Donald W. and Marilyn Heineking Wrestling Scholarship

The Heineking Wrestling Scholarship was established in 2003. Since that time, additional Heineking scholarships have been established in women's basketball, volleyball, softball, baseball, football and men's track/cross country, along with a men's basketball manager's scholarship. Don is a 1958 UI business graduate and former president of Security State Bank in Hubbard, IA. He is a member of the UI Foundation Board of Directors, the Johnson County I-Club Board of Directors and the National I-Club Board of Directors (honorary) and a member of the Iowa Scholarship Fund Board of Directors. Don lives in Iowa City and is a member of the Presidents Club of the UI Foundation. Marilyn Heineking passed away in February of 2004.

Robert G. and Annalee Jacoby Hockridge Wrestling Scholarship

The Hockridge Scholarship was established by Bettendorf natives, Robert (Bob) and Annalee Jacoby (Jake) Hockridge in 2004. Both Bob and Jake are members of the Presidents Club of the UI Foundation and have been loyal ticketholders and contributors since the early 1970s. Robert is a graduate of the UI with a degree in accounting. He was an executive vice president of finance at Brammer Manufacturing Company prior to his retirement in 1995. Jake received her degree in elementary education from UNI. The Hockridges both passed away in 2015.



***Johnson County I-Club Wrestling Scholarship***

The National I-Club has dozens of local I-Club chapters that form a strong presence within communities to gather Hawks together, carry the message of the National I-Club, and serve as a united voice of support for Iowa athletics across the state and beyond. The Johnson County is one of those local chapters. The club raises funds by organizing events, game watches, golf tournaments, I-Club luncheons, and more throughout the year. The Johnson County I-Club first established a football scholarship in 2001 and then endowed a wrestling scholarship in 2009. Both scholarships are awarded annually to athletes from the Johnson County area.

Gary Kurdelmeier Wrestling Scholarship

The Gary Kurdelmeier Wrestling Scholarship was established by Gary's family and friends as a tribute to the highly successful UI wrestler, coach and administrator following his death in 1998. Kurdelmeier graduated from the UI in 1959 where he was a Big Ten Champion, NCAA Champion and team captain for the Hawkeyes. He served as UI assistant wrestling coach from 1967-72 and then head coach from 1973-76. During his tenure, the Hawkeyes won three Big Ten Championships, two NCAA team titles and Kurdelmeier was named national coach of the year in 1975. He also secured the future of Iowa wrestling when he and former UI Athletic Director, Bump Elliott, hired Dan Gable as an assistant coach.

William and Kay Pitlik Wrestling Scholarship

Bill and Kay Pitlik of Cedar Rapids, IA, first created an endowed scholarship in 1998 to show their love for the Hawkeyes. Both graduated from the University of Iowa, Kay in 1952 and Bill in 1953. The Pitliks owned and operated Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company for many years in Cedar Rapids. Kay is an avid Hawkeye fan, and prior to Bill's death in 2008, they also endowed scholarships to benefit women's basketball, field hockey and football (2). Kay continues to support UI athletics very generously, in Bill's honor, including a naming gift to the wrestling area in the newly renovated Carver Hawkeye Arena. Kay passed away in 2018.

John and Dorothy Sill Wrestling Scholarship

The John and Dorothy Sill Wrestling Scholarship was established in 1999 through a generous estate gift by the Sill family. John and Dorothy were both born and raised in small town Iowa. They were married in 1941 and managed a family farm until 1959. They later moved to Manchester, IA, where he was the manager of the Delaware County Mutual Insurance Association and opened his own insurance agency. They were very active in the community and proud supporters of the West Delaware and University of Iowa athletic teams. John passed away in 1989. Dorothy followed in 1999.

Iowa Style Wrestling Scholarship

Gary and Camille Seamans established the Iowa Style Wrestling Scholarship in 2001. It is a tribute to the aggressive, determined and dominating style that Hawkeye wrestlers have exhibited under head coaches Gary Kurdelmeier, Dan Gable, Jim Zalesky and Tom Brands. An Iowa City native, Gary received his B.S. in electrical engineering from the UI and enjoyed a successful career in the telecommunications industry, retiring as chairman and CEO of Westell Technologies in 1998. Camille is a native of Dekalb, IL, and is now retired from her role as director of human resources for the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation of Chicago. Gary is a past recipient of the UI Alumni Association's Distinguished Young Alumnus Award.

BARBARA J. WILSON

President, The University of Iowa

Dr. Barbara J. Wilson began her term as the 22nd president of the University of Iowa on July 15, 2021.

