## Steve Houghton

Head Coach  
25th Season

Steve Houghton, the dean of Big Ten coaches, is in his 25th year as head coach of the Hawkeyes. He has compiled a career record of 271-272 (.499), recording the most wins of any coach in Iowa men's tennis history.

Since taking over the program in 1982, Houghton has led the Hawkeyes to 10 winning seasons - the last coming in 2002. His best season came in 1984 when Iowa won a school record 21 matches and finished fourth in the Big Ten Conference. Mike Inman and Sunil Reddy earned all-Big Ten honors. In 1989, Houghton was named NCAA Region IV Coach of the Year and picked up his 100th career dual win.

Houghton has coached many outstanding student-athletes at Iowa, including Tyler Cleveland, Claes Ramel and Martin Aguirre.

Cleveland became the first player in conference history to earn consecutive Big Ten Player of the Year awards in 2000 and 2001. He is only one of two Hawkeyes in school history to earn all-Big Ten honors all four years of his career (1998-2001). He was also the first men's tennis player to be named University of Iowa Male Athlete of the Year, earning the honor in 2000. Cleveland's other honors include 2001 Region IV ITA Farnsworth Senior Player of the Year, 2000 Big Ten Sportsman of the Year, 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, 1998 Region IV Rookie of the Year.

The doubles team of Ramel and Aguirre earned Iowa's first-ever national ranking, climbing to as high as 25th, by the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association. The duo became the first Hawkeyes to play at the NCAA Championships in 1989, breaking Iowa's 18-year absence from the tournament. They still hold the school record for best doubles record at No. 1 in a season (17-6).

He has coached two Davis Cup players at Iowa - Aguirre from Ecuador and Rudy Foo from Malaysia. Bryan Crowley won the Rolex Region IV championship in 1995 and was ranked first in regional singles action, before falling to career-hampering injuries.

Not only are Houghton's players students of the game, as their victories attest, but they are also students in the classroom. Houghton's players have consistently maintained a grade point average above 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale). Since the Big Ten started awarding academic all-conference honors in 1987, 69 Hawkeyes have earned the honor. Former Hawkeyes Ben Bamsey, Neil Denahan and Todd Shale were four-time award winners.

Houghton also had a successful playing career at Iowa, lettering three years and winning the No. 5 singles championship at the Big Ten meet. His career Big Ten singles record was 21-6, and his career winning percentage of .727 (40-15) is the second best in Iowa history.

The Hawkeye coach was a member of the 1971 Iowa tennis team that recorded a 3.53 team GPA, the highest of any NCAA team in any sport that year. That team also qualified for the NCAA meet after a third place Big Ten finish.

A member of the Iowa Tennis Hall of Fame, Houghton completed his sixth year as a member of the Region IV Ranking Committee. He is also involved with the Iowa City Tennis Association and has worked with the Iowa sports school's tennis program since its inception. He has also served on both the NCAA ranking and selection committees.

An Iowa City native, Houghton was a nationally ranked junior player at City High School. He earned his bachelor's (1971) and master's (1973) degrees from the University of Iowa.

Houghton was born January 9, 1949. Steve and his wife, Leora, have four children: Cari, Jeff, Jon and Scott.

Assistant Coach  
Fifth Season

Matt Brothers is in his fifth season as assistant coach of the Iowa men's tennis program. In just four seasons, Brothers has provided a significant impact on the team.

Brothers played two years at the University of Wisconsin – Green Bay before transferring and competing at Marquette University. He received numerous accolades including first team Mid-Continental Conference (1993-1994), UW-Green Bay team captain and MVP (1994), Marquette University team captain and MVP (1996), second team Conference USA (1995, 96) and the Marquette University Senior Leadership Award (1997).

In addition, Brothers has a wealth of post-college competitive experience, having played satellites, futures and prize money tournaments throughout Europe and the United States over the past six years. He plans on continuing to play the circuit as time allows.

While on tour, Brothers distinguished himself by earning a #1 ranking in doubles and a #3 ranking in singles in the Midwest Section in 1997. Perhaps even more impressively, he was ranked #4 in singles nationally (men's 25) in 2000 and 2001.

Brothers also has a strong background in the teaching/coaching arena. He has taught at all competitive levels in both Texas and Wisconsin. He has also coached on the collegiate level at the University of Wisconsin – Whitewater and Marquette.

"Matt adds a great deal to our program," said Head Coach Steve Houghton. "He is a student of the game, has successfully competed at both the collegiate and professional level and pushes our guys to be as good as they can be. He definitely knows what it takes."

Brothers, a native of Kenosha, WI, received his B.A. from Marquette in 1997.

Seventh Season

Frank Hess is in his seventh season with the Iowa men's tennis program. He served as an assistant coach for one season and a volunteer assistant for six.

Hess played No. 1 singles at Goshen College where he was the NAIA District singles runner-up during the 1985-86 seasons and champion in 1988. He was also the doubles runner-up in 1985. Hess recorded a career singles mark of 55-12 and set the Goshen College records for total career wins and career singles wins. He also received NAIA Academic all-America honors in 1988.

Hess graduated from Goshen College in 1988 with a B.A. in biology and English. He received his M.A. in 1995 and Ph.D. in 1999 in American Studies from the University of Iowa.

