Lincoln County Hospital

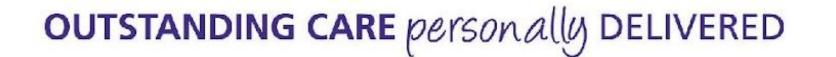

Activity during COVID



- Pre-COVID: 270 active volunteers recording around 4000 hours per month.
- May 21: 187 were still registered with us as many have taken the difficult decision to step down permanently from volunteering.
- Summer 21: recruitment campaign 56 applications.
- **Sept 21:** 108 volunteers are now active at the Trust and recorded 2458 hours. 83 volunteers are still opting to stay paused.

Over 100 existing and new furloughed volunteers worked during the height of the pandemic. All our COVID volunteers received a lapel badge and certificate from the Chief Executive thanking them.



Pandemic lessons learned



- Use of technology for online DBS clearances, and more online core training worked well and now adopted permanently.
- Virtual interviews worked well and reduced delays in scheduling so will retained in some cases.
- Recruitment process much more straightforward with only one reference now required rather than two.
- Voluntary Services team (in agreement with placement supervisors), now organise the placement of volunteers directly into their roles, minimising delays waiting for the supervisor to be available.
- Pre COVID recruitment to start date was around 8 weeks before COVID; now as little as 2 weeks.

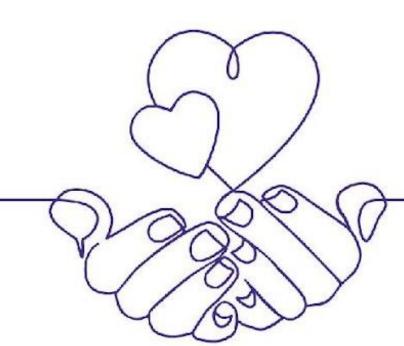






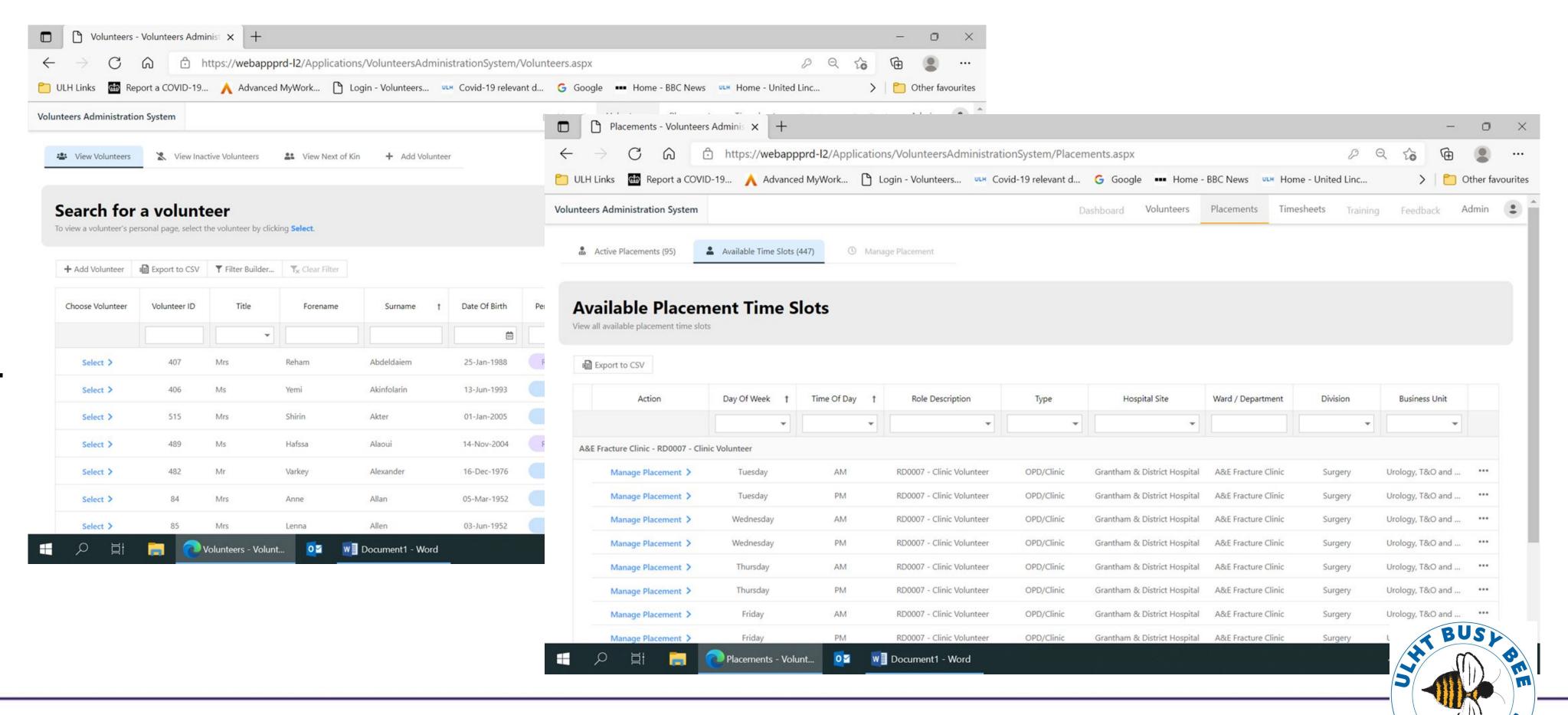
Database





During the pandemic Andy worked with our in house IT team to build a bespoke database that went live in June 2021.

