THE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA

The University of Iowa is a major public research university with a longstanding commitment to teaching, research, and service. Founded in 1847 as Iowa's first public institution of higher learning, the University has long been a national leader in such areas as creative writing, space physics, and health sciences. Today the University enrolls over 31,000 students in undergraduate, graduate, and professional degree programs. The faculty of some 1,600 members includes teachers and researchers in 11 colleges: Business, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Graduate, Law, Liberal Arts & Sciences, Medicine, Nursing, Public Health and Pharmacy.



Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz is in his 26th year as the head football coach at the University of Iowa. The position of UI head football coach was endowed in 2021 by Will and Renee Moon. The Bettendorf, Iowa, couple are UI alumni and longtime Hawkeye supporters.

Iowa's win at in-state rival Iowa State on Sept. 9, 2023, was his 200th victory as a college head coach. With Iowa's victory over Michigan State on Sept. 30, 2023, Ferentz surpassed Amos Alonzo Stagg for third place in Big Ten victories

with 116, and his career mark in Big Ten games stands at 122-85.

Ferentz and the Hawkeyes closed the 2022 season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl as Ferentz claimed the 10th bowl win of his career. That mark ties former Penn State coach Joe Paterno for most bowl wins in league history. Nationally, Ferentz is one of 19 coaches with 10 bowl victories.

Overall, Ferentz has a 196-119 record with the Hawkeyes, ranking third all-time in wins among Big Ten coaches. As a head coach Ferentz holds a 208-140 record in 28 seasons.

In addition to serving as Iowa's head coach for 25 seasons, Ferentz has been a member of the Iowa coaching staff for 34 seasons. His most recent contract extension extended his agreement with Iowa through the 2029 season.

Under Ferentz' leadership the Iowa football program has earned 21 bowl game invitations since 2001 (2020 Music City Bowl was canceled). That success has been achieved with strong commitments to the program, the University of Iowa, and the ideals that represent Hawkeye football – hard work, determination, player development and character, on and off the field.

Iowa has recorded eight wins or more the last nine seasons (Iowa was 6-2 in the 2020 COVID-19 season). Only four other programs (Alabama, Clemson, Georgia, Ohio State) have won eight games every year over that time frame.

In 2023, the Hawkeyes won 10 games, including their final four, to capture the Big Ten West Division for the second time in three years. Iowa advanced to the 2024 Citrus Bowl, marking the 13th January bowl game for the Hawkeyes under Ferentz, and finished the season ranked No. 24. The Hawkeyes have been ranked in the final AP Top 25 five of the last six seasons.

The Hawkeyes played the toughest schedule in the West Division in 2022, as two of their five losses came to playoff teams Michigan and Ohio State. Two additional losses were by three-point margins as Iowa improved throughout the season, winning five of its final six games.

In 2021, Ferentz led Iowa to its second Big Ten West Division title (2015), posting a 7-2 conference record and 10-4 overall mark. The Hawkeyes won 10 games for the seventh time under Ferentz and earned an invitation to the Citrus Bowl, Iowa's 12th January bowl game and 19th postseason invitation overall in the Ferentz era. Iowa was ranked 23rd in the final 2021 rankings, the fourth straight season the Hawkeyes have ended the year in the Top 25.

With Iowa's 33-7 win over Northern Illinois in the opening game of the 2018 season, Ferentz recorded win No. 144 as Iowa's head coach, surpassing the late Hayden Fry as the winningest football coach in program history. Fry was Iowa's head coach for 20 seasons (1979-98).

Ferentz is the longest tenured head football coach in the nation. Ferentz and Fry are the only head coaches to lead a Division I football program for 20 years, consecutively. With a 63-0 win at Illinois in 2018, Ferentz became just the fifth coach in Big Ten Conference history to win 150 games as a Big Ten head coach. Ferentz earned his 100th career Big Ten win at Penn State (Nov. 21, 2020).

The Hawkeyes have earned 25 conference victories between 2020-23, matching its highest four-year conference win total in program history (1982-85 and 2002-05). Iowa has posted five January bowl wins as Iowa's head coach. The Hawkeyes have twice won three straight bowl games (2008-10 and 2017-19) under Ferentz. Iowa has won at least six conference games four of the last five seasons.

Iowa opened the 2021 season with six straight wins, including three victories over ranked opponents while being ranked as high as second in the nation. Following consecutive losses, the Hawkeyes rallied to win their final four regular season games to earn the Big Ten's West Division title. The Iowa defense set a school record with 25 interceptions.

The Hawkeyes won 47 games from 2015-19, the best five-year win total in school history. Just eight programs in the nation won more games during that time frame. Ferentz guided the Hawkeyes to eight wins or more in five consecutive seasons (2015-19) and 15 seasons overall since 2002.

On the field, Ferentz's approach can be described as smart, tough, and physical. Off the field, academics and character development are a focus. In 2021, the University of Iowa outperformed its peers nationally in the classroom for the 10th consecutive year, according to data released by the NCAA.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes scored at least 26 points in each of the six wins, while holding three opponents to just seven points. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories over Minnesota, Nebraska and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the nation in the final CFP rankings and Coaches Poll, 16th by the AP Iowa's Music City Bowl date with Missouri in December was canceled due to the pandemic.

Iowa concluded the 2019 season with three straight wins over border rivals Minnesota, Illinois and Nebraska, followed by the 49-24 Holiday Bowl win over No. 22 USC. Following a 24-22 loss at Wisconsin to open November, the Hawkeyes handed No. 7 Minnesota its first loss of the season to maintain possession of Floyd of Rosedale. Iowa's three losses came by a combined 14 points to three teams who were ranked in the top 20 at the time. Iowa also maintained possession of the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Trophy with a win at Iowa State in September.

Iowa won six of its first seven games in 2018 and closed the season with wins in the final three games, including the 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State. The four losses came by a total of 23 points, and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa's defense ranked second nationally in interceptions after leading the nation in 2017.