"Frank has done an outstanding job for us," said Head Coach Steve Houghton. "He has a vast overall understanding of the game and is particularly skilled as a technician."

Hess was born May 3, 1966. He is married to Vassiliki Tsitsopoulou.

## Iowa Men's Tennis Student-Athletes Achieve Academic Success

Academics have always been stressed by student athletes at the University of Iowa. In scheduling of both tennis meets and practice sessions, every attempt is made to insure a minimal number of missed classes.

The goal is to give each player the best opportunity to succeed in the classroom as well as on the court.

Since the Big Ten Conference began naming an all-academic team in 1987, 34 Hawkeyes have earned Iowa's 69 honors. Iowa has had three four-time honorees, nine three-time honorees, eight two-time honors and 14 players earned the honor once. Hawkeyes Scott Elwell, Chaitu Malempati and Aaron Schaechterle were the most recent additions, earning academic all-Big Ten honors in 2005. The tennis team has consistently set the pace for all men's athletic teams at Iowa in terms of team grade point average.

Iowa has also earned all-American status as a team for their academic achievement. The 2000-01 Hawkeyes were honored as a national academic team by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association, the only Big Ten school to receive that honor. Pete Rose led the team in grade point average with a 4.18.

The 1971 Iowa squad (which Coach Steve Houghton was a team member) posted a combined GPA of 3.53, the highest average of any NCAA team in any sport that year. That team also played in the national meet.

The academic success of the members of the Iowa tennis program is a long standing tradition - a tradition that the Iowa tennis program takes great pride in upholding.

## Iowa Men's Tennis Student-Athletes Garner Individual Honors

From 1987-2002, the Big Ten named a Sportsman of the Year for men's tennis. Starting in the 2003 season, the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award was created to encompass male and female student-athletes from all sports. Four Hawkeyes earned the original honor during its 16-year existence. They were Klas Bergstrom (1993), Marcus Ekstrand (1996), Tom Derouin (1997) and Tyler Cleveland (2000).

"The Sportsman of the Year Award was a great honor," said Iowa Coach Steve Houghton. "It was based both on a high level of competitive success and exemplary sportsmanship. As a coaching staff, we emphasize sportsmanship and are very proud to have dominated that selection those eight seasons."

Cleveland was the first player in Big Ten history to be named Big Ten Sportsman of the Year and Big Ten Athlete of the Year in the same season (2000). He was also the first student-athlete in conference history to have earned Big Ten Athlete of the Year honors in two consecutive seasons (2000, 2001). He was also named Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1998.

## Former Hawkeyes Enjoy Professional Success

Former Hawkeyes Stuart Waters and Tyler Cleveland are doing quite well on the professional circuit. Both have earned ATP points with Cleveland amassing 12 points after only four months on the tour and being named the USTA Pro Circuit Player of the Week in October. Both have had success in futures events and money tournaments.

After graduating from Iowa, Cleveland moved on to a job as a stock trader, but he returned to tennis as a pro in 2005. Since then he has made major strides in the USTA Pro Circuit. He swept both singles and doubles titles at a Futures event in Irvine, CA, and was ranked as high as 691 by the ATP, moving up nearly 700 places from where he started. Waters and Cleveland have wins over former top NCAA players, as well as ATP ranked international competitors. Cleveland defeated Jeremy Wurtzman, a former #1 ranked NCAA player from Ohio State.

Waters and Cleveland had stellar careers for the Hawkeyes earning multiple first-team all-Big Ten honors. Cleveland was selected Big Ten Player of the Year in 2000 and 2001.

## 2006 SEASON PREVIEW



### Four Seniors Spur Hawkeye Attack

The Hawkeyes have the luxury of returning every member from a squad that improved their win total by seven matches from the previous season. The 2005 roster features four seniors, all of them veterans of Big Ten play.

Chaitu Malempati returns for his final campaign after playing the last two seasons at the number one position in singles. The talented senior is Iowa's most experienced player and is ready for a breakout year.

Returning Team MVP Brett Taylor is poised for another great season after posting an impressive 18-12 singles record in his first year at Iowa. Taylor's 18 wins, along with his five conference victories, were both team highs. The junior college transfer also played the entire 2004-05 season at number one doubles.

Senior Kyle Markham looks to improve after spending the entire year playing number two singles and number one doubles in his first year of Big Ten action. Markham, a celebrated doubles player, will be counted on for major contributions in 2005-06.

Aaron Schaechterle also returns for his senior season after two years of Big Ten experience. The versatile senior moved up to number two doubles at the end of the 2005 season.

### Returning Letterwinners Continue To Improve

The Hawkeyes return juniors Jonny Hoak and Scott Elwell. Both look to have a more significant role. Hoak, who has played anywhere from number three to number six singles, is an experienced player who led the Hawkeyes in conference victories in 2004.

Iowa is counting on more contributions from its talented sophomore class. Sophomores J.P. Ritchie and Bart van Monsjou came in as freshmen and were instant fixtures at number three and number four singles, respectively. van Monsjou was second on the team in dual singles wins with 14, plus he saw significant time at number two doubles. Ritchie was one of Iowa's most effective doubles players, teaming with Aaron Schaechterle for a team-leading doubles record of 12-6. Mat Sawin is the third member of the sophomore class, and was redshirted last season.

