Te Ao Maaori - The Maaori World

Maaori are the tangatawhenua or people of the land. The term emphasises the relationship of Maaori to a particular area of the land where they have ancestral connections. In Hamilton Kirikiriroa, 20% of the population identifies as Maaori.

The Maaori language and tikanga (customs, rules and regulations) provide the foundation for Maaori culture. Tikanga sets the codes of conduct for all situations, including important events such as the welcome on a marae, or everyday interactions with people that make Maaori who they are.

Learning a few basic words of Te Reo is a great way of understanding Maaori and the New Zealand culture. Please note that Waikato Tainui uses double vowels instead of a macron to make their vowel sounds longer. In other areas of Aotearoa New Zealand, you may see these words spelled differently.

History of Maaori in Kirikiriroa Hamilton

Timeline

Pre-European

The area has a history of 700–800 years of Maaori occupation and settlement. Hamilton was originally known as Kirikiriroa and was a large paa (settlement) located on the western side of the Waikato River.

1830-1850

This was a relatively peaceful period when Maaori and settlers (Paakehaa) lived and traded with each other. Waikato tribes grew and shipped large amounts of produce (wheat, pigs, maize, fruit and vegetables) as well as dressed flax to Auckland for both the local and international markets.

1863

The New Zealand Settlement Act enabled land to be taken from Maaori by the Crown. This resulted in 12,000 km² of land being confiscated in the Waikato region, and part of this land provided the basis for European settlement in Hamilton Kirikiriroa.

1800s

Between the 1400s and up until the invasions of the 1860s several hapuu of Tainui ancestry settled and occupied the area we know today as Hamilton Kirikiriroa. Many paa and mara (gardens) featured along the Waikato River which acted as the main transport corridor to Auckland. Today, Ngaati Maahanga, Ngaati Tamainupo, Ngaati Wairere, Ngaati Korokii Kahukura and Ngaati Hauaa are regarded as the mana whenua of Hamilton Kirikiriroa.

1858

The first Maaori King, Pootatau Te Wherowhero, was appointed. This was the beginning of the kiingi movement (Kiingitanga) and its centralisation within the Waikato.

1860s

Invasion of the Waikato occurred during 1863 and 1864, starting near Mercer, with the final battle occurring near Te Awamutu.

1976

More than 10% of Kirikiriroa/Hamilton inhabitants (9077 of 87,968 people) were recorded as Maaori.

2011

Several food storage pits (rua) were found near the Waikato River, close to the Waikato Museum.

2013

20% of Hamilton Kirikiriroa residents identified themselves as Maaori.

2018

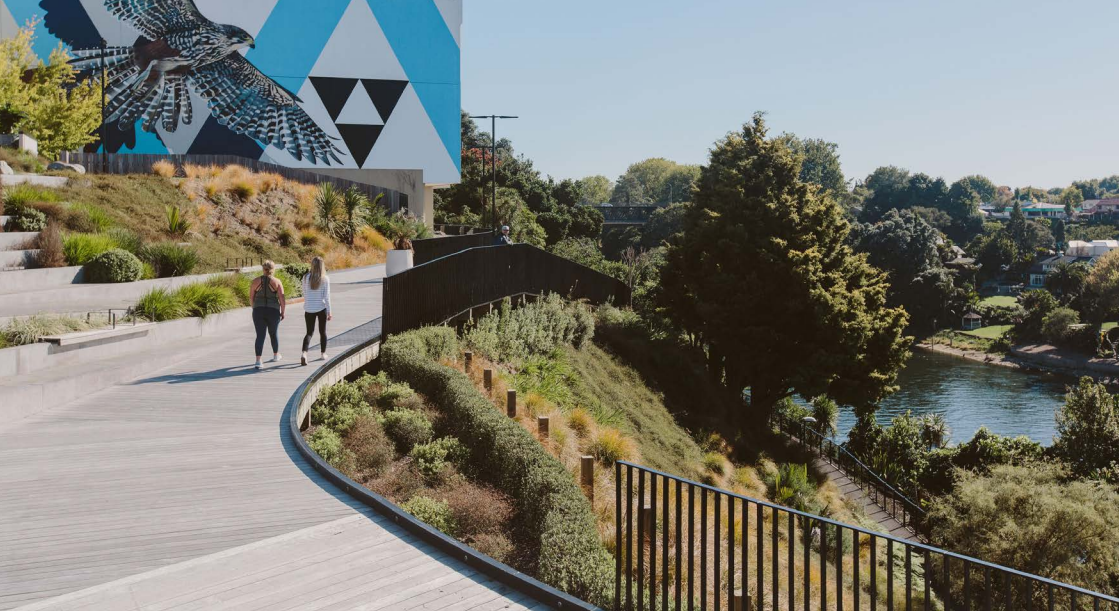
23.7% of Hamilton Kirikiriroa residents identified themselves as Maaori.

