SEASON OUTLOOK

With experience returning up-and-down the University of Iowa baseball team's roster, head coach Rick Heller has lofty expectations in his first season with the Hawkeyes.

Heller, who was named Iowa's 20th head baseball coach in July 2013, inherits a program with eight returning positional starters, including second-team All-Big Ten selection Eric Toole. The Hawkeyes also return eight pitchers from last season's squad and added 12 newcomers.

"With as many returning players as we have, my expectations for this group is high," said Heller, who coached the past three seasons at Indiana State. "I feel we're going to be strong defensively, and we have the potential to be strong on the mound."

"Offensively, we've made good improvements over the winter and have a chance to be a good offensive team. Hopefully we'll improve our power numbers (two home runs in 2013), and we should be able to take advantage of our speed, which is our strength."

Heller added two familiar faces -- Scott Brickman and Marty Sutherland -- to his coaching staff as assistants. The trio was together in 2010, leading the baseball program at Northern Iowa. Heller says the goal of year one is to implement their system.

"The big thing is we want to establish our style of play, a certain level of intensity and toughness with this group," said Heller. "Thus far, they have done a great job adapting to what we want to do."

"This team has a chance to have a good season. We've set our goals high, and we want to go out and surprise a lot of people."

STARTING PITCHING

Two of the three spots in Iowa's starting weekend rotation appear to be set with the return of junior left-hander Sasha Kuebel and the addition of sophomore right-hander Tyler Peyton. The third spot in the rotation could depend on the health of sophomore right-hander Calvin Mathews.

Heller and Scott Brickman, the team's pitching coach, wants the staff to be relentless on the mound and to battle every pitch.

"We expect our guys to attack hitters and try to get through the seventh inning," said Heller. "If we can do that, we have the pieces in the bullpen to win games."

Heller sees Kuebel as the Friday night starter, but the St. Louis native needs to rebound from a tough sophomore campaign where he went 2-8 with a 5.13 ERA. Kuebel was an innings-eater for the Hawkeyes, tossing 80 2/3 and finishing with 46 strikeouts.

"Sasha works extremely hard and is a tough competitor," said Heller. "He has no fear and attacks hitters. Whether he has a good or bad day, he is going to give us a chance to win."

Peyton joins the Hawkeyes out of Iowa Central Community College where he was a first-team all-region selection in 2013. The Grimes, Iowa, native went 6-3 with a 1.69 ERA, while leading the team in innings pitched (58 2/3), strikeouts (58) and limiting opposing hitters to a .141 batting average.

"Tyler is going to be an exciting guy to watch," said Heller. "He has a good fastball in the low 90s, a swing-and-miss slider and is working hard on his changeup. If the work he has done this winter carries over into the spring, he'll be a true three-pitch guy with a power arm."

Mathews is a wild card for the Hawkeyes. If healthy, Heller says the right-hander may be the team's top pitcher. The Bloomfield, Iowa, native missed the last three weeks of the 2013 season and didn't pitch during the summer or fall with a shoulder injury. Last season, he went 2-5 with a 4.50 ERA in nine starts (10 appearances) with 27 strikeouts in 40 1/3 innings.

"Calvin has a great three-pitch mix, his fastball is in the low 90s and can hit his spots," said Heller. "He's a legit No. 1 guy if he's 100 percent."

"If we have Calvin in some role, he's going to help us. We're hoping it can be as a starter, but if his shoulder situation doesn't allow him to throw a lot of pitches without setbacks, we'll try to use him as a short guy."

Junior Nick Hibbing will be a key cog for the Iowa pitching staff; it's just a matter of if it will be in the rotation or at the back-end of games. The right-hander went 3-3 with a 3.90 ERA in a team-high 19 appearances (two starts) as a sophomore and led the team with four saves. Heller may ask him to move into a starting role.

"We extended Nick in the fall to see what he would be like as a starter, and he maintained his velocity well," said Heller. "He is already at 93-94 and there is more in there. Nick cleaned up some things mechanically and is in line for a real solid year. He'll be more efficient and throw more strikes."

Junior left-handers Andrew Hedrick and Taylor Kaufman and sophomore right-hander Tyler Radtke give Heller more options in the starting role.

Hedrick had an injury-plagued sophomore season, going 1-0 with a 3.60 ERA in six appearances. The Ankeny, Iowa, native is 3-2 with a 5.01 ERA in 18 career appearances, which includes eight starts.

“Andrew is coming off some back trouble, but by the end of the fall, he was throwing well,” said Heller. “He has an electric arm. I saw him throw in high school and felt like he would be a weekend starter for somebody and still feel the same way. He is one of our best left-handers and is a great option for a Sunday spot start or a key bullpen role”

Kaufman could be an added bonus for the Iowa pitching staff because he was initially expected to miss the season after undergoing shoulder surgery this fall. Instead, Heller hopes to have the services of a southpaw that went 3-3 with a team-low 2.68 ERA in 2013. Kaufman made a pair of starts as a sophomore, including an eight-inning, one-run, two-hit outing May 18 at Purdue.


“I don’t know if it will be game one, but I am optimistic we’ll have Taylor by mid-March in some role,” said Heller. “When he went under the knife, we felt we’d be without him this year, and it was going to be a big blow. Instead, we’ll get back one of the team’s top pitchers and a quality left-handed arm.”

Radtke made the team via a tryout this fall and impressed Heller. The right-hander transferred to the UI from Villanova University, and he was a two-time all-conference pitcher as a prep at Stevenson (Ill.) High School.

“Tyler is a big, physical right-hander with a good, downhill plane to his fastball,” said Heller. “He is a tough competitor and a kid that works hard in the weight room, on the field and is a good teammate.”

RELIEF PITCHING

If Hibbing and Kaufman return to their roles in the bullpen, Heller will have a talented trio at his disposal at the end of games. Sophomore Blake Hickman is the third option, transitioning to the mound, giving Heller a legitimate power arm.

Hibbing and Kaufman combined for seven of Iowa's 11 saves and 36 appearances in 2013. Hibbing wants to stay in the closer's role, but will do what is in the best interest of the team.

"It's a tough call right now because Nick likes the closer's role, but with our injury situation, we may need him as a starter," said Heller. "He'll have a big role for us, but it's a matter of what's going to help the team the most."

Hickman made a commitment to pitching during the fall after having success in the Northwoods League this summer for the Waterloo Bucks. The Chicago native is raw, but has unlimited potential, which is what made him a 20th round pick by the Chicago Cubs in the 2012 Major League Baseball Draft.

"He has a big-time arm, is a 90-93 mph guy and was up to 95-96 in the summer," said Heller. "Over the winter, Blake made some nice improvements. He is throwing his breaking ball for strikes consistently and has cleaned up his mechanics with his delivery."

"We look for Blake to be one of the top back-end guys on our team and if he can pound the zone, he could be one of the top back-end guys in the Big Ten."

Iowa's bullpen also returns junior Ryan Rumpf and sophomore left-hander Jared Mandel, while adding transfers Brandon

Shulista, Jacob Sharp and Will Kenny along with freshmen Matt Allen and Jake Reinhardt.

After being a two-way player his first two seasons, Rumpf has turned his sole focus to the mound. The right-hander made just three appearances in 2013, posting a 6.00 ERA in three innings of work.

"Ryan had a good fall, he competes hard and knows how to attack hitters," said Heller. "He has no fear, which is what I like in Ryan. He's not afraid to challenge hitters. He'll be a solid bullpen guy for us."

Mandel didn't see any game action during his first spring with the Hawkeyes, but the left-hander impressed Heller during the fall.

"I told Jared after the fall season that he could be a guy that has a lot of appearances," said Heller. "I see him in the role of a lefty specialist, but he has good enough stuff to get right-handed batters out too. When he has good command, he can get guys out. I have a lot of confidence in Jared going into the spring."