### Newcomers To Make Immediate Impact

The freshman class is a strong one and all four have the ability to make immediate contributions. The class includes Christian Bierich (Landvetter, Sweden), Zach Frisch (Kansas City, MO), Walker Grimes (Chicago, IL) and Gregory Holm, from (Omaha, NE).

"Bierich brings a great deal of international tennis experience and is projected to play a significant role immediately," explained Houghton. "He is an outstanding baseliner who had tournament success this fall at the collegiate level."

"Frisch had a lot of success at the junior level and has carried it over into his fall performances at Iowa. He continues to improve. Grimes played a lot of tennis over the summer and also continues to improve. A serve-and-volley player, Walker is a particularly skilled doubles player and should challenge

for a singles position, as well. Holm also had a successful fall and will get better as he continues to evolve into an aggressive, all-court player."

### Keys to the Season

"We have a chance to have a really good season and continue to move up in the Big Ten," said Houghton. "We have a dedicated group of seniors who really want to finish on a high note. Sometimes seniors are looking ahead to other things in life, but this group seems very focused. They need to lead by example."

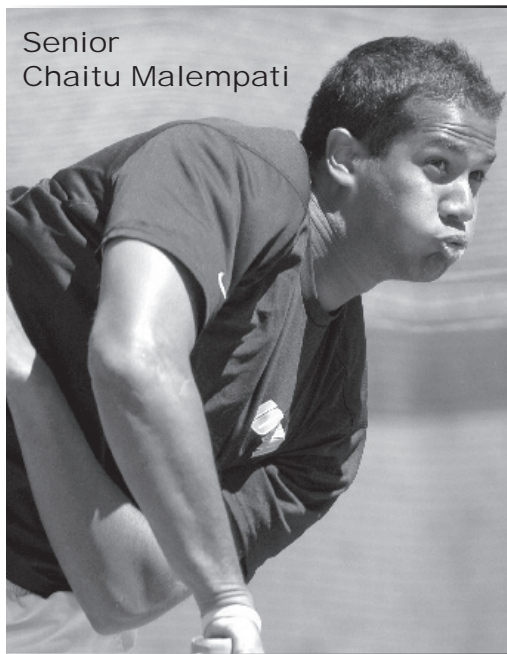
"The other returning players all need to take a big jump. They have the skills to do it and they know what it takes to be a successful Big Ten tennis player. The freshmen need to implement a fast learning curve. They are all very capable, but their success will

depend on learning quickly what it takes, and getting out of their comfort zones and doing it. This is as hard-working of a team as I've had the past few years. They are also 'engaged' in the whole enterprise. I'm confident that those characteristics will take us a long way."

### The Big Ten Race

The Big Ten is clearly one of the top conferences in the country and has been for a number of years.

"If anything, the conference will be stronger from top to bottom this year," explained Houghton. "Illinois, Ohio State and Minnesota figure to be the top contenders, but there is no such thing as an easy Big Ten win."

## Hawkeyes Tie for Ninth in the Big Ten

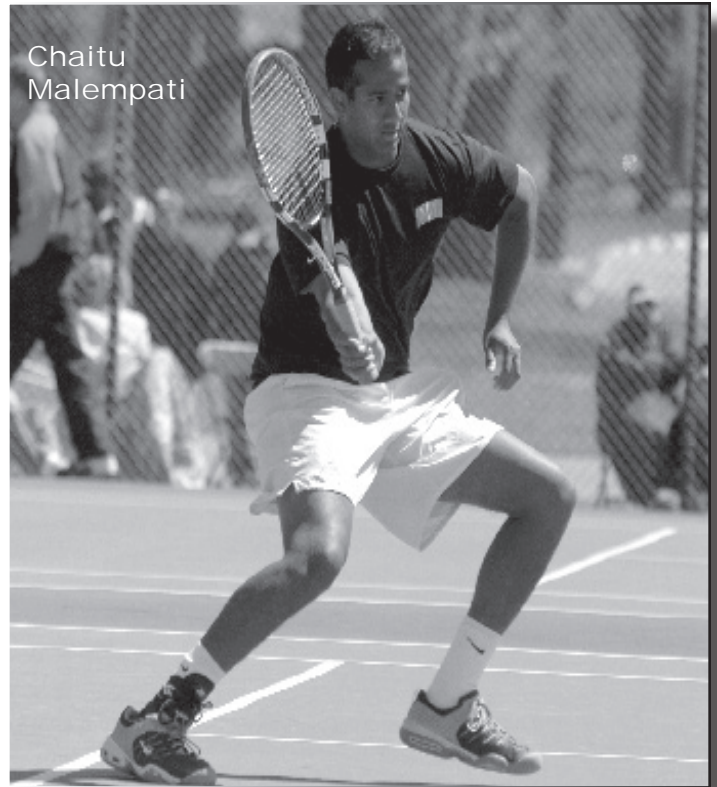
In a year in which over half of the roster was composed of newcomers, the Iowa men's tennis team responded well to the challenge and finished the season with 10 overall wins and a ninth place finish in the Big Ten Conference. Iowa almost broke through in the Big Ten Tournament, losing to eighth-seeded Michigan State in a match where the Hawkeyes had leads in the doubles matches.