Iowa's 8-5 record in 2017 included wins in three of four trophy games, with victories over Iowa State, Minnesota, and Nebraska, plus the Pin-stripe Bowl win to conclude the season. Iowa also began November with a 55-24 win over third-ranked Ohio State. Nine of Iowa's 12 regular season opponents were bowl eligible (posting an 8-1 record) as the Hawkeyes faced one of the strongest schedules in the nation.

Iowa closed the 2016 regular season with three straight wins, including two over ranked opponents. Iowa posted a 6-3 record in Big Ten play to tie for second place in the West Division and finished the season at 8-5 overall.

Highlights of the year included Iowa defeating second-ranked Michigan and 15th-ranked Nebraska in the final month of the season, as well as earning a January bowl invitation for the 10th time during the Ferentz era.

The Iowa football program enjoyed a historic season in 2015, posting a final 12-2 record. Ferentz led the 2015 Hawkeyes to a perfect regular season, setting a school record with 12 wins. The Hawkeyes won the Big Ten West Division (8-0) before falling to Michigan State, 16-13, in a close championship game that was decided in the final minute of play. The Hawkeyes earned their sixth invitation to the Rose Bowl, which was Iowa's first appearance in Pasadena in 25 years.

Ferentz was recognized with both the Hayes-Schembechler and Dave McClain Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year awards in 2015. He was

named Eddie Robinson (FWAA) and Woody Hayes National Coach of the Year (Columbus Touchdown Club), and received the Dodd Trophy, presented by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region 3 Coach of the Year.

COACHING HISTORY

Ferentz' coaching career began as a student assistant (1977) at his alma mater, the University of Connecticut. The next two years (1978-79) were spent at Worcester Academy, where he also taught English literature. He then served as a graduate assistant offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh during the 1980 season. That Pittsburgh team (coached by Jackie Sherrill) finished with an 11-1 record and a number two national ranking.

Ferentz joined Hayden Fry's Iowa staff as the offensive line coach in 1981, which became Iowa's first winning seasons in 19 years. The season was highlighted by the Hawkeyes winning a conference title and earning a Rose Bowl berth – both of which had not occurred in 20 years.

He continued as Iowa's offensive line coach through the 1989 season and had great success coaching offensive lines that, to date, have anchored four of Iowa's highest scoring offenses. In addition, eight of Iowa's top 10 offensive teams, in terms of yards gained per game, have operated with Ferentz as the head coach or offensive line coach. And Iowa's top nine passing teams of all time have occurred with Ferentz as the head coach, or offensive line coach.

Ferentz was named head coach of the University of Maine Black Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years before being hired by Bill Belichick and the Cleveland Browns to coach the offensive line. He remained with the organization after it moved to Baltimore and became the Baltimore Ravens, serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach. In all, he worked six years with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens of the National Football League.

He rejoined the Hawkeyes as head coach in 1999 and is Iowa's longest tenured head football coach.

PERSONAL HISTORY

Off the field, family is the top priority for Ferentz. Ferentz and his wife, Mary, have been married for 44 years. They have five children: Brian, Kelly, Joanne, James, and Steven. They also have five granddaughters (Presley, Blakely, Connolly, Jolie, and Bella), and six grandsons (John, Forest, Nixon, Lincoln, Beckett, and Marshall). All five of their children graduated from City High School in Iowa City and earned degrees from the University of Iowa; and each of the boys had the incredible experience of playing football at the University of Iowa with their father as head coach.

Kirk and Mary are very enthusiastic supporters of the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital. They serve as advocates for the Children's Hospital, hosting and speaking at events across the state to raise awareness and support for the hospital. Kirk and Mary established the "Ferentz Family Pediatric Research and Education Endowment Fund" in 2007. In honor of their granddaughter, Mary and Kirk donated more than \$1 million in 2017 to establish the Savvy Elizabeth Ferentz Neonatology Research Fund. In addition, the Iowa Ladies' Football Academy has donated \$3 million to the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital, which opened across the street from Kinnick Stadium in December, 2016.

Ferentz has also been involved in supporting several community and university-related initiatives, including serving as the honorary chair of the University of Iowa's United Way campaign. Kirk and Mary have also contributed generously to the University of Iowa, including donations to the University's College of Liberal Arts. Another significant gift was a \$500,000 commitment to support the Iowa Football Legacy Campaign, which included two key projects benefitting the Hawkeye football program; the indoor practice facility; and the Stew and LeNore Hansen Football Performance Center.

Ferentz was born Aug. 1, 1955, in Royal Oak, Michigan. He attended Upper St. Clair High School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and graduated from the University of Connecticut in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in English Education. He was a football captain and an academic All-Yankee Conference linebacker at Connecticut.

Ferentz received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Neag School of Education at the University of Connecticut in May, 2009. He was inducted into the Upper St. Clair High School Hall of Fame in September, 2002, and the Western Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in May, 2003.