Shulista, a local product out of Solon High School, joined the Hawkeyes following a two-year stay at Iowa Central Community College. He went 4-0 with a 2.27 ERA with 35 strikeouts as a freshman and 4-3 with a 3.27 ERA as a sophomore.

"Brandon is a bulldog, competes hard and will come right at you," said Heller. "He doesn't have an overpowering fast ball, but he pounds the zone and has a good breaking ball that is a swing-and-miss pitch at times. He's going to have a solid role in our bullpen and has the potential to be a spot starter."

Sharp comes to Iowa City by the way of Black Hawk College, where he was a first-team all-region and two-time all-conference selection. He went 8-1 as a freshman with a 2.40 ERA and 5-1 as a sophomore. Kenny pitched at Iowa Central Community College the past two seasons, posting a 7-3 record with a 3.12 ERA in 2013 and was 5-2 record with a 3.75 ERA as a freshman.

"Jacob had a solid fall and is another bulldog-type pitcher who attacks hitters and has a good slider," said Heller. "Will's health is going to be a factor in his role as he had some arm trouble at the end of his junior college season. When he's healthy, he's a big, strong left-hander that will throw in the low 90s."

Allen was an all-conference selection at Stevenson (Ill.) High School as a senior after going 6-2 with a 1.40 ERA. Reinhardt was ranked as the No. 500 prospect by Perfect Game and was a third-team all-state, first team all-conference and all-district selection as a senior at Dowling Catholic (Iowa) High School.

"Matt came in as a walk-on and competed as hard as anyone on the team," said Heller. "He doesn't have an over-powering fast ball, but he throws strikes and can pound both sides of the plate consistently. Matt has a big-time winner's makeup."

"Jake had his ups-and-downs in the fall, but he has worked hard with coach Brickman. We expect good things from him in the future."

Iowa will be without the services of sophomore Josh Martsching, who will miss the 2014 season after undergoing Tommy John surgery this fall.

CATCHERS

The Hawkeyes don't have a clear-cut, every day catcher in 2014, but Heller believes collectively the team will have a strong presence behind the plate with senior Trevor Kenyon, junior Joe Tellez and sophomores Blake Hickman and Jimmy Frankos.

Kenyon is making the move back to the catcher's position after playing primarily at first base and as the designated hitter in 2013. To maximize Iowa's offensive potential, Heller needs Kenyon's bat in the lineup. The Davenport, Iowa, native hit .307 with eight doubles and a triple, while scoring and driving in 16 runs.

"Trevor is one of our better hitters, both for average and power," said Heller. "Trevor has worked on his catching skills and has improved over the winter. He will be in the lineup in some capacity because we need his bat."

Hickman has the most Division I experience on the Hawkeye roster, starting four games behind the plate as a freshman. At the plate, Hickman batted .220 with four doubles and six RBIs in 2013.


"Blake had a nice fall and has worked hard on his hitting," said Heller. "He has improved as a player over the last four months. I don't think there is a catcher that throws better than Blake in the country, as he can really control the running game. He will catch a lot for us, but we're trying to decide how things will shake out every day."

Frankos and Tellez will also compete for playing time. Frankos played in 10 games as a freshman with one start as the designated hitter, hitting .200 in limited action with a pair of RBIs. Tellez joined the Hawkeyes out of East Los Angeles Community College.

"We're pleasantly surprised with Jimmy," said Heller. "He had a good fall, his blocking skills were solid and he did a good job receiving. He also made good strides with his swing during our individual period."

"Joe is a tough kid, a solid receiver and a good all-around player. After battling injuries during the fall, he looked like he was 100 percent before Christmas break."

Iowa also added Long Island University transfer Colby Brecht prior to the spring semester. The Norway, Iowa, native will be eligible in the spring 2015.

INFIELD

The Hawkeyes will be battled-tested in the infield in 2013 with starters returning at every position.

For the third-straight year, juniors Jake Yacinich and Jake Mangler will lead Iowa up the middle at shortstop and second base, respectively. Junior Nick Day is back for his second full season at the hot corner, and seniors Bryan Niedbalski and Trevor Kenyon return at first base.

Yacinich was one of Iowa's top players in 2013 despite battling through a concussion and back injuries for much of the season. The Des Moines, Iowa, native started 37-of-41 games and hit .286 with four doubles and 24 RBIs as a sophomore. Yacinich was Iowa's top clutch hitter, batting .362 with runners in scoring position and had 13 multi-hit games.

"Jake was our top hitter, played great shortstop and ran the bases well in the fall," said Heller. "He is an outstanding all-around player, and has put himself in a position to have a strong junior season."

Mangler started 38-of-39 games at second base as a sophomore. He batted .255 with 38 hits, 19 runs scored and 18 RBIs, and had nine multi-hit games. Defensively, Mangler was in the middle of 42 double-plays and posted a .979 fielding percentage.

"Jake had a good fall, played hard and is a good leader," said Heller. "He wants to win and gets everything out of his abilities. He has made some adjustments with his swing and gotten stronger to set himself up to have a good season."

Day settled in as Iowa's every day third baseman in 2013, starting 37 games and appearing in 41 contests. He hit .200 with 24 hits, including two doubles, one triple and a home run in the season-opener at Austin Peay. He also scored 15 runs and drove in eight.

"Nick played outstanding defense at third base this fall," said Heller. "I can't imagine there being too many better than Nick, defensively. He's aggressive, made plays on the run to his left and right and his arm was excellent. Nick improved offensively, and I expect big things out of Nick."

Niedbalski is penciled in as Iowa's starting first baseman after starting the final eight games of the 2013 season and manning the position during the fall. The St. Louis native hit .196 with nine hits, four RBIs and two runs scored in 46 at-bats as a junior in limited action.

"Bryan had a nice fall at the plate," said Heller. "The second half, he drove the ball well, which is what we need him to do. He hit for power and had some big-time quality at-bats. I was pleased with his effort this offseason and believe he will have a great senior year."

Senior Trevor Kenyon and sophomore Tyler Peyton are both candidates to fill in at first base. Kenyon started 12 games at the position as a junior, finishing with a .307 batting average. Peyton batted .358 with one home run and 38 RBIs at Iowa Central, posting a .462 slugging and .446 on-base percentage, while collecting 62 hits, 28 doubles and 27 walks.

"Trevor is going to be in the lineup somewhere," said Heller. "Tyler will hit in the middle of the order and most days he'll be our designated hitter. He is also an excellent first base-

man and can play third base if need be. He has a flat hack, drives the opposite field gap well and has improved his pull-side power.”

Sophomore Nick Roscetti returns after starting 28 games and seeing action in 37 contests as a true freshman. He started 15 games at shortstop, seven as second base and six at third base. The Sherman, Ill., native hit .272 with 28 hits, 10 runs and six RBIs.


“Nick is a very good defender,” said Heller. “He had a solid fall offensively and worked hard in the weight room to get stronger.”

The Hawkeyes added another piece to the infield puzzle with the addition of junior Jake Riffice from Sierra College. The Granite City, Calif., native was a Big Eight All-Conference selection after batting .300 with 23 RBIs, 27 runs and seven steals. He posted a .380 on-base and .362 slugging percentage.

“Jake is scrappy and does a great job offensively playing to his strengths,” said Heller. “He is solid defensively and is going to be fighting for one of the spots up the middle.”

Sophomore Devin Pickett returns after seeing limited action, playing five games as a freshman, where he was 1-of-2 (.500) at the plate. Iowa also added Wichita State transfer and Iowa City product Sean Moore to the roster, but he must sit out due to NCAA transfer regulations.

“Devin played well this fall when he was healthy,” said Heller. “He flattened his swing out in the offseason and was a completely different hitter from day one to the break. I know he’s confident and is a great leader and teammate.”

