



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
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Wellbeing



The wellbeing of our community, is characterised by the health, happiness and prosperity of people and the opportunity for individuals and communities to flourish and fulfil their potential.

Wellbeing is impacted by many factors such as access to food and health care, participation in work, income and education, affordable and healthy spaces to live, connectiveness to others, and liveability of the community.



Five Priorities

To focus council's direction, this council has developed five priorities.


- A city that is easy to live in
- A city where our people thrive
- A central city people love to be
- A fun city with lots to do
- A green city.
- These priorities set the direction of where council can influence, collate, partner and deliver in actions that will improve the social, economic, environment and culture wellbeing of our community.



Connecting wellbeing and our priorities







- Wellbeing indicators: How we track the wellbeing of Hamiltonians
- Five priorities indicators: How we track delivery towards the five priorities
- Service performance measures: Are we delivering on our commitments to the community
- Operational indicators: Technical measures used by the business to keep track of how we are doing
- Discussion: how do we tell the story of the change in the indicators



How to include in our decision making

- To provide information to assist council decision making, it is proposed in council reports that:
 - Explain how this decision delivers to one of the five priorities and how this impacts the dimensions of wellbeing
 - Identify the impact this decision will have on specific indicators
 - This may be specific eg an investment of \$6 million in a pool cover will increase the number of visitors at pools by 5% over the winter
 - This may be holistic eg an investment of \$6 million in a pool cover provides additional recreational space which contributes towards intervention options to address obesity rates



Targets – should we have targets

At this stage no targets have been set for the wellbeing and priority indicators. The Long-Term Plan measures included within the priority indicators have targets.

Wellbeing indicators are indicators of the wellbeing of the community. Other wellbeing reports such as Momentums Vital Signs and the Salvation Army's State of the Nation do not have targets they focus on progress and resulted directional trend. Both groups talk about the purpose of their reporting being to inform and promote debate and discussion about our progress towards greater wellbeing.

Staff recommend Hamilton City Council adopts the same approach and the wellbeing report focuses on the narrative in relation to Hamilton City and incorporates the indicators as trend indicators.