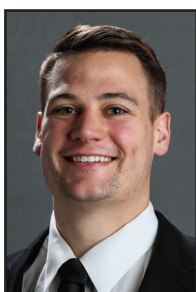

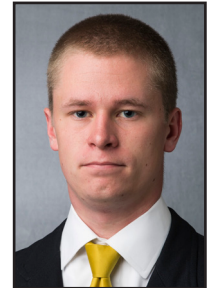

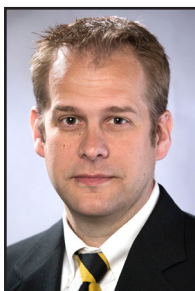

HAWKEYES - 1ST & 10

- The Hawkeyes played in the 2024 Citrus Bowl for the third time in program history. It was Iowa's 18th January bowl game, including the 13th under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Iowa is one of only nine FBS programs with an active bowl game appearance streak of 10+ years.
- Iowa won its third Big Ten West Division crown under Ferentz in 2023 (2015, 2021, 2023).
- Iowa was bowl eligible for the 22nd time in the last 23 seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- The Hawkeyes won 10 games in the regular season for the seventh time (five under Ferentz) and it was the 11th 10-win season in program history (eight under Ferentz).
- Iowa has won 25 Big Ten games between 2020-23, matching its highest four-year conference win total in program history (1982-85, 2002-05).
- The Hawkeyes finished in the top 25 of both the AFCA Coaches and Associated Press Polls for the 11th time under Kirk Ferentz and the 28th time in program history.
- Woody, Amos & Kirk... Ferentz's has 196 career wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference, the third-most all-time, trailing only Woody Hayes (205) and Amos Alonzo Stagg (199).
- Defensive coordinator Phil Parker was the recipient of the Frank Broyles Award, the AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year and the Football Scoop Defensive Coordinator of the Year. He is the first Hawkeye to win the Broyles and the third to earn the top AFCA honor.
- Special teams coordinator LeVar Woods was named the Football Scoop Special Teams Coordinator of the Year.
- CONSENSUS... DB Cooper DeJean and P Tory Taylor were consensus All-Americans – the 30th and 31st in school history. Iowa has had a unanimous first-team All-American in four straight seasons and the Hawkeyes are the only school nationally with a consensus All-American in each of the last five seasons.
- Senior Tory Taylor was named the recipient of the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter. He is the first Hawkeye to earn the honor.
- Iowa had 20 players earn All-Big Ten honors, including first-team selections Jay Higgins (LB), Cooper DeJean (DB and RS) and Taylor (P). DeJean was the recipient of the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year and the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year, while Taylor was tabbed as the Eddleman-Fields Punter of the Year.
- Taylor broke an NCAA punting yardage record, that was set in 1938, in the Citrus Bowl. He finished the season with 93 punts for a record 4,479 yards in 2023. He also had the best career punting average (46.3), single-season punting average (48.2) and most career games averaging 40 or more yards (43) in NCAA history.
- CLUTCH... The Hawkeyes went 5-1 in 2023 in games decided by seven points or less.
- What a duo... LB Jay Higgins tied the Iowa single season record, finishing with 171 tackles -- the most by a Power 5 player -- in 2023. LB Nick Jackson finished with 110 tackles to tally his fourth consecutive 100-tackle season. Higgins' 92 tackle assists were a school record.
- Iowa's defense ranked fourth nationally, giving up 14.8 points per game. The Hawkeyes allowed 20 touchdowns -- fourth fewest nationally -- in 2023. The Hawkeye rushing defense allowed seven

rushing touchdowns -- the third fewest in the nation.

- Iowa > 400. Iowa's defense has allowed fewer than 400 yards in 28 consecutive games -- the longest active streak nationally. The Hawkeyes gave up 4.08 yards per play during the 2023 season to lead the nation for a second straight season.
- The Hawkeyes have allowed 14 or fewer points in 19 of their last 27 games and the defense has held nine teams without a touchdown since the start of the 2022 season. The unit allowed one touchdown or less in 10 of 14 games in 2023 and in 19 of the last 27 games.
- Walking wounded. Four of Iowa's most prominent players -- QB Cade McNamara, TE Luke Lachey, TE Erick All and DB Cooper DeJean -- all missed substantial time with season-ending injuries.
- Since the start of the 2015 season, Iowa is 71-2 when leading by eight points at any point in a game.
- The Hawkeyes played in front of eight straight sellouts and 11 overall sellouts in 14 games. The three games that weren't sold out were the road game at Northwestern at Wrigley Field, the Big Ten Championship Game against Michigan and the Citrus Bowl vs. Tennessee.

WOODY, AMOS & KIRK

- Kirk Ferentz, in his 25th season as Iowa's head football coach and the longest tenured active head coach in college football, won his 195th career game as a member of the Big Ten Conference on Nov. 18 against Illinois. The victory moved Ferentz past Bo Schembechler for third in Big Ten history. He currently has 196 victories, trailing only Ohio State's Woody Hayes (205) and Chicago's Amos Alonzo Stagg (199).
- Ferentz has 121 Big Ten wins, which also rank third all-time, trailing Hayes (153) and Schembechler (143).
 - Ferentz won his 200th career game on Sept. 11 at Iowa State. He is the 27th coach at an FBS institution to reach the 200-career win milestone and the 99th coach across all divisions. Former Hawkeye head coach Hayden Fry finished his career with 236 victories.

THE NATION'S TOP ASSISTANT

- Iowa defensive coordinator Phil Parker was the recipient of the Frank Broyles Award, given to the top assistant coach in the nation, was the AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year and the Football Scoop Defensive Coordinator of the Year. Parker was the mastermind behind an Iowa defense that finished fourth in the nation, allowing 14.8 points per game.
- Parker was the first Hawkeye coach to win the Broyles Award.
 - He was the third Iowa assistant to earn the AFCA honor, joining Norm Parker (2011) and Ron Aiken (2002).

THE NATION'S TOP PUNTER

- Senior Tory Taylor became the first Hawkeye to win the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top collegiate punter. The Australian broke Iowa's single-season punting yardage record for a third consecutive year and he finished the 2023 season by breaking the NCAA single-season punting yardage record with 93 punts for 4,479 yards.
- A Big Ten coach (not named Kirk Ferentz) voted for Taylor as the Big Ten's best player in the Silver Football award voting. He finished sixth overall in the balloting.

DURING THE FERENTZ ERA...

Twelve different players have won 14 national awards under head coach Kirk Ferentz, including the AP Player of the Year, Davey O'Brien, Outland (twice), John Mackey (twice), Jim Thorpe, Lou Groza, Doak Walker, Lott IMPACT, Rimington, Butkus and Ray Guy.

B1G HONORS

- Junior Cooper DeJean was selected as the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year and the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year, while senior Tory Taylor was recognized as the Eddleman-Fields Big Ten Punter of the Year.
- DeJean was the sixth Hawkeye to be voted the top defensive back in the Big Ten and the third player to earn the league's top returner honor. Taylor earned the top punter honor for the second time in his career (2020). He was the first punter in league history to earn the distinction more than once.
- Iowa had 20 players earn All-Big Ten recognition, including first-team honorees Jay Higgins (linebacker), DeJean (defensive back, return specialist) and Taylor (punter). Sebastian Castro (defensive back) garnered second-team honors, while Joe Evans (defensive end), Nick Jackson (linebacker), Drew Stevens (placekicker), Logan Jones (center), Connor Colby (guard) and Nick DeJong (guard) were third-team honorees.