1936

Only 194 Maaori were recorded among the overall population of 16,150 people living in Kirikiriroa/Hamilton.

1995

Following a long period of negotiation over recompense for land losses in the 1800s, Waikato-Tainui signed a deed of settlement with the Crown, giving the tribe an estimated \$170 million in land and cash. This settlement made its iwi one of the most significant economic players in the region.



About Hamilton Kirikiriroa

The gateway to the central North Island, Hamilton, or Kirikiriroa in Māori, is New Zealand's largest inland city, sitting on the banks of the Waikato River. The river flows for 16km through the city with the eastern and western suburbs on either side.

Hamilton is at the centre of one of the richest agricultural and pastoral areas in the world. Dairy industry is centred around Hamilton and Waikato – a world-class centre of agricultural biotech excellence. The city is within a two-hour drive of two of the country's main sea ports (Auckland and Tauranga) and Auckland International Airport (New Zealand's major inbound and outbound airport).

Fast facts

- The city area is about 110km²
- About 169,000 people call Hamilton Kirikiriroa home (Stats NZ, June 2019).
- Hamilton remains the youngest of New Zealand's 67 territorial authorities by median age, with an average age of 32.3 years.
- New Zealand Europeans make up three quarters of the population with 19% Māori.
- The city is home to 160 ethnicities making up about 20% of the population.
- Indian, Chinese, Samoan, Filipino and Tonga are the major ethnic groups identified.
- The climate is mild and moderate year round and the rainfall keeps the city and surrounding areas very green.
- The city has more than 11.6km² of open space with 145 parks and gardens, 80 playgrounds, and 63 sports areas.
- Hamilton has three major events venues – FMG Stadium Waikato, Seddon Park, and Claudelands Event Centre.
- Hamilton Gardens attracts more than a million visitors each year and was listed as a Best of the Best destination by TripAdvisor in 2023.

Your Council

Hamilton City Council is here to make Hamilton a great place to live, work and play. Understanding how Hamilton is governed and managed gives you the opportunity to easily find information and allows you to get involved in decision-making.

Council has two separate components: the Elected Members comprised of the Mayor and the Councillors, who are elected for a three-year term of office, and the corporate body who are the administrators (staff).

Hamilton City Council is your point of contact for:

- building permits
- community safety, hygiene, noise and dog control
- liquor licenses
- local business development
- rubbish and recycling
- water supply
- open spaces including parks, gullies, lakes, and town squares
- community facilities like libraries
- community groups

Rubbish and recycling

Hamilton Kirikiriroa has four bins provided to each house by Council - rubbish (red lid), recycling (yellow lid), food scraps (green lid), and glass (green crate).

While food scraps are collected every week, your rubbish bin and your recycling and glass bins alternate fortnightly. You can find out which day to put which bins out at fightthelandfill.co.nz, or call 0800 101 010 for free.

Get involved

The Elected Members of Hamilton City Council hold regular meetings to discuss topics relating to aspects of Hamilton life. The calendar, agenda, and minutes, and how to apply to speak at a meeting can be found at hamilton.govt.nz/meetings.

Council regularly calls for community feedback on projects at hamilton.govt.nz/haveyoursay.

Local elections

In the local body elections, people vote for those they want to manage the running of the city. Local body elections are held every three years.

Hamiltonians cast their votes using the Standard Transferable Vote (STV) method. This means that voters will rank the candidates in order of preference rather than ticking the candidates they are voting for. Hamilton City Council also introduced the Maaori Ward in the last elections. Voters on the Maaori roll voted for candidates contesting two (2) Maaori wards.