With a lineup that did not feature a single senior, Iowa was led in singles competition by juniors Chaitu Malempati (No. 1) and Kyle Markham (No. 2). Freshmen J.P. Ritchie (No. 3) and Bart van Monsjou (No. 4), junior Brett Taylor (No. 5), and sophomore Jonny Hoak (No. 6) rounded out the Hawkeye singles lineup. Junior Aaron Schaechterle also saw time in singles play. Markham and Taylor were fixtures at No. 1 doubles, followed by Schaechterle and Malempati at No. 2 and Ritchie and van Monsjou at No. 3.

"Even though we're not yet where we want to be, I think we made significant progress during the 2005 season," said Head Coach Steve Houghton. "We won seven more matches than the previous year and moved up two places in the final Big Ten standings. We were very, very young, with only two starters who had much Big Ten experience."

## Taylor and Malempati Lead Hawkeye Attack

Team MVP Brett Taylor excelled in his first season at Iowa, pacing the Hawkeyes with 18 overall victories, five confer-

ence wins, and posting the team's top winning percentage (.600). After starting the year 9-1 at No. 6 singles, Taylor was bumped up to the No. 5 spot, where he went 5-6. In doubles competition at the No. 1 position, Taylor teamed with Kyle Markham to post an overall 13-19 record. Markham and Taylor advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2004 ITA Regional Tournament where they were ousted by the 17th-ranked duo of Ryler Deheart and GD Jones of Illinois.

Chaitu Malempati continued to be a stalwart in the Hawkeye lineup. Playing in his second season at the No. 1 singles position, Malempati posted an 8-13 dual record, including a victory over 93rd-ranked Paul Rose of Purdue.

## Freshmen Make Immediate Impact

Freshmen Bart van Monsjou and J.P. Ritchie made impressive debuts as Hawkeyes. van Monsjou ranked second on the team in singles wins with his 14-18 overall record after playing the entire season at No. 4. He also posted a 17-13 record in doubles competition. Ritchie stepped right into the Hawkeyes lineup, registering a 9-13 dual mark at No. 3 singles. He also led Iowa with 19 doubles victories, going 12-6 with Schaechterle, where they teamed up for a record of 12-6.