B1G WEST DIVISION CHAMPIONS

The Hawkeyes clinched an outright Big Ten West Division title and a trip to Indianapolis for the Big Ten Championship Game with a 15-13 victory over Illinois on Nov. 18 in Kinnick Stadium. It was the third Big Ten West Division crown in program history and the second in three seasons (2015, 2021, 2023).

10 WINS

- The Hawkeyes notched their 10th victory in the 13-10 walk-off road win at Nebraska on Nov. 24. It was the seventh time the Hawkeyes have recorded their 10th victory during the regular season, including five under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- It is the 11th time in program history that the team has reached the 10-win mark (1985, 1987, 1991, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2009, 2015, 2019, 2021, 2023).
- The Hawkeyes finished the regular season with a 7-2 Big Ten record. It is the fifth time Iowa has won at least seven league contests under Ferentz (2002, 2004, 2015, 2021, 2023).

MORE NOTABLES

- Junior DB Cooper DeJean, who suffered a season-ending injury in practice on Nov. 15, was a finalist for the Nagurski Trophy and Jim Thorpe Award. Iowa had semifinalists in DeJean (Lott Impact), Jay Higgins (Butkus), Drew Stevens (Groza) and Joe Evans (Burlsworth).
- Five Hawkeyes earned seven Big Ten weekly honors during the regular season -- DB Sebastian Castro, DB Cooper DeJean, LB Nick Jackson, P Tory Taylor (3) and K Drew Stevens. Iowa had the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week five times in 2023.
- SHUTOUT! Iowa shutout Rutgers, winning 22-0. It was the team's first Big Ten shutout since 2019 and the 16th of the Ferentz era.
- Head coach Kirk Ferentz was one of 20 coaches named to the 2023 Dodd Trophy Midseason Watch List.
- The Hawkeyes had 10 interceptions (to rank 65th nationally), including Sebastian Castro's 30-yard pick-six in the road win at Iowa State. The interception return for a touchdown extended Iowa's streak to 16 consecutive seasons (and 21 of the last 23 years). It is the second-longest active streak nationally.
- Sweet November. Iowa has won 18 of its last 19 games in the month of November, dating back to 2019.
- Iowa is 157-8-1 when allowing 10 points or less since 1970 and 390-59-19 when allowing 10 points or less all-time.
- The Hawkeye defense scored 12 points during the 2023 season and 52 points since the start of the 2022 season.
- The Hawkeyes went 3-0 in 2023 and are 9-1 dating back to the start of the 2022 season when not committing a turnover. The team is 12-1 in the same span when winning the turnover battle.
- The Hawkeyes have 234 interceptions since 2009 -- the most in the nation. Iowa's 34 interception returns for a touchdown tied for the fourth-most in the nation in that span.

ROCK STAR TORY

- Senior punter Tory Taylor was named the Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week on Oct. 24 after punting nine times for 444 yards, averaging 49.3 yards, against Minnesota. Four of his kicks traveled over 50 yards and four were downed inside the 20.
- Taylor punted seven times for 353 yards in the Big Ten Championship Game against Michigan. The yardage total was the second-most in BTCG history, his seven punts were tied for third and his 50.4 average was fourth. He had a 67-yarder in the game, the second longest punt in the game's history.
- Taylor earned his third Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week honor on Nov. 20 after punting eight times for a 51.6-yard average in Iowa's 15-13 victory over Illinois. In his final home game, Taylor had six punts of 50+ yards and two punts downed inside the 20. His eight punts pushed him past Jason Baker for the most career punts in school history.
- Taylor was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week on Oct. 9 after punting six times for 284 yards (47.3 average) in Iowa's 20-14 win over Purdue. Two of his six punts went over 50 yards (61 and 57) and two were downed inside the 20-yard line.
- Taylor earned his second straight weekly honor on Oct. 14 after putting on a punting display in the road win at Wisconsin. He had a career-high 506 combined punting yards (50.6 average) with half of his 10 punts going over 50 yards (two 60+) and six punts were downed inside the 20.
- Taylor has six career Big Ten weekly honors (2021 at Iowa State; 2022 vs. South Dakota State; 2022 at Rutgers, 2023 vs. Purdue; 2023 at Wisconsin, 2023 vs. Illinois). He is a midseason first-team All-American by the AP, ESPN, Sporting News, CBS, The Athletic and FOX and is a semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award.

1-2 PUNCH

- Iowa linebackers Jay Higgins and Nick Jackson were the definition of productive for the Hawkeyes in 2023. The duo combined for 281 tackles -- the most by a Power 5 tandem nationally.
- In all games, Higgins had 171 tackles -- the most by a Power 5 player. The 171 tackles tied Andre Jackson's school record and his 12.2 tackles ranked third nationally.
 - Higgins led or tied for the team lead in tackles in 12 of Iowa's 14 games. He had three games with 16 or more tackles (16 vs. Utah State, 18 at Penn State, 17 vs. Tennessee) and 10 games with 10+ tackles. His 18 stops in Happy Valley were the most by a Hawkeye since Jack Campbell had 18 tackles against Colorado State in 2021 and they were tied for the 10th-most nationally in a game this season.
 - Higgins has 11 career games with 10 or more tackles.
 - In Big Ten contests, Higgins had a league-best 109 tackles -- 21 more than Northwestern's Bryce Gallagher. Higgins averaged 12.1 tackles per game in nine league games.
 - Jackson had 110 tackles, including a season-high 13 stops at Penn State in Week 4. Jackson had three 10+ tackle games in 2023 and has 23 such games in his career. The Virginia transfer, who has 464 career tackles, ranked eighth in the Big Ten in tackles (7.9 per game). Jackson was named the Big Ten Co-Defensive Player of the Week on Oct. 2.
 - Jackson has had four straight 100-tackle seasons.
 - Both Higgins and Jackson were named to the Lombardi Award Midseason Watch List; Higgins was a semifinalist for the Butkus Award.

