OUR PHILOSOPHY BEHIND RECREATION

Above all, our desire is that recreation is simply another tool for bringing your students into a living, meaningful relationship with Jesus Christ. It is an opportunity for your students to bond together and for walls to breakdown, allowing trust and friendships to be built. Hopefully, this trust and friendship will translate into enriching conversations in your breakout sessions and cabin times.

BE INTENTIONAL WITH RECREATION

Encourage Your Students To Get Involved. If you do not want to participate or have a bad attitude, they will follow you. Whether you win or lose, remember the point is to have fun and to build unity within your group.

Be Respectful. It is easy to get a little too competitive, even as counselors. Remember, these students are watching you!! If you are yelling at the refs or being rude to the other teams, it can just turn ugly. Show your students what it looks like to be competitive with integrity.

Dress Appropriately. Help us out by making sure your students are dressed in such a way that whether they are bending over or leaning down while playing Broom Hockey they won't be revealing themselves inappropriately.



BROOM HOCKEY



TEAMS

- * Teams may be comprised of several churches or one church may have several teams.
- * Each team consists of 8 campers. Campers may only play for one team in the tournament. Counselors may not play in camper tournaments.
- * No co-ed teams.
- * Tournament play is gender specific.
- *Develop a creative, appropriate, and wholesome name for your team.
- *Register your team during breakfast.

RULES

- *No cleats, blades or shoe modifications of any kind permitted on the ice at any time.
- *Each game starts with a face-off and is 4 minutes long.
- * All players must hold onto their broom at all times.
- * For a goal to count, the puck must break the plane of the back side of the goal line and be under the height of the cones.
- * Goalkeepers must remain on both knees and stay in the goal box. At no time may a goalkeeper consistently lay down between the cones.
- * Goalkeepers may trap the puck with their hands and/or feet. When the puck is trapped, players must move back to allow the puck to be put into play. The goalkeeper must use the broom to put the puck back into play.

SUDDEN DEATH

- *In the event of a tied score, the game will go into "sudden death" overtime.
- *Goals are widened, and the first team to score wins.

SAFETY

- *No climbing or sitting on the railing.
- *Keep all snow and foreign objects off the ice rink.
- * When entering/exiting the rink, always use the gate closest to the ark window.
- *Helmets and gloves must be worn at all times while on the ice.



BOXSLEDS

- * Each church is allowed to send down 1 boxsled with at least 2 but no more than 6 riders
- *Register your churches Boxsled at the final counselor meeting

CONSTRUCTION

- * You are allowed to use duct tape and cardboard only to create your boxsled—painting or putting anything on your boxsled other than duct tape and cardboard will result in disqualification.
- * Boxsleds can be built before coming up to Hume, but hopefully students will put on the finishing touches while here at camp. You may build your sled in Memorial Chapel or other indoor locations; we just ask that you and your students clean up after you are done.
- *Put all trash and excess cardboard in designated locations.
- * You may purchase additional cardboard and duct tape at the general store if you run out.

CHECK-IN, SCORING, + JUDGING

* Only the riders, a counselor, and a few of the students who helped build the box are allowed at check-in. One student will have I minute max to explain the concept behind the sled. Judges base their score on two components: the creativity of the boxsled and the quality of the run.

SAFETY

* Each rider must be wearing gloves, a long sleeve shirt/sweatshirt and long pants.

THE GOLDEN MAILBOX

- * The church that receives the highest score in the Boxsled Blitz gets to take home the Golden Mailbox for an entire year.
- * If your church wins the Golden Mailbox it is up to you to bring it back when you return the following year and try to win it again.
- * You as a church can add anything you want to the mailbox (eg. a picture of your youth group, wheels on the bottom, have everyone sign it, etc.). Be as creative as you can be!
- * The only rule is that you may not remove anything from the mailbox that is already there.
- * Our hope is that the mailbox comes back every year with something new added to it.

THE HEALTH CENTER

The Health Center is located at the bottom of the Tube Run. HOURS // 8:00AM-11:00PM DAILY

- * A nurse is readily available during open Health Center Hours.
- * If you or your camper is injured or feeling ill, please check with a redcoat prior to visiting the health center to be sure a nurse will meet you there.
- * The Health Center is closed during chapel times. Please encourage your camper to wait until after chapel unless there is an emergency (i.e. allergic reaction, seizure, etc.). If there is an emergency during chapel, find a redcoat or staff member to radio the nurse on call.