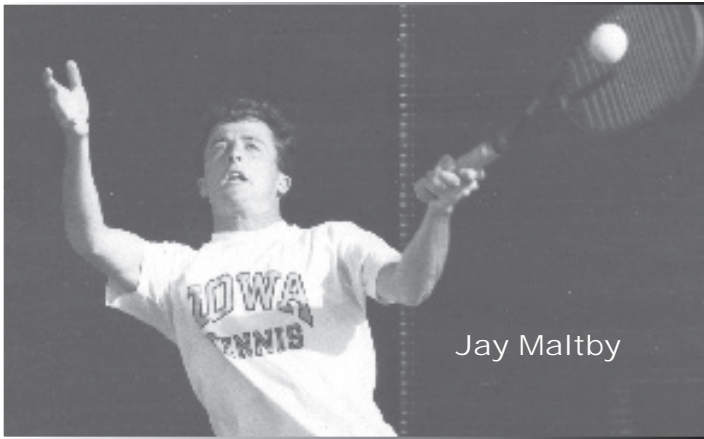

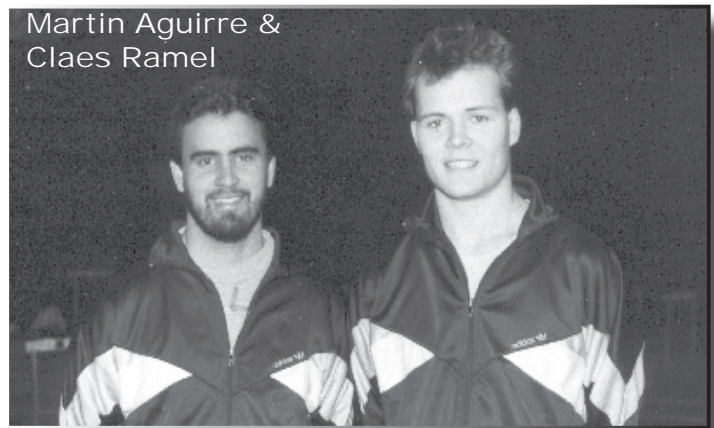

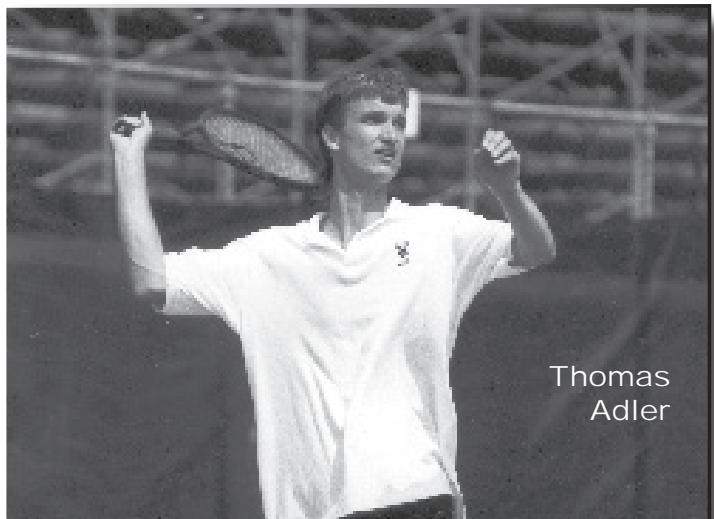

**Dr. David Skorton**  
University President

David J. Skorton was appointed the 19th president of The University of Iowa on March 1, 2003. He has been a faculty member at the University since 1980. He holds joint appointments at the rank of professor in the Departments of Internal Medicine, Electrical and Computer Engineering, and Biomedical Engineering. President Skorton was appointed vice president for research in 1992 and, additionally, interim vice president for external relations in 2000. He served as vice president for research and external relations from March 2002 until he assumed the presidency. He also continued his role as a physician, caring for adolescents and adults with in-born heart disease.

Co-founder and co-director of the UI Adolescent and Adult Congenital Heart Disease Clinic at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics, President Skorton has focused his research on congenital heart disease in adolescents and adults, cardiac imaging, and computer image processing. His research was supported by the National Institutes of Health, the Department of Veteran Affairs, the American Heart Association and by private industry. He has published numerous articles, reviews, book chapters, and two major texts in the areas of cardiac imaging and image processing. He has served in a variety of administrative positions at The University of Iowa, including director of the Cardiovascular Image Processing Laboratory (1982-1996), director of the Division of General Internal Medicine (1985-1989), and associate chair for clinical programs in the Department of Internal Medicine (1989-1992).

A national leader in research ethics, President Skorton is charter past-president of the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, Inc., the first entity organized specifically to accredit human research protection programs. He has served on the boards and committees of many national organizations, including the American College of Cardiology, the American Heart Association, the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine, the American Society of Echocardiography, the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, the Association of American Universities, the Council on Competitiveness, and the Korea America Friendship Society.

President Skorton is actively engaged in service to the community and to the state of Iowa, particularly in regional and state economic development. He served on and chaired the Iowa City Area Development Group, served on the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce Priority One Advisory Committee and the Technology Corridor Committee, and currently serves on the Cedar Rapids Symphony Orchestra Board of Directors. He is also a member of the Iowa Business Council and had served on the Iowa Department of Economic Development Board, the Governor's Life Sciences Advisory Committee, and the Iowa Research Council, of which he was president from 1999-2001.

President Skorton earned his bachelor's degree in psychology in 1970 and an M.D. in 1974, both from Northwestern University. Following a medical residency and cardiology fellowship at The University of California, Los Angeles, he came to The University of Iowa in 1980 as an instructor. He was named assistant professor of internal medicine in 1981 and assistant professor of electrical and computer engineering in 1982. He was promoted to associate professor in 1984 and to professor in 1988.

As a musician, Dr. Skorton worked as a professional jazz and R&B musician in the Chicago area. He has continued to study saxophone and flute in Iowa City and hosts a weekly program, "As Night Falls-Latin Jazz," on KSUI, the University's public FM radio station.



**Robert Bowsby**  
Director of Athletics

Director of Athletics Bob Bowsby is in his 15th year as the head of the University of Iowa intercollegiate athletics program.

As the chief administrator for Iowa's athletic department, Bowsby has earned a reputation as one of the most respected, energetic and ambitious athletic administrators in the nation. Over the past five years, Bowsby has guided and supervised the merger of the women and men's athletics departments. The

combined entity encompasses 24 varsity sports and an annual budget in excess of \$50 million.

As the head of Iowa athletics, Bowsby has been involved in the hiring of new head coaches in football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball, swimming and wrestling, enabling Iowa to maintain its standing as one of the most visible, successful and progressive departments in college athletics.

A Waterloo native, Bowsby became Iowa's 10th Athletic Director in June, 1991, after serving in the same role at the University of Northern Iowa since 1984. He previously served as Assistant Athletic Director for Facilities at Northern Iowa.

Bowsby earned his bachelor's degree from Moorhead State University (Minnesota) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named Bowsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and Sports Business Journal selected him from the four regional award winners as the National Athletics Director of the Year. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities. Bowsby was part of a 15-member commission on Opportunities in Athletics headed by US Secretary of Education, Rod Paige.

Bowsby served as chair of the NCAA Wrestling Committee and has served on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics. Bowsby just ended a five-year term on the NCAA Division I Basketball Tournament Committee, serving as committee chairman two years (2004 & 2005). The committee selects, seeds, brackets and manages all rounds of the NCAA Basketball Tournament, including the Final Four.

Bob has served as an Executive Committee member with both the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association and served in 2002-03 as President of the I-A Directors group.

Bowsby was also elected chair of the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee and represented the NCAA as one of two voting members on the United States Olympic Committee. Bowsby also was appointed by former United States Olympic Committee President LeRoy Walker to the NCAA/USOC Liaison Committee, chaired by George Steinbrenner and former NCAA President Cedric Dempsey. Bob has also served as a member of the Board of Governors for the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.