Welcoming Communities Plan

This is Hamilton City Council's commitment to lead collaborative efforts to develop a Welcoming Plan. This plan will follow the Welcoming Communities Standard and ensure our city is more open and accepting, building on existing efforts to embrace cultural diversity and inclusion.

Welcoming Communities is an initiative of Immigration New Zealand (INZ) in collaboration with the Ministry for Ethnic Communities, Department of Internal Affairs, and the Human Rights Commission. The initiative aims to help anyone new to the city feel more supported and included.

In 2020, Hamilton City Council applied to be a part of the Welcoming Communities Initiative, with our application being accepted in 2021.

On 1 April 2022, Council and Te Haa o te Whenua o Kirikiriroa signed a commitment to support Welcoming Communities, and we launched Council's Welcoming Communities Plan.

Hamilton Kirikiriroa is incredibly diverse with Hamiltonians representing more than 160 ethnicities, and a long history of people moving here from other countries. Latest statistics tell us that more than 27% of the city's population were born overseas.

Moving town or country can be challenging, and a comprehensive plan will help us to make Kirikiriroa a more welcoming place to be. Our goal is to ensure that Kirikiriroa feels like home for anyone who chooses to live here. The wellbeing of the community is at the heart of everything Council does, and that includes the wellbeing of people who are new to the city.

This plan was translated into ten languages: Hindi, Simplified Chinese, Samoan, Tongan, Spanish, Arabic, Filipino, Urdu, Dari, and Burmese. It will continue to grow and develop. If your organisation would like to contribute, contact communityadvisors@hcc.govt.nz.





Inclusive leadership

Local government, tangata whenua and other community leaders work together to create, advocate for and continue to foster a welcoming and inclusive community. They lead a shared plan to increase connections between newcomers and existing residents.

- The Welcoming Advisory Group worked with hapuu (sub-tribe) aligning Welcoming Plans with He Pou Manawa Ora (Hamilton City Council's Pillars of Wellbeing Strategy), principles of partnership, participation, protection and prosperity.
- The Welcoming Advisory Group worked with Maaori to develop a plan that reflects the principles of manaakitanga (the expression of aroha, hospitality, generosity and mutual respect, whanaungatanga (relationship, kinship, a sense of family connection between people), rangatiratanga (sovereignty, self-determination, the right to exercise
- Council through its People, Wellness and Safety Team worked with Diversity Works to develop a Diversity and Inclusion Strategy.
- Council started offering unconscious bias and cultural awareness training for leaders and staff.
- Council continue to maximise its Maangai Maaori (Maaori voice representatives within the Council governance structure) relationships when engaging on key policies, plans and strategies.
- Council used Single Transferrable Voting in the 2022 Elections and now has two Maaori wards.
- Te Haa o te Whenua o Kirikiriroa has partnered and supported the delivery of the Welcoming Plan.



Welcoming communications

People of all cultures and backgrounds feel included, listened to and well informed through a range of ways that take into account their different communication needs.

- Council launched a new website in July 2022 with a dedicated Welcoming Communities Page.
- Council invited diverse volunteers for a photo shoot to add to the database of images for Council use in its promotions and campaigns.
- Council used translated posters to promote local election.
- Council promoted election registration and voting in other languages.
- Welcoming Communities Plan translated into five migrant and five former refugee languages.
- Council booked 72 translation jobs with Decypher Interpreting. This includes the translation for the Welcoming Communities Plan.
- Hamilton City Council made it easy for residents to have their say on its draft Long-Term Plan, with information available in Simplified and Traditional Chinese as well as Hindi.





Equitable access

Opportunities to access services and activities and to participate in the community are available to all, including newcomers.

- K'aute Pasifika Trust opened the Pasifika Fale, the first stage of the Pasifika Village which will include Social and Health Services as well as an early learning centre.
- Talents of the Pacific Academy continues to work with schools to provide an environment for young people to engage and reconnect with their cultural roots, build confidence and learn the essence and beauty of Pasifika culture through the art of song, dance and language.
- As part of the requirements of the Disability Policy Action Plan 2022 -2025, Council is undertaking Accessibility Audits for Waterworld and Gallaghers Pool complexes.
- Council started offering unconscious bias and cultural awareness training for leaders and staff.
- Settlement organisations continue to provide information that is relevant and enables newcomers to access services they need.