AFTER HOURS

- * Emergencies only—Please use discretion regarding incidents at night.
- * An emergency is something which cannot wait until the following morning.
- * Please bring the camper to the redcoats at Ponderosa Lodge before going to the Health Center after hours.

COUNSELOR RESPONSIBILITY

- * It is your responsibility to see that your campers' health and safety are maintained while at camp. Ask students if they have any activity restrictions or allergies. Encourage campers to drink plenty of water, be at all meals, and wash hands for 20 seconds before every meal. Ask your students if they take regularly scheduled medications and remind them at mealtimes to get their scheduled dose.
- * Try to remain calm when someone is injured. When injury occurs, your responsibility is crowd control. Contact a Hume staff member to transport patient to the Health Center.
- * Stay with the injured camper.

MEDICATION

* Under California State Law, you are not allowed to administer any medicine to a minor, even over the counter medicines. There is a lock box in your cabin for you to keep your own medicine and personal belongings—please store them safely in there. Students are not allowed to have any medicine on them or in the cabin, other then emergency EpiPens and inhalers. Students may pick up their medicine in Ponderosa Lodge during the following times:

Breakfast......7:45-8:45am Lunch.........12:00-1:30pm Dinner........5:30-6:45pm Bedtime......9:30-10:30pm

IN THE EVENT OF A TRULY LIFE THREATENING EMERGENCY, CALL 911 FROM ANY PHONE.

Your church is responsible for transportation of any/all injured campers. If your church arrived in a bus, or if the situation is life-threatening, Hume Lake will arrange transportation.

CPR

If a camper is found unconscious & unresponsive, please do the following:

- 1. Survey the scene // Make sure the scene is safe.
 - ***If there is possible head/back injury, have someone help keep the camper's head/neck in the position you found them.***
- 2. Check for responsiveness of victim. Ask, "Are you okay?"
- 3. Send someone to call 911 and get an AED.

(Automatic External Defibrillator).

- * If you are alone, call 911 and get an AED. Then start CPR.
- * If the victim is a child, initiate 5 minutes of CPR. If help has not arrived, then leave the victim to get help.
- 4. Check for a pulse.

If no pulse after 10 seconds, start compressions with two hands over the chest. Push hard (2 inches deep) and fast (to the rate of the song "Staying Alive").

Keep doing CPR until trained staff take over

Look for medical alert jewelry and question any of the witnesses while you are preparing to do CPR.

If a bystander also has CPR knowledge, they can assist you while you are waiting for the medical staff to arrive.

SESSION ONE:

Cabin Discussions

1. What are things that I go to, to try and find meaning in my own life that are apart from God?

DEVOTIONAL ONE:

Read Proverbs 3:5-8. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. Be not wise in your own eyes; fear the Lord, and turn away from evil. It will be healing to your flesh and refreshment to your bones."

Our human tendency is to trust our own selves and do what we want to do, rather than trusting in God as Proverbs 3:5 instructs. In what ways do you lean on your own understanding over seeking God?

According to Proverbs 3:6, God promises to guide us if we acknowledge Him in all our ways. What would it look like for you to acknowledge God and trust Him with your whole being?

Read the following verses from Psalms and Proverbs:

Psalms 111:10 "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom; all those who practice it have a good understanding. His praise endures forever!"

Proverbs 1:7 "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction."

Proverbs 9:10 "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is insight."

After reading these three verses, describe what you learned about "fearing the Lord." What does it involve?

As we learn to fear the Lord, Proverbs 3:7 beckons us to turn away from evil. It is important to recognize that turning away from evil does not simply require us to turn away for a short time, but to do a complete 180 degree turn from the things that tempt us and then run toward God. The Bible urges us to wholeheartedly worship the Lord, and when we do this our heart's posture is toward glorifying Him and resisting the temptation of this world. Not only will we turn away from evil, but when we do this, God takes it a step further and provides us with healing and refreshment. God desires to restore and transform us, ultimately making us more into the image of His Son. In what ways do you see God transforming you more into His image?

SESSION TWO: Cabin Discussions 1. If I'm born into sin, is there any way that I can escape being a sinner? 2. How does fearing the Lord help alleviate the sin in my life?