She earned her bachelor's degree in journalism and her master's degree and PhD in communication arts from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

She came to Iowa most recently having served as the executive vice president/vice president for academic affairs of the University of Illinois System. Prior to that, she served as head of the Department of Communication, vice provost for academic affairs, executive vice provost for faculty and academic affairs, Harry E. Preble Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and interim chancellor of the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

President Wilson was a member of the Illinois faculty at Urbana-Champaign for 21 years. She was also a professor of communication at the University of California, Santa Barbara, and the University of Louisville.

President Wilson's research focuses on the social and psychological effects of the media, particularly on youth. She is coauthor or coeditor of four books and over 80 research articles, book chapters, and technical reports. In 2008, she was elected as Fellow of the International Communication Association.

President Wilson is a native of Appleton, Wisconsin. Her spouse, John Lammers, is a retired professor of communication. They have two grown daughters.

**Henry B. and Patricia B. Tippie
Director of Athletics Chair**

Gary Barta is in his 17th year as the director of athletics at the University of Iowa, where he occupies the Henry B. and Patricia B. Tippie Director of Athletics Chair. The position was endowed in 2017 by the Tippies, longtime supporters of the University of Iowa and Hawkeye Athletics. Henry B. Tippie earned his UI degree in 1949 and was presented with an honorary degree in 2009.

Barta has just completed a three-year stint as a member of the College Football Playoff (CFP) Selection Committee. He was appointed to the selection committee by the CFP Management Committee in February, 2019 and served a three-year term. He served as committee chairperson in 2020 and 2021.

Since the fall of 2020, Iowa's athletics programs have won 11 Big Ten championships, along with claiming the football West Division title in 2021. It is the most championships earned by the Hawkeyes in any two-year period. The Hawkeye football team posted 10 wins in 2021 and earned yet another January bowl invitation.

Hawkeye teams to have earned championships include women's soccer (tournament); field hockey (regular season); wrestling (regular season and tournament); women's basketball (regular season and tournament); men's basketball (tournament); women's gymnastics (regular season); indoor men's track (two) and outdoor men's track.

Five conference titles, along with the football division championship, were earned in 2021-22 as a follow up to six Big Ten championships in 2020-21. Six student-athletes were named Big Ten Athlete of the Year in their respective sports in 2020-21 as Iowa earned its highest finish in the IMG Learfield College Director's Cup since 1997.

In 2021-22, Iowa became just the second Big Ten school to have its football team and men's and women's basketball teams play in the Big Ten Championship Game since the football game was introduced in 2011-12.

Individually, Iowa was the only school in the nation in 2021-22 to have both a men's (Keegan Murray) and women's (Caitlin Clark) finalist for the Naismith and Wooden National Player of the Year Awards.

In addition, field hockey advanced to the 2020 Final Four, football earned a postseason bowl invitation (game was canceled), men's basketball reached the second round of the men's NCAA Tournament, and women's basketball reached the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in 2021. Soccer won its first ever NCAA Tournament game and the baseball and softball teams each placed fourth in the Big Ten, as did women's tennis.

The Hawkeye wrestling team won the 2021 NCAA Championships along with its Big Ten title, and the men's track team placed 12th nationally at the NCAA Championships, its highest finish since 1967.

• WIN •

Football: Iowa claimed its second West Division title with a 7-2 record in Big Ten games. The Hawkeyes opened the season with six straight wins, earning a No. 2 national ranking. After consecutive losses Iowa won its final four regular season games and earned an invitation to the Vrbo Citrus Bowl.

Head coach Kirk Ferentz has earned 178 career victories at Iowa and is the winningest football coach in school history. The Hawkeyes won three of four trophy games, with wins over Iowa State Minnesota and Nebraska.

Three Hawkeye players were named Player of the Year at their position in the Big Ten Conference, including unanimous consensus All-American offensive lineman Tyler Linderbaum.

Wrestling: Iowa earned third place finished in both the Big Ten and NCAA championships. The Hawkeyes sold out all home meets for the entire season, leading the nation in home attendance for the 15th straight year. Jacob Warner placed second in the nation to lead Iowa's five All-Americans, while three-time national champion Spencer Lee missed the majority of the year due to injury.

Men's Basketball: Iowa posted a 26-10 overall record, the second highest single-season win total in program history. The Hawkeye won the Big Ten Tournament championship for the third time in program history and the first time since 2006.

Individually, Keegan Murray earned consensus All-America honors, was named Karl Malone Power Forward of the Year, and was a finalist for the Wooden and Naismith Player of the Year Awards.