Connected and inclusive communities

People feel safe in their identity and that they are connected with and belong in the community. There are high levels of trust and understanding between members of the receiving community and newcomers.

- During Welcoming Week, Council partnered with Te Haa o te Whenua o Kirikiriroa to host the 'Poowhiri, waananga and kai' event as a cultural experience for newcomers.
- Council supported the collaborative celebration of World Refugee Day with Waikato Refugee Forum, NZ Red Cross, Refugee Orientation Centre Trust, Shama Ethnic Women's Centre, Hamilton Multicultural Services Trust and other related organisations to acknowledge the resilience of former refugees.
- Council funded 22 organisations through the Welcoming Communities Fund to support programmes and initiatives that contribute to the Welcoming Plan.
- Council in partnership with Tangata Whenua and ten other organisations successfully celebrated Welcoming Week and hosted events across the city.
- Hamilton Libraries worked with community groups in promoting cultures and their celebrations.
- Earthdiverse supported by Council and other funders continue to run 'diversity education courses and provide programmes designed to mitigate racism and discrimination and aspire to strengthen social cohesion in Hamilton.'
- Ethnic and community organisations worked together to celebrate Hamilton's diversity:
 - Africa Day
 - Hispanic Spring Festival
 - Lantern Festival Celebration
 - Multicultural Day
 - Unified Diwali Celebration
 - Shama Fashion Fusion
 - This is Kiwi - Indigo Festival
 - Welcoming Week Celebration
 - World Refugee Day





Economic development, business and employment

Communities maximise and harness the economic development opportunities that newcomers can offer. Councils work with business associations to promote the contribution that newcomer business owners and skilled migrants make to the region's economy.

- The following organisations delivered employment programmes:
 - NZ Red Cross supported 100 clients through Pathways to Employment Programme
 - HMS Trust – Migrant Employment Solutions placed 78 people to work
 - K'aute Pasifika assisted clients through their Employment and Education team
 - Refugee Youth Employment and Young Workers Resource supported young people to work
 - Council with Glenview Community Centre, K'aute Pasifika hosted He Waka Eke Noa with a number of employers to provide a drop-in opportunity for young people looking for work.
 - Waikato Hospital (Te Whatu Ora), Ministry of Education, Waikato Kindergarten Association and other organisations distributed copies of the Your Guide to Hamilton for their staff.
 - Workhub delivered Whakamana Programme to prepare young people for employment.



Civic engagement and participation

Newcomers feel welcome to fully participate in the community. Newcomers are active in all forms of civic participation.

- Council worked with high schools and ran sessions on civic education and other topics.
- Council events team provided opportunities for volunteers to be part of city events.
- Council ran voter education workshops with the Refugee Orientation Centre.
- Council worked with ethnic community groups to encourage and promote voting during the 2022 Local elections.





Welcoming public spaces

Newcomers and receiving communities feel welcome in and comfortable using public spaces.

- Using a co-design process, The Wise Group developed Houchens Retreat Centre into Tirohanga - the Houchens Wellness Place.
- K'aute Pasifika Trust opened its Fale as part of the K'aute Pasifika Village offering services at the heart of the city.
- Council parks and open spaces are accessible to individuals and community groups for sports and other celebratory or cultural events.
- Hamilton Libraries promote and support services and collections for ethnic and migrant communities.
- Nepalese community hosted the Tenzing-Hillary football cup at Ashurst Park.
- Chinese community celebrated Lantern Festival at Garden Place.



Culture and identity

There is a shared sense of pride in being part of a culturally rich and vibrant community. People feel their culture is respected and valued by other members of the community. There are opportunities to learn about each other's cultures.

- Council supported the development of identity spaces in the city such as the K'aute Pasifika Fale and village and the Al Rasool Community Centre
- Creative Waikato launched Whiria te Tangata 'to weave creativity and wellbeing into the diverse and under-represented communities they are already activating across the Waikato'
- Waikato Muslim Association in partnership with the University of Waikato supported by Council, hosted a Waikato Inclusivity Symposium in November 2022 to strengthen collaboration and engagement to create a dynamic and inclusive community.
- Council worked with ethnic community groups to encourage and promote voting during the 2022 Local elections.