The Hawkeyes know what they have in the outfield, and it's a talented trio headlined by Eric Toole, a second team All-Big Ten selection in 2013.

"It's hard not to be excited about Eric Toole," said Heller. "He's a guy that can run as well as anybody in our league, has a great feel and instincts stealing bases and is an outstanding leadoff guy. To top it off, he's one of the top outfielders in the Big Ten. He's a great player."

Toole started 45 games in centerfield as a sophomore, where he led the team with a .337 batting average, 59 hits, 32 runs and 22 steals. In Big Ten play, Toole batted .412 to rank second in the league and his 12 steals tied for the most in the conference. Toole reached base safely in each of the final 15 games of the 2013 season, which included a nine-game hitting streak and a school-record-tying 5-for-5 performance against Purdue in the second-to-last game of the season.

"Eric worked hard this offseason in the weight room, and I believe he will hit more doubles and drive gaps," said Heller. "We're pleased with where he was at before Christmas break, and if he can carry that over into the season, it will add a new dimension to his game that will make our team even better."

Goodman missed the fall season with a back injury, following a breakout sophomore season. The Apple Valley, Minn., native started the season off on fire, hitting above .400 for the first month and above .350 for the first half of the year. He finished the year with a .269 average with 50 hits, 28 runs, 24 RBIs, three doubles, one triple and one home run -- a game-winning, extra-innings grand slam to down Minnesota.


"Kris is one of our best athletes, hardest workers and best leaders," said Heller. "Being out with a stress fracture in his back in the fall, he has some catching up to do, but I believe he'll be one of our top guys this spring."

Zeutenhorst (right) returns for his senior season after starting 25 games and appearing in 40 contests as a junior. The Sheldon, Iowa, native batted .233 with six extra-base hits, 15 runs and 14 RBIs in 2013. He has the tools to be one of the team's best players.

"Taylor drove the ball and showed good power during the fall, which is what we need him to do," said Heller. "He worked hard on his hitting, and I felt good about where he was when we went to break. I think he has set himself up to have a great senior season."

The Hawkeyes have depth in the outfield with the additions of junior college transfers Dan Potempa and Joe Walsh and the return of sophomore John Barrett.

Potempa was a second team NJCAA Region XI selection as a freshman at Iowa Central after hitting .358 with 10 doubles, three home runs and 38 RBIs as a freshman. He followed it up with by posting



a .291 average with 10 doubles, three long balls and 24 RBIs as a sophomore.

“Dan is a very good hitter that gives us great options in left field, right field and at designated hitter,” said Heller. “His bat will be in the lineup quite a bit, and he has the makeup to be a quality pinch hitter. He has doubles power, some home run pop and is a tough kid and solid hitter.”

Walsh battled injuries throughout the fall, but Heller is hopeful the outfielder can return to his Oakton Community College form. The Palatine, Ill., native was a 2013 NJCAA Division II First Team All-American and the Region IV All-North Central District Player of the Year after hitting .412 with seven home runs, 26 doubles and 51 RBIs. The 26 doubles led the nation.

“Joe had a tough fall with injuries limiting what he could do,” said Heller. “We know what he is capable of and the numbers he put up last were some of the best in the country. We’re hoping Joe is 100 percent because if he is, he can help us.”

Barrett didn’t see any game action as a freshman, but proved to be a solid option for the Hawkeyes during fall ball.

“John was one of our top hitters this fall,” said Heller. “He is a guy we could use in left field as a spot starter or as designated hitter in our lineup. He is going to be one of our top pinch-hit options.”

Junior Taylor Kaufman also gives Heller another outfield option and a left-handed bat off the bench. Kaufman started 28 games in left field in 2013, posting a .252 batting average with 40 hits, 23 runs, 18 RBIs and four extra base hits. He also had a team-best 25 walks.

“Taylor gives us a quality left-handed bat,” said Heller. “He will be a good option for us in the outfield, one that we didn’t have in the fall.”

SCHEDULE

The Hawkeyes will face a challenging 53-game schedule that includes 15 contests against 2013 NCAA Tournament teams (Austin Peay, Kansas State, Indiana, South Dakota State and Illinois). Iowa will also play 22 games at Duane Banks Field, facing Mount Mercy in its home opener March 19.

“If we can get off to a good start with the number of experienced players we have, we have a chance to roll for a while and build some confidence,” said Heller. “We have a difficult nonconference schedule, but it will prepare us for Big Ten play.”

Iowa welcomes Nebraska, Indiana, Minnesota, and Illinois to Iowa City for Big Ten series, while traveling to Michigan, Northwestern, Ohio State and Purdue.

For the first time in its history, the top-eight teams in the regular season standings will qualify for the 2014 Big Ten Tournament, which will be held at TD Ameritrade Park in Omaha, Neb., May 21-25. NCAA Regionals will be held May 30 through June 2, Super Regionals from June 6-8 and the NCAA College World Series from June 13-23.

“This team has the opportunity to surprise some people and have a strong showing in the Big Ten,” said Heller. “We’re looking forward to getting out there, competing and winning some games.”

Rick Heller was named the 20th head coach in University of Iowa baseball history on July 12, 2013. Heller joined the Hawkeyes after serving as head coach at Indiana State the last four seasons.

Heller, a native of Eldon, Iowa, has been head coach at three institutions -- Indiana State (2009-13),

Northern Iowa (1999-2009), and Upper Iowa (1987-99) -- leading all three schools to NCAA postseason play. He led Indiana State to its first outright Missouri Valley Conference title in 2012. He led Northern Iowa to the 2001 MVC title and into the NCAA Tournament, the first regional appearance for the Panthers since becoming a Division I program in 1981. In 26 seasons as a head coach, Heller holds a career mark of 690-565-4.

Heller led the Sycamores to their first outright Missouri Valley Conference championship in school history and back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1995 during the record-setting 2012 season. Indiana State finished 41-19, including a 14-7 record in conference play to claim the regular season crown and earn an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament. The 41 wins were the most for the program since 1991.

Heller was named the 2012 Dan Callahan MVC Coach of the Year, while junior Jeremy Lucas earned the Joe Carter MVC Player of the Year award -- the first student-athlete in ISU history to earn the league's MVP -- and junior Dakota Bacus was selected as the MVC Newcomer of the Year. Eight members of the team were named All-MVC. Following the season, two Sycamores were drafted in the top-12 rounds and a total of three signed contracts to begin their professional careers.

Heller led Indiana State to its fifth-consecutive winning season in 2013, and to a semifinal appearance in the MVC Tournament. The Sycamores, who finished 26-25 overall, had four

players earn All-MVC honors, including Sean Manaea, the 34th overall selection in the 2013 MLB Draft by the Kansas City Royals. The draft selection was the second-highest in ISU baseball program history. Manaea became the 16th Sycamore to either be drafted or sign a professional free agent contract since Heller became head coach in 2009.

Heller led Indiana State to a 35-19 record in his first season in Terre Haute, Ind. -- the most wins for any first-year coach in ISU baseball history -- and a third place MVC finish. The Sycamores were one of two MVC teams to receive votes in the national polls during the season. In 2011, Indiana State went 29-28 and advanced to the semifinals of the MVC Tournament -- its deepest run since 2002.

During his tenure at Northern Iowa, Heller's teams won 270 games, including the 2001 Missouri Valley Conference championship and NCAA Regional Berth. While building the Panthers into an annual contender, Heller coached three MVC Most Valuable Players, one MVC Pitcher of the Year and helped put 22 players in professional baseball.

While at UNI, Heller's teams broke a total of 57 team or individual records, including setting team records for hits, runs batted in, doubles and extra base hits during the 2001 season. Heller led the Panthers to four MVC tournaments, winning the championship in 2001. All-American Ryan Brunner claimed the league MVP award and All-American Nic Ungs was named Pitcher of the Year.