Bowsby is a charter member of the Iowa Olympics Committee and a current member of the Board of Directors of the Iowa Games. Bob is a board member of the Iowa Scholarship Fund, Inc. and a Board member on the Honda Awards program, which recognizes our nation's top female collegiate athletes each year.

He and his wife, Candice, have four children, Lisa, Matt, Rachel and Kyle. Bowsby was born Jan. 10, 1952.



## ACADEMIC STUDENT SERVICES



Since its inception in 1979, Athletics Student Services has evolved from a two-person, academic support service to a broad-based, nationally prominent student support services operation. Its purpose is to assist student athletes to become tomorrow's leaders by offering academic and personal support services to assist them in making timely and satisfactory progress toward their degrees.

Athletic Student Services focuses on four important areas — academic counseling and monitoring, educational and support programs, retention programs and compliance services — when working with student-athletes. Following are descriptions of some of the programs, services and opportunities available to student-athletes in those areas.

#### Athletics Learning Center

The \$4.6 million Russell A. and Ann Gerdin Athletics Learning Center opened in 2003 and gives all Iowa student-athletes a state of the art facility to help them with their educations.



The Athletics Learning Center is a multi-level, 20,000 square foot facility which will provide a computer center, study areas, classes and meeting places for all Hawkeye student-athletes. It features an auditorium that converts into two classrooms, separate study rooms for under and upper-class student-athletes that feature 28 study carrels, a computer lab, five tutorial rooms, the book loan repository, office space for Iowa's Student Services staff and a display area to recognize the academic accomplishments of Iowa's student-athletes.

**Academic Counseling & Monitoring**  
Athletics coordinators work closely with student-athletes and their university-assigned advisors from the time they arrive on campus until the time they leave the University. Along with focusing on academic planning matters such as goal-setting, plans of study, choosing majors and degree requirements, athletics coordinators also help student-athletes understand NCAA, Big Ten and University academic policies. They also solicit feedback from instructors on academic progress made by student-athletes.

#### Retention

A full-time staff member directs the retention program, which identifies student-athletes who may need tailored academic assistance and structure, and implements individualized learning plans to help them succeed. Such plans may include daily and weekly planning sessions with athletics coordinators and retention staff, tutoring, study groups, mainstreaming into on-campus services like the writing center, math labs and services for students with learning disabilities.

#### Transition Seminar

All new student-athletes attend an eight-week transition seminar during the fall semester that is geared toward helping them make the transition from high school to college successfully. Seminar topics include time management skills, learning and study strategies, the culture and rules of the university, and life skills concerning alcohol and other substances, relationships and intimacy, diversity, tolerance, values and character.



#### Tutoring

Tutoring is available free of charge to all student-athletes. Tutors, who are post-graduates and teachers, help with course content as well as study strategies and are available in virtually all general education program subjects.

#### CHAMPS/Life Skills

Life skills programs are conducted throughout the year with and for student athletes on quality of life issues critical to personal growth, such as personal accountability, responsible use and nonuse of alcohol, diversity and gambling.

#### Minority Enrichment Program

This program offers a culturally supportive environment in which minority student-athletes have the opportunity to develop friendships and a support network in the university. A core focus group of students and staff coordinate programs such as guest speakers, holiday celebrations, community service activities with the local neighborhood centers, events with Cultural Centers and networking with minority faculty, staff, professional and business leaders.

**Career Guidance & Development**  
Planning a meaningful career and a fulfilling life is an ongoing process of expanding and narrowing choices, beginning when student-athletes arrive on campus and continuing throughout their college career and lifetime. The professional staff works with other career development professionals on campus to offer individual consultation, career development seminars, workshops, referrals to other campus offices and special events like the Senior Recognition Banquet for graduating student-athletes.

#### Compare the Numbers

Iowa's student-athletes have outperformed the University's entire student population each year since the NCAA started requiring a report of student-athlete graduation rates.





### Strength and Conditioning

The University of Iowa has two 2,000-square-foot facilities for strength and conditioning training of Olympic sport athletes. One facility is located in Carver-Hawkeye Arena and the other is located in the Recreation Building. Each facility has eight squat racks, eight Olympic platforms, multiple physio- and medicine balls, padded plyometric boxes and over 10,000 pounds of free weights. Iowa Strength and Conditioning staff Bill Maxwell, David Marmon and Damon Davis oversee the programs.

The major goals of the University of Iowa strength and conditioning program are the enhancement of athletic performance while reducing the risk of injury through a progression of free weight, multi-joint exercises. Those goals are achieved through Olympic lifts, squats, plyometrics, medicine ball and physioball exercises. These multi-joint movements improve synchronization of movement, intramuscular coordination and stabilizer muscle groups.

### Athletic Training

Continuing to set the standard in Sports Medicine Service, The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available.

Services from the UI Hospitals and Clinics, among the world's largest university-owned teaching hospitals, support the efforts of a dedicated sports medicine staff. Located next to Kinnick Stadium, the hospital creates a cutting-edge environment where staff physicians, interns, and residents can care for student-athletes with successful outcomes. Dedicated research and education result in outstanding care.