CitySafe

The Council operates a public safety plan to prevent crime and anti-social behaviour. The CitySafe team works together to ensure Hamilton is a vibrant and safe city. The team work in the central city, and suburban retail areas. Camera operators work to spot issues within the central city and ensure City Safe patrols, Police or ambulance are dispatched when issues escalate.

The team also ensures anyone travelling by bus and using the Transport Centre feels safe. More information about safety is available in many languages on their website police.govt.nz/english

Neighbourhood Support

Neighbourhood Support Hamilton work in your community to help make our homes, streets and communities safer and more caring places to live. With more than 950 active groups in Hamilton, joining an existing group is easy. If there is no group in your street, we can help set one up. As part of a group, then you will cope better in civil emergencies, and provide safe environments for our vulnerable communities. For more information visit nshamilton.org.

Disaster Preparedness

What would you do when disaster strikes? In the event of an emergency, you may need to look after yourself for at least three days before the emergency services can reach you. Make sure you have enough water and food stored for you and your family. If you have a phone you will automatically be sent an Emergency Mobile Alert if lives, property and health are at serious risk. Some useful information about how to prepare for an emergency can be found at getready.govt.nz/prepared.

Accommodation

There are a few things to consider when looking for a home in a new city. Location, furnishing, power services, and whether you want to rent or buy are just some of the things to think about.

Location

Think about where you plan to work and if you have children, which schools they're likely to attend. Find out more in the education section.

Landlords can't discriminate against you

Landlords can't decide to not rent to you or end your tenancy for reasons that breach the Human Rights Act. Read about Tenancy discrimination.

Tenants and flatmates

The law differs if you are a tenant or if you are a flatmate.

If you sign a tenancy agreement with a landlord, you're a tenant. You are legally responsible for the place and you're covered by the Residential Tenancies Act.

Flatmates live in a house but don't sign the tenancy agreement, instead signing a flatmate agreement with the head tenant. Flatmates are not covered by the Residential Tenancies Act.

Tenancy agreements

Tenancy Services is part of the Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment. It also provides guidance on dealing with common tenancy issues. If you have a dispute that you can't resolve, they can help resolve your issue. If that doesn't help, it will be referred to the Tenancy Tribunal, which is managed by the Ministry of Justice.

It's important to have a written tenancy agreement (lease). Both you and your landlord sign this and keep a copy. It is a good idea to know your legal rights and responsibilities before signing a tenancy agreement – Tenancy Services can provide free advice.

The landlord cannot ask you to pay any money to change your tenancy agreement. The only exception is if they are holding the property while you decide whether or not to rent it.

Bond and security deposit

A bond equivalent to two-to-four weeks' rent is often required when you rent. The bond is for the landlord to cover any damage that you inflict on the house, or any unpaid rent. Both you and the landlord will sign a bond form, which the landlord sends to the Tenancy Service Centre. The bond is paid back when you leave the house if there is no damage you inflicted or any unpaid debts.

It's a good idea to take photos of the house including any existing damage before you move into the house.

Finding rental properties or houses for sale

You can look for a place to rent that suits your budget.

Healthy home standards

The healthy homes standards lay out the minimum standards for heating, insulation, ventilation, moisture and drainage, and draughtstopping in rental properties. Check if the rental has complied with the standards.

Furniture and homeware

Houses and most flats are advertised as unfurnished. As well as furniture shops, you can also buy some items second-hand.

Some popular places to find secondhand goods include trademe.co.nz, buy-sell-exchange.co.nz, Facebook community groups and Facebook Marketplace, garage sales and op shops.

Buying a home

Buying a home can be a complicated process, especially when you haven't bought before. [Settled.govt.nz](https://settled.govt.nz) has the 'buyer journey guide' to help you in the process. Using a real estate agent registered with the Real Estate Institute of New Zealand (REINZ) will help protect you from any financial and legal risks. REINZ is the professional regulatory body for the real estate industry.

To avoid legal problems, use a lawyer when buying a house. You can check propertylawyers.org.nz or visit conveyancing.co.nz for information on buying and selling properties. You can ask for a copy of the current site valuation and the property rates at the local council.