Murray is the sixth Hawkeye under head coach Fran McCaffery to earn first-team All-Big Ten honors in the last nine seasons. McCaffery has guided Iowa to 20 wins or more in eight of the past 10 seasons and upper-division Big Ten finishes nine of the past 10 years.

Women's Basketball: Head coach Lisa Bluder's team posted a 24-8 overall record. The Hawkeyes were 14-4 in Big Ten play, earning a share of the regular season title. Iowa then captured the Big Ten Tournament title, winning both championships for the first time in program history.

Sophomore Caitlin Clark earned consensus All-America honors after leading the nation in both points per game and assists per game. She earned Nancy Lieberman Point Guard of the Year and Dawn Staley Guard of the Year honors, while center Monika Czinano led the nation in field goal percentage for a second consecutive season.

Field Hockey: Iowa won the Big Ten regular season title while recording an overall 17-3 record, which included a 16-game win streak to open the season. The Hawkeyes were ranked No. 1 in the nation for six straight weeks and advanced to the Elite Eight for the 20th time in program history.

Head coach Lisa Cellucci was named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year for the third straight year, becoming the first coach in league history to earn that distinction.

Four Hawkeyes earned All-America honors, including Anthe Nijziel, who was named Co-Big Ten Player of the Year and Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year for the second straight season.

Track & Field: The Iowa men's track and field team won the indoor championship for a second straight year, while placing second at the outdoor championships. The outdoor squad ended the season with seven school records and earned 10 All-America honors, including seven first-team

honors. The Hawkeyes also won the Drake Relays Cup.

In the indoor season Iowa tied for 18th at the NCAA Championships as head coach Joey Woody was named Big Ten and USTFCCA Regional Coach of the Year while assistant Jason Wakenight was named USTFCCA Midwest Region Coach of the Year.

During the indoor season, Jenoah McKiver won the 600-meter event at the Big Ten Championships and ran on the winning 4x400-meter relay team. McKiver placed second in the nation in the 400 meters and was named Midwest Region Athlete of the Year.

The Hawkeye women's track program saw four student-athletes earn first-team All-America honors during the indoor season and had seven individuals earn All-America honors outdoors.

Baseball: Iowa baseball posted a 36-19 record in 2022, the eighth most wins in a single season. The Hawkeyes were 17-7 in Big Ten play, tying for second place during the regular season. Iowa advanced to the semifinals of the Big Ten Tournament, winning three consecutive elimination games.

Adam Mazur was named Big Ten Pitcher of the Year and was named second-team All-America by Collegiate Baseball. Outfielder Keaton Anthony was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Peyton Williams joined Mazur in earning first-team all-Big Ten honors, while Anthony and Ben Beutel were second team honorees.

Iowa's pitching staff ranked in the Top-13 nationally in five categories and was the best staff in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes set a single season school record with 609 strikeouts.

Women's Gymnastics: Women's gymnastics once again advanced to the NCAA Championships, reaching the regional finals for the first time since 2004 after placing third in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes posted five of the top nine scores in program history.

Sophomore Adeline Kenlin finished as the NCAA runner-up on the balance beam – the highest individual finish in program history. She earned first-team All-America honors. Senior Lauren Guerin was a Big Ten individual champion for the second straight year.

Men's Golf: Juniors Mac McClear and Ronan Kleu each earned second-team All-Big Ten honors, and both were invited to compete as individuals at the NCAA Regional championships.

• GRADUATE •

- Hawkeye student-athletes recorded an 89 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR). UI student-athletes rank higher than the national average in GSR and 11 teams ranked at or above the previous year.
- Three UI programs posted a perfect GSR score: women's golf, softball, and women's swimming and diving.
- Hawkeye student-athletes had an average GPA of 3.21 during the 2021-22 fall semester and a 3.22 GPA during the spring semester. Iowa student-athletes have had an average GPA of over 3.0 the last eight years.
- 270 Iowa student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition for the 2021-22 school year.
- 66 Big Ten Conference Distinguished Scholars.
- Over 300 student-athletes earned Dean's List and President's List honors.
- Men's & Women's Cross Country: Teams were named 2020 United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCA) All-Academic Team.
- Soccer: 19 Academic All-Big Ten selections, matching team record for second straight year



- Women's Swimming & Diving: Earned the CSCAA Scholar All-America team honor for both the fall and spring semesters.
- Rowing: 27 student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition during the spring semester.
- Wrestling: Five NWCA Scholar-Athletes and 13 Academic All-Big Ten honorees.
- Softball: Eleven players Academic All-Big Ten recognition.
- Baseball: Ten players earned Academic All-Big Ten honors.