The Panthers recorded back-to-back 30-plus win seasons in 2001 and 2002 for the first time in school history and set the school single-season record with 35 wins in 2001. Heller also coached two Academic All-Americans in Brunner and Travis Welsch. Before taking over the Northern Iowa program prior to the 2000 season, Heller spent 12 years as a head coach at Upper Iowa University, a Division III institution. While at Upper Iowa, Heller recorded a 291-194-3 overall record and was named the Iowa Conference Coach of the Year four times.

Heller won his first conference championship in 1993 -- the first for Upper Iowa in 20 years -- while advancing to the NCAA Division III Regionals. His team won the Iowa Conference title and advanced to NCAA Regionals again in 1995, finishing 19th in the national rankings as Heller won his third Coach of the Year honor.





He repeated Coach of the Year honors again in 1996 when the Peacocks won the Iowa Conference and Central Regional to advance to the NCAA Division III College World Series. His team finished the year ranked sixth nationally and he was named NCAA Division III Central Region Coach of the Year.

In 1997, his team was ranked seventh nationally in the pre-season poll and won the Iowa Conference Tournament. In 1998, his team was ranked as high as 10th nationally while finishing with a 38-8 record to set a school record for winning percentage (.826). His final UIU team finished 30-15-1 and finished third in the Iowa Conference while setting five school records.

As a player at Upper Iowa from 1982-86, he was a four-year starter at shortstop and he also lettered in football and basketball. He is a member of the Upper Iowa Athletic Hall of Fame.

Heller is a member of the American Baseball Coaches Association and serves on the ABCA All-American Committee. He is also a member of the Indiana and Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Associations. In 2008, he was inducted into the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Heller has three daughters -- Tara, Alyssa, and Vivienne. His wife's name is Rachelle.

SCOTT BRICKMAN

**Pitching Coach
First Season
Northern Iowa, 1998**

Scott Brickman is in his first season as an assistant coach with the University of Iowa baseball program. Brickman joined the Hawkeyes following a four-year stint as head coach at Division II Belmont Abbey University.

During his tenure at Belmont Abbey, Brickman led the Crusaders to a 104-82 record, a 2012 Conference Carolinas Western Division Championship, and a pair of top-25 national rankings -- the first in school history. Brickman departs Belmont Abbey with the best winning percentage in the program's 22-year history.

In 2013, Brickman guided the Crusaders to a 27-17 record, and the squad earned a top-25 ranking during the regular season for the second time in program history. Five players garnered all-conference recognition, and pitcher Emilio Pagan was selected in the 10th round of the 2013 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, the program's highest draftee in its history.

Brickman led the Crusaders to the Conference Carolinas Western Division title in 2012 -- the third crown in school history and first in more than a decade. Brickman coached Pagan to ABCA/NWBCA All-America honors and two Crusaders earned all-conference and All-Southeast Regional honors. Steven Thiele was also tabbed as the Conference Male Academic Scholar Athlete of the Year for the second-straight season.

In his second season as head coach, Brickman led the Crusaders to an 11-win turnaround from his first season, winning 29 games and earning the first top-25 ranking in program history. Brickman coached six players to all-conference recognition and one All-Southeast Regional honoree. Three Crusaders also earned academic all-conference honors, and Thiele was the Conference's Male Academic Scholar Athlete of the Year.

From 2007-09, Brickman served as an assistant coach at Northern Iowa. In two seasons with the Panthers, five pitchers were drafted or signed by Major League Baseball organizations, accounting for 20 percent of the players drafted at UNI since 1962. During the 2008 season, Brickman helped guide the Panthers to 30 wins for just the fourth time in the school's 103-year history, while posting the fourth-best ERA (4.75) since the move to Division I in 1981.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Brickman spent five seasons as an assistant coach at Wofford College, where he coached two Freshman All-Americans and helped the Terriers win the 2007 Southern Conference Championship and an NCAA Tournament berth.

Brickman also served as head coach of the Florence Redwolves, a summer collegiate team in Florence, S.C., in 2004-05. The 2005 team advanced to the Coastal Plains League championship game and set the franchise record with 33 wins. Twelve of his players were drafted or signed by MLB teams, including 2006 first-round pick, Clemson University's Tyler Colvin.

From 2000-02, Brickman was an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Muscatine Community College. During his tenure, he saw three pitchers and 15 total players earn all-region honors, and four players were selected in the MLB Draft. Brickman also was an assistant coach at Wartburg College in 1998-99, helping the Knights win the Iowa Conference and advance to the 1999 NCAA Tournament.

As a pitcher at Northern Iowa, Brickman led the Panthers to a second-place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference in 1997, and he was a twice named Missouri Valley Pitcher of the Week.

The Denver, Iowa, native earned his bachelor's degree in general studies from Northern Iowa in 1998. He has a wife named Cassie.





MARTY SUTHERLAND

Assistant Coach/
Recruiting Coordinator
First Season
Northern Iowa, 1998

Marty Sutherland is in his first season as hitting coach and recruiting coordinator for the University of Iowa baseball program. The Cascade, Iowa, native is a former player and coach under UI head coach Rick Heller at Northern Iowa.

Sutherland served as an assistant coach for the Panthers from 2003-09, helping lead the team to 154 victories over six seasons. He coached 12 All-Missouri Valley Conference selections and an MVC Newcomer and Player of the Year honoree.

Sutherland also served as an assistant coach at Wartburg College during the 2002-03 season. Most recently, Sutherland was an assistant coach at Cascade (Iowa) High School and a hitting/fielding instructor at Bases Loaded Academy in Dubuque, Iowa.

Sutherland was an infielder at Northern Iowa during the 2001 and 2002 seasons, helping the team to its first back-to-back 30 win seasons in program history. He also played at Kirkwood Community College from 1998-2000.

During his two seasons in Cedar Falls, Sutherland batted .318 with 25 doubles and 29 stolen bases. He also finished his career with 64 RBIs.

In 2001, Sutherland was a second team All-MVC and second team All-Midwest region honoree after UNI won a school-record 35 games and claimed the Missouri Valley Conference Tournament title en route to the first NCAA Tournament berth in school history. Sutherland batted .349, and the Panthers finished 10th in the nation and led the MVC in hitting with a .333 batting average.

In 2002, UNI won 30 games and finished fourth in the Missouri Valley. The squad finished with a .327 batting average in conference games to lead the league.

Sutherland earned his associate's degree from Kirkwood Community College in July, 2000, and his bachelor's degree from Northern Iowa in Dec., 2002.





JIM MAGRANE

Volunteer Assistant Coach
First Season
University of Iowa, 2005

Former Hawkeye Jim Magrane is in his first season as a volunteer assistant coach with the University of Iowa baseball program. Magrane competed for the Hawkeyes from 1996-99.

Magrane joins the program after a 13-year professional baseball career with the Tampa Bay Rays and Washington Nationals organizations, while also playing in Puerto Rico, Venezuela, Mexico, China, Korea and Italy in 2013. He finished his career with a 102-93 record and a 3.84 ERA in 265 starts (307 appearances).

The Ottumwa, Iowa, native was the Tampa Bay Rays organization Pitcher of the Year in 2000, the Durham Bulls Triple-A Pitcher of the Year in 2004, and the Atlantic League Pitcher of the Year in 2009 after becoming the first and only pitcher to lead the league in wins, ERA and strikeouts.

The right-hander was also tabbed as the Chinese Professional Baseball League Championship Series MVP in 2010 and the Italian Championship Series MVP in 2013. He helped teams to seven titles in his 13-year career, two coming at the Triple-A level.

Magrane has been active on coaching circuit in his career, serving as a volunteer assistant coach at Kirkwood Community College in 2011-12 and being a pitching instructor at Diamond Dreams Baseball Academy in Iowa City from 2003-08.

