

2. Disincentives for more SNAs

At the moment, as our experience shows, creating an SNA is a clear disincentive because:

- 1. We have lost control over the use and therefore ownership of that land
- 2. We will be required to maintain the SNA at our own expense (fencing, weeding etc)
- 3. The creation of it has been at our expense with little or no help from HCC

3. What we propose

Landowners who want to create or enhance a SNA get all or some of the following

- 1. Materials and help to do so (plants, fences, help with on-going maintenance etc)
- 2. Rates relief to compensate for the loss of land
- 3. Purchase of the land by HCC with payment processes similar to the land taken for roads and other essential infrastructure under the Public Works Act
- 4. Whatever just and fair processes it takes to get Hamilton City 30% forested