Athletic Training Services connect student-athletes to the various resources and specialty areas. Iowa's staff of 10 full-time athletic trainers are committed to providing quality health care, injury rehabilitation programs, and prevention programs. With physical conditioning as one of the major components of a prevention program, the athletic trainers work closely with strength coaches to pave the way for safe and effective participation.

### Carver-Hawkeye Arena Training Room

The recently remodeled Carver-Hawkeye Arena (CHA) training room is one of the most modern, respected facilities in the nation. Traditional therapies include whirlpools, hot and cold units, rehabilitation weights, pulleys, and machines. Other therapeutic equipment available for athletes include ultrasound, electrical stimulation, traction, and external compression units. Also available are such unique optional equipment as the CYBEX 6000 (isokinetic exercise and testing device). Preparation activities, medical care and rehabilitation are provided for the basketball, softball, field hockey, volleyball, golf, and wrestling teams.

### Jacobson Training Room

Jacobson training room is used primarily by the football team for rehabilitation, treatment and team preparation. The facility features a lap pool, treadmill, CYBEX weight equipment, Biodex isokinetic machine, Fastex, slide board, surface floors, two stairmasters, five bikes and six whirlpools.

### The Fieldhouse Training Room

The Fieldhouse training room is used by the Hawkeye swimming and diving, gymnastics and rowing teams, along with the cheer squad. It supports medical care with ultrasound, whirlpools, hot and cold packs, high-voltage galvanic stimulation, electrical stimulation, and T.E.N.S.

### Recreation Building Training Room

The Recreation Building training room is used by the Hawkeye baseball, cross country, track, tennis and soccer teams. It supports medical care with ultrasound, whirlpools, hot and cold packs, high-voltage galvanic stimulation, electrical stimulation, and T.E.N.S.

### LIBERAL ARTS & SCIENCES

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) and Science (B.S.) in 58 major fields; Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A) in Music (B.M.) and of Liberal Studies (B.L.S.).

Admission - Freshmen and transfer students are to meet the college's admissions requirements.

### ENGINEERING

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Science in Engineering (B.S.E.) in six majors - biomedical, chemical, civil, electrical, industrial, and mechanical.

Admission - Students must meet the college's high admissions requirements.

### BUSINESS

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) in six majors: accounting; economics; finance; management and organizations; management science; and marketing.

Admission - Students must satisfactorily complete two years of pre-business study in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

### EDUCATION

Teacher Education Programs - Elementary education, art education, English education, foreign language education, mathematics education, music education, science education and social studies education. Additional teaching minors in coaching, ESL (English as a second language), hearing impaired, journalism, and talented and gifted.

### NURSING

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.)

### PHARMACY

Undergraduate Degrees Offered - Six-year Pharm.D. degree

Admission - Students must successfully complete pre-pharmacy course work in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. As well, students must take the PCAT (Pharmacy College Admission Test) during October of their freshman year.

## GRADUATE & PROFESSIONAL DEGREES

Many student-athletes who have attended The University of Iowa and completed their undergraduate degrees continue their education at the University.

Student-athletes who attend graduate or professional school must first complete course work toward a bachelor's degree in their field of study. The University also offers undergraduates the opportunity to participate in research and overseas study programs, as well as internships that will help prepare them for graduate school.

## RESIDENCE

Ninety percent of freshmen choose to live in one of the University's 10 residence halls. Each team has its own rules regarding residence of incoming freshmen. Most student-athletes live at least two years on campus.

The University residence halls provide students full-service dining rooms, study lounges, laundry facilities, recreational facilities, as well as vending and bank machines. Wireless networking is offered in 32 buildings and several outdoor areas, providing more than 170 access points across campus. Residence hall rooms currently have high-speed ethernet connections that give students free e-mail and Internet access in their rooms.

## LIBRARIES

The University of Iowa's library system is the largest in the state and has over 4 million volumes. Students also have access to the collections of other libraries throughout the Big Ten Conference via computer network. Besides the Main Library, The University has 12 departmental libraries: Art Library, Biological Sciences Library, Business Library, Chemistry-Botany Library, Engineering Library, Geology Library, Hardin Library for the Health Sciences, Mathematical Sciences Library, Rita Benton Music Library, Physics Library, Psychology Library and Law Library.

## COMPUTERS

There are 26 Instructional Technology Centers all over the campus which are filled 1,200 computers. These facilities are open at least 50 hours a week. Some are open 24 hours. Also, the Information Arcade in the Main Library provides a variety of specialized computing tools. The Computer Demo Center provides information for students who want to purchase computers and software.

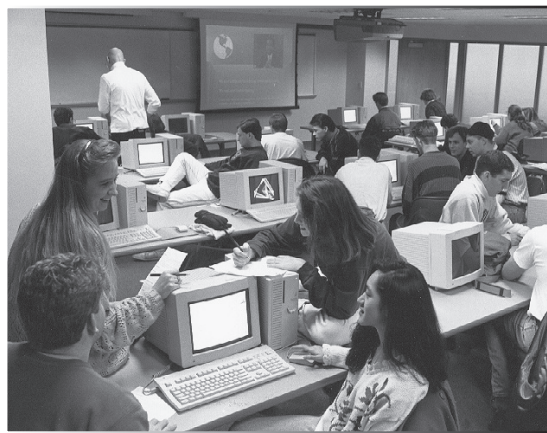
## CAREER DECISIONS

## SKILLS LABS

The University provides Skills Labs to help students improve a variety of skills necessary to succeed at Iowa: writing, reading, speaking, science, note taking, time management, test taking and foreign languages.