As a Hawkeye, Magrane was a third-team All-Big Ten selection as a senior, after going 6-4 with a 4.43 ERA. He threw a school-record 107 2/3 innings and struck out a UI single-season record 110 batters. During the 1999 season, Magrane also tied a 63-year old single-game record when he fanned 17 batters in a matchup against Western Illinois.

Magrane, who played two seasons apiece for Duane Banks and Scott Broghamer, went 11-8 during his Iowa career, finishing with 151 strikeouts in 172 2/3 innings. He signed as a free agent with the Tampa Bay Rays in 1999 and was drafted in the 33rd round by the New York Mets out of high school in the 1996 MLB Draft.

Magrane earned his bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Iowa in 2005.





MATT WOOLDRIK

Director of Baseball Operations
First Season
University of Iowa, 2007

Former Hawkeye Matt Wooldrik is in his first season as the University of Iowa's director of baseball operations and director of the Iowa Baseball Academy. Wooldrik competed at Iowa from 2003-07.

Wooldrik joins the program after serving as an assistant coach at Regina (Iowa) High School from 2008-13. He helped guide the team to three Cedar Valley Conference titles (2010-12) and a runner-up finish in 2013. During the 2011 season, Regina was sub-state runner-up, which included a loss to eventual state champion, Davis County.

Woodrik started 44 games for Iowa during his senior season, hitting .323 (51-of-158) with 22 runs and 22 RBIs and 10 doubles. The Hawkeyes went 31-23 during the season -- the best record in a decade -- which included a school-record 12 straight wins, 10 of which were Big Ten games. The Hawkeyes hit .325 as a team to rank in the top-15 nationally and their .425 on-base percentage ranked in the top-20 in the country.

An Iowa City native, Wooldrik prepped at Iowa City High, where he earned 13 athletic letters. He earned his bachelor's degree in management organization and finance from the University of Iowa in 2007.

**GARY BARTA
ATHLETICS DIRECTOR**

Now in his eighth year as director of athletics at the University of Iowa, Gary Barta continues to provide the UI's more than 600 student-athletes, in addition to more than 225 coaches, administrators and support staff, the strong leadership and strategic vision that is the foundation for the Hawkeyes' success both today and in the future.

Barta often notes, "Hope is not a strategy," and evidence of his commitment to planning and execution is his second strategic plan for the UI Athletics Department. The latest "road map"

addresses the next five years for the Hawkeyes and is built on the same core tenets contained in the first: Win. Graduate. Do it right.

The Hawkeyes are coming off a 2012-13 athletics year that saw eight programs participate in national championship competition, a record-setting year in terms of graduation rates – 77 percent, and steady progress in terms of facility improvements, highlighted by the opening of the new indoor practice facility for the UI's football program and the Hoak Family Golf Complex at Finkbine Golf Course, home of the Hawkeyes' men's and women's golf programs.

Under Barta's direction, the UI will continue to put into place the infrastructure that will provide the foundation for competitive success. The 2012-13 basketball season provides an outstanding example of the impact state-of-the-art facilities can have on a program. Boosted by a new practice facility and an enhanced strength and conditioning facility – two pieces of Barta's first strategic plan for the UI – Fran McCaffery's Iowa men's basketball team won 25 games and advanced to the championship game of the 2013 National Invitation Tournament. Lisa Bluder's Iowa women's basketball team earned its sixth consecutive invitation to the NCAA Tournament.

Another example of investments made under Barta's direction that have helped Iowa turn the corner competitively is the UI men's golf program. Barta increased his commitment to the sport when he hired native Iowan Mark Hankins, who had a vision for the program that included a new practice facility. Barta, Hankins and the Hawkeyes celebrated the opening of the new \$6 million Hoak Family Golf Complex in February, just three months before Hankins' nationally ranked squad made its fifth straight appearance in the national regional championships. The Hawkeyes have advanced to the NCAA Championships in three of the last five seasons.

Women's basketball and men's golf are two of the eight UI programs that participated in national championship competition in 2012-13. At the top of the list was Tom Brands' wrestling program, which crowned one national champion, had four wrestlers earn All-America honors, and finished fourth nationally at the end of a season that included a Big Ten Conference Dual Meet championship.

JD Reive's men's gymnastics team had three individuals earn All-America honors after finishing fifth at the national meet. Larissa Libby's women's gymnastics program advanced to NCAA regional competition for the sixth straight season.

The Iowa field hockey program under the direction of Tracy Greisbaum advanced to its sixth NCAA Tournament over the last nine years and 22nd in school history – a total that ranks No. 1 among the Hawkeyes' Big Ten Conference peers. Two Hawkeyes were named All-Americans.

Iowa's 200 and 400 medley relay teams and backstroke Grant Betulius earned All-America honors while leading Marc Long's men's swimming and diving team to a 32nd place at the national championship. Larry Wiecezorek's UI track and field program crowned eight All-Americans en route to placing 35th at the national outdoor championship.

Interest in the Hawkeyes continues to soar. Sellouts for home games of the football team at historic Kinnick Stadium and a waiting list for access to the premium seating areas inside the Paul W. Brechler Press Box are the norm. So, too, is Iowa leading the country in attendance at home wrestling events -- Iowa averaged just under 9,000 fans per home dual match in 2012-13 – and being ranked among the nation's Top 20 in attendance in women's basketball.

Success on the court has also resulted in spinning turnstiles for home games of the UI men's basketball team. The Hawkeyes' run to New York City's Madison Square Garden and the NIT championship game included a pair of sold out games on Mediacom Court in 15,400-seat Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Those two sellouts, paired with three regular season sellouts, helped to push Iowa's total average per game to 13,625, an improvement of more than 1,700 per game that has pushed the Hawkeyes into the nation's Top 25 in per game attendance.

Under Barta's leadership, Iowa has also embraced new technologies and that, too, has paid dividends: Iowa ranks among the nation's Top 10 in Facebook "friends" and Twitter "followers." The UI also delivers Hawk Talk Daily, a daily e-newsletter, and Hawk Talk Monthly, a monthly e-magazine, to more than 70,000 friends of the UI and fans of the Hawkeyes to complement the news, information, video and photography available on hawkeyesports.com, the official world wide web site of the Iowa Hawkeyes and the UI's anchor in the digital world.

Academically, Iowa continues to achieve at a pace that sets the bar across the state and competes favorably with its peers in the Big Ten Conference. UI student-athletes set new

records for academic achievement, according to data released by the NCAA in October 2012, as part of its annual report on the work in the classroom by student-athletes across the country.

Student-athletes that entered the UI in the fall of 2005 graduated at a rate of 77 percent, an all-time record for the Hawkeyes. That mark - which uses the federal government benchmark for graduation success - is three points better than the 2011 report when Iowa tied the previous school record of 74 percent set first in 1994-95. It is also six points better than the UI student body and 12 points better than that achieved all by student-athletes nationally.

The UI also set a new record by posting a score of 87 percent in the NCAA's "Graduation Success Rate" or GSR, one point better than what was posted the previous year. It marked the seventh time in the eight years of the GSR's existence that Iowa's student-athletes scored 80 percent or better.

The GSR's for football (82), men's basketball (89), and women's basketball (100) all bested the national averages in their sport: 68, 65, and 86, respectively.

The NCAA's Academic Progress Rate report for 2012-13 revealed that for the fourth consecutive year all of Iowa's 24 sports programs were comfortably above the 930 threshold that signals a red flag for the NCAA. The highlights of Iowa's report include APR's for 18 of Iowa's programs that were better than the national average in that sport, including football, men's basketball and wrestling. The APR for Iowa's football program - 961 - was an all-time best.

As noted, Barta has been the driving force behind substantial investments in the facilities used by Iowa's more than 650 talented male and female student-athletes. When the Iowa football program moves into its new \$54 million operations center in late summer 2014, the UI will have completed more than \$220 million of construction and renovation work over the previous eight years.