Can track all activity, volunteer status, recruitment progress and enable reporting. A dashboard is also in development.



Opportunities



From the dashboard we can see where our challenges, gaps and opportunities are:

- 1. Allowing for a number of volunteers remaining paused for personal or health reasons we could bring a further 63 volunteers back into role by supporting existing supervisors or considering alternative placements.
- 2. We could bring 22 more placements into action through focused recruitment and supporting new supervisors.
- 3. By increasing recruitment, placements and activity we could achieve a 50% increase in shift coverage.

So we started thinking...

How can we grasp these opportunities?



Busy Bees – the idea



Our key issue is placement level supervisor capacity due to staff vacancies and shortages, operational pressures, reluctance to take on supervisory role and inability to therefore support new volunteers.

Solution: using the NHSEI funding recruit 'our own' volunteer supervisors, that sit within our Voluntary Services team who have their own 'hive' of response volunteers able to be deployed where needed most.

Project aims:

- Recruit x 2 WTE Volunteer Supervisors
- Recruit 25 Busy Bee volunteers per site, seek out and support new placements and support paused volunteers to return to an active role.
- Develop the Response Volunteer model (Busy Bees) that could potentially become substantive if successful.
- Increase the number and diversity of volunteer placements with a focused recruitment drive within Eastern European and BAME communities.

Busy Bees - model

- Supervisor touches bases with ops teams to see where greatest need is unless already alerted.
- Busy Bees 'muster' and are deployed to where needed.
- As and when that need is fulfilled they return to muster and receive a new task.

Response volunteer roles:

- Emergency Departments & Admissions units
- Discharge lounge and ward discharge support
- Patient buddy & mealtime support
- Family Liaison



The Clinical Site Manager and Operational Matron can contact the Busy Bee Supervisor anytime during the day for any additional support.

When they are released the volunteer will return to the muster point ready to receive a further request. 09:30 and 13:30 The
Busy Bee Supervisor
will contact Clinical Site
Manager and
Operational Matron
following the bed
meetings to reach in
and see where help is
most needed.



The Busy Bee Volunteer attends and fulfils the required task and on completion checks that all is done and whether any further help is needed.

Details will include:

- How many volunteers
- For what purpose
- · How long for
- Who to report to on arrival

The Supervisor liaises with the Busy Bee Volunteers and arranges for someone to respond to the request and then confirms with the destination team who will be arriving and when.

Busy Bees - logistics



The original plan was for Scott and Alexandria to make contact with ops centres to find out which areas need assistance, though the reality is that they are being contacted beforehand as they have bleeps and portable phones and are visible and available.

'Corridor' requests are now a thing!

Additional elements:

- Reaching in to existing volunteers & supervisors, checking how they are & if any help or support needed.
- Reaching in to areas who do not have volunteers to explore opportunities.
- With Andy, Hilary & Marion reaching out to paused volunteers to help them return.









Busy Bees – measuring impact





Our database enables detailed tracking of all our volunteer activity.

We are also introducing a real time survey for patients and services receiving Busy Bee assistance and Busy Bee's own experience. Managed via iPads Martyn will receive the responses and provide reports.

Aims & achievements so far





- 50% increase in number of volunteering placement opportunities.
- 80% increase in returned volunteers.
- 50% increase in volunteer shifts from.
- 25 new volunteers recruited on each site.
- Responder hours rising during the project:
 - Month 1: 8 hours / day; 40 hours / week
 - Month 2: 16 hours / day; 80 hours / week
 - Month 3: 24 hours / day; 120 hours / week







- 7 Busy Bees recruited & 10 further applications in progress
- 17hours, 55 minutes of Busy Bee volunteer time given so far.
- Promotional day held in Boston Market and at a local church in Boston

Promotional work



- Communications officer member of our steering group.
- Posters, social media, videos on the website.
- Trust Board story; executive sponsorship.
- We already have uniforms so decided to have arm bands for our Busy Bees, these are 'snap' bands so can fit over any size arm and over polo shirts or fleeces.















Scott's first 2 weeks



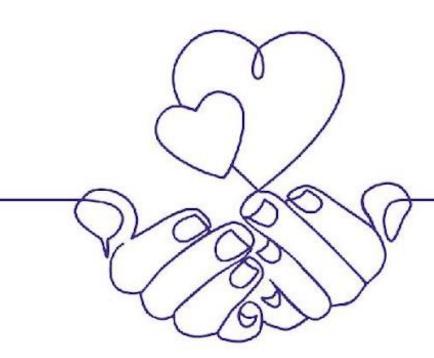
- Role Scoping; exploring new responsibilities that may be undertaken by our Busy Bees and other volunteers.
- Department In-Reach to discuss our volunteer offer.
- Recruitment; promoting Busy Bees to existing volunteers and bringing them on board.
- Training to existing & new volunteers.
- Supporting existing and new volunteers, checking in & offering guidance and supervision as required.
- Actively promoting Volunteering and Busy Bees internally & externally.
- Logistics all those little jobs that make the role work.