IOWA'S DEFENSE...

- allowed seven rushing touchdowns in 14 games -- the third fewest in the nation.
- held two straight opponents under 100 yards passing (Northwestern 81, Rutgers 93). It was the first time this happened in consecutive games since 1995.
- held seven of its last nine opponents under 100 yards rushing, including Rutgers to a season-low 37 yards. Iowa has held eight opponents under 100 yards this season.
- finished fourth nationally in scoring defense, surrendering 14.8 points per game.
- tied an Iowa bowl game record, finishing with six sacks in the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl game against Tennessee.
- finished fourth in team passing efficiency defense (102.13), seventh in total defense (282.5), 15th in third-down conversion defense (.313) and rushing defense (111.8), 16th in red zone defense (.758) and 32nd in first downs defense (230).

EVANS FINISHES 4TH IN CAREER SACKS

Sixth-year DL Joe Evans, who began his career as a walk-on linebacker, moved into fourth place on Iowa's career sacks list in his final game as a Hawkeye with his four-sack performance -- an Iowa bowl game record -- at the Citrus Bowl. The Ames, Iowa, native finished his career with 28 sacks, trailing only Jared Devries (43), Mike Wells (33) and Matt Roth (30).

BALL HAWKS

- Iowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 16 seasons and 21 of the last 23 seasons.
- DB Sebastian Castro's 30-yard pick-six at Iowa State in Week 2 extended the streak to 16 straight seasons, which is the second-longest active streak in the nation behind Utah (19). Iowa is one of four teams nationally to have a pick-six streak of 10-plus years.
- Iowa had 10 interceptions and one defensive touchdown in 2023 to rank seventh in the Big Ten and 65th nationally. The Hawkeyes led the Big Ten and the nation with six defensive touchdowns (four interceptions, two fumble returns) during the 2022 season.

2024 IOWA FOOTBALL 2023 SEASON REVIEW

STIFLING SHUTOUT!

The Hawkeyes notched their first shutout of the season in its 22-0 victory over Rutgers. It was the team's first Big Ten shutout since 2019 (Rutgers) and third since the start of the 2022 season. Iowa has 16 shutouts during the Kirk Ferentz era.

- Iowa limited the Scarlet Knights to 127 yards -- the fewest in a league game since 2019. The rushing defense held Rutgers 150 yards below its season average (34 yards) and bottled up the Big Ten's leading rusher, limiting Kyle Monangai to 39 yards on 13 carries.

- The 127 yards are the seventh fewest allowed in the Ferentz era, while the seven first downs allowed are tied for the sixth fewest and the seven pass completions allowed are tied for the fifth fewest.

HEAT SEEKING CASTRO

Senior DB Sebastian Castro was like a heat seeking missile for the Hawkeye defense, piling up 67 tackles (third-most on the team), including eight tackles for loss out of the CASH position, while intercepting a team-high three passes and recording eight pass break-ups. His three picks were 10th in the Big Ten and 56th nationally. Castro also had a forced fumble in Iowa's road win at Nebraska and a career-high nine tackles in the BTCG against No. 2 Michigan.

- Castro was a third-team All-American by the Associated Press in 2023 after allowing 40 completions on 74 targets (483 snaps in coverage). He allowed just 6.1 yards per completion and four catches over 15 yards.

- The Illinois native had seven solo tackles, including two TFL and a fourth quarter interception that sealed Iowa's road win at Wisconsin.

- Castro also came on a blitz in the fourth quarter against the Badgers in their own end zone. He flushed QB Braedyn Locke from the pocket to allow DL Yahya Black to record a sack and forced fumble, which ultimately resulted in a safety.

D STANDS UP TO MICHIGAN

Iowa's defense held second-ranked Michigan to a season-low 213 yards in the Big Ten Championship Game in Indianapolis -- 182 yards below its season average. The Wolverines had just 66 rushing yards, 103.8 yards below their regular season average.

- Iowa allowed 26 points, but Michigan's two touchdowns came on 5 and 6-yard scoring drives.

WHAT A STAND!

After a pass interference penalty gave Northwestern a first-and-goal from the 2 on Nov. 4 in Wrigley Field, Iowa's defense conjured up memories of Syracuse in 2005. The Hawkeyes stopped the Wildcats on four consecutive rushing attempts -- three from the 1 -- for a turnover on downs.

D CREATES HAVOC

After combining for three sacks and 24 tackles for loss in Iowa's first five games, the Hawkeye defense created havoc in Week 6 against Purdue. Iowa finished with a season-high six sacks (by five different players) and had a season-high 12 tackles for loss, matching the defense's performance in the Music City Bowl victory over Kentucky.

- DL Logan Lee had career highs across the board, finishing with 10 tackles, 2.5 TFL and two sacks. It was his first career game with 10+ tackles.

- DE Joe Evans finished with seven tackles, including a career-best 4.5 TFL and one sack. The 4.5 TFL are tied for the sixth most in a game nationally this season.

SAFETY X 3

Iowa recorded its third safety of the season in the first quarter against Illinois when DL Joe Evans sacked Illini quarter John Paddock in the end zone to give the Hawkeyes a 2-0 lead. It was the first time since 2018 that Iowa had three safeties in a single season.

- The team's second safety of the season came in the road win at Wisconsin when DB Sebastian Castro came on a blitz and DL Yahya Black's sack forced a fumble in the end zone (that was recovered by the Badgers).

- Iowa's defense scored 12 points in 2023 via one pick-six and three safeties.

T.O. CENTRAL

- Iowa's defense forced multiple turnovers in three consecutive games in wins over Michigan State, Purdue and Wisconsin. For the season, the Hawkeyes were -7 in the turnover battle this season (22-15). Iowa forced three turnovers in Weeks 1-3, eight from Weeks 5-7, one in Weeks 8-12, and three in Week 12 at Nebraska.

- The Hawkeyes forced a season-high four turnovers in Week 5 against Michigan State and followed with two more interceptions in Week 6 against Purdue. The four takeaways versus the Spartans were the most forced since 2021 against Penn State. Iowa had two fumble recoveries and a fourth-quarter interception (Ethan Hurkett) in Lincoln, turning the turnovers into six points.