Once you have done the research and found a house you like, you should get a professional property inspection. The inspection will check the property's durability, workmanship and structural soundness.

Expenses

Costs involved in owning a home are listed in the subsections below.

Financial Advice

Reach out to Authorised Financial Advisors at fma.govt.nz to get help with financial decisions. These professionals can help you with budgeting, planning finances, setting up insurance, and buying assets like a car and a house, and you can find one at fma.govt.nz.

You can also go to sorted.org.nz, an independent money guide offering free, impartial information and calculators to help you manage your money.

Rates and land tax

Home owners pay rates which vary depending on the area and are based on the capital value of the property. The Council rates department can provide you with information about rates.

Insurance

You need insurance on your home, to cover any damage or loss to the property caused by theft, fire or flooding.

Maintenance and repair

Some work can be done by the owner, but many jobs need to be completed by a tradesperson, e.g. plumber, builder, electrician. If you are renting the house you live in, the homeowner is responsible for organising and covering the costs of any wear-and-tear repairs.

Heating

Homes in New Zealand are heated individually, including apartment complexes. Please visit eeca.govt.nz on the forms of heating and the costs. For advice and information on buying a home, visit reinz.co.nz or free call 0800 473 469.

Electricity and gas

When you move into a new home, your landlord will tell you the electricity or gas supplier for your property. Gas is available in most areas either using LPG cylinders or piped natural gas. Some suppliers may require you to pay a deposit which will be included in your first bill. Electricity and gas usage is metered (actual and estimate) and companies bill their customers monthly. Phone and internet

You can choose from a number of companies that will set up your home phone and internet services. Pricing plans vary widely and it is always good to compare services and rates.

Television

Television in New Zealand is digital. You will need to have Freeview, Sky, or other digital services to watch TV. You can also watch TV online at TVNZ.co.nz or threenow.co.nz.

Transport

Hamilton is within two hours' drive of two of the country's main sea ports (Auckland and Tauranga), and Auckland International Airport. There is a good transport network in and around Hamilton Kirikiriroa, including bus, walking, and cycling networks. We also have a domestic airport, and an intercity train, Te Huia. Most transportation caters for those with a disability. Bus and train timetables and fares are available at the Hamilton Transport Centre, the Hamilton Kirikiriroa i-site Visitor Centre, and visithamilton.co.nz.

Go by bus

There are 35 bus services in Hamilton, with 12 buses travelling to regional centres. Bus tickets can be bought online at beecard.co.nz, in person on the bus from the driver or from the University of Waikato at the Student Centre Te Manawa.

Transit, our easy to use real-time bus tracking app, is free to download from the App store and Google Play. Fares are calculated by the number of zones you travel through.

For more information, visit busit.co.nz, call 0800 4 BUSLINE (0800 4 2875 463), or visit the friendly team at the BUSIT counter inside the Hamilton Transport Centre, on the corner of Bryce Street and Anglesea Street.

Go by train

Connecting the Waikato and Auckland, Te Huia train runs to and from Auckland with stations in Frankton, Rotokauri, Huntly, Papakura, and the Strand. Find out more at tehuiastrain.co.nz.

Go by taxi

All taxis in New Zealand must be registered to a taxi company, which sets the fare and operates 24 hours a day. Fares are charged based on distance and the amount of time the journey takes.

There are ride sharing and transport services on demand operating in Hamilton such as Uber, Ola, and Mevo. You can download the apps on your Android or Smartphone.

Driving in Aotearoa New Zealand

- You must drive on the left hand side of the road.
- You must wear a seatbelt.
- It is illegal to drive while you have drugs in your system
- It is illegal to drive if you are over the alcohol limit. If you are under 20, the alcohol limit is zero.
- You must follow the speed limit (round white signs with red outline).
- Lock your car and keep valuables out of sight.

Driver licensing

To drive in New Zealand, a person must have a valid driver license. If you have a valid or current overseas driver's license or international driving permit, you can drive using this permit for a maximum of 12 months from the date of your arrival in New Zealand.

Buying a car

When you buy a car, it is registered under the Motor Vehicle Register and if you are the first owner, you are issued registration plates.