That list of projects includes a \$47 million facelift and addition to Iowa's award-winning Carver-Hawkeye Arena, a project that directly impacted 23 of Iowa's 24 sports programs, two phases of improvements to the facilities used daily by Iowa's football program - construction of a new indoor practice facility and renovation of the Kenyon Outdoor Practice facility in Phase I, and construction of a state-of-the-art operations center in Phase II, a \$9 million investment in scoreboards, ribbon boards, and video walls at historic Kinnick Stadium, construction of the aforementioned \$6 million Hoak Family Golf Complex at Iowa's award-winning Finkbine Golf Course, turf replacement at Grant Field, the home of Iowa's nationally ranked field hockey program, resurfacing of the courts at

the Klotz Tennis Center, the home of Iowa's men's and women's tennis programs, and the construction of a new indoor turf facility.

On the horizon for Barta, from a facilities perspective, is the planning and construction of the "Hawkeye Campus." Located on the western edge of the UI campus, immediately west of Finkbine Golf Course and adjacent to the UI's Athletics Hall of Fame, the practice and competition sites for Iowa's soccer and field hockey programs, and the UI Sports Medicine Clinic, and near the UI's Ashton Cross Country Course, the Hawkeye Campus is envisioned to be the new home for Iowa's track and field, softball, and baseball programs.

Another favorite saying of Barta's is, "Vision without resources is irrelevant." Over the course of his career he has been directly involved in raising hundreds of millions of dollars in support of intercollegiate athletics. This task has remained a primary focus during his tenure at Iowa, where private support for the Hawkeyes continues to be a critical piece to Iowa's ability to remain one of a handful of NCAA Division I intercollegiate athletics programs that are 100 percent self-sustaining financially.

Under Barta's leadership -- and thanks to a talented athletics development staff - the UI has seen year-over-year improvement in annual giving in spite of the difficult economic environment. In addition, under Barta's direction, the UI generated more than \$20 million of philanthropic and corporate sponsorship support for the revitalization of Carver-Hawkeye Arena and more than \$30 million of support for phases I and II of the projects designed to position Iowa's football program for success in the next decade.

The UI also generated the \$2 million in private support necessary to fully fund the Hawkeyes' new practice facility for its men's and women's golf programs. Philanthropic support will also play a critical role in the development of the Hawkeye Campus.

Barta's involvement in the UI campus and the greater Iowa City communities extends far beyond his position as director of the UI's intercollegiate athletics programs. He is a member of the President's Cabinet, comprised of vice presidents and other campus leaders that provide counsel to UI President Sally Mason. That group was instrumental in the UI's response to record-setting flooding that besieged the campus and the Iowa City and Coralville community in June 2008.

Barta also represents the UI and the Hawkeyes at the conference and national level. During his first six years at the UI, he has participated in the creation and implementation of the Big Ten Network, the expansion of the Big Ten Conference and realignment of athletics conferences nationally, and the Big Ten's postseason bowl game agreements that were successfully implemented in 2010.

Nationally, Barta remains active in the Division IA Athletics Directors Association, the National Association of College Directors of Athletics, and currently serves on the NCAA Football Committee Board of Directors.

Barta is also involved in a variety of community groups, included the United Way of Johnson County and Partnership for Alcohol Safety, a joint effort between UI campus leaders and the city of Iowa City.

Barta often suggests to his staff that "Hope is not a strategy," which is why he is currently overseeing a comprehensive review of the strategic plan for the UI Athletics Department and has worked with the UI's leadership on a long-term financial plan.

As the director of athletics at the University of Wyoming for three years, seven different UW coaches were named Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year. He also spearheaded a fund-raising effort that netted the Cowboy athletics program \$11 million in private support and \$11 million in matching state fund.


As the senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington, he directed the "Campaign for the Student-Athlete," was a participant in the design, construction and/or renovation of several UW athletics facilities, including Bank of America Arena and the Dempsey Indoor Practice Facility. In addition to almost doubling the amount of annual private support received by UW, Barta also managed the department's external relations division, a task that included corporate sponsorship and radio contracts.

His responsibilities at Washington expanded over time to include hiring of coaching and administrative staff, and the day-to-day oversight of several Huskie sport teams.

The roots of his development experience extend to his first two positions: director of athletics development and external relations at the University of Northern Iowa and director of development at his alma mater, North Dakota State University.

Barta earned a Bachelor of Science degree in mass communication and broadcast journalism from NDSU in 1987. He was an option quarterback for Bison football squads that won the Division II NCAA National Championship in 1983, 1985 and 1986.

Barta, and his wife, Connie, have a son, Luke (15) and a daughter, Madison (13). He was born Sept. 4, 1963, in Minneapolis.



IOWA CONTINUES TO BUILD FOR SUCCESS

The UI Department of Athletics is under the direction of Gary Barta and is regarded as one of the top intercollegiate programs in the nation. Once again, the Hawkeyes enjoyed success both athletically and academically in 2012-13

Academically, the UI's federal graduation rate of 77 percent (for student-athletes who enrolled in the fall of 2005) is the best mark in school history. That mark was six points better than the UI student body and 12 points better than achieved by student-athletes nationally. For the fourth consecutive year, all 24 of Iowa's teams exceeded the Academic Progress Rate (APR) benchmark and the program posted a record 87 percent in the NCAA's "Graduation Success Rate." It is the seventh time in eight years of the GSR's existence that Iowa's student-athletes scored 80 percent or better.

Athletically, Hawkeye teams enjoyed another outstanding year in 2012-13, as a significant number of Iowa's 24 programs reached postseason play. The Iowa men's basketball team advanced to the championship game of the National Invitation Tournament, the women's basketball team competed in the NCAA Tournament for the sixth straight season and the wrestling team finished fourth at the NCAA Championships.

In February, 2013, the UI dedicated the 4,200-square foot James M. Hoak Family Golf Complex, a state-of-the-art golf facility featuring indoor putting and chipping green and two indoor-to-outdoor heated practice bays. It came on the heels of the completion of a \$47 million revitalization of Carver-Hawkeye Arena in the summer of 2011. That project included the construction of a practice facility for men's and women's basketball and volleyball, a 10,000-square-foot strength training and cardiovascular center, and an expansion to the Dan Gable Wrestling Complex, in addition to new locker room and support facilities for men's and women's basketball, wrestling and volleyball programs, and office space for the majority of Iowa administrative and coaching staffs.

Phase I of a two-phase project for the UI football program was completed in August, 2012. Phase I included a new indoor practice facility for head coach Kirk Ferentz' football program that has competed in 10 bowl games over the past 12 seasons. Phase II includes construction of the new Iowa Football Operations Center, which will include new team locker rooms, team meeting rooms, athletic medical training space, video operations, and coaches offices and meeting rooms. Funded entirely through private support and revenue generated by the UI Athletics Department, the project is an important next phase of the master facilities plan for Hawkeye football.

IOWA WRESTLING

The Hawkeye wrestling team -- the national attendance leader in each of the last seven seasons -- continued its dominance on the mat, finishing fourth at the NCAA Championships. Four Hawkeyes earned All-America accolades in 2013, including 157-pound national champion Derek St. John. Iowa has claimed 23 national championships since 1975 and 34 Big Ten titles in its history.

IOWA WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

UI head coach Lisa Bluder guided the Hawkeye women's basketball team to its sixth-straight NCAA Tournament in a year when the Hawkeyes hosted first and second round contests inside Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Iowa moved on to the Round of 32 following an opening-round victory Miami (Fla.) and finished 21-13 overall. The Hawkeyes are the only Big Ten team to appear in six consecutive NCAA tournaments and one of 13 schools nationally.