• DO IT RIGHT •

- The University of Iowa Athletics Department and the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital facilitated the "Kinnick Wave" during home football games in 2017, creating national recognition. The "Kinnick Wave" was presented the Disney Spirit Award in 2017.
- Thirteenth anniversary: Iowa Football/University of Iowa Children's Hospital "Kid Captain" program.
- Student-Athlete Academic Services has sponsored the annual Iowa Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (ISAAC) Day of Caring for 23 years, with over 250 student-athletes assisting area agencies with spring clean-up, landscaping, sustainability projects, etc. This service opportunity is in collaboration with United Way of Johnson and Washington Counties.
- Student-athletes annually participate in over 4,000 appearances resulting in the accumulation of more than 10,000 hours of community service and programming. Student-athletes also participate in educational programming opportunities throughout the year.
- The Gerdin Athletic Learning Center re-opened for in-person meetings in August, 2020, following solely remote work during the spring and summer 2020. During the 2021-22 academic year, student-athletes completed over 33,000 hours of quiet study time, advising appointments, and tutorial sessions.
- Within the Hawkeye Life Program, student-athletes gain experience in six areas which include Leadership, Community Engagement, Academic Success, Career Development, Health & Well-Being, and Diversity & Inclusion. 2021-22 highlights:
 - o Diversity & Inclusion -- UI student-athletes totaled over 1,170 hours towards Diversity & Inclusion educational and mentoring programs during the 2021-2022 academic year.
 - o Leadership -- Dance Marathon Fundraising - \$1,500 ISAAC alone. Also held a virtual "Athlete Hour" with patients and families of Dance Marathon day.
 - o Community Engagement -- UI student-athletes donated 2,665 hours of community engagement, resulting in an economic impact of over \$76,000, with 58 percent of student-athletes participating. Local agencies and organizations who benefitted included Iowa City Animal Center, Ronald McDonald House, CommUnity Food Bank, Iowa City Community School District, and Coralville Central Elementary and Northwest Junior High School.
 - o Career Development -- Nearly 400 students attended career related events including a financial literacy series, Polk County I-Club senior recognition, graduate, and professional school fair, and one-on-one career counseling meetings. Academic Services created a H2P (Hawks to Professionals) ICON page which allowed students to participate in virtual career opportunities during the pandemic.
 - o Health & Well-Being -- Created opportunities such as Hawk Identity, Go Green Mental Health Game, Hawks4Hawks peer mental health support group, De-Stress Fest featuring activities to reduce stress, MYPLAYBOOK TRAINING wellness educational modules for all incoming UI student-athletes, and Dog Therapy, which includes team pet adoption.

• FAN SUPPORT •

- In 2021-22, Iowa ranked in the top 25 in home attendance for football and men's and women's basketball. Iowa has led the nation in wrestling home attendance for 15 straight seasons.
- Iowa wrestling featured a sellout of Carver-Hawkeye Arena for all home meets in 2021-22, setting an all-time national record for average attendance (14,905).
- Iowa ranked third in the nation in women's basketball home attendance in 2021-22 (8,224).
- Iowa ranked 18th in the nation in football home attendance in 2021 (66,777).
- Iowa ranked 22nd in the nation in men's basketball home attendance in 2021-22 (12,105).

• PERSONAL •

Barta's involvement in the UI campus and the greater Iowa City community extends beyond his position as director of the UI's Intercollegiate Athletics programs. He is a member of the President's Cabinet, comprised of vice presidents and other campus leaders who provide counsel to UI President Barb Wilson.

Barta remains active at the conference and national levels. He recently completed a three-year term on the CFP Selection Committee, serving as committee chairperson in 2020 and 2021. Barta also recently completed a multi-year term on the NCAA Division I Council, as well as the LEAD1 Board of Directors. He is regularly involved in National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) events and activities.

From a state and local community standpoint, Barta has been a regular participant in numerous Chamber and Convention & Visitors Bureau initiatives during his tenure. He is a long-standing member of the UI Partnership for Alcohol Safety Committee and participated for several years on the United Way of Johnson and Washington Counties' Board of Directors, including a term as chair. Barta also serves on the Iowa Sports Foundation Board of Directors.

Barta earned a Bachelor of Science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from North Dakota State in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championship in 1983, 1985, and 1986.

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (24), and a daughter, Madison (22). He was born Sept. 4, 1963, in Minneapolis.