- Iowa picked off three Spartan passes on interceptions from Cooper DeJean, Sebastian Castro and Jermari Harris. They were the most turnovers by the unit since 2021 against Northwestern.

- DeJean and LB Jay Higgins both had interceptions against Purdue and the Hawkeyes forced a fumble and Castro had his third interception to seal the road win at Wisconsin. Iowa also had a safety on a Yahya Black sack against the Badgers -- its second of the season.

- Iowa turned 15 turnovers into 42 points this season. The opposition had a 44-42 advantage in points off turnovers in 2023.

- Under head coach Kirk Ferentz, Iowa is 122-25 when winning the turnover battle.

PBU

In their first game without all-everything DB Cooper DeJean's season-ending injury, the Hawkeye defense finished with a season-high 13 pass breakups against Illinois in Week 11. They were the most PBUs by Iowa since amassing 14 in a win over Indiana in 2002.

- Seven different Hawkeyes had at least one pass breakup against an Illini offense that threw the ball 47 times. Junior DB Jermari Harris had a career-high eight tackles and four pass breakups in the game -- the most since Quinn Schulte in 2022 against South Dakota State.

BLOCK-R-US

- The Hawkeyes blocked three kicks -- two punts, one field goal -- to rank 10th nationally. Iowa's special teams' unit has six blocks since the start of the 2022 season and it has at least one block in each of the last three seasons.
- Senior DL Logan Lee blocked Iowa State's Chase Contreras's field goal on the Cyclones' opening possession of the game in Iowa's 20-13 road win in Ames. It was Lee's second career blocked kick. He also blocked a field goal attempt versus Minnesota in 2021.
- Sophomore DL Anterio Thompson blocked a WMU punt in the third quarter -- his first career punt block -- that resulted in a safety. The block came in Thompson's first career game as a Hawkeye. Thompson had a second punt block in the road win at Northwestern to set up Iowa's first touchdown.
- Thompson tied for fourth nationally with two blocks.

THE MOST FAMOUS PUNTER IN AMERICA

- Punter Tory Taylor's senior season -- his fourth as the Hawkeyes' starting punter -- had 93 punts for a 48.2-yard average in 2023 with 40 punts of 50+ yards (seven punts of 60+), 29 being fair caught and 32 being downed inside the 20, 11 inside the 10 and six inside the 5. Taylor only had seven touchbacks and opponents average just 7.7 yards per return.
- Taylor, who led the Big Ten and ranked third nationally with his 48.2-yard average, was Iowa's first Ray Guy Award recipient.
 - Taylor broke the Iowa career record for most punts against Illinois in Week 12. He finished his career with 295 punts for 13,657 yards -- both Iowa career records (passing Jason Baker).
 - He broke Michigan State's Johnny Pingel's 85-year single-season NCAA yardage record that had stood since 1938 at the Citrus Bowl. His 48.2 average is an NCAA single season record and he finished his career with the best average (46.3) in NCAA history and 43 games averaging 40 or more yards -- an NCAA record.
 - In 2023, Taylor punted at least seven times in eight games and six times in 12 of 14 games. He punted 10 times in a game twice in his career.
 - The Australia native was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week on Oct. 9 after averaging 47.3 yards on six punts with two 50+ punts (61 and 57) and two punts downed inside the 20. He earned a second straight weekly honor after punting 10 times for a career-high 506 yards with five punts of 50+ yards (two 60+) and six being downed inside the 20 in the road win at Wisconsin.
 - Taylor earned his third Big Ten honor after punting eight times for a 51.6 average with six 50-yard punts in the 15-13 win over Illinois.
 - Taylor was named the Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week on Oct. 24 after punting nine times for 444 yards against Minnesota. Four punts went over 50 yards and four were downed inside the 20. He was also named to the Ray's 8 for his efforts in Weeks 1, 2, 4 and 5. In Week 4 at Penn State, Taylor punted seven times for 366 yards with a punt of 62 yards. His 52.3 per punt average was a career best.
 - Taylor set the school record for punt yardage in three consecutive years. He had 80 punts for 3,688 yards in 2021, 82 punts for 3,725 yards in 2022 and 93 punts for 4,479 yards in 2023.
 - Taylor was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week six times in his career (2021 at Iowa State, 2022 vs. South Dakota State, 2022 at Rutgers, 2023 vs. Purdue, 2023 at Wisconsin, 2023 vs. Illinois).

- During the Music City Bowl win over Kentucky, Taylor tied a bowl record with eight punts for 386 yards (48.3 avg.). Four of his punts pinned the Wildcats inside the 10 and two were inside the 15. He tied Nick Gallery (1993 Alamo) and Jason Baker (1997 Sun) with eight punts.

DYNAMIC DREW

Kicker Drew Stevens' sophomore season made 18-of-26 field goal attempts in 2023. The 18 field goals tied for the third-most in the Big Ten and tied for 27th nationally.