You can buy a car from a registered motor vehicle trader, a car auction or privately. The safest way to buy a car is from a trader who is registered with the Motor Vehicle Trader register. Visit motortraders.govt.nz or free call 0508 668 678 to check.

Warrent of Fitness

Your car must always have a Warrant of Fitness (WOF) to ensure your vehicle is roadworthy.

Search online for your local car garage WOFs centres and testing stations.

Car licensing (registration)

Car licensing and registration fees is a compulsory fee that helps to pay for road projects and safety programmes.

Make sure you buy your car from a trader on the Motor Vehicle Trader register. To check, visit motortraders.govt.nz or free call 0508 668 678.

Education

Schooling is compulsory from your child's 6th-16th birthdays, either via a school enrollment or via homeschooling with permission from the Ministry of Education.

The New Zealand education system has five levels:

- Early childhood education (ages 0-5)
- Primary school (ages 5-10)
- Intermediate school (ages 11-12)
- High school (13-18)
- Tertiary education (18+).

Your child is eligible for free education at a public school if:

- you have a work visa
- you have permanent residency
- you are a New Zealand Aid Scholar or a PhD student in a New Zealand university.

Alternatively, you may choose to send your children to a private school where you will pay fees.

The school year:

- runs from late-January to early December for secondary schools
- runs from late-January to mid-December for primary schools
- is divided into four terms.

Please visit the Ministry of Education website at education.govt.nz for the exact dates for school terms.

Most schools in Aotearoa New Zealand have 'zones' - areas where majority of their students live. You don't have to live within this area for your child to be able to attend the school,

but it makes it more likely for your child to be accepted into that school. You can see the zone for the school at educationcounts.govt.nz/find-school.

After school care

After school care programmes are run in many areas. The Government helps to pay some of the fees to help low income parents and caregivers with childcare they can afford. Visit workandincome.govt.nz or free call 0800 559 009 to check if you are eligible.

Examinations

The National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) is the national public examination system from Year 11. Visit nzqa.govt.nz/ncea for more information.

Learning support

Learning support helps children who may need additional support to achieve or engage in education. Children are able to access these services for a variety of support needs, including behaviour, speech, language, mobility, or vision support. Visit education.govt.nz or call 07 858 7130 for information about the schooling system in New Zealand.

Tertiary Education

Universities

There are eight universities in New Zealand including The University of Waikato based in Hamilton. All university students must be able to communicate in English and entry requirements may include assessment of English competence to qualify. International students need to pay the full rate of tuition fees.

Other tertiary education providers

There are many other tertiary education providers in the area. Polytechnics offer degrees, diplomas and certificates in vocational, technical and professional fields. For more information about courses and enrolment, contact the institution directly.

Working in Aotearoa New Zealand

Employment and business

To work in New Zealand, you must either:

- be a New Zealand or Australian citizen
- hold permanent residency
- hold a work permit
- meet conditions which allow you to work on a student or visitor permit.

Income tax

As soon as you arrive in New Zealand and even before you start a job, make sure you get an Inland Revenue Department (IRD) number. IRD collects income tax from people who are employed or run a business. To apply for an IRD number, you need to give proof of identity, e.g. your passport or your driver licence. Please visit ird.govt.nz for more information.

Qualifications

Your international qualifications may need to be confirmed by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA). Visit nzqa.govt.nz or call 0800 623 243 for more information.

Healthcare

New Zealand's public healthcare system is free to New Zealand citizens, permanent residents, work visa holders, or former refugees.

Health check-ups such as General Practice visits, dental, skin, and eye check ups are not free. If you need emergency care but don't meet the above requirements, you will still get the help you need.

A full guide to our healthcare system is available at moh.govt.nz/eligibility.

Family doctors

Your family doctor (also known as a general practitioner, or GP) will be your first contact with the healthcare system. It is free to enrol with any GP. You must pay for each GP visit, but you may be eligible for Government subsidies.

A friend or support person can stay with you during most medical examinations.

Publicly-funded health services

- Free public hospital treatment
- Free treatment at a public hospital 24-hour accident and emergency clinics

- Free or subsidised health care for those suffering from acute or chronic conditions
- All children 13 years or younger, and who are eligible for publicly-funded health services can receive free daytime general practice care
- From 1 July 2023, people no longer have to pay the standard \$5 prescription charge (prescriptions are already free for children aged 13 and under).