## HEALTH SERVICES

The University of Iowa provides the student-athlete with the most up-to-date and highest-quality medical care available. Students at Iowa can go to Student Health Services, which is open six days a week. Student Health Services is supported by a fee paid by all full-time students. It offers students unlimited free office visits (there is a charge for other procedures done in the office such as blood tests).

## CULTURAL CENTERS

There are three houses on campus that offer students from different ethnic backgrounds a place to congregate, the Latino and Native American Cultural Center, the Afro American Cultural Center and the Asian Pacific American Cultural Center.

## CAMBUS

There are six bus routes throughout the Iowa campus. The University Cambus provides over four million free rides to class and to the dorms for students each year. Some routes run seven days a week, and some run until 2:30 a.m. Cambus also operates a specialized transportation service for persons with disabilities.



## THE IOWA CITY COMMUNITY



Iowa City is a diverse, highly cosmopolitan community of 60,000 set in the natural scenic beauty of Iowa's rolling hills and woods along the tree-lined banks of the Iowa River. 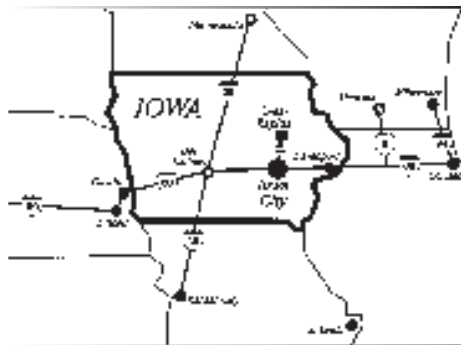

Economically, businesses such as Rockwell Collins, American College Testing and Procter & Gamble help keep the city booming. In Coralville, a branch office of Geico Auto Insurance has provided many residents with employment opportunities.

Culturally, Iowa City is alive with concerts, art exhibits, readings, plays and art events of all kinds. Located on the University of Iowa campus, Hancher Auditorium is a nationally-known performance center that brings in the best of Broadway, classical and jazz music, dance and other performances. The University of Iowa Theater Arts department also produces a full schedule of plays each year, featuring the work of student performers and directors. So whether you enjoy the arts as a spectator or as an outlet for your own creativity, Iowa City has the opportunities.

Residents of Iowa City are not only economically and culturally enriched, they also take advantage of the numerous recreational facilities offered around town. The area's more than 30 parks provide opportunities for year-round activities including boating, hiking, swimming, fishing and skiing.

The city's greatest charm, however, remains the sincere friendliness of its citizens, the cosmopolitan atmosphere and the successful partnership built between the community and the University.



Iowa City is located in eastern Iowa and is an easy trip to such cities as Des Moines (the capital of Iowa), Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, and Minneapolis. Also, Cedar Rapids, a city of more than 150,000, is just a short drive north of Iowa City. The Eastern Iowa Airport, which links residents to every major airport in the Midwest, nation and world, is only 20 minutes away.

## OLD CAPITOL

One of the most recognizable sites in Iowa City is the gold dome of the Old Capitol which is situated in the heart of downtown. Built in 1840, it is Iowa City's most historic building. The Old Capitol was the site of the first governor inauguration as well as the first six Iowa General Assemblies. It is also where the state's Constitution was drafted. When the capital was moved to Des Moines in 1857, the Old Capitol was dedicated to The University of Iowa, becoming the first building owned by the University.

## CORALVILLE LAKE

Just north of Iowa City is Coralville Lake, an outdoor recreational area that offers a variety of opportunities for the public. Coralville Lake offers picnic shelters, biking, hiking, fishing, boating, swimming, hunting, camping, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, golf and disc golf.

## PEDESTRIAN MALL

Located downtown and in walking distance of many of the University's dormitories is the Pedestrian Mall. It is a perfect place to sit outside and study or hang out with friends. During the fall, spring and summer months there are concerts and art festivals in the Pedestrian Mall.

## CORAL RIDGE MALL

The Coral Ridge Mall is a 1.2-million-square-foot shopping center located just minutes from the UI campus. The center combines a mix of over 120 specialty shops and strong department stores including Dillard's, JC Penney, Sears, Target and Younger's. Coral Ridge also offers entertainment features such as an NHL-regulation-sized indoor ice arena, state-of-the-art 10-screen movie theatre and a large carousel along with a 1,000-seat food court with sit-down restaurants. Specialty stores include Abercrombie & Fitch, Barnes & Noble, Gap, Old Navy, Scheels All Sports and Pier 1 Imports.

## THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago.

The name Hawkeye was originally the name of the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawkeye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

## HERKY THE HAWKEYE

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa.

The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a state-wide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 45 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.

## SCHOOL COLORS

For 40 years Iowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide what are now the school official colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of Iowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.



## SCHOOL FIGHT SONG

The Iowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, Iowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's *"The Music Man,"* Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of Iowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletics events the year around.