- In Week 10 against Northwestern, Stevens made a game-winning 53-yard field goal with 14 seconds remaining to give Iowa a 10-7 win at Wrigley Field. He was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week on Nov. 6.
- In Week 5 against Michigan State, Stevens tied a career high with four field goals, including a make from 53 yards -- the second-longest of his career. The 53-yarder is tied for the ninth-longest in program history. Stevens made three field goals in the win over Rutgers, his third career game with three or more makes. He has 10 games with two or more field goals in his career.
- He has made 34-of-44 field goal attempts (77.3 percent) in his career and is 39-of-40 on PATs. He is 4-of-6 from 50-59 yards in his Hawkeye career.
- Stevens has two career game-winning field goals. He made a 21-yarder with 28 seconds remaining in a road win at Minnesota in 2022 and a 53-yarder in the road win over Northwestern on Nov. 4 at Wrigley Field.
- Stevens finished with a team and career-high 73 points (18 FG, 19 PAT), which ranked 11th in the Big Ten. He has had a touchback on 41 of his 54 kickoffs.
- As a freshman, Stevens earned freshman All-America honors during the 2022 season after making 16-of 18 field goals -- the most by a Hawkeye freshman all-time (passing Mike Meyer and Nate Kaeding). In the offseason, Stevens added 20 pounds to his 6'1" frame.
- The South Carolina native went 7-for-7 from 20-29 yards, 3-for-3 from 30-39 yards, 4-of-6 from 40-49 and 2-for-2 from 50+ in 2022. Stevens finished tops in the Big Ten and 16th nationally with an .889 field goal percentage and he was sixth in the Big Ten in field goals per game (1.23).
- Stevens was a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award for a second straight season (2022, 2023).
- Stevens made a career-long 54-yard field goal in Iowa's 33-13 win over Northwestern in 2022. It was one of a career-high four field goal makes against the Wildcats, which led to him earning Big Ten Freshman of the Week and Groza Stars of the Week honors on Oct. 31. The 54-yarder tied for the seventh-longest in program history and was the longest by a Hawkeye since Marshall Koehn drilled a 57-yarder in 2015.

2024 IOWA FOOTBALL 2023 SEASON REVIEW

KING OF RETURNS

- Iowa's kickoff return unit ranked fourth in the Big Ten and 20th nationally, averaging 23.37 yards per return in 2023. Junior Kaden Wetjen, who has 335 yards on 14 returns, has a 23.9 return average.
- Junior Cooper DeJean had 241 punt return yards on 21 returns, averaging 11.5 yards per return, before going down with a season-ending injury. DeJean had a 70-yard punt return for a touchdown against Michigan State to break a 16-all tie in the fourth quarter. It was the 15th longest return in school history, the first of his career and the first by a Hawkeye since 2020. The Odebolt, Iowa, native was second in the Big Ten and 14th nationally with a 11.5 average and he was second nationally in punt return touchdowns.
- DeJean returned a punt 54 yards for a potential game-winning touchdowns against Minnesota, but it was taken off the scoreboard following instant replay after officials deemed DeJean used an invalid fair catch signal.

LESHON TO THE HOUSE

- RB Leshon Williams had an 82-yard touchdown run in the second quarter of Iowa's road win at Wisconsin. His rush was tied for the ninth longest in program history, the longest by a Hawkeye since 1997 (Tavian Banks) and the longest all-time by a Hawkeye against Wisconsin. It is tied for the seventh longest run in the nation this season.
- Williams has a team-high three 100-yard games this season and was Iowa's leading rusher with 821 yards (33rd-most in a single season) on 170 carries, averaging 4.8 yards per attempt. He is the 52nd player in program history to reach 1,000 career yards; he has 1,302 yards to rank 33rd in program history.
- He recorded his third 100-yard game in the road win at Nebraska, rushing 16 times for 111 yards. He had a 53-yard run in the second quarter, which is tied for his second longest and the team's fourth longest of the season, and a 22-yarder on Iowa's final drive to set up the game-winning field goal.
- Williams' most productive game came when he finished with a career-high 174 rushing yards -- the most by a Hawkeye this season -- on 25 attempts in Madison. It was his second 100-yard game of the year. He had his first career 100-yard game, rushing for 145 yards on 12 carries against Western Michigan (and he had two receptions for 27 yards, including a 25-yard touchdown).
- He had six "explosive" runs this season, including three runs of 53+ yards (82, 53, 53).

KJ GOES OVER 1K

- In his first game since Week 2 at Iowa State, sophomore RB Kaleb Johnson returned to record his first 100-yard rushing game of the season and fourth of his career in Iowa's Homecoming victory over Purdue. The Ohio native rushed for 134 yards -- the second-highest total of his career -- on 17 attempts and scored a touchdown, a 67-yarder in the opening quarter. It was Iowa's longest offensive play of the season and the second-longest run of Johnson's career.
- Johnson's 134-yard performance pushed him over the 1,000-yard mark for his career. He is the 51st player in program history to surpass the 1,000-yard mark; he has 1,242 yards as a Hawkeye, ranking 36th in school history.
- Against Illinois, Johnson carried the ball 10 times for 53 yards and hit paydirt, scoring on a 30-yard touchdown run -- the game-

winning score -- in the fourth quarter.

- Johnson was second on the team with 491 rushing yards on 117 carries with a team-best three touchdowns.

ROAD GRINDERS

- The Hawkeye rushing attack churned out 381 yards in consecutive victories over Purdue and Wisconsin -- the most in a two-game stretch since 2020 (226 vs. Michigan State, 235 vs. Minnesota). Iowa's 200 yards against the Badgers are the most since 2008.
- Iowa finished with 179 yards against Rutgers on Nov. 11 against the nation's 10th-ranked defense and 163 yards against the Huskers' fifth-ranked rushing defense. Nebraska entered the game allowing 86.5 yards per game.
- The Hawkeyes rushed for 254 yards against Western Michigan on Sept. 16 -- the most for the program since 2019 versus Middle Tennessee State (351 yards).

QB DEAC

- Wisconsin transfer Deacon Hill took the reins of the Iowa quarterback position when Cade McNamara departed with a lower body injury in the first quarter of the Week 5 game against Michigan State. Hill completed 11-of-27 passes for 115 yards and his first career touchdown -- a 13 yarder to Erick All.
- In his nine career starts, Hill posted a 6-3 record. He is 122-of-251 for 1,152 yards with five touchdowns and eight interceptions. Four of Hill's five touchdowns went to Hawkeye tight ends.
- The California native had his best game as a Hawkeye, completing a career-high 20-of-31 passes for 223 yards against Rutgers. He had a 10-yard touchdown pass to WR Kaleb Brown -- his fourth touchdown pass of the season. Against Illinois, Hill completed 19-of-29 attempts for 167 yards and one touchdown.