This applies to \$5 co-payments for prescriptions by approved providers. Prescriptions from specialists and non-publicly funded prescribers will still attract a \$15 co-payment.

For further information talk to your general practice or pharmacist.

- Subsidised fees for visits by family members to GPs
- Subsidised fees for visits to physiotherapists, chiropractors and osteopaths when referred by a GP for an accident case
- No charge for most lab tests and x-rays, except at private clinics
- No charge for healthcare during pregnancy and childbirth, unless provided by the private medical sector
- No charge for GP referrals to a public hospital for treatment
- Free breast screening for women aged between 45–69 years.

Specialists

GPs will sometimes refer you to a specialist for treatment. It is free to access a specialist through the public health system, but you may go on a waiting list which can take a few months. To access specialist advice quickly, you (or your medical insurer, if you have private insurance) will be required to pay all fees.

Accident Compensation Corporation (ACC)

If you have an injury either at work or at home, ACC provides personal injury cover to New Zealand citizens, residents and temporary visitors. Visit acc.co.nz or call 0800 101 996 for more information.

Immigrant and refugee children

Adults and children who enter New Zealand as refugees or immigrants will need an assessment of their documented vaccination status and an appropriate catch-up programme planned.

Regardless of their immigration and citizenship status, all children aged under 18 years are eligible to receive scheduled vaccines. All children are also eligible for Well Child Tamariki Ora services, regardless of immigration and citizenship status. Children who have been previously immunised in a developing country may have received some vaccinations.

However, they are unlikely to have received all of the vaccines currently on the New Zealand immunisation schedule. For immigrant children, a catch-up immunisation plan may be needed.

Dental care

In New Zealand, dental healthcare is not funded through the public health system, although basic dental care for children is free from birth until they reach 18. To enrol, contact 0800 TALKTEETH (0800 825 583). Most people register and pay for dental care services with private dentists.

Waikato Hospital also runs a dental department for emergency dental treatment.

Private health insurance

If your budget allows, private health insurance helps you to access specialist treatment sooner. The website at consumer.org.nz has useful information about types of health insurance and reliable companies.

Community Services Card

If you are a permanent resident with a medium or low income, you could be eligible for a Community Services Card. This can help you and your family with the cost of health care. You will pay less for doctors' fees and prescriptions. Visit workandincome.govt.nz or free call 0800 999 999.

Legal assistance

Lawyers are required to provide confidential and independent advice. Legal fees vary, so enquire about fees before requesting services. Free Legal advice is available at the Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) and Community Law Waikato. Call the local CAB on 07 839 0395 and Community Law on 07 839 0770 (eligibility requirements apply).

Legal ages

A range of age limits apply to different activities under New Zealand law. For instance, it is illegal to leave a child alone at home under the age of 14 or you must be 18 years before you are legally allowed to purchase cigarettes and alcohol. Human Rights Commission

It is illegal in New Zealand to discriminate on the grounds of race, ethnic background, sex, age, disability, religion or family status, among other things. If you feel you have been discriminated against, you can contact the Human Rights Commission. The Commission provides free and independent help. Visit hrc.co.nz or free call 0800 496 877.

Protection against family violence

Violence is unacceptable. The Police take family or domestic violence very seriously. Domestic violence includes things like physical, mental, emotional, financial, verbal, and sexual abuse, scare tactics, controlling behaviour, threats, and intimidation.

Adults and children who enter New Zealand as refugees or immigrants will need an assessment of their documented vaccination status and an appropriate catch-up programme planned. Regardless of their immigration and citizenship status, all children younger than 18 years are eligible to receive scheduled vaccines, and providers can claim the immunisation benefit for administering the vaccines.

All children are also eligible for Well Child Tamariki Ora services, regardless of immigration and citizenship status. Children who have been previously immunised in a developing country may have received some vaccinations. However, they are unlikely to have received all the vaccines currently on the New Zealand immunisation schedule. Many countries, including European countries, do not have the hepatitis B vaccine included in their national childhood immunisation schedule. For immigrant children, a catch-up immunisation plan may be needed.