DEVOTIONAL TWO:

Read 1 John 2:15-17. "Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world—the desires of the flesh and the desires of the eyes and pride of life—is not from the Father but is from the world. And the world is passing away along with its desires, but whoever does the will of God abides forever."

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God's Word instructs us to not love the world, meaning we are not to seek satisfaction, purpose, and meaning from the world over God's will and His Word. The things of this world are fleeting, but God and His Word endure forever.

As God's creation, we find our true meaning and purpose in Him. In what ways do you care more about the things of this world than God?

In what ways do you place your identity in the things of this world? How can you learn to find your true identity in God?

Read Ecclesiastes 2:11. "Then I considered all that my hands had done and the toil I had expended in doing it, and behold, all was vanity and a striving after wind, and there was nothing to be gained under the sun."

The Bible tells us that Solomon is the wisest man who ever lived. Even after chasing the things of this world, he declared that "there was nothing to be gained under the sun." Through all of his experiences with sin, NOTHING satisfied him. There was no meaning or purpose found in any of those things. Sin leads to destruction, pain, and emptiness.

Describe how you have experienced the destruction, pain, or emptiness of sin. How have you filled your life with things that are temporary and fleeting?

Romans 6:23 says, "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." The reality of sin is that it leads to death and separation from God. Sin is selfish, evil, and is characterized by anything that goes against God and His Word. But thankfully, there is hope in Christ. Because He loves us so deeply, He provides a free gift so that we can experience abundant and eternal life with Him.

In what ways have you experienced the hope of Christ in overcoming your sin?

SESSION THREE.
Cabin Discussions
1. Have you ever wrestled with the idea of 'eternity'?
2. What is the only way for us to live an eternity in Heaven?

CECCION THREE

DEVOTIONAL THREE:

Read Ecclesiastes 3:9-11. "What gain has the worker from his toil? I have seen the business that God has given to the children of man to be busy with. He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, he has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end."

In verse 11, Solomon writes that God "has put eternity into man's heart." What do you think this means?

Through Ecclesiastes 3:11, we learn that within every one of us there is a deep longing that can only be satisfied through God. We were made to be in relationship with God for eternity. We long to be with God in heaven. We have a deep and internal longing for true restoration of this world. Whether we can admit it or not, we intrinsically know that we need saving.

When in your life have you experienced a longing for a Savior?

How have you experienced a desire for eternity with God?

Read the verses from the Gospel of John that address the good news of Jesus Christ:

John 3:16-17 "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

John 14:6 "Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

The Bible clearly states that because God loved the world so deeply, He sent His Son Jesus to live a perfect life, to die a death that we deserved, and to overcome death through His resurrection. He is alive and seated at the right hand of God today. Through this, He saved us from eternal separation from God. He reconciled us to have peace with God. We have hope and eternal life because of our Savior Jesus Christ.

What does this mean for you personally?

What questions do you have about the Gospel?

SESSION FOUR: Cabin Discussions 1. If the purpose of our entire life is to "fear God and keep His commandments," how should that look in our daily lives?

2. How do you spend your time? If you desire to spend time with people and

things that are important to you, where does time with the Lord fall into that?

DEVOTIONAL FOUR:

Our theme verse for the entirety of the weekend is Ecclesiastes 12:13: "The end of the matter; all has been heard. Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of man." From this verse we learn that as Christians our purpose is to "fear God and keep His commandments." Throughout the weekend, we learned that fearing God necessitates a reverent and worshipful view of our Holy God, knowing that He is Creator and Sustainer of the universe. When we are tempted to find meaning and purpose in the things of this world, it is important to remember that our meaning and purpose as Christians is found in glorifying God through a life lived in obedience to Him and His Word.

As you prepare to head back home, how are you going to put into practice fearing God and keeping His commandments?

In what ways will you lean into your church community to help you put these things into practice?

Psalm 90:12 says, "So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom." In this verse, the psalmist, Moses, asks the Lord to reveal to him how fleeting his life is. In doing so we gain wisdom, humility, and understanding. We learn that our lives are truly so short and brief in the grand scheme of eternity, and that God is in control of it all.

As you really sit and think about this reality, how are you going to use the short time you have on this earth to glorify God?

In God and His Word true wisdom is found, not in ourselves. **How do we** remain humble and submit to God's wisdom? Do you trust that He is a good God?

God gives us all of His attention 100% of the time. How will you give Him your attention, reverence, and obedience?