AIR RAID

- Iowa went to the air to score its first two touchdowns of the 2023 season in the season-opening 24-14 victory over Utah State. QB Cade McNamara had a 36-yard touchdown pass to WR Seth Anderson on his first attempt as a Hawkeye (and the second play of the game) and McNamara connected with fellow Michigan transfer Erick All for a 3-yard touchdown on Iowa's second possession.
- Iowa's opening drive touchdown pass was the first to open a season since 1991 vs. Hawai'i (Matt Rodgers to Danan Hughes) and it was the first time in the Kirk Ferentz era that Iowa opened the season with a passing touchdown.

MCMNAMARA FOLLOWS CHUCK LONG

- QB Cade McNamara's first passing attempt as a Hawkeye went for a touchdown when he connected with WR Seth Anderson for a 36-yard score on the second play of Iowa's 24-14 win over Utah State.
- McNamara was the first Iowa quarterback since Chuck Long in 1983 to have a touchdown pass on his first completion of the season (24 yards to Norm Granger against Iowa State).

NICO FINISHES IN TOP 5

- Sixth-year WR Nico Ragaini finished his career in fifth place in school history with 156 career receptions for 1,597 yards, ranking 20th in the record books.

BROWN EMERGES

The Hawkeyes have an emerging weapon in the wide receiving corps in sophomore Kaleb Brown. The Illinois native finished his first season in Iowa City with 22 catches for 215 yards and a touchdown.

- Brown had a key 23-yard completion on Iowa's eventual game-winning scoring drive in the road win at Northwestern before recording three catches for 27 yards and his first career touchdown -- a 10-yarder -- against Rutgers.
- Brown's ascension continued against Illinois when he had career-highs in receptions (7), receiving yards (71), while tallying his longest career reception (31). The 71 receiving yards are the most by a Hawkeye wide receiver in 2023.
- He had five catches for 34 yards in the Big Ten Championship Game and three more in the Citrus Bowl against Tennessee. Brown had three or more catches in four straight games.

MORE BIG TIME TIGHT ENDS?

Sophomore Addison Ostrenga was one of Iowa's top receiving weapons during the final five games of the season, pulling in 25 receptions for 147 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-high eight receptions for 47 yards against Rutgers before making five catches for 24 yards and his second career touchdown against Illinois in Week 12. Ostrenga had a team-high seven catches for 50 yards against Michigan in the BTCG.

- His eight receptions are the most by a Hawkeye since Sam LaPorta had nine receptions last season at Illinois.
- Ostrenga wasn't the only Hawkeye tight end who made a big contribution against Rutgers. Freshman Zach Ortwerth had a 54-yard reception to set up an Iowa field goal. It was the longest reception of the season by a Hawkeye.

TIGHT END U!!

Iowa's tight end room accounted for 42.3 percent of the team's receptions in 2023 as five Hawkeyes have 72 receptions for 773 yards and five touchdowns.

- Graduate transfer Erick All had 21 catches for 299 yards and a team-best three touchdowns, while junior Luke Lachey had 10 catches for 131 yards.
- TE Addison Ostrenga had a career-high eight receptions for 47 yards against Rutgers and seven catches for 50 yards in the Big Ten title game against Michigan. He tied for the team lead with 31 catches for 192 yards and two touchdowns.
- TE Steven Stilianos (8 catches, 96 yards), TE Zach Ortwerth (1 catch, 54 yards) and TE Johnny Pascuzzi (1 catch, 1 yard) are Iowa's "next man up." Ortwerth had a 54-yard reception -- the first of his career against Rutgers -- which is the longest reception by a Hawkeye receiver this season.

O COMES THROUGH

- The Hawkeyes had their longest scoring drive in both plays (14) and time of possession (7:59) in the second quarter in the 15-13 victory over Illinois.
- Iowa outgained Illinois, 281-280, in the game with 54 yards coming when it counted most on a four-play, 54-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter. Sophomore RB Kaleb Johnson's 30-yard touchdown run propelled Iowa to its ninth win.

OFFENSE BREAKS THROUGH

After averaging 225.3 yards over its first nine games, Iowa's offense erupted for 402 yards against the nation's 10th-ranked Rutgers defense on Nov. 11. It was the first 400-yard game in the last 32 contests (Maryland, 2021).

- The Hawkeyes had 223 passing and 173 rushing yards -- the first 200+ passing and 100+ rushing game since Northwestern in 2022.
- QB Deacon Hill passed for a career-high 223 yards, completing a season-high 20 passes.
- Seven different receivers caught at least one pass and three running backs had 53 or more yards.
- Iowa didn't have a three-and-out in the game, had a season-high 21 first downs and punter Tory Taylor had just three punts -- a season low.
- The offensive unit was 9-of-18 on third downs and 2-of-2 on fourth downs in the game and controlled the time of possession to the tune of 38:22 -- the seventh-best all-time under Kirk Ferentz.

UNLIKELY HEROES

The Hawkeyes had two unlikely heroes -- DL Ethan Hurkett and K Marshall Meeder -- who were instrumental in propelling Iowa to a Heroes Game victory over Nebraska in Lincoln.

- Hurkett picked a good time to record his first career interception -- on Nebraska's final offensive series -- as he dropped into zone coverage, intercepted QB Chubba Purdy and returned it 16 yards to the Husker 37 to set up Iowa's game-winning field goal. The Cedar Rapids, Iowa, native led the team with a career-high nine tackles and 1.5 TFL in the game.
- Meeder, who transferred to Iowa from Central Michigan and joined the team two weeks prior to the start of the season, will go down in Hawkeye lore after drilling a game-winning 38-yard field goal as time expired. It was Meeder's first career game as a Hawkeye and his first attempt of the season.
- It was Iowa's second game-winning field goal this season as Drew Stevens made a game-winner in Week 9 in the road win at Northwestern.

A CLEAN NOTE PAD

The Hawkeyes had two games in 2023 where they did not commit a penalty -- Week 2 at Iowa State and Week 11 vs. Rutgers. Iowa has played penalty free football three times in its last 17 games (at Minnesota, 2022).

- Since 1970, Iowa has nine games where it hasn't committed a penalty.
- Iowa is fifth nationally in fewest penalties per game (3.64) and fewest penalty yards per game (30.30), sixth in fewest penalty yards (433) and eighth in fewest penalties (51).