IOWA MEN'S GYMNASTICS

The Hawkeye men's gymnastics team completed its most successful season in nearly a decade in 2013. Iowa finished fifth nationally at the NCAA Championships, marking the program's best finish since 2000. The Hawkeyes had three individuals earn All-America recognition, including Javier Balboa, who was the first all-around Iowa honoree since 2005.

IOWA MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

The men's track and field team placed 35th at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships and earned All-America recognition in nine events. Senior Justin Austin swept the Big Ten Athlete of the Championships and Big Ten Athlete of the Year honors for the second time in his career.

IOWA MEN'S GOLF

Head coach Mark Hankins led the Hawkeyes to their fifth-straight NCAA Regional appearance in 2013 and two student-athletes garnered all-region honors. Senior Steven Ihm made a splash in the summer, winning the Sunnehanna Amateur and competing on the PGA Tour in the 2013 John Deere Classic.

IOWA MEN'S BASKETBALL

Third-year head coach Fran McCaffery led the Hawkeyes to 25 wins -- matching the second-highest win total in school history -- and to the championship game of the National Invitation Tournament. The team's success saw increased attendance, as Iowa had six sellouts at Carver-Hawkeye Arena, which led to a No. 21 national home attendance ranking.

IOWA FIELD HOCKEY

The Hawkeyes advanced to their second-straight and 22nd all-time NCAA Tournament in 2012. Iowa had two student-athletes garner All-America recognition, the 82nd and 83rd honorees in program history.



"The University of Iowa grew on me beyond an athletic standpoint, branching to different areas such as the friendly community, the opportunity to study at a Big Ten university as prestigious as Iowa, and the personal preference of staying in the Midwest. The baseball program at Iowa offers everything that I looked for in my recruitment process, namely the level of competition everyone plays at, and the great coaching that surrounds me. I am thankful and very pleased with my decision in choosing Iowa and look forward to learning and upholding the tradition the university as a whole has maintained on an athletic and academic level."

"I chose the University of Iowa because I was really comfortable with the coaches throughout the recruiting process. I like the way Iowa runs the baseball program and the values that we have. Our coaches care about us on a personal level more than just with baseball as well. It is more than just baseball here, we are learning to become men too. I have had a great time attending Iowa and I believe it is a great place for me to graduate and get a degree."

TAYLOR ZEUTENHORST - Senior - Sheldon, Iowa

I chose Iowa because I felt the coaches here wanted me the most. They showed the most interest and they were there from day one. When I came on my official visit I loved the Iowa City environment. The students and the campus, it was all amazing. All the older guys told me I could play a big role as a freshman and from there I wanted to be that guy to help Iowa make it to the Big Ten tournament then Omaha. Coach Dahm became a person I could go to and I knew that this is the place where I belong. Also, education played a big part. In four years having a degree from the University of Iowa will be an advantage in the work field if baseball doesn't work out. I know I've made the right decision and I feel Iowa will help my game improve, and I will become a better person at the end.

The infield at Duane Banks Field has a new state-of-the-art playing surface, as AstroTurf was installed in the fall of 2013, replacing the natural grass infield. The AstroTurf surface in the entire ballpark is expected to be replaced before the 2014-15 school year.

"It is exciting for our players to see a commitment being made to this program," said UI head coach Rick Heller. "The number of quality repetitions we will get with our infielders and pitchers is going to make us better right away."

Additional cosmetic changes to Banks Field have also taken place, including replacing the posts and fencing behind home plate and giving the dugouts a facelift. New fences are scheduled to be installed prior to the 2015 season.

Iowa's baseball field was renamed Duane Banks Baseball Field in honor of the Hawkeyes' former head coach in 2001. Banks, the winningest coach in Iowa history, served as Iowa's head baseball coach from 1970-1997.

Banks Field was originally built in 1974. The 3,000-seat stadium had dimensions of 330 feet down the lines, 375 in the power alleys and 400 to centerfield before this year. That has decreased slightly and currently sits at 329 down the lines and 395 to centerfield.

In 2002, former Hawkeye and current Major Leaguer Cal Eldred donated \$245,000 to fund the installation of lights at Banks Field. It is the largest donation by a current professional athlete to Iowa Athletics.

The complex features locker rooms for both teams and umpires and a press box that was initially built in 1989 and renovated in 2002. It can accommodate several radio stations and up to 15 media members.

During inclement weather, the Hawkeyes can move to the Indoor Practice Facility, located directly behind home plate. The facility includes a full-size football field with field turf and it includes four full-size batting cages and five raised pitching mounds.

Duane Banks, following 28 years as Iowa's head baseball coach retired from coaching following the 1997 season.

Banks was inducted into the 2011 UI Hall of Fame. Banks led the Hawkeyes to its only College World Series appearance in 1972 and won Big Ten Championships in 1972 and 1990, as well as a share of the Big Ten crown in 1974. In 1981, Banks led Iowa to 44 wins, the most in school history. He earned Big Ten Conference and District Coach of the Year honors in 1990 and was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1991. Banks posted a career record of 901-585-4, while coaching six All-Americans, 31 all-Big Ten selections, 33 Academic All-Americans and 57 players who signed professional contracts. In the fall of 2001, Iowa's home field was officially designated as the Duane Banks Baseball Field.

In 1990, Banks led Iowa to a Big Ten title and to the NCAA playoffs for the first time since 1975. The 1990 squad won a record 22 Big Ten games and placed a record-tying five players (Tim Costo, John DeJarld, Chris Hatcher, Keith Noreen and Brian Wujick) on the all-Big Ten squad.

Many of his former Hawkeyes have earned pro contracts and five—Mike Boddicker, Cal Eldred, Jim Sundberg, Tim Costo and Jeff Jones—made it to the major leagues. Tim Costo was the eighth pick overall in 1990 draft, marking the second straight season Banks produced a first round draft choice. Eldred was selected in the first round by Milwaukee in 1989. Fifty-seven of Banks' former players signed pro contracts.



Banks served as an assistant coach for half a season at Iowa. The Hawkeyes won 14 of their final 27 games under his direction. Duane's next club won 28 games, at that time an Iowa record, in his first full campaign (1971).

Banks' 1972 team won Big Ten and District Four Championships to earn a berth in the College World Series, claiming Iowa's first outright Big Ten title in 33 years. As a result, Banks was named District Coach of the year.

Banks became Iowa's all-time winningest coach in 1985, passing Hall of Famer Otto Vogel, who won 440 games in 35 years. He joined the Iowa staff as an assistant coach in 1969, after serving in the same capacity at Colorado State. He spent two seasons at Parsons (IA) College, compiling a 91-10 mark in 1967-68. He was an assistant coach at Parsons in 1966.


Banks is a past president of the American Baseball Coaches Association and has held a number of administrative posts in the ABCA. He has served as chairman of the NCAA Division I coaches and as a representative of District Four. A member of the Hall of Fame and the Legislative Issues committees, Banks is a past member of the ABCA Board of Directors.

Banks was active in international baseball through the United States Baseball Federation. He took an all-star team to Canada, Japan and Korea in 1985 and coached another squad on a trip to Venezuela.

Banks and his Iowa team went to Holland in 1984 and he was on the staff of the USA college all-star team that played all over the world in 1982. He took an Iowa team to Mexico in the mid-1970s. A native of Grand Junction, CO, Banks played baseball and basketball at Northern Colorado. He was all-league and all-district three times in baseball at Northern Colorado and played on year of professional baseball with the Atlanta Braves organization in 1964.


Banks attended Mesa (CO) Junior College, received his bachelor's degree from Northern Colorado in 1965 and his master's degree from Colorado State in 1969.

The Iowa baseball program has a long history of former athletes competing on the professional level. More than 100 Iowa players have been sent into the pro ranks.

In 2013, Andrew Hanse (Tampa Bay Rays, 22nd round) and Matt Dermody (Toronto Blue Jays, 29th round) and recruit Kendall Coleman (New York Yankees, 11th round) were selected in the MLB Draft. Dermody went on to help lead the Vancouver Canadians to a Class A Short-Season Northwest League title after going 5-1 with a 1.77 ERA.

In 2012, two current -- Dermody and infielder Mike McQuillan -- and recruits Blake Hickman and Ryan Borucki were selected in the MLB Draft. It came on the heels of the 2011 Draft where Dermody along with recruits Derrick Loveless, Sasha Kuebel and Nick Hibbing were selected. Catcher Tyson Blaser also signed a minor league contract with the New York Yankees in 2011.

In 2010, relievers Zach Robertson and Patrick Schatz were drafted, as well as outfielder Kurtis Muller.

In 2009, three pitchers were drafted. Steve Turnbull signed with the Toronto Blue Jays, closer Mike Schurz was drafted to the Houston Astros and lefty Kyle Heim signed with the St. Louis Cardinals. Justin Toole later signed with the Cleveland Indians. In 2008, Caleb Curry and Kevin Hoef were each drafted. However, only Curry signed with the San Francisco Giants.

Toole gained national attention in 2012 when he played all nine positions in the same game for the Carolina Mudcats on Aug. 25. It was the first time it had happened in the minor leagues since 1994.

In 2007, Travis Sweet, Dusty Napoleon and Jason White each signed professional contracts-- Sweet with the Houston Astros, Napoleon with the Oakland Athletics and White with the Baltimore Orioles. In 2006, Tim Gudex inked with the Texas Rangers and Nate Price with the Chicago Cubs.

Two Hawkeyes were selected in the 2005 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Andy Lytle was taken by the Cleveland Indians, while Kris Welker was selected by the Chicago White Sox. Another pair of Hawkeyes signed free agent contracts, with Nate Yoho joining the Milwaukee Brewers organization and Jesse Brownell by the Colorado Rockies.

In 2004, first team All-Big Ten pitcher Nathan Johnson was selected by the Philadelphia Phillies in the MLB Draft.

Two Hawkeyes prolonged their 2003 baseball seasons at the professional level. Junior Kyle Thousand surrendered his final year of eligibility to pursue a professional career with the Toronto Blue Jays. The two-time All-Big Ten centerfielder was selected in the 26th round of Major League Baseball's amateur draft. Former Hawkeye MVP and right-handed pitcher Reed Pawelk signed a free-agent contract with the Florida Marlins following Iowa's 2003 season.

Four Hawkeyes were drafted by the major leagues after the 1999 season. Pitcher, Wes Obermueller was drafted in the second round by the Kansas City Royals, second baseman Brian Mitchell went in the 40th round to the Toronto Blue Jays and pitcher, Matt Sawvell signed a pro contract with the New York Mets.

Obermueller started the 2002 season as a member of the Wichita Wranglers, a Double-A affiliate of the Kansas City Royals, before being promoted to the parent club and making his Major League debut Sept. 20 against the Cleveland Indians. In 2003, Obermueller was traded to



the Milwaukee Brewers, where he won two games and struck out 34 hitters in 65 2/3 innings. He went 6-8 with a 5.80 ERA in 118 innings pitched in 2004 and 1-4 with a 5.26 ERA in 2005 before being traded to the Atlanta Braves in December, 2006. He spent 2007-09 playing professional in Japan.

Signed by the Tampa Bay Rays, hurler Jim Magrane set Iowa's single-season records for innings pitched (107.2) and strikeouts (110) during the 1999 season. Magrane pitched 13 seasons in professional baseball and was Tampa Bay Rays' organization Pitcher of the Year in 2000.

In 1998, Iowa infielder, Nate Frese, was drafted in the 10th round by the Chicago Cubs. He advanced to play for the Iowa Cubs, a Triple-A affiliate of the Cubs, before injuries forced him to retire.

In 1993, outfielder Bo Porter (bottom left) was drafted by the Chicago Cubs. During the 1999 season, Porter was brought up from the minors by the Cubs, seeing action in 24 games with starts in the outfield. Porter was the opening day centerfielder for the Texas Rangers during the 2001 season. Porter was hired as the manager of the Houston Astros in 2012.

Outfielder Chris Hatcher was drafted following the 1990 season. He has been a member of many minor league organizations, compiling a .275 batting average in 953 games. During the 1998 season, Hatcher was a member of the Kansas City Royals, where he saw action in eight games.

Tim Costo was a first-round draft pick of the Cleveland Indians in 1990 before being traded to Cincinnati. He spent the 1995 season at the Indians AAA class Buffalo team, playing in 105 games. He was also a member of the St. Louis and Toronto organizations.

Cal Eldred was a first-round draft pick by Milwaukee in 1989 and remained there until he was traded to the White Sox in 2000. In 1994, he had the honor of being the opening day pitcher, and led the American League in starts (25). Eldred made a name for himself in 1992 by going 11-2 for Milwaukee, winning 10 straight decisions. In 1993, he led the American League in innings pitched (258). After a two-year stint on the Chicago south side, Eldred signed a free-agent contact with the St. Louis Cardinals in 2003. In 2004, he was a key part of the Cardinal team that advanced to the World Series. Eldred is now the lead studio Big Ten baseball studio analyst for the Big Ten Network.

Mike Boddicker, a native of Norway, Iowa, earned All-Big Ten honors as a pitcher and infielder during Hawkeye career (1976-78). In 1983, he was named the American League "Rookie of the Year." After pitching in the major leagues for 11 years, Boddicker retired in 1993. He played for the Baltimore Orioles and Kansas City Royals. Jim McAndrew was selected by the New York Mets in the 11th round of the 1965 draft. The Lost Nation, Iowa, native pitched seven seasons in the major leagues, spending six years with the Mets (1968-73) and one season with the San Diego Padres (1974). He was a member of a World Series championship team, as the Mets won the 1969 title against the Baltimore Orioles. McAndrew tallied six wins for the Mets in 1969. McAndrew ended his professional career with a 37-53 career record that included a 10-win season in 1970 and a career-best 11-win season in 1972.

Former Hawkeye Bob Gebhard was the first general manager of the Colorado Rockies, leading the organization from 1992-99. Gebhard is currently the Arizona Diamondbacks as vice president and special assistant to the general manager.

DONALD W. & MARILYN HEINEKING BASEBALL SCHOLARSHIP

Don Heineking established the Donald W. and Marilyn Heineking Baseball Scholarship in 2004, with the first recipient to be named for the 2005-06 season. Don is a long-time supporter of Iowa athletics, a member of the Johnson County I-Club Board of Directors and member of the Iowa Scholarship Fund Board of Directors. In 2002, Don and Marilyn established scholarships in football and women's basketball. Then, in 2003, they added a wrestling scholarship and men's basketball manager's scholarship. Most recently, they added baseball, softball and volleyball scholarships.

Don lives in Iowa City and is a member of the President's Club of the UI Foundation. Marilyn passed away in February of 2004.

CAL ELDRED LIGHTS FUND

Cal Eldred lit up Hawkeye baseball once again, instead of employing his expert pitching, the former Major League Baseball star and his wife, Christi, made a gift to fund the installation of lights at Iowa's Duane Banks Field. The Cedar Rapids couple gave \$245,000 for the installation of lights at the baseball field named after Cal Eldred's former coach.

The gift, the largest ever from a current professional athlete's family to Iowa athletics, allowed the project to be completed in Sept. 2001. The Hawkeyes won the first night game played at Banks Field, April 10, 2002, against Northern Illinois, 11-9. The University of Iowa officially dedicated the lights Sat., April 13, 2002.

The Eldred's said their desire to give back to Iowa and to honor former Hawkeye coaches Duane Banks and Scott Broghamer -- who they said are their good friends and longtime mentors -- as reasons for making the gift. The gift was commemorated by a plaque at the field.

THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the *Fort Madison Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawkeye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.
Herky The Hawkeye

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.






